(The Meeting was Called to Order at 7 p.m.) DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Call the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance.
(All Stood for the Pledge of Allegiance) DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I'm going to ask you all to please remain standing for a quick moment of silence for the people who passed in the fire in Riverhead. Thank you.
(All Remained Standing for a Moment of Silence)
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you. All
right. The Mayor's away, his daughter is getting married. He's got a dinner this evening, so hoping he's having a great time, and I'll be pinch-hitting this evening, so we'll see how we do.

All right. I guess let's start with the monthly report. Chief, are you back there?

CHIEF MANWARING: Yes.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
CHIEF MANWARING: Good evening, hi. Just accept our reports. Last night at the Wardens they approved the application of Gabrielle Toussaint for the Rescue Squad.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.
CHIEF MANWARING: That's about all I have,
unless you guys have something that you need to --
tRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry. What, Wade?
CHIEF MANWARING: Unless you guys have something.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The only thing, Wade, is Paul, could you tell Wade that we checked, or I asked you about the roof at Station 2?

CHIEF MANWARING: Right, yeah.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, we had a contractor onsite looking at various roofs for the Sewer Department, primarily, and we included that one in the review. It is going to need, according to this one contractor, to be reroofed, so -- and because of the cost, we're going to have to get minimum of two other quotes, and depending on how other projects shake out, we may actually have -need a formal bid, which is going to take a little time to develop specifications.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Wade, that was the only question $I$ couldn't respond to last night, okay?

CHIEF MANWARING: Well, I knew they -- I knew they -- what do you call it? They went and looked at it.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. Well, I
thought they had, but $I$ couldn't confirm it to the rest of the Board of Wardens last night.

CHIEF MANWARING: I didn't hear nothing about it.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
CHIEF MANWARING: And that's it.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Anybody got anything else?

TRUSTEE ROBINS: (Shook Head No)
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thanks a lot, Chief, appreciate it.

CHIEF MANWARING: Good. All right.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. Village Administrator, Mr. Pallas.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Thank you. A couple of discussions items before $I$ begin tonight, resolutions. Just first, on the ferry queue redesign, we're still working through the comments with the DOT. I just wanted to let you know we haven't -- it hasn't been forgotten, it's just taking a lot longer than we had expected.

With regard to the sewer expansion project --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Wait a minute, Paul, before you go back on the ferry design.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're still in the queue for the money, correct?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. There's no -there's no issue at all with the money. We've got plenty of time at this stage. It's -- yeah, yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And the holdup is just on the New York State DOT side or is it --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Well, it's on -- it's on us now. But the comments are so voluminous that we want to make sure that this time when we submit them, they don't ask us the same question in a different way, which is basically what's been happening.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that what happened -ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, a couple of times now, so we're --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- is they came around in a circle and --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So do you have an anticipated time frame to get it back to them?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm hopeful by the end of December to get the next round of comments back, or responses to their comments back.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And the consultant is working on those?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Pardon?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who's working on the responses, the consultant?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's the consultant, yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: LKMA is the consultant.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Next, the sewer expansion for Sandy Beach and Manhanset. As you know, we are working with both the residents and Safe Harbor on agreements. We have gone back and forth a couple of times. As soon as those agreements are, at least from staff's perspective and the applicant's perspective, ready for your review, we'll send that out. I don't have any today, because they're -- on one case we're waiting for Safe Harbor to get back to us, even for their first set of comments. We haven't gotten anything back from them. With Sandy Beach, we're working with an attorney. They have hired an attorney to help, help them work through the

1 agreement.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm a little confused, and maybe you can clarify it. And we haven't exactly voted to move forward on this project yet, so how can we take money from them?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's -- well, we are going to have -- we're going to hire an engineer. We have to hire an engineer to take -- to go to the next step, we don't have a choice, and we don't have the money --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's part of the grant money.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Pardon me?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's the grant money that you got, correct?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes, but --
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because that's used for construction, if I remember correctly.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's a -- it's a grant for both engineering and it's a full -money can be used for either portion of that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Uh-huh.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: But there -- it's not even going to be enough to get started. And the thought is we don't want to start expending money if the project never happens. If we get the grant

1 money, we're going to have to pay it back. So this funding from both -- from Sandy Beach and Safe Harbor is going to help defray some of those engineering, upfront engineering costs.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I really think that we need to discuss that a little bit further as to -you know, there is some hesitation on some of us on this Board as far as this project, to begin with, as far as how it's going to get funded and moving forward, so I'm just -- I'm just -- I'm getting the feeling that the cart is going before the horse, and I'd like to not feel that we're asking for them for money, and then, all of a sudden, we as a Board turn it down. So I need to be clear on this, I'm sorry.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The agreement is contingent upon several things, one would be your approval, number one, of the overall project, and two, Safe Harbor's agreement. Without Safe Harbor's agreement, the project's not going to go.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I know it's not.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's that simple.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So the agreement that -- the draft that we have has those
contingencies in there.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Has the -- have either -has there been any change in Safe Harbor's commitment to what they're willing to put into this project, or is that just hearsay?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Not that I'm aware of.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I had several conversations them as early as yesterday, and they're still working on getting us comments.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. We'll watch and wait and see.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Thank you.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure. Next, in terms of resolutions, a change order for central pump station engineering. The project required some additional engineering, some support from the engineer, and that's basically what it is, it's not anymore complex than that.

We do anticipate that project to be complete in -- within the -- within a month. We're really at the stage now we're trying to think about the cutover schedule from the old to the new. That has to be done, obviously, quite carefully. We

1 don't -- without that station, we have a problem, 2 so we have to be very careful on how we schedule 3 and sequence that piece of it.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Did you say within a month? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes, yeah. The next resolution is for a meeting that $I$ have to attend in Albany on December 1 st and 2 nd for the New York Association of Public Power. There's really a staff -- we're still dealing with some staff issues that we -- that $I$ have to be present for as the president of the association.

The change order from microgrid is not going to be ready for this month. I did get an initial estimate from the contractor, but there -- I need to review it. It's a little bit more complicated than I expected, so I need to review it and tweak it a little bit. So I should have that ready for next month.

The last resolution $I$ have is $I$ had sent an email to you all regarding changes to rates at the various recreation facilities, the carousel, the marina and the campground. I don't know if you want to -- have any questions for me for that. It's pretty straightforward and --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I thought so.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- we had talked about this a couple of times at a couple of meetings, so.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we're all comfortable with putting the carousel tickets up to \$3 a ticket?

