1	(Whereupon the meeting was called
2	to order at 7:01 p.m.)
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Call the meeting
4	to order, pledge to the flag.
5	(Whereupon all stood and recited
6	the Pledge of Allegiance.)
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. You
8	may be seated. I just received a text
9	from Trustee Martilotta, he's going to
10	be about five minutes late, and Trustee
11	Robins is not going to be here today,
12	it's her mother's 90th birthday party,
13	and she's with her family.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Congratulations
15	to her mother.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll start with
17	Chief Miller.
18	CHIEF MILLER: Good evening. I'd
19	just like to ask that you accept all
20	reports that were given to the Village
21	this month. Also we need permission to
22	hold Washington's Birthday Parade on
23	the 18th of February, President's Day
24	weekend. Also I just we got all
25	cleared up with the security system for

1	the key fobs for the door. We had two
2	other vendors that were nonresponsive,
3	one guy showed up here, didn't he
4	found out he was one of the bidders, he
5	found out there were three other guys,
6	he gave Joe Milovich, Warden Milovich a
7	hard time, and so we asked him if you
8	write a letter, and the guy was, like,
9	I'm not bidding, I'm not writing a
10	letter. So I don't know what was
11	wrong. That was Lighthouse Security,
12	just so you know. Suffolk Security,
13	we've been after them for two, three
14	months now, and they haven't responded.
15	So that's all taken care of now.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just document the
17	phone calls, put them together with it,
18	and you covered the policy. That's
19	fine.
20	CHIEF MILLER: Also we have
21	Matthew Spinozzi, membership to Eagle
22	Hose. All his paperwork came back
23	fine, so we'll do that at the Board of
24	Wardens this month.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Your

1	meeting is Wednesday, right?
2	CHIEF MILLER: Before yours, yeah.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just give the
4	paperwork so we spell the name properly
5	and all.
6	CHIEF MILLER: The only other
7	thing we discussed the other night at
8	finance was a possibility of we've been
9	talking about buying a generator for
10	the tower, the cable tower where we
11	have our high band radio system and
12	repeated paging system. When we lose
13	power, it goes out, there's no
14	that's it, it's dead. So we've been
15	discussing a generator system, propane
16	fired with a switch gear, so when power
17	goes down it automatically kicks on. I
18	think Commander was the low bidder at,
19	like, 11,000 dollars I think it was.
20	But I spoke to Chief Flatley today
21	because all they have is battery
22	back-up up there, so if their batteries
23	go out then they're done. So I asked
24	him if he was interested in possibly,
25	you know, maybe we can get a little

1	cash out of them. He said they'd be
2	interested. He didn't give me a firm
3	answer.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Because we
5	have a proposal for them to go and do
6	work on that tower and do their
7	upgrade, and their upgrade includes a
8	generator putting in to power
9	everybody.
LO	CHIEF MILLER: Oh, okay, he didn't
L1	tell me that.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, Paul,
13	follow-up with that because in the
L 4	specs that I read through on that
L5	they're putting in a generator to take
L 6	care of everybody that's up there. He
L7	might not be on that part of it, might
L8	not know it. Read through the specs
L 9	that we had gotten two weeks ago
20	because they plan on starting that soon
21	and that included a generator for
22	everybody there.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: A propane
24	generator?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe so.

1	CHIEF MILLER: I just spoke with
2	well, I have to go back to the
3	meeting, but we were talking, and Norm
4	Reilly who is the head of Southold Town
5	Chief Council, he said that the County
6	is going to get out of the low band
7	paging, which is basically what we
8	have. We do have high band, but
9	they're going to get out of it all
10	together, so if calls come through the
11	County, we're not going to get the
12	calls. So he said down the road, and
13	he's not sure how long, it could be
14	within a year or so, we might have to
15	switch everything over to high band to
16	be able to get activated for any calls
17	and stuff so
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And when
19	they switch over and do away with the
20	low band, are they going to call
21	Southold and ask Southold to do it?
22	Supposedly.
23	CHIEF MILLER: What Norm was
24	saying, that's kind of what's going to
25	happen because Southold would be able

1	to I don't know. It was a little
2	bit beyond me.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: We have the issues
4	now, I know, when it comes from County,
5	sometimes you get it, sometimes you
6	don't, so you don't always get points
7	and that issue.
8	CHIEF MILLER: That's about all I
9	have.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: The service awards
11	program, did you have any changes for
12	next year?
13	CHIEF MILLER: No.
L 4	MAYOR HUBBARD: So put that down,
L5	Sylvia, for us to approve the points
L 6	for 2017 the same as they were going
L7	forward. We do that at our December
L8	meeting, set the program up for that
L 9	year. If anything does change at the
20	Warden's meeting on Wednesday, let me
21	know. I'll be at the meeting too.
22	CHIEF MILLER: Okay.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any other
24	questions for the chief?
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: By-laws? I saw

1	in your report that you guys are voting
2	on by-laws. When do those come before
3	this Board?
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They don't.
5	That's their by-laws, that's nothing to
6	do with us.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. As fire
8	commissioners though, aren't we
9	supposed to be in the loop on I'm
L 0	just curious, I don't know what it is.
L1	CHIEF MILLER: I mean, I can give
L2	you a copy. What it is, right now it
L3	has to do with the physicals that we
L 4	require the members to take, and just
L 5	rewording some things trying to take,
L 6	like, little loopholes out of what's in
L7	the by-laws already.
L 8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it more of
L 9	an operational the by-laws, gives
20	certain guidelines?
21	CHIEF MILLER: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You know, for
23	operating within the company?
24	CHIEF MILLER: You're supposed to
25	have certain training that's required,

1	if you don't make that then you get X
2	amount of time, if you don't get it by
3	then, then you get a suspension letter,
4	stuff like that. Same thing with the
5	physicals. But just rewording a few
6	things.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Doesn't sound
8	like a big deal. It was a question I
9	had because I saw because I know
10	that by law we're fire commissioners,
11	so we're supposed to I don't know
12	what the role of I mean, this is
13	sort of a question for Joe, what's the
14	role of a fire commissioner in
15	something like that, or is more of,
16	like, an operating procedure where it
17	doesn't come up to our level?
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: They take care of
19	everything in-house on what they're
20	doing and everything else, and we don't

MAYOR HUBBARD: They take care of everything in-house on what they're doing and everything else, and we don't set the guidelines to them, you know, the Board of Wardens does that internally, and the Village Board has never voted on by-law changes in the past.

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1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: As long as we're
2	not as fire commissioners then, what
3	are we responsible for?
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Financial.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If there were
6	some sort of problem, you know, would
7	this Board be liable? If the by-laws
8	created some problem and somebody
9	decided to sue, what is our liability?
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: If they sue the
11	fire department, the fire department is
12	part of us.
13	CHIEF MILLER: You can be sued no
14	matter what.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. Which is
16	why I think we should have a chance to
17	I mean, I don't know how New York
18	State law works around this, but if as
19	a member of this Board I am to be sued
20	based on by-laws, I should probably
21	have a chance to review them and look
22	at them, and we should I don't know
23	if we vote or what.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: We never have in
25	the past two hundred years, we never

1	have, but I mean, it's not part of the
2	procedure. I'm assuming it's a state
3	law that was done way back then, it was
4	never said it had to be voted on that
5	way, but we can check with the Village
6	Attorney when he comes back in.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, it's not a
8	big deal, we should just make sure I's
9	are dotted, et cetera.
LO	CHIEF MILLER: I mean, I can get
L1	you a copy of it, if you want to look
12	at it.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I would be
L 4	curious, but I'm not concerned about
L5	it, but I just want to make sure
L 6	process wise.
L7	CHIEF MILLER: Fire department
18	stuff. Anything else?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's it. Thank
20	you. Next is Village Administrator,
21	Mr. Pallas?
22	MR. PALLAS: Good evening,
23	everybody. In addition to the
24	resolutions that are listed there for
25	hires, I have a couple of other

1	resolutions that I'm requesting that I
2	believe e-mails were sent out today.
3	One is just the New York Association of
4	the Public Power annual business
5	meeting is January I think it's 18th
6	and 19th, and the two hockey club
7	contracts also we got them out to the
8	hockey clubs for comment, I sent them
9	to the Village Attorney. I just want
LO	to note that they're identical to last
11	year with the exception of the dates
L2	and the price. And I don't mean our
L3	price to them, because of their
L 4	schedule, what their total cost is
L5	going to be. The rate is the same,
L 6	everything is the same, again, other
L7	than the dates.
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry,
L 9	Paul, did you say you sent it to us?
20	MR. PALLAS: I sent it to the
21	Village Attorney and the hockey clubs
22	just for their comment, if any. I've
23	already heard back from one of them,
24	and they're fine with it as written.
25	Again, it's identical to last year,

1	we're just waiting for the other one.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just
3	misunderstood you, I thought you said
4	you e-mailed it to us.
5	MR. PALLAS: No, after the Village
6	Attorney review it, then I'll send it
7	out to the board. That was
8	resolutions.
9	Moving to departments, Road
LO	Department, just a couple of
L1	highlights, they helped with some
12	Christmas decorations at the carousel,
13	they've done some work, winterizing
L 4	work at the marina and our own
L5	equipment, of course. They're getting
L 6	the or they've gotten the sanders and
L7	snowblowers all set for the winter.
L8	Some projects they worked on, they did
L 9	work, a lot of work on the ice rink.
20	We did use other departments, other
21	than just the road barn for that, made
22	it go a little bit smoother, which was
23	good. We also put in a new the last
24	of the new the second new compressor
25	is now installed, and they are all four

1	running and running well. We are in
2	the process today of making ice.
3	Things look like going pretty good
4	there. They did a
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You said four
6	compressors?
7	MR. PALLAS: Four, yes.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's all we
9	have, right?
LO	MR. PALLAS: That's what we have,
L1	we have four, and they're all running.
L2	Typically they run all four when we
L3	first get started, then they'll start
L 4	to cycle once we've got all the ice
L5	made, they'll turn it down a little
L 6	bit.
L7	The fire main service for American
L8	Legion was completed as well, and still
L9	continue to work on trees jointly with
20	the Electric Department.
21	Moving to the Sewer Department,
22	again, I will just note that the
23	results displayed are actually October
24	results. There's still a delay in the
25	data, not in the sampling or the actual

1	results. We do our own results, all
2	the thresholds are within legal limits,
3	it's just a delay within their new
4	computer system. We don't really know
5	why, they've explained it, but it
6	didn't make a lot of sense to us.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My curiosity,
8	how come there was no sludge removal in
9	November?
L 0	MR. PALLAS: You know, I actually
L1	missed that when I reviewed this. I
L2	don't actually know, I think they just
L3	didn't have enough to remove. They've
L 4	done a better job of getting rid of the
L5	water, I guess, to where
L 6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To consolidate
L7	it?
L8	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, that's why
L 9	there's no sludge, wasn't enough to
20	haul.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because in the
22	past that's been an expense that's been
23	a concern, and at one point we had all
24	of these ideas of changing things, but
25	the procedure up there has been changed

1	enough so that we're I mean, my
2	curiosity because it is a big expense.
3	MR. PALLAS: Again, I think it's
4	just that past month they did a better
5	job of it, and hopefully that
6	continues. We are still looking into
7	other options. We're not spending a
8	lot of time looking into it because
9	they're working on it this way at first
10	pass.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just curious.
12	MR. PALLAS: Moving to the
13	Electric Department. They did, with
14	the Road Crew, they moved the Christmas
15	tree over to Mitchell Park from here.
16	They did all the Christmas decorations,
17	the streets, the poles, got that all
18	set up for the Christmas tree lighting.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great job.
20	MR. PALLAS: Thank you. The alarm
21	tech we finished the fire alarm,
22	carbon monoxide system at the power
23	plant, and they did a two pole
24	relocation on Carpenter Street as part
25	of the road project, so helped that

