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2 Regular Session 4/28/22 1 (The Meeting was Called to Order at 7 p.m.) 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'll call the meeting 3 to order, Pledge to the Flag. 4 (Pledge of Allegiance) MAYOR HUBBARD: Please remain standing for a 5 6 moment of silence for Lynda Lee Biedermann, 7 Richard DiBlasi, Carl H. Haasper, John F. O'Shea, 8 Hope Ellen Tuthill and Mary Tuthill. (Moment of Silence) 9 Thank you. Okay. I've got 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: 11 the annual Tree Committee report. Per the 12 ordinance that creates the Tree Committee, they have to give us a yearly report. I'm going to 13 just read through this, it's not long. 14 I also want to, you know, commend the work 15 16 that the Tree Committee does. Somebody calls up about a bad tree, or whatever, they contact 17 18 Village Hall. Jane and Polly are really fast to go out and look at it, give us an answer what 19 needs to be done right away. So I really 20 21 appreciate what they do as the Committee. Okay. 22 2021 Annual Report to Mayor Hubbard and 23 Trustees. 24 The Village of Greenport Tree Committee is 25 pleased to present this report of its activities

in 2021, a year in which we in the Tree Committee
strived to return to our normal activities as we
dealt with the lingering effects of the pandemic.
Our advisory committee members are appointed, and
our actions are governed by the Tree Ordinance of
1991, which requires an annual report and public
outreach regarding the importance of our trees.

8 Main Missions: Removal of hazardous Village 9 trees is part of our first mission: Safetv. 10 There have been more than 348 trees removed since 11 the re-establishment of the Tree Committee in 12 2007, including 23 removals in 2021. We have the 13 Village road crew to thank for removing the majority of these trees. Trees and stumps beyond 14 their capacity are put out to bid for pruning or 15 16 removal and stump grinding.

Diversification of Species: Since 2007, we have vigorously upgraded and diversified the public trees we have planted in the Village, having overseen the planting of over 548 trees, including 37 in 2021. Our tree census work continues as we chart new gains and losses.

Maintenance and Pruning: Maintaining proper
pruning and care for the existing trees that grace
our Village is a huge task. By supporting

judicious pruning, we can help preserve our 1 2 existing canopy. Again in 2021, dozens of street 3 trees were pruned by Village crews. We continued 4 monitoring our ash trees and consulting with the 5 DEC Forest Health Diagnostic Lab regarding any 6 suspected infestation of the Emerald Ash Borer. 7 Three infested ash trees were identified in the 8 Village and in 2021 we had them removed.

9 Community Wide Events: Outreach and 10 Education: In our annual Arbor Day Program, we 11 provided and helped plant the thirty-third annual 12 senior tree, an October Glory Maple, at Greenport 13 High School. Although we were able to provide the 14 annual tree dedicated to the graduating class, we were able to perform our other regular outreach 15 16 efforts, distributing conifer seedlings to the 17 fourth graders, and leading a discussion on the 18 importance of trees, only on a limited basis for 19 reasons of pandemic restrictions. We had to 20 forego our visit to the class, but were able to 21 deliver the seedlings and a hand-out on their care 22 and planting to the elementary school. We hope to 23 resume this very rewarding activity in the coming 24 year.

We have also helped to provide trees in

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honor of or remembrance of family and friends.
 The memorial trees are currently being recorded,
 catalogued, and mapped.

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The Committee thanks Mayor Hubbard and the Board of Trustees for their continued support of our mission.

And they're continuing a list of people that 17 18 want trees. We have several requests of people that want new trees. The other stuff was taken 19 The Village Clerk is keeping track of that. 20 out. 21 We're not going to do a spring planting this 22 year, just because of trees being taken down and 23 all the stump grindings. But we will be doing a 24 fall planting. So if anybody in the public that's 25 watching, anybody that's here, if you have a

1	request for a tree in a certain area at your
2	house, in the neighborhood, whatever, contact
3	Village Hall and let us know. Okay? That's all I
4	have on that. Thank you.
5	All right. Now we have a presentation,
6	Laura Klonher (phonetic)?
7	LAURA KLAHRE: Klahre.
8	(Laughter)
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Klahre? Okay, I'm close.
10	Okay. From North Fork Dark Skies Coalition. Just
11	come on up and
12	LAURA KLAHRE: Oh, that's great. Yeah,
13	thanks so much for inviting, totally appreciate
14	it. So, yeah, my name is Laura Klahre. I chair
15	the North Fork Dark Sky Coalition. It's a
16	volunteer group, obviously on the North Fork. We
17	have been together since, oh, geez, 2000 no.
18	What are we in now? Oh, so 2020. I don't even
19	know what date it is anymore. But for my real
20	job, I have my own organic farm, so Blossom Meadow
21	Farm.
22	And in November last year, I read that in
23	the town paper that the Village was going to
24	update their Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan.
25	And I thought, holy cow, you know, that's great,

and it would be really cool if the Coalition could help in any way with your initiatives.

