1	(Whereupon, the meeting was called to order at
2	7:03 p.m.)
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll call the meeting to order.
4	Pledge to the flag.
5	(Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of
6	Allegiance.)
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Please be seated. Thank you.
8	All right. I want to welcome everybody here to my
9	first work session as Mayor, with a couple of new
10	members on the Board. It's good to see a big
11	turnout. We welcome everybody here. Hopefully,
12	we'll get this many people every month, it would be
13	good.
14	We're going to start with the monthly reports.
15	The Fire Chief called me a little while ago, said he
16	had another meeting. With the switch of dates, he
17	didn't realize it, so he's not going to be here this
18	evening. So, if there's any questions on his report,
19	I'll try to answer them.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There was one here, some
21	resolutions on here.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. First one is they
24	want to advertise for a new Administrative Assistant.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do they have a job
2	description for that yet, or is there something
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. The one Wade Manwaring
4	was the Administrative Assistant.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: He retired or resigned the
7	beginning of March.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's going to be the same
LO	job description we used last time. I think he's been
L1	in the position about six years, so it would be the
L2	same thing. It's the same pay and everything else.
L3	They just want the Commission to go out to advertise
L4	for it.
L5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So is that going to
L6	go through the Village Clerk's Office, or is that
L7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
L9	MAYOR HUBBARD: It will go through the Village
20	Clerk, and the advertising we pay through their Fire
21	Department budget.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And they will
23	actually be doing the interviews? Because there was
24	confusion the last time. You know, I just want to
25	make sure that we're

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. There's a committee for
2	the Board of Wardens and the Chiefs.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe it's six people who
5	are on the committee. They'll do the interviews and
6	they'll pick somebody's that appropriate for the job
7	The other question they did, they want to go
8	out to go out to bid on the ambulance. They had
9	some questions on it. I was hoping to ask the Chief
10	about that. They're going for a gas ambulance
11	instead of diesel, and we've had diesels in the past
12	I don't know why they're going for gas, I don't know
13	what the reasoning is, but I will ask him that
14	question to find out before we go back to the old way
15	of doing it, because the diesels seem to be better,
16	and all the trucks were diesel and it seemed to be
17	easier. I don't why they're going back to gas. I'm
18	sure there's got to be a reason, but I don't know.
19	That's a question I will ask him.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: George, did I see that they
21	were going to approach Peconic Landing to perhaps go
22	in partly on that ambulance? I think I read that in
23	one of the reports.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're talking about that.
25	That was talked about at the Warden's meeting, but I

1	don't know where they went with that.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. It's not a bad idea if
3	they at least
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, if they want
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: If it's a subject with them,
6	right?
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: If they want to help out with
8	it, that would be great, but we'll find out on that.
9	I will ask him that also.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay, cool. Thanks.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Any other questions
12	on the Fire Department?
13	(No response.)
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. At this point, we have
15	Bob Foxen from Global Common is here. He wanted to
16	give a little presentation to us. I know he sent
17	some paperwork out today. Unfortunately, I was busy
18	with something else with a family matter, so I did
19	not read what you sent out today, Bob. I just got
20	the email when I walked in here.
21	So, in general, what they're looking at doing,
22	it's a proposal to possibly add a peaker plant up on
23	Moore's Lane, a second peaker plant like the Hawkeye
24	plant.
25	Also, there's a NYSERDA grant that's out there

1	for infrastructure and the distribution system. I
2	have to make sure I say it the right way. So they're
3	looking for basically a Letter of Intent of our
4	interest in doing the first part of it, which is on
5	the distribution system. They're going to do all the
6	work and everything else. They just need a
7	commitment from us that we'd be interested in signing
8	with them. That's the general part of it. I'll let
9	Bob, you know, discuss and answer your questions. I
10	think he's met with all the Trustees and myself
11	beforehand. So, Bob, you want to just give us a
12	the public an explanation of what you've got on the

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MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, it's not real formal. It's just -- it's in general, just so everybody has an idea of what -- I've mentioned it a few times before the election that we had something possibly going on, and I just wanted to get some information out to the public on it, that's all.

MR. FOXEN: Okay. And I apologize, because I didn't expect the turnout, and I would have brought more copies for everybody. So I'll try as best I can to explain what I have here in a way that everybody can follow it.

So what I wanted to do is give -- first of all, I think I recognize a few faces from last year that are out here, and I'm glad you're coming back for a second round. But I wanted to go through a little bit of background on how we got here, and then I was going to talk about a couple of opportunities that are out there for Greenport, and then what action that you might want to consider as next steps.

