1	(Whereupon the meeting was called
2	to order at 7:01 p.m.)
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Call the meeting
4	to order. Pledge to the flag.
5	(Whereupon all stood for the
6	Pledge of Allegiance.)
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. You
8	may be seated. We'll get started with
9	the fire chief, Chief Miller.
10	CHIEF MILLER: Good evening,
11	everyone. How are you tonight? So the
12	first thing is you all know that we
13	have hydrant testing on Sunday, just
14	remind you again, remind everyone else,
15	9:00 a.m.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: October 30th,
17	correct?
18	CHIEF MILLER: Yes. Also I'd like
19	you to accept all reports and
20	resolutions that we submitted. There
21	was a little misunderstanding with the
22	purchasing of the doors and amount on
23	my part. I wasn't clear on how that
24	was going to operate because of the
25	cost, and George and I discussed it,

1	and I guess we got that all
2	straightened out now. But we do have
3	some more big ticket items that are
4	going to be coming up. So we're
5	looking at a security system,
6	electronic security system to go along
7	with the doors, which is going to be
8	around 19,600 dollars. We got the
9	required two proposals, and the cheaper
10	one was 19,600, the other one was about
11	5,000 dollars more. It's going to be a
12	key fob system. We're going to have a
13	hundred of those, so everybody will get
14	one so they could access the building.
15	Also we bought Scott air bottles, they
16	were 17,530 dollars, so that's another
17	ticket item you're going to see. We
18	already got the PO for that, and
19	they've all been ordered.
20	We had four applications for
21	membership, two to the rescue squad and
22	two firemen, and that was about it.
23	Any questions for me?
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just to explain on
25	the doors, what he's looking at doing,

1	the security system with the doors, he
2	wants to do them together when they're
3	doing the doors in case anything needs
4	to be done as part of the security to
5	do that at the same time, so the two
6	contractors can work together on that
7	so they don't have to do additional
8	work or change something that's being
9	done.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Doors. All the
11	doors, the doors out back here and the
12	doors up front?
13	CHIEF MILLER: The generator room,
14	this building, and station two.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: The walk-in doors,
17	not the garage doors.
18	CHIEF MILLER: Yeah, they're all
19	bent out of shape, and it will secure
20	the building also. I mean, this place
21	obviously is not as secure as it could
22	be.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: So we'll be voting
24	on a resolution to do the doors, which
25	are part of Robert's report, but the

1	other part is he's doing that also
2	that fits under the 20,000 dollar
3	procurement policy, but they had the
4	two codes for that, so it's going to be
5	done simultaneously, but he's just
6	explaining what's going on with that.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So the
8	resolution is in Robert's report?
9	CHIEF MILLER: Yes.
LO	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: How is the new
L1	ambulance going?
12	CHIEF MILLER: Good. They had
L3	fire school tonight, so that went to
L 4	fire school with them tonight. We just
L5	got it in service, we got the okay from
L 6	the state, stickers, it's all certified
L7	and ready to go. It's in service.
L8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for
L 9	the chief?
20	CHIEF MILLER: Just one thing for
21	you, and I don't know if you'll be able
22	to make it, but the Southold Town
23	Chief's Council dinner is going to be
24	November 17th, and I think that's your
25	work session night. It's at Vinevard

1	Caterers. For some reason it's on a
2	Thursday this year, it's from 6:00 to
3	9:00 p.m., but you're invited.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'll look
5	at the calendar and see if I can.
6	Where is it at?
7	CHIEF MILLER: It's going to be at
8	Vineyard Caterers.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you for the
10	invite. Take care. Next, we had
11	public hearing on the Eastern Long
12	Island Hospital, their seawall curb
13	construction area project. We had the
14	public hearing, we took discussion on
15	it, it's up to us to discuss. Most
16	important, anybody have any questions
17	or issues with it so we can put
18	something on the agenda to move that
19	forward? Does anybody have any
20	questions? I think Paul got answers
21	for the couple of questions that we had
22	had. After the public hearing I
23	believe we got answers I think it was
24	the same day.
25	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I sent that

1	out, yeah.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm good.
3	MR. PROKOP: So I just want to let
4	the Board know that the Planning Board
5	had this on their agenda at the last
6	meeting, and if I'm not mistaken, they
7	approved it is my recollection. They
8	didn't make it as a specific condition,
9	but the Board did make a request or
10	recommendation that within six months
11	there be a drainage plan.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was my
13	question was the drainage plan.
14	MR. PALLAS: Correct. Nothing
15	it was a voluntary, they didn't make it
16	mandatory, they said that they need to
17	discuss their drainage issues with the
18	Village, that's how they more or less
19	left off with it.
20	MR. PROKOP: Basically maintain
21	drainage on site, and there was a
22	letter from an engineer submitted to
23	the Planning Board through the Village
24	Administrator saying that the project
25	will not make basically as I

1	understand it, saying that the project
2	will not make the drainage worse is
3	more or less what it said, and then so
4	the Planning Board voted to have that
5	recommendation in their approval.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Is that a letter
7	from John Conlon?
8	MR. PALLAS: No, it's an engineer
9	that we asked to do the
L 0	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If I remember
11	reading it correctly, it just states
L2	that it's not going to make their
L3	current situation, which does get a
L 4	little flooded once in a while, it's
L5	not going to make it any worse.
L 6	MR. PALLAS: Correct. I think the
L7	wording was it's not going to change
L8	the current situation.
L9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The drainage
20	situation, that's not something that we
21	can write as a condition into the
22	wetlands permit, is it?
23	MR. PROKOP: Yes, it is. You have
24	the right to review drainage especially
25	since there's a question as to whether

1	the drainage is into the wetlands.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I mean, we have
3	that project at the end of Manor Place,
4	which I did ask Paul if this was going
5	to effect it, and we have two different
6	versions because I have a project
7	that's in the discussion stages where I
8	checked and is going to make a
9	difference for some of the property
10	owners down there. So I'm a little
11	concerned I'm concerned about the
12	project, that we're following through
13	with it at the end of Manor Place, and
14	I'm not quite sure, and I'm not the
15	only one that has observed it. I'm
16	sure Jack observed it too, the rain run
17	off.
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: At this point I
20	have a concern about it, and I think it
21	just needs to be put into their
22	wetlands permit that we have a concern.
23	The drainage is a concern, and I know
24	you and I had a conversation about it,

and it was their drainage plan may go

25

1	back to a Planning Board decision that
2	was done maybe ten years ago when they
3	extended the envelope you know, they
4	exceeded or they expanded on their
5	building envelope, they took away a lot
6	of their parking spots and they did
7	elevate a little bit in the back. So I
8	would really ask that we put something
9	in it to deal with drainage, so that's
10	my request.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: What would you
12	like to be put in?
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That they
14	really need to come up with a drainage
15	plan for the drainage plan for their
16	property. You know, it's going to run
17	into the creek. I know it gets
18	filtered, but I just I'm just afraid
19	that and this may be a simple
20	layman's terms, but when you notice
21	where they actually ended the end of
22	the stone wall that they've put up, the
23	water is going to run around it. Right
24	now they've got something blocking it,
25	but if they pull that away from there,

1	the water is going to come down, and
2	it's naturally going to want to run
3	towards the creek. So that's my
4	concern. So I rather a drainage plan
5	or how they're going to deal with the
6	drainage, something that draws it to
7	their attention that the Planning Board
8	may have just made a simple
9	recommendation, but I think we need to
10	say we need to see it. My opinion. I
11	don't know how anybody else feels about
12	it.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I thought
14	that they had said along that that
15	part of it was along that wall, I
16	believe it was an eighteen inch strip
17	of I thought that that was it, I
18	don't I'm not engineer, I don't know
19	how much will go down there. I know
20	that I believe I read that, if I'm not
21	mistaken.
22	MR. PALLAS: That's correct.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm not an
24	engineer, so I wouldn't know but
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just, you

1	know, as I said I would rather err on
2	the side of caution because it does
3	the rain water does ruin the blacktop,
4	it does run into the creek, we have an
5	MS-4 problem with storm water runoff.
6	I know that the creek level comes up
7	because the seawater is getting higher
8	coast-wide, and it's going to keep
9	going, and I just the properties
10	there will start suffering.
11	MR. PROKOP: What the Planning
12	Board does with approvals sometimes is
13	they require the applicant to come back
14	at a later time to review the approval
15	or to review a condition. So one of
16	the things you might consider doing is
17	to request that report, and then have
18	it come back at a later time on our
19	agenda.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Is that what
21	you're looking for, are you looking to
22	stop the project and not issue the
23	permit at this time?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm not
25	looking to stop the project, I'm just

1	putting out that there needs to be a
2	discussion on drainage. The Planning
3	Board the hospital has been kind of
4	laid back on their comments or
5	questions or response to the drainage
6	question, and I think at this point I
7	would like to see it reviewed. I'm not
8	for stopping the project, I just want
9	to make sure that they respect the fact
LO	that there are properties that are
L1	along that waterfront that they could
12	be possibly adding to the already
13	height of the tides when they're coming
L 4	in and during storms and the storm
L5	runoff as it is. That's my concern.
L 6	If it's something we can put in to have
L7	it reviewed, I think that would be the
L8	best route to go, but I would like to
L 9	make them accountable for it. That's
20	what I'm not seeing from them, I'm not
21	seeing them being accountable for the
22	drainage.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: How long a
24	time are you thinking? How far out in
25	the future?

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think
2	they have to finish the project, they
3	have to get around to the other side
4	because they're stopped, correct?
5	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What is their
7	estimated time of finishing the
8	project?
9	MR. PALLAS: I can't imagine it's
10	more than a week or two, quite frankly,
11	I mean, they went pretty quickly on
12	what they built, so I would guess once
13	they restart, maybe a couple of weeks.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So if we were
15	to go for six months and then come
16	back, would that be a reasonable time?
17	MR. PALLAS: For them to fix the
18	drainage problem or to provide
19	information?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To provide the
21	information to us so that we could
22	review it.
23	MR. PALLAS: I think that's ample.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They're looking
25	for a drainage plan. I think that's

1	what we're requesting of everybody as
2	of late, are we not? I mean, we're
3	requesting people downtown to put in
4	drainage, even if it's they're one
5	gutter, they're requiring drainage for
6	one gutter. So I think that the
7	hospital needs to take the proactive
8	approach of trying to take care of
9	that.
10	MR. PALLAS: I think I don't
11	see a reason why they couldn't come
12	back to you in six months with a plan.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's what the
14	Planning Board asked for, so you want
15	it part of their wetlands permit
16	application that we're going to approve
17	that you want them to come back with a
18	solidified drainage plan within six
19	months.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm just asking
22	what you're asking for to make sure the
23	motion is written up on the agenda that
24	way.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm

1	asking for is that at the end of six
2	months, after the completion of the
3	project, at the end of six months they
4	come back with a drainage plan.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Everybody
6	comfortable with that?
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm
8	comfortable with that, absolutely.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll put that as
10	part of their agenda item for next
11	week. Any other discussion on that?
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll move on to
14	the next. We had a public hearing
15	amending Chapter 132 of vehicle and
16	traffic, Section 49, Schedule 11, no
17	parking any time under Village Code, no
18	parking can be on the east side
19	Carpenter Street from Bay Avenue north
20	to the dead end of Carpenter Street.
21	We had the public hearing on it. There
22	was a few comments, there was a couple
23	of written letters that came in on it
24	questioning going all the way to the
25	end of the road or just going up to