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So then we contacted Peter Clarke and had 3 4 some great discussions about where the Village Board was thinking of going with things. And then 5 6 I started reading through your Village Code, and 7 then also reading other Local Waterfront 8 Revitalization Plans that were written throughout 9 New York State. And as all of you are much better versed on this than me, it seems that anything 10 11 that's in the LWRP can then -- once it's in there, 12 then New York State DOS will fund it.

13 So as my college professor said at one time, 14 "A good thesis is a done thesis." So we are not 15 trying to make this more difficult, but actually 16 easier for you. And it seems that putting just 17 perhaps like a few phrases in the LWRP will make a 18 big difference.

So not -- I'm here as a -- you know, I hate when I've been in meetings where people come and they tell you what to do, right? Whereas this is your show and I'm just trying to help out, right?

So Susan Harder, who is part our -- of our
North Fork Dark Sky Coalition, she's also the New
York Delegate for the International Dark Sky

1 Association. She wrote the code for Village of 2 Sag Harbor, and she said that she would definitely be available to write any code in the future that 3 4 you might like or want. 5 So I guess this would be like better to have 6 it be a discussion. 7 (Laughter) 8 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Well, I think -- if I may, 9 Mr. Mayor. MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 10 11 TRUSTEE CLARKE: I think the important thing 12 for us to know at this public meeting, and to let 13 the public know, as well as to be inclusive of the 14 full Board, when you presented the concepts to me 15 and their adoption in other communities and how it 16 works in the LWRP, I did share that information with the Board. So they've seen the materials 17 18 that you've shared with us. 19 LAURA KLAHRE: Oh, great, good. 20 TRUSTEE CLARKE: I shared them both with the 21 Clerk and with our Administrator, Mr. Pallas. And 22 I think one of the important things to connect with is exactly what you're saying, you know, how 23 24 can you help us with what we're -- what we're 25 doing.

9 Regular Session 4/28/22 1 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. 2 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Because many of our activities already embrace the principles in --3 4 LAURA KLAHRE: Good. TRUSTEE CLARKE: -- how we're moving 5 6 forward. The Administrator -- if I may, 7 Mr. Mayor. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. TRUSTEE CLARKE: The Administrator shared 9 with me that there is already work being done to 10 11 convert all the street lamps in the Village to an 12 LED model, which by its very nature, he informed 13 us, was compliant with the Dark Skies Coalition 14 requirements, as you had shared them with us. LAURA KLAHRE: 15 Right. 16 TRUSTEE CLARKE: So the good news is things are happening. We also are in the process of 17 18 waiting for answers to an RFP for help with the revisions to the LW -- LWRP, and then subsequently 19 20 any code changes that would take place out of 21 So the timing's very good. that. 22 So I think it really is, I would say, maybe 23 question and answer, if you have specific 24 questions for us or anyone on the Board, or the 25 Administration has a question for what's required

in us moving forward and how we can work together, I think that's the best use of our time.

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3 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah, definitely. You know, 4 I agree, we're doing a lot of this stuff already as a nation, right? And so it boils down to 5 6 fixtures that are fully shielded, so meaning that 7 they're facing directly downward, that they are on 8 motion detectors, so that you're not wasting 9 electricity, and then the light source itself should not be anymore than 2700 kelvin. 10 Around 11 marine environments, people are saying 2200 12 kelvin, which means it's more of an amber light, 13 right?

