1	(The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.)
2	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. If we
3	could open up with the Pledge of Allegiance,
4	please.
5	(All stood for the Pledge of Allegiance)
6	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. Here
7	we go. Oh, I forgot to bang the thing. All
8	right. I'll bang it at the end.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Gavel us in.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
11	Welcome, everybody. I'm going to be filling in
12	for Mayor Hubbard this evening. He is home, a
13	little under the weather. So we start off with
14	the Chief, right?
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: (Nodded yes)
16	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. Chief,
17	come on up, man.
18	CHIEF WEINGART: Good evening.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Good evening.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good evening.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: How are you?
22	CHIEF WEINGART: Good. Yourself?
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Good, thanks.
24	CHIEF WEINGART: Pretty simple tonight.
25	Just accept the reports that we submitted, and

1	just the two resolutions requesting permission for
2	the parade on February 16th, and to accept the
3	application of Elias Zamayar to Standard Hose
4	Company No. 4.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We did get a notice from
7	the dealing with some additional insurance for
8	the firefighters. I'm just curious what took so
9	long for it to get to us, to be honest with you.
10	CHIEF WEINGART: Which insurance, the
11	cancer?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
13	CHIEF WEINGART: We had to compile a lot of
14	information and get that in, because they wanted
15	years of fit testing, and the amount of years that
16	the members have been in, and all of that, and
17	they're date of births.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So my
19	understanding is, if I understand this correctly,
20	is that right now there's only 16 who are eligible
21	for this insurance?
22	CHIEF WEINGART: That's 15.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Fifteen or 16?
24	CHIEF WEINGART: Fifteen.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Fifteen? Oh, okay. All

1	right. I just
2	CHIEF WEINGART: It was supposed to be
3	effective January 1st, but they have now pushed it
4	to February 15th or 16th?
5	CLERK PIRILLO: Fifteen, 15.
6	CHIEF WEINGART: Because there's still a lot
7	of questions.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
9	CHIEF WEINGART: Especially like the older
10	members that have been interiors, or no longer
11	interiors. It was basically thrown at all the
12	Departments in the Districts,
13	CLERK PIRILLO: We've already communicated
14	with the insurance company, who is aware that at
15	our meeting on the 24th, we'll be voting on one of
16	the options. On the 25th they'll have the
17	paperwork, so we'll be in plenty of time, being
18	that the deadline was extended.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. It
20	just concerned me that we were so far behind.
21	That was because this is this was kind of
22	announced a long time ago, so that's my question.
23	CHIEF WEINGART: And it's changed several
24	times since
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1	CHIEF WEINGART: this whole entire thing
2	started.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I just want
4	to make sure that, you know, our you, as the
5	Chief, and our Volunteer Fire Department members
6	deserve to be have access to what's ever
7	available to them, and I just want to make sure
8	that you get it.
9	CHIEF WEINGART: I agree.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay?
11	CHIEF WEINGART: And there's been lots of
12	questions
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	CHIEF WEINGART: and they haven't been
15	able to answer it with the proper channels as
16	they're introducing it. Like I said, it's
17	probably going to be the deadline's going to be
18	extended again. Like I said, with the older
19	members, there are just
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	CHIEF WEINGART: There's too many questions
22	to be
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
24	CHIEF WEINGART: answered at this time.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, I just you

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Okay.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: He's going to work on

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: that there was no
2	payment scheduled. And if he did, it wouldn't
3	matter.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: But I don't believe
6	he is.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm just checking.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are you guys getting what
9	you need on tree trimming, and doors, and all that
10	stuff? Did we get that tree that's hanging over
11	your guy's house?
12	CHIEF WEINGART: Over at Standard Hose?
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Over at standard Hose,
14	yeah.
15	CHIEF WEINGART: We're working on that.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
17	CHIEF WEINGART: We're going to see, we
18	might be able to do it inhouse, or see if we can
19	get a you guys contract with Johnson Tree
20	Company.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right, right. But you're
22	getting what you need from the Village on that?
23	CHIEF WEINGART: (Nodded yes)
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
25	CHIEF WEINGART: The only other question,

1	with the Titan doors, I know there's an issue with
2	that. I've heard that the doors are in. I know
3	that the Village doesn't let out money until
4	it's you know, the job is completed, so I guess
5	there's a little holdup with that.
6	CLERK PIRILLO: There shouldn't be a holdup.
7	I've communicated several times, as has Robert,
8	to I believe his name is Bob Elmore, that the
9	Village cannot be deposited for the materials.
10	Mr. Elmore called me earlier this week and was
11	supposed to call me back on Tuesday morning and
12	has not done so as of yet.
13	CHIEF WEINGART: Okay.
14	CLERK PIRILLO: So I understand that the
15	materials are in. He once again provided an
16	invoice for half the amount, which, again, is not
17	acceptable to us.
18	CHIEF WEINGART: Right.
19	CLERK PIRILLO: So we'll need to re-explain
20	that to him.
21	CHIEF WEINGART: Okay. So that came up last
22	night with our Wardens meeting.
23	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Anything else for
25	the Chief?

upgrade design. I had mentioned last month that they were going to have a proposal ready for this month to vote on, but they didn't put it all together yet, but I will have it for next month.

Just, you know, the project is continuing, of course.

The other item related to that, I don't know if I mentioned this last month, the application process is a little different than what I'm used to. The application is actually prepared by the Governor's Office of Storm Recovery. We have to publish it in the paper. They are sending me a draft, hopefully, by the end of next week. I'll circulate it once I get it for everybody's review. But it's really their application on our behalf. I'm not quite sure why it works that way, but it does. It makes my life easier, so I'm fine with it.

The other item, I just want to mention that I had a meeting yesterday morning with a group of people that are interested in reusing the effluent water from our wastewater treatment plant. I think I had talked about this a little bit at one point. We're still having discussions. They're still extraordinarily preliminary at this stage, but I just wanted to let you know that there were

a number of folks represented from Peconic
Landing, the golf course, the County, the DEC, and
Peconic Estuary Program folks were there as well.
Again, I have nothing to report, because there was
really no action at this stage, so.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's great.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Just a couple of highlights, one on the Road Department. The only thing I'll just mention, we did -- they did go around and clear all the tops of the storm drains, and make sure with the impending rain that things are as clear as they could possibly be on that.