1	Ludlam Place. That's open for
2	discussion now.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I feel that
4	it shouldn't be all the way to the end,
5	I think by the time you get to Ludlam
6	Place or even Central Avenue, the
7	traffic drops the parking drops off
8	considerably. There are houses down
9	there with people who really don't have
10	much off street parking at all. I know
11	of one house that has no off street
12	parking, definitely going to be
13	impacted by this, and I really think
14	that we don't need to extend it all the
15	way to the dead end. I would say
16	either Central or Ludlam, either one of
17	those corners.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, at the
19	minimum it would have to go to Ludlam.
20	If you're going to keep Central Avenue
21	behind Emilio's with parking there,
22	it's not going to get any better. I
23	mean, that's really that's the end
24	of the commercial district when you get

to Ludlam, and then from on it's really

25

1	just houses.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. There's
3	no businesses down there, and as I
4	said, I think those houses down there
5	need parking, if nothing else, for
6	their own vehicles.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, my
8	original goal was to get it out for
9	discussion and to get something put.
10	My concern is the emergency vehicles
11	trying to get through there, that has
12	always been a right spot. I think at
13	one point years ago there was much
14	discussion about trying to get the fire
15	trucks to even make the corners down
16	there. So as I said, I don't have any
17	objection, I think to Ludlam is
18	probably a good compromise.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Would that
20	work for the fire trucks?
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. The biggest
22	problem they had when they used to come
23	down Park Street is they couldn't make
24	a left to get onto Ludlam with people
25	parked up to the corners. We've

1	brought that back, two spots back past
2	the house that's there except for the
3	house that's on the corner of Central.
4	So they've been able to get through the
5	corner that way, but now with the
6	congestion and the new business that
7	are opened up along Carpenter Street,
8	there's been lot of congestion between
9	Bay Avenue and Ludlam Place with people
10	parking there, and it's hard to get
11	through. So I think that would by
12	going from Bay Avenue to Ludlam would
13	solve the issue of what we had. If we
14	need to extend it farther in the
15	future, we can, but I think that would
16	solve the issue of what we had what
17	we went through this past summer.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, as
19	I said, my original goal was just to
20	get it out for the topic of discussion
21	and see how, you know, everyone felt
22	about it so I
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: So Joe, to change
24	this, if we want to switch this, we
25	need to re-notice what we're going to

1	be voting on?
2	MR. PROKOP: You don't need to
3	re-notice it, you just you need at
4	least eight days before the change and
5	the day that you vote so
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Eight days or
7	seven days?
8	MR. PROKOP: It's seven days
9	excluding Sunday, so it's really eight
LO	days. You couldn't change it tonight
11	and vote on it next week. It would
L2	have to be voted on next month.
L3	MAYOR HUBBARD: We didn't do that
L 4	when we did Wickham Street, we changed
L5	it at the work session and then we
L 6	voted on it the following week.
L7	MR. PROKOP: It was a different
18	change, there were other circumstances
L 9	but this one would be
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. So
21	then that one we're not going to take
22	any action on that, we're going to
23	re-notice it that we're changing it
24	from Bay Avenue to Ludlam Place for the
25	no parking, and then that will be up

1	for a vote next month.
2	MR. PROKOP: You don't have to
3	re-notice it, you just need the time
4	period, so we'll put it on the website
5	the new language on the website, and
6	that will be sufficient notice.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm just making
8	sure the clerk has that, she's writing
9	it down, so she'll notice that that
10	we're changing it, and we'll vote on
11	that next month then.
12	MR. PROKOP: What is that change?
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's going to be
14	no parking from Bay Avenue heading
15	north to Ludlam Place, no parking on
16	the east side of Carpenter Street. Any
17	other discussion on that?
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll move
20	to Village Administrator Pallas.
21	MR. PALLAS: Thank you. Good
22	evening, everybody. In addition to the
23	regular reports, I have two
24	resolutions. One is not on this, it
25	was just sent out a few days ago. The

1	first one is to ratify the emergency
2	repair of engine number four. The
3	second is the road reconstruction
4	authorizing the road reconstruction for
5	Carpenter Street, curbs, sidewalks, and
6	paving, Carpenter Street and Monsell
7	Place, and I if possible, I don't
8	know if you can vote on that tonight,
9	if you're comfortable voting on it, we
10	may be able to get into the schedule
11	for the curbs and sidewalks contractor
12	as early as the beginning of next. If
13	we wait to vote until next week, then
14	it would be pushed off, I don't know
15	when we'd fit in their schedule. So I
16	don't know if you're comfortable with
17	that or not, but I just wanted to throw
18	that out there as a possibility.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Did
20	everybody review the plans and see what
21	we've got going on?
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a project
25	we've talked about this for quite a

1	while so
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it's the
3	top of Monsell Place, correct?
4	MR. PALLAS: Just the one block,
5	yes.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Monsell, from Main
7	to Sterling.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm fine with
9	it.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm fine with
11	it.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: All good.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll offer a
14	motion to authorize the commencement of
15	work on Carpenter Street and on Monsell
16	Place.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll second that.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Opposed? Motion
23	carried. You can try to get on the
24	schedule. And we'll ratify that at our
25	meeting next week.

1	MR. PROKOP: Is there a cost on
2	that?
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: 315,000 dollars.
4	MR. PROKOP: That should be part
5	of the vote.
6	MR. PALLAS: Well, there's a
7	separate resolution under Robert's,
8	same question will be asked for
9	Robert's for the budget modification.
LO	You can do it now, if you want.
11	MR. PROKOP: There should be two.
12	The one that you did should include the
13	315 and then there should be a separate
L 4	budget modification.
L5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Let me
L 6	get this clear, in other words, we need
L7	to do the budget modification as well
L8	as this resolution all at the same
L 9	time?
20	MR. PROKOP: Yes, it's two
21	resolutions together, yes, because you
22	need to appropriate the money.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Where is
24	it here?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll offer a

1	motion to do a budget modification of
2	transferring 315,000 dollars from
3	appropriated fund balance into capital
4	out of capital to general and to
5	road construction and contractual for
6	315,000.
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Second.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
LO	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
L1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Opposed? Motion
L3	carried. Again, we'll ratify that also
L 4	for next week.
L 5	MR. PALLAS: Thank you. The next
L 6	item I have, I don't know if there's a
L7	representative here from the Lavender
L8	Farm, they had requested if the Board
L 9	would be interested in allowing them to
20	use Moore's Lane for parking for their
21	annual trek to the Lavender Farm in
22	July. Again, I don't think there's a
23	representative here, so I don't I
24	have very limited information from
25	them. The last correspondence I got,

1	which I only got a couple of days ago
2	actually, I apologize, that they're
3	looking something in the order of two
4	to three hundred cars, but they are
5	hiring a firm to do an analysis of the
6	parking and how many spaces,
7	attendants, and security will be
8	needed. They haven't done the analysis
9	yet, they're thinking about two to
10	three hundred cars at any given time.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry,
12	analysis on our property?
13	MR. PALLAS: I assume. That's
14	this was all a discussion about I'm
15	just telling you what they told me.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And have they
17	not I mean, I'm going to ask a
18	question because I know that they're in
19	the Suffolk County Land Preservation
20	Program, and that limits some of their
21	usage of their property. They can't
22	find parking on their property
23	anywhere? It's just a general
24	question.
25	MR. PALLAS: Understood. I do not

know, this was just a request that they
put to me to ask you all about whether
there would be any interest in speaking
with them about this as a possibility.
That was and what I told you is all
I know.

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MAYOR HUBBARD: I think the plan that they were talking about was when people coming down Route 48, instead of bottlenecking all the way into East Marion, to put a sign up for parking on Moore's Lane, have people park on Moore's Lane and take them out by shuttle so it's not a reoccurrence of what happened last year. It's a matter -- we need to have their parking study, but we also need to know the dates that they're doing it because if it's 4th of July weekend, we have our carnival is there with fireworks and everything else, and they can't use it during that weekend, and that was the worst weekend they had this past year was 4th of July weekend, so that plan will not work. If it's later on in July, and they want

1	to park a hundred cars on Moore's Lane
2	and take people by bus to ease
3	congestion on 48, you know, I don't
4	think it would be a bad thing, as long
5	as the polo grounds are not being used.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And we'd get
7	some kind of payment?
8	MR. PALLAS: I would think so,
9	yes.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, they would be
L1	renting property from us and making
L2	sure that it's taken care of. If it's
L3	a rainy weekend and they're out in the
L 4	field and it's all rough and everything
L5	else, they'd be responsible. But they
L 6	were going to come and explain what
L7	they wanted, but they've asked us
L8	several times, we had them on for
L 9	today, and obviously they couldn't make
20	it.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I would think
22	that we would also want them to have
23	some kind of a security company or
24	somebody to manage that traffic, you
25	know, get it in there and get it out of

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1	there.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, that's part
3	of what their proposal was. They're
4	looking at how it might possibly work.
5	They were asked I believe by the Town
6	of Southold to see if they could come
7	up with some other plan to not tie up
8	the north road as they did, and this
9	was one of their ideas was to use
10	there. So get some more information
11	from them, have them do their parking
12	study and come back with something
13	else. It's still six months away, but
14	if they've got something else in
15	writing that we could actually see,
16	then we could talk more about it.

MR. PALLAS: I will do that. Okay. Moving on to department reports, Road Department and Water Department, again, there's just a couple of highlighted tabs, I know there's some questions about the water machines, they are, as far as I know, as of before I went away to Albany, they were both working. We repaired -- replaced

1	a coin change piece of it, I think, I
2	don't know what it's actually called.
3	A few other items, we removed swimming
4	buoys, checked channel markers, still
5	working on signs as we find problems
6	with signs that need to be replaced,
7	and they put up hunting signs for the
8	hunting season.
9	Some projects, they did Moore's
10	Lane, they did a lot of clearing and
11	cleaning of trees and vines and worked
12	both the road crew worked and the
13	Light Department worked on it as well,
14	cleaned a lot of things up there, fixed
15	some signs. We had gotten several
16	complaints about it, so we did that
17	work as well.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, could you
19	go over the tree committee and the
20	village working together on the tree
21	project?
22	MR. PALLAS: Specifically?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, there was
24	an e-mail that we all received from the
25	chairperson on the tree committee and

1	I'm really not clear as to what he was
2	talking about.
3	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I spoke with
4	him. I'm not sure, to be honest, what
5	prompted it because they had met with
6	both the Electric Department and the
7	Road Department and decided on who was
8	going to do what work, so apparently he
9	wasn't sure that that's what was
10	decided. There were no changes,
11	nothing has changed, we are still doing
12	the same things that we were doing, so
13	I don't
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because I had
15	seen him cutting trees today.
16	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, they're working
17	on the list that they both agreed, so I
18	don't know, I'm not sure. I think
19	maybe because he didn't see progress he
20	was concerned, but also wasn't sure of
21	who was doing what. I met with him,
22	spoke with him, we're updating the list
23	as the work gets done and keeping him
24	informed.
25	Moving on to the Sewer Department,

