1	(Whereupon the meeting was called
2	to order at 6:59 p.m.)
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Call the meeting
4	to order. Pledge to the flag.
5	(Whereupon all stood for the
6	Pledge of Allegiance.)
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. You
8	may be seated. We'll start with the
9	fire department, Chief Wayne Miller.
10	CHIEF MILLER: Good evening. How
11	is everybody tonight? So I have an
12	application for membership, Megan Melly
13	(phonetic), my new daughter. She wants
14	to join rescue squad only, and she
15	signed up for the EMT class in Suffolk
16	Community College, that's all that's
17	available right now. So we'd like to
18	get that approved.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Was that in the
20	prenup?
21	CHIEF MILLER: Yeah. Also the
22	Board approved to buy the chief's cars
23	through Eagle Chevrolet, the low
24	bidder, so we'd like to ask to get that
25	approved, and also the budget

1	modification that I wrote up to
2	transfer the funds.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I hadn't
4	seen the budget modification, but
5	that's fine.
6	CHIEF MILLER: That was it. I
7	just had a few
8	MR. BRANDT: I have copies. He
9	spoke to me about it this afternoon,
10	told me it was a go, so I made copies
11	for the Board to look at the budget
12	mod.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll see that
14	afterwards before we vote on it.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Has the village
16	attorney gone over the to make sure
17	that there's no issues with it because
18	we had such confusion the last time.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe he's
20	reviewed the bid specs on the new
21	chief's cars.
22	MR. PROKOP: I'm going through it
23	now, I'll have an answer by tomorrow.
24	I have the full set of all three bid
25	specs, I'm going through them.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So if you have
2	any questions then we'll know before
3	the regular next week.
4	MR. PROKOP: Yes, and I have them
5	with me tonight if anybody has any
6	questions.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do we have any
8	catch dates in them. Purchase dates.
9	MR. PROKOP: I don't know.
10	CHIEF MILLER: Also, as you know,
11	there's a problem with the AC. I'm
12	sure Paul told you. Cole Mechanical
13	was here to today to try to figure out
14	what's wrong, and basically it looks
15	like the whole system is just
16	antiquated and needs to be replaced.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
18	CHIEF MILLER: Also we had someone
19	here look at all the doors, the steel
20	doors, we've been talking about
21	replacing all them, so Warden Milovich
22	had made some phone calls, and they had
23	someone here to get prices to replace
24	most of the doors depending on the cost
25	and what we have in the budget.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we get
3	I'd love to see numbers.
4	CHIEF MILLER: Yeah, well, the guy
5	was here today. So the company is East
6	Islip Building, they're on contract
7	with the county, so they have the
8	doors, they won't install them, so we
9	would end up buying to doors and then
10	pay someone to install them. So when I
11	get a price
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: They'll come back
13	with pricing before we go ahead and
14	actually do it.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And the work that
16	has to be done on the doors, is it just
17	age or are they malfunctioning.
18	CHIEF MILLER: Yeah, they're
19	malfunctioning
20	MR. CORWIN: Excuse me, Mr. Mayor
21	
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, Julia, can
23	you use the microphone, they can't hear
24	you in the back.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm just

1	checking, the condition of the doors,
2	was it age, or were they
3	malfunctioning?
4	CHIEF MILLER: I think it's a
5	combination of both. They're all
6	having their issues.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: They've been
8	ground down, they tried to make them
9	work for the past 25 years, and
LO	sometimes they lock, sometimes they
L1	don't, and it's time.
12	CHIEF MILLER: Something
13	definitely has to be done. Any
L 4	questions?
L5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any questions for
L 6	the chief?
L7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Good luck on
L 8	your chicken barbecue this Saturday. I
L 9	understand the tickets were sold out
20	way before.
21	CHIEF MILLER: They were actually
22	sold out two weeks ahead of time.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS:
24	Congratulations.
25	CHIEF MILLER: All 760 plus. So I

1	caught some flack from my wife because
2	I didn't have enough for some of the
3	people in our family.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Give me a call
5	because it looks like the captain is
6	not going to be home, so I might have
7	one.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I might have two,
9	so do the same with me.
LO	CHIEF MILLER: Very good,
L1	appreciate it.
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. We've
L3	got a couple of discussions to go over
L 4	from public hearings we had last month.
L5	Discussion on the Tuthill wetlands
L 6	permit application for the in-ground
L7	pool at 129 Bay Avenue. Did the Board
L8	have anything to discuss on that? It
L 9	seemed pretty straightforward from the
20	public hearing we had.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I understand
22	that ZBA I wasn't there, but I heard
23	that ZBA decided to table this or
24	something because of the scenario. Is
25	there anything we should be doing?

1	MR. PALLAS: The only thing I saw
2	on the notes from ZBA was the
3	applicant's name is different.
4	MR. PROKOP: Is this Tuthill?
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
6	MR. PROKOP: So the applicant is
7	deceased in the middle of the
8	application, and we're looking for
9	authorization for somebody to proceed,
10	and the representative expeditor
11	represented to the Board that she has
12	authority and would provide that to the
13	Village. So we need that for our file.
14	If we're planning on taking action on
15	this next week, then what I would
16	recommend is that we I'll contact
17	her and let her know that we need
18	something right away for this Board.
19	Right now it's sort of it's really
20	in limbo because we have an applicant
21	who is deceased, so really we don't
22	have an applicant anymore. We need
23	some kind of an authorization for
24	somebody to proceed.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: So we should have

1	an answer from the ZBA before we
2	approve the wetlands permit
3	application. That's our portion,
4	that's all we're talking about is that.
5	MR. PROKOP: True.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Joe, has the
7	family contacted you, do they want to
8	proceed with the work?
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, the expeditor
10	at the public hearing last month said
11	they wanted to.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They did?
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, she came
14	last month.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Shelby was here
16	representing the family.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that we
18	need to wait. First of all, we need to
19	have a legal document that Joe is
20	suggesting, but ZBA, is there a
21	possibility of them changing something
22	drastically that would involve a
23	wetlands permit?
24	MR. PROKOP: I think it's a small
25	possibility, but there's going to be

1	conditions there probably will be a
2	condition or some kind of discussion
3	about screening, you know, something
4	like that.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: So we'll wait on
6	the ZBA before we go and do anything.
7	I don't want to take action and approve
8	a permit and have it be different than
9	what the other board is working on, so
LO	we'll wait for them to do that. So
L1	we'll table our discussions on anything
12	on the wetlands permit until we get a
13	final determination on the name and on
L 4	the ZBA.
L5	Discussion on proposed local law,
L 6	reference Chapter 132 to amend the
L7	south side no parking regulation on
L8	Wiggins Street from Fifth Street to
L 9	Third Street to be year round. We had
20	the public hearing, we had some
21	discussion on it. Did the board want
22	to discuss anything on that?
23	MS. WALDEN: I'm a resident. I
24	would like to ask you not to do it,
25	it's not going to make a heck of a lot

1	of difference.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We had a
3	public hearing last month.
4	MS. WALDEN: I wasn't here, I
5	didn't realize it, that's why I'm here
6	tonight.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Does the Board
8	want to hear her comments?
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm okay with
10	that.
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's fine.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Step up to the
14	podium, give your name and address for
15	the record.
16	MS. WALDEN: Diane Walden, 331
17	Wiggins Street, Greenport. I've been
18	there 52 years, I've been through
19	everything with that ferry line, and I
20	don't want you to take away my parking
21	all winter. I don't think there's any
22	necessity for it. The ferry line has
23	calmed down a lot now. Out biggest
24	problem is in the spring when
25	everything is going to Shelter Island

1	to fill up swimming pools and build
2	houses. The ferry line has been very
3	quiet as of now, there's been no
4	problems except maybe this morning.
5	Somebody went through and hit a rock
6	and ended up standing up on the
7	Mitchell chain there for Mitchell Park.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, she did.
9	MS. WALDEN: Other than that, I'd
L 0	like to ask you to reconsider it, don't
L1	do that. I don't think there's any
L2	need for it. If there becomes a need
L3	in the future, fine, but right now I
L 4	don't think there's a need for it.
L 5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, for this
L 6	month there isn't but all through
L7	March, April, and May there was a need
L 8	for it.
L 9	MS. WALDEN: That's what I mean,
20	reconsider it in the spring, but it
21	really doesn't happen until, like
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: But the process
23	goes through, as of next week they can
24	start using that lane again, so it was
25	suggested by somebody else to modify

1	the times of it, but, you know, that's
2	the discussion that we're going to
3	have.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It currently
5	goes from when to when?
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Memorial Day to
7	Labor Day. So June, July, and August
8	you can't.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Would it be
LO	better and I'm just throwing this
L1	out, you're saying it starts in the
12	spring time, so maybe March, April,
13	May?
L 4	MS. WALDEN: Maybe April until
L5	Labor Day or something.
L 6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Or beyond Labor
L7	Day. Sometimes after Labor Day on the
L8	weekends it gets to be a little crazy,
L 9	doesn't it?
20	MS. WALDEN: Really, no. The
21	ferry line is working fine on the
22	weekends and everything, unless it's
23	Maritime Festival, and that's just
24	chaos everywhere.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav.

1	MS. WALDEN: Thank you.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Board have any
3	other discussion on this?
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is anyone open
5	to instead of the full twelve months
6	considering going from March to let's
7	say the end of October?
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think we should
9	consider amending it possibly.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: We could do that.
11	This is for discussion, we would have
12	the vote on it. If we change the dates
13	on the code, would we have to have
14	another public hearing on it as a code
15	change?
16	MR. PROKOP: You don't have to
17	have another public hearing, it has to
18	be changed seven days before you vote.
19	The change has to occur at least seven
20	days before you vote.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's now.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Today, right?
23	MR. PROKOP: Yes, which is today.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Could we refine
25	those dates a little bit right now if

1	we're going to consider voting on it?
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: April 1st to
4	October 31st.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a six month
7	span.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Here's a
9	scenario to throw out, what if the
LO	committee of folks who is working on
L1	traffic flow, what if something comes
12	out of that and we end up rerouting the
13	ferry down Fourth through the MTA
L 4	property, does that have any
L5	ramifications if we make this change
L 6	now? I guess we'd have to amend the
L7	code again if we want to
L8	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'd have to
L 9	change it again. The thing that I'm
20	concerned about is the school bus
21	starts going down there in two weeks,
22	and if we get a busy day like it was in
23	the spring time, the school bus is not
24	going to be able to get through with
25	cars parked on both sides of the

1	street.
2	MS. WALDEN: There are only two
3	kids on the street.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: We already heard
5	your comments, please, Mrs. Walden.
6	That's the only issue that's going to
7	be happening because as of Labor Day,
8	which is the 4th or whatever, the road
9	is open to parking again on that side
10	of the street.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But if we were
12	to change if we were to vote on it
13	if we were to deal with a compromise
14	here today, which is the seven days
15	before and vote on it next week, then
16	that would go into effect before school
17	starts, correct?
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, it would,
19	yes.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think we
21	have an option to take some type of an
22	action so that it's I mean, we could
23	also put a sunset on it, which I've
24	never done and have never suggested
25	here, but I know they do it in a lot of

1	New York legislation. You put a sunset
2	clause on the end of the resolution
3	that says at the end of two years from
4	now you review the law to see if you
5	want to continue it or not. That's
6	another option. But I think at this
7	point I understand the school bus, I
8	do, and we've all seen the drama that
9	goes on down there when the big tractor
10	trailers come and there's issues.
11	Rerouting it may take one year, two
12	years, three years, who knows where
13	that's going to go, so we have to come
14	up with some type of relief.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This isn't a
16	dead end.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm willing to
18	look into lengthening the time for the
19	no parking and let's see what happens
20	over the winter. It's only a
21	suggestion.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: This is an
23	ongoing process, and I think, you know,
24	the idea is to try and work with the
25	residents and with people using the

1	road and being impacted by this the
2	most, so I definitely think we should
3	appreciate Mrs. Walden's comments. I
4	would be willing to amend this next
5	week.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We did have
7	another comment last week to the same.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, we did.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They were
10	Greenport residents who asked us for
11	this.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: That we don't do
13	it? Yes.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I'll put
15	out April 1st through October 31st.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think
18	that's reasonable because, again, if
19	that covers down in the spring, and we
20	know, like, even if it slows down
21	initially in September that will free
22	us up for the first couple of weeks of
23	school, and then we always kind of get
24	some sort of bump of tourism sometime
25	in October. I think that would take us

1	through and then
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have the
3	pumpkin season in October, so that
4	always causes a bump.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
6	I think that would get us through, and
7	again, we've made a change, a positive
8	change, and then if we look at it next
9	year and we can find a way to improve
10	it, then of course.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do we need a
12	motion?
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Do you want to
14	make a motion to amend the time frame
15	from the public hearing to go from
16	April 1st to October 31st for no
17	parking on the south side of Wiggins
18	Street?
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, that's my
20	motion, yes.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll second that.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: The motion was
23	seconded. All in favor?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Opposed? Motion
4	carried. So we're going to change
5	that. That will be up for a Board vote
6	on the overall change of the code for
7	next week. So we will have public
8	comment for that if you want to come
9	back and speak before we take official
LO	action on it. All we did now is change
11	the dates of the time frame for the
L2	public hearing. Before we take an
L3	official vote you'll have a chance to
L 4	speak at next Thursday's meeting, pro,
L5	con, whatever, any other input, we'll
L 6	take it then.
L7	MS. WALDEN: Okay. Thank you.
L8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you for
L 9	coming and for your comments. We
20	appreciate all that.
21	Okay. Comments from the public
22	hearing regarding the proposed local
23	law 2016 amending the rental properties
24	portion of the Village Code to
25	incorporate legislation concerning

1	short term rental properties is still
2	open. Are we ready to have a
3	discussion on that, or do we want more
4	time to put things together? I know
5	it's kind of been a work in progress
6	with everybody.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: We didn't close
9	the public hearing, so that's why it's
LO	on the agenda.
L1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I mean, I know
L2	that we've all had discussions amongst
L3	ourselves, and Doug has written
L 4	something, but I also think that
L5	there's been more people in the
L 6	community that have been thinking about
L7	it, and I would like to hear some of
L8	their comments, and when we officially
L 9	close it then get into a bigger
20	discussion. I think it would give us
21	more time to really deal with what dug
22	put out. I mean, I know Julia just
23	handed something here, and as I, you
24	know, I had a discussion with Doug the
25	other day, and I'm all over the place

on a lot of the stuff.

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MAYOR HUBBARD: We could just continue the open comment period on it. I did have a discussion with one of the landlords that has a rental, and she was going to put together a proposal speaking to some of the other ones to give us something that they thought from their perspective of what they could work with and what they thought was a good compromise from their side going forward with it. I haven't gotten that back from her yet, but she told me over last week that she was going to speak to a couple of other people that were doing it, she's from down on Fifth Street, and come back with some more comments.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said,

Doug, you took the initiative and got everything in one format, and I think there's a lot that we want to discuss among ourselves and think about. And as I said, I really -- I've heard from a few people who have other ideas that

1	they want to throw out, but I also know
2	that we left it open so that's the only
3	kind of
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll give it
5	another month, we'll discuss it before
6	we go and bring something that we
7	actually want to propose out to the
8	public. Take some more comments, get
9	some more letters, circulate them
10	around, and try to come up with
11	something that we could actually
12	propose to have a public hearing on for
13	the September meeting.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm hopeful we
15	might keep it open for another couple
16	of months possibly even. Let's see how
17	it goes, see what
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Get some more
19	comments, put together a draft proposal
20	from ourselves to put out there that
21	the public can then read and look at,
22	and then have a discussion in
23	September. If we're going to try to do
24	something, then we'd be doing it
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because we're

1	not just dealing with short term, we're
2	dealing with the whole Chapter 103 to
3	begin with. It's a little bit, you
4	know, there's some ideas that you've
5	taken on, there's some idea I've done,
6	there's some the village attorney, you
7	know, included in when he redid his
8	and then of course we now have, what is
9	it, October 1st we have a whole new set
10	of building
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fire code.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, so we
13	need to kind of I don't want to jump
14	the cart and then all of a sudden we
15	have to go back and change something
16	because we've got a new set of rules.
17	My concern is the is the safety and,
18	you know, the safety of the units. My
19	other question is, have we had any fair
20	amount of complaints about short term
21	rentals this summer?
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: We've had three.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We've only had
24	three?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All partying
2	related, right?
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: One was partying
4	related and the police were called.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, and they
6	dealt with it, and that was, you know.
7	However many there are or whatever,
8	there's only three that I know of that
9	ended in a complaint, so I didn't
10	that might not be in the future, but as
11	of right now it still hasn't been a
12	major issue, so I mean, we have the
13	season is almost over, we haven't
14	gotten a draft yet, so we're going to
15	do something to start for the next
16	season, but we'll keep the ongoing
17	comments.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I've had more
19	complaints about the buses dropping
20	people off.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Don't even go
22	there.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I've had many
24	more complaints from Village residents
25	about how they can't find a place to

1	live, and so there are no the
2	availability of rental houses and
3	apartments is growing more scarce.
4	That continues to be my concern, not
5	I mean, partying we have laws for, so
6	it should get dealt with, nuisances
7	should be dealt with, but those are the
8	majority of the complaints I've heard,
9	so I'm going to keep pushing for this.
10	I've put out the idea of the cap, it's
11	in my draft. By the way, I don't know,
12	I feel like it's my job to put ideas
13	out there and let everybody take a
14	whack at them and see what works and
15	what doesn't, so I'm going to keep
16	doing that. I hope it's helpful. I'm
17	trying to be helpful. At this point, I
18	hear that the consensus of this Board
19	is not to make a big move toward any
20	kind of regulation of the number of
21	short term rentals, that's I think what
22	I'm hearing from everybody. I'm
23	comfortable, you know, I've put the
24	idea out there, people can discuss it,
25	continue to discuss it. I'm

1	comfortable backing off of that for the
2	purposes of us getting something done
3	now that's less complicated. You've
4	said a bunch of times, Mr. Mayor, that
5	you think we should get the short term
6	included in the rental permit law so we
7	understand what's out there and so we
8	can focus on the safety and I
9	absolutely support that, so I'm happy
10	this draft I put out there a week
11	ago, I've talked to a bunch of people
12	since, I'm happy to have the cap
13	portion of what I put in here pulled
14	out for the moment. What I think we
15	have a great opportunity to do right
16	now, and, you know, we'll hear from the
17	public more, but we have a great
18	opportunity to remove a lot of the red
19	tape in this rental permit law, which
20	people have told me has caused them to
21	reconsider renting to people year
22	round, which goes back to the thing
23	I've read the most complaints about is
24	finding a place to live. So, you know,
25	Trustee Phillips started removing some

1	of that stuff. My draft here has more
2	strike through's than additions
3	especially if you remove the cap stuff.
4	So that's what I would love feedback on
5	from you all, from the public. And,
6	you know, I make a couple of
7	distinctions in my draft. I say that
8	short term rentals pay a higher
9	permitting fee which is to cover the
10	enforcement aspect. I also say that
11	short term rentals are required to have
12	a walk through inspection by our
13	building inspector, not the option to
14	sign a notarized affidavit. I think
15	our short term landlords who have come
16	to speak on this have all said they're
17	fine with that, they're fine getting
18	inspected, they're fine paying a fee.
19	I think that's a nice compromise. I
20	don't want to scare away people from
21	buying a home and renting it to a year
22	round resident, nor do I want to scare
23	somebody away from making an investment
24	in the Village. And I'll discuss the
25	other piece of the short term tenant

1	during my report, but I hope people
2	will take a look it's a long
3	document, a lot of people don't want to
4	read this stuff. I hope people will
5	look at the strike through's, and from
6	my perspective our rental permit law
7	now really isn't working. I don't
8	think you have tangible results that we
9	have safer places to live for tenants.
10	I don't think you have tangible results
11	in general that we've improved the
12	status of rental living in the Village.
13	I just don't see it. We sent out 200
14	some odd applications, the 80 we got
15	back are good, that's good, that's 80
16	places that are safe. That is a win.
17	However, percentage is not great in
18	terms of the success, and I'm just
19	if we just throw the short term rentals
20	into a law that I'm not sure is
21	working, then we may just have an
22	overall system that's not working, and
23	so I would like to see us at least try
24	to do something with Chapter 103 once
25	we've begun a process, let's do

1	something to make it better and more
2	efficient.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So we'll
4	keep the hearing open to get more
5	comments, we'll try to put something
6	together from the Board for next month.
7	Next item is Village
8	Administrator, Paul Pallas' report.
9	MR. PALLAS: Thank you, Mayor and
LO	Board. I have some executive session
L1	items to discuss regarding personnel
L2	and potential contracts. I know I sent
13	e-mails about some of that. I'd ask
L 4	that we do that. In addition to the
L5	regular items, I just want to highlight
L 6	a few things in my report. I'll start
L7	with the road crew. They've been doing
L8	a lot of work on signage with our new
L 9	traffic enforcement process. We've
20	done a lot of work in cleaning up
21	signs, adding signs, putting them in
22	the right place, putting the right
23	signs in the right place, and I think
24	that has made a big difference. The
25	traffic enforcement individual has

1	pointed out a lot of these things,
2	which is good for us. It helps us see
3	where we need to put things and
4	whatnot. That's been really going
5	well. The crew has also been working
6	on the playground equipment at Third
7	Street right here. It's more or less
8	finished. I think the only thing left
9	is mulch at this point, so I think
10	we're in good shape on that.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's actually the
12	border and the mulch, the border is
13	still not done.
14	MR. PALLAS: I thought they
15	finished it today, but that's what I
16	was told
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: It wasn't this
18	morning.
19	MR. PALLAS: two hours ago, so
20	hopefully they told me the right story.
21	I know they're looking to put the mulch
22	in tomorrow. That's a good thing.
23	They also did a lot of work at the
24	skate park. We are going to try to
25	keep up with the skate park so that

