| 3 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll call the |
| 4 | meeting to order. We'll pledge to the |
| 5 | flag. |
| 6 | (Whereupon all stood for the |
| 7 | Pledge of Allegiance.) |
| 8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. You |
| 9 | may be seated. Okay. First order of |
| 10 | business is Chief Miller, Assistant |
| 11 | Chief Weingart. |
| 12 | MR. MILLER: How is everyone |
| 13 | tonight? |
| 14 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening. |
| 15 | CHIEF MILLER: What do you got for |
| 16 | me? |
| 17 | MAYOR HUBBARD: What do I got for |
| 18 | you? Nothing. |
| 19 | CHIEF MILLER: You got all the |
| 20 | reports, right? |
| 21 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, I got all |
| 22 | the reports. A couple of budget |
| 23 | modifications, the applications for |
| 24 | membership, Sylvia already has them |
| 25 | already down on the agenda. |
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| 1 | CHIEF MILLER: I have three more, |

| 2 | but we're waiting for some more |
| 3 | paperwork on those, so we'll have to |
| 4 | wait until next month. |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. |
| 6 | CHIEF MILLER: We discussed about |
| 7 | the boat last night. There were some |
| 8 | questions. First of all, you did say |
| 9 | that if anything happens to it, the |
| 10 | Village will pay, it ain't coming out |
| 11 | of the fire department's budget, right? |
| 12 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. |
| 13 | CHIEF MILLER: Okay. So that was |
| 14 | one thing. The other thing was they |
| 15 | want to know, you know, if someone is |
| 16 | going to be out there riding in that |
| 17 | boat, what kind of authority do they |
| 18 | have? Because basically you're not a |
| 19 | peace officer, you're just out riding |
| 20 | around. |
| 21 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. |
| 22 | CHIEF MILLER: That was another |
| 23 | question that we had. I mean |
| 24 | MAYOR HUBBARD: They're not a |
| 25 | peace officer, they're going to be more |
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1 a harbor manager just patrolling, just, 2 you know, trying to -- the consensus with everybody is that the boat's 3 there, people see that when they're 4 5 flying in at sixty-five miles an hour 6 they're going to slow down. 7 MR. MILLER: All right. MAYOR HUBBARD: To be able to 8 9 write tickets and everything else, we're not even sure where we're going 10 11 with that part of it. 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry, but couldn't we find someone who has 13 14 whatever requirements to be a TCO who can also operate -- I mean, that's a 15 16 possibility, isn't it? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: The pitch I gave 18 to the fire department is it's going to be somebody with the fire department 19 because it's their boat. Because 20 21 there's a rescue call, when it goes in, 22 it's going to be somebody from the fire 23 department that's actually manning the 24 boat. 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, okay, got Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 it. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: The partnership for this, you know, for the trial 3 period for this year. 4 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And we're going 6 to pay? 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: We would be paying an employee, paying somebody from the 8 9 Village to operate their boat for the summer season, Friday afternoon, 10 11 Saturday, and Sunday. 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can that person also be a firefighter? 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: That person is going to be a firefighter. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So someone is going to get a job from the fire 17 18 department? MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. That's 19 20 originally how I said we were going to 21 try to get somebody from the -- because 22 they already know the boat, the 23 procedure to get the keys, everything 24 else. | 3 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Got it. |
| 4 | CHIEF MILLER: The other concern |
| 5 | was one person being on the boat, there |
| 6 | are concerns that there should be two |
| 7 | people on the boat. |
| 8 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Why? |
| 9 | CHIEF MILLER: I'm just telling |
| 10 | you. |
| 11 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just asking |
| 12 | you why. |
| 13 | CHIEF MILLER: That's the |
| 14 | department, you know, that's a concern, |
| 15 | you know, working by yourself out on |
| 16 | the water. |
| 17 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Fair enough, it's |
| 18 | a safety concern. |
| 19 | MAYOR HUBBARD: A lot of the |
| 20 | gentlemen that are out there, they are |
| 21 | out scarpering by themselves, they do |
| 22 | stuff like that, they are on the boat |
| 23 | most of the time by themselves. |
| 24 | CHIEF MILLER: I understand. I'm |
| 25 | just relaying what was said to me last |
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1 night.

MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not looking 2 at hiring two people, we're looking at 3 one person just to have the boat out 4 5 there circulating. If a rescue call or 6 something went in that you were needed, 7 they would go back to the dock, and then you guys would take over on 8 9 whatever needed to be done. CHIEF MILLER: So another concern 10 was what happens if you come across a 11 12 boat that's broke down out there? Are you going to let the guy tow it in? 13 14 Because then you got concerns about liability if you tow somebody's boat --15 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: They would call Safe Tow like they would anybody else. 17 CHIEF MILLER: No towing? 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. I mean, if 19 20 somebody is twenty foot off the dock, 21 and they just needed assistance to get 22 over to the dock, they may, but, I 23 mean, it's not something -- we're not looking to go into business or 24 25 anything, we're really just trying to Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

| 3 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're looking |
| 4 | more for a deterrent effect, right, |
| 5 | George, a deterrent to speeding? |
| 6 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. |
| 7 | CHIEF MILLER: And also have you |
| 8 | spoken to the police about this, I |
| 9 | mean, what's their feeling of us having |
| 10 | a boat out there? |
| 11 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I spoke to Chief |
| 12 | Flatley about it. |
| 13 | CHIEF MILLER: Bay Constables, the |
| 14 | sheriffs are out there, you know. |
| 15 | MAYOR HUBBARD: They thought it |
| 16 | was, you know, an extra person, a boat |
| 17 | out there at extra times. They thought |
| 18 | it was a good idea. He didn't say |
| 19 | anything that it was going to be |
| 20 | interfering with his stuff at all |
| 21 | because, like I said, we're not writing |
| 22 | citations, we're not chasing people |
| 23 | down around the breakwater, they're |
| 24 | going too fast. It's really just |
| 25 | instead of the boat tied to the dock, |
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to have the boat out on the water.
 That's the intention.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And the process 3 will be that if they observe something, 4 they will call it in to the --5 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, they would 7 have a radio and everything. They would call it into the marine unit or 8 9 whatever, you know. A lot of it is still -- it's all a work in progress, 10 11 you know. It's a concept, it's an idea 12 that we're trying to see if we could 13 do. Any other concerns, you know, I 14 mean, I could meet with the wardens again, we could discuss other things. 15 16 CHIEF MILLER: Yeah, they didn't 17 really take any action last night, so 18 they wanted some questions answered 19 before they gave the okay. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. Well, we 21 got to find people that are willing to

do it too. I just -- I didn't want to do anything unless I knew that we were going to be able to use the boat, you know, that's all.

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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We'll have to 1 2 train somebody probably on the code stuff they're looking for. Like, for 3 4 example, you know, there are specific 5 codes what you can and can't do in our 6 waters, right? You can't anchor, for 7 example. So Ed or someone will have to do a training, or maybe Jeff, well, not 8 9 Jeff, but, you know. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. I mean, 11 it's not going to be just sitting 12 there. You have to go through the mooring field, go through the harbor, 13 14 and just, you know, be out there, be present. Somebody has a question or 15 16 whatever, just to see how it works. And if it doesn't work -- in the past 17 18 we used to -- when we had a harbor 19 manager or whatever you want to call 20 him, harbor master, it wasn't 21 technically a harbor master, we paid

him X amount of dollars to use his own boat for the season. We put fuel in it, he'd use his own boat, it was one guy who would just troll around. I'm

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1 not looking to go and buy a boat right now or do whatever, so we figured the 2 boat is there, it's not used -- it's 3 used for emergencies, you guys go out 4 5 on the weekend, you know, some, but it's sitting there a lot. If we get 6 7 moving more often, somebody can make a few extra dollars doing it, and we have 8 9 the boat out there on weekends. You know, that's the idea. 10 11 CHIEF MILLER: All right. I'll 12 bring that back. The only other thing 13 I had was did you happen to secure 14 another quote for another engineer for 15 the ramp? 16 MR. PALLAS: I have not as yet. I will. 17 18 CHIEF MILLER: I want to get that ball rolling to try to sit down, work 19 20 something out. Other than that --21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Everything is 22 straight with the painters? I read in 23 your report there was concern about the 24 painters and the money and the 25 procurement policy and all that.

| 2 | on, yeah. I mean, the guy is paid, |
| 3 | we're just trying to work a couple of |
| 4 | things out. |
| 5 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Let any |
| 6 | of us I'm sure you call Robert and |
| 7 | ask him this stuff, right? |
| 8 | CHIEF MILLER: Yeah, I sit down |
| 9 | with him regularly. |
| 10 | MAYOR HUBBARD: He'll be back |
| 11 | tomorrow. This is something we talked |
| 12 | about this morning. We're waiting for |
| 13 | him to get back because there's some |
| 14 | gray areas on some questions and stuff |
| 15 | he had done and what he had said, so |
| 16 | he'll be back tomorrow, and I'll speak |
| 17 | to him, and I'll be in touch with you |
| 18 | tomorrow. |
| 19 | CHIEF MILLER: Anything else? |
| 20 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for |
| 21 | the Chiefs? |
| 22 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Wait a minute, |
| 23 | I did read you were having a meeting or |
| 24 | you were requesting a meeting with the |
| 25 | LOSAP representatives, is that going |
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| 1 | forth? It was in here in your notes, |

| 2 | someone requested to |
| 3 | CHIEF MILLER: That we wanted to |
| 4 | |
| 5 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Someone |
| 6 | requested to someone wanted to meet |
| 7 | with the LOSAP reps? |
| 8 | CHIEF MILLER: I didn't hear |
| 9 | anything about that. What was the date |
| 10 | on that? |
| 11 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It was captains? |
| 12 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Captains |
| 13 | officers' meeting maybe. |
| 14 | CHIEF MILLER: From April? |
| 15 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't |
| 16 | remember. |
| 17 | CHIEF MILLER: Jeff, do you know |
| 18 | anything about that? |
| 19 | MR. WEINGART: Jimmy did say |
| 20 | something about it. He's in the |
| 21 | process of putting the changes in and |
| 22 | all that. |
| 23 | CHIEF MILLER: Yeah, well, there |
| 24 | is some concern about the way the new |
| 25 | system is going to be adopted starting |
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1 in January, concerns about actually 2 incentive to come to the calls because the way it reads it's pretty much --3 I'm not too thrilled with it. 4 5 Basically it tells you that you don't have to make any alarms, you don't have 6 7 to go on rescues or fire calls, and if you make X amount of meetings and 8 9 everything else you get your points. So we're going to have a by-law 10 11 meeting, I think we set it up for June 12 1st because we're going to have to do something to curb that because anybody 13 14 can join the fire department, and then all of sudden they don't have to make 15 16 any alarms or any EMS alarms and they 17 still get their fifty points for the 18 year and they get credit for -- what good is that? You know what I'm 19 20 saying? 21 Right. Well, I MAYOR HUBBARD: 22 mean, you have limits on the amount of 23 meetings and other stuff you can do unless you're taking trainings --24 25 CHIEF MILLER: They can still make Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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their fifty points without a problem
for the most part, especially here with
all the meetings we have.

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, you max out 5 at twenty of them. I don't think you'd 6 add up to enough without it unless 7 you're a firefighter one and doing 8 that, and I don't think somebody would 9 do that intentionally, and not -- take 10 the classes and not go to alarms.

CHIEF MILLER: Well, we had -- we 11 12 actually had someone come to the meeting last night that didn't get any 13 14 points for any fire alarms or any rescues, and they had thirty-nine 15 16 points, and they're an EMT, so that's 17 another eight points that they would 18 have got, so they were, like, two or three points shy of fifty without going 19 20 to any alarms, getting any points for 21 that. So it can be done fairly easily. 22 So I mean, that's a concern that I have 23 because, you know, it's basic --MAYOR HUBBARD: I understand that, 24 25 but in that category the only thing

1 that was changed was where you had it broken up where you'd get fifteen 2 points for making five percent alarms 3 and twenty-five points for making ten 4 5 percent of the alarms, they ruled that 6 that's illegal to break it up that way. 7 So you had the ten percent you get your full twenty-five points. That's the 8 9 only change on it. You're still supposed to make alarms. 10 11 CHIEF MILLER: Right, but you 12 don't have to. MAYOR HUBBARD: The old way you 13 14 didn't have to either, but I mean, the only thing this is doing in that one 15 16 category is just going from five percent to get fifteen points and then 17 18 you had ten percent alarms you got twenty-five points, that's just all, 19 you can't break it out into two 20 21 different places. 22 CHIEF MILLER: I think you guys 23 really need to take a look at that because I read it all today, and 24 25 depending on the amount of alarms that Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

we have it goes from seven and a half
-- we have -- what was it, Jeff, two
hundred?

MR. WEINGART: Anything under five 4 hundred calls, you had to make ten 5 percent, anything over five hundred 6 7 calls, you had to make seven and a half percent. So for rescues you'd have to 8 9 make seven and a half percent to get vour twenty-five. Since we do under 10 11 five hundred fire calls, you have to 12 make ten percent. Since we do over five hundred rescues, you have to make 13 14 the seven and a half percent.

CHIEF MILLER: But what I'm saying 15 16 is as it stood last year if you didn't 17 get any of your points for fire or 18 rescue, and if you made fifty points 19 you didn't -- under the old way, you 20 didn't get credit for the fifty points. 21 Now, you don't have to do that. You 22 can get credit for the fifty points, 23 you don't have to go to any alarms. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are you concerned 24 25 that that's going to disincentivize

1 people from showing up at alarms? 2 CHIEF MILLER: Well, we have a pretty hard time right now. You know, 3 we've been having some issues, so I 4 5 mean, that's not making it any better. You know, this is something that I have 6 7 a concern with. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I read 8 9 through it when they were switching it what they were proposing. Originally 10 11 with the law when the law was done, you 12 needed to make ten percent of your alarms to be eligible for any of it. 13 I 14 don't think they changed that category. The way that it's broken down in the 15 16 thing, but if you look at it, you 17 needed to have ten percent of your 18 alarms to be eligible at all.

19 CHIEF MILLER: Read the last page.
20 It tells you you can't deny them their
21 points if they don't get their fire
22 alarms. I read it today.

23 MR. PROKOP: Do you have a 24 department quota that's different from 25 the LOSAP?

CHIEF MILLER: No, I read the 1 2 thing that you guys gave us for LOSAP. If you read the last page on the back 3 part of it, it says that you can't deny 4 them their points if they don't make 5 their alarms, but if they get fifty 6 7 points just for, like, going to 8 meetings and trainings. Where the old 9 way that we had it was you had to make ten percent of either or to get 10 11 twenty-five points and then qualify to 12 get your fifty. Anything else? 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's it. 15 Thank you. 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you, 17 Chief. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. On the discussions, we're just going to go a 19 little -- the Chief of Police wanted to 20 21 come to the meeting tonight, he can't 22 make the public hearing next week, the 23 continuation, but he was going to be here at 7:00, said he couldn't make it 24 25 until 7:30. So we're going to do the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

| 2 | scheduled, it's already been noticed. |
| 3 | MAYOR HUBBARD: At next week's |
| 4 | meeting when they go to do it, it will |
| 5 | be table the public hearing on it. |
| 6 | MR. PALLAS: I just wanted to make |
| 7 | everybody aware of that so there's no |
| 8 | surprises. |
| 9 | Okay. Number of resolutions, the |
| 10 | first two just are hirings and |
| 11 | re-hirings for Marina, Carousel, and |
| 12 | other things like that. The next |
| 13 | resolution is a request to solicit |
| 14 | engineering services to rebuild central |
| 15 | pump station for the wastewater |
| 16 | treatment plant. It's long overdue, |
| 17 | and I think we need to move forward on |
| 18 | that. So I would just like to get |
| 19 | engineers in, get some quotes from them |
| 20 | to do the design to rebuild that whole |
| 21 | facility. The concept that we've |
| 22 | kicked around internally is to get rid |
| 23 | of the building all together and put it |
| 24 | in underground facility. I think they |
| 25 | come almost like a package that you can |
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| 1 | install relatively easily. So I think |
|----|---|
| 2 | that would be we'll talk to the |
| 3 | engineers once we hire them, I'm going |
| 4 | to let them tell us what makes the most |
| 5 | sense. |
| 6 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: So you're talking |
| 7 | about engineering first and then plans? |
| 8 | MR. PALLAS: Engineering first, |
| 9 | then plans, yeah, correct. This is |
| 10 | just for the engineering and the design |
| 11 | to prepare the bid package essentially. |
| 12 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. |
| 13 | MR. PALLAS: The next item is a |
| 14 | request for reimbursement to Dan King |
| 15 | for operator certification testing for |
| 16 | his 2A wastewater treatment plant |
| 17 | operator test. There was a cost |
| 18 | associated with that, he's requested |
| 19 | reimbursement for that. He took the |
| 20 | class, he's now taken the test, he's |
| 21 | passed the test, so he's asking for |
| 22 | reimbursement for that. Dan King again |
| 23 | is going to continue his training for |
| 24 | the 3A license, and he's again looking |
| 25 | for approval for us to pay for that |

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1

training as well.