1	again, in addition to some of the
2	regular items, just one project that
3	they're working on as one of the main
4	drive motors has failed and they're
5	working on repairs, that's in progress
6	as we speak. It's a rather large piece
7	of equipment, we've found gotten a
8	couple of quotes on it, and I think
9	it's being worked on as we speak.
LO	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that in one
L1	of the new pieces?
12	MR. PALLAS: It's part of the new
L3	plant, yes, I forget the the area
L 4	motor.
L 5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So it had a
L 6	malfunction?
L7	MR. PALLAS: Mechanical. The
L8	shaft actually seems to have we
L 9	don't know, it's all encased, but it
20	appears that the shaft separated from
21	the drive motor. It was an odd
22	failure. Once we open it up, and
23	again, I haven't spoken with them, I
24	haven't had an opportunity to see where
25	the status is, so I don't know what, if

1	anything, they found as of now.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do you have an
3	estimate on the repair?
4	MR. PALLAS: Do not, until they
5	open it.
6	Moving on to the Electric
7	Department, we did all of our DMNC test
8	on all of the engines, and we're within
9	the right time frame. Engine number
10	four, as I think I've reported a couple
11	of times, has been repaired, working
12	it works well, and everything is fine
13	with that. Questions on those
14	departments?
15	Building Department and Code
16	Enforcement, again, we're just
17	beginning the process of getting our
18	new Code Enforcer, Traffic Enforcement
19	individual trained on building code
20	matters, and he's started to do some
21	very small general code enforcement
22	work. That's an ongoing process, we're
23	ramping up that as we go as the traffic
24	season, if you will, is starting to
25	slow down or has slowed down, he's

1	going to be able to spend more time on
2	regular general code enforcement. And
3	also I've attached the statistics for
4	the parking ticket information. Month
5	of September, we had 13,300 in fines
6	collected and the total to date as of
7	the end of September was a little over
8	34,000 dollars.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a
10	question because you did tow a car out
11	of the parking lot, that's the one
12	that's up at the wastewater treatment
13	plant?
14	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What's the next
16	plan for that vehicle?
17	MR. PALLAS: We're trying to get
18	in touch with the owner as I understand
19	it. I haven't again, I haven't
20	gotten an update from Greg. I think
21	the car has virtually been abandoned.
22	I don't think there's anybody that's
23	claiming ownership.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So what's the
25	next step for that because I don't

1	really want to see
2	MR. PALLAS: We're going to get
3	rid of it.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A car garage.
5	MR. PALLAS: No, we definitely
6	will be getting rid of it soon.
7	MR. PROKOP: We know who the owner
8	is, we contacted the person before.
9	The car was basically abandoned in our
10	Village lot. We know we determined
11	who the owner was, Officer Morris was
12	able to find that out. He was in
13	contact with the person several times
14	with written notices. He placarded the
15	car, nothing happened. The person had
16	several days notice. We removed the
17	car because it was considered to be in
18	an unsafe location to our Village lot.
19	We tried to have it removed to a tow
20	lot. The tow company would not do
21	that, so we had it removed to a Village
22	lot. We're going to go through an
23	abandonment procedure with the Village
24	if the person doesn't respond. We're
25	still trying to reach the person, but

1	we apparently know who it is and where
2	the person lives, he just isn't
3	responding, so we will go through an
4	abandonment procedure if he doesn't
5	respond and we'll auction the car or
6	dispose of it, whatever we need to do.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have a question
8	on that last item there on the
9	mandatory carbon monoxide detectors now
LO	in the New York State code?
L1	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I know that later
13	in the report we're talking about we're
L 4	going to be hiring a Fire Marshall.
L5	Are we going to initiate inspections
L 6	then of all the commercial buildings to
L7	make sure that they're compliant with
L8	their CO2 detectors.
L 9	MR. PALLAS: That's part of the
20	I would assume part of the Fire
21	Marshall's process.
22	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm going to
24	ask a question because, I mean, from
25	reading this I knew about it, okay, and

1	maybe I've missed it, but I haven't
2	seen any outreach to the commercial
3	community. Have you been around?
4	MR. PALLAS: Yes, we sent letters
5	actually.
6	Moving on to Recreation
7	Department, just a couple of highlight
8	items. We've started gearing up for
9	the ice rink to open, flyers are being
LO	made and distributed to schools for
L1	that. We're also working with two
L2	separate groups for, like, contractual
L3	arrangement as we did last year with
L 4	one, this year we should have two under
L 5	contract to use the ice rink. Those
L 6	contracts should be done Friday or
L7	Monday, I'll be sending it to legal
L 8	counsel for review. The contract is
L 9	pretty much the same as the contract
20	is pretty much the same as last year, a
21	couple of minor changes. I don't
22	anticipate any issues with that either.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I do have a
24	question of planning since I happen to
25	notice that there's been a fair amount

1	of repairs for the pump out boat. Is
2	that something that we need to review,
3	the life of that boat?
4	MR. PALLAS: Yes, definitely. In
5	fact, it's actually out for repair now,
6	and this only happened in the last
7	couple of days, so I haven't even
8	gotten a chance to find out what's
9	going on, but certainly there's been a
10	lot of issues with that boat and it
11	needs a complete review.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Has it been
13	operator issues, or has it been
14	equipment issues.
15	MR. PALLAS: Equipment issues.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The life
17	expectancy on those type of boats I
18	mean, we've had that for a while, have
19	we not?
20	MR. PALLAS: Again, it was here
21	when I got here, so I don't know.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm not sure how
23	old it is.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was a grant
25	or something, it was something with the

1	Town of Southold years ago that we got
2	that. Okay.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: They had an issue
4	where a steering cable broke during the
5	summer, which was repaired. I heard
6	they tried to use it on Saturday and
7	the engine would not run. They said
8	that something is wrong with the engine
9	and they want it towed to Gull Smith to
10	have it looked at was the update I got
11	today on it.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then there
13	was something with the actual system
14	itself, wasn't there, we didn't have a
15	pump?
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, those
17	filters were clogged several times, but
18	the gentleman who was down there was
19	able to take care of it in the past,
20	and now we just need to train somebody
21	new on what's going on.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, it
23	just seemed to be down more than it was
24	up.
25	MR. PALLAS: Yup. As far as the

1	mooring, famous dock, railroad dock,
2	we're updating applications, and they
3	will be mailed out this month.
4	Moving on to the rec center
5	itself
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just to back up
7	onto the ice rink, I know last year we
8	had the other compressor, but it wasn't
9	installed in. When that's all being
LO	put together, we're putting in the
L1	fourth compressor as we put the whole
L2	thing together?
L3	MR. PALLAS: Yes, the fourth
L 4	compressor will be installed and
L 5	operational. It's physically here, we
L 6	just have to have it installed.
L 7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. At the end
L 8	of last year it came in, they said it
L 9	wasn't going to make any difference,
20	putting it in at the time didn't
21	warrant for somebody to come out
22	special to just do that, that's why
23	we're making sure they're putting it in
24	place when the rink goes together this
25	year.

1	MR. PALLAS: Correct. We're going
2	to do that at the same time we're doing
3	the start up.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And the
5	condenser, that was also talked about
6	last year?
7	MR. PALLAS: We just haven't had a
8	chance to do anything with that, but we
9	think with the four compressors working
10	I think we'll be able to work
11	operationally. We made some minor
12	changes with the condenser with the
13	venting, which did seem to help a
14	little bit, and I think with the four
15	compressors we should be in pretty good
16	shape.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: When are they
18	going to start on that?
19	MR. PALLAS: I don't I haven't
20	got a schedule yet, George.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. It's not
22	going to stay eighty degrees for much
23	longer, and, you know, so.
24	MR. PALLAS: I know. The rec
25	center, they are working with the

1	library on the literacy program, which
2	is held four times a week. It seems
3	like a very good program. There's a
4	variety of things that they're doing
5	there, movie night movie day rather
6	with pre-K and kindergarten. That's
7	pretty much it for me.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any questions for
9	Mr. Pallas?
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
12	Okay. We have Stephen Gaffga is here
13	in place of Treasurer Brandt who is
14	having procedures taken care of.
15	MR. GAFFGA: Good evening,
16	everybody. Let's start with there's
17	quite a few resolutions to go over.
18	The first one is the appropriating fire
19	apparatus reserves to fund the purchase
20	of the ambulance. That was about
21	198,254 dollars. The second resolution
22	we are going to have to wait on. The
23	change order for the ambulance was not
24	voted on by the wardens, so we have to
25	move that on until that procedure has

1	been followed, so we'll have to wait on
2	that resolution for appropriating the
3	fire apparatus.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: They didn't vote
5	on that last night?
6	MR. GAFFGA: That's what I was
7	told by Wayne.
8	The third resolution is the budget
9	amendment to fund the retaining wall
10	engineering plans.
11	The fourth resolution is the
12	budget amendment to fund the repair of
13	the aerator gear drive system. That
14	was I believe just under 10,000
15	dollars, about 9,800.
16	The fifth resolution is for the
17	budget amendment 3526 to fund
18	replacement of the parts for engine
19	number four, and the amount on that was
20	140,000.
21	The sixth resolution is for the
22	capital purchase of the replacement
23	doors, authorizing the fire department
24	to purchase the doors for a total of
25	29,564.72 pursuant to the Suffolk

1	County contract DCR020116.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's the
3	resolution that the chief was speaking
4	about?
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's off of a
7	County contract, right?
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
9	MR. GAFFGA: Yes.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: But when you're
11	going off County contract, we have to
12	state by Board resolution that we're
13	doing that, that's why we didn't go out
14	to bid for it because the County
15	contract was cheaper, and that's in our
16	that's procurement policy.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just wanted
18	to make sure that everyone knows that.
19	MR. GAFFGA: And the last
20	resolution is to accept the proposal
21	submitted by BST for the opening of the
22	rate study for the sewer and water
23	rates. That's going to be at a fee not
24	to exceed 10,976 dollars. They were
25	the low bidder by quite a bit.

1	To go on to the utility billing,
2	we have our part-time meter reader,
3	Brendan, everything is on schedule.
4	Sector three is currently being brought
5	in and sector four will start being
6	read hopefully by tomorrow and will be
7	done by the end of the month, so
8	everything should be on time. One item
9	of note in the housing authority is
10	that there was one unit that failed
11	inspection due to some damage caused by
12	tenant, which was paid for and fixed by
13	the tenant, so that's all taken care
14	of.
15	We paid the 75% payment for the
16	TCC, so that contract is good, and I
17	believe that's about it.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any questions?
19	Okay. Thank you. Okay. The Village
20	Clerk?
21	MS. PIRILLO: Good evening, ladies
22	and gentlemen.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening.
24	MS. PIRILLO: I normally start
25	with additions, so to change it up I'll

1	start with a deletion. Similar to the
2	treasurer's office deletion, I also
3	have one on my report for the 1,700
4	dollar change order, so that's going to
5	have to wait until next month as well.
6	My deputy and I attended the
7	Planning and Zoning SCAVOA seminar last
8	week, and thank you for allowing us to
9	attend, it was very informative. In
LO	addition, I was able to obtain
11	additional copies of one of the
L2	handouts, which is a Planning and
L3	Zoning outline, so I provided one for
L 4	the Planning chair and one for the
L5	Zoning chair, and I hope that's
L 6	helpful.
L7	Date of the upcoming Village
L8	election is March 21st. There are two
L 9	open trustee positions. Each trustee
20	term is four years. The Third Street
21	Firehouse will be the polling place.
22	Voting hours will be 6:00 a.m. to 9:00
23	p.m. Assuming that there are two
24	Village voter registration days, as

have been in the past, the first one is

L	Thursday, March 9th, and the second is
2	Saturday, March 11th. November 21,
3	2016 is the first day that the Village
1	Clerk may accept absentee ballot
5	applications.