They did -- have done a little bit of work on -- in Moore's Drain, doing some clearing, very minimal at this stage, but the -- what they have done has actually made a little bit of a difference. We do know that the water is flowing almost down to the drain. And we also know that the level of water, there's a -- I don't really know what to call it other than a holding pond down off of Moore's Lane, on the west side of Moore's Lane, what we call pole yard, and the level of water there has gone down a couple of inches. And it's quite a volume. It doesn't sound like much, but the depth and size of that

1	pond is pretty big, and that did go down, so
2	that's somewhat significant, and we'll continue to
3	do that to the extent that we can.
4	The only other item on that group is they
5	did the Water Department did, and the Road
6	Department, installed new water machines up on
7	Moore's Lane. Those are installed and
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are they brand new?
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Brand new.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: They seem to be
12	working really well.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They are. But you will
15	do something about the front of that building,
16	correct?
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. There's a lot
18	of I mean, you know, maybe we can do some work
19	on Moore's Lane. It's we need to do something
20	in the front there. I did notice a month or two
21	ago that when we do get a lot of rain, there's
22	nowhere for the water to go. It's for whatever
23	reason, when that was put in, the road was pitched
24	down towards the building, and there's a giant
25	puddle right in front of that every time it rains

1	heavy. Again, it's going to be a lot to fix, it's
2	not a simple fix, unfortunately, but
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, you're going to have
4	to bust it up and regrade it, right?
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, exactly.
6	It's just right, you have to raise the whole
7	thing up then yeah.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Could we also do some
9	cosmetic out in the front, because
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: that tree that's on
12	the side of there really needs to be trimmed
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: so that it will
15	survive. It might even become a Christmas tree in
16	Mitchell Park one of these days, but
17	(Laughter)
18	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, we took a look
19	at we took a look at that, and we were almost
20	going to use it. But when you really look deep
21	into it, there's not much to it.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, it's the corner.
23	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's too close to the
24	building.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But if we could I

mean, it's fantastic to have the new machines,
I've used them myself. It's nice and neat and
clean inside. It would be nice to see the outside
done the same way.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yup. Moving on to Sewer Department, nothing specific, other than they've been doing, as you see, a lot of general maintenance on the jet-rodding the system in various spots, and just general maintenance, keeping the plant functional. And as the report reads, we're still well within all of our permit limits consistently, so that's good.

Moving on to the Electric Department. The only item I want to just note, on the tasks accomplished, the very first one talks about a rotted pole. We have noticed a number. In the last month or two, we've replaced a few poles that have had significant rotting, and we think it has to do with a specific manufacturer and vintage that seem to be that they're rotting from the inside, if it -- it sounds a little bit crazy, but that's exactly what they're doing. So they're very difficult to find until they're quite -- in quite bad shape.

You know, as part of the process for this

1	microgrid is going to replace a significant number
2	of poles that they did find were rotted. They do
3	what's called a hammer test, and it's pretty much
4	exactly what it sounds like. They take a hammer
5	to it and listen to see how hollow it is, so that
6	that's going to take care a lot of that. But some
7	of these that we are doing now, they have to be
8	done, or they're a danger, so we're doing them as
9	we find them. That's it on Electric.
10	Building Department, just a reminder again,
11	with the impending weather this weekend, snow
12	events of two inches or more, that vehicles must
13	be removed from Village streets that use the
14	municipal lots for that. So, again, just a
15	reminder for folks.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And we can get that
17	notice onto the website and the front?
18	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, I saw your
19	note. We will I had asked yes, we will take
20	care of that.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Get that notice
23	fixed, yes.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.
25	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Moving on to

Recreation. On this report, talks about the December Ice Rink, lack of Ice Rink, I guess. We are now fully operational in the Ice Rink. We were able to quickly recover from having nothing to a lot of ice in a short amount of time.

A little bit concerned about the weather, rain coming over the weekend. Hopefully, we can recover quick enough to have some ice skating on Monday with the school holiday. But I just caution that we may not be able to skate on the day when kids are home, unfortunately. We can't control the weather.

And that's it for me, unless somebody has questions.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just -- excuse me. I want to follow up on an email discussion this month on -- so I talked a lot about the -- I forget what we call it -- the rain garden on Fifth Street that has changed everything down there. So thanks, that's great, but we know we have other spots like that. And I think it's not that it's good to get a bunch of rain, but it also -- when we have a dryer year, we don't notice this stuff. So I'm hoping that someone cataloged all the other spots where that was happening, and so we can put

1	them on a list and try to work through them.
2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. I mean, we
3	continue to monitor all those spots. There's like
4	two or three that really need to be addressed.
5	But, you know, each one has
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right out here.
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Each one has a unique
8	set of circumstances.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's not like there's
11	a same fix for all of them.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You know, that one on
14	Fifth, that worked. The same thing wouldn't work
15	down here.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's a different
18	issue, more to do with water table and
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And the lake, right?
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And the drain,
21	Moore's Drain not draining.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
23	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: But the but the
24	groundwater levels have come up.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There's reports out
2	there that show and that they have come up. And
3	it's just you could only take the water to the
4	ground and that's it.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, I know.
6	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I can see it in my
8	basement.
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. So
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sorry.
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's okay.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I didn't mean to cut you
13	off.
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But can you give us
16	what is the status? I know that there's a problem
17	with is there a problem with the Silver Lake
18	pump?
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, there's not a
20	the pumps work fine. The issue with the pumps is
21	that they are pumping into the lake, and the level
22	of the lake is such that the pump can't overcome
23	the level. There's just too much head pressure
24	pushing back against the pumps. There's a check
25	valve in there, essentially

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: that prevents that
3	from happening, so the water doesn't back into the
4	system. So the pumps can't overcome that check
5	valve, there's just too much water that's
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It doesn't need to be
7	cleaned or cleared?
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No. The pumps have
9	been the pumps, just so you know, had been out
10	of service for a number of years. They
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They just recently got
12	put back into service.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I wasn't even aware
14	that we had pumps until a year ago.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, because they got
16	overloaded
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So then they weren't
18	functional
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, okay.
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: at all. So we had
21	that completely redone about a year ago, I think,
22	and, you know, things have been fine. So the
23	pumps still work, but now we fixed the pumps, but
24	the water level has gone up to a point where the
25	pumps can't overcome it. That's we're hopeful

1	that we if we get the lake to drain a little
2	bit, there'll be a little bit more room.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Through the drain, through
4	Moore's Drain?
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. But, again, a
6	lot of that is driven by groundwater, so it's
7	not
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. Is there at
9	what point do you get concerned and start to think
10	about we have to re-engineer this?
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. I mean, I
12	think about it a lot.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You're there?
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You know, it will
17	just the drain is the first, the first thing to
18	work on.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Once that is once
21	I'm comfortable that we've done everything we can
22	with Moore's Drain, then we'll see if that was
23	effective enough. If not, then we'll have to
24	start thinking about other, other things.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. I've had some

1	people on Third Street express concern, so for
2	their houses and stuff.
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thank you.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And, again, as I
6	mentioned
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, we all have, so.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But you and I have been
10	talking about this for the last two years, so.
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: As I mentioned, also,
12	that is the lowest spot in the Village.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I know.
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And that's where
15	water is going to flow.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Anything else?
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thanks.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay. Moving on,
19	Mr. Brandt. Treasurer Brandt. I apologize.
20	TREASURER BRANDT: I'm up. Good evening.
21	We have a couple of budget modifications here.
22	First one is to fund the Clark Street
23	repair. I believe this is the last invoice
24	towards that project, totaling 17,850. Again, I
25	believe that's done.

