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| 2 | to order at 7:00 p.m.) |
| 3 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Call the meeting |
| 4 | to order. Pledge to the flag. |
| 5 | (Whereupon all stood and recited |
| 6 | the Pledge of Allegiance.) |
| 7 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. You |
| 8 | may be seated. Okay. The first order |
| 9 | of business will be the fire department |
| 10 | report. There is a chief's council |
| 11 | meeting tonight, that's what the chief |
| 12 | told me about last month, invited me to |
| 13 | it, but I couldn't make it to that |
| 14 | because they're having a meeting |
| 15 | tonight, so there's going to be no |
| 16 | chief here. Is there any discussion on |
| 17 | the fire department reports that I |
| 18 | could try to answer? |
| 19 | MR. BRANDT: I just want to point |
| 20 | out to the Board that we got an |
| 21 | authorization on the change order. |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: The 1700 dollars |
| 23 | from the Board of Wardens last night. |
| 24 | MR. BRANDT: You and I got a |
| 25 | notice this morning from them, but I |
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1 just wanted to make sure they're aware 2 of that. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The question, 3 George, is I noticed that there was 4 discussion between was it the fire 5 chief and Paul in reference to some 6 7 quotes on something with the buildings? MAYOR HUBBARD: The apron on the 8 9 front. The engineering report on replacing the apron in front of the 10 11 buildings, in front of both buildings. 12 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I don't know the status of that. I haven't spoken 13 14 to him about it recently. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. It's in 15 16 the report here, that's why I'm asking. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: They took the 18 recommendations that we had talked 19 about. 20 MR. PALLAS: Okay, great. I 21 wasn't aware. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: They had three

MATOR HOBBARD: They had three
different prices and everything else, I
think it was H2M was the lowest of the
three prices.

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1MR. PALLAS: I think that's2correct.

MAYOR HUBBARD: And it's knowing 3 that if they're needed during the 4 5 construction or to monitor the phase, there would be an additional cost for 6 7 that, but they were substantially lower than the other two firms, and it 8 9 included everything in it. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So now what is 10 11 the next step that they've now accepted 12 it as -- who is going to -- do they have the money for the apron or --13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, this is to go to design, to go out and get the 15 16 prices, that's what we asked for. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: This is just the 19 engineering and the design phase of --20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All 21 right. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: To me it's semantics, you know, pour into cement, 23 whatever, but we've got to go through 24 25 the design phase, and they had the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 prices, and they asked for Paul's 2 assistance in figuring out which one of the three was the best way to go. 3 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So their 5 next step is --6 MAYOR HUBBARD: To draw up the 7 specs of what they're going to do. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Now, is that 8 9 something they're going to do through the Village Hall, or are they trying to 10 11 draw them up themselves? MAYOR HUBBARD: No, they're hiring 12 -- H2M will be the contractor or the 13 14 engineering firm that will design what's going to be put in, and then 15 16 they would go out to bid once they have them back. 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's just I don't want -- it's getting pretty bad. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's been bad for 20 21 years, it's been put off several years, 22 and they've decided to go out and do 23 it. I think they're concentrating on the doors and the security system that 24 25 they talked about last month with us,

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| 1 | and this is in the phase. It's not |

| 2 | something that will be done this |
| 3 | winter. |
| 4 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I |
| 5 | wanted to know. |
| 6 | MAYOR HUBBARD: But they're going |
| 7 | to go through that, get the bids and |
| 8 | everything else, and try to do it in |
| 9 | the spring. |
| 10 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's |
| 11 | towards their capital improvements |
| 12 | towards the next budget year. |
| 13 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, they have |
| 14 | money in the reserve for the apparatus, |
| 15 | capital line item. There's money still |
| 16 | in there, plus we put money in there |
| 17 | each year. We need to go and find out |
| 18 | what the actual cost is going to be. |
| 19 | The prices that they had gotten varied |
| 20 | 70 to 170,000, so they'll get prices |
| 21 | and see where they stand. Robert had |
| 22 | put extra money in their repair, |
| 23 | maintenance, and buildings line item to |
| 24 | cover the aprons, but then with the |
| 25 | doors not closing and everything else, |
| | |

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| 1 | they decided to do the doors right now |
|----|---|
| 2 | because that was less money, finish the |
| 3 | engineering on that and then try to do |
| 4 | that in the spring or half in the |
| 5 | spring and the other half in next |
| 6 | year's budget. They'll work on that |
| 7 | and get back to us. |
| 8 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: George, I just |
| 9 | have a question on the reports that we |
| 10 | have on the hydrants and looking at the |
| 11 | different comments and stuff like that. |
| 12 | So, I mean, does the fire department do |
| 13 | painting and that kind of maintenance, |
| 14 | and whose responsibility as the |
| 15 | plumbing and the packing, that's all on |
| 16 | our Water Department? We take care of |
| 17 | all of that? |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. |
| 19 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are we successful |
| 20 | at usually keeping that getting all |
| 21 | of that done every year? |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: They look at all |
| 23 | of them, the ones that need to be |
| 24 | replaced, hydrants are expensive, last |
| 25 | year we did replace three hydrants, |
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1 we're going to try to do another two this year, you know, and try to stay up 2 on it because some of them -- I was on 3 a couple myself when we were doing it, 4 5 and you need somebody a lot younger 6 that me to try to open them. In an 7 emergency, you could do it putting four guys on there, but it's just --8 9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. So you kind of prioritize it, the ones that 10 11 need the most attention. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, the ones 13 that need the major work, you know, 14 leaks and stuff like that, they take care of them right away so they don't 15 16 freeze during the winter. The painting 17 of the new ones that we put in, we 18 didn't paint them so everybody knew 19 that they were new hydrants, so they're 20 solid red instead of painted the orange 21 and yellow. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, the new 23 ones, yeah. MAYOR HUBBARD: So they'll take 24 25 the ones that didn't work or very hard Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

| 1 | to open, they'll be on the top of the |

| 2 | list to get them they will be the |
| 3 | two that will be replaced this year, |
| 4 | and we're trying to stay on top of it |
| 5 | doing at least two a year to replace |
| 6 | them. Any other questions for the fire |
| 7 | department? |
| 8 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, I know, I |
| 9 | noticed in here that there was a |
| 10 | discussion, a while ago there was a |
| 11 | grant process that was going through |
| 12 | between all the fire departments? |
| 13 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. |
| 14 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Now, I see |
| 15 | mentioned in here, that was the grant |
| 16 | that they didn't get? |
| 17 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. |
| 18 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So what is the |
| 19 | is that something where all the fire |
| 20 | departments are now going to share in |
| 21 | the cost of upgrading, or I heard that |
| 22 | there was some suggestion of money in |
| 23 | this report that they may have to pay? |
| 24 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Well, they |
| 25 | will be discussing that at the meeting |
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in a month, so I don't have an answer 1 2 for that. In general, a lot of that had to do with upgrading the equipment 3 at Southold Police Department and with 4 5 the grant that they had gotten from Mr. 6 Reichert, which was very beneficial, 7 that will help a long ways on that. They are working on the -- how we're 8 9 putting in new meters and other stuff on the town work, that we cleared the 10 11 path going off Webb Street in there, so 12 they're working on that part of it. The in-house equipment that the fire 13 14 departments are all talking about, I'd have to wait for them to give you an 15 16 answer on that. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just 18 curious. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: They've made steps 20 in trying to make the whole system 21 better, upgrade and all, so they're 22 getting there, but they did not get 23 that grant. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's 24 25 what I was wondering because I remember Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

that was last year sometime. 1 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: That came up at this meeting last year, last November 3 when they started that. Anything else? 4 Okay. Move on to the discussion on the 5 6 proposed local law on Carpenter Street, 7 we had the public hearing, we discussed it, we talked about modifying the 8 9 proposal to go down from Bay Avenue to Park Street -- Park? 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Ludlam. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. From Bay Avenue to Ludlam, and that's what we're 13 14 going to put out for a vote for next week. Any other discussion with the 15 16 Board? 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I think we 18 pretty much discussed it at the regular 19 board meeting, and there was a 20 compromise on it, and I think with the 21 new paving and new curbs and the 22 parking, I think it will make it much 23 easier to travel on that street. 24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And safer. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And safer,

| 2 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So that |
| 3 | will go on as a to vote on that. |
| 4 | MS. PIRILLO: Yes. |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll go on |
| 6 | to the Village Administrator Paul |
| 7 | Pallas's report. |
| 8 | MR. PALLAS: Good evening, |
| 9 | everybody. Start with the resolutions, |
| 10 | the first one is a request to go out to |
| 11 | RFP for engineering of replacing the |
| 12 | central pump station. It's certainly |
| 13 | outlived its usefulness. I think at |
| 14 | this point it definitely needs to be |
| 15 | replaced. I'm asking if we can go out |
| 16 | to get quotes from engineers to design |
| 17 | a new system. We have some ideas that |
| 18 | we will you know, I'm not going to |
| 19 | preclude any of their ideas, we're |
| 20 | going to keep the RFP relatively simple |
| 21 | and see what they come back with, so |
| 22 | I'm just asking for a resolution for |
| 23 | that. The second one is for accepting |
| 24 | the bids for the replacement of the |
| 25 | cooling tower at the power plant. You |

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1 may recall that guite a while ago we 2 had gone out to bid for this, and we had only received one quote. We then 3 rebid it, and we did get two guotes. 4 One was for one a little less than 1.6 5 million, the second one was 780,352 6 7 dollars for M Corp. services that we did open those bids a while ago in 8 9 April. I have had a couple of discussions with the vendor, with the 10 11 apparent low bidder, M Corp., that even though it was April, he's still holding 12 his price, so that's going to be on --13 14 I'm asking for approval to replace the 15 cooling tower. 16 TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's pretty 17 substantial difference. Are you 18 comfortable with --MR. PALLAS: I mean, we went to 19 20 bid twice, Boilermatic was the only 21 bidder last time, when they rebid it 22 this time they came in just slightly 23 less than they were. M Corp. is a decent company, I have no concerns 24 25 about them.

| 1 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This is part of |

| 2 | the capital improvements? |
| 3 | MR. PALLAS: Correct. |
| 4 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we're |
| 5 | getting down to the I mean, after |
| 6 | the cooling tower, any other capital |
| 7 | that was on the original list as part |
| 8 | of the upgrade? |
| 9 | MR. PALLAS: There's a number of |
| 10 | what I call very small items. This is |
| 11 | the only - this is the last major item, |
| 12 | the rest of it are small things like |
| 13 | painting control panels and things like |
| 14 | that were included on the list, which |
| 15 | some of that we're going to end up |
| 16 | doing in-house anyway, light bulbs, |
| 17 | dials, that kind of thing, but this is |
| 18 | the last major item on the list. |
| 19 | There were two items that I don't |
| 20 | believe are in your package. One is |
| 21 | for engineering services, we opened the |
| 22 | bid for the sewer expansion of Sandy |
| 23 | Beach. We had three quotes for that, |
| 24 | one from Dvirka & Bartilucci, one from |
| 25 | H2M, and one from Cashin Associates. |
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| 1 | The low bid was from Cashin Associates. |
|----|---|
| 2 | It was for 157,343 dollars. Next |
| 3 | Dvirka & Bartilucci was 159,000, and |
| 4 | finally H2M at 231,200. |
| 5 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's for |
| 6 | drawings? |
| 7 | MR. PALLAS: That's for the design |
| 8 | of the sewer expansion. If you want to |
| 9 | have a discussion on that, I don't know |
| 10 | if there's funding available, I don't |
| 11 | know. |
| 12 | MAYOR HUBBARD: We've worked with |
| 13 | all of them, I mean, I would say we go |
| 14 | with the lowest bidder, I mean, save a |
| 15 | few bucks. There's not a big |
| 16 | difference, but we might as well just |
| 17 | save. We know them as a reputable |
| 18 | company, we've worked with them before, |
| 19 | so we can put that on for next week. |
| 20 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That would come |
| 21 | out of this may be a Robert |
| 22 | question, that would come out of sewer |
| 23 | capital fund? |
| 24 | MR. BRANDT: It would come from |
| 25 | fund balance, from their reserves. |
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| 1 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: From the sewer |
|----|---|
| 2 | fund balance, right, Robert? |
| 3 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Which is 1.6 or |
| 4 | 1.7 if you round up, right? |
| 5 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, you have |
| 6 | on here solicit bids for the Manor |
| 7 | Place bio-retention? |
| 8 | MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I'll get to |
| 9 | that. |
| 10 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, I'm sorry. |
| 11 | Excuse me. |
| 12 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just to clarify |
| 13 | that, so we're still gearing up for CFA |
| 14 | funding. This is to make us shovel |
| 15 | ready so we can get Empire State |
| 16 | Development money hopefully to do the |
| 17 | actual expansion? |
| 18 | MR. PALLAS: No, this one was a |
| 19 | smaller project for just Sandy Beach, |
| 20 | not the entire expansion. The balance |
| 21 | of the work is what we would do with |
| 22 | CFA. |
| 23 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's what I |
| 24 | mean. |
| 25 | MR. PALLAS: But not this |
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| 1 | particular project. So once we start |
|----|---|
| 2 | this, then we can look at the CFA for |
| 3 | the balance of the work. |
| 4 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But this is for |
| 5 | the engineering. |
| 6 | MR. PALLAS: The engineering just |
| 7 | for Sandy Beach. |
| 8 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just for Sandy |
| 9 | Beach, which still runs a line along |
| 10 | the creek, right? |
| 11 | MR. PALLAS: No, it's just going |
| 12 | to be Beach Road and then crossing |
| 13 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Underwater. |
| 14 | MR. PALLAS: Underwater to |
| 15 | whatever street. |
| 16 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Come out through |
| 17 | Stirling Harbor coming across over to |
| 18 | Ludlam Place pump station. |
| 19 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Which we think |
| 20 | may be harder to get funding for |
| 21 | because it's just |
| 22 | MR. PALLAS: Correct, right. |
| 23 | MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a smaller |
| 24 | amount of homes and everything else, so |
| 25 | but it's something that we can do. |
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1 Once you get that and get that line in, 2 there's no saying that you couldn't go farther along that way before you made 3 the whole loop coming around. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Even with the 5 6 designated park lane? 7 MR. PALLAS: Well, there are challenges with this design, there's no 8 9 question about it. The end of Sandy Beach is actually parkland, and there's 10 11 a process that would need to be 12 followed to go across that land. There's a process, I believe the 13 14 terminology is alienation of parkland. It's not a legislated process, it's 15 16 something that there's no laws that 17 govern it, but practice has been that 18 you have to go to the legislature to 19 get approval. I'm not totally familiar 20 with the process, and I don't know, we 21 didn't include that as part of this 22 proposal from them at this stage, but I 23 know Cashin is familiar with it, but that's not included in that price, and 24 25 I'm not sure how much an engineer does

with that anyway, but I know there's a legislative -- you have to approach the legislature, state legislature for that.

5 MR. PROKOP: Well, that 6 application would come from the 7 Village. I would be handling that, working with you. It's not an overly 8 9 complicated process, but it has to be done properly. We need two sponsors, 10 11 and I can explain that to you, but we 12 need to know the specifics about --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's some 13 14 history on that property, so I hope you research that because there's some 15 16 historic significance to the monument 17 that's over there, there's something 18 that went along with that. I don't remember the particulars, I would have 19 20 to go back and take a look myself, but 21 there was a reason that was dedicated 22 parkland.

23 MR. PALLAS: I haven't had the
24 opportunity to research that yet.
25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, you

25

2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: So the next step 3 beyond this then once the engineering 4 design is done would be to actually go 5 out to bid to perform the work; am I 6 correct?

7 MR. PALLAS: Well, I think the interim step would be the -- working 8 9 with Joe would be the alienation of parkland. We don't want to go out to 10 11 bid, go through all that process, if 12 we're not going to be permitted to do it in the first place, but we're going 13 14 to need to have the design in order to approach the legislature anyway. So in 15 16 order to get to that next step, we're going to have to have the specifics of 17 18 the project.

19TRUSTEE ROBINS: So we really20don't know except for right now this is21the only cost that we are really aware22of is the cost of this engineering23study, correct?

24 MR. PALLAS: Correct.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Even to apply for

grants or anything else, you need to 1 2 have a design of what you're going to be doing, so we need to take this step 3 to then try to see where we can get 4 5 funding from. There's multiple sources have said they want to assist us, but 6 7 they need to have something besides just our engineering report, now we 8 9 need the design. Once we have the design, we can go to Senator 10 Gillibrand, other people that have said 11 12 they want to assist with this process, here is what our project is going to 13 14 be, and then try to get money for it. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I would be 15 16 concerned that they would see this as a 17 project for just -- how many homes are 18 there in Sandy Beach? MR. PALLAS: Twenty-four if I'm 19 20 not mistaken. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We might have a 22 harder time getting big funding for 23 twenty-four homes, especially when we're sort of bypassing a bunch of 24 25 other homes not in the Village. Do we Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 2 complicated or expensive it might be to get the legislature to approve this 3 parkland piece? I know we have support 4 5 from our legislators, but --6 MR. PROKOP: It's not expensive, 7 it's just you have to have plan it out. One of the things about the legislature 8 9 is that they're only in session certain times of the year, so you have to find 10 11 the proper -- you have to find the 12 sponsors and work with them, and then you have to time it so that it will get 13 14 to the session at a time that they will be in session and have time to deal 15 16 with it. Because otherwise, if you 17 skip one, like the summer, for 18 instance, we would want to get it done before the summer because if we don't 19 20 do that, then they're out of session 21 for the summer, and then it kicks it 22 over to the next year. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think I know 24 where you were going from is that July, 25 is it July --

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: CFA's are due in
 July.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: July CFA's are 3 due, those applications are due to 4 5 start going through the process. I 6 think that our opportunity is to run 7 parallel. I think we can get the information on this and also deal with 8 9 a different way with the bigger funding that you're looking at. I mean, we 10 have to have the information anyway on 11 12 this as well as -- you're looking towards the information for the bigger 13 14 project, correct, the engineering on that, is that what you're looking for? 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm worried that

17 we're going to do this engineering and 18 not have what we need to do the bigger more regional project where I think the 19 20 town has expressed interest in 21 supporting it, right? So do we know 22 how much more it costs to do the 23 engineering for the larger project 24 that's in our --

> TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You mean, to Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 go around --2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, the one that was released to the public that 3 4 says the prospective project? MR. PALLAS: I don't know that I 5 6 could give you an exact answer, but 7 just looking at the complexity of this design relative to the rest, I would 8 9 just venture a guess that you're talking about in the order of an extra 10 11 hundred thousand dollars, that would be 12 my quess. 13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, because 14 there's a wetland area or something that has to be dealt with going up 15 16 Beach Road. 17 MR. PALLAS: This is all of Beach 18 Road. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sorry, the road 20 the breweries and the cemetery are on? 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Manhassett. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. I think 23 there's an area where -- anyway, it 24 looks at little more complicated maybe, 25 but going under this seems pretty -- I

mean, what do I know, but it seems 1 2 complicated. MR. PALLAS: No, I understand. 3 But again, I think that's why I couched 4 5 that very carefully, I mean, it's going to be in the order of a hundred 6 7 thousand dollars plus or minus fifty. I mean, I just don't know, I haven't 8 9 really looked at it. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is there economy 10 of scale to be achieved if we were to 11 12 do both at the same time, or could we decide at a later date, which shouldn't 13 14 be too much later because we have to have this plan before we can go for CFA 15 16 if we wanted to do the bigger project? MR. PALLAS: I'm not sure I 17 18 understand the question. You're saying 19 to engineer the whole thing but only 20 bid out part of it? 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No, I didn't ask 22 it very well, that's why you didn't 23 understand it. Is there economy of scale if we were to add on the 24 25 engineering of the larger project Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 around Stirling Creek later on? If we
2 were to do it all at once, would we
3 save money?