Under legal notices, there was an advertisement for a Zoning Board member in the September 29th edition of the papers. There was a return date of the 13th October. Four responses were received. There was an advertisement for a Housing Authority board member. It was noticed in the October 6th edition of the paper with a return date of October 20th, and no responses were received.

The sewer main extension at Beach
Street engineering design services RFP
was noticed in the October 6th edition
of the paper with a return date of
October 20th. Three responses were
received. One was from DMB for a total
of 159,000 dollars divided into eight
tasks and including 15,000 dollars in
out of pocket expenses. Another was

from H2M for a total of 231,000 dollars
divided into seven tasks and with an
additional estimated 12,000 dollars for
task eight, which was not included in
the RFP. Cache and Associates quoted
157,343 dollars, and this information
will be copied to the Board tomorrow.
It was a late opening today, and Paul
has not had time to review it, but I
just wanted to let everyone know that
they were opened, and those were the
three numbers.

On November 2nd, Bill Vonife will be initializing the installation of the rounding boards at the Carousel. The Carousel Committee would like to make that an event. As soon as we know the time, we'd like to invite the press and the public to attend. We now have seven of the fourteen rounding boards completed with all of the others in progress, so the committee would like to thank everyone for their help and patience.

The BID meeting that was scheduled

1	for today has been moved to next week,
2	the 27th of October.
3	That's it. I went quickly. Any
4	questions on any
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sylvia, you
6	sent an e-mail out earlier today in
7	reference asking us for input on a one
8	day film
9	MS. PIRILLO: A one day still
L 0	photo shoot, yes.
L1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that
12	something that you want to discuss here
13	today?
L 4	MS. PIRILLO: If the Board would
L5	like to, sure.
L 6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My
L7	understanding is that from what I'm
L8	understanding is that they're not
L 9	actually going to be closing down or
20	the need to close down any streets,
21	it's just walking along the streets.
22	MS. PIRILLO: Correct. No need
23	for road closure. Most of the filming
24	will take place on private property
25	with limited use of our Village

1	property.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: It was three or
3	four models and some staff just taking
4	pictures.
5	MS. PIRILLO: Entire staff of
6	fourteen, so it's much less of a
7	project than we had this past week,
8	which by the way, went very well.
9	Everyone cooperated well, everyone was
LO	well-organized, they were finished
11	sooner than expected, so it went
L2	exceedingly well.
L3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't have a
L 4	problem with is it Dance Co.?
L5	MS. PIRILLO: Yes, it is.
L 6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think it's
L7	great, I don't have a problem with it.
L8	I would like to say that I am much
L 9	happier with having the information
20	e-mailed in this manner instead of a
21	short as I said, I like having
22	information ahead of time, so thank you
23	very much for accommodating me being
24	questioning the last one, but I think
25	it went well, and it served its

1	purpose. As I said, I prefer to have
2	as much information as possible when
3	you're asking for a late, you know,
4	last minute application, which I think
5	is possible. I think we're flexible
6	enough to do that. I don't quite agree
7	with Trustee Roberts' suggestion in his
8	work session report today. He has a
9	suggestion for a late fee for
10	applicants, an amount which I think we
11	need to be flexible as a Village. I
12	thank you for providing the information
13	in this manner, and I hope it
14	continues.
15	MS. PIRILLO: I provide the
16	information to the Board as it's
17	provided to me, so some of the projects
18	unfortunately require a lot of work.
19	They require scoping out areas and
20	various other factors go into it, so we
21	don't always unfortunately have the
22	time that we'd like to have, but as
23	soon as I have the information, I
24	disseminate it.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think

1	we all agree that getting that
2	information is much helpful.
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
4	It makes it much easier when people are
5	asking questions. We can answer them.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for
7	the clerk?
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
10	MS. PIRILLO: Thank you.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Move on to the
12	Village Attorney's report.
13	MR. PROKOP: My report is very
14	brief. I just have one request, as was
15	mentioned before, I'd like the Board to
16	consider putting out a request to
17	retain a Fire Marshall for at least a
18	few hours a week to start off with.
19	The reason for this is we had access in
20	the past to the Southold Town Fire
21	Marshall when there was a specific
22	need, and things have come up, I've
23	contacted Southold, and their Fire
24	Marshall time now is really very
25	limited or not really available to us

1	at all I was told, and we need to have
2	somebody it's my recommendation that
3	we have somebody on staff for that
4	reason. There are also other things
5	that come up from time to time that we
6	need a Fire Marshall to be able to
7	respond to, an I make the suggestion
8	for that reason.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Is that something
10	that the building inspector cannot take
11	care of?
12	MR. PROKOP: Right. It's a
13	different certification.
14	The other thing I wanted to
15	mention to the Board is that in case
16	you're not aware, some of the large
17	applications that have been pending
18	before the Planning Board and also the
19	Zoning Board of Appeals are now being
20	acted on. As an example, the project
21	at Front and Third is being is going
22	through the process now of being acted
23	on by the Zoning Board of Appeals. So
24	they reviewed all the different
25	variances that are involved at their

1	meeting on Tuesday night. They didn't
2	take a formal action, they'll probably
3	be trying to do that at the next
4	meeting, but they did go down the list
5	of variances and have a discussion on
6	each one, so they are in the process of
7	trying to come to a conclusion of that
8	application. And the couple of other
9	applications that there are a couple
LO	of other applications that they acted
L1	on. I don't have anything else to
12	there is I do need a brief executive
13	session tonight to discuss litigation.
L 4	There is something that's come up in
L5	litigation I need to discuss with the
L 6	board, and any questions that you have
L7	that are appropriate for executive
L8	session also. Does anybody have any
19	questions for me.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
22	MR. PROKOP: I just want sorry,
23	to piggyback what was said about
24	Officer Morris, you know, getting the
25	we have what's called a parking day

1	now in the Southold court, and people
2	that are questioning their tickets
3	have questions about their tickets
4	come, and I've seen it's actually a
5	very limited number of questions about
6	tickets compared to the number of
7	tickets that he's issuing. I've been
8	working with him very closely. Every
9	day or so he contacts me about
10	questions that he has, and he's really
11	I think he's really done a great job
12	and gotten up to speed very quickly.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Have we taken care
14	of all of the questions that we had of
15	the comptroller's office?
16	MR. PROKOP: So I've spoken to
17	Robert about that a number of times
18	because that's really a coordination of
19	Greg, Officer Morris, Robert, the
20	treasurer, Robert Brandt, and myself
21	because we both have different we
22	both view different parts of the
23	system, and Treasurer Brandt has done
24	has been in contact with both
25	Southold and the comptroller. Whatever

1	the log jam was as far as getting the
2	money moving has been removed as far as
3	I know due to Robert's work on this,
4	and he we have gotten several checks
5	now from office of the I think the
6	comptroller releases it to Southold,
7	and then we get the money from
8	Southold. So Robert has an exact
9	number of that, but he's been able to
LO	get a couple of big checks now.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Have they
L2	corrected July? The last I knew July
L3	had not been received yet.
L 4	MR. PALLAS: That I do not know,
L5	but I can follow up.
L 6	MR. PROKOP: Right. We got it
L7	backwards, we got some of the later
L8	money first I think.
L 9	MS. PIRILLO: July was corrected
20	by not received. So actually one check
21	was received and we're awaiting two
22	more.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a new system
24	and everything else, and I mean, I just
25	don't want it to be backlogged and

1	
1	we're waiting three, four months to get
2	the money that's already bee paid in.
3	If you could work with Robert and try
4	to get that rectified. We had gotten
5	one check, we got something for August,
6	but we didn't get July's yet last I had
7	checked with it, and we just need to
8	have that taken care of. Instead if
9	sitting on somebody else's paupers, we
10	need to collect those.
11	MR. PROKOP: At the management
12	meetings that we've been having, you
13	know, we try for weekly, it's pretty
14	much every other week, one of the
15	topics that we go over is we actually

16 look at the reports that Robert has 17 been getting from the comptroller's officer and also from Southold and, you 18 19 know, going over exactly what the status is. So there was a couple of 20 corrections and it was taken care of. 21 22 The other thing is we should be getting reports from FBS, the collection 23 24 company now that there's activity, so I 25 should mention that to Robert and try

1	to work with him on that.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought there
3	was something that came to us recently.
4	MR. PALLAS: We have the report
5	here.
6	MS. PIRILLO: Greg is able to pull
7	reports of various types from the FBS
8	system, and he does that so that we can
9	reconcile to the paperwork that we
10	receive from the comptroller's office
11	because that's the first step before
12	going to Southold, so we try to make
13	sure on a monthly basis that those
14	numbers match.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
16	MR. PROKOP: At some point, you
17	know, working with this system in other
18	Villages I can tell you this all should
19	reconcile. The number of tickets that
20	we're writing should reconcile with the
21	money that we get from the
22	comptroller's and also the FBS reports.
23	Now that this is set up and working, we
24	should be able to reconcile those
25	reports, so I'll work with Robert and

1	Officer Morris.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I believe
3	everything had reconciled except we
4	haven't received the check, so that's,
5	you know, we need to get the checks
6	sent to us.
7	MR. PALLAS: We'll follow-up on
8	that.
9	MR. PROKOP: I can give them the
10	name and number of other municipalities
11	that are doing this, so if they have a
12	question about how to work all this
13	out. I'll get it for him.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Very good.
15	Anything else for the Village Attorney?
16	Report from committees, audit committee
17	we had a meeting, we recommended going
18	with BST as for sewer study, and there
19	was one other thing, I don't remember
20	what it was. There was one other
21	recommendation, I thought there was
22	two.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I think we
24	didn't quite come to a resolution on
25	the second one.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: So that's all it
2	was was the one.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was just the
4	one. The other one I think we never
5	really did come to general consensus
6	which direction we were going to go.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. All
8	right. That's all we had under
9	committees. We'll go to reports from
10	the Board, our Trustees. Where did I
11	start last month? I try to alternate,
12	and I don't remember.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think you
14	started over that way.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So we'll
16	start on this side.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Greenport
18	Improvement Committee is moving forward
19	with a project in November. They're
20	working on a round table discussion
21	with the some members of the
22	committee and some second members from
23	museums to try and work out monthly
24	displays in the schoolhouse towards
25	getting it open on a regular basis.

1	It's been a work in progress. There's
2	a lot of ideas thrown out, but they
3	need to focus in a direction. I'm
4	working on that. Some of the other
5	things that I've been working on, I've
6	been playing phone tag with and didn't
7	really get completed, so it's been
8	busy, but I don't have all the
9	information, so it will have to wait
10	until next month.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
12	Trustee Robins?
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The BID had a
14	meeting September 29th, so a number of
15	things discussed, one thing was the
16	webmaster Katherine Schroeder, she's
17	requesting three to four hundred
18	dollars for three to four hours of work
19	from Bastion, who was the creator of
20	the creator of the current web page
21	that they're using. It was designed
22	through Word Press. There's some
23	issues and updates that need to be
24	done. She reported that the Village of
25	Greenport BID Facebook page has

received 74,000 views, so a lot of
people are coming to check out the
Village online. John and Katherine are
working on a database of all business
owners, and when it's complete, they'll
use it to distribute the natural gas
survey. That will need to be monitored
and updated with any new changes in
businesses, but that's definitely a
step forward in terms of getting that
survey out.