Like you see on some people's porches now, 14 how they're using those really blue LED bulbs, 15 16 right? And so that's like a 4000 kelvin, 3500 kelvin, 5000 kelvin bulb. It looks like you're in 17 18 a hospital room. And I'm trying to stay out of 19 the hospital, so I don't want that on my front But -- and it also creates more glare when 20 porch. 21 you're driving. So they really -- everybody's 22 been putting in 2700 kelvin light bulbs, or even more amber than that. 23

24 So, I guess for the Village Administrator, 25 the street lights that you're putting in, do you

1 know what the kelvin light source is? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I took that as a 2 note, but I don't -- I don't recall specifically. 3 4 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I do know that there 5 6 are certain specifications that are required for hybrid lighting, so there's a little difference, I 7 8 think, when it comes to, you know, light on a 9 house or a business, as opposed to a streetlight. 10 LAURA KLAHRE: So there are -- I forget. It 11 was a village in Nassau County that actually some 12 citizens that brought a lawsuit against them, 13 because the light -- the light source that they 14 put in was way too bright and is actually trespassing into their bedrooms. So Southold 15 16 Town, when they updated theirs in 20 -- what, 17 2020? They used 2700 kelvin, and they have seen 18 substantial savings, as I'm sure you've done all 19 the math. But 2700 kelvin seems to be the going 20 for street lights. 21 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure. 22 LAURA KLAHRE: And everybody seems pretty happy with that. But, again, in some areas, they 23 24 are doing 2200 kelvin, like along a dock, right? 25 So then it's less glare, and so then it's not a

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1 marine hazard, you know, navigation hazard. 2 But, yeah, when I read about the lawsuits 3 and then realized that they were putting in these 4 really bright lights, you know, similar to like a hospital room, you know, you could just imagine 5 6 that going into your bedroom at night. 7 I think it's interesting that people are now 8 putting flagpole downlights on -- you know where 9 the ornament is on top of the flagpole? So instead of that ornament, now people are putting a 10 11 downlight. One manufacturer of that is 12 EcoMountain, and I've talked to the guy himself, really nice man, and helped develop the 13 technology. And so that way, instead of having 14 these tremendous floodlights that are just kind of 15 16 shining up and making it, you know, glare when you're driving, but also just making the sky glow, 17 18 by putting that simple downlight feature and using the amber light on that, it really does make a 19 marked difference as well. 20 Are you -- so with the LWRP, since you have 21 22 a lot of docks and everything, if you put some action items, just a few, in the revitalization 23 24 plan, then if you did any work on those docks and

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were going to upgrade that lighting, New York

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State DOS would pay for it. So I don't know what
 your capital projects are like for the marina,
 but, you know, even when you're driving places and
 you see a light that is not shielded versus
 shielded, it's amazing how much easier it is to
 drive by, and, hence, the same with boat
 navigation.

8 So do you guys have any other questions 9 or -- I mean, the motion sensors are a big one. 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We wouldn't put that 11 on a streetlight.

12 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. No, I hear you, yeah. But -- but with other things, like parking lots, 13 motion sensors, a lot of communities now have 14 lighting code and exterior lighting codes in 15 16 general, that within a half an hour of the business closing, the parking lot lights need to 17 18 be off, and so they're either on a timer or on their motion sensors. 19

And there's a lot of data now showing that, you know, crime is reduced by putting lights on motion sensors in like parking lots, because then cops and people will actually look when that light is on, right? If the light is always on, then you don't even bother looking, so it is a crime

1 deterrent. And yeah. 2 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Do you want to see if there 3 are any questions from the Board and the Mayor? 4 LAURA KLAHRE: Definitely. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, just the only --6 LAURA KLAHRE: I'm sorry. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: You said that Susan has 8 looked at the LWRP. If you have some suggestions 9 or stuff that's in the document now, before we 10 get -- you know, we're out for RFP, we're getting 11 people to consult --12 LAURA KLAHRE: Right. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- us on that and try to 14 finish it. But if you have recommendations at this point now that you could put together and 15 16 send to the Village Clerk and she'll distribute it to the Board, so that we'll be one step ahead of 17 18 the consultant trying to go forward with that 19 stuff that, you know, that's worked in Sag Harbor or other places. Give us those recommendations 20 21 now, would probably shorten the process. We've 22 been doing this LWRP for too long. 23 LAURA KLAHRE: Oh, my goodness, yeah. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: And we want to get it finished. 25

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LAURA KLAHRE: I hear you.

MAYOR HUBBARD: So, if you have some recommendations, please forward that to us.