2 The next resolution is again related to the wastewater treatment 3 plant with Ray Dunbar retiring we're 4 5 going to need to fill a position, and at this point I'm asking for approval 6 7 to post an employment position for a laborer at the wastewater treatment 8 9 plant. I know we have also an executive session item to discuss 10 11 staffing at various facilities after 12 the meeting. Just a few topics of discussion, 13 14 the MS-4 report will be posted on the website by next week. We'll accept 15 16 public comments until the report gets 17 submitted. It's supposed to be 18 submitted by June 1st. I'll make sure that it's up on the website either 19 20 tomorrow or Monday so for any public 21 comments for that. 22 At our Cablevision tower site, we

need to do some fairly extensive
clean-up there. We may need help with
that. I haven't spoken with Pete yet

to see how much he can do with staff. 1 2 He's got a lot of work going on with the spring, so we may need to actually 3 get somebody in to help us with that. 4 I'd also like to put in some added 5 6 security there, either a gate or 7 fencing. There's people just come in and dump things there. There's some 8 9 easy access. We're looking to put up 10 some gates and fencing. PALLAS: We may not have it by 19 then. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Pete has kind 21 of taken over the maintenance or the 22 clean-up at Mitchell Park, is he 23 overseeing that with the staff that's 24 there? 25 MR. PALLAS: Temporarily, yes, for

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1 I mean, that may be a permanent now. 2 solution, we can discuss that, but for now, yes. He's making sure that all of 3 the work that's needed to get done 4 5 there is getting done, planting, 6 mulching, grass, and all that. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The boardwalk lights were not on the other night when 8 9 I was out there. I don't know if there's something going on. Do we turn 10 11 those off? No, they're on in the 12 winter. MR. PALLAS: There's --13 14 MS. PIRILLO: Paul, we're working on the boardwalk lights. I don't --13 14 again, there's -- I am very confident that it's fine. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. If --17 MR. PALLAS: I understand. We 18 don't have --19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We may want to 20 pursue protecting ourselves in these 21 kinds of -- maybe we should have some 22 sort of standing agreement with them 23 that covers emergency services in the future. I would imagine they wouldn't 24 25 sign up for it at this point since Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 we've already been working with them, 2 but --MR. | 14 | CHIEF FLATLEY: I agreed to talk |
| 15 | to them that day because they had some |

| 17 | you know, I think the Wiggins Street |
| 18 | and the ferry line issue is very much |
| 19 | like just about every traffic issue we |
| 20 | have on the north fork, whether it be |
| 21 | in Greenport Village or in Southold |
| 22 | Town where it's really only effective |
| 23 | or needs to be effective for two or |
| 24 | three months out of the year, maybe |

25 three months out of the year, and the

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big an issue through the winter months 2 and the spring months, at least in my 3 opinion. And Mayor, I know you use 4 5 that road everyday, so you're going to 6 have a lot better knowledge than I do 7 on it, but the theory of converting -to me the theory of converting Wiggins 8 9 Street into a two way roadway is with the caveat that you could get the ferry 10 11 line off of Wiggins Street and move it 12 to somewhere else, and I don't know if 13 that is possible. And that was just a 14 theory that I floated because to me if you could make a Wiggins a two way 15 16 street again and move the ferry line to if there's property over on the MTA lot 17 18 or somewhere else, and I don't know, 19 you've probably already looked into 20 that portion of it, but that way it 21 would not rob the residents of Wiggins 22 Street of parking spaces by their 23 houses. The way it is right now, if you were to use -- I know there's been 24 25 a couple different plans thrown around.

One of the major issues -- well, what 1 2 we talked about last time was motorists following the correct route to get on 3 the ferry, and I think a lot of them 4 5 are coming from the Cross Sound Ferry 6 System from the east that are 7 traversing through the Village, and they are using Third Street instead of 8 9 following the signage, and I did look at the signage last time, the signs are 10 11 still intact up on 48 directing 12 motorists from the east to use Moores Lane for ferry traffic, but people are 13 14 not paying attention to it, so I think, you know, at least in my opinion a 15 16 route to go by for a short term solution would be to better educate the 17 18 motorists that are using that roadway 19 and that are using that ferry and 20 trying to get them to go on the route 21 that's already posted up there, whether 22 it be by additional signage or trying 23 to reach out to the people that use the ferry and hand out pamphlets, or hand 24 25 out what is the preferred route for it,

| 20 | something that I sent to the Mayor this |
| 21 | morning, and I have copies for |
| 22 | everybody here, but I didn't know when |
| 23 | he was going to discuss it, so I think |

| 25 | MAYOR HUBBARD: We can discuss it. |

1 I wanted the Chief -- you saw the one that was sent out last week? 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: From Doug --3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 4 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I've seen that 5 6 too. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Do we have the one from -- Ron's, yeah. Chief 8 9 Flatley's, could you give him a copy of that? 10 11 MR. PALLAS: He has it. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do you want the 14 full one? This is -- because you got the e-mail this morning, there was 15 16 something added to it (handing). 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Where did you 18 quys all learn to draw these drawings? MAYOR HUBBARD: What's that? 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Everyone became, 20 21 like, a technical --22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no, I 23 asked Paul if Daryl could -- I told --Paul and I had a discussion earlier in 24 25 the week because I was taking a look at Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 the one that was proposed by, I'm 2 sorry, I forgot his name, the gentleman that lives on Wiggins Street that put 3 4 the proposal --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 5 Ron. 6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Ron. And T 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Ron. also know that a big portion of the 8 problem is if -- and I've heard the 9 comments that if we made Wiggins a two 10 11 way street that everyone would be 12 bouncing from the ferry because the 13 stoplight would be holding everybody 14 up. So my thought was to anyone coming off the ferry traffic would not be able 15 16 to make a left-hand turn onto Wiggins at all, they'd have to go -- no matter 17 18 how you came down Third Street, you'd need to do the circle to go back up 19 20 Third Street, you cannot make a 21 left-hand turn onto Wiggins. As you're 22 coming down Third Street, we have an 23 issue with trucks and vehicles coming 24 out of Sterlington Commons, so my 25 suggestion was to make that only a Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 right turn only so that they would go 2 down the road. There would be two areas where one would be for the ferry 3 traffic to -- if you came down Third 4 Street and you couldn't enter the --5 6 you can't enter the ferry line from 7 Third Street, you would have to go back around the corner and go up to where 8 9 the linage comes in. And the other thing is I made a suggestion on that 10 11 that if they come down Third Street 12 trying to go to the ferry, they'll be 13 making a right-hand turn, go up, and 14 then they make another right-hand turn, no left-hand turn from Wiggins to 15 16 Fourth so that they'll go back up to Front Street, they'll have to go back 17 18 to load down Fifth Street or Sixth Street to get on the line. I think 19 20 Paul said you do that once and they 21 might remember, but as I said, it's 22 just a thought.

CHIEF FLATLEY: With all due
 respect, I think the only thing that
 accommodates at least from what I can

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1 see is the people that are using Third 2 Street incorrectly to access the ferry. I think the solution -- any kind of 3 proposed solution should include 4 spreading out some of the traffic 5 6 coming off the ferry too so it's not 7 backing right up to the traffic light on Third Street. That was my original 8 9 opinion to try to split some of that traffic onto Wiggins and spread it out 10 11 over the other intersections so Third 12 Street is not handling all of the --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think part of 13 14 the problem is a couple of things, the traffic coming out of Sterlington 15 16 Commons slows up sometimes the getting out from Wiggins. Most of the time 17 18 anybody coming out of Wiggins is making a right-hand turn anyway or they're 19 20 going straight. I think that most of 21 the concern for the residents, if I 22 heard them correctly, was the thought 23 pattern that the ferry traffic would be, you know, they'd see the line was 24 25 there and they'd be going up Wiggins

1 Street to get out. I think that just 2 by having them continuously go up Third Street, and maybe we need to get New 3 4 York State to retime the stoplight. CHIEF FLATLEY: That would help 5 6 also, yeah. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That could be the other part of the solution. 8 9 CHIEF FLATLEY: Put a count somewhere further down on Third Street 10 11 just to try to count the amount of 12 traffic that they have to accommodate to clear that a little bit quicker. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: George, what about working or prevailing upon the 15 16 ferry company to provide more staff to do traffic management down there? I 17 18 think that was one of Ron Nelson's 19 proposals. I mean, you know, can we 20 ask that, can we demand that from them? 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Where would you 22 want to put somebody else? 23 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Out on the street, you know, the same thing that 24 25 Don Fisher did for years basically, you

| 20 | cones out there and everything else. |
| 21 | The issue we have right now down there |
| 22 | is people are parking on the south side |
| 23 | of Wiggins Street. When they're parked |
| 24 | there, people in the ferry line have to |
| 25 | go around that cars that are parked |
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there, and then they're right in the 1 middle of the road, and they don't go 2 back over to the right-hand side to get 3 back where the yellow line is. Parking 4 will end there next week, Memorial Day 5 you're not allowed to park on that side 6 7 of the street. If those cars were not there now, and if the ferry put cones 8 9 down the length of Wiggins Street between Third and Fourth so the ferry 10 11 line stays over to the right you would 12 not have much of an issue down there. 13 I mean, I was there this morning, I 14 took a picture this morning from -- I had to get in line at Fifth Street this 15 16 morning, that's how it is a lot of days 17 Most days I have to go to Fourth now. 18 Street, today I had to go to Fifth 19 Street to get in line, and I was 20 standing in front of Colin Ratzy's 21 house, and I took a picture down the 22 road, the road is completely blocked. 23 When I went to meet with Ron and his family and all, I had to park by the 24 25 synagogue and walk down there because I

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could not get down the road at all. 1 2 And so if there was a rescue or a fire or anything on that block, it's 3 completely impassable the way it is. 4 5 So that's why we're trying to come up with something, whether it's 6 7 permanently eliminating parking on the south side of the street and make that 8 9 one lane just ferry all the time, even year round, because the ferry traffic 10 11 now in the morning, even in February 12 and March I've had lines, and it's out 13 there almost every day. So that side 14 of the street, they know they can't do it now after Memorial Day to Labor Day, 15 16 if we at least in the short term -- I know it's starting in a week and a 17 18 half, but we need to eliminate parking completely on that side of the road. 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think that's a 20 21 fairly easy solution. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's already in 23 our code that it goes for the three months, we just need to extend that. 24 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And enforce it.

1 the ferry. She's saying when you come 2 off the ferry you couldn't go up Wiggins as a two way. The idea of 3 making Wiggins two way is to get half 4 5 the ferry traffic to be able to go that 6 direction so everybody doesn't have to 7 sit in a line going up the other direction. 8

9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But this says --MAYOR HUBBARD: If you go back and 10 11 look at the public hearing, I mentioned 12 this to them also, if you look at the public hearing in 2001 when it was 13 14 switched people spoke there saying they didn't want it to be a one way because 15 16 they wouldn't be able to park in front of their house, so it's gone both 17 18 directions.

19TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, but in202002 if you go back and read the public21hearing where they -- the Board at that22time, they had the public hearing, and23the neighbors were complaining because24it was a two way, and the Board25themselves admitted that they made a

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mistake, and then they put it back in 2002 to a one way street because I pulled the minutes out for that one. So, you know, it's been discussed both ways. TRUSTEE ROBINS: But, you know,

7 this is fifteen years later, and 8 obviously the volume of traffic and the 9 number of people out here have 10 increased so much that we have another 11 situation that we're dealing with now, 12 so we have to be realistic about it.

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Just the proposal 14 you have here, Trustee Phillips, going up -- if you want to get down Fourth 15 16 Street and you're coming down Third, you're going to go up around the block 17 18 around over to Fifth and everything 19 else just to get down there, you're 20 making that one way no left turns for 21 an issue that only happens for two 22 hours in the morning.

23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, it's24 an idea.

MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I know. When Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

I looked at that, I mean, that's not 1 2 something to enforce all day long, it's early in the morning that you have 3 problems and you have Friday and 4 5 Saturday during the summer. You know, besides that, the less impact on 6 7 everybody just to accommodate the problem areas, I think that's what 8 9 Chief Flatley was saying. You know, we don't want to reroute everybody all the 10 11 time to take care of a two hour 12 problem. I think you're 13 CHIEF FLATLEY: 14 also going to find that if you put signs up in places that people don't 15

16 agree with the reason why it's there, 17 they're not going to follow it as much 18 as you would like them to, no matter if it's restricted or not. We have 19 20 parking lots where it's a right turn 21 only, people want to make left-hand 22 turns all day long, they're still going 23 to make it, they're just, you know, 24 hoping they don't get caught when they 25 do it.

1TRUSTEE ROBINS: Chief, do you2think that GPS is part of the problem3directing people down the closest

route?

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5 CHIEF FLATLEY: Oh, definitely. 6 And they're disregarding traffic signs 7 because they'd rather look at their navigation GPS systems. That happens 8 9 -- we're dealing with the same problem up on Love Lane in Mattituck. 10 The commercial GPS that all the truckers 11 12 use have access from if you're going from the main road to the north road to 13 14 come down Love Lane because that's the shortest distance between 48 and 25, so 15 16 we're getting tractor trailers coming 17 down a road that you can't even get 18 cars through sometimes. So people 19 follow navigation, people don't want to 20 look at street signs anymore. It's 21 unfortunate.

22TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We haven't found23a way to intervene with the GPS24systems?

CHIEF FLATLEY:

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We're tried

We tried it with Love Lane, we 1 before. 2 tried some different locations. Τt. seems to be very hard to get them to 3 make changes on the routes that they 4 describe on there. I'm not saying it 5 can't be done, but we haven't had too 6 7 much luck with it. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Once again, at 8 9 some point we're going to run into where the ferry company is just going 10 11 to say we don't have enough manpower, 12 we don't have enough money to take care of it, which is very distressing 13 14 because they're a business operated in the Village of Greenport. And then 15 16 I'll be honest with you, I know 17 everybody is going on that, you know, 18 in the winter months it's not busy, but I have seen it start to increase over 19 20 the years from what it was years ago, 21 and at some point we have to do 22 something. And other communities I've 23 seen that have ferry companies have actually followed similar to this, and 24 25 yeah, it's rough for the first week or

two, but then people get the general 1 2 idea. As I said, the ferry company is the issue. Right now they're appeasing 3 us by having somebody down there, but 4 5 in the meantime, the summer you know as 6 well as I do one person is not going to 7 be able to deal with all of that. So, you know, I don't think it's fair that 8 9 Southold Town Police Department be called every time there's an issue that 10 11 the company North Ferry should be 12 taking care of. They're operating a business in the Village of Greenport, 13 14 and they should be taking care of it. Do we need to help them a little bit? 15 16 Maybe traffic control calming it down a 17 little bit will help because everybody 18 is going down, I mean, you get people coming down Third, they're doing the 19 20 invisible circle that's there, and it's 21 been used for years that way. That's 22 how they drop people off, but at some 23 point our traffic has increased, and we're going to be maxed out. And, you 24 25 know, as we become more of -- and as I

1 just heard at some of the meetings --2 at a NEMTEK meeting that I went to the other day, the traffic on the south 3 side is to the point where they don't 4 5 know what to do with it, so they're pushing everybody over this way. 6 7 CHIEF FLATLEY: Oh, there's definitely a lot more people that use 8 9 -- come out on the north fork and then take the ferries across if they're 10 11 going from say Bridgehampton east. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You know, the ideal thing would be if the train was 13 14 in full bloom, we had buses in full bloom so we could bring people out 15 16 without having to use the cars, but 17 that's not the case. We're too used to 18 Long Island driving with our cars. 19 CHIEF FLATLEY: I think if you go 20 anywhere else and look at other ferry 21 systems, usually their employees police 22 their own lines of the people that are 23 waiting to get on the ferry systems. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, they're 24 25 also on their own property. South

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1 ferry is on their own property, and the north ferry here is using our road as a 2 staging area instead of actually being 3 over onto the railroad property, which 4 we've all discussed. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or in rural 6 7 areas. I mean, where the south ferry drops off, I mean, it's just a road 8 9 end. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's just a road 11 end. 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So this is about -- this is the kind of stuff that all 13 14 the applications before our Boards, many of them, particularly anything 15 that has sort of complexity like SAKE, 16 what do we talk about? We talk about 17 18 SEQRA, we talk about traffic, we talk about parking. So this is a business 19 20 operating in the Village of Greenport, 21 what's in the building file for this 22 piece of property? Is this use 23 approved? 24 MR. PALLAS: The ferry use? 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was 1 2 established years ago when originally wasn't the ferry line used to come down 3 Third Street and that's when they moved 4 it over to Wiggins? 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the ferry 6 7 originally was down on the end of Main Street, and it was moved over to there. 8 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So this was approved by a Village statutory 10 11 board, this traffic use of the streets? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm sure the 13 Village Board approved it when they 14 moved it from the end of Main Street to down there. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Did they approve 17 the situation that is happening today 18 with the congestion? 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: How would they 20 know? 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because I mean, 22 think about it, if someone came to us 23 right now and said, "Hi, I want to 24 operate a business in your Village, 25 here's my application. I want to clog Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 your streets for two hours a day for 2 four blocks, " what would our Planning Board say? They'd say -- probably 3 let's have -- they'd have a SEQRA 4 Hearing, that's how it would work 5 today. It seems to be that this -- I 6 7 don't know if this has to be grandfathered in because of the way it 8 9 was done, but is there a way for us to run the North Ferry through the process 10 11 that every other business, you know, we 12 make folks that are opening a hat shop in a place that used to be a candle 13 14 shop go through a whole long process to open a business, yet this happens on 15 16 our streets. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: They have a lease 18 with somebody else who owns the property down there, it's been done for 19 20 how many years. I don't know how you 21 can go back and tell them now you can't 22 operate anymore.