MR. PALLAS: I mean, the short 4 5 answer is yeah, there's always some learning curve that's built into these 6 7 quotes, right? So I would say that the answer is yes, we'd probably save a 8 9 little if we engineered it now, I think that's what the question is, as opposed 10 11 to engineering it in two different 12 pieces. I don't know how significant that is from an engineering standpoint. 13 14 Yeah, I don't know that it would be significant. 15

16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. And do we 17 have any sense for what it could cost 18 to do whatever project, like, if by an 19 order of magnitude, is it hundreds of 20 thousands, is it --

21 MR. PALLAS: No, I mean, typically 22 engineering costs are in the range of 23 five to ten percent of the overall 24 cost.

25

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So this

would be a million dollar project,
 roughly speaking a million dollar
 project to get the twenty-five homes
 connected.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: And those are 5 only seasonal homes, they're only lived 6 7 in, what, five months of the year? And I will point out also that most of the 8 9 homes on Manhassett, Champlain, and those houses going down there are also 10 11 -- a lot of them are only seasonal 12 homes and there aren't full-time residents there. I was dealing with 13 14 the area, took a census down there, and I know a lot of people who live in the 15 16 area, so, you know, those things would have an impact I would think also in 17 18 terms of --

19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The sensitivity 20 there, the water, I mean, it's a bad 21 spot to have a septic tank.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, the Sandy
Beach area, yes, but just the road in
general going down.

25

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That whole area,

1 I'm no expert, but as I understand and 2 told by the people working on this water quality initiative that anything 3 like that where you have septic is bad, 4 and then add in what's going on at 5 Brewery Yacht Yard, I mean, they've got 6 7 a huge septic for that huge facility, two huge boat yards creating all kinds 8 9 of bad stuff for the water, and we're not including that in this, and I don't 10 11 think I understood until we just 12 started talking here that this project was only for twenty-five homes and not 13 14 for the whole region. MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, we've talked 15

16 about it both ways. We talked about this before we went out and got these 17 18 quotes on doing just the Sandy Beach area and coming across there, coming 19 into Ludlam Place or the other. 20 And 21 original at one point we had a price of 22 four hundred and something thousand to 23 do that. We said no, let's take care of the Village residents that are 24 25 there. We also can -- once that is

connected there, you might be able to 1 2 add on twenty-five homes on Inlet Lane and the other ones that are down that 3 are low lying areas there that aren't 4 in the Village, but they're in that low 5 flat. You might even be able to hook 6 7 Brewers Boat Yard coming in that direction and Stirling Harbor going in 8 9 the other direction. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I remember this 10 11 now. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: So once you're connected, we're taking care of the 13 14 Village residents, but then we might be able to expand farther out in that low 15 16 lying area and bring that all in one 17 side and take the rest from the other 18 side were some of the initial talks and 19 everything else about it. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks. Okay. 21 I do remember that. So we've got 1.7 22 in this fund, we're going to spend 23 about ten percent of that to do this, and we still have fund balance. I 24 25 quess I would just say that maybe we Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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should -- if we're going to consider 1 2 trying to get Empire State Development money or other big, you know, water 3 quality improvement program grants at 4 5 CFA this summer, we probably need to get on the second phase of that at 6 7 least in terms of engineering quickly. We have to have shovel ready plans to 8 9 get funded, and we know that there's a lot of support through those channels. 10 11 Empire State Development wants us to do 12 this, and who knows what CPF -- the 13 town may eventually get a CPF plan 14 together that we can use potentially to help the non-Village residents with 15 16 their connection fees, and that would be a great thing. So I don't want to 17 18 miss another year is all I'm saying, so if we have the money in the fund, and 19 if the Board thinks that this is a 20 21 worthy way to spend part of our fund 22 balance in the sewer fund to plan for 23 the future, maybe we should start thinking in terms of bidding out the 24 25 next set of engineering next month.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 1 But I 2 think you also have to put into perspective the whole picture of what 3 is going to be the cost because we will 4 5 not be collecting hook up fees, at least that's my understanding, we don't 6 7 collect hook up fees from those who live in the Village. So you're going 8 9 to have to figure that amount of money into your cost of what you're trying to 10 11 do in the sewer fund balance because 12 we're going to be expending equipment, 13 correct? 14 MR. PALLAS: For this, and as I

mentioned earlier, the looking to do 15 16 central pump station, so there's some other -- you know, our own internal 17 18 infrastructure upgrades, and I was going to mention that, that I just 19 20 caution you when you look at the 21 funding that there is work to be done 22 on the sewer system, other than 23 expansion.

24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I mean, I know 25 we've gone out to think about a sewer Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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-- evaluate for sewer increase, rate 1 2 increase, but I think where you're going, and I see your head doing the 3 dollars, okay, for a grant and for 4 5 going down the road trying to collect money, but I'm also looking at the 6 7 other side is that there's no hook up fees coming in, and we have a sewer 8 9 system that we have to maintain. So we can't be cutting them -- we have to get 10 11 a balance here some place, you know, 12 you understand what I'm saying. 13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, I'm only 14 proposing that we use fund balance for the engineering so that we can go get an expansion would be easier to fund

15 16 the grants, and then I'm proposing that 17 18 for both water quality improvement and Empire Statement Development if it 19 20 includes the whole region. So if we 21 have all the engineering in place, and 22 if we get that grant, then that would 23 cover the hook up fees, that would replace the hook up fees from our 24 25 residents, and then we'd go to the

town, and the town would have to deal 1 2 with their residents if they want -because the town eventually I hope is 3 going to do CPF water quality where 4 town residents can either get the new 5 6 septic tanks funded or partially funded 7 or they can get a hook up to us if they're next to our system, but that's 8 9 their business, not ours, but it's an option for them. So I'm only proposing 10 that we would use fund balance for the 11 12 engineering so we can go get the grants, and then I think -- I might be 13 14 wrong, I think we can use this as part of our match if we get funded because 15 16 we've already put the funding in, but 17 we'd have to check on that because 18 there's always a match locally. 19 MR. BRANDT: The engineering, as I 20 recall, is 80/20. So we could 21 potentially get -- but on this 22 particular grant, the actual dollar 23 figure this year I believe was 85 total, next year we don't know what 24 25 it's going to be. So we should be able Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

| 3 | TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: When was the |
| 4 | grant due last year? I forget what |
| 5 | month. |
| 6 | MR. BRANDT: July. |

| 8 | why I'm making mention of it now is we |
| 9 | need to |
| 10 | TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Right. Now, |
| 11 | as I'm looking at this, it's November, |
| 12 | before we hit the ground it's December, |
| 13 | January when we get everything |
| 14 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Put out a bid, |
| 15 | it takes a month. |
| 16 | TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So if we were |
| 17 | to if I may, Robert, if we were to |
| 18 | want to apply for this grant, how much |
| 19 | time would you need with the plan? |
| 20 | What would you need sitting in front of |
| 21 | you to apply, and how much time do you |
| 22 | need? |
| 23 | MR. BRANDT: We need a complete |
| 24 | engineering. As Doug pointed out, it |
| 25 | has to be shovel ready. That's the |
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extent of it. 1 2 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, that's correct. And I do want to clarify, I'm not sure 3 the engineering is included. I do have 4 to confirm that. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't mean to 6 7 interrupt, but if I remember the process that went, okay, it started off 8 9 if you were starting on a bigger project, you had to apply for the 10 planning grants first on a lot of the 11 12 bigger projects, you had to apply for 13 the planning grants so that they 14 assisted you in doing the engineering portion and -- right, it was not doing 15 16 the engineering but writing --MR. PALLAS: To do the 17 18 feasibility, and that's what we had Dvirka and Bartilucci do were the 19 20 eastern and western feasibility 21 studies, and that was grant funded, but 22 if I remembering this correctly, it was 23 the second step that isn't -- I don't think, and I'll confirm it, I don't 24 25 believe that that's -- we can get

1 grants for that. I don't know why. 2 We'll check. We can check tomorrow, we'll get a firm answer either way. 3 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Maybe we could 5 get an outline to refresh our memories 6 from you and Robert as to the process 7 for that, you know, going through what the process is for those CFA grants. I 8 9 don't remember, it's been a while since I looked at it. I do know that it was 10 11 explained to me, okay, is that each 12 region the application goes to a group 13 of region people who grade the grant on 14 points, and we need to also get an idea of what the points are going to be, 15 16 what are the heavy hitters for points 17 on whatever applications are coming in 18 because if it doesn't get past the 19 regional committee, it won't go any 20 further. Okay? So those are some of 21 the things -- and I think there are 22 some within that point system that are higher than others that you kind of 23 need to gear -- you got to look at 24 25 what --

| 18 | How is scallop season going? Not good, |
| 19 | right? |
| 20 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, scallop |
| 21 | season isn't going, but that also has |
| 22 | to deal a lot with there's two |
| 23 | theorys of thought, one of them is the |
| 24 | nitrogen, which is dealing with the |
| 25 | sewer system, okay, that's part of it, |
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1 okav. The other thing is the build up along the shoreline where we're 2 hardening the shore with new 3 construction, with docks, bulkheads, 4 5 that's also dealing with it, and we're 6 also dealing with recreational boating, 7 which is much more than it ever used to be, and that does cause some damage. 8 9 You know, there is -- you can't get away from it, okay, it does cause 10 11 damage. So I think that the cesspool 12 system in the Town of Southold, I think, yes, it's important that we deal 13 14 with trying to get the water quality up. It's a resource that's available 15 16 to produce income especially for some 17 of the people in the Village of 18 Greenport. So no, I don't have a 19 problem with that. Bay scallop season 20 has a lot of things going wrong with 21 it, and thank God we don't have any 22 locks like Shinnecock, let me tell you. 23 That was too much. 24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: If I may, how 25 long -- just because this is due in Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

| 22 | TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's my |
| 23 | concern. Like, I see us, and maybe |
| 24 | this is the reality of the situation as |
| 25 | we learn as we go forward, but to me, |
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it seems like we would be getting this 1 2 back in an April, May timeframe, does that sound about --3 4 MR. PALLAS: For a full design, 5 yes. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So that was 7 why I was asking that before, Robert, I 8 wasn't trying to be a wise guy, like, 9 if you get this in April or May, am I --10 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: He can begin 12 work before having these drawings. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Can you? 13 14 MR. PALLAS: Yes, I'm sorry, Jack, the last piece of it is the design 15 16 itself. So we can work on the 17 application process in advance of the 18 design, that can be done. It's going to be bits and pieces missing, you 19 20 know, like the cost because part of the 21 engineering would be to develop an 22 engineer's estimate of the project. So 23 it could be done. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I still have one 25 question on all of this. If we do the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

expanded project, okay, in the east 1 2 district beyond Sandy Beach, okay, if you build it, will they come? I mean, 3 4 can you guarantee, are you going to get 5 customers? I mean, just, you know, 6 door to door, my survey is that people 7 don't want to hook up, okay, I mean, does it, you know --8 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Does the hook up fee -- I think what it is, does the 10 11 hook up fee make sense to them? 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: People who have 13 cesspools and don't have to pay for it, 14 why would they want to? You know, I mean, I've done somewhat of a survey on 15 16 that, and I don't hear of a lot of 17 people that are interested in doing it, 18 unless we mandate it, but to mandate --19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can you share 20 the results of your survey with us? 21 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll be happy to. 22 You know, this was anecdotal, okay, so, 23 you know, but I mean, know a number of people that live and own homes on that 24 25 road, a lot of them are seasonal,

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they're not there all year round, and, you know, they say my cesspool is fine, why would I want to pay to hook up to a sewer because, you know, it's a 15,000 dollar charge.

MAYOR HUBBARD: 15,000 dollar hook 6 7 up fee, right. I mean, I think at this point we're this close with this part 8 9 of the project going forward with this, so really we need to take and put this 10 11 on the agenda to vote on this part and 12 let's get that part moving forward. You can immediately start on the other 13 14 phases of it, but I need to move this forward. We don't want to drop this 15 16 and say we're going to redo all this because that's where we were four 17 18 months ago, and we said let's separate 19 it out as two separate things. So 20 we're close with this, let's move this 21 forward, let's start working on the 22 rest of the process to go and see what 23 we could do with the other half going 24 around the other way.

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm

1 saying, we can work them parallel. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Agreed. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You know, as 3 each step goes, okay, we did up to here 4 5 now, what do we need to expand if we're 6 going to do the other way, and I think 7 that's the way we should think of things at the moment is we have only a 8 9 limited amount of money to deal with, the revenue from the Sewer Department 10 11 is going to be paying for all of this 12 for hooking up Village residents because we don't get a hook up fee from 13 14 Julia, I have, you know, I kind them. of agree with her a little bit, it's 15 16 been we approached some people on going 17 west that, you know, somebody wanted to 18 put a hook up, you know, wanted to 19 create a line, and oh, we're going to 20 get so many people to come on. Well, 21 George, I think you got what, two 22 people that maybe were interested? 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: One said they would, one out of forty-three. But 24 25 that it, you know, things could change. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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When somebody comes to the option of 1 2 having to replace their cesspool for 6,000 instead of hooking up to us, at 3 that point they may want to. To go 4 5 down the street right now and ask ten 6 people will you hook up tomorrow to get 7 us to 150,000 dollars, they're going to say no, until they need a cesspool, 8 9 then they have the option to decide what they want to do. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And the town 12 will be able to step in and help subsidize that funding and reimburse 13 14 them, and who knows who else might want to step in and reimburse them. And we 15 16 know that the two boat yards --17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They definitely 18 -- they wanted to get onto the system 19 for a long time. They need to. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think if we 21 look at not only is that a big number, 22 but you keep talking about, like, 23 seasonal houses, I don't know how seasonal houses are, but if we're 24 25 simply talking about effluent being

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1 removed from the water, I mean, really, 2 Brewers is the place you want to hook All of the houses in the entire 3 up. 4 area probably don't have the output 5 that -- that's a large commercial 6 facility. 7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Could Brewers be included in the Sandy Beach project 8 9 that we're working on or not? MAYOR HUBBARD: It depends on the 10 11 -- I mean, the end of the Village line 12 is here on Beach Road, you've got 13 houses right next door to it that may 14 want to with the situations that they've had with having problems during 15 16 the summers and everything else. They 17 may want to tie into it right away, we 18 don't know that. But until we actually 19 have something designed and ready to 20 go, we can't even ask them that. So we 21 need to get that put in, and when they 22 do all this there's going to be a 23 design and say you have room for an extra forty houses as they do it, and 24 25 we'll know forty houses just to the

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west of the Village line, we could 1 2 approach those forty people, this pump will be able to handle that, and then 3 we could approach them and say we're 4 5 putting this in, we got it, would you be interested at that point. I think 6 7 if we just get the design, the design 8 set, and we're taking care of our own 9 Village residents to start with, and then we can expand from there, I think 10 11 it's a good start. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I would 13 agree. 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's what I 15 support. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Just a couple 17 -- a question for you, and one for 18 Robert, if I may, real quick, who do we need to get permits for to bring it 19 20 underneath the water? 21 MR. PROKOP: Department of State 22 and possibly the Army Corp. of 23 Engineers. 24 MR. PALLAS: And DEC. 25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I mean, Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

This is part of 4 5 the hook up money we had gotten from Peconic landing which was put away to 6 7 save for future expansions, so the 720,000 dollars we got from there, we'd 8 9 be taking 150,000 to design this, and so it's not effecting the ratepayers, 10 11 it's money we put away for exactly 12 something like this to expand the system. That's why it's there. Yes, a 13 14 million dollars, whatever, we're not going to kill the fund balance, we 15 16 would not do that, we would bond, try 17 to get grants or somebody else to do 18 it, zero interest loan from EFC, 19 whatever we could do to pay for it, but 20 we will be bonding for the actual 21 construction. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I know, like, 23 interest rates were low, I didn't know if this -- like, I know we have the 24 25 money, but I didn't know if we wanted Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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to hold on to --1 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, no, we would not use the money for the actual 3 construction, we would bond for that. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you 5 6 very much. 7 MR. PALLAS: Just so I'm clear at this point, you're going to move 8 9 forward with this piece, do you want me to get engineering prices for the rest 10 11 of it as a separate project? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. The future expansion is, I mean, if they decide to 13 14 do affordable housing, any other pieces of property there. MR. PALLAS: On my list. Okay. 4 Next item? The next item is also not 5 6 on your package, I think it was the 7 resolution to approve -- ratify, sorry, the labor for the engine 4 repairs. 8 9 This was with Golten's Marine. It's a little -- I don't have the paperwork, 10 11 and I apologize, it's a little over 12 140,000, just to ratify the labor for 13 that. Robert, you have a budget mod 14 for that?

| 22 | go out to bid anyway without the |
| 23 | approval because I know the design |

 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That bulkhead
 was just redone so --

MR. PALLAS: I'm aware. 4 We actually sent them all the drawings, 5 and now they're asking to certify. 6 7 That information came to me within the last week, I haven't followed up with 8 9 it. I don't know, we just sent the drawings, it was designed two years 10 11 ago, what more do you want? But we'll 12 work with the State, I think we'll be 13 able to get by that. I'll keep you 14 posted on that.

