Sedat, 10 Arthur Swan and Billy William Haf, Jr. 11 (Whereupon, all remained standing for a moment of silence.) 12 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 14 I've got couple of announcements first. 15 Village Hall will be closed on 16 September 7 in observance of Labor Day. 17 The annual East End Seaport Museum 18 Maritime Festival will be held on September 19 26 and 27. 20 The October meetings of the audit and 21 co-committees will be held on October 5, 22 2015 because Columbus Day is the day we normally have it, so we're doing it a week 23 24 earlier, if anybody is interested. 25 Also, on Friday, September 11, from Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 Then we'll move to presentation, we 3 have Tony Hill of Penflex with Dave Rogers 4 from RBC. They are the people that are in 5 charge of the LOSAP program for the fire 6 department and they're going to do a --7 I'll let them explain. 8 MR. HILL: Hello. 9 So I'm Tony Hill, I'm from Penflex. 10 Dave is from RBC. 11 My firm -- You guys might remember Ed 12 Houlihan, for those of you who have been 13 Trustees maybe for a while. He started Penflex, and we are the actuary and also 14 15 assist the Village in the administration of 16 the program. 17 All right, so the Village hires us to 18 do all the actuarial calculations similar to 19 what the State Retirement System does it for 20 all of your employees and tells you what to 21 contribute. We do the same thing, except 22 for the volunteer firefighter service award 23 program. 24 I understand that there are some 25 trustees that are new, so on your, in front Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 of you, you should have what every volunteer 3 firefighter gets, as for the summery of the 4 plan. So this goes through --5 I'm sorry, I quess to be distributed. 6 I'm not gonna really -- I'm not gonna 7 spend a lot of time on it. You can read 8 through it. What this is meant to be is a 9 plain-English definition and explanation of 10 the benefits that are provided by the 11 program. 12 But to really bullet point it, the 13 volunteer firefighters, there's a point 14 system. All right, so this sort of like a 15 pension, but there's not salary. Most 16 pensions are based on salary, so instead of 17 it be based on salary, it's based on points. 18 For every call, drill, meeting, 19 training things that a volunteer goes to, 20 they earn points. The magical number is 21 fifty. If they earn fifty points in a year, 22 they get credit for the pension for the 23 year. That pension is \$20 lifetime monthly 24 benefit payable at age sixty-five. 25 So a volunteer firefighter that joins Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 at age forty, volunteers for twenty years, 3 at age sixty-five, he or she can get \$400 a 4 month for the rest of his or her life. 5 Payment is guaranteed to be made for 6 ten years, so if they die before age 7 seventy-five, payment will continue to a 8 beneficiary that they name; otherwise, it's 9 payable for the rest of their life. 10 All right. The maximum benefit that 11 can be earned in this plan is \$600 for 12 thirty years. 13 Several years ago, maybe five, six, 14 seven years ago, the max was twenty and the 15 Village had a referendum to increase that to 16 thirty, so in the next couple years, 17 firefighters will be hitting that thirty 18 year, this year is the twenty-seventh 19 year -- Well, the plan, originally there 20 was buyback, the Village bought back five 21 years of service, so it's not actually the 22 twenty-seventh year, it's the twenty-third 23 year, but with the five year buyback, this 24 is the twenty-seventh year, so there will be 25 a point in the future where firefighters Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

2	will hit that cap again, and not be able the
3	accrue any more benefit in the plan, so
4	that's something that's really something
5	mainly to keep aware of because of the cost
6	of the program.
7	I'm going through this really quick
8	because if you have questions, I can
9	certainly answer them.
10	The contribution that the Village makes
11	in 2016 for this plan is roughly 233,000
12	about, okay, so that is done by evaluation
13	based an assumed rate of return. We're
14	assuming five-and-a-half percent rate return
15	based on a life expectancy assumption and
16	the volunteer population.
17	Okay.
18	You are the plan right now is
19	roughly seventy-five percent funded. There
20	was some, I don't know, we can go into all
21	that if you want to, but there has been
22	the Village has changed vendors over the
23	years. We were brought in to try to help
24	get back on track, so in order to keep costs
25	manageable, it would be great for you to be
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1Regular Meeting August 27, 20152putting in \$400,000 a year and get caught up3quicker, but, you know, that's not reality,4there are property tax caps and things like5that we have manage through these things,6and so we are on a slow path of getting this7fund built back up.

Okay.

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9 So it's going to be -- down the road is 10 when the firefighters reach this cap, it 11 will help in cost savings, unless you decide 12 to extent it out, but that's something for 13 down the road.