1	it's not as big a project as it was two
2	years ago. They did a lot of work this
3	year. I think if we keep up with it,
4	that's going to maintain it in a good
5	way. I think it looks great, they did
6	a great job.
7	Sewer department, the only item of
8	real note is the cooling fan for the
9	variable frequency drive was replaced,
LO	that's a safety issue for the equipment
L1	itself, so that's a good thing, that's
L2	been completed.
L3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, before
L 4	you go on, wasn't there something with
L5	some type of a retaining wall at the
L 6	sewer plant?
L7	MR. PALLAS: We have an engineer
L8	working, yeah, that's not been done
L 9	yet, but we have an engineer doing
20	design on that.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So it's still in
22	the design phase for plans, right, it
23	hasn't gone out to bid yet?
24	MR. PALLAS: Still in design, yes,
25	correct, hasn't been out to bid yet.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So we're
2	on a deadline, you know, as far as, you
3	know, a projected date when the
4	engineer may be finished with it?
5	MR. PALLAS: I don't have that. I
6	could get that.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My
8	understanding was if I remember Ray's
9	concern was at some point that
10	retaining wall may take a dive.
11	MR. PALLAS: When Ray brought this
12	to my attention quite some time ago, we
13	reviewed, and I may have reported, we
14	reviewed all the drawings of the
15	buildings, and we don't believe I do
16	not believe there's any specific danger
17	to any plant equipment or structures.
18	It certainly has to be fixed, but there
19	doesn't appear to be any danger. The
20	base of that retaining wall is either
21	at or above the foundation of the
22	building right next to it, so it looks
23	stable. The building itself and
24	equipment all looks stable, but it
25	certainly needs to be fixed.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So the engineer
2	is in the process of developing it
3	before we could go out to bid?
4	MR. PALLAS: Correct. That's what
5	he's doing, he's doing the design specs
6	for it.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So
8	perhaps next month we might get an idea
9	of a timeline as to where we're at.
10	MR. PALLAS: I will try to get
11	that out before then.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Great.
13	MR. PALLAS: Moving onto the
14	electric department, I had sent an
15	e-mail out late today about tomorrow's
16	DMNC test on two of our units. One
17	unit is scheduled for repair, unit 4 is
18	scheduled for repair work starting
19	Monday. We hope that should take no
20	more than a week. Once that's
21	completed, there's a one or two day
22	break-in period for the unit with no
23	load on it. Once that's completed,
24	then they will move right into the DMNC
25	test for that unit as well. The gates

1	have been completed. The report says
2	nearing completion, but they are
3	completed now. The line trucks were
4	inspected, everything is good with
5	them. I just mentioned about the
6	engine number 4, so that's electric.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Before you go,
8	are the water machines up at the light
9	plant? I kind of got a few complaints
10	that they weren't working too well, is
11	that what's going on?
12	MR. PALLAS: We've had a couple of
13	issues, but they've been resolved. I
14	don't remember what the specific issues
15	were. They are working now as far as I
16	know.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who is
18	Mr. Segulski (phonetic) used to watch
19	them over like they were his children.
20	Who is officially responsible for them
21	now?
22	MR. PALLAS: Derryl is kind of
23	oversees it, but he works with the
24	water department on maintenance issues
25	on that.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So there is a
2	regular maintenance done?
3	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And do you know
5	the hours, is it still open from
6	MR. PALLAS: I don't know that.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because I know
8	at one point we had someone coming in
9	to close them up at night.
10	MR. PALLAS: We still do. I don't
11	remember the time offhand, I'm sorry.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the price
13	has gone to 50 cents?
14	MR. PALLAS: Has it changed?
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I thought it was
16	50 cents.
17	MR. PALLAS: It hasn't changed
18	since I've been here.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was 25 I
20	thought.
21	MS. ALLEN: It's 50 cents and one
22	of them is not working.
23	MR. PALLAS: I will check.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, I just want
25	to give a compliment, the road

1	department when we had that flash flood
2	last week down on Front and First
3	Street, the road crew really got down
4	there to deal with that backed up
5	drains very quickly. I was really
6	impressed with their work. It was
7	there and then it was gone just like
8	that, so I just wanted to give a little
9	shout out to those guys. I thought
10	they handled it really well.
11	MR. PALLAS: I will pass that
12	along.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, the water
14	department, are they planning on
15	putting any more new hydrants in before
16	the winter, or are we what is the
17	plan on that?
18	MR. PALLAS: I don't have a plan
19	for that at the moment. I will check
20	with them to see what their status is.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because I
22	notice another one was having an issue
23	as the same one that they just recently
24	replaced, water was leaking from the
25	ground.

1	MR. PALLAS: The same one they
2	just fixed?
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, that
4	one is fixed. I just found another
5	one, and I will e-mail it to you.
6	MR. PALLAS: Please.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because I see
8	it bubbling up out of the ground, the
9	water bubbling up.
10	MR. PALLAS: Please. That we will
11	take care of.
12	Moving on to the building
13	department, I think you already
14	mentioned new codes, that's also
15	highlighted in the report here, we have
16	new codes coming into effect, a lot of
17	changes starting in October. So that's
18	the big story there.
19	In terms of code enforcement,
20	traffic enforcement really is the only
21	thing that we're focused on at the
22	moment. I have attached the statistics
23	for the worksheet, the one you have I
24	believe is already dated, but we have
25	collected or at least the monies have

1	been received through the process. It
2	says 13,725. I believe as of today
3	it's over 16,000 at the moment. That
4	represents 476 tickets that were issued
5	and 430 were issued by our own code
6	enforcements, so the bulk of them are
7	being issued by our own traffic
8	enforcement.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a
10	question, Paul. After I got your
11	analysis here, I pulled out the FBS
12	contract that I have in possession, and
13	reading back all the discussions that
14	took place in 2015 about this whole
15	process, and I asked Robert if we had
16	received any of the funding yet or if
17	we had received the billing from FBS
18	because according to this they're
19	supposed to be sending a bill for
20	services, and to date he hadn't
21	received anything, so he was looking
22	into it. Can you perhaps give us an
23	idea of where the funding is going to
24	be coming into us from?

25

MR. PALLAS: I'll let him fill in

1	some of the details, but the process is
2	the money doesn't come from FBS, it
3	comes from Southold, and there's a
4	process with the State, they have to
5	then the State, State approves it,
6	and the money gets sent. That's the
7	big picture story. FBS's fee is only
8	on tickets that are beyond 30 days.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Beyond 30 days?
10	MR. PALLAS: There's no fee to us
11	if it's within 30 days. It's my
12	understanding as of today only one, I
13	assume it's one, because they only give
14	the amount, what we talked about as of
15	this report, their total take is only
16	50 dollars.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So the other
18	issue that I have in here is that
19	Southold Town is going to be issuing us
20	the check, so from an audit point of
21	view, FBS is going to be giving us the
22	reports so there's a checks and
23	balances between what we're owed and
24	so the treasurer has access to this
25	site to do a checks and balances?

1	MR. PALLAS: We have access to the
2	site.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I understand
4	you have access to the site, but does
5	he have access to the site so that he
6	can check on the money situation, or
7	does this site not show the funding
8	moving back and forth?
9	MR. PALLAS: No, this is only an
LO	FBS internal report.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's
12	what I'm asking. So next step, how are
13	we checks and balancing that we're
L 4	going to get funds?
L5	MAYOR HUBBARD: We need to speak
L 6	to Southold Town and have them release
L7	the funds.
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well
L 9	MR. PALLAS: I'm not sure I
20	understand the question actually. We
21	know what tickets we've issued, we know
22	what FBS has processed, so we know what
23	Southold should be getting from that.
24	The State actually sends a report that
25	details all of that, so we can match

1	three	different	things	to	see	that	it
2	all ch	necks.					

asking is next year when we're audited by our independent auditors, this is going to be one of the things that they're going to be looking at because this is new. That's why I'm asking now, so let's think about how we're going to deal with that in the beginning, and I'm assuming that the treasurer would have some suggestions to that, so that's why I'm asking.

MR. PALLAS: Sure.

MR. BRANDT: I do have access,

Trustee Phillips, to the website. It
is report driven. The procedure, we
should be clear on that, Southold is
required to make a monthly report to
the State Justice Fund. They process
it, they clear it for payment, and then
they authorize Southold to pay us. We
get -- as Paul said, we do get a
monthly statement. We've already
received the first 300, you can see

1	June's payment from the report. There
2	was a glitch with them as far as
3	processing I guess due to the volume.
4	They caught their error up there,
5	they're correcting that, and in the
6	next statement cycle, which I should be
7	getting in about a week, week and a
8	half, we should see the balance of
9	these funds being processed. I expect
LO	payment from that. Moving forward, I
L1	expect to be able to tie up these
12	monthly reports to the monthly
13	statement I receive from the State
L 4	Justice Fund.
L5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's
L 6	what I wanted to know.
L7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have a question
L8	about the you know, a person gets a
L 9	ticket and pays it with a credit card
20	before the 30 day period, and it's not
21	going to a collection agency, do those
22	funds come directly to us then, or are
23	they also going to Southold and
2 4	MR. PALLAS: Whether it's paid in
25	time or late, the payment process is

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1	identical.

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's in the contract here that it has to be all be paid to the Town of Southold, that's what in the contract?

MR. PALLAS: Yes, that's where the checks are being payable regardless.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I want to talk about the sort of prioritization of the parking enforcement. This was sold to us as a way to, you know, to deal with the fact that there's sort of a free for all happening downtown. There was, there's not now. The signs, and the paint, and this has I think had a huge effect, so I'm grateful for it, and I think, you know, I'm glad you pushed this through, Mr. Mayor. But this was sold to us as an effort to make sure people aren't parking in handicapped spots, people aren't parking in fire lanes, people aren't parking outside of lines, and that's good as well as the parking study that's commissioned by I think two Boards ago that told us that

1	moving cars more frequently, flipping
2	cars is better for the businesses, they
3	will make X amount of dollars more per
4	year. That was I don't remember the
5	numbers, but it was very clear that was
6	the analysis of that study. So this
7	was all supposed to be in that line.
8	I'm concerned that it's not that I
9	want people to park on the wrong side
10	of the street, it's not that I want
11	people to be driving around in
12	un-inspected vehicles, I mean, that's
13	you know, I may have been guilty of
14	that once or twice, you know, people
15	get busy. Those are fine things to
16	ticket, but for that to be such a
17	significant portion of what we're doing
18	doesn't that's not what I voted for
19	when we added this code enforcement
20	officer, and from my perspective I
21	can't figure out sorry, parking
22	enforcement officer, I can't figure out
23	why he's ever getting in the mayor
24	mobile and driving around. The parking
25	stuff is all within a very small radius

1	of blocks. So if it's that he needs
2	stuff to do, then, you know, that would
3	be one thing, but if he needs something
4	to do, I would I've never seen chalk
5	go on any tires, I don't know how he's
6	doing it or if he's doing it, but I
7	would rather see us focus our effort on
8	the things that I thought we were going
9	to focus on including we've given very
10	few for parking too long or whatever
11	that is, violating the two hour limit.
12	I'd rather see us enforce that than
13	you know, if we have to choose, than
14	unregistered or un-inspected.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: As a brief
16	explanation on that, when somebody is
17	parked in front of a fire hydrant, and
18	he goes to write them a ticket, and
19	he's walking around to put it on the
20	windshield and sees no inspection, and
21	he has the authority to do it. He's
22	not going around looking for inspection
23	tickets. It's people that are parked
24	illegally, they're parked in front a
25	fire hydrant, he's putting a ticket

1	down there, and he sees a year old
2	inspection sticker, in his duty of what
3	he's supposed to do by us, he writes
4	them a ticket for that also. If they
5	didn't park illegally, he's never even
6	close to their vehicle, and they never
7	even get looked at. That's where those
8	all have come from. If you look at
9	most of them, the inspections, they
10	also got a ticket for something else,
11	and that's why he's done that. He's
12	also in the car because we talked about
13	Johnson Place, going down there. He
14	can't walk from Central Avenue to
15	Johnson Place to look at the cars
16	parked along a no parking zone where
17	it's a hazard to get through, so he
18	drives the vehicle down there. Does he
19	take a different route going back each
20	time? Yes. I mean, I don't tell him
21	where he's supposed to go or whatever.
22	I've seen him use the car. I know this
23	past weekend when it was really hot he
24	was doing, like, an hour in the car, an
25	hour out because it was boiling hot,

1	and he would drive down there and check
2	out Fifth Street and cool off a little
3	bit in the car, and then go an park the
4	car and walk around again. So
5	that's
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's all fair.
7	I just think we only got five for
8	parking longer than permitted.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: We had said we
LO	weren't going to be looking at those.
L1	If we want to start looking at that,
L2	that's not what we told the public we
L3	were going to be doing. I see some
L 4	people said we should be doing more of
L5	that and not the other things. We can,
L 6	but then I think we're going to piss
L7	off a lot of our store owners if we
L8	give people a ticket for being there
L 9	for an hour and a half or an hour and
20	ten minutes instead of an hour.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, it's a two
22	hour limit in most of the
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Some are 30
24	minutes, some are two hours.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But those spots

1	Trustee Phillips has it in her
2	report, those 30 minute spots are vital
3	for our residents to get to the
4	pharmacy, to get to IGA. You know,
5	you're going to talk about it later,
6	but for me, he should be at IGA because
7	I think we have a couple of ten minute
8	spots
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They're
10	supposed to be 30 minutes, and I tried
11	to decipher the code, and Paul and
12	Derryl, and I tried to put a map
13	together, and so did you, okay, it's
14	extremely complicated. We need to
15	review it and be clear on some stuff.
16	I have found some discrepancies, and I
17	think at this point and I will talk
18	about IGA when I get to my section, but
19	that is also part of the problem is
20	it's not clear as to who, what, when,
21	and where. I'll be honest with you, if
22	we had enforcement or a police
23	department throughout the Village,
24	anybody parking the wrong way would
25	have gotten a ticket. All right. So

1	and my question is why would you park
2	the wrong way on a street? That's just
3	a general common sense, whatever. But
4	I think the other thing is is that it
5	also gives him a chance to look at
6	areas where perhaps we have too many
7	vehicles parked in strange ways that
8	just people need to be reminded
9	because, you know, we have to get
10	safety vehicles in and out too. After
11	my little experience on Main Street
12	today, which I will talk about later
13	too, I almost met up with a tractor
14	trailer trying to maneuver down Main
15	Street between Bay Avenue and Central
16	Avenue. It was an interesting
17	experience. So hopefully he'll be over
18	there a little but more too to be
19	honest with you. That's another
20	concern, that he go over to the Bay
21	Avenue and Central area, that section
22	of town too. But I think at this point
23	the inspections, if you go to Wal-Mart
24	or any of the parking lots in the Town
25	of Riverhead, if they stop to look at

1	your vehicle if it's in a handicap
2	spot, or if it's in a fire zone, or
3	wherever, and you have an out of date
4	inspection, they give you a ticket as
5	well.

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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I may or may not have gotten one of those once. But what I want to say is that it's okay with this trustee if -- revenue wise it seems like we're going to do okay. So it's okay with me if we get less volume of tickets and we focus on the things that our residents need, which is the ability to park at IGA particularly for the elderly, particularly for people who are nonresidents, people who come from Orient who don't walk so well. So I'd like to see us focus on enforcing the stuff around the short term spots because only five doesn't seem right. I'm sure there are people parking more than 30 minutes next to the pharmacy, next to IGA. So that's all I wanted to say.

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And he was

1	directed when he started by me to not
2	unless it's really blatant, to not
3	go and do those because some of those
4	are local people, they're in the
5	restaurants, and we didn't want to get
6	everybody irritated as we were trying a
7	learning curve on doing that. We're
8	almost done with the season. If we
9	want to prioritize and do the short
10	term parking for next year, we can
11	definitely ramp this in a different
12	direction. This was to try to keep the
13	general parking where everybody wanted
14	to under control.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Again, kudos to
16	everyone involved for that. It's okay
17	with me if the guy puts a chair down at
18	the IGA and just sort of reminds
19	people, hey, remember, you know, you're
20	only supposed to be here 30 minutes.
21	So if it's a tourist who is going to go
22	to lunch, you tell them you got to go
23	park somewhere else because people need
24	to go shopping.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I find it

1	interesting to see the number of people
2	who now get out of the car and make
3	sure that they're parked between the
4	lines. So that's an observation. And
5	some of the store owners who actually
6	come out and say, you know, make sure
7	you park between the lines. Okay. So
8	the learning curve the mayor is
9	correct, the learning curve is there.
10	And it is giving us information that we
11	need from these tickets to see where we
12	may need to change some stuff.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll give you an
14	example of something that I observed at
15	a meeting yesterday, went over to Sag
16	Harbor, we had a meeting. Some people
17	that were at the meeting were in a two
18	hour zone, I was in a three hour zone.
19	But after I parked and walking a block
20	and a half, they had three TCO's out
21	there doing code enforcement. Three
22	full-time, they're there all day long.

As somebody is pulling up they're

telling them you can't be here more

than this or that and just directing

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1	people. It's a huge expense on their
2	part, but they're trying to keep the
3	front part open. But the gentleman
4	that was sitting at the table with me,
5	he said all right, my two hours are up,
6	I got to go, and he left to go move his
7	car. So most people do actually listen
8	to that. They know if somebody is out
9	there, they're going to get a ticket.
10	We're not a stringent on them, but most
11	people know if you're in a two hour
12	zone, if you're going to be there
13	longer, you got to move it along. I
14	think they're trying to do that. I
15	don't want to us heavy-handed as it was
16	when I was walking down Sag Harbor,
17	one, two, three, like, a block and a
18	half and there's three of them out
19	there. It'll scare the heck out of
20	you, like, I'm not parking anywhere
21	near here. We don't want to be that
22	way either. So it's trying to do it in
23	a friendly way just to keep people
24	moving, and we can readjust at the end
25	of the season, we'll decide our plans

for next season.

2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I also think the
3	clear signage, you know, really clear
4	signage about parking limitations, you
5	know, in front of the IGA will go a
6	long way. I mean, there's really
7	nothing to look at right now, but it
8	seems to work okay at the post office.
9	They're telling you postal patrons
10	only, you come in, you pick up your
11	stuff, and you leave, and I think that
12	same kind of clear signage should
13	probably work at the IGA without having
14	to assign a TCO over there, even if
15	they are friendly and smiling.

MR. PALLAS: Next would be recreation department. Both pump out boat and pump out station had some issues during the month. They've been both repaired and are working at this time. We've had a contractor out to look at the boardwalk lighting that would be west of the west pier. We've gotten one quote, we need to get additional quotes because the price --

1	the idea that we're going to go with,
2	what we wanted the contractor to come
3	up with is to have lights that actually
4	plug in rather than are hard wired so
5	that if there is a flood tide coming in
6	we can unplug them and put them in
7	storage so they don't get ruined. We
8	thought that was a good solution, a
9	little more expensive, but it certainly
10	will save them from they're probably
11	going to be LED's as well, they'll be a
12	little brighter than the ones that were
13	there. That's a relatively dark area.
14	So we just need to get additional
15	quotes an then schedule the work.
16	The marina revenue as you'll
17	notice I'm sure was down, but five of
18	our regular yachts come in on the east
19	pier hadn't settled their dockage.
20	They'll be settling it this month,
21	which is going to make a big difference
22	in the August revenue.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do we have fewer
24	boats moored?
25	MR. PALLAS: At the mooring field,

1	or are we talking about the
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The mooring
3	revenue is down, does that mean we just
4	had less
5	MR. PALLAS: I haven't analyzed
6	it, Doug. It may be a timing issue, I
7	don't know. I'll have to take a look
8	at that.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Does that
10	include transients or just seasonal?
11	MR. PALLAS: As far as I know,
12	it's both.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can the I
14	mean, that seems like a harbor master
15	thing, just to make sure everyone who
16	is on a mooring belongs there?
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's not part of
18	what we had going on with that, that
19	had been done at the marina office
20	before. We're going to have to when
21	we discuss where we're going with
22	everything with the marina and
23	everything else, that job would have to
24	be assigned to somebody. Right now
25	it's not assigned anybody. Whoever

paid for their permits beginning of the season put their paperwork in to Jeff at the marina office still has a right to do that.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

MAYOR HUBBARD: But we're going to have to set up a plan and who is going to be in charge of it and how we're going to do that for the next season.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Isn't that -- I

feel -- I don't know. It seems to me

the harbor master could get a list of

the moorings that are supposed to be

occupied and just --

MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, he definitely could, yes. Really it was just to try to slow people down out there, it was not something that was even talked about with everything else, but, you know, the whole job description of that going through the civil service and everything else, once that's decided which way we go with that for the next season, again, that could be definitely assigned there, but it's not something

1	that it is right now.
2	MR. PALLAS: Rec center, in
3	addition to some of the normal stuff,
4	some of the events that are detailed
5	there, I did want to point out that we
6	did have an impromptu inspection by
7	Suffolk County Department of Health. I
8	think I had mentioned, there were some
9	new inspectors from the county that
10	were a lot more
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Zealous?
12	MR. PALLAS: Even with that, we
13	did very well initially. With this
14	impromptu inspection, we had no
15	citations or deficiencies, we we're in
16	good shape there as well. Campground
17	is doing good. Also the revenue
18	reports as you can see are now on Excel
19	spreadsheets, so I apologize for the
20	small I didn't realize how tiny it
21	was, I will have them turn it next time
22	so the print is a little bigger.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Could you thank
2 4	Margot for letting the Trustees know
25	about the Big Top Circus that they had

1	down at the Fifth and Sixth Street
2	Beach. It was enjoyable to watch the
3	children, and especially it seemed to
4	be larger than in years in past,
5	different age groups than I've seen
6	before.
7	MR. PALLAS: We have more we
8	have 93 children registered, which I
9	think is a banner year. It's never
10	been we're almost at capacity
11	really.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I understand
13	more summer kids, more people on
14	vacation here, which is pretty neat.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I recommended a
16	few people to the camp, they all had
17	young children, and they are wanting to
18	write literally testimonials as to what
19	a great experience it was for the
20	children. I hope to share those with
21	the Board.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think with
23	Margot's fresh ideas and a different
24	approach to it and everything else,
25	word will get around, and hopefully it

1	will just continue to grow and be a
2	better program all along with the kids.
3	Anything else for Paul? Thank
4	you, Paul. Robert.
5	MR. BRANDT: Good evening,
6	everyone. So I have now two
7	resolutions, two budget amendments.
8	I'll pass this out. Chief Miller spoke
9	to me about this this afternoon, so I
10	wanted to have this prepared so we
11	could get this underway. Everyone has
12	a copy? His intent is to fund it from
13	the apparatus fund. I'm going to do it
14	as an amendment to the budget to bring
15	it into the general fund revenue and
16	expense lines, that's what this
17	represents, and then the funding will
18	move it in the appropriate spot. Just
19	so you know what the price was, again
20	it's 96,596 for this car.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Two cars.
22	MR. BRANDT: Two cars, excuse me.
23	I have a second budget amendment to
24	fund the balance of the repair of the
25	carousel doors.