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I personally am.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes, yeah.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just asking, I mean, because, you know, there'll be -- you know, I'm sure there'll be some comments, but -- and that I just want to make sure we're all on the same page with that, that's all.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I think they're all -- I think they're all reasonable.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm not -- I'm not, no, but I'm just --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: At least by what I saw, I don't see anything unreasonable.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: They need better music for three bucks.
(Laughter)
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's all I have. The Treasurer is unable to be here. If you have
any questions on his report, I can try to answer them, or, you know, get it from him tomorrow or Monday.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I see we're funding the purchase of the two pickup trucks. Are they here? Are they -- the two pickup trucks, the two Ford Rangers?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, those were awarded last month.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, I know, but are the -- are the trucks here yet or no?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, they're --
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No? Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: They're months away, unfortunately.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, given the state of affairs with the auto industry, they're, yeah, probably eight to ten months.

CLERK PIRILLO: They're eight to ten months out.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Oh, really?
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah, they're eight to ten months out.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, okay. All right.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, so --
TRUSTEE ROBINS: They haven't been built
yet, in other words, probably.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Well, either they haven't been built yet, or --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Or they can't -- they got to get --

TRUSTEE ROBINS: On a container somewhere.
CLERK PIRILLO: Or they're in the process and parts are difficult to obtain.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Or sitting on a boat off California.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The other thing that I'm looking at is the cables for the light plant, G16. That truck is how old?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't -- I don't know off the top of my head.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. Are we to the point that that's something that needs to be looked at as far as -- I know you've mentioned a couple of times that you're trying to create a maintenance or a -- you know, check to see which vehicles needed to be upgraded or discarded.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, we're still working, working through that. We do know that the bucket trucks are now available on state contract --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- which is going to simplify the process tremendously, so that, you know, it's not -- it's still going to take time, because that, you know, unlike a pickup truck, actually does take that long to build, similar to a fire truck. The -- I don't -- we're -- we are working through it. I -- early next year I think we'll have a decision on what -- how many, if we need more than one.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do the bucket trucks have similar regulations of replacement, similar to the ambulances?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No. They're just done on an inspection basis. The prime -- the two main issues -- well, they get inspected every six months. They're -- they get tested, what's known as a dielectric test just to make sure that the insulation is still good, and the hydraulics and the cables and all that get tested at the same time, and those -- based on the independent test,
they identify what repairs were made, whether or not it can be used or not. That's done every six months.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. Is this the oldest bucket truck or --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't -- I honestly don't know.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do we -- how many bucket trucks do we have?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We have three.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Three? Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We have three.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
That's --
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Any other questions for Mr. Pallas?
(No Response)
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. You're off the hook. Oh, I'm sorry. Yes, I'm getting it. There you go. If you wouldn't mind, Clerk Pirillo.

CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. Thank you very much. My written report, as we know, is rather voluminous this month. I will keep my verbal comments, however, abbreviated.

I wanted to let everyone know that the Friends of Mitchell Park are once again sponsoring not one but two separate weekend dates where they will be responsible for the purchase of tickets. They'll be reimbursing the Village, and also for skates for all skaters 16 years old and younger. Those two dates will be, as of now, Sunday, the 16 th of January, and Sunday, the $20 t h$ of February.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: That's for ice skating? CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, it is.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: What was the second date?
CLERK PIRILLO: The 20th of February.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you.
CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome. And the 16th of January.

We just wanted to give a shout-out to the Tree Committee. They have once again worked diligently, and they have procured 22 trees through NYPA. Once again, you may have seen them around the last week or so planting, so thank you to them. They all get up early in the morning and help oversee the project, so we thank them for that.

I have only one addition this month

1 resolution-wise. New York State has come out with a program called the New York State Emergency Rental Arrears Program, and I brought it to the attention of Treasurer Brandt. He and I will work together. We would like to -- we would like to be part of the vendor agreement for this, because it could help some of our residents with their utility bills. And so we do have that agreement at hand and we'd like to include it for this month.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Sure.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Can you say the name again of the actual program?

CLERK PIRILLO: I can. The full name is New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance State Emergency Rental Arrears Program.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you.
CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sylvia, is the HEAP Program in -- are we in the HEAP Program yet?

CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
CLERK PIRILLO: Of course. This is above and beyond

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But the HEAP

Program is moving forward now?
CLERK PIRILLO: Always.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, okay.
CLERK PIRILLO: We have several residents that partake in that program, always.

Moving on to my report, just some additional information. Under Agreements and Contracts, the contract between the Village and Long Island Computer Networks was executed by Long Island Computer Networks on the $16 t h$ of November, and the Management Team has been meeting with that group via electronic method, Zoom, and also in person. So they are ready to come on board. In fact, they actually performed some tasks for us today.

We thank also Chris Winters, our previous provider, for spending his time to meet extensively with us and with the new providers.

The Intermunicipal Agreement between the Village and Southold for Municity was fully executed on the 12 th of this month.

Moving on to bids and RFPs, we opened two bids this morning. As you saw from the unofficial bid results for the fire truck that went out to bid, there was a disparity of about $\$ 400,000$ between the two base prices. Now I reference them

1 as base prices, because each of the vendors that 2 submitted had various discounts attached to their 3 prices. They're either prepayments on chassis or 4 loans.

6 apologize -- bid documents were sent to the Chiefs 7 and Attorney Prokop today for their review, so 8 that they can see if any exceptions were taken by 9 the low bidder and to compare the two results. 10 Once they are ready to proceed, they'll let us 11 know. We'll get it onto the agenda.

They would have preferred to do it this month if they can timing-wise, if that works for them. Then we'll be happy to accommodate them, as long as you Board Members feel that that's appropriate. If not and it's done in December, we know that one or both companies really will only hold the price until the end of the year. So if that's the case, we will be happy to work with the Fire Department to get the contracts executed as soon as possible, so that no discount is lost for the Village. It's not an onerous task, because the bid package includes the contract.

Moving on to one of my favorites, which is the Recreation Center Christmas Program. I would
just like to thank those that have already contributed, which is, of course, our friends at the Rotary, the Rotary Club of Greenport, Jane Ratsey Williams, John Quinlan and Michael Collins, Hawkeye Energy Greenport, and as always, Phillip Ross Industries. So thank you to all those parties.

That concludes my report, unless anyone has questions

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This resolution for the change order for J.R. Holzmacher, is that -- for the central pump station, is that the same issue you were talking about, Paul?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So is that resolution -you said you had to find some more paper -- we had to get some more paperwork? Is that -- I'm sorry, refresh my memory.

CLERK PIRILLO: No, that's for the microgrid.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, that's for --
that was for the microgrid.
CLERK PIRILLO: That is for the microgrid.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: For the microgrid?
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I
misunderstood. Okay.
The other question that $I$ have is we're having the public hearing for the cannabis opt-out next week.

CLERK PIRILLO: Uh-huh.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My understanding is that we'll be asked to vote after the public hearing is completed, is that --

CLERK PIRILLO: That's correct.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- correct? Okay.
Everybody here is aware of that?
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Yeah.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I just wanted

CLERK PIRILLO: I mentioned that last, last meeting.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: And it's due by a certain date by the State --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: December 31st, right.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: -- or you lose your opportunity.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.

