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CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: All right. So 1 2 welcome back, everyone, here in the new year. 3 Happy New Year to everyone. 4 I'm going to open the regular meeting of 5 January 6th, 2014. It is now 5:09. Not so 6 bad, Lucy. Come on, relax, it's a new year. 7 We have two items on the menu today, on 8 the agenda. 9 AUDIENCE MEMBER: I like menu better. 10 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah, I do, too. That's why it just comes out like this. And I 11 don't know if we have Mr. --12 MR. BROKOW: Yes. Bennett Brokow. 13 14 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Bennett Brokow is 15 here? 16 MR. BROKOW: Yes.

17	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So we can
18	start with Item #1. This would be a
19	discussion and possible motion on an
20	application submitted by Matthew Ritter on
21	behalf of Bennett Brokow, in parenthesis, 449
22	Main Holding, LLC, the owner of the commercial
23	property located in the Historic District at
24	449 Main Street. The owner would like to
25	install replacement windows, rebuild Yankee

gutters, restore the elaborate gingerbread 1 trim at the gables, replace the front porch 2 railings and remove the kitchen entry 3 overhang. This is Suffolk County Tax Map 4 5 #1001-4-7-18. 6 Mr. Bennett. 7 MR. BROKOW: Yes. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I will move the 8 chair for you so we can be a little bit more 9 personal. 10 MR. BROKOW: Oh, okay, up front and 11

12 personal?

13	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah, up front and
14	personal.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So you sit right
16	here and you tell us what it is that you want
17	to do and then we'll decide.
18	MR. BROKOW: What's what.
19	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: What's what,
20	right?
21	MR. BROKOW: Okay. All right.
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So let me
23	just see what we have filed here. So this is
24	a beautiful home that you bought.
25	MR. BROKOW: It is nice, isn't it? The
1	inside is gorgeous.
2	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's commercial,
3	right?
4	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And residential.
5	
6	It's the residential portion?
7	MR. BROKOW: I no. I'm taking out

8	the kitchens. It's going to be
9	MEMBER WALOSKI: Which room is it going
10	to be?
11	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Is this working
12	here?
13	MR. BROKOW: Yes. It's right next to
14	Special Effects. It's in between the hotel
15	and
16	MEMBER WALOSKI: Oh, that's that
17	wonderful house, yes.
18	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, yeah. The inside is
19	in great
20	MEMBER WALOSKI: It needs a lot of work.
21	MR. BROKOW: The floors are in great
22	shape.
23	MEMBER WALOSKI: Are they, because I
24	went in there last year and I thought that
25	there was a lot of work that needed to be done

1 inside.

2 MR. BROKOW: Oh, yeah. We had to3 restore all the plaster.

4	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah, I thought it
5	was
6	MR. BROKOW: Six weeks, yeah.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. We do not
8	have a lot of images, or pictures, or
9	anything. So is everybody
10	MEMBER BORELLI: I know, that's a
11	beautiful home, yeah.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I mean, everybody
13	knows where this
14	MEMBER CLARK: Yes.
15	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes
16	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: house is?
17	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's a beautiful
19	historic house, and I know it needs a lot of
20	work and you're willing to
21	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, that's okay. That's
22	what we're doing.
23	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: do part of
24	this.

25 MR. BROKOW: Yeah

1	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So, Mr. Bennett,
2	please tell us what you are proposing what
3	needs to be done.
4	MR. BROKOW: Okay.
5	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I know Matthew is
6	working on your property.
7	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, yup.
8	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And tell us what
9	you need us to approve.
10	MR. BROKOW: All right. I'll take you
11	through it.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes.
13	MR. BROKOW: We'll restore like we're
14	going through the siding, replacing all the
15	rotted siding with new planks wherever is
16	needed. Matt is rebuilding the Yankee
17	gutters, the soffits, trim, fascias. We
18	removed an overhang that was really something
19	that was maybe added on in the it looked
20	the '50s or '60s. It was really it had a
21	corrugated plastic roof, and so that has been

22 removed.

23	There's also another add-on that was
24	built, it's like a box in the back. It was
25	built on dirt, and the Building Inspector

thought that was structurally unsound and 1 2 requested that we remove it, if possible. We 3 looked into it and we are applying for a demo permit to remove it. It's not really -- it 4 5 was not anything original, it was more of a hodgepodge. But it's still up, if you care to 6 7 look at it. I would welcome your input on 8 that also. 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: One thing. I 10 mean, since we don't have any photos or any plans --11 MR. BROKOW: Correct. 12 13 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: -- that you 14 submitted, it's a little bit difficult for us 15 to fully understand what you're trying to do. 16 We know your building from -- because we're walking by or driving by every day, but we are 17

18 not familiar with the specific details.

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19 MR. BROKOW: Okay.
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20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So that's why you
21	have to be a little bit more specific, or we
22	may have to ask you to submit some photos or
23	additional information so we can make a
24	decision.

25 MR. BROKOW: Okay. Well, I did submit

1	photos to the Building Inspector when I made
2	this application, so I don't know if they were
3	passed on to you.
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah, okay.
5	MEMBER CLARK: How many?
6	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Excuse me. David
7	Abatelli?
8	MR. BROKOW: Half a dozen.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Do we I mean, I
10	don't have those.
11	MR. BROKOW: It's not a big deal.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Do you have them?

13	MR. BROKOW: I can get them to you.
14	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right, right.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So I do not have
16	them in this file here that you gave us. We
17	may not be able to come up with, you know, a
18	decision tonight, but we want to
19	MR. BROKOW: Okay. That's fine, sure.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: listen to you,
21	because we I think we all like very much
22	what you're trying to do, but we may need more
23	information
24	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, that's fine.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: in order to
1	sign off on this.
2	MR. BROKOW: Okay.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay? So

4 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes. If you could give
5 us like specs on the windows, you know, what
6 you're planning on putting in.

