3	calling together the Village of Greenport
4	Historic Preservation Commission meeting.
5	Today is October 2nd. The time is
6	approximately 5:00 p.m.
7	I am Stephen Bull. I am the
8	Chairman. To my right is:
9	MEMBER WETSELL: Susan Wetsell.
10	MEMBER McMAHON: Dennis McMahon.
11	MEMBER BORRELLI: Roselle
12	Borrelli.
13	CHAIRMAN BULL: We have four out
14	of the five members present and so we
15	have a quorum.
16	Item number one is going to be
17	pushed to a little bit later in the
18	meeting. We are going to go straight to
19	Item Number 2 which is the 440 First
20	Street. Discussion and possible motion
21	on the application submitted by Eric
22	Urban. The applicant is proposing to
23	demolish the existing porch on the south
24	side of the dwelling. SCTM #1001-4-7-1.
25	MS. MOORE: Are you ready for me?

2	CHAIRMAN BULL: We are ready.
3	MS. MOORE: Should I go to the
4	CHAIRMAN BULL: Please and speak
5	into the microphone.
6	MS. MOORE: Okay.
7	CHAIRMAN BULL: Thank you.
8	MS. MOORE: Patricia Moore here
9	for Eric Urban. I expect him to be here
10	momentarily. He was supposed to meet me
11	here at 5:00. So I may need to ask for a
12	few minutes while he comes in.
13	This began with sometime ago
14	the Building Inspector, Eileen Wingate,
15	had sent out a notice to us. Must be
16	more than a year ago, I guess, concerning
17	the structural integrity of the porch.
18	My client at the time was able to
19	get some structural supports put up. But
20	that at this point a year or so later,
21	Eileen is concerned that the structural
22	supports are not sufficient as a
23	permanent solution here. The concern
24	the issue is that the porch is a the
25	south side of the porch I'll come over

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 with the photographs because it is easier. Pardon me. 3 I will just show you. What we 4 5 are talking about is this side. Just this side of the porch. 6 7 CHAIRMAN BULL: We have the same 8 picture. 9 MS. MOORE: It is just this side 10 of the porch that is very drastic. 11 CHAIRMAN BULL: He is taking off 12 just a portion of the porch? 13 MS. MOORE: Just a portion of the 14 porch. Just the concern is -- the issue 15 is that it has been deemed not to be 16 structurally sound. The costs to 17 reconstruct the porch, particularly -- it is a massive structure without much 18 19 practical use. It is a significance 20 investment. So that is why we are here 21 because we submitted to the Building 22 Department a demolition request to 23 address to the concerns of the Building 24 Department. 25 We are damned if we do and damned

2	if we don't in this scenario. I would
3	like to keep it as is, but the solution
4	is not a permanent one that can be
5	addressed. It would take a significant
6	investment to rebuild a porch of this
7	size.
8	CHAIRMAN BULL: So why are you
9	taking down the porch?
10	MS. MOORE: Because it has been
11	deemed to be structurally unsound by the
12	Building Department. And the so we
13	have to address it one way or another.
14	Either we have to take it down or we have
15	to invest in replacing it or rebuilding
16	it, so. And it is a sizeable structure.
17	CHAIRMAN BULL: So I was visiting
18	the site and I looked underneath the
19	porch and I have photographs of the
20	underside of the porch. I don't know if
21	you have looked.
22	MS. MOORE: No. I haven't seen
23	them.
24	CHAIRMAN BULL: These are
25	pictures of the underside of the porch.

2	This is the porch, the front of the
3	porch. You can see the posts there and
4	they all the wood is good. Also you
5	could see on these pictures you can see
6	the 2X4s.
7	MS. MOORE: Yes. We put those up
8	and we thought that was sufficient to
9	keep it pardon me. I'll go back.
10	CHAIRMAN BULL: Let me show you
11	something else.
12	MS. MOORE: Okay.
13	CHAIRMAN BULL: You see some of
14	the damage, water damage in the roof.
15	MS. MOORE: There is Eric.
16	Fashionably late. Okay.
17	MR. URBAN: I didn't think I was
18	first.
19	MS. MOORE: No. Someone else
20	was.
21	CHAIRMAN BULL: So here is a
22	picture of the house, the side of the
23	house.
24	MS. MOORE: Yes, we got that, I
25	believe.