CLERK PIRILLO: It's due by a date certain. And my understanding, Attorney Prokop, if you would correct me if I'm wrong, is that because we have permissive referendum included, we would need to vote at this month's meeting, which is why I mentioned it last time. We have -- I already prepared the SEQRA resolution and also the resolution for the actual.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So -- okay. So the permissive resolution -- I mean, permissive referendum is mentioned. Okay. All right. That's what I wanted to know.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: So that would take place next month, after the vote? If we did a permissive referendum, would that -- when would that take place?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: No. So they --
CLERK PIRILLO: No.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'm sorry. The vote, the vote would be at this meeting, at this meeting -next week's meeting.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Next week's meeting, right.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: If the Board wants to go ahead with it. There's an --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's to opt out,
correct?
ATTORNEY PROKOP: To opt out.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: The opt-out is for two different things, it's for retail stores, and also for things called dispensaries, which are basically cafes. And what will happen after that is a notice will go in the paper from the date of -- from the date of the publication of the notice is a 30-day permissive referendum period, where a certain number of residents can file a petition for a referendum, if they'd like, and then that referendum would be a period of time after that. I think it's 30 to 40 days -- 30 to 45 days after the -- if the petition is filed.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: If a petition is not filed, then the law becomes effective on the 30th day after the notice is published, and we send it off to this new board in Albany called the Cannabis Control Board. And I've been on their website. I'm submitting other Local Laws, and there's actually -- there's actually a whole new agency in Albany called the --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. They're not --
that hasn't gotten their act together, yeah.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah. You can go on their website and they -- but they have a special download provision for people -- for municipalities all across the state that are now uploading these Local Laws, because a lot of cities, towns and villages are opting out.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: The referendum you mentioned is a voting referendum of village residents?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So --
TRUSTEE ROBINS: And the --
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Go ahead.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: The petition that has to be filed, is that an official petition that you get from a State website and there -- are there a certain number of signatures required if -- you know, if there were residents that wanted to file a petition for the referendum, how would that work?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: There's a certain number of signatures that are required.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Certain number of
signatures that are required?
ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah. And it's a -- it's a formal petition, basically, it's not -- it's not a -- like an opinion petition that you might see go around, it's a formal process.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So depending upon which decision we make, whether to vote to opt out or to stay in, okay, because we have a public hearing, I just -- that permissive refermend -- refermend -I'm having a long day today. That doesn't have to be completed by December 31st?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: I don't think so, no. The --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If I'm reading it correctly, it can go into January and February.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But even though we opt out, it's still -- we're still telling the State that we voted on opting out, but we now have to -we're waiting on the a time for a permissive referendum, correct?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. The law, the law says adopt, adopt the Local Law by December 31st.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just wanted to be clear --

ATTORNEY PROKOP: So it would be --
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- that we all understand, because we normally don't vote -- we normally don't vote after a public hearing, we normally go to the next session. I'm just double-checking. I want to make sure that I know and everybody else here is comfortable with it, okay?

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Joe, what if we don't opt out, what -- does there have to be a referendum?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: If you do not opt out, then you can never opt out again forever. It's -you would never be able to opt out and you would -- and, basically, we would have to -- we would be required to accept those places as -- that it says either are a primary legal use or a conditional use.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: And do both of those have to be accepted, or just can one of them be?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Both, subject to reasonable zoning. We could do -- we could enact some zoning, but it couldn't be so restrictive as to be prohibitive.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we also have the option of -- if I'm reading correctly, some of

1 them have either opted out of the smoking lounges and have just done the retail. We have that availability as well, correct?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, I haven't -- I haven't reviewed that, but I think you probably could do that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: But I haven't reviewed that for everybody. So, you know, if you go -- if you do this, six to 12 months later, you could always -- you could undue it. You could say that we -- you know, we decided now that we don't want to opt out. You know, you go into 2022 and make an assessment based on what's happening in other communities or in this community and reverse the opt-out. But if you do not opt out, you could never --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, you're in then.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- then opt out, that's it forever, so.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: I had one other question for the Clerk.

CLERK PIRILLO: Sure.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: I received the holiday

1 festival calendar from the BID and I got two dates. I have two dates here and I'm trying to understand what's going to happen on each one. December 4th is the parade of lights and tree lighting.

CLERK PIRILLO: Uh-huh.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: And December 11th is Santa comes to town. I'm used to Santa coming to town on the 4 th as well.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's the -- that's the railroad.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: In other words, the parade usually has Santa arriving.

CLERK PIRILLO: Santa's definitely coming on the 4 th or the 5th, depending on --
(Laughter)
TRUSTEE CLARKE: So he -- so he's coming twice. That's all I wanted to make sure.

CLERK PIRILLO: He's definitely going to be --

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Or he's coming and staying for a week.
(Laughter)
CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. Yes, he's staying in Greenport for a week.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: All right. Very good, very good. So the traditional historic way we've managed that weekend is what's being planned, the tree, the Santa, gifts, kids, the whole thing?

CLERK PIRILLO: Correct.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I believe Santa goes for a train ride, doesn't he?

TRUSTEE CLARKE: The other one is tied to the Long Island Railroad Museum.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Railroad Museum, I think it is, Railroad Museum of Long Island.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: And Santa's giving out gifts there, too.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Santa goes --
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, he's going to do that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Santa goes for a train ride on Long Island.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, yeah. I think that's how we --

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Okay. So I just wanted to make sure I had my Santa stories straight.

CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. And that's tied into Shellabration weekend as well.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Fantastic. Thank you.

CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome. Anything else?

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All good? All right.

CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Mr. Deputy Mayor, I just --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Please.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I apologize. I neglected to request an executive session --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Oh.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- for contract negotiations, please.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay, we'll do
that. All right. We're cruising right along here. So Village Board of Trustees. All right. So --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Village Attorney.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Village Attorney.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I apologize. I put a check there, I shouldn't have.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: So I was going to discuss cannabis, so --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you. No, I

1 I'm just saying thank you.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Oh, yeah, thank you for that. Thank you.
(Laughter)
ATTORNEY PROKOP: The -- we're starting -we're starting to produce the Local Laws that have been asked to draft. I've been getting comments as recently as yesterday on some of them, so I've been waiting for that. But I did produce the one Local Law on parking, and if the Trustees could please look at that and forward any comments that you might have or questions to me, I would appreciate it.