1	The second one is actually a budget
2	transfer. We had some small capital projects in
3	the Sewer Fund that need to be taken care of.
4	They're all minor projects. As I said, one is a
5	repair pump at Claudio's. The other one is a
6	repair of a generator at Central, jet-rodding, a
7	motor for the head works screen, etcetera. So the
8	total of that budget mod comes to
9	seventy-six-sixty.
10	Okay. I'm asking for a resolution. My
11	annual request to put the outstanding water and
12	sewer balances in arrears on the Village property
13	taxes for 2019 this year. That calculation is
14	done by the end of April, okay?
15	Utility Billing, don't laugh.
16	CLERK PIRILLO: (Indicating Thumbs up)
17	TREASURER BRANDT: (Indicating Thumbs up)
18	It's on or close to schedule.
19	Community Development. No Housing Authority
20	meeting in December. There'll do one at the end
21	of this month. You can see there's nothing
22	significant has changed there.
23	We did get our annual Suffolk County subsidy
24	tax for the Sewer District.
25	And that's really the big excitement in my

1	department at this point. Any questions?
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No questions. I did call
3	you earlier this week just to ask that you track
4	for me, for us, the HUD allocation for our housing
5	vouchers with the current shutdown in the
6	government.
7	TREASURER BRANDT: Right.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And you said that we have
9	received the January vouchers, but, really, it
10	would be the February vouchers that may be in play
11	here.
12	TREASURER BRANDT: Correct.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And we don't know yet,
14	correct?
15	TREASURER BRANDT: Correct. We don't have
16	any information at this point.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
18	TREASURER BRANDT: You know, we don't know
19	how they're going to handle that yet.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
21	TREASURER BRANDT: And it's getting close,
22	because it's
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
24	TREASURER BRANDT: Yeah. So I'll keep you
25	in the loop on that.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I guess what I'm going to
2	bring up, I was going to bring it up later, but in
3	reviewing a lot of the Governor's State of the
4	State Address, and reading the publications from
5	NYCOM, it's my understanding that we are going to
6	lose, if it continues without our State
7	Legislators putting it back, close to it's
8	29,000
9	TREASURER BRANDT: 29,000.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 500 dollars from the
11	AME?
12	TREASURER BRANDT: Uh-huh.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: From the which?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The AME money that we get
15	that comes from the State.
16	TREASURER BRANDT: We get an annual subsidy
17	for municipalities, and we've consistently gotten
18	29,000. The new budget the Governor has proposed
19	has eliminated virtually all villages from getting
20	the same subsidy, except for I think five or six.
21	That's, again, proposed. You know, we don't have
22	official word that it's going to go down yet, but
23	that's where we're at this point. That news came
24	through as of yesterday.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, NYCOM is

1	encouraging us, as a municipality, to reach out to
2	our local State Legislators. So I think that's
3	something that we as a Board really need to
4	perhaps encourage, that we have some letters
5	written from the Mayor and the Board of
6	Trustees
7	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yeah.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: requesting that this
9	money is important to us as far as our budgeting,
10	and that it needs to be you know, we need to
11	start at least making them aware of the fact that
12	this isn't you know, it's part of our budget,
13	it's important. We use it for roads and repairs.
14	TREASURER BRANDT: Right, right. That goes
15	in the General Fund, so.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: General Fund. So I think
17	that I would ask if we could all support perhaps
18	having the letter composed, either by the Village
19	Administrator and the Mayor, stating that this is
20	an important thing to our community and to our
21	budget, so
22	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: That's a really
23	good idea.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I hope you all feel
25	the same way.

1	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I think that's a
2	really good idea, absolutely. Anything else for
3	the Treasurer?
4	(No Response)
5	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you very
6	much, Mr. Brandt.
7	TREASURER BRANDT: Thank you.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. All
9	right. To the Clerk, Ms. Pirillo.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: Hello. Good evening,
11	everyone.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Good evening.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: Starting for a change with
14	my report. I only have two items for discussion,
15	unless anyone else has something.
16	Under contracts, we approved the term sheet
17	with excuse me. We approved a term sheet for
18	T-Mobile lease extension. That term sheet was
19	actually relayed to T-Mobile. We are now waiting
20	for their legal counsel to provide a contract,
21	which Mr. Prokop will then review. So we're not
22	expecting to get that in front of you until at
23	least February, okay? Just to clean that up.
24	Secondarily, you'll see that Robert and I
25	doubled up on the outstanding water and sewer

1	balances resolution. That will not appear on
2	under me in the agenda, it will be under Robert's
3	area, okay?
4	Reverting back to the Fire Department, as we
5	discussed, we need a resolution on Thursday's
6	agenda, and perhaps the Board should discuss if
7	you would like to select Option 1 or 2 for the
8	paperwork submitted.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Do you want to take a vote,
10	or you just want to
11	CLERK PIRILLO: No.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: No. Just need to know how
14	to propose it on the agenda.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, yeah. Well, the
16	Mayor spoke about
17	CLERK PIRILLO: We're voting on Thursday.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: proposing Option
19	No. 1.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Option 1, yeah.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Option No. 2, if I'm
22	reading it correctly, expands it to other types of
23	cancer.
24	CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah. The types of cancers
25	are actually categorized

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
2	CLERK PIRILLO: into less and more
3	severe, and the price differential could be
4	substantial. It was suggested that we begin with
5	Option 1. We could probably at any point change
6	over to Option 2.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was my question, is
8	if we could at some point have that
9	CLERK PIRILLO: That's my understanding,
10	yes, we could upgrade.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I personally think
13	we should go with Option 1 to start, you know, the
14	opening policy. And then, like you said, if it
15	turns out that Option 2 ends up being something
16	that takes better care of everybody, then that's
17	something I'm totally comfortable doing. But I
18	think just in the in order to make sure we get
19	this going and get it done, I think Option 1 is
20	something that could do fairly immediately, is my
21	understanding.
22	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, correct.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: You know?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I think so, because
25	there's apparently some confusion and some