7 MR. BROKOW: Yes, I can. Basically, you8 had recommended on my last project the

9	Andersen replacement windows, and I'm using
10	those windows to replace the sizes up to what
11	Andersen will build.

12 MEMBER MC MAHON: Standard, right. 13 MR. BROKOW: The windows that are too 14 large for the Andersen replacements, we're retrofitting those with insulated glass. So, 15 basically, those large beautiful windows will 16 17 remain pretty much original, except they will have retrofitted insulated glass. So that's 18 what we're doing with the windows. 19

20 MEMBER WALOSKI: So you would be

21 repairing the existing windows and then

22 putting in a supplement?

MR. BROKOW: The smaller windows we're
replacing with the white Andersen replacement
windows.

MEMBER WALOSKI: Do you have -- have you
 made a decision on how many mullions and - MR. BROKOW: There were no mullions on

4	the building at all on the original windows,
5	so it's just clear glass.
6	MEMBER MC MAHON: So they're
7	one-over-ones is what you're saying?
8	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, exactly.
9	MEMBER WALOSKI: Oh, all right.
10	MR. BROKOW: That's what's there.
11	MEMBER WALOSKI: All right.
12	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's what you said?
13	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah.
14	MEMBER MC MAHON: Okay.
15	MR. BROKOW: And that's all original
16	glass that is there. So there will be some
17	new ones, and the large windows we will
18	retrofit with insulated glass.
19	MEMBER WALOSKI: Right. Okay, got it.
20	MR. BROKOW: So you're going to see
21	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So all the new
22	replacement windows will be insulated windows?
23	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes.
25	MR. BROKOW: We're doing the first floor

1	this year due to costs, you know, budgets and
2	stuff like that, and then next year we'll go
3	upstairs. Inside, you know, we're just pretty
4	much restoring what's there, you know,
5	refinishing the floors. We pretty much redid
6	all the plaster in the house and
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah. This is not
8	a registered landmark, so we are not really
9	you don't we don't really have any say on
10	what you're doing on the inside, as long as
11	the Building Department is fine with what
12	you're doing.
13	MR. BROKOW: Right.
14	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You may need a
15	permit for some changes or structural changes.
16	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
17	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: But that's not
18	what we are looking at. We are basically
19	looking at the exterior, the outside.
20	MR. BROKOW: The exterior is going to be
21	pretty much
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we're talking

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on siding, on windows and the reconstruction
or repair of anything that you want to do
about the porches, and the trim work, and that
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1 kind of thing. 2 MR. BROKOW: We're pretty much keeping 3 it as original as possible, replacing rotted 4 wood with good wood. The front porch has a 5 vinyl rail system, which will be replaced with 6 wood. 7 MEMBER WALOSKI: Sounds good. 8 MR. BROKOW: And that's pretty much the 9 spirit of what we're doing. MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah, sounds great. 10 MR. BROKOW: So you're not going to see 11 anything changing. 12 13 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. There is vinyl railing right now? 14 15 MR. BROKOW: Yeah, that's going. 16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So how -- I mean, 17 do you have -- I mean, this is what we would

18 like to see.

MR. BROKOW: We don't -- we're not at
that point yet.
CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Is there anything
that you can show us that -MR. BROKOW: I'll show it to you -CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: -- you want to
replace it with?

1	MR. BROKOW: Yes, prior to doing it.
2	This is going to be like the last tail of it.
3	We're not doing that probably until April.
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.
5	MR. BROKOW: Prior to that, I can show
6	you basically, we're getting wood railings
7	from Riverhead Building Supply, and then Matt
8	is going to put in the spindles, which will be
9	to the period.
10	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right. I mean, so
11	we may ask you to come back
12	MR. BROKOW: Sure, of course.
13	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: at one of the

14	next meetings before you are ready for this
15	MR. BROKOW: Absolutely.
16	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: to show us what
17	the design of the railing and the spindles
18	are.
19	MR. BROKOW: I'd be happy to do that,
20	sure.
21	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay?
22	MR. BROKOW: I'd be happy to do that.
23	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So what
24	else is happening right now as far as
25	construction is concerned that may need our

1	approval?
2	MR. BROKOW: You know, it's just a lot
3	of rotted wood, you know, rebuilding you
4	know, it's just a lot of repairing and
5	replacing rotted wood and systems such as the
6	gutters, the Yankee gutters, and the soffits,
7	the fascias.
8	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah. Everything I've

9	seen going on so far is just bringing the
10	house back up to snuff, and it's more or less
11	keeping it from going any further. You know,
12	it's simple stuff. It's siding repair.
13	MR. BROKOW: A lot of cosmetics.
14	MEMBER MC MAHON: It's the Yankee
15	gutters, which are primary to keeping water
16	from dripping down inside the walls.
17	MR. BROKOW: There you go.
18	MEMBER MC MAHON: It's all the basic
19	stuff. Okay? So they've never they
20	haven't gone
21	MEMBER WALOSKI: And that's just repair
22	and rebuilding.
23	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's all repairs.
24	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.
25	MEMBER MC MAHON: And it's all very

1	necessary. He's at a beginning point. He's
2	really just pulling it together to the point
3	where he can proceed. The porches would be
4	the last thing he's going to do.

5 MR. BROKOW: Yeah.

6	MEMBER MC MAHON: Everything is pretty
7	much beat up. The stringers and risers are
8	shot, pretty much, so I can see that that will
9	be the last thing where he'll progress.
10	In regards to the back portion that
11	you're tearing off
12	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: that's here nor
14	there, as far as I'm concerned. They might
15	have different feelings about it, but if
16	you're tearing anything that was added on and
17	getting back to that point is getting it more
18	back to what it was.
19	MR. BROKOW: That's what we're doing.
20	MEMBER MC MAHON: So that's where we're
21	heading with that. If you were going to reuse
22	that and doctor it up and change it to maybe
23	add some of the components of the house, it's
24	not a point, because you're tending you're
25	planning on getting rid of it.