One thing that I wanted to mention outside of my report is I've been speaking to Rob Connolly. I've been -- I've asked for a while to -- or suggested for a while that we have a training session for the -- for the Planning Board, you know, to cover the requirement that they have, and, you know, maybe ask -- answer questions that they may have about process and the law. And I've consulted with Rob Connolly about that, and we've agreed to schedule a training session, and that should happen in the next -- in the near future, hopefully, in the next few weeks.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that training session for Planning Board and Zoning and or is it --

ATTORNEY PROKOP: It was intended for Planning.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just for Planning alone?
ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, so far.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: And that's going to be in addition to the NYCOM training that they're offering in early December? There was some thing to sign up there.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Signup for online, yeah.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, online training.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah. So NYCOM has four one-hour classes, and we might wait until that's over and see how many people take advantage of that.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I signed up for one of them for Zoning.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah. I signed up for all of them, and they're all pretty good.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, they're good. I have -- I got to check the times. My question is, is if you and Mr. Connolly are going to do the Planning Board, would we as Trustees be invited to
that as well?
ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, I don't see why not. You know, it's up --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I -- yeah, I --
TRUSTEE ROBINS: You have to ask them if they want us.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Not really.
(Laughter)
TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm kidding.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: But, you know, as long as it -- as long as it doesn't violate open meeting requirements, but I'm sure that it won't. You know, we'll just have to be careful of that, and I'm sure it won't be a problem.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'll speak to Mr. Connolly about that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, I think the benefit of doing an inhouse training with that is you can make -- you can answer questions and have a discussion that's more specific to the topics in the Village, you know, and I think that that's more helpful. When we do -- when we do the Suffolk County Village Officials Association

1 trainings, or the NYCOM trainings, it's more --
2 it's more broad, and you're trying to address
3 questions that everybody in the entire county or
4 the state might have, and I don't know if it's as
5 helpful as when it's more specific.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the only reason I'm asking it is since we are the policy-makers and are dealing with the code, and we've all been kind of looking at the code and some issues, I think it would be interesting for us to hear what -- you know, some of the questions that are brought up, and some of the answers or the discussion that they as the Planning Board members, who are on the ground dealing with it, that could lead to a more -- a clearer insight into some of the suggestions that we might want to be making over the next couple of months. So that's the only reason why I'm asking. I think it would be a great educational component for us, as the policy-makers in the Village of Greenport, to deal with the Village Code. So that's one of the reasons why I'm asking. And the other, sometimes you need a refresher course.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, okay.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: And, of course, it would be offered to the Zoning Board. Just we took the -- I just spoke to Rob about the Planning Board first. But whatever he wants to do as far as the Zoning Board or doesn't want to do is fine.

And I think that, you know, we get together -- the Suffolk County Village Officials Association is sort of on a six-month schedule with their trainings. They tend to do October and April, so we start thinking about the topics now in a month or so. If there's anything that you would like to see, because they are supposed to be geared towards the Village Boards also, the Board of Trustees and Mayors, also. So if there's any topic that you think would be interested -interesting for you to hear as a Trustee, please let us know, or let SCVOA. You know, there's Debbie Young at the Suffolk County Village Officials Association, and you could just send her an email on behalf of yourself or on behalf of the Board just saying that, you know, it would be really great if we talked about, you know, whatever, whatever you think might be appropriate, and that it would be very much appreciated.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Joe, I had a question,

1 because I know at one point I thought we were 2 going to be discussing the accessory apartment 3 law. But $I$ understand from Paul that it's being 4 rewritten from the July 2nd copy that we received.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: It will be different from that, yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It will be, okay. All right, yeah, because that one didn't settle too well, so that's why I'm asking. Okay. All right.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: It wasn't a successful draft. And, you know, I've gotten a lot more comments, again, as recently as yesterday, and we'll be working on a new draft.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. And the other thing is we were looking towards -- what was the other thing? The curb cuts. Will we be seeing that soon, or because --

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. So there's a couple more --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do you want thoughts on that? Because I have been thinking about it really seriously, and, well, I think we had some of the discussion the other day.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: You could say it now, I mean, if you have any --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm not really in favor of giving the Planning Board control over the curb cuts. Two reasons is that we -- curb cuts have a tendency to decrease parking spaces on the roads. I think that we're responsible for the roads, and the -- and the new parking spaces and the traffic. And I think that sometimes there needs to be a -another level of just approval on something that has a different perspective than those that are dealing with the planning and the site plan.

I recently also would think that if we were going to do something like this, that we would add the reverse, that if people want to take a curb cut away and take away their parking spaces within their site plan on their property, that we should know that as well, because they're adding -intensifying the street parking, as we've had several examples. So I think that that's something that's not just -- I think that the Village Board at some point needs to be in some type of a comment period with it, that's all, okay?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: If I -- if I may, there just -- so everybody's clear, there's a case at the ZBA currently that's dealing with this
issue. I would suggest maybe we shouldn't discuss that in too much detail.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, how am I supposed to know that there's something before the ZBA?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm letting you know. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, that case, I mean, if we follow -- if we follow the code with that case, then --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They have to come to us anyway.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah, that it will -- it should come to you, so probably shouldn't be discussed.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: There is -- there's been an application that's pending that would require -- that's requesting an additional curb cut, and so that may come to you, or should come to you.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Are we all set?
ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, the only other thing, we finished up the AT\&T paperwork, finally.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Oh, good.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: We were able to get the executed agreement from AT\&T. And the Mayor signed it right away and we got it back, so now --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Good.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- we have that. The settlement is now binding on all parts.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Good. All right.
ATTORNEY PROKOP: Thank you.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you. All
right. Let's try this again. All right. Now to the Trustees. Trustee Robins, you want to lead us off?

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have my report here. I gave a BID report from last month's meeting. And as you all can see, the -- they've gotten their tree lights up now. And they've worked with the Village on all the other ornaments, the stars and everything, and it looks fantastic, so that's a good thing. They've spent a -- I think they're spending $\$ 14,000$ on it this year. But they'll be lit from now until the end of February, I think, so it will really light the Village nice.

They had a successful Halloween event in

1 spite of the weather. It was kind of extended an extra day, and the Village worked with them on that as well to make it happen.

They had their scavenger hunt, and this year they did a project with the -- a group called the Teal Project for children that have food allergies, and they help to put -- promote it to the school. And 20 bags of non-food things were given out to kids, and so that was kind of a nice thing that they did.

They're working on their website and reaching out to offer affiliate memberships to people who aren't in the direct BID district. People can opt to -- from here basically to Riverhead. If they'd like to buy a membership on the BID website, they can promote their business on the Village of Greenport website. So they're working on developing that right now. They --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia, is that part of their mission statement?

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm sorry?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that part of their mission statement for the BID?

