| 10 | remain standing for a moment of |
| 11 | silence for Anna M. Ciacia, |

| 14 | Gardiner, Frank R. Kruszeski, |

| 19 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |
| 20 | You may be seated. |
| 21 | Okay. I just have a few |
| 22 | announcements. Trustee |
| 23 | Martilotta is away. He will not |
| 24 | be joining us tonight. |
| 25 | Paul Maffettone of Michael's |

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| 2 | Hope will host a Narcan workshop |
| 3 | at the Old Schoolhouse from 5:30 |
| 4 | - 7:30 p.m. on March 31, 2016. |
| 5 | Anybody interested is |
| 6 | welcome to come on down there. |
| 7 | They are going to be giving out |
| 8 | free Narcan kits for people to |
| 9 | have at home in case you ever |
| 10 | have an emergency or something. |
| 11 | Its available to them. And he |
| 12 | is going to do a discuss on |
| 13 | Heroine use and stuff and |
| 14 | counteract the drug I should |

| 16 | The Annual Organizational |
| 17 | Meeting will be held on April |

| L2 | So we will move onto Erin |
| L3 | Short and Tall Ships of America. |
| L4 | MS. SHORT: It is so, so |
| 15 | great to be back in Greenport. |
| 16 | You have no idea. Darlene, my |
| L7 | co-worker and I have been so |
| 18 | excited all week just to be |
| L9 | here. |
| 20 | So my name is Erin Short. I |
| 21 | am the Tall Ships Challenge |
| 22 | manager with Tall Ships America. |
| 23 | We are a National Member |
| 24 | Organization based in Newport, |
| 25 | Rhode Island. We support the |

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| 2 | people, ships and programs of |
| 3 | sail training and tall ships |
| 4 | through professional development |
| 5 | grants, sail training |
| 6 | scholarships, conferences and |
| 7 | public events. |
| 8 | One of the things that we do |
| 9 | one of the public events that |
| 10 | we do is that we organize the |
| 11 | tall ships challenge series and |
| 12 | it is a way to help promote our |
| 13 | ships and their programs through |
| 14 | maritime events and races. Our |
| 15 | host port partners use these |
| 16 | events to showcase their |
| 17 | communities and their maritime |
| 18 | history while also bringing |
| 19 | money into the local economy. |
| 20 | 2015 marked the third time |
| 21 | Greenport has hosted the ships. |
| 22 | You knew what you were getting |
| 23 | into and yet you persevered. To |
| 24 | be a Tall Ships Challenge port |
| 25 | you must be creative, |

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| 2 | resourceful and enthusiastic. |
| 3 | It helps, of course, to have a |
| 4 | strong team around you. Your |
| 5 | community, your stakeholders, |
| 6 | sponsors, volunteers and staff. |
| 7 | I would like to recognize and |
| 8 | thank Kit Lizette (phonetic) and |
| 9 | Captain Jack LeBeau (phonetic), |
| 10 | Shoreside and Waterside |
| 11 | Operations. And Jeanmarie and |
| 12 | Sylvia, Paul, the Tall Ships |
| 13 | Hearing Committee and Mayor |
| 14 | Hubbard and the Business |
| 15 | Improvement District and the |
| 16 | East End Seaport Museum. Thank |
| 17 | you guys so, so much. |
| 18 | So this part of the year we |
| 19 | recognize the hard work, the |
| 20 | professionalism and again the |
| 21 | enthusiasm you showed throughout |
| 22 | those four days in July. It is |
| 23 | my absolute honor to present the |
| 24 | Tall Ships 2015 Court of the |
| 25 | Year Award to the Village of |

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| 2 | Greenport. |
| 3 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you |
| 4 | very much. Okay. I would like |
| 5 | to just thank Erin for coming |
| 6 | out with that nice presentation. |
| 7 | That is beautiful. We will hang |
| 8 | it up in Village Hall. |
| 9 | First we want to thank the |
| 10 | Village Board members, the |
| 11 | Steering Committee, all the |
| 12 | volunteers, the sponsors. |
| 13 | Everybody that did this. |
| 14 | Without all of us pulling |
| 15 | together and working on this, it |
| 16 | never would have happened. |
| 17 | It was a very memorable day |
| 18 | for me. I had just become mayor |
| 19 | when this actually happened. |
| 20 | And doing interviews for French |
| 21 | t.v. and stuff like that. It |
| 22 | was a real thrill for me. It |
| 23 | was interesting but, you know, |
| 24 | it was different. The reception |
| 25 | hall the whole thing. |

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| 2 | Greenport shined. Greenport |
| 3 | looked great. Everybody worked |
| 4 | together toward a common goal. |
| 5 | There were no issues. No |
| 6 | problems. The volunteers kept |
| 7 | everybody in order. Everything |
| 8 | went really nice. Greenport |
| 9 | shined really bright. |
| 10 | And I just want to thank the |
| 11 | whole community who put up with |
| 12 | traffic. Trouble getting to |
| 13 | IGA, whatever, for the four |
| 14 | days. We all did a great job |
| 15 | and Greenport looked really |
| 16 | good. And I am honored to |
| 17 | accept that on behalf of |
| 18 | everybody because the whole |
| 19 | community did this. I just want |
| 20 | to thank everybody for that. |
| 21 | Okay. We have some regular |
| 22 | business that we have to take |
| 23 | care of also. Public Hearings, |
| 24 | we have a public hearing that |
| 25 | was withdrawn by the applicant |

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| 2 | for 24 Beach Road. We will not |
| 3 | be having that this evening. |
| 4 | We have a Public Hearing on |
| 5 | a proposed amendment to Chapter |
| 6 | 132 (Vehicle and Traffic) of the |
| 7 | Greenport Village Code, creating |
| 8 | new parking regulations. |
| 9 | Yes, anybody who was here |
| 10 | for that, you can go. You are |
| 11 | welcome to stay but you don't |
| 12 | have to. We will just give them |
| 13 | a second. Thank you. |
| 14 | Okay, the public hearing on |
| 15 | the new traffic tickets. We |
| 16 | signed a contract with FBS. |
| 17 | They have been working on our |
| 18 | traffic tickets. That is who |
| 19 | does the Southold Town tickets |
| 20 | now. We are trying to |
| 21 | coordinate our tickets to mirror |
| 22 | what Southold has as their |
| 23 | tickets. The public hearing is |
| 24 | to add other chapters or to |
| 25 | define the chapters that will be |

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| 2 | on our parking ticket and they |
| 3 | way we are going to enforce |
| 4 | them. The actual I have a |
| 5 | sample of the ticket here. It |
| 6 | is really everything that is in |
| 7 | our code. We are just taking it |
| 8 | and putting it all down of a |
| 9 | piece of paper. These this |
| 10 | is getting printed today. The |
| 11 | final part they were working on, |
| 12 | making sure each chapter was in |
| 13 | there. |
| 14 | So we are little late in |
| 15 | getting this out to the public. |
| 16 | We have to review it, hold a |
| 17 | public hearing on. We can |
| 18 | circulate it. We are not going |
| 19 | to vote on it this evening. |
| 20 | Anybody who wants to see it. |
| 21 | Anybody who wants to comment on |
| 22 | the idea of it. |
| 23 | All of it is in our Code. |
| 24 | Vehicles being parked, |
| 25 | handicapped zones, illegal |

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| 2 | parking, parking in a bus stops |
| 3 | It is all the general stuff we |
| 4 | have. But we needed a public |
| 5 | hearing to change our ticket |
| б | format. |
| 7 | So that is what we have |
| 8 | here. It is basically going to |
| 9 | be the same as Southold Town's |
| 10 | tickets. |
| 11 | So I will open up to the |
| 12 | floor. If anybody wants to |
| 13 | discuss the parking ticket |
| 14 | issue. |
| 15 | MR. SWISKEY: William |
| 16 | Swiskey. 184 Fifth Street. |
| 17 | This is kind of small and hard |
| 18 | to see. |
| 19 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. |
| 20 | MR. SWISKEY: Something |
| 21 | caught my eye. It says Parked |
| 22 | on Johnson Place. So we are |
| 23 | going to enforce no parking at |
| 24 | the Fifth and Sixth Street park |
| 25 | this year on that road? |

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| 2 | MAYOR HUBBARD: On that |
| 3 | road, yes. |
| 4 | MS. SWISKEY: All right |
| 5 | because the neighbors have been |
| 6 | hollering about it for a while. |
| 7 | It happens every weekend. There |
| 8 | are cars parked. Do you have |
| 9 | somebody that is going to do it? |
| 10 | And are we going to put the |
| 11 | signs up? |
| 12 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe |
| 13 | the signs are still there, Bill. |
| 14 | I believe the the signs were |
| 15 | there the last time I checked. |
| 16 | It is something that is in |
| 17 | the Code. Yes, we are going to |
| 18 | be enforcing that, trying to |
| 19 | keep people out of there so you |
| 20 | can drive through that area. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: All right. |
| 22 | Thank you. |
| 23 | MAYOR HUBBARD: You're |
| 24 | welcome. |
| 25 | MR. SOLOMAN: I'm Michael |

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| 2 | Soloman. I just noticed this |
| 3 | for the first time and I saw it |
| 4 | before. I'm an attorney also. |
| 5 | You have Other Vehicle Codes |
| 6 | and under vehicle codes you have |
| 7 | allowing the dog to run at |
| 8 | large, allow dog to chase or |
| 9 | harass any person. I think the |
| 10 | way this ticket is set up now is |
| 11 | not proper. Those are not |
| 12 | vehicle codes. If you look at |
| 13 | I don't know if you have the |
| 14 | ticket in front of you. I think |
| 15 | somebody better pay attention to |
| 16 | that. |
| 17 | I see it I looked |
| 18 | quickly. I don't see anything |
| 19 | about the unlawful you have |
| 20 | to remove snow, which I know is |
| 21 | a big violation that goes on, if |
| 22 | we are going to use it for all |
| 23 | code violations. I know we |
| 24 | talked about a vehicle code |
| 25 | amendment but you have other |

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| 2 | things here that you have |
| 3 | denominated improperly. I guess |
| 4 | it is something that Mr. Prokop |
| 5 | will take a look at, I assume. |
| 6 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe it |
| 7 | is just to put everything on to |
| 8 | one ticket so they can use that |
| 9 | for everything as they are doing |
| LO | it. |
| 11 | MR. CASKER: Good evening. |
| 12 | Arthur Casker (phonetic) from |
| 13 | Beach Street. I want to speak a |
| L 4 | little bit more broadly about |
| 15 | this whole idea of the parking |
| 16 | violations, tickets and so |
| 17 | forth. And I am very concerned |
| 18 | that the aspect or the prospect |
| 19 | of enforcing various dimensions |
| 20 | of the Village Code we are going |
| 21 | to lose the sight of the fact |
| 22 | that what we are after is |
| 23 | enforcement and not revenue |
| 24 | generation. Because frankly, I |
| 25 | see sugar plums dancing in the |

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| 2 | heads of the Village Board and |
| 3 | others associated with the |
| 4 | Village in terms of how much |
| 5 | money the Village is going to |
| 6 | take in by rigid enforcement of |
| 7 | every code violation that can be |
| 8 | followed. Whereas, before the |
| 9 | whole idea behind this, if I |
| 10 | recall correctly, was enforcing |
| 11 | of parking regulations. And now |
| 12 | it is looking like a pile on for |
| 13 | everything you can think of. It |
| 14 | might be used to ticket someone |
| 15 | to generate revenue. |
| 16 | In conjunction with that I |
| 17 | see the juxtaposition of that |
| 18 | with the contract that has been |
| 19 | recently entered into with FBS |
| 20 | to collect the village tickets |
| 21 | that I guess are not paid on the |
| 22 | spot or paid in town hall or |
| 23 | however that operation works. |
| 24 | But I see particularly |
| 25 | because it was mentioned and |

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| 2 | it wasn't clear to me how it was |
| 3 | going to work at the last work |
| 4 | session that FBS, I believe, |
| 5 | is going to be permitted to tack |
| 6 | on fees, fines and additional |
| 7 | charges onto the specific |
| 8 | penalty for the violation. And |
| 9 | frankly, it begins to sound like |
| 10 | exactly what the city of |
| 11 | Ferguson, Missouri has just been |
| 12 | roundly criticized for by the |
| 13 | Federal Courts for creating a |
| 14 | situation where the parking |
| 15 | violations are being used and |
| 16 | similar violations are being |
| 17 | used to the disadvantage of the |
| 18 | citizens of the town as a way to |
| 19 | generate revenue. |
| 20 | And I think that is the |
| 21 | wrong approach and I certainly |
| 22 | hope that that is not the intent |
| 23 | of the piling on of all of these |
| 24 | violations on the traffic ticket |
| 25 | and hiring an enforcer to |