4 LAURA KLAHRE: Your current Greenport LWRP talks about only -- exterior lighting only with 5 6 regard to light trespass. So it says, "Lighted facilities and lighted signs shall be placed and 7 8 shielded in such a manner as to not cause direct 9 light to shine on other properties, and shall not 10 be permitted to create a hazard on a public 11 street." But there is no measurable -- like light 12 trespass is measured in foot candles. So in 13 Southold Town Code, it says .5 foot candles at the property line. But in the New York State School 14 Guidelines, it actually says .15 feet off of the 15 16 property line. So it might be good to actually 17 tag a measurable -- you know, a measurement to 18 that.

And then in the one-pager that I created for you a few months ago, I took excerpts from other LWRPs dealing with exterior lighting code, so then you could just cut and paste, you know? Control C, Control V. And, you know -- and these LWRPs have already been approved by DOS, so it would make it pretty easy.

Regular Session 4/28/22 1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, good. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I do have one question. LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. 3 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know that in the 5 Village of Sag Harbor -- we have shipyards here, 6 we have shipyards, we have two of them. And we 7 have, you know, not only Mitchell Park, but we 8 also have along Stirling Harbor small marinas. LAURA KLAHRE: 9 Uh-huh. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And insurance liability 11 creates a contradiction with your Dark Sky 12 theories, okay, to be honest with you, as you have 13 to create a safe environment. So I'm not quite That may be something you need to think 14 sure. about, or at least maybe in your present -- in 15 16 your putting together information for the Village Board, I think that we have commercial enterprises 17 18 that have parking lots that have to be lit for safety reasons. 19 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. I'm not saying get rid 20 21 of lights, I'm saying reduce the glare, so put the 22 light where it's needed. So by putting shields, shielded fixtures, then the light is directed 23 24 downward, and so the light that's coming out from 25 the side, which isn't helping you figure out where

1	your parking space is or anything else, it just
2	kills your eyeballs. So all of that is taken into
3	consideration with marine navigation.
4	Susan Harder has been the New York Delegate
5	for the International Dark Sky Association for
6	probably like 15, 20 years at this point. So we
7	don't take this invite here lightly, and so we
8	would never want to suggest a road that you you
9	know, that you would be pissed going down in the
10	future, so
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's not the
12	intent.
13	LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What I'm asking is if you
15	have information, it would be helpful, especially
16	if you're discussing the LWRP.
17	LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As far as the navigation,
19	I'm very familiar with the issues from sea looking
20	to land
21	LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: with lights being too
23	bright for navigation.
24	LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Although a lot of the

1 mariners do use those lights for points of --2 points of navigation. So i.e., if the North Ferry is -- at many times has requested that certain 3 4 lights be either toned down or turned off, okay? 5 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, as I said, that's 7 what I'm looking for. It's not saying whether 8 you're just --LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. 9 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- looking for 11 information, and I think it's important that we 12 have that information, because we are not 13 Sag Harbor, okay? We're a little bit more 14 different. LAURA KLAHRE: Oh, yeah. 15 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's --17 LAURA KLAHRE: Which is great. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's where I'm coming 18 19 from. 20 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah, I hear you. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 22 LAURA KLAHRE: It is -- definitely, this is 23 not a scenario where you would just take all of 24 Sag Harbor's, you know, code and put it directly 25 into yours. But I think that because they're also

19 Regular Session 4/28/22 1 a maritime village, it's a good starting point. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, I've read the code, 2 3 that's okay. All right. 4 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. 5 6 LAURA KLAHRE: So --ATTORNEY PROKOP: I have a question. The --7 8 when you were talking about 2700 kelvin, kelvin, 9 isn't kelvin the temperature of the filament that generates the color of the light? 10 11 LAURA KLAHRE: Correct. 12 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So what is -- what is 13 the -- do you have standards for lumens or light 14 candles that you recommend? 15 LAURA KLAHRE: So lumens, the brightness in 16 general, that's -- in most code that I've read, it's based on a per-acre or a per-parcel 17 18 breakdown. I don't have that off the top of my 19 head. I've been weeding raspberries and 20 blueberries for days. So we could definitely get 21 that recommendation for you, but I don't know it 22 off the top of my head. 23 But, yeah, definitely, lumens per acre is a 24 real concern as well, so -- and all the Dark Sky 25 legislation that I've seen not only talks about

1	the fixtures themselves, but also lumens, so I
2	should have brought that up. But I don't know
3	what the off the top of my head, I don't know
4	what the going lumens are per acre, but, actually,
5	Susan Harder would.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
7	LAURA KLAHRE: So
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any other questions?
9	(No Response)
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, thank you very much
11	for coming.
12	LAURA KLAHRE: Thank you.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll look over this, and
14	we'll be in touch. And, you know, if you could
15	help us out with, you know, any of the wording and
16	stuff like that, that
17	LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. So what do you think
18	like the next steps and time frame are? I mean,
19	just so that I could like report back.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, right now, our
21	LWRP, we're out for a consultant.
22	LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not going to have that
24	back until next month, and then we'll be voting on
25	that to get actually start working and

1	reviewing what it is	•
2	LAURA KLAHRE:	Great.

