3	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: I'd like to call the
4	meeting to order with a salute to the flag.

8	be seated. Okay. Just two quick announcements.

15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you very much.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Happy birthday.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.

18	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Just want everybody
19	to know that.
20	Okay. We'll start with the Fire Department
21	report. Chief Breese.
22	CHIEF BREESE: Good evening. You got all
23	my reports and the
24	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
25	CHIEF BREESE: I will have the final point

1	sheet for you. I'll drop it off to Sylvia
2	tomorrow.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
4	CHIEF BREESE: She's just finishing up on
5	it right now, she's getting done with it. I'll
6	have that for you tomorrow.
7	There's one correction. I apologize. Last
8	month when I was here, I incorrectly stated the
9	date for Washington's Birthday Parade. It's the
10	14th of February, not the 21st, and I needed to
11	make that correction.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Change the resolution?
13	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

14	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	CHIEF BREESE: That was a mistake on my
17	part. I apologize for that.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: But I believe the
19	Clerk has that in her report. I saw it in her
20	report.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: So that will be a
23	resolution to change that.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
25	CHIEF BREESE: There's also one other thing

1	I guess you need to make a resolution for,
2	probably. I was talking to this is coming
3	from Southold Police. On the day of the parade,
4	Wiggins Street, between Third and Fourth Street,
5	there's a one-way street, we need to make that a

9 CHIEF BREESE: So we can redirect the

10	traffic. Southold Town Police said it would be
11	easier if we if the Village Board makes that a
12	resolution and then has the traffic go that way
13	down the street. It's an easier it's easier
14	for them, I guess. I don't know how that exactly
15	works.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. No, we could
17	do that. You're going to want probably have
18	fire and police stationed down there early,
19	because I know last year we tried to leave here
20	to get to Standard Hose
21	CHIEF BREESE: Right.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: and Fourth Street
23	was completely blocked with people, with fire
24	trucks and the barbecue, and everything else. It
25	took almost 10 minutes to get from here to there.

1 So just if that's going to be the one-way street 2 going the opposite way, to make sure that they could get access all the way to Sixth Street to 3 get out when they're lining up along there. 4

CHIEF BREESE: Okay. All right. 5

6	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll add that as a
7	resolution. We'll vote on that next week, and
8	we'll send a copy to the Supervisor so they know
9	about it.
10	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: We're just going to
12	have to get some barricades or something, or
13	we'll put barricades up to block
14	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah, they usually block it
15	with barricades.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: the roads to make
17	sure it's clear.
18	CHIEF BREESE: Okay, we'll do that.
19	The other thing is, maybe Sylvia knows, is
20	our fire truck, is all the contracts signed for
21	that, do you know?
22	CLERK PIRILLO: The contracts,
23	unfortunately, are not signed. We sent them out
24	again for the second or third time on the 8th,
25	and it was sent by scan to Firematic. And we

- 2 possible. So we still, as of today, didn't
- 3 receive it.

- 4 CHIEF BREESE: Okay. All right.
- 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Chief, do we have two
- 6 ambulances going, or just one at the moment?
- 7 CHIEF BREESE: Two right now.
- 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
- 9 CHIEF BREESE: We got the other one back.
- •

That's the other thing, is within the next month

- or two, we're going to have to go out to bid for
- 12 a new ambulance, because our backup ambulance
- right now, we just put new tires on it. It was
- out for a while. We spent, I think, \$6,000 on it
- to get electrical problems repaired. Then we put
- 16 \$4,000 worth of tires on it. And then recently,
- we had fuel problem with it with a fuel tank, and
- 18 they were estimating \$8,000 to repair that. So
- it's getting pretty expensive for an ambulance
- that keeps breaking down. They got it back.
- 21 It's only cost us, I think, 28 or \$2900, but it's
- 22 not going to last long. There's a problem with
- the fuel tank, and George might know better,
- being a mechanic. There's something with the
- 25 tank delaminated, and something happened with the