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| 2 | collect the money. Thank you. |
| 3 | MAYOR HUBBARD: You're |
| 4 | welcome. Okay. Any other |
| 5 | comments? |
| 6 | (No response.) |
| 7 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Motion to |
| 8 | close the hearing? |
| 9 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Motion to |
| 10 | close. Also move. |
| 11 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second. |
| 12 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All |
| 13 | those in favor of closing the |
| 14 | public hearing? |
| 15 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye. |
| 16 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye. |
| 17 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye. |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Opposed? |
| 19 | (No response.) |
| 20 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Motion |
| 21 | carried. Okay. That will be or |
| 22 | for discussion at our work |
| 23 | session next month. We will |
| 24 | take all of your comments in |
| 25 | looking at the ticket and |

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| 2 | everything else and the format. |
| 3 | Just also to explain it Mr. |
| 4 | Casker, it is not set up to be a |
| 5 | revenue generator. The idea |
| 6 | with FBS, the way the town |
| 7 | handles their tickets ours |
| 8 | are handled differently and they |
| 9 | never get through the system |
| 10 | because FBS does it all for the |
| 11 | town. The town justices were |
| 12 | not as thrilled with the amount |
| 13 | of parking tickets we had done |
| 14 | in Greenport last summer. They |
| 15 | asked if we could similar to |
| 16 | that so they don't end up with |
| 17 | having to spend three hours |
| 18 | going through fifty parking |
| 19 | tickets in open court. And they |
| 20 | asked if we could do this to |
| 21 | mirror what the town is doing. |
| 22 | And the revenue for FBS only |
| 23 | comes after the ticket isn't |
| 24 | paid after thirty days. So the |
| 25 | first thirty days there is no |

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| 2 | extra fee. Whatever the ticket |
| 3 | is, you just pay that. If it |
| 4 | goes beyond that FBS gets a |
| 5 | portion of the penalty paid |
| 6 | after it goes beyond thirty |
| 7 | days. Just to clarify it. |
| 8 | MR. CASKER: Thank you. |
| 9 | MAYOR HUBBARD: That closes |
| 10 | that. |
| 11 | Under Public to Address the |
| 12 | Board, before we start on that, |
| 13 | we have three letters that came |
| 14 | in that they wanted to be added |
| 15 | to the agenda. We gave copies |
| 16 | of that I believe she gave it |
| 17 | to the transcriptionist. |
| 18 | Pursuant the clerk will read |
| 19 | them in really fast for the |
| 20 | record, just so we have them. |
| 21 | MS. PIRILLO: Letter number |
| 22 | one is dated March 24, 2016. |
| 23 | Dear Mayor Hubbard and |
| 24 | Trustees: I would like to add |
| 25 | my voice in protest of Walter |

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| 2 | Gezari's plan for a helipad in |
| 3 | Greenport. His request for |
| 4 | permission to land a private |
| 5 | helicopter in Greenport for his |
| 6 | own personal convenience cannot |
| 7 | be equated with medivac |
| 8 | helicopters landing at ELIH. I |
| 9 | hope that the Mayor and Trustees |
| 10 | will not be intimidated by his |
| 11 | threats to move his business. |
| 12 | Allowing Mr. Gezari rights |
| 13 | to a heliport would open the |
| 14 | floodgates to everyone. How |
| 15 | could any other request be |
| 16 | denied? The Town of Southold is |
| 17 | already trying to regulate |
| 18 | helicopter flights over the |
| 19 | North Fork to the Hamptons |
| 20 | because of their excessive |
| 21 | noise. |
| 22 | A helicopter pad is not a |
| 23 | legitimate part of Greenport's |
| 24 | working waterfront. You cannot |
| 25 | compare the noise level of a |

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| 2 | helicopter to the ferry, |
| 3 | commercial fishing boats, buses |
| 4 | or train, especially when a |
| 5 | helicopter is not an integral |
| 6 | part of Mr. Gezari's business. |
| 7 | The LIRR is noisy but is not |
| 8 | part of the waterfront and |
| 9 | provides public transportation |
| 10 | for all. |
| 11 | Helicopter traffic in |
| 12 | Greenport would have such a huge |
| 13 | and detrimental impact on the |
| 14 | peaceful ambience of the |
| 15 | Village, and if the Board does |
| 16 | not reject STIDD's proposal |
| 17 | outright, it should go to a |
| 18 | referendum before the Village |
| 19 | residents. |
| 20 | Respectfully, Ann Heller, |
| 21 | 543 Third Street, Greenport, New |
| 22 | York. |
| 23 | Letter number 2 is dated |
| 24 | March 24, 2016. |
| 25 | To Mayor Hubbard and |

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| 2 | Trustees: Trustee Roberts' |
| 3 | ancillary comments on Silver |
| 4 | Lake in a recent e-mail to me in |
| 5 | response to the STIDD matter |
| 6 | again brought up qualms about |
| 7 | visions for the lake. I am |
| 8 | adamant in my opinion that it |
| 9 | should remain a protected nature |
| 10 | preserve limited only to a |
| 11 | nature trail, if any public |
| 12 | access is proposed at all. No |
| 13 | recreational activities or |
| 14 | structures should be allowed |
| 15 | which would cause the |
| 16 | destruction of this freshwater |
| 17 | wetland. Silver Lake is too |
| 18 | small to support activities such |
| 19 | as boating and fishing and it is |
| 20 | home to a variety of wildlife. |
| 21 | Some of which are on the DEC |
| 22 | endangered or threatened list, |
| 23 | e.g., the mud turtle, Cooper's |
| 24 | hawk, goshawk. Crowds of people |
| 25 | in the area will disturb nesting |

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| 2 | sites, trample endangered flora |
| 3 | and destroy one of the few |
| 4 | untouched areas left. |
| 5 | The young man you mentioned |
| 6 | who tried to cross Moore's woods |
| 7 | at 3:00 a.m. to get home says |
| 8 | more about his lack of judgment |
| 9 | and mental condition at the time |
| 10 | than the danger of Silver Lake. |
| 11 | You should be aware that the |
| 12 | area surrounding Silver Lake is |
| 13 | a swamp - named the "Dismal |
| 14 | Swamp" on old maps. Traipsing |
| 15 | through a swamp is a risky |
| 16 | endeavor. |
| 17 | Building and maintaining |
| 18 | boardwalks through the terrain |
| 19 | will be costly. Who exactly |
| 20 | would be responsible for the |
| 21 | upkeep of these trails? Just |
| 22 | something else to think about. |
| 23 | Respectfully, Ann Heller, |

| 25 | Next letter is dated March |

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| 2 | 24, 2016. |
| 3 | We ask that the following |
| 4 | statement be written into the |
| 5 | records of the Village Board's |
| 6 | Public Meeting being held |
| 7 | tonight, Thursday, March 24, |
| 8 | 2016: |
| 9 | Silver Lake is a small lake |
| LO | that is surrounded by dense |
| 11 | wetlands that harbor incredible |
| L2 | wildlife and an ecological |
| L3 | balance for the area. Arbitrary |
| L4 | trail access could offer |
| L5 | problems, especially concerning |
| L6 | the inability to visually |
| L7 | monitor how and when the area is |
| L8 | being utilized. There is also a |
| L9 | significant issue of safety and |
| 20 | liability as the lake is very |
| 21 | deep and does not freeze solidly |
| 22 | in the winter. We do understand |
| 23 | its allure for public use, but |
| 24 | it is not a body of water that |
| 25 | should offer unfettered access. |

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| 2 | A boardwalk directly to the lake |
| 3 | itself invites people who may |
| 4 | not use the best judgement in |
| 5 | utilizing it. |
| 6 | A boardwalk also presents a |
| 7 | significant responsibility in |
| 8 | terms of keeping it maintained |
| 9 | properly, including constant |
| 10 | clearing of undergrowth and |
| 11 | phragmites; let alone the damage |
| 12 | that will be done to the habitat |
| 13 | itself installing the boardwalk |
| 14 | in the first place. This |
| 15 | potential destruction should be |
| 16 | closely evaluated by the DEC. |
| 17 | We have no problem with |
| 18 | cleaning up Moore's Woods and |
| 19 | providing hiking trails from the |
| 20 | Bay to the Sound. It is a |
| 21 | beautiful woods and trails would |
| 22 | be wonderful for the entire |
| 23 | community to enjoy. What we |
| 24 | take serious exception to are |
| 25 | suggestions to provide direct |

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| 2 | access to Silver Lake, |
| 3 | particularly with providing |
| 4 | boardwalks. |
| 5 | As evidenced by the recent |
| 6 | rescue of an individual |
| 7 | wandering into the dense swamp |
| 8 | and undergrowth of the wetlands, |
| 9 | this is not an area to be |
| 10 | trifled with. We fear a |
| 11 | boardwalk will invite people |
| 12 | into a compromising location |
| 13 | that could be dangerous, |
| 14 | especially since it would be |
| 15 | difficult to police and patrol |
| 16 | regularly because of its |
| 17 | remoteness and isolation. While |
| 18 | a boardwalk may appear to make |
| 19 | it safer, we feel it will be an |
| 20 | enticement that could have |
| 21 | unfavorable results. Moore's |
| 22 | Woods is one thing. Silver Lake |
| 23 | is another. |
| 24 | Respectfully, Lynn A. |
| 25 | Decker and CaroleAnn Myavec, 547 |

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| 2 | Third Street, Greenport, New |
| 3 | York. |
| 4 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |
| 5 | Okay. At this point I'll open |
| 6 | up to the public to address the |
| 7 | Board. |
| 8 | Your name and address for |
| 9 | the record. |
| 10 | MR. SOLOMAN: Michael |
| 11 | Soloman. 135 Bay Avenue, |
| 12 | Greenport. Before I address the |
| 13 | two issues I want to discuss. |
| 14 | One is the helicopter issue but |
| 15 | I also want to - I am appearing |
| 16 | this evening, the attorney for |
| 17 | Port Partners which is the owner |
| 18 | of the Rhumbline property. And |
| 19 | I saw on the resolutions that |
| 20 | there is a request to write to |
| 21 | the state Liquor Authority |
| 22 | concerning the Village's |
| 23 | position regarding some building |
| 24 | code violations. |
| 25 | I am only here to advise you |

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| 2 | on behalf of the landlords the |
| 3 | we have only become my client |
| 4 | has only recently become aware |
| 5 | of the problems. So we are in |
| 6 | support of resolving any issues |
| 7 | and I intend to work with Mr. |
| 8 | Prokop on this and the Justice |
| 9 | Court with respect to |
| LO | whatever the landlord can do |
| 11 | because we have only recently |
| 12 | become aware of the problems |
| 13 | with Rhumbline. So I wanted |
| L 4 | Village to be aware of that. |
| L5 | But let me speak on behalf |
| L6 | of the STIDD systems helipad |
| L7 | issue. I'm the chairman |
| L8 | Some people may know that. I |
| 19 | met the Mayor the other day with |
| 20 | Channel 12 they did a piece on |
| 21 | it. |
| 22 | I am the Chairman of the |
| 23 | Greenport Citizens against the |
| 24 | helipad. And believe it or not, |
| 25 | there has been quite a number of |

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| 2 | people who have expressed their |
| 3 | interest in the community. I |
| 4 | will tell you that there is not |
| 5 | a sole on Bay Avenue of which I |
| 6 | live that is in support of this |
| 7 | proposition for Mr. Gezari to |
| 8 | move forward. I also know by |
| 9 | speaking and I want to |
| 10 | comment and compliment the |
| 11 | mayor. He has been very open |
| 12 | about phone calls, letters, |
| 13 | communicating personally |
| 14 | regarding this issue. |
| 15 | I do understand that as of |
| 16 | this moment there in no formal |
| 17 | application before the Village |
| 18 | in which the request is being |
| 19 | made. I also understand legally |
| 20 | why Mr. Gezari is proceeding in |
| 21 | the fashion that he did in the |
| 22 | sense of speaking to the mayor |
| 23 | or the board. In essence, his |
| 24 | legal requirement here would be |
| 25 | to file a permit with the |