1	MR. PROKOP: Can I just ask a
2	question? I'm sorry.
3	MR. BRANDT: Sure.
4	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry, I
5	apologize. The 96,000 is based on
6	this is for the Tahoe, the chief's
7	cars?
8	MR. BRANDT: Yes.
9	MR. PROKOP: And what happens if
10	we don't take the 96,000 bid?
11	MR. BRANDT: Isn't that the one
12	that
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: He hasn't
14	reviewed it yet.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: This is the bid
16	that they just accepted at the meeting
17	last night, correct?
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The wardens
19	accepted it perhaps, but I asked the
20	question, the Village attorney hasn't
21	reviewed it yet, correct, is that my
22	understanding?
23	MR. PROKOP: This is the lowest
24	bid, but we have to review the lowest
25	bid first. I'm not trying to put

1	MR. BRANDT: No, I'm glad you
2	pointed that out. I totally
3	misunderstood what he was saying.
4	MR. PROKOP: It's a situation
5	where the lowest bid is being reviewed,
6	so you and I will work on this and get
7	it taken care of.
8	MR. BRANDT: Thank you, Joe.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We should be
10	able to get it done by next week if
11	it's all
12	MR. PROKOP: Sure, we'll get it
13	done tomorrow.
14	MR. BRANDT: I'll resend it out, I
15	apologize.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're going to
17	just be ordering the vehicles, it's not
18	going to be done right away. It's not
19	something they don't have the
20	vehicles ready or made or anything.
21	It's going to take 30 to 45 days before
22	you get a vehicle back, before it's
23	prepared and prepped.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just want it
25	done right.

1	MR. BRANDT: The carousel doors
2	have been are in the process of
3	being repaired. Six out of the eight
4	are done. We had a purchase order in
5	place for the former company that was
6	doing the repairs. This company that's
7	now doing the repairs is actually doing
8	a reengineering and beefing up these
9	doors, and they've been working I've
10	been told amazingly well, so we should
11	alleviate the problem. So as scared as
12	I was about the amount, I'm asking you
13	to authorize the budget amendment to
14	fund the payment of these doors. There
15	will be two more doors repaired, and I
16	expect to see an invoice soon on those.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So there was a
18	pending bill with Flecken (phonetic)?
19	MR. BRANDT: We had a purchase
20	order in place to Flecken (phonetic),
21	all right, that we didn't use from last
22	year, but it rolls forward when we do
23	soft codes on the budget, so that money
24	is still available, so I didn't have to
25	encumber the whole thing in this

1	budget.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is the idea that
4	we make a big spend now so that we
5	don't have to spend big bucks down the
6	road, that it could become more of a
7	maintenance issue with the
8	reengineering?
9	MR. PALLAS: Yes, absolutely.
LO	Virtually all of the doors are being
11	rebuilt, the mechanisms that drive the
L2	doors are being redesigned and are
L3	being rebuilt. It took them a little
L 4	while on the first door, they played
L5	around with it for a little while,
L 6	tried different things, and came up
L7	with a solution that they think was
L8	good and I agreed. A couple of the
L 9	iterations weren't going to work, so
20	they had to put things on and take them
21	off, but now they pretty much know what
22	every door needs. We're down to doors
23	the remaining doors that need to be
24	fixed had a lot more problems than just

that, the motors in one case was not

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1	even there, which I don't quite
2	understand, but the motors need to be
3	replaced, things like that. So that's
4	going to be done, we're hoping to start
5	in the fall after the season to get all
6	of them working, and then it will
7	become a maintenance process. And also
8	if we have all 12, if one fails, it's
9	not, you know, something that has to be
10	today. We're kind of still a little
11	bit in that situation now with six
12	operational. Actually five. Six were
13	repaired, one of them had another
14	problem that cropped up, so we've been
15	working with five this season.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The I know
17	that they were, the committee, the
18	carousel committee was planning some
19	sort of potential event for the release
20	of the rounding boards.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Nothing official
22	in terms of an actual event yet.
23	They're going to take probably several
24	months before they have everything
25	completed. I think in my report I

1	mention that I think there are two
2	completed paintings and probably two
3	more expected, and then they're in the
4	process of starting to do the
5	photography and the digital imprint on
6	the rounding board itself. So I would
7	anticipate probably within the month
8	you're going to see the first one
9	there, so whether they actually make a
10	little ceremony or an event about it,
11	I'll keep you apprised, but we haven't
12	discussed anything to that nature in
13	the last meeting I was at.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If and when they
15	do, I would love to know from them if
16	they could have an event and have some
17	sort of capital campaign to help with
18	this door situation because I think
19	those rounding boards are going to be a
20	major event and, you know, we could
21	potentially partner with them on a
22	fundraiser that could help us, you
23	know, with this it's an important
24	expense, it's just
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll bring that

1 to them because they are interested in

2	doing fundraising, you know, I think,
3	you know, whether they wanted to do it
4	for the ride itself or for some of the
5	artwork, but they're definitely they
6	definitely want to be involved in that.
7	Okay? Certainly the artwork, and
8	there's more artwork beyond the
9	rounding boards, by the way, there are
10	also the inner panels, you know, which
11	are also paintings that go on the inner
12	part of the ride, and that would
13	probably be next. You know, this is
14	probably going to be an ongoing thing
15	for several years, which could create,
16	you know, some attraction and some
17	novelty to the carousel.
18	MR. PALLAS: I just want to point
19	out one more thing on the doors just to
20	remind the Board that we struggled to
21	find a vendor for this. So this took
22	us quite a while to find somebody that
23	Flecken could fix them, but all they
24	did was fix them the way they were,

didn't add any enhancements to it, and

25

1	they didn't last, and they weren't
2	interested in reengineering and
3	whatnot. The company we have now is
4	very interested in working with us on
5	this. I just wanted to remind the
6	Board of that.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, I have a
8	question. There was some equipment
9	that was stored at one of the carousel
10	members' own residence, has that been
11	picked up and stored somewhere else?
12	MR. PALLAS: It has not. We're
13	waiting for
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're talking
15	about the inner panels at Victor
16	Brown's house.
17	MS. PIRILLO: We have the contact
18	information, and we will pass it along
19	Our road crew has already said that
20	they are able to do that, to retrieve
21	the panels.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They're going to
23	need to be stored in a safe place,
24	protected.
25	MR. PALLAS: Yes, that's going to

1	be the challenge.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then
3	Robert, I have a question dealing with
4	the has there been a spot audit for
5	the cash procedure at the carousel?
6	MR. BRANDT: Steven just did one
7	across the board, it was reported to
8	the audit committee.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, I know
10	it was, but I'm just and they still
11	have the procedure of how to handle
12	cash and put it away, correct?
13	MR. BRANDT: Correct. That hasn't
14	changed.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just checking,
16	thanks.
17	MR. BRANDT: We had a situation
18	last month with the utility billing,
19	which I became made aware of. Our
20	regular meter reader got behind due to
21	weather mostly and an abundance of
22	check reads. He was told to get caught
23	up at all costs, and the cost was that
24	he started reading the meters on the
25	weekend. When I was made aware of that

1	I firmly said absolutely no, so I just
2	wanted to publicly apologize if anyone
3	was startled by the meter reader
4	traipsing through their yards over the
5	weekend. What that ignited in our
6	department though is we had a part-time
7	meter reader sitting idle awaiting a
8	phone call. I made a phone call to
9	him, he was definitely interested in
10	some more hours. I met with him. We
11	are now putting him on a schedule on a
12	part-time basis, so hopefully he'll
13	handle any overflow and we'll avoid
14	that situation all together. Again,
15	you know, overtime it happens rarely in
16	the meter reading department, it's
17	usually weather driven either by the
18	winter and/or the heat of the summer.
19	In this case, it was a double whammy
20	because the overload of people wanting
21	their meters rechecked. So again, I
22	just wanted to say publicly again,
23	the overtime happens rarely, but it
24	does happen in the winter, you know,
25	snow and, you know, icy conditions,

1	that's unavoidable. The situation with
2	the heat of the summer, well, I'm
3	hoping that by reactivating, if you
4	will, this part-time meter reader, that
5	should avoid the bulk of that. Again,
6	he was anxious to put in some hours, so
7	we'll put him to work.

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MAYOR HUBBARD: Just another concern on that, I know my bill was for 37 days. I know some people had 40 days in their bill. People that are on a fixed budget and everything else, 40 days, that's a third percent higher bill for the month. It's a hardship on people. We need to stay on track and do 30 day billing, which is what we're supposed to be doing, and to try to get caught up and do that, it's a hardship on people that are on fixed income. 30 percent increase in their electric for a month is very difficult. So use the other guy. I mean, we went a year without asking him, if our main guy can't keep up, we need to call him in more often and not get that far behind.

1	MR. BRANDT: Understood. Again,
2	Mayor, we're going to give him he's
3	going to have preset hours to
4	accommodate his part-time because he
5	has his part-time job fluctuates, but
6	if he knows what days he's going to be
7	with us then it won't be we call and
8	he's not available. That's the
9	situation.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: I understand.
L1	Before we get back, we need to stick to
12	the 30 day billing as much as possible.
13	40 days is a big jump.
L 4	MR. BRANDT: Understood.
L5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Let me ask a
L 6	question, and I know periodically some
L7	bills get estimated, is that also
L8	happening at times where, you know,
L 9	people, if they can't get in to read
20	the meter, is the amount of those being
21	estimated decreased, or is it still in
22	the same
23	MR. BRANDT: The last report I
24	said I think it's maintaining the same.
25	And those are the people that are

1	saying why are you estimating my bill,
2	I was home, or whatever the story is.
3	That's what these check reads are, to
4	go back and
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Let me ask you
6	a question, years ago, and I don't know
7	if they still do it or not, we have a
8	meter that's upstairs, okay, and they
9	would leave a card that said, you know,
LO	we were here trying to read the meter,
L1	would you fill out. Do they do that
12	still?
13	MR. BRANDT: They do not. And
L 4	that was a good suggestion, and we are
15	working to implement that.
L 6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are we talking
L7	about electric meters here or water?
L8	MR. BRANDT: Electric.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I thought all the
20	services are on the outside of the
21	house, aren't they?
22	MR. BRANDT: Most are out, but
23	there are still
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then there
25	are those that are difficult, they

1	is it water that does the electronic?
2	MR. BRANDT: There's also water
3	and the water meters in certain houses
4	they are inside, and we have to have
5	the homeowner home to access them. But
6	that suggestion was just told to me at
7	the end of last week, and I think it's
8	a good idea, so we talked about
9	starting to implement that, so I'll
10	keep you abreast.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do both of them
12	have identification that they are
13	Village of Greenport employees?
14	MR. BRANDT: One does, the
15	part-time will have one when he
16	officially starts, we'll have the ID
17	available. But at the moment he does
18	not have it. Any questions on meter
19	reading? Okay. That's service.
20	We just had a bond payment, this
21	is for the refunding from 2012. I just
22	want to point out that this is the
23	second to last of the huge payments.
24	In the 2018-2019 fiscal year, the
25	principal drops 535 to 365, so the

1	projected savings is finally we're
2	finally seeing or will be seeing the
3	impact from that, which is quite nice,
4	so I just wanted to point that out to
5	everyone else. Any other questions?
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
7	Village clerk is next.
8	MS. PIRILLO: Good evening, ladies
9	and gentlemen. I'm starting as usual
10	with the add-ons. The tree committee
11	has put together a very comprehensive
12	list of trees within the Village that
13	need to be removed, pruned, or trimmed,
14	and that includes tree stumps. That
15	list has been reviewed by both the road
16	and electric department, and those two
17	departments work in conjunction and are
18	able to work on a large number of the
19	trees that were highlighted by the tree
20	committee. For the balance of those
21	trees, the tree committee has requested
22	that we go out to bid as is normally
23	done.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is Floyd
25	Memorial Library on that list?

1	MS. PIRILLO: For which, pruning,
2	trimming, or removing?
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, they have
4	a tree that needs to be removed because
5	their insurance company is requesting
6	that the limbs be moved away from the
7	building because they also have a tree
8	itself that is uprising the cement and
9	is growing into the road and their
10	insurance company wants it out. So
11	I've had pictures, I know that the
12	director has tried contacting the
13	Village a couple of times. I know,
14	Paul, you and I spoke about it a couple
15	of weeks ago. I have pictures of it, I
16	would be more than happy to send it to
17	you, but I do believe in all fairness
18	in looking at the picture, it's
19	something that really needs to be taken
20	care of.
21	MS. PIRILLO: Many times it's not
22	unusual for us to receive such requests
23	with photos attached. We have here
24	we have it on the list, and it says on
25	hold at present, so I don't know if the

1	tree committee is aware of something
2	that we're not, if it is in fact the
3	same tree. So we will check with them
4	and see.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, the
6	director approached me, their insurance
7	company is being rather emphatic.
8	MS. PIRILLO: That's fine. They
9	could send us the insurance company
LO	letter, that would be very helpful.
L1	That happens a bit.
L2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we see that
L3	list?
L 4	MS. PIRILLO: Of course. I just
L5	received it.
L 6	MAYOR HUBBARD: The protocol for
L7	the tree committee is the ones that are
L8	in the worst, the most dangerous shape
L 9	are the ones that they prioritize and
20	put them at the top of the list. We
21	have a lot of homeowners that do ask
22	for a tree to be taken down because
23	they think it's unsightly or it's
24	damaging their house, and it's really
25	nothing wrong the tree. So they'll

1	have to go, we can talk to John Quenlin
2	about that list or where they came up
3	with that. If that one was put on
4	hold, there might be other ones that
5	are more crucial that need to be done,
6	so that might not be why it's
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, she
8	approached me, and I said I would make
9	mention of it, and I do have pictures
10	of it.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I hadn't
12	seen anything from her, so I did not
13	know that she had sent something in.
14	Well, forward that e-mail around to the
15	Board members so we could all see it,
16	and then I'll talk to John and try to
17	get an answer.
18	MS. PIRILLO: Thank you. We also
19	received a wetlands permit application
20	for Eastern Long Island Hospital to be
21	scheduled for public hearing for
22	September 22nd.
23	Some updates: Trustee Martilotta
24	asked me recently, this week, earlier
25	this week I think regarding the status

1	of the scanner project that we're
2	working on, and the inter-municipal
3	agreement. You will see on the
4	upcoming abstract that were are paying
5	for what's called RDN licenses, remote
6	desktop network. I've spoken with
7	Southold Town, once that check is
8	received, they already have the
9	contract in hand, so once that check is
10	received, we've already reached out to
11	John Stepnoski, our IT team, and deputy
12	clerk, those three will meet together
13	to determine where the three scanners
14	will be actually positioned, and we'll
15	move forward with actually obtaining
16	the scanners. So that's the status on
17	that project.
18	Status check on clerk to the
19	boards which was discussed, there are
20	approximately a little over 900 people
21	on the list. The list is being
22	canvassed in pieces because of that.
23	We approached residents first, no
24	response. We sent out the first
25	hundred letters, responses were due

1	back today, no response. Another
2	hundred letters will go out tomorrow.
3	So because of the volume, we're going
4	in smaller chunks, and I'll keep the
5	Board apprised as to progress on that
6	as well.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is there a
8	posting that we can publicize through
9	other channels?
10	MS. PIRILLO: It's a civil
11	service, that's why there is a list, so
12	that's how we're canvassing.
13	MR. PROKOP: Doesn't it free up if
14	there's
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You have to go
16	through the whole list.
17	MR. PROKOP: You don't have to
18	okay.
19	MS. PIRILLO: The whole list.
20	MR. PROKOP: I thought if you went
21	through a certain number of people and
22	they don't take it, then it frees up.
23	MS. PIRILLO: No, you have to do
24	the whole list. Friends of Mitchell
25	Park as part of their mission statement

1	would like to and need to provide us
2	with events in the park that are for
3	public consumption, if you will. One
4	such event that they would like to
5	propose to the Board is Tai Chi
6	classes. Those would be for free, no
7	charge, and they anticipate less than
8	25 people being present, so they'd like
9	to know from this Board if that's
LO	workable for the board and whether a
L1	public assembly permit application is
L2	required since they intend to get less
L3	than 25 people.
L 4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: What time of day
L5	are they talking, morning?
L 6	MS. PIRILLO: Morning, early
L7	morning.
L8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we have a
L 9	schedule that we can approve?
20	MS. PIRILLO: Yes. It's clearly
21	in inception stages. I will ask them
22	for a schedule.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I got an earful
24	about this at Monday night Dances, so
25	I'm glad to see that we can do that.

1	MS. PIRILLO: We also received of
2	course very late a filming permit
3	application yesterday past 5:00 for an
4	event, a film event to be held this
5	Sunday from 12:00 to 5:00 using Village
6	streets. It would entail to my
7	understanding four bicycle riders on
8	Front and Main and Carpenter. Filming
9	would be filming the bicycle riders. I
10	have been told that the impact would be
L1	minimal because they're handheld
L2	cameras. I can't speak to the voracity
L3	of that statement, I'm just saying what
L 4	I was told. As we know, there's a 500
L5	dollar permit fee and 250 dollar clean
L 6	up fee. So I wanted to ask this Board
L7	what you would like to do with that
L8	application, if anything?
L9	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it
20	promotes Greenport, it's not a bad
21	thing, they're not setting up a big
22	camera crew and everything else, so a
23	couple of people with handheld cameras,
24	a bicycle going by, I don't see where
25	it could be a big it shouldn't be,

1	if it turns out to be more than that,
2	then we would have our code enforcement
3	officer who is working saying you can't
4	be blocking the sidewalks, you can't be
5	blocking the streets, you've got to
6	move it along. But, you know, to see
7	some pictures, an ad, a commercial,
8	whatever it is to highlight some of our
9	stores, I think that would be kind of
10	neat to see that I think or whatever
11	show they're doing with it.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I would
13	agree.
14	MS. PIRILLO: It's actually a
15	pilot for a reality show.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's my feelings
17	on it. We'll let Greg know about it so
18	that he's down in that area, and if
19	they start blocking the sidewalks or
20	disturbing traffic or people, then
21	they're going to have to be told that
22	they have to move along, that's not
23	part of what we would say is okay.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There's no
25	effect on traffic?