1	MR. BROKOW: It's going.
2	MEMBER MC MAHON: So there you go. So
3	that's no need for
4	MR. BROKOW: Pretty much.
5	MEMBER MC MAHON: more discussion in
6	that regard.
7	MR. BROKOW: We're going to try to get
8	the house tight at this point.
9	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah. Yeah, tighten
10	it up.
11	MR. BROKOW: Weather tight.
12	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's it. You go top
13	and bottom.
14	MR. BROKOW: Exactly.
15	MEMBER MC MAHON: And then in between
16	you start doing your windows and all your
17	siding repairs.
18	MEMBER WALOSKI: That's more a Building
19	Department thing that
20	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, it's not even.
21	MEMBER WALOSKI: As far as preservation.
22	MEMBER MC MAHON: It's not even, yeah.

23	When	the	demo	comes	into	it,	that's	а	permit.

24 MEMBER WALOSKI: It's the building.

25 MEMBER MC MAHON: Permit item.

1	MR. BROKOW: I think you guys want to
2	know that I'm not putting in, you know, glass,
3	rechanging glass, clear glass.
4	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right.
5	MR. BROKOW: Door fronts and
6	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right, right.
7	MR. BROKOW: You know, I understand.
8	MEMBER MC MAHON: It's one-over-ones,
9	it's what was there. We can't ask you to
10	throw in two-over-ones. When you bought it,
11	that's what
12	MR. BROKOW: Right.
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's what you saw.
14	As far as you know and as far as I know,
15	that's what the house was.
16	MR. BROKOW: Oh, yeah.
17	MEMBER MC MAHON: So that's where you go
18	with it.

19 MR. BROKOW: Yeah.

20 MEMBER MC MAHON: So that's where he's
21 heading.
22 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah, that's fine.
23 MEMBER MC MAHON: I think you're doing a
24 great job. I know Matt's doing a good job.

25 MR. BROKOW: Yeah.

1	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Listen to him.
2	MR. BROKOW: Okay.
3	MEMBER MC MAHON: Well, that's it. I
4	mean, if we want to if you want to come
5	back and show us what the rails are, then
6	that's fine.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah. I mean, I
8	think we would like to see that, too.
9	MEMBER MC MAHON: The spindles are what
10	they are. It's very obvious those spindles
11	will stay, and the rail itself that captures
12	these things, it's just for your sake has
13	got to be probably something that's a little

14	beefier and probably I don't know if you
15	can get it at Riverhead Lumber. I've not had
16	much success, but it can duplicated and added
17	to
18	MR. BROKOW: We'll he's going to the
19	railing, the top rail
20	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yes.
21	MR. BROKOW: we're going to buy.
22	Matt's going to make the spindles.
23	MEMBER MC MAHON: Okay, fine.
24	MR. BROKOW: So he's going to make a
25	beefy square one and he's going to actually

1	add I believe he said he's going to add
2	some Victorian centers to it. So it probably
3	would be a good idea. You know, if you'd like
4	to see it, we'll
5	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah.
6	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, it would be nice
7	to see what you've got going on.
8	MR. BROKOW: We'll bring in some
9	components in and we'll show it to you.

10	MEMBER MC MAHON: Bring one, because
11	you're going to want a mock-up anyway
12	MR. BROKOW: Yeah.
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: that you can see
14	MR. BROKOW: Exactly.
15	MEMBER MC MAHON: and then approve
16	it, and then just bring it by and let us see
17	it.
18	MR. BROKOW: We'll lay it out and I'll
19	take a picture of it on the counter and lay it
20	out or something.
21	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, that's all.
22	That's right.
23	MEMBER WALOSKI: This won't hold you up
24	in any way?
25	MR. BROKOW: No.

1 MEMBER MC MAHON: No. No, we don't want 2 to hold you up, that's the big thing. And at 3 the point you are right now, I understand that 4 you are marching through the basics. You're

5	really just tightening it up. You're getting
6	the Yankee gutters done.
7	MR. BROKOW: Find no surprises.
8	MEMBER MC MAHON: You're doing what you
9	got to do, that's all. That's right. And you
10	will find surprises and find
11	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, besides the raccoons
12	and the
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's right. All
14	right. So good, good to go as far as I'm
15	concerned.
16	MEMBER BORRELLI: When was it built?
17	MR. BROKOW: I don't have the exact
18	dates. I'm thinking 18 mid 1800s is what
19	I'm thinking.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: David Abatelli, do
21	you have any information when the house was
22	built?
23	MR. ABATELLI: If it's not in what
24	Roselle is looking through right now, just on
25	the second page

2 doesn't --

3	MEMBER BORRELLI: It doesn't say.
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah, it doesn't
5	say. Well but, anyway, it doesn't
6	MEMBER BORRELLI: I'm just wondering.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's not that
8	important for us to make the decision.
9	MR. ABATELLI: That's all we would have.
10	MR. BROKOW: I know there's an old well
11	that's in the basement, so, I mean, it's a
12	stone foundation, it's old.
13	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Well, now you're
14	hooked up to public water and sewers.
15	MR. BROKOW: Right.
16	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So that's beyond
17	us, yes.
18	MR. BROKOW: Okay.
19	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So, I mean,
20	I have a feeling that you are really trying to
21	do to reconstruct, and repair, and restore
22	the house close to where it was at one point,
23	even though it has gone through some

24 changes --

25 MR. BROKOW: Right.

1 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: -- over the course 2 of time. 3 MR. BROKOW: Yes. 4 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And, you know, I 5 -- you know, I'm happy, you know, to say that, 6 you know, I like what you are going for. We need maybe a few more -- a little bit of 7 information as far as some of the details are 8 9 concerned. MR. BROKOW: Yeah, I'll take a whole --10 I'll talk to Eileen about the photos. If she 11 12 doesn't have them on her computer, I'll take some more photos. 13 14 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah. Well, let's open up the discussion more. Lucy, do you 15 16 have any other questions? 17 MEMBER CLARK: (Shook head no). 18 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I mean, I'm

19	willing to make a motion to basically approve,
20	you know, the next step before you know,
21	the windows, for example, because that's
22	something that you need to order
23	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: at one point.
25	And it's one-over-one. I mean, there's

1	nothing special about mullions or anything.
2	MEMBER WALOSKI: No that's fine.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right?
4	MEMBER WALOSKI: That's fine with me.
5	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So it's basically
6	replacement in kind.
7	MEMBER MC MAHON: Exactly.
8	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Are there any
9	windows that may be a little bit larger,
10	because
11	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: the Building
13	Department asks you to provide egress and
14	they're going to I don't know. It's not a

15 residence.