1	fuel, and they don't make the tanks no more.
2	They wanted to make a custom tank for it, and
3	that's what was going to cost so much. And they
4	boiled the tank out, that's not originally, but
5	eventually we have specs right now, they have
6	a crew working on specs, getting it together to
7	go out to bid for a new ambulance. I believe we
8	have enough money in the Apparatus Replacement
9	Fund with the purchase of the new engine, enough
10	money left for an ambulance, so
11	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: A projected cost,
12	did they have anything, any idea?
13	CHIEF BREESE: No, not at this time. It's
14	probably going to be around 200,000, so
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the electrical fire
16	is that the ongoing problem with the ambulance?
17	Is that something that's going to keep happening
18	CHIEF BREESE: It started out as
19	electrical. They thought they had all the
20	electrical problems replaced fixed on it.
21	That's why we put new tires on it. We were going
22	to put all new tires on it, because we thought it

25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1	CHIEF BREESE: They thought they ran it out
2	of fuel and there was a problem with the fuel
3	tank, and that turned out it needed new injectors
4	and a new fuel pump, and they wanted to replace
5	the tank. It was going to cost \$8,000, and we
6	told them I said we're not spending that much
7	money on that thing. It's just ridiculous
8	putting all this money in there. So they said
9	they thought they could get it going for another
10	six months to a year by doing what they did.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
12	CHIEF BREESE: So, hopefully, we'll have a
13	new ambulance by then, SO we won't have to spend
14	more money on it.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And our the agreement
16	with Peconic Landing is that working out for you

12	Okay. We'll move to Mr. Pallas.
13	MR. PALLAS: Thank you. I have just a
14	couple of things. I do want to highlight a

15	few a few things, starting with well, I
16	have two resolutions, one for N.D. Eryou
17	Consulting Engineers for design and
18	preparation of design and specifications for the
19	power plant for oil tank storage and containment
20	of the building. This is all a result of the
21	Suffolk County Department Health inspections and
22	whatnot. So we're moving forward on that.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have one question
24	before
25	MR. PALLAS: Sure.

10

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- you continue on that 2 one. We've already paid them a -- there's two 3 vouchers --MR. PALLAS: Correct. 4 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- that we've already paid them for. I just want to verify, is this 6 paperwork that we're putting out for discussion 7 now and resolution, is this going -- is this 8 9 recouping what we have already had them do, or is this setting for a different, you know, project 10

11	or
12	MR. PALLAS: This is different work. This
13	particular one, this particular piece was
14	something the County had not indicated was
15	required during the initial process. As they
16	were going through it, they decided to add more
17	things that they wanted done. In essence, this
18	is for the containment piece, making the building
19	a containment, secondary containment system, the
20	building itself, to sealing the concrete and
21	things like that. That's what this piece is for,
22	which was not indicated in their initial
23	run-through.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So the total
25	amount, roughly, to deal with these gas tanks,

the total amount that we're going to be paying

out of the Light Plant is what, between the work

before and this one?

MR. PALLAS: I don't have the numbers of

the first two.

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thirteen thousand?

7	MR. PALLAS: The first two is about 26.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, that's this is
9	13,000, isn't it?
10	MR. PALLAS: This is 13,000.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They both were 13,000.
12	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, so it's 26, then.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Twenty-six? Okay. And
14	we have no paperwork from the previous Director
15	of Utilities dealing with any of this stuff?
16	MR. PALLAS: No. This was something the
17	County had requested once before, and it
18	wasn't some of it was followed up on, but not
19	enough of it, not even near enough of it.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. The only reason
21	I'm asking is, and I'm sure George
22	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. This is the
23	interior stuff, this is not the exterior fuel
24	tank
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The fuel tanks? Okay.

12

1 DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: -- that we were

getting the drawings on.

3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: This is the
5	basement. We had the one we were written up
6	for about 10 different tanks that weren't marked
7	properly. There were some abandoned tanks that
8	were still inside that weren't taken care of.
9	That's a different Department of Health survey
10	that they did.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just wanted to
12	know.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: And we had two
14	years ago, it was the same thing that was in this
15	year's report, and then they got the tanks
16	labeled and the other stuff taken care of. This
17	is to finish up the rest of it, so if there's a
18	spill in the basement, it's contained there, not
19	going into tanks and pumped out.
20	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Basically. So it's
22	to finish up the violation from two years ago to
23	get that taken care of.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
25	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: The exterior tank,