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I spend a lot of
2	Sunday afternoons down there, and
3	there's already no room to move on
4	Sunday afternoons, so I think this is
5	probably a danger to the public. I
6	wouldn't support it. It's kind of
7	cool, but it would be a lot better if
8	it was, like, an off season kind of
9	thing. Sunday afternoon, like, this
10	time of year right before Labor Day, I
11	think it's going to just bring more
12	havoc to what's already there.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is there some
14	other section of Greenport that they
15	could use instead of that particular
16	section? Has that been approached to
17	them?
18	MS. PIRILLO: I did broach the
19	topic. I think the idea is to show the
20	main drag, if you will because other
21	streets could be anywhere else. This
22	is promoting our business community and
23	also definitely showing that it's on
24	the east end and on the north fork
25	because they find it very indicative of

1	the north fork. I'm not advocating for
2	it, just
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just asking
4	because I we all know what the
5	traffic is on Sunday afternoons.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think the
7	Board should let them do it. Like the
8	Mayor says, we already have a traffic
9	enforcement, we have the officer on
LO	duty. If it's not working, it's over.
L1	If we could just explain that to them
L2	that we have an officer on duty, if
L3	they have some crazy idea, you know,
L 4	that they're going to close the road or
L5	whatever, make everybody uncomfortable,
L 6	then they just leave and here's your
L7	deposit back. I would think that
L8	right?
L 9	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, they're paying
20	for the application. If they violate
21	the rules
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: The 250
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, the clean up?
24	If they're just standing on the
25	sidewalk watching bicycles go by, that

1	could be like somebody could
2	actually just do it and not even tell
3	us that they're doing it, filming your
4	own kid going down the street or
5	whatever, you know. If it's very
6	small, low key, and that's what they're
7	doing, we would have to just be very
8	specific with them that if it impedes
9	anything or anybody, then they're going
10	to be told that you have to leave.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I think you have
12	to consider that this application came
13	in with four days notice, two business
14	days notice.
15	MS. PIRILLO: Absolutely.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I'm generally
17	not opposed to this stuff, but if they
18	only thought to give us two days
19	notice, how much respect are they going
20	to have for Greg when he comes up and
21	says hey, guys, you can't these are
22	people on a deadline, they've got to
23	get a show down and finished so they
24	can they're trying to get a show
25	sold to people. These are

1	entrepreneurs fast after building
2	something, and they're not if Greg
3	kicks them off the streets, you know,
4	they're not I would think that's
5	going to be a very tough position for
6	Greg to be in.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: There also are
8	police officers right there, and he'll
9	just say I need a hand, these people
10	are blocking the sidewalk, and they
11	need to go. There's officers downtown
12	that would back him up, you know.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Again, I just got
14	to tell you I'm there every Sunday
15	afternoon in my real estate office, you
16	can't walk down the sidewalk right now
17	as it is with people walking,
18	strollers, people stopping to look in
19	windows, people sitting on benches that
20	shouldn't be there and everything else.
21	I just think this is really going to
22	add more chaos to the mix, I really do.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: I go to Alfred's
24	every Sunday Ralph's every Sunday.
25	It's crowded, that's what we've been

1	promoting and trying to get to.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think there's a
3	limit, but that's just my opinion.
4	Thank you.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: So do we have a
6	consensus on the Board to let them try
7	it or do you want to just tell them no?
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm going to
9	let them try it.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm for
11	following the normal process and we
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Vote on it on
13	the next week.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, file an
15	application and
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They did file
17	an application, did they not?
18	MS. PIRILLO: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, but I
20	mean, we have residents who ask to do
21	stuff in our parks or other places, and
22	we don't fast track them, and I'm not
23	trying to discriminate against
24	nonresidents, I just think that
25	everyone it should be a level

1	playing field.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: What do you feel,
3	Trustee Phillips? We have two and two.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm having a
5	real hard time with the noon to 5:00 to
6	be honest with you.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine, just
8	tell them no, there was not a consensus
9	of the Board. It's short notice, it's
10	not on the agenda, they wanted to know,
11	and there was not a consensus on the
12	Board to give them permission.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just afraid
14	between the traffic and somebody get
15	hit, I'm just uncomfortable with it.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: The Board is not
17	comfortable with it. Tell them no.
18	MS. PIRILLO: Will do. Thank you.
19	Any questions on my report?
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is the new
21	marina, the resolution for the new
22	marina person, is that person reporting
23	into the clerk's office?
24	MS. PIRILLO: No.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Tara? Tara

1	reports to Paul.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's just in the
3	clerk's report, I wasn't sure what that
4	was about.
5	MS. PIRILLO: Most of those
6	personnel things are on the clerk's
7	report.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Tara we know
9	has started already?
10	MR. PALLAS: Part-time, correct.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And she's there
12	on the weekends?
13	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for
15	the clerk? Thank you. Village
16	attorney.
17	MR. PROKOP: Thank you. I wanted
18	to say first to the Board that I as
19	you know, of course, I attended the
20	public hearing on the short term rental
21	discussion, and I just want to give you
22	my perspective. I thought that it was
23	a very valuable public hearing, and
24	there was a chance that due to family
25	plans I was not going to attend, but

1	I'm really happy that I did attend. I
2	thought that the input that came to the
3	Board was represented many different
4	parts of the Village, different views
5	and different parts of interest of the
6	Village. I hope that discussion
7	continues. As the person that, you
8	know, is responsible for the drafting
9	and then also enforcement, if that
10	comes to be, I got a lot of insight out
11	of the comments that came in. I was
12	grateful for that.
13	In my report I covered one topic
14	that I mentioned before to you, and I
15	thought it was important at this time
16	because of things that are coming up in
17	the Village. That's the assessment of
18	property in the Village. One of the
19	thins that you need to be aware of is
20	we get the Village receives

commercial property owners by what are

1	that commercial as compared to
2	residential property owners grieve
3	their taxes and get tax reductions.
4	What happens with because the
5	Village is not an assessing unit, we
6	rely on the assessors of the Town of
7	Southold to do our assessing, we get
8	judgments periodically in the Village
9	or sporadically I should say in the
10	Village, and they also carry many years
11	of refunds. So a judgment could
12	typically have I would say most
13	often it's four to five years of
14	refunds. It's not really rare to have
15	one that's many more years. These
16	things are not scheduled. They come in
17	as they as a settlement is made with
18	the court, and we're not part of the
19	court process because we're not an
20	assessing unit, and so we have a couple
21	of different problems. Number one, we
22	can't budget for this because we don't
23	know how they're coming in. We're not
24	part of the settlement or negotiation
25	process. So we can't budget for it, we

1	don't know the amounts that are coming
2	in, we don't know when they're coming
3	in, and I have more often this year
4	than before received calls from
5	Robert's department with concern about
6	not, you know, number one, I want you
7	to know that I look through all these
8	when they come in. I work very
9	Linda has done a great job on these.
LO	She's the front person with these, and
L1	I work closely with her as they come in
12	when I get to the Village to check the
13	calculation and the legality of these
L 4	judgements when they come in. But it's
L5	a difficult thing to deal with. Many
L 6	villages the other part of this that
L7	you should know is that as this process
L8	got to become more of a business for
19	the law firms that handle this, what
20	the state and the county did was that
21	they set up a process where if one of
22	these judgments come into a town, the
23	town doesn't pay it. It's paid for by
24	the county, and then the town
25	reimburses to county over I believe

1	it's a ten year period. So the town
2	can make one of these settlements and
3	not have a real impact because it's
4	paid for out of the as I said, out
5	of the county. And I think that on
6	your tax bill you'll see there's a line
7	item that says article seven, refunds,
8	or article seven, something. I think
9	that that's how we all get re-billed
10	for this. When the legislature set up
11	that process though, they didn't do it
12	for all taxing units or assessing
13	units, they only did it for towns or
14	excuse me, I should say that they did
15	not do that for villages, they may have
16	done it for other assessing units, they
17	didn't do it for villages, so we're
18	basically stuck with this, and it's a
19	difficult situation. There are things
20	that other villages have done to work
21	with this, and I'm happy to discuss it
22	with you if, you know, down the road if
23	you like to have that discussion, but I
24	wanted to make you aware that this is
25	going on. And, you know, Robert does

1	such a great job with the budget, I
2	mean, we're down to the dollar in some
3	of these line items, and we struggle
4	during the year to keep it that way,
5	which is remarkable, but then we out of
6	the blue get one of these judgments,
7	and it just sets everything askew.
8	So the other part of the
9	assessment discussion that I wanted to
LO	bring to your attention is that there
L1	is there are types of properties and
12	classifications in New York State for
13	different types of properties, so a
L 4	residential property will have many
L5	different could be many different
L 6	classifications, the same with
L7	commercial and other types of
L8	properties, and I think that we might
L 9	take advantage of that, number one, as
20	a way to keep track of the uses of
21	properties in the Village as they occur
22	because when a property use changes
23	from single a single family
24	residence class is class 210, and when
25	that class when the use of that

1	property changes to something else, a
2	two family or a rental property, you
3	know, a short term rental property,
4	whatever other use there may be, I
5	think that we should take the
6	initiative to have the classification
7	changed, you know, because that's the
8	proper thing to do and give the
9	information to the Town, and also, you
10	know, maybe have a discussion as to
11	whether there's a different value to
12	the property based on its use.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have to my
14	understanding is that we present a
15	report to Southold Town assessors in
16	dealing with permits, building permits,
17	or improvements to properties, and that
18	they actually come down and actually
19	take a look at the properties, and I
20	know that the two people that are
21	mostly involved in it are very familiar
22	with Greenport, and I'm just wondering
23	if they're not already reclassifying
24	things when they're coming to do the
25	assessment.

1	MR. PROKOP: I think for the
2	information that they have, they are.
3	For the information that they get from
4	the Village, they're doing it I've
5	met with them many times about this,
6	they do a great job, but it's their
7	work limited to the information that
8	they get from us, and as we're
9	reviewing you know, we have a rental
LO	code now, our inventory our
L1	knowledge of the actual uses in the
12	Village is changing, you know, we may
13	consider a different
L 4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who is actually
15	generating the reports for Town of
16	Southold?
L7	MR. PROKOP: I don't know. That's
L8	really what I'm talking about, that
19	process.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who generates
21	the reports?
22	MR. PALLAS: What report?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: For the
24	assessments. Every six months they're
25	supposed to be sending stuff to the

1	Town of Southold.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: The building
3	department.
4	MR. PALLAS: For the permits
5	you're talking about, the building
6	department does that.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is she or he or
8	whoever is doing it, are they coding
9	it, or do they have a format that they
LO	follow for the Town of Southold.
11	MR. PALLAS: That I can't answer.
12	I have to check.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That would be
L 4	one of the questions to find out.
L5	MR. PROKOP: So, you know, this is
L 6	something the first item that I
L7	talked about is something that we
L8	should really deal with because it's an
L 9	impact on the Village, the second thing
20	is something that we could discuss,
21	classifications and values, things like
22	that.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: If I could
24	ask you a question on that, what
25	classifications are there, other than

1	you said single family, like, a single
2	family owner occupied house, and then
3	you mentioned a couple of others, is
4	there something separate for a two
5	family rental, is there something
6	separate for a short term rental?
7	Like, how specific do these changes
8	get?
9	MR. PROKOP: So there is a
10	separate for two family, there is
11	separate for multifamily. We might
12	if a property is strictly, you know,
13	nonowner occupied short term rental, we
14	may look at the list of
15	classifications, and maybe pulling it
16	out of residential into something else.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I remember
18	you had said that we spoke about
19	this in the past, that that would be a
20	commercial use property.
21	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: The short
23	term rental, but I think it's great
24	that you say this because I've been
25	trying to find this. Clearly I'm not a

1	lawyer. I've been trying to find out,
2	like, where in the law that would be
3	classified or in the tax code.
4	MR. PROKOP: If you go on if
5	you just Google New York State property
6	classifications, you'll get to one of
7	those lists. If you don't get it,
8	please let me know, and I'll e-mail it
9	to you.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. One of
11	the things as you're saying this, and
12	it may be generated by the building
13	department, I would think that all
14	changes would come from applications
15	from building permits, you know what I
16	mean, from changes to the
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Rental permits
18	as well.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: From rental
20	permits as well, sure, but if you took
21	a single family house, and let's say,
22	you know, you bought my house and you
23	turned it into some sort of short term
24	rental situation, that wouldn't
25	necessarily require any permits, that

1	wouldn't raise a flag I wouldn't think
2	for the building department to push
3	that change forward, right? I'm just
4	trying
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: The only
6	information we get, whenever there's a
7	building permit, the building
8	department generates a file and sends
9	that the Town twice a year. That's the
LO	only time. You know, if it's been a
L1	legal two family, it went back to one
L2	family, it goes back to two family
L3	again, it doesn't change the
L 4	classification unless there's a
L5	building permit. Besides that, we
L 6	don't give any other information on it
L7	except when places are sold or if
L8	there's a building permit. That's the
19	only time that we have any interaction
20	with the assessor's office in the Town,
21	in that helps.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It does.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: We don't go around
24	and just say we're going to reclassify
25	this whole block or something like

1	that, we do not do that.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's great.
3	I was actually looking for that one
4	piece. Thank you.
5	MR. PROKOP: I have reviewed the
6	rest of the assessment law, and I don't
7	know property by property, but what I'm
8	hearing at meetings compared to the
9	assessment law, I think that there's
10	probably other information that we
11	could pass along.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are there costs
13	that we have to take on to achieve the
14	savings that you're proposing?
15	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry, excuse me,
16	what savings do you mean?
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If I understand
18	this correctly, you're suggesting that
19	we should take over our own assessing?
20	MR. PROKOP: That's one option,
21	I'm not
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There would be
23	costs, so at some point we'd have to do
24	some analysis to figure out that we're
25	going to spend a little to save more or

1	to earn more, right?
2	MR. PROKOP: Yes. That's very far
3	down the road, I just wanted to what
4	I did was I wanted to bring options to
5	you. I'm obligated to let you know
6	that that's one of the options. But
7	I'm more concerned that we know that
8	we're managing this excuse me, that
9	you as the Board is aware of it, and i
10	is something that we talk about in
11	management in the Village, but
12	particularly these judgments are a
13	major concern. Out of the blue
14	something comes in for 10 or 12
15	thousand dollars.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's a quick
17	turn around, right?
18	MR. PROKOP: Right.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The Town gets
20	more time.
21	MR. PROKOP: Well, the Town, they
22	get 10 years, we get 90 days.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Joe, is that like
24	the hawk eye thing that happened a
25	couple of years ago?

1	MR. PROKOP: Yes, that's an
2	example.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So if we have to
4	do our own assessing, is that then an
5	elected position?
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We used to have
7	our own assessing unit, and it was
8	disbanded years ago, wasn't it, George?
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: It was. I really
10	don't know the history on it. It got
11	turned over to the Town many years ago,
12	and I don't know.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was done
14	because of I believe cost
15	effectiveness. It was cheaper to have
16	the Town do it. I believe that's what
17	the story was. Mr. Gordon, Fred
18	Gordon, used to be the village assessor
19	I do believe, and it was disbanded, and
20	I think it's in the code book some
21	place. I have to go back and take a
22	look.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's worth
24	considering.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Continue, Joe.

1	MR. PROKOP: Thank you. I do have
2	a few things that are litigation and
3	contract related that I need to talk to
4	you about in executive session. I
5	wanted to mention that it looks like we
6	have the contracts ready to be signed
7	for Habitat for Humanity. We got the
8	comments back from their attorney, and
9	I'll have that for the Mayor to sign in
10	a day or two.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You a while ago
12	had given us a document, what was it,
13	Chapter 61?
14	MR. PROKOP: 65.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought we
16	had something for 61.
17	MR. PROKOP: Oh, right, there is
18	something for 61, it's environmental
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What's the
20	status of that? I mean, it's on my
21	cheat sheet.
22	MR. PROKOP: We would need another
23	public hearing on it at this point
24	because it's more than I don't think
25	we ever had a public hearing.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, we didn't.
2	We never got to that point. That's why
3	I'm asking.
4	MR. PROKOP: We need to have a
5	public hearing. So my recommendation
6	on Chapter 61, that's the environmental
7	review chapter of the Village code. My
8	recommendation was that we list certain
9	things as type two actions, and we make
10	the code the code doesn't really
11	relate to the current regulations under
12	SEQRA. That chapter was written 20 or
13	30 years ago when SEQRA first came out,
14	and it's just not relevant to the
15	current regulations. So in order to
16	help our Boards and relate to the
17	current code, what I want to do is make
18	changes in Chapter 61, and I can
19	recirculate it and
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: If you could do
21	that, take what you had, send it around
22	to all of us so we can review it and
23	look at it again, and then we can
24	schedule a public hearing once we're
25	comfortable with it.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, it's
2	on my cheat sheet and it has no action
3	attached to it, so that's why I'm
4	asking.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If I remember
6	correctly, it took things like new
7	signs from type one to type two, right?
8	MR. PROKOP: Yes. From unlisted
9	to type two. So it was the use
10	evaluations that we do and signs, a lot
11	of these are done by the Boards anyway.
12	Sort of informally they've adopted a
13	list of type two actions on their own,
14	but this would codify it in our code,
15	which is something that we should do.
16	I just want to mention that I have
17	met with Greg, the parking enforcement
18	officer and had a couple of discussions
19	with him. I have seen him in action,
20	it's amazing to see him fly around the
21	Village and try to take care of
22	everything that's happening. You know,
23	just to mention that, you know, when
24	you write an when you issue a
25	parking ticket, and he's well aware of

1	this, I've working with him on this,
2	when you issue a parking ticket, you're
3	actually commencing a legal action
4	against that person. It's a legal
5	process that you're commencing either
6	against the vehicle or the owner. And
7	so you're not it's not just a matter
8	of running around the Village and when
9	you see something wrong, it's not just
L 0	a reminder, you're actually starting a
L1	legal process, and he was aware of
L2	that, I've worked with him on the
L3	documentation, and that's part of the
L 4	time consuming part of his job.
L5	Does anybody have any questions
L 6	for me? Thank you very much.
L7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Report
L8	from committees. Audit committee met,
L9	we discussed a bunch of small things,
20	there were no major tasks that came out
21	of it and no recommendations to the
22	Village Board. That was all we had
23	from there.
24	Next would be Board of Trustees
25	reports. We'll start with Trustee

1 Phillips.

2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a couple of things. As I wrote in my report, 3 from time to time there are certain 4 regulations and codes that we kind of 5 need to take a look at to see if 6 7 they're still working or they're not working, and throughout a lot of the 8 9 Planning Board and ZBA, the section on bulk and parking regulations and uses 10 11 permitted in R1 and R2 that was amended 12 back in 2002 seems to be one that I think was originally developed --13 14 originally the thought pattern back in 2002 when they had a committee that was 15 16 studying housing and trying to keep 17 housing within the Village or having 18 people be able to have -- it was for the rezoning from some areas from R1 to 19 20 R2 so that people had the opportunity 21 to have economic benefit of renting out 22 an apartment in their houses. I think 23 we've become -- I think that's become a 24 -- a lot of the areas that it was 25 intended for have been developed, and I

1	think we need to take a review of this
2	again and see if this is something
3	or put it out to the public that they
4	might want to change the requirement
5	for off street parking per dwelling and
6	see what they think about it. So
7	that's where I'm coming from.
8	Sometimes we need to look at those.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I want to
10	clarify, you're suggesting that the way
11	this works currently is that the only
12	thing subject for site plan review is
13	the parking, right?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. If they're
15	putting if they're doing an existing
16	if they are putting in a new
17	sorry, it's been a long week and a long
18	day.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just want to
20	understand what you're getting at.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If the owner of
22	an existing one family dwelling in an
23	R2 District, which is legally
24	nonconforming with respect to any of
25	the bulk requirements seeks to convert

1	the existing dwelling to a two family
2	dwelling, okay, they are exempt from
3	the off street parking per dwelling
4	unit because it's an existing building,
5	not a new building. This was something
6	that came out of changing a lot of the
7	R1's to R2's to develop for owner
8	occupied apartment, you know, rentals
9	in houses for people to generate
LO	income. I think what's happening is,
L1	and I'm sure you'll agree with me, a
L2	lot of the Planning Board plans as of
L3	late, there's been much this has
L 4	been an exception that has been
L5	discussed not only within Planning but
L 6	within Zoning. When I served on those
L7	two boards, if there was a particular
L8	section of the code that continued to
L 9	be cropping up all the time, there used
20	to be a suggestion from those boards to
21	the Village Board that this section of
22	the code should be reviewed. That's
23	what I'm asking for. I'm reading it,
24	I'm hearing it, I'm just asking that we
25	need to put it out to the public to see

1	if they want this still to continue.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So your concern
3	is that the off street parking should
4	not be exempt, it should be part of the
5	process.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Part of the
7	process, so let's talk about it and see
8	how the community feels about it.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Got it. Thank
10	you.
11	MR. PROKOP: So if the owner of an
12	existing
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I copied it
14	right out of the code.
15	MR. PROKOP: Right. Seeks to
16	convert an existing dwelling to two
17	family, then in that event the area
18	requirements except for off street
19	parking shall not apply. So are you
20	concerned that the area requirements
21	don't apply or that the
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Parking. The
23	other issue that has been on the tip of
24	great many tongues is garbage pickup.
25	Garbage everywhere. Dumpsters

1	overflowing. Dumpsters that perhaps
2	maybe we should approach it in allowing
3	them to put some type of a coverage
4	fencing in front of it so that I've
5	seen it in other communities where they
6	allow them to put temporary fencing
7	around their dumpsters so that, you
8	know, people can't get to them easily
9	or it's at least covered if it gets
10	overflowed. Especially along the back
11	of Adams Street, it can be pretty
12	distressing especially and I'm also
13	concerned about, you know, garbage
14	feeds animals. We haven't seen them
15	yet because of the summer activity, but
16	as the fall gets going we're going to
17	see more raccoons, more other things
18	that I don't think we want to see. So
19	I think we just kind of need to have a
20	discussion with the business district,
21	and I would really like to have either
22	the Mayor or some members along with
23	our liaison to the BID district talk to
24	us perhaps that they need to come up
25	with some suggestions to mutually deal

1	with the garbage pickup. I had meant
2	to get a printout from Robert today as
3	to how much we've spent with the Town
4	of Southold having to dump this year.
5	I haven't had a chance to compare it to
6	last year, but I think they're making
7	more runs. Is that true, Paul, they're
8	making more runs than they have?
9	MR. PALLAS: I haven't looked at
10	it.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just as an
12	observation.
13	MR. PALLAS: They haven't said
14	anything to me. They have said that
15	they needed to add I'm going to
16	assume that they have because they have
17	added pickups to downtown, so I'm
18	assuming they're making more runs to
19	accommodate that.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. But
21	there's been a lot of additional
22	garbage put into our garbage cans that
23	really is the business owner's
24	responsibility, so I think it's time we
25	have a discussion between both the BID

1	and our Board, and I think it's time
2	that I'm not generating the garbage
3	from my business, but I'm willing to
4	say, okay, let's work out something so
5	that we're all mutually happy and the
6	residents aren't carrying the full ball
7	of the expense for garbage pickup in
8	the downtown business district.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So what
10	numbers did you have Robert run for
11	you?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I didn't. I
13	was going to ask Robert to run
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, I thought you
15	said you did.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I didn't
17	get a chance to. I want to compare to
18	what we spent last year with the Town
19	of Southold within a certain time.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, that's the
21	stuff they're taking out of the cans.
22	I mean, the bigger problem you're
23	talking about is the regular big
24	dumpsters and the garbage and the other
25	stuff, that's something you need to go

1	directly to the businesses because the
2	Village is not going to start carting
3	away
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Those dumpsters
5	are private carriers, right?
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I mean, we need
7	to have an agreement. We need to
8	discuss with them that they need to
9	take a little pride in making sure that
10	that area is kept clean. But we also
11	need to discuss the cans down street
12	because there are businesses putting
13	their garbage in our cans. Okay?
14	Instead of taking responsibility of
15	taking it as an expense for their
16	business. And I think that also needs
17	to be discussed. I mean, I got a
18	couple of calls over the last couple of
19	weekends of overflowing garbage cans
20	which Paul was kind enough to make sure
21	that they got picked up, but one of
22	them I said well, the gentleman from
23	the road crew emptied it and it had the
24	business owner's garbage in it from his
25	business, and I don't think that's fair

to the taxpayers.
MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's not.
Hopefully he reported that to Paul so
he can go after that business owner.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm not sure
what the process is.
MR. PALLAS: Nothing was reported
to me. I'll follow-up.
MAYOR HUBBARD: The cans aren't
that big for a business to be taking
all of their garbage cans and try to
fit them into that little can, that's
not really probable. I see a lot of
homeowners taking their one bag of
garbage and other stuff getting in
there, so there's more of that, but an
actual business filling up that one
little can, they're not going to get
much in there instead of using their
dumpster.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have some
businesses do have a lot of small items
for sale, such as food products that
their the thought is that at this

point we need to put it out there, we

25

1	need to discuss it before next summer,
2	you know. We have people complaining
3	that, you know, the streets aren't
4	clean. Well, you know what, if it's in
5	front of a business owner's store, they
6	need to take the initiative to sweep,
7	just don't say it's the Village's
8	responsibility. We need to have this
9	discussion. We need to have it.
LO	Period.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Why don't you go
12	to next BID meeting with Trustee Robins
13	and bring it up and talk to the BID
L 4	about it? I mean, you're asking for
L5	somebody else to go, so you've got to
L 6	I know a lot of the complaints come
L7	to your web page and all, and I saw the
L8	pictures and everything else from it,
L 9	so maybe you go with Trustee Robins,

them for something, they have five

people at a meeting, and we get no

discuss that something needs to be done

back there and find out what they want

to do. I know mostly every time we ask

2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They didn't have
3	people at the meeting today.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm more than
5	happy to go.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: I thought you were
7	asking for somebody else from the Board
8	to go, so why don't you join Trustee
9	Robins, and go with her, and ask the
10	BID to step up and take care of their
11	garbage.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: May I? It's
13	your turn but Section 112.16, it's
14	pretty clear that receptacles for
15	commercial purposes need to be
16	screened, they need to be secured so
17	animals can't get in there, so, you
18	now, if we just had a couple of
19	effective pre-enforcement, you know,
20	visits around town, and maybe, you
21	know, we did signs and we did parking,
22	and maybe this is the next one for you
23	to direct our code enforcement people
24	to go and say look, next because
25	September is going to be pretty busy