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| 2 | building department. And the |
| 3 | building department would have |
| 4 | to take a view on whether he is |
| 5 | permitted to do this or not. |
| 6 | All indications and |
| 7 | everything I have read from our |
| 8 | building codes is there is no |
| 9 | permission for anybody to build |
| 10 | a helipad. So I would assume |
| 11 | that Ms. Wingate, as part of her |
| 12 | responsibility, would probably |
| 13 | reject the application and then |
| 14 | it would force Mr. Gezari to go |
| 15 | to the Planning. I think |
| 16 | initially based upon what |
| 17 | planning they do it may force an |
| 18 | application to go to the Board |
| 19 | of Zoning Appeals. Once they |
| 20 | got that, if he did get that far |
| 21 | and everything was approved, |
| 22 | then the coup D'etat, he has got |
| 23 | to come here because the way I |
| 24 | understand it the Village has to |
| 25 | give consent to the FAA to |

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| 2 | permit this to happen. |
| 3 | So I am not disputing |
| 4 | whether if he is efficient a |
| 5 | good businessman. I believe he |
| 6 | is. He figured, all right, let |
| 7 | me come here first. See what |
| 8 | the Village's position is going |
| 9 | to be. Why should I spend money |
| 10 | going to building, planning, ZBA |
| 11 | and then come here for the |
| 12 | resolution to find out he can't |
| 13 | do it. |
| 14 | I think it is important to |
| 15 | the extent the Village can |
| 16 | and I know there is no |
| 17 | application so it is very hard |
| 18 | for the Village to really do |
| 19 | anything to sort of let Mr. |
| 20 | Gezari know that this is a |
| 21 | venture that under no |
| 22 | circumstances should ever be |
| 23 | approved by our Village, |
| 24 | Greenport. |
| 25 | In light of what we are, I |

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| 2 | said this to Channel 12 when I |
| 3 | was interviewed the other day |
| 4 | and I wrote it in a letter that |
| 5 | I think you have all received. |
| 6 | We are basically a Norman |
| 7 | Rockwell type of village. We |
| 8 | are one of the few that are sort |
| 9 | of left in America. Even the |
| 10 | Tall Ship presentation sort of |
| 11 | lends credence to all of this. |
| 12 | We have ice skating rinks. We |
| 13 | have carousels. We have a |
| 14 | beautiful marina. We have a |
| 15 | beautiful waterfront. |
| 16 | Why don't I concede for |
| 17 | discussion purposes that we do |
| 18 | get a little bit noisy during |
| 19 | the summer because that is the |
| 20 | new life of Greenport. For nine |
| 21 | or eight months a year I am a |
| 22 | full-time resident you can |
| 23 | hear a pin drop in Greenport. |
| 24 | Literally you can hear a pin |
| 25 | drop. I know that we have |

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| 2 | busses that come in and we have |
| 3 | trains that come in. You have |
| 4 | to accept that. Busses and |
| 5 | trains are something any of us |
| 6 | can use. We can go on a bus. |
| 7 | We can go on a train. It is not |
| 8 | a one man toy. |
| 9 | And I live right behind Mr. |
| 10 | Gezari and I will tell you as a |
| 11 | neighbor not that I have met |
| 12 | him, but as a neighbor adjoining |
| 13 | a commercial property he runs a |
| 14 | respectable business. He |
| 15 | doesn't run a noisy business. |
| 16 | He runs a clean business. And I |
| 17 | know for a fact he is extremely |
| 18 | successful. But when he comes |
| 19 | into the Village and says I want |
| 20 | to now put a helipad in, right |
| 21 | in the heart of the Village |
| 22 | and if you really walk down the |
| 23 | Bay Avenue some of those |
| 24 | houses I'm sort of buried |
| 25 | behind one of the buildings. |

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| 2 | Once you get beyond the |
| 3 | towards the further east end of |
| 4 | the block you are looking |
| 5 | directly at the back of Mr. |
| 6 | Gezari's facility. The people |
| 7 | on Sandy Beach are overlooking |
| 8 | the facility. The people in |
| 9 | Sterling Condominiums are |
| 10 | overlooking the facility. And |
| 11 | to think that we would have any |
| 12 | notion of permitting a man to |
| 13 | come in here and put a bring |
| 14 | helicopters, to me would be |
| 15 | foolhardy. Especially knowing |
| 16 | that if it is approved we are |
| 17 | basically handing over |
| 18 | jurisdiction to the FAA. We |
| 19 | would lose all control of how |
| 20 | long engines could run. How |
| 21 | many landings can there can be |
| 22 | in a day. And I know this |
| 23 | because they may have great |
| 24 | intentions. I am going to come |
| 25 | in here three times a week. |

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| 2 | Don't worry about it. |
| 3 | But I will tell you as a |
| 4 | lawyer practicing almost forty |
| 5 | years, if you have to rely upon |
| 6 | code enforcement, forget the |
| 7 | Village of Greenport, anywhere |
| 8 | in the United States to resolve |
| 9 | your problems, it is not going |
| 10 | to happen. Because there is |
| 11 | always ways to work around code |
| 12 | enforcement. You can pay fines |
| 13 | and everything else. But once |
| 14 | we permit one helipad, one |
| 15 | helicopter to come to Greenport, |
| 16 | what stops other facilities from |
| 17 | coming in later on and saying, |
| 18 | we now want to bring in |
| 19 | helicopters. |
| 20 | I don't have to tell anybody |
| 21 | when you hear the noise of the |
| 22 | roar and I said to the Mayor |
| 23 | when I spoke to him I said, |
| 24 | Mr. Mayor imagine this: we have |
| 25 | houses right now on the market |

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| 2 | for sale on Bay Avenue. Bay |
| 3 | Avenue is a pretty nice part of |
| 4 | the Village. Here comes a |
| 5 | realtor with the buyer showing |
| 6 | the property the way it is right |
| 7 | now. Put in your mind of what |
| 8 | the buyer thinks. Do it after |
| 9 | Mr. Gezari gets approval and |
| 10 | here comes helicopters over the |
| 11 | house as you are trying to sell |
| 12 | the property. It will have a |
| 13 | direct economic affect on every |
| 14 | single property definitely on |
| 15 | Bay Avenue but I am going to go |
| 16 | way beyond that. Whether it is |
| 17 | Carpenter. Whether it is |
| 18 | Central. Whether it is |
| 19 | Sterling. It is going to affect |
| 20 | all the properties because there |
| 21 | is no way for us we can't |
| 22 | regulate where these helicopters |
| 23 | are going to go. |
| 24 | Half the people who |
| 25 | correspond with me are half the |

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| 2 | people correspond with the Board |
| 3 | in the mail. |
| 4 | Look at up island. They are |
| 5 | screaming about helicopters they |
| 6 | are getting up island and they |
| 7 | are basically warning us. If |
| 8 | you sort of let this happen |
| 9 | you're asking for it. |
| 10 | And then I want to go one |
| 11 | step further because I don't |
| 12 | know if anybody even went this |
| 13 | far and thought about it. Once |
| 14 | you have the helipad I am |
| 15 | going to suggest to you |
| 16 | because Mr. Gezari indicated it |
| 17 | would be good for bringing |
| 18 | customers in and he also |
| 19 | indicated it would also be for |
| 20 | like, deliveries. I think he |
| 21 | said make some quick deliveries. |
| 22 | Once he has the right to bring |
| 23 | the helicopter what is the |
| 24 | biggest trend that everybody in |
| 25 | America is concerned about now? |

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| 2 | Amazon and their drones. Now |
| 3 | you have given him a peg. You |
| 4 | have given him a peg. So now |
| 5 | now imagine this, every |
| 6 | beautiful yacht captain's chair |
| 7 | going out on a drone to wherever |
| 8 | they have to go to get delivery. |
| 9 | While I appreciate Mr. |
| 10 | Gezari's and his success I |
| 11 | know he is a pilot. I know he's |
| 12 | got planes. I know he's got |
| 13 | helicopters. This is his toy. |
| 14 | I suggest what he should do, if |
| 15 | he wants to go to Mattituck |
| 16 | Airport its fifteen minutes. |
| 17 | Bring your helicopter to |
| 18 | Mattituck and drive here. You |
| 19 | want to go to Rose Field in |
| 20 | Orient, cut a deal with the |
| 21 | owner of Rose Field to bring |
| 22 | your helicopters and drive the |
| 23 | eight minutes to get here. |
| 24 | There there is really |
| 25 | there is really no patch. |

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| 2 | But when I hear I didn't |
| 3 | hear the comment from Mr. Gezari |
| 4 | but I read it in the paper where |
| 5 | there was some threat about, |
| 6 | well, you know something I am |
| 7 | I going to leave and I'm going |
| 8 | to move and I'm gonna take the |
| 9 | employees with me. And I saw |
| 10 | some comments from some Trustees |
| 11 | and there was some disturbance |
| 12 | about it and my response to that |
| 13 | is: If this Village or any |
| 14 | village is going to use the |
| 15 | threat of taking employees or |
| 16 | the lack of employees as a |
| 17 | reason to grant approvals then |
| 18 | we have a bigger problem. |
| 19 | Because then I can say to you |
| 20 | tonight, well, let's go ahead |
| 21 | believe it or not I think we |
| 22 | should approve Third Avenue and |
| 23 | Front Street. Let's put the |
| 24 | hotel. Let's put the |
| 25 | restaurant. Let's put stores. |

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| 2 | You know what, we'll get jobs. |
| 3 | So if we are going to become |
| 4 | an entity where we just talk |
| 5 | about giving jobs I can almost |
| 6 | tell you why you shouldn't deny |
| 7 | anything in the Village that is |
| 8 | going to bring jobs. |
| 9 | If Mr. Gezari did have the |
| 10 | nerve to leave what is the net |
| 11 | result of it? The village taxes |
| 12 | are still going to get paid on |
| 13 | his property. When he leaves |
| 14 | the village taxes don't go with |
| 15 | him. And that is prime |
| 16 | waterfront in the village. And |
| 17 | I have faith that somebody else |
| 18 | will deal with that issue. |
| 19 | Thank you so much for your |
| 20 | time. I appreciate it. |
| 21 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Who |
| 22 | else would like to speak? |
| 23 | MR. SAAVEDRA: Carlos |
| 24 | Saavedra and my wife Nicole. 502 |
| 25 | Front Street. |

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| 2 | We recently got denied |
| 3 | approval for a fence. And we |
| 4 | were wondering if the Board |
| 5 | would be kind enough to review |
| 6 | and old law that we think might |
| 7 | be a little confusing and |
| 8 | perhaps outdated. It had to do |
| 9 | with corner properties. |
| 10 | MS. ECKSTROM: It is 150(B) |
| 11 | and it affects corner properties |
| 12 | such as ours. Our variance was |
| 13 | our request was for a six |
| 14 | foot fence and currently the |
| 15 | code is a four foot fence that |
| 16 | is allowed. So we just we, |
| 17 | you know, appreciate the |
| 18 | opportunity to speak tonight and |
| 19 | we are hopeful that the Board |
| 20 | would review the code. Because |
| 21 | as it stands today it is very |
| 22 | unclear. And we believe that |
| 23 | this is not just for us but |
| 24 | for our neighbors as well who |
| 25 | have been very supportive of our |

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| 2 | case. But other people with |
| 3 | corner lots, we thought this |
| 4 | would be, you know, helpful in |
| 5 | just clarifying, you know, what |
| 6 | exactly the code is referring to |
| 7 | and, you know, we're hopeful |
| 8 | that we will be able to keep our |
| 9 | six foot fence. |
| 10 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Good. Thank |
| 11 | you. We will be reviewing the |
| 12 | code after the questions that |
| 13 | came up. We haven't sat down |
| 14 | with it yet. We will discuss |
| 15 | that at our work session next |
| 16 | month. Thank you. |
| 17 | Does anyone else want to |
| 18 | address the Board? |
| 19 | MR. BUCK: Good evening. My |
| 20 | name is Jonathan Buck, 635 Main |
| 21 | Street, Greenport, New York. |
| 22 | I wanted to formally oppose |
| 23 | the helicopter pad. My mom has |
| 24 | an apartment which is adjacent |
| 25 | to Carpenter Street. No less |