1 supposedly, we had specs and drawings on that. 2 We've never been able to find them, so we will 3 have to start on that over when we go to redo the fuel tank on the outside. 5 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, for the --DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the gas tank. 6 7 MR. PALLAS: For the gas tanks, for the 8 diesel and regular unleaded gas. We do have -- I guess we're about 90 percent done with those 9 10 specs now. It's pretty boiler plate. We're just 11 getting -- you know, it's a package deal, Lube 12 Cube, I think it's called. So I think were in 13 pretty good shape on that. DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 14 15 MR. PALLAS: The second resolution is for 16 the Building Inspector to attend the Code 17 Enforcement seminar. I don't have the details, I apologize for that. 18 19 On the Road Department, there are a few 20 things in there that deal with debris and leaves 21 cleaning out. Those are all part of the MS4 22 process. We're required to do these, they're

going to do anyway, but we're required to do them

work is ongoing that we constantly have to do 25 Work Session 1/20/15 1 anyway. So we're -- I'm just highlighting that 2 we're doing that as well. 3 The Adams Street water main project is 4 moving forward. It's a good project, too. We're 5 doing that inhouse with assistance of a 6 contractor for the trenching. We did receive the water -- I'm sorry. We 7 8 received the Fire Hydrant Report, and they are 9 working to correct any of the deficiencies on that as well. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So our road -- Water 12 Department, the Water Department's working on the 13 hydrants, or --14 MR. PALLAS: Yes. Well, for the -- yes. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Because it was quite an extensive list, so that's why I --16 17 MR. PALLAS: The list is extensive. A lot

of them are relatively easily corrected.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

2 Mr. Weingart, Weingart. DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, Jeff Weingart. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Jeff, who did the 4 5 report. It was for the first year. It's really 6 been extensive as to what we needed done and what 7 we didn't need done in the past. It's just, 8 well, we need X, Y and Z. It was nice to see that detail done on it, to be honest with you. 9 10 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. It's the first time I'm 11 seeing them, so I think --12 DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: I did review it. A 13 lot them were the same ones that were on there last year, some that are hard to open, and 14 everything else. I've discussed this with Paul 15

16	about, you know, replacing some of the ones that
17	are real problems or Sixth Street was one area
18	where there were several in a row that had issues
19	and we discussed that. That's right when we had
20	the cold snap, so they weren't doing anything
21	then, but that will be a priority. I think
22	there's five of them on the top of the list, and
23	then the other stuff, when it gets warmer out,
24	they'll be working on that, too.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, it's great.

16

DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: That's a priority 1 2 and should taken care of. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was nice to see in 4 step-by-step issues to move forward. MR. PALLAS: Right, right. And it makes 5 6 our job easier to fix, too. 7 So on the -- with regard to the Sewer 8 Department, on the statistics, because I'm not 9 going to go over the individual statistics, but as you review of them, you can we see that we 10 continue to be significantly below the permit 11

12	limits. We have a lot of room between what the
13	tests are showing and what our limits are. So
14	that the plant is operating at a very high level,
15	is why I'm pointing that out.
16	We did have a significant amount of
17	stormwater influx during the second week of
18	December, if you recall that rain we had in
19	December. It actually cost three million more
20	gallons than November, which is, you know, highly

unusual this time of year. But we were able 22 to -- we dumped the extra water into the

23 out-of-service BNR basin. If you remember, we

24 take one basin out of service in the winter, we

25 only have the two operating in the summer, so we

use that extra capacity for stormwater influx.

2 Collection system, they continue to work on

3 that. We did have a -- one pump at the Ludlam

4 Street pump station went bad. Backup pump was in

5 service, and we're working to go repair the bad

6 pump.

7 On the Electric Department, as I mentioned,

8	Eryou Engineering, they have —— they have already
9	done their on-site review for storage tanks. We
10	filled the new underground service of the
11	American Legion building, and the testing, A $\&$ F
12	Testing has been on site and continuing to review
13	the work that was done for the upgrade.
14	So any questions on that from the Board?
15	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: When are we going to
16	have a report from A & F Testing?
17	MR. PALLAS: The report is due mid
18	February.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
20	MR. PALLAS: The work, the actual work that
21	they're doing is supposed to be completed by the
22	end of January, and the report is due mid
23	February.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So they're pretty much

- 1 work through -- I was trying to find out -- I was
- 2 looking for the sheet that I have for their
- 3 proposal. They're pretty much getting through