2	CHAIRMAN BULL: And if you see the
3	side of the house you can see the porch,
4	the roof of the porch being held down by
5	bricks. And there is no maintenance.
6	MR. URBAN: Those are steps.
7	They aren't being held down by brick.
8	CHAIRMAN BULL: There are bricks
9	on this roof over the porch that are
10	holding the roof down, as far as I can
11	tell. I'm not up there. That are
12	holding parts of the roof of the porch
13	in place. I don't know what.
14	MR. URBAN: They are not being
15	held. All it is is a tarp on there.
16	MS. MOORE: Just to go back on
17	the record. Only because for the sake
18	of the reporter.
19	MR. URBAN: Fine.
20	MS. MOORE: So what I explained
21	previously is that we receive a notice
22	that this was not structurally sounds.
23	So that is why we put in the application,
24	but and what Mr. Bull was describing
25	is some supports under the deck that you

3	CHAIRMAN BULL: The supports under
4	the deck look sound to me. I am not an
5	engineer. Have you had an engineer do an
6	assessment?
7	MR. URBAN: Yes, we did.
8	CHAIRMAN BULL: Where is that
9	report?
10	MR. URBAN: It was filed with the
11	Village.
12	MS. WINGATE: I didn't bring it.
13	I can go run and get it. I think that
14	would be a really good idea. I do
15	believe that the violation issued was for
16	unsafe. I did not say structurally
17	unsound. It was more about the
18	aesthetics of having a building look like
19	that in our Historic District.
20	MS. MOORE: Well, if it is
21	cosmetics, then
22	MS. WINGATE: No. It is
23	structural. Let me go get it.
24	MS. MOORE: Okay.
25	MEMBER BORRELLI: One thing would

2	be structural and the bottom not being
3	safe to stand on because of what the
4	beams are on. But the more concerning
5	issue is the top falling down.
6	MR. URBAN: Myself and two
7	roofers have been up there. And we
8	didn't come through it. I can guarantee
9	you Greenport, you know, ambulance wasn't
10	called.
11	MEMBER McMAHON: So you are
12	saying it is sound?
13	MR. URBAN: Yeah.
14	MEMBER McMAHON: Okay.
15	CHAIRMAN BULL: Okay. Then we are
16	in agreement that it is sound?
17	MR. URBAN: Yeah.
18	CHAIRMAN BULL: So what is your
19	what is the future that you plan to
20	have for that porch if there is no need
21	to demolish it?
22	MR. URBAN: I don't know. The
23	Village is saying it is not sound, so I
24	am going to demolish it. So I am in a
25	Catch 22 here.

2	CHAIRMAN BULL: Excuse me. Hold
3	on.
4	MS. MOORE: Why don't we wait
5	until Eileen returns.
6	CHAIRMAN BULL: She is just
7	returning with an engineering report.
8	MS. MOORE: Yes.
9	CHAIRMAN BULL: So what was the
10	original complaint?
11	MR. PALLAS: I will further
12	comment once I see the written report
13	that we received from the engineer that
14	the applicant hired, but my recollection
15	was we requested it to be made safe. The
16	engineer characterized the work was done
17	as temporary repairs. That was two years
18	ago.
19	We reissued a letter saying that
20	we have got to have that updated. And
21	essentially make it permanent to make
22	it permanent essentially or review the
23	structural soundness of it. That is
24	essentially what we were asking for. We
25	did not make a determination that it was

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 not sound. That would be an engineer's 3 role, not the Village. MR. URBAN: It seems that we are 4 5 arguing about semantics here because basically according to the violation, 6 7 where I read it it is obviously -- they 8 were talking about it being temporary. 9 They referred to the International Code of Building Maintenance. 10 11 Well, I have gone to that 12 International Building Maintenance and 13 they said temporary supports. There is 14 no definition of what temporary is defined as unless you are defining that 15 16 as two years. 17 CHAIRMAN BULL: Let's go --18 MR. URBAN: I certainly am not. 19 CHAIRMAN BULL: So, excuse me, 20 let's go beyond that question. What is 21 -- this house, the parent supports and 22 the other supports that are holding up 23 the porch are in need of maintenance. 24 What is your maintenance schedule to 25 maintain this building? Would you care