So we have some hirings, you have 15 the list of folks there. The next item 16 17 is a discussion item. Over the course 18 of the last several months, and I think I've discussed a little bit of this 19 20 with you all prior, but the New York State Public Service Commission has 21 22 issued orders. We are not generally 23 subject to Public Service Commission jurisdiction, but they have -- are 24 25 applying these new fees to even

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1 municipals that are regulated by the New York Power Authority. The actual 2 mechanics of this haven't been worked 3 out yet, but because we are NYPA 4 regulated, whether it's going to be 5 6 direct from NYPA or NYSERTA, we're not 7 real sure how this is all playing out, but I wanted to alert the public and 8 9 yourselves obviously about these added There are two different fees, 10 fees. 11 one is called a zero emission credit, 12 and the other is called a renewable energy credit. The zero emission 13 14 credit is a straight fee, and it's going to be about 3/10 of a percent per 15 16 kilowatt hour I believe is the last number that we had received, and that 17 is essentially a subsidy for upstate 18 19 nuclear power plants, to shore them up 20 because the market -- they're not 21 making any money in the market, which I 22 -- believe it or not, I don't 23 necessarily, but anyway, that's a policy issue that the governor has 24 25 proposed -- not proposed, but is Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 implementing through the Public Service Commission. The other one is renewable 2 energy credits, what will be collected 3 by NYSERTA, and the money will go into 4 5 a fund at NYSERTA to promote renewable 6 energy projects. The renewable energy 7 credit is a variable number. Right now for the first five years it appears 8 9 that that in and of itself, the range is from as much as .12 cents to .24 10 Combined total of both of those 11 cents. 12 fees is .42 to .54 cents per kilowatt hour. So I just wanted to alert you to 13 14 it, it's supposedly going into place Januarv 1. I don't know if both of 15 16 them are going to be ready administratively with NYSERTA and the 17 18 Commission to be implemented, but 19 again, I just wanted to alert you to 20 it. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we create 22 some sort of communication to people 23 just so they can understand, you know, 24 the average home of three people, you

know, can we do a little modeling, you

25

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know? 1 2 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I mean it's simple enough. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I quess people 4 5 can look at their bill just to give 6 people a heads up, people who don't understand kilowatt hours and stuff. 7 MR. PALLAS: Understood. 8 The 9 other thing I'm going to be exploring with the Power Authority who regulates 10 11 our bills is to see if we can put this 12 as a separate line item on the bill. Currently we don't do things like that, 13 14 but I certainly think it's fair that a customer should be aware that this is 15 16 not a Village imposed number. So I will be going to explore that with the 17 18 Power Authority. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Once again, 20 when is this supposed to start? 21 MR. PALLAS: January 1st, but I 22 don't think the actual fee -- the 23 actual rate change will happen then. I think we haven't even gotten any 24 25 communication from them, from NYSERTA Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

| 13 | MR. PALLAS: That one is further |
| 14 | upstate. |
| 15 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we don't get |

| 17 | renewable energy, we use hydro here? |
| 18 | MR. PALLAS: Yeah, we went around |
| 19 | in circles on this with the public |
| 20 | service commission. We had three or |
| 21 | four filings with our attorneys that do |
| 22 | this work. Multiple people have filed, |
| 23 | and we've tried to make that argument, |
| 24 | and they're not giving credit for |
| 25 | existing large hydro facilities. And |
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| 1 | that's actually been the way that |
|----|---|
| 2 | they've moved forward on a lot of |
| 3 | renewable orders, they don't give |
| 4 | credit for existing large hydro. |
| 5 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And do LIPA |
| 6 | customers have to pay this too? |
| 7 | MR. PALLAS: They are impacted by |
| 8 | this, and I apologize, I don't remember |
| 9 | how, but they definitely are involved |
| 10 | in this. I don't know to the extent |
| 11 | if they are to the same extent, but I |
| 12 | do believe they are participating in |
| 13 | this. |
| 14 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We use |
| 15 | renewable, we get a big rate hike, the |
| 16 | people burning fossil fuels don't? |
| 17 | MR. PALLAS: No, this applies to |
| 18 | statewide. I'm sorry, this is |
| 19 | statewide, this is not |
| 20 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's why I |
| 21 | just asked about LIPA. |
| 22 | MR. PALLAS: Well, LIPA is a |
| 23 | different entity because of the way |
| 24 | they're regulated. So I know they're |
| 25 | participating, but maybe not in the |
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same form. All customers -- that's how 1 2 we got thrown into this, because the order actually said all residential 3 customers. Typically, you know, our 4 5 first pass at going back to the 6 Commission is to say you didn't really 7 mean us, right? And they said, yeah, we did. Usually they say no, we 8 9 didn't, but this time they said yeah, we did. So there was a whole -- the 10 11 next set of filings have to do with 12 whether our hydro allocation counted, and it was a lot of -- it got into a 13 14 lot of technical stuff with how they're actually calculating it, but the claim 15 16 is that they're already accounting --17 the hydro plants are already accounted 18 for in the calculation that they used to come up with how much renewable 19 20 energy they wanted in the State. The idea is to increase the use of 21 22 renewable energy in the State, that's 23 the goal of this. Okay? 24 I do have obviously other things, 25 but I do have one quick executive

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session item as well. I sent an e-mail 1 2 out late, and I apologize for that. Moving on to individual 3 departments, in the Road Department 4 5 just a couple of highlights there. As you recall, we did the -- there was a 6 7 film event here, and the road crew did assist with that, which went fairly 8 9 well. We started to do turning off water, we turned off water in the parks 10 11 and ball fields. We've completed a 12 bike rack installation, that was a grant with the Town of Southold, so 13 14 they've been busy. The end of Sixth Street, we did a comprehensive repair 15 16 to the drainage system at the end of 17 Sixth Street. Hopefully that's working 18 We also assisted -- the road well. crew assisted with the road 19 20 construction project. The road crew 21 has been working on tree removals with 22 the line crew, they've been working 23 jointly on that, which is a much better way to do things, and we've done a lot 24 25 of the tree removals on our own, and we

continue that process with the balance 1 2 of the tree work bid out, and we're working on structuring that bid now. 3 4 Moving on to Sewer Department, the flow statistics, flow and sampling 5 statistics, if you see there's an 6 7 asterisk there, the results are the same as last month. The lab we use 8 9 hasn't provided us with the information They changed their system, their 10 vet. 11 computer system or something, so we 12 haven't gotten the answers back from 13 them. We do our own in-house sampling, 14 our own in-house testing prior to sending them out, and generally they 15 16 always agree with our results, and the 17 October results are the same within all 18 of our legal limits. I just wanted to 19 point that out. The major project that 20 they're doing there now is the faulty 21 aerator is still being worked on at the 22 contractor. We haven't finished that 23 yet, I think we need to do a budget mod to finish that. I think, Robert, we 24 25 have that on the list today.

| 4 | and a gear drive that failed, the shaft |

| 8 | to be rebuilt. |
| 9 | TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: How old was |
| 10 | it? |
| 11 | MR. PALLAS: Four years, five |
| 12 | years. |
| 13 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What is the |
| 14 | normal life expectancy on that |
| 15 | equipment? I mean, we are anticipating |
| 16 | that we're going to have to repair it |
| 17 | again in five years? |
| 18 | MR. PALLAS: No, I don't think so. |
| 19 | I think this was just an aberration. I |
| 20 | have to check on each individual piece |
| 21 | what the expected life is, I would have |
| 22 | to imagine it's at least ten years on |
| 23 | something like this. However, what we |
| 24 | are looking to do after we repair this |
| 25 | is we are going to look to have a spare |
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1 on hand because we don't have a spare. 2 Adam is working on a comprehensive list 3 of equipment that he believes we should 4 have on hand. As we move forward, you 5 know, we'll look to purchase some of 6 those things. So that was the big 7 ticket item on that.

Moving to the Electric Department, 8 9 we did a pad mounted transformer at Brewers in Stirling Harbor, the 10 11 transformer needed to be replaced, so 12 it is for us a relatively big job, but 13 straight forward to replace that 14 transformer. Again, they worked with the Road Department on tree work. 15 The 16 alarm system is almost completed at the 17 power plant. I think there are a 18 couple of more days worth of work on that and that should be finished. 19 We did have one storm event on October 20 21 22nd, we did have some outages. I 22 think they repaired them in pretty good 23 time, they did a good job on that. The road project, they did -- they've been 24 25 working on two -- I think they're done

| 12 | to get started on. |
| 13 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, I just |
| 14 | have a question about the gas tanks |
| 15 | because we have, you know, we have to |
| 16 | fob system, and I really haven't seen |
| 17 | anything in here as to whether it's |
| 18 | working well? |
| 19 | MR. PALLAS: Yeah, it is working. |
| 20 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it working |
| 21 | out where we have a better calculation? |

| 24 | analyzing it is there's actually two |
| 25 | separate systems, there's a monitor on |
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1 the delivery system and then a monitor 2 on what gets pumped out. We can reconcile those two to see that they 3 make sense. I'm actually a little 4 behind on that, I got sidetracked, I'm 5 about two or three months behind in 6 7 updating that, but I will be updating that. 8 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the fire department is all comfortable, they're 10

beginning they were having some --

not having any issues? Because in the

MR. PALLAS: I haven't heard any complaints since the beginning, I think it was just a learning curve more than anything else.

17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just a 18 question, I haven't seen it for a while 19 so that's why.

20 MR. PALLAS: Building Department, 21 you know, is continuing, there's quite 22 a number of applications, just a couple 23 of highlights. We're looking at the 24 application process and renewal fees 25 for the directional signs. These are

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1 the signs that have advertising for 2 businesses. Apparently there was supposed to be a renewal process, but 3 it just seemed to fall off the wayside, 4 5 so we're looking into that and getting 6 them back on target. I just wanted to 7 point that out. In terms of code enforcement, Greq Morris is beginning 8 9 to work on general code violations. As you can see, he's got a report -- a 10 starting point for his report on some 11 12 of the ones that he's been working on 13 in his training. He's attending 14 training, should be finished the end of January or December. 15 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: He is reporting 17 directly to you, Paul? 18 MR. PALLAS: Yes. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we talk 19 about this for a second? So what's the 20 21 pie chart of his time right now? I see 22 that car driving around a lot. How 23 much time is he spending on parking enforcement versus code enforcement 24 25 versus other Building Department work? Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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We have been -- well, 1 MR. PALLAS: 2 I don't know the exact numbers, but I would say that right now in terms of 3 parking enforcement it's probably ten 4 5 percent if it's a lot. Code 6 enforcement it's probably thirty or 7 forty percent, but he's learning, working with the Building Department, 8 9 so he's going out with them, with Eileen on those kinds of things. He's 10 11 also going through a lot of files. 12 He's -- I've tasked him with doing FOIL 13 requests with the Building Department, 14 so he's going through a lot of files, which is helping him learn the process. 15 16 As he's going through them, he asks 17 questions about what this paper means 18 even though it's not part of the FOIL, so he's doing a lot of that kind of 19 20 work. 21 That's good to TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 22 hear. I'll admit to being a little 23 taken aback. We had a discussion at the last regular meeting where I said 24 25 is the Enforcement Department handling

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this, and you said we don't have an 1 2 Enforcement Department and yet here we have a thing branded Enforcement 3 Department. I was sort of surprised 4 that this never -- this is I think a 5 big kind of visual move that the 6 7 Village made to put someone in a uniform, to have a badge, to have a 8 9 logo. It's not necessarily a bad thing, I just was surprised that never 10 11 came up at these meetings. And we've 12 also -- we've put gear on the mayor mobile that looks sort of like police 13 14 lighting, there's, like, a little horn and buzzer on the thing like a police 15 16 quys. Those are sort of big public 17 displays of force or enforcement. I'm 18 just surprised that that just happened without this elected board getting to 19 talk about it. 20 21 MR. PALLAS: I'll take 22 responsibility for that, Doug. I mean, 23 I didn't bring it up to -- you know, there were a lot of things happening at 24 25 the same time, and I perhaps should

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1 have brought some of that to your 2 attention, and I apologize. MAYOR HUBBARD: I can just say the 3 issue of the lights, Paul did ask me 4 about that, and if he's parked 5 somewhere writing a ticket or whatever 6 7 with nothing on the vehicle, it's hard to identify that it's actually an 8 9 official vehicle, and if he's blocking a crosswalk or something, trying to get 10 somebody to move, it was more a safety 11 12 issue for him or whoever else is using that if they're at the scene of 13 14 something, if Eileen is using it, you can jut put a light on so people 15 16 actually notice what it is when they were doing that. Paul did ask me about 17 the lights before they went on. You 18 19 know, the badge and, you know, it's his 20 own pants, we got him a shirt. Ι 21 didn't think it was a whole lot of 22 stuff, you know. I mean, he got his 23 own jacket, he put a label on it. Some people thought he went overboard, but 24 25 at least he's identifiable. I mean, we

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1 had a problem a couple of years ago 2 where our meter readers had nothing on and they were walking in people's yards 3 and nobody knew. So I wanted to make 4 sure he was identifiable with 5 something, and that's where that all 6 7 kind of went. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, actually 8 9 it kind of brings up a voucher that was presented, and I can understand the --10 11 it was a purchases of the badges, and I 12 can understand the code enforcement officers having it because they're 13 14 actually writing tickets, I even believe in the code that you're allowed 15 to write a ticket. 16 17 MR. PALLAS: That's correct. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I don't know where the policy came to give the 19 20 Deputy Clerk and the Village Clerk 21 badges? I'm sorry, I have a hard time 22 understanding that one, okay, I'm 23 sorry. I have pulled the vouchers. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The clerk's 24 25 office has badges?

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's 1 2 the voucher I pulled because I wanted to understand what the policy was as to 3 how that came about. 4 5 MR. PALLAS: The question was 6 posed to me when Greg had a badge, and 7 it just -- it wasn't the correct whatever, it didn't work with his 8 9 uniform or his shirt rather. He asked me if he could get a new badge, I said 10 sure, I don't have a problem with it. 11 12 He asked about expanding it to other 13 people, I just asked him if there was a 14 rationale for it, and he ticked off some things, like, for me, Eileen 15 16 obviously, myself, mentioned the Clerk 17 and Deputy Clerk as election officers, 18 that's how it kind of came to pass. I 19 said sure, and that was the whole 20 story. I didn't give a lot of thought 21 to it, I'll be perfectly honest. It 22 was presented to me, sounded like a great idea, I didn't have a problem 23 with it, and I moved on to other 24 25 things.

I though that was a great success, 17 I thought things went very well. The 18 reports I got back from the school and, 19 you know, rec center kids went there, 20 it was really great. I went on it 21 myself, I thought it was a great thing, 22 I thought that was great. 23 The mooring field, Bayman's dock, new applications have been mailed out, 24 25 so we're working on that. The Road

Department at the time I wrote this had 1 2 begun installing the ice rink, it is completed, and we're gearing up to get 3 the compressors all up and running over 4 5 the next week, so that should be in 6 good shape as soon as it gets cold 7 enough to make ice. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Are we using 8 9 the same parts and set up for the set up of the ice rink to get it going that 10 11 we have in the past? 12 MR. PALLAS: Yes. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, and the 13 14 clubs, the contracts of the clubs --MR. PALLAS: That's on me. I just 15 16 haven't gotten to it, Mary Bess, it's on my to do list because obviously now 17 18 I have to get it done before the December meeting so you can take a look 19 20 at it, so I will be working on that 21 over the next week. 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I had a request 23 from Greg who is involved with the skating teams there, and he mentioned 24 25 that the tubes I guess are full of Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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leaves now. He said that if those 1 2 leaves are removed before they pour the water on, that will make a big 3 difference in terms of the ice 4 freezing. 5 6 MR. PALLAS: Absolutely, we'll 7 definitely remove them, no question. There's a few things we have to do, and 8 9 that's one of them, we have to put the sand around the edge, which we 10 attempted to do last year, and freeze 11 12 that first, so that keeps the water when we fill the rest of it from -- it 13 14 helps keep it from leaking out the 15 bottom. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It helps to 17 insulate the pipes too. 18 MR. PALLAS: A little bit. You 19 don't really want them insulated, 20 because that's really the way the heat 21 gets absorbed, directly into the pipes, 22 where it's really just the edge that we 23 need insulated. Moving on to the rec center 24 25 itself, the Department of Social Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

Services, we sent all of the 1 documentation that they require for the 2 end of the summer camp program. 3 The kids got a tour of El Gallion. And the 4 5 campground is closed, that's all shut 6 down now and --7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I would like to say that the campground over the past 8 9 year since the new manager has been there for the last two years I have 10 11 seen the revenue go up. I think the 12 gentleman is doing an excellent job. From the road front I have seen several 13 14 improvements. I didn't get an 15 opportunity to go down when he was 16 there, so I'll have to say that I've 17 been very impressed. 18 MR. PALLAS: As have I. He's made 19 some suggestions, a couple of 20 suggestions that I will be bringing to 21 you over the course of the winter, some 22 minor things that need to be done, fix 23 up the roadway, remove a building, 24 replace a building, that kind of thing, 25 so he's got some ideas that I will

explore. 1 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we still looking to expand? 3 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I mean a little 4 5 bit. Again, that's all part of what he has been discussing with me. We think 6 7 we can do a little bit of an expansion in-house. A major expansion is going 8 9 to be costly, and I don't know that it's -- I just have to think about it a 10 11 little bit more, but we're certainly 12 going to look into doing just a minor 13 expansion. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: You done? 15 MR. PALLAS: I'm done. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Only took you an 17 hour. Okay. Village Treasurer, Robert 18 Brandt. MR. BRANDT: Good evening, 19 20 everyone. Couple of budget mods that have been mentioned. The first one is 21 22 for change order for the ambulance for 23 1700. We got the approval. That's coming from their apparatus fund. The 24 25 second one is -- Paul was mentioning Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 it, the wastewater treatment plant, I 2 just want to talk a little bit about that, Adam, as Paul mentioned, is going 3 to be providing us a list of equipment 4 The plant is very modern and up 5 there. 6 to date, however there is going to be 7 ongoing maintenance, and we have to take that into account, and we've asked 8 9 him to provide us a list of that so we can start lining up funding for that. 10 11 So that is going to be another expense 12 that is part of the rate study, we did include that, which is underway. So 13 14 we're aware of that. That said, we need an additional 16,000 for this E&R 15 16 Basin Air Drive Rotary unit, which I have no idea what that is, but he asked 17 18 for that for funding to go in place 19 with that.

I have a resolution, our annual resolution to authorize Paul as Village Administrator to cash a check in the about of 1300 to get the ice rink going, for the banks, to start the season with that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Where are the 1 2 -- I see that the trailer is there, is that -- that's the office where --3 that's the office where they will be 4 taking the ticket money? 5 6 MR. BRANDT: Correct. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the procedure, as I asked in the e-mail 8 9 earlier today, the procedure for cash collection is going to be going through 10 11 the procedure that we have in place? MR. BRANDT: The only thing that 12 changed, as I pointed out in the e-mail 13 14 is the addition of cameras, but no, everything is as we've outlined in the 15 16 audit committee. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So who is --18 between Paul, who is going to be the 19 manager? Is it Margot who is going to 20 still be overseeing this during the 21 nighttime on the weekends? 22 MR. PALLAS: Well, I mean, she's 23 responsible for it, but on the weekends we have staff, part-time staff that 24 we've used in the marina for all 25

| 18 | responses. Trustee Roberts had |
| 19 | somebody who might be interested, was |
| 20 | going to give me a resume |
| 21 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're trying. |
| 22 | MR. BRANDT: Okay. I just didn't |
| 23 | want it to go idle. |
| 24 | MAYOR HUBBARD: No, the ad went |
| 25 | out in the paper and everything else, |
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1 and no responses. 2 MR. BRANDT: I just wanted to open my mouth on it. We have an upcoming 3 bond payment for the Sewer Department, 4 this is the EFC noninterest loan, 5 that's due December 1st, and it's 6 7 scheduled for next Monday. I put it in here, normally I put it in the 8 9 following month, but I had no significant other payments, so I wanted 10 11 to put something in there. 12 Rate study is underway, I have another meeting with them tomorrow, in 13 14 fact, tomorrow is Friday, I have another meeting with them on the rate 15 16 study. There has been no issues that 17 they've raised, it's been pretty 18 standard questions that we've been getting and the information and my 19 20 staff has been readily giving them 21 everything the second they need it, so 22 I don't foresee any issues with that, 23 but I guess I'll find out tomorrow, I'll keep you abreast on that. That's 24 25 kind of it for me. Any questions?