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| 2 | than approximately two hundred |
| 3 | feet away from the STIDD. |
| 4 | Two thoughts come to mind. |
| 5 | First, is the noise and second |
| 6 | is safety. And we do have to |
| 7 | worry that in the unlikely event |
| 8 | that there is an accident with |
| 9 | this helicopter coming to and |
| 10 | from Greenport that the Village |
| 11 | would be sued for permitting a |
| 12 | helicopter to come here. And |
| 13 | would hold all of us liable in |
| 14 | this room liable to some degree. |
| 15 | I do suggest Mr. STIDD |
| 16 | utilize FedEx or UPS for his |
| 17 | next day arrangements. Thank |
| 18 | you. |
| 19 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Anyone else? |
| 20 | MS. HELLER: Ann Heller. |
| 21 | You just read my letter, Third |
| 22 | Street. |
| 23 | I just want to stand up and |
| 24 | officially oppose this |
| 25 | helicopter pad and also add, a |

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| 2 | veteran sailor here in Greenport |
| 3 | mentioned that the helicopter |
| 4 | pad would have a very |
| 5 | detrimental affect to any boats |
| 6 | that are sailing in and out of |
| 7 | the area or are moored there. |
| 8 | So that is another aspect. Not |
| 9 | just the noise but the affect it |
| 10 | will have on the boating here. |
| 11 | And I agree with everything that |
| 12 | Mr. Soloman said also. |
| 13 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |
| 14 | MR. CASKER: Good evening |
| 15 | again. I hope that perhaps you |
| 16 | can enlighten me a bit on a |
| 17 | couple of things on the mission |
| 18 | report. |
| 19 | What I noticed tonight is |
| 20 | that there is a resolution |
| 21 | approving the declaration of old |
| 22 | 8-3-3, a fire engine, as surplus |
| 23 | equipment. And determining the |
| 24 | truck is of nominal value. And |
| 2.5 | turning it over to a fire |

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| 2 | department in South Carolina, |
| 3 | where they would be able to use |
| 4 | it. |
| 5 | And I am concerned because |
| 6 | when I look, a resolution that |
| 7 | was passed only a month before |
| 8 | that, there was a resolution for |
| 9 | a purchase from the Village of |
| 10 | Greenport for \$3000 of a fire |
| 11 | truck known as the old 8-3-3. |
| 12 | And I presume we are talking |
| 13 | about the same piece of |
| 14 | equipment here. |
| 15 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we are. |
| 16 | MR. CASKER: By the Phoenix |
| 17 | Hook and Ladder Company of the |
| 18 | Greenport Fire Department. And |
| 19 | the first half of that |
| 20 | transaction I don't understand. |
| 21 | How is it that one of the |
| 22 | individual companies of the fire |
| 23 | department can or does purchase |
| 24 | from the Village of Greenport a |
| 25 | piece of equipment that I |

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| 2 | thought was owned by the Village |
| 3 | of Greenport? And the fire |
| 4 | department where did they get |
| 5 | the money from to do this? Who |
| 6 | did they pay it to? I see they |
| 7 | paid a \$3000 check. It was |
| 8 | reported in the clerk's report |
| 9 | that they drew up a check for |
| 10 | \$3000 to purchase this piece of |
| 11 | equipment. I just don't |
| 12 | understand where the money is |
| 13 | coming from. Which pocket it is |
| 14 | coming from? Which pocket it is |
| 15 | going into for the initial |
| 16 | transaction of selling a piece |
| 17 | of Village owned equipment to a |
| 18 | specific fire company? And then |
| 19 | turning around less than a month |
| 20 | later and saying it really |
| 21 | doesn't have any value. We're |
| 22 | going to give it to a place in |
| 23 | South Carolina. What happened? |
| 24 | Can I get an elaboration on |
| 25 | that? |

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| 2 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. |
| 3 | MR. CASKER: I'm very |
| 4 | confused. |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. The |
| 6 | Phoenix Hook and Ladder was |
| 7 | taking money that they made when |
| 8 | they did their carnivals. They |
| 9 | were taking that money. So that |
| 10 | is not Village tax payer money. |
| 11 | It is not declared from a |
| 12 | budget. It is money they make |
| 13 | on their own personal fund |
| 14 | raising efforts. And they |
| 15 | were taking that and the |
| 16 | member that is in the department |
| 17 | in South Carolina is an ex-chief |
| 18 | and an ex-member of their |
| 19 | company. He has been up here |
| 20 | visiting. They are still |
| 21 | friendly. |
| 22 | MR. CASKER: I understand |
| 23 | that part of |
| 24 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. |
| 25 | MD CACKED. I am ingt |

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| 2 | wondering how the deal was. |
| 3 | Where did the money come from |
| 4 | and whose money it is? |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: It was their |
| 6 | money that they raised through |
| 7 | fund raising. |
| 8 | MR. CASKER: So that is |
| 9 | that goes into what, a fund that |
| 10 | they can do with what they want? |
| 11 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. If |
| 12 | companies they have chicken |
| 13 | barbeques, they have a carnival. |
| 14 | Any of the fund raisers, that is |
| 15 | money that the members have just |
| 16 | for themselves. It is not |
| 17 | Village money. It is not |
| 18 | department money. The companies |
| 19 | do their own fund raisers. That |
| 20 | is what they use to buy jackets |
| 21 | for themselves. To go out and |
| 22 | have dinner. To do whatever |
| 23 | with. That is their own money |
| 24 | that they raised. |
| 25 | MR. CASKER: So, okay and |
| | |

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| 2 | I presume they account for that |
| 3 | among themselves? |
| 4 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, they |
| 5 | do. |
| 6 | MR. CASKER: But not to the |
| 7 | Village? |
| 8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: No. |
| 9 | MR. CASKER: Thank you. |
| 10 | MAYOR HUBBARD: You're |
| 11 | welcome. Yes. |
| 12 | MR. SALADINO: John |
| 13 | Saladino, Sixth Street. |
| 14 | Is there going to be an |
| 15 | executive session? |
| 16 | MAYOR HUBBARD: No. |
| 17 | MR. SALADINO: Are there any |
| 18 | Board representatives? |
| 19 | MAYOR HUBBARD: There is |
| 20 | one. |
| 21 | MR. SALADINO: Can you share |
| 22 | it, please? |
| 23 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. The |
| 24 | agenda that we talked about at |
| 25 | the work session for the bulk |

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| 2 | head feasibility study. That |
| 3 | we had picked a firm that was |
| 4 | going to do it. It came to our |
| 5 | it was noticed by some former |
| 6 | employee that we had a problem |
| 7 | with that engineering firm in |
| 8 | the past. We reviewed |
| 9 | everything that had happened in |
| 10 | the past. We decided not to use |
| 11 | that engineering firm. We went |
| 12 | to the next highest bidder. It |
| 13 | is costing us a few dollars more |
| 14 | but we are going with D&B |
| 15 | Engineers, which is a company we |
| 16 | work with all the time. And |
| 17 | we're going to have them do the |
| 18 | feasibility study. We are not |
| 19 | going with the original one. |
| 20 | And thank you Mr. Swiskey |
| 21 | for bringing that to our |
| 22 | attention. And we took your |
| 23 | advice. We looked at it and we |
| 24 | didn't we weren't on the |
| 25 | Board. We didn't realize it was |

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| 2 | an issue. And we changed our |
| 3 | mind and we are going with a |
| 4 | different company. |
| 5 | MR. SALADINO: Is there a |
| 6 | big difference between D&B and |
| 7 | |
| 8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Five |
| 9 | thousand? |
| 10 | MR. PALLAS: Thirteen. |
| 11 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, \$13,000. |
| 12 | This one here is for \$77,000. |
| 13 | So the other one must have been |
| 14 | \$64,000. I don't remember the |
| 15 | amount. |
| 16 | In fairness to the tax |
| 17 | payers and everything else, to |
| 18 | make sure we get what we want |
| 19 | out of this I think it is a good |
| 20 | move to do that. |
| 21 | MR. SALADINO: I agree. |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank |
| 23 | you. |
| 24 | MR. SALADINO: With |
| 25 | Resolution 30, I support it. I |

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| 2 | mean we got used to Wiggins |
| 3 | Street being one-way. It was |
| 4 | always a two-way. I got used to |
| 5 | it being a one-way. Going back |
| 6 | to a two-way. I don't know. I |
| 7 | would like it better. I may |
| 8 | only be speaking for myself but |
| 9 | that is my opinion. |
| 10 | The other thing is I heard |
| 11 | Mr. Soloman talk about his |
| 12 | association with the landlord |
| 13 | for Rhumbline. I was at the |
| 14 | work session. I didn't hear |
| 15 | anything about any conversation |
| 16 | about the Village's concerns |
| 17 | about an SLA license being |
| 18 | renewed. I don't think you |
| 19 | discussed I'm positive you |
| 20 | didn't discuss it at the work |
| 21 | session. |
| 22 | My question is: In all the |
| 23 | years that I have been coming to |
| 24 | the meetings and all the liquor |
| 25 | licenses that I have seen come |

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| 2 | before this Board for I have |
| 3 | never seen one where the Board |
| 4 | decided to make a comment about |
| 5 | it. You accepted liquor license |
| 6 | you have announced liquor |
| 7 | licenses without offering |
| 8 | comment for companies for |
| 9 | applicants that didn't own the |
| 10 | property, for applicants whose |
| 11 | buildings was in total |
| 12 | disrepair. You took an |
| 13 | application from the guy who was |
| 14 | going to buy Claudio's. He |
| 15 | didn't own Claudio's. You took |
| 16 | an application from American |
| 17 | Beach, which was in total |
| 18 | disrepair. Not that it is not |
| 19 | beautiful now. I don't want |
| 20 | anyone especially Swiskey |
| 21 | saying anything about American |
| 22 | Beach. But you took |
| 23 | applications from from |
| 24 | Industry Standards. He didn't |
| 25 | have a lease on the property. |

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| 2 | I am just these are |
| 3 | building violations. Why would |
| 4 | why would the Village be |
| 5 | concerned about an SLA |
| 6 | application for a building |
| 7 | for a business that only has |
| 8 | construction violations? He |
| 9 | can't open until the violations |
| 10 | are corrected, I'm guessing. |
| 11 | You are not going to let him |
| 12 | open until Eileen is satisfied |
| 13 | that all these violations are |
| 14 | corrected. I am not |
| 15 | I guess one of the questions |
| 16 | I'm asking you: How did it get |
| 17 | to a Resolution, number one and |
| 18 | are there any concerns you can |
| 19 | share with the public that you |
| 20 | might know that we don't? |
| 21 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. Okay. |
| 22 | It was part of the Village |
| 23 | Clerk's Report. That is why it |
| 24 | was in there. After reading it |
| 25 | when we were doing I was |

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| 2 | working on the agenda. I |
| 3 | remembered a conversation I had |
| 4 | with the Building Department |
| 5 | last fall. They were issued a |
| 6 | temporary CO for six months to |
| 7 | operate the outside bar. That |
| 8 | expired after six months. I |
| 9 | didn't know it was only a six |
| 10 | month CO for it. And they went |
| 11 | for a year without permission to |
| 12 | have it. So the outside bar and |
| 13 | deck was not allowed to be. |
| 14 | So if they got the liquor |
| 15 | license they would be using the |
| 16 | outside bar again and they don't |
| 17 | have a CO for That. That is why |
| 18 | I said we should make a comment |
| 19 | about that only until they |
| 20 | correct their building |
| 21 | violations and the permits. |
| 22 | Because if they got a license |
| 23 | they would go back to serving on |
| 24 | the outside bar that is not even |
| 25 | supposed to be allowed. |

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| 2 | MR. SALADINO: So the |
| 3 | comment to the SLA would only be |
| 4 | about the use of the |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correcting |
| 6 | the outside bar. Because if |
| 7 | they go back to use it again |
| 8 | they shouldn't have been we |
| 9 | dropped the ball on that. We |
| 10 | did not enforce the temporary |
| 11 | six month CO. I didn't know |
| 12 | there was a time restraint on |
| 13 | it. Probably the Planning Board |
| 14 | or whoever approved it, they |
| 15 | said do it for six months |
| 16 | MR. SALADINO: So they have |
| 17 | to go for a site re-evaluation? |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. And |
| 19 | it never happened. And we |
| 20 | dropped the ball on that. So I |
| 21 | didn't want to do it a second |
| 22 | time. |
| 23 | MR. SALADINO: I would just |
| 24 | hate to see a viable business |
| 25 | not be able to open for the |