1	project go very well.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What's going on
3	with the water tower? I mean, not the
4	water tower, the tower that we have,
5	the cooling tower?
6	MR. PALLAS: We're working on
7	contracts, once the contracts are done
8	we will in fact, he called me today,
9	I haven't returned his call, they want
10	to set up a site meeting to start
11	scheduling that.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do we have an
13	anticipated time that it's you know,
14	do you have a deadline date that you're
15	looking for to get it finished or
16	started?
17	MR. PALLAS: The deadline would be
18	summer operating season, summertime
19	really. But the way the project is
20	going to be staged is that we won't
21	the engine won't be out of service,
22	only of brief periods of time when they
23	do cut overs, we'll make sure that we
24	have everything in service as much as
25	possible, maybe a day or so as I

1	recall.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The other
3	question I had is dealing with the gas
4	tanks up there, the fuel. I know that
5	we went to a new system, are the checks
6	and balances working? I mean, are we
7	
8	MR. PALLAS: They seem to be. I'm
9	a little behind in catching up with the
10	reports and tracking of them. We do
11	have two separate systems, one that
12	tracks the vehicles, one that tracks
13	the actual tank volume, and I just I
14	take a look at that, I compare the two
15	to see if they all line up. I just got
16	a little bit behind, but up to now
17	they've been pretty good, everything
18	has been matching.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And
20	nobody has had any issues, or the fire
21	department has been able to get in and
22	get what they need?
23	MR. PALLAS: You know, at the
24	start up many months ago we had a
25	little bit of an issue, but we've been

1	no, no complaints, everybody seems
2	to be working with it very well.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Great. Thanks.
4	MR. PALLAS: Moving onto the
5	Building Department, just a couple of
6	items there, one item actually. The
7	code enforcement officer completed his
8	building safety training inspection of
9	safety yes. So he's going to ramp
10	him up now on some rental permit
11	enforcement and inspections on those,
12	that's probably the big ticket item
13	with that, and the reports are
14	attached, the traffic enforcement
15	tickets.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Only rental
17	permit, or what about other safety?
18	MR. PALLAS: That's the biggest of
19	the items, but he does do other work
20	than that, yes, of course.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. And as I
22	understand, he's going to be trained
23	he'll be fully code enforcement trained
24	by April?
25	MR. PALLAS: That's actually

1	building inspection. He is able to do
2	permit inspection essentially, but, I
3	mean, that's something that takes, you
4	know, it's one thing to have the
5	credentials, it's another to have the
6	experience. So that takes a long time
7	to gain that experience, but he'll be
8	able to do it, he'll have all the
9	background to do it.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes. And his
11	parking numbers here, is this money
12	that is collected in FBS, or is this
13	money that's been cited, fifty-two
14	thousand?
15	MR. PALLAS: As I understand it,
16	the FBS doesn't lock it in until it's
17	collected, that's my understanding.
18	MR. BRANDT: We just received the
19	November check, so we're right on
20	schedule with that.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we have
22	fifty-two thousand dollars in revenue
23	this year that we didn't have last
24	year?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.

1	MS. PIRILLO: We just received
2	10,035 dollars at the end of November
3	that we were waiting for that was the
4	outstanding, so we just need the
5	that was for October, so we're waiting
6	for November, December.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Including seven
8	grand in November where I personally
9	was pleased to see a diversity of kinds
10	of tickets with a focus on parking
11	outside of lines, handicap spots. So
12	if we're going to average eight grand a
13	month, that's a hundred thousand
14	dollars in revenue that we should think
15	about I was thinking about this
16	because I was at the BID meeting this
17	morning. They're not raising their
18	levy, and they have a fifteen thousand
19	dollar beautification, downtown
20	beautification budget. As far as I can
21	tell, that goes to all different arrays
22	of flowers, which are great, flowers
23	always look great, but if we're pulling
24	in a hundred grand, which is largely
25	from the downtown area, we all know

we've got some issues down there to

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	-
2	work on, it would be great to maybe use
3	some of that money to fund a grant
4	writer to go try to get some downtown
5	support, whether it's waste management
6	or we can all think of any number of
7	ways to spend that money, and/or people
8	have been kind of talking on your side
9	about sidewalk stuff in the commercial
10	district, and, you know, I just want to
11	call out this seems to be working.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They've been
13	talking about a lot of things.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes, ma'am. We
15	have some money in the budget, I wanted
16	to throw out that if it's really that
17	effective, we should put that to work
18	potentially in the form of a grant
19	writer to work with BID to get and I
20	think BID should contribute too, maybe
21	less flowers, a little more, you know,

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sort of thinking forward, but how we

could work together with them. It's a

whole new -- Julia isn't here to give

the report, it's a whole new slate of

1	people leading it, and they have a
2	really good, I think, long look at
3	what's going on in the Village.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, I have to
5	ask a question because I know at one
6	point there had been a grant that was
7	written for downtown, economic
8	something. Do we know what happened
9	with that? Did we give that up, or is
10	it still in limbo somewhere?
11	MR. PALLAS: No, that basically
12	expired. There was a lot of conflicts
13	with that grant and the LWRP, there was
14	a lot of cross over, and it just didn't
15	seem to make a lot of sense to put much
16	effort into that.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just
18	wondered if we lost out on the money is
19	all.
20	MR. PALLAS: I spoke with the
21	State about that, and there was no
22	repercussions, but I had discussions
23	with them about it.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's all.
25	MR. PALLAS: Moving onto

1	recreation. Marina, the boats, the
2	three boats have been winterized, the
3	carousel has obviously been decorated,
4	I thought they did a great job
5	decorating the carousel. All of the
6	buildings necessary for ice skating are
7	all set up and ready to go. Again, the
8	sponsorships continuing on the ice
9	rink, the panels on the side of the ice
10	rink, soliciting those, and we've been
11	doing good at that, better than we have
12	in the past actually.
13	Moving onto just the recreation
14	program. Christmas party for the
15	Recreation Department is tomorrow at
16	5:00, I think everybody all got
17	invitations for that from Margot. It
18	will be at 5:00. As part of that, a
19	lot of donations, thanks to the Village
20	Clerk getting donations for that.
21	Personally I can tell you she's very
22	good at getting donations from people.
23	That's going to be good. And that's
24	all I have. Short and sweet.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any questions? I

1	just we had talked earlier about the
2	pump out station at the marina, did
3	that get winterized?
4	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Did the sprinkler
6	systems that we had talked about, did
7	they get
8	MR. PALLAS: Yes. They've all
9	been done.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's cold out
L1	there, I just want to make sure that
12	they did get those taken care of after
13	we talked Monday.
L 4	MR. PALLAS: Yes, I followed up
L5	with them three or four times to make
L 6	sure it got done.
L7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we ready for
L8	ice with the carousel doors?
L 9	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I mean, there's
20	only so much you can do obviously.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're tested
22	and
23	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I mean, we only
24	use the one door during the winter, so
25	as long as it doesn't build up too

1	much, we should be okay.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. The
3	Village Treasurer, Robert Brandt.
4	MR. BRANDT: Good evening,
5	everyone. I have a fairly light repor-
6	here. I have one request for a budget
7	amendment to fund the ongoing
8	department-wide computer upgrade
9	services totaling 18,700. Did anyone
10	have any questions on that?
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
12	MR. BRANDT: Utility billing, all
13	meter was on schedule at the time of
14	the report. This morning they were
15	working on the red tags. All the
16	billing was out for the month, so the
17	reports got to me in a timely manner,
18	so I was able to process all the year,
19	month end stuff I had to do including
20	sales tax that went out on time.
21	Community Development, missing
22	from my report attachment are the
23	financials, I have copies here for
24	everybody. There was no meeting in
25	November, we just had one this past

1	Tuesday. There was I was told there
2	was an interest in someone getting
3	involved with the Board, we've tried to
4	contact them, we've had no success, so
5	I'm looking at you because you had
6	given us the lead on that.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: She didn't
8	respond?
9	MR. BRANDT: No. We're kind of
10	anxious to hear, so if she's still
11	interested.
12	MR. PALLAS: I had sent two
13	e-mails, I didn't get any response
14	back.
15	MR. BRANDT: Okay. No significant
16	payments went out this month. Rents
17	are slightly up at 86,000 this month,
18	property taxes were at 1,000,042. I
19	was looking at the outstanding report,
20	it's negligible this year, which is a
21	good sign, we've done a good job
22	collecting property taxes, including
23	the arrears in the sewer and the water
24	that was attached. That's pretty much
25	it. Sorry, it's light. Christmas.

1

MAYOR HUBBARD: I know the

2	paperwork just got back to the
3	auditors, were they going to schedule
4	to come and see us in January?
5	MR. BRANDT: I'm going to try and
6	get them in for January or February.
7	I'm waiting to hear back from Mr.
8	Freitag on that. I just over-nighted
9	that paperwork out. As soon as I get
LO	the okay on that and they release the
L1	financials, I will of course get copies
L2	to the Board, and then I'll try to
L3	schedule it ASAP. I know we're a
L 4	little behind the eight ball time wise.
L5	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. Just
L 6	to let everybody know where we're at
L7	with the process.
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have one
L 9	question, I happened to be going
20	through my checklist, and I see that
21	back in 2013 we signed some intermodal
22	agreement with the Town of Southold for
23	tax preparation, and it's due it
24	ends in 2017. Are we is it time to
25	up it?

1	MR. BRANDT: That's going to be on
2	next month.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I
4	beat you to the punch.
5	MR. BRANDT: Yeah, you're stealing
6	my thunder a little bit. We have to
7	get the property tax stuff underway.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I was just
9	curious, that's all. That was my only
10	question.
11	MR. BRANDT: That was a good one.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you very
13	much. Village Clerk, Sylvia Pirillo.
14	MS. PIRILLO: Good evening,
15	everyone. I have two additional
16	resolution requests, one is regarding
17	scheduling of the public hearing for a
18	wetlands permit application submitted
19	by Brewer Yacht Yard, the second is to
20	direct the CAC to review said
21	application. So those two will appear
22	on Thursday's agenda.
23	Update on the clerk typist
24	position, we as of today have eleven
25	interviews scheduled during two days,

1	the 28th and 29th of December. There
2	may be twelve interviews scheduled for
3	that position.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Good.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.
6	MS. PIRILLO: You're welcome. In
7	addition to those that I've already
8	written in my report that we appreciate
9	for the rec center program that will be
10	held tomorrow night, I'd also like to
11	recognize Heather Walker who provided
12	literally two large bags of hats and
13	gloves for our children, the Cutchogue
14	Lions Club, Bridgehampton National
15	Bank, Trustee Julia Robins, and Mayor
16	and Mrs. Hubbard.
17	In the interest of brevity, any
18	questions?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
20	MS. PIRILLO: Thank you.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. The Village
22	Attorney report.
23	MR. PROKOP: So I have a couple of
24	things I'd like to bring to your
25	attention. With regard to PSEG,

1	there's been a few developments. I now
2	have the first draft of the easement
3	agreement done. There is going to be
4	it's under review, proofreading and
5	review before it's circulated, but it
6	will be circulated very soon. And
7	there also will be a the first time
8	that we tried to do this back in the
9	summer excuse me, the first time
10	that we were talking about doing this,
11	and I was working on it, I visualized
12	one agreement and not the summer, a
13	month ago or so, after speaking with
14	the representatives from PSEG, it looks
15	like it will be two agreements. One
16	will be the actual easement agreement,
17	which will be more of a formal
18	agreement, you know, as your typical
19	easement type of real estate
20	instrument, and the other will be a
21	construction access agreement, which
22	will be more of a business type
23	agreement or business contract between
24	us and PSEG, and again, this is if we
25	come to terms. I'm just we'll

