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1	MAYOR NYCE: Being 6:07, I will call
2	this meeting to order. Please, join me in
3	the Pledge of Allegiance.
4	(Pledge of Allegiance.)
5	MAYOR NYCE: Please remain standing for
6	a Moment of Silence for Mary T. Avlon,
7	Cornelius Charles Richard, Jr., and Ken
8	Diamond.
9	(Moment of Silence.)
10	MAYOR NYCE: It is unusual, but I
11	would like to extend this, Trustee Kempner's
12	mom passed away last week. She is outside
13	the District but I would like to extend
14	another moment of silence for her and her
15	family and let her know that she is in our
16	thoughts. Let's have another moment of

17 silence for Ann Kempner.

18	(Moment of Silence.)
19	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you very much. You
20	may be seated. Out thoughts and prayers go
21	out to the Kempner Family. Please bare with
22	us, obviously we are having some technical
23	difficulties with the PA, and the fellow
24	that generally runs it, is not here. I have
25	several announcements. The first one is the

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1	new website is up and running and we are
2	constantly upgrading. We are looking for
3	comments from people on how we can improve
4	and make it more user friendly. The address
5	is www.villageofgreenport.org.
6	The Village offices will be closed on
7	October 10th in observance of Columbus Day.
8	The Village, in conjunction with the school,
9	the high school, will host the annual
10	Halloween Parade. We will post that on the
11	website and Suffolk Times and Patch will
12	know about it. We will get it out to as many

13	people as possible, and to let you know the
14	date when it's available. The Greenport
15	Fire Department will perform the annual
16	hydrant testing on the 30th of October from
17	9:00 till noon. We recommend that you not
18	do laundry at that time, as it will be
19	perfect for the next day. So that will be
20	going throughout the Village 9:00 till noon
21	on October 30th.
22	So announcements of public interest.
23	The first one is, we discussed at great
24	length at the Work Session, people with
25	special needs. When a storm or a major event

1	is taking place and people with special
2	needs it became apparent that the
3	definition of Special Needs should be a
4	little bit, should be finer and a little bit
5	more clear. Special needs in a sense, of
6	what we are talking about, if you need any
7	medical attention of any sort, not just, you

8	are not ambulatory but if you need any
9	medical attention or you are under some
10	medical attention whereby you absolutely
11	need some sort of electricity, you need to
12	let us know in advance. None of the
13	shelters have backup generation. Therefore,
14	if power goes out and you need electricity
15	or a respirator or something else, we need
16	to get you some place else. The Suffolk
17	County, has the Suffolk County Joint
18	Emergency Evacuation Program or JEEP. The
19	phone numbers are 631-852-4900 or
20	631-853-8333. We will continue to announce
21	this. Please take this very seriously and
22	get this information out to us. If you have
23	any questions, please call Village Hall. We
24	need to plan in advance for this. When the
25	storm happens, it's already too late. There

1	is also a website. If you Google and type in
2	Suffolk County, all written out and J-E-E-P,
3	it will take you to the website and give you

4	the information there as well. In addition,
5	please call Village Hall and ask for Clerk
6	Pirillo and lets make sure that the Village
7	has a list of people with Special Needs.
8	There will be a volunteer clean-up
9	effort on Moore's Lane drains from 9:00 a.m.
10	to 3:00 p.m. on October 22nd. Those wishing
11	to volunteer should please bring their own
12	rakes and gloves. What we are doing is the
13	preliminary step of removing leaves,
14	branches, etcetera, that have fallen in the
15	drain. This is a preliminary effort to
16	ascertain how functional our engineer
17	wetland is. The DEC is working with us.
18	This is Step 1 and we are going to see how
19	much we can get done in six hours worth of
20	work. We have a number of volunteers and
21	this is going to take place a number of
22	times to do this throughout the Fall.
23	The next announcement is to please,
24	make people aware that the dumping of
25	household garbage in Village trash

