19	will be made out of Versatex. All the
20	trim, the Yankee gutters and everything
21	will be Versatex.
22	We are restoring basically the
23	same as it looks there. The porch, I

wanted to do a little more gingerbread on

it but the State said that they don't

2	have the money to allocate to do anything
3	more but capsulate the columns, do a
4	little trim do a little additional
5	trim on it. And that's it.
6	On the front porch I am keeping
7	all the existing brackets and we're going
8	to try to abate the lead in place because
9	we have to do a total lead abatement on
10	that, that building. That is very
11	expensive to do to begin with. That is
12	why we are trying to save the existing
13	siding. Because there is a lot of wet
14	rot to begin with.
15	And I did a infrared in the
16	wintertime. There was heat loss through
17	the walls and the windows and everything
18	else. So we want to insulate the walls

Otherwise, it will just continue to peel if we just paint it again. We came to the conclusion, the best thing is just to take everything off.

17	plank what I see here but it will be done
18	in

24	off and it disintegrated as we tried to
25	take it off. It is not really it is

3	bracket at some point. It is composed of
4	three pieces that are laminated together
5	which is not normal for a bracket on a
6	historical house.

9	reinstalling some missing or some soft
10	brackets.
11	MR. O'BRIEN: Could be. It is
12	not a solid bracket.
13	CHAIRMAN BULL: Those brackets
14	traditionally provide some sort of
15	support for the
16	MR. O'BRIEN: Structural support.
17	But we are rebuilding the gutters. We
18	are actually going to do it with the
19	CHAIRMAN BULL: Right.
20	MR. O'BRIEN: We are going to go
21	back into the attic. So it will be self
22	supporting. I need to ventilate the
23	Yankee gutter. I have to get ventilation
24	to the end.
25	CHAIRMAN BULL: Right. And then

25	that are pieced together. Solid pieces

12	going to be able to do them or you can't?
13	MR. O'BRIEN: Until we take them
14	down oh, those. They are staying.
15	MEMBER BORRELLI: This is what I
16	am talking about. I don't know if that
17	is what you are talking about. Those are
18	actually solid pieces of wood all put
19	together and formed in a bracket. So I
20	don't know if that is what
21	MR. O'BRIEN: That is the other
22	one that I have seen that are made out of
23	a piece of wood.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 1 2 with the previous occupants appearing as ghosts. And her home was also on the 3 4 walking tour. We had a lunch break at noon. And then at 1:30 we had Dennis 6

McMahon, who is a local developer. And he talked about his restoration progress on some of the houses that he did in the Village. He replaced James Olinkiewicz who was unable to show himself but his restoration of the sanctuary, the de-sanctified Methodist Church was on the walking tour.

Following that we had Rob Brown who is a local architect in Greenport. And he was talking about his renovation of the American Beech properties. American Beech properties came before this commission because they had something they needed to fix. They had come to us for many things, but they had something they needed to fixed. And as a commission we did that. So as part our demonstration of our work he talked about

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HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 9-11-17 as part of his presentation.

And finally we had Sarah Kautz visit us. She was the Director of the Society for the Preservation of Long Island Antiquities which is known as SPLIA. And she spoke about the new architectural design in the historical contexts on Long Island. She gave an eye opening in some of the ways that you can use modern architecture behind existing structures. And she had a good example of a library which enhanced functionality of the property yet it was in the context of a city that needed to grow.

After that we had a walking tour.

And I took Sarah out on a tour. We went
to see Walter Foote and Diane's house
which was pretty amazing. They took us
inside and we got to see some of the
original walls which were actually
covered with circus posters of Greenport.
There must have been 150. And they were
preserved and put into the house.
Incorporated into the design of the

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HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION 1 2 house. That was a very special moment. We also visited other houses 3 4 along the way. One of the houses we 5 visited when we took Linda Mackey on an earlier tour at lunch time was the house 6 7 at 440 First Street. So we went and looked at a house on 440 First Street 8 9 which was in need of obvious maintenance 10 and repair. It is one of the most 11 important houses we have in Greenport by 12 its look and its position in the Village. 13 And we were concerned because I myself 14 lived across from this house for many 15 years. For fifteen years. And the house 16 had never gotten any measurable 17 maintenance at that time and it was still 18 in a situation of disrepair. And we will 19 be following up with her to find out what 2.0 can be done to encourage the homeowner to 21 do the proper maintain, to keep a 22 historic structure of that kind viable in 23 the Village.