23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm not sure if
24 you can. I'm raising it as an issue.
25 Is there a way to -- I guess, the

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1 answer to my question is I have to go 2 look at the building file, see what's 3 there. MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm sure you're 4 5 not going to find anything in there because there's nothing there. 6 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So then this is not an approved use? 8 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Where 1975 there was a public 10 was it? 11 hearing held by the Village of 12 Greenport, there was an article in the Mattituck Watchman where they moved the 13 14 traffic that was coming down Third Street because it was clogging up and 15 16 going -- backing up Front Street, they 17 moved the route to be the loading 18 staging area that they did. Okay? The Board at that time passed -- they had 19 20 public hearings and they passed 21 resolutions to that, that's how this 22 came about back in 1975 under Joe 23 Townsend, Joe Townsend was mayor. Then there was a point when David Papel was 24 25 mayor, then they made Wiggins back to a

two way street in 1999, I mean, 2000 1 maybe, and then -- or 2001 -- then they 2 had a public hearing in 2002, they put 3 it back to being a one way street on 4 5 Wiggins, so it's been discussed for a 6 long time. But what the biggest issue 7 has is that North Ferry up until now, and I will have to say that I have to 8 9 give them the benefit and the credit that they have been discussing stuff, 10 11 they have been taking action for a 12 change, but in the meantime they also need to come up to the plate to find 13 14 another solution to deal with this within the Village of Greenport without 15 16 -- if a business moves next door, and we, you know, it becomes active like 17 18 this is, the business owner is going to lose business or he's going to get his 19 20 neighbors mad at him, and there will be

21 some conversation. The conversation is 22 taking place, but I think that they 23 need to come back to us, which I 24 believe the mayor, and I, and Paul have 25 had discussions dealing with -- and

even Marty at the Southold Town 1 2 Transportation Comission, we had discussions of how we need to bring 3 4 people to the plate. It's not just 5 North Ferry, and it's not just the 6 Village of Greenport. We also have the 7 State of New York that has to get involved in this because they're in 8 9 public transportation, which is where they go under the guote. It makes a 10 11 little bit of a different guise being that from what I'm understanding, Joe. 12 MR. PROKOP: The ferry itself is 13 14 technically a state highway because it's an extension of one, so the State 15 has to be involved. 16 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's the 18 push to get them to talk, but in the meantime we have to do something for 19 the summer months to make it safe for 20 21 everybody that's trying to travel down 22 there, and that's where I believe the 23 idea of making Wiggins two way came. I have concerns about the ferry traffic 24 25 going up Wiggins Street. I don't think

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it's fair to the residents on that 1 street to deal with all the ferry 2 traffic. I think that we should make 3 it so that the ferry just goes up Third 4 5 Street and change the light pattern, but that's my feeling, I'm only one on 6 7 the Board. TRUSTEE ROBINS: I thought you 8 9 said yes, you want it to be two way, or no, you don't want it to be? 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If it's going 12 to be two way, I don't feel that the residents on Wiggins Street should be 13 14 dealing with the ferry traffic coming off and because the stoplight is backed 15 16 up that they're going through the 17 residential area because they're not 18 going to go slow, they're going to 19 zoom, they're on an agenda to move 20 quickly because they need to get out to 21 get onto their vacation time or 22 wherever they need to go. I think the 23 ferry traffic needs to be concentrated 24 on Third Street and change it that way. 25 That's my own feeling. If I was living

on Wiggins Street and had to deal with 1 2 the ferry traffic line and the ferry traffic coming off the ferry I'd be 3 upset. I have to deal with the 4 5 hospital traffic, and honest with you, at times it's very frustrating to have 6 7 the employees coming out of Eastern Long Island Hospital. They don't stop 8 9 at the stop sign, they zoom, they're out of work, they're in a hurry, 10 11 they're not thinking. I live with it. 12 Okay? But there's four houses on 13 Atlantic Avenue where that happens, and 14 I own three of them, so we live with it. Okay? But it's going to be the 15 16 same thing here. I just don't think 17 it's fair for the residents on Wiggins 18 Street to deal with the traffic and the 19 line up so. 20 CHIEF FLATLEY: What if you change 21 Wiggins Street to a one way street in

23 AUDIENCE MEMBER: That would be 24 insane.

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MAYOR HUBBARD: The ferry line Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

the other direction, westbound?

would have to be someplace else. 1 2 CHIEF FLATLEY: No, keep the ferry line as the ferry line, just going in 3 that direction and open the rest of the 4 street to just westbound traffic that 5 6 way you're clearing the ferry, you're 7 giving the people coming out of Third Street the opportunity to go up there. 8 9 It's just the residents of Wiggins would have to exit their properties to 10 11 the west instead of the east. I'm just 12 throwing it out there. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There's no --13 14 there's not enough room to have them exit into the parking lot, is there? 15 16 Forget it, sorry. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Unless you cut 18 off part of the parking lot. Somebody had proposed -- I think Don Fisher 19 20 proposed --21 This is something MAYOR HUBBARD: 22 that's been thrown around for forty years, and there's never been a perfect 23 solution for it at all. 24 25 Okay. Well, I appreciate you

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coming, Chief. 1 2 CHIEF FLATLEY: Any time at all. MAYOR HUBBARD: We're going to 3 have Ron give his -- he can talk about 4 5 it, if you want to listen to what he 6 has to say. That's the gentleman that 7 drew the other map that's there. Ron, 8 if you want to come on up. Did you 9 want to speak? First I should ask did 10 you want to speak? 11 MR. NELSON: Yes. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I didn't 13 want to put you on the spot and say you 14 had to, I just, you know, was asking 15 you. 16 MR. NELSON: I was anticipating 17 having a slide show in a week from now, 18 right; is that correct? 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, at the 20 regular meeting. I told you at the 21 regular meeting that we're having the 22 public hearing. We did this only to 23 accommodate the chief of police who 24 would not able to be here at our 25 meeting next Thursday.

1 MR. NELSON: I quess the first 2 thing -- the first point I would like to make is that based on the length of 3 the queue of cars that you can put on a 4 5 ferry boat, a twenty-five car ferry boat, which is, like, 415 feet head to 6 7 tail, that queue of cars fits in the space on Third Street northbound 8 9 because there's 520 feet available, so you could take all twenty-five cars 10 11 off, or twenty-five whatevers, you 12 know, trucks, whatever that's going to be, it will fit there. I will show 13 14 that next week graphically with satellite images and measurements. 15 So 16 I think the unloading problem can be dealt with rather simply if the North 17 18 Ferry company will play ball with us. It takes roughly at a max six minutes 19 for traffic to turn left in a worst 20 21 case situation where all the traffic 22 turns left at the light at Front and 23 Third. So if the North Ferry Company

their ferries arriving at the north end

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would simply do some flow control with

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of their route such that they don't 1 come more often than six minutes, the 2 traffic is going to flow just fine on 3 the unloading side. The problem, the 4 real problem is not unloading. 5 The real problem is loading. We can talk 6 7 about eliminating the parking on the south side of Wiggins, but that's --8 9 that's going to make it better, but it won't solve the problem because in the 10 11 mix of vehicles going onto the ferry 12 there's quite a few big trucks. Frequently there are semi's, 13 14 seventy-three feet long, the legal limit in the country. These 15 16 seventy-three feet long vehicles get special treatment. They get to sit at 17 18 the corner of Wiggins and Third and wait instructions from the North Ferry 19 20 operations to load. They do not go 21 through the serpentine curve these 22 days. So they sit there, and now you 23 can get on a busy day while they're waiting to get their turn on the ferry, 24 25 you can get several of these trucks

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like this morning, there were three of 1 2 them lined up, and now suddenly the North Ferry operator is trying to guide 3 traffic has, you know, more than two 4 hundred feet of truck sitting there 5 backed up ready to load, and he's 6 7 trying to keep the vehicles behind them in the case where there's no parking on 8 9 the south side, but since they're two hundred feet away from where he 10 11 frequently is, people break loose and 12 they move out into the middle of Wiggins, and they get down there and 13 14 they discover oh, my God, the serpentine -- the loop is full, I'm 15 16 going to have to sit here, and at that 17 point Wiggins Street eastbound is 18 jammed. And Chatty can't get a bus through, and making it one way or two 19 20 ways or anything isn't going to work 21 because you just don't have enough 22 width that street to manage trucks and 23 cars. So the solution that you need has to have a separate lane for trucks, 24 25 or we're going to be screwed probably

forever. I think it's untenable. 1 So 2 we need plan B that's rather different from using Wiggins, and that's what my 3 -- that's the short version of my story 4 that will be illustrated with numbers 5 6 and graphics and stuff like that to try 7 to make the point like a physicist would make. Thank you. 8 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Okay. Review the matter, we can talk about 10 11 it. He's planning on moving all the 12 traffic over into the MTA property. CHIEF FLATLEY: That would be my 13 14 solution obviously too, probably everybody's if you knew you could get 15 16 access to the MTA's property there. MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. Also we 17 18 had a meeting with the MTA last week, and they're just concerned with the 19

20 size of the vehicles and stuff as
21 proximity to the train tracks and how
22 close they could be and everything
23 else. That's something we need to get
24 answers for before we even look at that
25 because there's four people from the

| 1 | MTA that were here and said, you know, |

| 10 | MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll go back to |
| 11 | the Village Clerk. |
| 12 | MS. PIRILLO: Good evening, ladies |
| 13 | and gentlemen. Starting as usual from |
| 14 | the back, I may have an additional |
| 15 | resolution to my report, and that is |
| 16 | that we are awaiting updated |
| 17 | inter-municipal agreement from the Town |
| 18 | of Southold. Clerk Nevill let us know |
| 19 | today that it is expected tomorrow. |
| 20 | This is important for our future goals |
| 21 | because it's including the laser |
| 22 | feature and GIS systems, so that moves |
| 23 | forward our projects that we have been |
| 24 | discussing as of late. So we hope to |
| 25 | receive that tomorrow, and if so, I'd |
| | |

1 like to add the approval of that onto 2 my report.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 3 MS. PIRILLO: Thank you. Under 4 utilities, we have available the annual 5 drinking water quality report that was 6 7 received and posted to the website. Ιn addition, we have mailed letters to 8 9 neighbors of Mr. Colin Ratzy on the main road regarding his recent 10 proposal, and we're awaiting feedback. 11 12 Attorney Prokop will expand on notices of coordinated review upon which we've 13 14 been working guite extensively 15 together. 16 Reverting back to Stephen's 17 report, the BST engagement letter, I 18 wanted to let the Board know that I reviewed it fully and compared it to 19 20 the RFP approved by this Board. There 21 was one point that gave me pause, and 22 that's regarding the out-of-pocket 23 expenses, but that's because if you read the engagement letters, BST has 24

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added the two out-of-pocket expenses

1 and made it one. So for example, they 2 have a total of 4,500, that's divided into the 2,600 for the Village Wide 3 Audit and the 1,900 for the electric, 4 so I just wanted to call that to the 5 Board's attention in case anyone had 6 7 the same questions that I did. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We reviewed 8 9 that in audit committee. Those questions came up. 10 11 MS. PIRILLO: Okay. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If you remember, were you at audit committee 13 14 when we reviewed BST? MS. PIRILLO: No, but we hadn't 15 16 had the engagement letter --17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know, but the 18 question that you brought about about 19 the added expenses --MS. PIRILLO: It wasn't a 20 21 question, I was just merely telling the 22 Board that I reviewed the engagement 23 letter to ensure that it complied with the RFP that was approved just for due 24 25 diligence for the Board.

1 MS. PIRILLO: 2 The Board asked that I advise of notices of complaints 3 received via our website. We received 4 It was regarding a fence on Front 5 one. 6 Street that was purported to be an 7 illegal fence, and according to Paul Pallas we've already issued a notice of 8 9 violation, okay, and whatever further action will be taken will be taken by 10 11 code enforcement. 12 Dances in the Park, an update, there is an additional band called 13 14 Upper Cut that we've made contact with and sent a contract to and received a 15 16 W-9 from, so progress is made that way. I wanted to take a moment to thank 17 18 Mr. Reichert of the IGA known as 19 Chathmore Supermarkets formerly for 20 receipt of a check for 8,000 dollars, 21 so thank you to them very much. Thank 22 you to Friends of Mitchell Park for 23 helping us complete a grant application 24 for which we were accepted, which gives 25 us another 5,000 dollars for the

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program, so thank you to everyone who
 helped make that possible for our
 program.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, you led 4 5 that, so thank you for pursuing that. 6 MS. PIRILLO: Thank you. Your 7 welcome. I wanted to let the Board know that I had the pleasure today of 8 9 going to San Simeon Nursing Home with Margot Devito and Joe Cortell of the 10 11 library. For the first time ever, our 12 children in the rec center and others 13 not in the rec center participated in a 14 program in which children and seniors interact. This is popular in other 15 16 communities, and has not yet been 17 tested for lack of a better word here. 18 The seniors appreciated it very much, and so did the children. Each of the 19 20 children wrote a story and read it, and the children and seniors were at tables 21 22 together and also participated in joint 23 activities and group activities such as coloring, and it was very successful, 24 25 so I wanted to thank Joe also, Joe

Cortell for helping us with that. 1 2 I have a brief report this month. Any questions? Thank you. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. 4 5 The Village Attorney's Report? 6 MR. PROKOP: Thank you. I hope to 7 follow-up with a report that's brief, but I will answer questions if there 8 9 are any. The first is that -- first item on my report is that we worked for 10 11 a long time to obtain the -- and 12 finalize the assignment and assumption agreement between the Village and 13 14 Suffolk County and the MTA. That has now been completed. We have the 15 16 executed agreement. So Suffolk County 17 is now not -- is no longer a layer 18 piece, we don't have Suffolk County between us and the MTA for the four 19 20 properties that are involved. We lease 21 those properties directly from the MTA. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: They hand 23 delivered that to me. 2.4 MR. PROKOP: That was a big step 25 for us.

| 1 | The next item is regarding Habitat |

| 3 | approval by conceptual approval by |
| 4 | the County that we would have a |
| 5 | resolution adopted by the legislature, |
| 6 | which would have two parts; one would |

| 9 | two years, two additional years, and |
| 10 | then also a second part approving the |
| 11 | Village's transfer of the property to |
| 12 | Habitat for Humanity. |
| 13 | We I heard back from the |
| 14 | attorney for the legislature and also |
| 15 | the County's real estate department. |
| 16 | What they want to do is do a first |
| 17 | resolution of extending the time period |
| 18 | for two years, and then they want the |
| 19 | Village to approve a contract from the |
| 20 | Village with Habitat for Humanity, and |
| 21 | then they will approve the sale to |
| 22 | Habitat For Humanity. That's how they |
| 23 | want to do business. We're proceeding |
| 24 | along. We will we're now waiting |
| 25 | for the resolution from the |

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legislature.

2 We have -- we have a couple of coordinated reviews that one of which 3 are coming up, one is before us, notice 4 of coordinated review. It's involving 5 6 the project at Front and Third Street, 7 and we have -- pretty much at this meeting we need to decide if we're 8 9 going to comment on the application at all, and I attached in my report the 10 criteria for determining significance. 11 12 I know there's a lot there, but they're basically the kinds of things that you 13 14 would, you know, I mean I hate to trivialize it as common sense, but 15 16 basically it's the impacts on the 17 environment that we could comment about 18 regarding the project. So it would be things like impacts on noise, traffic, 19 20 views, utilities, increase in the 21 number of people in the Village, a 22 major change in the type of energy, 23 potential hazards to human health, and things like that. So these were all 24 25 listed on page four of my report. The

other thing is we will be having at 1 least one, maybe two additional notices 2 of coordinated review coming to the 3 Board at the next meeting. That will 4 be for Gleason, which is Central -- the 5 project 144 Central, and also for 6 7 Latham, which is a B&B project. So does anybody have any questions about 8 9 the coordinated review? MAYOR HUBBARD: The only question 10 11 I had, you said you want comments on 12 that this evening, or is that something you want as a resolution for next week? 13 14 MR. PROKOP: Either -- well, I think we should discuss it tonight and 15 16 then based on the discussion try to do a resolution for the next meeting, for 17 18 this meeting meaning a week from 19 tonight. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything 21 else on Joe's report before we go back 22 to that item then? 23 MR. PROKOP: There's a couple of quick things I wanted to mention 24 25 administratively that I'm going to try Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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to do to help the Village. One is that what I'd like to do if everybody is in agreement with this is try to digitize some of the building applications or some of the Board applications and also the building applications too. So many municipalities if the Planning Board, or a ZBA, or the Trustees, or the Town Board has a meeting on ab application, there's a big screen where -- which is connected to a laptop, and you actually -- the plans from the application and the renderings are actually digitized, and the public can view them, the Board members and the public can view them

16 while the application is being 17 explained. And then the applicant can 18 also use it has a prop, you know, for 19 the explanation of the application. So 20 many of our applications now, the 21 applicant and the public come and they 22 speak to the Board -- excuse me, the 23 applicant speaks to the Board, and the public is left trying to visualize the 24 25 application really with nothing in

| 23 | positions, the Clerk of the Board. |
| 24 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is that person |
| 25 | going to be paid to go to all the |
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meetings, the Clerk? 1 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. That is going to be their -- they'll be manning 3 the camera, setting that up and 4 5 everything, the live stream. That will be part of their job description. 6 So 7 to make sure that we have a screen with a projector and the laptop is here. We 8 9 just got the new laptop. Jean Marie is here with it. So they just, you know, 10 11 here's your disk or whatever, pop it 12 in, and then they just sit there and do what they have to do with it. It will 13 14 be helpful for us but also for the public who would have access to it. 15 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just out of curiosity, Paul, are all of the -- or 17 18 currently, I know I've asked you for PDF's of the application and the 19 20 drawings and whatever, are we doing 21 that for all applications now, scanning 22 them into a PDF file? 23 MR. PALLAS: No, we haven't yet as 24 a general matter. The only thing I 25 would suggest, I think this is a good Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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idea as a general matter. I think maybe we want to set some criteria as

to what -- you know, you don't want 3 every one, some of them are simple and 4 5 straightforward. You know, maybe Joe 6 and I could get together and figure out 7 some kind of a game plan on which ones would go that way and which ones 8 9 wouldn't. I don't know, just a 10 thought.

