CHIEF MILLER: I have a few things. It came up at the warden's meeting, they wanted to know what the status of the LOSAP was and if all that stuff has been taken care of and sent into Penflex because some of the guys said they hadn't gotten their statements or whatnot.

CLERK PIRILLO: No, it hasn't been signed by all the trustees yet. It will be signed tonight and sent over.

CHIEF MILLER: Thanks.

Railroad. They have proposed a change in their schedule. I had attended a meeting with the East End Transportation Council, I think it's called, and they presented it to that group. I know there was a presentation at the Southold Town Board, and I asked them to come here to present it to the Village as well. So they'll be here next week to make that presentation to us.

Peconic Land Trust is prepared to present their plan for the end of the old Mobile property at the end of Fourth Street. They will be here to present.

I have the plans, I will e-mail them to the entire Board tomorrow morning, so you can get a look at them. I know you got the -- I believe you got copies for their wetlands permit, these are full-color renderings of their plans that I'll send out to everybody.

And last item as far as discussion, IGA has requested, they want to

The sidewalk is very wide there, it will still be passable. I think it may impact one parking space. I just got the easements documents and drawings either yesterday or today. I haven't had a chance to send them out, but I will get them out tomorrow as well.

I wanted to alert you to that. I don't know if we need a resolution, you know, for next week if nobody finds it objectionable. Again, there's zero impact or minimal impact on that, so that's it for that.

That's why they didn't start the paralleling, which is a separate project in and of itself, so they've caught up on all of those things that were outstanding and they've been focused in the last two or three weeks on the parallelling issues, and

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That wasn't the 11 12 capital, is that my understanding, it wasn't 13 just the capital? 14 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It wasn't just 15 capital, correct. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It includes all the 16 17 repairs? 18 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So now on line with 20 LIPA in doing what we're supposed to be 21 doing as far as maintenance? 22 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, we have 23 kept them informed on the major milestones, 24 and they have not had any issues with us at 25 this stage.

MS. ROBBINS: We had a meeting with them a year ago, year-and-a-half ago in Saratoga Springs where they actually gave us a rating of the work we had done and they approved, we were on track and doing well.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: The contract for the piping for the water separator that you're doing with the County, is there a conflict that you can't do --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There's a full County contract that we're piggy backing on. It's got all the whole -- whatever requirements there are for contracting is contained in the County contract. I can shoot you a copy of it, Joe.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Moving on to the Building Department. Nothing specific other than the activity has been very high. I'm sure you can see it around the Village, there's a lot of construction projects underway. That's good as well.

Moving to the Recreation Department.

Visitor's Dock is set. 6 7 moorings were put in place. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're charging, right? 9 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm sorry? 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Visitor's Dock, we're 12 gonna charge? 13 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We will charge 14 to the extent that we did last year. To the 15 extent we can, you know, as long as we can 16 catch people -- wrong word. As long as we 17 see people in time to get them before they 18 leave, we will do that, yes. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is there signage 20 down there? 21 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We did put 22 signage up. I don't know if it's still 23 there. I double check. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are you going to 25 bring up Dockwa or that's his --

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I mean, I can mention it. We have implemented the new reservation system that you all approved last month. We just implemented it, so we gonna have the training.

TREASURER BRANDT: We actually, just started the training beginning of, that was actually on Tuesday. We had some issues with some of the wording on the website, so we have been working on correcting that, making sure the rates are correct, so we haven't had an official launch yet. We should go live with it the beginning of next week, but we wanted to make sure that both Donna, Margo and myself have an understanding of how it is operated. It's a lot slicker and easier than we thought. We just had that first training. We'll try to get live on the website, have it up and running beginning of the week.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For the benefit of the public, can you just say briefly what Dockwa is?

TREASURER BRANDT: Dockwa is a

reservation system. It differs from the one we have been using. The one we currently have is an actual software installed on the computer, one computer in the marina office. It requires manual input. It requires taking a phone reservation and putting the information in.