MAYOR HUBBARD: No questions? All
 right. Thank you. Village Clerk
 Sylvia Pirillo.

MS. PIRILLO: Good evening, ladies 4 and gentlemen. This month is an annual 5 6 resolution setting the tax bills, which will be held on March 14, 2017 at 10:00 7 In addition to my report under 8 a.m. 9 legal notices is the fact that we noticed a certificate of village 10 11 offices to be filled, which is for two 12 trustees with terms to expire on April 1, 2021. 13

14 We received notification from Heap that the regular benefit component of 15 16 the program opens on November 14th, and 17 at this point is expected to close on 18 the 15th of March. The emergency 19 benefit component is expected to open 20 on the 3rd of January 2017, and again, 21 anticipated to close on the 15th of 22 March.

Review of old business, if you
will. We have discussed for some time
a clerk to the boards. We were stymied

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1 by the fact that we had an extensive 2 list, which we worked rather heavily. Unfortunately we did not receive 3 responses from interested parties 4 5 partially due to the fact that our 6 salary was low. I've spoken with Paul 7 and with Robert, and we are able to up the salary from 12 dollars per hour for 8 9 that position to 15. Civil service is aware of this, and they have kindly 10 11 offered to help us by generating and 12 disseminating letters for us. I should 13 know by after Thanksgiving, early 14 December what the responses are to that. I should be able to report to 15 16 the board about that at the next work 17 session. 18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sylvia, how many 19 hours would that job entail? Is there 20 a specific number of hours at that 21 rate? 22 MS. PIRILLO: It's a full-time 23 position. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thirty-five hours. 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great to hear.

I'm not asking -- I don't think we're looking for someone 17 18 to sit there and actually review plans and --19 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Not at all. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But a 22 secretarial type of person is going to -- a secretarial type person is going 23

24 to be trained enough to know what

paperwork needs to go into a package

and to follow the guidance of Paul as 1 2 to the village administrator as to what he wants into the packages. I mean, 3 that's what I'm envisioning, I'm not 4 5 envisioning anybody who is going to be taking a role of being in the Building 6 7 Department to read plans. MAYOR HUBBARD: That is not what I 8 9 said. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's completely 12 not what I said. I'm relaying information to you from a 13 14 recommendation from the building inspector that somebody in an entry 15 16 level position that has never done 17 anything in a Building Department, that 18 somebody who had some experience in a Building Department would probably be 19 20 helpful for this person to be clerk of 21 the boards who is going to be going and 22 taking care of this. It was just 23 something that was said to me when we discussed this position and how to fill 24 25 it. So I'm saying at 15 dollars an

1 hour, you still may get somebody that knows Word and everything else, has 2 never been in a Building Department at 3 all before, knows nothing about it, 4 5 you're going to have a big learning 6 curve, you're going to have to learn 7 the process. Never been to Village Hall, a ZBA meeting, planning board 8 9 meeting, to expect them to solve all these problems that you're talking 10 11 about first week on the job, I'm just 12 trying to give you a little heads up for what the feeling was from the 13 14 people that are doing for us now. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This is a clerk 15 16 typist civil service title? 17 MS. PIRILLO: Yes. 18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: What's the 19 average salary for a clerk typist in 20 Suffolk County? 21 MS. PIRILLO: I don't know. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We have to know 23 that. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I believe the 25 average is 32 I believe. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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MS. PIRILLO: 32 thousand dollars 1 2 a year? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I believe so. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And what does 15 4 dollars an hour equate to? 5 6 MR. PALLAS: Roughly 30. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. As long as we're not significantly off of 8 9 whatever the average -- my guidance would be as a trustee to try to be near 10 11 the average or better. 12 MS. PIRILLO: 12 was not unreasonable. The issue became the 13 14 fact that the list did not -- was not comprised of people that live close to 15 16 this Village in any way, shape, or 17 form. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because it's the 19 whole county, right? 20 MS. PIRILLO: So when we met as a 21 group in management, that was one of 22 the issues that we discussed, and 23 that's how we got to the 15 dollars per house. Hopefully that will garner 24 25 better results.

| 25 | revised the technology a little bit on |
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1 Jean Marie's computer today, and it seemed that there was a connection 2 between the scanner and her computer. 3 We also have been researching pricing 4 on new scanners. There is a scanner 5 available for about two thousand 6 7 dollars, which can scan pages up to eight and a half by fourteen, which 8 9 would be rather standard. The second scanner, second type of scanner that's 10 11 available would be able to scan pages 12 as large as eleven by seventeen, that would be about three thousand dollars. 13 14 We discussed with the building inspector the largest sizes of papers 15 16 in the building department files. The 17 largest size would be twenty-four by 18 thirty-six. A scanner that's capable of scanning that would cost 19 20 approximately sixteen thousand dollars. 21 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Would those scan 22 blueprints? 23 MR. PALLAS: Yes. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Ultimately I 25 think scanning of blueprints would be Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

an objective, especially if we're going 1 2 to go out and buy a scanner. I think that would probably be an important 3 thing to take into consideration. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: As we talk 5 6 about this two thousand dollar scanner, 7 if I remember early on when we were looking into this when we didn't think 8 9 we were going to be able to get the scanners from Southold, we had looked 10 11 into and found one on Amazon for a 12 similar price, I don't know if anyone remembers, to do about the same thing. 13 14 I mean, and when we say it needs an adapter, if it's older it has some sort 15 16 of serial type adapter and it needs 17 some sort of USB type adapter. Μv 18 confusion, I quess, which is I assume the right word, like, I mean, it's a 19 20 scanner. This is going -- this is in 21 excess of a year to plug up a scanner. 22 MS. PIRILLO: I agree. It's 23 actually much longer than year, this has been going on for many years. 24 25 We're right now in the homestretch

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1 because we are in the process of 2 actually getting it to work, and it's up to the board how many we would like 3 to have. The eight and a half by 4 fourteen version has network 5 6 capabilities, the larger one does not, 7 so the larger one would be standalone. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, even if 8 9 the larger one is standalone, we have two that require the adapters. Like, 10 11 if somebody would tell me what adapters 12 they are I'll go tomorrow at lunch to Best Buy and I'll buy, like, two 13 14 adapters, like, I don't mind. I'd just like to get it going. My frustration 15 16 is we hired -- and I could be wrong, 17 but I believe when we hired the TCO to 18 be the building inspector, one of the ways we were going to train them to be 19 20 building inspector was to start 21 scanning the files. Does that sound 22 about right? 23 MR. PALLAS: No. 24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Not train, 25 but Greg in his downtime was going to Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

be able to do that? 1 2 MR. PALLAS: That was the clerk of the boards. 3 MS. PIRILLO: These are all tied 4 5 together. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's my 7 misunderstanding. But even with that said, I just -- I just marvel that it's 8 9 taking so long. MS. PIRILLO: We can buy the 10 11 scanner tomorrow, if that's what the 12 board would like to do. Would you 13 prefer to buy the eight and a half by 14 fourteen or the eleven by seventeen. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I have more 15 16 questions than answers. What are the 17 specs? How many pages an hour? How 18 many -- the networking versus 19 non-networking, what are the 20 implications for that? Because we have 21 to get it into -- where are we putting 22 the --23 MS. PIRILLO: We could -- also 24 we've discovered that our current 25 copier already has documents in it, if Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 you will. Any documents that were 2 scanned into our copier may also be easily translatable. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's on a hard 4 5 drive or something on the thing? Could 6 we get a chart that says these are your 7 options to purchase, these are the specs? 8 9 MS. PIRILLO: Absolutely. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we get that 11 so we can make a -- I can't make a 12 decision based on --13 MS. PIRILLO: What kind of specs 14 would you need, which are the most important specs in your opinion? 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Speed, pages per 16 hour, and then implications of network 17 18 -- so if it's not network connected, I 19 assume that means it goes to someone's 20 hard drive, and then there's time that 21 has to get spent to get it from the 22 hard drive to the network. MS. PIRILLO: That's my 23 24 understanding because it's standalone. 25 MR. PALLAS: I think, and I Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 haven't spent the time that maybe I 2 should have, I suspect that that means that it's connected to a computer. I 3 don't know that it means that it's not 4 5 -- that doesn't mean you can't direct 6 it when you scan it to go directly to 7 the network. I suspect what this means is that it's only available to that 8 9 computer as opposed me being able to print to it or scan to it. You know, 10 11 most of our printers now, the two big 12 ones in the building, everybody has 13 access to. So I think by saying not 14 networkable that it's only connected to a computer, it's not the process to get 15 16 the documents into the server. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So then 18 network connectivity is a nonfactor? MR. PALLAS: No, I didn't say 19 20 that. You've asked for a chart. Give 21 us a few days to do that, and I have to 22 think about the implications of both of 23 those things. So I think there's going

24 to be a trade off, right, between the 25 advantage of having a network as

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1 compared to the size. I think the 2 speed of the scanning is not necessarily an important piece of this 3 because especially we're talking about 4 5 the old files. Some of these papers are very old, you're not just going to 6 7 stack them and let them go. This is going to be labor intensive, it's going 8 9 to be one page at a time. So you're going to have lay it down, put it in 10 11 the file, take the next one. I don't 12 know that speed matters per se. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But that brings 14 my next question is I understand we have to go at some point to the old 15 16 files, but we should be able to start 17 with the new ones that we've been 18 working on. I mean, and hear me out, 19 okay, we have the copiers upstairs that 20 scan, they do the PDF's when you want 21 to send something out to somebody, it 22 gets scanned on the computer in a PDF. 23 What is the plan for storage if you're going to be scanning these? Now you're 24 25 talking about a standalone computer

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that somebody, you know, there's not 1 2 going to be any other -- you have to --I mean, someone would have to come in 3 and actually stand before that 4 5 computer. I thought there was supposed 6 to be some network working with 7 someplace else. I'm sorry, I'm getting a little confused here as to what the 8 9 whole goal of the scanning is anymore, okay, I'll be honest with you. I'm 10 11 getting lost. 12 MR. PALLAS: Correct me if I'm wrong, but the initial -- the way that 13 14 I understood it is that we were going to start with the old files. 15 16 MS. PIRILLO: The Building 17 Department. 18 MR. PALLAS: Correct, the old Building Department files. That was I 19 20 think how this discussion was always -it was to start with the old stuff 21 22 first. Once we got the system set up, 23 you could go in parallel paths certainly, but the initial concept was 24 25 to start with the old ones. Once the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 system was working, then the new ones 2 would go right into that same process. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I thought it was 3 related -- because I was watching the 4 5 ZBA, the archived ZBA from the other 6 night, and it was brought up that 7 somebody wanted to be able to review the plans for the applications there 8 9 before them, and so instead of having to go into the office and FOIL and go 10 11 during business hours, et cetera, that 12 the most -- everything that's before the boards now would be online as it is 13 14 I believe with the town. I thought the idea was for us to replicate that with 15 16 the old -- my perspective is that the old files are great, but what's most 17 18 important is that people get information about what's happening 19 20 right now. 21 MR. PALLAS: I think, again, we're 22 talking about two different things, I 23 think. The application that's before a board is a package. A Building 24 25 Department file has lots of other

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2 MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it was as we're working on stuff now, anything we 3 have now would be taken care of and 4 would be scanned so we don't get 5 6 farther behind later on, and as time 7 permitted, we go back to the older files and start taking the older files 8 9 and taking them and archiving them on the computer. But so that way they do 10 take two years to put all the old stuff 11 12 on, but we're still two years behind on everything that's happening today. So 13 14 that they would start doing today's stuff, but we still only have one 15 16 person in the Building Department. So 17 even if we have three brand new 18 scanners there right now, we don't have the personnel to do it. There's only 19 20 one person, and she would not be able 21 to get caught up on Ed's list, which I 22 talked to her about, start doing that, 23 take care of the current stuff, and do 24 the scanning. So we need to get 25 somebody else there that's going to do

it, even if they're all -- you get the 1 2 adapters tomorrow and she gets the new scanner, it's all sitting there, we've 3 4 got three scanners and nobody to 5 operate them. 6 MR. PROKOP: But the current 7 applications, somebody puts it into the feeder and pushes copy, and we get ten 8 9 copies, and they're distributed. There's no reason -- we could just as 10 11 easily push scan and scan them, isn't 12 that -- and then push --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the other 13 14 question is -- is -- is, okay, and hear me out, I'm sorry, I work -- I 15 16 work with paperwork and files. All my 17 life I've worked with clerk typists in 18 situations, even though they were 19 management, okay. We have to have a 20 plan before you even start scanning, 21 and this is what I'm not seeing, is we 22 take the new applications, you're going 23 to have to set up some type of a home file so that that file can be updated 24 25 all the time. And that's why I'm

saying starting with the new ones - MS. PIRILLO: It's called tagging.
 MR. PALLAS: That's part of the
 systems.
 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But
 starting with the new files would be an

7 experience of well, okay, now we know what we need to do with the old ones. 8 9 But in the meantime, there is a lot of frustration from everybody trying to 10 11 get on the same page. And Joe is 12 right, if you're copying for ten people, hit the scan button to put the 13 14 PDF so it goes some place. That's what I'm confused about. I'm hearing all of 15 16 this about equipment, I'm hearing all 17 of this, and confusion, and I don't see 18 a plan of action of A, B, C, how we're 19 even going to get that far.

20 MR. PALLAS: I mean, we can 21 document that certainly, but again, I 22 just want to be clear that we -- and 23 maybe I'm not viewing this correctly, I 24 think we're talking about two different 25 processes. If we start scanning,

quote, new files, they're related 1 2 generally to existing buildings. So if we just only do the new stuff that 3 comes in and don't tie that to the 4 5 existing documents in the file, someone is going to say where is the old stuff 6 7 and so I want to make sure that --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, I'm 8 9 sorry, maybe I'm being too simplistic, but if you have a new application, 10 11 you're already pulling the old file to 12 begin with, okay, in all fairness, you're pulling an old file to review 13 14 what's in it, so what's the difference between taking the whole thing together 15 16 and dealing with it at the time. Okay? I'm sorry. I worked in a business 17 18 office for too long, okay, I don't understand why it's taking so long to 19 20 get this to move forward. I'm sorry, I 21 don't. Okay? I don't understand why 22 mailings take so long to get done. I 23 worked in a building where you put out mailings every day. Okay? I'm sorry, 24 I don't understand it. 25

MS. PIRILLO: The lists -- if 1 2 you're speaking of the mailings for the clerk typist list, it had 937 people on 3 it. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So? 5 I'm sorry. 6 Where I worked, that went out in a day 7 and a half. MS. PIRILLO: It wasn't an issue 8 9 that my staff wasn't working hard enough on it, it was a few issues, one 10 11 was postage, so what we were doing was 12 sending them out in groups of hundreds 13 or more, so this way in case we got --14 we received a response that we could then use and meet with the person, then 15 16 we would not have to go further on the 17 list, that was the first thing. It was 18 very gracious of civil service to help us because now we have their 19 20 assistance, and they are going to do a 21 mass mailing for us or have already 22 completed a mass mailing, and then 23 we'll be apprised of the results, and then we can hopefully, now that we have 24 25 a higher salary, we can hopefully

1 schedule appointments and interviews. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I understand that, Sylvia, but you and I discussed 3 this back in September and October and 4 we're now in November. Okay? I'm 5 6 sorry, I just have to put it on the 7 table, we had a discussion in October about it, and it wasn't the middle of 8 9 October, it was the beginning, so I don't understand why things aren't --10 11 why it just doesn't move a little 12 faster, that's all. Sorry, I'm frustrated. 13 14 MS. PIRILLO: My apologies. ТΟ reach that number of people, to send 15 16 the mailing, and then to give them an 17 appropriate -- you need to give them an 18 appropriate time to respond, so you 19 have to tell them that they need to 20 respond by a certain date, and then the 21 frustration I believe was on all

22 levels, which is why management met and 23 decided to -- that we were able to 24 increase the salary, and that was 25 problematic, so we were able to do

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We're looking forward to having 1 that. a clerk of the boards. 2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: This wasn't a 3 bulk mailing, these were individually 4 addressed envelopes to --5 6 MS. PIRILLO: Yeah, of course, 7 obviously. TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't want beat 8 9 a dead horse, but just going back again on investment, if we were to invest in 10 a scanner, again, I want to emphasize 11 12 the point that if we're going to spend thousands of dollars that I believe 13 14 that it should be in a scanner that is capable of scanning blueprints and 15 16 putting them into a PDF format, that's the way Southold Town does it, it's 17 18 extremely convenient to have those plans available to be e-mailed, and I 19 20 think that's would simplify things a 21 lot, especially on the large projects 22 that we're getting now that are coming 23 in as thirty, forty pages of 24 blueprints. 25 MR. PALLAS: We will take a look

1at the different scanners that are2available. I think, if my memory3serves me, that when we went from the4eleven by seventeen to the next size,5it was not -- it was a significant6difference in cost.

MS. PIRILLO: As I said, it jumps
from three thousand to approximately
sixteen.