14 So, again, the annual contribution 15 right now is somewhere around two hundred 16 thirty-five. Dave will present about how 17 the investments go. It's certainly a lot of 18 the cost. The main driver of the cost is 19 the return the assets, so we all have seen 20 what's happening in the Market, you're not a 21 hundred percent the SMP, so you're not 22 seeing that volatility, but certainly it's 23 impacting you, so if we continue to have 24 years that are, you don't return the 25 five-and-a-half, the idea is that over a Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 long period of time, it's going to 3 counterbalance, but right now we're in a 4 more difficult challenging situation. 5 So, again, our job, we do the actuary 6 work, tell you how much to contribute. We 7 also assist with the administration, when a 8 firefighter wants to change the beneficiary, 9 when a firefighter dies, contact the 10 beneficiary, do all that kind of stuff for 11 the Village. 12 Any questions about that? I know I'm 13 trying to go really quickly. I know there are some new trustees that 14 15 are new to it, are there questions about it 16 at all? 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Not immediately, no. 18 MR. HILL: If things come up, I can 19 certainly answer, but I want to give Dave an 20 opportunity to speak too. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It would be great if 22 we could get your contact info and digest it 23 24 MR. HILL: Sure. 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: -- ask some question. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 MR. HILL: Sure. 3 MR. ROGERS: Hello, everybody. My name is Dave Rogers I'm the senior vice president 4 5 portfolio manager with RBC Wealth 6 Management. We work in Albany. 7 Those big blue folders in front of you 8 is what I brought down. There is a lot of 9 information there. I won't expect anybody 10 to, you know, study it today. 11 We have been -- we're approaching our 12 tenth anniversary together. We have been 13 working with you guys since November 2005. 14 When we became involved with you, we 15 put an investment policy in place that puts 16 constraints on we can do with the assets, 17 it's conservative, it's roughly 18 thirty-percent stock, seventy-percent fixed 19 income. 20 We set that because if you do the math 21 and what market returns tend to be over 22 time, you get to a six-percent rate of 23 return, which is what we're trying to do 24 every year and help you achieve your 25 actuarial assumptions. 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1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 That being said, we're struggling with 3 earnings right now. You know, we didn't put 4 these in place when -- nobody envisioned 5 interest rates going to zero, and still a lot of our assets are in fixed income; and 6 7 we get the question a lot, you know: Should 8 we be more aggressive? Should we get more 9 involved in the Stock Market? We're not 10 sure that's a good idea either. You know, 11 the Stock Market is at all-time highs. So we're kind of in a difficult 12 13 position right now where, unfortunately, I'm the one that has to tell you that I think 14 15 we're going struggle to earn five-and-a-half 16 percent for a while; and the trade off,

17 again, is do we take more risk and then 18 maybe have that backfire on us, or do we 19 just recognize that these cycles happen, you 20 know, rates will go up again some day. Ι 21 truly believe that really to get to that 22 five-and-a-half, six percent number, we need 23 rates to go up and the Stock Market to 24 correct, and that may be a ways off. 25 Right in our investment policy

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 statement, it does say that our actuarial assumption could be irrelevant for long periods of time, and unfortunately this the one of those. Again, largely, you know what you're getting in the banks these days, and if there is nothing else out there with a guarantee on it that's got any kind of yield either.

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10 So we are struggling to get you earning 11 at right now. I think we'll get through 12 this. We got through '08 together guite 13 well, you know, and we're just going to have 14 these times, I think, where we're just not 15 going to be able to meet your actuarial 16 assumption, and I'd be thinking that in your 17 planning and budgets at this stage of the 18 game.

19Our long term record is fine, but, you20know, now when you have 2008 wrapped in21here, there is nothing -- unless we were22completely in the Stock Market, there's23really -- our benchmarks are averaging about24five percent now over the last ten years.25There is no time period now that we're

Again, largely it's driven 3 where interest rates are, and, you know, 4 there is nothing we can really do about 5 that. 6 So there is a lot of different things 7 we can do. We're happy to have the 8 discussions about what else is out there. 9 Do we increase risk? Do we change our 10 investment policy? But our advice, at least 11 at this stage, is to kind of keep things the 12 way they are. 13 If you have questions or concerns, 14 certainly let us know what they are and 15 we'll engage those with you. You do get a 16 monthly statements. We can give you 17 quarterly performance reports. They are 18 distributed around. You know what's going 19 on. We encourage questions. Our cards are 20 in those folders, so all our contact 21 information is there. I know Sylvia knows 22 how to find us. 23 We're happy to, you know, entertain any 24 questions, comments or concerns that you 25 have. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 So that's a short-and-sweet 3 presentation tonight. 4 Are there any questions I can answer 5 for anybody? 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody of the Board 7 have any questions? 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Got do read it. 9 It may be in here and if I haven't seen 10 it yet, but the executive summary, the 11 one-pager of proposed changes from old to 12 new would be helpful or just a little 13 e-mail. 14 MR. ROGERS: For the investment policy? 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes. 16 MR. ROGERS: I actually have an old 17 copy in there. I think it says copy on it. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If there is anything 19 you wanted to highlight, some sort of an 20 outline bullet. 21 MR. ROGERS: So what I'll do is, I'll 22 send e-mails out tomorrow. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Like read this 24 section carefully. I mean, I'll read the 25 whole thing but --Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