1	I'll put together the agreements with
2	the terms as they've been discussed so
3	far, but then we still really have to
4	wrap things up basically.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Put all the nuts
6	and bolts in place.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Joe, can I ask
8	you a question? Because I've been
9	getting e-mails from some people who
10	live on Fifth Street as some
11	suggestions for the contract. Would
12	you like me to forward them to you?
13	MR. PROKOP: Oh, that would be
14	great. Any comments anybody has, sure.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
16	MR. PROKOP: I'd rather hear them
17	now than later.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's why I'm
19	asking because I received an e-mail
20	today and last week, and I just want to
21	make sure that the residents on Fifth
22	Street are heard and have the
23	opportunity to express their concerns,
24	you know, in the contract.
25	MR. PROKOP: Definitely. That

1	would be great. And copy Paul, please.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think
3	actually I'll copy everybody because
4	it's part of the discussions that we're
5	all going to have.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We're all on
7	the same page.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're all on
9	the same page, and that's what we need
10	to be, and that's where she should be.
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
12	MR. PROKOP: So the way that this
13	has been going so far is after the last
14	meeting, Paul Pallas and I had several
15	days of discussions, and then we spoke
16	also to the representatives of PSEG and
17	got feed back from them. One of the
18	things that's happened in the last
19	just past day or so is that PSEG has
20	made a request that we allow them to do
21	some surveying work on Fifth Street.
22	So that's an outstanding request from
23	PSEG, they, you know, basically poking
24	around, you know, they have the
25	instruments that can find locate our

1	system where it is, and that will be
2	important.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's nice that
4	they asked this time.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it goes
6	back to when they were there before, we
7	told them to get away. Everybody on
8	the road, that lives on the street
9	wants to know is it on the right side,
10	left side, down the middle. This will
11	give the answers, and then we can tell
12	them better exactly where it's going to
13	be dug up on the street and what's
14	going to happen, so that's the way to
15	find out.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We can't sign a
17	contract without a plan, and they need
18	to survey to give us a plan.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Can I just
21	ask, Paul, right, I just want to make
22	sure we're all
23	MR. PALLAS: That's exactly right.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: When the van shows
25	up there again with people using sonar,

1	doing whatever, and everybody doesn't
2	think they're starting to dig, but this
3	is just to move the process along so
4	they can tell us they're going to dig
5	where on the street.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: When they're
7	going to do that, I'm assuming they're
8	going to give us some sort of dates or
9	range?
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I
11	was going to saw, can we at least get
12	an idea?
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We can put
14	that on the website or I mean,
15	something so people know that this is
16	happening.
17	MR. PALLAS: We'll ask them to
18	we'll certainly ask them to provide,
19	you know, schedules for that work.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that
21	would be great because that way we
22	could get it out. We promised
23	communication, we promised to be open
24	about it, and I think that as each time
25	they do something to get the plans to

1	get to the end result, it behooves us
2	to get the information out, and I know
3	a few of us can get it out rather fast.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The easement
5	agreement would be where the trying
6	to think of the big potential snafus.
7	The easement agreement would have to
8	define this as distribution standard
9	only?
10	MR. PROKOP: It does. So one of
11	the paragraphs that I have in
12	normally in an easement agreement, any
13	type of easement, you describe what the
14	easement could be used for and also the
15	limitation. So it might be to, you
16	know, pass and repass, you know,
17	somebody to walk across your property,
18	it could be for a right of way. In
19	this case, what I did is I have a
20	paragraph that limits it says it's
21	for a conduit, which will and this
22	is just my idea, we have to discuss
23	this, as I said, but it would be for a
24	conduit which will contain one
25	distribution line not to exceed 13KV

1	power.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: One live?
3	MR. PROKOP: Yeah, one live. I
4	mean, they want the ability in case
5	something happens with that line to be
6	able to run another line through it,
7	but it would be one live line, right.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's how we
9	quell people's concerns about
10	electromagnetic is that it's only
11	distribution, distribution has been
12	13KV for how many years?
13	MR. PALLAS: On Long Island,
14	forever.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's not likely
16	to go up.
17	MR. PALLAS: It can't, no.
18	MR. PROKOP: They'd have to redo
19	all the equipment.
20	MR. PALLAS: It would be billions
21	of dollars to change it.
22	MR. PROKOP: Yes, it does have
23	that limitation in it, and so far the
24	terms that are terms meaning the
25	term of the agreement, you know, that's

1	another whole section, and the
2	consideration because the first term
3	will be the proposal is for the
4	first term to have a set consideration
5	that we've negotiated, but then after
6	that the next options to have fair
7	market value, so we have to come up
8	with a structure, a means of
9	determining the fair market value each
LO	time. So those are the questions that
L1	I've been dealing with in drafting the
12	agreement. And then, you know, whole
13	harmless, you know, the other things we
L 4	spoke about. As I said, the business
L5	terms will be in this other agreement,
L 6	but the other agreement will be
L7	attached to the easement agreement when
18	it's recorded, when the easement
L9	agreement is recorded, and they'll be
20	contingent on each other. So if
21	there's any problem with the business
22	terms as far as payment or any of the
23	other limitations, then that would be a
24	breach or become a problem with the
25	actual easement. So those are the

	kinds of things we'll be dealing with.
2	Again, I want to get it's not going
3	to be a hundred percent obviously
1	because there's always going to be
5	changes, but I'd like to get it close
5	before we circulate.

MAYOR HUBBARD: The sooner the better you can get it to us so we can review it and go over it to try to get this taken care of. I don't want to drag on this, I want to get something in writing for all of us to see, let the public see as soon as possible.

agreement is going to be the tough one probably between us. It's going to require probably lots of negotiation and probably — I could also see them trying to sneak in there some sort of deferred payment or, you know, in my mind as we've negotiated this, this is, you know, you're going to pay us whether your project works or not, we're getting our money, and we're getting our back-up line, whether you

1	deliver or not. So as long as you're
2	putting something in there where we can
3	if they decide to bail, or if their
4	drill doesn't work, we can go after
5	them to get that back-up cable still
6	installed.
7	MD DDOVOD. Dight And that I

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MR. PROKOP: Right. And that's one of the other considerations with the agreement, the easement agreement, because there's an -- I don't want to grant an easement, we don't want to grant an easement, and then have them abandon that project, the project fails, and then get stuck with an easement. So the whole thing has to be tied up together. And also the technology changes, you know, twenty years from now or seventy years from now we want to get the easement back, we don't want to have their equipment in our roadway if we don't use it anymore.

We have been continuing to have discussions with Habitat For Humanity.

We had committed -- the Village Board

1	had committed to transferring a
2	property, 324 Johnson Court to Habitat
3	For Humanity. Habitat looked at the
4	property after committing to this, and
5	they would like to talk to us about
6	additional an additional piece of
7	property basically to expand the
8	property that they're dealing with. So
9	we need to I'm talking to them about
10	that.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we going
12	have an executive to discuss?
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're going to be
14	having an executive tonight.
15	MR. PROKOP: I think the substance
16	of that should be in executive session.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There's a
18	Counsel matter there that I wanted to
19	ask about.
20	MR. PROKOP: Okay. The North
21	Ferry Company, so I'm getting requests
22	about what the status is of the
23	Attorney General opinion. I did
24	complete the request has been made,
25	it's into the Attorney General. What I

1	did to try to speed it up was I found
2	the person that's actually responsible
3	for this in the Capital Building in
4	Albany. It's actually within a
5	department of the Attorney General, a
6	subdepartment. It's these decisions
7	are actually made by an office called
8	the Solicitor General. The Solicitor
9	General is within the Attorney General,
LO	and then within the Solicitor General
L1	there's another department called
L2	Appeals And Opinions, and I found the
L3	person specifically in that department
L 4	that's responsible for this, and I
L 5	e-mailed the request to them, and we're
L 6	now waiting on that. I think informal
L7	I requested an informal opinion. I
L8	think that informal opinions come in
L 9	two months or less, and formal come in
20	a much longer time, it could be
21	anywhere up to a year for a formal
22	opinion, but I did specify an informal
23	opinion so at least we can start out
24	with something that will come quicker,
25	sooner than we can deal with.

1	With regard to I just wanted to
2	mention something about the parking
3	enforcement. So I've been working
4	closely with Greg Morris now regarding
5	parking, you know, our working together
6	has developed, and, you know, as I say
7	every time, Greg is doing a great job,
8	he's right on top of this and very
9	knowledgeable and technically competent
L 0	also, which is a real pleasure to deal
11	with. What Greg has been doing now is
L2	he started coming to the monthly court
L3	dates we have for our parking calendars
L 4	in the Southold Court. As an example,
L5	this coming Monday, the 19th, we have
L 6	almost fifty parking tickets I think
L7	that are on the calendar. I think it's
L8	twenty-nine people with almost fifty
L9	tickets. And so these are people that
20	received tickets that pleaded not
21	guilty and want to challenge the ticket
22	in Court for a number of reasons, and
23	but it's when I get there, you know,
24	one of the things about this is I'm
25	faced with twenty-nine people, and

1	they're not pleased to be there to
2	begin with, so it's a challenge, but
3	Greg came the last time and was really
4	great. He has all the back-up on every
5	ticket, and somehow he's able to
6	actually recall every single ticket.
7	He has the information there with him,
8	but he's able to recall every single
9	ticket, and it's been a really great
10	it actually makes the experience better
11	for everybody because the people are
12	actually explained to them why they got
13	the ticket, and it's been a lot more
14	efficient.
15	The other thing, speaking to Greg,
16	we do have the FBS management system
17	for our tickets, and there is
18	information that Greg can get out of
19	the system, so we were discussing this
20	today in the Village Hall and with Greg
21	as to try to get management reports
22	that would give us information that
23	would be useful, you know, rather than
24	just the total dollars, other
25	information that might be useful for

1	us. The rest of the things I have are
2	probably for executive session, unless
3	somebody has a question for me.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: The only question
5	I have, Joe, the paperwork to the
6	County for 324 Johnson Court, I sent
7	you the e-mail this morning, we have to
8	give a report to the County by the end
9	of the month.
10	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, that's just a
11	simple letter that I'll try to draft
12	tomorrow.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Is that something
14	you need Joe to help you with?
15	MR. PALLAS: Maybe a question or
16	two when I get to it, but it's just a
17	simple they want to know where it
18	is, and all I'm going to do is
19	basically what was just said, and, you
20	know, we're in the process of
21	transferring to Habitat, that's all
22	they really need.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: The County each
24	year asks for an accounting of any
25	houses that they have put out any

1	property they have put out there for
2	affordable housing. We had gotten a
3	request, and it has to be in by the end
4	of the month. That's where I just want
5	to make sure that you get together with
6	Joe, that it gets out on time and gets
7	back to them so there's no other snafu
8	with this thing. If we've come this
9	far, I don't want to say well, you
10	didn't report it this year, and now
11	it's off or whatever.
12	MR. PALLAS: That will go out.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for
14	Joe?
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you, Joe.
17	Report from committees, the only one we
18	had was Audit Committee met on Monday,
19	we went over different paperwork and
20	everything else working on the cash
21	collection procedure for Mitchell Park
22	for Dances in the Park, also for the
23	skating rink that's about to open and
24	all. Robert is working on getting
25	different cash boxes or a different way

1	of securing money and stuff down at the
2	marina when the staff is not there.
3	That's pretty much all we have from
4	there. We're working on that just to
5	safeguard everything, so that's in the
6	works. Okay. Report from trustees,
7	we'll start with Trustee Martilotta.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. Mine
9	is brief. Continuing to work on that
10	calendar and it's becoming more
11	expansive, but I think it's going to be
12	helpful. My plan is to try and share
13	it with everybody, at least, like, a
14	working copy, a draft copy thereof
15	right after the new year. What I
16	thought was going to be two weeks has
17	turned into six weeks. I'm going to
18	call it quits there at seven, and we're
19	going to send it out to everybody else
20	and see what we have.
21	Thank you for American Legion
22	getting the water main set up.
23	Everybody was super excited about that.
24	And I wanted to also make sure I thank
25	my kids are still talking about

1	pulling the lever to turn on the
2	lights.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Glad they enjoyed
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: They did.
5	They're pretty convinced the reason it
6	runs is because of them. Also, I
7	apologize for being late. My son had,
8	like, Little Tykes wrestling, which is
9	ridiculously awesome, however, getting
10	a young man in sweat pants and in the
11	car on a twenty degree day and back to
12	Greenport
13	MR. PROKOP: What's his weight
14	class, forty pounds?
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It proved to
16	be a bridge too far by 7:00, and I
17	apologize. That's all I have this
18	month, sir.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
20	Trustee Roberts?
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks. Couple
22	of walk on things that have happened
23	since the report. Well, this is I
24	forgot to put in, I wanted to ask you
25	to approve the a cappella festival for

next spring again, May 6th with a rain
date of May 7th, just get that on the
calendar, so I can start fundraising.
Hopefully we can vote on that next
week.