MR. PALLAS: Yeah, so it's a huge 10 11 difference in cost, and the new files, 12 new things that come in, anything that 13 we need a print that size, typically 14 it's digital anyway, so we can just have the digital file sent to us, so we 15 16 wouldn't need it to scan new things. 17 It is the old things, the old files, as 18 I understand it, from a guick thumb through the files, there aren't a lot 19 20 of them that contain prints that size, 21 and I think that our thought process 22 was when we come across those, we would 23 go out and get them digitized somewhere else because the difference in cost is 24 25 so significant and the value of --

going forward value becomes minimal 1 2 since we're going to be receiving things digitally anyway. Once we were 3 done scanning all the files we have, 4 5 granted it's a long process, the need for the larger format would be much 6 reduced. But we'll take another look 7 at this, and we'll come back to you 8 9 with information. We'll come back as soon as we can, certainly by the next 10 11 work session with a plan going forward 12 on scanning existing files as well as 13 as new applications come in to scan 14 them in jointly. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Some independent 15 16 places do that, I mean, I've taken 17 plans to Ink Spot, and he can digitize 18 plans and, you know, so probably just using an independent source like that 19 20 versus investing in equipment, I can 21 see that definitely, but I'm just 22 saying to have them in that format I

23 think is very important for the

24 Building Department.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that file is 6 7 going to be connected to just the Municity program, or is it going to be 8 9 connected to whatever is being scanned? MR. PALLAS: This is a separate 10 11 question. Again, I don't know the 12 Municity program, but the scanning files would be as I understand it in 13 14 one place, Municity is somewhere else. My understanding is you can link 15 16 Municity to those files. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm 18 asking. That's my understanding. 19 MR. PALLAS: The first step, you 20 asked me about Municity, we're going to 21 have Greg get well versed on that and 22 start putting in that data. The 23 scanning of the new applications, we will come back to you with a plan by 24 25 next work session as to how we're going

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residents and applicants. I'd spend 1 2 your extra thirteen grand on the nice scanner if you tell me it's going to 3 save us twenty grand in staff time. 4 MR. PALLAS: I don't know -- well, 5 6 I mean, it's just going to be a 7 ballpark number. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right, exactly. 8 9 MR. PALLAS: It's impossible to know until we start the process what 10 11 it's going to take to go through all of 12 the files. Every file is different, you have different sizes. As I said 13 14 before, you're going to be doing this one sheet at a time. They have staples 15 16 they have to pull apart. I mean, I think the number that's been thrown 17 18 around is two or three years, I think 19 that's probably fair. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Elapsed person 21 time? 22 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, to get 23 everything in. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So then we have 24 25 to decide what's first, what's second. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 You know, an interesting number would 2 be what would it cost -- at the current rate of applications coming in, how 3 much time is required just to scan the 4 stuff coming in? 5 MR. PALLAS: The new files coming 6 7 in is not going to be -- and I understand your point, Trustee 8 9 Phillips, that is not a significant amount of time. I don't know that that 10 11 number is relevant compared to scanning 12 in all of the files that exist. I think that those are two different 13 14 worlds apart in terms of numbers of documents that need to be scanned. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I would suggest 17 that you put it into small chunks so 18 that we can bite off one at a time on whatever your plan is, but before we 19 20 commit to spending money and a bunch of 21 time on a clerk of the boards, we 22 should just understand what the plan 23 is. MR. PALLAS: Again, I'm getting 24 25 two different signals I think here, and

1 I just want to make sure I'm -- the little chunks, there's two things that 2 we're scanning, new applications and 3 existing files. So if we're going to 4 do new files coming in and when those 5 new files come in, scan in the 6 7 associated property file so that it's all in one place, and, you know, I have 8 9 to think about how that looks, but that's one thing. But again, that is 10 11 not the significant time piece. The 12 significant time piece is all the other files. So there's only two things, the 13 14 new stuff and the old stuff. There's nothing in between. And of course the 15 16 birth and the death certificates, which 17 is a separate entity all together. That would probably be the easier one 18 to figure out how long it would take 19 20 because they're, I assume, relatively 21 straightforward. 22 MS. PIRILLO: We have death 23 certificates that literally date back to the 1800's and birth certificates as 24 25 well, and those are kept in large

| 3 | uniformed sizes that are less |
| 4 | antiquated would not be as time |
| 5 | consuming of course. |

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll get some 7 information on it. What Trustee 8 Phillips was saying, you know, the old 9 files have to be -- if we do just the new stuff, we have a property down on 10 11 Third Street that something came up 12 that happened seventeen years ago, you start the new file, you don't have the 13 14 old ones, but the file on that piece of property had two thousand documents in 15 16 it. So to do that one current one to 17 stay current and take that folder for 18 that one property with the two thousand documents, it's a month and a half 19 20 worth of work on one thing to get it 21 current to go out. So a site plan that 22 said you had to put drainage in on 23 something twenty years ago before the ZBA went and got a ruling on it. So 24 25 you can't just do parts of it, the

1 whole process -- we need to start 2 somewhere, and the whole process is not going to be done overnight. So, you 3 know, I know you're frustrated, you 4 5 know, we don't have an IT group at 6 Village Hall to do this stuff, they're 7 all kind of doing it along with everything else and getting mad at them 8 9 and all --

10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm not getting 11 mad, I'm just getting that I'm not sure 12 that some of the stuff --

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: You're screaming, 14 you're hollering, you raised your voice repeatedly hollering at people that are 15 16 over there, and they're trying, but 17 there's only so much they can do along 18 with the day-to-day operations that go on along with this backlog of stuff 19 20 that we keep talking about. So yes, 21 we're frustrated about it. Jack and 22 Doug brought this up when they first 23 got on the board, they wanted to do this, I'm sure they're frustrated too, 24 25 but we need to do it the right way the

first time instead of wasting three 1 2 months of time on it and find out well, we can't find it on the computer, we 3 can't retrieve it, and it's all just 4 5 wasted time. So I think we're trying 6 to make sure it's done properly. 7 Myself, I feel waiting for these new scanners and everything else through 8 9 the whole process the way we were going with it, I think if we had just bit the 10 11 bullet a year ago and just bought a 12 scanner and started it, we wouldn't be where we are now, and now we know we 13 14 should have spent three grand on the scanner last year, and at least we'd 15 16 have something scanned. If you could 17 report back and try to put this all 18 together and a game plan on it would be 19 appreciated. 20 MR. PALLAS: We will have that by 21 next work session, yes. 22 MS. PIRILLO: Any other questions? 23 Thank you. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Village Attorney 25 report is next.

MR. PROKOP: I have one contract 1 2 negotiation and one litigation matter for executive session, very brief. 3 Other than that, I just wanted to 4 mention that we have, you know, it's a 5 small point that I'm continuing to work 6 7 with Greg and Paul on parking enforcement and code issues that have 8 9 come up, and Greg's been working out -working very hard and his efforts have 10 11 been showing in the continuing parking 12 calendars that we've had in court and the number of tickets that have been 13 14 processed. Does anybody have any questions regarding my report or 15 16 anything else you'd like to know that 17 I'm working on? 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I do, but I don't know which of these we are 19 20 discussing in public and which we are 21 not. | 25 | server and my server as far as e-mails. |
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There's days that I don't get Village 1 2 e-mails until the middle of the night. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Don't run for 3 4 president. MR. PROKOP: And it's because I 5 6 only use one handheld device. So I'm 7 not aware of an e-mail, so if you could, whatever was said in the e-mail, 8 9 could you please repeat it, I'd be 10 happy to answer the questions. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm looking for 12 it. MR. PROKOP: I wouldn't do the 13 14 plan for Wiggins Street, if that's what you're asking me. I would work towards 15 16 acquiring it if that's what you wanted to do, but I wouldn't --17 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: As I understand 19 it, we've got to either -- we have to 20 do our business or get off the pot on 21 this on Wiggins Street very quickly, 22 and so I think I would like us to be 23 able to do this, but I would like to hear from, you know, I guess I'm ready 24 25 to jump in and say we should go spend

the money and do this or include it in 1 2 sort of a larger bond that we might do for all kinds of improvements if the 3 Village Administrator were to tell us 4 5 this would be a key strategic property for future Village efforts related to 6 7 the MTA site, or if Community Development felt like this would be a 8 9 great win for us in terms of providing housing. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: If we could just 12 pause for a second, the public is all looking up at us like what the heck are 13 14 you talking about, we have never discussed this with the public. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just asked the 17 question can we discuss -- okay. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I just want to 19 explain on Wiggins Street what we're 20 talking about so the people -- they're 21 looking at me like what are they 22 talking about? There's a piece of 23 property next to the Village parking lot on Wiggins Street, 319 Wiggins 24 25 Street that was offered to the Village

to buy, and so we've looked at that. 1 2 It's a two family rental, a legal two family rental. We've looked at taking 3 that piece of property and adding that 4 5 to the Village Housing Authority as one of our rentals to keep it from turning 6 7 into an Air B&B whatever to keep it as two rentals in the future. There is a 8 9 garage on the piece of land that's kind of beat up and everything else, and the 10 11 garage -- it was suggested by the 12 people that had approached me on it to make additional parking where the 13 14 garage is, keep the house with one driveway, take the garage away, and add 15 16 that to the parking lot. This is on 17 the south side of Wiggins Street, the 18 last house next to where the MTA parking lot is. That's what we're 19 20 talking about, just in general, it was 21 offered to us. We had gotten an 22 appraisal a couple of months ago that 23 came back really low, we got a second appraisal which is closer to the asking 24 25 price, and now we're discussing whether

1 we want to go forward with it, okay, 2 just so --AUDIENCE MEMBER: Thanks. 3 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: They're all 5 looking up like what are you talking 6 about? They're thinking it's a Wiggins 7 Street revamp, you know, road regrading, no way traffic, everything 8 9 else. Okay? MR. PROKOP: I think that in terms 10 11 of a specific negotiation, price 12 negotiation or something, that should probably be executive session, but the 13 14 general concept, the pros and cons, that kind of thing could be discussed 15 16 publicly. But what you said is accurate, if we're interested in 17 18 pursuing it, then we need to do something or we stand to miss out. 19 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My question 22 was, first of all, you know, do we have 23 a plan for, you know, the reason for us to be purchasing the property, I guess, 24 25 do we have an actual plan of action of

what we're going to do with it? Number two is where are we going to find the

funding for it? That was the second question. I'm sorry, it's not on my phone, it's on the computer.

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6 MR. PROKOP: Okay. So number one 7 is when this first became -- we became aware of this, Paul and I went to look 8 9 at the property, and we sort of talked about conceptually things that could be 10 11 done with the property and determined 12 that it would be a benefit to the -- it would be a significant benefit I think 13 14 to the Village to have that property. It serves several different functions 15 16 that are important to the public and 17 the Village.

18 MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe the 19 treasurer sent you around a couple of 20 months ago the financial paperwork on 21 it of how to pay for it, how to fund 22 it. We have money left in the 23 community development account, we just got more in from a recent sale, so 24 25 there's money in there, I believe it's

around 160,000 now, something like 1 2 that. We got another 42,000 come in from the recent closing. The rents 3 that will be coming in from it would 4 5 help cover the payments with the 6 community development money, and with 7 the rents coming in it would basically -- I think at the time we had figured 8 9 out that it would be about 50,000 from 10 the Village to get the property, and 11 then it would be self-sustaining from 12 there on with the rents. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The next 13 14 question was who is going to be actually managing it, was that going to 15 16 be falling under our Housing Authority, 17 you know, where they would be 18 maintaining it? I'm going to put the mic away because everybody thinks I'm 19 20 shouting, I talk loud enough as it is. 21 MR. PALLAS: My understanding, and 22 this is going back obviously a little 23 bit, but my understanding was that it

24 was going to be under the Housing25 Authority.

each other. 1 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So it has significant importance to the Village 3 itself in creating housing for some 4 people to be able to stay here, number 5 one, and number two, we would be 6 self-sufficient in it would be not a 7 burden on the taxpayer budget because 8 9 it would be self-sufficient, correct? MR. PALLAS: That's right, that's 10 11 the analysis. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Before we --I mean, I've been looking through my 13 14 e-mails, I don't think I've seen an estimate, that house needs work, in 15 16 fact, that needs significant work I think. 17 18 MR. PROKOP: In part of the discussion, that was mentioned to the 19 20 seller's attorney. 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: But I mean, 22 as we're looking into buying it and who 23 is going to manage it, and we're saying it's not going to be a burden on 24 25 anybody. That house needs a lot of Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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work tomorrow. 1 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's why I'm 3 asking. TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, I think it 4 needs about a hundred thousand dollars 5 worth of work, not thirty thousand. It 6 7 needs roof, siding, windows. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I tend to 8 9 agree with you, the roof is no good, the siding is no good, the windows look 10 11 like they're old. 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Probably exterior porches and things like that. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Has our building inspector looked -- I'm not an expert, 15 16 has our building inspector looked? MR. PALLAS: I don't know if we 17 18 reviewed it to the level of detail to 19 come up with, you know, a better 20 estimate, if you will, of what is 21 needed. We can do that I would assume. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We would have to 23 do it quickly. I will say that if we can afford it using community 24 25 development money, then it could be Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

self-sufficient in terms of the debt 1 service and the rent, this is a great 2 way to make sure -- basically we can 3 have people have housing, it's two 4 5 family, and, you know, potentially who knows who is going to buy it, but it 6 7 could be a future code enforcement problem for us if the wrong -- if 8 9 somebody buys it who doesn't intend to keep it up when we keep our places 10 11 pretty nice. So if we could afford it, 12 I'd like to see us do it, and I guess we have to talk in exec about what it 13 14 means to afford it.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. No, we can 15 16 do that. The reason we -- going back 17 to what Jack was saying about the work 18 on it, we had given a lowball bid when we talked about this last month, and 19 20 the seller said I'm not going to take 21 that bid. So we took money off of what 22 they wanted to be able to have some 23 money that we have available to do repairs on it, and they turned us down. 24 25 That's why we're at this point now.

1 They said we won't accept that. So now 2 we need to either up the offer or let it go on, and that's -- we could talk 3 about that in executive session. We're 4 5 at that point now either we need to go 6 to what they want or jus tell them sell 7 it to, you know, whoever. That's what the -- that's the e-mail that came back 8 9 from Joe saying they said we do not take your offer. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's why I'm 13 asking the questions so that, you know, 14 we can make a decision as to, you know, are we all focused on the same reasons 15 16 for purchasing it? 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Like I said, 18 I'm with you, if the numbers work out, I think it's great. 19 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's why I'm 21 saying is why talk the numbers if we're 22 not going to be in the same direction 23 of that it's going to be something that's a benefit to some community 24 25 residents who want to stay here who are

1 having a hard time finding a place to 2 live. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Can I ask one 3 other question, isn't it occupied right 4 now? 5 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm assuming that if we did purchase it, we wouldn't 8 9 displace the tenants that are there, we would like them to remain? 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Not at all. I 11 12 mean, to do repair work or whatever, it would be like anything else, but no, 13 14 the idea is, I mean, there's a house a block up that somebody bought, turned 15 16 it into an Air B&B, and it is, and now 17 it's off the housing market, and it's 18 just not there. And I drive by that 19 every day, and the place looks The 20 gorgeous, it looks really nice. 21 gentleman was at our last meeting said 22 he wouldn't have bought it if he had 23 known he wasn't going to be able to do that. You know, when this became 24 25 available, a two family house right

1 there, I thought it was a good idea to 2 try to preserve it so we don't lose two more rentals, that was the intention. 3 And that's what we all kind of 4 discussed, but now when push came to 5 6 shove, they want an answer. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. That's why I asked the guestions. 8 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And my other housing question is an update on Webb 10 11 Street's Habitat? MR. PROKOP: So I finally was able 12 to speak to the attorney for Habitat 13 14 today, and he said that they had reviewed the lot and they think that 15 the size of the lot is too small to be 16 17 developed with a structure that would 18 be usable for them. So what they claim that they're trying to do is that they 19 20 believe that there's an adjoining lot 21 or paper street or something that they 22 have an interest in to join with this 23 lot and then move ahead. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You're talking 25 about down the hill there towards the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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turn around? 1 MR. PROKOP: I don't know. He 2 said he didn't know. He said somebody 3 at Habitat has been discussing this 4 5 with somebody, I don't know who they're 6 discussing with because that person 7 wasn't in the conversation. But he said that there still is an interest in 8 9 the lot, but not just by itself, they need to get adjoining properties to 10 11 create one of their facilities, one of 12 their houses. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because there 13 14 are houses on those lots, their argument is that it's not big enough? 15 16 MR. PROKOP: He thought that it was too small to build a house. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For what they'd 18 like to build. Okay. And what is down 19 20 the hill from that? 21 MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry, I don't 22 know. 23 MR. PALLAS: That's Village land. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is it wetland, 25 is it buildable?

| 12 | They looked at this a year and a half |
| 13 | ago and said it was great and now |
| 14 | MR. PROKOP: Yeah, well, I don't |
| 15 | know that they ever looked at |
| 16 | MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I actually met |
| 17 | somebody out there, they asked me some |
| 18 | questions about, you know, what's |
| 19 | permitted, and they didn't at that time |
| 20 | did not indicate that there was any |
| 21 | issue. |
| 22 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. |
| 23 | MR. PALLAS: I said you may need |
| 24 | some variances for a house. |
| 25 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did you say |
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1 that someone is talking from their 2 office to the Village. MR. PROKOP: Yeah, he said they're 3 4 talking to somebody about a paper 5 street. He didn't say somebody at the 6 Village, he said they're speaking to 7 somebody in Greenport about acquiring a paper street, that's what he told me. 8 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What's a paper 10 street? 11 MR. PROKOP: A paper street is a 12 piece of land that's been designated as a street that has not been yet 13 14 developed, not paved or opened. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, so he's 15 16 talking about the turn around down there. 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: He's trying to talk about the turn around that around 19 20 there then. 21 MR. PROKOP: He didn't know. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: What, the 23 trail that --24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no, 25 there's the street --Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Where the old dump is. MR. PALLAS: I know the spot. I don't know who they're talking to is what I'm -- I've never heard this before so. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I feel like we had this and now we don't. MAYOR HUBBARD: Joe was trying to schedule a closing date, and their lawyer said we're not going to close because of this issue. That's what he told him today. MR. PROKOP: I mean, a couple of

things happened to them internally. 15 16 The woman that was putting this 17 together, the real estate director, 18 left in the middle of this, and then somebody else took over. So maybe, you 19 20 know, the second person might have had 21 a different assessment of the property. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Maybe 23 I'll try to reach out to Diane, the 24 executive director, and see if we can't 25 save that. Is that all right?