1	especially with Maritime and all that,
2	but I know I walk around, I see a lot
3	of dumpsters just sitting out there,
4	and I think the nature of the
5	complaints that we've gotten has been,
6	you know, you guys could do better,
7	and, you know, if we put it on the
8	business owners to put up a little
9	fence, you know, you've got to screen
LO	it, that's what the law says. So we
L1	might as well give people a courtesy
12	heads up that we're going to enforce
L3	it. We can ask the BID like we did
L 4	last time, do you have any concerns, is
L5	there anything you'd like to, you know,
L 6	ask for their input and then go and
L7	enforce it.
L8	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'd have to do it
L 9	for our own because we have five of
20	them out there that have no screen or
21	nothing, we're out of compliance on our
22	own code.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we should do
24	it.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS. I don't think

1	from my impressions from the BID, I
2	mean, the group that was formed
3	recently, the committee of sidewalk
4	beautification is concerned about
5	garbage and, you know, contributing to
6	that, so I think we, you know, I think
7	they'll be receptive to the idea.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: On weekends during
9	the summer they need to empty their
10	dumpster more often. If they did that,
11	it wouldn't be overflowing and looking
12	as bad as it does. Some people dump it
13	once a week, they can't do that. They
14	need to step up their own game and take
15	care of dumping, cleaning up their own
16	garbage and their own dumpster more
17	often.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That whole
19	stretch along Adams Street by the IGA
20	going back towards Third Street is also
21	pretty bad.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My
23	understanding is we're not supposed to
24	be encumbering sidewalks, but yet I
25	believe there's a group of stores that

1	have their dumpsters actually on the
2	sidewalk, and I don't know if they have
3	permission from the Village to do it.
4	I know when I was cleaning out one of
5	the lots with Mark's fishing gear, I
6	had to put a dumpster on the road, and
7	I had to draw, have insurance, and
8	whatever, and then I see a store that
9	is I don't know, do they have
10	permission to do that or whatever?
11	MR. PALLAS: I have to check.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's pretty
13	distressing and it's time. The
14	downtown business district has been
15	selling this as a destination, it would
16	be nice as to clean up from their
17	destination business.
18	The last thing is in IGA's parking
19	lot what I've noticed, and I've had a
20	fair amount of complaints, and I've
21	watched this myself because I started
22	to hear that the carts are all over
23	town again. One Sunday, walking I
24	was walking past Village Hall, and a
25	gentleman had a cart from IGA that he

1	walked all the way from IGA up to
2	Village Hall where he was parked, took
3	his grocery bags out, and then just
4	left the cart because he wasn't going
5	to walk it back to IGA because he
6	couldn't get anywhere near to park for
7	IGA. I notice that the spots we
8	need new signs on the back, which I
9	think we changed those, I don't think
L 0	they're 10 minutes anymore, I think
L1	they're 30, aren't that? They're 30
L2	and they're not even marked 30. So
L3	what I would like to do is the section
L 4	that's directly across from that, I
L5	believe that's two hour parking if I'm
L 6	reading the code correctly?
L7	MR. PALLAS: This is the cross
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You know, where
L 9	the building, the spots right directly
20	across?
21	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think those
23	are two hour parking, it's either two
24	hour or it's no time, I can't figure it
25	out from the code, but we need to

1	change that in all honesty to help IGA.
2	They are an anchor store here in this
3	community, and in all honesty, they
4	I've heard a lot of my neighbors and
5	I've heard a lot of friends say I can't
6	even get near IGA, and I'm just heading
7	west to go shopping. I don't think
8	that's fair to them. That's one of my
9	thoughts is we need to try to correct
10	that for them. Bring that to a public
11	hearing, which we would, but I can't
12	figure out whether those are two hour
13	parking spots or they have no time
14	according to the code, George, it's
15	very confusing. It's really confusing.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Work with Paul,
17	try to figure out exactly what spots
18	are designated what because we have to
19	know what's there before we go out and
20	have a public hearing to try to change
21	it.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then the
23	other thing is I'm putting this out for
24	discussion, today I was headed down a
25	street, and I was going between Central

1	Avenue to Bay Avenue, and a taxi had
2	blocked the road and was asked to move
3	a couple of times, and refused to, and
4	a tractor trailer truck, a huge one
5	decided to come down Main Street with
6	no room to maneuver. No one had room.
7	So I'm asking that we start looking
8	into making that section one way, which
9	way needs to be worked out, but making
LO	it one way between Central Avenue and
L1	Bay Avenue so we have parking on both
12	sides and one vehicle going through
13	because today it could have been if
L 4	it had been somebody that wasn't being
L5	cautious, it could have been a
L 6	dangerous situation. There's been a
L7	lot of mirrors slapped this summer I've
L8	noticed, there's been a lot of
L 9	confusion there. When they get
20	deliveries it's crazy. So I'm just
21	asking that we start the discussion on
22	that. That's pretty much all I have.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: So you want to
24	make Main Street one way between Bay
25	and Central?

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Not all the way?
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'd like to
3	hear what everybody else has to say
4	because if you make it one way, and I'm
5	not an engineer, but it would still
6	leave parking on both sides. We can't
7	lose anymore parking, but we have to do
8	something because everybody is waiting
9	to try to I don't know if you've all
LO	traveled that section recently.
L1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I try not to.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I do too,
13	but there are people who don't, and I
L 4	know some senior citizens have asked me
L5	if they could possibly get that
L 6	changed. I'm just throwing it out to
L7	see how everybody feels. If that's the
L8	case, then I'd be more than willing to
L 9	work with Paul and Derryl and try to
20	come up with a plan.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Just a one block
22	one way?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just around the
24	block so that it's it would be
25	rerouting the traffic. I'd like to put

1	a plan together, but I just want to
2	know how everybody feels because I
3	don't want to waste anybody's time. As
4	I said, I'm not an engineer, so I would
5	need Paul and Derryl to help me with
6	it.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'd be up for a
8	better situation than what we have now,
9	that's for sure.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: One question
11	I have about that, are we allowed? Is
12	that our jurisdiction?
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: I was just going
14	to say you'd have to lobby the state to
15	get the State Route changed.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm
17	saying is I don't know.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's technically
19	our control, but it's still considered
20	State Route 25, so I believe before we
21	actually go and change that we would
22	have to ask State's permission even
23	though we're responsible for
24	maintaining it, but it still is
25	considered technically a State road.

1	We'd have to look at some kind of plan
2	for it because, I mean, if you make it
3	one way heading south, then you're
4	going to come up to Bay Avenue, make a
5	right, go down Carpenter Street, come
6	back up Central Avenue, you're going to
7	divert everybody around that block
8	because it's one way traffic. I'd have
9	to see how you're going to where
10	you're going to send people. That's
11	going to push everybody onto Carpenter
12	Street, and I think that's going to jam
13	up that road back there.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We need to do
15	something, so I feel strongly about
16	that.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sit down with Paul
18	and draw up a little map and send it
19	around kind of what you're thinking.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It could be
21	seasonal.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It could be
23	seasonal. I've seen that in places
24	that I've gone to, certain times of the
25	year it's only one way, so, you know.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We have more
2	control just as a general question,
3	we have more control as to limiting
4	parking on one side, is that something
5	we would control, or would that also
6	have to go to the State?
7	MR. PROKOP: I think parking we
8	control.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I understand.
10	I see your point about losing spots,
11	but if we have to lobby New York State,
12	this could feasibly take some time.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think it's
15	a great idea for improvement.
16	Absolutely.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know that the
18	Southold Town Transportation Commission
19	in the discussions there there is some
20	plans, there is a dormant plan that's
21	been laying around to going out on Main
22	Street to get onto the north road and
23	putting the circle back in. Suffolk
24	County has a dormant plan on that,
25	which that's just to go with what you

1	had in your report. There's a couple
2	of traffic plans that are apparently
3	dormant and not going any place.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're going to
5	have to be a squeaky wheel I would
6	imagine. How many parking spots a
7	question to throw in there for you to
8	look at, if we took out parking on one
9	side of the street, what's the impact?
LO	How many spots? And
L1	MR. PALLAS: Four or five maybe.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: 24.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: One side, right?
L 4	You're talking one side.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: If you're going
L 6	down the section down there all the way
L7	up to
L8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: To the light.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, I'm talking
20	downtown.
21	MR. PALLAS: I thought we were
22	talking about one block, I'm sorry.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just one block.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That should be
25	in the mix because 24 is a lot of

1	spots.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Like I said,
3	I'm not going to do the work unless
4	it's a general consensus that we do
5	want to just kind of look at it because
6	I don't want to waste staff's time or
7	my time to be honest with you, so
8	that's pretty much it.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
10	Trustee Robins.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have a report
12	on the carousel committee meeting.
13	First discussion was about the music at
14	the carousel. It continues to be a
15	topic of conversation because on
16	occasion music other than traditional
17	band organ music apparently is being
18	played. Margot had a, you know, a firm
19	conversation with the staff to make
20	sure that it's really the intent of the
21	committee that the music being played
22	there should be band organ music.
23	They're in agreement that if they can
24	find some CD's of music that is playing
25	different songs but in the band organ

Discussion of staffing, Margot reported that the staffing has been adequate, although it can be challenging keeping up with it. She's had to shift workers from some of the other rec departments in order to make sure that all the shifts were covered, but that's been pretty successful all summer. Most of the people are working 20 hours a week.

We received an e-mail from Bob
Wisman who used to do the maintenance
for the carousel. He hasn't been able
to return from Florida this year
because his wife has been ill. He just
wanted to make sure that the carousel
operators were entering any mechanical
issues in their logs, for instance, if
they found any miscellaneous parts
sitting on the ride or heard any
unusual noise or anything like that
that it was logged so that it could be

1	investigated by a mechanical
2	technician.
3	We went over again the need to
4	retrieve the inner panels, we discussed
5	this earlier, from the home of Victor
6	Brown and store them safely on Village
7	property. So I think that's hopefully
8	in the works now.
9	An update on the rounding boards.
10	The committee had the opportunity to
11	view the two completed paintings,
12	Circus Parade by Keith Martell and
13	Early Fishing by Marla Mill. Both of
14	the paintings are really wonderful. A
15	sketch of the booth house was completed
16	by Keith Martell, and another painting,
17	ice boating, is expected to be
18	delivered this week by Ina Hattan. The
19	placement of the pictures on the
20	rounding boards will be done using a
21	grid designed by Clerk Pirillo and Gail
22	Horton. Gail Horton will compose a
23	brief description of the scenes on each
24	of the rounding boards, a little
25	plaque. The photographers, Kathleen

1	Bifulco and Bill Vonife have
2	successfully achieved the proper
3	resolution and are now ready to begin
4	the digital reproduction. Bill is
5	ready to create and install the first
6	panel, so that's coming as I said
7	within the month probably. Gail will
8	write a brief description for the staff
9	to explain what the panels represent,
10	and this is the first of many that will
11	be installed. There was a discussion
12	about different fundraising ideas.
13	Gail drafted a letter to Patrick
14	Lofthouse to inform him that the
15	committee will no longer be using his
16	design for T-shirts, and she's going to
17	ask the clerk to have the letter
18	approved prior to mailing it just to
19	make sure. This is over the T-shirt
20	logos.
21	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: May I ask a
23	question?
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're going to

1	put up the rounding boards one by one
2	piecemeal instead of all at once?
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I mean, I
4	don't know if they'll go up piecemeal,
5	but they want to get the first one up
6	just to kind of create a little bit of
7	buzz and show everybody what it's
8	about, and then I would say they're
9	probably going to do them after two or
10	three at a time are completed. Okay?
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So you'll have
12	primary color, primary color, primary
13	color, sea scene, and then more primary
14	colors. There will be one panel, one
15	board, that's going to go on the
16	carousel permanently?
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think there are
18	eight or ten panels.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So they're going
20	to take one of the existing
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, you're
22	talking about one of the solid colors,
23	yeah, I don't know how they are going
24	to decide which one is being done.
25	You're working with Gail on that,

1	aren't you?
2	MS. PIRILLO: There are 14
3	rounding boards total, four paintings
4	have been completed to date. The one
5	from Ina Hattan did come in, so we have
6	four. Those four are out with Kathleen
7	Bifulco for photography with Bill
8	Vonife. The intention I believe is to
9	put up a few at a time. For example,
10	these first four, and also the
11	committee was contemplating a press
12	event at least for the first four for
13	which we would circulate press releases
14	and invite all the members of the press
15	so that we can give the press and the
16	public a very good idea of what it will
17	look like. What we did with the grid
18	that Trustee Robins was referring to
19	was that Gail and I sat and we think
20	put the boards in such a way so that no
21	two paintings are together of the same
22	artist. Some of the artists have
23	completed four paintings, some
24	completed three because we wanted to
25	keep a variety of tones.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I want to
2	support the committee, I'm just glad to
3	hear that it's not going to be just
4	one. I think that looks a little
5	weird.
6	MS. PIRILLO: I don't believe that
7	was the intention.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Four looks like
9	a project.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There are two
11	done already, and as I said, I think
12	two more will probably come in. We had
13	this meeting, which was on the 9th.
14	MS. PIRILLO: We have four total
15	right now.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, so, you
17	know, they still have to be go
18	through the process of being
19	photographed and digitized and
20	installed on the actual rounding
21	boards. But yes, I think we didn't
22	discuss specifically a press event, but
23	they are hoping that they're going to
24	make it a grand sort of announcement
25	and put them out to the public.

1	We did some discussion on
2	fundraising and how to go about doing
3	it. We pointed out that the committee
4	cannot do any fundraising on their own
5	it would have to be sponsored by the
6	Village and overseen by us. They did
7	get a request from the Friends of
8	Mitchell Park to use the carousel for
9	an event in honor of Jerry Tuthill who
LO	passed away recently. It was
L1	acknowledged that any use of Mitchell
L2	Park would be subject to approval by
L3	the Board of Trustees, so I'm sure if
L 4	they want to do something like that,
L 5	they'll send a formal request in for a
L 6	public assembly permit and such.
L7	As I mentioned, the BID did not
L 8	have a meeting today. They weren't
L 9	able to get enough of a quorum, so
20	they'll be having a meeting next
21	Thursday. Trustee Phillips, if you
22	would like to attend the meeting, we
23	can go over that together if you want
24	to come to talk about the trash
25	situation, I would certainly bring it

up with them as well.

2	Just another little thing, I
3	happened to be having a conversation
4	over the weekend with John Quenlin, and
5	he told me something that I just wanted
6	to share with you that I didn't know
7	about. I spend a lot of time going to
8	conferences upstate with the New York
9	Power Authority and the New York
10	Association of Public Power and NYPA
11	often talks about different programs
12	that they have for communities for
13	investment and infrastructure and
14	things like that. Most of them are

ours, but this is a tree planting
program that apparently John told me
that we've been doing for a number of
years where they offer tree share where
if we plant a tree, they give us -- you
probably know about this tree planting
program from the New York Power

really grants and programs -- most of

NYPA's programs are for much larger

entities than a small Village like

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Authority?

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I guess we've
3	been doing it for a while. I just
4	thought it was really great to hear
5	that they invest in villages and help
6	us to plant trees. John gave me a list
7	of trees that we are going to submit to
8	them for a match so that we will have
9	twice the trees than we planned on. I
10	can copy this if anybody would like to
11	see it, I think there's close to a
12	dozen trees here. That's my report.
13	Thank you.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
15	Trustee Roberts.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we talked
17	about Chapter 103 already a bunch, so
18	said what I said about the cap. I
19	would like to put it out there, and
20	I've talked to a couple of short term
21	rental landlords just sort of
22	personally and in passing and have had
23	support for this, so I want to say to
24	everybody watching out there if you're
25	a short term rental landlord I believe

1	that this Board, if we're going to do
2	anything with short term rentals, we're
3	severely lacking in data and research
4	on this because it's a new phenomenon.
5	So I've gone and I've found research
6	from other places that have large
7	planning departments that are not
8	fundamentally different from us but
9	they're not us, so they're different
10	places. I've quoted a Sonoma County
11	study, California a bunch as just sort
12	of I'm trying to grasp at data to try
13	to help us make this decision. And the
1 4	data we don't have is who are the
15	people what is the economic impact
16	of the short term rental tenant? And
17	I'd like to try to find a way to get
18	that. We did a study with St.
19	Joseph's, which at some point we should
20	figure out if we're going to release or
21	what. I shared a couple of things
22	here, but we know a little bit about
23	our kind of community. I went in
24	search of people who understand this
25	stuff, and got bounced around to

1	Professor Huddy at Stony Brook who does
2	a lot of sociological research,
3	research, and trends, and surveys, and
4	I basically said so how could if the
5	Village wanted to do this, how could
6	we, you know, figure out we hear a
7	lot at the podium about short term
8	renters come and they spend a bunch of
9	money here, and, you know, they I
10	can my own anecdotal evidence
11	because your demographic sort of
12	determines the anecdotal evidence you
13	got. I'm a parent of a young kid, so
14	we meet the beach, and they always say
15	well, how do you guys figure out how to
16	live here? We would love to live here,
17	but we can't for A, B, C, or D reason.
18	That happens frequently. You know,
19	that's all anecdotal. So I asked
20	Professor Huddy how can we try to make
21	some science out of this? And she said
22	basically that transient people are the
23	hardest people to track down and gauge,
24	you know, their sort of economic
25	impact, and the best way to do it would

1	be to do what she would call a sort of
2	unscientific survey where we could get
3	access to information about their
4	spending habits, what their future
5	spending habits or investment habits
6	might be with this Village. So if
7	short term landlords are willing to
8	share confidential information,
9	basically an e-mail address with me, no
10	name or anything else, I will put
11	together if the Board is okay with
12	this, I will put together a short
13	survey that helps us gauge what these
14	folks might what their behavior
15	might be economically here short term
16	and long term. I can do it all online,
17	I can host it myself, and we can get
18	potentially a couple of hundred
19	respondents and get some nice pie
20	charts about the behaviors and sort of
21	economic tendencies of this group, and
22	then have that data if and when we ever
23	want to think about should we do
24	something with regards to the short
25	term rental stock in the Village, then

1	we've got some information. It would
2	take a couple of months to compile.
3	I'll say this, these are all folks
4	mostly who are renting their places via
5	web sites, or apps, or, you know,
6	electronically, so it should be a group
7	that's fairly savvy with filling out an
8	online survey. I'm willing to do the
9	work if people would just give me
10	e-mail addresses I could get the e-mail
11	out. So what I'd like to do after
12	this, if you're all interested in this
13	data like I am, put together a survey
14	for you to look at, you know, give a
15	sign off or give me feedback on it, and
16	then, you know, reach out to our short
17	term landlords and ask them to help me
18	out with some e-mail addresses.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I would question
20	if a landlord would be free to give out
21	the e-mail address of a client. I
22	mean, just kind of a privacy thing. I
23	don't know, just a question.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: That would really
25	be up to the landlord. If the landlord

1	feels comfortable doing it and they
2	know what customers might be okay with
3	it, that would be up to the landlord.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think the
5	landlord would have to ask the customer
6	if they're allowed to give out their
7	e-mail address.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm asking the
9	short term landlord to ask their
10	tenants if they'd be willing to be part
11	of this study. I mean, the truth is
12	that any data we get about the short
13	term tenants is bound to be useful in
14	the decision making process here and
15	give us more information about the
16	economic phenomenon that we really
17	can't understand, which is this new
18	sharing economy that is so new to us
19	that it didn't really make it into
20	Chapter 103.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I was recently
22	reading in the Shelter Island Reporter
23	that their Shelter Island business
24	community is doing something similar to
25	that, and I wonder what questions they

1	put on I mean, their rental
2	situation is different than ours as
3	they have bigger homes and larger
4	pieces of property and probably more
5	party houses than we do, but it would
6	be interesting to find out what
7	questions they're asking and how
8	they're doing it in the business
9	district or the business community is
10	doing it. I saw it in the Shelter
11	Island Reporter had the article.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great idea.
13	MR. PROKOP: You know, the
14	businesses that I frequent when I come
15	here when I'm here, I try to ask two
16	questions, one is has there been a
17	change in their business as the rental
18	situation has changed, and then second
19	is the parking, their comments about
20	parking, and I think if you address the
21	business community as far as the
22	economics, I think that you would have
23	a larger sample a larger and more
24	representative sample group, and you
25	would be talking to you basically

1	would be looking at the impact side of
2	it, which would be more direct results.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You're
4	suggesting surveying our commercial
5	business owners?
6	MR. PROKOP: Yes. Just a
7	suggestion.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, there's
9	value there. The thing they can't tell
L 0	us that only the tenants could tell us
L1	is what might they do five, ten years
L2	from now. There's a long arc to this
L3	Village, even those of us who haven't
L 4	been here our entire lives are aware of
L5	the ups and downs of the economic
L 6	growth and retraction here, right? So
L7	who knows what's going to happen in 20
L8	years, and we could be making a
L9	decision now to potentially restrict or
20	manage or whatever this short term
21	rental activity that could have a big
22	impact later on that we would be
23	better at guessing at that if we ask
24	these people, just curious, would you
25	ever want to invest in the Village,