TRUSTEE ROBINS: They're working on a new mission statement, but $I$ think that is something

1 that was in there originally, that they can -- you
2 know, it's an opportunity -- it's not for
3 businesses directly in the BID, they would have to
4 pay. But this is just their website, in other
5 words, it's not -- you know, they're not getting 6 membership in the BID. You're simply allowed to

7 say that you have a business, you know, that you
8 would like to be promoted on their website.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought originally the agreement was anyone that was in the 11944 area.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's membership in the BID, per se, but this is not membership. This is just to be able to have your businesses appear on their website.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I guess maybe I'm a little confused as to the -- the original reason for the BID was to promote our own Business District.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Not to be promoting other areas.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: All right. Well, that I'd have to ask Rich. He's an attorney, he can give you that, you know, information. But this is -you know, I'm just reporting what was at the

1 meeting.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, but it's a question. I'm asking a question.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, yeah.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It is my understanding in years past that the BID was -- the membership were those that were within -- already within the Business Improvement District.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That they reached out to those who were outside the district that had 11944 zip codes that would be able to purchase affiliates to be on. But I'm a little -- the whole purpose for the BID was to promote Village -- you know, Village of Greenport Business District. So promoting --

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think it's a fundraising thing, you know, to help get funds to do more events and things like that in the Village, so that's where they're coming from.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm not comfortable with it, but that -- you know, I'll take that up in a different direction, because I am a BID member. Okay, thanks.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sure. The Gate Committee,

1 which deals with government things, had a couple
2 of ideas. They -- you know, trash cans are always
3 an issue. They'd like to have more conformity of
4 the trash cans again. Obviously, over the last
5 year or so, we've added additional trash cans in
6 the Village. They don't all match everything, but
7 something that they'd like to talk about.

25 Things changed, I guess, up in Albany and they

1 weren't able to move it forward. But that was 2 originally a Suffolk County grant, I think. I 3 spoke to Paul about that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was part of the Downtown Revitalization Grant.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, the Downtown Revitalization Grant.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was originally awarded to us in 2010.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yep.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And we actually -- my understanding is after it sat still for so long, we had to decline, we had to decline that we were going to do anything with it, and get out of the loop.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Administration changed up there, people they were dealing with were different, so it just never happened. But it's something that's needed. It's very dark back there. Really, it would be nice to have, you know, better lighting back there. You know, that's the parking district where people need to park, and, you know, so I think it's important.

A little thing I'm going to bring up that $I$ just have been observing recently and it's of

1 concern to me, and it has to do with the
2 intersection of Center Street and Main on the west 3 side, that -- that jog in the road that takes

4 place, I guess, right across the street from
5 Peter's shop, and, you know, Demarchelier, or
6 whatever. And that's where the road kind of jogs
7 in and the lines divert the traffic to kind of
8 squeeze into Main Street. And I have seen -- I mean, I've had a couple of encounters with cars, that most people, when they're heading south towards Main Street, you know, towards -- towards Main Street, they swerve out a little bit and come into the other lane. And, I mean, I had a couple of really jarring experiences where people came and, you know, were coming fast right -- you know, basically right at me swerving into the lane. So I think it's something that needs to be observed. I've spent some time sitting there, actually watching it happen. And, specifically, there are two parking spaces in front of Demarchelier from that corner over, that, you know, if they were eliminated, and I -- you know, I know eliminating parking spaces is an unpopular idea here, but I think it would widen that out a little bit and make that a better flare, if you will, to come

1 into Main Street.

2

I don't know if you understand exactly what I'm talking about, but $I$ think it's a dangerous situation, and, unfortunately, people are driving faster than ever, you know? And so if somebody is coming along, ripping along there 40,45 miles an hour, and they're swerving basically into oncoming traffic, because they're going over the double line and coming onto the other side, you know, of the northbound traffic on Main Street. So --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, if I --
TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- it needs to be observed and looked at a little bit.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If I remember correctly, we curved it because -- we curved it. We had to repaint the lines there for a reason. Remember? It's by Peter's.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It actually used to be worse.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, that's what I thought.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We did the sidewalks and curbs, and the paving project that we got State money --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- for we did reconfigure that to the best that we could. So I think we did eliminate some of the errors there -not errors. The jog, we cleaned it up a little bit. I don't know how much more could be done, short of changing the whole road configuration there.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: What I'm thinking, and maybe you could go down there and observe it, too, is that eliminating those two parking spaces would widen that area enough for traffic to kind of correct itself and get it onto Main Street and merge in without -- that's a very abrupt merge, in other words, and people are coming around there. And, you know, if they're coming too fast -- even if they're not coming that fast, they're going over the yellow line into the other lane, you know. And if somebody's coming in the other direction and they don't see -- I had a really jarring encounter with somebody who was traveling way too fast, you know, and was coming right at me there.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I certainly will take a look at it. I think we did put a bump-out there as well, so --

TRUSTEE CLARKE: There is a bump-out.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There is a bump-out.
CLERK PIRILLO: There is.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. The cars would
have to be parked out into the road lane. I'll take a look at it. Maybe just moving them, moving them a little bit. I'll take a look at it.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I mean, isn't that the area where they had that accident recently with all those cars being hit?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, there was a Jeep that was destroyed.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: There were -- there were many, many areas of Main Street where the cars were hit, starting all the way down by South Street and coming all the way up. And then you had, of course, the parklet accident there. I would hate to see parking eliminated there for personal reasons. I believe that the root cause is that we have excessive speeding in the Village with very little --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Enforcement.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Enforcement. I would do anything to see a sign or any of the -- anything that the Southold Police Department could do to
try and advise people of their speed. We routinely have people at rush hours, morning and evening, doing over 40 dollar -- miles an hour. Of course, when the police come, they always come at lunchtime and sit at the various places and say that there's no problem.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Southold Town Police Department does have, and I believe we could request --

TRUSTEE CLARKE: They have several of those things that say how fast you're going.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The speed, yeah, the speed monitors.

TRUSTEE CLARKE: We just don't have anywhere to put it.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I think that Chief Flatley would be happy to -- if we request it, I think we could get that.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yeah, I saw that. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, they did it on the --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: A little farther north.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They did it across from the gas station, but it would be -- actually,

1 there kind of was a discussion today at
2 Transportation Commission on how the speed
3 limit -- you know, the 25 , 25 mile per hour speed
4 limit that we have on Main Street really isn't
5 working. And that enforcement probably is going
6 to need to be requested by us a little bit more.
7 I think that that's something that I would like to 8 see the Village Administrator get a hold of Chief 9 Flatley and --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I already took a note.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you, Paul.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: It's unfortunately become worse. I agree with Trustee Robins, that it's a concern not only at that particular junction, but on several others.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. No, we're definitely having a speeding problem in the Village and it's -- you know, it's very unsafe to pedestrians, cars, everybody, so.

The other topics, I mean, these are ongoing things. I don't know if we want to get into a discussion tonight, probably not. But, you know,

1 I have proposed a moratorium on permits for new 2 development in the waterfront commercial and 3 retail commercial districts. I've had some

4 conversations with Trustee Phillips about it. I 5 think we, you know, want to look at the update to 6 the LWRP. I think that's a -- something that has 7 to be done.

I seriously -- I have serious concern about infrastructure in the Village, and I'm just afraid that if we let, you know, development get out of control, we simply will not have the resources to keep our infrastructure, which is -- we were just talking about our infrastructure, you know, vulnerable and probably inadequate for the volume of traffic that we have at certain times of the year.