It's really on the second page 4 where the asset classes are listed. 5 We needed to add some asset classes for 6 things that are going on today that weren't 7 going on five or six years ago. 8 An example unconstrained bonds, you 9 know, these are managements that can short 10 interest rates. We never needed that when 11 the Bond Market was -- Well, it's in the 12 bold market for thirty years, and we think 13 that's changed now, so there are some asset 14 classes we just need to add to and we 15 expanded some of the upper and lower ranges 16 a little bit to produce a bit of flexibility 17 around what is going on with the markets 18 right now. 19 But that's it, everything else is 20 pretty much the same, so I'll highlight that 21 for you and send it down to Sylvia. Give me 22 a couple of days on that, but I will do it. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 24 MR. HILL: I'm going to add one thing. 25 Dave kind of looked to me when you Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 mentioned the Executive Summary. 3 Back in June, at the June meeting, did 4 everyone get like a manila folder with 5 information from us with a special 6 commentary and a fact sheet; does that sound 7 familiar at all? 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes. 9 MR. HILL: Okay. So that's our way of 10 communicating to the Village Board outside 11 of a meeting like this, where we just don't 12 have as much time about what you really need 13 to know about what's going on with the 14 program. 15 One of the things we changed is that we 16 now project out two years for our cost, so 17 that 35,000, the Village always knows 18 exactly -- the Village always, has always 19 had an advantage in a different fiscal year 20 because this plan runs on calendar year --21 I'm assuming you run on a June 1 fiscal 22 year -- but what we're doing now is you 23 always, like that thirty-five, you know 24 exactly what to budget, and so we recognize 25 two years ago that we're in just a different Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 time as far as volatility and different 3 things, so we need to at least come up with 4 ways to let our customers know in advance on 5 how to react to the budgets. You'll always 6 know exactly what you need to budget, no 7 surprises where, like at the end of the 8 year, the Market goes down by fifteen 9 percent and all of a sudden you're stuck and 10 your budget is already set. 11 Also just a little bit about us, I should have mentioned, we work the 350 12 13 villages, fire districts, I'm sorry 300 here 14 in New York State, villages, fire districts, 15 towns on these service award programs. 16 This is all we do. We don't do any 17 qualified plans, we don't do any 401(k) or 18 private pension plans, just these service 19 award programs is what we do, so we have a 20 little bit of a niche expertise. 21 I passed my cards out to Sylvia; if you 22 have any questions, please let me know. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you very much for 24 coming down. 25 Nice to meet you. We have the CAC Report here, so 9 I'll open it up to anybody from the public 10 that would like to address the Turret and 11 Leighton Wetlands Permit Application. 12 Okay. 13 Nobody from the public wants to comment 14 on that one. 15 I'll make a motion that we'll close the public hearing, and we'll discuss that at 16 17 our work session. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second. 1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 210 Carpenter Street, the Greenport 3 Shipyard. 4 Again, that public hearing has been 5 noticed and we have a copy of the CAC Report 6 here, so I'll open it up to the public if 7 anybody would like to comment on the 8 Greenport Shipyard Application. 9 Your name and address for the record. 10 Thank you. 11 MR. OSINSKI: My name Michael Osinski, 12 307 Flint Street in the Village. 13 I own the Widow's Hole Oyster Farm in 14 the Village. We have been growing oysters 15 for fourteen years. 16 I just got a copy of this CAC 17 recommendation about the mitigation. They 18 want to test, they want to hire an outside 19 tester, environmental, full environmental 20 assessment conducted, and somewhere in here 21 it says they want to make sure the 22 pollutants aren't seeping into the water. 23 We are the canary in the minefield. 24 Oysters are a very delicate animal, and if 25 there was any pollution, we're the first Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 1 2 people to be effected. 3 I've been growing oysters for fourteen 4 years in the Village, and it's been a real 5 pleasure. 6 I also have to make a caveat. Steve is 7 my neighbor, and it's an honor for me to 8 call him my friend. When I moved here, I 9 really, you know, I looked up to men like 10 Steve, and I still do. I'm sure, George, 11 you grew up him. Steve is a respected 12 member of this community, but we're all 13 neighbors here. What are we, three blocks 14 from any point from each other? 15 Anyway, the point I wanted to make is 16 I've been going oysters for fourteen years. 17 In the fourteen years, I've been notified of 18 every closing in Long Island. The State 19 notifies me. The DEC notifies me. 20 I've been closed twice, Hurricane Irene 21 and Hurricane Sandy; and those closings were 22 all the rainfall rushing out and polluting 23 the bay, all kinds of contaminants wash in. 24 Mostly sewer systems backed up, cesspools 25 backed up, and they closed us down, I was Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 closed for three weeks after the Sandy, but 3 those are the only times I have been closed 4 and the State -- matter of fact, Monday the 5 State is coming over to check, they're going 6 to pull oysters, they're going to do 7 water-quality sampling at my dock, and they 8 do this, they've been doing this for 9 fourteen years.

10 The point I'm trying to make is, there 11 is no pollution from the shipyard that's 12 affecting the most delicate of creatures in 13 Greenport Harbor. There is no such thing, 14 and I don't think it's -- I think common 15 sense should prevail here with the Board.

What we don't need is to go out and spend taxpayers' money, to go out the hire outside consultants to look for something, to go out and start digging in somebody's backyard and looking for things. There is no pollution.

If there was pollution, I would be the first person to be notified. Everybody in Long Island would be told, you know, Greenport Harbor is closed because --

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 everybody in my business would be notified 3 and told Greenport Harbor will be closed 4 because of pollution from the shipyard. 5 There is no such thing and there never 6 has been as long as I've in this harbor 7 growing oysters for fourteen years. 8 I don't think that this a real problem. 9 I think that spending taxpayers' money and 10 forcing, forcing an honest, hardworking 11 taxpaying citizen to cover these expenses to 12 go out and look for something that doesn't 13 exist is an overreach, and I hope common 14 sense prevails on this Board. 15 That bulkhead, the sooner that -- if 16 there was any problem there, the bulkhead is 17 the solution, get it done, get it done as 18 fast as possible, get people on the water, 19 get them working. 20 This is, the shipyard is the heart and 21 soul of Greenport. It's been there since 22 whaling days. You may find -- if you go 23 dig, you may find whale oil. This is an 24 important feature of what Greenport truly 25 It's not bars and restaurants. is. Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 Greenport is the working waterfront. 3 Get these guys working as soon as 4 possible. 5 Thank you very much. 6 MS. ROBINS: Thank you. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 8 Anybody else want to address the Board? 9 MR. OSINSKI: Oh. One other point I 10 wanted to raise. I'm sorry, George, I 11 forgot. Sorry, I beg your pardon. 12 The body, the governmental body that 13 oversees pollution is the DEC. It's my 14 understanding they have okayed this work. 15 The Village of Greenport doesn't have --16 When I get shut down for polluted 17 water, it's not the Village that comes and 18 shuts me down, it's the DEC. It's their job 19 to look for pollution and find it. They 20 okayed this work, put them to work. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you, Mike. 22 MR. OSINSKI: Thank you. 23 MR COSTELLO: My name is John Costello. 24 I'm with Costello Marine Contracting, and we 25 are performing the bulkhead repairs at Steve Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 Clarke Shipyard, Greenport Yacht; and I'm aware of what the DEC, I'm aware about the marine contracting business since before the DEC was formed.