1	build a business here, would you ever
2	want to a lot of these folks who
3	come here may be involved in tech, and
4	we have a real lack of tech jobs around
5	here, so the closest place you probably
6	got to go to I just want to get some
7	gut sense of possible future stuff in
8	addition to what's happening yeah, I
9	want to hear that people are spending
10	money in restaurants, I think we all
11	know the answer to that, but I'm more
12	interested, you know, what's the next
13	shipyard business that maybe could get
14	built here. What's the next oystering
15	aquaculture thing that could get built
16	here? And if those implications are
17	out there, we want to know about it
18	before we make a bid decision.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Why don't you put
20	together a questionnaire, something
21	you're going to send around and
22	circulate to the Board so we can all
23	see it, feel comfortable with it, see
24	what other questions it's very

25

similar to what you did with Joanne's

1	questionnaire, sent it around so
2	everybody has it so if somebody has an
3	issue or something with it.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: To be clear, St.
5	Joseph's did that, this is going to be
6	just
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: You, yourself.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm not a
9	researcher.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, you're going
L1	to approach the short term landlords
12	and ask them if they would give you
13	some names to send it out to, but just
L 4	before you send it out saying it's come
15	from the Village, we should know what
L 6	you're sending out, that's all.
L7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Absolutely. I
18	think everybody should see it.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Put something in
20	writing and send it around.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I will. Thank
22	you.
23	I think you saw on my report, I'd
24	love to see us, you know, just on
25	behalf of our residents, I've heard

1	from several people about Route 48 and
2	Main, you know, can we just send a
3	letter to the State and Town asking for
4	whomever is responsible up there to
5	consider a safer intersection there?
6	We had someone hit on a bike, we had
7	you know, ask anybody, you all know
8	that when you drive it, I know it's not
9	in our jurisdiction, but it effects
LO	everyone who lives and visits here
L1	pretty much. So can we just get a
12	letter saying would you please look at
13	this intersection and consider, you
L 4	know.
L5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Unfortunately
L 6	that's been attempted and lobbied many
L 7	times to try and get that situation
L8	cleared up, you know.
L 9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Maybe we need to
20	do a better job.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: When they were
23	repaving, they stopped the paving 200
24	feet on the other side of it because
25	nobody wanted to go ahead and pave it,

1	that's why the paving project stopped
2	there because of the four different
3	agencies that were involved in it,
4	that's why.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Who controls
6	whether there's a traffic light there?
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's a county
8	road, isn't it?
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, it's a
LO	matter of where the town, the county,
L1	and the state take over, and that's why
12	the state paved right up to the sign at
L3	Shady Lady and stopped because the rest
L 4	of it was in somebody else's
L5	jurisdiction, and they would not put
L 6	asphalt down on somebody else's road.
L 7	So that part, short portion there is I
L8	believe the county owns past the end of
L 9	the entrance to Main Street. The town
20	owns from that place up to Route 48.
21	So going in that way it's the town, the
22	county, and then the state takes over
23	the rest of the way out. So they need
24	all three of them to get together to do
25	it, and neither one of them would pay

1	for the paving, that's why the paving
2	ended. The worst section right there
3	is that intersection, and nobody would
4	pave it. So we could send a letter, we
5	could send it to all three, and it's
6	going to be the same run around that
7	happened when they took the circle out.
8	I don't know who actually approved to
9	take it out 25 years ago.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Except things
11	have changed, and we had a horrible
12	tragedy on the north road in the Town
13	of Southold, which that got a traffic
14	light changed, and so maybe somebody
15	thinks Village of Greenport just sent
16	their Board seems to want us to look
17	at this, and we've had other tragedies.
18	There's much increased traffic flow,
19	there are more ferries, more wineries,

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said,
there is a dormant plan for the traffic
circle with Suffolk County. If the
Mayor would like, I'll be more than

et cetera, maybe it's now time for me

to look at this.

1	happy to go with you and see Al Krupsky
2	and see if we can find out what the
3	plan is, why it didn't go any further,
4	and try to start with that first. I do
5	know that the stoplight, there was
6	discussion way back when with the
7	Kontakosta's Winery was being put up,
8	that was part of their and that was
9	put down because of the issue of back
10	up of traffic with going east with the
11	stoplight. There was issues of that.
12	So Southold Town didn't agree with
13	that, but there's nothing to say that
14	we can't go to Suffolk County and say,
15	okay, we have an issue, you know, I
16	understand there's an old dormant plan,
17	can we see if it's still viable. I'm
18	sure is it Andrews or Anderson, who is
19	the Suffolk County.
20	MR. CORWIN: Gilbert Anderson.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Gilbert
22	Anderson is the one I think that's in
23	charge of it, or his name came up in
24	Southold Town Transportation Commission
25	in discussing that.

1	MR. PROKOP: He's Suffolk County
2	DPW.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Let's make it
4	stronger than that. Let's have a
5	resolution to write a letter so it's in
6	the public record, and it gets
7	discussed, and maybe these guys write
8	about it. That's the beginning of our
9	lobbying. Then we vote on it. It
10	can't hurt us to write a letter if we
11	all agree on this, and then, yeah, I'm
12	good at being a squeaky wheel, so we'll
13	go squeak.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll sign on to
15	that.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: You're looking for
17	a resolution, what do you want the
18	context of the letter to be?
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Asking for help
20	making the intersection at 48 and Main
21	safer, and I guess it would go to
22	Lavalle
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think we can
24	also use the example of what happened
25	with the tall ships even where we were

1	in gridlock. I think that's a good
2	example to show to the regular use of
3	the roadway, which is the reason why it
4	brought into my mind that we need to
5	deal with stuff down there. So I think
6	we have a lot of examples to show to
7	them that Greenport needs to have some
8	assistance from some place in keeping
9	the traffic flow moving, and that's not
10	what's happening.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Keeping our
12	residents and visitors safe.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: So you've got a
14	resolution being sent to the town, the
15	county, and the state requesting some
16	type of upgrade or safety work to be
17	done on the intersection safety
18	traffic flow at the intersection of
19	Route 48 and Main Street. We'll look
20	at the wording on that when you get it,
21	but that's what he wants as a
22	resolution.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks. We
24	talked about the trash in the
25	commercial district. I'd like to point

1	out that the town I had a brief
2	e-mail back and forth with Bill Ruland,
3	town Councilman who spearheaded their
4	little Love Lane, those big belly solar
5	things, which have been discussed. It
6	seems like they're saving money,
7	increasing efficiency of pickup
8	particularly on weekends when you need
9	to pay overtime for staff. So I think
10	they're about 4K a pop. I also think
11	we need something at the beach. The
12	pickup has been great down there, I
13	have to say the crew has done well.
14	There are times when it gets
15	overflowed. There was one day in
16	particular which we all know about that
17	was fixed the next morning immediately,
18	thank you, but I think we need more
19	we may need a couple of more down there
20	particularly near the play area, you
21	know, the play equipment and stuff
22	because sometimes you see I think
23	more trash gets left in that area
24	potentially because you've got to walk
25	really far. But I'd love to see, Paul,

1	if you guys could look into these
2	things and if you can run numbers and
3	find that we can save money with them.
4	I've got a contact for sales.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Actually, Doug, I
6	remember right before you came on I
7	think David Abbotelli, he did do a
8	he wrote a grant I think, a downtown
9	development grant, you know, the county
10	grant, and we did look into those type
11	of trash receptacles. I don't think we
12	qualified for that grant, but the BID
13	was also involved in writing that, it
14	was a mutual grant, so we can revisit
15	it. We had some information on it.
16	I'll have to ask David Abbotelli, he
17	was the village administrator at the
18	time. Okay?
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I do think BID
20	should go in on it with at least for
21	downtown. The beach is probably just
22	ours. Thanks.
23	Greenport Ocean Race, so I put in
24	my report last week a public mass
25	assembly permit, although I started

1	thinking about what they actually want
2	for this. By the way, this is
3	September 30th through October 2nd, the
4	race takes off October 1st in the
5	morning. They actually since we
6	negotiated with the Seaport Museum to
7	host their opening reception and their
8	closing reception, so the Seaport
9	Museum will be hosting that, they may
10	or may not need access to Tuthill Park,
11	like, for their sit down dinner. I
12	think they have enough space there for
13	standing up to
14	MS. PIRILLO: I'm sorry, I have a
15	question. You referenced the public
16	assembly permit application that was
17	submitted?
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It was not
19	submitted.
20	MS. PIRILLO: It was not
21	submitted?
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. I wrote
23	this a week ago and they said yeah,
24	we're going to submit one, and so I'm
25	correcting my report to say it was not

1	submitted because they don't actually
2	need one as I understand it, and I'd
3	like to confirm that, but they're going
4	to bring boats to the marina, then
5	they're going to walk through Mitchell
6	Park to the Seaport Museum to have
7	their party. They may at some point
8	ask us to use Tuthill Park, at which
9	point they would need to submit a
10	public mass assembly permit, right, the
11	way people do for the beach?
12	MS. PIRILLO: For what would they
13	use Tuthill Park for?
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They'd use
15	Tuthill Park the Seaport Museum site
16	is a little cramped for sitting down
17	for their group, so they might want to
18	put tables and chairs over there.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Across the
20	railroad tracks?
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right, and have
22	their reception when people are
23	standing up at the Seaport Museum.
24	This is all kind of in progress. It's
25	a bunch of volunteers trying to figure

1	it out, and I'm trying to get them to
2	make up their minds, but what we know
3	today is that they're going to have
4	their receptions at the Seaport Museum,
5	both the opening and closing, so they
6	don't actual need to assemble in
7	Mitchell Park. So what I'm proposing
8	to the Board is that we sign on as, you
9	know, the way we do with other events
10	and festivals, we sign on as a cohost
11	of the Greenport Ocean Race, which
12	includes the Greenport Cup, which was
13	won by Captains Monsole and you guys
14	know the history. So I'm just
15	proposing that we have a resolution
16	that says we are hosting the Greenport
17	Ocean Race in conjunction with the
18	Chinese Yacht Club, that's funnily
19	enough the exact name of the
20	organization, and it's on these dates,
21	and they will use they will be in
22	our marina, and we've always offered
23	them a discount on dockage, I think we
24	should continue to do that, it's off
25	season, we're not going to be losing

1	revenue, so we should just continue
2	that program, but otherwise there are
3	no other costs to us, nor do they need
4	the park at all. So I'm hoping we can
5	just sort of sign on as official
6	co-hosts and then we're good.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. And then
9	to reiterate, they very much want you
10	to shoot off the starting gun Saturday
11	morning.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Once they get
13	things settled and let me know where
14	they're having and what they're having,
15	you know, I'll be glad to.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I want to thank
17	the Seaport Museum for agreeing to
18	partner with us on this. I think it's
19	a great way for us, and I think we
20	should probably come up with more ways
21	to use our management agreement with
22	them because this is it's going to
23	keep the park open for our residents,
24	and while we can't attach monetary
25	value to that necessarily, I think it's

1	a great thing.
2	Sixth Street, are we any closer?
3	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, in fact over
4	the last two weeks I've had three calls
5	with the railroad. They now finally
6	have it scheduled for repair in the
7	fall, that's how they described it, so
8	September, October time frame. He has
9	been keeping me up to date with contact
10	there on that. He's had to wade
11	through his own bureaucracy to get that
12	answer, but that's where it is.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So you decided
14	not to just black top?
15	MR. PALLAS: They're willing to do
16	it, when he gave me that answer, in the
17	fall, I didn't want to spend the money.
18	I can take a look at it again, but if
19	they're willing to do it he even said
20	don't spend the money, we're going to
21	do it.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I realize Sixth
23	Street, but are they going to fix Fifth
24	Street too?
25	MR. PALLAS: I was only told

1	Sixth.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: What's wrong with
3	Fifth Street?
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought
5	somebody said something to me about
6	Fifth Street.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: I go down Fifth
8	Street, I think that one is pretty
9	even.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just asking
11	because
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: I haven't heard a
13	complaint about Fifth Street.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're going to
15	wear out Fifth Street because everyone
16	uses that instead of Sixth.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, Fourth
18	Street gets hit because they did come
19	out and fix Fourth Street at one time,
20	but the Hampton Jitney buses destroy it
21	because they're much bigger than they
22	used to be.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Any movement on
24	Clark's Beach?
25	MR. PALLAS: I just haven't had

1	time, Doug, to look at it.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: One last piece
3	of data that came in late for me that I
4	think is helpful for everybody, I did a
5	Bill Swiskey impression and I foiled
6	for some stuff from East Hampton and
7	Southold. I foiled for short term
8	rental violations of their law, East
9	Hampton does it four times per year,
LO	Southold we all know that, and I just
L1	got the results in today, I can forward
12	it, but there are zero violations that
13	have been sited in East Hampton and
L 4	Town of Southold had about 32 ordered
L5	remedies that went out, and they've got
16	three cases currently, you know,
L7	violations that are in court, and I
18	don't think there's been an outcome
19	yet. I'll note though what's
20	interesting about it is that all of
21	their enforcement effort seemed to be
22	centered around two weekends in the
23	winter. So December and then in
24	January. So it seems like they did
25	notice to remedy in December, and then

1	they did second round in January, and
2	they haven't done any in the summer
3	based on the foil that I got. All the
4	names and stuff are redacted, but I
5	have them all, and I'll forward them to
6	you. I just got them late today.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
8	Trustee Martilotta.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. I
10	apologize to everyone for not having
11	this typed up prior. I was out for
12	most of the summer, and I came back to
13	a colossal number of e-mails from the
14	Village, it's staggering actually. I
15	got caught up with that. Some of the
16	stuff that we talked about, we talked
17	about digitizing the documents. Also I
18	was able to Mayor Hubbard asked me
19	to go and speak to the anti-bias task
20	force, that was a very nice event they
21	had on a very hot day. Oh, my
22	goodness. But it was a really great
23	event. I promise next month I will
24	have it typed up. Like I said, I spent
25	most of the month trying to get caught

1	up in what I missed from last month.
2	We're just about there, and I should be
3	on it. I apologize for that, and thank
4	you for your patience.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: 60 e-mails a day
6	will fill up your box pretty quick.
7	Thank you.
8	I've got a few things I want to go
9	down. The list of trees and everything
10	else, we did that already. There's
11	they're trying to do the first ever
12	Greenport Film Festival this Saturday
13	at the movie theater. Not really sure
14	of the exact time, actually Steve
15	Bellone's office called me when we were
16	here, I'll call him back afterwards.
17	They wanted to get Steve Bellone to
18	come out and do an opening ceremony
19	with myself down there, we're not sure
20	of what time. They have stuff going on
21	from 1:30, 3:00, 5:00, and 7:00,
22	different stuff going on. Basically
23	they gave me some tickets for the Board
24	members to have, they want us to go and
25	look at it. What they want to try to

1	do is to get the county and the Village
2	on board to try to make this into a big
3	event for next year. I had a meeting
4	with them, with Sylvia, with the clerk
5	to go over and basically what we told
6	them was if you do something in the
7	beginning of May or October would be
8	the ideal time and you would have the
9	best chance of getting something
10	approved out here for us because if
11	they want to do July and August, we're
12	too busy and they're not going to find
13	accommodations and everything else.
14	But they want to try this out, they've
15	got some big producers, some people
16	involved in it. Actually just the four
17	different subjects that they have,
18	international pilot screening with some
19	foreign films. They said one of them
20	is really good. That's at 1:30. They
21	have actors panel, which some of the
22	actors I don't know who they are, but I
23	saw some names. There is a poster
24	around or you can go to their web site.
25	That's at 3:30. There's a New York

1	pilot screening at 5:00, which is local
2	films. And then at 7:00 there's a
3	Spike TV special, I am JFK Junior,
4	that's at 7:00. What they want to try
5	to do is to expand it to make it into,
6	like, a bigger thing, use the county's
7	promotional council and everything else
8	and get everybody involved in trying to
9	do something. This is going to be
10	small, low key, they're going to try
11	something. Josh Sapin has donated the
12	movie theater for them to use it for
13	that Saturday, so Saturday the 20th.
14	Like I said, there are some tickets
15	here, but they want us to go and look
16	at it to decide if we want to be
17	involved in trying to do this as a
18	promotion for something out here. He
19	said he'd love to see this grow into
20	something where, you know, he uses
21	France and other places, you know,
22	these big things, the red carpet and
23	everything else. Seems a bit much for
24	Greenport, but it could grow into
25	something, you know, in October next

1	year or something that might attract
2	couple of hundred people out here, some
3	limos down on Main Street unloading
4	people, who knows. So I do have some
5	tickets here, so go check out one of
6	the four different things they have. I
7	know it's chicken barbecue day, there's
8	a lot of other stuff going on that day,
9	the gallery opening, the painting for
LO	the Village is that day, you know,
L1	there's a lot going on that day. I
12	have to work. I told him I'll be down
13	there at some point. But if you're
L 4	interested in one or the other, take
L5	some tickets, just check it out. Also
L 6	we did talk about if this does go over
L7	well and they're going to try to do it
L8	is to go to local schools and to set up
L 9	one of them to be our local school kids
20	to make a film or whatever in school
21	and have that, you know, an hour of
22	that time frame set up for it. So
23	that's, you know, try to get the local
24	kids involved if this is going to be
25	something and they said they'd like

1	to grow it into something that's a
2	yearly event.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's through
4	Suffolk County's Film Commission,
5	correct?
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right now it's
7	not.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, this is
9	separate from that?
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, this is a
11	couple of independent people, they said
12	a producer Bob Berkowitz or something
13	was a producer, people that have done
14	other TV shows and everything else,
15	they're trying to get whoever they can
16	to kind of show up. That's all day on
17	Saturday at the movie theater.
18	We had money, I mentioned this six
19	months ago, a year ago, leftover money
20	from down at Mitchell Park for the
21	ferry terminal center that was never
22	done. It was 350,000 dollars. Gene
23	from New York State and from the
24	federal government transportation
25	highway funds had money that was

1	awarded to Greenport 10, 12 years ago,
2	it was never used. We've had a meeting
3	with the Friends of Wiggins Street,
4	that whole group, you know, getting
5	together. Paul and Robert had worked
6	on trying to find ways to draw down
7	this money to get it for us. There
8	really was no way that we were able to
9	access when something that was done at
10	Mitchell Park already to be used. So
11	the discussion we had a meeting with
12	the State, Stella Lagunis (phonetic)
13	from the ferry was there with the state
14	and the federal government were all
15	there again talking about the overall
16	concept that we have for redesigning
17	Wiggins Street and everything else. We
18	need to get an engineering study done,
19	this money that's available, it's
20	there, it was allotted to Greenport,
21	it's still there, to try to use that
22	and put a resolution on to advise them
23	that we'd like to do the engineering
24	study and use that money to see what we
25	want to do with the overall property

1	down there, to see if it's something
2	that we want to do, to take Ron
3	Nelson's plan, have real professionals
4	looks at it, design it, create it, do
5	the engineering, and decide what we
6	want to do.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a
8	question. That money can't be
9	converted into fixing the bulkhead in
10	Mitchell Park?
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, it cannot.
12	Robert spent two days in Hauppauge
13	trying to do that along with Paul going
14	through the past bills and everything
15	else. That's what we tried to do it a
16	year ago, and it cannot be.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So it's only to
18	be used for studies.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: It can be used
20	transportation, it's transportation
21	money and everything else.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Capital
23	improvements only I'm guessing.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Well,
25	originally the discussion I had with

1	Gene was that stuff we did down in
2	Mitchell Park, find some of those
3	bills, and use that to draw it down.
4	The research that Robert had done on
5	it, all that stuff was done with grant
6	money already, so you can't use a grant
7	to fund a grant. All that stuff we
8	wanted to try to do, it was not
9	eligible for that. The idea was we
10	were trying to say anything that we
11	did, the floating dock, anything that
12	was spent down there to try to get that
13	money to put it towards the bulkhead.
14	There's nothing that we found in the
15	research at Village Hall and Hauppauge
16	to be able to get that money to be used
17	toward the new bulkhead at Mitchell
18	Park. So that's the answer to your
19	question.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The MTA, it's
21	their property, they're not going to
22	spend if they were to spend money
23	doing this, it would probably take
24	forever to get them to do it, and
25	probably won't happen, so this allows

1	us I'm just trying to follow the
2	logic. So basically we're doing this
3	because we could do it now versus wait
4	on MTA?
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. And to go
6	through and say we want to try to do
7	something down there, the only way it's
8	going to be done this is speaking
9	again with Gene, I forget Gene's last
LO	name, that if we say we want to move
L1	forward with the project, he's working
L2	with creating a project identification
L3	number that they will designate that,
L 4	they'll put a number to the project, it
15	will be on their radar for any future
L 6	funding to go if we want to do the
L7	whole project, but they need an
18	engineering design of what's actually
L 9	going to be there to see if it's going
20	to work, elevations, heights, drainage,
21	all that other stuff of where they want
22	to go with that.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can it be used
24	for parking?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Part of Ron's

1	proposal is the parking, that's
2	redesigning the parking, the ferry
3	queue, everything else, getting
4	everything off of Wiggins Street and
5	all, but the State won't do anything
6	without an engineering study to see how
7	that it's done properly, that the
8	drainage is covered, lighting,
9	everything is included in it.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can it
11	hypothetically be used for parking at
12	another site?
13	MR. PALLAS: No.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It has to be not
15	just transportation, but transit.
16	MR. BRANDT: Intermodal.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, that's the
19	general idea to see if we want to do
20	it. I see you shaking your head, do
21	you got discussions on it or some other
22	feeling?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the money
24	was got for Mitchell Park, and nothing
25	against the ferry company, but we've