Dockwa is an online reservation system that's being used throughout the Eastern Seaboard. They are all over the place right It allows us to use multiple locations to access it, it's a self-serving thing. other words, if someone wants to come to, they're in New Jersey and they're like, what's on Long Island, Greenport will pop up, it's free advertising. They click on that, they get the full rates, what's available. They can request online an reservation. Our end, we say yes to the reservation as long as we have the dock space, but it's all tracked in this program that's online.

The beauty of that is we have multiple locations doing the work at the same time,

there's no bottleneck. Also we get paid
upfront when the reservation is okayed,
money comes, we're paid right up front.

There's no going through that, so it's a lot
sleeker, it's a lot easier, there's a lot
less stress to the workers in the office
that are handling the reservation system.

And the reports generated are particular to what Paul was asking for. The certain reports when he first got here, we weren't able to produce them out off the old software, now this new software is able to do customizable reports so we can track different variables than we were before.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That system is geared though for the smaller transient spots, what about the bigger boats?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right now we're only using it for the transients. The larger boats, because of the size of the pier, at any one time, we have maybe six or seven, most of those are all summer long. We didn't want to complicate the system because it's a different setup. We do a

Proceedings - 4-20-2017 1 2 little more personal touch with the larger 3 boats to begin with, which obviously worked 4 out very well. As of now, I can tell you 5 that the East Bay was fully reserved for the 6 summer, there's no space. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Both sides? 8 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Both sides. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Congratulations. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. 11 We're using both sides? 12 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, we can 13 only use the end of the east side because of 14 the power that's there because we don't 15 really have anything once you get about 250 16 feet in. Actually right now, we're setting 17 up for two boats on the east side. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Last year, I think we 19 only had one, right? 20 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: One. 21 gonna have two. I've spoken with Claudio's 22 just to make sure they were aware of it as a 23 courtesy. I've also spoken with the North 24 Ferry to let them know because one of the 25 boats is rather large -- I was gonna send an

So we'll have, again, two boats at the The other side is basically full. There'll be times when you won't see boats there because they go out for a few days and come back, but if people call at this stage for any length of time, we have a three-day spot here, that's about it?

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: On heavy days, we can put a boat, just not offer it shore power on the further-in portion of the east side, right?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes, smaller boats.

We have done that on weekends, we have done that multiple times. We don't want any long stays there, it's just too tough to manage. And they always want power and then they try to run cords across the pier which

First one was from the Sewer Department. They're looking to transfer money between accounts where they're not needed to fund, nitrate recirculating pump, I don't know what that is. The control panel at the campground needs some servicing. I don't know what that's related to, I'm not familiar with that. I asked Adam about that, it's a bit above my head. So we're asking for a transfer of monies from water service interest debt to equipment secondary treatment, this is not hitting fund balance, we are just reassigning the expenses, so I want to be clear on that.

Second one is, this is a budget amendment, the second one coming up, this is to fund the installation of the oil-water separator that was just mentioned. I just got hold of this, the proposal that Paul mentioned, we just got this. I don't think

I think common sense makes it clear that the largest cause of traffic congestion at lower Third and that general area is the North Ferry Company.

I was thinking as I was watching a Planning Board meeting the other day, imagine if the North Ferry Company came today before our Planning Board for a so-called use evaluation to show us their site plan and the hub-bub there would be about traffic on Facebook.

So it's a pre-existing non-conforming use, it's one of the tiniest -- the little parcel that they use it's part of the larger MTA property, but the little piece of land that they rent from the MTA is tiny, and it creates the most chaos in the Village. think, you know, we have been talking about this for a while, we've sent some letters, I don't have high hopes for what those letters

I think a couple of us have reached out to Shelter Island Heights Corp. to ask them if they're willing to pitch in and help out with the issue, and I don't think they are unless, you know, forced to do so, so I'm coming to you tonight to ask you to join me, let's use politics, let's use our political power as a government, let's go and do some lobbying and, you know, the rates on ferries in Suffolk County are regulated by the Suffolk County legislature. At some point, the North Ferry has to go back for a rate increase and for years and years and years they've gone for rate increases and there's never that I'm aware of, been a discussion of, you know, what about some compensation for the people of the Village of Greenport who help you, you know, operate your business which I understand operates at a profit. It's a private corporation that we're dealing with, it's not a government, so they can operate in secret. We have to

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operate in the public view. So we don't really know what their books look like. But we got, you know, as we're all preparing --

We have time to get this done before Memorial Day. We have time to put together I think Paul and the team a decent plan. can put together a decent plan to do this if the Board wants to do it and then we could free up 30 or 40 parking spots this summer.