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I think everyone has read about the Bay to Sound grant or the Bay to Sound trail, phase two, that John Stepnoski at the Town got. Thank you all for supporting that when I brought it to you, whenever that was, a year ago. I want to point out, though, that they got that funding through the CFA, which is that big grant, you know, monstrosity that happens in July, and he was, you know, so that's how they got that project funded, so I hope we have -- I know we have less horses than the Town, but I hope we've got a plan in place to put in an application for some of the projects around here for CFA. So this is the wake up call now, I think, we've got six months until that is due in July. Anyway, great project, thank you for your support.

1	John Stepnoski asked if he could or
2	he and I were talking about him coming
3	and just sort of giving us a quick
4	overview at next week's meeting. Mayor
5	said offline that that would be all
6	right, so he'll come next week and just
7	tell us what he's working on and what
8	the funding is going to go for. It's
9	mostly clean up right now. They didn't
10	get all the funding they wanted, but
11	basically for free they're going to
12	haul some of the trash out of the park,
13	which is great, out of the wetlands.
14	There are many more phases to it, so
15	we'll just sort of, I guess, continue
16	to support. They need something, they
17	need language from us, they need a
18	resolution I think. They need us to
19	we have to look at his e-mail. Did you

MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it's just a repeat of what we had before. We had done that when they originally started the program. Look at the e-mails, if it's something that has to be by a Board resolution, that's fine. We already committed to say we want to go back, get the project moving again, so they already have that. If they need something else, talk to --

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, we should just read the fine print there and make sure. We talked about Habitat, so we don't need to bring that up.

I attended the -- just sort of
because I was curious about it both as
an elected official and just as a
human, the Plum Island Preservation
meeting hosted by the Save the Sound, I
don't know if that's the exact name of
the group, but there were a bunch of
town people there and County and, you

1	know, water quality people and nature
2	conservancy. Fascinated that Sam
3	Waterston narrated a ten minute short
4	film about Plum Island just about
5	and these guys are trying desperately
6	to keep it preserved for either
7	education research or parkland. So
8	Plum Island is not part of our
9	jurisdiction, but it is ten miles away,
10	and, you know, we certainly have an
11	interest in making sure that that
12	remains something good and safe. So I
13	just asked the people who run it, you
14	know, the Village is not we have no
15	governance over it, but would it be
16	helpful if a Village nearby had some
17	sort of statement that we support
18	efforts to preserve, and they said
19	absolutely, they'll take anything they
20	can get. So they're trying to sort of
21	just drum up regional support, so I
22	thought maybe we could have some sort
23	of letter from us that says, you know,
24	we support the efforts to preserve Plum
25	Island. Basically the idea is these

1	guys are trying to keep it from getting
2	turned into a golf course or, you know,
3	resort, hotel, et cetera. So I don't
4	know exactly I don't know exactly
5	what the next step is, but assuming
6	that there is consensus on this Board
7	to preserve Plum Island, it would be a
8	good thing if we could send a letter.
9	I think we'd send it to all our
10	elected, to senators and congress
11	people and all that stuff.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do we already
13	know how the Town of Southold Board
14	feels on that?
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, they were
16	all there urging.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know. But
18	have they given an official I think
19	that before we do anything, I think we
20	need to see how they have worded
21	their
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure. Ask them
23	what we can do to help their efforts,
24	but they were all there, rah, rah,
25	preservation. They also zoned it.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know it's
2	been rezoned.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So they were all
4	calling for all the help they could
5	get.
6	So into my actual report, don't
7	need to go through all of it, you can
8	read it, some stuff not really for
9	action. Pleased that we're moving
LO	forward on Clerk of the Boards for
11	Building Department. I worry about the
L2	spring rush.
L3	Number three, I'd like to call
4	your attention to it. So I've been
L5	just doing some research about hearing
L 6	a lot from folks in Town about the
L7	traffic concerns as we have a couple of
L8	new projects going up at Third and
L 9	Front, you know, one of our more
20	complex traffic and parking areas.
21	Then now the Legion Hall is going to
22	start getting used soon, and who knows
23	what's going to happen at the old
24	Chatter Pot/Blue Canoe site, so there's
25	more activity happening there. It

1	comes back to us, you know, I think a
2	much larger muni might have someone sit
3	down and do a sort of civil engineering
4	planning study of how traffic should
5	flow, and on top of that we've got a
6	transit site, the MTA site there that
7	is underutilized. There's no structure
8	on it, it's not paved, we have a
9	parking problem, and there are parking
10	we leave parking spots on the table
11	there. We've all talked about all this
12	stuff a lot. So I started trying to
13	figure out is there someone who could
14	help us with this. So it turns out the
15	Regional Planning Association has been
16	helping other villages and towns with
17	their transit oriented and their
18	traffic congestion issues, and it's all
19	funded by the Suffolk County IDA. So I
20	just called the people I know at the
21	County and said can you guys help us
22	with this, we're a tiny village, blah,
23	blah, blah, and they said yes. I ended
24	up getting to the Deputy Executive
25	Director of the IDA up in Huntington,

1	Kelly Morris, who said send us a
2	letter. Each year over the last
3	several years we voted to fund, you
4	know, about a hundred thousand dollars
5	or two hundred thousand dollars worth
6	of planning services to smaller munis,
7	the most recent of which was
8	Amityville, and if you go research the
9	Amityville project, I sent everyone the
LO	link, it's a huge document, but, you
L1	know, they're doing the work that
12	IDA funded there is going to
13	significantly improve the area around
L 4	their train station. And so while our
15	train station it's more of a at this
L 6	point, its huge value to us is that it
L7	gets tourists in and out of here during
L8	the heavy months without bringing more
19	cars, and so we should try to milk that
20	as much as we can because it's good for
21	all of us, environment, community, et
22	cetera. So the short story is if we
23	send a letter, it's likely that this
24	program will get funded again, so if we
25	send a letter asking for help and

1	explaining what we think our concerns
2	are and where we need help, that we
3	could be in position to get a grant
4	that would fund a full kind of plan,
5	not a study where we go out and we talk
6	to people and ask them what they think
7	about this and that, I think we've done
8	a lot of that honestly. This is an
9	actual plan that we can take to the CFA
10	and say okay, here is our plan, it's
11	quote, unquote shovel ready, now we
12	need funding to do A, B, C, or D. A
13	lot of us have come up with solutions.
14	Mayor, you proposed a traffic reroute
15	on Wiggins because I think you were
16	trying to help solve the same problem.
17	We've got this great committee of
18	people with Ron Nelson who have tried
19	to figure out. So we're all trying to
20	come up with a solution. Let's none
21	of us is a civil engineer, so let's see
22	if we can get some people who do this
23	and get it done without any impact on
24	taxpayers. So I'm just asking that we
25	send this letter, probably requires

1	Paul or Darryl just to sort of apply
2	some sort of technical information to
3	the ask, and I sent a sample of
4	Amityville's letter that got funded, so
5	we just need to make it more Greenport
6	centric because what they're doing in
7	Amityville is not for us, but the idea
8	is that they could do something based
9	on and this Board could be the
10	mouthpiece of the people in that
11	setting. Any issues with that?
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Work on a
13	letter, send it around, let everybody
14	review it, and get
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have one
16	question on it, Doug. You mentioned
17	the whole area of the railroad and
18	Third Street. Are you talking about
19	the whole Village as a whole with
20	traffic, or are you just talking about
21	that one concentrated area?
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This funding
23	opportunity as I understand it would be
24	related to the transit hub.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I

1	wanted to know. All right. Okay.
2	Because there also has been much
3	discussion about where we need to be
4	ten, twenty years from now downtown,
5	and that's why I'm asking because you
6	don't want to have we have to throw
7	out a lot of ideas to get money to help
8	develop some of the changes that we
9	need to make for quality of life. I
10	just want to make sure that I'm clear
11	that you're talking about down in that
12	area only, correct?
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: As I understand
14	it, that's what IDA will fund. We need
15	planning work for the whole Village.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know we do.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: LWRP is I don't
18	even know where, but that could happen
19	in parallel to this.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was my
21	question.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: We also have to
23	look because we got the other grant
24	that we're working on the from the
25	State similar to what's going on down

1	there, the one through Ron Nelson's
2	group from Gene, from New York State,
3	the money that was for Mitchell Park,
4	they're doing that down there. We
5	don't want to do double the work to get
6	to the same point. So look at what's
7	involved and what we're requesting from
8	Gene from the State on the other grant
9	left over from the ferry terminal for
10	Mitchell Park. That was 324,000
11	dollars that was left over.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I think that
13	could fund the work.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the first
15	part was for a study. I just want to
16	make sure we're not
17	MR. PALLAS: Duplicating, yes.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Two different
19	groups trying to do two different
20	things, two different answers, and
21	they're not compatible. So I'll make
22	sure we're staying on the same path
23	with where we're trying to go. Look at
24	Gene's paperwork, what you got there,
25	try to put together I mean, the more

1	money we could get to try to do
2	something, that's fine, but we don't
3	want them going in different directions
4	and have two plans
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You don't want
6	competing projects. That's why I
7	asked.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Double check the
9	paperwork that we have with the State
10	and a letter with this, and try to
11	coordinate them together so our letter
12	that we sent to the State on the other
13	grant, similar wording to that that
14	we'll work on the same thing if we get
15	more help, a different set of eyes on
16	the same project, that wouldn't be bad.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or maybe we can
18	get RPA to help us in a different part
19	of the Village or help with different
20	aspects of what we're doing, I don't
21	know.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think it's a
23	great opportunity, and there's a lot to
24	discuss, and I think we need to talk
25	about it so we're not going in

1	different directions.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I was going to
4	state it later, but I think we as a
5	Board need now to kind of come to a
6	decision of where we a lot of people
7	are talking about the quality of life,
8	and it's not just the business
9	district, it's the residential district
10	in the summer time, and, you know, we
11	want our youth to stay, we want to keep
12	the Village vibrant, and we want a
13	community, and I think that's part of
14	what we as a Board need to start
15	thinking some policy decisions.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Agreed. I mean,
17	we've been dancing around short term
18	rentals, which is part of that.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We've been
20	dancing around a lot of things.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So yeah,
22	agreement. My next thing is I just
23	want to update everybody on the we
24	talked last month about the One
25	Greenport group. I've just been really

1	kind of humbled and energized by this
2	group of folks that's come together.
3	It's exciting. I want to thank
4	everybody, I want to thank you guys for
5	sort of being open to hearing from
6	them. So at this point I gave you the
7	mission statement that folks have
8	drafted, that's the major
9	accomplishment. I think next month
10	we'll have more specifics. We're
11	meeting once a month, second Tuesday at
12	8:00 a.m. at my office if anybody wants
13	to join. So there are a lot of kind of
14	there are a lot of little things
15	happening in town to help the immigrant
16	community, and the group has been very
17	clear that they want to help bring
18	everyone together, both people who have
19	lived here for thirteen generations,
20	and people who have been here for two
21	generations, and people who just came
22	here, and it doesn't matter where
23	people came from, they want it to be
24	about unity. However, there's also an
25	acknowledgment that one-third of the