1	taken money that is helping them as a
2	business.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I assumed they
4	were contributing a portion, that this
5	was just for our portion. We're going
6	to pay for the whole thing?
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: This is for the
8	engineering study to get the project
9	moving forward, to redesign the traffic
LO	off of Wiggins Street, the parking, the
L1	curbs, the sidewalks, everything else
12	that was in Ron's proposal.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the
L 4	heights
L5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Isn't going to
L 6	paying anything.
L7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How much money
L8	are we talking about?
L 9	MAYOR HUBBARD: The State figured
20	that the engineering study would be
21	between 200 to 300,000 dollars.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: This money
23	was originally for the ferry idea to go
24	from
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: This was for the

1	ferry terminal to be in the marina
2	office at Mitchell Park. This money
3	was designated, given to the Village
4	12, 14 years ago, it's never been used.
5	The ex-mayor informed me about it when
6	I got in office, said there is money
7	left in a grant that's there. That's
8	when the State came down and met with
9	Dave Kappell and myself, a gentleman
10	from the state and the federal
11	government and said this money is
12	there, nobody has ever drawn it down,
13	done anything with it, let's try to do
14	something with it. The money is
15	earmarked for Greenport, let's do
16	something with it. That's why we spent
17	Village resources to go and try to
18	figure out how we could try to draw it
19	down and we got nowhere with it. If
20	the Board is not comfortable with it,
21	then it just won't happen, and we'll
22	just never get the money.
23	Improvements, I know you're saying it's
24	North Ferry, but it's improvements to
25	the whole parking area, cars off

1	Wiggins Street, it's the whole the
2	overall improvement will be on in
3	the Village. This is to get the
4	engineering study done, and then going
5	for grant money or whatever to try to
6	see how you're going to fund the
7	project.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And the moving
9	forward, in order to get grant money,
LO	you're going to have to have this
1	engineering study done, correct?
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's a lot of
L 4	money dedicated to one area.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's money that
16	the Village hasn't been able to take
L7	advantage of for 12 years. It's there
18	but if there's not Board consensus on
19	it, then I can't go anywhere with it.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think the
21	original ferry wasn't the idea
22	originally to put a ferry in Mitchell
23	Park to go to the south shore?
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: That was part of
25	the original concept, and that's where

1	this was asked for the marina office
2	was going to be is one of the
3	they have 40 grants down there. This
4	was one that they got money, that if
5	that was going to be a ferry terminal,
6	this could be used for that. That
7	never happened.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That makes
9	sense.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: I was not on the
11	Board. This is how it was explained to
12	me when it was brought up, you know,
13	last year.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And
15	essentially if we don't use it, just so
16	I'm understanding, if we don't use it
17	for this engineering study project,
18	there's no other real uses for it?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Basically it could
20	be reassigned to somewhere else, some
21	other community could get it, whatever,
22	or we could continue to try to do it.
23	What it is it's a reimbursable grant.
24	We have to prove that we spent the
25	money to get the grant money back.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So it's going to
2	come out of our budget and then we get
3	reimbursed?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's what Robert
5	was trying to find anything that we had
6	done at Mitchell Marina that was not
7	part of a grant that we had paid for to
8	try to get the money to be able to use
9	it for the bulkhead or other
10	improvements and stuff at the park. He
11	could find no bills on anything that we
12	had, any records that said you spent
13	this money, it wasn't reimbursed by
14	anybody else, it's Village money so
15	that we could get it back.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the
17	restrictions were that it had to be for
18	transportation?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's from the
20	federal highway fund. The federal
21	highway fund gave it to New York State
22	and New York State has control of it.
23	The gentleman that was from the federal
24	government that was there says, you
25	know

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just
2	throwing it out, George, so there's no
3	way that we could use this to fix some
4	of the mess at top of Third Street,
5	with that property there and perhaps
6	work something
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Which property?
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The one at the
9	corner of Third and Front, can't use
10	that for anything there?
11	MR. PALLAS: No.
12	MR. PROKOP: You mean farther
13	south?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, the
15	property that's next to the movie
16	theater that's vacant.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: You mean buying
18	that property and
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, and
20	trying to ease the situation at that
21	section of the wall.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: You'd have to buy
23	the property before you get a grant to
24	improve it.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's a lot to

1	digest I guess. Can we do we have
2	to make a decision right now?
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. The sooner
4	the better because, you know, if we're
5	going to get it because the gentleman
6	from the state I'm trying to
7	remember everything that went on,
8	there's minutes from that meeting. I
9	can send you a copy of the minutes from
10	that meeting. In September they're
11	going to designate the pin number on
12	it, they want to know if we're going to
13	move. If we're going to move forward
14	with the project and do anything down
15	on Third Street, which we've all
16	discussed and everything else, we have
17	to start somewhere. This was to do the
18	engineering study. We'd still have to
19	RFP for it, and then they give us the
20	name of who to RFP through. They have
21	to approve the engineer that's going to
22	do the work, so the state is working
23	with us on the project, it's just a
24	matter of if we want to anything, we
25	have to come up with funds to try to do

2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's a lot to
3	digest. I kind of would like to read

4 the minutes.

it.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There are three other agencies or companies, Heights, Jitney, MTA involved who, you know, it seems to me they should either have some skin in the game with a contribution, they don't have to foot the whole bill, or, you know, we're not going to be taking any input. If we're spending grant money that was hard earned for the Village, then we're going to do whatever we want, and, you know, we'll listen to your input, but we're making the call. That's fair, right, if we were to go that route.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, this is the start. We can't do anything with getting future grants. I mean, if we want to go ahead with what had Ron had proposed with the public hearing we had and everything on it. If we want to just keep status guo down there, then

1	we just don't do anything, we don't
2	worry about it, and keep it as status
3	quo. I was trying to find ways that we
4	could come up with some money to try to
5	do improvements down the end of the
6	road. You're saying Hampton Jitney,
7	but this is on the north side of the
8	tracks, everything in Ron's proposal,
9	everything is on the north side of the
10	tracks. It's getting the ferry queue,
11	the stuff moved, the walkway between
12	the two museums, the brick walkway down
13	to connect them with parking behind the
14	train museum. Not that that would be
15	the overall that's a concept. The
16	engineer could say that's not going to
17	work, you need to do this, drainage,
18	the archaeological issues, everything
19	that could be underground. All the
20	other issues, but that needs to be
21	addressed by somebody, and the only way
22	to address it is getting the study
23	done, and there was money that's never
24	been able to be used that we've tried
25	to. I tried every other way I could

1	possible find to use the money, and
2	this was an option where that money
3	could be used for that. That's the
4	reason I'm bringing it up, that's where
5	it came from. So to vote on it next
6	month, that's fine. Think about it,
7	whatever. The money is there, it's
8	waiting for the taking. The State has
9	been down twice saying are you going to
10	do anything with this money, or do we
11	just say we don't want it, and it will
12	go to somebody else.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or maybe we vote
14	on it next week?
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not voting
16	on it tonight or anything, it was just,
17	you know, think about it, get back to
18	me. We'll have the Board put something
19	on the agenda which wouldn't be until
20	Monday. I'll get the minutes
21	circulated around of what happened at
22	the meetings, and I thought Stella had
23	the Board included on it, but I'm not
24	sure.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, we haven't.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: If we were to
2	vote let's say we all vote yes, how
3	long would it take before we started
4	such a study? On thing that concerns
5	me is we have to lay out 300,000
6	dollars, would we even have it in the
7	budget for the year, or would that come
8	from where would we get the
9	capital fund, is that where it would
10	come from?
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: It could come from
12	capital, but the State says that they
13	are very anxious to reimburse the
14	money, so as soon as we spend it, we
15	give them a bill, we get our money
16	right back. They said they are very
17	because I asked the same thing, are we
18	going to wait six months, a year to get
19	the money back, and the gentleman from
20	the State said no, we want to pay it
21	back as quick as possible. And that's
22	when I put Robert on the spot, I said
23	all right, well, Robert is in charge of
24	the bills, as soon as we get a bill in,
25	he's going to send it right in to you,

1	and	they	said	that	they'll	get	it	back
2	to ı	ıs.						

MR. BRANDT: The money is sitting there and they want to get rid of it, they want to get it off their books.

They're anxious to do it. They're reallocated it from it's old purpose so it became intermodal, they moved it so they could use it in conjunction with this area. The money is there, they are anxious to get it off their books.

That's their headache, so they're saying do it.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What's the contingency that they're going to hold? I'll talk to you about it over the next couple of days because it's wonderful to hear that, I've heard them say that from the State before, but -- and I don't know if Doug will agree with me, but when you write a grant, and you hear them say yes, the money is there, sometimes it takes a year to get it because they come up with all kinds of -- I just would like to read the

1	minutes and have some thoughts on it.
2	It's a lot to have to digest at the
3	moment.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: You're welcome to
5	see the minutes. The gentleman from
6	the State twice came down to me and
7	said look, this money is there, are you
8	going to take it or not? If you're not
9	going to take it, they're going to
10	clear the books, and it's going to get
11	shipped to somebody else.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I understand.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: He's begging to
14	give us the money, and I'm trying to
15	find a way that we could use it. After
16	Ron's presentation, it's, like, well,
17	this is a good place we could use it to
18	improve you know, it's not even our
19	property, it's MTA property that we're
20	leasing and all, but it could solve a
21	problem in Greenport and it would make
22	the whole end of the road look better.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It would be
24	great.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: And so we've got

1	to start somewhere. I'll circulate the
2	minutes around, think about it, and
3	before I put something on the agenda
4	I'll poll you on Monday and we'll have
5	it, and then we can discuss it before
6	we vote on it on Thursday.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Very good.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's fair.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: I have two
10	personnel issues that I want to also
11	bring up in executive session. That's
12	all I have. At this point I'll bring
13	the public to address the board.
14	MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth
15	Avenue. First of all, the playground
16	equipment looks really good. I've been
17	watching the progress of that going up
18	down there. And not sure who got it
19	done, but thank you for the crosswalk
20	signs. I had talked about that a long
21	time, that's nice, and I've noticed
22	people have slowed down with that being
23	in the road.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul was kind
25	enough to take that suggestion and go

1 with it.

2 MS. ALLEN: Whoever did it, I was very happy when I came through and saw 3 them. A question about talking about 4 5 parking spaces. The taxi stand, does it get utilized by a taxi? I've never 6 7 seen a taxi in that spot. If it's not, to me, that's a waste of a usable 8 9 parking spots. Everyone is crying no parking, no parking, no parking. I was 10 against a taxi spot to begin with 11 12 because it's taking away. To me, it's a wasted open space. I know someone 13 14 had made a comment one day on one of the pages about fire hydrants and 15 16 people parking too close. Is there a 17 way, you know, not so much in town, I 18 mean, I had someone pull and literally back and parallel parked in front of 19 20 the fire hydrant by Mitchell Park, and 21 I said to him you can't park there, and 22 he said yeah, I know, I'm just going to 23 sit here. If I wasn't in my car, I would have went and got one of the 24 25 officers and said hey, get that guy out

1	of there. But a lot of fire hydrants,
2	there's no marking that they're not
3	supposed to be around them, I don't
4	know if that's something that could be
5	looked into or not.
6	About the short term rentals, I'm
7	not crazy about asking people what they
8	do. People come once and never come
9	back again. My brother and
LO	sister-in-law have utilized one at
L1	least twice. They love it. They don't
12	necessarily spend the entire time in
13	Greenport, they got to Manhattan, they
L 4	go to the south shore, so I don't think
L5	you're going to get the information
L 6	you're really looking for on that. But
L7	when I was reading on the rental codes
18	under rental property it says shall
L 9	exclude B, any legally operating
20	commercial hotel, motel business or bed
21	and breakfast establishment operating
22	exclusively and catering to transient
23	clientele, that its customers
24	customarily reside at these
25	establishments for short durations for

1	the purpose of vacationing, travel,
2	business, recreational activities,
3	conventions, emergencies, and other
4	activities that are customary to a
5	commercial hotel motel business. Why
6	can't the short term rental just be put
7	in with that? That's basically what
8	they are. They're running a business.
9	You know, you already have it for bed
10	and breakfasts, for hotels and motels.
11	It's been batted around, they're
12	running a business because of the turn
13	over. They're renting like a B&B would
14	rent or like a hotel would rent, why
15	can't short term rentals just be put
16	into this exclude this way they have to
17	and also where they have to follow
18	the same guidelines because I don't
19	think it's right that there's, you
20	know, people that are renting out that
21	aren't paying the rental permit, and
22	they're not it's not a fair playing
23	field with the B&B's and the hotel.
24	And it's been going around and around
25	and around. Because that also goes

1	back to how many short term rentals are
2	actually on the books that have rental
3	permits?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're not
5	permitted now. There is no they're
6	not required to have a permit, they
7	don't have to have anything.
8	MS. ALLEN: So if you're renting
9	space in something you own, you don't
LO	need a rental permit for any
L1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, that's why
12	we want to
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Summer rental,
L 4	transient rentals are in the code
L5	saying you do not need a permit.
L 6	That's in the law that was passed four
L7	years ago.
L8	MS. ALLEN: I was trying to go
L 9	through paperwork and trying to find
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's not required.
21	MS. ALLEN: Then personally I feel
22	they need to be in with the B&B's, and
23	the hotels, and the motels. But the
24	bottom line is the first thing anyone
25	who rents their home whether it's for

1	one night or if it's for a full year,
2	everyone should have to pay a rental
3	permit fee. Price you can decide on
4	how you want to do short term, long
5	term, but there needs to be the level
6	playing field that everyone you
7	start with that. Everyone needs to be
8	on the same page there. I heard you've
9	only gotten 80 notices back for rental
10	permits, and there's how many rentals
11	in Greenport in the Village.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: A lot of them are
13	not required. 87 inspections were done
14	to date.
15	MS. ALLEN: And you don't know how
16	many rental units there are in the
17	Village?
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, because
19	owner occupied under the rental
20	permit law, owner occupied was
21	excluded.
22	MS. ALLEN: All right. I know a
23	lot now, and to me that doesn't seem
24	right.
25	MR. PROKOP: There's a problem

1	I just wanted to point out to just make
2	the public aware that in our code there
3	is a definition of an inn in our code,
4	but and this has come up at the
5	Planning Board, that type of occupancy
6	is not allowed to have a kitchen as I
7	understand it, or kitchen facility,
8	unless I'm incorrect, but I believe
9	that that's the case. So there's a
LO	little bit of a definitional problem
L1	there. However, Suffolk County, as I
12	understand it, Suffolk County looks
13	through social media, and if they see a
L 4	short term rental advertised, they
15	consider it to be subject to one of the
L 6	business taxes of Suffolk County, one
L7	of the commercial taxes, so they
18	effectively treat a short term rental
19	as a commercial occupancy.
20	MS. ALLEN: That's why I thought
21	if they were added in with the B&B's
22	and the hotels, you know, that everyone
23	is on
24	MR. PROKOP: I'm just pointing out
25	it would probably take a change in the

1	code because we already had that happen
2	where somebody wanted to officially
3	make a there's a building with five
4	apartments in it that there's an
5	application to change to short term
6	rentals, basically to an inn, and there
7	was an objection at the Planning Board,
8	which I believe is correct, that the
9	kitchens would have to be removed. So
10	that's you know, we're just in
11	our code there are just some
12	definitional issues that come up.
13	MS. ALLEN: Thank you. I agree
14	with Trustee Roberts and Phillips about
15	up by Shady Lady. George, I don't know
16	why they ever took that out either. To
17	me, I would prefer to see a traffic
18	circle in there than a light because of
19	the logistics of Sound Road, whatever
20	that side road is. I know there's
21	spots where but my preference also
22	is to have a light at on Front and
23	Moore's Lane because that intersection
24	has been getting worse each year, and
25	not just summertime, it's year round,

1	and that's what I've always said, I've
2	wanted a light at that corner.
3	As far as doing the oh, the
4	other thing, when you were talking
5	about the garbage and about the
6	screens, and you mentioned that the
7	Village does the Village have
8	dumpsters?
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
LO	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay, I didn't
L1	know there were Village dumpsters, I
L2	was thinking just the regular garbage.
L3	I'm like, wait, what is he talking
L 4	about?
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: At the marina they
L 6	have one, they have one behind the post
L7	office, they have one at the railroad
L8	dock.
L 9	MS. ALLEN: I didn't realize that
20	those were Village dumpsters, that's
21	probably why I never
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, the ones that
23	are lined up behind Deep Water Grill,
2 4	one of those is the Village's dumpster
25	for our marina, and there's one behind

the post office that they use when they
do the Dances and stuff it goes in
there, and at the railroad dock, so
there's a few.

MS. ALLEN: Maybe I was thinking they were the business's that were there. I do agree with having them screened and maybe they'll prevent people, not just tourists, but locals from putting their household garbage in them.

The other was talking about Main Street, yeah, that one little section is difficult. Maybe if it was one way heading north up to Central and people coming on Main Street coming into town they're going to see it's, you know, one way the opposite way, they go down Center. To me, I don't think that's a big deal, you know, depending on which way you route it. If you route it one way all the way into town, yes, then you're going to have people trying to leave going there. But I think if you have the one way heading out, you're

1	not going to get the congestion behind
2	Carpenter. But something that it
3	is, that's a tricky one just like the
4	top of Fifth Avenue is, and I go all
5	the back ways, you know, because of
6	traffic, and I try when I go to my
7	niece's, I try to go all the way, you
8	know, through the back roads because it
9	is, and people just don't know how to
10	drive anymore, that's the problem.
11	Thank you.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
13	MR. HARRIS: Good evening, folks.
14	I know it's late, but I've been sitting
15	here waiting to get up and talk about
16	this, and it's about the Trustee
17	Phillips suggestion about making one
18	way. In my opinion, one way between
19	Bay and Central, that's just not going
20	to work. The fact that if you took
21	away the parking on the northbound side
22	from Bay right up to Park Street,
23	you've got an intersecting road, so
24	there's parking places on the east
25	side, which you're not going to lose.

1	You have you're supposed to legally
2	there's so many feet from the corner
3	set backs, so there's parking places
4	that people may park now that's
5	illegal, or quite honestly, if you went
6	and widened the road, take a foot on
7	either side, lose a foot on each side
8	of the road, you gain two feet
9	doesn't sound like a lot, but there's
10	your where your cars are meeting.
11	To take and reroute traffic onto
12	Carpenter Street, it's a very narrow
13	street to begin with, and now you're
14	going to have to intersect coming out
15	onto if you're coming north, say if
16	it's one way coming north and you're
17	making the swing onto Bay, and then you
18	get up to the corner of Bay and
19	Carpenter, very narrow, and there's a
20	delivery truck, there was a tractor
21	trailer there today
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know I almost
23	got run over by it.
24	MR. HARRIS: at the restaurant,
25	so now you've got another tractor

1	trailer that you're making him or her,
2	whoever the driver may be, get off the
3	main street to go on a one way venture.
4	How are you going to do that? Now
5	it's, again, it's a main thoroughfare.
6	The fact of the matter is two options,
7	one, you either do away with the east
8	side parking. You're going to lose
9	maybe eight places. Those businesses,
10	I'm going to tell you right now, if the
11	people want to go to those businesses,
12	they're going to get there. They'll
13	find a place. The mayor's mom's house
14	is on Central Avenue, that street is
15	loaded up with cars that are parking to
16	either go to restaurants, go to
17	shopping, or to visit downtown.
18	They're using the back streets to park
19	on, so to give up a certain amount of
20	parking places to keep traffic moving
21	on your main corridor, to me that's,
22	again, it's either do away with one
23	side of the street parking for that
24	area or cut your sidewalks back on each
25	side a foot and gain that extra two

1 feet. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Pete, can I ask 3 a question? MR. HARRIS: Go ahead. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I understand 5 where you're coming from, but don't you 6 think that we should at least discuss 7 something? Maybe it will expand beyond 8 9 that, but in the meantime, don't you think we should try to at least look at 10 11 a couple of different options? Do you really think it's really that safe to 12 try and drive through there right now? 13 14 MR. HARRIS: Mary Bess, right now just by taking and detouring people off 15 16 and making it one way, I don't think 17 you're making it any -- to me, you're 18 not making it any safer with other aspects. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You didn't hear 20 21 I want to work with Paul, who is me. 22 an engineer, and with Derryl, and put a 23 plan together try to alleviate some. It may expand beyond that section, I 24

have no idea, but I don't want to spend

25

1	time and waste staff time on something
2	that maybe other people don't feel it's
3	important. I feel it's important. I
4	feel that emergency vehicles should
5	have the opportunity to get through
6	there. Okay? I agree with you,
7	Carpenter Street is overloaded, but
8	until I don't want to waste staff
9	time working on something to present to
10	the Board, which is what I was trying
11	to get across.
12	MR. HARRIS: Mary Bess, I totally
13	understand where you're coming from,
14	and again, if you just did away with
15	parking on one side of the street, then
16	there is no more congestion.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That may come
18	out of it, but I don't want to waste
19	staff time.
20	MR. HARRIS: Because if you take a
21	fire truck or a police car, and now you
22	make it one way, and you have to
23	deviate off the main road to take a
24	bypass because we have a one way for
25	two blocks.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I understand
2	that, and to be honest with you, I
3	probably will ask your opinion about it
4	once I get it done because you did a
5	lot of it with the Town of Southold.
6	MR. HARRIS: And just to go back
7	to when I was with the town or with the
8	State, between the State and the town,
9	43 years in the highway business. When
10	they did away with the traffic circle
11	and what the mayor said as far as when
12	they repaved Route 25, and I was told
13	the reason why they left it off because
14	of the roundabout. Well, while I was
15	in office the talk of the roundabout,
16	we had county officials, we had state
17	officials, and that was the low end of
18	the three that was being discussed.
19	One, was it the very west end of the
20	divided highway by the traffic light at
21	Wendy's Deli where it meets the
22	County Road 48 meets back into Sound
23	Avenue, that was the number one. Then
24	they were talking about doing it at
25	Wickham Avenue and 48 because that was