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, we were 2 trying to schedule a closing on that, and then the lawyer said -- you know, 3 he was giving him dates, and their 4 5 lawyer said no, we're not going to do 6 it now. 7 MR. PROKOP: I think one of the things that you might -- if you speak 8 9 to her, one of the things you might do is talk to her about, you know, the 10 zoning in the Village and what -- the 11 12 fact that we do have an undersize lot 13 section in our code, you know, so they 14 may do a little more exploration on 15 whether or not it can be developed. 16 They didn't talk to me, I don't know if 17 they talked to the Building Department 18 or where they get that assessment from, 19 but if it's a single and separate lot, 20 I mean, there must be something that 21 could be done with it. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. And 23 excited about your letter to the 24 attorney general on the ferry. 25 MR. PROKOP: Okay. I pieced

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1 together a couple of other letters to 2 get to that, it wasn't just a matter of sitting down and doing the letter, and 3 I took some -- I had to state it a 4 certain way because I tried to limit 5 6 the issues, and so I'll look it over 7 again, and then get it out to take care of that. Were there other questions 8 9 that you had in your e-mail because I don't have -- I'm looking at my phone. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Actually some 12 of them I can't -- I think they need to be discussed in executive, I'm sorry. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for 15 the attorney? 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 18 Trustee Martilotta? TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 19 Short. We 20 were able to get the line brought in, 21 the water line brought in to the 22 American Legion, it's awesome. What 23 I've been working on is I started doing this initially when I first came on, 24 25 failed miserably, I am trying to now Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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make -- I'm not going to try, I'm going 1 to have a calendar of events. I want 2 to have it for the Village throughout 3 the year of reoccurring events that 4 5 happen for anything from the Maritime Festival, et cetera, to put them all on 6 7 one calendar for us that we can plan forward, and then speak to individual 8 9 departments, things that are coming up not necessarily reoccurring. For 10 example, like, we were speaking about 11 12 the grant that may be due in July for 13 the sewer expansion. That would 14 something that I would like to put on there. I plan on having --15 16 distributing among the members of the 17 board probably my hope is immediately 18 following Thanksgiving, just something in a rough draft form and then 19 20 hopefully this is something we can 21 improve upon and build upon. Really, 22 to be honest with you, for me I think 23 it would be a tremendous help, if only for me, because it would allow me to 24 25 then be able to look forward and plan

| 9 | rentals. It's been months. I'm |
| 10 | frustrated with the lack of movement, I |
| 11 | know people have been busy, but we're |
| 12 | now running out of time to get everyone |
| 13 | ready for the summer. I want to make a |
| 14 | slight correction to the clerk's |
| 15 | report, I did attend the NYCOM |
| 16 | webinars, I just wasn't in the office, |
| 17 | but I've been watching them, and I went |
| 18 | to the one on short term rentals they |
| 19 | had last week, they're great, I hope |
| 20 | all our ZBA and planning folks and you |
| 21 | guys take advantage, they're really |
| 22 | informative. |
| 23 | MS. PIRILLO: I apologize. I |
| 24 | didn't know that because you didn't |
| 25 | register through me, right? |
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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I didn't. 1 No 2 worries. So NYCOM -- so we had been down a path where we had sort of 3 consensus that we were going to add 4 5 short term rentals to the existing 6 rental permit law. I've also made the 7 argument here that a rental permit law is disincenting year round rentals with 8 9 red tape. Add to that, NYCOM recommends pretty clearly, and I had an 10 11 e-mail exchange with them afterwards 12 with Wade, the guy who does the webinars, that they recommend that 13 14 short term rental legislation be separate from any other rental 15 legislation. So we don't -- we could 16 17 take these two issues separately, which 18 people have suggested from the podium. So what I did was take the short term 19 20 rental draft that I put together, and I 21 pulled it out of the rental permit law, 22 and I just made it a separate short 23 term rental draft. Again, I am not a lawyer, I am just trying to help grease 24 25 the wheels, if you will, for this

1 process so that we get something done. I took the language that we had from 2 the other drafts, I put in language 3 approximating what I think a short term 4 rental law could look like with the 5 expectation that -- but I put it in the 6 7 way I would like to see us do it with a cap of five percent of all residential 8 9 properties, which you've all said by consensus you're not interested in, so 10 11 we can take that out, but I'm putting 12 it out there because I think it's a good thing for us to do at some point. 13 14 But everything else we have more or less agreed on. I tried to take your 15 16 suggested language on fees, et cetera. 17 I put it here, I'm trying to make it 18 easy. I don't know what would be harmed by us -- by having Joe find some 19 20 time in the next few weeks to put 21 together a real draft of a law, not 22 just Doug Roberts trying to figure out 23 how to draft a law and put it out to the public, get public hearings going. 24 25 If we're going to do something on this,

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1 the time is really running out for next season, and I think people will be very 2 frustrated with us if we don't act. 3 4 MR. PROKOP: Could you please send 5 that to me in Word, what you have in 6 your report? 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So for this I sent it to the office, and 8 9 Sylvia's team put it in here. I have two versions for anyone who is 10 11 wondering, I have one with strike 12 through's so you can see the changes I made and then one that is clean. 13 Т 14 will send those to you in Word assuming that's okay with the Mayor. 15 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Great. 18 And you probably should take out the thing about the cap, I just -- I think 19 20 it would be good. All right. Number 21 two, we can figure that out later, I 22 would like to see us budget -- our rec 23 program is successful, our families and parents and kids love it. It doesn't 24 25 quite pay for itself based on some back Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 of the envelope math and talking to 2 Robert, but it comes close, and the fees we collect are very reasonable for 3 after school and our summer camp 4 5 program. It's successful, it's not 6 expensive, I'd like to see us expand 7 it, and I think a great way to do that is with youth sports leagues. When I 8 9 was a kid, I played in my Villae's little league and soccer league. When 10 I was a young adult, before I was very 11 12 busy, I volunteered and coached in city baseball league. I think a .5 FTE 13 14 15,000 dollars in the budget that helps sort of coordinate, working under 15 16 Margot, coordinating rec activities, 17 the way we have people who work at the 18 carousel and ice rink, but also 19 coordinating parent volunteers. I've 20 talked to parents who are interested in 21 We don't have enough kids to run this. 22 our own kind of full league, we'll have 23 to sort of have a couple of teams, and then when I talk to the other leagues 24 25 in East Marion, and Orient, and in

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Southold, they're interested in 1 2 partnering with us. The thing that I -- I see kids playing soccer all over 3 this Village in sort of disorganized 4 5 games, which is great, but why not 6 harness it, why not make it a great 7 program within the Village. So I'm asking, Mr. Mayor, for us to try to 8 9 budget this in next year, and I will commit to, you know, joining up the 10 11 volunteer parents and making sure that 12 -- and just doing some research on -we've done a little research on what 13 14 the capital costs would be for equipment. It's not expensive to buy a 15 16 line machine, and a couple of nets, and a bag of soccer balls. So I would love 17 18 to see us budget for that, and hopefully the Board would support it. 19 But I do believe it needs a kick start 20 21 from the Village, and our rec program 22 is successful, and I think that our 23 manager would make it successful, but I think just given the dynamics here, we 24 25 need to sort of jump start the thing or

1 else it probably won't happen, and, you 2 know, it's too bad that kids here, including my own when she's ready, we 3 have to drive to Southold to play 4 5 organized sports. We're the hub of the population density, we're the place 6 7 where all the kids are, we shouldn't have to drive out to Orient if our kids 8 9 want to play little league baseball. That's my belief, so I hope we can 10 11 budget for it. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, Greenport 13 didn't have enough people to have a 14 team, that's why they hadn't done it. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But Orient does? 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Because different 16 demographics, they play different 17 18 sports, they do different things. 19 That's why we built the little league 20 fields eight years ago and did all the 21 work on that, you know, because they 22 were playing there. It's just that the

Our 3 4 rec programs are great, and a little 5 extra budget, most of which we'll get back through fees I think would be a 6 7 great investment in, you know --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 8 A place to 9 look -- I'm with you. A place to look would be, like, my son, when he was 10 11 five, I guess he can do the same thing again this year, they have the PTA, 12 which is now I think called the PTO, 13 14 they have, like, a little after school thing for, like, once a week for, like, 15 16 three or four weeks or something, and they get herds of kids out there to do 17 18 it, and it's great, but again, it's 19 thirty minutes, and my son is picking 20 dandelions and he should be playing 21 soccer, but you know, they really enjoy 22 it, and they get a great turn out for 23 it, and that might be some place to build it from. I'm sure my wife knows 24 25 who runs it, I'm sure she does.

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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm suggesting

4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 5 And I agree with you, I think that's a 6 good idea, and I think that we could 7 probably get some help for Margot from 8 that existing program and bring that 9 over to us is all I'm saying.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think 10 11 the PTO organization when we did the 12 Halloween parade, I mean, we worked well with them and the library, I think 13 14 that you could probably maybe take another step and get ahold of some of 15 16 the executive officers of the PTO and 17 talk about a joint effort, and I think 18 that way what is being said is that 19 that will get it out to the word that, 20 you know, that Margot can connect with 21 them and then take it from there. 22 That's an idea. Ι 2 think this is a longer conversation, I'm putting the idea, I wrote it up 3 here, but I think we need to seriously 4 5 think about the way tourism here is 6 changing, the way transportation to the 7 Village is changing, and our Zoning code, and I would like to put out for 8 9 consideration, not tonight, we're not going to vote on this any time soon, 10 11 but I wrote it all here, but I think 12 that our requirements of parking spots in the commercial district at this 13 14 point, given how many people travel here on transit and Hampton Jitney 15 16 might be something worth reconsidering. 17 If we can have Monday night Dances and 18 we can pack that park with hundreds of people, and we don't, you know, say we 19 20 can't do Monday night Dances because of 21 parking, I'd hate for really great 22 projects not to get built because the 23 code says you have to have ten spots of parking when I think that that's 24 25 becoming sort of an outdated thing in

1 the way the Village is developing. Moreover, most -- the code, as I 2 understand it, says that existing 3 developed lots are not subject to that 4 5 requirement. So we have just a handful of undeveloped lots, and this could be 6 7 a way for us to incent people to come and invest here. So I put it out for 8 9 consideration, probably not worth a long discussion tonight, unless anybody 10 11 wants to get into it. 12 And then I have one thing I'd like 13 to bring up, it's not in my report, but

14 I've been thinking about it since just as events have unfolded. I've been 15 16 saddened and disappointed by the Suffolk Times story today about some of 17 18 the things -- about Latino community 19 feeling that there are changes coming 20 and feeling uneasy. One-third of our 21 residents are Latino people. I've been 22 saddened by the sort of divisive 23 rhetoric that's been out there. There was an issue at Mattituck school where 24 kids were harassed. It's a thing 25

that's happening, and as leaders of the 1 community, I'd like to see us take a 2 leadership role in providing support to 3 our residents, and I think maybe just 4 sort of a simple commission or 5 committee. In Dinni Gordon's book 6 7 there's talk of a community that lives in the shadows, that there's almost 8 9 kind of several different Greenports, and her book does a great job of 10 11 looking at immigrants over the last 150 years and how it's always been sort of 12 13 a process of assimilating, and so the 14 most recent population has just been -population of immigrations has just 15 16 been discussed at length in the presidential election, and so I don't 17 18 want to get into that, nor do we have to thankfully, we'll leave that to the 19 20 feds. The point is this: There may be 21 federal policies that will change the 22 lives of the folks who live in our 23 Village, and I would love to see us take an active role in listening to 24 25 folks, in potentially providing

quidance or advice, you know, here's 1 2 what's not changing, here's what you don't need to be worried, here's what 3 you want to think about in terms of the 4 5 future, and I think we can accomplish -- I'd also like to see us think about 6 7 more sort of overall community relationships. The antibias task force 8 9 does a really great job of bringing folks together to talk about issues of 10 11 bias and of fighting against it. That's great, and that's a Southold 12 Town thing, I'd like to see the Village 13 14 have something like that, and I think maybe we could start with something 15 16 called a One Greenport Initiative where 17 we're one village, we're one community 18 regardless of what's happening outside 19 of our Village and people getting 20 elected to offices or not and what they 21 We're a Village, we all work think. 22 together, we're neighbors, and I think 23 very simply what we could do is have a committee that we appoint of folks who 24 25 are focused on this concept of One

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1 Greenport. They can advise the Board 2 on issues facing the Latino community, the immigrant community specific here 3 to the Village. They can host events 4 5 that bring folks together, something 6 very simple. I think we do a great 7 thing in appointing Sister Margaret as a liaison to the Latino community. 8 9 This is sort of -- and I would expect her to be involved with that, and she's 10 great, and I have gotten to spend some 11 12 time with her, but she's not a Village resident. She should be part of this, 13 14 but some of our business owners, our Latino business owners, some of whom 15 16 I've checked in with over the last couple of weeks and our residents and 17 18 non-Latino people, and so a few folks have come forward to ask, you know, 19 20 could the Village do something like 21 that, and I'd like to honor that 22 request and suggest to you all that we 23 consider appointing a commission, and I came up with this name, the One 24 25 Greenport Commission to advise us, and,

1 you know, we have a Greenport 2 Improvement Committee, we have several committees that do volunteer work and 3 advise us on various issues, and this 4 could be one that provides a lot of 5 6 change and concern for people who live 7 here, and I want -- I think this would be a good thing for us to serve the 8 9 community.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 10 I did 11 have a discussion with you earlier on 12 that today. I just want everybody to know, anybody who's watching on camera, 13 14 anybody that's here, if anybody sees anything, hears anything, anybody being 15 16 bullied or harassed or anything like 17 that, that's not something that we will 18 tolerate in the Village for anybody. 19 So if somebody sees something, let us 20 know. Let any of the Trustees know, 21 anonymous on the website, you see some 22 kid downtown being picked on, whatever, 23 send something to Village Hall, and we have to take that seriously. Everybody 24 25 has to feel safe that's here. They

1 have to be One Greenport, you know, it's a cute name, you know, I wouldn't 2 come up with that, but just so 3 everybody knows that, you know, we have 4 5 to watch each other's backs, we have to make sure everybody is safe. We don't 6 7 want kids being intimidated, we don't want somebody saying bad things or 8 9 treating somebody -- thank God a lot of stuff that's happening elsewhere has 10 11 not happened here, and we'd like to 12 keep it that way. If you see something, say something. Let somebody 13 14 know. Let the kids and everybody feel safe of where they're at. 15 16 MS. PIRILLO: Mr. Mayor, if I may, 17 both myself and the Deputy Treasurer 18 are fluent in Spanish as well. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So if 19 20 somebody has a question and they can't 21 communicate, let them know that, they 22 could call Village Hall to get a 23 message through that they saw something 24 that happened. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I think Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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it's everyone, it's not just the 1 Latinos, I think it's all -- we're such 2 a diverse ethnic group, this Village of 3 4 Greenport, and I think that everyone, 5 if we see anybody being picked on, I 6 think we need to be up front and say 7 look, we're a community, we care about you, we're here. We're here because we 8 9 love Greenport and we love our residents. I can agree with you that 10 11 there are some nervous -- I've had some 12 discussions with some of the -- I was at the anti task force event a couple 13 14 of -- a week ago, and it was a very uplifting event, and there were of lot 15 16 of Greenport residents there. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, and they 18 do a great job, and I'm proposing that the Village have something along those 19 20 lines that's focused on the Village. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Our issues are a 23 little different. So I'm requesting that either we discuss this or we have 24 25 a resolution to --

TRUSTEE ROBINS: 1 Okav. In my 2 Carousel report, you know, the major thing that took place was obviously the 3 first -- the installation of the first 4 rounding board images, so I'll leave 5 that part of the report, just the rest 6 7 of the business, the Carousel committee, we're in discussions about 8 9 beginning the decorating of the Carousel for Christmas. They're going 10 11 to start that, decorations have been 12 dropped off, and I think on Monday we're going to start the decorating. 13 14 There was a review of some of the new actual paintings that have come in. 15 There's still seven additional 16 17 paintings pending. Gail Horton spoke 18 with Poppi Johnson about exhibiting 19 those paintings at the library in the 20 spring. They're talking about possibly 21 auctioning them off. I went to ask 22 Sylvia Pirillo about how we would work 23 that out with the treasurer in terms of having a designated budget line for 24 25 Carousel fundraising because that would

1 be the purpose of selling the paintings would be to go into a fund for ongoing 2 work on the Carousel. So anyhow, the 3 4 rounding board event took place on November 2nd. It was indeed a very 5 6 nice event. It was moderated by the 7 committee chair and local historian, Gail Horton, who was a Village Board 8 9 member when the Village first acquired the Carousel from Grumman Corporation. 10 11 She gave a brief background of the 12 Carousel history and of the photographs and themes to the rounding boards 13 14 painting projects. There were several members of the original carousel 15 16 committee in attendance, including 17 former mayor Dave Kapell, 18 representatives of the friends of 19 Mitchell Park, reporters from local 20 newspapers, current carousel committee 21 members, Marla Miln, Trustee Phillips 22 and myself, and Margot, Paul, and 23 Sylvia all attended the event. And just a special thank you to the friends 24 25 of Mitchell Park for providing funding

1 for the project. If anybody hasn't been in to see them, the first four 2 that went up, we were delightfully 3 surprised to see how good the thin 4 5 vinyl sheet that he applied actually 6 looked on the plywood. It actually 7 gives the pictures texture so that it actually looks like you're looking at a 8 9 canvas. So we look forward to seeing the rest of them up there, I think that 10 11 to see that come to fruition and see 12 what it actually meant was pretty exciting and everybody is very pleased. 13 14 I discussed with Paul doing some -- a structural survey of the entire 15 16 carousel. There was a break in one of the supports for one of the rows of 17 18 horses that took place a couple of 19 months ago. It was apparently dry rot 20 that caused it, so when things are a 21 little bit quieter, Paul and I talked 22 about getting somebody to go in and 23 probe all of the beams considering they're painted and you can't really 24 25 see just to make sure there's not

Onto my BID report, this was the 4 meeting from October 27th. John Kramer 5 6 presented a budget report. We have a 7 new member that's going to serve on the Board, Cindy Pizzati, from Capital One 8 9 is going to be the treasurer. She actually attended the meeting today, 10 11 she seems not just interested in 12 budgeting, but she was also bringing a lot of good ideas to the BID on some 13 14 things that she has from her experience living in the Village for many years. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: John Kramer 17 stepped down as treasurer? 18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: He's going to be the interim president now, so Cindy is 19 20 going to be the treasurer. Trustee

21 Phillips came to the meeting to discuss 22 some complaints that she's been having 23 from residents about trash and 24 dumpsters, so we did have a discussion 25 on that. Paul came in as well. We

just wanted some clarification as to 1 2 Village code on dumpsters. In reading that code recently, I did see that most 3 of our code does apply to construction 4 dumpsters and not to the small covered 5 6 dumpsters that the businesses are 7 using. We talked about, you know, how often they need to be picked up and 8 9 emptied and that they should be covered and also that they should probably have 10 11 some kind of a barrier fencing around 12 them not so that they're exposed. We do know that there are several 13 14 dumpsters that are on Village property, especially I think the ones on Adam 15 16 Street between Third and the IGA, so, you know, we're looking into that. I 17 18 have had a couple of other complaints I 19 believe recently from people about a 20 dumpster that's in that alleyway 21 between the arcade and the Claudio's 22 building, in there, so there are a 23 couple of places. I don't think that 24 our code can mandate people to empty a 25 dumpster that's not full, if I'm

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correct, but, yu know, management of, 1 2 you know, if they're overflowing and stuff like that, I think that's 3 something that could fall in the realm 4 of our code enforcement officer to keep 5 6 an eye on people and obviously to, you 7 know, give people fines and tickets sine that's usually what gets results. 8 9 Anyhow, the BID is also interested

10 in partnering with the Village on some 11 of -- at least making somewhat of a 12 contribution to new trash cans that 13 Paul Pallas says that we're looking 14 into replacing all the trash cans in 15 the Village I believe within the next 16 year or two; am I correct, Paul?

MR. PALLAS: We haven't gotten a plan yet, but we're looking into what would be a suitable replacement.

20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. One of the 21 problems we're having with the trash 22 cans on the street is that they don't 23 function well. The ones that have the 24 hinged lids on them stay open, the tops 25 get bent and wracked and stuff like

But that's definitely one of 1 that. 2 their things, their sidewalk beautification committee is pretty 3 actively engaged in those kinds of 4 things. They're the ones that have 5 6 been involved in the planters, and so, 7 you know, we had a meeting today, there is going to be further discussion of 8 9 things that they want to do to try and make the downtown area more appealing 10 11 and to be on top of things. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'd like to thank you because I do believe that 13 14 they heard what I was saying, that, you know, the residents in our community, 15 16 they'll deal with the parking and 17 they'll deal with the, you know, the 18 crowds in the summertime, but they're having a hard time dealing with not 19 20 taking enough pride in picking up the 21 garbage or expecting it to be someone 22 else's responsibility, so I was 23 thankful, very thankful they were receptive because I could see the ideas 24 25 starting to flow. Thank you.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Like I said, the 1 2 discussion continued on it today at today's meeting. Just a reminder, the 3 Shellebration events sponsored by 4 Cornell Cooperative Extension is on 5 December 3rd and 4th. The website is 6 7 up and tickets for wristbands are for sale, that's a two day event. They 8 9 went over some long range planning and management goals, and one of them was 10 11 garbage removal, another thing was 12 Greenport holiday festival. The whole week that's coming up between 13 14 Thanksgiving and Christmas --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Does that 15 16 require anything in terms of -- does that require a resolution for street 17 18 closure or anything like that? TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, no, these are 19 20 just -- just the Christmas parade, 21 right, that's --22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And we already 23 did that. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, that's 25 already done. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: When Clerk 1 2 Pirillo and I were dealing with the Halloween parade with the events group 3 from the BID, we were able to be able 4 5 to get them the future dates of all the 6 activities within the Village to put 7 onto their publications so that there was communication between the Village 8 9 and the holiday committee so that the parade is being advertised, the tree 10 lighting, all the normal things that we 11 12 do as normal traditions with the Village of Greenport. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: So the BID is coming up on our annual meeting, that's 15 16 going to be held December 1st at 17 Greenport Harbor, 6:00 p.m. They're 18 getting ready to have the elections, they have four board seats to be 19 20 filled, two tenant seats and two owner 21 Today one of the tenant seats seats. 22 was filled by Rob Place who is the new

23 liquor store that took over Claudio's 24 Spirits.