16	MR. ABATELLI: Yeah.
17	MEMBER MC MAHON: It's preexisting.
18	MR. ABATELLI: Not that I'm aware of.
19	But, as he said, I think the first floor is
20	certainly going to be commercial.
21	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah.
22	MR. BROKOW: Second floor will either be
23	like a gallery or office.
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's going to be
25	commercial, yeah.

1	MR. BROKOW: Because I'm moving the
2	I'm removing the kitchens, so there's no
3	dealing with sprinklers. And I don't think I
4	want people living above a commercial use
5	downstairs.
6	MR. ABATELLI: Okay.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So you
8	will, at one point, come back to show us some
9	more details about the ongoing project as far

10 as --

11	MR. BROKOW: Absolutely.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: porches and
13	some of the details are concerned. But other
14	than that, you are going to restore what was
15	there before, even the gingerbread?
16	MR. BROKOW: The gingerbread, as much as
17	is practically possible. Some of it is so
18	intricate that I haven't to be honest, I
19	haven't even looked into
20	MEMBER MC MAHON: Recreating it, yeah.
21	MR. BROKOW: matching it up, because,
22	you know, we're missing a lot of it. So that
23	is the jury is still out on my end
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.
25	MR. BROKOW: only because of, you

1	know, budgetary stuff. But it's something
2	that, you know, any pieces that we take down
3	we will keep, so we can
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Good.
5	MR. BROKOW: deal with it at a later

6 date.

7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I mean, this is
8	part of the application, restore the elaborate
9	gingerbread trim at the gables, so that's
10	something that we will have to discuss going
11	forward, whether that is possible.
12	MR. BROKOW: Yeah. I have to look into
13	where I can
14	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Because some of it
15	is missing, correct?
16	MR. BROKOW: Oh, yeah, a lot of it,
17	yeah.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah.
19	MR. BROKOW: I'll have one half and the
20	other half is missing, so we're trying to see
21	if we can steal some from a blind side of that
22	property
23	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right.
24	MR. BROKOW: to have the front.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: But facing the

1	street, the street elevation is pretty
2	that's the part that is more intact; is that
3	correct?
4	MR. BROKOW: It's more intact, but it's
5	still missing some pieces, too. It is missing
6	some pieces.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: All right. So we
8	will work with you on this. I mean, I think
9	we would be more interested in getting the
10	street elevation possibly
11	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.
12	MR. BROKOW: That's what we're trying,
13	to do.
14	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: done, and then,
15	you know
16	MR. BROKOW: We're trying to move it to
17	take pieces.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Possibly do
19	something simpler on the side.
20	MR. BROKOW: That's what we're trying to
21	do.
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. All right.
23	MEMBER BORRELLI: Have you seen the

24	house on First	Street that	sold. It	's between
25	Center and the	IGA. It's	very simil	ar to the

1 gingerbread on your house, and maybe -- I'm 2 thinking they might have been built by the 3 same builder, maybe. I'm just wondering about the gingerbread, because maybe they have 4 5 extra. 6 MR. BROKOW: You know, I'm not sure, but 7 I did pass a house and I said, "Boy, it sure looks like it might have been the same 8 builder." I don't know if that was that 9 10 house, though. 11 MEMBER WALOSKI: Is that the one that 12 Schneider was working on? 13 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah, Schroeder. 14 MEMBER WALOSKI: Schroeder, yeah. 15 MEMBER BORRELLI: Maybe they have extra, or maybe they -- I don't know, or have found a 16 17 place where they make replacement for it, you know, or -- I don't know, but you might see. 18 It looks like the same stuff to me.

20	MR. BROKOW: There is a there's a
21	renovator's catalogue, VanDykes
22	MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes.
23	MR. BROKOW: Restoration.
24	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yes.
25	MEMBER WALOSKI: Perfect.

MR. BROKOW: They actually have 1 2 reproduction. 3 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yup. MEMBER WALOSKI: They do? 4 MR. BROKOW: Yeah, they have -- yeah. 5 6 MEMBER WALOSKI: Thank goodness for Old House Journal, right? 7 8 MEMBER MC MAHON: All right. 9 MR. BROKOW: So we'll know what to do. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So are 10 there any other questions for Mr. Bennett? 11 12 MEMBER WALOSKI: Not at this time. 13 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Oh, no. I'm

sorry. I mean, you're --

10	railing layout. I'll do some homework on some

11	of the details that you know, I may say,
12	"Look, I can get this. It's not exact, but
13	it's real close."
14	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right.
15	MR. BROKOW: It's of the period, you
16	know.
17	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's the way it
18	goes. That's the way it goes.
19	MR. BROKOW: Yeah, we'll make it is
20	what it is, yeah.
21	MEMBER MC MAHON: So approach it the way
22	you're approaching it.
23	MR. BROKOW: Yeah.
24	MEMBER MC MAHON: And I think everybody
25	will be very happy with your outcome.

1	MR. BROKOW: Okay, good. Thank you very
2	much.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So then
4	Dennis made that motion. I
5	MEMBER WALOSKI: I second the oh,

6 okay.

7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Caroline
8	MEMBER WALOSKI: I second the motion.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Waloski seconds
10	the motion. And all in favor?
11	MEMBER BORRELLI: Aye.
12	MEMBER CLARK: Aye.
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: Aye.

19	to Item #2, which is a continued discussion
20	and possible motion on an application
21	submitted by Bill von Eiff from the First
22	Baptist Church. The church is located in the
23	Historic District at 74605 Main Street, The
24	previous application.

