16	MAYOR HUBBARD: I have a few
17	announcements.
18	The little delay was we're
19	live-streaming the meeting tonight, so
20	it's our first time doing that, so if
21	you leave early, you can go home and
22	watch it. You don't have to wait for
23	the video tape.
24	Under announcements, the annual
25	May Mile Event will be held at Peconic

3	The first annual BID Mother's	
4	Sidewalk Sale will be held on also on	
5	May 7.	
6	The Village will be hosting the	
7	Memorial Day Parade this year, on May	
8	30th. That will be - Our Greenport	
9	Parade will be at 8 o'clock from the	
10	Arcade down to the end of the railroad	
11	dock and then back here with the	
12	children; and then the town-wide parade	
13	will be starting at 10 o'clock at	
14	Steamboat Corner with the dedication	
15	and speeches and everything first and	
16	then the parade will come through town	
17	and back here for refreshments	
18	afterwards.	
19	The Village Offices will be closed	
20	on May 30th in honor of Memorial Day.	
21	That's all the announcements. I'd	
22	like to ask the East End Seaport Museum	
23	up, we have a presentation from them.	
24	Come on up to the podium and let's	
25	chat.	
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MR. WILE: I have some giveaways to give everyone (handing).

I want to thank the Mayor and the Board for having us today. Especially, I would like to say thanks for, as many of you know, we were scheduled to appear here last month and I appreciate the courtesy when my mother was taken ill.

My name is Ian Wile. I am the current chairman of the East End Seaport Museum and Marine Foundation, and I would like to say thanks to both the community and the Village for having us today to talk a little bit about what we did in 2015, who we are, in case nobody knows it, and a little bit of a relook at what our mission is, why we are here, what we're doing, what we've been up to, and what is on deck for 2016.

A little bit about myself is, I'm a Greenport resident, Fifth Avenue. son goes to Greenport schools, as some Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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It's been really a privilege to participate in the museum, both as a citizen and then as a board member last year and being nominated as the chairman this year.

It gave me great pause to try and figure out what to do, what was this organization about; and so I set about a little bit in the last couple of months, really the beginning of the term was in January, I wanted to take an assessment to see what we did in 2015 because the way the organization works is there is a whole bunch of people, all the board members and volunteers, members and sponsors and donors all sort of are busy doing work just like in many of the volunteer boards and originations in this Village. Everybody takes on an awful lot on their own and has their own initiative and has their own almost

6 Regular Meeting 4/28/2016 entrepreneurial drive when it comes to this; so we aren't all aware of everything that is going on, again, for me to go and take a look and see what was accomplished in 2015. As I started to make the list and look at the pictures and images and hear stories from people who participated, it became clear that what I wanted to do was put together a little bit of a book which is what you have in front of you. It's sort of a visual guide, a little bit of a, almost a little in-house cheerleading for ourselves of what to try and beat and accomplish for next year, but it really -- for me, it was sort of a kind of a staggering set of accomplishments. I'll give you some of I hope you breeze through it, I hope you look through it a couple of times and it will generate some questions and maybe hopes and ideas for 2016. Some of the great victories from

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7 Regular Meeting 4/28/2016 1 2 last year is the aging aquarium. 3 750 gallon Peconic estuary aquarium was 4 completely redone with great, great 5 help from Long Island Aquarium. 6 sent all donated labor and time to 7 really refurbish the whole thing. 8 really was a remarkable accomplishment 9 to have it ready for our launch and 10 opening last Memorial Day. We'll 11 continue with that. I'm really 12 working, you know, really 13 reestablishing that as a grand focal 14 point of the museum, but that was a 15 true great accomplishment because a lot 16 was done with very little. 17 2015 also introduced a lecture 18 series, an adult-focused lecture series 19 that we introduced, you'll see a little 20 bit of rundown in there. We had, every 21 week throughout the summer, we had 22 talks from some local folks like Arnold 23 Scott, Pat London (phonetic), but also 24 somebody who has been working in 25 Antarctica. We had somebody discussing

George Washington in there and his
decision to move towards sea power, so
there was something, a little bit of
something for everybody; and I'm truly
excited about the lecture series list
that our board members have already
planned that I think could help really
establish this as an ongoing growing
piece. I have a list of the dates for
2016 that I'll share in a bit.

Some other highlights, obviously for us, you know, I think the thing for me is that before I got involved in the museum, all I really knew about it was Maritime Festival. I feel like that, you know, it seems like it exists for nothing all year round and then this like two-day blip and that was it; so for me it was really eye opening to see the stuff that happens 12 months a year of work and then really with this compressed set of focused events.

So this series is huge, but also what we do education-wise. There were Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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know, we can see it from here, it is important to remember that some of us have never been out on it.

We are a contributing partner to Glory Going Green and all of his projects with the Village kids on Saturdays, which are arts and sciences and, truthfully, it always seemed like this great club of kids and they learn music and science and everything like that, but just last week at our board meeting, we met one of the young men who has been a participant in that program over many years who came to present to the museum as a practice audience some science that was far beyond most of us in the room. showed his incredible passion for microbiology and everything. really, you know, as a community member made me proud to have been, not taking complete claim for all of the successes, but you know, it was really remarkable being at least one component

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We do cruises from the Peconic

Star. We send about a thousand people out on the bay, and last year it was

Captain Dave who knows just how to position the boat to get everybody their required selfie for Facebook so everybody looks like they only boat at sunset.

Land and Sea, I think, you know, everybody who participated in that last year felt like that was an interesting way to a great window into the shipyard, which is sometimes scary and closed off for the public working on the water. For me, one of the great, I don't know if it was accidental or just a wonderful component of that is that as everybody is leaving the doors opened up to the shed there and you could see all the work that was really happening. It was like this window into the other part that I would say 80 percent of the people walking around in

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this Village, certainly 90 percent of

the people on a Saturday, have no idea

what's happening, so it was really just

a -- it's not --

I'd like to reiterate that for me the museum is not about just preserving history but about taking a look at what is really happening right now and there is some amazing stuff that's going on.

Maritime Festival is obviously the big -- it was the 26th annual celebration, I know it's a big party, it takes over the Village. We all have, you know, we all end up working together to try and figure it out, and it's, you know, I think it's a thing that is now, if you look at the number of years, we're into a multigenerational approach here. are people whose kids are now, you know, they're bringing their kids, they were here as kids; so that's really an interesting perspective to approach it as we move into the future to see what Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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We do have some amazing things in 2016 that I would like to introduce. I have a full rundown, so I want to get you, you know, I don't want to take us all down with the whole list of the entire season as we have started to really develop. There is really quite a full list -- given that it's April, there is quite a full list of things on tap.

One of the things I would like to announce, I wasn't here obviously last week, and I'm not sure, I believe some mention was made of this, but the Paul Jerome Nautical Education, which is done in partnership with the Maritime Museum raised some money and put together two life-saving CPR classes or scholarships for two students. We had an essay contest and we have nominated the two, we've selected to two recipients. They both had to be from Greenport High; one is Madison Hilton,

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she is a sophomore; and Nicholas	
Wallace is a senior. Both of them will	
be attending life-saving courses in	
South Hampton courtesy of the Paul	
Jerome Fund.	