25

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They had the

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election? 1 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, December 3 1st. TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, he's 4 5 serving -- he will be on the ballot, in 6 other words, for that position, but 7 he's serving interim right now. Yeah, two people have stepped down, Gail 8 9 Sitter and Maureen Gonzalez, so there are those positions available. 10 Thev did ask me, George, to bring to you a 11 12 request as to make an interim mayoral appointment for Cindy Pizzati. She 13 14 works for Capital One, and they are considered a tenant in the BID, but 15 16 she's an employee, so she would need a 17 mayoral appointment, so they're 18 requesting that you provide mayoral -an interim appointment of her until, 19 20 you know, we have the regular meeting 21 in, what is it, the second week in 22 April after, you know, the org meeting, 23 the organization meeting. Will you make mayoral appointment? 24 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who was the

1 mayoral appointment? 2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, really we haven't had a treasurer since Jan 3 Claudio stepped down last year, so 4 we've been kind of --5 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's why I have 7 to go back and look and what we had at the last organizational meeting. The 8 9 clerk will check on that and we'll make sure it's taken care of. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And I just wanted 12 to read their BID mission statement, which the Greenport BID is an elected 13 14 board of diverse business owners and renters decided upon by their peers to 15 16 establish long term growth and management tools for our downtown area 17 18 where all business, residents, and 19 visitors can harmoniously enjoy the 20 assets of Greenport Village. I see 21 some people coming into this 22 organization, I've been involved with 23 them for several years now, and I think that since they hired a consultant 24 25 about a year and a half ago to come in Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 and give them a sense of what they --2 he felt that the BID should be doing, they've really tried to organize 3 committees and get more involved, and I 4 think an alliance between the BID and 5 the Village is very important because 6 7 the BID, they are our businesses, whether people like it or not, this is 8 9 our economy, this is who we are, these are the people that are providing jobs 10 here and, you know, they're part of our 11 12 tax base, they care about the Village, and so, you know, I feel very positive 13 14 about it. I've seen a real shift. When I first got on there, it was kind 15 16 of, like, you go to the meeting, and I thought that they were spinning their 17 18 wheels, but they're really come around, 19 and they're really starting to get 20 organized, and I think the Village is 21 going to feel the change, I really do. 22 Thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: 23 Thank you. 24 Trustee Phillips? 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I had read an

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article about an organization that's 1 called North Fork Rebuilding Together, 2 so I reached out to them because they 3 have developed a group here out on the 4 5 north fork, a Robert Harper from Mattituck, and what I would like to do 6 7 -- what they do is they're a volunteer group that come in to help people who 8 have incomes of 40,000 dollars or less 9 who already have existing homes that 10 11 need help in repairing a door, 12 repairing some items that perhaps they either can't afford to repair or 13 14 they're of an elderly nature. And I was hoping that I could ask them to 15 16 come at a regular board meeting to present what they do because they're 17 18 looking for volunteers, they're also looking for people to participate in 19 20 their program. They're very --21 apparently they originally only came 22 out to William Floyd, they're now in 23 Mattituck, and a lot of it is that they're helping people who are trying 24 25 to stay independent in their homes. We

have a lot of residents in the Village 1 2 of Greenport who probably fall within that, some of our senior community 3 could use some help especially some of 4 those who are having the building 5 6 department come and say they need to 7 have something repaired. So I would like to, if the Mayor and the Board 8 9 would approve, is ask them to either come to our next meeting next week or 10 11 to come to the December regular board 12 meeting and just give a small synopsis of what the organization is. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: That would be fine 15 if they come. Our meeting not next 16 week, just so that you know. 17 No, I know, I TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 18 won't be here either. So I just --19 would you like to have them come for 20 the one after Thanksgiving, or have 21 them come at the December meeting? 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: If you want to get 23 the word out, if they want to come for the one after Thanksgiving, that's on 24 25 the 28th, if they want to come, that's

1 fine.

2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are these the 3 same people that do the work for the 4 town? Because the town had something 5 on the website there when they do their 6 announcements they have a program for 7 seniors.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's 8 9 completely different from this one. This is all based on volunteers and 10 11 donations, and they have financial 12 qualifications that are restricted to 40,000 dollar gross income for one 13 14 person and 5,000 after, and all their funds come from private donations, 15 16 foundations, banks, or fundraisers, and 17 they do -- they try to do a lot of 18 fixing for wheelchair ramps, weather 19 stripping, small plumbing and 20 electrical work, things that some of 21 our seniors just can't afford to do, 22 and I think it would be, you know, it 23 would be a great process. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's why I think

25 more sooner than later because if it's

| 14 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I could imagine |
| 15 | an ambulance going over and keeling |
| 16 | over. The other thing is something |
| 17 | that I've been thinking about, and I |
| 18 | would like to not at this meeting or |
| 19 | the next meeting but at some point have |
| 20 | a discussion. Our revenue for our |
| 21 | budget comes from mostly comes from |
| 22 | our property taxes, and in looking at |
| 23 | the applications that have been before |
| 24 | the Planning Board and before the ZBA, |
| 25 | a lot of them are dealing with some |
| | |

housing projects that are trying to 1 2 increase living space for people to come into the Village of Greenport. I 3 think it's time that, in all honesty, 4 5 the only thing that we have left to 6 develop is to go up. I've been reading 7 especially with the CFA money that there has been a lot of proposals put 8 9 together for housing above commercial spots. Downtown Greenport may be the 10 only spot left that we have some point 11 12 of increasing our assessment value, and also an opportunity to perhaps create 13 14 housing for younger people to stay here. Most of our young people are 15 16 walkers, they take the train, they take the bus, they're not really into cars, 17 18 but that also hopefully would create a downtown regeneration into full 19 20 year-round businesses as well. So I've 21 been thinking that the CFA is coming 22 up, that they have the planning grants 23 that you can actually create a desire for, you know, other communities have 24 25 done it, and I think we also need to

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deal with our parking situation and 1 2 should be combining that type of an application with a planning grant to 3 overview our whole parking situation in 4 5 the Village of Greenport. I'd be more 6 than willing to help work on that one. 7 I think it's important. We've all been talking about it, it's time to get the 8 9 information. We have an opportunity with some of these grants, so it's not 10 11 something that I'm recommending that a 12 resolution or anything, it's just I would like to have that discussion over 13 14 the next couple of months, that's all. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are you talking 15 16 about a height increase? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm talking 17 18 about creating the incentive for 19 property owners who already have 20 buildings that can go, have second 21 stories on them, be put on with the 22 idea of apartments that are either size 23 restricted or, you know, giving an incentive to developers to that way. I 24 25 think we need to talk about it. Okay?

1 We cannot keep increasing the intensity 2 of houses on Fifth Avenue, Fourth Avenue, Sixth Street, Fifth Street, we 3 need to think -- let's think outside 4 the box a little bit. I'm just 5 6 throwing it out for discussion. And I 7 think that was pretty much it, the rest of it I have for executive session. 8 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. 10 All right. I've got a few things. 11 Just so everybody knows on camera and 12 everybody here that Arthur Tasker was appointed to the Zoning Board. It was 13 14 an appointment by me, which I didn't know -- before that, I want to thank 15 16 Arthur for doing it. It's not something midterm that it needs Board 17 18 approval on, it's just a mayoral 19 appointment until the end of the term 20 in April. That's why I appointed him 21 before the meeting so he could fill in, 22 he went to the meeting, thank you very 23 much, Arthur, for joining us, and for your work on the Zoning Board. 24 25 I had a meeting with the Village

Clerk with Noah who did the North Fork 1 2 TV Festival last August at the movie theater, it was the one day, the 3 Saturday event. They want to try to 4 5 expand it for next year. He has a 6 date. Al Krupsky, our county 7 legislator joined us for the meeting. The county would like to help do their 8 9 advertisement, their 3% hotel tax, they have money available, they'd like to 10 11 get involved with that to try to 12 promote this and make it a bigger thing. He had a tentative date for 13 14 September 7th to 9th. Before Al can do anything, he wants to know that the 15 16 Village ourselves are in support of it. It's really, I mean, it's a couple of 17 18 hundred people, they want to do a Thursday night thing at one of the 19 20 wineries, something at the movie 21 theater and Mitchell Park on Friday, 22 and then use the movie theater on 23 Saturday. So it's going to be some 24 people coming out here and everything 25 else, it's after Labor Day, so I want

to just put a resolution on that we're 1 2 putting our support behind them doing the second annual North Fork TV 3 Festival. The county, for them to move 4 5 forward, they need to know that we have 6 support from the community it's going 7 to be in. TRUSTEE ROBINS: What were the 8 9 dates, George? MAYOR HUBBARD: 7th to 9th. 10 I do 11 have brochures here, anybody wants to 12 look at it, he left some paperwork if 13 you want to look through. Just people 14 that are going to come out to it, they're going to try to promote it 15 16 earlier to get bigger stars, you know, 17 more active people, so it should be 18 interesting. I did go for part of it 19 last time. There was a lot going on 20 that weekend, the chicken barbecue, 21 open house, gallery reception, but I got down there for a little bit of it, 22 23 it was fun. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I did too. It 25 was very entertaining.

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was 1 2 interesting. Are we -- in their plans of this, are we going to need to do a 3 mass assembly permit for ourselves? 4 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: At this point 6 right now, no. You know, they're 7 trying to put it all together to see who they can get involved, what they're 8 9 going to have, you know, the actually talked about using Mitchell Park for 10 11 displaying something in the 12 amphitheater, you know, some kind of concert or comedian show, whatever they 13 14 could try to do. He's trying to work on the whole thing and put funding 15 16 together for it, but we told him we 17 can't do anything without a date, 18 neither could Al, so he came to us with a date, actually the clerk gave him, 19 20 like, three different weekends, but 21 that's the one that they picked. So 22 we're just going to -- we'll see how it 23 progresses during the winter and see 24 what they come up with. 25 Okay. Carpenter Street, Paul told

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1 me today that they're going to be here, 2 the milling machine is going to be in Greenport on Monday. They're not done 3 with all the curbs and sidewalks, but 4 5 they're working on it, but they're 6 going the mill the road and pave it 7 after Thanksgiving. Oh, okay, an 8 update.

9 MR. PALLAS: An update: Just before I came to the meeting I met with 10 11 the paving contractor, and he's actually looking to -- not a commitment 12 13 yet, but to pave before Thanksgiving. 14 So when they worked out a way that they can be able to do that and keep the 15 16 curbs and sidewalks finished in time 17 for him to do the paving, so it looks 18 like if the weather stays okay, we 19 should be okay and be able to do the 20 actual paving before Thanksgiving.

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: That would be even 22 better because once you start getting 23 into after Thanksgiving, it could get 24 cold, and you never know. Okay. That 25 was the question I had today. I didn't

want them to mill the road on Monday 1 2 because the machine is here, which is better, but then not be able to -- it 3 gets cold out and they can't pave it 4 until April, we'd have some irritated 5 6 people. But the road does look good, 7 the stuff they've gotten done, it looks nice, the road is going to be really 8 9 well improved once it's done, so thanks everybody for supporting that. 10

11 Last thing I have on my report, we 12 had a Village Board meeting, the Board discussed -- it's on the PSEG topic. 13 14 We met in executive session. The whole Board has done a lot of research over 15 16 the past couple of months talking about where we are with it, what we got going 17 18 on with it. It's the unanimous Board's 19 feeling that the back-up power cable is 20 crucial to the Village for the future 21 moving forward, it's something that 22 really should be done, PSEG has 23 committed to putting the automatic switch gear, which would save hours 24 25 worth of time in case of a power

outage, it could then be done remotely 1 2 without sending somebody down here to manually do it, which is a big plus to 3 us, to everybody throughout the whole 4 5 Village and other people that we supply 6 power to. So they committed to that, 7 they committed more cash on top of the offer, so what we're looking for now is 8 9 the Board has decided we want to try to move this project forward, and they're 10 11 looking to have a vote on a resolution 12 next week for the Village Administrator 13 and the Village Attorney to try to work 14 on a contract and negotiating a deal. Just to update everybody also, we did 15 16 get a determination from the DEC that 17 we were denied lead agency status on 18 the project. There's three criteria 19 that they use, we were denied on all 20 three of them. It could be appealed, 21 but in my opinion, if we lost on one or 22 we lost on two and won on one, we might 23 have a chance, but we lost on all three, I don't think we have a chance 24 25 of winning the appeal to move it

forward. So depending on Joe's 1 determination on that of what we should 2 do with that, we have the right to 3 appeal until December 15th, which is 4 5 thirty days or eighteen, whatever, 6 thirty days to appeal it. If we're 7 going to try to move forward as good partners with them and move forward and 8 9 try to partner and get the best thing we can for the Village, for the 10 residents down there that we vote to 11 12 not appeal. I'll leave that up to Joe for them to determine. There will be a 13 14 resolution to not appeal. It adds thirty days into the process, I don't 15 16 think we're going to win, and let them 17 move forward with the process of what 18 we're going to try to do. They also did commit to paying for the ombudsman, 19 20 however you pronounce that, a local resident to work hand on hand with the 21 22 project every day. They will pay for 23 that person to do that. Again, it's going to be a resident from Fifth 24 25 Street, we don't know who or what,

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we'll figure that out. 1 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We pick the person, right? 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we'll pick a 4 5 person that we're hiring to be our local resident that's going to sit 6 7 there and be the watchdog because we're going to be working and doing other 8 9 things, so to be there for the whole project. The project is looked at 10 11 starting time of September 15, 2017 and 12 has to be completed by May 15, 2018. So it's nothing that's going to happen 13 14 now, we've got ten months to go through this. I just want everybody to know 15 16 that's watching that's going to hear about this, that's the whole Board, we 17 18 feel this is a good deal for the Village overall. It's going to be an 19 20 inconvenience to some people, but for 21 the general good of everybody, the deal 22 is at the point where it was zero or we 23 move forward. They were ready to just say tell us we're not going to do the 24 25 project, they'll do something else.

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And the benefit of the back-up cable 1 2 with the cash and the improvements, the full width repaving, and we're going to 3 be on them like a dog making sure that 4 5 they're doing everything that's in the contract. It's going to be worded so 6 7 that they don't have a repeat of what they had before, that we can move this 8 9 forward and have some cash. We're doing a lot of other projects in the 10 11 Village, the back-up cable for the next 12 twenty, thirty years, which is big, the 13 road repaved, and so everybody knows, 14 the whole Board has come together, and we're going to try to have them move 15 16 that forward so --17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can you say the 18 number? TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Not yet. 19 20 We're going into contract negotiations. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Everybody knows 22 the previous number, it's more than 23 300,000 dollars more than the previous number, but I don't have the exact 24 25 amount. They sweetened the pot. You

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know, exact dollar amounts we'll work 1 2 out, but everybody wanted more money, the ten million dollars people asked 3 for was never going to happen. I mean, 4 I think this is a good project, I think 5 6 it's going to be beneficial to 7 everybody, the street is going to look great by the time they do it, and 8 9 everybody they can come to the meeting and discuss it with all of us next --10 11 oh, the meeting won't be next Thursday, 12 it will be on Monday the 28th just so everybody knows that's watching this 13 14 when they talk about it, next Thursday we won't be here, but the meeting will 15 be on the 28th. We definitely will 16 have one resolution on there to 17 18 authorize the Village Attorney and the 19 Village Administrator to negotiate the contract and move forward with it. 20 21 There may be one on not appealing the 22 SEQRA designation, I'll leave that up 23 to Joe if we need to do that or not. That's all I have. I want to thank the 24 25 Board for meeting, coming together, for

doing the research, everybody did their 1 homework, and I think we got a 2 consensus that it will be beneficial to 3 4 the Village. 5 At this point I'll open it up to 6 the public to address the board. 7 Anybody would like to -- just your name and address for the record. 8 9 MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth That's going to be a wild 10 Avenue. 11 meeting on 28th, hope everyone brings a 12 chair. First off, I believe the house you're talking about on Wiggins Street, 13 14 that was my grandparents' old house. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Was it? Okay. 16 MS. ALLEN: The one right at Montgomery. I didn't realize it was 17 18 two family, that's why I was confused 19 at first. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, there's two 21 rentals in it so --22 MS. ALLEN: It's been many years 23 since I've been in that home. I personally feel it would be a win win 24 25 for the Village to buy that even if it Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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1 costs up front to fix it. The benefits 2 for the years to come with the income 3 from there I think it's well worth it, 4 and I really hope that you do buy it.