1	receptacles is against the law and will be
2	prosecuted accordingly. More and more, we
3	are having people dump in the trash cans
4	downtown or near and around dumpsters in the
5	Village, and we will be working with the
6	Village Attorney and Code Enforcement and we
7	will be prosecuted of those who are dumping
8	household garbage in public facilities. Just
9	in getting the tourists trash out let alone
10	household garbage. If you are a tenant and
11	unsure about trash removal, please contact
12	the building owner or landlord. They are in
13	general, responsible for making sure you
14	have a facility to remove your household
15	trash.
16	We have one public notice. That is
17	Business Two R's 8 LLC D/B/A Scrimshaw
18	Restaurant, is going for a liquor license
19	renewal. They have submitted a liquor
20	license renewal application and was received
21	on September 12th. As per SLA Regulations,

22	there is a 30-day comment period as in our
23	interim policy full blown new SLA liquor
24	license policy. We are announcing this to
25	the public, anybody wishing to comment, can

1 do that as SLA, if they have an issue with 2 this.

The next portion of the agenda is the public to address the Board. At this point, I will open it up if there is someone that wishes to address the Board, you can do so at this time. If I can have your name and address for the record.

9 MR. WINKLER: John Winkler, 25 Fifth 10 Street. I just wanted to give an update on 11 the Friends of Fifth Street Park Agenda, and we have had a great response from the 12 13 neighbors and I spoken to Southside Landscaping and they are donating their 14 labor for the Fall cleanup of the perimeter 15 16 and then the spring, they are going to do the mulch and the plants or whatever else we 17

18	want to provide them. And they're donating
19	labor. We just have to take out for
20	materials. We're very happy they have
21	stepped up to the plate for us and I think
22	this is a situation where a lot of the
23	contractors in the Village would probably
24	help the Village, if someone went and asked
25	them. So I don't know if there is a

1	procedure for that, adoption or anything
2	that they can do. I think it should be
3	something that you should look into because
4	I got a lot of responses. Okay. Thank
5	you.
6	MAYOR NYCE: And thank you for your
7	volunteer effort. Anyone else wish to speak
8	and address the Board?
9	MS. HELINSKI: My name is Claudia
10	Helinski, 625 Second Street, Greenport, New
11	York. For the last 13 years I have been the
12	proprietor of the Salamander General Store.

13	Here in the Village, my husband and I were
14	owners of the Salamander Cafe for 6 years
15	before that. I am most fortunate to work in
16	an occupation that I love and live in a
17	place that I love. In November 2010, my
18	husband and I were invited to be
19	stakeholders in the Local Waterfront
20	Revitalization Program and were asked to
21	identify Village strengths and weaknesses
22	and all agreed that parking was one of the
23	biggest problems the Village faced. This
24	situation has not improved. Local businesses
25	paying increased costs must rely on

municipal parking places for customers. In fact, our own Village Planning Board

2	fact, our own Village Planning Board
3	requires that potential businesses to
4	describe the parking that will be available
5	at their locations. Even businesses like
6	mine that have adjacent parking areas need
7	to rely upon municipal parking places for
8	their customers and they may need to do

1

9	their local errands in the Village. We
10	thank the Planning Board for their service
11	to the Village and respectfully request that
12	they return the largest municipal parking
13	area in Greenport to the general public use
14	on Saturday's. Thank you.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
16	MS. CLARK: Hi, I am Karen Clark and I
17	live at 192 Fifth Street. I understand from
18	the Work Session that the parking situation
19	is going to be addressed by the Floyd
20	Memorial Library. So it is going to be
21	addressed by various Board committees. I
22	would hope that the residents that live
23	close to the library would be notified of
24	all meetings and that there input would have
25	some type of effect.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. Just so you
2	know, the next step to take from this Board
3	has been passed on to the Code Committee.

4	MS. CLARK: Thank you.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Karen, be rest assured
6	that we will make sure that everyone
7	involved in the Code Committee will have to
8	go through that process. If the Code
9	Committee has something that they would like
10	to recommend as an amendment, they will have
11	to set up a public hearing and that will
12	also be noticed and the public can be given
13	an opportunity to address the Board and the
14	proposed code amendment. There is quite a
15	process.
16	MS. CLARK: You will notify?
17	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
18	MS. CLARK: We have a lot of
19	residences that live in the City and aren't
20	here but hopefully they can write or e-mail
21	their input.
22	MAYOR NYCE: We are trying to adhere
23	to the regulations the ZBA has, I think 120
24	feet of the property line be notified. So we
25	will also make sure that there is

1 announcements on the website's.