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| 2 | season. That he would like |
| 3 | any businessman would tell you |
| 4 | would probably be his most |
| 5 | profitable because of of the |
| 6 | construction language or a |
| 7 | building violation. |
| 8 | If he has to square it away |
| 9 | with the Planning Board. I am |
| 10 | just not sure I mean to deal |
| 11 | with the SLA is laborious. You |
| 12 | know, so I just I just didn't |
| 13 | think that his license should be |
| 14 | held up for any reason if it was |
| 15 | only concerning a building |
| 16 | violation. I mean if the guy |
| 17 | committed murder or something, |
| 18 | that's fine. Hold it up. But I |
| 19 | mean as far as a building |
| 20 | violation it seems, you know, |
| 21 | like a big deal. |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. If |
| 23 | you look at the application and |
| 24 | it says permitted uses and it |
| 25 | has written down on there, |

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| 2 | permitted outdoor deck, outdoor |
| 3 | bar and dining. And that is on |
| 4 | the application and that is not |
| 5 | true. It is not permitted. |
| 6 | MR. SALADINO: Oh, no. No. |
| 7 | MAYOR HUBBARD: That's why |
| 8 | we did it. Normally we don't |
| 9 | comment on them at all except to |
| 10 | the public and anyone that wants |
| 11 | to comment because we don't want |
| 12 | to get involved in it. But just |
| 13 | they marked off on that saying |
| 14 | it is a permitted use. I took |
| 15 | exception to that because it is |
| 16 | not. |
| 17 | MR. SALADINO: Oh, no, |
| 18 | George, I totally agree with |
| 19 | that reasoning. That's fine. |
| 20 | And I had some other comments. |
| 21 | That is for another time. |
| 22 | Thanks for listening. |
| 23 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |
| 24 | MR. SWISKEY: William |
| 25 | Swiskey, 184 Fifth Street. I |

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| 2 | see people from Bay Avenue and |
| 3 | Central Avenue has spoken on the |
| 4 | helicopter. I think they are |
| 5 | they ones with the most skin in |
| 6 | the game. So if the board is |
| 7 | even going to consider that, |
| 8 | they should really consider. |
| 9 | And here is the thing I |
| LO | have a few things I wanted to |
| L1 | ask about. For the third month |
| 12 | in a row the Planning Board |
| 13 | meeting has been cancelled. I |
| L 4 | mean, I understand there is not |
| 15 | even enough members, which would |
| 16 | be three, showing up for a |
| L7 | quorum. Am I right? |
| L8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. |
| L9 | MR. SWISKEY: Well, how did |
| 20 | we get there? I mean, don't we |
| 21 | have anybody that is willing to |
| 22 | serve. I mean one of these |
| 23 | Trustees or all of them must |
| 24 | have names of people that would |
| 25 | be willing to serve, that they |

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| 2 | can put forward. How do you go |
| 3 | three months without naming |
| 4 | people? |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, Chris |
| 6 | Dowling, we accepted his |
| 7 | resignation at the February |
| 8 | meeting. He was still on the |
| 9 | Board up to that point. Pat |
| 10 | Mundus has been away. The month |
| 11 | before that well a different |
| 12 | member couldn't make it. This |
| 13 | month another member can't make |
| 14 | it. |
| 15 | I have asked numerous people |
| 16 | about it. I have been turned |
| 17 | down by the people I have asked. |
| 18 | I've asked publicly for somebody |
| 19 | to give me names over the past |
| 20 | six months. I have got a few |
| 21 | names over the past few months |
| 22 | and they were people that I felt |
| 23 | had something had a personal |
| 24 | agenda or something to gain by |
| 25 | being appointed to the Board. |

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| 2 | And so we are just trying to see |
| 3 | if we can get some more names |
| 4 | and have a fair choice. |
| 5 | MR. SWISKEY: No Trustee put |
| 6 | forth any names? I mean |
| 7 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. They |
| 8 | have given me some names, Bill. |
| 9 | Yes. |
| 10 | MR. SWISKEY: And they were |
| 11 | turned down or weren't |
| 12 | considered? |
| 13 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. |
| 14 | Actually a couple of them that I |
| 15 | had mentioned and had even |
| 16 | talked to declined to take the |
| 17 | Mayor's offering. |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: We are |
| 19 | looking. We are trying to fill |
| 20 | it. I was trying up to the day |
| 21 | before the work session so I |
| 22 | could announce a name. I have |
| 23 | not come up with one yet. So, |
| 24 | we are definitely trying. |
| 25 | MR. SWISKEY: Well, what |

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| 2 | will somebody then like Mr. |
| 3 | Salinkes (phonetic) do with his |
| 4 | hotel? Because he has an |
| 5 | application before the Board for |
| 6 | I guess a use evaluation for |
| 7 | Meson Ole. He can't really |
| 8 | proceed with any building |
| 9 | because he might not get this |
| 10 | use application. |
| 11 | MAYOR HUBBARD: The Planning |
| 12 | Board work session that was |
| 13 | scheduled for next week has been |
| 14 | cancelled. They have an agenda |
| 15 | out for the regular meeting. |
| 16 | What is the date of that? |
| 17 | MR. PALLAS: April 7th. |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: April 7th |
| 19 | will be the regular planning |
| 20 | board meeting. They will have |
| 21 | quorum. They will have a |
| 22 | meeting. So it is only holding |
| 23 | off Mr. Salinkes for one week. |
| 24 | The work session won't happen |
| 25 | but the regular meeting will. |

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| 2 | MR. SWISKEY: Because it is |
| 3 | like we have one ZBA member that |
| 4 | went away for the whole winter. |
| 5 | I mean, to me, this is reaching |
| 6 | a point if you are going away |
| 7 | for one month or being sick or |
| 8 | something knowing that you |
| 9 | are going away for the whole |
| 10 | month is being disingenuous to |
| 11 | the position in my estimation. |
| 12 | I mean I think it is time if |
| 13 | these people want to be away |
| 14 | they don't belong on this board. |
| 15 | It is time to start looking more |
| 16 | locally. I know there are good |
| 17 | people out there that can do |
| 18 | this job that haven't been |
| 19 | asked. |
| 20 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Well ask |
| 21 | them to come forward and send me |
| 22 | an e-mail. Tell them to contact |
| 23 | me. |
| 24 | MR. SWISKEY: Well, I'll |
| 25 | give the names to you and maybe |

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| 2 | somebody else can give you some |
| 3 | names. It is just like running |
| 4 | amok lately. |
| 5 | And then I wanted to speak |
| 6 | on this well in the budget |
| 7 | there is the Secretary to the |
| 8 | Board. Which I think is |
| 9 | superfluous because these Boards |
| 10 | are in total is how many |
| 11 | hours a month? Zoning, Planning |
| 12 | and HPC. |
| 13 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Anywhere |
| 14 | from an hour to two hours per |
| 15 | meeting. |
| 16 | MR. SWISKEY: So times |
| 17 | three. So maybe a total of six |
| 18 | hours a month. And we're going |
| 19 | to hire a senior code |
| 20 | enforcement officer. And part |
| 21 | of the logic of hiring that |
| 22 | first it was to relieve Eileen |
| 23 | who supposedly well that is |
| 24 | going to free up a lot of |
| 25 | Eileen's time. So we don't |

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| 2 | really need to hire a Secretary |
| 3 | to the Board because we are |
| 4 | going to have an employee who is |
| 5 | going to have greatly reduced |
| 6 | duties. I think the Board |
| 7 | should consider that. |
| 8 | I'll speak again to that at |
| 9 | the public hearing. But we can |
| 10 | have the clerk do it because it |
| 11 | is like six hours a month. And |
| 12 | I don't see any reason why we |
| 13 | have to hire an extra employee |
| 14 | for this. It just it boggles |
| 15 | my mind because Village Hall |
| 16 | is becoming there is so many |
| 17 | people in Village Hall. I can |
| 18 | remember when there was like |
| 19 | half a dozen people who ran the |
| 20 | whole Village. And it wasn't |
| 21 | this Village is not that much |
| 22 | more busy than it was back then, |
| 23 | believe it or not. We were |
| 24 | building parks. We were doing |
| 25 | upgrades at the power plant, the |

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| 2 | whole thing. And now it just |
| 3 | seems that everybody needs an |
| 4 | assistant who needs an |
| 5 | assistant. |
| б | I think it is time to look |
| 7 | at the personnel manager of the |
| 8 | Village and let's say, you are |
| 9 | supposed to do this. Do your |
| 10 | job. You are not hiring an |
| 11 | assistant. That is just my |
| 12 | personal whatever opinion |
| 13 | anyway. |
| 14 | Before we go any further, |
| 15 | have we run our DNMC test yet? |
| 16 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I know we |
| 17 | did two engines. Did we do the |
| 18 | third engine? |
| 19 | MR. PALLAS: All three are |
| 20 | done. |
| 21 | MAYOR HUBBARD: All three |
| 22 | are done. |
| 23 | MR. SWISKEY: Both tests? |
| 24 | MR. PALLAS: Sorry? |
| 25 | MR. SWISKEY: Both tests? |

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| 2 | Because we owed them a test. |
| 3 | MR. PALLAS: One test covers |
| 4 | both periods. |
| 5 | MR. SWISKEY: All right |
| 6 | because I was just curious about |
| 7 | that. We have major problems |
| 8 | with the power plant. A |
| 9 | \$10,000,000 lawsuit? I can |
| 10 | remember standing at this podium |
| 11 | time after time and this has |
| 12 | been going on since about 2008 |
| 13 | and being told by the mayor and |
| 14 | the members of this Board that |
| 15 | everything was fine, everything |
| 16 | was dandy. What went wrong? |
| 17 | Was I lied to? |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: At the time |
| 19 | they felt everything was moving |
| 20 | progressing forward. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: Who? |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: You said the |
| 23 | mayor told you that. So that is |
| 24 | what he was telling you. |
| 25 | MR. SWISKEY: And nobody on |

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| 2 | the Board bothered to go up |
| 3 | there and look. |
| 4 | MAYOR HUBBARD: We all had |
| 5 | concerns. We all had questions. |
| 6 | It was raised at numerous work |
| 7 | sessions and other meetings |
| 8 | about switching from analog to |
| 9 | digital and all the other stuff. |
| 10 | And you called Justine Phillips |
| 11 | and myself out for picking on |
| 12 | Mr. Nailer (phonetic) when we |
| 13 | asked him a lot of hard |
| 14 | questions and now you are |
| 15 | questioning us saying we didn't |
| 16 | mention it. We did mention it |
| 17 | and we talked about it. You |
| 18 | said we were treating them |
| 19 | wrong. So I we can't be |
| 20 | everywhere. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: Now you are |
| 22 | twisting things, George. Mr. |
| 23 | Hellier (phonetic) had no |
| 24 | expertise. You hired Braun |
| 25 | (phonetic) Engineering. You |

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| 2 | hired Genesis Engineering. They |
| 3 | were supposed to be running this |
| 4 | project. Were they just |
| 5 | stealing \$750,000 from us? |
| 6 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Say that |
| 7 | again, Bill? I'm sorry. |
| 8 | MR. SWISKEY: We are |
| 9 | demanding in the lawsuit I |
| 10 | have a copy of it. Have any of |
| 11 | you seen the lawsuit? The |
| 12 | papers that were filed. We are |
| 13 | demanding one payment of |
| 14 | \$5,000,000 for the transformer |
| 15 | and another payment of |
| 16 | \$5,000,000 for problems with the |
| 17 | switch gear. The 86 piece which |
| 18 | how you get \$5,000,000 out of |
| 19 | I won't explain what it is. |
| 20 | And then 750,000 reimbursement |
| 21 | for engineering fees. So we did |
| 22 | spend \$750,000 for engineering |
| 23 | on it for a company that gave us |
| 24 | basically a product we now have |
| 25 | to gue over And nobody noticed |

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| 2 | anything? Nobody It boggles |
| 3 | my mind. Trustee Robins stood |
| 4 | there and said, oh, everything |
| 5 | is fine. Well, it is not fine, |
| 6 | is it? It is like this |
| 7 | this is like wow. In other |
| 8 | words, |
| 9 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: I doubt |
| 10 | that I said everything is fine, |
| 11 | Bill. I didn't comment on it. |
| 12 | MR. SWISKEY: Well, it is in |
| 13 | the record. It is in the |
| 14 | minutes. |
| 15 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: I wasn't on |
| 16 | the Board when this was when |
| 17 | this upgrade was voted on. And |
| 18 | I probably wouldn't have voted |
| 19 | for it if I had been on the |
| 20 | Board, to be honest with you. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: All right. |
| 22 | And then we have the basic first |
| 23 | contract from Genesis |
| 24 | Engineering and I already read |
| 25 | it today. And it limits his |