1	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: 65?
2	MR. LAMOTHE: Zero.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Oh, God. All
4	right. Located at 64 650 Main Street.
5	MR. LAMOTHE: 650.
6	MEMBER CLARK: 650.
7	MR. LAMOTHE: 650.
8	MEMBER CLARK: Right.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So what I wrote in
10	my agenda is correct, Tom?
11	MR. LAMOTHE: 650 is the address.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So what does it
13	say on my agenda?
14	MR. LAMOTHE: I don't have a copy of it.
15	MEMBER CLARK: It says 74605 Main
16	Street.
17	MR. VON EIFF: That's my address.
18	MEMBER CLARK: That's his address.
19	MR. LAMOTHE: Okay. That's the

20	confu	sion.

21	MEMBER CLARK: That's the confusion.
22	MR. LAMOTHE: Okay.
23	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So what is
24	okay. So what is the what is
25	MR. ABATELLI: Building the steeple on

1	your building?
2	MR. VON EIFF: Building the steeple on
3	my building, there we go.
4	MEMBER CLARK: Listen closely, 650.
5	Thank you.
6	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Sometimes things
7	get lost. You know, what can I say?
8	MS. CLARK: Got it now.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Do you want to
10	proceed with reading the Item #2?
11	MEMBER CLARK: Sure. Would you like me
12	to?
13	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: No, no, no.
14	MEMBER CLARK: Okay.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You can speak

16 later.

17	MR. VON EIFF: Lucy's all ready.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I know, I know.
19	The previous application called for
20	replacing the church steeple with a
21	prefabricated 26-foot-four high fiberglass
22	steeple. The much larger circa 40-foot-high
23	historic wood steeple was removed in 2010.
24	The HPC Board Members requested that the
25	Applicant research alternatives for a design

1	that would more closely match the original
2	historical steeple historic steeple. The
3	property is located at Suffolk County Tax Map
4	#1001-3-4-12.1.
5	Welcome back, Bill.
6	MR. VON EIFF: It's good to see you,
7	Frank.
8	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: All right. So, I
9	mean, this also is an ongoing project, and,
10	you know, we have discussed this many, many

11 times, but you have something new to show to 12 us.

13	MR. VON EIFF: Well, what we did was we
14	as I said the last meeting, that we don't
15	have that many options. The widths and the
16	designs of the steeples, this is the way
17	they're made. So, as I said last time, we
18	just couldn't possibly put something like that
19	back up on the building for many reasons.
20	One, it's just cost prohibitive. Second is
21	we're getting back into woods and materials
22	that give way, and we're back into leaking
23	into the building.
24	So these are built very nice. They're

25 built to mount on the building, so they bolt

through, but it's sealed very nicely. We're
 not talking a lot of them.

3 So what we did was there was one other 4 company that we had worked with three years 5 ago to get quotes, and that was -- there's 6 really two big ones, Piedmont Fiberglass and

7	Unlimited Fiberglass. Both companies
8	specialize in church steeples and that's what
9	they do, plus other types of things, but
10	mainly steeples.
11	So I talked to the fellow I talked to
12	years ago at Unlimited Fiberglass and he's
13	able to it's something they've done before.
14	They're able to build us an additional base,
15	which is what is shown there. That will be
16	seven-feet-four-inches wide. And the steeple
17	will be all one piece, except one part. I
18	mean, there's one part that we'll meld, the
19	top part, but it will be custom made so that
20	we have a wider base. So instead of the
21	six-foot base, the very
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Excuse me.
23	MR. VON EIFF: Yes, go ahead.
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Except for the
25	14 fact original baca

25 14-foot original base.

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MR. VON EIFF: Well, the -- I didn't

2	think we were going back to the original, I'm
3	talking where we are now. But looking at what
4	we propose, the six foot, we're able to get up
5	to seven-feet-four-inches, and that's the I
6	talked to them about they just can't make
7	it any wider. They don't have the moulds.
8	You know, there's a lot of Dennis, you and
9	I, we know.
10	MEMBER MC MAHON: These people are in
11	the business
12	MR. BROKOW: Yes.
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: to crank these
14	things out, and they do not it's like any
15	other company. Once you start to increase
16	inventory, how many churches need steeples?
17	MR. BROKOW: Right, exactly.
18	MEMBER MC MAHON: How many variations
19	are you going to include, and where can you go
20	with it?
21	As far as I'm concerned, just to open it
22	up a little bit, this is a big improvement
23	over the first one that you had proposed.
24	MR. VON EIFF: Thank you.

1	MEMBER MC MAHON: I think it adds a lot
2	more attention.
3	MR. BROKOW: Exactly.
4	MEMBER MC MAHON: And if you just flip
5	back to the original, first off, to include
6	that, the shape of that vent system is a lot
7	better than the other one. That makes me feel
8	a lot better.
9	MR. BROKOW: It matches the windows,
10	which is nice, on the side.
11	MEMBER MC MAHON: You got closer to the
12	height. You're 35 feet, as opposed to the 40
13	that was original. That's quite a bit over
14	that's another six feet over
15	MEMBER BORELLI: Yup.
16	MEMBER MC MAHON: the 29.
17	MEMBER BORRELLI: Yup.
18	MEMBER MC MAHON: So I understand
19	Frank's concern, and whatever, but once you
20	start getting wide like that, then have you

21	removed the interior post that used to go down
22	to the basement, or whatever?
23	MR. VON EIFF: Those are still in the
24	building.
25	MEMBER MC MAHON: They're still in the
1	building, yeah.
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right through the building.

building.

that --

know, pretty good.

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MR. VON EIFF: Yeah, because they go

MEMBER MC MAHON: Right through the

MR. LAMOTHE: All the way through, yeah.

MR. VON EIFF: And they're still, you

MR. VON EIFF: It's everything else

MEMBER MC MAHON: But, I mean, that --

see, that's where you start heading with that.

MEMBER MC MAHON: Understood.

MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah.

MR. VON EIFF: Yes.

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16	And then you're talking that's big bucks to
17	even start getting that.
18	The base, then, you have to marry the
19	base to the second and third portions of that.
20	MR. VON EIFF: Yes.
21	MEMBER MC MAHON: So it's not just
22	making a wider base.
23	MR. VON EIFF: No.
24	MEMBER MC MAHON: You can't just get

25 away with a wider base, I understand that.

