L	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It is 5:05, and
2	welcome to the our Regular Meeting of the
3	Historic Preservation Commission. It is
1	August 5, 2013 and as we stated before, it
5	is now 5:06. We have three items on the
5	agenda tonight.

Let's start with No. 1, discussion and possible motion on an application submitted by David Glaser and Linda Plotkin, owners of the residential property located in the Historic District on -- we don't have a house number yet. The Building Inspector didn't know, it's between Center and North Streets, and as we found out, it's the southerly lot of the two. The owners intend to construct a new residence on this

17 empty lot. Suffolk County Tax Map #1001-4-2-35.2. Okay. Welcome to our 18 19 Historic Preservation Board Meeting. We're 20 very interested in knowing what you're 21 planning to put up in this historic 22 village. Now please state your --MR. GLASER: David Glaser. 23 24 MS. PLOTKIN: Linda Plotkin. 25 MEMBER WALOSKI: So this is a totally

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1 new construction? 2 MR. GLASER: This is a totally new 3 construction. It looks like Eileen 4 provided you some elevations. So this is a 5 modular house, one-story, Queen Anne style 6 home that we're looking to do. Linda is a 7 painter and has chosen the color scheme. 8 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Painter like artist? 9 10 MR. GLASER: Yes, an artist painter. Not a house painter. 11

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: That is a very

L4	MR. GLASER: Very important
L5	distinction to make. I refer to her on the
L6	colors.
L7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we will be
L8	talking to Linda.
L9	MR. GLASER: And so we're going to do
20	cedar.
21	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: These are the
22	questions that we're dealing with, I mean
23	I understand that you had to get a
24	variance?
25	MR. GLASER: We needed a variance

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2 were three feet.
3 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And you got the
4 variance?
5 MR. GLASER: We got the variance. We
6 actually had a meeting last week. Anyway,
7 so we do have the variance. So we're

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because the setbacks, the combined setbacks

- 8 cleared to go. And as I understand, your
- 9 concerns are just the visual?
- 10 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. Mostly,
- 11 yes.
- MR. GLASER: Now a question for you.
- How far back of the exterior are you
- 14 concerned about? It's not like we're going
- to be putting a Frank Gary?
- 16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Well, a chain
- 17 link fence is not something that we would
- approve but if it's a Frank Gary, we may
- 19 sit down and think about it. Well, we of
- 20 course would like to look at the entire
- 21 structure. Mostly importantly from Second
- 22 Street and the side elevations. I am sure,
- you know, once -- because it's a new
- construction, you're not going to start
- 25 with cedar siding and put up vinyl in the

1 back.

MR. GLASER: No, we're not. We're

3 going to do cedar all around.

4	MEMBER WALOSKI: And what about the
5	shingles?
6	MR. GLASER: Black asphalt roof.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Shingles, black?
8	MR. GLASER: Yes.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Are you sure
10	about that, Linda?
11	MS. PLOTKIN: Shall I take a seat?
12	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes.
13	MS. PLOTKIN: This is basically what
14	it's going to look like. This is I
15	originally had drawn this is very vague
16	and I thought that was much too bright. So
17	I thought that was much more.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So a dark roof?
19	MS. PLOTKIN: Yes. With a pecan color
20	cedar shingle on the whole house, with a
21	trim on the windows. And then a detail
22	around the windows. And inside the
23	windows, vanilla accent. There is another
24	color. I couldn't find a color exactly.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Have you picked

1	a window manufacturer?
2	MR. GLASER: Yes.
3	MS. PLOTKIN: We have some ideas on
4	the door too. Here are two options for
5	doors. That is the one that we chose. And
6	these are the windows.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: When it comes to
8	the mouldings, there are different styles
9	that you can select from. Are you going
LØ	with a diver that has a space bar in
L1	between?
L2	MS. PLOTKIN: This would be a grid. I
L3	think that the mullions would be on the
L4	outside. It looks more authentic.
L5	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Jeld Wen makes
L6	basically like Anderson.
L7	MEMBER MCMAHON: There is a whole
L8	variety. This indicates that it would be a
L9	thermopane window.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You have choices
71	as far as the woodwork and the mullions

22 You know, what we would like to see in the 23 Historic District is something that looks 24 more traditional, more real as far as the 25 windows are concerned. So yes, you're right. We want to see the mullions on the 1 outside. And you know, then there are 2 3 these options when you can have a spacer bar and the mullions on the outside. This 4

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looks more realistic and that is what we 5 6 would like to prefer. 7 MR. SWEIGART: If you want a picture, I can show you want you're talking about? 8

You want this wood --

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It doesn't have 10 11 to be wood. It could be composite.