Unlike the situation last year that was really not a pressing deadline, at least for the peaking plant, like there was the other time, I think there's an opportunity you want to take advantage of, and I'll talk about that. There's not any great sense of urgency like there was a year ago.

1	And that's probably a good place to start, so
2	that the first slide on the second page, the title
3	says Background and Context.
4	And for those of you that weren't familiar with
5	the process last year, LIPA received 38 proposals for
6	peaking plants all over Long Island. You remember,
7	we were proposing that you put another peaking plant
8	in at the site over on Moores Lane.
9	There were 38 proposals that were submitted to
10	LIPA. Each of the bidders had to submit a deposit o
11	\$30,000, nonrefundable, and they probably spent tens
12	of thousands, if not \$100,000, for each proposal,
13	for, what I would say, internal costs for the
14	companies. And then around the middle of last year,
15	maybe it was later in the year, LIPA decided to
16	withdraw the RFP. Everybody lost their money and
17	they did nothing. So the at that point
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
19	MR. FOXEN: that opportunity, if you will,
20	went away for everyone. And what didn't go away is
21	LIPA still needs the peaking power, particularly on
22	the East End. And so the need or opportunity,
23	depending on how you look at it, is still there.
24	I hear rumors that LIPA may be issuing another
25	RFP that would focus on just the East End. Whether

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those rumors are true or not, I'm not really sure, and we also don't know when that would be, when and if that happens.

The other thing that's going on at the State level is with NYSERDA. I don't know if you folks are familiar with NYSERDA. It's the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority; kind of oversees all the energy policy programs and a lot of funding from New York State.

So, as a result, really, of Hurricane Sandy, when there were so many outages and so much -- so many electrical problems throughout the Island, the Governor and NYSERDA became very concerned about finding a way to prevent those outages in the future, or to get the lights back on quicker if there was an So they started a program called the New outage. York Microgrid Prize Process, and the New York Prize Process is basically a grant program that allows people -- that will help people to strengthen the grid and put more localized distributor generation, both conventional generation and renewable So that program, there's a total of 40 generation. million dollars around the State from different communities to take advantage of that program. Ι think it's a really good opportunity, and I think

1	Greenport would be likely to qualify.
2	So, as I say, I think it's a good opportunity
3	for Greenport. What I wanted to do here today was to
4	offer we could offer a unique solution that PSEG
5	and Greenport, everyone could benefit from.
6	Let's see, the next slide down here, I want to
7	talk about the peaking power plant. And, George, I
8	should just ask you, I don't want to overstay my
9	welcome, but
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, just keep it brief. Just
11	in general, you know, what's going on, what you
12	know, where we're going with it. I think it's more
13	you're looking for a Letter of Intent, I believe, for
14	the May 15th deadline to try to go for the grant
15	money.
16	MR. FOXEN: There's two things we're looking
17	for. One is commitment to go forward with the
18	Microgrid Prize opportunity.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
20	MR. FOXEN: There is a pressing deadline on
21	that, but that's not that just commits you to a
22	feasibility study. There's no
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
24	MR. FOXEN: plans or anything you're
25	committed to at this point. And then I wanted to

talk to you about there's a commitment on -- I'd like to discuss with you, as we talked about, for moving ahead at least the next step with the peaker.

So, anyway, what kind of peaker are we talking about? We're talking about a 50 to 75 megawatt peaking plant. It would be pushed as far back as we could at the site, where the wastewater treatment plant and the other peaking plant is. We would like to use natural gas, if it's available. If it's not, we would like to use liquified natural gas that would burn much cleaner than diesel, and be a lot less expensive, and make the project more viable.

With diesel, we would use diesel only as a backup fuel. The advantage of -- other than the cost with natural gas, as you probably know, you'd have much, much lower air emissions, sulphur and particulates. Basically, natural gas has potentially zero sulphur and zero particulates. So there would be a big advantage in terms of emissions and cost of using that as a fuel.

There's a number of benefits associated with the peaking plant. One would be, depending on the size of the plant, and what we would finally negotiate, there would be rental income, something in the range of 300 to \$500,000 a year. It's very

substantial property taxes. It could range anywhere from around 900,000 to a million-and-a-half dollars a year in total, of which the Village would be something, between IRS, and these are just estimates, we can have an attorney look at, between 140 and 282,000 a year for the Village, 750,000 to 1.2 million a year for the schools. So it's -- if you add up the rent and the -- and the taxes, there's a lot of financial benefit for everyone.