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| 2 | liability or Genesis' liability |
| 3 | to basically about \$250,000. |
| 4 | And then I read the next |
| 5 | contract that we signed and that |
| 6 | also refers to this limitation |
| 7 | on liability. Do these |
| 8 | contracts actually say that we |
| 9 | are limited to \$250,000 that we |
| 10 | can recover? Because I am a |
| 11 | layman but that is what I read. |
| 12 | And I remember hollering about |
| 13 | that at a board meeting and not |
| 14 | getting an answer. Because that |
| 15 | is the most ridiculous clause I |
| 16 | have ever saw written into a |
| 17 | contract. And how it got by the |
| 18 | Board and approved, I don't |
| 19 | know. But I would like to know, |
| 20 | are we is that the limit we |
| 21 | are entitled to? Forget |
| 22 | \$10,000,000 because we only have |
| 23 | \$2,000,000 worth of liability |
| 24 | insurance for the whole Genesis. |
| 25 | You are not going to squeeze |

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| 2 | 10,000,000. That is just a |
| 3 | figure you throw out there. Is |
| 4 | that all we are entitled to? |
| 5 | And I want I want an answer. |
| 6 | MR. PROKOP: I have to say |
| 7 | that that that exact matter |
| 8 | is in litigation. And I would |
| 9 | recommend that the Board not |
| 10 | discuss that issue. I'm sorry. |
| 11 | MR. SWISKEY: I realize |
| 12 | that. Have we filed for |
| 13 | judicial intervention on this |
| 14 | lawsuit or not? |
| 15 | MR. PROKOP: I don't know |
| 16 | what that |
| 17 | MR. SWISKEY: That means it |
| 18 | would be assigned basically an |
| 19 | index number, which is six |
| 20 | numbers plus the year. And it |
| 21 | would be on e-courts. We could |
| 22 | find this. |
| 23 | MR. PROKOP: The case has an |
| 24 | index number. You asked me that |
| 25 | at the last meeting. |

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| 2 | MR. SWISKEY: It is five |
| 3 | numbers and the date. |
| 4 | MR. PROKOP: I gave you the |
| 5 | index number. |
| 6 | MR. SWISKEY: That is the |
| 7 | one that was filed with the |
| 8 | County Clerk, Judith Pasquale. |
| 9 | To be filed with the court you |
| 10 | have to ask for judicial |
| 11 | intervention. Then you get the |
| 12 | six numbers, the index number. |
| 13 | Every Village lawsuit has a six |
| 14 | number index number plus the |
| 15 | year. I was going to bring some |
| 16 | examples, but I forgot. I |
| 17 | apologize. But I am I telling |
| 18 | you it is like this this |
| 19 | amazes me. I was called I |
| 20 | was insulted from that and I |
| 21 | warned you people about this. |
| 22 | You didn't listen and now we're |
| 23 | in a mess. How bad is the mess? |
| 24 | What all right. Here is the |
| 25 | main question: How much would |

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| 2 | it costs us to fix what is |
| 3 | wrong? |
| 4 | MAYOR HUBBARD: We haven't |
| 5 | gotten a price on that, I don't |
| 6 | believe. |
| 7 | MR. PALLAS: Not yet. |
| 8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: They have |
| 9 | been working on that A&F is |
| 10 | designing it, coming up with a |
| 11 | plan of attack to correct it and |
| 12 | get everything straightened out. |
| 13 | MR. SWISKEY: Have we got |
| 14 | that even yet? Because I would |
| 15 | like to see it when we get it. |
| 16 | MAYOR HUBBARD: You will see |
| 17 | it when we get it. Mr. Pallas |
| 18 | said he hasn't gotten it yet, |
| 19 | but we should we are |
| 20 | expecting it shortly. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: We have been |
| 22 | asking for this for over a year |
| 23 | because I have been asking this |
| 24 | Board about it. I mean, it |
| 25 | doesn't take a year to get this. |

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| 2 | MAYOR HUBBARD: They came up |
| 3 | with a plan. I don't think we |
| 4 | have a price of what it is going |
| 5 | to cost to repair it yet. |
| 6 | MR. PALLAS: We don't have |
| 7 | the design plans yet. Once we |
| 8 | get the design plans we can get |
| 9 | a price. |
| 10 | MR. SWISKEY: One of the |
| 11 | things in the lawsuit said that |
| 12 | the tap voltages on the front |
| 13 | the primary tap voltages on the |
| 14 | new transformer are different |
| 15 | than from the old one, if I read |
| 16 | right. So that is public |
| 17 | knowledge. Are the secondary |
| 18 | voltages different? |
| 19 | MR. PALLAS: No. They are |
| 20 | the same. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: I'm not going |
| 22 | to go there. Somebody was |
| 23 | somebody better look at that. |
| 24 | Anyway, I find it disgusting |
| 25 | basically. And I think the |

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| 2 | public has a right to feel it is |
| 3 | disgusting. We were lied to by |
| 4 | our elected officials. And |
| 5 | other officials just ignored it. |
| 6 | When the previous mayor who |
| 7 | just got an award lied to |
| 8 | people lied to people about |
| 9 | more than just that and nobody |
| 10 | says - on this Board says |
| 11 | anything. |
| 12 | Do you realize somebody |
| 13 | told me today. I don't know if |
| 14 | it is true or not but it is a |
| 15 | good source, that I guess |
| 16 | there is a tent city someplace |
| 17 | down by the Cablevision tower. |
| 18 | I mean, immigrant laborers, they |
| 19 | got no place to live. I think |
| 20 | you better send somebody down |
| 21 | there to take a look. |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We |
| 23 | will look at that. At the |
| 24 | Cablevision tower? |
| 25 | MR. SWISKEY: Around the |

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| 2 | Cablevision tower. In that |
| 3 | area. Because this guy walking |
| 4 | back from the swamp had it |
| 5 | made no sense how he did that. |
| 6 | But if he was coming from there, |
| 7 | yeah, could have. So let's |
| 8 | check it out. See if we have |
| 9 | MAYOR HUBBARD: First I have |
| 10 | heard of that. We will check it |
| 11 | out tomorrow, Bill. |
| 12 | MR. SWISKEY: Thank you, |
| 13 | George. Okay. Let's see here. |
| 14 | Oh, the anonymous complaints. |
| 15 | You know there was a big thing |
| 16 | made about anonymous complaints |
| 17 | on the Village website. So I |
| 18 | went there just for the hell of |
| 19 | it. And you actually have to |
| 20 | give your name, your e-mail |
| 21 | address. Somebody knows who you |
| 22 | are. The person seeing it. The |
| 23 | clerk knows who you are. |
| 24 | Basically there is no anonymous |
| 25 | complaint. |

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| 2 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe |
| 3 | that has been changed. |
| 4 | MS. PIRILLO: The name and |
| 5 | address portion was first of |
| 6 | all the form was replicated from |
| 7 | the Town of Southold form. And |
| 8 | the name and address portion was |
| 9 | the affirmation. We have since |
| 10 | and it was brought to our |
| 11 | attention. We have since, for |
| 12 | the comfort of the public |
| 13 | corrected that so it is an |
| 14 | optional field and the public is |
| 15 | told it is an optional field. |
| 16 | The next day it was corrected to |
| 17 | read, optional field. |
| 18 | MR. SWISKEY: Okay. Thank |
| 19 | you. That that is good |
| 20 | because anonymous is anonymous. |
| 21 | And if somebody has your name |
| 22 | your are not anonymous. |
| 23 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct. |
| 24 | MR. SWISKEY: And the ferry |
| 25 | fee. This I have been |

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| 2 | pushing this one for a while, |
| 3 | the ferry fee. And the |
| 4 | reasoning for not that we |
| 5 | can't have a ferry fee is |
| 6 | because the Bridgeport fee was |
| 7 | overturned by the judge. But |
| 8 | that fee was in effect for many, |
| 9 | many years. And the only reason |
| 10 | that it was overturned is |
| 11 | because they started using the |
| 12 | fee for a purpose that it wasn't |
| 13 | intended. The original fee was |
| 14 | intended to the ferry |
| 15 | infrastructure and the street. |
| 16 | Instead they put the money into |
| 17 | general funds. And the ferry |
| 18 | didn't even object then until |
| 19 | they tried to raise the fee. |
| 20 | Then the ferry objected. So, |
| 21 | theoretically we can impose a |
| 22 | fee. |
| 23 | And I see there is an item |
| 24 | on the agenda about pro-bono. |
| 25 | Well why don't we give Mr. |

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| 2 | Roberts a couple of thousand |
| 3 | dollars so maybe he can get a |
| 4 | legal opinion. You know, in |
| 5 | other words, he is going around |
| 6 | these guys are going around |
| 7 | and just give them some money |
| 8 | to hire a lawyer. Let's get a |
| 9 | real second opinion from |
| 10 | somebody you know what I |
| 11 | mean? Not somebody that is |
| 12 | going to be a given. I think it |
| 13 | is \$100,000 a year if you go |
| 14 | into the Village caucus. We |
| 15 | can't just blow this off. I |
| 16 | think we really have to push for |
| 17 | that fee. If there was an |
| 18 | item in the last election and I |
| 19 | think we should still keep |
| 20 | pushing it. |
| 21 | And the next thing is |
| 22 | two-way traffic on Wiggins |
| 23 | Street. A friend of mine almost |
| 24 | had an accident down there today |
| 25 | because somebody was passing |

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| 2 | him. All right. And he was in |
| 3 | a hurry and on his way to the |
| 4 | ferry. You get two-way traffic |
| 5 | and some butthead on that street |
| 6 | coming at like a hundred miles |
| 7 | an hour and got a line on one |
| 8 | side. I think you better |
| 9 | measure the street and have a |
| 10 | traffic engineer give you |
| 11 | before you just into that. If |
| 12 | it costs you a couple of |
| 13 | thousand dollars it might |
| 14 | prevent somebody from being |
| 15 | seriously injured. Because that |
| 16 | is a narrow street. Especially |
| 17 | at the end where that pulvit is, |
| 18 | that sidewalk. That pulvit |
| 19 | won't support a car. So that |
| 20 | pushed everything here. |
| 21 | And also there is another |
| 22 | thing I have noticed. Everybody |
| 23 | says, oh, we can't. The ferry |
| 24 | is MTA. Well guess where the |
| 25 | ferry's pilings are. They are |

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| 2 | not on MTA property. The are in |
| 3 | Village waters on Village |
| 4 | property. Do they even have a |
| 5 | permit to have those pilings |
| 6 | there? |
| 7 | MAYOR HUBBARD: You asked |
| 8 | that last week Bill. I don't |
| 9 | know. |
| 10 | MR. SWISKEY: Well, I think |
| 11 | it maybe something the lawyers |
| 12 | should check into and if they |
| 13 | don't they need to pay us or |
| 14 | they take their pilings out. |
| 15 | Also, every time that they do |
| 16 | work there we require this one |
| 17 | or this one to go CAC and get a |
| 18 | wetlands permit. They just go |
| 19 | down there and they shove |
| 20 | pilings in. Well that is on our |
| 21 | property. So maybe it is time |
| 22 | we start playing a little bit of |
| 23 | hardball with the ferry. |
| 24 | Because they have been sticking |
| 25 | it to the Village and the people |

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| 2 | on Wiggins Street since I was a |
| 3 | kid. And I think it is time |
| 4 | that we had a Board that took a |
| 5 | firm stand and said, we don't |
| 6 | live on Shelter Island. We live |
| 7 | in Greenport. If the Shelter |
| 8 | Island people aren't happy, not |
| 9 | my problem. |
| 10 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Bill, I |
| 11 | just want to comment on the |
| 12 | repairing rights on the dock. |
| 13 | Actually I think I believe |
| 14 | that that needs to be |
| 15 | determined. And I am going to |
| 16 | recommend actually that the |
| 17 | Village have that property |
| 18 | surveyed all the way from |
| 19 | down Fourth Street and |
| 20 | Harbormill all the way up to the |
| 21 | docks to determine that. And |
| 22 | also to do a deed search from |
| 23 | back to 1834 when the Long |
| 24 | Island Railroad came out |
| 25 | originally and purchased that |