2	MS. CLARK: Yes, because rumors can
3	get out of hand. So if we are all on the
4	same page. That would be great.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
6	MS. CLARK: Thank you.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Any one else
8	wish to address the Board?
9	MS. JACQUILLARD: Hi, my name is
10	Arlene Jacquillard. 4475 Alex Lane,
11	Mattituck. My husband and I and partners,
12	own the Greenport Laundromat. Seems to me
13	that the problem is parking today. We have
14	no objection whatsoever to Farmers' Markets.
15	I think they are wonderful. There is so many
16	all over the country. I just think that the
17	main parking lot in the Village is not the
18	place for it. My business on Saturday is
19	down 50%. My customers can not carry their
20	laundry from blocks away. They set of these
21	booths and they parking is used for their
22	employees. There is no parking for then my

23	customers. I think it is a wonderful venue
24	but I think there might be a better place
25	and location for this. And I thought that if

1	I bring it up this time, maybe they could
2	think of another location that might be more
3	appropriate and not affect all year-round
4	businesses. That's it.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
6	MS. WICKHAM: Good evening. My name is
7	Abigail Wickham and I live in Mattituck, New
8	York. I am here tonight representing the
9	Second Street Association in respect to the
10	Second Street Building. I would like to
11	briefly address the Board on that eyesore,
12	which has been disgracing the neighborhood
13	for over three and a half years. We have
14	spoken to the Building Inspector, the
15	Village Attorney and we have attempted to
16	have an alliance and in dealing directly
17	with the issue of the buildings presence. We

18	are confident that the Village does
19	appreciate the gravity of the situation. We
20	do deal and maintain and imperative that the
21	building be removed immediately. And that
22	with NFHA is ready. That they can rebuild
23	the structure with a new dwelling and
24	changing it's plan to conform to the usage
25	requirements of the Village Code in

1	proposing a two-family dwelling on that
2	site. However, we are concerned about the
3	process of obtaining the permits, obtaining
4	the contracts to build, obtaining plumbing
5	and actually proceeding with construction.
6	It can take a very long time and the
7	neighborhood can not endure the building to
8	remain as it is, while that process
9	continues. For over three and a half years,
10	as you know, have passed that the
11	neighborhood has been dealing with this
12	problem. The decision of housing alliance
13	to comply with one building code is not a

14	good enough reason why the building remains
15	a nuisance. It's a health hazard. We have
16	again asked that the Housing Alliance to
17	remove the building immediately. It is
18	eminent that from looking at this, that the
19	information that we have, the cheapest,
20	fastest and easiest way to rebuild a
21	two-family residence here would be to remove
22	the existing building and then rebuild. The
23	existing structure, is damaged, rotten,
24	molded and lead paint infested and could be
25	removed in no time at all. While they

1	continue with their permit process, their
2	reviews and their financing, the Housing
3	Alliance can allow the foundation to be
4	aired out, dried out and exposed to light
5	and then go in a way to rebuild with these
6	new materials and conform to current code.
7	While there has been recent process in
8	minimizing the plans to the Building

9 Department, this should not generate yet another long period of time for that to 10 remove the nuisance. That time was years 11 ago. We want to ensure that the Village 12 13 understands and the Housing Alliance 14 understands that if the Village issues a 15 permit to rebuild, that is and of itself 16 does not resolve the issue. The building 17 does remain a terrible nuisance. Therefore 18 urge you to keep up your efforts and abate 19 this nuisance. We trust that if a permit is 20 issued, there will be strict conformance 21 with village requirements to code and that 22 the Village will keep the Housing Alliance 23 on a tight leash to adhere to the code. This 24 can only be accomplished if the building is 25 removed now. Once there is any hesitation on

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1	part of the Housing Alliance to eliminate
2	the nuisance, we expect that the Village
3	will proceed to renovate it. We do thank you
4	for your efforts in this regard and we will

5	continue to request to have this matter
6	addressed promptly in manner and I thank you
7	for your time.
8	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Is there
9	anyone else that wishes to address the
10	Board?