The other thing is there's some really important energy benefits for Greenport, too. One possibility is that we could use peak power from this plant to offset the 30% of the peak power that Greenport currently buys from the grid. And I haven't really -- I haven't had a chance yet to look at the economics of that, but my -- I believe that the 30% we're not buying from Niagara Falls is probably a fairly -- it's fairly expensive energy. So Greenport would potentially, and we haven't really studied this yet, but potentially be able to reduce the cost that you're paying for that 30% of excess electricity.

Another advantage would be it would provide additional backup power in the event of an outage. So if, for example, you don't want to use or you're

1 not able to use the existing Greenport plant up here 2 in a storm, this plant, we would design it so you 3 could turn it on during a storm event and have it as 4 backup power. 5 And then the final offer that we would make, 6 and this came up in some of our earlier discussions 7 with Julia and Mary Bess, was we would give Greenport 8 the option to buy the physical assets at book value 9 at the end of the initial term. So you -- in other 10 words, what we would try to do is carve out just 11 enough of the generation capacity that would be 12 necessary for Greenport, for your own Village, so you wouldn't be obligated to buy something you didn't 13 14 really need. 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How long is the initial term, 16 Bob? 17 MR. FOXEN: Twenty years. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Twenty years.

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MR. FOXEN: The other advantage, the way we're designing the system, is it would facilitate renewable energy. We would use reciprocating engines, which are basically the same engines as in your car. And those engines, as you know when you're driving, they're very efficient as they cycle up and cycle down. So if we're putting in solar, or wind,

or a combination of all the above, those engines would facilitate renewables, so that when there's no sun or no wind, those -- you could turn on the conventional generation. And we talked about minimal environmental impacts.

Next slide is the New York Microgrid Prize

Program discussion. I said before, that there's
substantial money, total if 40 million dollars, to

Help facilitate quote, unquote microgrid. Actually,
Greenport is a really good example right now of
microgrid. So you all don't really have -- this is
really not something new for you, but there's
improvements that you could make that would help in a
number of different ways.

There are three phases in the NYSERDA program. In Phase I, they're going to give \$100,000 grants to 25 facilities, and that \$100,000 would be used for a study, a feasibility -- what they call a feasibility study. And essentially what we would do is just look at different alternatives and come up with a recommendation as to what would be the best option, so -- and that's really all we're looking for a decision on in terms of the Microgrid Prize Program tonight.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct, okay.

MR. FOXEN: The second phase, and each phase is competitive, the second phase, they're going to give a million dollars each to 10 communities to design whatever you come up -- recommend in the feasibility study. So you have to -- the 25 in the first phase, 10 in the second phase.

And then the third phase, there's up to \$7 million for implementation of the project that is ultimately designed. If you do the first phase and you don't like what you see, you don't have to go ahead, you can stop whenever you want. But, presumably, you're going to want to go ahead, you're going to -- you're going to recommend a plan if it was in your interest.

I think Greenport, as I said, is very suitable and very -- has very good opportunity to win at least some of this prize money. The criteria, one is the entity has to have a -- what they call critical facilities. Critical facilities include things like hospitals, you have a check there, wastewater treatment plant, you have a check there, fire department, you have a check there, government buildings, the ferry. So all these things I think would make it likely that Greenport would qualify.

The other criteria is are you susceptible to

1	storm impacts, like from Sandy and so forth. I
2	believe the answer to that would be a yes as well.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, it would.
4	MR. FOXEN: So and there are a couple of
5	other criteria, but those are the most important
6	ones. And, as I said, I think you would have a good
7	chance of getting this, this funding.
8	The proposals for the Microgrid Prize are due
9	May 15th. And we're actually doing a similar
10	proposal for Port Jefferson, and so they're fairly
11	there's a fair amount of work in the proposal. So
12	it's important that we start on it right away if you
13	want to do that, so the clock doesn't run out.
14	Next page talks about the team that's working
15	on the Microgrid. We've got three or possibly four
16	partners on this. One is D & B Engineers, who I
17	believe has done work for Greenport before, and a
18	company called Burns Engineering. They're out of
19	Philadelphia, and they're really a national expert on
20	microgrids. And then my own firm, Global Common,
21	which has done a lot of development. I'm a
22	Professional Engineer. I'm an Environmental Engineer
23	by training. So between the three of us, we have
24	really strong expertise in doing this work.
25	In terms of action items/next steps, we would

-- we'd need to make a decision -- you would need to make a decision to go forward in short order, and just to make sure we don't miss the deadline. And there's a couple of paths that we could take going forward, and we can talk about that. And then we would go ahead and we would prepare the proposal for that at no cost to Greenport.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.