Vandenburg (phonetic) is now serving as the interim president and John Kramer is the vice president. Sara Phillips has left the Board, so there will be an annual meeting December 1st, and there will be new officers nominated and a vote to replace and add some new people. Rich Vandenburg said that the Board needs an administrative assistant. There was discussion as the whether Katherine Schroeder should fill that role. She wrote a description of the tasks that she performs currently.

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Another question was whether she should

2	be at events to do photos for us. Rich
3	is going to be providing us at the next
4	meeting with a summary of what she's
5	doing. The next meeting, there's a
6	date change on my report here, it's
7	actually been moved to next week on the
8	27th. It will be an extended meeting
9	to plan the agenda for the annual
10	meeting and voting of officers.
11	They're going to check the procedure
12	for online voting in the bylaws and a
13	copy of the bylaws was made by Kim
14	Loper and distributed to all the
15	members at the meeting.
16	John Kramer met with the owner of
17	Ralph's to discuss the trash problem
18	over there. It's certainly one of the
19	key areas, they're generating a lot of
20	trash and messiness on the sidewalk, so
21	we're going to be checking with the
22	Village about code enforcement. They

did want to know if the BID were to

Village would be willing to collect the

purchase extra trash cans, if the

1	trash from them. They are definitely
2	willing to put the money up to
3	supplement the cans to help keep
4	everything looking good downtown. The
5	BID Beautification Committee discussed
6	having businesses sponsor projects that
7	they're working on. Some of the
8	additional businesses that are not
9	right in the downtown district asked if
10	they could have planters in front of
11	their businesses. I put out a question
12	to the membership at the meeting about
13	parking and asked for some input on how
14	they thought the last summer's parking
15	management went. The consensus at the
16	meeting was that there should be
17	consistency, and they would like to see
18	two hour parking uniformly throughout
19	the Village, and not, like, a melange
20	of different, you know, parking times
21	at different places. And besides the
22	consistency in that, they said that
23	adequate signage throughout would be
24	really important. And I know Paul said
25	that we have been working on that, but

1	I think there's still probably some
2	room for improvement next year.
3	BID needs a secretary and a
4	treasurer. John has asked Cindy
5	Cavatti (phonetic) from Capital One to
6	join as treasurer. John will bring her
7	up to speed and educate her on, you
8	know, BID treasurer's job and what has
9	to be done. He referred back to
10	John referred back to the report from
11	Marco Lamandry (phonetic), the BID
12	consultant that they hired a year ago
13	to come and discuss different ways to
14	organize the BID and make it more
15	effective. He recommended the BID hire
16	an admin to perform the duties, and
17	that admin could do the secretarial
18	job. I think that's one of the
19	positions that they have a hard time
20	filling is secretary. They voted on
21	and approved to hire an admin for
22	twenty dollars an hour. John Kramer
23	has obtained some insurance quotes for
24	the BID, and he'll bring them to the
25	next meeting.

1	A little bit of discussion about
2	Dances in the Park, a couple of members
3	brought several members brought it
4	up and asked me to inquire about it.
5	They reported not seeing collection
6	boxes at one of the performances and
7	that they didn't see any money being
8	collected. They said that the band was
9	collected money and asked why they were
10	allowed to do that when the money
11	should be going to the Village.
12	Members also said that they knew many
13	local bands that would love to perform
14	for very reasonable rates, which could
15	result in less money expended for the
16	event overall.
17	Carol Miloski (phonetic) did a
18	promotion with the North Fork Chamber
19	of Commerce. She requested 165 dollars
20	for a Halloween event poster, and it
21	was approved. She's been working with
22	Trustee Phillips and Clerk Pirillo on
23	details of the event. And that's
24	basically the report from that meeting.
25	There was a Carousel meeting on

October 4th. Carousel is now

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2	consistently using traditional carousel
3	music. There was a little bit of
4	controversy about the fact that some of
5	the people working there were playing
6	music other than carousel band organ
7	music. Bob Wisman, who has been with
8	the carousel since it was brought here
9	to Greenport has been involved with
10	carousel maintenance for years, so he's
11	back, and he was updated on everything
12	that's been going on during the course
13	of almost a year that he's been down in
14	Florida and his wife was ill.
15	It was reported that a repair was
16	made to a broken four by four that
17	supports a row of horses. The four by
18	four was replaced in about two hours.
19	I was advised by Paul Pallas that the
20	four by four had a considerable amount
21	of dry rot which caused it to break. I
22	suggested to Paul that we do a full

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inspection of all framing members

during the winter to make sure there

are not other beams with this problem.

1	Painted wood can cover dry rot and make
2	it difficult to see. The wood needs to
3	be probed to make sure it is sound. It
4	was emphasized that staff should be
5	reminded to stop the ride if patrons
6	get a little overzealous. John
7	Kozinski (phonetic) is now working with
8	the Road Department, but he's still in
9	charge of lubricating the gears on a
10	weekly basis as well as other
11	maintenance.
12	Margot Devito reported that the
13	staffing at the Carousel has been
14	manageable this season. Dave Abottelli
15	mentioned that the upcoming Christmas
16	schedule when the Carousel will be open
17	during the week can present some
18	staffing problems. The Village is now

10	the original, the actual paintings that

L 4	Library. I suggested it would be best
L5	if the fundraising for the Carousel be
L 6	organized a group, other than by the
L 7	committee, which was part of the
L 8	Village. Gail Horton was going to
L 9	check with the Friends of Mitchell Park
20	about the possibility of having them
21	oversee this part of the project.
22	Plans for the holiday decorations at
23	the Carousel were made. Margot Devito
24	will ask John to bring decorations to
25	the Carousel this week after Halloween.

1	Arlene Klein and Marjorie Spetus
2	(phonetic) will review the existing
3	decorations and provide a list of
4	additional items needed to Margot and
5	Marjorie, and I will confirm the
6	holiday dates with Sylvia. Christmas
7	tree lighting will be Saturday,
8	December 3rd at 6:00 p.m. The
9	Christmas parade will be Sunday,
LO	December 11th at 11:00. The menorah
L1	lighting is still a time to be
L2	determined.
L3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's December
L 4	25th, isn't it?
L5	MS. PIRILLO: First of all, the
L 6	parade is at 1:00. It's on the 11th at
L7	1:00.
L8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Did I say that or
L 9	not? Maybe I transposed it. It's
20	December 11th at 1:00. It would be
21	appreciated if committee members
22	participated in decorating of the
23	Carousel on November 21st at 10:00.
24	This schedule will ensure that the job
25	is completed by December 2nd.

1	I just want to say Paul Pallas and
2	I just returned from a very productive
3	and whirlwind NYAP conference up in
4	Albany, some very interesting speakers
5	and we'll be writing a report. There's
6	some really important things going on
7	in the world of public power, which
8	will definitely have an impact on our
9	small municipal electric company as
10	well as the other municipal electric
11	companies in the state, so I will have
12	a report for you next month on that.
13	Okay? Thank you very much.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: My apologies
16	for not having this typed up,
17	unfortunately I was on I got called
18	up for State active duty for a few
19	weeks, I wasn't able to get it in in
20	time, I wasn't home. A few updates, as
21	far as scanning, suddenly it seems that
22	we have picked up the three scanners
23	from Southold Town, they are in the
24	Village, Village Hall. There's some
25	sort of conversion to use them, I guess

they're an older model scanner. We do
have them, so we're making progress
again, and I'm super excited about
that. Hopefully we can start scanning
soon.

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I met with members of the Legion They were concerned because we Hall. hadn't gotten them the water. I then spoke -- they need -- essentially the background is they need I believe it's a four inch water main to be brought in so that they can get their sprinklers going. Once the sprinklers are going, then they have access to essentially fire insurance. I spoke to Darryl, he felt he was very close to getting somebody to be able to do the work. Essentially it needs to come across Third Street, but it's got to go underneath that big drain, which is, like, a four foot depth, so it has to be I believe the term was coffered maybe on both sides, like, a cement wall on both sides of the pip to come underneath. He felt he was close on

1	that. I'll follow-up with him in a few
2	days, but the progress there as well.
3	Also concerning the ZBA position,
4	as per the Mayor I collected up all the
5	resumes, I've been reaching out to
6	everyone, I've spoken to several. I
7	haven't completed. When I am, I'll
8	present it all to you, sir, obviously,
9	and I'm going to work with Mr. Pallas
10	as well. So that's going on well, I'm
11	hoping that will be done soon, but some
12	of that is just dependent on my ability
13	to get in contact and meet with people,
14	which, you know, at times can be a
15	little bit of a challenge. We've been
16	at it for about a week, we're more than
17	half way through.
18	I believe that was it. I actually
19	did have one question I meant to ask
20	you, Mr. Pallas, if you don't mind, do
21	we know when the code enforcer will be
22	certified? I believe this came up
23	before, I know he's taking the classes.
24	MR. PALLAS: I have to check the

schedule. There's six classes.

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1	MR. PROKOP: He finished the first
2	module, there's six, and each module is
3	a couple of days of classes.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, it's a
5	couple of days.
6	MR. PROKOP: It's spread out over
7	two months I believe.
8	MR. PALLAS: That's correct. I
9	believe if not the end of this year,
10	early next year if I remember the
11	schedule correctly.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I was just
13	curious what six classes meant.
14	MR. PROKOP: So he can write
15	Village code now, he needs the classes
16	to write State code.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That was all
18	I had, sir.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: We have Trustee
20	Roberts' report, everybody got a copy
21	of it, did anybody have any comments or
22	anything on that?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's kind of
24	hard to discuss it with him not here.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: I understand. If

1	there's any questions, I'm just putting
2	it out there if anybody had questions
3	on what he put in, and when he gets
4	back we can have a discussion with him.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: One thing I
6	thought that he did that I really liked
7	was the idea of amending the code for
8	the ZBA alternates. I just like the
9	idea of having, you know, almost, like,
10	a bullpen of people. If people are
11	unavailable, then we have people to do
12	it. Suddenly we have a bunch of
13	applicants and
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: That did come up
15	several years ago. The alternates are
16	only to be used in place of somebody
17	that has a conflict. When somebody
18	goes away for the winter, they can't
19	fill in as an alternate. That's
20	against State law.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, it is?
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, it is.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, that I
24	didn't realize.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: We were given a

1	ruling on that when Mr. Moore had
2	brought that up several years ago about
3	doing that when he was going away they
4	wanted to have an alternate, and that's
5	not allowed, it's only for a conflict.
6	So what he's got in there would not
7	alleviate the problem, and if we
8	expanded from five to seven, we have a
9	hard time keeping it filled at five.
10	So, you know, for what he's got in his
11	report to do it when somebody is going
12	to go away for six months, you can't be
13	part-time.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I didn't
15	realize that.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: When we changed
17	the code for the alternate, we didn't
18	have that in the code originally, and
19	when we went through a couple of years
20	ago to change the code, that's when we
21	got the decision on that, that's why
22	the code that we have is written the
23	way it's written.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you. I
25	didn't realize that. On paper, it

1	looked great.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It also, as I
3	said, it may look great but ZBA, you
4	know, is a judicial arm of our
5	government, and to have that kind of
6	fluidity on a member to me isn't fair
7	to the applicant. You know, you could
8	start with one ZBA member and then all
9	of a sudden during the application you
10	get a new one. I'm not comfortable
11	with that.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, it's
13	impossible anyway.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I am not so
15	crazy about this Mitchell Park
16	solicitation policy. I think that
17	that's really a Board decision.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's something
19	we can discuss next month. I just want
20	to leave it out, if anybody had a
21	question to put it into the record that
22	we had his report. He's away on
23	business, he couldn't be here, and I
24	just wanted
25	My report, we had I had a lot

1	of meetings and stuff like that,
2	different things going on. I did go to
3	the Cast grand opening at their new
4	building, which was very nice. The
5	members and the directors of Cast
6	wanted to thank our Building Department
7	for helping them through the process of
8	getting everything done. I had two of
9	the people on the Board of Directors
10	that came up and thanked me for our
11	building inspector, Eileen Wingate,
12	doing a good job with them, getting
13	them through the hurdles they needed to
14	do. They still have to expand one
15	hallway that doesn't quite meet code,
16	but they're working on that, and they
17	were just very thankful, and I just
18	want to say that publicly to her and to
19	Paul to let her know that they did
20	thank her very much for the work that
21	she did on getting them moved over.
22	It's a much better set up for them,
23	they seemed really happy with it. They
24	have a parking lot now, and I think
25	it's going to work out well for them.