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MAYOR HUBBARD: So I would say probably
June --

LAURA KLAHRE: Great.

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- where we start getting 7 into the nuts and bolts of it. So if you had 8 something to us, you know, for June, that we could 9 sit there and try to work what your -- your goal 10 and our goal together to make it all so that the 11 LWRP comes out as a better product.

12 LAURA KLAHRE: Yeah. I mean, it's just great that by putting it into the Waterfront 13 Revitalization Plan, that then DOS will easily 14 fund it. You know, just one sentence, and all of 15 16 a sudden they'll be like, "Oh, yeah, okay," now -- now this funding is accessible to you. 17 18 All right, good. The information that we 19 have already sent you is really, I think, the first -- you know, here it is, okay, then you chew 20 on it and think, okay, what else do you need from 21 22 So thank you for your time. us. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 24 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you for coming, 25 Laura.

Regular Session 4/28/22 1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Public to address the 2 Board on any topic? Any from -- anybody from the 3 public want to speak? 4 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Sure. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Come on up. Just name and 6 address for the record. 7 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Margaret deCruz, 25 8 Washington Avenue. 9 Actually, it's a question relating to Dark 10 Skies, because I'm not sure. Are you guys talking 11 about or looking into residential codes, also, for 12 how people are lighting their houses and outside, 13 and all that kind of stuff, or are you just 14 talking about --15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right now, no. We're 16 looking at just -- their questions are more about 17 what's worded in the LWRP with the waterfront and 18 elsewhere. 19 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Okay. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know what we have in 21 the code for lighting. Light is not supposed to 22 emanate beyond the property line, which is what we 23 I do have some neighbors of mine that have have. 24 really bright spotlights. 25 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Right.

23 Regular Session 4/28/22 1 MAYOR HUBBARD: And when they come on, they 2 shine up my whole backyard. MARGARET DE CRUZ: Right. So that's also 3 4 supposed to be down. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 6 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Like that's what I mean. Like, if we could inform the public, I think it's 7 8 very important about --MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 9 10 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Yeah. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, we can. We can pull 12 the code back up and look at our the code on the 13 outside lighting and all. 14 MARGARET DE CRUZ: Okay, thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: You're welcome. Anybody 15 16 else wish to address the Board? 17 ERIC KOCH: Eric Koch, 127 Sterling Avenue. 18 I was in a month ago to address a clause regarding 19 the stipulations that were set against 123 20 Sterling Ave, it was Clause 3. It reads the units 21 shall only be sold to purchasers that can 22 demonstrate they're first-time homebuyers and do 23 not own any other residential property. And I had 24 kind of walked you guys through my pitch as to why 25 I thought that was unfair, and then asked you to

change it to or see it in the light of the units
shall be sold to purchasers that can demonstrate
they are first home -- first-time homebuyers, that
part would stay the same, and do not own any other
residential property within Southold Town.

6 So I think what is kind of confusing about 7 the way it is right now is that SONYMA -- I see 8 why you guys are trying to do that and it totally 9 makes sense. But SONYMA considers you a 10 first-time homebuyer if you haven't had a primary 11 residence for the past three years. So just because -- you know, yes, you have people who may 12 13 have never bought a house before applying, totally good, but you could also have people who bought 14 house 10 years ago, sold it after seven, and have 15 16 now been renting in the Village for three years, and would still qualify as first-time homebuyers. 17 So --18