MR. FOXEN: With the understanding we do the feasibility study if we write the proposal.

And then what I would also encourage you to do is, and I recommend, is I'd like to get to the point where Greenport would sign the Lease Option Agreement that I gave to you. We can still keep tweaking some aspects of that. I should say this: The option agreement that I'm asking Greenport to sign is a conditional agreement. There's a very clear criteria, that Greenport would have to approve any final steps, so that it doesn't -- it doesn't irrevocably bind you to going forward. The reason that we need it is after -- we would want to speak with LIPA about a Power Purchase Agreement, and before we can go to LIPA, we have to be able to demonstrate to LIPA that we have site control. And so we need to show them a piece of paper that says

that, you know, if we get a Power Purchase Agreement, we have the right to use this, this site. Now it doesn't have to be an absolute right, but they need a fairly strong comfort feeling, comfort level that we really can do this, or they're not going to sit down and talk to us seriously about this.

So the way we crafted the option agreement was that, you know, we're going it go forward, we specify the rent we would pay, specify the terms, and so on, and other conditions. But there's a very clear caveat that we don't go forward unless the Board gives final approval.

So those are -- those are the key points that I wanted to talk about. And I'm happy to take questions or give --

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, I appreciate you coming. One thing I just want to point out to the public is last time we had talked about the peaker plant, that was going to be just for LIPA, and we weren't going to be able to get any benefit from that. This here would be something that would help us by doing that. Last time we were completely out of it. If we let them do it, we could never get any power from it. With this proposal, we would be able -- if we need the power, we will be able to get

1	power from it, which is a big benefit to the village
2	for it, besides just the rent. But if we need the
3	power from it, we could be able to tap into it.
4	MR. FOXEN: Right, correct. Does anybody have
5	any idea what you pay for that 30% that you don't get
6	from Niagara Falls?
7	MR. PALLAS: It's market, market rate.
8	MR. FOXEN: It must be pretty is it
9	MR. PALLAS: In the summer, it's pretty high.
10	MR. FOXEN: I don't know, but the market looks
11	fairly high to me, but
12	MR. PALLAS: But it's variable every, you know,
13	hour, as you know, so it's purely market.
14	MR. FOXEN: Yeah. Okay.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Did anybody have
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. I have a question for
17	you, Mr. Mayor.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What timeline are you
20	proposing for this?
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I'd like to get the
22	Letter of Intent, that we could vote on that for
23	next at our regular meeting next week
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: A week from today?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just to say to go ahead, to go

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1	ahead with him to try and go for the grant.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Not on doing the plant or any
4	of the other stuff. We're not going to do that until
5	we have more public comment on it. This is just to
6	try to meet the May 15th deadline to try to go for
7	the NYSERDA grant, because if we don't vote on it at
8	our regular meeting to say there's no outlay or
9	cost to us. They're going to do all the work. They
10	just want us to be a partner with it. That would be
11	before we do anything on actually doing the for
12	the plant and everything else, we would have more
13	public comment on it, and we would discuss it
14	further.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, this does say we need a
16	Letter of Support, right, from us?
17	MR. FOXEN: Yes.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
19	MR. FOXEN: Yes.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What's the contents of that
21	Letter of Support?
22	MR. FOXEN: I believe I sent it, but just to
23	explain to everybody, it essentially says that
24	it's for the Mayor's signature, and it essentially
25	says that we are supporting assuming that we're

1	taking the read on the apprication.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, you would be.
3	MR. FOXEN: Okay. So it says that we support
4	at this time, we're planning on D & B being the
5	lead applicant, so we support D & B's efforts to
6	solicit this grant from NYSERDA, that's basically all
7	it says.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's one of the
9	paperwork that came around. I think he sent a hard
10	copy around today that I did not get to see.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Called Peaking Plant Letter
12	of Interest?
13	MR. FOXEN: Yes.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is that the one? Okay. I'm
15	just curious. I don't want to monopolize, but why
16	Greenport? East End is a big place. What do you
17	love about Greenport?
18	MR. FOXEN: Well, for one thing, it's already a
19	municipal utility. So you as I said earlier, you
20	guys really are already a microgrid in and of
21	yourselves, so you control your own wires. So one of
22	the things that define a microgrid is you have to be
23	able to operate in what they call in "Island Mode".
24	In other words, you have to be able to operate
25	independently or in tandem with the grid, and you're