1	MR.	PALLAS:	I	will	pass	that
2	along.					

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MAYOR HUBBARD: Also I was down there when the ship came in Monday night. Wish they had more lights on the ship, it would have been a little more spectacular. The white light and little green light coming around the corner, you couldn't really tell much of what it was, and you really couldn't even tell it was a tall ship until they were twenty feet from the dock, but you know, we had Village staff down there, I want to thank them for coming down, helping them tie up. It seemed like it was a good turn out for the free time for the Village. I know our kids went down there, I was down there with the clerk and Margaret and they brought the kids when -- our rec center kids did the tour, but also the school posted a lot of pictures, the classes that did go down there. They had a good turn out, everybody really enjoyed it. It's a pretty awesome ship, you know, so if

1	anybody does have time to get down
2	there, you know, check it out. The
3	weather is not going to be the best the
4	next couple of days, but, you know, it
5	is what it is. That's pretty much all
6	that I had.
7	So we'll move on to open it up to

So we'll move on to open it up to the public. Public wish to address the Board? State your name and address for the record, please.

MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth
Avenue. Very briefly, I would like to
thank you, Mayor Hubbard, and the
Village for extending the offer, and
the Seaport Museum, to Greenport School
for allowing the children. I went with
both of our fourth grade classes as a
pseudo chaperone, and it was amazing to
watch these little kids ask the
questions and be on that ship. So I
want to thank you and the Seaport
Museum for extending that invitation to
our children because a lot of these
children would never see something like
this, and to me it really touched me

1	that they were able to go, so I just
2	wanted to personally say thank you.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
4	MS. WILLIAMS: Good evening, my
5	name is Jane Ratzy-Williams, I live at
6	229 Fifth Street. I am speaking as a
7	member of the Tree Committee, not on
8	behalf of it. Our mission is kind of
9	three fold, to identify dangerous trees
LO	in the Village, to identify trees that
L1	need to be pruned, and to plant trees
12	where we think our neighborhoods could
13	benefit from them. And this week
L 4	several of us, apparently you guys
L5	included, got a call from a resident on
L 6	Central Avenue about a tree coming down
L7	on her property, and she had come
L8	before the Tree Committee, we
L 9	identified the tree as a tree that
20	should be only pruned, not taken down,
21	and the Village crew were there ready
22	and did take it down in order to put in
23	new sidewalks, and she was told that
24	sidewalks trump trees. As we move
25	forward when we take outside vendors to

1	help the Tree Committee, we've asked
2	that we're not, as we're a volunteer
3	committee, we're not always and
4	certainly not up in the trees, we're
5	not as knowledgeable as we might want
6	to be, and that the those tree
7	companies, if they identify a tree that
8	we thought should come down felt that
9	the tree didn't need to be or they
10	could identify a different situation
11	that they thought would be popper, that
12	they stop all work immediately and come
13	to the Tree Committee, and we would
14	discuss it. I would like to propose
15	that the Village crew also kind of
16	adopt this idea. We'd be happy to talk
17	with them. We had guaranteed this
18	person that the tree was only being
19	pruned, and it's gone. And we worked
20	very closely with the Village crew,
21	they're really hard working guys, and I
22	appreciate it, but I know for a fact
23	four or five of you got calls on this
24	as I did. As we move forward, I think
25	this is a positive way to approach it.

1	Thank you.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: The tree you said
3	was on Central Avenue or Carpenter
4	Street?
5	MS. WILLIAMS: It was on Central
6	Avenue on the corner of Carpenter and
7	Central. It was Ruth's tree.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: The tree was on
9	Bay Avenue.
10	MS. WILLIAMS: You're right,
11	excuse me.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: I just want to
13	make sure we're talking about the same
14	tree, make sure it wasn't something
15	else, that's all. Anybody else wish to
16	address the Board?
17	MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184
18	Fifth Street. The MS-4 project on the
19	end of Manor Place, when are we going
20	to start that, the drainage project?
21	MR. PALLAS: We're still waiting
22	for approval from DEC on the final
23	plans.
24	MR. SWISKEY: When do we expect
25	final approval? We have the money,

1	right? Everything else, I assume?
2	MR. PALLAS: It's a grant. They
3	haven't told us when they're going to
4	approve it, we're waiting for their
5	approval.
6	MR. SWISKEY: Because several
7	people had asked me about that, and I
8	know we had a grant to do it, I don't
9	think we lost the grant, and I couldn't
10	get an answer. But anyway, I think
11	you're doing the right thing at the
12	hospital, they're going to have to come
13	up with some way to keep their water or
14	their property because it's inundating
15	the end of the street and it's going to
16	get worse with that wall. Twelve
17	inches of permeable soil ain't going to
18	take away that water that used to flow
19	onto their dirt between that driveway
20	and the bulkhead. They're not putting
21	any water into Sterling Creek now off
22	their property, they're sending it all

on Village property and we're putting

liability, so we should force them as

it in the creek, which makes it our

1	we do to a homeowner that has gutters
2	on his house doing a renovation, he has
3	to contain the water on his property,
4	he has to put in dry wells, and I think
5	the hospital, like Mary Bess said,
6	should be made to do the same thing. I
7	think six months is a long time. I
8	think they could come up with a
9	drainage project suggestion in ninety
10	days, that's what I would ask for. Six
11	months they'll figure you're just going
12	to go away. I think it's an important
13	issue. The 315,000 or 50,000, 350,000
14	for the street?
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: 315.
16	MR. SWISKEY: All right. Are we
17	using the State contract or the Town
18	contract?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: County contract on
20	the cement and the Town contract for
21	the asphalt.
22	MR. SWISKEY: So we're covered
23	legally there. And we're doing how
24	much on Carpenter Street, the whole
25	street?

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're doing curbs
2	between curb and sidewalk between
3	Bay and Central and then on the west
4	side of Carpenter Street from Park to
5	Kay Street we're doing curbs behind the
6	back of all those houses and then
7	paving the entire road.
8	MR. SWISKEY: So the whole road is
9	getting paved. All right. I just like
10	to get clearance on that.
11	Now, I noticed in the report that
12	one ticket was written for timed
13	parking in the last month. Trustee
14	Robins just brought up that the BID
15	seems to think we need two hour
16	parking. Well, we're not enforcing it
17	anyway. I mean, we got this guy
18	running around, and if you're six
19	inches outside the line you're getting
20	a ticket, yet the biggest thing that
21	over the years as I've been through all
22	the discussions, we wanted a TCO to
23	enforce our timed parking so that we
24	get a turnover. You go to the IGA in
25	the summer, you can't find a parking

1	space, you might as well go to Southold
2	Town. Those cars are parked in that
3	twenty minute zone all day, yet he
4	completely ignores them. I don't
5	understand that at all. Has he been
6	told to ignore it?
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: When we hired him
8	this year when we started it, we were
9	taking care of the quality of life
10	issues between the handicap zones, fire
11	hydrants, and parking on the corners.
12	We're setting up a plan for next year
13	to go forward and take in what the BID
14	is recommending, what everybody is
15	talking about, and then we will expand
16	and go into the timed parking next
17	year. We didn't have time to go and do
18	that at this point, we were trying to
19	take people that are parking on the
20	corners and where they didn't belong.
21	MR. SWISKEY: You know, because to
22	me it's just turning into a money
23	scheme. It was supposed to be about
24	turn over. Thirty something thousand
25	dollars in three months this is turning

1	into a money scheme. I mean, people
2	are getting ticketed in the residential
3	neighborhoods. It's BS. The timed
4	parking was the thing, it's always been
5	the discussion over the years, and when
6	we hired him, everybody thought that's
7	what it was about.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's not true,
9	Bill, we didn't say that. When we
10	hired him and he was coming on, we said
11	we were going to take care of the fire
12	hydrants, the handicap zones, and the
13	corner parking.
14	MR. SWISKEY: Well, if you say so,
15	but I don't remember it being quite
16	that
17	MS. ALLEN: That's what was said
18	from the beginning.
19	MR. SWISKEY: It was timed
20	parking. And Mr. Prokop, did we write
21	the letter to the State yet on the
22	ferry fee?
23	MR. PROKOP: I'm drafting it now,
24	it's going to be presented to the
25	Board.

1	MR. SWISKEY: When are you
2	expecting to present it to the Board?
3	MR. PROKOP: Within a few days.
4	MR. SWISKEY: Within a few days,
5	and then when it's sent, can the public
6	get a copy of it?
7	MR. PROKOP: It will be a public
8	document, yes.
9	MR. SWISKEY: That's what I
10	thought, it will be a public document.
11	Okay. Oh, and well, I was going to ask
12	the last thing I really wanted to
13	ask about was how is the PSEG
14	negotiations coming?
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Really, there has
16	been not much has happened. We have
17	asked them for information. Paperwork
18	was sent to them several weeks ago, we
19	have not heard back from them, and
20	nothing no new talks, no new nothing
21	has come up yet.
22	MR. SWISKEY: Nothing at all has
23	come up? Thank you.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
25	to address the Board?