1	You have to then everything has to be
2	scaled again and again and again.
3	MR. LAMOTHE: Exactly.
4	MEMBER MC MAHON: And then you get back
5	to the weight, which became the problem.
6	MR. VON EIFF: Yes, with the original.
7	MEMBER MC MAHON: Of the original.
8	MR. VON EIFF: Yes.
9	MEMBER MC MAHON: I don't know, and we
10	had this discussion. This church was moved at
11	some point.

12 MR. LAMOTHE: Yeah.

13	MEMBER MC MAHON: And how much was
14	original to this?
15	MR. LAMOTHE: I can tell you what
16	happened. The forward part of the building
17	was moved to
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Can you identify
19	your name for the minutes, please?
20	MR. LAMOTHE: Yes, she has it. She has
21	my name.
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: She does?
23	MR. LAMOTHE: Yes.
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Lucia?
25	MR. LAMOTHE: She took it earlier. Yes,

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1 she did.
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2	MS. BRAATEN: I did.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Oh, good. Thanks.
4	MR. LAMOTHE: Yes. The building that
5	you see there now is half the size. What is
6	now the forward portion

7	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right, right.
8	MR. LAMOTHE: where the pulpit is was
9	the original building. It was where the North
10	Road and the Main Road meet, and it was moved
11	in 1845, 1846 to the present location and
12	expanded on.
13	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right.
14	MR. LAMOTHE: And so it's so you're
15	looking what you see, actually, when you
16	come down the street is all the addition.
17	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right, yeah.
18	MR. LAMOTHE: It's the wider portion
19	further into the parking lot that was the
20	original building. That goes back to about
21	1833.
22	MEMBER BORRELLI: I think it looks great
23	compared to the other one. I think it's fine.
24	It's almost perfect.
25	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, I like it a lot

1 better.

MEMBER BORRELLI: Compared to the way

3 it -- you know.

4	MEMBER MC MAHON: You made an effort.
5	MR. VON EIFF: Yeah.
6	MEMBER CLARK: Yes.
7	MR. VON EIFF: And we felt everyone, you
8	know, on the Board really likes it, felt it
9	fit, you know, a lot nicer, even looks when
10	you look at the stained glass windows and all
11	and the shape and length, it really looked
12	nice with the vents.
13	MEMBER CLARK: Yup.
14	MR. VON EIFF: So I was very thankful we
15	were able to find this company. We spent a
16	lot of time researching what they had. I told
17	them the situation and they do the best they
18	can.
19	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah. The first
20	drawing doesn't have the staging of the
21	second.
22	MR. VON EIFF: Exactly.
23	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right. It looks more
24	like well, at least it's an attempt to
25	MEMBER BORRELLI: It looks like a

1 needle.

2 MEMBER MC MAHON: -- address the stages, 3 because the first stage now has a trim detail 4 to it, whereas the last one you proposed 5 really just lacked a lot of detail. The fact 6 that there's a little gable on the top of --7 the very top of the spire adds something to 8 it, and it has these little columns that kind 9 of replicate the front of what you have going on, even though the columns are not original. 10 11 MR. VON EIFF: Right. 12 MEMBER MC MAHON: You got to keep on -you got to keep all this stuff in mind. 13 14 MR. VON EIFF: Yes. 15 MEMBER MC MAHON: Any time I go into an 16 older building, I try to drag into it whatever the last renovator did. 17 18 MR. VON EIFF: Yes. 19 MEMBER MC MAHON: You have to start 20 somewhere so you can go back. If there's more

21	of the detail of what was the church at some
22	other point, you try to drag that forward and
23	do with it what you're trying to do.
24	I understand that we don't have the
25	depth and the width of this beautiful thing
1	that was original steeple.
2	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I'm glad you said
3	beautiful thing.
4	MEMBER MC MAHON: It was no
5	beautiful, it is. I mean, none of us would
6	doubt that.
7	MR. VON EIFF: Oh, no. We love it.
8	MEMBER MC MAHON: It's got the dental
9	mouldings up there that we will miss.
10	MR. VON EIFF: We had a hard time taking
11	it down, but we had no choice. I mean, we
12	would have lost the whole piece.

MEMBER MC MAHON: Well, we have cupolasthat are missing off our own homes.

15 MR. VON EIFF: Yes.

16 MEMBER MC MAHON: And when I started

17	thinking ab	out this	project,	I was	in my	attic
18	the other n	ight				
19	MR. V	ON EIFF:	Yes.			

20 MEMBER MC MAHON: -- and thinking that 21 if I put this back, will the structure that I 22 have in my house now handle the weight of what 23 is going to --

24 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right. I have the25 same problem with my house.

1	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, because yours
2	ours were both
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: We're neighbors.
4	MEMBER MC MAHON: the same builder as
5	well, not to muddle the conversation with
6	that. But understood, that when you start
7	adding a lot of structure back into that
8	building, you take the chance of adding the
9	weight and recreating some of the issues hat
10	they had prior to them taking it down. So, I
11	mean, you know, you got to there's a

12	practical	issue	in	regards	to	that,	SO	Ι

13 understand it.

14 MR. VON EIFF: Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So, if we can --

16 MEMBER MC MAHON: I'm fine with this.

17 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes.

18 MR. VON EIFF: Thank you.

19 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You are fine and I

20 feel that there are quite a few Board Members

21 fine with the improvement. But I'm not fine

22 with this, because I really would like to have

23 the original back, if I --

24 MEMBER MC MAHON: Sure.

25 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: -- I wanted to.

1	And I have no comparison whether how much
2	more or maybe less money it would be to build
3	at least the lower tier, the first tier to
4	make it a little bit more substantial and have
5	it built by a local builder, and then put
6	maybe something else on top of it. But, you
7	know, we still have to discuss the fact that

8	this is going to be a totally different
9	steeple
10	MEMBER WALOSKI: I agree with Frank,
11	yeah.
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: and a different
13	appearance.
14	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And the next
16	question would be, would the Village be better
17	off not approving something like this, where
18	the congregation spends a lot of money on, and
19	not having a steeple at all, and maybe 10
20	years from now there might be money to put
21	something original back up. I'm just tossing
22	this at the conversation because we need to
23	have that conversation. I'm not willing to
24	personally, I'm not willing to just approve
25	something that is from a catalogue.