1	already really configured to be able to do that. You
2	can seal yourself off from the grid if you really
3	wanted to fairly easily and operate independently.
4	So you really fit, as do most communities, municipal
5	utilities, you already fit the definition of a
6	microgrid.
7	Second of all, you meet some of the criteria.
8	You have a hospital. There aren't many villages or
9	towns with hospitals out here. You have the
10	wastewater treatment plant. So you have certain
11	criteria.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For the grant, right?
13	MR. FOXEN: For the grant.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But you could put this plant
15	anywhere. I mean, so you don't have to you don't
16	need the grant for the plant.
17	MR. FOXEN: You mean for the microgrid, or are
18	you talking
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So backing out of the grant,
20	just putting the plant here in general, we don't need
21	to win this grant for you to put this plant here.
22	MR. FOXEN: I'm sorry. Are you referring to
23	the peaking plant, or are you referring to the
24	microgrid?
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So we don't have to

1	win the NYSERDA grant for you to put the plant here,
2	that's just something you're offering to do in
3	addition, right?
4	MR. FOXEN: The peaking plant, really, it's
5	interrelated, but they're separate. So you could do -
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
7	MR. FOXEN: You could go after the microgrid
8	proposal and never do the peaking plant.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So is it fair
10	MR. FOXEN: Or you could do the peaking plant
11	and never do the microgrid.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
13	MR. FOXEN: But they are kind of complimentary
14	if they work together.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So is it fair to say
16	you're one of the reasons you're choosing
17	Greenport is because you could also easily win the
18	NYSERDA grant?
19	MR. FOXEN: Yes, yes. I think Greenport is
20	from the standpoint of the peaking plant, I think
21	it's a good location just because well, there's
22	some transmission related reasons why this is a good
23	location, too, which I can mention those. But I
24	think there's an open-mindedness toward considering
25	energy generation that probably doesn't exist in some

of the places, at least on the South Fork.

The other advantage that Greenport has is there's an underground cable that runs from Southold across Shelter Island to the Hamptons, ties in at a substation in East Hampton. So by having a plant here, you're able to serve Greenport, you're able to serve the North Fork, you're able to serve the South Fork. So I think it really makes this location very desirable to LIPA.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But if most of the people live on the South Fork, wouldn't it also be worth considering putting it down there? I mean, aren't they going to need most of the energy?

MR. FOXEN: I don't think they're going to get a plant down there.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we end up -- okay, right.

MAYOR HUBBARD: But I think some of it is we've already got two power plants in Greenport now. I think they're choosing here because "not in my backyard". Nobody else wants a power plant near them, but we have a location that could be ideal for it and be a revenue generator for us, and there's already two up there. Most other places, I know on Shelter Island they were trying to find a place for a power plant, they searched the whole island, nobody

1	wants it near them. And I think that's what they run
2	into most places. Where there's two there already,
3	they're saying to put a third one really would have a
4	small impact on the environment with the new type
5	plant, and we could get some generation, generate
6	revenue from it.
7	MR. FOXEN: Right.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think that's why Greenport is
9	the key.
10	MR. FOXEN: And you could look at this both
11	ways. On the one hand, you'd say, "Well, we have the
12	power plant to supply the South Fork" and incur that
13	burden, or you could say, "Well, it's an opportunity
14	for us, because we're going to get a
15	million-and-a-half dollars a year of income and we're
16	not going to have any significant impact."
17	So, if you talk to people in Port Jefferson, I
18	don't know if you know the story there, but they're
19	losing their power plant. They have a very large
20	power plant they're losing and it's killing them,
21	because it supplies 40% of their tax base. So it's a
22	trade-off. You guys have to decide, is it you
23	know, is it worth the benefits or not?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think, Bob, just for
25	clarification for me, part of the feasibility study

1	for us to have that document to deal with some of the
2	questions that are now being asked is an important
3	document for us, where if you're going for the grant,
4	we're not having to pay for that feasibility study,
5	correct?
6	MR. FOXEN: Correct, correct.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think is that what
8	you're really getting to at this point tonight, you
9	need just to say that we kind of agree that the
10	feasibility study is worth our effort to go forward?
11	MR. FOXEN: Tonight, really, we're just focused
12	right, that's the immediate decision. The other
13	questions that Doug is raising, you know, those are
14	broader questions about whether you want to have this
15	peaking plant here or not.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But having the
17	feasibility study will give us information and
18	reference information to go back to, correct?
19	MR. FOXEN: Yes, it will. Now, it's still I
20	don't I can't tell you right now how much of the
21	scope of that feasibility study is going to be
22	focused on bigger issues relating to the peaking
23	plant on the South Fork. It's probably not going to
24	talk about that. It's going to really
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Our area.