I would, at this point, like to
put a plug in for these two fine
people. If the Village is looking for
lifeguards, they will be trained up
shortly, and they have options for, to
pursue as their interest continuing on
into open-water classifications as
well. So we're very proud to extend
those two fine people who had to
compete against others to win an essay
contest and did fine work; so it's
kudos to the school; and, we'd like to
thank all the schools that were helpful
in getting the word out to their
students.

We do have this -- as I said, we have the calendar of events that's remarkable. There are a couple of pending things that I'd like to show.

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There is Kenny White, who many of you know was obviously a lifelong resident of the Village and a dedicated museum member and board member, we're having a celebration in his memory on May 22.

There will be a reception at the Village from 1:00 to 3:00. This is in conjunction with a tree planting, but it's not clear yet if the tree will be going in on that day, but certainly the reception at the museum, and there will be a plaque that we're dedicating at that moment.

We officially open on May 27th for Memorial Day with an opening exhibit exploring the local marine archeology.

We have an archeologist, Brett Pirillo (phonetic) who is going to, he comes from Brookhaven National Lab, and he will be introducing and showing off some its artifacts that he's found.

That will be our opening exhibit this year.

Many of you have heard and as this

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2 Village was kind enough to grant, we

3 have the Schooner America arriving

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4 shortly thereafter on the 9th and 10th

of June, and we're developing programs

6 for that. There will be tours dockside

7 available for free for students and

8 there will be a lecture, talk,

9 presentation on the 9th, that's a

10 Thursday, that will focus a little bit

on the history of Greenport and the

12 quest for the cup, but also some new

sailing opportunities in the Village,

and sort of a lively discussion with

other local resident, parts of the

sailing community and boating community

to both look at the historic schooner

and modern opportunity.

We have many school visits already planned. There is an educational program all year round that has limited capacity, so there is an opportunity to register kids to participate in these educational programs all through the year; and I'd encourage you to spread

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the word about those because the spots	
will fill up fast.	
We continue our lecture series all	
year, and I'd like to give you this.	
I'll give you this list to publish	
(indicating), and we will continue to	
publish them on our Facebook and	
websites and we will to push those	
through to the Village as we go.	
I think, you know, I obviously	
know that there has been a lot of	
discussion about the museum and its	
relationship to the Village; and there	
was a lot of talk about us last week	
and last month and maybe the month	
before and I'm not sure about the month	
before that, so I'm happy to answer	
some questions.	
I'll say that I'm, you know,	
particularly passionate about this	
institution. I think that it's a it	
accomplishes a remarkable amount of	
stuff for very little ask; and it's one	

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of these opportunities to actually do a

lot for the residents and kids who live

3 here, especially the kids. It's my

4 hope as the incoming chairman to see it

5 move more towards a year-round

6 institution and to continue programming

7 that isn't just specifically about

history and artifacts, but to make it a

9 living, breathing space. And we've

10 talked about things including taking

11 youth-boater-safety certificates and

12 providing those in-house during maybe

an off season so that there is space

14 and time. We can use that as a

15 classroom. We have had a number of

16 sailing instructors say that they would

17 volunteers to do some tactics lessons

18 and interesting things like that down

19 to, you know, can we set up a captain's

20 license ticket course and testing in

21 there, you know, in midwinter. You

22 know, anything we can do that is on

23 mission, I think is really important to

me, and I would like it be important to

all, of course.

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Before I open up to questions, I would say that I do have to say thank you to everybody who is here in support of us and frankly whoever has questions, but a huge thanks to all of our members, sponsors, donors, the Village, everybody who has been part of the challenge of running a non-profit in this environment and running yet another institution layered on the institution.

> I'm happy to answer any kind of I'm sure there are some. questions. know a few, but I'll take them as they are presented.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Is there anybody from the Board that has a question for Ian?

TRUSTEE ROBBINS: I just want to make a comment.

I participate in meetings with the District, and I had conversations with people on the Board here as well. of the things that I think create some

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speculation is that we don't have financial reports from you guys on a regular basis; and you know there are certainly people in the community who have argued, why isn't the museum paying rent, and I --

Number one, I just want to say I totally support the museum. I even worked on that building years ago when it was being constructed; but with that being said, I really feel if we had regular financial reports and we can see the profit and loss statement that would go along with giving us more information in terms of deciding if there is rent due and what that would be.

MR. WILE: So I can take it in a couple of parts. I think these are obviously, you know, these are all very clear and very important. One of the most important things to me in all this would be transparency, and I think openness is really important in this;

2 Essential in my mind if this is meant

3 to be a Village asset, if this should

4 be something that is important to all

of us, nobody should feel that it's

6 closed off or, you know, pieces of it

7 are not available.

From a financial standpoint, what

9 I can say is that it is somewhat of a

10 moving target. As another business

owner in town, I can tell you it looks

a lot like my own personal things. We

run slightly red until about May, gray,

darker gray, black and then, you know,

where we end up. I can tell you at the

end of last year, you know, we are not

17 red, but we are not -- it's not that

it's generating mad amounts of money.

I do understand that there is a feeling

20 that it must be, right, with all of the

21 activities and all the fundraising,

there must be just oodles of cash in

there.

 $\mathbb{R}$ 4 | What I can tell you as a public,

as a 501(c)3, our 990 form, which is

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6 right in myself. The 2014 document and

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8 publically available, and I'd be happy

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our tax filing at the end of the year is a public document. The 2015 document is due on May 15, so as soon as that is available, I will walk it past and past and past is all to provide copies of it.

What I can tell you from 2014 is that, you know, well, starting in 2013 its net after proceeds and expenses was minus \$25,000 in 2014. We fixed that and we netted a grand \$15,000 at the end of 12 months of programming, much of which will be pushed ahead in my mind too. It's not a lot of money compared to -- I know I heard a number out there of around \$12,000 a month offered for that space by the audience last week and so that gets us through the six weeks of that ask.

What I will say is we pushed ahead to earn enough money for our programming. It's not -- when you look Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

at our 990, what you'll see is that
most of the income comes from program
proceeds, so our cruises that we run,
not the asks and not the fundraisers
and not the, please, can you write us a
check, and all those things, but from
program revenue.

The other thing I do think is important to clarify, and I guess what I would say first is that, you know, as a Village resident, right, as a tax payer and Village resident, I understand and further would applaud the idea of, like, let's look under every rock and find untapped revenue and we should look everywhere; and some places, I believe you will discover that there is revenue and some places you'll discovery there is revenue best left to be sought elsewhere.