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| 2 | property, to determine, you know |
| 3 | to determine exactly who does |
| 4 | own the repairing rights and to |
| 5 | survey the whole area down |
| 6 | there. |
| 7 | MR. SWISKEY: I think that |
| 8 | you are going to find out that |
| 9 | the ferry is on our ground. The |
| 10 | railroad dock was put in the |
| 11 | railroad may have at one time |
| 12 | and the county had the right |
| 13 | to that. But the ferry that is |
| 14 | our land. |
| 15 | I think if you hire the |
| 16 | right person and they do a good |
| 17 | job, you are going to find we |
| 18 | own that land and they are going |
| 19 | to have to start paying. What |
| 20 | are they paying over there on |
| 21 | they pay \$125,000 on the other |
| 22 | side, don't they? |
| 23 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: About |
| 24 | that. |
| 25 | MR. PROKOP: 185. |

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| 2 | MR. SWISKEY: And what do we |
| 3 | get? |
| 4 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Zero. |
| 5 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Bill, can |
| 6 | I just make a comment? There is |
| 7 | and we recently questioned it |
| 8 | a while ago. There was an |
| 9 | application from the North Ferry |
| 10 | to the DEC and the Arm Corp of |
| 11 | Engineers for wetland permits. |
| 12 | So I'm assuming that at some |
| 13 | point that is going to come |
| 14 | before us. |
| 15 | MR. SWISKEY: Well, if it |
| 16 | doesn't and they start building |
| 17 | then your Building Inspector |
| 18 | should go down there and say |
| 19 | stop. |
| 20 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They have |
| 21 | made there is a permit |
| 22 | already in existence. So there |
| 23 | are several questions. |
| 24 | MR. SWISKEY: There is no |
| 25 | such thing as a maintenance |

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| 2 | permit. Once you start it goes |
| 3 | on for years. I guess it was |
| 4 | Stirling Harbor, wasn't it John? |
| 5 | It is time to bust these people. |
| 6 | It was the same with their |
| 7 | shipyard. These permits don't |
| 8 | go forever. To use that excuse |
| 9 | is just I mean. This is a |
| 10 | big issue and I commend Trustee |
| 11 | Roberts for looking into it and |
| 12 | keep pushing because it is just |
| 13 | a lot of money that and a lot |
| 14 | of grief that the people on |
| 15 | Wiggins Street have suffered |
| 16 | forever. |
| 17 | I got one more thing to say |
| 18 | about the about the |
| 19 | Rhumbline. I just want to |
| 20 | well on the work session report. |
| 21 | They went in there and they |
| 22 | wrote sixteen separate |
| 23 | violations. I mean, I am |
| 24 | looking at and half of these |
| 25 | things look like what are they |

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| 2 | piling on? They are closed but |
| 3 | they got a violation they got |
| 4 | two violations because on the |
| 5 | wall of any public building |
| 6 | and I don't know if we have one |
| 7 | in here or not. We should. It |
| 8 | should be a maximum occupancy |
| 9 | sign. They got two violations |
| 10 | for that. That to me was like |
| 11 | and for a restaurant that is |
| 12 | closed and going under |
| 13 | renovations. And if they are |
| 14 | operating that outside bar |
| 15 | illegally, how come our Building |
| 16 | Department didn't catch it. |
| 17 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I just said, |
| 18 | I don't know why it wasn't |
| 19 | caught, Bill. I don't have an |
| 20 | answer for that. |
| 21 | MR. SWISKEY: It seems to me |
| 22 | that a lot of strange things are |
| 23 | going on in the Building |
| 24 | Department. When are we |
| 25 | getting the Senior Building |

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| 2 | Inspector. Because I got no |
| 3 | faith in the Building |
| 4 | Department. |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: That is part |
| 6 | of next year's budget. We have |
| 7 | to approve the budget first. |
| 8 | Then we will be looking for |
| 9 | somebody June 1st. |
| 10 | MR. SWISKEY: All right. |
| 11 | Thank you. |
| 12 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |
| 13 | You're next. |
| 14 | MS. Allen: Chatty Allen. |
| 15 | Fifth Avenue. I kind of want to |
| 16 | ducktail on what Bill said but I |
| 17 | have the opposite position of |
| 18 | Wiggins Street. First off, |
| 19 | before I forget to tell you. |
| 20 | After the meeting that little |
| 21 | Casey was telling you about. |
| 22 | Right at the corner there by the |
| 23 | with the train there. I |
| 24 | noticed this morning it is like |
| 25 | caving in. If you want to have |

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| 2 | somebody go down there and check |
| 3 | it out. I was in my bus. So I |
| 4 | wasn't able to snap a picture of |
| 5 | it to show you. |
| 6 | I have the opposite view of |
| 7 | turning it back to a two-way |
| 8 | street. The way you the way |
| 9 | the Mayor and Board presented it |
| 10 | is that the residents, you were |
| 11 | going to have them in that |
| 12 | little parking lot if they |
| 13 | didn't use their own driveways. |
| 14 | If no one had parked on that |
| 15 | road there is plenty of room for |
| 16 | two-way traffic and for the |
| 17 | ferry line itself. I use that |
| 18 | twice a day. I do it in the |
| 19 | height of the morning with the |
| 20 | ferries. You know, sometime we |
| 21 | have to sit and wait. My kids |
| 22 | know. Not a big deal. I also |
| 23 | use it in the afternoons as |
| 24 | well. And it is not as crowded. |
| 25 | When we have problems is |

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| 2 | when we have cars parked on both |
| 3 | sides. And we can't go passed, |
| 4 | but like you said and I agree |
| 5 | with finding who owns what |
| 6 | property because we found out a |
| 7 | few years back when we tried to |
| 8 | sell my step-parent's house, |
| 9 | which is the last house on |
| LO | Wiggins there, that the ferry |
| 11 | actually took over part of their |
| 12 | property. And they had to go |
| 13 | through a lot in order to be |
| L 4 | able to sell the home once both |
| 15 | of them had passed. So it would |
| L6 | be interesting to find who |
| L7 | actually owns what in that area. |
| 18 | I also commend you for now |
| 19 | starting to enforce different |
| 20 | parking regulations. I agree |
| 21 | with Johnson Court. The signs, |
| 22 | as far as I know, are still up |
| 23 | there. To me that is more of a |
| 24 | hazard than those streets when |
| 25 | the weather starts getting warm. |

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| 2 | Because people, you know, they |
| 3 | just park where they want to |
| 4 | park. They don't want to walk. |
| 5 | I see that all over. I see that |
| 6 | at the schools. It says, No |
| 7 | parking in the front circle, you |
| 8 | know, beyond 2 p.m. And we try |
| 9 | to pull our busses in and there |
| LO | is four cars sitting there and |
| 11 | we try to get them out. But I |
| 12 | agree with that and I commend |
| 13 | you for doing all of that. |
| L4 | I am also looking into what |
| 15 | we talked about at the work |
| L6 | session with the Boy Scout, Girl |
| L7 | Scout camp. I've got feelers |
| 18 | out. I can only remember one |
| 19 | other girl that was a scout with |
| 20 | me then. But we are going to |
| 21 | try to figure out exactly, you |
| 22 | know, if anyone does have the |
| 23 | photos for that. Jack is not |
| 24 | here. Thank you. |
| 25 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. |

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| 2 | MS. McINTYE: Good evening |
| 3 | Joanne McIntye (phonetic). 242 |
| 4 | Fifth Avenue. |
| 5 | Just a few issues. During |
| 6 | the wintertime with the snow |
| 7 | removal. The snow had been |
| 8 | around and the Inspector had |
| 9 | come around just to Notice |
| 10 | people, just to let them know, |
| 11 | to knock on the doors that you |
| 12 | need to remove your cars off the |
| 13 | road. They weren't ticketed at |
| 14 | all. These people know. They |
| 15 | have been told in the past. |
| 16 | They have been told by |
| 17 | residents, by homeowners nearby. |
| 18 | And the code enforcer does not |
| 19 | do anything but say, can you not |
| 20 | or, you know, their not home or |
| 21 | can you remove your car. If |
| 22 | they are not home nothing is |
| 23 | done. So I am not so sure that |
| 24 | just knocking on the doors has |
| 25 | been effective. |

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| 2 | The Notices I did like to |
| 3 | see come out and let the owners |
| 4 | of the homes that had that |
| 5 | rent these homes to other |
| 6 | people. Maybe that word is |
| 7 | passed along a little bit. It |
| 8 | had been better this year which |
| 9 | is greatly appreciated but not |
| 10 | as what I expected though. |
| 11 | I also do say that with |
| 12 | Meson Ole I am looking at the |
| 13 | project and what I do see and |
| 14 | have seen is a lot activity that |
| 15 | had been done over there. You |
| 16 | can't tell me that all of that |
| 17 | was emergency repair. That |
| 18 | place is gutted. And it has |
| 19 | been changed. The entire |
| 20 | exterior has been changed. You |
| 21 | know it. I know it. I believe |
| 22 | there are emergency repairs that |
| 23 | have to be done and it is a |
| 24 | little excessive. I think the |
| 25 | Building Inspector needs to look |

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| 2 | a little bit further and to |
| 3 | detail what is referred as |
| 4 | emergency repair as opposed to |
| 5 | the truth of what is necessary. |
| 6 | I would also like to talk |
| 7 | about mildly about |
| 8 | subdivisions. And what I would |
| 9 | like to find out is what the |
| 10 | status is going on in the |
| 11 | subdivisions. |
| 12 | As you know, being a Fifth |
| 13 | Avenue resident we have two |
| 14 | subdivisions that are in the |
| 15 | works. So 221 Fifth Avenue and |
| 16 | 238 Fifth Avenue. Also there |
| 17 | was another one that was on |
| 18 | Third Street which is I |
| 19 | believe I was 408 to 412 Third |
| 20 | Street and they were subdividing |
| 21 | that lot and that was supposed |
| 22 | to go to many years ago as |
| 23 | opposed to something that they |
| 24 | said the subdivision went |
| 25 | through many years ago. |

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| 2 | Something didn't go through. |
| 3 | Whatever the case, Mr. Prokop |
| 4 | was supposed to look into those |
| 5 | locations and what was going on |
| 6 | back then. I don't know what |
| 7 | happened from that point. Also, |
| 8 | there was a subdivision over the |
| 9 | summertime on Main Street with |
| 10 | Mr. Urban. So these four |
| 11 | subdivisions that I am aware of, |
| 12 | I would just like to find out |
| 13 | what the status is. Does |
| 14 | anybody know at all? |
| 15 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe |
| 16 | the one on Fifth Avenue went to |
| 17 | the Planning Board. They were |
| 18 | turned down. They are scheduled |
| 19 | whenever the applicant brings |
| 20 | it to the Zoning Board. They |
| 21 | have not been moved forward to |
| 22 | any other Boards at this point. |
| 23 | The one on Third Street was |
| 24 | pending litigation on that. |
| 25 | There his lawyers said he is |

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| 2 | sending us paperwork. And we'll |
| 3 | see what happens with that. |
| 4 | That was approved in 1997, I |
| 5 | believe. They said he never got |
| 6 | the paperwork. He sold the |
| 7 | property. He never went did |
| 8 | his paperwork. So it is a Catch |
| 9 | 22. He is saying we're wrong. |
| 10 | We are saying he is kind of |
| 11 | wrong. So we will see what |
| 12 | happens. |
| 13 | MS. McINTYE: So we are |
| 14 | assuming or I'm assuming the |
| 15 | 62 days passed. Somewhere along |
| 16 | the line somebody didn't pass on |
| 17 | an approval. He didn't file |
| 18 | with Suffolk County. And in my |
| 19 | opinion he should not be awarded |
| 20 | a subdivision on that. |
| 21 | MAYOR HUBBARD: And he |
| 22 | hasn't been. |
| 23 | MS. McINTYE: Yes. I agree |
| 24 | with that. Yes. As of today |
| 25 | but things slip through the |

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| 2 | woodwork here. And we just want |
| 3 | to make sure we are on track |
| 4 | here. |
| 5 | MAYOR HUBBARD: No. We are. |
| 6 | That still needs a signature |
| 7 | from the Zoning Board. He needs |
| 8 | a signature from the Zoning |
| 9 | Board now and they are not going |
| 10 | to act on something that |
| 11 | happened almost 20 almost 17 |
| 12 | years ago. |
| 13 | MS. McINTYE: Absolutely. |
| 14 | And |
| 15 | MR. PROKOP: That |
| 16 | application that you referred |
| 17 | to. I think it is on Third |
| 18 | Street. |
| 19 | MS. McINTYE: Yes. |
| 20 | MR. PROKOP: So that |
| 21 | application if I'm not |
| 22 | mistaken was an application for |
| 23 | a subdivision on that property. |
| 24 | And then the application was |
| 25 | withdrawn and the person |