Τ	MR. FUXEN: The Teasibility study is really
2	going to focus on, you know, this area.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Our area of Greenport.
4	Okay. That's what I wanted to get defined, because
5	that right now is the first step.
6	MR. FOXEN: Yes.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I understand the rest of the
8	questions, and that, I'm sure that we will be having
9	further discussion with the public on that. But I
10	think to be able to get that feasibility study and
11	for us not to have to pay for it is a plus.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Does that include an
13	Environmental Impact Study?
14	MR. FOXEN: The feasibility study typically
15	wouldn't have a lot of environmental assessment. I
16	mean, it would it would be basically looking at
17	different generation alternatives. It would look at,
18	as I say, conventional generation, it would look at
19	solar, it would look at wind, it would look at
20	batteries, various things like that. It would look
21	at the cost of those things, economic feasibility.
22	It would have to, to some extent, look at
23	environmental issues to the extent you'd have to make
24	sure that everything could be permitted and comply
25	with environmental rules. But it wouldn't include

1	what I would call environmental impact assessment or
2	things like that.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, wouldn't that actually
4	come the environmental impact would actually come
5	if we get to the next step of building the facility?
6	MR. PALLAS: It would probably I would
7	assume it would mean there's actually three steps.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
9	MR. PALLAS: So you're probably in the second
10	step where that would take place.
11	MR. FOXEN: Yeah. Yeah, because you don't know
12	what you're going to do the environmental assessment
13	on, because you haven't really defined what the
14	alternatives are yet.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So that would be during the
16	engineering phase, then, Paul?
17	MR. PALLAS: Yes. Typically, yeah.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So, when we apply for the
19	grants, do we apply in three phases? We get the
20	you would write the bid for the 100K for the first
21	study, and then you'd have to apply again?
22	MR. FOXEN: Correct. So, as I say, there's 25
23	in the first, then there's 10 in the second round,
24	and five or seven, I forget five, I guess, in the
25	third round. So you have to keep winning.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
2	MR. FOXEN: So and there's a fair amount of
3	work. I mean, so for us, it's really the first
4	round is kind of almost like a loss leader, because
5	even though \$100,000 seems like a lot, but if you see
6	the scope of work that LIPA is looking for excuse
7	me, NYSERDA is looking for, it's quite a bit of work
8	But we I think that you have a good shot at
9	getting to round two and three.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But sorry. But before
11	round two, do we have to commit at that point? Do we
12	have to sign a, you know, option agreement?
13	MR. FOXEN: No. All you have to do for round
14	two is just round two is design, basically project
15	design.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That would be an option
17	agreement, right?
18	MR. FOXEN: No. No, not an option agreement
19	for the peaker. It would be just design of whatever
20	comes out of the feasibility study. The feasibility
21	could say study could say, "You know what, we
22	don't need another peaker, you need a cogeneration
23	plant at the hospital," for example. It could come
24	up with there's a whole range of possibilities I
25	could look at. It may say that a peaker would be

1	advantageous. So until it goes through that, you
2	don't know. So let's just say it did say we
3	recommend a peaker, and then we go ahead and design
4	the peaker in Phase II and you have a million dollars
5	for the design. Well, you still are you don't
6	have to go forward in Phase III if you don't want.
7	You could stop that at any stage that is along the
8	way.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Bob, I do have a question. So
10	we get through the engineering phase now and say you
11	are awarded the contract, okay, and there's a big
12	prize, and the construction prize would be there,
13	okay? Part of this grant is for renewables. Is some
14	of that money would be used, then, to say build a
15	community solar here in the Village
16	MR. FOXEN: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: or something along those
18	lines?
19	MR. FOXEN: In fact
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Because that's what we're
21	MR. FOXEN: Yeah, exactly, Julia. So not only
22	is it possible, it's required.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right, okay.
24	MR. FOXEN: If part of the mix of generation is
25	not renewables, you don't you won't get to the

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1	second phase, let alone the third phase. So it has
2	to be an integrated mix of conventional and
3	renewable.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. Thank you.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, Bob I want to
6	thank you very much for coming out and enlightening
7	all of us. And I'm sure we'll get discussion from
8	the public on it before we go any further.
9	MR. FOXEN: Thank you.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: But thank you for coming out.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you.
12	MR. FOXEN: Thank you.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: And if anybody wants to see
14	this, I'll have the Village Clerk make copies
15	tomorrow and you could pick it up at Village Hall, or
16	she'll put it on our website so you could see what's
17	there and everybody can read it, okay?
18	Okay. We had Tall Ships down there. I spoke
19	to the former Mayor and Peter Clarke about coming.
20	They're not here with the change of dates, and I did
21	not have time to speak to them personally today. So
22	would you like to give a brief report on Tall Ships,
23	Julia and Jack?
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, I'm going to let Jack do
25	most of it. I have the notes, but I wasn't at the