2	to comment on that?
3	MR. URBAN: That would depend
4	upon finances as I move forward.
5	MEMBER McMAHON: This house as I
6	have seen it a huge, huge project.
7	MR. URBAN: Yeah. Thank you.
8	MEMBER McMAHON: My house, I have
9	been working on it for twenty years.
10	MR. URBAN: Thank you.
11	MEMBER McMAHON: I just had my
12	porch roof or my ceiling installed. If
13	there is an issue with house, it being
14	temporarily supported or if there is an
15	issue with having to resubmit for your
16	permit in that regard, I'm sure there is
17	no issue.
18	As far as that house goes and how
19	much it is going to cost to repair it, I
20	wouldn't want your bill.
21	MR. URBAN: Exactly.
22	MEMBER McMAHON: But, if there is
23	an issue with the Building Department in
24	regards to how it is being supported
25	you know, I'm not sure what the question

2	is here. I'm not sure where we are
3	heading with that.
4	MR. PALLAS: We the request
5	we received an application for
6	demolition.
7	MEMBER McMAHON: Oh, okay.
8	MR. PALLAS: And you have to
9	decide if that is appropriate.
10	MEMBER McMAHON: Okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: If that is
12	appropriate or not.
13	MEMBER McMAHON: Okay.
14	MS. MOORE: Well, that is why we
15	were kind of
16	MEMBER McMAHON: I think we need
17	to nail it down a little bit. You are
18	asking to demo that
19	MS. MOORE: Because
20	MEMBER McMAHON: because it is
21	your feeling that you cannot afford to do
22	it. It is not a question of whether or
23	not the building department has condemned
24	it. That is the word we have to use,
25	condemned. If it has not been condemned

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 by an engineer, then that's where we have to start with this conversation. 3 Now, on the historic end of it, 4 we would love to see it be restored on 5 the button like it is. If that is not in 6 7 your budget, which I could see how it 8 could not be, then that's -- I don't know 9 where we go from there. I have not had 10 that conversation. 11 MEMBER WETSELL: Well, there is 12 always the option of selling it to 13 somebody. 14 MR. URBAN: That is my personal 15 choice. Are you here to make my personal 16 decisions or am I here to make --17 MEMBER McMAHON: No. Hold on. MS. MOORE: What we had tried to 18 19 do here is we had submitted a request to 20 split the property in order to be able to 21 sell -- because this is a life long --22 this is the second or third generation in 23 the family. The last thing he wants to 24 do is sell the family home, but the 25 reality is, as you pointed out, is to do

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 a renovation of this exterior. That alone is probably in the two hundred 3 4 range, conservatively, easily. 5 MR. URBAN: Plus. 6 MS. MOORE: Conservatively. what we had proposed to do was subdivide 7 8 so that he could keep the little carriage 9 house as his private --as his home. And then be able to sell this to someone who 10 11 would be able to restore it that he would -- we would all love to see. 12 13 Village and he as well. 14 That has run into obstacles because planning doesn't want to see a 15 16 subdivision. They want everything to 17 stay the same. But in reality that is --18 you know, they say no to that. He is 19 then stuck with his timeline to do -- to 20 fix this house within the timeline --21 within the lifetime that he has. And go 22 from there. We can't -- it would be 23 lovely to invest that kind of money but

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he doesn't have it. And he has to work

within his means. That is why we are

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 here.

Village of Greenport, you are insisting on us reconstructing this or attempt aesthetically improving it to the character that the Village would like.

Well, that is all very nice but impossible. And the solution here is the demolition of the piece of the structure if we can't come to some sort of compromise. And we are just not seeing the compromise.