11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Joe, I have a 12 question. On page two under the 13 Assiski (phonetic) garage application, 14 the second paragraph, this isn't related to the application per se, you 15 16 say that you recommended the Village 17 develop a property card type system 18 where all approvals, denials, permits, 19 et cetera are entered into a system and 20 can be retrieved and printed out in a 21 summary sheet. Now, currently, our 22 property cards are all at the Southold 23 Town tax assessor's office. That's 24 where I go to get property cards all 25 the time. All of that information is

theoretically being reported from us based on the building permits et cetera are on those property cards already. So those property cards exist already in Southold Town. The tax assessor does them.

7 MR. PROKOP: This is a different type system. So this would be a live 8 9 system in the building department and throughout the Village so if somebody 10 11 wanted to see -- what happens -- if somebody wanted to see all the prior 12 13 approvals on the property, they would 14 be able to -- you know, applications, approvals, denials, anything that's 15 16 happened with regard to a property you would be able to do this. Many towns 17 18 and villages have this where -- right 19 now we're arranged basically by 20 application, not by property, and what 21 I hope to do, if we could, I mean, obviously I'm not, you know, in the 22 23 management of the Village, but if I could make a suggestion because this 24 25 works very well, you know, to change

1 our system to be property oriented 2 rather than application oriented so you could go to a property and see what's 3 happened there in the past. Like the 4 5 ferry, we just had a question tonight about the ferry property, and then 6 7 there was another question as to what's in the property file? Well, we really 8 9 don't have -- in my understanding at least is that we don't have quote, 10 11 unquote property files, we have application files, so you would have to 12 find the application file. 13 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Excuse me? I'm confused because the whole idea behind 15 16 doing the scanning is going to be by 17 tax map, property map. 18 MR. PROKOP: Right. Okay. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Maybe what 20 you're suggesting is that when 21 something comes in, it gets put into 22 that system. MR. PROKOP: Right. 23 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Recently we've had 25 applications that came in, they didn't Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

go back and get the folder, there was 1 2 nothing that happened in twenty years, and they didn't look what previous 3 approvals and stuff were there. They 4 5 started a new application, a new folder 6 with what's happening right now, didn't 7 go back to twenty-five years ago, and there was stuff in the previous stuff. 8 9 I think that's what Joe is saying so it all ends up being together, but when we 10 11 combine everything and it's all on 12 disk, it would all be there, even the old stuff. 13 14 MR. PROKOP: That's what I mean. I'm sorry, I didn't mean for this to be 15 16 the meat of my report. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, I brought it 18 up because you were calling it a 19 property card and --20 MR. PROKOP: What we call property 21 cards -- in other municipalities, you 22 can request a property card, and then 23 everything back to year one is on there, you can see everything that's 24 25 happened.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we already 1 2 know we have an issue with the procedure was -- and I'm assuming Paul 3 has changed it, when an application 4 comes in, all of the files are now 5 being gathered; am I correct, Paul? 6 7 MR. PALLAS: They're being reviewed, and anything that has a 8 9 pending application, there's a tag placed in the property file so you know 10 if you go to that property file that 11 12 there's something else going on, you have to get it out of that property 13 14 file. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Instead of 15 16 relying on everybody's institutional 17 history as in the past. I'm being 18 facetious. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Digitizing this 20 is clearly proving to be a challenge 21 because, you know, the report again is 22 waiting or I don't know where we are 23 with it. It sounds to me like maybe this is a really heavy lift, and 24 25 something that if we're going to Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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digitize our building files would be a 1 2 great benefit to everybody but could also be very expensive and take our 3 team off task, and maybe we need to 4 5 think differently about it. Maybe 6 there's some grant out there we can --7 I don't know. It would be great. MAYOR HUBBARD: Once the equipment 8 9 gets all set up and everything else and we get through that hurdle to get the 10 11 agreements and everything set up, I 12 think once they start on it it won't be as bad. It's still going to take a lot 13 14 of time, it's going to take a year or two to get it all done, but the hardest 15

16 part is getting the licenses and the 17 equipment actually here.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What's the hold 19 up?

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: He's been working 21 on it with Southold Town, we're now 22 getting the equipment here, the 23 licensing, setting the whole parameters 24 up of how to be able to go and use it, 25 start doing it. It's not just putting

1 a scanner there and start running 2 things through, it's all a program. MS. PIRILLO: I think you may have 3 been in the men's room during part of 4 my report when I mentioned that we're 5 hoping to have a revised IMA, 6 7 inter-municipal agreement as early as tomorrow with Southold Town, which 8 9 includes the GIS and the laser fusion. So that's a positive step in our goal 10 11 direction. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: We legally can do 13 it that way. 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. MR. PROKOP: Does anybody -- I 15 16 don't have anything else to -- going 17 back to the legal part of my report, I 18 don't have anything else unless somebody has questions. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You mentioned a 20 21 coordinated review, do you want the 22 discussion now about that. 23 MR. PROKOP: We should have it as 24 soon as possible. It's up to the Mayor 25 and the Board.

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1 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not going to 2 have the discussion at the regular meeting. If it needs to be a 3 resolution, we need to discuss it now 4 5 what you want to do. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sylvia, I'm 7 sorry, my memory, it's been a busy month, did I not write my thoughts on 8 9 the corner of Front and Third? MS. PIRILLO: I'm sorry, I can't 10 11 hear you. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Didn't I write to you my comments on the Front and 13 14 Third for a coordinated review because I thought we had to do it last month? 15 16 MS. PIRILLO: I believe that you 17 did submit comments, yes. I don't have 18 them with me. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't 19 20 remember what they were then. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I put some 22 thought into it. I don't know where 23 the rest of the Board is. I wanted to bring up the height issue and see --24 25 because he's asking for a variance on Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 height. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, and that's something you and I discussed. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, I think 4 5 it's our job to sort of look after the code and think about this. We have 6 7 several three story buildings down there. He's asking for a third story. 8 9 Where are we on this? I think it actually ties to a much larger issue 10 11 that Trustee Phillips and I discussed. 12 Where are we in general on this, because this is not going to be the 13 14 first request for a variance on a three story, and so especially it's not a 15 commercial CRWC, so where are we on 16 this? 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I believe --19 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Where are we -- I 21 mean, if you want to change the code or whatever, there's a process of doing 22 23 that. Right now it's up to the ZBA to interpret the code and issue a variance 24 25 accordingly. What we're doing here is

1 just if there's something particular on 2 that one piece of property, coordinated review is talking about just that. You 3 know, the bigger picture, if you want 4 to change the code or whatever, that's 5 6 something we have to go through a 7 public hearing and rewrite the code, and then the ZBA would interpret what 8 9 the new code and the new law would be. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we also --10 11 if I understand it correctly with a 12 coordinated review, we're also allowed 13 from this Board to say that we would

14 prefer that they not grant the variance 15 for the height, correct?

16 MR. PROKOP: You can do it in terms of SEQRA, so the first thing is I 17 would like to point out to the Board 18 that it's a three story building with a 19 fourth floor of use. It's three 20 21 constructed floors, and then there's an 22 additional floor on top, which is a use 23 that's going to have a deck and --TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's an outside 24 25 structure though, it's for exterior use

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only, it's not an interior space,
 correct?

MR. PROKOP: Yes, but it's four 3 floors of use, three of which are 4 5 enclosed. So you cannot recommend an approval or a denial, but you could say 6 7 that the approval of the height variance would have a negative impact 8 9 -- you feel would have a negative impact on the environment or the 10 11 Village. You know, just as a 12 suggestion, things might be views, noise, the character of the 13 14 neighborhood, things like that. Those are -- it might have a detrimental 15 16 impact. That's the way that you would need to express it, as a suggestion. 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What about the 19 current zoning, is that something that 20 we could suggest, perhaps it should be 21 changed to make the property not have

23 is that something the Village Board can 24 suggest, or is that something the 25 applicant would have to go through and

to require -- I mean, I'm just asking,

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do? I mean, it's zoned waterfront 1 commercial, it's not really waterfront 2 commercial. There's no water view from 3 there except on the fourth floor 4 there's going to be from the rooftop. 5 6 MR. PROKOP: The change in zone 7 could only be to another zoning district that we have, or it could be 8 9 to what's called a planned development district, which is a zoning which is 10 11 particular to a particular property or 12 area. Those are the only changes in zone we can recommend. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we make a change to zone while the application is 15 16 in process? MR. PROKOP: Yes, the application 17 18 would have to wait while the change of zone took place, but you could do it 19 20 while the application is in process. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is that done 22 routinely? 23 MR. PROKOP: I've done it before. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just asking 25 because I reviewed that property and Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 the file and there's been applications 2 on that property since 1987, and they've denied every time it's gone 3 onto it, so it's -- and it was the same 4 5 type of application, the same type of desire to put that much intensification 6 7 of use on that property because it was zoned waterfront commercial, I'm just 8 9 throwing it out. I don't know if it was zoned something else. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. But I 12 mean, if we want to change the code and 13 make it a new zone and everything 14 else -- the coordinated review right now is to give our thoughts of what we 15 16 want to do with that. You know, we're not supposed to tell the ZBA, "We don't 17 18 want you to approve this." TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm not --19 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: We need to put 21 together our thoughts, and there's a 22 time frame on it, it's forty-five days. 23 So we need to get our comments 24 together, what we want to make a 25 comment on to them, and then they will Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 read and interpret them and do what 2 they feel is appropriate with the variance as they're going forward with 3 it. If you want to make a special 4 5 district or whatever, that's going to take you -- you have to write to the 6 7 district, you have to go through public hearings, that's going to take months 8 9 to do. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm just 10 11 throwing out ideas, that's all, because 12 I'm finding it a little difficult to be discussing the coordinated review at a 13

14 work session without all the 15 information in front of me, so I'm 16 finding that a little disheartening. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: What information

17 MATOR HOBBARD: What information18 would you like?

19TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think20that, you know, I don't have the21paperwork that was for the coordinated22review. We were sent something a while23ago, were we not? How long ago was24that sent, Sylvia?

MS. PIRILLO: I'm sorry, I can't

| 21 | effect of that would have an adverse |
| 22 | effect on noise levels in that |

| 24 | say either or, right? |
| 25 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. |
| | |

MR. PROKOP: 1 Yes. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So I want to put out to people, what do we think 3 about a fourth floor, you know, roof 4 deck? 5 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Against the law. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And it's effect on the environmental noise levels? And 8 9 is it possible for the ZBA to issue a variance for the third story without 10 the fourth floor deck? 11 12 MR. PROKOP: Yes, they could issue the variance for the third floor and 13 14 put in as a condition -- include as a condition that there would be not be a 15 16 fourth floor deck, you know, fire pit, 17 and all the other things. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So this one 19 trustee, I'm just putting this out 20 there, would support that. From a 21 SEQRA perspective, we have a lot -- I 22 don't see an environmental impact when 23 you have a bunch of three story buildings around it to have a three 24 25 story building. A fourth story roof Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

deck would have an environmental impact
 in my personal opinion.

MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, we do have 3 it in our code that you can't have 4 outdoor amplified music at all, so it 5 6 really would -- they would be able to 7 sit up there. I mean, it's in the code, so as long as it's enforced and 8 9 everything else, if they were going to do that, they couldn't have a band 10 11 playing on this outdoor deck, you know, 12 but --

13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It doesn't have
14 to be a band to make a lot of noise.
15 People do make a lot of noise.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: They do, yes. 17 It's higher up. People coming out of 18 the movie theater, fifty people come 19 out of the movie theater all at once, 20 it's noisy for the time being, you 21 know.

22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Speaking of 23 that, we have the intensification of an 24 eighty seat restaurant on the ground 25 floor and hotel uses for sixteen units

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on the second and third floor as well 1 2 as a roof deck, so the amount of traffic that's going to be generated on 3 that corner where we already have a 4 fair amount of traffic issues to begin 5 6 with is going to be horrendous. Are 7 they going to be -- you know, irregardless of whether they exit off 8 9 onto Front Street or whether they exit off onto Third Street, they're going to 10 11 be right in the midst of what we were 12 just discussing before, the ferry traffic, or the traffic coming out of 13 14 Sterlington Commons. You know, it's just a little bit too much for that 15 16 corner of the road to handle for traffic. 17 18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: If you look at

10111111101119the plans, they're not coming out onto20Front Street, there's no exit on Front21Street, it's right into Third Street,22it's right into the zone that we're23worrying about with the ferry right24now. That's their exit. So I mean,25more than the height, that's my concern

is really the traffic situation on 1 2 Third Street. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just brought 3 that up, I was going through the list 4 5 of variances. Your shift of topics was fine. 6 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I agree with the height, it should be part of the 8 9 thought from the coordinated review, but the traffic of loading and 10 unloading trucks, people coming in and 11 12 out. What if they have a party that has a bus that delivers the hotel 13 14 restaurant clientele, where is that 15 going to stop? 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The challenge though with that piece of property is 17 18 that it's been vacant for -- since the carousel left it, right? And what 19 20 could one ever put there that would not 21 increase the intensity? It's sort of 22 an impossible scenario given its 23 current zoning. 2.4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Ideally something 25 that would fit -- every project that Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 seems to be proposed for there is 2 maximizing the limits of every code that we have. Somebody that would put 3 something in there that's manageable 4 for the site and had enough room. 5 The trouble is everybody is looking dollars 6 7 and cents, and they're looking to maximize their profits on it, they want 8 9 to put in the biggest possible thing that they can. I mean, with this we 10 11 could send a letter to them saying 12 we're concerned about the fourth floor 13 being open space and being used as a 14 deck and concerned with the parking, and then let the Zoning Board use the 15 16 powers that they have to deny --17 approve or deny what's going on, but 18 we're just voicing our opinion about parking, traffic, and the noise of the 19 20 open fourth floor deck. We'll put that 21 as a letter, and that would be 22 forwarded to the Board, and those would 23 be our comments. The rest of the stuff with the variances, they're going to 24 25 have to deal with that, they'll go

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through the legal ramification, they're 1 going to deal with that part of it. 2 But that's what we would do as a Board, 3 that should be what our letter is T 4 think. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Fine with me. 6 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And we could --I will point out that the department I 8 9 think that they're asked -- the amount -- our code requires that they have a 10 lot of spaces, I think it's twenty-six, 11 12 and they were going to be proposing, 13 like, six or something. Now, there 14 is --TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think it was 15 16 twelve. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks. There 17 18 is a huge municipal parking lot that we currently don't enforce any limits, but 19 if we were to down at the railroad 20 21 station, so I don't know if it's our 22 place at this point to -- I think I'm 23 going to go with what you said. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because you're 24 25 getting into a previous application Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

that tried to do it, and that denied 1 2 what you're thinking. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I don't think 3 it's my place to do so. 4 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're voicing our 6 concerns, and then they'll do what's 7 appropriate as they're doing it. I think that's the easiest way. Do you 8 9 want that as a resolution, Joe? Can we just have a letter written that the 10 11 Board will approve and then forward the 12 letter? MR. PROKOP: Yes, why don't we do 13 14 that. Sylvia and I will draft the 15 letter. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: They'll draft the 17 letter, they'll get it out to us, 18 everybody will see it before it's sent 19 to the Zoning Board then, and just 20 answer back that you're okay with it. 21 I'm going to review it, and then we'll 22 forward that to the Zoning Board. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Remind me, what was the waterfront commercial use, or 24 25 are they requesting a full variance on Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that we 1 2 need to, I mean, I was thinking about the pedestrian traffic, vehicle 3 traffic. It would be -- it's my 4 5 understanding though that there's a ZBA made the decisions on the 6 7 interpretations? TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes. 8 9 MR. PROKOP: That's right. Anything else on 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: 11 that discussion? 12 MR. PROKOP: No, that's fine. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll draft 13 14 a letter, everybody will look at it, and then just give a text back or an 15 16 e-mail back to the Village Attorney 17 that you're okay with it, or if you 18 have any questions or want changes on 19 it, you know, send that back to him as 20 soon as possible so we can get this out 21 for next week. 22 MR. PROKOP: Next time, maybe I 23 can structure -- you know, I have the SEQRA language here, and maybe next 24 25 time all I have to do is make sort of a Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 work sheet instead of just having a 2 dump of all the language, you know, for you to go through. Maybe the next time 3 I can sort of make a one or two page 4 5 work sheet for the Trustees to work on, 6 and that way you can make notes, and we 7 can, you know, consolidate it at these 8 meetings.