1	meeting last week? So you want to start, and I'll
2	back you up on it. I have notes from Sylvia, okay?
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sylvia did the meeting.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, it was done before and I
7	was going to try to make a call today and I just
8	to make sure they were coming, so.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right, sure. The
10	first thing we've got coming is on the 5th at noon,
11	Steve Bellone is going to be coming out for a press
12	conference. They haven't determined exactly where
13	that location is yet. As I understand it, it's going
14	to be at the next meeting.
15	Going forward from there, it being my first
16	meeting, I was trying to get a feel for where
17	everything was at. It's as we're moving forward,
18	I feel that it's starting to take some sort of a
19	shape now.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We have contracts for, I
22	want to say three of the boats, but that is something
23	that's changing. It looks like they're going to drop
24	one boat and just have seven in front of eight
25	instead of eight, use that money more towards

1	marketing.
2	Let's see. Beyond that, one of the things that
3	I'm going to try and do with Trustee Robins is like
4	trying to give it a shape. We're going to try and
5	assign like tasks to people so that we have something
6	to show up. Like next month, I'd really like to be
7	able to go into detail with you on everything that
8	happened, and that's something that I'm going to be
9	able to give you next time.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. No, I understand that.
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I mean, it's moving
12	forward, but this being my first meeting, I cannot
13	give you great detail on
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Two days into
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: being in office and having
17	the meeting, I appreciate you going and, you know,
18	taking the bull by the horns and getting some of this
19	information.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, and we discussed it
22	at the budget hearing the other night, that we're
23	going to have a regular report from the Treasurer
24	monthly on it. We're going to keep everybody
25	informed what's going on. That's the goal of what we

1	were going with it. And, hopefully, it's going to
2	end up being a very profitable affair, cover all its
3	bills, make a little extra money for us. But we've
4	got a really tight scope on it now and we're going to
5	keep it that way. So it's a brief report, but I know
6	it was his first meeting. I understand.
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's where it was on the
9	agenda, and the other gentlemen weren't here, so I
10	just wanted to give a little report, you know,
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But about that, there's going
12	to be a resolution next week for us to approve 17,500
13	bucks for Tall Ships, right?
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: For the marketing, yes.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's what's that
16	that's in that report, yeah.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that will come up in the
18	other report, but yes.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: In which report?
21	MR. BRANDT: That would be in my report.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it's in Robert's.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's in Robert's report.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Can we talk about then
25	or now?

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we will, yeah.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, I was just trying to go
4	through the agenda and that was there. I didn't want
5	to just skip over it and people thought we were just
6	ignoring it. I just wanted to mention what we had on
7	that report right now.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I believe Robert has
9	some information dealing with not only that, but some
10	of the things that we paid off the abstract today,
11	so and there's some things coming up that will be
12	in his report.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. But we'll talk about
14	that when we get there.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: George
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If I were asking for \$17,000,
17	I would be here, that's just me. I think that's
18	disappointing that they're not here.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. With the change of
20	the way everything was structured with different
21	Co-Chairs and everything else, I have not had a
22	chance to speak to them both directly, so I, you
23	know but it's a Village-wide event, it's not just
24	the two people, but I understand.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: George, I just wanted to

1	mention also that in terms of the organization of the
2	event, our new Event Planner, Kit Liset, who's come
3	on board, and what she's doing is kind of mapping out
4	the whole thing. That's how it's really going to
5	take shape. You know, Jack and I are waiting. I
6	think Jeanmarie said that she and Sylvia are going to
7	be putting together, you know, a folder, you know, of
8	everything.
9	MS. ODDON: Packets.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You know, a packet, basically,
11	and it's going to give us a lot more definition. You
12	know, she's going to coordinate all the different
13	venues and things that are happening, the bands and
14	everything. She's going to be the person that will
15	really pull it together.
16	So, by the next work session or sooner, you
17	know, as soon as we have that information, we can put
18	it out to the public. We can do some updates on our
19	website if people want to know what's going on, so
20	that they understand, you know, the direction of
21	where we're going with it, okay?
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, there is a Tall
23	Ships website Facebook page now
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Yeah, but that's not
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: that, hopefully, will be