MR. SWEIGART: It's not like it's on 12 13 the inside of the glass.

> CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: That is what we prefer in the Historic District. This is much nicer.

17 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.

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MS. PLOTKIN: It looks more authentic.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. It looks

like it's individual panes, but they're

not.

MS. PLOTKIN: Yes.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: This is what we

have to deal with now because the industry

is producing new products all the time.

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1 Okay. Now, you don't have a lot of mullions, I see. Are these double-hung 2 3 windows or casements? MR. GLASER: I was assuming that they 4 5 were double-hung. 6 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It says 7 double-hung. So this is the style. You have the grills that you just discussed 8 9 with the prairie style. 10 MEMBER WALOSKI: This one has a

different pattern then those.

MR. GLASER: Let me show you.

13	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I would assume
14	that it's all the same style.
15	MR. GLASER: Yeah.
16	MEMBER WALOSKI: This one looks like
17	it has a little border.
18	MR. GLASER: I am findings a window
19	that I think comes as close as possible.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Do you see this?
21	MR. GLASER: Yes. That's fine.
22	MEMBER WALOSKI: It's still within
23	keeping of the
24	MR. GLASER: Yes.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Now as far as

1	the design elements. You have some design
2	elements to embellish the facade from the
3	street. I just would like to know what
4	kind of material that is?
5	MR. GLASER: It's plycon.
6	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It doesn't say
7	Plycon here. Plycon is a company that
8	makes these decorative elements and

9 composite material, which we approve. It 10 looks like wood. It can be painted. It 11 doesn't have that cheesy. You're not going 12 to put these cheap looking plastic. 13 MR. GLASER: So you would approve 14 either plycon or wood? CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. 15 16 Absolutely. 17 MR. GLASER: It will be one of those 18 two. 19 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So the shingles will be natural. 20 21 MS. PLOTKIN: It will look authentic. 22 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So it will have 23 the color, which you call pecan?

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1 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Now as far as
2 the railing, it's 30 inches high from the
3 top of the deck. There was no dimension on

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that.

MS. PLOTKIN: Yes. Something close to

4 the height of the railing. Do you know 5 what the height of the railing is? The 6 building code does not require you to have 7 a railing at all if the deck is less than 30 inches off the ground. I am an 9 architect, so I don't like to see 36 or 34 inch higher railings, if they're not 10 11 required by code. If you're above 30 12 inches, then you have to go to 34, 36 13 inches. I would like to see the railing 14 much more lower because it's in-keeping with the traditional historic homes. I 15 mean, some of them are as low as 24-25 16 17 inches. As you ride along the Village, you will see the homes. It's a much nicer 18 It's all proportioned. A 36 inch 19 20 railing, looks out of place. Also, you can 21 always come back and talk with us. I am 22 just telling you, if it's less than 30 23 inches, you don't need it. 24 MS. PLOTKIN: Less than 30. That's 25 fine.

1 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And the 2 spindles, is it plycon. 3 MR. GLASER: The contractor that we're 4 using likes to use wood. 5 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Good. We like wood too. And will it be painted white? 6 7 Linda? 8 MR. GLASER: Is that your butter or 9 your vanilla? MS. PLOTKIN: Vanilla. 10 MEMBER WALOSKI: So it's a warm white. 11 12 Vanilla and the wood go nice together. 13 MS. PLOTKIN: Actually, this is the 14 vanilla. This will be green. So we will do this kind around the windows. 15 16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So what do you think about this, when you walk around the 17 18 Village and see green railings? 19 MS. PLOTKIN: Yes. I like it. What 20 would you suggest? 21 MEMBER WALOSKI: It's personal. It's

a little different but the color

24 of a rustic look. I see what she's trying

25 to do. She's trying to bring the green all

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the way through. So that is goes around.