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Could you give -- could 19 vou give that example again? I'm sorry. 20 It's 21 important that I -- I missed you halfway through 22 your example and it's important that I get it. Please, if you don't mind, would you repeat that? 23 24 ERIC KOCH: Sure. So SONYMA, which I think 25 is where everyone extrapolated the guidelines for

the affordable housing units, and the pricing and 1 2 the income, or really the income levels for the applicants, says that you would be considered a 3 4 first-time homebuyer if you had not had a primary residence for the past three years. 5 So I 6 understand what this clause is trying to do and it 7 totally makes sense, but by honing in on "Does not 8 own any other residential property," it kind of makes it unfair, in my opinion, because it 9 basically says like, okay, you could own 10 11 commercial property, you could have invested in a 12 bunch of stock over the course of how many years, whatever it is. 13

In my case, I invested in a piece of 14 residential property like 14 years ago. I am by 15 16 far like -- I pass with flying colors for every other aspect of this application as far as where 17 18 my life is, my income levels, what income levels, what I'm -- you know, how I'm trying to establish 19 myself here. Like things are crazy, crazy hard 20 right now, and, you know, I'm trying to get my 21 22 business going. My business is going good, but I can't figure out how to live here and do it at the 23 24 same time. 25 I -- basically, the other thing I wanted to

say is I apologize for not tackling this when you 1 2 guys were talking about it. So what happened there was I was here when Mr. Pawlowski had 3 4 basically submitted the first plans, and I was aware of that first sheet, first set of 5 6 stipulations in regards to the property at the 7 time that they set back in 2007. So when 8 Mr. Pawlowski got that all to passed and 9 construction was good to go, I said okay, like 10 those are the rules. And since then, I've gotten out, gotten prequalified for the loan already, 11 12 like I set up the money, I'm good to go. And then I wasn't aware that you guys were then adding on 13 to those stipulations in, I guess, last year, in 14 the fall, and I also wasn't here. So I apologize 15 16 for missing that, and I apology for being late to 17 the party.

From what I understand, those units have --18 those units haven't sold yet. You may have seen 19 the article in the paper last week about the 20 21 building in its entirety selling, and him 22 submitting a new offering plan to the State. So I thought that door might be still open, if you 23 24 would like to make changes, if you guys would 25 consider that.

Yeah, the example that I gave last week or 1 2 the other month was that in the way it's written, 3 you know, someone could own property in a 4 completely different market, let's say like Arizona for example, much more cheaper to live, 5 6 whatever it is, maybe I went to school there, graduated, bought a house, and then moved back. 7 8 And if you look at every other stipulation, like, 9 clearly, my life is here. I work here, I live here, I've been here for four years now. 10 I'm 11 trying to make a life here and not in Arizona. 12 And I don't have a piece of property in Arizona, I'm just making an example. And under that 13 situation, I wouldn't be eligible for -- to apply 14 for the units. So that's kind of where I was 15 16 arguing. And, you know, in my case, I chose to invest in an invest -- in a residentially 17 18 property. Let's say I could have invested in 19 stock, I could have invested in purchasing a property, I could have invested in anything. 20 Ι 21 shouldn't be punished for having invested in 22 residential property. So the other side of that is I've never had 23 24 a primary residence, so this would be

25 theoretically my first home.

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So I just wanted to check in with you guys and see if that had crossed your table since I was last here. And if not, if you would take some time to consider it. And then as far as me pitching this to you guys, I -- you know, how do I check in to see where your heads are at? And, you know, is it I come every month and ask? Is it -you know, how do I learn the status of my -- my issue, and what you guys, you know, feel, or how you feel about it, and if anything is being done about it, or it's, you know, been side-tabled,

Okay. I mean, my feelings 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: 14 on it and what the -- consulting the Village Administration and everything else, the 15 16 stipulation agreement, we had to sign off on that. We talked about it with the whole Board. The 17 18 whole Board passed a resolution for me to sign the 19 stipulation agreement. That was sent in to 20 Department of State. The new owners of the 21 property are still waiting for that to be 22 approved, and it's not something that's opened to 23 be rediscussed or changed at this point. 24 Even though the units haven't ERIC KOCH: 25 sold and Mr. Farrell has to resubmit a

whatever it is, basically the status?

1 new offering? 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, they got a C of O with 3 the stipulation agreement in place, and our 4 wording is part of that stipulation agreement. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's part of -- that's 5 6 part of this. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: So that's what we did six 8 months ago. That's the only way they could go 9 move it to the Department of State, is we had to 10 rectify what we wanted as the stipulations. 11 was signed off by us, the Village Attorney, the 12 Attorney and the --13 Neighborhood Association. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: The developer, and that was 15 all sent to New York State. We're just waiting 16 for New York State to give them final approval of that paperwork for them to go move forward to be 17

19 ERIC KOCH: Do you understand what I'm 20 saying, though, is -- did you see my perspective 21 in that it is kind of unfair in the way that it's 22 written concerning --

able to start selling the units.