1	questions that need to be answered, as per the
2	Chief.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yeah.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I think that, at this
5	point, we need to get something in place, and the
6	rest of that can really be worked out as it goes
7	along.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I agree 100%.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm fine with that. I
10	expressed told you that the other day.
11	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, thank you.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think Option 1 would be a
13	good start.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I had a discussion
16	with the Mayor and with his feelings, because I
17	needed to know a little bit more as to how many
18	were actually involved, and there was an
19	explanation similar to what the Chief said. So
20	Option 1 I'm comfortable with.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Makes sense, yeah.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I think it makes
24	sense.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. I'll put Option 1 on

1	the agenda for Thursday.
2	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right, there
3	you go.
4	CLERK PIRILLO: I apologize. I will have a
5	lot of add-ons, which I'll discuss right now.
6	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
7	(Laughter)
8	CLERK PIRILLO: We received more than
9	usual. We received two public assembly permit
10	applications. One is for the Star Hose Company of
11	the Fire Department for the annual carnival.
12	That's May 23rd through the 26th.
13	The second public assembly permit
14	application is the annual, for the Floyd Memorial
15	Library, Brady Rhymer Concert, and that is on
16	July 16th.
17	Quite a few bids were opened, so we have
18	five resolutions to be added on. I'll start with
19	the most recent. We opened one this afternoon.
20	There was one sole bidder, which was Russell Reid.
21	That was for liquid sludge hauling and disposal.
22	I did check the numbers versus what was previously
23	bid, and this is actually lower, I'm happy to say.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: So it's a savings of a few

thousand dollars per year, and also some savings per thousand gallons, so that's good news.

The contract for the delivery of No. 2 heating oil management recommends be given to Burt's Reliable. The price there was 11 cents per gallon over rack price. There was another bidder, that bid was higher.

Similarly, the same applies to the delivery of diesel fuel, Burt's Reliable, 11 cents over rack. And, again, there was another bid which was higher.

A resolution awarding the contract for delivery of 87 octane gasoline we recommend goes to Hands Fuel Company. That was the sole bidder, and that price is 15 cents over what we call the rack price.

Resolution awarding the contract for the performance of contractor services we recommend to Stanley Skrezec, and, again, the sole bidder. The bid prices, there are quite a few of them. So for Thursday's resolutions, we'll have an attachment showing the per-half-day costs and the per-full-day costs, as well as a breakdown of nights and weekends.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.

1	CLERK PIRILLO: Last add-on resolution is
2	one rescinding the resolution from December's
3	meeting regarding the Manhattan Film Institute,
4	okay? I don't know if there are any questions or
5	discussion on that item.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think her letter was
7	self-explanatory, the letter that we received.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yeah, I think it
9	was pretty straightforward.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Interesting.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I missed this letter.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: As chance would
13	have it, I was reading it in the car before, so
14	here.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It was my fault, so
16	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: No. As chance
17	would have it, I was reading it in the car before,
18	just to make sure I knew what was going on.
19	Anything?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't think we really
21	need to delve on it.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I don't thinks so.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No, go ahead.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think we just need to
25	move on and

1	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I think we should.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: On what the Village Clerk
3	is asking for
4	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: the motion to rescind.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Agreed.
7	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. I'll be
8	attaching the previous resolution from the
9	December meeting.
10	Any questions on my report?
11	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: No.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you all.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you
15	CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
17	Mr. Prokop, you're up.
18	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Hi. Good evening. So
19	updates on a few items that are contained in my
20	report.
21	I wanted to mention that we the
22	Department the New York State Department of
23	Transportation, as far as I know, has not yet
24	commenced the speed limit study that they had
25	promised to do. I'll let you know if there's any

1	change in that status. We did expect that it
2	would start soon, but I don't believe it has
3	started as of yet.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.
5	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I reported to the Board
6	last month that we had provided executed deeds for
7	the two for two properties to Habitat For
8	Humanity. Habitat has not the information that
9	we have is that Habitat has not yet recorded the
10	deeds. There's these are deeds that Habitat
11	prepared, working with their surveyor, provided to
12	the Village. We executed and provided them back.
13	There was a recommendation that I made to
14	Habitat about changing one of the deeds before
15	it's recorded, and that's being reviewed by
16	Habitat. We are going to be speaking to them to
17	try to move this along and complete it. I think
18	that will happen next week.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Did we get a date
20	set yet?
21	CLERK PIRILLO: No.
22	ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, because there's
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You guys can only do
24	Friday, right? I can't remember who, but
25	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'm available every day.

1	I think Paul could only
2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, I was only
3	available Friday.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I wasn't trying to call
7	him out, but yeah. So
8	ATTORNEY PROKOP: No. I was just going to
9	say, schedules didn't match up. You know, I
10	didn't
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. All right. So I
12	can try to close that and get the meeting, the
13	three of us, yeah.
14	ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's a real I'm going
15	to do an email in advance explaining what's
16	happening and
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
18	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I think the email may even
19	obviate the need for a telephone call, but
20	we'll see.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
22	ATTORNEY PROKOP: A telephone call might be
23	good just to wrap it up.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, because they're
25	all so just so everyone knows, new CEO, new

1	lawyer, everybody's new and no one seemed to
2	really even know that we were out here. So we
3	gave a little nudge and now we're back in
4	business.
5	ATTORNEY PROKOP: The report on Genesys is
6	that we are in the discovery preparation phase for
7	the expected mediation. The we've gone
8	through from the Village's standpoint, we've
9	gone through many years of decades of minutes
10	and agendas, pulling out information regarding
11	Braun and Genesys. We will be exchanging the
12	information that we have with Genesys, and also
13	receiving information from them. And we expect to
14	have a mediation in the later the latter part
15	of February or the beginning of February excuse
16	me, beginning of March is what I'm hearing now.
17	The time for the Village to respond to the
18	Genesys part of the claim has been extended until
19	February 19th.
20	I think that that so I have one or two
21	updates to give you in Executive Session.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a question on the
23	tax certiorari cases.
24	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah, yes.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it possible for you to

1	perhaps email to the Trustees exactly what
2	properties you're concerned about?
3	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Oh, definitely, yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that would help
5	us, especially at budget time.
6	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Since that is one item
8	that doesn't mesh with our budget. And if we have
9	an idea of what we're looking for, or what the
10	possibility of, or what the potential is, I think
11	that would be important for all of us to know.
12	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. I agree.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'm working with Linda
15	has gotten the information together. I'm trying
16	to meet with her to put together a spread sheet
17	that will have a list of the cases and the
18	potential exposure and I'll provide it to you.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that's important
20	for us to know.
21	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
23	ATTORNEY PROKOP: With regard to the
24	insurance, the cases that the insurance company
25	attorney is representing, defending the Village