This particular institution, I
think, provides a huge service, but
further I think it's really important
to clarify the relationship of this

2	museum, the foundation and the Village.	
3	You know, I had to dig myself you	
4	know, as a volunteer, as a Village full	
5	of volunteers, I feel like there's,	
6	like the number of people that are in	
7	this room, we're all permanently bound	
8	to be on one of any of the boards in	
9	rotation, right. We're all probably	
10	going to serve on one of these things,	
11	so as a team of rotating volunteers who	
12	shows up for these things, you know,	
13	there is a little bit of catching up to	
14	figure out what went before and what is	
15	the history and institutional	
16	knowledge, and it's sort of a little	
17	fuzzy. So I had to go back and dig	
18	myself to see what that relationship	
19	is, and for clarification, I don't want	
20	to, you know, beat a dead horse if	
21	everybody knows it, but I'm not sure if	
22	everybody does and for my own sake,	
23	I'll clarify. The building is an MTA	
24	building, right, so a	
25	Long-Island-Railroad-owned building,	

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leased to the County who then has a sublease to the Village. The Village has a management agreement with the East End Seaport Museum and Marine Foundation for the consideration of \$1 which is totally fine to build, operate a museum.

There are a number of pieces of that that we're charged with doing in conjunction with that, it's part of our management agreement. We are supposed to chase down artifacts, you know, acquire some artifacts, curate some exhibits, create an educational program, promote the business of tourism for the Village of Greenport and maintain the entirety of the museum. As I'm reading that contract and looking at what I feel like we have been doing, I'm very pleased with our performance personally, and I think we can grow and even do better, but I do think it's interesting in that model, in that situation, the idea that there

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is missing rent or an opportunity for rent is somewhat confusing because as a foundation, we are operating the Village's museum and pleased to do so, and we feel like we have done some great things and have some really great things in store. //////

That said, I do think that as a Village, sort of, arm, as an opportunity in the Village, that there probably is opportunity for the museum to be a revenue generator, but I'd like to not think about it in such a rent or not-rent situation. We have inquiries to bring boats in all the time, you know, is it something that we can load up an off-season marina and be a draw for revenue in that space. Can we participate in projects together, can we chase down grants together. Part of the arrangement between the Village and the foundation is in fact to pursue one grant per year together as a joint grant. Can we come up with some funds

together that work towards the Village?

I think totally that is not to say that

I believe in any way that there a rent

From a financial clarity
standpoint, I think from the board to
ourself, for the foundation, we can be
more transparent about the PNL. I
don't think that that's necessarily -it's not a public document until the
tax filings, so I think that that would
be, you know, we would obviously want
to speak to counsel and CPA to make
sure that it doesn't risk our 501(c)3
in any way, but I see that we can be
communicative.

When I think about it, when I saw a number of, say \$12,000 a month and I see it multiplied out to \$144,000 a year, what I would say is that if I could be let off the chain to go fundraise that and not have to stare down concerns that we're just excessively raising money, what I'd Flynn Stenography & Transcription Servi

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rather do is create a curator position,

educational coordinator position, an

archivist position, a full-time

executive director position. It seems

to me there would be a place where I

would rather create careers and jobs

than funnel an invoice frankly that we couldn't pay back to our benefactor, so

I feel like there is better opportunity

to work together.

Long answer to your question, but it's important.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: May I follow up to that?

MR. WILE: Sure.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I think

you're here making the case, which I

think is something we can consider that

this would be a rent-free arrangement,

so I think what Trustee Robbins is

asking is not to just see the

statement, the public statement, but if

we're going to do that, that means the

five of us have to have the trust of

2 the folks out there and out there and

3 that we're taking revenue off the table

4 for a really good reason and we're

5 taking revenue off the table with a

6 partner that has the same level of

7 fiscal accountability that we do. For

8 example, I'm the liaison of the marina.

9 Anybody can go log onto the website

10 right now and see exactly what we spent

on what we spent it. They can see how

much we earned. They can see how much

profit made. So it's there's a sort of

public accounting that I have to do

15 with all these folks looking at me

right now.

So I would propose that if that is

18 going to be part of our negotiations or

part of our agreement, that you give us

a quarterly, and I think the

contract -- I don't have it in front of

me, I think the contract says you're

23 supposed to be giving us pretty

24 detailed reports, so transparency can

save the day, and that helps anybody

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2	who wants to say the museum should pay
3	X-Y-Z, I don't remember hearing the 12
4	grand number, but anybody who wants to
5	pay, you know
6	MR. WILE: I definitely read that
7	in every news outlet.
8	MR. SALADINO: It was \$12,000 a
9	year.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You get my
11	point, right? So if you're willing to
12	because that keeps the critics away
13	of such an arrangement. I'm not, you
14	know, promoting it or not. I want to
15	talk about it with you and others.
16	MR. WILE: Certainly, as I said, I
17	think that as part of our arrangement,
18	we can certainly make a more regular
19	appearance. Remember just in the same
20	way that you're in your first rounds
21	here, I'm in my first go around here,
22	so there are some things that I can do
23	to change our relationships, and we be
24	very transparent. It's a very easy
25	thing to be transparent about. There's

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This is what we spent this quarter, you know, so that everybody can see it.

MR. WILE: Agreed and not trying to stonewall, but I would like to say right away that anybody who is concerned about transparency and I've heard things about board members, you know, and salaries or any of these things, there is no reimbursement for board members, there very little staffing, there is very little in the way of anything outside of operations. It's a very lean organization. Most of the board members were, or some of our board members, not myself shamefully, were painting and scraping mold and doing all this kind of stuff to get ready for the coming season. personally happy to share that. don't think it's, I personally don't think it's appropriate to be in a

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public forum, I'm happy to discuss it with our, our contractee, right our management contractor, and I believe that's you to decide what to do with it.

I think that as I said, the quarterlies will show a certain thing, what they're going to show is in the first quarter, it's roughly a straight loss, right, we have insurance and expenses, no income. Second quarter, summer quarter begins to turn, third quarter, by the time we finally collect on the Maritime and some of the other events, you know, we kind of roundabout into a year-end, and that's why I reiterate, not that I don't want to share quarterly, but it's a yearly picture in the same way that any seasonal business in this town has been, and I'd like to see it be less seasonal a project, but the business of it is largely seasonal, right, we do more, we will raise more, do more,

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present more and receive more for
twelve weeds and as a result of all
that work, we can present programming
for Village resident year round.
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Would you
consider as part of your work trying

consider as part of your work trying
the support people trying to get going
in agriculture; can that be part of
this? To me the seaport has always
historically, this was one of the great
oyster capitals of the world.

MR. WILE: It's obviously available; it's a loaded question because I'm in that world as well.

I think what we have said today, everybody who has shown interest in participating in that museum, if there is a way that we can squint and make it fit the mission that we're charged with, which is to, and I'm going give it word for word, which is I think really important to remind us all and myself included every now and then that the mission says "On behalf of the

2 Village of Greenport, the East End

3 Seaport Museum and Marine Foundation is

4 proud to act as a steward of the

5 maritime heritage of the east end of

6 Long Island, celebrating our long and

varied history through artifacts and 7

8 exhibits, the operation support of Long

9 Beach Bar and Bud Light and the Village

10 Blacksmith. Additionally -- this is

11 key -- the museum offers a full

12 calendar of educational and cultural

13 events and seeks to make sure that our

14 community's connection to the water is

15 not relegated to history."