23 I mean, I see your MAYOR HUBBARD: 24 perspective, but, I mean, to me, just because 25 SONYMA makes some law that says because you

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That

1 haven't owned a house in three years, you're a 2 first-time homebuyer --3 ERIC KOCH: No, that's --4 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- that to me, I don't see 5 that as being a first-time homebuyer, in my own 6 perspective. I'm not speaking legally, just 7 mvself. If you've had three or four homes, you 8 sold them all, did whatever, I don't see how you 9 reset the clock to go back as a new first-time 10 homebuyer after three years. 11 So that's also an industry ERIC KOCH: 12 standard as well. So if you look at the lending industry as a whole, three years is the mark, 13 that's -- you know, that's not just SONYMA making 14 15 it up. 16 So I guess that's the other question, is for these applications, you know, are you guys 17 18 reviewing each particular one? Is the Board going to pick, you know, based on Mr. Farrell's 19 suggestions? How's that going to go? 20 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That goes to our --22 that's going to our Housing Authority to review the applications to meet the criteria for the 23 24 Village of Greenport's housing; is that not 25 correct?

31 Regular Session 4/28/22 1 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We have nothing to do 2 with the selection process, if that's what he was 3 asking. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. We only -- we 5 only review the application. 6 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We will just confirm 7 that they meet the qualifications. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Qualifications, that's it, we're not picking them. 9 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We don't -- we're not 11 reviewing them. We're not any part of the 12 selection process. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, that's what --14 ERIC KOCH: So that's why I was tying it back to SONYMA, because I think the guidelines are 15 16 going to be very strict to SONYMA. So I don't think the Housing Authority is going to go and 17 18 say, "Oh, Tony Smith bought a house 20 years ago, he's not a first-time homebuyer." They're 19 20 basically going to say, like, regarding SONYMA's 21 guidelines, do they qualify? If the answer is 22 yes, then they're good to go. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They don't follow SONYMA. 24 ERIC KOCH: So --25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Isn't SONYMA that you

haven't owned? I don't understand your -- your
interpretation of SONYMA I don't think is correct,
because you -- you could buy a residence and then
decide to -- to rent it out, which is basically
what you did. And then you think that if you do
that for three years, you qualify again as a
first-time homebuyer? I mean --

8 ERIC KOCH: It has to be -- so it has to be 9 considered your primary residence. It was never my primary residence, that's what I'm saying. 10 So since I've owned the property, it was never a 11 12 primary residence. It was actually a land swap within the family. We just continued to rent it 13 out and it's in my name. So it's basically a job 14 opportunity. So if I bought it and lived it in 15 16 for three years, that's a different sorry, then it was my primary. In this case, it was never my 17 18 primary, I've never had a primary.

Plus, I'm saying this -- all I'm saying here
is yes, okay, first-time homebuyer qualification,
I think that's totally fair, and then doesn't own
any other residential property within Southold
Town. So it's universal, it's not like, oh,
you're making an exception for one guy. That kind
of makes sense, because it's like, okay, clearly

1	they're trying to live here, they want to be here.
2	They don't have another place to live within
3	Southold, right? And it's you know, there's
4	I'm not there's no there's no cheats there.
5	So that's all I was asking for.
6	The reason I keep referencing SONYMA is
7	because when we look at the you know, the
8	156,000, for example, now that's all coming from
9	SONYMA, that's all. They're the ones writing the
10	rules there, and that's what the so
11	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'll have to look at this
12	and advise the Board. I mean, I don't see that.
13	Based on what I've heard so far, I don't see that
14	there would be any change made, but I will take a
15	look at it and advise the Board.
16	ERIC KOCH: What would what would lean
17	you towards making it? What would and what
18	would you see differently that would make you say
19	okay, actually, there is cause for a change here?
20	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, I think that
21	we're in we're the position that we're in
22	now is fixed, I don't see that we can reopen it.
23	And I'm not sure that what you're I'm not sure
24	that your position, your position is what the
25	intention of the project was to begin with. I

think the project or the intention of the project was to give people a chance that don't own -- were looking for their first investment in real estate to be where they lived, their home, to be able to take advantage of that, not -- not the situation that you're proposing.