1	MR. MCSHEA: Christian McShea, 149
2	Fifth Street. I have a few things,
3	I'll be quick or I'll try to be quick.
4	Starting off with the parking
5	attendant, I have seen some kind of,
6	like, a little bit of strange activity.
7	I actually witnessed him, it was during
8	the peak summer time, probably August,
9	but I was getting a sandwich from the
10	deli, and I saw a family, you know,
11	they were probably day-trippers, they
12	parked their car and they got out and
13	they were over the lines, and he kind
14	of, like, kind of hid for a while, and
15	then, like, they left and he went and
16	gave them a ticket for parking outside
17	the lines. Like, he could have just
18	been, like, yo, man, like, you're
19	parked outside of the lines, you've got
20	to fix the spot. It seemed like he was
21	just, like, whatever, and I didn't
22	think too much of it at the time, but a
23	couple of weeks ago I parked my car
24	I live on Fifth Street, you know,
25	pretty much down by the beach. I

1	parked on the opposite side facing the
2	wrong way, which I know is an offense,
3	but I was cleaning my neighbor's
4	leaves, which they're all senior
5	citizens, well, two of them are, two
6	houses, and it was pretty obvious that,
7	like, I wasn't it was a barely
8	congested street, it was, like, a rainy
9	Saturday, and he gave me a 75 dollar
10	ticket for parking the wrong way I
11	believe.
12	MR. SWISKEY: It's silly.
13	MR. MCSHEA: I just think if
14	you're going to get people during the
15	summer, you're going to get tourists,
16	you want revenue from the tourists,
17	first of all, there's ways to go about
18	that, but, like, you know, he's got to
19	cool it off during, like, you know, off
20	season. It's just, like, weird because
21	there's nothing in town he can't come
22	down my block and, like, it just seems
23	like it's really, like, not entrapment,
24	but he's just kind of, like, looking
25	for I don't know. You know, raise

1	my taxes, like, I'd rather pay taxes
2	than, you know, get ripped off.
3	Whatever. Anyway, the other thing is
4	his uniform, is that like, where did
5	that come from? Was it issued from
6	town? I feel that it looks too
7	like, too enforceful. It almost looks
8	like an NYPD, like, motorcycle jacket,
9	like, it's just very, very odd that
10	he's in this type of uniform. Like, he
11	basically should be equipped with a
12	holster and a pistol if he's going to
13	be walking around like that. It's
14	very, like, kind of intimidating, the
15	uniform that he has. Who did issue the
16	uniform? Is that his own uniform?
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: The pants are his,
18	we gave him a shirt, that's all we gave
19	him.
20	MR. MCSHEA: He's wearing a jacket
21	with I believe some type of, like, New
22	York Police Department patch on it.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: I haven't seen the
24	jacket, I don't know.
25	MR. PALLAS: It's Village Code

1	Enforcement.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a Village
3	patch on a jacket? Okay.
4	MR. MCSHEA: It's just very odd.
5	And just in general, has the Village
6	explored any, like, muni meter
7	opportunity, like, you know, not
8	actually having a physical meter in
9	front of every, like, a post meter, but
10	a machine where you go out and you
11	punch in numbers and, you know, you
12	basically put your ticket, your stub in
13	the window. It doesn't have to be
14	every spot in town, doesn't need to be
15	you know, maybe residents could get
16	a sticker to be exempt at certain
17	times. But, you know, in the summer
18	time we're probably missing a lot of
19	revenue. And, you know, people they
20	could pay, and if they run out they ge
21	ticketed, but to go after people are
22	parking, like, two inches outside the
23	line in a tight spot is kind of, like,
24	you know, look, I'm for revenue, but
25	I'm saying let's kind of do it the

1	right	way	and	maybe	step	it	up.	So	has
2	the m	uni r	neter	ever	been				

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, about four years ago we got prices on that, we had public hearings on it, and 99% of the people that came were opposed to it, and the overall thing was the Village just dropped it at that point because there was no support from anybody for putting in the muni meters.

MR. MCSHEA: I've been in the

Village for two years, my wife was born
and raised here, so I mean, I'm not,

like -- I don't want, you know, that to
seem like I'm just some -- well, I

guess I am some kind of yokel that just
showed up, but I would like to maybe
perhaps we could revisit that. I mean,
it's a business decision, and, you
know, we're looking for revenue, and,
you know, that's part of that whole,
you know, fiasco with the PSEG thing,
it's a revenue generator. People
aren't happy with it, but we're still
going to go through with it or you're

1	going to go through with it, and if
2	we're going to go through with that, I
3	don't think a muni meter would be so
4	harmful. So anyway, I'd like to get
5	into that soon.
6	But quickly, the film shoot, is
7	there a permit fee or what is the
8	qualification to register for the film?
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: They fill out an
10	application and there is a fee involved
11	in it.
12	MR. MCSHEA: Are you willing to
13	disclose the fee, does it depend on
14	timing or days or location, or is it
15	just a general fee that you have to
16	pay?
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, it's a
18	general fee, then it depends on how
19	much they're using and what property
20	they're entailing and all. Can we
21	disclose the amount of that, Joe?
22	MR. PROKOP: Yes, it's a public
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, it's a five
24	thousand dollar fee they paid.
25	MR. MCSHEA: So if I were to want

1	to shoot a film in the town, I would
2	come to you and pay a five thousand
3	dollar fee and I could
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the normal
5	fee it's five hundred dollars, plus
6	there's a two hundred and fifty dollar
7	clean up fee, but then anything
8	additional they wanted, they wanted
9	security, they wanted other stuff done,
10	so that's where the additional costs
11	came into it. But it's in our code a
12	five hundred dollar fee, plus a two
13	hundred and fifty dollar a day clean up
14	charge.
15	MR. MCSHEA: Excellent. I'm glad
16	you guys got that covered. I wanted to
17	say well, first off, I've been a
18	little bit of a pain in the butt
19	sometimes, and first off to Jack, I
20	mean, you serve this country, I
21	apologize if anything ever came your
22	way, I mean, you don't ever deserve
23	anything like that. Mr. Mayor, I
24	apologize for any, you know, harsh
25	things that have been said, but I'm

1	going to kind of continue on that track
2	right now. I did want to I can't
3	get around it, the PSEG project. I
4	just wanted to kind of I thought
5	that there would be some type of update
6	tonight, where that's going. I've
7	written many e-mails to the trustees, I
8	believe you've been on some of the
9	e-mails. I've kind of been begging you
10	guys for a letter saying that it won't
11	go down Fifth Street, and I haven't
12	received a response. I think there's
13	been much evidence that this doesn't
14	belong there, and you guys really
15	haven't been, like, very sensitive to
16	our needs or our expressions, and it's
17	odd to me that there's been no you
18	guys haven't reached out to anybody,
19	you haven't just, you know, said hey,
20	you know, maybe we should, you know,
21	reconsider this, or, you know, I'm
22	sorry, we have to do it because of this
23	blah, blah, or, like, you know,
24	there's just been no communication.
25	There were contractors up the block,

1	you know, outside the high school
2	working on the State road, and I spoke
3	to them. They were there working for
4	they were subcontractors for PSEG,
5	so they're there doing their due
6	diligence now because they're going to
7	have everything in line, and then it's
8	just going to be, like, wham, you guys
9	are going to be here next Thursday and
10	you're probably going to, like, vote
11	for it, and I don't understand, like,
12	why? We were supposed to put the thing
13	on hold, and why would you be so
14	callous so as to just not listen to so
15	many people that have a problem with it
16	and just, you know, maybe just try to
17	break down and come talk to people.
18	Like, it just seems like you're just,
19	like, we're doing it. You just don't
20	want to talk to anybody, you know, it's
21	like bam, bam, bam, bam, and,
22	like, I'm concerned that, you know,
23	people are saying oh, what about the
24	other people on the other side of town
25	that could really use the money, and

1	I'm, you know, up here complaining
2	because it's going to go down my
3	street, but, like, what about me? You
4	know, it's just weird, like, you're
5	worried about them, you're going to
6	worry about their sensitive feelings,
7	but what about me? This is nuts. But
8	anyway, I do this is going to get a
9	little touch and go here. I approached
10	Mr. Prokop back in August and I said
11	look, this whole thing really should
12	not be happening at this time because
13	of the conflict of interest of where
14	your occupation is on Shelter Island
15	and the fact that you're the Mayor of
16	Greenport. You control and, you know,
17	a lot of things that happen, or I'm
18	sorry, we have thruways here to help
19	assist Shelter Island get by as a
20	community, and you control that, and
21	you have relationships there, and I'm
22	not saying you did anything wrong, this
23	is what conflict of interest is. You
24	were supposed to be removed from the
25	situation. You really shouldn't have

1	been involved in the situation. You
2	look like a great guy, I hardly know
3	you, but you like somebody I'd want to
4	be friends. Okay? I'm not saying you
5	did anything wrong, but there is a true
6	conflict of interest here, and it
7	should have been recognized, and I
8	spoke to Mr. Prokop about it, and from
9	my understanding from when I was here
10	at the last meeting, you were the only
11	one negotiating with PSEG for the
12	project until about, like, a month ago,
13	and that was a week after I spoke to
14	Mr. Prokop. So I believe, like, the
15	timing of that is, like, weird, like,
16	all of a sudden you're going to play
17	musical chairs. There is a direct
18	problem there, and it should have been
19	recognized. You should have admitted
20	it. Or you know what, hey, we made a
21	mistake, let's fix it, whatever. But
22	just get it off of Fifth Street. I
23	don't want anybody else to I don't
24	want it on Fourth Street, whatever.
25	Just find a new place. There's been no

1	compromise, like, and it's just strange
2	to me that there's been no compromise
3	and no communication and it's just odd.
4	And I'm sorry, the other thing is
5	I believe this town is going to been a
6	full-time mayor. I mean, we had some
7	events go on this week, which God
8	forbid, unfortunate stuff, terrible
9	stuff, but I think the revenues I know
10	are bad, we should generate some more
11	revenue. I think you'd be a great
12	full-time mayor. You've got your own
13	business, I understand. I don't know
14	what you do there, but you have my
15	endorsement. I'm not saying that
16	whatever, I just truly feel that this
17	town at this point might need to you
18	know, I know you guys are taken with
19	your health care benefits and stuff
20	like that, but you know what, maybe you
21	need that, maybe that's a little more
22	incentive, and maybe somebody should be
23	a full-time thing because right now Mr.
24	Pallas is pretty much doing everything,
25	every part of the day-to-day of this

1 neighborhood, and he's got so much on

2	his plate. I don't understand. Like,
3	every time I come here this guy's book
4	is, like, he can't get everything done
5	by himself. I mean, he's got to get
6	some help. Whatever. Anyway that's
7	all I got to say. I really wish you
8	guys would just reach out and have some
9	more sensitivity about the PSEG thing,
10	and I feel like you really failed to do
11	that. So I wish the best to you, and I
12	really mean no harm, I just really feel
13	that, like, a great injustice is
14	happening here. So anyway. Cheers.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
16	MS. MCENTEE: Joanne McEntee, 242
17	Fifth Avenue. I do agree with parking
18	kiosks. I we actually visited Port
19	Jefferson, and it was actually amazing.
20	The parking there was sure, it took
21	us a little while to find a few parking
22	spots or a parking spot, but it was
23	really nice. You found the kiosk, you
24	put your money in, we put our money in
25	because we planned on being there until

1	8:00. We left much sooner than that,
2	so the Village of Port Jefferson
3	benefitted from our money because we
4	left much sooner than that. It was so
5	easy to do, there were just a few
6	around, and it was just I just
7	thought it worked so well with the
8	community. And people were happy to go
9	into another parking spot and pay for
10	my parking spot again. So, I mean,
11	there is revenue to be made, so I agree
12	with the kiosks and maybe it is
13	something to look into in the future.
14	Let's not go back forty years ago.
15	Today is today and things have changed
16	much differently.
17	I would like to visit the code
18	enforcer. My understanding is that he
19	was hired as a traffic control person,
20	and from the work session and the
21	following week he was hired as a
22	resolution, he was then turned into a
23	code enforcer. So I just like to get a
24	little clarification, is that true, is

25

that exactly what happened? And was --

1	because it is a union I'm
2	understanding, a union position, was
3	that posted?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: He was hired
5	originally as just doing parking
6	enforcement. The person who we had
7	doing code enforcement had left us, and
8	then we decided to move him instead of
9	part-time we were moving him over to
LO	full-time to go to the classes do the
11	training. I believe once he gets his
12	training he'll be moving into the
L3	full-time position. Right now he's
L 4	still just considered parking
L5	enforcement. Civil service wise, where
L 6	does he stand with that?
L 7	MS. PIRILLO: Civil service wise
L8	he is per the last resolution.
L 9	MS. MCENTEE: So he is will be
20	considered a union worker?
21	MS. PIRILLO: He's been a union
22	worker.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: He is in the
24	union.
25	MS. MCENTEE: So that position