16 That last piece is our open door

17 to talk about issues related to

18 commercial fishing, how to start

19 agricultural business, how to move that

forward, how to, you know, have --

there is a burgeoning Long Island

Oyster Grower's Association that is in

23 its very infancy. You know, I think

24 they would love to be able to get

together and have a meeting there and

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make that space available. To me it's an old-fashion meeting space, and if it can fit uses that are both appropriate and, what I seek as chairman to be able to go to a donor or to a granting organization and say this is what we do for the community and this is what we'd like to do and have them say this is what I we would like to be a part of that because making all of these opportunities available is not a revenue generator. I can make that space available for agriculture meetings and we can do classes for the kids and we can teach boating safety, but those are not revenue generators. It's a nonprofit, we are going to have to seek some granting, some donors and some sponsors for some of these and we need to be able to do that without concern that it's just seeking money and not returning. That's a big reason for my presentation today is to show that we are returning what we've

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Defore, and we seek to return more.
You know, the goal is that that's an available space and as you're aware, at's hard enough to get sometimes beople to show up.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It could be an example of a grant we could go after together because it can be -- there's a lot of money economic development, and agriculture is growing.

The last thing I wanted to throw out. If we decided not to go with a rent payment, would you consider a rep share on the Maritime Festival because I think the Village does put considerable resources against it, so it could that be a way to help you cash-flow wise and again we'd have to talk numbers, but I'm guessing that that's doing pretty well, so would it be something you would consider?

MR. WILE: I'm an out-the-box person, so I'm going to say I'd consider everything. I'd say that

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asking for a piece of that is not your

strongest play. I'm going to honest.

(Applause.)

I'm going to be honest and say it takes a year to pull off. It's crazy for all of us, residents, museum folks, people who like it, people who don't like it, it's crazy all around. people swear and they love it and some people don't; and some people swear they like the tree out front of my house and some people hate it, you know, it's a polarizing event. It's a big event that's hard to do, and it's not, in my opinion and I've long said this, it shouldn't remain our sole fundraiser and it is, in fact, far from it, as I said, our largest revenue generator is from program activities and sponsorship, so to say -- I'm going step back from your specific question and address sort of the spirit of it which is there opportunity for revenue generation or revenue sharing --

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TRUSTEE ROBERTS: As partners.

MR. WILE: As partners and I come back to one of the real easy ones which is that there is an ongoing fleet of boats that would love to come in to the marina and the marina is empty now, empty in October and empty in late September, empty mid-week, and if we can help fill that, great. For the American, for example, different than in the past, we asked for a waiver for dockage, perhaps what needs to happen is a standing either marina budget or a house rate or something like that, where we know that I can act faster, so right now, on the table right now is the Mystic Whaler, one of the great sailing boats on the coast who would love to come here for Maritime Festival. I'd love to have them here. I'd love to put them on the railroad dock near the museum so could we do sales against that and do day sales and rent share of the day sales and we do Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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2 all the work and promote it, totally

3 available and on the table. A better

4 smarter move than trying to grab a

5 piece of the festival which the whole

6 goal is to generate some money for us

7 obviously as a fundraiser, where we're

8 charged as part of our management

9 agreement to promote tourism in

10 Greenport, so that is our largest piece

of that, of answering that contract.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So maybe it gets

bigger if we're able to put resources

14 against it.

MR. WILE: One of the ways to --

16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just to be clear

17 right now, my first year through as a

18 trustee, it was sort of like I would

bump into somebody that works at light

20 plant and they'd say, "oh, I had to go

21 hang a bunch of stuff for Maritime

22 Festival, "I'm thinking that's probably

23 not in your job description, so if --

and that said to me that maybe we're

not thinking ahead and maybe we're not

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partnering up and we're not strategizing enough and maybe this festival, you know, that parade could be maybe four times bigger and there could be all kinds of stuff we're not thinking about.

MR. WILE: I'll tell you where it can get bigger and where I can use the Village and it will be great.

Last year, we had, we were faced with sort of a crisis, a Maritime Festival crisis in the 11th hour when somebody at the insurance company finally looked at pictures of all of these wonderful Maritime Fests gone by and went, wait the maritime festival is near the water, and suddenly they said that sounds like a liability and rate to cover that festival went through the roof, so as a result, some of the maritime related activities got pared back so we didn't lose everything because it happened literally 24 hour before the festival. So we managed to

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pull it together to get coverage for the kayak race but every other piece of water got trimmed down, so as a, it's fuzzy territory as a municipality where some of this takes place, could, you know, do we get to hold some of the, can we give up some of the roughly \$10,000 in insurance coverage that Maritime Festival costs and work on that together. I'm all for it. think the Maritime Festival would be happy to use that money for something else. Could we, you know, we have talked before about having more demonstrations, more things in the street that are more interesting and again it's just the difficulty of getting people to show up and do these things. It's a very dense tourism season now, Sag Harbor's Festival is the week before, Southampton was even up against it. It's a dense season. Everybody's chasing the same, you know, 20,000 people around.

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So the question I would ask is does everybody want it to be that much larger or do we want it to be richer and if we can make it richer, than let's make it richer. If it has to be richer and larger, fine, but if -- for me, I'd like to have it mean more. think getting people on the water, near the water, demonstrations, you know, anything we can do along those lines is That requires some partnership with the Village in terms of the park, in terms of the streets, in terms of working together to decorate and all of those sorts of things, so a couple of things along those lines. WE have a standing maritime committee as part of transparency, one thing I would say is there are a lot of committees made out of one person because nobody wants to participate, they only want to talk about it later. Participate in the maritime committee, if you don't know how to get on it, call the museum, call

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partnership standpoint, I think there is great opportunities both from a project based thing, but also, you know, I think we have some great granting opportunities, there are also granting opportunities from the tourism standpoint from looking at the way the wine counsel and other groups work where they coordinate, I think we have some remarkable nonprofit organizations on this end, especially in this town by itself, but also a little broader. There is no reason that we can't chase down an overall I love New York Grand for example, where it would encompass the Stirling Historical, the Seaport Museum, Shelter Island Historical or you know, we can put it together as a group grant, and then last year, for every year for the last few years Wine Counsel has gotten \$750,000 for grants to showcase that there are Long Island I think many know that already, maybe we can ask them to showcase some

I just want to comment on this
one. Checking through the records of
the Clerk's Office and the Village
Administrator, it's in our code
already. It says that there is
supposed to be a stop sign at that
intersection. I don't know when it was
taken down. I don't remember it ever
being there. We don't need to have
this public hearing, we just need to
put it back up because it's already in
the code.

I didn't want to change the agenda. I just wanted to let everybody know about that, so that will be going back up. There is really no discussion on that, it's already done. Somebody had that idea a long time ago, you know.

The second public hearing is a proposed amendment to Chapter 132 of the Village of Greenport making Wiggins

Also with that it is proposed right now, there is no parking on the south side of the street from Memorial Day to Labor Day. The intention is to make it no parking year round for that block.

Also, we have, there are maps that we have here to show people on it.

We're looking at taking the entrance now to the parking lot that's right on the corner there, so you have to go through the ferry line to get into it, which problem-some at times. It's hard to get out.

We're proposing to make a curb cut
to just east of the last house on Third
Street on the south side, I mean on
Wiggins Street, and put a curb cut in
there so anybody along that block that
needs to park, they'll be entering the
parking lot from Wiggins Street to go
in, that way instead of having to go
through the ferry line to get out the

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Regular Meeting 4/28/2016 other end.