7 ERIC KOCH: That's exactly my situation, 8 though. This would be my first home, otherwise, 9 I'd own a home by now. And I'm trying to live 10 here, there's just nothing to buy, there's nothing 11 to afford. That other piece of property was a 12 long, long time ago in a completely different 13 place, completely different situation.

And to what I said earlier, like, okay, 14 instead of buying a property, I could have went 15 16 out -- it doesn't single out anyone else who invested in stock or commercial property, even. 17 18 You know, I could -- I could own 10 different 19 commercial properties and still be eligible for So the clause in general is just not --20 this. 21 it's too broad and it's no good.

22 So thank you for considering that. My last 23 question is how do I keep in touch with where your 24 head's at, and who do I ask to say, "Hey," you 25 know? How does: --

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, the minutes of this Board are -- the minutes of all the Boards in the 2 Village are available online within a very short 3 4 amount time after a meeting. ERIC KOCH: Okay. So you guys basically 5 6 discuss it in private and then I could --ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, we don't discuss it in 7 8 private, we discuss it publicly, and then -- and 9 then there's a transcript that's published online. 10 So you could attend the meetings, or you could 11 review the transcript, it's up to you. 12 ERIC KOCH: Okay. So there's a meeting 13 after this where you guys --14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: There's no meeting after 15 this, this is the meeting. 16 ERIC KOCH: This is it? 17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah. There's a meeting 18 every --19 ERIC KOCH: So that's what I mean. Like you 20 said you'll look, but how do I know? How do I 21 know once you've looked and how you feel after you 22 look? How do I know? 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because, if you look at 24 the web -- the Village website, you'll see the 25 agenda for the work session. You'll also see the

agenda for this meeting posted ahead of time that has all the information as to, number one, what we're going to discuss, and on the regular meeting here is the actual resolutions as to what we're going to discuss and vote on.

6 So we make the Village over the last --7 since 2009, since I've been here, we have been 8 pushing out as much information to the public to 9 be as transparent as possible, to make the 10 community, the Village community know the workings 11 of our Board.

ERIC KOCH: I understand, so yeah. So I read the agenda for this one, for example, didn't see it said. So if I read the agenda for the next one, that's where I'll see it. Like if it's on there, then you guys are talking about it. If not, then it's --

18TRUSTEE PHILLIPS:Best thing to do is to19check the work session, check the work session20agenda, because that's where we actually discuss.21Okay? That creates the agenda for this meeting.22ERIC KOCH:23MAYOR HUBBARD:24All right.25I believe the

24 main part of your question is, the only thing that 25 you're going to get an interpretation from the

1	Village Attorney is can this be changed at this
2	point, when everything has been submitted already
3	to the Department of State. It's there, it was
4	signed off by everybody. We're going to confirm
5	that that's a done deal, basically, is what the
6	Village Attorney is going to look at and reveal.
7	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.
8	TRUSTEE CLARKE: Yes.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: If it's a done deal, it's
10	just a done deal and it's not going to be changed.
11	TRUSTEE CLARKE: I don't mean to
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
13	TRUSTEE CLARKE: make the waters anymore
14	murky, but I from my perspective of what we've
15	gone through to produce that document and to get
16	it this far, I would say there's very, very little
17	chance that that would be amended on based on
18	the difficulty in getting all the parties that
19	were involved in agreement. It needed to be
20	agreed upon by multiple parties and signed upon in
21	order to be moved forward. To undue that, I
22	think, would require to go through all the same
23	process again. So where I may be sympathetic to
24	some of the things you might be saying, I don't
25	believe that anyone here has any power bestowed on

ERIC KOCH: Gotcha. 3 4 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Just to be very 5 straightforward. 6 ERIC KOCH: Yeah, I --TRUSTEE CLARKE: The chance of this being 7 8 changed I think is very slim. 9 ERIC KOCH: I understand, Yeah. I was 10 basically reaching out to see if there was any way 11 the Board can make like a light exception to 12 what --13 TRUSTEE CLARKE: I mean, I wish we could, 14 because I'm sure we're all sympathetic to your plight and how you see things. But, at the same 15 16 time, I don't see that as being possible, from 17 what I've experienced in the past three years 18 working on that. 11	make changes in the the stipulation many times
12	and it just was impossible to do.

15	original stipulation. I certainly did not read
16	that. That bit about the residential property was
17	not in the original stipulation.