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: If you look at the 10 Planning Board agenda, there's five 11 applications on the Planning Board 12 agenda that all have a coordinated review. So this is a new process to 13 14 us, so we need to get up to speed on it sooner than later, but with five of 15 16 them coming up, we're going to have a bunch of these to do over the next 17 18 month.

19MR. PROKOP: I'll put the work20sheet on the screen and then we'll all21--

22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, otherwise
23 written comments, you want something in
24 writing usually, right? So a work
25 sheet might be a great way to start it,

1 direct us.

MAYOR HUBBARD: We all just need 2 to get the comments back in early and 3 put the stuff together so if he has 4 5 five comments, they can draft a letter 6 together, and then we can look at that 7 instead of trying to have the whole discussion right now. We're caught a 8 9 little off guard on it. That's what happened last month, we talked about 10 it, said we have forty-five days, not 11 12 the thirty, and time flies because there's so much else going on, so I 13 14 think that's where we ended up. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know. 15 Thank 16 you. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are there any 18 other coordinated reviews that I need to be worried about right now? 19 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. 21 They're not with TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 22 the clock ticking. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, but five of the six applications for the Planning 24 Board are all in the historic district 25 Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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and all need coordinated review. 1 So 2 that will be next week when they have their meeting, that will start the ball 3 rolling. How fast they go through, 4 5 whether they come to us right away or 6 not, but over the next couple of months 7 there are five more applications that need this process. 8 9 Anything else for Joe? MR. PROKOP: 10 Thank you. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Report 12 from committees, we didn't have any committee meetings this month, so we'll 13 14 go to Trustee reports. Jack was on top, he's not here, the next one I have 15 16 in my package was Trustee Phillips, if 17 you want to start? 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: T have been --Carlos DeJesus who is the Village 19 20 Historian and I have been discussing 21 some items within the historic district 22 within the Village of Greenport. He's 23 been doing some research and has discovered that the information website 24 25 that is showing all of our properties Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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that are either in the National 1 2 Register or the Federal Register or some properties that are outside of the 3 district but still need to have reviews 4 under the historic commission aren't 5 6 updated. So in talking to the lady at 7 the commission and talking to Carlos, my suggestion is that we need to take 8 9 our previous applications that are -and pictures and photos and go back and 10 11 make sure that they're all entered with 12 the State of New York. Also it would be a good review for the historic 13 14 commission, so I'm suggesting that perhaps we could have the Village 15 16 Administrator, the Village Clerk, the 17 Village Attorney, and whoever you 18 appoint as a Trustee to work out a plan 19 of action to get this process started so it's corrected because as Joe is 20 21 starting to do more coordinated reviews 22 because historic properties have to 23 have it, I feel that some people either don't realize what they need to go 24 25 through. Some people may be missing

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out on some tax benefits that are 1 2 involved in historic properties, but it's just something that we've spent 3 4 years doing. And the other question 5 that has come up, which is one of my questions is the fire boat is now a 6 7 registered historic -- it's on the National Register, and the railroad 8 9 property, which is now being separated from the Village would need to start 10 11 coming into -- if they're going to do 12 any type of work, we need to get a decision as to do they need to come 13 14 before a Historic Board for anything from now on since they're not under the 15 16 Village rule. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In other words, 19 if they want to do brick work, or if

20 they want to do some type of work at 21 the railroad building because they're a 22 national -- on the National Register 23 they need to go before a historic 24 commission, where before because they 25 were associated with the Village they

1 didn't need to. And the fire boat, we need to find out -- when I explained to 2 Ms. Betsworth that the fire boat was 3 part of -- is now because they got a 4 5 grant and they've become part of the 6 National Register for historic sites, how do we deal with them? Because 7 they're tied up at the railroad dock. 8 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, I didn't think we'd have any jurisdiction over 10 11 them. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know. 13 As I said, I ask these questions and 14 got a lot of we don't know, we have to do some research. So that was my 15 16 suggestion is if you would just appoint 17 someone along with the management team, 18 and we could try to get it straightened out so that the historic commission 19 20 actually could do the project because 21 according to the code, they're supposed 22 to be working on these type of projects 23 every year along with the other duties that they have. 24

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The liaison meeting was mentioned

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1 in newspaper this week. Our topic 2 really dealt with discussions, it didn't deal with anybody making any 3 offers or anything for our sewer 4 system. We discussed housing, we 5 discussed the issues between the Town 6 7 of Southold and the Village of Greenport on trying to create downtown 8 9 housing. I discovered that in the Town of Southold, the biggest problem for 10 11 them to do apartments above their 12 commercial retail buildings is Suffolk 13 County Health Department because they 14 have to have so many requirements because there's no sewers, so that was 15 16 an interesting thing. That's why they keep spreading all of their affordable 17 18 housing out into the other areas, not into the downtown districts like 19 20 Mattituck, Southold. 21 We also discussed the CPF funding. 22 I did a little research, and I found

I did a little research, and I found out that they have a full code, and they have a whole plan that's already set for 2015-2016, so that's something

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1 that it was suggested by the liaisons that if we wanted to present a project 2 to the CPF committee for some property 3 in the Village of Greenport, for some 4 project or whatever, that we would have 5 6 to develop it and present it to them, 7 although in their code we are allowed to do that, which I didn't really know. 8 9 As I said, I met with Paul on a couple of items, and Sylvia and I had 10 11 been discussing some projects for 12 better public communications, attending SVOCA, and the New York MTC meeting, 13 14 I'm still reviewing some of their plans from the information gathering. 15 The 16 only thing I can tell you is that the 17 only thing they had on for Greenport 18 was a bike route, and they knew that we had a train station in Greenport, other 19 20 than that, all of their work or 21 proposed plans were for the south side. 22 So Heather Lonza (phonetic) and I both 23 were there, and we even discussed helicopters, which they were amazed 24 25 about. So that's pretty much it.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: May I ask a question? They said we need to present 3 a plan, you guys showed them the 4 5 several thousand dollar study we did on 6 the sewer, right? 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The liaisons for Southold Town in our first meeting 8 9 with Jack a year ago asked for a copy of the East West Sewer District -- I 10 11 mean the sewer --12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Expansion? 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Expansion. 14 They're familiar with it, but their discussion of planning is to take a 15 16 look and see in the Village what you 17 think could be a possible product, I'll 18 say product, to present to the Land 19 Preservation Board. It had nothing 20 really to do with -- the water quality 21 money is not even set yet. I mean, you 22 know, it's going to be money that is 23 not additional funding, it's going to be coming out of the existing CPF 24 25 collection.

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1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So your note 2 here about the plan was for land preservation, if we had an idea? 3 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But the Town 5 6 Liaisons confirmed that they did 7 receive East West study a year ago. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, no, 8 9 because Jack presented it to them again, and I had already -- and Paul 10 11 had been gracious enough to give it to 12 me so I could put it on a UBS (sic) stick for them to review a while ago 13 14 because we sit and talk a lot of ideas, we're not agreeing to anything. This 15 16 is just -- we discussed harbor master situations, we've discussed other 17 18 things that are joint between the Town 19 of Southold and the Village of 20 Greenport, mutual stuff. I do know 21 that in all honesty, and I wrote an 22 e-mail to the Mayor this morning, that 23 before we even get into the discussion of selling our sewer, I think we as a 24 25 Village need to make a policy as to how

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but he's been pushing for several 1 2 months to get it going. We're waiting for the new budget year to start that, 3 but when he does the sewer study, then 4 you'll have some information of what's 5 6 available, where you're going with it, 7 what the prices need to be and everything else. 8

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's just that, you know, we have people who are 10 11 looking for money for expanding the district, and we're talking about it, 12 but I think we need to get down to the 13 14 business plan of where we're going to go with what we have before we start 15 16 trying to expand out too far. I mean, 17 we have Peconic Landing is going to be 18 coming online, is Eastern Long Island 19 Hospital increasing? You know, San 20 Simeon made an approach to us, I'm sure 21 you've had other properties, whatever, 22 I mean, we could quickly go to 650,000 23 and be in trouble.

24MR. PALLAS: Again, these are25lump, you know, lump load type issues

that we would know at least 1 2 significantly in advance of where we were on those, but still we should know 3 what the ultimate number is. 4 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, you 6 know, I know that we're waiting for the 7 new budget year for the sewer study. MAYOR HUBBARD: When we get that, 8 9 the whole process needs to be -- I know what you're saying, we had the East 10 11 West sewer study, we've never actually 12 done anything with it, we haven't set up what we're going to do, how we're 13 14 going to manage it, what we're going to do with the information that we got 15 from it. So that's what needs to be 16 17 done as a Board and say -- we talked 18 about Colin Ratzy with his starting his 19 project to see how well that worked 20 before we approached Sterling Harbor to 21 see if they would go and put in a 22 similar -- if we could get that deal to 23 work, because we're going to need a 24 piece of land for a pump station 25 somewhere down there, and we own no Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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So talking to them, would they 1 land. 2 do a similar deal like Colin did to put the pump station there to get the stuff 3 moving from Sandy Beach far enough up 4 5 to get onto the main that's coming down 6 Sterling or Atlantic, excuse me, 7 Atlantic going down from Peconic Landing. So somewhere we can't just 8 9 put the sewer in there without some way of getting the stuff uphill. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm --11 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: And we don't have 13 any land down there that we could use, 14 so that's why were trying to get this thing wrapped up with Colin to see if 15 16 that process works so that -- Mike 17 Asivo (phonetic) has been very helpful, 18 he wants it, everybody down there wants it, but we need a piece of land down 19 20 there to put a pump station, and that's 21 what we're trying to see if this other 22 thing works out, if they would go 23 forward and say yes, you have, you know, 20 by 20 piece of land, whatever 24 25 we need to do to get a pump station in

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1

there.

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How often do the town liaisons meet with us? 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, we're 4 5 going to be meeting more frequently than we did in the past. Jack was not 6 7 available a lot when he was called to duty last year, so hopefully we're 8 9 going to have another meeting next month. I'm not sure what Jack's 10 schedule is, I work around him. So 11 12 hopefully, I'm interested in having a 13 meeting because the newspaper article, 14 I know that they did not mention at the meeting that there was any proposal 15 16 being presented, but the newspaper made it sound like Jack and I made some kind 17 18 of a deal, and that's not the 19 situation. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's going 21 around, that idea. That makes a better 22 news story. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Anyway, I just think that we as a Board need to start 24 25 putting our business sense into dealing Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

with the sewer plant, so that's where I 1 2 think we need to start off first, and that's why I wrote the e-mail I wrote 3 4 this morning. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I haven't 6 read it yet, but I will read that, and 7 we'll put something together and try to put a plan together for next week's 8 9 meeting. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Other than 10 11 that. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Trustee Robins? 13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: First report, I 14 had my first meeting with the Carousel Committee. There was a maintenance 15 16 report submitted by Bob Wisman by 17 e-mail. In his report he pointed out 18 some of the difficulties involved in 19 accomplishing regular maintenance 20 scheduled for the Carousel machinery. 21 I'm going to be going over maintenance 22 protocol with Paul Pallas and Margot 23 Devito to determine the best way to achieve regular and efficient 24 25 maintenance. Margot reported that the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 work on the doors in ongoing. Ι 2 reported that the Village has engaged a new contractor, Liberty Iron Works in 3 Southampton, they're a metal 4 fabricating company. Their services 5 6 are similar to Flek and the company 7 that built the original doors and has been our contractor since they were 8 9 installed. We decided it's definitely time for a change. I spoke with the 10 11 workers at the Carousel in March, and 12 they advised me that there's a problem 13 they thought at the time with the gear 14 rod that the doors move along when they They reported that the rods 15 open. 16 aren't heavy enough to handle the 17 weight of the doors. They removed one 18 of the rods and took it back to their 19 shop to fabricate a prototype. They will return and install it for a trial 20 21 period. Happened to see them working 22 over at the Carousel today, so I 23 stopped by to talk to them, and they actually told me that they discovered 24 25 that the problem wasn't the rods, the

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1 problem was the bushings, so they, as 2 Paul reported, I think were in the process of replacing bushings today, 3 and they're going to complete the rest 4 of the four doors now and additional --5 MR. PALLAS: Four done and two 6 7 more before Memorial Day. TRUSTEE ROBINS: So that's good 8 9 I'm very concerned about the news. maintenance of that Carousel, so I 10 11 intend to kind of stay on top of that. 12 Margot said that -- Margot reports that the summer staff is all in place for 13 14 all the recreational facilities. She clarified and reiterated the existing 15 16 employment policy with all the 17 employees to make -- set up separate 18 meetings with both of them just so they're all on board and understand 19 20 what the rules and regulations are of 21 employment there. She's assured me 22 that she has a back up list of workers, 23 you know, so if somebody doesn't show up, she has somebody to come in and 24 25 cover them. She's also done

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cross-training with all the employees 1 2 so that they're available to work at either the Carousel or the marina to 3 help alleviate staffing issues. I 4 think that's a great idea. The other 5 thing that the Carousel is still 6 7 dealing with are the rounding boards, and they finally have assigned one 8 9 painting to each of the artists. Apparently everybody sort of chose the 10 same thing, so everybody now is getting 11 12 one of their chosen patterns and the other pictures are being assigned by a 13 14 random selection by competent Village staff, Sylvia and her staff are going 15 to be doing a drawing to determine 16 17 them. 18 MS. PIRILLO: Starting tomorrow 19 morning at 11:00. 20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: So, you know, the 21 idea was everybody is getting started 22 on their first painting at least, so 23 hopefully that will continue to move forward. I'm very excited to be 24 25 working on the Carousel, so thank you Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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for that appointment. 1 2 I attended a big meeting today. Ι requested and they did submit a budget 3 report for last year and a report on 4 5 their budget for this year, so I've included that for everybody. Did I 6 7 give you one for Jack Martilotta? TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we get this 8 9 electronically maybe? TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I'll scan 10 11 it. I'll put all my stuff online 12 tomorrow. So they discussed the treasurers report, then they discussed 13 14 -- put a discussion of the budget cap and their tax assessment. They did get 15 16 a slight increase this year of 900 17 dollars, and that apparently is tied to 18 the tax cap discussions with Robert. 19 They wanted to increase their budget 20 more, but they are locked into the tax 21 cap right now. They are going to try 22 and -- John Kramer who is the new 23 treasurer is going to contact Bob Scott to discuss assessments, what they feel 24 25 is -- you know, because there's been a

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lot of work going on in the Village on 1 2 business properties that they just want to make sure that the properties are 3 being properly assessed and paying, you 4 5 know, a higher rate of tax. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: The building 7 department gives them a list twice a 8 year. 9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. Is it twice a year? So that was -- they 10 wanted to follow through with that. 11 12 They are in the process of obtaining a 501C status. That's going to take a 13 14 while. Until they do that, they can't do any direct fundraising. The budget 15 16 for this year includes requiring 17 regular invoices from their website 18 manager, one of their big expenses. They voted to require her to provide 19 20 itemized monthly invoices with a 21 description of her services and costs 22 to be broken down. They voted to approve the cost of all the plants, 23 materials, and labor for the planters 24 25 that we put out recently in the

Village, so they'll be working on that. 1 2 They've obtained their contractor, and they're ready to move forward with 3 that. I advised them that if there 4 5 were going to be any changes of 6 location, that they have to come to us, 7 that that's our determination. I don't know if, Paul, you and Darryl were out 8 9 looking at planter locations. They seem to feel that some of the planters 10 11 were in awkward locations, that people 12 would be having difficulty getting out of their cars in certain places. I 13 14 noticed several of them that were right 15 alongside crosswalks where I thought 16 that people may have to veer around, 17 you know, if you have a large group of 18 people crossing the street, so I'd like to see those planters reviewed in terms 19 20 of their location. 21 MR. PALLAS: If they have 22 alternate locations, maybe they could

let me know. If you move one, then itwill be too close to the next one.

25

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just think, you

1

2 busy out there. MR. PALLAS: We'll take a look. 3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: A lot of 4 5 discussion about trying to plan for the 6 shoulder season. Right now the season 7 is here, it's easy for them. I mean, everything comes to them at this point. 8 9 What they're trying to do is do more planning for the off season, so I think 10 11 they're going to do a meet and greet 12 invitation to all the members of the bid, all the stores and businesses 13 14 early next month to come over. They'll have a few quest speakers from the 15 16 wine, oyster, food industries and stuff 17 like that to speak with them and get 18 ideas on how to promote the good things that go on here in the Village the rest 19 20 of the year, not just in the -- during 21 the summer. They approved -- there 22 were two fundraising applications they 23 received. One was for Dances in the Park, they approved 500 dollars for 24 25 that, and they approved 500 dollars for

1

Shakespeare in the Park.