2 MS. PLOTKIN: It's a very small

3 detail around the trim around the windows.

4 This would be nice to have this little

5 accent.

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6 MEMBER WALOSKI: It has a prairie
7 cottage look to it. It's not, you know,
8 Village looking white trim house. I have
9 no problem with it.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: The thing is,
Linda, the dark color railing doesn't show
as well. If you were to use a lighter
color, it would bump out a little bit. I
haven't seen dark railings in the Village.

MEMBER WALOSKI: I have seen them sort of at Soundview Road there. These are historical colors. I think it's in keeping

with prairie look and the period that she
is going for. And I don't see why her
vision can't be brought through.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I am just
asking. Everything project is new. It's
different. This is a new house.

MEMBER WALOSKI: The green might show

up nicely against the pecan.

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1 MS. PLOTKIN: Yes. MEMBER WALOSKI: I think that it 2 3 would. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You can ask your 4 5 designer, he or she could show you it. 6 Okay. 7 MEMBER WALOSKI: I think it has more of artistic look to it. 8 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Now, there was a indication on your plans with the 10 possibility to have solar panels? 11 12 MR. GLASER: Yes.

MS. PLOTKIN: That would be in the

back. 14 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You know that 15 16 there are a lot of trees on your property? MS. PLOTKIN: At this point. There 17 18 will be some. There is going to be a 19 driveway going up. 20 MR. GLASER: This is the wider -sorry, this got moved. You actually have 21 22 an earlier version. This is the side. So Linda's studio would be here. We were 23 looking for solar panels for that. We're 24

certainly proned to where the side

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entrance. This would be far back on the
lot. So it's set 12 feet back from the
sidewalk. That is another something feet
further.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Have you done
the research on it? Has someone told you
that it's feasible and effective?

MR. GLASER: No, we haven't.

9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: There is a lot
10	of trees.
11	MR. GLASER: The research that I have
12	done on solar panels, they actually want to
13	see the house on the site before they do
14	it. At this point that's something that we
15	would hope for.
16	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: This is an
17	interesting detail. So far we don't have a
18	lot of solar panels in the Historic
19	District. We have to come up with some
20	kind of a solution on how we're dealing
21	with this. All I can say, coming from
22	Europe, they have very strict rules on
23	saving energy. So they allow solar panels
24	even on historic structures and landmark
25	buildings.

1	MR. GLASER: Well, Germany has the
2	greatest amount of solar power.
2	CHATRMAN HELLENDAHL. This is

something that we need to be aware of

5 because this is the future. So I am not 6 opposed to this at all. I am just --7 MS. PLOTKIN: Well, we would have to wait until they actually do the work. 8 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: If it's in the back of the house, it might be a problem, 10 as far as I am concerned. But if it's 11 something that faces the street --12 13 MS. PLOTKIN: Right. 14 MR. GLASER: I am sympathetic to this. We're members of the Historic Preservation 15 16 un Greenwich Village Society. 17 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Greenwich Village in the city? 18 19 MR. GLASER: Yes. So we're both very -- we're aware of it. 20 21 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Where? MS. PLOTKIN: On Perry Street. 22 23 MEMBER WALOSKI: I used to live on 24 Bleecker between Charleston and Perry.

MR. GLASER: Wow.

Is there anyone

1 here that is not? 2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Lucy is not. 3 MR. GLASER: So we're sympathic. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So this is 4 5 something that we have to deal with. So is there any other questions as far as the 6 7 design is concerned? 8 MEMBER WALOSKI: No, the design is 9 good. 10 MR. GLASER: Do you know about solar 11 tubes? 12 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. 13 MR. GLASER: Instead of a big skylight, there are two companies that 14 15 manufacture a relatively small --16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Tunnel? 17 MR. GLASER: Solar tube tunnel that will bring daylight --18 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You should look 19 20 at one of those examples before you decide 21 to install it. 22 MR. GLASER: Okay.