We also would like to designate, depending on what is needed there, every morning right now, there is about six to seven cars parked on the street. They do have driveways they could use, but if anybody needs to do that, we'd like to make it like resident parking spot and take five parking spots right in the beginning of that for residents that need to have a place to park, they could use those spots and we'll designate them resident parking.

That's the concept and that's the idea of it. The main goal that I've had, that we've discussed on this was to alleviate some of the traffic coming from the ferry, blocking up the entrance to Sterlington Commons all along that street, when the big boat unloads now, traffic gets all the way back to the ferry entrance, you can't move in and out, so the idea is for you to come off the ferry, go right up

The maps are available, and I'll open up for public comment. We're here to get some input on it; we want to talk about it.

MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184
Fifth Street.

George, if you remember, the concept of making Wiggins Street one way was because there were big problems there when the traffic -- a tractor trailer coming off the ferry, okay, all right, on side of Wiggins Street, the south side which is the ferry line, you're gonna have cars all the time in summer, Now if one of them happens to be a tractor trailer, he's gonna be sticking way out into one travel lane. You get another tractor trailer coming off the ferry, you ain't gonna have any room. And then -- this whole thing is just about inconveniencing the people on Wiggins Street more so we can kowtow

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their house. You're gonna make them

get off the street for the convenience

of people coming and going to Shelter

Island. They're gonna have to park in

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this parking lot, which I guarantee you'll never be able to reserve those parking spaces because they'll fill up in the summer. You know what it's like. Nobody's gonna write tickets. So and if they get a guest, where is the guest gonna park.

I don't think this thing has been thought out. I think it's time that the Village look more at what we can do for the residents of the Village of Greenport and the traffic coming up Third Street in the summer, well, we'll live with it. We've lived with it for I don't know how years. It's like I just don't understand it. There enough traffic -- have you ever -- you know, on Wiggins Street on a busy summer, the traffic can be blocked up all the way from, like to Sixth Street. I mean, there's been times when Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Streets were blocked by the ferry traffic. I mean, and this isn't gonna relieve it, this is just gonna --

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and they're gonna come off that ferry
like a bat out of hell, they're gonna
zip up that street, I guarantee ya, and
there's gonna be cars coming the other
way. The ferry line decides it, it
just won't work. I think these board
members and I think each board member
has to think individually in his heart
is this for the people of Wiggins
Street and the people of Greenport or
is this just something to help the
ferry out of a jam.

Let the ferry put some traffic control out there. The traffic control that they have now is a joke. In other words, traffic comes down Third Street, I mean, and it's not supposed to, okay, so then when you get through, you can then send them up Wiggins Street.

That's what this is about too. No.

Enough kowtowing to the ferry. I think every trustee here has to think about this really hard.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth

3 Avenue.

And I disagree with Bill. Ι'd like for you to get in a school bus and try and go down Wiggins when there is cars on both sides. People in the ferry line don't stay behind. I can't tell you how many times in the past three years, I have been hand up because cars are on both sides. you can't turn because people are coming the other way. I agree 100 percent with doing this because this way, if you're heading towards the ferry, someone comes down Third like they're not supposed to, instead of blocking up and congesting and causing accidents, the car is told go on Wiggins.

Every house on Wiggins has a driveway. You're going above and beyond accommodating them by giving them an extra space. Okay.

20 proposing from a bus driver's point of

view and from a personal point of view

22 to be able the go down Wiggins to avoid

some of the congestion and hopefully

avoid accidents because, believe me,

there has been more than once that I

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Regular Meeting 4/28/2016 have witnessed near accidents with the way it is, so I commend you and I support it 100 percent.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

Does anybody else want to address this?

MR. NELSON: Ron Nelson. Our house is at 310 Wiggins Street.

It seems to me that there's a real problem, there is no doubt you're making an effort to solve it. It seems to me though that this is not an inspired solution.

Clearly the problem is that the two-way traffic on Third Street that leads up to this sort of dead end, if Wiggins Street is a one-way street, it seems to me that there are some other options that haven't been considered, like making Third Street one way, or make it two ways just so far as down to Sterling Commons so people can get to Sterling Commons without going around the block, but, you know, you would

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want a one-way street between the
entrance to Sterling Commons and

Wiggins Street. That seems like a

5 possibility.

The other thing that seems to me is sort disastrous about this proposal for making Wiggins two way is that the traffic off the ferry, we'll see again a lot of traffic stopped at the light and say hey this s easy, I'm just gonna turn left and go down Wiggins, so the traffic, you know, that's gonna be on Wiggins Street is just going to be crazy.

Another problem is not everybody
on Wiggins Street has a driveway that
is conveniently located near the entry
to their house. I can say my
sister—in—law at 320 Wiggins Street has
a driveway that is located on the far
side of her house. Since her knee
operation, her mobility is not really
great and this is not going to be very
handy at all to have to go walking

It's a tough question. People on

It's a tough question. People on Wiggins deserve a lot of consideration. They're the ones that, I guess, suffer the most, you know, so I would tend to listen to them more than you should listen to me, and differently more than Swiskey.

I didn't want to get into dynamics of accommodating the ferry, and it's obvious to the Board, as it is to rest of us, that the good part of the people, a good portion of the people getting off the ferry are going to direct to Wiggins Street and increase the traffic there.

I don't know. I love the idea of the stop sign, but without the two-way street, the stop sign is kind of like

MAYOR HUBBARD: There's no place

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to go.

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MR. SALADINO: -- no place to go.

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So good luck.

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MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

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Anybody else want to comment on

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this?

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Okay, just to add a couple other

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points. I mean, I take the ferry six

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days a week to go to work. I'm down

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there every morning.

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The ferry line usually gets bad around 7:00 to 7:15 until around 8:30, 9 o'clock and then it' not bed after that, so this wouldn't really be a factor most times except for during the summer on Friday and Saturday when everybody is heading that way. It's worse at those points, but with two-way traffic on there, it's no worse than going down Central Avenue or Fifth Avenue or Bay Avenue with somebody coming the other way. We give a little and you take a little and everybody.

Right now, with the people going up Wiggins Street the wrong way, around the school bus and everything else to get in the line with no other way to get there is a hazard, I see it every morning. The line is built up, instead of going around the block, we tell them to do that, they just scoot down there one way, do a U-turn and get in the back of the line, which to me, I see it quite often, I think that's a hazard.

Is it a great solution? No, I

don't think there really is a good

solution. There has been talk about it

for 40 years down there, what to do

with ferry and everything else. I

think we're attempting to try to solve

a problem. The bigger boats have

created a bigger problem because now

you got 25 cars at once instead of 12

cars and when they unload, they're back

past the Blue Canoe, and nobody can get

in or out of Sterlington Commons or

other places because the line is son

2 long. It used to be half the amount of

3 cars, now they're there all at once, so

4 we're trying to alleviate that some by

5 giving them another way to go.