1	Village are Latino people, so there's
2	sort of an emphasis there but not at
3	the exclusion of other people. So
4	they've made that that's been part
5	of the discussion. So far the group
6	so there have been people who said I'm
7	going I've got an attorney who could
8	come and help give, you know, pro bono
9	legal advice around immigration issues
LO	on Saturdays, and then others have said
11	oh, we're doing this kind of an
L2	education event, you know, at our
L3	church. So then the school, David
L 4	Gamburg has been participating and
L5	sharing, so there are a lot of little
L 6	things happening, and the idea is to
L 7	sort of help everybody know what
L8	services and help is out there, get the
L 9	Village involved so that we can help
20	communicate out and sort of be a place
21	for people to get assistance if they
22	need it. So it's mostly about
23	communication, they do want to have an
24	event this probably in June, so I'll
25	have more details next month, but on a

1	Saturday have a sort of cultural
2	festival, food, music, dancing in the
3	park, and all that stuff. So I'll have
4	more details next month to make a
5	formal ask of you, so that's sort of
6	where that is, but great group, and
7	anybody is welcome to join us.
8	I wanted to ask I think this is
9	the time of year to start thinking
10	about next summer, so I think so we did
11	some good work on sandwich board signs.
12	I think you made a bold sort of
13	pronouncement, Mr. Mayor, that okay,
14	we're going to start enforcing the
15	code. First, you asked everybody do
16	you have any suggestions for the code?
17	Not getting any, you went and enforced
18	it, and our sidewalks are clear for
19	people to walk through. So I wanted to
20	sort of throw out there that this is
21	the time to do that about the trash
22	problem for next summer. None of us
23	are thinking about it now because it's
24	cold and there aren't a lot of people
25	downtown but

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm
2	thinking about it.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So I
4	want to propose that we use the same
5	that worked, so maybe let's try it
6	again. BID is thinking about it, I was
7	at their meeting today, and they're
8	talking about they've been working
9	with Paul on getting new trash
10	receptacles, which is great, but these
11	dumpsters are the real issue. If you
12	go other places, I was up in Huntington
13	seeing my sister last week, and you
14	see, you know, people lock their
15	dumpsters so that not anybody can dump
16	into them, like, that's a thing that
17	people do in other places, so I don't
18	think it's it doesn't change the
19	character of our Village to ask people
20	to because we do have the law that
21	you're supposed to, you know, not have
22	that thing be overflowed. So I'd love
23	to see us make that an effort for this
24	year so that maybe next summer things
25	are little cleaner down there.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just an update,
2	the BID, I did ask the BID to give me
3	input on dumpsters when I went to visit
4	them two months ago. I haven't heard
5	from them. I will try to catch up. I
6	did some homework with other towns,
7	some of them are extremely complicated
8	when it comes to dumpsters, and some
9	are very simple. Some of them are just
LO	requiring screening around it, you
L1	know, some type of screening so that
L2	it's not visible, if they're visible to
L3	the streets. From one who has locked
L 4	dumpsters before, people still put it
L5	on top of the dumpster, so I understand
L 6	where you're coming from, but I think
L 7	we need to get some type of screening,
L8	and we need to get some of them that
L 9	are on Village sidewalks off the
20	Village sidewalks. I think the BID
21	needs to discuss among their own
22	business members who have issues with
23	garbage. I think they need to kind of
24	come back and say look, we're going to
25	work I understand the cans, that's a

1	great thought, but they do some of
2	them do have dumpster issues, and they
3	either need to make a policy among
4	themselves to have trash pickup more
5	than just once a week, which I don't
6	think that's something we can
7	legislate, so I think it has to be an
8	enforcement issue.
9	MR. PROKOP: The Planning Board
10	often when they have applications, they
11	come up with some discussion about
12	that. You know, many of the dumpsters
13	are shared already, and one of the
14	issues now that we have that I'm
15	working with the Village on regarding
16	dumpsters is that the collection is
17	about two or three hours before the
18	time that it's supposed to be. We have
19	in our law that collection of dumpsters
20	can't be before a certain time, and the
21	company that's doing it is coming
22	around about two or three hours before
23	that time.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They're trying

to beat the traffic, that's what part

25

1	of the problem is.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: 4:00 in the
3	morning compared to 7:00 in the morning
4	is a big difference.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Maybe we need to
6	think about a compromise during the
7	summer months to it's just a thought
8	that maybe we need to come up with a
9	compromise that during certain months,
10	you can come earlier because if that
11	gets it cleaner, I think that would be
12	an improvement people would support.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think the 7:00
14	in the morning timeframe is fine,
15	doesn't have to be earlier than that.
16	It's more the restaurants that are
17	really busy have one dumpster, and it's
18	overflowing by 6:00 in the evening, and
19	then it looks like crap afterwards.
20	Paul, if you could make a copy of our
21	code, which says the rules on dumpsters
22	with them being screened and everything
23	else, make a copy of that, and send it
24	to the BID, and have them send it out
25	to their people that way they know

1 what's actually on the code so when we

2	go to enforce it they can't say they
3	didn't know what the code was to make
4	that clear. Some places are going to
5	be issues. I know on the back of Adams
6	Street, the restaurants that are in the
7	front, they have no property to put a
8	dumpster on, that's why they're on the
9	sidewalk behind that whole row of
10	stores there. But if we move them over
11	into the parking lot and off the
12	sidewalk into the IGA parking lot or
13	did something else to try to make it an
14	area, they have to walk an extra twenty
15	feet over to the side, we'll get it
16	fenced in or something so it's not as
17	obvious with everything right there,
18	you know. Those other couple of
19	restaurants, they have no place for
20	them.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the other
22	thing, and I did mention it, as a
23	business, that is the cost of doing
24	business, and they need to take a
25	little pride in understanding that it's

1	not just the business community that's
2	looking at these dumpsters, it's our
3	residential community, and that was
4	what was getting a little irritating
5	over the summer. The residents that
6	wanted to walk around, it's their
7	Village, they want to go to stores,
8	they want to go to restaurants, but if
9	you park behind Adams Street and try to
10	cut across, some of the dumpster
11	situation is pretty and the animal,
12	that's the other thing that concerns me
13	is the animal, you know.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's not good
15	for tourism to have trash everywhere.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, it's not.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: We've got five
18	dumpsters lined up by the marina
19	office, does not look very well.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, no, we
21	have to get ours in order too.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: The whole area
23	should be fenced around it. It's going
24	to be harder for the garbage companies.
25	Make a copy of the code, let's get it

out to all the stores, ands there's
certain homeowners that have dumpsters
now all the time. Everybody that has a
dumpster, let them know about it.

MR. PROKOP: We did have a meeting last week about the dumpsters. One of the times I was in the Village Hall, we did have a quick meeting about the dumpster issue, Eileen, Greg, Paul and I, and we did think that we came up with a resolution or a plan, but definitely that's a good idea, I'll work with Paul.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just another

thought on that as we -- I'm not ready

to push for this, but as we -- we get

so many visitors in the summer, many of

whom don't understand that they're

coming to a community where people

live, and so, you know, I see it all

the time in West Dublin, it's, like,

they put their -- they're gone for the

weekend, they just put their trash in

the street thinking someone will come

and deal with it. And so, you know, we

1	may think about either I don't think
2	it's fair to ask the taxpayers to pick
3	up vacationers trash, but, you know,
4	there may be some sort of back to short
5	term rentals in the code I proposed I
6	put something in there where the
7	landlord has to tell the tenant here's
8	what you do with your trash, but maybe
9	there's some sort of way to work with
10	BID on a pay to play service where if
11	you're visiting, you can access some of
12	these trash removal services. But I
13	don't want to neglect the residential
14	districts because we also feel it there
15	with visitors because, you know, in
16	some places, like, in Brooklyn, you can
17	just put your stuff in the street and
18	someone will eventually take it, but
19	that isn't the case here.
20	Paul, does Harry Monroe, our
21	campground guy, is he the kind of
22	person who could write a grant?
23	MR. PALLAS: I honestly don't
24	know. I don't think so, but I could
25	talk with him. We generally don't have

1	him do any work over the winter so
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, I would
3	imagine does he have another job?
4	MR. PALLAS: No, I don't believe
5	so. I believe he's retired.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I see the
7	campground as one of the highest
8	profitable it is on paper one of the
9	highest profitable things we do, it's a
10	small number, but profitable is good.
11	So if there's a way there's been
12	talk about expanding that campground
13	for years, I'd love to see us really
14	explore that. I don't think it would
15	be a big grant that we'd need. There's
16	probably twenty thousand dollars out
17	there somewhere to put even five more
18	camp sites, that's more revenue for us.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, did you
20	ever pull up the original
21	MR. PALLAS: I didn't have an
22	opportunity, but that was a bigger
23	expansion. I think for a smaller one
24	like that, I think he actually came up
25	with an idea on his own that we could

1	probably do most of it in-house. You
2	know, just again, I haven't had a
3	chance given the time of year. It was
4	brought to me as he was leaving, so
5	I'll revisit that. That's something
6	that we can do short term, and look for
7	grants for the larger expansion, I'll
8	have to find that paperwork.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There was a lot
10	of work that went into that, and it's
11	it could be one of those things that
12	we could present with not too much of a
13	problem.
14	MR. PALLAS: Yes, I'll take a
15	look.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. If
17	the Board switching gears to the
18	youth boat and sailing program. If I
19	if the Village and the Board can
20	support with staff taking care of
21	boats, I've got enough between
22	talking with the new president, the
23	incoming president of the Seaport
24	Museum, Arlene Klein, and some of their
25	other volunteers, and a couple of other

1	people in town, there's momentum behind
2	having a program this summer where kids
3	get on boats, either kayaks or
4	sailboats, and I think we can find the
5	funding to buy four or five of these
6	little opti's. There are people
7	when they're used they're traded for
8	hundreds, not thousands of dollars,
9	they're tiny little boats. The thing
10	that would concern me is just that if
11	we don't we wouldn't want to make
12	that investment and then neglect it
13	because A, we'd have five boats we'd
14	have to deal with, and B, it would be a
15	shame. So if we can find a way in our
16	current staffing to find a few hours
17	person hours a week of someone to kind
18	of maintain these little boats with the
19	volunteer sort of coaching one of our
20	staff people how to do that, if I can
21	get at least that commitment last
22	month I asked for a halftime staff
23	person to kind of oversee rec sports,
24	which I still would love to see, but
25	this I think I could get enough

1	volunteers that if we can get, you
2	know, let's call it four hours a week
3	of someone to just make sure these
4	boats are in tiptop shape, I think I
5	can marshal volunteers plus Seaport
6	Museum. And I believe that the Seaport
7	Museum management agreement with us
8	expressly requires them to help us with
9	these kinds of projects and vice versa,
10	that's sort of the way it's supposed to
11	work, and we're not doing enough of it.
12	They've got new leadership there, and
13	I'm interested to see if we could make
14	this work. They could serve as sort of
15	the clubhouse, and you've got a great
16	spot there in Tuthill Park where kids
17	could hang out and have lunch, and we
18	have the visitors dock, which on
19	weekdays is not so full, and we're not
20	charging anybody anyway, so let's use
21	it for our kids instead of I mean, a
22	tourist can find a spot over where they
23	pay. If we can do that, I think I can
24	make this I don't want to go marshal
25	the volunteers and all that and then

1	find that the Village can't support it.
2	There's also insurance questions.
3	MR. PALLAS: If I way, in addition
4	to the insurance, which I think may
5	turn out to be relatively significant,
6	there was having our camp kids go to
7	something like that with regard to our
8	annual permit to run the camp, my
9	memory was that we looked at this
LO	briefly, and it was kind of a really
L1	big deal, and the requirements were
L2	pretty strict as to personnel that
13	would be doing the sailing instruction,
L 4	if you will. I can't recall all the
L5	specifics, but I do remember that there
L 6	was nothing we could do short term, and
L7	the qualifications had to be very high
L8	level qualifications in terms of water
L 9	safety and things like that. I would
20	want to look I would like to look at
21	that first to see if just to pass
22	the feasibility threshold before you go
23	any further.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: In fairness, I
25	think we were looking at it in May or