23 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I don't think 24 that you will like it. MR. GLASER: I have a friend that 25 1 swears by it. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Well then talk 2 to another friend. 3 4 MR. GLASER: The point being, that 5 there would be a possibility of small tubes of that size that would be visible from the 6 street that would sit on the roof. 7 MS. PLOTKIN: But not as visible --8 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I know exactly 10

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what you're talking about. I am not opposed to this because it's a rather small detail. I don't know if you wold really like the effect of it. It sounds wonderful and yes, it brings in light, but there are other ways to bring in light. This is not a huge house.

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MS. PLOTKIN: Because it's one-story
there would not be that much sunlight

coming through our windows. So that's why
we thought this would be a good idea.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: As far as I am
concerned, I don't have a problem with it,
but I don't like them personally. I don't
think it will do you good. It will bring
in some light.

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1 MR. GLASER: I don't want to travel 2 down to North Carolina to see someone's 3 bedroom. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You will have 5 some trees, probably obstructing some of the view. This is an attic; right? 6 7 MR. GLASER: Yes. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You can do a 8 regular skylight and frame this 9 accordingly. And make this a nice interior 10 11 experience. You will cathedral ceiling 12 this portion that you want to bring light 13 There are different ways.

14	MEMBER WALOSKI: I have skylights on a
15	barn that I put in when I moved here. They
16	were constructed in aluminum. You might
17	want to look my barn is on Carpenter's
18	Street. And I had them constructed by a
19	company in Brooklyn and they sit like the
20	skylights that were on the brownstones.
21	They're very elegant. It's just a
22	suggestion. They were not tremendously
23	expensive to put in.
24	MS. PLOTKIN: We have to work on that.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: The attic is for

1	storage?
2	MS. PLOTKIN: Yes, for storage.
3	MEMBER WALOSKI: You know, that is ho
4	they used to build those brownstone's. So
5	I had an attic, but when it went it was
6	all the way up. When you were in the
7	attic, it had walls around it. Like a
8	donut.

MS. PLOTKIN: Since we're talking

about curb appeal, then would the skylights 10 11 be more visible than the sonotubes? 12 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes but they have 13 that house construction. They look very 14 period. 15 MS. PLOTKIN: They do? Okay. 16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: They will be visible. But it's on the side anyway's. 17 18 MR. GLASER: Right. 19 MEMBER WALOSKI: You can have it 20 pitched any way you want. 21 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Well, you're 22 talking about your skylight, which is 23 something like this? 24 MEMBER WALOSKI: Right.

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- 1 this works in a space like your studio,
- 2 maybe. It may not work up front, where you

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: But Caroline,

3 have a different layout.

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4 MEMBER WALOSKI: This is the back,

5	right?
6	MR. GLASER: Yes.
7	MEMBER WALOSKI: This is something
8	that can be just looked into.
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I am not too
LØ	concerned about this. That is my
11	point-of-view if you decide to go with the
12	tunnels. You may want to increase the size
L3	of the windows if you want to increase the
L4	light. I think that would be my first
L5	choice, as opposed to putting in some fake
L6	light. It would look fake.
L7	MS. PLOTKIN: The tubes from the
L8	outside?
L9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. It's
20	covered with glass. You would see some
21	daylight.
22	MS. PLOTKIN: There are two styles
23	that we have seen. One is kind of a bubble
24	glass. The other one is flat.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: The flat one you

1 would choose? 2 MS. PLOTKIN: The flat one I would 3 choose. It would be less visible than a 4 skylight. 5 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So are there any 6 other questions on this new construction? 7 Lucy? Dennis? MEMBER CLARK: No. 8 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Since you're so 10 engaged in this design --MEMBER WALOSKI: I just like what 11 12 they're doing. I just want them to have 13 what they want. I like where they're 14 going. 15 I make a motion that we accept the 16 design proposed by David Glaser and Linda Plotkin. 17 MEMBER MCMAHON: I'll second. 18 19 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: All in favor? 20 MEMBER CLARK: Aye. 21 MEMBER MCMAHON: Aye. 22 MEMBER WALOSKI: Aye. 23 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Aye.