4	most of what they put into their bid that they
5	were going to do?
6	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. As far as the
7	discussions, it's not as it's not like a
8	construction project where you can actually
9	measure that kind of progress, because they'll
10	they may get hung up on one little thing, and the
11	next thing, it looks like it's going to take a
12	while, but goes really quickly, because they
13	don't find any issues. So it's but as of now,
14	there's no reason to think they won't be done in
15	time.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I see Elemco Electric
17	was on site to review and update drawings for the
18	plant upgrade. Is this something to do with
19	their previous work or
20	MR. PALLAS: It's just as-built drawings.
21	It's just to make sure that the as-builts match
22	what was actually there.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And this is for the
24	second phase or the old first phase?
25	MR. PALLAS: Well, whatever work they've

- TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's for work they've
- 3 completed?
- 4 MR. PALLAS: Yes
- 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
- 6 MR. PALLAS: Yes.
- 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are we going to get
- 8 charged for them being on site?
- 9 MR. PALLAS: No, no.
- 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. This is part
- 11 of --
- MR. PALLAS: It's part of the package. The
- as-builts are part of the normal --
- 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
- 15 MR. PALLAS: -- course of business.
- 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just checking.
- 17 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. Moving on to the
- 18 Building Department, we did in a highlight, we
- 19 did exceed this —— last year's total for
- December -- I'm sorry -- for the year, by \$12,000
- 21 for permit fees, Building Department fees,
- compared to previous years. It was the highest
- 23 since 2005, which is good, collected fees. You
- 24 know, work -- a lot work going on, which is good

1	The one oh, the other thing I wanted to
2	point out, we did we are in the process, as
3	has been requested, of putting together a
4	brochure, if you will. This is just a draft of
5	all Building Department application process.
6	It's a pretty comprehensive document, which has
7	all the different permits that are required for
8	various, you know, instances, whether it's a sign
9	permit or wetlands permit, rental registration,
10	dumpster, regular building permit. We're also
11	going to be upgrading the website, so that you
12	can it will be you'll click on the Building
13	Department, it will go to a single page that will
14	have a description similar to this, and there'll
15	be links for each one for the forms that are
16	required, and those forms will be, you know, PDF
17	forms, you know, new updated, cleaned-up forms
18	for the all the applications that would be
19	online.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So this is a document,

21	when it goes online, that is going to be going
22	through the Clerk's Office to make sure that
23	everything is the same on the website, or are we
24	hiring another computer person to put this on?
25	MR. PALLAS: No. It's all going to be done

21

inhouse collaboratively. 1 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So the Clerk's 3 Office is involved in this process as well? 4 MR. PALLAS: When we get to that stage, 5 yeah. We're not event -- we're not there yet, 6 this is still a draft. When we get to that 7 point, we will, yes. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I just want 9 to know. MR. PALLAS: As far as the one note in here 10 11 about 131 Third Street, that's the Meson Ole 12 building, we continue to monitor that structure. 13 We do have some concerns about the structural 14 integrity of the building. And, again, we may be in a position to take some action. I think 15 there's maybe some more of the discussion from 16

the Village Attorney on that as well. I just
wanted to keep you advised that there are some
issues with that building that we continue to be
concerned about.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, would there be a

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, would there be a point at which we would have to barricade that off? I'm concerned about that front porch structure and the collapsing front wall on the porch.

MR. PALLAS: Yeah, we would — that would be part of what action that we might take, whether it be cover the roof with some kind of a tarp to keep water from getting in to stop the deterioration, and to do just that, to barricade it off to keep it safe from pedestrians and people just going into the building.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I know our Code Enforcement Officer has been very active through — walking throughout the Village, you know, finding a number of violations in houses, and citing people and discussing it with them.

13	That being said, I still know that there are
14	several buildings around town that I've observed
15	that have are not totally boarded up, that
16	have open windows and things like that, where
17	it's certainly possible that animals are getting
18	in. It's also possible that maybe squatters are
19	getting in. And, you know, I have photos of
20	them. I, you know, would like to go over them.
21	I think we if we've cited people a number of
22	times, aren't we within our rights to take action
23	to board those, and then put a lien against the
24	property, or something, if the owner doesn't do it?
25	MR. PALLAS: I believe that's correct. I

1 think ultimately, if a determination has been made, that we have to do something physical and 2 3 pay for it, then the -- whatever that cost, would 4 be put on the tax rolls. 5 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, okay. I'd like to go over that with --6 MR. PALLAS: Sure. 7

TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- you and Ed Ward.