I did in my report download some information on basic requisites of land use moratoria in terms of time limits and recent -- you know, how long it can last. There are very strict procedures for the adoption of them and things like that. But I think that maybe at some point we could have a full Board discussion of it at a work session to see where everybody feels -- see how everybody feels about that idea.

So that's it for me. Thank you. DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you. Trustee Phillips.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Pretty much, Paul, the LWRP, we asked for the consultant to -- an RFP or something with the resolution. Has that been moved forward?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: To be honest, I haven't had a chance to write that up yet, but it's on my radar, definitely. As I -- as I had mentioned, I'm also looking into grants for potential funding for that consultant.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just -- I'll be real truthful, $I$ 'm going to keep pressing on it, because it needs to be done. As I said last month, it's an important document that we've had. I know that we have an existing LWRP that we're operating under, but, in the meantime, it's something that I think in order to move forward on any kinds of decisions of looking at anything, whether we stay the same with some codes or we change some, that's going to be an important document, not only for this Board, but some of the other Boards.

As I said in my work session report, there

1 was the Riverhead Local article about Downtown
2 Riverhead with their revitalization, and it brought to mind another piece that I read years ago that was written by the former Mayor that's build it -- build it and they will come. Well, they're here now, and I think it's time that we -we as a Board really start taking the initiative and the leadership, because I hear some people in the community saying that we're not taking the leadership. And I think that we need to be more vocal about our thoughts on the Village and what's going on currently.

So the other thing is getting into the waterfront commercial. I really would like to have a review of the conditional uses. I think that we have some real hard, serious thoughts to deal with. We also -- my understanding is that we can take a look at some of the properties and perhaps -- and I don't like to use the word rezoning, but I think that's what it is, but carefully consider what we're doing in the waterfront commercial district.

So that's pretty much -- the other is the parking, the district bulk and parking regulations. I think if we're going to discuss

1 parking spaces, for the Planning Board or the
2 Zoning Board to understand that we need to deal 3 with the residential portion of it as well as the 4 commercial. And I think just piecemealing it with 5 the commercial is not really the best for the 6 whole Village. So that's one of the things I

7 think we need to really discuss Article 5 of the 8 district bulk and parking regulations and take a 9 hard look at it, okay, especially if we're going 10 to be discussing in the future accessory

11 apartments, which would be intensifying the usage 12 in a residential area. The waterfront commercial 13 I do not believe needs to have accessory 14 apartments in it.

25 Thank you.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're welcome.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Honest question. Do you go first, or do I go first?
(Laughter)
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Well, I don't have a report to file, so I think you should go first.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right, I obviously agree. Obviously has --
(Laughter)
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. We made a lot of progress on the contract, which is what I've been doing with you guys for now an extended period of time, and I believe we'll discuss some of that in executive session. So, honestly, that's about where I'm sitting. So that's all I got. That's all you got, Trustee Clarke? No? All right

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you very much.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you. All
right. So I guess it's time for --
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Public.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Pardon?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Public, public.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Oh, yeah.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, yeah.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Public to address the Board. Please state your name and an address for the record when you come up.

MR. SALADINO: I'll go.
CLERK PIRILLO: Can you let Michelle go first?

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Oh, we got somebody in the back, Mr. Saladino.

MICHELLE BUCKLEY: Is that all right? Are you sure.

MR. SALADINO: Well, you know. (Laughter)

MICHELLE BUCKLEY: I have to put this -this is like my podium. And I'm not going to take your time, because your time is very valuable and precious.

My name is Michelle Buckley and I am a Licensed Social Worker, and I live on 420 Carpenter, Apartment B, in Greenport, and I've been thankfully successfully living in the Village for 10 years.

I'm here this evening for several reasons. First of all, to thank each and every one of you for your dedication and commitment and service that you provide this fabulous community. Without

1 your input, your dialogue, and successful
2 negotiations, we wouldn't have one of the best 3 communities on the East End, truly, so I'm

4 thankful for that. In particular, I'd like to 5 thank Sylvia Pirillo for her years, as well as 6 Paul. Their dedication is to be very much 7 revered.

I've been operating a ministry out of my home for the 10 years I've been living here, and at times it can be a little tricky and -- yeah, a little tricky. So I'm doing the best I can with the tools that I have. I'm extremely dedicated to the work that $I$ do, which is for the welfare and good of all.

I have been a Social Worker for 25, 35 years, and $I$ work in conjunction with my husband, Dr. Buckley, in Montana for 30 years. So we work very closely together to help people that are disadvantaged, that are just -- that are poor, homeless, struggling with things that a lot of people choose to not contend with. So my job at times is very challenging and difficult, and I don't always perform in the best manner because of that. I balance a lot, as you all do, and I recognize and respect each and every role.

I operate in a mannerism that is very different than most, it's also very effective, and for which I am grateful of my uniqueness.

So I want to thank Sylvia for -- several years ago, $I$ was sick and dealing with Lyme and Q fever, and down and out, and she was kind enough to give me the privilege to volunteer on the Skate Park Committee. So I had approached a couple of the people that were on the committee. I entered into the Facebook group and did what I could, until Dr. Yao at Stony Brook Rheumatology literally resurrected my life with a drug called Plaquenil, that's also used to treat COVID. Very grateful for Dr. Yao's work in Lyme Disease, which is one of the areas that I specialize in in helping people that struggle with pandemic illnesses such as Lyme, COVID, environmental illnesses.

I don't know if you've ever seen the movie with Julia Roberts, Erin Brokovich, a very brave woman. And I have a story similar to hers, so I'm following in her footsteps to carry on the baton.

Currently, in addition to the ministry that I provide out of my home, I've been specializing for the past five years doing social justice work

1 through the local court system from New York City all the way to Shelter Island, and my cases are
set very specifically so that attorneys can
reference my cases and help other people.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Is there --
MICHELLE BUCKLEY: In closing --
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.
MICHELLE BUCKLEY: -- thank you very much for the time. I just wanted to be here tonight to thank you, and it's a privilege to be able to let you know and be aware of my work. And I would like to conclude my assessment of the skate park, which is not in a condition safe for children, and I have the area of expertise to say that. So I guess my hope and my prayer would be that the Village would mobilize resources to fix the skate park for the safety of children, or temporarily suspend its operation until it's fixed --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.
MICHELLE BUCKLEY: -- so that a serious injury could be prevented. So thank you very much.

And, Mr. Prokop, it's especially nice to see you today.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you very much.

MICHELLE BUCKLEY: God bless you all.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you, Michelle.
MICHELLE BUCKLEY: Is that relevant?
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Don't forget your bag.

MICHELLE BUCKLEY: I hope so (laughter).
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Please.
CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. Just if I may clarify and counter one statement. We right now have a very active Skate Park Committee, led by Colette Galvez and her husband, and they have repeatedly on numerous occasions held working sessions to ameliorate the skate park.