Also with possible development on the end of Third Street which could be coming, there's stuff before our Boards along with the Mason Ole, there's going to be more traffic down there, and trying to get people a different way to get out instead of waiting for the stoplight, what's the intention of

There is a lot that I think that we should be working together on instead of working against each other for; and I feel like in the last several years, there has been major headway in that manner. We have people on the Board that care, people in the community that care and people that volunteer in these groups that care; and rather than working against each other, we should be working together, and I think that's the main thing we're all looking for here.

I took a lot of notes in the public comments tonight and I don't want to take up more time because we're already into a late hour.

There are a lot of things that people don't legally understand with the agreements that the museum has or that the bid has when it was formulated

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2 or why Mitchell can or cannot be used

3 for certain things; and it's hard to

4 understand and access all of those

5 things. The reason that I became

6 involved is because I wanted to.

When we look at revenue centers,

8 we have a (inaudible) we have an office

9 marina that has catering capabilities.

6 how I can help them because I

out for all of these different groups,

14 those when those are the people putting

residents here, and all I'm asking for

is a little bit more understanding, a

16 little bit more clarification, and if

that is difficult right now, I'm

18 standing here being a fifth-year

19 resident, fifth-year business owner and

I understand that, I'm doing the same

21 thing, but I'm still doing it with a

smile on my face and I'm still doing it

shaking someone's hand and I'm still

doing that and inviting them into my

space. I just don't appreciate doing

it where I feel scrutinized for trying to create a community around where I wanted or thought I was going to move into a community.

I look forward to and hope that in the next year and the years to come that we can create more of these things together because growing up in Babylon in Suffolk on the south shore, my most memorable school trips are these things, and the reason that I live on the east end are the trips I took out here to the museums, are the trips I took out here to stand in the bay and that's the reason I'm here, and that's why I think that we should continue to build community and work together.

MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street.

I wasn't going to comment on the museum or else I would have done it after the presentation; and it's true volunteers advocate for what interests

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them, for what they feel is important, as Ms. Phillips said, the bid and the I've stood at this podium for museum. years not advocating for the bid or for the museum, but for the 2,200 residents that perhaps don't benefit from those things. Perhaps to say that with some people, it's first and foremost in their mind, and if they chose to do that, that's fine. Again, I stood at this podium for years, never advocated for anything for myself, it was always for the Village, the people here that were on this Board for those years, if they chose to, could attest to that. I don't think it's adversarial. I think that people that ask questions have a legitimate reason to do so, especially if the Village is subsidizing some endeavor, whether it be the museum or a festival or whatever. If it's taxpayer's money being fronted to do those things, all 2,200 residents have a right to question it. You can answer

Regular Meeting 4/28/2016 or you cannot.

As far as the outrageous rents being suggested, I made the comment, \$12,000, it was in response to words that I heard from the Board that the museum was to pay or should pay \$8,000 a year. I never mention \$12,000 a month, perhaps if I was a different business owner, I could pay \$12,000 a month, but I can't, but I can pay \$12,000 a year, and I didn't think it was outrageous that they paid \$8,000 a year.

To suggest that people don't have a right to question what's going on with a Village asset, I find that mildly insulting. I think if you look for a subsidy from the Village, you should be willing to explain it. If the reward is -- if the Village's subsidy helps everybody, than fine, give it to them; if it helps one class of people or one demographic of the Village, you should have to explain why Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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you're doing that. What's the tradeoff

for the residents?

I didn't think anything said last month was adversarial. I took exception to the price, the people on the Board that know me, it's always about money with me, you know.

So I would have said that -- I wasn't prepared to say that at all until the last speaker, so I'll say it now.

If you'll allow me, I'd like to present an alternative opinion to Mr. Swiskey's about the ZBA. In the interest of full discloser, I'm a member of the ZBA.

If Eileen was here, 5 she could have given -- I believe it 6 was three years ago, all the marinas on 7 the south side of, mini marinas on the 8 south side of Sterling Creek that they 9 would have to comply. Trustee Phillips 10 knows better than me. My estimation is 11 750 boats, 400 at (inaudible) 200 at 12 Sterling Harbor and the rest were on 13 the Creek, one pump-out, Sky Gonzalez 14 (phonetic) stepped up and had an 15 application and agreed right off and put the pump-out in. God I wish there 16 17 was more guys like that, but there's 18 not. 19 20 required to put the pump-out in in

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Sterling Harbor, by resolution was required to put the pump-out in in addition to their pump-out boat. I don't want to be insulting to anybody, but what they did was a joke. It's a toy.

I guess my comment is before we Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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think about spending \$5 million, look

for the easy solution. By law, they're

mandated to put these pump-outs in. In

1997, they had three years to comply as
a courtesy; no one did.

Before we think about a \$5 million sewer project, which is a good idea if somebody comes up with the 5 million, but you should look for the easiest solution first. There 750 boats in that creek, and it effects the whole Village because of MS4 because of they're complying with MS4 because it's an impaired waterway, that's the reason we have to comply, one of the reasons. So I guess what I'm saying is we have to be serious about it, we can talk about it and pretend we're serious about it or we can actually do it. It's not that hard. It's a no-cost item to the Village, no-cost item to the Village and between that and maybe we don't pretend that wetlands permits last for 20 years or 25 years, you

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know, so between pathogens and suspended sedimentation and all the other things that are going on in Sterling creek, before we spend \$5 million on a sewer project that has no effect so far, there's 19 houses on Sandy, I'm not sure, compared to the 700 boats in Sterling Creek.

Thank you for listening.

MR. TASKER: Good evening. Arthur Tasker. I live on Sandy Beach, 17 Beach Road.

I don't think John's had a complete opportunity to review the proposals that have been presented by the Board from the engineering firms, but certainly it's not the 26 houses on Sandy Beach that are the only ones who would be served by a sewer system. stood here, interestingly, and remarked about the lack of pump-outs in all the mini marinas along the east side and west side of Sterling Creek. I stood here in 1992 when one of the clients or

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real estate people was in here looking for a permit to replace his dock and it turned out the proponent or the person who wanted to build the dock, the dock builder who we all know well, mentioned something about the LWRP, and I had never heard of the LWRP; so I went over to the Village Hall and found out that the LWRP didn't permit construction and commercial use of that narrow little strip of land along Sterling Creek. The Board gave him a Wetlands Permit anyway, and it had to do with the influence of the realtor and so forth in terms of the particular person who bought it, but that person was required to put in a pump-out at his mini marina.

Now, that's notwithstanding the fact that, I forget exactly which provision of the code it is, but it's not a marina — they got around this by, I think it was Ben Burns saying, well, it's not a marina and that's

2 because the definition of marina in the

3 Village Code, can you believe this, the

only definition of marina is a place to

5 store boats that sells marine supplies,

6 and since this guy wasn't selling

7 marine supplies, it wasn't a marina and

8 therefore, he shouldn't be restricted

9 from having eight or ten boats when the

10 code specifically requires that family

boatyards, as they may be called, can

only have four boats, and he was

13 standing there saying, he's gonna put

ten boat in, and it went through; so

15 that's why the west side of Sterling

16 Creek is like it is.

But let's get back to the sewer

18 issue. Indeed, boats coming out of

19 Sterling Creek have a great deal to do

20 with it, but it isn't just the

21 pollution in Sterling Creek we were

talking about, that isn't why the

23 residents on Sandy Beach and hooking

24 all the way around to Manhasset where

25 there are substantial number of

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prospective users, we want a sewer because we are in a very small neck of sand and we have cesspools, not even septic systems. In fact, going back to this hearing that I was talking about, this same person who was the proponent for the dock builder was criticizing me, who am I to talk when I've got a cesspool on Sandy Beach, and the answer to that is why didn't you, when you were the Village Trustee, and he had been, why didn't you propose a sewer for us on Sandy Beach and then you couldn't raise that question.