1	June, and we said well, we can't do it
2	this year, so I'm asking that we take a
3	look and
4	MR. PALLAS: I'll revisit what the
5	requirements I'll have Margot
6	contact the County and find out what
7	the requirements would be, and I'll
8	pass that along.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because another
10	option could be that we outsource this
11	to some other organization that could
12	deal with all that. The point is that
13	I think I've got people in town who
14	there's momentum behind wanting to help
15	local kids get on boats, so let's work
16	together, and but if you help me
17	figure out how to do it so that we're
18	covered insurance wise and that we're
19	covered staff wise, I'll go and get the
20	other stuff to happen.
21	Monday night Dances, I want to
22	propose something a little bit radical,
23	but that I think will improve the
24	overall program and help it last into

25

the future regardless of any potential

1	changes in volunteers. I want to
2	propose that we do as we do for Tall
3	Ships and as Seaport Museum does for
4	Maritime and outsource the Monday night
5	festival still under the direction of
6	this Board, but put out an RFP for
7	someone to put on ten Monday night
8	concerts, and one of the challenges we
9	had is that because it's all public
10	record because right now the way it
11	works is that Village contracts with
12	ten individual entities, each band, and
13	so it's all public record, and so one
14	band can see what another band is
15	getting paid, and some bands have been
16	really gracious and offered us deep
17	discounts because they love playing
18	here, but then another band sees that
19	and says well, how come those guys are
20	it creates an awkward situation, not
21	to mention that then our clerk's office
22	has to deal with ten different bands,
23	sometimes some of the bands don't have
24	sort of proper mailing addresses,
25	right, you guys have to track them

1	down. I would love to streamline the
2	process, put out an RFP to get an
3	entity that we trust to put on a
4	festival for a proposed that would X
5	dollars, and then, you know, we
6	interview, we, you know, screen the
7	potential entities to do this, we write
8	one check to that entity, and we have a
9	contract in place that there will be
10	music every Monday night at 7:30, and
11	then everything will otherwise you
12	know, they would deal with getting
13	sound and all of that stuff, so I don't
14	think there would be any the people
15	coming to the concerts won't notice a
16	difference. I think we'll save time
17	and money, and we'll make sure that the
18	program can continue to be great.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know, can
20	we legally do that, Joe, to hire
21	somebody else to go
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We already do.
23	Like, at Tall Ships, that's what we do,
24	we hire one
25	MS. PIRILLO: At Tall Ships though

1	we enter into individual contracts with
2	the ships as well.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm talking
4	about the music only, I'm sorry, the
5	music. Like, at the Tall Ships, the
6	music we hired one
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: She was an event
8	coordinator for the three days of the
9	event.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. But the
11	music was outsourced to one person who
12	booked all of the and I believe
13	that's what Seaport does with Maritime.
14	MR. PROKOP: You know, I'd have to
15	look into it. I don't want to say yes
16	or no, you know, I'd like to
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: I just
18	MR. PROKOP: develop it and
19	then see
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: I have a
21	reservation just saying we budget
22	eighteen thousand dollars, here's the
23	eighteen thousand, you do what you want
24	as long as we have music. We kind of
25	lose all control of what's going on on

1	Village property, everything that's
2	happening because this person is in
3	charge of the whole thing.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So yeah, that's
5	a good concern, and I would have that
6	as well. So the idea we would
7	stipulate in the RFP you're going to
8	have to report to the Board and tell us
9	what you're planning to do. You know,
10	we would have it's like any project,
11	it's like when we hire think of it
12	like you hire someone to put in
13	we're going to hire someone at some
14	point hopefully to put in a sewer main
15	under Stirling Creek over to Sandy
16	Beach, right, so we're going to pay
17	those people a payment, and then
18	they're going to do part of the work,
19	and Paul and his team are going to
20	review and make sure it looks good, and
21	then we're going to pay them the next
22	payment. We're not going to be sort of
23	then they're going to hire maybe
24	some subcontractors, one person to
25	drill, and one shop to lay the pipe,

1	and we're not going to be managing all
2	those individual subcontractors, that's
3	sort of how I'm thinking of it.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'm just
5	how if we set a price at something,
6	and they shortcut on the sound or
7	shortcut on a band or whatever, they
8	could end up making a ton of money, and
9	we don't get what we're looking for
LO	because we don't have control over it.
L1	That's a concern. We look at the
L2	contracts and everything else
L3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fire them.
L 4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, you fire
15	them, but you're already half way into
L 6	the season, and you don't know what
L7	you're getting for it. Right now, yes,
L8	we hire the bands and the sound guy, we
L 9	take care of that stuff all in-house.
20	If we just say the budget for this is
21	going to be twenty grand, here's the
22	twenty grand, you hire the music and
23	everything else, we're losing control
24	over it, and this person could end up
25	making five, ten thousand dollars

1	themselves and hire cheaper bands, less
2	quality of stuff, less quality of sound
3	or whatever, and we've already got them
4	hired for a season. I just have
5	concerns about that, that's all.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think also in
7	taking your analogy of a contractor,
8	the contractor pays everything out
9	first and then gets reimbursed with his
LO	billing. I don't think that's what
L1	you're trying to drive at is that this
12	person would pay for the bands first
13	and then come back and ask us for
L 4	reimbursement?
L5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No, I'm
L 6	suggesting
L7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're
L8	suggesting giving them a budget.
L 9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We contract with
20	an entity who then provides a festival
21	that is basically so that there's very
22	little paperwork that needs to get
23	managed here, and so that the person
24	can then so that the entity doesn't
25	have to so each band is hired

1	individually and they don't have to
2	sort of know what each
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Has there been
4	complaints between the bands as to the
5	amount of money?
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm
8	getting at. Okay. I'm not hearing
9	that, this is the first I've heard
10	about it. I mean, I know, I've seen
11	the contracts, but has there been an
12	issue of discrepancy between this band
13	got paid more than I did?
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, yeah.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the first
17	we've heard of that.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I was trying to
19	sort of
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's all
21	right. I'm being blunt tonight.
22	That's another issue.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We can continue,
24	but I'm worried that then we might get
25	a race to the, you know, I'm not doing

1	it if you're not going to pay me this.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think
3	the other thing is Dances in the Park
4	has become so popular that I think that
5	we as a Village Board have the
6	opportunity to say well, you've got
7	exposure that you're not going to get
8	someplace else with your band. You
9	know, they're negotiating these prices,
10	correct, are they not, the price is
11	negotiated before they sign the
12	contracts?
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah,
14	individually.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Individually.
16	So I mean, that's just being in
17	business. I don't know what else to
18	say. I see where you're coming from,
19	okay, and I think that the complaints
20	between the bands, that's an issue,
21	especially since we're a public entity
22	and all of their contracts are actually
23	public documents once they are signed,
24	but I also understand where George is
25	coming from. We could hire somebody,

1	and as much as we're taking checks and
2	balances on Monday, we could all of a
3	sudden have a Monday Dances in the Park
4	and no band show up because there was a
5	dispute between the event coordinator
6	and the band. Do you understand what
7	I'm saying?
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's why you
9	got to put out an RFP and find the best
10	that could happen with any project.
11	MR. PROKOP: That's a good point.
12	I'm trying to think of how this would
13	fall together, but one of the things
14	that happens is the Village Clerk
15	spends a lot of time with these and
16	Paul with these contracts as they're
17	coming to be, not just money, there's
18	so many other things, you know, the
19	people come up with the bands come
20	up with last minute requests, and then
21	there's issues that come up, and, you
22	know, we have to work.

MAYOR HUBBARD: No, there is. We have a very well sponsored event with a lot of donations from business owners

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1	and people downtown and other stuff
2	like that. I think to alienate them
3	that we're taking control over it, and
4	we have a firm from Huntington that's
5	down here running our dances and lose
6	the sponsorship money that we're
7	getting
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Why would we? I
9	don't see why that would change. We
10	still have to pay for the festival,
11	right, so we're taking donations. This
12	is still sponsored by A, B, C, D
13	sponsors, and so it becomes it gets
14	revenue neutral to the public. That
15	continues, it's just all I'm
16	suggesting is that we take the
17	paperwork portion and outsource it.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: If somebody is
19	just doing the paperwork, fine. I
20	don't feel comfortable saying if the
21	budget is eighteen thousand dollars,
22	here's the eighteen thousand, make sure
23	we have music. I'm not comfortable
24	with that myself.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we can pay

1	them, you know, the way NFL players get
2	paid. You know, concert, here's one
3	tenth of your number. Concert, here's
4	one tenth of your number, and we can
5	write the terms any way we like. You
6	know, we terminate if we don't find
7	these elements are there. I think what
8	you would find is that you would end up
9	with just as much control as we have
LO	now. The way it works now is that
L1	there used to be a committee of people
12	who did this, there's now one volunteer
13	who does the work and we're all
L 4	grateful for it, but what if the
L5	volunteer decides she doesn't want to
L 6	do it, what if things change, what if
L7	other people want to get involved, it's
L8	right now what we have, we have a
L 9	system driven by one volunteer, and I'm
20	worried about the back up plans there
21	for the future. This may not be the
22	year to do it. At some point I think
23	that the Village is going to either
24	have to bring it in-house and have a
25	staff person just run it, which that

might be the way the Board wants to go
or outsource it. I'm just worried
about where we are now, but we could go
another year, and it will probably be
great.

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And if the bands MAYOR HUBBARD: have concerns, hopefully all the bands will lower the prices down to get the exposure and they'll all go for the same amount. I know last year we turned away several bands that wanted to come and play and offered a cheap price, I don't know exactly the quality of who they are and all, I just know we received four or five e-mails after we had already set the schedule, well, we wanted to be on, how do we get in on this, we can never get in. So those people that are begging to get in, you're probably going to get quality music, you might get a better price from them instead of overpaying the ones that are complaining that they're not getting enough.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And my point in

1	that is that we currently I don't
2	believe have any effective control over
3	who gets chosen for the festival, so
4	that wouldn't change, right? All the
5	e-mails come in, and it's not, like,
6	you know, none of us takes steps in and
7	says oh, it must be, you know, you've
8	got to hire this band. It just sort of
9	happens, and it's great.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, Diane takes
11	care of it, she does a great job of it.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And so I don't
13	think there would be any effective
14	change, we would just remove the
15	paperwork from our plates. I think we
16	could have the potential to make it a
17	more revenue positive event than it is
18	now. Sounds like people are a little
19	uncomfortable, why don't we just think
20	about it? It's early.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's it for
23	me. Thank you very much.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
25	Trustee Phillips?