9	MR. PALLAS: Absolutely.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It concerns me.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As far as the financial
12	part of it with the Code Enforcement Officer, how
13	many hours is he working a week now?
14	MR. PALLAS: Twenty.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Twenty? Okay.
16	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, he's part-time.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And most of it is
18	because I see him quite regularly inside. Is
19	most of it out just walking around and taking
20	care of, and discussion, or
21	MR. PALLAS: At first, that's kind of how
22	it was, but people are getting to know that he's
23	there, and he actually fields quite a number of
24	calls.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

24

1 MR. PALLAS: You know, that people say,
2 "Can you go take a look at this," "Can you go
3 take a look at that?" Even staff will do that as
4 well. Very involved with the Road Department,

5 for example, during leaf pickup times, which has been very effective, letting people know that 6 7 they can't be putting things out and that kind of 8 stuff. But it's been -- it's kind of a mixed 9 bag. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm just wondering if he's -- you know, it's -- the first 11 12 time I am starting to see activity, and I'm just 13 not hearing it from you at every Board meeting. So that's -- it's an expense that we decided to 14 do, so I just want to make sure that it's being 15 16 used wisely. 17 MR. PALLAS: I mean, my perspective, it is. I think it's been effective. 18 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 20 MR. PALLAS: We've gotten a good reaction 21 and action from the general public, even when we 22 go out to -- when we do follow up on a complaint, 23 people seem to be doing what we're asking them to

three visits, they get the idea that they have to

- cooperative on that. So that's unfortunate, but
- I think we're starting to make up for it now that
- it's gotten quite cold out. So I think we're in
- better shape than we were.
- The new building that we bought has been

1	a has worked out really well. People are
2	receptive. The staff has a much easier time
3	working in there, as Jeff will attest to. So I
4	think that was a very good —— a good thing that
5	we did.
6	The ice itself has been working very well
7	this year. I $\operatorname{}$ we attribute that mostly to a
8	very small change that we made in how we get the
9	ice set up initially. We in years past,
10	the whenever there would be any kind of a
11	melt, or even when we would start to freeze the
12	ice, it would just go out the bottom. This year,
13	we put a kind of at a 45-degree angle, a layer
14	of sand around the edge of the ice rink on the
15	interior; wet that down a little bit, let it
16	freeze hard before we started freezing everything
17	else; kept the water in. And even when it warms
18	up, you know, it doesn't we don't lose all the
19	water that's as it starts to melt. So that
20	has held up very, very well. And that really was

just a result of everybody, the entire staff,

22	really, putting our heads together, or their
23	heads together, not me, but to figure out what we
24	can do. You know, there's got to be a fix to
25	this. It just seemed crazy that it was it's

working out, and I think that they did a bang-up job on coming up with the idea. And so I just wanted to mention that as well.

And, lastly, the reason I brought Jeff up there, as part of the ongoing discussions on the Public Assembly Permits, one of the things that happens from time to time is we get these groups of boaters, clubs that come to the marina, and they've used the park area as kind of a spot where they get together when they're not on their boats. I just wanted — Trustee Murray asked if Jeff could come in and just discuss what that process looks like.

TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah, we're -- Jeff has come to all of us, I believe, and wanted to discuss this. He's got a few groups right now that want to put their tents up that they have in

the past. And we need to decide what we're going to do with the Marina.

I feel, and I think some others feel, that if you're coming in as a group, the Marina — the park is there for the Marina to prosper, I guess, and we want to accommodate these groups so that they come in. There's about \$15,000 worth of revenue on the table if we do not accept these

groups. And we need to decide what we want to do with the Marina.

I — Jeff and I are both in agreement that we need to accommodate these groups. This is what the Marina is for, is to bring in these boats. And they want a tent, and that's a big issue with everything going on with the park. So we want to bring it to the table to discuss how we feel about these groups using tents.

DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. If they don't have a tent, are they not going to come here?

TRUSTEE MURRAY: Two groups will not come.

DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: They will not come,

The Business 2 Improvement District had two meetings in the 3 beginning of January to discuss their objectives 4 for 2015, so I'll just give you the high points of what they discussed there. 5 Their primary objective is to improve 7 communication with their members and with the 8 public. Obviously, the Tall Ships is a big item 9 for them this year. And, also, discussing 10 possibly expanding the BID itself, the district. So the suggestions and things that they mentioned 11 12 in relation to that were improvement of 13 communication and advertising, distribution of 14 the monthly meetings to members, and creating a 15 communication calendar. Also, continuing to 16 develop a welcoming kit for new businesses, new 17 and existing businesses, and to send that out on 18 a bi-annual basis. Possibly to have a 19 professional person out there to do their PR for 20 And to increase the BID database, so that

they can automatically get out all of their

publicity and PR.

They -- I suggested to them that I thought

it would be a good idea for a member of the BID

to come to our work sessions on a regular basis.

Now, I know it didn't work out this month. I was not at the regular meeting, I was up in Albany. But I thought that it would be a good idea for them to reach out to the community, and come and give a report, beyond what I do, just to let them know what they're doing, and just to have a more public presence at the meeting. That way they could also make themselves available for some questions that I think some of the residents may have.

They also talked about increasing advertising in PR, as I said, maybe hiring a professional. And to increase their outreach to a lot of the regional organizations around here, the Wine Council, the Chamber of Commerce, and

some of the other local organizations.

17	And then, lastly, they were in this
18	proposed discussion of expanding the BID
19	footprint outside the Village, basically, to
20	other businesses in greater Greenport. I think
21	Rich Vandenberg had contacted Joe Prokop about
22	that, discussed there are apparently two ways to
23	do that. One way would be to actually have to
24	disband the BID and reorganize it from scratch.
25	Maybe a good idea, maybe not, because, you know,

it would have to pass a vote again to do that.

Rich was going to look into if there were other

ways to do it, and possibly consult with some —

an attorney who specializes in that. So that was

basically what they talked about.

As I said, I didn't get to the regular

meeting. I checked the notes and it was only

attended, I think, by for four or five people.

So I think they kind of decided they would table

most of other discussions to their next meeting.

The goals of the organization include to

maintain a financially sound organization, while		
providing safe, reliable, low-cost energy and		
service to members, develop and/or support the		
development of programs that are focused on		
reducing energy usage and peak energy demand,

ongoing oversight of the wholesale energy		
market/NYISO process to achieve a reasonable cost		
of energy and transmission, and to ensure the		
correct application of FERC's Order 888 and 889,		
as well as the New York ISO OAT.

is what we are a part of.		
Develop programs to assist members in

there's no room for the ferry. You'd be imposing
on the ferry boats getting in and out. It was

the one space. The Ferry talked to us about it, they offered a price. We countered with a price. Neither one was happy with the price. We spoke, we discussed it. Right now, there is nothing in writing, there is no agreement. Last time we met was in

August. The Ferry company said, "Well, if you're going to do it for this year, you need to sign it right away." We were not comfortable with it. We said, "We're not signing anything until we

finish the process," and they're not speaking to

12	us anymore.
13	So, as of right now, there's no ongoing
14	negotiations, there is no document to see. It
15	was something they want to ask they wanted to
16	talk to us about, because of hazard to
17	navigation. And we went with Legal Counsel and

- 10 the Village jurisdiction, not Southold Town?
- 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I think it's in the
- 12 Village.
- 13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It is in the Village?
- 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think, Paul, you
- mentioned there was some issue and couldn't find
- 16 the permit.
- 17 TRUSTEE MURRAY: I can see why Mr. Matassa
- and they want to build this, and I don't have
- 19 a problem with it. It's in his dock needs to
- 20 be rebuilt. I think it's in line with what we're
- 21 putting out there and what we're allowing. He's
- 22 going through the right channels of approval,

2	little bit of advice here. Maybe it's just
3	because the price that I heard floating around
4	was \$750,000, except the gallons per day
5	transmitted do would amount to an upfront fee
6	of a million-and-a-half. And I don't think this
7	Board should be just throwing away 700
8	three-quarters of a million dollars.
9	And if they started without a permit in
10	place, that's their problem, that's not ours. We
11	want this Village could use that
12	million-and-a-half dollars, and if they don't
13	like it, I'm sorry. But that's what they should
14	be paying, calculated on the gallons of sewage
15	that their engineer, our engineer, and they all
16	agreed to it, was 13,000 13,000 gallons a day.