So there's a lot of murky mud and other things floating around here in the water that need to be addressed.

But the idea that you can fix it, you can deal with the need for a sewer by saying four people will pump-out is a pipe dream, and it's not a solution.

It should certainly be done, but it's not a solution to the need of the people on Sandy Beach. If they have

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more than three or four guests over a
weekend, they have to call Daisy Morris
on Monday morning because the cesspools
don't have the capacity.

MS. FINNE: Tina Finne, I live at 120 Center Street, Greenport.

I spoke to the Mayor this morning.

I live in a neighborhood where, over
the last 27 years, besides our house,
we bought three other houses and
rehabbed it, and we sold them, and
tried to make the neighborhood nicer.

I have a lot of concerns about housing in the Village. I have had a lot of concerns about what's going on lately with people trying to build up and take over neighborhoods and overcrowding.

Then I received an e-mail from Mr.

I think I have been now on the Zoning Board of Appeals for almost two years, not quite two years; and what I've become aware of is that all issues that deal with housing, whether it's Airbnb or where a house is being built or whose investing or what is happening to the reconversion of the houses that were once one-family, then became two-family and are now becoming one-family again because investment is increasing in the Village, all of those issues are full of terrible tensions;

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and I think that the idea of having a group of people who meet every once in a while and communicate on Facebook and try to work through these tensions and sort of come up with other ideas is a good thing.

It may be that Doug did not present it as he should have, but I think the tension over this particular moment should not obscure the need for a group of people who really focus in a sort of informal way on the Village's housing problems. It is certainly true that in one-square mile, we can't solve all the problems of housing. Long Island as a whole has a huge housing crisis, and, in fact, Greenport is not quite as bad as many other places in terms of the shortage of lower income and workforce and attainable housing, there are many different labels, but as some of you know, I wrote a book about Greenport, and while I was writing the book, I was interviewing people from

all walks of life, and in discussing	
education, law enforcement, housing,	
medical matters, healthcare system, the	
area that came up most often as an area	
of problems was housing. It was	
interviews from all sorts of people,	
and I learned there are Village	
employees who cannot afford to live in

There are young farmers that are being	
brought here by Peconic Land Trust, and	
they can't afford to live in the	
Village. So the need for housing is	
extreme, and I think it's not, of	
course, not true that we can deal with	
all those problems, but we can deal	
with some of them, and I think in order	
to deal with some of them, a group that	
would get together and try to relieve	
some of these tensions and try to	
figure out where the opportunities are	
is a very good idea.

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George, I think you and I are the only two here that go back far enough to remember. Do you remember how many affordable houses, these are single-family house built in this Village when your father was mayor? think we built 15 or 20 affordable They're lived in by families houses. now, some have been sold. We built Lakeside Gardens Complex. To say that the Village has not done anything, the Village has done a lot, and there is only so much the Village can do. There's no more land to build affordable houses, and the two-family houses that people -- we helped the elderly fix up and they had varmints and everything else, but there was money from the Federal Program. all got done. Now Greenport's complexion has changed and we can't do anything about it.

The house on -- do you remember

Figorelli's (phonetic) house on Fifth

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Street, you know, you know Andy, well, that was a two-family house. Somebody came in from Westchester bought it for 600,000, stuck another 600,000, but that's gonna happen and there is nothing that we can do about it. The Village is built out, and if you want housing, you got to go to the Town because —

You speak about the Peconic Land
Trust. Do you know how much land they
own in between Suffolk County and
Nassau? It's tens and twenty millions
of dollars and they take more off the
tax rolls every day. They take land
off that could be used to build
affordable housing. Maybe the Village
should get together with the Town and
say stop, enough is enough, quit buying
land for preservation because all that
does is make everything else that's
left dry up. There was somebody that
actually, a couple of them, the people
had money, they wanted to build an

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affordable-housing complex between, I
guess it's Manhasset Avenue there, you
know that enchantment place, that big
empty property, well, suddenly as soon
as the word came out, one of these, I
forget whether it was the Land Trust or
whatever, they bought the land up.

Now, why is that even allowed to happen? Why are they allowed to use public money to take this land? You could have 40, 50 affordable houses there, so maybe somebody should —Doug, you should go to the Town and ask them what the hell is Southold Town doing because they're doing squat. They make a lot of promises and they do nothing.

-- I've been looking at them for 20 years, and they do nothing, but the Village has done more than its share.

And Tina, you know the Section 8
is a thankless job, but she provides
help, provides apartments for, I don't
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know how many, and it's hard to find
them because the landlords, the older
people are dying, the houses suddenly
they're becoming a \$1 million mansion,
like on my street, still they struggle
and they should be given credit.

The Peconic Land Trust, the Trust for Public Land, the Nature conservancy does not get any public money at all.

They rely entirely on contributions from individuals, foundations and things like that, but it is entirely non-public money. I know that because over the course of my dealings with the Nature Conservancy, I help them preserve 160,000 acres in the Adirondacks. I help preserve 3,000 acres of land that was the last piece of Baxter State Park in Maine that

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2 Percival Baxter, the Governor, had been 3 unable to purchase that was added to 4 it, it was the jewel of Baxter State 5 Park; and I also helped preserve 22 6 acres of Sound front and Ancient Beach 7 Forest on Sound Bluffs in Riverhead 8 that would have been developed into 9 houses and not affordable housing you 10 can be sure, but I want to make sure 11 that you know Land Trusts and Land 12 Preservation organizations have nothing 13 to do with public money and everything 14 to do, particularly with Peconic Land 15 Trust, their particular interest is in 16 preserving farmland and keeping it in 17 farming, so it doesn't become 18 mini-mansions spread all over the 19 potato fields of Bridge Hampton. 20 Thank you. 21 (Applause.) 22 MR. 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tonight that we're spending some money on parks, one of my passions is volunteering to beautify the parks in the Village, and I just want the -- the residents of Fifth Street and the area around it have been subsidizing the park for quite a few years now and we need some help. This Local Law shall be entitled "Local Law of 2016 Amending Section 132-39 of the Greenport Village Code Making Wiggins Street a Two Way Street."

### 1.2. Enactment.

Pursuant to Section 10 of the Home Rule Law and the Village Law of the State of New York, the Incorporated Village of Greenport, County of Suffolk and State of New York, hereby enacts by this Local Law of 2016, a Local Law of the Village of Greenport.

#### 1.3. Effective Date.

This Local Law shall take effect on the filing of the approved Local Law with the

Secretary of State of New York, which shall be with in twenty (20) days after its approval by the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of Greenport.