1	on, there's you know, there's always a few
2	cases pending for minor damage cases, and I just
3	want to say that the attorney has successfully
4	closed out several of those cases recently. It
5	was good to see them come to a conclusion.
6	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
7	ATTORNEY PROKOP: And that's my report,
8	unless there's any other questions.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I do have a question.
10	Recently, in Newsday, there was an article with
11	the fight that's going on between Altice and
12	Mr. Dolan, where he has suggested that all
13	municipalities that have a contract with the
14	Cablevision franchise review them to make sure
15	we're getting services. Is that something that we
16	need to be proactive about?
17	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. So that's one aspect
18	of what's happening with the Altice takeover,
19	which is now a year or two old. He was talking
20	mainly about the services that are provided to the
21	customers, which is the amount of programming
22	that's provided, the number of channels and the
23	type of service that's provided. So, as an
24	example, my channel 61 where I live used to be
25	24-hour weather and traffic, now it's only 10

12-hour weather and traffic. You know, so that's a change in my customer service. I didn't get a reduction in my price for that.

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So he's -- Mr. Dolan respectfully mentioned that as one aspect of things that municipalities should be checking for, but I think that that's more under the customer agreements. It can be covered in the -- it's, number one, a customer But in the -- in the franchise agreements, issue. it actually lists the number of programming channels, not what each channel is going to be dedicated to, but the number of programming channels, channels that will be provided, and often. And we should check that and make sure that we're continuing to get the programming, our residents and businesses are continuing to get the services that they're entitled to.

I'm happy to look over -- I'll go back through the agreement and make sure that that's being complied with.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So our franchise agreement, if I'm understanding what you're saying, is that we have a certain number of -- for the Village of Greenport, for our franchise, is our community is entitled to certain number of

1	channels that they provide?
2	ATTORNEY PROKOP: It may not specify the
3	number.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
5	ATTORNEY PROKOP: But it will specify if
6	there's a change
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The type?
8	ATTORNEY PROKOP: that there won't be any
9	change
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
11	ATTORNEY PROKOP: in the in the
12	programming.
13	So there's other things, there's other
14	issues that have come up with the way that this
15	was taken care of, and one of one of them is
16	the whether the assignment of each municipal
17	contract from Cablevision to Altice, that
18	wasn't it was done correctly in some in many
19	villages, it wasn't done fully in a lot of other
20	villages. So that's one of the things that we
21	should look at. And whether we should consider
22	whether we should require Altice to enter into a
23	new agreement with the Village, rather than just a
24	transfer from Cablevision to Altice.
25	And there's other provisions of the contract

1	that we have that we should also review, and
2	I'll make the Board aware of that. I could
3	develop a quick memo or outline of what I think we
4	should consider.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Is it your opinion that
7	those oversights were on the part of the
8	municipalities, or were they intentional on the
9	part of Altice, you know, to not include all the
10	municipalities?
11	ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, that's a good
12	question. A lot of it had to do with the fact
13	that Cablevision operated under a few different
14	companies, under a couple of different companies,
15	one of which some of which aren't even named
16	Cablevision, so I think Altice treated the
17	companies differently. I'm not sure if that's due
18	to their corporate setup, but each of the
19	contracts should have been assigned to Altice, and
20	there should have been a hearing or a public
21	meeting on the assignment, when if and when it
22	took place.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Especially since they're a
24	monopoly and nobody out here has any choice.
25	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I am not a Cablevision
2	customer, but
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm not either, but
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can I ask a couple of
5	questions, though? Number one, on that point, so
6	why at this in this day and age, why does
7	the Village need cable TV service? I mean, can
8	we do we need it, or can we
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Well, we use we
10	use that
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Who's watching TV on the
12	job?
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's for the
14	mostly for modems and
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: WiFi, isn't it?
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. Besides the
17	internet pipe, why would we need you were
18	talking about channels and stuff, so
19	TREASURER BRANDT: Right, processing.
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There's a number of
21	things we use it, use this use it for.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry, but Joe was
23	talking about channels that are included in the
24	package.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's a franchise.

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1	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'm talking about on
2	behalf of our residents and businesses.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Our residents.
4	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: For the residents,
5	not yeah, not
6	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Not for people watching TV.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thank you.
8	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Not for our employees
9	watching TV.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no.
12	(Laughter)
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second questions is
14	forget I even brought that up. Second question
15	is
16	ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, I didn't make it
17	clear, I'm sorry.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No, no, sorry.
19	ATTORNEY PROKOP: If I didn't make it clear,
20	I'm sorry.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, now I got thrown
22	off. Sorry.
23	ATTORNEY PROKOP: No. So there's a the
24	other thing that Altice has done that's different
25	from Cablevision, and I think that we are one of

1	the villages that's affected by this, is there's
2	a there's a time period under the under the
3	Federal Law that three years prior to a contract
4	expiration, Altice excuse me a cable
5	provider can send out a letter to its municipal
6	franchise holder and notifying them that the
7	franchise period will expire, and that they'd like
8	to they'd like to enter a negotiation period.
9	And when that letter goes out, you don't need
10	to you don't need to you don't need to enter
11	the negotiation period. But what it does is it
12	triggers a time frame that if you have any
13	significant complaint about the Altice service,
14	you have then a limited amount of time that you
15	could register the complaint, so that it's
16	addressed in the contract renewal period.
17	So we should review all these. I did review
18	this at one point a couple of months ago when
19	these letters started coming out, but I'd be happy
20	to talk to the Board about it, you know, as one of
21	these things that we need to discuss, or at least
22	be aware of.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I remember my second
24	question. If and when we negotiate with Altice

for the people who are still watching, the

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residents, not employees, watching TV on their service, can we negotiate to get some real estate for our government meetings? I mean, we're doing a pretty great job of hosting them ourselves, or using IQM2, or what the new company is called. mean, I think we're getting the information out there, but there are a lot of people who may have trouble finding a web page to watch one of these But they're used to the remote and they things. can go to Channel 22, and, you know, it's -somehow, the Town of Southold gets to control when our meetings are broadcast or not. So, you know, no one asked us what we thought of that, it was just we were told that they're going to be in charge.