17	Divide that by 130, which is what we allow for a
18	building, that comes out to 100 buildings, times
19	15,000, comes out to a million—and—a—half. If we
20	take any less than that, this Village Board would
21	be derelict in its duty, I can tell you that.
22	Thank you.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
24	MR. TASKER: Good evening. I'm Arthur
25	Tasker. I wanted to address the Matassa

1 question, a couple of points.

I believe there's some misapprehension with respect to Mr. Matassa's application. First of all, he is his own neighbor. He owns the adjacent property on which there is a comparable dock to what is presently there.

Second of all, the dock does not need to be replaced. Although he stated in his application that it was damaged during Hurricane Sandy, it was not.

Third, the question of getting to deep
water by moving it eight feet out, as I testified

13	at the hearing several weeks ago, is a phantom.
14	He's got a foot-and-a-half of water where he
15	presently is, and when he moves the dock out
16	eight feet, he'll get two-and-a-half to three
17	feet of water. He wants to put a big boat on it
18	and that's inappropriate. So I think if these
19	misapprehensions are correct and properly
20	understood, the viewpoint should be different.
21	Thank you.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
23	MR. MATASSA: It's in reference to the
24	Matassa application. My name is Vincent Matassa.
25	First of all, I'm glad to hear the Board is

willing to accommodate boaters, and realizes the
importance as a source of income for the
community.

So I'm here today to support the proposal
of my dock permit and answer any questions you
may have.

Number one, Greenport is a maritime boating

community. It has a rich history with the water.

9	The Waterfront Revitalization Plan, available on
10	the Town's website, demonstrates the Village's
11	continued commitment to the position of Greenport
12	as a place that has recreational, economic and
13	historical maritime benefits.
14	The DEC has approved this permit.
15	Three, the Army Corps has likewise approved
16	the permit, concluding that the dock has no
17	impact on navigability.
18	This project, this proposed project will
19	improve the quality of life to the surrounding
20	community of Stirling Creek by enhancing the
21	safety of the creek, by upgrading an old failing
22	dock. It will improve and upgrade
23	infrastructure, enhancing property values, and
24	supporting the goals of Greenport's role as a
25	waterfront, boating, recreation and fishing

community, and promoting local maritime uses, the
economy, and marine recreation.

At the last meeting, I submitted several
letters of support from adjacent property owners,

5	and who have docks and boats on the creek.						
6	Additionally, a petition of support was						
7	submitted, further demonstrating support among						
8	our neighbors.						
9	The fact remains that this proposed dock						
10	extension is consistent and compatible with						
11	current uses of the creek, and is in the spirit						
12	of a maritime community, and does not interfere						
13	with navigation.						
14	I would also like to I would also like						
15	the Board to give no consideration on the letters						
16	of objection submitted and dated July of 2013,						
17	and I guess duplicated at the last meeting.						
18	They're not for this current application.						
19	That's basically it. Any questions you						
20	have?						
21	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: No.						
22	MR. MATASSA: Also, the dock is exactly the						
23	same size dock as what's existing. It's a						
24	six-by-twenty dock. And I don't know if						
25	anybody's familiar, but all I'm doing is moving						

- 1 it out eight feet along the proposed dock line.
- 2 Thank you.
- 3 DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
- 4 MR. FISHER: Thank you. Don Fisher,
- 5 Railroad Museum of Long Island, 440 Fourth
- 6 Street.
- 7 Just as a follow-up to our conversations
- 8 from the last month, we are meeting with the
- 9 North Ferry Company regarding the parking area
- north of the building on Friday.
- 11 DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
- MR. FISHER: So we're moving forward. And
- I'm hoping to have the conversation. They may
- see their rights to the parking area. And I hope
- 15 that the Board has continued to discuss our
- 16 proposal for ceding the rights on the lease to
- 17 the building soon. I kind of get the North Ferry
- 18 Company and some information or a letter from the
- 19 Village Board here, and I can move things along
- with the MTA and the Long Island Railroad. Thank
- 21 you.
- DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
- Okay. Anybody else wish to address the Board?
- 24 (No response.)
- 25 DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'll

1	entertain a motion to go into Executive Session
2	for personnel reasons.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