2 And the last thing I just wanted to give just a little -- I'm not going 3 to read the whole thing, it's kind of 4 boring, but the NYACK conference that 5 6 Paul and I attended up in Saratoga 7 Springs April 21st to 23rd. Variety of speakers, there was a very interesting 8 9 presentation on battery storage. One of the exciting areas of development in 10 11 the energy industry is battery storage 12 because the use of renewable energy via solar and wind is only as good as, you 13 14 When the sun or the wind are know. blowing, so that's where all the 15 16 technology is going now is to how to 17 store that energy to be able to be 18 used, so we heard some very interesting discussion on that. We also had a 19 20 presentation of two of our NYACK 21 members, two small utilities upstate 22 who also receive New York Prize. They 23 gave a little bit of a presentation. One was from Jamestown Electric. They 24 25 talked about their system, which is

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actually currently considered a micro 1 grid. They work on a gas turbine 2 It has a two breaker 3 system. disconnect to get in island mode. 4 5 Right now what they're questioning is 6 if they wanted to create an independent 7 system to operate during storms if it's worth it for them to invest in it at 8 9 this point. So they're probably going to do a cost benefit analysis to decide 10 11 if they would want to move forward with 12 this project any further. The other village was Sherburn. 13 14 They're on the central part of the state. Very rural, population 1,300. 15 16 They're, like, one square mile. 17 They've focused on energy efficiency 18 programs, efficient hot water heaters, LED lighting. They feel they do need a 19 20 micro grid to deal with a grid outage 21 to add generation. They currently have 22 none. So they would like -- they're 23 hoping that natural gas, which is about two miles away will come into their 24 25 area and give them some kind of an

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opportunity for a gas generator for
 backup.

We had an interesting speaker from 3 the Empire Center For Public Policy. 4 5 He talked about the -- he gave an economic overview of the state of the 6 7 economy, not just in New York but in the United States. Very interesting 8 9 Power Point presentation on employment and why things -- you know, income and 10 11 things haven't moved really. Anybody 12 who would like to see it, let me know, I'd be happy to share the Power Point 13 14 with you, you know, graphs and, you know, charts that basically show the 15 difference between job development 16 17 since the recession downstate versus 18 upstate. Upstate really is in a very 19 bad way. You would be surprised the 20 levels of unemployment and the 21 struggles that a lot of people are 22 going through in the rest of the state, 23 very different than the downstate New York metro area, Westchester. So that 24 25 was a pretty interesting report.

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We also had legal updates from Tom 1 2 Ruderbush (phonetic), they're our Washington attorneys, take care of all 3 of our electric contracts. Susan Store 4 (phonetic), our NYACK lobbyist in 5 6 Albany and Washington gave us an update 7 on current proceedings, items of interest to public power. And then the 8 9 last of our presentations were from two 10 guys from the New York Power Authority, 11 JT Flick who was in charge of emergency 12 management always gives insightful 13 presentations, and Frank Ronsey 14 (phonetic) who talked about NYPA. Thev have an industrial economic development 15 program, sounded very exciting. I 16 17 think we're a little small for it, but 18 I had a conversation about it anyway. 19 That's it for me. Thank you. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 21 Trustee Roberts? 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. So I 23 put out there -- since we're now the co-committee, I have put out there 24 25 suggested language, and I don't Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 necessarily -- I think this probably 2 needs to be a longer process than us making decisions now, but I put out 3 there suggested language to tighten up 4 what I believe is a vagueness in the 5 code about residential over retail and 6 7 CR, and I wanted to sort of -- I wrote it here. I think the code kind of 8 9 contradicts itself in places, and we should as a Board make a clear sort of 10 11 decision about where we want to be with 12 this, and then if we decide to, you 13 know, go through the process, if we 14 decide to make a change to the code, have public hearings, et cetera. So I 15 16 put in here request a public hearing, 17 what I'm trying to say is at some point 18 if the Board decides to put out a code 19 change about this particular issue, then we would have the normal code 20 21 change -- I'm not suggesting a special 22 public hearing, I think I was a little 23 confusing on that, so I just wanted to be clear on that. 24 25 MAYOR HUBBARD: We could all look

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1 at it, comment. Joe had a letter on 2 it, his interpretation of it, which we had asked for last month, so let's all 3 review that, and if we come up with a 4 consensus we could, you know, move 5 forward next month and schedule a 6 7 public hearing if it's something that we all feel comfortable with. 8 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fair enough. Okay. Good. Moving on, water quality, 10 11 so, you know, the research out there is 12 pretty clear that wastewater treatment plants are the most effective way to 13 14 ensure the future quality of our waters. I won't bore everybody with 15 16 it, there are a million articles out 17 there you could read, everybody is 18 talking about it. While people can talk about what's in Stirling Basin 19 20 right now, we all know that what 21 continues to happen each day is that 22 pollutants leach from septic 23 particularly from Sandy Beach into the water, and the way to fix that is with 24 25 a wastewater treatment plant. Anybody

1 you talk to -- I've been around talking 2 to a lot of people just trying to network, get advice, get leads on 3 potential funding sources if we were to 4 5 go forward with the project. When I tell people whether it's the chair of 6 7 the regional development council, folks in our state representatives offices, 8 9 yeah, we've got this Shelba-ready (phonetic) project, we just are a tiny 10 little village that would need to put, 11 12 you know, over half of our general funds worth of money into a capital 13 14 project to do it, they all go, wow, you have a Shelba-ready wastewater 15 16 treatment plant with capacity, that's 17 amazing, nobody has that, very few 18 people have that, you should be able to get support for it. So most other 19 20 agencies or anybody I talk to is very 21 bullish on the project, so I'm glad 22 we're pursuing -- you know, I'm glad 23 we're learning about funding opportunities. And I want to call out 24 25 Trustee Phillips point that we also do

need to do what she suggested and make a policy. The funding thing is not

going to happen any time soon, it's going to take time, so I think these are great things to do in parallel.

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6 So I do want to report back and 7 highlight, you know, a couple of things since it's been in the press. The 8 9 Mayor asked me to attend a meeting called by Assemblyman Thiel who is one 10 11 of the sponsors of the CPF water fund. 12 And just so everyone is clear, the way it works is that -- here is what I 13 14 learned at the thing, which I didn't know going in: A town, towns control 15 16 CPF, I think we all know that. A town 17 may allocate up to twenty percent of 18 its CPF monies to water quality projects. They may only do so by 19 20 presenting a plan to the public and 21 having it voted on after public 22 hearings on the November ballot. So a 23 town can elect to do that. So what we learned at that meeting, which was 24 25 pretty much a surprise to everyone in

the room I think including Assemblyman 1 2 Thiel is that Southold Town is the only one not electing to do that this time 3 So that was -- so we learned 4 around. that, so we know that at least for this 5 year there's going to be no CPF water 6 7 money coming from the Town of Southold. I started asking questions, and when 8 9 asked, what the supervisor said was we have not identified any worthy water 10 11 quality projects in the Town of 12 Southold, so I was glad to hear you say that you gave the East West Sewer study 13 14 to our town liaisons a year ago. So I'm not sure, there's maybe a 15 disconnect on the Town's side, but 16 either way that's where we are. I 17 18 mean, we're going to find the money either way I think if we decide to do 19 20 it because everybody except the Town of Southold seems to think this is a 21 22 really great project. And maybe they 23 will eventually think it is a great project, and if they decide to go 24 25 forward with it next year -- I know

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they struggle compared with the south 1 2 side towns because they don't have as much money as them. So, you know, 3 hopefully we can keep working with 4 them, and if they decide to get 5 involved, it would be great to have 6 7 them involved if we decide to go forward. That's what I learned. We're 8 9 pursuing other things, which I listed in here, and I appreciate that our 10 11 staff that you, Mayor, are having us 12 look into those things. So I'll continue to bang the drum for it, go 13 14 talk to as many people as I can. And to clarify, when I talk to them I say 15 16 hi, I'm just on a sort of research 17 errand here and trying to learn as much 18 as I can. I asked -- I put out this little 19

flyer that I -- sorry I didn't put it in the report, but there's this thing called -- by the Long Island Clean Water Partnership, they're having a conference on June 9th called Water We Going to Do, and it's the fifth version

| 8 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. So this |

| 10 | my idea about potentially making |
| 11 | trying to incent people to use our pump |
| 12 | out boat to help with the water quality |
| 13 | issue, there may be a reason why we |
| 14 | can't based on how that pump out boat |
| 15 | is funded, we may have to charge, I'm |
| 16 | not sure, so if this is but I wanted |
| 17 | to sort of put out there that an |
| 18 | investment that we might consider |
| 19 | making is telling people Village of |
| 20 | Greenport pump out boat is free, please |
| 21 | use it. I think that creates an |
| 22 | economic incentive for the operator of |
| 23 | the Village pump out boat to more |
| 24 | aggressively to not sit at the dock |
| 25 | and wait to be called, but to go around |

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and say hey, who needs a pump out 1 2 because then that operator is going to get bigger tips. So I'm trying to use 3 an economic incentive because I think 4 we all know that part of the reason why 5 6 we have pollution in our waters is 7 because people open the seacock on their marine, you know, what's it 8 9 called, holding tank, and just drop it there, even though that's against every 10 11 law on the books. So I wanted to put 12 it out there. It's not an insignificant investment we'd have to 13 14 make because Stephen tells me that it's probably more than the 5K in revenue 15 16 that I had estimated. 17 MR. GAFFGA: About 7. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So, you know, it's not a small investment. However, 19 20 we make investments around here to do 21 important things. Our ice rink loses 22 money, you know, then we have other 23 things which are super profitable like 24 McCann Campground. So I wanted to put 25 it out there for discussion. Maybe

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1 it's not something we do this season, 2 but it's something that I think would be -- it potentially would decrease the 3 number of people who irresponsibly dump 4 5 waste into the Stirling Basin and other 6 places if our boat is actively incented 7 to go out and, you know, go around on a Saturday and say hey, do you need pump 8 9 out, do you need a pump out? Maybe we could come up with some sort of a 10 11 system where they can, you know, hang a 12 sign on their boat that says pump me out. I don't know exactly how we 13 14 figure this out, but I was trying to think of ways that the Village can help 15 16 with this problem so. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: We have an 18 agreement with Southold Town that we sign yearly, so we'd have to talk about 19 20 the agreement and what's in there 21 because that's where everything is set 22 with the prices and all, and that's 23 what we sign every year. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Isn't that just 25 for them to come and empty into our Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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pump out station, for their boat to 1 2 come? MAYOR HUBBARD: That's just their 3 boat? 4 5 MR. PALLAS: Them to dump into our 6 pump out station. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They decide what 8 9 they're going to charge people to use theirs. I'm proposing that the boats 10 11 who call up channel whatever at the 12 marina and ask for a pump out, that we consider, you know, broadcasting them. 13 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, what is -- I know in years past I've seen the 15 16 pump out boat going up and down Stirling Harbor, is that still -- I 17 18 mean, is he still doing that? MR. PALLAS: I'm not as familiar 19 20 as I should be with that process. I 21 will find out. I believe so, but I 22 have to check on it. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought he 24 was pretty visible going around the 25 whole year, but to be honest with you, Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 I'm not down there that much anymore, I'm at home in the office, so I don't 2 get to see that direction. 3 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If you were to report back that this is not going to 5 6 make a significant impact, then there 7 would be no point in pursuing it. MR. PALLAS: 8 Sure. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Herzog Park, also known as Sixth Street Beach, sat 10 11 down with two very concerned citizens 12 who put a lot of time and effort into 13 this park, and I really appreciate 14 their time and effort, I think we all do, Maritza Budet and John Winkler. 15 So 16 what we wanted to do is not come up 17 with a list of things that haven't been 18 done, as Paul pointed out, we did most of those things. Rather, take their 19 20 institutional knowledge from years of 21 sort of caring for this, and I think we 22 owe it to the taxpayers and to our 23 visitors and everyone who lives here to 24 kind of be proactive about managing the 25 tasks there. So we came up with this

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1 list of, you know, ongoing maintenance, 2 we came up with a list of proposed capital investments, and we came up 3 with a list of emergency things that we 4 5 think should be done, you know, for 6 example, to go back behind that cable 7 crossing box is treacherous, and, you know, kids go there to learn to fish 8 9 and stuff and they've got to walk around strange industrial things. 10 Ι 11 don't even know what they are. I don't 12 know if we can compel Verizon or whomever owns that stuff, but that 13 14 seems like something that I'd love to see us look into shortly and making 15 16 sure that structure is safe and sealed off and no one can mess around with it 17 18 would be great. But, you know, we don't need to go through this list of 19 20 items, it's somewhat obvious stuff. Ι 21 think mostly what this allows us to do 22 is to show the public this is what we

do each year when we launch, when we kick it off, this is what we do when we 24 25 close it down, and, you know, this is

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1 what we do. We just make it a 2 checklist, if there's anything missing, somebody please throw it out there, but 3 it's a checklist that we use and 4 5 essentially a project plan for what happens. John and Maritza also 6 7 proposed, and I agree with them, that we should be more proactive, we should 8 9 be putting -- and it may not be in this year's budget, I'm not sure, but we 10 11 should be putting in the budget more 12 landscaping, and, you know, hiring people to, you know, be more proactive 13 14 about the places in the grass where it's not so great. The fact that the 15 16 grass is growing into all the sandy 17 areas, the borders between the play 18 area and the grass have disappeared, the volleyball court needs some love, 19 the beds and all that stuff. I've said 20 21 all this before, I'd really love to see 22 us -- it's a world class -- to have 23 something like that in the town that you can walk to is just amazing, and so 24 25 this is our idea and our plan, and so

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we hope it will get consideration, and 1 2 if you have any questions about it, find me or find them. 3 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Lastly, so we're 6 going to start hearing about parking 7 very soon. We already have a little It's a concerning issue. Could 8 bit. 9 we send Darryl or somebody around to look for weaknesses in our signage? 10 Ιt seems to me that -- and could we 11 12 potentially put together this idea of a 13 parking map that we can broadcast to 14 the public, put it on our -- you know, a lot of the people who come visit, if 15 16 you talk to business owners, you know, 17 people come in already knowing their 18 menu because they find it on Yelp or 19 they find it on some site on their 20 phones, right? And we talked about 21 phones being how people get around, so 22 if there's a way on -- we can ask Bid 23 to help with this, to serve up this parking map if we were to generate it, 24 25 and I think we can put it on

VillageofGreenport.org as well and 1 2 whatever, just get it out on channel so people know that there is parking all 3 over the place, you're just going to 4 have to walk a little bit. And since a 5 6 lot of our visitors are from the city, 7 they have to walk everywhere, so they should be cool with that. I think if 8 9 people realize that, you know, if you're from Brooklyn, which everyone 10 saw that article that a lot of Brooklyn 11 12 people come here, if you're from Brooklyn you're used to cruising around 13 14 and parking eight blocks from your house. You can do that here too, and 15 16 that might help relieve some of the 17 congestion. If we can get some help 18 from our -- we do say this every year, if the Bid would encourage the 19 20 restaurant tourists in particular to 21 park in the lots. I know we're going 22 to enforce this year, which is very 23 exciting, the two hour limits and the thirty minute limits. We've already 24 25 put up some new signs, which is great.

We have problem areas like around the 1 2 railroad dock where people just sort of treat it like their own personal 3 parking space. So if we can look for 4 5 weaknesses to, you know, if maybe a sign is faded, but people should know 6 7 there's a big lot on Adams Street, the Long Island Railroad lot, it may be 8 9 covered in dirt right now, but there's often parking there. I don't know if 10 11 we have -- we don't have any sort of 12 time limits there at the moment, right? MAYOR HUBBARD: No. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're not subject to the same limits as the 15 16 streets? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, it was never 18 set up that way. It's just open free 19 parking. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, we'll deal 20 21 with that later. Anyway, I think you 22 get my point. If we can look for ways 23 to point people because I think once you point them off of Front Street 24 25 north to the lots on Adams or South Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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Street, then if those are full they 1 2 might see oh, look these people park on the streets in this little village, 3 isn't that great, and maybe they'll go 4 park there, and that's one of the 5 things about living here is that 6 7 sometimes people park in front of your house. But it's better than a problem 8 9 of people just jammed up downtown clogging things up. 10 11 Thank you to everybody who helped 12 with the A Cappella Fest, there are many people to thank, I sent e-mails 13 14 Thank you to the Clerk, thank around. you Paul, thank you, Board, for 15 16 supporting it, Mayor, for supporting It was a lot of fun. Kids had 17 it. 18 fun, folks had fun. Really excited about the Shelter 19 20 Island Yacht Club donating -- it looks 21 like they're going to donate four 22 Friday mornings worth of sailing 23 classes to the summer camp, which is really exciting. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It needs to be 19 leveled out.

20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So there may be 21 a big investment there that we may not 22 be able to make, I don't know, that's 23 what people have told me to ask about. 24 MR. PALLAS: I'll take a look. I 25 don't know either.