## 1.4 Purpose and Intent of Local Law.

The purpose and intent of this Local Law is to provide for the orderly flow of traffic in the transportation center area and the downtown areas of the Village of Greenport.

## 2.0 General Provisions.

2.1 Section 132-39 of the Greenport Village Code is hereby amended to delete Wiggins Street from the schedule of one way streets in the Village of Greenport, restoring Wiggins Street as a two way street.

## 3.0 Severability

In the event that any section or portion of this Local Law or Chapter shall be deemed void or not effective, the remaining provisions of this Local Law and Chapter shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **CONTRACT FOR VENDOR SERVICES**

AGREEMENT, made this day of 2016 by and between the Village of Greenport, with offices located at 236 Third Street, Greenport, New York 11944, party of the first part (the "Village") and Harry Munroe, with an address of 32 Laurelton Avenue, Lake Grove, New York 11755 (the "Contractor").

WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the promises and the agreements herein contained, and the payments herein provided to be made, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. The Contractor shall perform all services required to be performed and completed as outlined (the "Contract Work") in the March 7, 2015 Request for Proposals (the "RFP") and the Contractor's proposal (together with the RFP the ("Contract Documents") as follows:
- A. Beginning on or about March 1, 2016, prepare Park for opening on May 1, 2016, and closing on October 31, 2016, and complete clean-up at closing, including verifying that electricity and water are turned on at opening, bathroom facilities are cleaned and prepared, and general clean up are performed, and that all services are turned off and trailers are removed by the closing of the Park on October 31, 2016.
- B. Collect all rents and fees when due and deliver rental fees to the Village offices on a daily basis, and work in conjunction with Village staff to assure accurate and timely accounting.
- C. Ensure that all parties for seasonal rentals execute rental agreements, provide identification and vehicle registration, and abide by campground rules and regulations, and leave in a timely and orderly manner at the end of their stay, and assist Village staff with the off-season registration process.
- D. Maintain the park grounds, including cleaning up and refuse left behind by campers, weed-whacking, mowing grass & overgrowth where riding Village lawnmowers cannot clear, checking all plumbing and electrical systems to ensure proper functioning, perform periodic Fall and Spring cleanups.
- E. Bathrooms will be checked and cleaned daily, re-stocked when necessary, and thoroughly cleaned weekly.
- F. Act as point of contact for all campers, handle camper inquiries and concerns, as needed, and resolve conflicts when required.
- G. Flexible on-site hours, with phone availability hours more regulated. Minimum of 15 hours on-site over five days per calendar week, including at least one weekend day.

- H. Additional duties related to the above that may reasonably be requested by the Village.
- 2. In consideration of the Contractor satisfactorily performing this Contract the Village of Greenport shall pay the Contractor the amount of \$16 per hour for service time provided with services to be provided at a minimum of 15 hours per week of the Contract period, and the Village will also provide a space for the Contractor's personal camper, at no charge to the Contractor, for the duration of time of the Contract.
- 3. The Contractor shall not assign or subcontract this Contract or any part thereof and shall not employ any Subcontractor or other person or organization (including those who are to furnish the physical of material or equipment), whether initially or as a substitute.
- 4. This agreement establishes a contract vendor-vendee relationship only between the Village and the Contractor and the neither the Contractor or any agent, employee, helper or assistant of the Contractor shall be considered an employee of the Village of Greenport. The Contractor shall procure and maintain where required, at Contractor's own expense, and without any contract expense to the Village, workman's compensation insurance, New York State disability insurance, and liability insurance and be prepared to provide the Village of Greenport proof of that coverage on request.
- 5. Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold the Village of Greenport harmless for any damages, fees or costs incurred by the Village of Greenport due to any negligent or intentional act or omission by Contractor.
- 6. Payment shall be made by the Village to the Contractor on a semiweekly basis, on the basis of invoices to be prepared and submitted by the Contractor.
- 7. Contractor shall provide the required services in a professional manner, to the best of the Contractor's ability, and in accordance with the Contract Documents. The Village of Greenport reserves the right to terminate this Contract at any time in the event that Contractor fails to provide the required services in a satisfactory manner or violates any provision of this Contract or the Contract Documents.
- 8. This Contract, and the Contract Documents constitute the entire agreement between the Village of Greenport and the Contractor and the Contract may only be altered, amended or repealed by a duly executed written instrument signed by both the Contractor and the Village.

This Local Law shall be entitled "Local Law of 2016 Amending Chapter 132 of the Greenport Village Code to amend Section 132-23.1 to add additional parking regulations and Section 132-37C regarding fines and penalties."

#### 1.2. Enactment.

Pursuant to Section 10 of the Home Rule Law and the Village Law of the State of New York, the Incorporated Village of Greenport, County of Suffolk and State of New York, hereby enacts by this Local Law of 2016, a Local Law of the Village of

Greenport.

#### 1.3. Effective Date.

This Local Law shall take effect on the filing of the approved Local Law with the Secretary of State of New York, which shall be with in twenty (20) days after its approval by the Board of Trustees of the Incorporated Village of Greenport.

#### 1.4 Purpose and Intent of Local Law.

The purpose and intent of this Local Law is to create two additional handicap parking spaces in the Village to enact parking regulations for the Village of Greenport would be similar to existing Town of Southold regulations for more efficient regulation and enforcement.

- 2.0 General Provisions.
- 2.1 The following Sections shall be added to Chapter 132 of the Greenport Village Code.
- 132-23.3 No person shall double-park a vehicle on any Village of public highway or roadway.
- 132-23.4 No person shall park a vehicle in whole or part on a sidewalk located adjacent to a highway.
- 132-23.5 No vehicle shall be parked upon any public highway or roadway without first being registered and inspected pursuant to the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York.
- 132-23.6 On a one-way roadway, vehicles shall be parked facing in the direction of authorized traffic movement; on a two-way roadway, such motor vehicle

shall be facing in the direction of authorized traffic movement on that portion of the roadway on which the vehicle rests.

- 132-23.7 No person shall park a vehicle so as to obstruct any driveway except with express permission of the owner.
- 132-23.8 In an established or designated parking area, a vehicle is to be wholly within the markings or signage where established or designated lines and markings are indicated."

#### 2.2 Amendment to Section 132-37C

Section 137-32C of the Greenport Village Code shall be amended to read as follows:

132-37C. Penalties and Penalties for overdue fines.

- 1. The fine for a violation of any provision of the Chapter 132 unless specifically set as a different amount shall be \$75.
- 2. In the event that the fine due for a violation of this chapter is not paid within 30 days of the date of the issuance of the ticket for the violation, there shall be a penalty of \$50 imposed on the original amount of the fine for the violation ticket.
- 3. In the event that the fine due for a violation of this chapter is not paid within 60 days of the date of the issuance of the ticket for the violation, there shall be a penalty of \$100 imposed on the original amount of the fine for the violation ticket.
- 4. In the event that the fine due for a violation of this chapter is not paid within 90 days of the date of the issuance of the ticket for the violation, there shall be a penalty of \$150 imposed on the original amount of the fine for the violation ticket."