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| 2 | notified the Village and said |
| 3 | that he realizes that it had |
| 4 | been previously approved. I |
| 5 | think that is more or less the |
| 6 | summary of what happened. And |
| 7 | the approval was basically 20 |
| 8 | years ago. |
| 9 | I reviewed the documents in |
| 10 | the Village that were relevant |
| 11 | to that. I reviewed the |
| 12 | relevant law. And it is my |
| 13 | opinion that at this time there |
| 14 | is no action to be taken by the |
| 15 | Village with regard to that |
| 16 | property. And I think there |
| 17 | was a letter to the Village I |
| 18 | believe from the attorney and I |
| 19 | believe we are waiting at this |
| 20 | point. |
| 21 | So when you said that I just |
| 22 | wanted to follow up and say that |
| 23 | because I just wanted to let you |
| 24 | know that I did in fact follow |
| 25 | up on it. And a good amount of |

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| 2 | work was put into it by the |
| 3 | Village staff pulling together |
| 4 | records that are here and are |
| 5 | not here. |
| 6 | MS. McINTYE: Because we all |
| 7 | do know that something that |
| 8 | happened 20 years ago, someone |
| 9 | that does not follow through |
| 10 | especially with Suffolk County |
| 11 | that, you know, who would expect |
| 12 | that that would go though at |
| 13 | that point in today's world. |
| 14 | You know, if it is something |
| 15 | that happened that many years |
| 16 | ago is not being permitted in |
| 17 | today's world. And that is |
| 18 | where I stand. |
| 19 | Has anybody heard anything |
| 20 | about in reference to the |
| 21 | Urban property on Main Street? |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: I have not |
| 23 | heard anything about that. Is |
| 24 | there any applications on it? |
| 25 | MR. PALLAS: I don't know. |

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| 2 | MR. SALADINO: It is First |
| 3 | Street. |
| 4 | MS. McINTYE: First Street. |
| 5 | Excuse me. First Street. |
| 6 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I |
| 7 | believe, if I remember, the |
| 8 | applicant had to bring further |
| 9 | information and I haven't seen |
| 10 | it come on any of the agendas. |
| 11 | So I'm assuming that the |
| 12 | applicant is still sitting with |
| 13 | whatever he needs to do if he is |
| 14 | going to move forward with it. |
| 15 | MS. McINTYE: And as far as |
| 16 | how the Village stands about |
| 17 | this, our Trustees and how the |
| 18 | Village is, do we feel that this |
| 19 | is a move to go forward on |
| 20 | subdivisions on substandard |
| 21 | lots. |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: That is |
| 23 | something that the Zoning and |
| 24 | Planning Board will be taking |
| 25 | care of. They know the code and |

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| 2 | they are acting on that. And I |
| 3 | have faith in the job that they |
| 4 | do and they will do what is |
| 5 | appropriate. |
| 6 | MS. McINTYE: If someone has |
| 7 | a 12,000 square foot, you know, |
| 8 | they still have to go through |
| 9 | the process. Why don't we make |
| 10 | something in effect in the books |
| 11 | and just make it make it |
| 12 | stand. Make it strong and be |
| 13 | able to say, hey, you don't have |
| 14 | a lot that is adequate. |
| 15 | Why are we splitting up |
| 16 | these lots and why would we want |
| 17 | to split up these lots and make |
| 18 | them smaller? Take a 15,000 |
| 19 | square foot lot, we could make |
| 20 | it 75,000. That is according to |
| 21 | the law. That's fine. How do |
| 22 | you take a 14,000, cut it in |
| 23 | half or subdivide it according |
| 24 | to what you would like to have |
| 25 | it and and it is not |

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| 2 | according to the law. |
| 3 | I totally agree that they |
| 4 | have to go through the process. |
| 5 | I completely understand it, but |
| 6 | why don't we follow through and |
| 7 | make it in our laws that you |
| 8 | cannot do this. I mean how much |
| 9 | smaller can you make our lots in |
| 10 | the Village of Greenport? |
| 11 | Honestly, I just I look to |
| 12 | see people in my backyard. How |
| 13 | many people? I have no privacy. |
| 14 | None. And that's what is |
| 15 | important to our people that |
| 16 | live here on a daily basis. Not |
| 17 | just renters or intransients or |
| 18 | people that come in and out of |
| 19 | this community. We're here. |
| 20 | I appreciate you listening |
| 21 | to me tonight. Thank you. |
| 22 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Does anybody |
| 23 | else wish to address the board? |
| 24 | (No response.) |
| 25 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We |

| 12 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, it will |
| 13 | be. We have also done contracts |
| 14 | with the Tall Ships. It will be |
| 15 | the same thing, the same idea. |
| 16 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I |
| 17 | just wanted to be sure. |
| 18 | MAYOR HUBBARD: So I offer |
| 19 | an amendment in the resolution, |
| 20 | resolution approving the gratis |
| 21 | dockage of the Yacht America on |
| 22 | June 8, 9 and 10, 2016 at the |
| 23 | Village of Greenport Mitchell |
| 24 | Park Marina, for the purposes of |
| 25 | including STEM educational |

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| 2 | programs for children aboard the |
| 3 | vessel. The Village Attorney |
| 4 | will draw up a contract to be |
| 5 | signed. |
| 6 | So moved. |
| 7 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second. |
| 8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor |
| 9 | of the amendment? |
| 10 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye. |
| 11 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye. |
| 12 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye. |

| 3 | Resolution 03-2016-34. |
| 4 | Resolution to request |
| 5 | pro-bono, third party legal |
| 6 | opinions on the feasibility of a |
| 7 | per passenger, per trip fee |
| 8 | attached to North Ferry Company |
| 9 | fares to compensate the Village |
| 10 | of Greenport. |
| 11 | So moved. |
| 12 | TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second. |
| 13 | TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have a |
| 14 | question about exactly what it |
| 15 | is at this point. I take it |
| 16 | you know, I'm not sure about |
| 17 | pro-bono legal opinions per se. |
| 18 | I would like as I said I |
| 19 | think we need, at least from my |
| 20 | perspective, more research into |
| 21 | who shook the area and whose |
| 22 | cost control is what before we |
| 23 | start looking for additional |

| 25 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The other |

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| 2 | comment that I would like to |
| 3 | make is that we County of |
| 4 | Suffolk is the agency that |
| 5 | regulates the ferry companies, |
| 6 | Peconic Bay and the North Ferry. |
| 7 | The fares are based upon |
| 8 | approval of Suffolk County |
| 9 | Legislature. There has been |
| LO | discussion in the past there |
| L1 | has been discussions with the |
| L2 | North Ferry. |
| L3 | My understanding is that at |
| L4 | some point they are going to be |
| L5 | applying to the county for |
| L6 | approval for another, larger |
| L7 | vessel. I think it is better for |
| L8 | us to work with them. We could |
| L9 | build into their fee schedule |
| 20 | some type of a a compensation |
| 21 | to the Village. Which I think |
| 22 | they are starting discussions to |
| 23 | be amenable to. I think we are |
| 24 | moving forward on that. |
| 25 | The only other way to change |

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| 2 | it would be to go to the State |
| 3 | of New York for a law which |
| 4 | would then create a toll. From |
| 5 | my understanding and then |
| 6 | that way New York would then be |
| 7 | controlling the toll booth. |
| 8 | I think at this point, |
| 9 | moving forward we I can't see |
| 10 | getting another opinion on this. |
| 11 | The Village Attorney has given |
| 12 | his views and the County of |
| 13 | Suffolk is going to say yay or |
| 14 | nay any way. |
| 15 | MR. ROBERTS: So the best |
| 16 | way for us to position ourselves |
| 17 | is the best way for us to |
| 18 | positions ourselves is to get |
| 19 | this to happen for the people |
| 20 | who live here is for us to |
| 21 | explore all possible avenues. |
| 22 | And the best way for us to get |
| 23 | the County Legislature to rule |
| 24 | in our favor on it is |
| 25 | assuming we at some point get |

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| 2 | people who are on this Board who |
| 3 | are in favor of it is for us |
| 4 | to start lobbying now. And we |
| 5 | can't lobby if we're saying that |
| 6 | I don't know anything about |
| 7 | these I heard a statement |
| 8 | Joseph, I would like to ask you |
| 9 | about. We are moving forward on |
| 10 | the ferry fee. I am not aware of |
| 11 | a we from this Board that has |
| 12 | moved forward on the ferry fee. |
| 13 | If that is happening I would |
| 14 | love to know about it. |
| 15 | But if we go and ask nicely |
| 16 | as Deputy Mayor Martilotta |
| 17 | likes to say, something along |
| 18 | the lines of, you know, if you |
| 19 | ask for something that is a |
| 20 | suggestion. If you require it |
| 21 | then that is a law. Going and |
| 22 | asking has no leverage. And |
| 23 | putting up a toll booth I am |
| 24 | up for exploring all options, |
| 25 | but what we need to do now on |

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| 2 | this Board is create leverage. |
| 3 | And we are starting very, very |
| 4 | at a great disadvantage |
| 5 | because there has been however |
| 6 | many years that they ferry has |
| 7 | been running through this |
| 8 | Village. That, in my view, is a |
| 9 | lack of leverage. |
| 10 | So I don't know. Let's |
| 11 | just use common sense here. |
| 12 | You've got to get as many |
| 13 | opinions as you can get. And it |
| 14 | is no disrespect to anybody |
| 15 | sitting at this table, no |
| 16 | disrespect to our Attorney, but |
| 17 | it just helps to get a fresh |
| 18 | perspective sometimes. Let our |
| 19 | attorney get back to the |
| 20 | day-to-day business of the |
| 21 | Village. |
| 22 | And I'll tell you this, if |
| 23 | if you vote this down the |
| 24 | only difference will be that |
| 25 | Trustee Doug Roberts is going to |

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| 2 | go make a bunch of phone calls |
| 3 | and ask for pro-bono legal |

| 5 | say that I am not representing |
| 6 | the Village Board. I am looking |
| 7 | for answers. If I get any good |

| 20 | think. They want to get paid |
| 21 | for the road damage. Let's go |
| 22 | let's go get some answers. |
| 23 | Thank you. |
| 24 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay I just |
| 25 | want to my comments on this, |

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| 2 | free legal advice, its like |
| 3 | getting a second opinion when |
| 4 | you go to the doctor. It is not |
| 5 | costing us anything. I really |
| 6 | wish we would just go and just |
| 7 | get the second opinion. I think |
| 8 | it is its not costing us |
| 9 | anything. What does it hurt to |
| 10 | go and ask. Nothing against |
| 11 | Joe. Like Trustee Roberts said, |
| 12 | it is a free, second opinion. I |
| 13 | would think I would hope that |
| 14 | we could just pass this. But |
| 15 | everyone has got their own |
| 16 | opinions on it. I think we |
| 17 | should pass it and get the |
| 18 | second opinion. |
| 19 | TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Mayor, |
| 20 | you and I have been to the North |
| 21 | Ferry recently. I am not sure |
| 22 | if you reported on that at the |
| 23 | work session. I think the North |
| 24 | Ferry has had a change of |
| 25 | attitude. I think there is a |

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| 2 | lot of discussion going on. I |
| 3 | think it is going to continue to |
| 4 | go on. They are aware of the |
| 5 | issue. |
| 6 | They, at the company have |
| 7 | issues on Shelter Island, as |
| 8 | well as here. I think that we |
| 9 | have that that we have |
| 10 | information going to other areas |
| 11 | that are ongoing and everyone is |
| 12 | going to talk. It is the first |
| 13 | time North Ferry has |
| 14 | communicated with the Village of |
| 15 | Greenport in the manner that has |
| 16 | been going on. |
| 17 | I am sorry I was not at the |
| 18 | work session, but I think at |
| 19 | this point this is just going to |
| 20 | be counterproductive. And I |
| 21 | think we just need to move |
| 22 | forward. Keep the discussions |
| 23 | going with North Ferry and keep |
| 24 | pushing forward to get the |
| 25 | Suffolk County Legislature and |

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| 2 | their budget review office to |
| 3 | include some type of a |
| 4 | percentage on top of the fees |
| 5 | when they go for the change |
| 6 | which they will be going for |
| 7 | soon. |
| 8 | MAYOR HUBBARD: Free advice |
| 9 | is never bad. Any other |
| 10 | discussion? |