CHAIRMAN BULL: So --

MR. URBAN: Let me put it to you this way: this is not new construction. This is what you call a restoration project. When you go to a financial institution to get financing for a restoration project, it is a whole different scenario than new construction. I am not so sure that anybody on the Board or any of these Boards in the Village understand those facts of reality. And my middle name is not Trump and I'll leave it go at that.

2	CHAIRMAN BULL: So I believe this
3	hardship is self-created.
4	MS. MOORE: Are you telling us or
5	are you asking us?
6	CHAIRMAN BULL: No. I'm not
7	asking you. I'm just saying it is a
8	belief of mine that the hardship is
9	self-created because of your
10	apparently there are not sufficient funds
11	to restore the house as you would like.
12	MR. URBAN: In the period of time
13	that you are requesting it.
14	CHAIRMAN BULL: I'm just saying
15	I'm not saying about any period of
16	time. I'm talking about a house that has
17	been in this state of deterioration for
18	several
19	MR. URBAN: Oh, has it? Oh,
20	okay. Yes, it has. Have you turned
21	around and seen it twenty years earlier
22	when I first bought it out of my family?
23	CHAIRMAN BULL: I have actually.
24	MR. URBAN: You have?
25	MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes.

2	CHAIRMAN BULL: I your
3	neighbor across the street.
4	MR. URBAN: Have you not seen any
5	improvement over the last twenty years?
6	CHAIRMAN BULL: I have only seen
7	one minor improvement
8	MR. URBAN: Oh, you have. Well,
9	I'm sorry you only noticed that one minor
10	improvement.
11	CHAIRMAN BULL: I believe you put
12	another roof.
13	MR. URBAN: Yeah. Apparently.
14	Would you like to see the bills for that
15	roof?
16	CHAIRMAN BULL: I am not
17	interested in seeing your bills. That is
18	your business.
19	MR. URBAN: That will be the last
20	time I will spend that kind of money on a
21	major improvement on that house again. I
22	don't think I would be able to afford it.
23	And those were in high times. We are in
24	totally different times now.
25	CHAIRMAN BULL: Understood. So

2	let's stick to the issue of the
3	Preservation Commission work. This is a
4	character defining feature. That is what
5	the porch is. It is possible to replace
6	it with materials as appropriate. But
7	you don't have the budget for it, to do
8	that. There are tax credits available
9	for restoration, but they may not be of
10	use to you.
11	MR. URBAN: Exactly.
12	CHAIRMAN BULL: I don't know how
13	my other colleagues feel about this, but
14	based on item number one, that is a
15	character defining feature. I don't see
16	how we can ever let you take that porch
17	down, demolish it, since it can be
18	repaired. Since there is structurally
19	is good enough with this
20	MS. MOORE: Wait a second.
21	MR. URBAN: What is that?
22	MS. MOORE: The house before it.
23	MR. URBAN: Oh, yes. I could
24	bring it to 1898. I can bring it back to
25	its original restoration.

2	MS. MOORE: I'm sorry. One
3	moment, please.
4	MEMBER BORRELLI: Just one
5	question. We are sitting here as the
6	Historic Preservation Commission. So we
7	are concerned with the historic the
8	decoration, the facade, the porch, the
9	beauty of it. So you're asking to have
10	the right side of the porch demolished?
11	Right?
12	MR. URBAN: Right.
13	MS. MOORE: Right.
14	MEMBER BORRELLI: So what I
15	don't understand what that gets you. You
16	demolish the right side of the porch
17	because it is too extreme and too much
18	expense for you to restore it. So you
19	want to take that wing of it off. What
20	does that get you?
21	MS. MOORE: Because that is the
22	section that right now has the supports.
23	MEMBER BORRELLI: So the other
24	suggestion would be, if you don't have
25	the funds to that right now, to restore