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6 I can tell you that the DEC came with a 7 determination that this a Type II action. 8 There is no more environmental regulations 9 that have to be followed. There is no 10 wetlands on this property. There should 11 never even been a Wetlands Application made for this event. Bulkheads are not -- behind 12 13 the, the dirt behind the bulkhead is not wetlands. We are not going out in front. 14 15 We're building a dock.

16 Eileen Wingate asked that the permit 17 application, Wetlands Permit Application be 18 made for this. My daughter told her, I 19 don't believe it should be. The DEC says it 20 should not be; but, as asked, we made the 21 application for Wetlands Permit at the 22 guidance of Eileen Wingate in order to calm 23 things down, we made the application. We made the application. The DEC had 24 25 it declared several things about this

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 application. It has three or four permits from the DEC. When they make a determination that SEQRA is closed, that there is no environmental Type II done, the environmental review was done.

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7 We have a Water Quality Permit from the 8 DEC. They have a -- the wetlands regulation 9 that if you're doing dredging, we're not 10 doing dredging; and we have the -- all the 11 DEC, there's five different reviews at the 12 DEC on the environmental regulations. Ιf 13 there is any contamination of any soil, if, 14 they want I it retained behind the bulkhead.

What I'm going to do is, I'm going to submit to the Board a few drawings of the amount of fill that was excavated there.

You will see the fill, most of it is
beautifully clean sand, a lot of debris was
taken and taken to the dumps. It was all
taken out of there.

22 What we did, we were short a few 23 hundred yards of fill, and I can tell you 24 not only will I give you a sample of the 25 fill, it was dredged overboard in New

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 Suffolk. Some of it was purchased from East 3 Coast Mines. There is no contamination on 4 either one, so the additional fill needed to 5 fill some of the voids, bulkhead was falling 6 over, we put it in straight, half the boards 7 are gone, but it did require some fill, it 8 was brought in, and if you take the -- I'll 9 give you the sample of the material that put 10 in behind the bulkhead (handing), and the 11 DEC, should there be any contamination 12 whatsoever, there is contamination in a lot 13 of yards, I can tell you, you probably have 14 more in the Village than anywhere, at the 15 Village Highway Department and a few others; 16 but still keep it inland, keep it off the 17 roads. 18 Road runoff is another big problem in 19 the Village of Greenport, as you all well 20 know. It's going overboard, water runs 21 downhill. The material being placed at 22 Steve Clarke's Greenport Yacht is permeable, 23 it will go -- the water, the rain will go 24 into the ground. 25 Clean sand is a filter. It is one of

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 the best filters of swimming pools. It will 3 filter any of the rainwater, and it will 4 contain the contaminants behind the bulkhead 5 where they belong, if there is any. I'11 6 just give you a couple of -- look at some of 7 the photos (handing), and I think you should 8 pass them because I could tell you, it's a 9 little bit -- that's the material that we 10 placed in from out of town, East Coast Mine 11 in New Suffolk. 12 As you can see, as the excavation, you can see in all the photographs, you can see

My wife and I will

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4 I have been asked by many in the marine 5 industry if we would consider going back 6 into the marine supply business, and I would 7 definitely -- although the building over on 8 Corwin Street is not available right now for 9 what we would like to do, we would certainly 10 consider the eastern end of Long Island and 11 Greenport is my home. I'm a graduate of 12 Greenport High School.

13 That being said, when I heard about 14 this project and what was going on, having 15 worked with Steve and John for many years, 16 Mary Bess and her family, I came up to 17 Greenport to look at what was going on, to 18 look at some real estate, and I walked 19 around the project, and like every project 20 that the DEC is involved with, there are 21 many rules and regulations that must be 22 followed.

23 When I walked the job site, I could see 24 the care of which Mr. Costello and his 25 people use in not disturbing the

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 environment, putting in the bulkhead, due to 3 the fact that, yes it needed repair. 4 The Department of Environmental 5 conservation of New York has come up with 6 rules and regulations so that when a boat is 7 hauled out of the water and it's pressure 8 washed, all the sediments that is washed off 9 the bottom of the vessel goes into 10 containment basin. Then it is tested to see 11 that the toxins that are in paint that the 12 designed to kill marine algae and things do 13 not go into the water and are thus not 14 harmful to marine environment. 15 That is basically what Mr. Costello has 16 done for Mr. Clarke down here is protect the 17 environment. 18 That being said, there are a lot of 19 regulation you have to go through permitting 20 process DEC, Army Corp or Engineers, so 21 forth and so on. Having made my living around the water and being from Greenport, it makes you think that Greenport is not only a special place, but they want to keep it a special place.

18 Now, politics aside, when you go through the DEC, and you go through the Army 19 20 Corp of Engineers processes, you then come 21 up against the local government, which has 22 the right to determine what is going on and 23 to protect their quality of waterfront 24 properties to the best of their ability. 25 Now I hear that they've got a