So if there's a way, and maybe villages can get together and sort of -- because they probably would rather have a town, because it's bigger, but if there's any way to get, and maybe through your other village connections, or NYCOM, or whatever, if there's any way to negotiate something where the villages can control what goes out over that platform, I think that would be good.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. I think some of that discussion would be with the Town directly,

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1	but and I think that this might have been	
2	brought up at the last negotiation, but I will, I	
3	will look into that.	
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. Thanks.	
5	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Anything else?	
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: (Shook head no)	
7	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.	
8	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Thank you.	
9	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you very	
10	much. All right. Board Discussions: I don't	
11	believe we have any.	
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, we don't.	
13	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Right, there's	
14	nothing?	
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.	
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No hearings, no wetlands.	
17	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.	
18	Reports From Committees: So failure on my part, I	
19	did not ask the Mayor for his committees.	
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Audit didn't meet.	
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Audit, Audit didn't meet.	
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Audit didn't meet, and	
23	we're going to meet next month, I think, as of	
24	now. But we were just I don't know.	

CLERK PIRILLO: We're expecting it to be

contact the DEC. We have reached out to the DEC

three or four times to see if that conversation

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1	took place and we have not gotten a return call
2	back from the DEC yet on that.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The DEC, last time I
5	met with them, seemed comfortable with our
6	presentation and our design, with the exception
7	that they wanted us to at least meet with this
8	group and get their take on any endangered species
9	and plants that might be in the in the area.
10	At the site visit with this group, and I
11	apologize, I don't remember their name, they said
12	they didn't they did not believe there were any
13	endangered species or plants in the in the
14	area. They weren't necessarily thrilled with the
15	project, but they didn't they could not say
16	that there was any specific danger.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
19	Trustees, here we go. Who wants to go first?
20	(Laughter)
21	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: You got it.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thank you.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So, actually, I have an
25	update to my own report. Item one, I spoke with

1	the new president of the Seaport Museum, who I see
2	all the time, because he lives two doors away from
3	me, but we don't often talk business. We had a
4	good chat today, and so I think he said that he
5	is first of all, he was not made aware that
6	there, you know, was a contract with the Village,
7	and he's just getting up to speed on a whole bunch
8	of stuff. So I guess this was I was giving him
9	news. But he was happy to hear the news, and I'm
10	going to share the contract with him. And so he's
11	going to I think he's going to call the Clerk's
12	Office and ask to get on the agenda next month.
13	Paul Kreiling, Seaport Museum.
14	CLERK PIRILLO: Actually, the Village
15	Administrator directed a letter to Mr. Kreiling.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, good.
17	CLERK PIRILLO: Today.
18	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, it went out.
19	It went out today, I think.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Teamwork.
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
22	CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good.
24	CLERK PIRILLO: Asking, asking
25	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: For that.

1	CLERK PIRILLO: Actually, stating that it's
2	Section 5 of the contract.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
4	CLERK PIRILLO: There is a provision that
5	states that we should the Board should be kept
6	abreast of
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
8	CLERK PIRILLO: their actions.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: And Mr. Pallas made that
11	clear. That was sent today, actually, so
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So he wouldn't get
13	it yet. So we're all on the same page here.
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So he was happy to come
16	talk to us, so I won't steal his thunder, but it
17	was a good chat. And I think the president of the
18	Seaport Museum is eager to work with the Village
19	and to do the right thing, so we'll see what
20	happens.
21	So we about I think a year ago at this
22	time, we were talking about this dog run, and then
23	I don't know what happened, PSEG happened, we
24	missed it. I thought it was in the budget.
25	Mayor's not here, so I wrote this before I knew

1	whether he'd be here or not. So I guess the
2	question for him or for Robert is, is it in the
3	budget, and can we still do it, because people are
4	really excited about it. By the water tower.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. No, I know, I
6	know the project. I don't is there any I
7	don't think there's any specific item.
8	TREASURER BRANDT: I'm sorry, I couldn't
9	hear.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: They why don't
11	you?
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Remember last year
13	we were talking about
14	TREASURER BRANDT: The right. There was
15	no money specifically earmarked for that.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
17	TREASURER BRANDT: We hadn't put money in
18	the general parks line for that, the 7110-401
19	line.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So this is probably
21	a Mayor question.
22	TREASURER BRANDT: I'm sorry?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that's a Mayor
24	question.
25	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's a Mayor question,
2	but I just want to put out there that everyone's
3	really fired up about it. So I hope we can try
4	to
5	TREASURER BRANDT: Okay.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: rekindle that for the
7	spring.
8	And I put some notes in my report about
9	the I just wanted to we've talked about this
10	stuff, some offline, some online. I just I
11	want to make sure we whenever we do the project
12	down at the beach, that we do it right. And I
13	feel strongly that we I just want to make sure
14	we do not replicate Mitchell Park, but, rather,
15	focus on making it a family-friendly situation
16	down there.
17	And a question I think for you, Paul. Does
18	that pirate ship have to get ripped out?
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I haven't looked at
20	it to any great extent to see if it's if it,
21	you know, is no longer safe. I wouldn't want to
22	comment one way or the other whether it has to or
23	not.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. I'm sure it has to
25	be updated. My lay my unscientific dad opinion

1	is that it probably needs to be updated.
2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Well, yeah, I'm sure
3	it does, but I don't know if it's if it's
4	salvageable, is what I
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's my question I was
6	going to ask.
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I just don't I
8	don't know.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If you
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: When we we will
11	when we get to the start actually putting pen
12	to paper, which, you know, it may be delayed a
13	little bit at this moment
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I understand.
15	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: we will certainly
16	take a look at that
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks,
18	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: as part of the
19	process, yes.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's really it's really
21	that staircase. I think if you flattened her out,
22	maybe she could stay, or part of her could stay,
23	because it's just
24	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Uh-huh.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's an amazing thing.

1	And I don't know if anybody if you don't chase
2	little kids around, you may not know this, but you
3	climb to the top of that thing, the watchtower,
4	you get one of the best views in Greenport around
5	that point there.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Uh-huh.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's amazing.
8	Okay. This is another Mayor question, so
9	probably not what we're talking about. I just
10	sometimes I feel like we can other governments,
11	they have the they vote on the law the night of
12	a hearing, if it's not too controversial and
13	everyone's all in on it. So, you know, I'm just
14	trying to grab an extra month of revenue on all
15	those people parking in our lot. But with the
16	Mayor not here, that's he makes the agenda. So
17	I just want to put out there that we don't always
18	have to wait, as I understand it, but I could be
19	wrong. But either way
20	ATTORNEY PROKOP: There's no requirement
21	that you wait, but there's
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Protocol, tradition.
23	ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, sometimes
24	changes are made, things like that.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Anyway, Mayor

1	thing, he's not here.
2	And I won't bother bringing up the LWRP. I
3	think we should be a lot more proactive on it than
4	we are, but
5	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I missed
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you.
7	ATTORNEY PROKOP: I missed part of my
8	report, and I'm so sorry. There was an addendum
9	to my report and I which I did not do in
10	writing.
11	Thank you for mentioning the LWRP. I
12	completed my editing review of the LWRP and I'm
13	prepared to give it to the Village.
14	I had one other subject. Substantively,
15	there was a couple of questions and
16	recommendations I have regarding laws that
17	accompany the LWRP. But as far as the edit run
18	through the LWRP, I've completed that and I'll
19	give it to the Village.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Awesome.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you.
23	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Thank you.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you.
25	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.