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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We may have to ask the school to help, you know, I don't know. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In the past, the soccer leagues have played over on the school field because it was built for soccer. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, we're essentially trying to resurrect EMO or GMO, and a couple of the parents from that are involved, so it's -- it's orienting East Marion too, but I think

9 essentially trying to resurrect EMO or 10 11 12 orienting East Marion too, but I think what's exciting about this is that 13 14 Greenport is going to be the center of this, so kids whose parents are working 15 16 or are otherwise on foot will be able 17 to participate, and I think that's 18 going to be really great. I would look into -- I have volunteered to look into 19 20 sponsorships so that kids in the rec 21 program could participate with no 22 charge. There is going to be a charge 23 for their insurance policies and stuff, but anyway, more updates -- at some 24 25 point I hope to come to you with a

1 proposal from this league to use A, B, 2 C of Village resources. Thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Most 3 of what I had -- it's a busy month of 4 5 presentations, speeches, talks, 6 everything else. I do have a gentleman 7 who John Patugno (phonetic), he's an architect, he's selling his house and 8 9 his business in Scarsdale. He bought property down on Bay Avenue at that 10 11 condos between Bay and Central, and 12 he's approached me, he wants to join 13 our planning board. I was out of town, 14 but he had a visit, him and his wife met with Sylvia, talked about stuff. 15 16 I've talked to him a couple times on 17 the phone, I haven't personally met 18 He's going to be moving out here him. beginning of June, so I want to put his 19 20 name down for a motion to appoint him 21 to the Planning Board. He wants to meet everybody, learn the Village. He 22 23 served on a planning board and a zoning board in his hometowns before, he's got 24 25 experience with it, and so that will be

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the fifth member we need on our 1 2 Planning Board, and then all of the boards will be full. He's an architect 3 by trade, so I'll put his name on there 4 so we'll have a motion for that for the 5 6 meeting next Thursday. 7 Everything else we've kind of covered, you know, during the meeting, 8 9 so at this point I'll open up to the public if the public would like to 10 address the board. 11 12 MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth Avenue. Of my first questions is we 13 14 have a no alcohol in the park rule, correct, in Mitchell Park. It gets 15 16 lifted for Maritime Festival. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 18 MS. ALLEN: Is it lifted for Dances in the Park? 19 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. MS. ALLEN: Will the "no" be 21 22 enforced? I mean, when Dances in the 23 Park started, people would come with their little bags and their cups where 24 25 you didn't know what was in them. The

1 past two years now, they come with 2 tables and they set up and they pull the bottles of wine out, and literally 3 everyone pretty much in the park is 4 5 drinking. Last season -- the only 6 reason I bring this up is last season 7 someone who technically wasn't there for Dances in the Park had a beer in 8 9 his hand and was told get out, you're not allowed to drink in here, yet from 10 11 the distance from me to you, he's 12 standing there with a beer, you got the 13 bottle of wine, you're not told to put 14 it away. MAYOR HUBBARD: I could say 15 16 it's --MS. ALLEN: If it's a no, it 17 18 should be universal, and it should be put out there that there is no alcohol 19 20 in Mitchell Park. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: It was done 22 discreetly. Nobody went and enforced 23 the code completely because people would buy a pizza, bring their dinner 24 25 down, have a glass of wine discreetly

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1 with their dinner and enjoy it, and it didn't become a huge issue, we were 2 just letting everybody enjoy what was 3 4 going on. 5 MS. ALLEN: Right. But the past 6 two it has become not discreetly and 7 literally someone popped a bottle of champagne. So its' not discreet 8 9 anymore, and it's, you know. MAYOR HUBBARD: We could put 10 warnings, try to make it so that it's 11 12 discreet and just announce, you know, that --13 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I was going to suggest that we could ask the volunteer 15 16 who MC's the whole thing to say 17 something. MAYOR HUBBARD: 18 Right. 19 MS. ALLEN: My concern is when someone that lives here and has lived 20 21 here their whole life gets approached 22 by the police and is going to get a 23 ticket or get arrested because they 24 have a can of beer, and yet the person 25 five feet from them has a bottle of Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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It needs to be universal. 1 wine. 2 Either it's okay or if you're seen you're going to be told to put it away, 3 that's all. What's good for the goose 4 5 is good for the gander. You need to make it so that, you know, it's not 6 7 selective. You know, because who knows, you know, I could have -- I 8 9 don't drink, you know, I could have a bottle of wine and just be passing 10 through, I'm not really there for that. 11 12 So, you know, that was something that a few people had mentioned that, you 13 14 know, friends last year they're like (indicating) you know, into their cup 15 16 that you can't see. I said what the heck are you doing, they're popping it 17 18 right there. I said I guess you can 19 drink.

20 Okay. This proposed building on 21 the corner of Front and Third. I have 22 been extremely vocal, I am dead set 23 against it. First of all, when you 24 need as many variances as this building 25 needs, it's going to have impact like

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no one knows right now. Mary Bess, there's only one entrance and exit for this building, and it literally goes into the turning lane on Third Street.

4 5 They don't want to have a loading 6 berth, that's another variance. They 7 need thirty-six parking spaces, they want eight, and there's no way for a 8 9 truck to pull in there. You think the ferry is bad? This will be a 10 11 nightmare. And while I'm sitting here 12 listening, I don't know if this is considered a corner lot like a house, 13 14 you can't have a fence over four feet, but yet now you're going to have 15 16 literally to the sidewalk, you know, how many stories up. I agree that it's 17 18 going to have a huge impact, so I 19 applaud you on that. And just to throw 20 it out there, the Village should buy it back and let the farmer's market be 21 22 there permanently. Because really that 23 lot size is not appropriate -- Meson Ole is going to go back to Sterlington 24 25 and have two restaurants there, you

1 really don't need three restaurants, 2 you know, that close together. You know, they're not crazy with farmer's 3 market behind IGA on South Street 4 there, that's plenty big enough where 5 6 something can be set up, you know, you 7 put something in the wintertime, I don't know if they do farmer's markets 8 9 in the winter or not, but, you know, just an idea. People always say oh, if 10 the building doesn't go, what are you 11 12 going to put in there? There's been -- you guys were 13 14 talking about the flower boxes and stuff going in. I know I had mentioned 15 16 this last season. The benches especially at the corner of First and 17 18 Front, I don't know if they ever moved or not, but where the benches are, if 19 20 they could be moved to the other side 21 of the crosswalk because unfortunately 22 you can't legislate common sense and 23 common courtesy, but where they are especially that corner, people just 24 25 literally stand there and, you know,

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1 traffic can't qo anywhere because you 2 don't know are they crossing, aren't they crossing, and then they jump in 3 front of you. And I had mentioned 4 5 that, you know, if you move it over a 6 little it frees up the intersection, 7 you know, and this way, you know, someone just, you know, posted that now 8 9 there's -- they want stop signs on First and Front. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I saw 12 that. MS. ALLEN: Because of the 13 14 crosswalks. Hello, there's a stop sign on the other side. Look before you 15 16 cross. Common sense again, a crosswalk, yes, pedestrians have the 17 18 right of way, but pedestrians also have to use their brains and say that car is 19 20 coming awfully fast, I'm not going to 21 walk out in front of it. You know, so 22 stop signs there I don't think are a 23 good idea. And just to touch on I told you 24 25 before with this ferry line between Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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Fourth and Fifth and Fifth and Sixth in 1 2 the mornings it could be down there. Now, I'm in a 66 passenger bus, I'm a 3 big old thing, yet last week and this 4 week I have had not one, not two, but 5 three cars literally I'm just 6 7 approaching and they're flying in front of me to make U-turns to get into the 8 9 ferry line. You know, I don't know what a perfect solution is, I just know 10 11 it gets frustrating when you're trying 12 to make the turn in that thing, and there's cars all over, and people won't 13 14 move for you. You know, I know between Fourth and Fifth the line you really 15 16 can't see because I was going to 17 suggest painting the line and putting 18 "ferry" so people hopefully stay to the other side because even now between 19 Fourth and Fifth and Fifth and Sixth 20 21 you can't get through, you know, it's 22 not just between Third and Fourth. I 23 wish I knew a magic cure to this, but for right now I think, you know, like I 24 25 said, if people would follow the rules

SWISKEY: I realize that, but 4 5 what you're saying makes not quite much Even in the test position, that 6 sense. 7 breaker has power from the bus unless you physically remove all the wiring, 8 9 you still have power. The only way to test really is you have to isolate the 10 plant from the transformer outside, 11 12 make it a dead plant. Shut off the 13 second transformer so you have a 14 completely dead plant, and then try Black Starting, and then you should be 15 16 able to heat up your bus from your generator. So if it's possible, I'd 17 18 like to see a report from A&F on this

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issue because it's very important.

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we will.25 MR. SWISKEY: It is possible to

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test, like I said, you can make the 1 plant Black Start a generator and turn 2 on the plant bus and basically you're 3 simulating a Black Start because once 4 you get online, once you get on that 5 6 particular isolated bus you can run all 7 your auxiliaries. And you have to be very careful if you're going to Black 8 9 Start with the number four unit because it has no internal oil pump, so you 10 11 have to get that online very quickly, 12 otherwise -- you have two electric driven oil pumps, if you don't get 13 14 those on fairly quickly, you can burn out that million dollar engine in a 15 16 heartbeat. So I'd like to see something from A&F because it's more 17 18 than a serious issue, it's more than 19 just something that should be passed 20 off.

21 And the cooling tower bid, one bid 22 was a million five and the other was 23 seven. Somebody left something out of 24 a bid for that to happen. That's 25 almost impossible to happen. So I

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would look very closely at that, and

1 it's a little bit scary when you see 2 something like that. I would -- if 3 you're thinking about accepting the low 4 5 bid, there has to be something missing. 6 Let's go to another topic here, 7 the East End Seaport Museum gave a presentation here last week basically 8 9 why they couldn't pay rent -- or last month. After a while, a few of us went 10 11 online, we found their reports, and, 12 you know, they actually have 95,000 dollars in the bank since the beginning 13 14 of 2015. So they could have paid a minimum of at least a thousand dollars 15 16 a month in rent. I think it behooves this Board not to let that issue die. 17 18 I mean, even two thousand dollars a 19 month, which if you put it away over 20 five years would have paid for all the 21 repairs that we had to put into that 22 thing over the past few years. But for 23 them to cry poverty, and then I see 95,000 dollars in basically almost a 24 25 non -- zero interest bearing account.

Because I do read those reports and I 1 2 do know what they mean, so maybe you should have your treasurer look at them 3 4 and give you a report, are these people 5 BS'ing us, or do they have money? 6 Because my opinion is they have money, 7 and for them to come here like they were a poor charity case, that's 8 9 ridiculous. We just put, what, 60,000 into that building in a roof and a 10 11 heating system the last couple of 12 years. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Something like 14 that. MR. SWISKEY: I mean, I really 15 16 think, like I say, have your treasurer 17 gather the report. They don't even 18 have the 2015 yet, it was due basically 19 a while ago, so maybe we should press 20 them, we want to see the report. Let 21 your treasurer review them, your money 22 man, and he can tell you how much rent 23 they can afford because with 95,000 dollars in the bank, you can afford 24 25 rent. I mean, that's a lot of money.

| 11 | MR. SWISKEY: I was shocked. I |
| 12 | think the town should either, you know, |
| 13 | forget Brewers and these other people, |
| 14 | they want the sewer, let them pay. |
| 15 | Basically those people on Beach Road, |
| 16 | Sandy Beach, the twenty-five houses, |
| 17 | they are Village residents, and they |
| 18 | should have a sewer, and for half a |
| 19 | million dollars you can sewer that. |
| 20 | You put a gravity main down the road |
| 21 | inverted towards land that we own there |
| 22 | at the monument, you put a little pump |
| 23 | station. I would make it big enough |
| 24 | for the future in case people in those |
| 25 | areas wanted to get on, and this is |

where it would take a little 1 2 engineering, but that area could serve as the station. Your directional board 3 under the creek entrance, and it 4 doesn't cost that much, you know, you 5 6 put an eight inch pipe, and then you 7 put a four inch pipe inside that so your pipe is actually sleeved, so there 8 9 will be no leaks, and you dump it into a manhole on the corner of Sterling and 10 11 Sterling there, and it goes into 12 whoever places the sewer station. So that could be done. Now, if the town 13 14 would simply reach in their pockets and take part of this four million they got 15 16 from us, which really their remarks were, like, oh, we did -- no, that 17 18 money came from us. We get no benefit. There has been not one CPF purchase in 19 20 the Village that has anything to do 21 with the Village. I mean, we get this 22 BS, like, Pike's Cove, the old Sills 23 Farm. Well, that's a long ways from the Village, and it's no benefit to 24 25 anybody. I think that maybe we need to

1 tell the town that you exempt us from 2 CPF money, since there is no land left to preserve in the Village, or you give 3 us the 500,00 because we want to do the 4 5 sewer, and if there's anything left over from the 500,000, which there 6 7 probably could be a couple of hundred thousand after you do Sandy Beach, you 8 9 use it for road ends, you use it for vour MS-4. But I think it's time we 10 11 took a stand with the town. The ferry 12 walks all over us, they refuse to pay 13 us any money. And did anybody ever 14 find out who owns the land, you know, where the pilings are? That's Village 15 16 waterfront. Every time they put a 17 piling and do work there, they should 18 be applying for a wetlands permit. Instead they just walk all over us. 19 20 Well, maybe -- Julia, you were going to 21 look into it, right? 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right, I believe 23 it's Village land, yes. MR. SWISKEY: That's Village land, 24 25 so we have a club to hit them with if

we choose. We also have another club. 1 2 We don't have to let them use Wiggins Street for the ferry, we could make 3 Wiggins Street a dead end, put a 4 cul-de-sac there for the boats, force 5 all the traffic up and down Third 6 7 Street, which the State claims they Let it back up to the school, the 8 own. 9 State will be out here in an instant to do something, believe me. In other 10 11 words, we're not playing hard ball. They're playing hardball, we're getting 12 kicked in the face, the people on 13 14 Wiggins Street are getting kicked in the face, and we're going yes, yes, 15 16 yes. Well, this Board has to remember 17 it's the Village of Greenport Board, 18 not Southold Town Board, not Shelter 19 Island Board, not the North Ferry 20 Board, and I'm going to keep bringing 21 this up at every meeting. And actually 22 legally, I spoke to a couple of 23 attorneys, Mr. Prokop, and we can charge a fee. I understand you and 24 25 your Shelter Island, but maybe we

should hire an outside counsel, 1 somebody who is independent that 2 doesn't have a stick in the game and do 3 another study, and how much would it 4 cost? A few thousand dollars? 5 We throw thousands of dollars away on 6 7 nothing, so let's allocate 5,000 and really find out. Let's speak to our 8 9 representatives in Albany, let's see what takes to get it done instead of 10 11 just oh, it can't get done. Well, thanks a lot, Sheller, Ronnie just 12 stepped on my face again, and I'm 13 14 getting tired of it. I don't -- I'm very unpopular over there right now 15 16 because I keep proposing this thing, and they're all worried about it. 17 18 Tough. Anyway that's my view on that. That one really -- but four million on 19 20 the CPF money, it's time we took a 21 stand with the town. Scott Russell, I 22 mean, I got nothing against Scott, he's 23 working for what he considers is best for what considers him, but he seems to 24 25 have forgotten that this little Village

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is also part of Southold Town. And 1 2 just because the Fishers Island Ferry District might want part of it or the 3 Fishers Island sewer district, well 4 5 that's fine, they need the money too. 6 But sewering Sandy Beach Road, those 7 twenty-five houses is not that hard if you have the money. It was looked into 8

years ago, it's just a matter of

10 course.

9

11 Oh, and 350,000 gallons, you'd 12 have to double the size of the Village, another hospital, another school, the 13 14 whole nine yards to come any place close to using up the capacity of the 15 sewer. That was the most ridiculous 16 17 thing that I ever heard. If you're 18 really worried about reserving it, 19 reserve 100,000 gallons for yourself, 20 you still have 200,000 gallons to go. 21 That's a lot of hook ups. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Excuse me,

Bill. I didn't say to reserve the whole 300,000, I said to have a policy to reserve some and make what we could

sell outside. Please, I did not say 1 the whole amount. I did not say the 2 whole amount. I said we needed to make 3 a policy to set aside what the Village 4 5 needs to take care of the Village residents in the future and what we 6 7 could sell outside. MR. SWISKEY: I won't argue Mary 8 9 Bess, but if you want to reserve -- at next meeting, bring up a resolution 10 11 that we're going to reserve 100,000 12 gallons, that's more than this Village will ever need in our lifetimes, in our 13 14 grandchildren's lifetimes. That will put that to rest instead of like --15 that went and on and on and on. 16 Ι 17 would ask Mr. Roberts, somebody, just 18 put the resolution, any of you Trustees 19 can put a resolution on the agenda and 20 let's see if it passes. Let's put out 21 money where our mouth is. Thank you. 22 That's about all I got to say. I 23 forgot the rest. Thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish 24 25 to address the Board?