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 Conservation Advisory Committee that is a 3 bunch of appointed people, they're not 4 elected people, may I use the word tree 5 huggers to an extent because they're against 6 anything that deals with the environment. They're very cautious, and they should be, 7 8 but they don't have degrees in Marine 9 Science, there's a lot of things that 10 they're not familiar with, they simply want 11 to have a voice. 12 That being said, I would just like the 13 Board to consider how much weight their 14 recommendations pro or con actually carry 15 because if you impede any business owner's 16 ability to make a living and increase costs, 17 especially today's economy, you could be 18 looking at some costly litigation for the 19 Village of Greenport or any municipality for 20 that matter. 21 Thank you. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 23 MR. I don't know if 5 that counts. 6 There is few things that I would like 7 to just mention. This public hearing is 8 about a permit process. It's about a permit 9 process that wasn't followed. It's about a 10 contractor and a business owner that took it 11 upon themselves not to follow the permit 12 process and the law of Greenport. 13 Regardless what we hear today, and I have a 14 few things to say, but regardless what else 15 we hear today, Chapter 142 of our code 16 mandates that you follow that process. 17 You can make any excuse you want, that 18 the DEC decided this, the DEC decided that, 19 we didn't think it was necessary, I dispute. 20 Not me personally, the contractor disputes 21 that a bulkhead is not part of the wetlands. 22 The first thing I would like to say is 23 the DEC doesn't speak where it's impossible 24 for them to make a mistake, for them to 25 decide that this is a Type II process Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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Just let me say the DEC's own reports online, there is a thousand of them. The DEC, the EPA and the United States Navy in shipyard remediation, anything done in a shipyard, anything done in a shipyard has a high potential of toxic waste, anything, digging, excavating, bulkhead replacement. 10 Six or seven heavy metals are always found, asbestos, PVCs, pesticides and fuel.

12 For the Village to ask for the CAC to 13 recommend and ask that soil test is done, as 14 experienced as John Costello is and as much 15 experience as Steve Clarke has, they can't 16 look at a piece of property and say there is 17 nothing wrong that with. They don't have 18 that ability.

19 By the owner's own statement, when the 20 CAC made their inspection of the property, 21 after the process was over without permits, 22 we asked about another piece of property, a 23 portion of the property they had done prior 24 to that without a permit, and the owner's 25 own statement was "Oh yeah, that piece was a

When they excavated there, they 3 dug up tanks, they dug up motors, they dug 4 up equipment. 5 A reasonable person would say, "Well, 6 if there is toxic inclusion there, why 7 wouldn't it be forty feet away here?" 8 To suggest that we're trying the kill 9 the working waterfront, that we're trying to 10 inhibit people from making a living, to 11 suggest that Mike's Oysters should be the 12 benchmark of what happens in Greenport is 13 ludicrous at best. 14 This project was a month ago. I don't 15 know what's leaching into the water, not 16 being an oyster man, I have no idea if one 17 month is enough time for any toxicity to 18 show up downstream, a half mile away where 19 Mike's oyster beds are, I don't know, and 20 that shouldn't even be the issue. That 21 shouldn't even be the issue. 22 The process is the issue, and the 23 process is, you apply for a permit, you get 24 an inspection, you get a recommendation from 25 the CAC, which by the way is mandated by the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 LWRP. In 1977, they mandated that CAC be 3 created and oversee these projects and make 4 the recommendation to the Village Board. Ιf 5 you don't think those people are qualified, 6 if you don't think myself and the rest of 7 the people on that committee are qualified, 8 by all means, change it; but this the all 9 part of the process. It's not a bunch to 10 tree huggers. It's about people that care 11 about Greenport, about revitalizing the 12 oyster factories and the oyster business 13 here by preventing pollution and toxicity 14 from entering the water. None of the 15 recommendations were outrageous. 16 Three of yous were on this board for a

while and two newcomers and yous have to kind of recollect the recommendations that were made and none of them, unlike other municipalities, were over the top.

I would like to remind you also about the LWRP. The LWRP says that we should promote a working waterfront. Sometimes people that work on the water, and I'm not saying it's Mr. Clarke, but sometimes people

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 that work on the waterfront look at the waterfront as a toolbox. They don't look at it as an asset, they look at it as a toolbox to promote their business and provide a profit.

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7 That's the reason we have places like 8 Love Canal and the Gowanus Canal and years 9 ago the Hudson River and the rivers in 10 Pennsylvania that spontaneously combusted 11 into fire, it's because the people that work 12 on that waterfront cared more about doing 13 their job on the waterfront than preserving the waterfront. That's one of the reasons 14 15 the LWRP addresses that with the CAC and 16 with the Village Board.

17 There is a law in New York State that 18 if you're in an environmentally sensitive 19 area, you take the shovelful of dirt out a 20 hole, one shovelful of dirt out of a hole, 21 regardless what you hear here or what you 22 heard before, this is law and it's 23 undisputable, if you take a shovelful of 24 earth out of a wetlands area, before you put 25 the shovelful back, it has to be

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 characterized, and that means it has to be 3 determined if it's toxic or if it's not. If 4 it's not, you're allowed to put it back. Ιf 5 it is, then it opens up another bullet. 6 What do you do with it? Where do you get 7 rid of it? Who do you get in touch with to 8 provide the fill to put that back?

9 To come here with a sample of sand and 10 say this is clean fill, with all due respect 11 to John, he's been in this business a 12 million years, he doesn't know that. He 13 doesn't know that at all.

For two people that were on this Village Board, one as a mayor, one as a deputy mayor, both of them as trustees to say they didn't know they needed a Village Wetlands Permit to do that is disingenuous at best. I find that hard to believe.

20 This project was done by stealth, no 21 one was notified. Steve Clarke's statement 22 was, he didn't believe you needed a permit. 23 He also stated for the record that he was 24 positive John Costello didn't know that he 25 needed a Wetlands Permit to do this. Again,

That not true. 3 As a member of the CAC, I've been on 4 three other projects where John was the 5 contractor, all of them he had applied for 6 permits, Wetland Permits from the Village. 7 Chapter 142 of the Village's code is black 8 and white, it's as plain as day for everyone 9 to read. You need a Wetlands Permit. The 10 DEC can make recommendations. I don't 11 believe the Army Corp of Engineer issued a 12 permit for this project, so to exclude them. 13 The DEC, the permit was applied for on the 14 6th of July, the completed application was 15 received on the 9th of July and the permit 16 was issued on the 10th of July. In my 17 experience, seven years on the CAC, here and 18 in other municipalities, that's unheard of. 19 To declare this a Type II action, I 20 also dispute. By their own records and 21 there is a thousand of them online about 22 shipyard remediation, none of them, none of 23 them, the DEC, EPA and US Navy would agree 24 that this is a Type II action. 25 We can debate it, you can debate Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

For a shipyard that's 10 been in existence since the 1800s, to assume 11 that there's not toxicity here is ludicrous. 12 Heavy metals, lead, cadmium, nickel, copper 13 trace elements, it stays with you forever. 14 To suggest that doesn't happen there is 15 not realistic. To suggest there is no fuel 16 there, there's no asbestos there are also 17 unrealistic. 18 These are not reports written by the 19 friends the snail gardens or two headed 20 frogs or tree huggers; these are reports 21 written by the United States Navy, by the 22 Environmental Protection Agency, and by the 23 Department of Environmental Conservation in 24 New York State; so we can go on speculation 25 or we can read what we know are facts.