1	Ms. Robins.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Trustee Robins, I
4	apologize.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, the things from the
6	Carousel Committee, last month, you know, they
7	were involved with decorating the Carousel. I
8	think they don't have the decorations down yet;
9	looked great. It was all part of the whole
10	downtown Christmas Parade, that by the time the
11	end of December came around, it seemed like it was
12	ancient history. It was so early, starting on
13	December 1st. But the Carousel looked great, the
14	downtown looked great.
15	And the other thing that they're continuing
16	to work on, if you any of the other Trustees
17	have seen them in Village Hall, the paintings for
18	the new inner scenic panels are really coming out
19	nice.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: They're amazing.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I mean, they're
22	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I saw them in
23	Sylvia's office, they're incredible.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They're so they're
25	you know, they'll complete that project, and it

1	will be the same process of introducing it to the
2	public, having them photographed, and eventually
3	installed on the on the metal panels. They're
4	going to be lower. They're not going to be as
5	high as the ones on the as the rounding boards.
6	And, eventually, they will do an auction, as they
7	did last year, to raise some funds for the
8	continuing work on the Carousel.
9	Other than that, it's mainly maintenance and
10	things. They have somebody that's going to be
11	working on helping to paint the horses now. I
12	think they have a new woman that's going to be
13	involved in that.
14	I was down there the other day. I happened
15	to notice that a lot of the seat areas, the
16	saddles are kind of worn looking, so I was going
17	to point that out to Mr. Wissmann, who has been
18	taking care of the horses.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: A lot of kids
20	sitting on those saddles.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: A lot of a lot of
22	some big kids, too.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yes, very true.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm sure. So that's what
25	they've been up to.

1	I did not I missed the BID meeting in
2	December. But, again, the big thing that the BID
3	was involved in in December was getting the
4	Christmas lighting done downtown. And I'm sure
5	everybody has seen and can enjoy the lights
6	wrapped around the trees and the star bursts that
7	are up in the trees. The intention is to leave
8	them up probably through the end of February, just
9	to light the Village. It's looking a little quiet
10	downtown right now. But I've seen some really
11	nice Instagram photos of the shot taken, you know,
12	looking up Front Street and then down Main Street.
13	And the attention would be to even increase that
14	and add more trees next year. So they're
15	committed to that and it's good thing.
16	They'll be, you know, getting back to their
17	meetings again, and eventually they have their
18	annual meeting, I think it will be in the
19	beginning of June. They're hoping that they'll
20	get better attendance. It was a little lean in
21	attendance last year.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, right.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: But they seem to be working
24	hard to improve communications.
25	The other thing I wanted to mention is I'm

1	going to go up to Albany with Mr. Pallas to the
2	NYAPP Conference. Haven't been at all last year.
3	I was, you know, not able to travel with my bad
4	hip. Looking very forward to it.
5	As we know, a lot of new initiatives coming
6	out of the Governor's Office right now. Some of
7	them will have an impact on us in terms of our
8	Electric Department and other things. So, you
9	know, we have a lot of interesting people up there
10	that come and speak to us and give us information
11	on all sorts of things and possibilities.
12	I did read that one of the Governor's big
13	initiatives is to get us, New York, to 100%
14	renewable by, what was it, 2040 or 2045?
15	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I think so, yeah.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, it was a it's a
17	very ambitious thing, but very exciting. And, you
18	know, being a small utility, I think that there's,
19	you know, room for our input on this. And I hope
20	to bring you back some good information to share
21	next month. That's it for me.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, if we're using
23	hydro, can we get our 29 grand back?
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We've always had hydro.
25	That's

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's what I'm saying.
2	So can we get our 29 grand back from AME?
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, for AME.
4	(Laughter)
5	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: You're all right?
6	Is that it?
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's it for me. Thank you.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay. Trustee
9	Phillips
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I attended the Southold
11	Transportation Commission meeting. One point of
12	interest is that the Southold Planning Board has
13	requested, in reference to the Vineyard project,
14	that there be a speed limit reduction on Route
15	the back road from Moore's Lane west of
16	Chapel Lane.
17	There is also with the East Marion
18	Association and the Orient Association's request
19	to change the speed limits from Greenport east.
20	There's been a lot of discussions of moving the
21	traffic along.
22	I understand from some of the
23	representatives of the Town of Southold that met
24	with the meeting with the Love Lane project that's
25	going on, that the traffic circle is very much

alive in discussions at the end of Main Street and the North Road to alleviate -- they realize that the traffic needs to flow. So there's a lot of discussions going on. Hopefully, it will get moved up on the agenda a little bit faster than it's been sitting, so we'll see.

Other than some various things, from complaints from some residents over the last couple of weeks that I've worked with Paul Pallas on, I did attend the meeting this past weekend that was put together by a group called The Greenport Association. It was a lot of feedback, a lot of interesting discussions, a lot of familiar topics that we've all heard over the years. And they are going around the room and describing them as residents of the Village of Greenport.

I noticed that there -- there was one common theme among the fact of them being newer to the area, or not as long as some of us who have been here for generations, was the fact that they weren't -- they weren't in the know on a lot of things that are available from the Village Government. So I talked to Paul about this and I have a couple of things.

There was -- the common theme was the communication from the Village Board about our Planning or Zoning and Our Historic Review activities. People were concerned as to what was going on. They weren't familiar of meeting procedures, or they weren't -- you know, they didn't -- couldn't quite figure out on the website where to find information. So I'm going to ask that this either, and I'm not sure, Joe, I asked you if this needs to be policy, or if this just needs to be something that becomes part of the normal procedure. But when the public notices go out for all of our Statutory Boards, I would like to have it actually published on the website. Currently it's only our Village Board stuff that's being published under the legal notices. It's not including Planning's legal notices, or Zoning, or Historic's. So I think that it's time that we took a look at the website and made it a little more friendly-user. A lot of people found

it kind of cumbersome in trying to find

information, because if they didn't really know

where to look for some of it, it was kind of

24 frustrating.