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just going
2	to ask for a very strange request, one
3	of them is recently in the news we've
4	all been hearing the stories of fish
5	die off of the bunkers, it happened in
6	Hampton Bays and a lot of other areas
7	in the east end in the past few years.
8	The Village of Greenport has been
9	fortunate that the menhaden or bunker
10	stock that arrives in Stirling Harbor
11	and creek area, and they do, I've got
12	pictures of them swirling around up and
13	down the whole creek, it's like a
14	track, have found their way out of
15	Stirling Creek without a problem, but
16	at some point we're going to have a
17	potential for an episode, it could very
18	possibly happen, and cleaning it up, a
19	fish die off is expensive and kind of
20	disruptive to the quality of life
21	because it's pretty awful. Anyway, the
22	at Atlantic States Fisher's Commission
23	has currently issued a public
24	information document for amendment 3 to
25	the interstate fishing management plan

1	for Atlantic menhaden. According to
2	National Fisheries Services on Data
3	Collection, the fish stock is neither
4	overfished or in trouble, but due to
5	the fisheries management plan, the
6	State of New York technically got the
7	short end of the quota amount that is
8	shared by all the states on the
9	Atlantic seaboard. I would like to
10	work with the Village Administrator or
11	whoever to create a letter of support
12	for increasing the harvest amount for
13	the New York commercial fishermen to be
14	sent to the Atlantic States Fishery
15	Commission, Governor Cuomo, and New
16	York State Commissioner of the DEC
17	because they're the ones that have to
18	go to effectively go to Atlantic
19	States and continue pressuring so that
20	our New York fishermen can get a bigger
21	portion of the quota. Part of the
22	problem that's happening with it is
23	that because they have decreased the
24	amount of fish, or menhaden, or bunker
25	that the trap fishermen or the

1	commercial fishermen can catch, the
2	stock has rebounded so much that we've
3	got they get caught up into certain
4	areas, and one of these days we're
5	going to get caught. Stirling Creek,
6	what happens is they come in when they
7	get chased by the blue fish and the
8	striped bass, they come in, they circle
9	all the way down to the end where
LO	Brewer's has their second smaller boat
11	on Manhassett Avenue. Their schools
L2	swirl around in there, they swirl
L3	around in they're actually all over
L 4	the place because the striped bass and
L5	the blue fish come into the creek. One
L 6	of these days we're going to get
L7	caught. I'd like to get an
18	opportunity, January 4th the comment
19	period ends, I would just like to get a
20	letter from the Board and Mayor stating
21	that we support getting a bigger quota
22	for the commercial fishermen. That's
23	all, that's one of the things.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: I can tell you
25	that at the East End Mayors and

1	Supervisors meeting yesterday, Sean
2	Walter brought this up along with Larry
3	Cantwell from East Hampton Town, and
4	that organization is sending a letter
5	in asking to have the quota raised.
6	It's due by January 5th, I believe, and
7	our association is sending a letter in
8	to increase the quota for New York
9	State.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As the Village
11	of Greenport used to be a big bunker
12	harvesting port and because most of the
13	commercial fishermen are either on the
14	Montauk side or the Hampton Bays side
15	or the Greenport side, I just think it
16	would also help if we went a letter in
17	also.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. I'm
19	just letting you know that
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I was going to
21	ask if that was a possibility.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: We voted on that
23	yesterday, that's already being sent
24	out.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's great.

1	The other thing that I had is a couple
2	of years ago the Peconic Land Trust
3	took over the mobile property at the
4	end of Fourth Street, and I know that
5	at one point it was supposed to be able
6	to have the public get in and out under
7	the to be able to walk in, to walk
8	out, I was just wondering or I would
9	like to see if we could invite them to
10	come to the January meeting and give us
11	an update as to, you know, what's going
12	on at the Widow's Hole Preserve.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think Paul's got
14	something to say?
15	MR. PALLAS: Actually we met with
16	them about a month ago now. They had a
17	very basic proposal for that, so I can
18	certainly talk to them about if they're
19	prepared at this stage to do that.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think for the
21	public I think it would be great. I
22	mean, we have a great exposure with the
23	Fifth and Sixth Street beach, but part

of the thought process was for our

public, our Village residents to be

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1	able to walk through that preserve and
2	some educational components, and I'm
3	not sure that they
4	MR. PALLAS: They're proposal does
5	include that. It's not as I the
6	drawing they showed me anyway, and as I
7	read the agreement, I don't know that
8	it was walk through it as much as walk
9	around it.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think
11	there's been a lot of proposals about
12	it, but it was supposed to be able to
13	have educational components.
14	MR. PALLAS: They actually have a
15	viewing platform proposed as well, so
16	there's a number of good elements with
17	it. I'll speak with them, circulate
18	what they I'll ask if they're ready
19	to circulate what they sent me. We had
20	asked for some changes, so let me speak
21	with them, and I can
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think we need
23	to get it out to our residents in the
24	Village.
25	The other thing that I was doing,

1	I was reviewing parking because that's
2	been a topic, a big topic, and I
3	discovered that the Hampton Jitney in
4	their Southampton parking lot, they
5	charge their customers seven dollars a
6	day, but yet we don't receive any
7	funding, and I was just wondering if
8	it's possible for the Village Attorney
9	to give us an opinion if we're allowed
10	to create some type of time to charge
11	parking down at the railroad parking
12	lot?
13	MR. PROKOP: Yes, I can do that, I
14	just want to check on the ownership and
15	the lease.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's my
17	question.
18	MR. PROKOP: I have the lease out,
19	and I will check it.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because I've
21	noticed that we have a what is it, a
22	food van that's been there for quite a
23	while and looks like it's using the
24	parking lot for winter parking for
25	somewhere else, other than in their own

1	parking lot. As I said, I think it's
2	time that we we have to maintain
3	that parking lot because of the lease,
4	is that not right, Joe?
5	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, we're the
7	tenant.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think that
9	we need to create some type of
10	something from Hampton Jitney itself
11	for using the parking lot and something
12	to benefit the Village residents, but I
13	don't know if it's legal or not, that's
14	the next question.
15	MR. PROKOP: I have to look at
16	the I mean, my initial reaction is I
17	think that we could do something along
18	those lines, but I have to look at the
19	lease and just make sure there's no
20	restriction on it because I think it is
21	meant to be for the public, I think we
22	have to allow figure out a structure
23	that would allow the public
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: The last time we
25	looked at that, the money would have to

1	be split with the MTA, and they didn't
2	want to pay to put in parking meters
3	because we had to split whatever the
4	revenue was. So we had talked about
5	it, it was going to cost us forty grand
6	to put it in, and we had to split the
7	money with them, it would take that
8	much longer to get the money back.
9	That's where it ended at the last
10	discussion.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It doesn't hurt
12	to ask again.
13	MR. PROKOP: I'd be happy. It's
14	something that we periodically look,
15	talk, discuss in the Village Hall, and
16	I'd be happy to look into it.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The other thing
18	is there's been much discussion about
19	the Christmas decorations and the
20	misstep between the organizations
21	within the Village, not the Village
22	government, but between the BID, the
23	fire department, there's so many
24	activities going on through the holiday
25	season that I had a couple of

1	suggestions from people that if
2	possible when we have our organization
3	meeting that you create either a
4	holiday committee or a Christmas
5	committee to communicate between the
6	different groups to create a unified
7	holiday celebration. It was a
8	suggestion that's been passed
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Isn't that what
10	the GIC is supposed to be, Greenport
11	Improvement Committee?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, that
13	was taken away from us. David Nice
14	took that away from us. That was
15	supposed to be through the BID, and it
16	never continued. I mean, if you want
17	them to do it, that's something that
18	I'll work on, but that was kind of
19	leaned towards the business district
20	over the last couple of years. I mean
21	if you and I would like to talk about
22	it, I would like to talk about it and
23	see if we could kind of get a
24	communication going together.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Does GIC still

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, they will be meeting next -- I'm sorry, they have set a date, I don't remember when it is, I'm sorry.

And the other thing is Trustee Roberts and I are both on the same plane that we're at the point where we kind of need to discuss either dealing with the RFP for a planner or to look towards someone to quide us in developing some planning dealing with housing in the downtown district. I think that we have an opportunity with the funding that may be coming through the State to at least get some help, and I think that -- I think we owe it to the Village residents to give a plan or to give some thought to where we want to be ten, twenty years from now, and I know I don't have the expertise, you don't have the expertise, none of us here. So I think that I'm not really sure where the RFP was for the grant writer, I'm not sure, did you not

1	ask for one for a grant writer for
2	planning, or was that for something
3	else?
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, I asked
5	for one three months ago or something,
6	to put one out that was going to be,
7	you know, contingency fee based.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know
9	where that is.
10	MR. PALLAS: I haven't done
11	anything with it. I don't know, was
12	there direction? I don't recall to be
13	honest.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have to go
15	back and look at the minutes, I'm
16	sorry, I don't remember, I just
17	remember you mentioning it. So I just
18	think that if it's all right, I will
19	start throwing some ideas, and do you
20	want to throw some ideas, and Paul, and
21	maybe pass them back to the Village
22	Board for the Mayor to take a look at.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. The
25	discussion before was about something

1	for the budget for next year and all,
2	but that's not something we really
3	started on yet. Everything that's
4	budgeted at this point right now
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no, I'm
6	talking about yeah, no, I'm kind of
7	talking towards next year's budget, I'm
8	not talking towards this year.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What we could do
LO	though is put out an RFP that says if
L1	you're a grant writer who wants to work
L2	on contingency, and if you get
L3	something funded, you get X percent of
L 4	it as the management fee. That's
L5	something we could attempt, wouldn't
L 6	cost us too much time, and we could see
L7	we could all hit our networks and
L8	see what comes back.
L 9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Anyway I'd like
20	to throw the idea out and just kind of
21	
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, if that's an
23	idea you have, the two of you get
24	together, put something together in
25	writing, and then we can look at it.

1	Just to ask Paul to write it up is
2	going to be very hard not knowing what
3	you want.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't
5	remember I don't remember I don't
6	remember what we discussed.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Put together what
8	you want as an RFP so that we have
9	we can proofread it or whatever, but we
10	kind of had that that was similar to
11	what we had at Mitchell Marina, we want
12	this or that, but we didn't really know
13	what we wanted and we didn't get what
14	we wanted because we didn't word we
15	didn't ask for what we wanted to get.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's where
17	I'm at.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Get together, join
19	together, put something in writing of
20	what you want to ask for, and then we
21	can try to work on that next month.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just don't
23	remember what you said to be honest.
24	That's pretty much it.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.

1	Did anybody have any questions on
2	Trustee Robins' report? Her report is
3	there, just wanted to mention that.
4	I've got a short list of stuff
5	just to fill people in on a few things.
6	So everybody knows, the fire boat is
7	heading to a shipyard in Rhode Island
8	probably January 3rd. They're hauling
9	it out, they came up with the rest of
10	the money to do it, they're going to
11	haul it out, redo whatever needs on the
12	bottom, paint it, sonar it, weld it,
13	repair it, do whatever, so it will be
14	seaworthy and be available to be used.
15	It's probably going to be gone for a
16	month and a half, two months is what's
17	projected depending on what they find.
18	There's actually a travel lift up there
19	that will pick that up and take it off
20	on a travel lift. Just so everybody
21	knows when you see it gone, that's
22	where it's heading. Everyone's been
23	asking to get the thing hauled out to
24	test the bottom for years, so they
25	finally got the funding to take care of

1 that.

2 From the tree committee meeting, I want to just thank the Village highway 3 guys and the Electric guys. They took 4 5 out thirty-one trees that we didn't have to go out to bid for. They 6 7 actually -- and also they got NYPA, we got thirty trees from NYPA along with 8 9 ones that the tree committee bought, they put in forty-eight trees over the 10 past several weeks, which is a very 11 12 good thing. They're finalizing I believe it's twenty trees that they're 13 14 going over the final list on it now that's beyond our Village guys doing, 15 16 we're going to go out to bid on that. That's been out there, the Village has 17 18 been working on it, taking a couple of 19 more, getting them done, so we're going 20 to actually try to go out to bid for 21 that, and there was forty stumps that 22 are on the list now to get ground and 23 do that work during the winter, and then so everybody knows where that list 24 25 was, it's been chopped up and modified

1	numerous times, but at the meeting I
2	told them, John and Polly to get
3	together, go around to the list, and
4	give it to the Village Clerk so that we
5	can actually publish that and go
6	forward with that. We had already
7	talked to I think we already voted
8	go out to bid, but just we never did it
9	just because our guys were doing a
10	great job in getting it done, it's a
11	lot cheaper for our guys to do it than
12	to pay somebody else.
13	Had the meeting yesterday with
14	Frank Field, a gentleman from rotary
15	from the train museum and all. Frank
16	Field has some surplus train equipment
17	that he'd like to possibly sell to the
18	Village for the Village to set up a
19	train a miniature train set like he
20	has up in Moore's Lane, off Monsell
21	Trail, in Moore's Woods, we're not
22	really sure. It was a good discussion,
23	he's got stuff that he's got a surplus,
24	rotary would like to get involved and

help install, purchase, do whatever, so

25

1	it's going to be a community effort
2	that's going on. No real particulars
3	on it yet, but just want to let the
4	Board know that it's in the works and
5	it could be a really neat addition up
6	there on Moore's Lane.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that
8	would be awesome.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: With rotary's help
LO	and everybody else pushing on it, I
L1	think it could be a really good thing.
12	When we get more information, they were
L3	going to go and take a walk around
L 4	there to the spots we talked about
L5	where it could go or whatever, and
L 6	we'll get back to you, but moving
L7	forward on that and maybe get a train
L8	back for next Halloween, do some train
L 9	rides with the kids. It's a thought,
20	we're working on it, just so everybody
21	knows there's some progress on that. I
22	want to thank rotary, Joe Cheropovich
23	(phonetic) for pulling this together.