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 years that there is no toxicity there and 3 that it's just too expensive to decide if 4 there is, and the fact that -- my 5 calculations, I might be wrong, but I went 6 by the permit, and it was 300 something feet 7 of primary bulkhead and then 250 feet, but 8 if we only use 400 feet because they stopped 9 when it made the turn 50 feet around the 10 bend, that was just using a mathematical 11 equation, that comes out to 2,300 cubic 12 yards, 2,300 cubic yards of excised 13 material, 3,300 tons of material that we 14 have no clue what's in it, that a simple 15 soil test and an environmental consultant could tell us exactly. If we find out that 16 17 it's toxic, we move from there. If we find 18 it's fine, it's not a problem. 19 I just don't understand the pushback on 20 that. 21 Mr. Costello, the contactor, said that 22 this is a minor project. The owner's 23 statement to us when we made the inspection 24 was that it was the largest civil 25 engineering project in the Village of Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 Greenport, excluding perhaps Mitchell Park. 3 I can think of a few others, but I'll take 4 him for his word. 5 The largest civil engineering project 6 in the Village of Greenport, you don't think 7 there should be some kind of an 8 environmental oversight on that, you don't 9 think there should be some kind any 10 oversight in that. You think somebody 11 should be able to do the largest civil 12 engineering project in Greenport on their 13 own, without this Board's, CAC's, somebody's 14 oversight. I think that's ridiculous to 15 suggest. 16 We can't be hypocrites about the 17 environment. We can't be hypocrites about 18 go green, go solar, do this do this, do 19 that, then let a project like this go on 20 without oversight. 21 It's contrary to what the LWRP says. 22 People talk about the LWRP all the time, 23 perhaps we should read it. I have. Perhaps 24 the people that promote it should read it. 25 It's there. Does it say promote the working Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 waterfront? Of course it does, and it should, but does it say that the working waterfront should have free reign and do what they please to be able to do business, not even close, not even close.

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7 Again, not speaking for the CAC, only 8 speaking for myself, it's hard to separate 9 the two because I have the information, a 10 lot of the information because of my 11 position on the CAC, but I would recommend 12 that this Board reject this permit, go 13 through with the recommendations about soil 14 testing and stuff like that, not codify an 15 illegal act.

There has been four or five other 16 17 illegal projects at that site, and you and 18 the contractor and the owner of the property 19 work it out among yourselves, but don't 20 legalize an illegal act after the fact just 21 because you're worried that somebody down 22 the road is going to say, "well, he didn't 23 have to do it, I don't have to do it." You 24 can address that by punitive damage, fine, 25 whatever you decide, but don't codify this

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 and make it legal after the fact before you 3 even know what harm has been done. 4 Thank you. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 6 MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184 5th 7 Street. 8 Now, we all know that Steve is going to 9 have to finish his bulkheads, okay, you 10 can't leave them in that condition. 11 That aside, this whole process in the 12 Village is, it's almost like it's out of 13 control. In other words --14 I have to ask the attorney a question. 15 All right. Does the Village consider a 16 bulkhead replacement coming under the 17 jurisdiction the CAC? 18 MR. PROKOP: Yes. 19 MR. SWISKEY: So this bulkhead then 20 legally came under the CAC's jurisdiction, 21 well, review, I guess you could say, the 22 Village review? 23 MR. PROKOP: Yes, I think that is 24 correct. 25 MR. SWISKEY: So then that puts an end Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 to anything --3 I'm surprised that John would make that 4 statement that he didn't know. 5 But what you're gonna basically have to 6 do here is you're going to get somebody like 7 Environmental Management because you can't 8 stop the bulkhead, that would be crazy. 9 Because we did at the light plant, we 10 did this at Mitchell Park. I've been 11 involved in a few of these projects. One of 12 them, a sitting mayor actually turned us in 13 at the light plant or thought he was turning us in, it cost a fortune and even the guys 14 15 from the DEC were laughing. 16 But you got to put in inch and a 17 quarter wells down to water. Probably on 18 that spot, you probably went ten to fifteen, 19 they're probably gonna cost you a hundred 20 bucks a piece. Then take the core and 21 they're going to analyze it, and there is anything bad there, then you reach a whole 22 23 new process. 24 The bulkhead can be in and then you can 25 either, they'll tell you either to cover it

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 and you can't build houses there, but you 3 have to stop it from getting into the -- but that's a process, and this Board just can't 4 5 ignore the process, and Steve, I'm sorry 6 because I like you, okay, but the process 7 here was just -- it was, it was mashed up. 8 Okay. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anyone else want 10 to speak? 11 I'll be quick, I promise. MS. SMITH: 12 Liz Smith, 309 South Street. 13 While we've lost our person who was 14 calling us out as tree huggers, just for the 15 record, my masters is Conservation Policy 16 and my PhD is in Environmental and Natural 17 Resource Economics, so I may be a little bit 18 qualified. 19 I just want to address a few points as 20 follow up of the last few weeks. I am a CAC 21 member, I've been exposed to it regarding 22 the Wetlands Permits. 23 The first is a comment specific to 24 process and incentives. I know you're going 25 to hear some repeat, but I have to, sort of, Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

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I have a suggestion. Can we please ask the Board to review the policies and procedures that govern that when rules are not followed. I heard Trustee Martilotta say more than once, "Rules with no enforcement are merely suggestions." Well said and quite applicable.