| 14 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: On anything above |
| 15 | 150,000, there's a cut off for it. |
| 16 | It's a one time tax. |
| 17 | MR. CORWIN: That goes to Suffolk |
| 18 | County or Southold Town? |
| 19 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Southold Town, |
| 20 | each town controls it. |
| 21 | MR. CORWIN: And then Southold |
| 22 | Town doesn't get a share at four |
| 23 | million bucks, did I understand that |
| 24 | right? |
| 25 | MAYOR HUBBARD: That is correct. |
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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's controlled 1 2 by a municipal board of town residents. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The land 3 preservation committee controls it. 4 5 MR. CORWIN: Mr. Swiskey is 6 correct, we're part of Southold Town 7 but -- Mr. Roberts suggested parking, showing people where to park and stuff, 8 9 that's great. There's parking lots down there, but don't send them up to 10 Broad Street, I don't need them parking 11 12 there. There's too many cars on Broad 13 Street. 14 The cable crossing building at the

end of Fifth Street, I don't think it's 15 16 part of Herzog Park at the end of Fifth 17 Street, the Sterling Historical Society 18 owns that cable crossing building, and what happened is the steel all over the 19 20 door rusted out from the salt water 21 over the years and really lifted the 22 whole roof up, so the thing is falling 23 down. Sterling Historical Society 24 doesn't have the money to take that 25 down. I ask asked the president of the

| 11 | or not what Trustee Robins said, but |
| 12 | what I heard was the Bid is trying to |
| 13 | make themselves a 501C-3, did I hear |
| 14 | that correctly? |
| 15 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes, that's what |
| 16 | they're |
| 17 | MR. CORWIN: How can somebody |
| 18 | that's authorized by State law, |
| 19 | collects taxes from people downtown, |
| 20 | turn around and make themselves a |
| 21 | 501C-3. |
| 22 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: They were advised |
| 23 | by they hired a consultant on Bids |
| 24 | last year to give them a report, and it |
| 25 | was his recommendation, he's developed |
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1 Bids all over the country. They didn't 2 come to it on their own. I can give you a copy of his report if you'd like 3 to see it, but Rich Vanderberg 4 5 (phonetic) who is an attorney is 6 working on that. 7 MR. CORWIN: Well, it doesn't seem right to me. I don't know. I don't 8 9 think it's right, but that's okay. The sewer capacity, 650,000 10 gallons a day this plant is licensed 11 12 for as I understand. Mr. Pallas several months ago presented how much 13 14 infiltration goes into the sewer system during a rainstorm, and it was -- I was 15 16 surprised, it was quite a bit of 17 capacity. I commend you for saying 18 well, where are we going to put the 19 capacity and save some for the Village, 20 but I would say you don't have 650,000 21 gallons, you have 650,000 gallons less 22 your infiltration when you start 23 thinking about that. 24 I'm sorry, I can't read my own 25 writing. The assessed valuation of the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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Village. Two-thirds of it is 1 2 residential, one-third of it is business. If you go through the tax 3 roll, which I did several years ago, 4 5 two-thirds of the general fund is paid 6 by residential and one-third is paid by 7 businesses. I don't have any way to tell how much of the general fund goes 8 9 to the business district, how much goes to residential, but I would guess 10 11 conservatively fifty percent goes to 12 the business district and fifty percent goes to residential, and I think that's 13 14 very concerning, but I still get to pay for the East End Seaport Museum. And 15 16 now, last month Mr. Wilder got up and 17 spoke very eloquently, he's a very 18 eloquent speaker and I'm certainly not, forty-five minutes of all the things 19 20 the Seaport Museum is doing, but he 21 never said the part about every year 22 for the last four or five years the 23 Village has put at least 10,000 dollars into the maintenance of that building. 24 25 Two new roofs, a new heating system, I

don't know what they'll come up with 1 this year or next year, but I don't 2 want to pay for it. I can't see that 3 lighthouse from my house. I spent 4 hours -- I spent about two hours 5 looking around the World Wide Web for 6 7 the financial statement that Mr. Swiskey spoke of. The last one 8 9 they filed was 2014, December of 2014, so they owe December 2015. They're a 10 11 little behind, that's fine, people get 12 behind. But as Mr. Swiskey said, they have this great big chunk of money at 13 14 the end of the year. I don't understand why they don't pay for their 15 16 own repairs or pay rent. So if they're 17 going to get 24,000 dollars rent free, 18 give the railroad museum 12,000 dollars, give the Sterling Historical 19 20 Society 12,000 dollars. I mean, you're 21 giving out money, give everybody money, 22 huh? To me, you guys got insulted a 23 month ago when Mr. Wilder came up because he said you can go look for the 24 25 financials yourself. Well, I looked

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for the financials. I've heard Trustee Phillips say probably a half a dozen times, I'm going to get the financials Mr. Wilder told you, you can look for them yourself. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I found them. MR. CORWIN: Well, it took me two hours to find them, and I just stumbled on them. They weren't easy to find. I got to tell you, you got to either have East End Seaport Museum pay their own way including the Maritime Festival, or charge them rent for that railroad terminal. Thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Anybody else wish to address the board? MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street. Is there going to be an executive session? MAYOR HUBBARD: Tonight, yes, there is, talk about employee placement personnel issue.

23 MR. SALADINO: Did we hear that 24 personnel issue?

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we did.

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MR. PROKOP: It includes the 1 2 discussion regarding the performance of 3 an employee. MR. SALADINO: Also is it possible 4 5 for me or the public to get a copy of the Bids report that you read tonight? 6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll have 7 everything online tomorrow. Okay? 8 9 I'll have Sylvia put it all in. MR. SALADINO: I have a question 10 11 about the power plant, which is like 12 totally out of character for me. I spoke to an electrical contractor, and 13 14 actually the owner of the contracting company is very friendly with our 15 16 testing company. Is A&F testing doing 17 any repairs or just testing? 18 MR. PALLAS: A little of both. 19 MR. SALADINO: So they're doing 20 repairs? 21 MR. PALLAS: Yes. 22 MR. SALADINO: Because this guy 23 was under the impression that they only 24 did testing. 25 MR. PALLAS: They do some minor

1 wiring.

2 MR. SALADINO: As far as the tower, he had told me -- I didn't know 3 there was bids for the cooling tower, 4 5 Billy knew, but this guy because he does that he knew that one bid was one 6 million five and one bid was half of 7 that. So my question to him was how 8 9 could that be possible? And he said, well, there's no performance bond, so 10 anything is possible. They could kind 11 12 of do -- are we in that position where we can give them the bid for 750,000 13 14 and then because there's no bond, we -it's genesis -- am I allowed to say 15 16 that? It's that all over again. I'm 17 concerned that somebody starts the 18 work, we've been through that, somebody 19 starts the work, lowball the figures, 20 start the work, can't complete the 21 work, winds up costing us more money. 22 MR. PALLAS: It's a valid concern, 23 John. I have not even been able to review the bids yet, so I will take 24 25 that into consideration.

| 11 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, they were |
| 12 | informed about it. |
| 13 | MR. SALADINO: Is that the |
| 14 | railroad's responsibility or our |
| 15 | responsibility? |
| 16 | MAYOR HUBBARD: It's theirs. |
| 17 | Trustee Roberts took pictures of it, |
| 18 | forwarded it to the people that we met |
| 19 | with last week, and they're going to |
| 20 | get it taken care of. I can't tell you |
| 21 | when. |
| 22 | MR. SALADINO: So can we fix it |
| 23 | and then, like, send them the bill? |
| 24 | I'll go slow. |
| 25 | The other thing about parking, |
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1 we're concerned about parking maps, and 2 I've said this a hundred times, I think there's a parking problem when you want 3 to park in front of the Carousel on the 4 5 4th of July, but, you know, there's a 6 different dynamic about parking. 7 Anybody that complains about parking, does anybody here know anybody that 8 9 drove from up island, any place up island, and came here and couldn't find 10 11 a parking space and turned around and 12 went home? Does that happen? They 13 drive fifty-five miles and they say, 14 you know, I can't park in front of the Coronet, I'm driving home, and they 15 16 turn around and leave. People find parking. You know, I just think if you 17 18 got to walk a block or two -- I would send them all down Witch Street to 19 20 park. John Winkler volunteered to let 21 them all park in front of his house. 22 MR. WINKLER: We have guns down 23 there, you know. MR. SALADINO: As far as the 24 25 sewer, the number that I read in the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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newspaper was six million dollars for 1 2 the seventy homes or eighty homes to bring sewers. If we leave Brewers out 3 of the picture, there's forty over here 4 5 by Manhassett, and I believe I read another thirty on the west end of the 6 7 district. Six million dollars. If somebody else is paying for it, do it. 8 9 I think it's a great idea. Do it. Ι don't care about the capacity, but I 10 11 don't want to pay for it. I don't want 12 to pay for it. The other thing that I would think about that I had 13 14 conversations with Trustee Roberts, the manager at Brewers is supposedly on 15 16 board and he's willing to put money up 17 and stuff. We all realize he's just 18 the manager there, you know. I would kind of like to hear that from Mike 19 20 Brewer, you know, before we start 21 laying pipe. And the other thing is, 22 my question is if those forty homes are 23 there now on Fiddler and Beach and Angler, and they're kind of happy I 24 25 quess, I don't know, with the system

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that they have. So if I'm a homeowner 1 2 there, and you come to me and say, listen, we're going to give you this 3 sewer, if you want it's going to cost 4 5 you 15,000 dollars to hook up to it and 6 then 150 percent of your water bill 7 each month to pay for it, and I got something that already works, I'm kind 8 9 of saying, you know, maybe I'll go to the Bahamas instead of hooking up to 10 this sewer. Wouldn't it -- before we 11 12 go crazy with this, just kind of find out how many people -- aside from the 13 14 people at Sandy Beach, we all know --MAYOR HUBBARD: Theirs are free, 15 16 that's right, so they want it. MR. SALADINO: We all know the 17 18 people at Sandy Beach, and they want sewers. If Art was here, he'd be 19 20 telling us that, but those other forty 21 people or the other thirty people, 22 what's the incentive for them except 23 their ecological desire to do the right thing? What's the incentive for them 24 25 to hook up to a sewer for 15,000

| 3 | just don't understand what the |
| 4 | incentive is. |
| 5 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: John, I've looked |
| 6 | into that a little bit as well, and |
| 7 | actually it's going to be more than |
| 8 | 15,000, that's our hook up fee, but |
| 9 | then you have to do the hook up to your |
| 10 | house which is extra. Probably looking |
| 11 | at anywhere between 5 and 15,000 |
| 12 | dollars depending on how you get to the |
| 13 | house. |
| 14 | MR. SALADINO: You're kind of |
| 15 | making my point. |
| 16 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, I agree. |
| 17 | I've been doing research on this on my |
| 18 | own, you know, but just talking to a |
| 19 | lot of people down in that area. Would |
| 20 | you be willing to spend that kind of |
| 21 | money when you have a septic system? I |
| 22 | even spoke to one of my plumbers, and |
| 23 | he said I could put a brand new septic |
| 24 | system in my house for about four |
| 25 | thousand dollars and it would last me |
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| 1 | for the life of the house. So there's |

| 2 | going to be that issue as well. Unless |
| 3 | I read in the newspaper article they |
| 4 | were talking about mandates and forcing |
| 5 | people to do it, and I don't think that |
| 6 | would be a very |
| 7 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Suffolk County |
| 8 | is working on that. |
| 9 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Then we're going |
| 10 | to be saying we're selecting 75 to 100 |
| 11 | people, and you have to do this, but |
| 12 | nobody else does. So I'm just seeing |
| 13 | potential things that haven't been |
| 14 | looked at yet. |
| 15 | MR. SALADINO: If I could ask the |
| 16 | Trustees, if they can spend up to |
| 17 | twenty percent of the CPF for water |
| 18 | issues that would be town wide, is |
| 19 | there do we get a sense of how much |
| 20 | would come our way for that particular, |
| 21 | you know, I mean, I don't know what |
| 22 | they collect a year, so I don't know |
| 23 | what twenty percent |
| 24 | MAYOR HUBBARD: They budgeted 5.5 |
| 25 | million dollars this year is what they |
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projected to be, so twenty percent 1 would be one million dollars town wide. 2 MR. SALADINO: So that would pay 3 for twelve percent of the six million 4 5 dollar tab to put sewers in. Who would be responsible for the other 6 7 seventy-eight percent? MAYOR HUBBARD: We're looking for 8 9 funding all around. I've talked to Senator Gillibrand's office, they have 10 11 -- everybody is pushing this right now, 12 so we're looking to get grant money to 13 cover the expenses. The only way to 14 really make the whole program work is to get funding from the federal 15 16 government or state government to say 17 we're going to pay -- we'll get the 18 mains to be put in, we'll pay to hook up these houses to it. Because I spoke 19 20 to people on two sides of the street, 21 one said I'm really into this, I might 22 spend the money if I had it, neighbor 23 across the street said there's no way in heck I'm going to spend that amount 24 25 of money for my house, I can't afford

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to do it. So we have to have grant 1 2 money and have the government say we're going -- the main is going to come down 3 your road, we're going to pay to hook 4 5 you up, and they're going to have to 6 fund that. That's the only way the 7 expansion is truly going to work because relying on the homeowners to do 8 9 it, you might get ten percent hook up, the other ninety percent doesn't, and 10 11 the line is there, and nobody is using 12 it.

MR. SALADINO: I think if Brewers, 13 14 both Brewers kind of knew exactly how much it would cost them to do that 15 16 because sometimes I get the impression that well, we're in the Village, it 17 18 will cost us nothing, and I'm not sure if that's the reality of it. I think 19 20 it would be a lot of money for them to 21 hook up and do that. I love Billy's idea. I don't know if it's possible 22 23 with the DEC to tunnel under, but I love that idea to bring for 500,000, 24 400,000 we don't have to hear Arthur 25

1 anymore. I think it's a great idea. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: The approach we did with Colin Ratzy's project, that's 3 why I had the clerk's office go and 4 send a letter to each of the homeowners 5 6 up there because he proposed that, and 7 I just wanted to see of the other twenty homeowners or property owners, 8 9 would they be interested? We sent the letters out last week, I'm waiting for 10 11 an answer back. Because to make that all worthwhile, he's going to put it in 12 13 for his property to solve his problem. 14 I want to see -- he said oh, everybody is going to want to do it. I don't 15 16 know if they are. I don't know if the 17 gas station or Mills, if any of those 18 people are going to want to hook up. 19 That's why we sent the letter out to 20 get information so we can make an informed decision before we do it. 21 22 MR. SALADINO: The other thing I 23 wanted to mention, I mentioned a couple -- Colin made the statement, and I 24 25 believe him, that he said he could do

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the job for 70,000. Now, obviously his 1 labor is for free, so usually a 2 contractor you double the price, for 3 140,000 dollars he's going to tunnel 4 5 and run a mile and a half of pipe and 6 put in a pump station. It just didn't 7 seem like that big of a project for Sandy Beach. If they could do his 8 9 project for 70, and you double the price because he's not going to work 10 11 for free over there, you know, it's 12 140,000 dollars. You know, that to me 13 seems -- and you're accommodating the 14 Village residents as opposed to somebody who is not. You're not 15 16 spending taxpayers money on somebody 17 that doesn't live in the Village. I 18 would be in favor of that. I think it's a good idea. I don't know with 19 20 the DEC if it's remotely possible, but 21 if it is, I think it would be nice. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: May I just add 23 that it seemed based on the story I read about the Town Board's discussion 24 25 and what I know about what the other

east end towns are doing, they're using 1 2 CPF water for, you know, helping individual homeowners put in one of 3 these new environmentally friendly 4 5 septic systems. And the county has had 6 an initiative around that as a well, 7 you had to enter a lottery, you could potentially win the opportunity to put 8 9 one in and they'd pay for it. So that's where I think if the Town Board 10 11 could do something, it seemed that's 12 where they were leaning in their discussion the other day, so that could 13 14 help with the fees as well as homeowners could apply to the town to 15 16 be part of CPF water to get the hook up fee covered by that CPF, it's an 17 18 option. MR. SALADINO: That's great for 19 20 the people that win that lottery and 21 get to do that, but every dollar they

20 the people that will that lottery and 21 get to do that, but every dollar they 22 have spend and give to a homeowner to 23 put in an approved -- their type of 24 approved septic system, that reduces 25 the total amount that they collect from

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that 1.1 million dollars, and that just 1 2 makes the project more expensive. Ιt relieves a little bit of the burden on 3 4 that particular homeowner, but not on 5 the taxpayer. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They get -- I 7 think their CPF fund in the town has been between three and seven or eight 8 9 each year of total money they have each 10 year. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. The lowest 12 year they had was 1.7 million, the highest they've had was 6.5 million 13 14 over the life of it. So it varies depending on home sales. When there's 15 16 no home sales, the amount goes down. 17 They're around a midpoint right now of

18 five million.

MR. SALADINO: I would just ask before we start getting a consultants, before we start spending money, a lot of us here are on a fixed income, so I don't want to spend -- I can't speak for everyone. I don't want to spend six million dollars.

1 And the last thing I would mention 2 is the pump out boat, I'm in Stirling Harbor everyday, my boat is in Stirling 3 4 Harbor, I'm there every single day 5 especially during the season. The pump 6 out boat is not laying around. He's 7 got a list, he's being called constantly. The problem with the pump 8 9 out boat is capacity. It doesn't have a lot of capacity. The problem is the 10 11 pump out boat that was supposed to be 12 for Brewers has no capacity. The pump 13 out that he installed is a joke. I'm 14 sorry. And people just -- if they have company and there's no boat available 15 16 because -- the boats on my dock have 80 17 gallon, 9 gallon waste tanks, and the 18 pump out boat holds 150, 200 gallons, and so for them to fill the boat, run 19 20 it back to Mitchell Park, pump it out, 21 run back to Stirling. He's got a list, 22 if you look at the kid, he's got a list 23 of twenty-five names on the list. It's just a physical impossibility for him 24 25 to service everybody that needs to be

1 serviced. Not charging them, it's not 2 about the money. These guys, it's not about the money. And if you want to 3 make it free, I mean, that's okay too, 4 5 but the problem is not -- you're not 6 going to get better service by not 7 charging the five bucks. I don't know what that five bucks covers or how much 8 9 is profit, I have no idea. You're not going to get a better service out of 10 11 the boat. It's not going to 12 incentivize the kid that's running the boat or the guy that's running the boat 13 14 to do more. It's impossible. What you need is a second boat. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fair enough. 17 MR. SALADINO: That's it. Thanks 18 for listening. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish 20 to address the Board? Okay. I'll 21 offer a motion to enter executive 22 session to talk about the job 23 performance of an employee at 10:09. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second. 25 MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor? Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service