1	still should have been posted. Was it
2	not posted and reached out to the
3	public as well? Because a union
4	position has to be, you know, reached
5	out?
6	MR. PALLAS: There's no
7	requirement to post positions publicly
8	for that.
9	MS. MCENTEE: For the Village of
10	Greenport?
11	MR. PALLAS: There's no
12	requirement, correct.
13	MR. SWISKEY: It's a civil service
14	position. The contract can say one
15	thing, but if it's a civil service you
16	have to advertise.
17	MS. MCENTEE: So regardless of
18	what is said tonight, I really feel
19	that this, and going forward, that this
20	really should be looked into. Any
21	union position needs to be looked into,
22	needs to you need to follow what the
23	union contract is. Every position in
24	the union needs to be posted. I am not
25	in a union, but I work for a company

1	that has a union, and it is imperative
2	that you do follow those rules. If
3	that can be done to see what exactly
4	happened and to follow through with it,
5	please.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll check the
7	procedure on it, and I'll let you know
8	on that, Joanne. Let me check the
9	procedure of where we stand. We always
10	comply with civil service, with the
11	union rules, and everything else.
12	We're always in compliance on it.
13	We'll make sure that we are in
14	compliance like we do with all the
15	other union workers. We wouldn't
16	jeopardize them and make sure we have
17	them in the correct job classification.
18	MS. MCENTEE: I mean, I just don't
19	want to jeopardize his position either.
20	I mean, jump from one position to the
21	next within a week's timeframe
22	according to the resolution, and that
23	makes me think that we didn't do the
24	right thing.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS. It wasn't a

week's timeframe.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: He worked for four months before we moved him up. He was 3 part-time during the summer, he was 4 working seventeen and a half hours from 5 6 June until September, and then, you 7 know, instead of dropping his hours back, the need was there because Mr. Ed 8 9 Ward had left us, and we saw what a job Greg was going that we felt he would be 10 11 qualified for it, and that's when we 12 made him full-time last month. So it wasn't within a week, he had already 13 14 worked for us for three and a half months, and then we just increased his 15 16 hours, made him part of the union, and 17 sent him off to start taking classes because they were starting at that 18 19 point, so we wanted to give him the 20 title to be able to go and qualify to 21 take the classes. 22 MS. MCENTEE: And we certainly

MS. MCENTEE: And we certainly need to have him. Thank you.

23

The film crew that came in and the application fee, I honestly feel that

1	we need to revisit that in the future.
2	You know, our fees are so inexpensive,
3	and we can make a heck of a lot more
4	money. I mean, there is no reason why
5	any film crew, especially like the one
6	that we had come in, that five thousand
7	dollars minimum and then your add-ons
8	after that. There is no reason I
9	mean, I hope you are researching out
10	that after the fact because after here
11	they went to Sagaponack, and maybe you
12	should check and see what their fees
13	are, you know, because, you know, we
14	charge a very minimal fee. So I get
15	the add-ons and things like that, but
16	it should be revisited. We are
17	entitled to those funds. You know,
18	that's a lot of work that we put out
19	there. We're addressing all the
20	business owners in town. You have all
21	the people that are coming through, we
22	have to redirect traffic, we have to
23	stop traffic. It went smoothly, don't
24	get me wrong. It was an awesome thing
25	for our Village, but, you know, maybe

1	revisit that again because they're
2	going to be here again in the future.
3	As for I also agree that we
4	should eventually and Mr. Mayor, if
5	you'd like to be our full-time mayor,
6	we'd love to have you because honestly
7	we have grown so much in this Village,
8	and we really need a full-time mayor.
9	A part-time mayor or an absentee mayor
LO	no longer exists in our Village. We
L1	have grown so much. Yes, we know that
L2	it is an expense in our Village, but if
L3	we find somewhere, some way to find it
L 4	in our budget, find some way to pull in
L5	a full-time mayor, we'd love to have
L 6	you. Thank you.
L7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
L8	Anybody else wish to address the Board?
L 9	MR. WINKLER: Good Evening. John
20	Winkler, 175 Fifth. Any progress on
21	the lead agency for PSEG? Are we
22	allowed to talk about that?
23	MR. PROKOP: Right. So one of the
24	things that I can talk to you about
25	that is going on is on September 26th,

1	the Village submitted a package to the
2	DEC requesting to be appointed lead
3	agency by the commissioner. Because
4	there's now two different entities that
5	want to be lead agency, it has to be
6	decided by the commissioner. One of
7	the interesting things that happened is
8	that the Village within the timeframe
9	submitted a letter to the DEC
10	requesting lead agency status. LIPA
11	did not submit a letter requesting lead
12	agency status, they submitted a letter
13	past the time period on October 11th,
14	and they put that in as a common letter
15	to our request, but they also requested
16	lead agency status. So the Village
17	yesterday submitted a response to the
18	a reply to the DEC's comments, and
19	one of the things that I pointed out
20	was actually their request was late and
21	that we should be appointed for that
22	reason. The LIPA request also did not
23	comply as far as I can in my
24	opinion, with responding to the three
25	criteria that the commissioner is

1	supposed to apply in a determination of
2	lead agency status, which ours did, and
3	that's one of the other things that I
4	pointed out to the commissioner. I
5	also pointed out the number of factual
6	mistakes that I believe existed in
7	their submission and also procedural
8	errors that I feel LIPA made in their
9	commencement of the SEQRA process. So
10	that was submitted to the commissioner
11	as of yesterday, and the commissioner
12	now has twenty days from the submission
13	to make a decision. It should really
14	have been twenty days from September
15	26th, but I think that the commissioner
16	may feel that it's twenty days from
17	October 11th, which is the date of the
18	LIPA submission, which will be October
19	31st. So within that we expect that
20	there will be a decision within that
21	time period.
22	MR. WINKLER: Nothing can happen
23	until this is resolved for lead agency?
24	MR. PROKOP: Nothing is supposed
25	to happen. So now one of the other

1	things that is going on. There's no
2	update as far as the Village is
3	concerned, there's nothing that's
4	happened as far as the Village is
5	concerned except for these letters
6	about the DEC lead agency, but in the
7	meantime, LIPA has had submissions to
8	other agencies. So LIPA sent in a
9	request for permit from the Army Corp.
10	of Engineers, we're aware of that. I'm
11	not aware of any other requests to any
12	other agency, but there is a pending
13	request to the Army Corp. of Engineers.
14	No other agency should act on anything
15	until the lead agency and SEQRA is
16	taken care of, that's a requirement of
17	the New York State law. So that's
18	and I've pointed that out to every
19	agency, so that's one of the things
20	that's, you know, in the mix here.
21	MR. WINKLER: As this process
22	takes longer, we're going to be moving
23	farther and farther into the winter and
24	maybe possibly effecting this project
25	going into the spring or the summer or

1	whatever. I'm sure you're aware of
2	that, but my understanding is even if
3	we lose the lead agency, the Village
4	still has the final say on any wetlands
5	permit or any environmental impact on
6	the Village. We still have final say
7	whether this project can go forward, I
8	mean, through the CAC and the wetlands
9	permit, if I understand it correctly.
10	MR. PROKOP: Right. As far as the
11	project moving forward, the Village has
12	the absolute final say because they
13	need our permission to move forward.
14	You know, they need the easement from
15	the Village to move forward. And then
16	some kind of a discussion about the
17	wetlands, I don't know that they need a
18	wetlands permit, their position is that
19	they don't need it, our position
20	originally was that they do, but we're
21	still reviewing that with LIPA, but
22	they need our approval with regard to
23	the easement. The project cannot move
24	ahead unless we consent to the
25	easement. If the Village does not give

1	excuse me, if the Village does not
2	get lead agency status, we still are
3	what's called an involved agency, and
4	because we are an involved agency, we
5	will be involved in the SEQRA process.
6	So whatever submission or whatever
7	decision LIPA has as far as the impacts
8	on the environment, we will have a
9	similar, you know, similar input and
10	response. So the reason why they call
11	it an involved agency is because you
12	are involved, and even if we don't get
13	lead agency status we still will be
14	involved. And conversely, if we are
15	lead agency, then LIPA will be
16	involved.
17	MR. WINKLER: I had a conversation
18	with DEC about lead agency, and they
19	told me that the Village is, you know,
20	the final really has the final say
21	on the environmental impact and the
22	wetlands impact, that we still have
23	some protection, even if we lose this
24	lead agency.
O E	MD DDOKOD. Alexalutal.

MR. PROKOP: Absolutely, yes.

25

1	MR. WINKLER: That's the point I'm
2	trying to make, which is good, but
3	again, it seems to be dragging on, and,
4	you know, it's going to start
5	impacting, you know, the Village in the
6	summer or the spring or whatever if
7	this thing does happen, and I just
8	wanted to make sure I knew what was
9	going on with that. Thank you.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
11	Anybody else wish to address the Board?
12	MR. MCSHEA: Just curious, what
13	part of your negotiations why don't
14	you feel insecure about them filing for
15	lead agency and actually you're kind of
16	fighting over this when you're supposed
17	to be working on a deal together? I
18	mean, this is something you guys should
19	have worked out where they could have
20	been, like, all right, you guys got
21	lead agency, you know, I don't
22	understand, like, I know you still have
23	power, even if you're not lead agency,
24	but don't you feel, like, a little bit,
25	like, I mean, not stabbed in the back

1	here, but this is just, like, this is
2	just more leverage they have to
3	circumvent you in certain situations,
4	and doesn't that spook you at all?
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't
6	understand.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't
8	understand.
9	MR. MCSHEA: The deal is you want
10	to be lead agency and they want to be
11	lead agency. They want to run the
12	project through your town. Basically
13	they want to run the project in your
14	town, you say I'm lead agency or this
15	doesn't happen. Okay? You don't fight
16	them for this, you tell them pull the
17	permit, I'm lead agency, okay, or this
18	doesn't happen. I mean, what don't you
19	get? Like, I don't understand.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's not how the
21	laws work.
22	MR. MCSHEA: That's not how the
23	laws work? That's how the they
24	don't have the right to come down the
25	street unless you tell them to.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's
2	separate from lead agency.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: The environmental
4	laws are set up by the State, there's a
5	procedure that has to be followed,
6	that's all.
7	MR. MCSHEA: What don't you
8	understand? Did they have to file for
9	lead agency?
10	MR. SWISKEY: No.
11	MR. MCSHEA: No. So you tell them
12	I'm lead agency or we don't get the
13	deal done. That's it. Like, I mean, I
14	don't understand. What is not seen
15	here? What is difficult to see you?
16	You have all the leverage. They want
17	to run the project through your town
18	without your approval. You tell them
19	I'm lead agency, you pull the permit,
20	or this doesn't get done. I mean,
21	that's how this works. This is the
22	world. Like, what is going on?
23	What I meant to say before, this
24	is going to get a lot uglier if it
25	doesn't go away. Okay? Make it go

1	away. Because I'm done with it, it's
2	emotionally draining to me, and you
3	guys are foolish, and you're
4	incompetent, or something else is going
5	on.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Does anybody else
7	wish to address the board?
8	I offer a motion to adjourn it to
9	executive session to speak with the
10	lawyer on pending litigation.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any apposed?
17	Motion carried. Thank you for coming.

19	adjourned at 8:46 p.m.)