He's the one that talked to me, he

scheduled a meeting with a bunch of

24

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1	dif	fer	rent	ре	eople	and	every	thing	else,
2	so	it	was	a	good	posi	tive	thing.	

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I got a letter from Peter Jauquet from the Planning Board, he resigned from the Planning Board, so I'm going to be looking for an appointment to fill the position on the Planning Board.

The last thing, this is something that I've talked to a couple of the Trustees about, the last time the Village Board had a raise in salary was 2006, it's been ten years. The job and everything has changed quite a bit. I want to propose that we raise the salary of the Mayor and the Trustees up. Exact numbers I'll have to everybody. I didn't finish the paperwork with the treasurer to see what it's going to be. We've saved a lot of money on health insurance reducing that all down. I'm not talking huge raises, but just a little something that hasn't change in ten years, and I think it's about time that

1	we do a little something. It would be
2	for next year's budget, we can't change
3	it now, it will be for next year's
4	budget. So the numbers will go around,
5	and it will be posted to the public,
6	we'll take comment on it, and see what
7	goes on from there. And that's all
8	that I have.
9	Now I'll open it up to the public,
10	anybody like to address the board?
11	MR. FISHER: Don Fisher, Railroad
12	Museum of Long Island, 440 Fourth
13	Street. In regards to what Mary Bess
14	said about coordinating the Christmas
15	events in the Village, from the
16	Railroad Museum Board, we'd like to
17	express our thanks to the BID this
18	year. For the first time in my memory,
19	the BID reached out to us, and I think
20	Mary Bess had something to do getting
21	them stimulated, reached out to us back
22	at the beginning of November to find
23	out what we were doing at the museum.
24	Historically we have hosted Santa the
25	first weekend in December since 1993.

1	So it was gratifying to have the BID
2	reach out, and I don't know if they
3	coordinated with the fire department or
4	not, but this year the fire department
5	had their Santa Claus parade the second
6	week in December. Some years we have
7	had Santa Claus coming in on the train
8	and Santa Claus coming in on the fire
9	truck the same day usually within an
10	hour of each other. So I'm not sure
11	who was responsible, you know, I give
12	credit to Mary Bess, I give credit to
13	the BID. Our Board says thank you
14	because this year it was very smooth,
15	we had a nice turn out on the first
16	weekend, and I'm sure the fire
17	department had a nice turn out on the
18	second weekend, and we were all able to
19	host Santa and his reindeer and
20	Mrs. Claus and celebrate the beginning
21	of the season in a very, very organized
22	way, and I just wanted to say thank you
23	to Mary Bess and also express our
24	thanks to the BID and to the fire
25	department. Really it was a great

1	start to the season. Thank you.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
3	to address the Board?
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: My daughter is
5	still talking about Santa coming in on
6	the train.
7	MR. SALADINO: John Saladino,
8	Sixth Street. Buy the train. People
9	love it. I personally don't, but
10	people love it. People love trains. I
11	mean, I can remember when they did it
12	down there I haven't said that, I
13	did that for Fisher.
14	As far as the parking, I'm just
15	not sure why the Hampton Jitney needs
16	to take up and this is no knock with
17	the Hampton Jitney, I use it all the
18	time myself, they take up ten parking
19	spaces to load and unload passengers in
20	a public parking lot. They don't pay
21	anything for it, which we find out now
22	from the attorney that perhaps we can
23	charge them. I did notice in listening
24	to the conversation that their bus stop
25	at least on the North Fork, I don't

1	ride it on the South Fork, but at least
2	on the North Fork their bus stop for
3	every hamlet, every village is adjacent
4	to a public parking lot, and I just
5	thought of that tonight, you know. So
6	I'm not saying we should throw the
7	people out, they use the Hampton Jitney
8	because in Greenport they're mostly
9	Greenporters, but I don't know if it's
10	a good idea to charge them, but I don't
11	know if they should have the right to
12	take up ten parking spaces. There's no
13	reason why they can't unload and load
14	at a place that's convenient for them
15	to turn around, it doesn't have to be
16	there, it could be a lot other than
17	that. As far as the parking, I have a
18	question for Mr. Pallas, but I'll ask
19	it through the Board. The parking lot
20	north of the Long Island Railroad
21	station, their parking lot, their dirt
22	parking lot, just from my own personal
23	experience I know it holds about
24	forty-five or fifty cars. I think if
25	you striped it and did it, it would be

1	fifty cars. Does this Board,
2	Mr. Pallas, do you have any idea how
3	much it would cost to pave that?
4	MR. PALLAS: John, off the top of
5	my head, I don't. It's not just the
6	paving, it's the preparation and
7	agreements with the MTA. It's not
8	MR. SALADINO: I hear the argument
9	well, when I say the paving, you
10	know, it's everything that goes with
11	it, you know, whatever they do to pave,
12	I don't know, and I hear the arguments
13	that the MTA would have a say, and I
14	express this opinion all the time, I
15	think unless you do something radical
16	there, the MTA could care less.
17	They're certainly not going to come
18	here and sue the Village for paving
19	their parking lot. So to me it seems
20	foolish to take into consideration a
21	problem that in all likelihood would
22	never ever happen. The food truck on
23	the south side of the property, I
24	personally know I'm not sure I
25	should say this because you might press

1	me for the name, I personally know two
2	people that own homes on Shelter
3	Island. They rent them for the winter.
4	They keep their car here during the
5	summer, they live in Manhattan, they
6	keep their car here during the summer
7	at that parking lot. When they come in
8	on the Jitney, they get in their car,
9	they drive to Shelter Island. They
10	rent their homes for the winter, so
11	they can't keep their car. Right now
12	their cars until May are in that
13	parking lot. So to me that's, like, a
14	little crazy that we have a parking
15	problem in Greenport, and some guy on
16	West 44th Street has had his car parked
17	in Greenport. So, you know, that might
18	be something we might want to think
19	about.
20	And the other thing, Mary Bess, I
21	applaud you with the fish. I'm not
22	really concerned about the bunker die
23	off in Stirling Creek. We get good
24	flow there, good flush. We see the
25	bunker there every year. They're good.

1	But again, they might and I'm going
2	to whine about it again, you know, they
3	die from oxygen deprivation. We get
4	the pathogens and the nitrogen load.
5	We've got seven hundred boats in the
6	creek. We've got two pump outs
7	sometimes. We've got one pump out boat
8	sometimes. We have a new marina
9	project that I applauded the a marina
LO	owner on for being willing to install a
L1	pump out, and the spirit that we
L2	entered the agreement with them, we
L3	thought it would happen as they did the
L 4	work, and as it turns out that's not
L5	the case. I would just love for this
L 6	Board to get serious about, you know,
L 7	pump outs, and it doesn't sound like a
L8	big deal, but it really is. It's a big
L 9	deal, especially in again, I whine
20	about this all the time. The only
21	impacted waterway, the only impaired
22	waterway in Greenport. A lot of the
23	stuff that we have to comply with the
24	MS4 is stuff we wouldn't have to worry
25	about if that creek wasn't impaired.

1	And anyway
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just for your
3	information John, the MS4 has changed
4	and become extremely more stringent.
5	The Town of Southold just I don't
6	know, I forgot to ask Paul, did we
7	receive anything about the MS4 changes?
8	MR. PALLAS: I
9	MR. SALADINO: Well, actually I
10	read them for the Town of Southold. I
11	read them and I read their conversation
12	with the DEC. From what I understand,
13	because of Greenport's proximity to the
14	water, the only impaired waterway
15	and we don't even know for sure I
16	understand because they haven't
17	measured it since 1977. So I mean, but
18	they're going on the fact that this is
19	the only impaired waterway in
20	Greenport, and because of that, we have
21	to comply with a lot of the things on
22	MS4. If we clean up the creek and they
23	decide to measure and they see that
24	it's, in fact, not impaired, which I
25	believe it's not, perhaps a lot of the

1	burden of complying with MS4 wouldn't
2	fall on our shoulders. I don't know
3	for sure. Anyway thank you, thanks for
4	listening.
5	MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth
6	Avenue. I just want to add on to what
7	John was saying about parking. I call
8	it pothole city, what he was talking
9	about about repaving that because that
LO	will add a lot more spaces. I
L1	understand what you were just talking
12	about on the further lot not being able
13	to really put in the parking spaces
L 4	because it would cost the Village too
L5	much, and then you have to share in the
L 6	profit. I know that it's a free
L7	municipal parking lot, I pass the sign
L8	all the time. Is there a way that the
L 9	Village could put up a time limit in
20	there? Twenty-four hour parking, you
21	know, you can park for twenty-four
22	hours to keep people like John just
23	said, his friends that leave their car
24	there, you know, for months at a time,
25	which especially in the summer months

1	is taking away from people that are
2	coming here or even, you know, people
3	that live here, they can't find
4	anything, so they're, like, all right,
5	I'll go over by the railroad, maybe I
6	can find something there. You know, I
7	don't know if that is a viable option
8	to put a twenty-four hour, you know,
9	time limit on it.
10	MR. PROKOP: We're looking at that
11	now. As you heard before, it's going
12	to have to involve the MTA, but we are
13	looking.
14	MS. ALLEN: No, no, no, I
15	understand that, I totally get it. I
16	know so many people in the Village and
17	in Greenport are so opposed to any kind
18	of parking meters anyway. From what I
19	just heard being said, I would voice
20	against not doing there if the Village
21	isn't going to profit from it.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. The reason
23	that it wasn't done before trying to do
24	that on the Shelter Island side it's
25	forty-eight hours you can park for

1	free, otherwise you have to pay forty
2	dollars a week during the winter, sixty
3	dollars a week during the summer. We
4	had nobody to go down and look at that.
5	The Shelter Island ferry officer is
6	right there, in the morning one lady
7	goes, leaves the office, walks around
8	the parking lot, writes up a ticket,
9	and goes back inside because there's
10	somebody there. With us having no
11	we didn't have a parking enforcement
12	officer, we had nobody on staff to do
13	it, so we would have to leave Village
14	Hall to go down there and see what cars
15	are there and make a record of it. Now
16	that we have Greg on staff, that's
17	something that could be very viable to
18	do this upcoming summer. So it changes
19	the scenario of that, so it's something
20	we will definitely look into.
21	MS. ALLEN: That's perfectly fine.
22	And I'm so excited when I heard about
23	the miniature train and Halloween
24	again. Since Frank hasn't had his
25	train at Halloween, and the little ones

1	they don't understand, like, you know,
2	when you talk and your face lights up
3	when you talk about it. They never got
4	to experience that. So I really hope
5	all of this goes through and you do
6	find a place for it, you know, because
7	even as an adult, you love going on
8	that miniature train. So I commend you
9	for that, and if I can help out with it
10	at all, let me know, because I would
11	love that. Thank you.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
13	to address the Board? Okay. I'll call
14	a motion to enter executive session to
15	talk with the lawyer on pending
16	litigation and a contract.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Opposed? We're
23	adjourned to executive at 8:50. Thank
24	you.