2	the right whole wing of the porch then
3	when you don't have the funds to do the
4	rest of the porch we are going to take
5	off the top, the front and the front
6	door. And then when you don't have the
7	funds to do the left side of the porch
8	you are going to demolish that as well?
9	What I am saying is: What is the plan?
10	What is the plan going forward? We are
11	going to take off the whole right wing of
12	the porch, to what end?
13	MS. MOORE: Obviously, we can't
14	tell you what the future is going to
15	hold. Okay.
16	MEMBER BORRELLI: Right.
17	MS. MOORE: So what we have to
18	deal with is what the present is.
19	MEMBER BORRELLI: Right.
20	MS. MOORE: At the present time
21	we have supports on the building. And
22	what we are being told maybe Eileen
23	can be clearer exactly on what the
24	violation is because if it is not a
25	structural issue then, professionally

24 1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 speaking, aesthetics is not a basis to, 3 you can't force people to paint their 4 house. 5 MS. WINGATE: But you can. MR. PALLAS: If I may, the town 6 7 engineer two years ago said that there 8 were temporary repairs. And, no, I don't 9 know what the definition of temporary is. 10 But two years with 2X4s and 4X4s is not a 11 permanent solution. 12 If an engineer -- if the same 13 engineer wants to review this and sign 14 off that it is still structurally sound, that is -- I mean I don't like it, 15 16 certainly. But I think that satisfies 17 what we are asking for. Either come up 18 with permanent repairs or certify that 19 the repairs are sound. 20 MS. MOORE: That they are in the 21 same condition as they were when --22 MR. URBAN: I am not paying another five hundred dollars for an 23 24 engineer to come out there and approve

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exactly what he approved. There is

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 nothing wrong with the 2x4s or 4X4s or whatever the construction was. Eileen 3 can attest to that as she reviewed it or 4 5 looked at it. There is no deterioration 6 to those supports. I mean we turn around 7 and we are getting nit picky over the 8 situation. 9 Now, you want to see me spend 10 more money on nickel and diming me on 11 everything that you guys want me to do, 12 we are only going to stretch this out, 13 stretch my budget out. And you know 14 what, I don't know what else I am going to do. You are tying my hands behind my 15 16 back. And that is basically where we are 17 going to go. Nowhere. 18 CHAIRMAN BULL: We are trying to 19 provide you with direction. We are not 20 trying to tie your hands. 21 MR. URBAN: I don't -- I have 22 plenty of direction. I am a smart and 23 individual person. I have come across 24 this Board more than ten years ago before

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I put this roof on. Basically I didn't

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 need your approval or the present Board at that time. I could have put an 3 4 asphalt shingle roof on there at probably 5 one third the cost. At the time they said, we don't need to approve the color. 6 7 In fact, they didn't even read the color 8 of the roof that I picked. All of those 9 things were done when I came back. 10 basically said, you know what you made 11 the right and best decision. 12 I know the right thing for this 13 house. And if people want to fight me 14 for what I am doing on this property, 15 then fine. Let's get into a fight. But 16 that is not the way I was operating ten 17 years ago here. 18 CHAIRMAN BULL: Understood. 19 Okay. Ten years ago I wasn't on this 20 Commission. I have heard from you that 21 the outcome of the roof was satisfactory. 22 Not only to yourself but satisfactory in 23 meeting the goals of the Historic 24 Preservation Commission. So there we are

on the same page.

That roof actually is part of the character that when you look at the house. I know when I visited your house and I looked at the roof of the house I was deceived and discovered pleasantly that the roof wasn't slate, but was a material that looked like slate. And it looked pretty good.

MR. URBAN: Good. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BULL: But this porch is a character defining feature. It is, in my opinion, you would be able to maintain and to restore this porch. And that there are other parts of the house that obviously are probably on your list of next to-do items. This I believe would require -- we have no up-to-date engineering report that says the porch eminently needs to be demolished. I think we need to have a site visit. We need to get a public hearing going on this because of the very nature of the fact that there is a character defining feature.