MR. LAMOTHE: If I may just speak to the
 money-down-the-road issue.

3	Very briefly, we're a small congregation
4	comprised of elderly and working people,
5	single mothers, whom we have to help, as a
6	congregation, pay the rent. There is no way.
7	Now, we were given a gift towards this
8	that could just about cover this as a special
9	designated gift. Outside of this, there is
10	nothing that can be done. There is no money
11	coming down the road.
12	MR. VON EIFF: There's other issues
13	that, you know, we need to take care of, too.
14	You know, with a building from the 1800s, it's
15	just endless.
16	MEMBER MC MAHON: Well, it's
17	maintenance.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So why not then
19	use the gift for something else that is I
20	mean, I'm not putting I'm not trying to put
21	words into your mouth, but help the single
22	mothers and their kids.
23	MR. LAMOTHE: No, we're maintaining. My
24	point is we cannot invest thousands and
25	thousands and thousands of dollars into a

1 steeple. We can do this.

2 MR. VON EIFF: I think there's two -- I 3 think a lot of this, too, Frank is your 4 personal opinion, and we're really trying to 5 do our best. And, you know, with this, I mean, I -- as a church, as people who belong 6 7 to the community of Greenport, we all care, 8 and we care what it looks like, we devote our 9 time. To me, it's a little disheartening that 10 you're giving a church this much problem 11 trying to put a steeple back on a church. 12 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I'm not -- I'm not 13 trying to give you --MR. VON EIFF: I know, but it's your 14 15 personal opinion. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I'm just trying to 16 expand the discussion --17 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah, but I also agree 18 19 with Frank on this. 20 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: -- the 21 conversation on this.

22	MR. VON EIFF: I know. But what it is,
23	it's also coming down to there's weight
24	issues. There's possibly more damage in the
25	church. If you've been in the church, it's

1	one of the most beautiful churches around. We
2	have to be very careful with the interior,
3	too, because
4	MEMBER WALOSKI: Then why is it
5	possible you could live without the steeple?
6	MR. VON EIFF: Well, we've lived without
7	for three years and it would be nice to put it
8	back on. I think it would look
9	MEMBER WALOSKI: It would be nice to put
10	it back on if it were in proportion to what
11	was originally there.
12	MR. VON EIFF: Well, we're talking
13	about
14	MEMBER BORRELLI: Can I just say one
15	thing?
16	MR. VON EIFF: Sure, yeah, Roselle.

17	MEMBER BORRELLI: What's originally
18	there, I don't even know that originally
19	that
20	MR. VON EIFF: Right.
21	MEMBER BORRELLI: as squat and fat as
22	it is makes more sense than what they're
23	thinking of putting on now. I'm kind of
24	liking what they're it's thinner and it's
25	taller, or maybe the height is the same. But

1	I'm thinking fat and I had just made the
2	suggestion to go just a little bit bigger just
3	to make it
4	MR. VON EIFF: Sure, you have to.
5	MEMBER BORRELLI: But the fact, like
6	exactly what Dennis said, that looked a little
7	plastic.
8	MR. VON EIFF: Right, it looks
9	MEMBER BORRELLI: It looks like a
10	darning needle to me.
11	MR. VON EIFF: Sure.
12	MEMBER BORRELLI: Like I'm going to get

13	my needle, point de pois, and I'm going to go
14	out there and I'm going to do that with a
15	needle.

16	And, as Dennis said, putting the
17	columns matching the front, putting the two
18	things, the two the base and then the one
19	above it has given it a lot of architectural
20	detail than putting that the little shutter
21	window thing on there, the grille in the form
22	of a gothic sort of window matching the
23	stained glass in the front. I'm with Dennis.
24	I'm thinking it

25 MEMBER CLARK: I'm with you guys.

MEMBER BORRELLI: We actually improved
 maybe upon the original, I'm thinking, I mean,
 in a sense. I'm not sure that I like so much
 fat and -- I'm liking it. I mean, I don't
 like the original.
 MR. VON EIFF: Sure. No, and --

7 MEMBER BORRELLI: That one only looks

8	plastic and crazy, but this one looks
9	beautiful.

MEMBER WALOSKI: Well, that's going to 10 be plastic, too, though. 11 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: This will look 12 13 plastic, too. 14 MEMBER BORRELLI: But you don't have to 15 know it's plastic. But you won't know that. 16 I'm thinking, with the detail that they put on 17 there, actually matching the front door, the 18 columns in the front, and picking up the thorn 19 of the stained glass is exactly what the 20 original is -- had done originally. And I 21 think it even improves on it, as Dennis said, 22 with the two levels of boxes there, these 23 bases, is even better than what you originally 24 had, so I say go for it. I mean, I don't 25 know. I think it's actually improved upon --

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MR. VON EIFF: Can we take the vote and
 then - MEMBER BORRELLI: -- than the original.

4	MEMBER CLARK: Can we make a motion?
5	MR. VON EIFF: Let's make a motion,
6	because
7	MEMBER CLARK: Can we make a motion?
8	MR. VON EIFF: Can we make the motion?
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah.
10	MEMBER CLARK: I could make a motion.
11	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Is there more
12	discussion on this before we take a motion?
13	MEMBER BORRELLI: Well, I would never
14	tell a I mean, apart from taking a motion,
15	I would never tell a congregation, "Don't put
16	a steeple on a church," because the steeple on
17	the church is what sends the church, and the
18	prayers, and whatever the people who are the
19	believers in that church up to God. So you
20	can't tell a congregation, "Don't put a
21	steeple," "Don't use your money in that way."
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So this, Bill
23	that's why I like this Board to open up the
24	conversation.