10 I'd like to add when the penalty is 11 less costly than following the rules, the 12 incentives are pretty clear, do what you 13 The Village can change this, so I want. 14 urge you to review at a minimum the fines 15 assessed to those who break Village rules and laws and think about incentives that are 16 17 set up as part of these rules.

18 Specific to the shipyard and no 19 disrespect to Mr. Clarke or Mr. Costello, I 20 don't know either of you very well. I won't 21 pretend to know your intentions. I do know 22 that very blatantly the law, the Village Law 23 of Greenport was not followed as it pertains 24 to the Wetlands Permit.

I have spoken to several of you about

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 this, weighed in as a member of the CAC, you 3 have the report, but I want it on record 4 publically tonight some of these issues. 5 For the CAC in particular, guite 6 frankly, we were put in an unfair position. 7 To review an issue of this magnitude 8 basically after the fact, borderline 9 ridiculous, incredibly time consuming. We 10 handed off the recs in short for everybody. 11 They require standard testing to insure 12 that public health and environmental safety 13 standards are met. 14 In my personal and professional 15 opinion, these are a lower bound threshold. 16 I also want to make a comment, and it was 17 brought up tonight, regarding: Hey, listen the DEC has weighed in, why does the Village 18 19 care, why do we have to take time doing 20 this? 21 I'm hoping that everyone in this room 22 can agree that when it comes to the best 23 interest of the Village of Greenport, those 24 who live and work here probably care more 25 about the health and safety than anyone, Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 which is precisely why the Village of Greenport is the last permit to be issued. No permit, no work. It should be that simple.

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6 And here is my plea as a 7 conservationist, as an economist, as a CAC 8 Member, and as a Village of Greenport 9 homeowner, I've been really upset the last 10 few weeks with the state of affairs as it 11 relates to this project; and we have heard 12 tonight, and I think you folks would agree 13 that the working waterfront is the heart and 14 soul of Greenport, historically and today; 15 but let's be honest, if we pollute our waters, we don't need a working waterfront 16 17 because our fish will die, our kids can't 18 swim, people aren't going to want to come 19 here and spend money, we won't have to worry 20 about jobs because no one will want to live 21 here.

I recognize that I'm taking this to the umpteenth level, but let's think about it, folks, this isn't going to happen overnight, environmental degradation almost never does; Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 but that said, once it does, the impacts are long lasting. Once we degrade an ecosystem for anyone in here with an Environmental Science background who works on the waterfront, who lives by the waterfront, it's not easy or cheap to fix.

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8 How serious is the condition at the 9 shipyard, so many people have had the 10 question to me, I don't know. We haven't 11 gone, we haven't been able to test anything, 12 the protocols weren't followed.

13 I would argue that you don't need to be 14 an expert, and I know you've heard this 15 tonight, I don't think you need to be an 16 expert to realize that work done at the 17 shipyard that is 185 years old warrants some 18 environmental review Heavy metals, toxins, 19 carcinogens, I don't know about you guys, 20 but I'm don't want that in my water, and I'm 21 not saying it's there, but I'm saying we 22 have to check.

23I know everyone has to -- we're trying24to weed through, but we have to protect our25water for us, our kids, our grandkids and

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 for our legacy. Do we want to be the --3 here's my question, do we want to be the 4 people at the helm of the boat that allows 5 environmental pollution which could impact 6 generations of Greenporters. 7 I'm urging the Village Board to think 8 beyond short-term gains and profits, think 9 about what is at stake long term and let 10 that guide you in your decision making. 11 I'm thanking you for giving me the 12 opportunity to talk tonight. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 14 Anyone else wish to address the 15 Wetlands Permit Application? 16 Okay. 17 I'll offer a motion to close the public 18 hearing on the Costello Wetlands Permit. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll second it. 19 20 MR. PROKOP: Mayor, there were 21 documents that were presented to the Board 22 tonight by Mr. Costello and Mr. Clarke, the 23 pictures and the sand. They really should 24 become part of the record tonight and left 25 here, I mean, if we are going to close the Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

Otherwise, the alternative 3 would be to leave it open, so they can be 4 seen at some other time. 5 I recommend if you are going to close 6 the hearing, that we accept them into the 7 record tonight, please. 8 MR COSTELLO: Again, this is John 9 Costello. 10 I will leave this sand. I can tell you 11 that the sand has been tested at the 12 laboratory for the dredging project in New 13 Suffolk and that's where the majority of the 14 sand was brought in was. It has been 15 The sand we brought in. All the tested. sand that's there and all the material that 16 17 was there, none of it has been tested, but 18 whatever was brought in has been tested. 19 I'm going to give you a copy of the 20 photographs, it's exactly what I put in so 21 it's part of you record. 22 I don't like to be called disingenuous 23 a couple of times. That's not something I 24 personally like. 25 I've been investing in Greenport and I Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service (631) 727-1107

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 have, and you've seen anything I've done in 3 Greenport has been an improvement for the 4 Village of Greenport. When you take one 5 shovelful of dirt and test it, it needs 6 testing, you better start testing at 7 Mitchell Park daily because they're digging 8 there daily because their holes are 9 happening to the bulkhead and you have to 10 put a shovel in the ground.

Let me tell you, Mitchell Park some of the developments, same age as this shipyard was developed back in the colonial days and probably all of the upland and inland sources have a degree of pollution right down to Greenport, all the way from the ferry, the train station.