It is right now, in our assessment, not at all in a dangerous condition whatsoever. If it were, it would have been closed by now. In fact, they have changed numerous wooden boards. They have banged nails and screws literally themselves, for which we thank them personally and professionally. They have done so with a lot of their own funds. They are right now in the process of procuring metal for the metal portions.

The skate park is in actually what we feel to be very good condition. They are also thinking

1 of ways to raise more funds, including Saturday 2 evening, additional Saturday evening events starting in the spring, going through summer, maybe coinciding with Dances in the Park, maybe not. They have let us know about several ideas, none of which are yet solidified. But we do owe them a debt of gratitude. There have been a great amount of activity at the skate park increased, and for that we are thankful, just to clarify.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. I think it's in great shape. I was just there the other day with my kids.

CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: So thank you.
CLERK PIRILLO: And they continue on.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you for all the hard work.

CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome.
MARGARET DECRUZ: Hi. Margaret de Cruz, 25 Washington Avenue. I really came to speak with our Treasurer, but he's not here, about the Community Development Fund, so I guess I should wait.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The public hearing is next week.

CLERK PIRILLO: There's a public hearing on Monday --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: The public hearing is Monday.

CLERK PIRILLO: -- the $29 t h$ of November, regarding opportunities for that.

MARGARET DE CRUZ: So you can bring ideas, or the ideas will be already decided?

CLERK PIRILLO: That's what the hearing is for.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: That's what it's for.
CLERK PIRILLO: The 29th of November, beginning at 7 p.m.

MARGARET DE CRUZ: Great. Okay. So then I have some questions. This thing is too high. Oh, well. I was curious about the cannabis opt-out thing. So you're going to have a meeting --

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am.
MARGARET DE CRUZ: -- with the whole -whoever comes, right?

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am.
MARGARET DE CRUZ: And we'll be able to speak. And then you guys have to immediately decide if you want to opt out based on that?

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: There's a time limit as to when --

MARGARET DE CRUZ: Yeah, I heard that. It just didn't make sense, also, that all of a sudden you all decide, but that -- so -- and that's before a referendum, really, right?

TRUSTEE CLARKE: I didn't understand that.
MARGARET DE CRUZ: So it sounds like you guys decide whether to opt out or opt into the cannabis thing.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Okay.
MARGARET DE CRUZ: And then you make your decision, and then the people in the Town can then petition to have a referendum?

TRUSTEE CLARKE: Yeah.
MARGARET DE CRUZ: So the referendum happens after you all make that decision, right?

ATTORNEY PROKOP: The decision, if the decision is in favor of the opt-out, it's conditional on what happens later. Whether or not there's a referendum and what happens in the referendum, the decision is conditional on that.

MARGARET DE CRUZ: Okay. Okay. So here's another thing $I$ was ask -- I'm curious about. This has to do with me, because $I$ have to suddenly get an entire new heating system in my house, and I -- there's a gas -- natural gas comes 400 feet

1 from my house and 400 feet from my house that way
2 (indicating). And I'm not sure how to petition
3 the Town to get more natural gas lines, because
4 it's a dollar -- it's $\$ 108$ a foot if $I$ wanted to
5 bring natural gas to my house. That's 400 feet,
6 which I can't do.


And then solar, I'm thinking, okay, I'll go to electric and eventually will have solar. And if I went that way, if $I$ were part of PSE\&G, I can get rebates and discounts, but with Greenport Electric, $I$ can't. So there's a lot of -- it's just -- you know, it's very difficult. I don't -it's hard to figure out what to do that's not fossil fuel oriented, for one thing.

Anyway, I guess I'm hoping we get more solar in Greenport. I don't know what's going to happen. I know you don't -- I'm talking to you only, talking to you all, so --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Margaret, perhaps Mr. Pallas could explain, because we had something recently with solar with -- that we're dealing with NYPA, correct, Paul?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, we are. We don't -- it's correct, we don't offer rebates, but we are going to be implementing net metering soon.

1 I had worked with the Power Authority to implement

So I guess that's it for me. Thank you. DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.

Mr. Saladino.
JOHN SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street. Just a couple of things.

Trustee Phillips had mentioned the discussed code change for Chapter 150-12, 150-16, and tonight you mentioned bringing the residential district into -- into the parking equation. I'm

1 not sure what you're thinking, but my thinking is, 2 is that if you -- if you choose to change Chapter 3 150-12, Chapter 150-16, the parking or the lack of 4 parking in the -- in the residential district, or 5 the hardship to park in the residential district 6 would probably go away, you know.

And the premise, the idea is, is that when you start charging for parking, new businesses, change of business, you start parking for charging (sic), and a fund is built up, then you can acquire space and there'd be more parking for the business district, and those people that came to visit the business district wouldn't have to park in the residential district.

So my thoughts are that you should focus on that before you start thinking about changing parking regulations in the residential district, if that's what you were thinking. If you have an entirely different thought, I apologize.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay. My thought, to be honest with you, John, is it's time for us to discuss these things. Whether they change or stay the same or we change them, $I$ just think that it's just time that this Board look at things, and because people, and you run into quite
regularly --
JOHN SALADINO: You're preaching to the choir.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, I know I am, okay? So that's why I'm just kind of putting my foot down onto the pedal and saying it's time, it's time for us to take that leadership role and do it.

JOHN SALADINO: I think it would be crazy not to, not to address those two portions of the code. We say -- my Dad used to say it all the time, "That was then, this now." 1990 was then, and now it's an entirely different --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's exactly right.
JOHN SALADINO: -- Village. So to not address that would be not in the best interest of the Village, I think.

The other thing I would like to -- I heard tonight, and not to offend my pal, Paul Pallas, with the new rate changes, $I$ think to make the carousel $\$ 3$ is crazy, $I$ think it's crazy to do that. It's a 66\% increase in the ride of the carousel ride.

If you look at the other things that are being suggested in the -- in the trailer park, you're going to from a monthly rate of $\$ 640$ a

1 month -- \$645 a month to $\$ 650$ a month. That's
2 less than 1\%, that's crazy. If anything, double 3 their price and let the little kid ride for -- it

4 should be -- the carousel should be a loss leader
5 anyway, it should be like a dollar or free.

9 a year. To bring my boat to Montauk is \$14 a 10 foot. In Greenport -- plus electric. In

11 Greenport, it's a bargain. It's almost cheaper, 12 it's almost cheaper not to rent a slip at my 13 marina than keep at Brewer -- at the Village 14 marina.

So, you know -- and a guy that's coming to Greenport, a guy that's spending $\$ 300$ in fuel or \$200 in fuel, even a -- even a semi-local guy from Southold or Cutchogue that wants to come to the Village for a night, to stay a night, he's buying a couple of hundred dollars worth of fuel for the roundtrip. An extra dollar a foot is not going to -- he's not going not come because the price is too high. People are going to go. People are going to go to Block Island, people are going to go to Montauk, people are going to come to

1 Greenport, go to Connecticut, go to Mystic, wherever they want to go, and the price of dockage is not going to affect their decision to come here. So I would raise the price of the campground. I would raise the price of the marina.