5 One of the things that Doug was talking about with this 15,000 to hire 6 7 somebody for our children to play sports. This past year, yes, the ball 8 9 fields were used, Doug, because I went to numerous games up at the polo field. 10 Both the little league field where they 11 12 did the baseball and also the softball field where they do do softball. Part 13 14 of the thing is, like the Mayor said, we don't have the children coming out 15 16 to play. The other towns do. 17 Greenport doesn't. We also -- the 18 older they get, the more involved they are with things. You can have teams, 19 20 you know, that are in Laurel that have 21 kids from Orient all the way to Laurel 22 on the same teams because there aren't 23 enough in each individual town. Another factor to that, I don't know if 24 25 I didn't -- if I misread what you

wrote, a lot of parents can't afford a 1 2 seventy dollar fee for their child to play a sport. Okay? I know that's 3 part of the problem with the pee wee 4 football. It's astronomical what the 5 6 parents are asked to pay for their 7 children to play, you know, pee wee football. I would love to see a focus 8 9 trying to get a football team starting with the little ones in Greenport, 10 otherwise I'm petrified a few years 11 12 from now Greenport Schools will no longer have football. We had a hard 13 14 time getting a junior high team for the numbers this year. You know, so it's 15 16 not even, you know, just so much having 17 someone to organize all of this. What 18 Trustee Phillips said was correct, as a member of the PTO and working with the 19 20 school itself, if you combine the 21 Village with Margot with Kim who is the 22 PTA president and the school, the word 23 will get out. Yes, they do combine with the library and Oyster Pond 24 25 Students come to their after school

1 program that they have, which is 2 usually I think three weeks -- three or four weeks in a row, it depends on how 3 it's configured, and yes, they get tons 4 5 of kids that come, but it's a minimal 6 fee that the parents are paying. When 7 you start having to organize sports, and you're asking parents with more 8 9 than one child to pay seventy dollars or more to play a sport, they can't 10 11 afford it. 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That what they 13 pay at our rec center. 14 MS. ALLEN: And a lot of kids can't afford to go to the rec center 15 16 because the parents can't afford it. 17 That's all I'm trying to say. You 18 know, a lot of people can't afford that. I mean, I don't know if it's 19 20 seventy dollars -- what the seventy 21 dollars for the rec center is, is that 22 for a month? 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes. 24 MS. ALLEN: They only pay seventy 25 dollars for a full month at the rec Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 center? 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought they were on a sliding scale for their 3 income. Maybe I'm mistaken. 4 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They may be, but 6 the official published fee is seventy, 7 second kid is thirty-five. MS. ALLEN: Even still, you know, 8 9 I know a lot of families who they can't afford to send their children after 10 11 school to the rec center or to the rec 12 center in the summertime. You know, no, that might not sound a lot if it's 13 14 for a month, but still, you know, you have to look at the dynamics of a lot 15 16 of the kids you see in the field out 17 playing or in the park playing. It's 18 because they're getting out getting their exercise, the parents don't have 19 20 that extra money to put out seventy 21 dollars for them to play sports for a 22 couple of months. I'm just trying to 23 give you the opposite point of what I hear and what I see. Okay? And for 24 25 the Village -- you want the Village to

put out 15,000 dollars to hire 1 2 somebody, I'll do it for nothing, I'll volunteer and help organize. That's a 3 lot of money to do that, to pay 15,000 4 5 for someone to work with other people. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's what we 7 pay our rec center staff. They're part-time people. I didn't make these 8 9 numbers up. MS. ALLEN: No, no, I'm just 10 11 saying, you know, we all work together, 12 the school, the rec center, the 13 library, the Village, everyone already 14 works together, I don't feel that the Village needs to spend an extra 15,000 15 16 dollars to hire another person to be 17 put in here. Like I said, I would 18 volunteer to, you know, to do something like that. It's not a bad idea. 19 I'm 20 not knocking this at all. I'm just 21 trying to explain to you from someone 22 who is with the school, around these other kids, you know, I see the flip 23 side of what goes on. Okay? It's not 24 25 a bad idea. Your idea about the

getting rid of the parking law, bad 1 2 idea. You started out when you first ran, we need parking in Greenport, 3 there's no parking, and now all of a 4 5 sudden tonight you're saying oh, we've got ample parking, you know, so let's 6 7 just throw that law out. I disagree with that. 8

9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm not saying 10 not to solve the parking problem, I'm 11 saying to not block applications 12 because of -- just to be clear on what 13 I'm saying.

14 MS. ALLEN: But I know I have been very vocal on one application, which is 15 16 coming very close to possibly going 17 through by them not having to have 18 parking, and I look at the bigger 19 picture. The way you were proposing 20 this, like, yeah, let them just pay for 21 twenty spaces or thirty spaces, and now 22 they can build this monstrosity in this 23 little tiny lot because that's what will happen if it goes through that 24 25 they can buy these spaces, these

parking spaces, and you're already --1 2 it's like what Trustee Phillips said about putting more houses on these 3 lots, trying to cram things into one 4 5 little spot, there's already a lot 6 going on in that corner. You know, and 7 my personal feeling is this guy should be meeting more codes than what he is. 8 9 You know, that's my personal opinion. I've been very vocal from day one about 10 11 that project, it shouldn't go on that 12 lot. It's gorgeous, but it shouldn't be on that lot. Okay. I had something 13 14 else, but I have no idea now. Thank 15 you. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Anybody else wish to address the Board? 17 18 MR. TASKER: Good evening, Arthur 19 Tasker, Beach Street in Greenport. 20 Several items that I want to speak 21 about, some are relatively brief. 22 First thing, a word of caution, if I 23 may, used electronic equipment is worth what you pay for it if it's given to 24 25 you. I want to caution you if you're

1 going to be taking scanners that the Town of Southold no longer wants for 2 which you have to get adapters and 3 extension cords and so forth to try to 4 make a workable system out of it. 5 Second of all, as far as scanners are 6 7 concerned, if you get a scanner that's big enough to handle thirty-six by 8 9 twenty-four drawings or something like that, it will not adequately handle 10 11 stacks of eight and a half by eleven 12 documents guaranteed. You should look into renting or leasing large size 13 14 scanners. I know they're available. I think Panasonic has a program that 15 16 leases scanners. So second item of short note 17 18 however is the question of Habitat. Т think there's the sense that well, 19 20 Habitat is reneging on a deal. I was 21 here when the two people from Habitat 22 presented to the Board well more than a 23 year ago I believe when this thing

24 first came up. There was a woman who

25 was -- I don't remember their

1 positions, but there was a woman who 2 spoke very well about what Habitat is, how it works, and I said at the end, 3 pay attention, they're the real deal, 4 Habitat is the real deal, and I believe 5 6 there was a gentleman who spoke also. 7 One of them made the caution during the course of that discussion about the 8 9 possibility if they were purchasing the property that it may not be a suitable 10 11 lot to build on. So don't think 12 they're -- don't raise this fact that 13 oh, they're coming late to the party 14 and they're backing out of a deal on some flimsy excuse. They warned you 15 about it beforehand, I believe there 16 17 was a subsequent time when the subject 18 of where does Habitat stand, where does 19 the Habitat project stand several 20 months later, and I raised the 21 question, I'm quite sure it was I who 22 raised the question that is it a 23 buildable lot, and everybody just kind of threw up their hands and it didn't 24 25 get any consideration. So don't be

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1 surprised that this has now come up and 2 act like Habitat is jerking the rug. Speaking of jerking the rug, I was 3 very concerned while I was sitting 4 listening to the first half of the 5 6 discussion concerning the sewer 7 expansion project to include the twenty-seven or so houses within the 8 9 Village of Greenport that are not connected to the sewer, and frankly, I 10 11 thought the rug was going to get jerked 12 on the project from the way the discussion was going by saying well, we 13 14 should incorporate Southold, and east, and west, and so forth, and I'm very 15 16 pleased that the Mayor called us back 17 to where we were and what had been 18 previously agreed to, which is why you 19 went ahead with getting guotes for an 20 engineering design study to include 21 only the portion of the project that 22 included the houses in the Village of 23 Greenport that did not have sewers and that is on Sandy Beach. And so I'm 24 25 glad to see that that is going to

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1 proceed as originally intended. Let's 2 call the -- the mention was made about hook up fees, and Trustee said rather 3 disdainfully well, we're not getting 4 5 any hook up fees out of those people. 6 That's right because we're in the 7 Village of Greenport. No body in the Village of Greenport paid a hook up fee 8 9 to hook up to the sewer. Now, let's understand what a hook up fee is. 10 Ιt doesn't hook you up to the sewer, it 11 12 gives you permission to hook up to the sewer. Each individual resident has to 13 14 pay their plumber to come from underneath their house to come up to 15 16 the sewer pipe, the lateral as it's 17 called, to the sewer pipe to become 18 part of the sewer system. So nobody is getting a free ride out of this, it's 19 20 only that all of the Village residents 21 will be treated the same. As far as 22 sewer hook up fees, the idea that other 23 parts adjacent to that area or other areas where they might extend the sewer 24 25 system, that's already been tried and

1 got a very direct answer. People are 2 not going to pay 15,000 dollars to hook up to the Greenport sewer system when 3 they can put in a 5,000 dollar septic 4 5 system any more than they are likely to 6 install one of the newly approved for 7 Southold Town sewer systems that also cost 15,000 dollars. The informal data 8 9 that Trustee Robins got is perfectly Now, there should have been a 10 valid. 11 survey because, in fact, it was part of 12 the contract when the original study of 13 extending the sewer system was led in 14 2013 I believe. It included a survey by the Village of all of the residents 15 16 in the area, not just in the Village, 17 because that is only Sandy Beach, and 18 you had twenty-seven yeses right there, 19 and you hardly needed the survey, but 20 even they wouldn't survey, but had any 21 survey been done at that time as was 22 supposed to have been done of residents 23 in that area, you would have gotten the same resounding no. The 15,000 dollar 24 25 hook up fee has been there since day

The only possibility who is 1 one. 2 really interested in that we've spoken about before, I've mention it, and I'm 3 sure he's had communication with you, 4 and that is the two marinas. I believe 5 6 at one point he made an offer that you 7 get the -- if the sewer mains were brought to a reasonable point that is 8 9 reasonably close to the two marinas, he'd pay for the rest of line to bring 10 11 up the two marinas, particularly to 12 pick up not just the number of boats and so forth that they have there, but 13 14 for the very large restaurant that they have sitting out on the end of the sand 15 16 bar. So you need to keep your 17 variables separate. Let's do the 18 Village of Greenport as was planned, don't coopt it, don't confuse it with a 19 20 very unlikely to occur extension on the 21 basis that the other people in the Town 22 of Southold won't want to. There's 23 another direction to that, and it was read -- that came up that was 24 25 discussed, and that was the alienation Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 of parkland issue. Some of you will 2 recall that this came up at the time you were considering leasing some land 3 in -- up in Malarky Lodge to put in the 4 5 COJAN plant six months or a year ago, 6 and the question was raised then by Mr. 7 Corwin and with my support that that would require an act of the state 8 9 legislature because it involves the alienation of parkland. What was going 10 11 to be done was part of the land that is 12 parkland and go back to the 1991 Village law that created the parkland 13 14 in the Village of Greenport and included the entire ninety something 15 acres I believe of the Moore's woods, 16 17 that it is parkland up there, and that 18 is why because they were going to lease -- the project involved leasing part of 19 20 that land to another entity, that it 21 would require an act of the legislature 22 to permit the alienation. Alienation 23 of land means selling, leasing, giving an easement, giving a right of way. It 24 25 involves a change in ownership to some

1 extent of some part of the land, which 2 is parkland. That is not what's going to occur with the sewer, despite the 3 fact that some of it will go down on 4 Sandy Beach Point, which is one of 5 those parcels of parkland that was 6 7 created at the same time. There's no alienation that's going to take place. 8 9 It's Village land, it's a Village sewer. Moreover, the ordinance that 10 11 created the parkland specifically 12 included possible permitted uses in parkland, one of those is sewer 13 14 systems. So you can look up that -the law that created that and you will 15 16 see that, all the parkland, Steam Boat 17 Corner was one of the parcels, there 18 were half a dozen parcels in the 19 Village of Greenport, but most 20 particularly Sandy Beach Point and 21 Moore's woods were two of those. So 22 don't let that red herring get in the 23 way of proceeding with the sewer 24 program. 25 Finally, two points specifically

1 regarding the design proposal that came 2 through. Two of them, I believe it was two, one certainly proposed an 3 alternate system of sewage, rather than 4 5 an eight inch gravity main feeding a four inch force main, that there was a 6 7 different system that would involve each of the individual installations 8 9 with the residences that would be substantially less expensive to 10 11 install. I got the sense from -- I 12 can't recall where, that that alternate 13 proposal was rejected out of hand, and 14 I don't know the reason for that. Finally, the design that was -- the map 15 16 that was given to the design contractors, I don't think it makes 17 18 much difference in terms of the cost of their design, but the maps showing 19 20 where the line was to run did not 21 continue sufficiently long to include 22 eight of the houses in the Village. It 23 only covered twenty of the houses that are in the Village, and not the eight 24 25 further houses at the east end of the

| 1 | line. So there's another four or five |

| 3 | incorporated in that design. I'm sure |

| 9 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |
| 10 | MR. SALADINO: John Saldino, Sixth |
| 11 | Street. I want to echo some of what |
| 12 | Arthur had said. I applaud you for |
| 13 | moving forward with the sewer study for |
| 14 | Sandy Beach. I think it would be |
| 15 | unrealistic for us to think that the |
| 16 | people down Manhassett, Fiddler, Angler |
| 17 | because the pipe would come down the |
| 18 | main street, and then I think 15,000 |
| 19 | dollars, to expect them to pay 15,000 |
| 20 | dollars for a hook up fee in my mind |
| 21 | and kind of believing what Trustee |
| 22 | Robins says is unrealistic, and I also |
| 23 | believe 15,000 dollars is just the tip |
| 24 | of the iceberg for them if we take the |
| 25 | price of the laterals, if we take the |
| | |

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1 price of going from the east end of 2 Angler to Manhassett from the east end of Fiddler. I think 15,000 dollars --3 to tell a resident there that it's 4 5 going to cost them 15,000 dollars to hook up to the sewer I think wouldn't 6 7 be applauded by them, and I think it's unrealistic to believe that's what it's 8 9 going to cost them. So to bring it to Sandy Beach, I'm in total favor of 10 11 that. I think it's a good idea. 12 Again, I applaud you for moving forward. I don't believe -- there was 13 14 some concern about the DEC and the ACE. I personally don't see that. I think 15 16 just by recent experience that a few 17 years ago they granted permission to 18 put a thirty-six inch pipe. I understand it was for an electric as 19 20 opposed to a four inch sewer pipe from 21 Conklin Point to Shelter Island, and 22 now they seem to have permits I 23 believe, I'm not sure, to go under the bay again with HTD. I honestly don't 24 25 think to go from Sandy Beach to

Stirling, I don't see the DEC or the 1 2 Army Corp. of Engineers being a stumbling block in my opinion. I 3 understand Trustee Roberts concern 4 about the creek being impaired. I just 5 want to remind the Board, the creek is 6 7 impaired not for nitrogen loading, which we would normally associate with 8 9 septics leeching into the creek. It's pathogens, fecal coliform, which is 10 11 human waste, seven hundred boats in the 12 creek. I know, I whine about this all the time, I apologize, every one of the 13 14 mini marinas on the west side of the creek has access to the Village sewer. 15 16 I think there comes a time that we're 17 going have to think about codifying the 18 LWRP. I mean, it was mandated in 1998 19 that every one of them had three years 20 to hook up to the Village sewer. I 21 don't believe anyone has. As far as 22 the other side, the west side of the 23 creek, I think the same should -- I think the marina should be -- I 24 25 think -- I won't get into that. Also I Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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would ask -- I have a question, both 1 2 marinas have property in the Incorporated Village, does that mean 3 that because they own property inside 4 5 the Incorporated Village, there will be no hook up fees for them? One marina 6 7 has 300 boats, the other one has 190. That's close to 500 boats, 500 slips. 8 9 I mean, I know from being on the CAC how they calculate usage and stuff is 10 11 by the slip. So, you know, I see the 12 two marinas as a Peconic Landing type place, but the owners of the marinas 13 14 might not see that because one marina has forty-seven square feet in the 15 16 Village, and the other one has two 17 hundred square feet in the Village with 18 a total of ten acres of property. So, 19 you know, that to me would be something 20 that I would be concerned about 21 expending that kind of taxpayer money 22 to get a sewer line to those two 23 marinas that wouldn't have to pay except for the use. So that's one 24 25 thing on my mind. And also to get some Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 type of sanitary system on that side of the creek for those boats. 2 The last thing I would like to 3 mention is that we talked about 4 5 Habitat, and Joe had mentioned to merge 6 a piece of property. I'm sure the 7 attorney knows, and just to remind you guys, Village code prevents that. 8 9 We're not allowed to merge properties 10 in the Incorporated Village. Chapter 11 118 tells you that. So unless you 12 change the code, I don't know how you would merge the two properties. Thank 13 14 Thanks for listening. vou. MR. WINKLER: Good evening, John 15 16 Winkler, 175 Fifth Street. I don't know if you're allowed to speak about 17 18 this, but I know that some of the residents of Fifth Street were 19 20 concerned with damage after this 21 project was complete, if there would be 22 any liability to PSEG for any repairs 23 on the homes that, say, you know, a crack in their foundation showed up a 24 25 year later or if their water lines were

damaged a year later, they started 1 2 leaking. I was just wondering, were their concerns addressed, or is that 3 still part of this negotiation where, 4 5 you know, people could have some confidence that if there is any damage 6 7 to the property from this project, that they're going to be compensated or 8 9 maybe there's a fund put aside for a period of time of ten years or 10 something where they can draw from if 11 12 there is some repairs, damage to the homes or the utilities that are coming 13 14 to the homes created by this project or may have been created by the project. 15 16 I think that would probably be very 17 important to the people of Fifth Street 18 to know that. And besides that, I 19 definitely think you guys did a good 20 job on this. It seems like you guys 21 did your due diligence, and that's all 22 that we ever wanted. And we appreciate 23 your efforts, and you seem to have gotten a lot better deal than we 24 25 started with, so that's really great,

but I think that is one concern that 1 2 people have, if there's any damage to the property. It would be my concern 3 also, so I hope you can address that. 4 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll make 6 sure something is in the contract about 7 it. We know during construction it is, anything that happens when they're 8 9 doing construction on our mains or anything that happens during it is 10 11 covered. We'll definitely discuss 12 that. MR. WINKLER: And I read your STR 13 14 proposal, and I thought my head was going to explode, but one thing you 15 16 have to consider, I'm already booking 17 for next year, even now. So whatever 18 happens with this law, please consider 19 this. It can't happen the year you do 20 it, you have to give people time to 21 transition out of this. Okay? So 22 maybe it should happen the next year after you make the deal or figure this 23 out because, again, I'm booking 24 25 already, so just keep that in mind. I

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1 appreciate it. Thank you. Thank you 2 again for all your hard work. MS. GORDON: Dinni Gordon, 152 3 Sixth Street. I'll be very brief. 4 Т wanted to endorse the idea that Doug 5 6 had and had spoken with several people 7 about and I have spoken with several people about about having a little 8 9 group, it could be very informal, it doesn't have to be called the 10 commission, which makes it sound 11 12 awfully formal, that is focused -- I think there are two issues in this 13 14 period of uncertainty about what is going to happen to immigrants, 15 16 undocumented immigrants. There is, you 17 know, very little that we really know 18 now, and so I'm not so concerned that 19 this group is dealing with those 20 prospects, but I think a group of 21 people who are prepared to be 22 welcoming. There is now sort of I 23 think a lot of people don't really realize that in addition to the 24 25 anti-immigrant sentiments that are very Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 widespread around the country and the 2 anxiety about the great demographic change that's going on, there's also 3 what's referred to as the welcoming 4 movement, and a couple of big 5 6 organizations, national organizations 7 that are promoting that, and I think we're in a very good position to be a 8 9 welcoming small town, and that that can be done in kind of casual ways, but 10 11 casual but focused if it's possible to 12 bring those two things together. And if we could have some social occasions, 13 14 some soccer games, some picnics, some kind of just ways to create connection, 15 16 and that if we've done that and then there is really a kind of crisis about 17 18 removing the immigrants that we have found have contributed in important 19 20 ways to Greenport, we will be ready to 21 respond to that. So I just wanted to 22 endorse the idea. 23 The other thing I came to say, 24 you've really taken care of, and that