25 MR. VON EIFF: Yes.

1	MEMBER BORRELLI: Their faith in God is
2	steering people, they want it up to God.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So everybody can
4	say something. And everybody has maybe a
5	different opinion, but we need to go through
6	this.
7	MEMBER BORRELLI: You can't tell someone
8	what their faith depends on.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: We need you to
10	understand that there
11	MEMBER BORRELLI: Faith depends on
12	history, and history, it always has a steeple
13	on a church.
14	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: She's still
15	talking, yeah.
16	MEMBER CLARK: She's allowed.
17	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes, she's
18	allowed.
19	MEMBER CLARK: Thank you.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So and you are,
21	too.

22 MEMBER CLARK: Thank you.

23 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So that's why we

24 need to talk about this, because --

25 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah.

1	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: you know maybe
2	my point of view. Maybe I am a little bit too
3	anal about this, but there are this is a
4	new Board. When you came here three years
5	ago, it was a totally different Board and they
6	were much more hostile to your initial
7	proposal, and, you know, things have changed.
8	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: The economy has
10	changed. The church, the congregation maybe
11	has changed a little bit.
12	MEMBER CLARK: They've come back with
13	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we take all
14	this into consideration.
15	MEMBER CLARK: And they did that. They
16	went, they did their homework that we asked
17	them to do.

18 MEMBER BORRELLI: Exactly.

MEMBER CLARK: They are trying to work
with us.
MEMBER BORRELLI: It's improved upon,
it's better.
MEMBER CLARK: I think it's lovely. I

24 like it a lot better than --

25 MEMBER MC MAHON: The thing, too, is

1	that every building goes through its changes,
2	and I think you have to respect that
3	particular you know, we're in 2014 now.
4	You know, of course, these things go these
5	buildings go through their changes. These
6	columns weren't original to the building
7	either. So, you know, what are you really
8	saying at that point, you know?
9	MEMBER BORRELLI: They're Grecian.
10	MR. LAMOTHE: They were put on in the
11	early 1930s.
12	MEMBER CLARK: Right, what are we

13 saying?

14	MEMBER MC MAHON: How much do you go
15	back? And, you know, do you tell them to tear
16	off the columns because they're put in in the
17	'30s? I think you just move ahead and you
18	kind of respect you drag elements of what
19	you think was there, which I think, again, is
20	a vast improvement over the first drawing.
21	MEMBER BORRELLI: Exactly.
22	MEMBER MC MAHON: And I think the
23	effort's made.
24	I agree with Frank as well, you know,
25	because I'm trying to be a politician and I'm

1	going to ride both sides of the fence, but I
2	think but I think what has to happen here
3	and what you've done, I think as far as we can
4	really we can't predict what the financial
5	being, you know, is going to happen with your
6	church here, we can't do it. And, at this
7	point, you're telling us, you know, that it
8	doesn't look good, and you're trying to

9	maintain you've got other issues you've got
10	to deal with, and you're trying to help your
11	congregation at this point. I think that is
12	first and foremost. And I think that the fact
13	that you
14	MEMBER BORRELLI: And it's also a gift.
15	MEMBER MC MAHON: There you go, yeah,
16	yeah.
17	MEMBER BORRELLI: It was gifted by the
18	congregation. Somebody wants to make a gift
19	of the steeple.
20	MR. LAMOTHE: Right.
21	MEMBER BORRELLI: So you say, "Yes, sir,
22	thank you very much," and let's find the best
23	steeple we can put up. We can't say, "No,
24	don't give us the gift."
25	MEMBER MC MAHON: Let's make a motion,

then, okay?
 MEMBER CLARK: I make a motion.
 MEMBER MC MAHON: Could we make a motion

4 on this, then?

5	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: If there is no
6	other discussion
7	MEMBER BORRELLI: I make a motion to
8	approve.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Caroline, you are
10	still pensive.
11	MEMBER WALOSKI: I'm voting no.
12	MEMBER MC MAHON: Okay, that's good.
13	MEMBER CLARK: There's no motion yet.
14	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. So then we
15	can well, we can so make a motion, Lucy,
16	if you want to.
17	MEMBER CLARK: I make a motion to accept
18	the application for the First Baptist Church
19	to renovate their steeple according to the
20	latest, with the 35-foot height, the
21	seven-foot-four-inch width on their church
22	MEMBER MC MAHON: And I'll second it.
23	MEMBER CLARK: as submitted.
24	MEMBER MC MAHON: I will second that.
25	MEMBER BORRELLI: Aye. I'm in favor.

1	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You're in favor?
2	MEMBER WALOSKI: I vote no.
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You vote no. I
4	abstain, because I know you're
5	MR. VON EIFF: Thank you.
6	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Where you're
7	coming from. But with three votes that's
8	why I wanted a full quorum here.
9	MR. VON EIFF: Yes.
10	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: That's it, because
11	we didn't have a full quorum the last couple
12	of meetings. So I was thinking that it might
13	pass the way it was going last month.
14	MR. VON EIFF: Okay.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So when are you
16	going to possibly put the steeple up?
17	MR. VON EIFF: We can order it now,
18	which is exciting.
19	MEMBER CLARK: Yes.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Good.
21	MR. VON EIFF: It won't be delivered
22	until May, so it would probably be May that it

23 would actually be installed on the --

24	MEMBER	MC	MAHON:	Better	weather.	

25 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: But you do need a

1	building permit.
2	MEMBER MC MAHON: Better weather.
3	MR. VON EIFF: Yeah, better weather.
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So you do need a
5	building permit.
6	MR. VON EIFF: Yes. We'll file I'll
7	see Dave and take care of that.
8	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. All right,
9	Bill, thank you for your patience.
10	MR. VON EIFF: Great. Thank you.
11	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Tom, you, too.
12	MEMBER MC MAHON: Give the people their
13	steeple.
14	MR. VON EIFF: Thank you, Roselle.
15	MEMBER BORRELLI: You're welcome.
16	MR. VON EIFF: It was nice meeting you.
17	I didn't meet you last time, Caroline.

18	MEMBER WALOSKI: Nice meeting you, too.
19	MR. VON EIFF: Thank you.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: All right. So we
21	have a couple of points to discuss not to
22	discuss.
23	MEMBER MC MAHON: No, we have motions.