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So, Paul, I'm going to ask if that there's a

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way that we could deal with the web, the web page as far as starting to create sections that would put all of Planning under one section, Zoning under one section, so people find it a little bit easier to find things. So that's something I'm looking to you for guidance as to what's the best way to proceed with this. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I mean, technically, there's no impediment. I -- you know, as we spoke, I did point out that the -- procedurally, the legal notices for both Planning and Zoning do get attached to the agendas when they're published on the website. So they are on the website under -- as attachments to the agenda. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: In the agenda, yeah. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But the fact is the agenda doesn't usually go on until a couple of days or a week before. And I think that the

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But the fact is the agenda doesn't usually go on until a couple of days or a week before. And I think that the notices need to be on the website at the same time period that they're actually -- or even before they get into the legal paper. That's what I think. Once the --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't think there's any technical impediment. I don't know if there's any special legal requirements to segregate them

or do it differently. I can certainly talk with the Village Attorney and see how that might get implemented, to see how --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think it's in addition to the paper. I mean, you know, not everybody's on the website. But I think that for those who are looking for information and they hear that there's a meeting coming up, the agenda is not on there yet, because it hasn't been created by the Chair people. But we've already written the legal notices, because they have to be.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think for communication between us and the residents, so that there's another step of communication, is really important, and I think that's our role, I think it should be. So that's one of the things I'm bringing up.

The other thing is, is a conversation that I had with our Deputy Clerk over the -- in an email about the IQM2 system. I would really -- I think it would be a positive move to try to get the agendas, so that when the livestream is going, it's not a PDF that they have to separately punch up. It should connect directly, similar to what

1	the other municipalities do with the IQM2. You
2	actually can click on it and it matches the agenda
3	to the livestream. You can actually read it as
4	it's going along.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It doesn't do that right
7	now.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is that an upgrade we have
9	to do?
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I am not sure, that's my
11	question.
12	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Well, we'll certainly
13	investigate it, and we'll report back as to what
14	that would if it's possible with this system,
15	and how it might be accomplished, and if there's
16	an associated cost with that.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. I just think it
18	would be it's for me, I'm computer literate,
19	okay, and so are you. The PDF, pumping it up,
20	doesn't mean much. But to someone who wants to
21	watch it as it's going along with the
22	conversations on it, I think it's important.
23	So other than that, that's pretty much it.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. Well,
25	mine's also pretty brief. I mean, we were pretty

1	busy with Santa. But the
2	(Laughter)
3	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: That shared
4	services thing we did with the school was once
5	again a big success. We had good turnout again.
6	And the Village was really super helpful with the
7	people they brought over there, and they brought
8	over some kids that, you know, played basketball
9	with the kids most of the time, and it was really
10	fantastic.
11	Other than that, I also wanted to make sure
12	just to thank you, Mr. Pallas, for like cleaning
13	up the drains and stuff before the world ends in
14	about three to four days, it looks like. All
15	right? Winter finally shows up.
16	Other than that, I really don't have much
17	else. Anybody else have anything before we do the
18	public?
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. At
21	this time oh, I'm sorry.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, no.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I apologize. All
24	right. At this time, public to address the Board.
25	There you go.

1 MR. BULL: Steve Bull, 24 Sandy Beach. 2 had made an application for a wetlands permit, and I had made that application, I thought, in time 3 4 that it would be a part of the agenda for some sort of a notice, so that the CAP Committee could 5 6 do their job. It was to raise my house. And so I 7 presume it's something that I'm misunderstanding 8 about making an application for a wetlands permit 9 and for a building permit that has slowed this process down, and I was hoping that someone could 10 11 perhaps explain that to me, how that happened. 12 What is the process? Is that -- Paul, could you 13 talk on that? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: 14 Yeah. The -- I do recall receiving the application. The process 15 16 would be the -- this Board would schedule a hearing for the following month once the 17 18 application is presented to them. That would be 19 on an agenda. I have to double-check to see if it's on the agenda -- would be on the agenda for 20 21 next week to schedule the hearing for the 22 following month, that would be the process. MR. BULL: Oh, okay. So that if I made my 23 24 application in December, it wouldn't necessarily 25 be a part of this work session, but it would

1	actually come up next Thursday?
2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: As an agenda item to
3	schedule a hearing to for that.
4	MR. BULL: I see, okay. Well, then
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And then
6	MR. BULL: thank you very much for your
7	attention in this matter. I just was I kind of
8	was confused. I was here to help answer any
9	questions there might have been in that process,
10	SO
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, Steve, we can't
12	talk about it until after a public hearing.
13	MR. BULL: Well, I understand that.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
15	MR. BULL: Oh, okay. I just that's what
16	I'm asking, because I'm not very familiar with the
17	process.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. We have to have
19	the public hearing first before we can even
20	discuss it.
21	MR. BULL: Understood.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I'm assuming that
23	your plans have already been delivered to the
24	Village Hall.
25	MR. BULL: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Along with the DEC
2	permits?
3	MR. BULL: Yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, I did
6	receive we did receive the plans. I just
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, that's fine.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I have to
9	double-check that they were
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we're just at the
11	beginning of the process.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're at the beginning of
13	the process.
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, at the very
15	beginning.
16	MR. BULL: Oh, so at the beginning of the
17	process it doesn't even come up here. This is my
18	misunderstanding.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I had no idea what you
20	were talking about. I probably will in about a
21	week.
22	ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's part of the work
23	session before we vote to set the public hearing,
24	isn't it?
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Not usually. No, not

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1	usually.
2	MR. BULL: That's all I have. Thank you.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
4	Thank you.
5	MR. BULL: Happy New Year.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Happy New Year to you.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: To you.
8	MS. DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Hi. I'm Lily
9	Dougherty-Johnson, 51 Washington Avenue. When you
10	guys were talking about drainage and the Fifth
11	Street rain garden, I just hope on your radar is
12	Park Street and Carpenter Street. That corner
13	gets really that's a huge puddle that takes
14	over the whole street. Pretty dangerous for small
15	children or elderly, and probably not great if it
16	ices over. So that was all. Thank you.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. Thank
18	you. Anybody else?
19	(No Response)
20	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: No? All right.
21	So with that, Executive Session, right?
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.
24	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Motion to motion to
25	adjourn.

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1	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: So with that, at
2	8 o'clock, I make a motion to go into Executive
3	Session.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: To discuss?
6	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: To discuss
7	ATTORNEY PROKOP: To discuss contract
8	matters.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Contract matters.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: personnel,
11	contract matters and personnel issues.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second.
13	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Thank you.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All in favor?
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Aye.
19	All right. Do I get to do the gavel?
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Executive Session.
22	(The meeting was adjourned to Executive
23	Session at 8:00 p.m.)