I think the public deserves us at least making a small step to help solve the problem.

MAYOR HUBBARD: I think if we do the maintenance agreement instead of 24 hour, you can make it 48 hours. That would be, you still can't park for a whole week there unless they're in the Jitney spot which is 20 spots for the Jitney and the other 20 people can's just park if they're leaving and going somewhere else and just park there. 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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The theme to my next two things is waste.

So Fifth Street Beach, I'm tired of seeing dog waste on the beach. You don't see dog waste, I rarely, if ever, see dog waste at Mitchell Park. And I think part of that is because we have those receptacles to pick up dog, you pick it up and there's garbage cans everywhere.

According to our code, it is actually illegal to have a dog in any public park and everybody violates it right and left, but at least when the Mitchell Park people violate it, they're picking up the waste.

So I'm proposing that we follow the logic here, in order to put doggy bag receptacles down at Fifth and Sixth Street Beach or Herzog Park, we need to first acknowledge that people are walking their dogs and then in order to put those things

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up, we have to basically say that can walk your dog there. So I'm proposing that --The Town of Southold, several years ago went through a process where they figured out, you know, and I sort of took their code here, I revised it for what I think would make more sense for the Village with smaller beaches that are, you know -- the only beach that we have is primarily a bathing beach, so I took out code for beaches that are a little more rustic, so I'm proposing that we legalize dog walking off-season and during early morning and late evening on-season on leashes only. I'm proposing that we then go and put up really good signage, we put up the receptacle things for the bags and put a code enforcement in place to make sure people clean up after their dogs so that every March and April it is not just a field of dog poo from people who just let their dogs run wild in February.

People have a theory that dog poo doesn't stick around when there's snow on the ground; it's gonna melt with the snow.

I guess I would ask the Board, let's either enforce the current law, let's take

just sort of go and there are people who, I think we all know and John Saladino reminds us every time that the real problem in the creek is that people just open up and dump into the creek, and so if we have a stronger customer service model around how we're getting to these boaters who want to pump-out, I don't see where there is harm in asking the CAC to come up with some ideas.

I mean, I would like to know the boat owner that purposely dumps his brown water in Stirling Harbor. I would love to meet those people because I would love to have a conversation with them. If it's happening that often, I would to get ahold of those people and have a one-on-one conversation with them.

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Some people, they go out further and do it, you know, they shouldn't do it at all, but I don't think that many people are dumping it right there, right sitting at the dock in the creek.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Then why have, why require pump-outs? I mean, you have to -I'm not an environmental expert -- I'm gonna give up.

MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, I understand the theory of what you're saying, but let's work with Paul and we could ask them, we don't need an official vote to ask them to give us a recommendation. When you're in a car, it's a lot worse.

I know many year ago, hedges were not considered part of the four-foot on a corner lot. To me that never made sense because a hedge could be just, can cause just as much of a blind spot as a fence. Not safe.

To me that's a huge liability when you have these, you know, you can have a dog that's laying down, a little kid that goes running and because it's now getting dark because there's really not a lot of lighting in that area where people are sitting, and the fact my other pet peeve

that people are drinking, you're not always paying the right amount of attention, someone goes to get up, they're tipsy, they fall on an animal, you know.

are all the way over on the other end, so I
can see their waste being left behind
because the owners have no clue where they

There are adults and children that are petrified of dogs and when you're down there and kids are playing, and they see a dog come running, I've seen kids freak out about it. I know I tense up because of my fear and almost being attacked on numerous occasions, you know.