1	MS. PLUTKIN: Thank you.
2	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we're moving
3	onto Item No. 2, discussion and possible
4	motion on an application submitted by Julia
5	Moran and James Betz, the owners of the
6	residential property located in the
7	Historic District at 809 Main Street.
8	They wish to have paint samples approved
9	for the exterior of their residence.
LØ	Suffolk County Tax Map # 1001-2-1-26.
11	Julia and Jim are not here. I did
L2	speak with Julia this afternoon and told
L3	her we're going to talk about the paint
L4	samples, which most of us have seen.
L5	MEMBER CLARK: I have not.
L6	Can we not take care of the gentleman
L7	that is sitting here?
L8	MR. SWEIGART: That would be nice.

19 MEMBER CLARK: Please.
20 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: This is a
21 relatively short. Everyone has seen -22 MEMBER CLARK: I haven't.
23 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You haven't.
24 MEMBER MCMAHON: I have. I remember
25 seeing paint samples.

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1 MEMBER WALOSKI: I saw some samples that they had put on the house itself. The 2 3 color scheme looked lovely. 4 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I have seen 5 I took a photo. They have already 6 started painting. So this is -- I have no 7 problems with it. It's a blueish-white. 8 MEMBER MCMAHON: It's beautiful. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's beautiful. 9 10 And I have no problem with them continuing to paint and I have no problem. 11 I don't 12 want them to keep continuing to come back. 13 MEMBER MCMAHON: I agree. 14 MEMBER WALOSKI: It's a light Robin's

- 15 Egg Blue. It's very pretty.
- 16 MEMBER MCMAHON: That's fantastic.
- 17 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So may I have a
- 18 motion to accept the colors?
- 19 MEMBER MCMAHON: I will make a motion
- 20 to accept the application for Julia Moran
- 21 and James Betz.
- 22 MEMBER WALOSKI: I will second the
- 23 motion.

- 24 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: All in favor?
- MEMBER MCMAHON: Aye.

- 2 MEMBER CLARK: I'll abstain.
- 3 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Aye. Yes. You

MEMBER WALOSKI: Aye.

- 4 have to have to abstain. So the motion
- 5 carries, 3 Aye's and 1 abstention.
- 6 MEMBER CLARK: Did you guys even get
- 7 an application?
- 8 MR. ABATELLI: It's really a
- 9 consultation.

10	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: She's taking
11	care of it. There is no building permit
12	application required. There will be a
13	building permit application if they start
14	making structural changes.
15	So Item No. 3, discussion and possible
16	on an application submitted by Michael
17	Sweigart, the owner of the commercial
18	property located at 429 Main Street. He
19	wishes to change the first floor window and
20	paint the exterior. I don't even know what
21	you're trying to do, Michael.
22	MR. SWEIGART: It's not the first
23	floor windows.
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I didn't get the
25	application until today. I don't know what

- 1 you're trying to do. Pull up a chair.
- 2 MR. SWEIGART: I will explain it to
- 3 you.
- 4 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Eileen said it's
- 5 painting and windows. It's all I know.

6 MR. SWEIGART: I didn't realize this 7 until today. There are too many things 8 going on. All I am doing now, Caroline, 9 the other day was trying to figure out what 10 colors and I had a meeting today. Sorry I 11 didn't answer you. I had everyone and it's brother asking me questions. I will end up 12 with a drab white, like the rest of the 13 14 town. I sort-of got out voted by the other 15 partners in crime. And so, you won't have -- I don't have any colors right now. Here 16 17 is a picture of the building. I want to 18 put blue trim on. There was a burgundy 19 there. There was a dark blue. The only 20 thing is when you start putting a blue trim 21 here and you start doing the shutters, with 22 the light blue, that doesn't look right. 23 So we're probably going to do white all 24 there. It's going to be called Times 25 Vintage. It will be written in black.

1 That will be in black. And I would like to 2 convince my cohorts, maybe a little 3 something at the top of the windows. Try and get something in there of a different 5 color. I would like to see this blue here. It's the Benjamin Moore color and maybe put 6 7 that on the facia board. 8 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So Michael, 9 you're painting the entire front? 10 MR. SWEIGART: And the front building. 11 We basically, we're thinking about covering 12 the stucco but once we cleaned it, it didn't look so bad. So I left it alone. 13 And that is one expensive operation. So I 14 guess at this point, what we have done, 15 I've got Anderson inserts and I am going to 16 17 frame -- the frame is good enough. 18 going to keep it. The frame is going to 19 look identical. And basically, I want to keep it the same. The front doors, if you 20 21 look at this front door, it has the six 22 panes at the top, which sort of fits in

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style with this.