2	MR. URBAN: Well we can always
3	turn around and sit there and say this
4	was a character defining feature in 1935
5	on this house. And I got pictures that I
6	can bring it back to the 1898 porch.
7	MEMBER McMAHON: That would be
8	good.
9	CHAIRMAN BULL: That would be
10	good.
11	MR. URBAN: Oh. Great. Yeah.
12	And you know what that would do? That
13	would eliminate that side of the porch.
14	MEMBER McMAHON: It doesn't
15	necessarily
16	MR. URBAN: Okay. It is an
17	option.
18	MEMBER McMAHON: It presents us
19	with
20	MR. URBAN: It is an option.
21	MEMBER McMAHON: We were
22	continuing our conversation.
23	MR. URBAN: Sure.
24	MEMBER McMAHON: That is what we
25	have to do. If there is a point with the

2	2X4s I'll come over and look at the 2X4s.
3	MR. URBAN: Sure.
4	MEMBER McMAHON: I'm available.
5	but if that is not the issue or if that
6	is the issue then that is out of
7	MR. URBAN: I am trying to figure
8	out what the issue is.
9	MEMBER McMAHON: The issue for
10	this Board, for here is because it
11	affects the immediate visual street
12	facade of the house that we have to be
13	concerned about. That's all.
14	MS. MOORE: We understand.
15	MEMBER McMAHON: There is nobody
16	here that wouldn't love to see you fall
17	into a boat load of money and be able to
18	do
19	MR. URBAN: Unfortunately
20	MEMBER McMAHON: I'm a builder.
21	I'm on a house
22	MEMBER BORRELLI: Can I say
23	something, Dennis?
24	MEMBER McMAHON: Yeah.
25	MEMBER BORRELLI: I don't mean to

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 interrupt you, but not only is he a 2 builder. So I just want to go back to 3 4 your original comments. You are not in 5 this solo. This is the Historic Village of 6 7 Greenport. We are the Historic Preservation Commission. And there are 8 9 two of us sitting here right now that own historic homes and are neighbors of 10 11 yours. Right? So when you assume that 12 we don't know what we are talking about 13 when we want to do a major renovation, 14 you really -- I don't know that you know 15 what you are talking about. 16 MR. URBAN: I am not assuming 17 anything. In fact I used to --MEMBER BORRELLI: You said --18 19 MR. URBAN: I used to sit on a 20 Board. 21 MEMBER BORRELLI: You said we 22 don't understand what it is to do a major 23 renovation. And I am telling you that 24 you have a builder over there that is 25 living in a home that is probably older

1 HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 10-2-17 2 than both of ours. And he not only restores he knows exactly what is 3 involved, as do I. 4 5 So we are just trying to preserve the beauty of the Village with which we 6 7 all live in. And you are standing in front of the Historic Preservation 8 9 Commission. So we are just concerned 10 with the preservation of history. That 11 is what we are trying to do. We are not 12 trying to demolish a porch, a right wing 13 of the porch that you don't have the 14 funds to do the left wing of the porch and then you demolish that too and we are 15 16 left with nothing historically. So we 17 are trying to preserve history. MR. URBAN: I didn't issue the 18 19 violation on myself. 20 MEMBER BORRELLI: I'm not --21 MR. URBAN: That is what I am 22 saying. 23 MEMBER BORRELLI: I am just 24 saying, let's go back to what we were 25 saying. Dennis is here. And I'm just

2	saying this man knows what is involved as
3	well as I do. So don't tell us that we
4	don't know what we are talking about.
5	MR. URBAN: I am just saying
6	I'm not saying that you don't know what
7	you're talking about, but please don't
8	insult me in not knowing what I am

But if those temporary 2X4s -- even though that is not what any of us maybe want to look at, then I'm sorry. That is an issue, but if the issue is tearing this down to remedy the 2X4s. That is not the point. What we are saying is we would like to see it stay. if there is a violation with regard to the 2X4s, those are two different situations. Okay? So if those 2X4s and the temporary wall are doing their job then that is -- if that has to be looked at again. That is one thing. Tearing down a porch is whole another. That is

We can separate those two points. It is a money issue. It can't 6 7 be done at this time. I know that 12 would help remedy the situation. 13 somebody with some big bucks can walk in 14 to that project and do exactly what we would like to see done. 15 16 MEMBER BORRELLI: And that is my 17 point. Exactly, it has been said. We are not the building committee or whoever 18 19 it is that is not allowing you to do the 20 to subdivision. We are here just 21 concerned with the beauty of it and the 22 history of it. 23 MR. URBAN: I understand that.