And, Jack, I mean, you give your kid a dollar and he shows up, "Yeah, I want to ride the carousel." "You can't, you can't, you need \$3." You know?

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right.
JOHN SALADINO: So, I mean -- and you guys know me, I'm a money guy. I mean, let's raise the prices on everything, except the carousel. I mean, that should be, in my opinion, even a loss leader.

But if it's two bucks now -- I argued with the previous Mayor about this when it went from a dollar to $\$ 2$, and now it's going to go from $\$ 2$ to \$3. I don't ride the carousel, but, you know, I have grandchildren that do and stuff.

And I kind of forgot what the last thing was. You know, I listened to -- oh, the parking. I would encourage you not to eliminate two parking spaces. I'm sorry, Julia. You know, to eliminate
those two parking spaces would just -- would just be -- you know.

And the accidents that were on that corner if I read the Suffolk Times correct, and the reporter is here, she could correct me, or maybe you guys could, they were all alcohol related.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Uh-huh.
JOHN SALADINO: Alcohol and speed. So, you know, if the guy doesn't drive drunk, and after he's drunk he doesn't drive too fast, chances are they wouldn't be crashing into cars in front of that spot. So with parking the way it is now in the Village, even to eliminate two spots would be, I think, ill-advised.

So thank you, thanks for listening.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you.
RANDY WADE: Thank you all for doing such great work. I'm Randy Wade, Sixth Street, Greenport.

The carousel proposal is for how much?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Three dollars.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Three dollars.
RANDY WADE: Okay. I would agree with John about large boats. I feel like they should

1 totally be competitive, and we should get a lot of 2 money, because it's really expensive to maintain 3 the marina. But I'm okay with the carousel, \$3.

4 Maybe you could do four for 10, or something like 5 that, give a bargain.

But -- and I think there's confusion about the marijuana laws. The main point is that if you want, it's my understanding that if you want to regulate them and say they only would belong in one place or another, or we only want to have this type of thing or another, you absolutely have to opt out. That's what the vote is. It's not saying that it can never happen. It's saying that this is the only way the Village will have any control of what's going to happen.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Randy, I think we all understand that.

RANDY WADE: Somebody else didn't. It really -- I said it -- I'll say -- never mind, it wasn't for you.

The CDB, can any of that -- the Community Development Block Grant, could any of that go for planning, do you know?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: I don't believe so.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
CLERK PIRILLO: No.
RANDY WADE: No? It has to be hard stuff?
CLERK PIRILLO: No.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. It's the -- it's through Suffolk County Consortium, which is the -you have to -- we have to apply, and we have to present projects and planning. That's not part of this Consortium's --

RANDY WADE: Got it.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- purview.
RANDY WADE: Okay, great. Does anybody know what the -- there's debris by -- on Moore's Lane west, where the railroad is apparently going to come out, and by the baseball diamond. It's as if somebody's torn up a road and there's concrete and rubbish, rubble there. Does anybody know what that is? Piles of it.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: New stuff?
RANDY WADE: It's brand new, that I could tell.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Piles of concrete, you say, behind the baseball diamond?

RANDY WADE: It's like --
TRUSTEE CLARKE: Right at the entrance?

RANDY WADE: No, it's -- you know, you drive in to the south. You know where the south entrance of the Mini Railroad would be?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Uh-huh.
RANDY WADE: So you drive in, as I was doing to go see if anything's going on, and right there by the woods, just north of that baseball diamond, are these piles of -- it looks like a road has been torn up and dumped there.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Does it have anything to do with our construction, you know, the road, you know, we're doing all the work down on the streets?

TRUSTEE ROBINS: You mean Fourth Street?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Fourth Street, yeah.
ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm not familiar with it, so I'll have to look at it and find out.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I don't -- me either.
RANDY WADE: Because $I$ would think if it was a contractor, he would have to get a permit to temporarily dump there.

Then getting back to Moore's Woods and Moore's Lane, I seriously hope, and maybe you can't consider this since the Mayor's not here, but that there be a Moore's Woods Committee, and

1 that now, especially -- the campground the,
2 Greenport campground is encouraged to have a
3 rural -- Moore's Lane should remain rural, and
4 right now there are trailers in front of the
5 little, you know, "For Sale" or "For Rent" booth, 6 or manager's booth, or whatever there is at the 7 Village campsite, and there shouldn't be trailers 8 or campers or anything on the street side of that, 9 it should all be back in the property. So there's 10 a -- some problem that needs to be addressed with 11 the way the campsite is being managed.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's the manager's trailer, is it not?

CLERK PIRILLO: They've been there all summer, Randy.

RANDY WADE: I know, and I was waiting for it to end, and thought that -- because it really shouldn't have been out on the street side this summer either.

CLERK PIRILLO: They were there last year as well, and it's when --

RANDY WADE: Okay.
CLERK PIRILLO: It's when we don't have -when we don't have sufficient -- sufficient room. And luckily, it's a testament to how well the
campground is doing.
RANDY WADE: That's great. But I feel like then we rent a couple of less spots in order to keep it all contained on the site, and not have it spill onto Moore's Lane, which is --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not spilling --
RANDY WADE: -- an asset of the Village.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not spilling onto Moore's Lane.

CLERK PIRILLO: It's not Moore's Lane, it's part of the campground still, because it's prior, it's prior to where the fence starts and where the sign is.

RANDY WADE: But you know how the residential developments were required to have 100 feet of woods and natural buffer to Moore's Lane, our own campground should also be required to have a buffer, a natural buffer on Moore's Lane, which --

CLERK PIRILLO: But it's not required, there's no such requirement.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There's no requirement that we're aware of.

RANDY WADE: I understand what you're saying. I guess I'm asking the Board to make a

1 requirement, and to take charge of ensuring that
2 Moore's Lane is the rural corridor that it should 3 be. And it is a huge asset to the Village to have

4 that sense of wildness right outside our dense
5 little Village. That's something that a lot of
6 towns would really like to have, and it's
7 something that gets planned into a lot of towns 8 and we have it.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's always been a trailer beyond the --

RANDY WADE: What did you say?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I said there's always -as far as back as I can remember, Randy, there's the booth there, but always -- there's always been a trailer beyond, just right next to that booth. There's been -- as long as I've walked that, there's always been the visual of a trailer right behind the entrance.

RANDY WADE: Okay. Then I have a brand new request, which is that we revise the way we approach that campsite and make sure that all the campers and metal structures are put behind that booth.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
RANDY WADE: Thanks.

DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
RANDY WADE: Thank you very much.
DEPUTY MAYOR MARTILOTTA: All right. Anyone