1	MR. SWEIGART: Yes, I didn't know, but
2	the frames are the old ones. We have to
3	replace a few of the crown mouldings. Like
4	for instance, here, we found the
5	replacement. The trim right here is rotted
6	out and has to get replaced here.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we're looking
8	at a front elevation. We're talking about
9	the trim facing the street with parts that
10	are rotten. So they are going to be
11	replaced with wood and painted white?
12	MR. SWEIGART: Yes. This door here is
13	a wider door. This is a 7 foot door. So
14	what I have decided to do, rather than do a
15	white fiberglass door with mullions that I
16	think looks terrible, is to go with a
17	mahogany and the wood mullions, which is
18	what we have. So the other side will not
19	match.

MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.

MR. SWEIGART: There is a mailbox slot
on both of them because that is what was
there. They will both be stained with
mahogany. This parts looks okay. This

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doesn't look right. So I can't do that.

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1 The mahogany stain might darken it up a little bit. 2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You mentioned 3 stucco? 4 5 MR. SWEIGART: The original stucco. 6 Well, the whole building on the side -- not 7 over here. This is all wood in the front. 8 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: That stays 9 white? 10 MR. SWEIGART: Yes. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: And the stucco 11 12 is white?

MR. SWEIGART: That is going to stay

white. They looked actually fairly decent.

15 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I will have to 16 take a look at them. 17 MR. SWEIGART: What I am going to do also, underneath the socket on the first 18 19 floor and here, there is a color called 20 something white, and all it is a white. 21 It's really, really light. You can't even 22 tell it's a blue. It's already even 23 painted underneath there. You can't even 24 tell. 25 MEMBER WALOSKI: Okay. It's a little

- 1 accent color. I think it's nice.
- 2 MR. SWEIGART: I think that is it.
- 3 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: The replacement
- 4 windows are already in, right?
- 5 MR. SWEIGART: Yes. The only thing
- 6 that I did different is, I did the 6 over
- 7 1. It was 1 over 1. It really didn't look
- 8 as good.
- 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So who caught
- 10 you?

11	MR. SWEIGART: Nobody caught me. She
12	actually came by and thought I was painting
13	it. Then my daughter and my ex-girlfriend
14	came and I sort of got out voted.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Our problem is
16	always new merchants and sometimes don't
17	know that they're in the Historic District
18	in Greenport.
19	MR. SWEIGART: I did know that.
20	However, I didn't know that putting the
21	actual frame of the windows, that I had to
22	do that. I wasn't actually touching the
23	frames.
24	MEMBER WALOSKI: So there is nothing
25	on the bottom floor?

MR. SWEIGART: No. Nothing on the bottom floor.

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Disregard what I said about changing the window on the first floor. I didn't have the application until

- 6 five minutes before the meeting.
- 7 MR. SWEIGART: That was my fault.
- 8 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes.
- 9 Unfortunately. That is why I just got this
- 10 application.
- 11 MEMBER CLARK: I saw no paperwork for
- 12 Item No. 2. I have paperwork for this
- gentleman. I saw nothing for the other
- one. Nothing.
- 15 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.
- 16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: What I said, I
- 17 didn't get it until the meeting started.
- 18 MEMBER CLARK: I was saying that there
- 19 was nothing on Item No.2. I wasn't saying
- that there was nothing on this gentleman's
- 21 application.
- 22 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Item No. 2, just
- for clarification, this was distributed by
- 24 e-mail, I believe to all of us, by the
- 25 Building Inspector.

2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes. 3 MEMBER CLARK: There was an e-mail saying that there was a painter there if 5 you wanted to stop by. 6 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It doesn't 7 matter. So are there any other questions? 8 MR. SWEIGART: You know, I am a firm believer of keeping it older. 9 MEMBER WALOSKI: The only reason why I 10 11 spoke to you --12 MR. SWEIGART: Again, I am sorry. 13 MEMBER WALOSKI: I just wanted to tell 14 you that any color that you have to run it 15 by the --16 MR. SWEIGART: Right. I know you guys 17 met on Monday. I'm sorry.