18 We did the largest project done in 19 Greenport was building the Railroad Dock. Ι 20 participated in that job. At that time, you 21 could use creosote, we did, we took creosote 22 out and put creosote in, that was probably 23 one of the biggest jobs. Steve Clarke's 24 little bulkhead is minor compared to that 25 job, but we're supposed to support the train Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service

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1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 should we ever need it in the future, but 3 there are plenty of jobs. 4 Thank you. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're going to take the 6 photos and the paperwork and add that into 7 the record for the public hearing. 8 Any other discussion from the Board? 9 All in favor? 10 (All Said Aye.) 11 Opposed? MAYOR HUBBARD: Motion carried. 12 13 We'll close the public hearing. We'll 14 review it, discuss it and talk about it at 15 the Work Session. 16 Okay. 17 Next we have Public to Address the 18 Board. 19 We're going to open the Public to 20 Address the Board. 21 MR. SWISKEY: Just as an afterthought 22 of what John said, Mitchell Park we know is 23 polluted, we tested it. 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8 Now, I'm not going to go into that, you 9 know, I don't -- But you going to require 10 some testing down there, inch and a quarter 11 bores and you got to put the bulkhead in no 12 matter what. You can't, you can't leave it 13 because that stuff is gonna wind up in the bay, so you got to let him do the bulkhead, 14 15 but you got to make him do the testing to 16 find out exactly what's there, but that's 17 enough of that, let's get to the --

18 Well, a couple of the items here, I 19 went to the -- well this isn't really an 20 item.

William Swiskey, 184 5th Street, Iforgot to tell you, I'm sorry.

I went to a Planning Board meeting
tonight and I want to tell you I was like,
what's going on here.

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 I asked about -- and I guess Mary Bess asked for a meeting of the Boards about this, so I had asked the building inspector the other day when I went in to get all the information, the CAC Report, so the building inspector was there, I says, "Well, what is this guy going to do about parking at the new restaurant, the new inn?" "Well, he doesn't need it because the building was existing."

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12 The restaurant was existing, not the 13 inn he's putting upstairs, and I don't know 14 where they, where the chairman of the 15 committee came out with an interpretation 16 tonight, he said it was a very blank 17 interpretation, but you got a building 18 upstairs, you got apartments going in, 19 you've got, you know, it's a totally 20 different entity than the restaurant 21 downstairs, you can't categorize it under 22 that little, whatever it is. 23 Do you remember the Biagio Hotel down 24 the street? We made that man put in 25 parking, we made him put in parking across

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 the street, yet this restaurant doesn't -there's something wrong on -- there's something wrong in your Building Department, they can't be handing out opinions like that.

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7 Another thing I noticed was your 8 planner was advising one of the applicants, 9 well if you do this, maybe the Planning 10 Board will -- she can't do that either, and 11 she can't give them legal advice, only Mr. 12 Prokop can do that; and believe it or not, 13 not one member of that Board asked Mr. 14 Prokop whether this place had to meet the 15 parking requirements or not.

I agree with Mary Bess, this Board had better start looking into what's going on around them. It's like, it's like --

You want to turn into the mess at the power plant because you've already had three or four projects in the last year, and Steve Clarke's is one of them, it's just, it's out of control. You got to get a hand back on it or it's just going to go. One other thing, I stopped by Moores

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 Lane today and they were digging -- they're going to put a force main in, I guess sewer station, small sewer station for the power plant and the -- and I'm looking and they're putting in a two-inch pipe.

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That's crazy. I don't know what
engineer recommended that and why -- it's
got to be a minimum of four inches,
especially if you're thinking of taking in
sewer customers in West Greenport, you
better make the infrastructure big enough to
handle, a two-inch pipe is ridiculous.

I would advise you to go up there tomorrow before they get too far and ask what's going on here, because that pipe should be a minimum of four inches, maybe even a six inch, depending on how much flow you expect in the future.

20 Anyway, one of the main items I got up 21 this morning was, I don't want the Maritime 22 Museum putting up a hundred, eighty- or a 23 hundred-foot tent in Fifth Street Park and 24 having a party, it just doesn't belong in a 25 residential neighborhood.

Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 You know, I don't care what they said, they can put it up in Mitchell Park, but they don't want to go behind the -- What is it the marina office where they're allowed to have tents?

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Well, they put in the park policy that says it can't be any other place in the park, so they either take that or they go someplace else, but they can't go to Fifth Street just because the view is nice there, that's ridiculous.

13 You know, these people are making money 14 off of the Maritime Festival, these 15 merchants, don't kid yourself. You know 16 what I mean? It's all about money, and just 17 keep it out residential neighborhoods. Ιf 18 you want to take the downtown away from me, 19 so I go shopping in Southold or Cutchogue 20 for two days, do it; but don't bring a 21 hundred cars into my neighborhood with a 22 tent that's going to be there all weekend. 23 I mean, there are other places they can 24 put this tent up. They can put it up in the

parking lot right off of Wiggins Street

1 Regular Meeting August 27, 2015 2 abuts the railroad property or they could, 3 you know --4 No is no, they have to learn that 5 sometimes you have to take no for an answer, 6 and I would appreciate the Board, you know, 7 just basically --8 And you can't really grant them an 9 exemption which they may ask you for because 10 you just put this park policy in place. То 11 just trash it now would be crazy. If you 12 want to change the policy, then have a 13 public hearing and change the local law and 14 the policy, but it's like John claiming he 15 didn't know that he needed a wetlands 16 permit. I like John, but I find it 17 laughable, okay. 18 The only thing I wanted to ask is has 19 there been any more progress at the light 20 plant; have we even started on the report 21 because that's sort of a serious mess up 22 there? 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're working on a 24 report for corrective action, we should have 25 that for the work session.