1	the black spot because we've had so
2	many really bad accidents there. Quite
3	honestly, up until when the lady that
4	lives up on Sound Road got hit by the
5	police car, we haven't had a serious
6	accident at that location probably I'm
7	going to say close to ten years. When
8	they first changed the setup, it was
9	terrible. We went from a traffic
LO	circle to a T, and we had some we
L1	had a couple of really serious
L2	accidents. When we had the tall ships,
L3	we had backups. But I think probably
L 4	the worst backup we had was just this
L5	past summer when people wanted to go to
L 6	East Marion to go to the Lavender Farm
L 7	because Doug Geed on Channel 12 is
L8	telling everyone to come out and smell
L 9	the flowers, you know, and sit there
20	and meditate.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're a
22	destination.
23	MR. HARRIS: The fact of the
24	matter is, you know, I don't see a
25	roundabout over I would take a

1	roundabout over a traffic light because
2	traffic continually moves. In
3	Riverhead, since they changed the
4	traffic circle and made it two lanes by
5	the hospital, that is so much more
6	efficient because now the intersecting
7	lanes can come out while there's
8	somebody already in the circle. That's
9	the concept of what you need. You have
10	to keep it moving and not make them
11	stop, only when you come up, you know,
12	you drive up to the area, okay, you may
13	have to pause or you may have to stop,
14	but 90 percent of the time you'll never
15	have to stop because it's just a
16	continuous flow. That's my take on it,
17	folks. Thanks very much.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
19	to address the board?
20	MR. TALADINO: John Taladino,
21	Sixth Street. I too think that a one
22	way street is probably not the best
23	solution. Everybody panicked when we
24	talked about taking parking from the
25	south side of Front Street in front of

1	the park, and it was going to be a
2	catastrophe, the world was coming to an
3	end, and it seems like it worked out.
4	I think if we eliminate those spaces, I
5	think you have the number, don't you,
6	how many spaces from Bay to Central?
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: From Bay up to
8	Park was, like, 14 spots. You get 10
9	on the other side, if you get rid of
10	them all, it could give a lot of room.
11	MR. TALADINO: To ensure the
12	health and safety of the Village and
13	the drivers, to lose 10, 12, 14 spots
14	that people would probably find
15	elsewhere anyway. I think that's
16	probably one way I got to be
17	honest with you, Mary Bess, I can't
18	even envision it. I can't even
19	envision those blocks being one way. I
20	know I would be confused.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said
22	MR. TALADINO: I understand, it's
23	good to start a discussion. The other
24	thing I wanted to talk to you about,
25	garbage. First of all, I would like to

1	say thank you for the harbor master. I
2	know he's here. I see a difference, I
3	see a big difference. Thank you for
4	the TCO, I see a big difference. I'm
5	not one of the guys that care if the
6	TCO I live in West Dublin also, I
7	don't really care if he drives down my
8	street, I park in my driveway, he can
9	drive down my street a thousand times a
10	day. I don't really care because I'm
11	parked legally, all my neighbors are
12	parked legally. If they're not, they
13	should get a summons. I think it's
14	crazy to suggest that he should ignore
15	unregistered vehicles. I think it's
16	crazy to suggest that he should ignore
17	un-inspected vehicles. The two traffic
18	accidents I was in in the last 53
19	years, one guy had an un-inspected
20	vehicle, he crashed into my car. The
21	other guy had an unregistered vehicles,
22	he crashed into my car. Both of those
23	cars shouldn't have been on the road.
24	I think they're equally as important as
25	overtime parking. I understand the

1	concept when the guy first was hired
2	and stuff, move traffic along, but if
3	you see a violation. And we're
4	grown-ups, you know, if your car is
5	unregistered, if your car is
6	un-inspected, I know, you, Trustee
7	Roberts mentioned that, that's on you,
8	and if you get a ticket, that's on you.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: True.
10	MR. TALADINO: I read some e-mails
11	from one of my good friends that we
12	shouldn't be singling out the locals.
13	I find that insulting. I think the
14	locals are just as smart as the
15	tourists. If they park illegally, they
16	deserve to get a ticket. Who better
17	than the locals to know the rules, you
18	know. I think the guy that comes from
19	East Germany, rents a car at Kennedy
20	Airport, and he parks here, maybe he
21	don't know the rules, but a local, he
22	knows the rules.
23	As far as the garbage, and I read
24	some place else on somebody's web page
25	that it is suggested by business owners

1	that the Village pick up the business's
2	garbage. I don't think the Village
3	should be in the garbage business. I
4	think we should leave that to the
5	mafia, they do it well. I'm only
6	kidding. The last thing we should be
7	is in the sanitation business. It just
8	thank you for saying where the
9	Village dumpsters, now I don't have to
10	drive to Cutchogue.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: They'll be locked
12	up tomorrow, John.
13	MR. TALADINO: I think that's
14	probably the solution. I mean, give
15	the sanitation guys or whoever dumps
16	them the keys. As far as people
17	putting household garbage in
18	receptacles, anybody that drives
19	through the town sees it every single
20	day. I hear a story today from a
21	friend that told me one of the rental
22	people in town actually suggests that
23	to his tenants. There's a trash can
24	down the block, when you leave for the
25	weekend, take your trash and put it in

1	the Village receptacle. I don't know
2	how you guard against that. To me,
3	that's really insulting, but I don't
4	know how you would police that, I don't
5	know how you would guard against it.
6	I'm sorry, I had a few other things, I
7	didn't write them down. And the last
8	thing with the TCO, I don't think he
9	should be a parking lot attendant. I
10	don't think he should sit on a chair
11	with a stand at IGA's parking lot and
12	inform the people that they have X
13	amount of minutes to park here. I
14	think you hired him to do a job, let
15	him do his job, let the people educate
16	themselves. It happens once, it
17	happens twice, it won't happen again.
18	As far as overtime parking, I don't
19	know how that works, chalks the tire,
20	looks at his watch, comes back, I don't
21	know, but a guy that parks the wrong
22	way on First Street or on Front Street,
23	those guys deserve a ticket. Those
24	guys really deserve a ticket. Thanks.
25	Thanks for listening.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
2	MR. WINKLER: John Winkler, 175
3	Fifth. By the way, I'm the friend that
4	told him that story. The anecdote is
5	that I had a couple staying with me
6	that I didn't have any days opening at
7	my property, and they wanted to stay
8	longer, so they found a three day
9	rental on Bay Avenue, and they walked
LO	in the door, and there was a sign up,
L1	when you leave, put your garbage in the
12	container on Main Street. So and to
L3	me, this again, your survey, I can
L 4	give you the survey of the people that
L 5	are coming out here. They're not going
L 6	to start a business here, they're
L7	coming out here with their families
L8	with young kids that can't afford to
L 9	rent for a month, they can only rent
20	for a week, they can only rent for
21	three days. They're from the city,
22	they're from Brooklyn, they're from
23	Jersey, they're from Germany, they're
24	from England, they're from Sweden, and
25	they're looking for a place that they

1	can afford to stay with their family.
2	Where they're spending the money, we
3	all know they're spending it in the
4	restaurants, they're spending it in the
5	antique shops, they're spending it in
6	clothing shops. They're not eating
7	they're not cooking in my apartment
8	anyway. Chips, stuff for the kids
9	maybe, that's about it. They're going
LO	out and they're spending money in this
11	Village. This short term rental thing
12	is a very difficult thing, very
L3	difficult concept to solve. I commend
L 4	Trustees for trying to come up with a
L5	civil way of handling this. But in all
L 6	honesty, my opinion is the owner has to
L 7	be there, and I think that would solve
L8	a lot of problems. Number one, if
L 9	you're in an R2 district, you have an
20	apartment you can rent, you live
21	downstairs, number one, it's going to
22	limit the amount of short term rentals,
23	it's going to take care of your problem
24	there because not a lot of there's
25	not a lot of people that live in their

1	space short term and have occupied
2	owners. And also that problem, they're
3	making sure that those people are going
4	to be screened, they're going to not
5	bother their neighbors, they're going
6	to make sure they're going to be neat,
7	not going to be disruptive, the owner
8	is going to take care of the garbage,
9	the owner is going to keep their
LO	property neat as a pin because if they
L1	want to charge a good price, it's got
12	to be nice. They get reviewed, all
13	these web sites have reviews, and if
L 4	you get a bad review, you're done. So
L5	my opinion is I think I know a lot
L 6	of people spoke, and they don't think
L7	you need to be owner occupied, but it
L8	really makes a difference. Just this
L 9	one character telling the people to
20	dump it down you know, he's renting
21	the first floor to somebody full-time,
22	and then he's got the second floor, and
23	another little space for him to stay
24	when he comes, and he rents this place
25	short term, and he tells the people to

1	put the garbage in the receptacle down
2	the end of the street. They were,
3	like, amazed because they came back to
4	tell me all this, you know. They were
5	laughing. And I get a lot of return
6	people from all over the world, they
7	keep coming back to Greenport because
8	they love Greenport. They love the
9	Village, they love the people, they
10	love the beaches, they love the
11	vineyards. Even Board members know
12	that there's not enough places to stay
13	in this Village. It's become so
14	popular as a destination, and we need
15	extra space for the transient people.
16	Yes, we need space for year round
17	renters, of course we do. If you start
18	charging exorbitant fees, there's a lot
19	of two family homes that do rent long
20	term, and they're owned by senior
21	citizens. If you start charging these
22	people a thousand dollars a permit fee
23	if they're renting their apartment,
24	they can't afford that. They can't
25	afford that. They can't afford half

1	the time to fix their place up, you
2	know, to maintain their house, you
3	know, they're struggling, they're on a
4	fixed income. They can't take an
5	exorbitant rate increase or permit fee
6	to do what they got to do. I think,
7	you know, Chatty is onto something I
8	think a little bit, that I know that
9	Suffolk County, they've come after me,
10	okay, for hotel tax, which I pay now,
11	and I guess they do treat me as a
12	business. If I'm paying hotel tax, I
13	guess I'm a business, but so is every
14	other renter. Even if you rent long
15	term, you're in a business, you're
16	making money off your property. Okay?
17	So we need to find a balance between,
18	you know, people helping their income
19	because they're on a fixed income or
20	retired or whatever, and that's why I'm
21	doing it, it supplements my retirement.
22	And I bought the house with that
23	intent, and I just sort of, like,
24	happened out of blue that all of a
25	sudden this internet thing happened

1	just like Uber and all the other stuff.
2	So as difficult as it is, I think being
3	an owner occupied probably is the most
4	important part of this whole idea. And
5	not just because I am, but I don't want
6	to get a bad rap, you know, that I'm
7	one of those type of rentals, you know,
8	that are putting garbage down at the
9	beach, you know, tell my guests to put
10	it down at the beach because I don't
11	want to cart it to Cutchogue. But now
12	I know where the dumpsters are, thank
13	you very much. But I think that's the
14	key, that's my opinion. Thank you for
15	your time. Paul, I want to thank you
16	for today with the our beach got
17	destroyed in that storm, Fifth Street
18	Park, Herzog Park got destroyed by the
19	storm, and a few problems down there
20	that we've got to work through with
21	DEC, but right now it's a mess, and I
22	hope we can expedite it. Thank you
23	again for your time. This is my
24	opinion.
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MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

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MR. TASKER: Arthur Tasker, Beach
Street in Greenport. A bunch of
things, first of all, I have to say
with Mr. Winkler's comment that owner
occupancy in terms of any rental, but
particularly short term rentals is a
key to making it work. I want to come
back to that point with regard to
speaking with comprehensivity (sic) or
not of the whole idea of pay to occupy
as opposed to short term rentals. Pay
to occupy is the concept that needs to
be dealt with.

But first a couple of historical notes, somebody's eyes perked up when the Chinese Yacht Club was mentioned in conjunction with the Greenport Race Weekend. There really is a Chinese Yacht Club, it's more than a hundred years old, and it got started when several Greenporters went to the boat show more than a hundred years ago at the old coliseum I think it was. They include Jamie Mill's grandfather, Mike Byrne's grandfather, and I think my

1	grandfather were among the group, and
2	then somehow they ended up in Chinatown
3	probably where they shouldn't have
4	been, and that was the origin of the
5	Chinese Yacht Club in Greenport. It
6	was a prominent group of people who
7	were involved in it, and it still meets
8	on a small time basis periodically I
9	understand.
10	To go back to the whole idea of
11	pay to occupy. I mentioned back in

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November perhaps for the first time on my part the need to have a comprehensive look at rentals in Greenport, whether it's a hotel, or a motel, or a B&B, or a short term rental, or a long term rental, or any kind of rental, there needs to be a comprehensive look at it. Now, what has been suggested most recently by Mr. Roberts, and I have to say I think he did a terrific job in pulling things together, it's clearly evident he's put a lot of thought and a great deal of effort into it, and you can tell from

1	the research that he's done a great
2	deal of research from the various
3	sources that he sites in different
4	cities and other locations all around
5	the country, and I think he should be
6	congratulated for that. But frankly, I
7	don't think it is truly comprehensive
8	because as Mrs. Allen points out her
9	view is that short term rentals ought
10	to be in there with the B&B section of
11	the law. Well, that we're really
12	talking about there's still two
13	non-comprehensive views of pay to
14	occupy. I suggested as one way to view
15	this is a matrix. On the top you have
16	one family, two family, short term
17	rental, bed and breakfast, inn, all of
18	those different kinds of things, and on
19	the vertical axis you have square feet,
20	write in the number, owner occupied,
21	yes or no, how many parking spaces,
22	one, two, or three, and make a matrix
23	out of it, and it puts everything in a
24	way that you don't have inconsistent
25	regulations, and more particularly,

1	inconsistent definitions and wording.
2	Because the Village code with respect
3	to occupancy is everywhere but on the
4	same page when it comes to how it
5	defines the various terms and ways that
6	things can be used and done in the
7	village. It's chaos from a linguistics
8	stand point if nothing else.
9	Switching gears, the parking
10	enforcement idea, I hope we don't lose
11	track of the fact that we put in the
12	parking enforcement regulation because
13	we wanted to have enforcement, not
14	making money, and I'm afraid we're
15	losing sight of that. Though it's hard
16	to argue that if you're ticketing
17	somebody because they're parked
18	pointing the wrong direction and it
19	turns out that they don't have an
20	inspection sticker, it's hard to argue
21	that they shouldn't be given a ticket
22	for that as well, but there gets to be
23	a bit of a piling on sense of this, and
24	we're doing it for money, and we're
25	trying to gouge everybody we can, and

1	losing track of the fact that it's
2	enforcement for the convenience of the
3	people of the Village and also the
4	people who visit the Village, not to
5	make money. You saw what happened when
6	the towns in the suburbs of St. Louis
7	started enforcing parking regulations
8	to make money, and many of the people
9	ended up in jail because they couldn't
10	pay their fines. That may not be a
11	risk here, but the idea still presents
12	itself.
13	The question of assessing the

The question of assessing the

Village and whether or not the Village
should be doing it's own tax
assessment, we stopped that about 25
years ago I think, and one of the
reasons should have been if it was not
is that the disparity between the
assessment that the Town of Southold
might place on a property and the

Village of Greenport might place on the
same property is going to end up with
nothing but tax certiori suits, either
suing the Village or Town, one way or

1	the other. Because they say my
2	valuation is this, they say it's that,
3	I want it lowered no matter what. It's
4	just going to lead to tension and also
5	a cost of doing it. Assessing
6	properties isn't cheap. They've got
7	three people or four people I believe
8	who are actually doing the assessing in
9	the Town of Southold, and they've got
10	an office full of staff who support
11	them doing it. I don't think we want
12	to get into that business again.
13	The question of the traffic
14	circle, I agree with Mr. Harris, a real
15	traffic circle like the one they have
16	up in Riverhead near the hospital is
17	the way to. What we had as a traffic
18	circle that was taken out 25 years ago
19	wasn't a traffic circle, it was a way
20	to split up the traffic and divide the
21	traffic that was coming in from the
22	west and going north and heading east.
23	It was no more a traffic circle than
24	the man in the moon because east west
25	traffic just went straight through.

One night Kitty Diller, who was a

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2	French teacher in the Village, drove us
3	home from a school event, she had one
4	too many, she drove right straight
5	across the traffic circle. That's a
6	different story. But a true traffic
7	circle, not a traffic light. When you
8	stop traffic, everything has to start
9	up again, the grand back and forth as
10	to who goes first, who has the right of
11	way, who turns before whom. True
12	traffic circles, which are broadly used
13	in Europe, they are ripping out traffic
14	lights as quickly as they can and
15	installing traffic circles because it
16	keeps the traffic moving. I commend
17	Mr. Harris for recommending that, I
18	support it very much.
19	I noticed, and unfortunately the
20	fire chief isn't here, I noticed in his
21	report, the written portion of it
22	something that caught my attention that
23	I really don't understand and perhaps
24	someone here can help me with it. In

the treasurer's report I guess from the

1	warden's meeting it says Warden Kaelin
2	also read the two percent distribution
3	proposal. Motion made by Warden
4	Grilli, seconded by Ray Corwin to
5	accept the treasurer's report, also to
6	accept the two percent proposal. What
7	is this? Two percent of what to whom
8	is going to be distributed? Can anyone
9	answer that question?
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's from the New
11	York State Insurance Fund, and by law
12	that gets distributed back two
13	percent out of it gets distributed back
14	to the fire companies to be split among
15	the members.
16	MR. TASKER: Among the members?
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: To be used for the
18	benefit of the members.
19	MR. TASKER: What insurance fund
20	is this, Mr. Mayor?
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: The actual law, do
22	you know the law that it comes from,
23	Joe? There's one
24	MR. PROKOP: I'm not familiar with
25	it, I'm sorry.

1	MR. FISHER: Your fire insurance,
2	George. What you pay for your house's
3	fire insurance. Two percent of what
4	you pay for fire insurance comes back
5	to the fire departments for
6	MR. TASKER: To the individual
7	members of the fire department?
8	MR. FISHER: No, to the company
9	for the benefit of the members of the
LO	company.
11	MS. PIRILLO: I believe it's the
12	VBL, Volunteer Benefit Law.
13	MR. FISHER: No.
L 4	MR. TASKER: It seemed an unusual
L5	concept to me. I'm not familiar with
L 6	it.
L7	MR. FISHER: It's part of the New
L8	York State Insurance Law.
L 9	MR. TASKER: Then finally I'll
20	conclude with my question on my
21	perennial subject I'm always interested
22	in, can anyone tell me the status of
23	the RFP process for the sewer design
24	for the east and west sewer expansions,
25	whether it's on a small scale, Sandy

1	Beach only, whether it's a big scale,
2	the whole east, the whole west, or
3	what, has there been any progress made
4	on the RFP for that?
5	MR. PALLAS: No, there has not
6	been.
7	MR. TASKER: Okay. Thank you very
8	much.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
10	to address the board?
11	MR. CORWIN: My name is David
12	Corwin. I'll try to make this long.
13	First, the assessor, the village used
14	to do their own assessing 35 years ago.
15	What would happen is Mr. Gordon would
16	take the town assessment rolls, call it
17	the Village assessment roll. It wasn't
18	very expensive, but the certiori suits
19	were expensive. So the Board said what
20	the heck, let's get rid of it. I think
21	what happened was the State said
22	villages can now take the town
23	assessment roll, but if you do that you
24	can't ever go back to being your own
25	assessment union again. So I go up to

1	the assessor's office occasionally, get
2	an assessor's card. Twice I asked the
3	gentleman that does Village of
4	Greenport assessments, Bob Scott, I
5	said how do you assess these
6	properties? He said everything we do
7	is by the square foot. So if you're in
8	a two family, square foot. If it's a
9	single family, square foot. If it's a
10	four family, it's by the square foot,
11	it's not by use.
12	MR. TASKER: Yes, it is.
13	MR. CORWIN: Well, I don't agree
14	with you, and I'm speaking now. Once
15	again, I went through this this morning
16	with you, you ask Bob Scott how do they
17	assess property in Greenport, it's by
18	square foot, that's all. Garage,
19	different rate. Deck, different rate.
20	It's based upon square foot. I've
21	asked twice and got the same.
22	MR. PROKOP: That's the correct
23	answer by the way. As far as I know,
24	that's what they do. It's by square
25	footage.

L	MR. CORWIN: When the Village got
2	rid of it, I think it was a mistake
3	because if they were doing their own
1	assessments they could go and say hey,
ō	it's a four family house, you should
5	pay more taxes.

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I see on the village administrator's report that they're going to take out the drying beds and make an easement. I'm puzzled by that because I never heard that mentioned here. A few months ago there was an idea of well, build a new drying bed, put a vacuum pump in it. That didn't go. I said it wasn't going to work, Mr. Swiskey said it wasn't going to work, but Mr. Roberts said well, why don't you call up some other people and complain, not agreeing that the vacuum pumps wouldn't work. But I said to you before you take the drying beds out, because at one time some of those drying begs did work, why don't you try to see if you could make one or two of them work, and then you wouldn't have

1 such a big sludge problem.

This idea of one way on Main

Street would never work, but here's another idea that Bill Swiskey had that I think is brilliant. He says paint the parking spaces smaller so they're just for compact cars. Bill is right sometimes. He says paint the spaces smaller so that compact cars -- I ride my bicycle down there, I hate to drive down there, and I look at these SUV's in these spaces and I say why would anybody park there? You know you're going to lose your mirror to someone.

Let's go onto the short term

rentals. You're all -- the speakers

and you people yourselves as you

discussed it tonight, you're ignoring

the real problem with short term

rentals. They're taking rentals that

used to be for a year, two years, five

years, and you're turning them in for a

weekend. And yeah, the owners make a

lot of money, Tuesday ZBA a gentleman

on Center Street and Second Street

1	fixed up the house, beautiful. How
2	many units are you going to have?
3	Well, it's one now, but I'm going to
4	have two. Is it going to be short term
5	rentals? Well, I'd like to have long
6	term rentals, but you know, if my
7	budget, maybe I'm going to do short
8	term rentals. Anyone that fixes up a
9	house, buys a house for rental income
10	is going to do short term rentals, and
11	you're just letting all the apartment
12	units in Greenport disappear. Sorry
13	for taking so long. Thank you.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
15	Everybody has spoken. I'll offer a
16	motion to enter executive session to
17	talk about important issues with
18	personnel at 10:35.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Second.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: All opposed?