1	started to be you know, start to be updated soon.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. But we are very
3	pleased with this new Event Planner. She's a go-to
4	person, and she's hit the ground running.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay?
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anymore discussion, we can
8	bring up that other stuff when we come to the bill
9	part of it and we can discuss that other stuff you
10	had.
11	MR. CORWIN: Excuse me, Mr. Mayor, but if the
12	Trustees would speak into the microphone, we'd be
13	able to hear back here.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Everybody, pull your
15	microphones a little closer so they can hear us.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It's not on.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I can't pull mine any
18	closer.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, it is on?
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's on.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm sorry, I apologize.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I can't pull my cord any
23	closer.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll try to speak up a
25	little bit louder. All right, the next report is

1	from Village Administrator, Paul Pallas.
2	MR. PALLAS: Thank you, Mayor. I have
3	before I get into the individual Department reports,
4	I have a number of discussion items. First a few
5	resolutions.
6	First resolution is for authorization for the
7	Mayor to sign work order requests for Duncan,
8	Weinberg, Genzer & Pembroke. Those are the attorneys
9	that work for the New York Association of Public
10	Power, the NYAPP. That organization does not have
11	dues, it's not a dues-based organization. We
12	function with these consultants, and instead of dues,
13	we the association members agree to pay these
14	consultants to do a lot of to do our these
15	particular ones to do our legal work. We also have a
16	subconsultant in there that does our public relations
17	work, and we pay a portion of that, or a small
18	portion, actually, of the total.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
20	MR. PALLAS: But that's we've been doing
21	this for years and all these 13 13 members of the
22	association all contribute to this as well. That's
23	what that resolution is about.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1	MR. PALLAS: The second
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Wait a minute, Paul.
3	MR. PALLAS: I'm sorry.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do you know what percentage
5	of the overall did we pay?
6	MR. PALLAS: I don't remember off the top of my
7	head. I was trying to find this before the meeting.
8	I couldn't find the spread sheet that we produced for
9	that, but I can get that to you.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we have had them for a
11	long time. They actually are more of a lobbying
12	situation as well, are they not?
13	MR. PALLAS: The attorneys are not, the
14	subconsultant is.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	MR. PALLAS: Susan Stohr is the Lobbyist.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	MR. PALLAS: They do the legal work for at
19	the New York ISO with the New York Power Authority,
20	and even the Public Service Commission. Even though
21	we're not regulated by the Commission, there are
22	some of them are and some of them aren't. So they
23	will do it's all pooled, essentially, for the
24	funds for the
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1	MR. PALLAS: For these consultants
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And I have to say, I know
3	I've met at the last couple of NYAPP conferences Tom
4	Rudebusch and Jeff Genzer and they are absolutely
5	amazing at what they do. They really know their
6	subject, and I think the Village is fortunate to have
7	them retained for their services.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
9	MR. PALLAS: Second resolution is for my
10	attendance at the APPA, American Public Power
11	Association annual meeting, and I think that's being
12	held in Minneapolis, if I'm not mistaken.
13	The third resolution is authorization to issue
14	the RFP for the Bulkhead Feasibility Study. I
15	shouldn't say review, the Bulkhead Feasibility Study.
16	That was a grant, or is a grant project. It's a
17	matching grant. The total amount of the project is
18	estimated, I think, at 180,000, so this would be for
19	the half that we would have to pay I'm sorry. So
20	half we would have to pay is 90. Some of that can be
21	done with in-kind. But because it's mostly
22	engineering and feasibility, there's not a lot of
23	in-kind that we can do. It's not like physical work
24	in that, and the balance would be covered by the

grant. And this phase is just to put the RFP out to

25

1	hire the consultant to do the feasibility study of
2	rebuilding the bulkhead at Park.
3	It's been around for a little while, with the
4	changes in administration here, and the person at the
5	State that was handling it also left. So I had sent
6	it to them for review several months ago and I just
7	recently realized that the person hadn't responded,
8	and they gave it to somebody else to review, and now
9	we're at the stage where
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: we've incorporated all of their
12	comments and we're going to be can issue it.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So the RFP, you have a
14	deadline date as to when you want to get it out?
15	MR. PALLAS: Well, if we can approve the
16	issuing, we can we're well past all the deadlines,
17	because they held it, so
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, no, I
19	understand.
20	MR. PALLAS: But if we could
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But the deadlines with
22	inhouse, how, you know
23	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. We can approve it next
24	at the Board meeting next week and we can we'll do
25	it right away.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
2	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
4	MR. PALLAS: The last resolution is just
5	ratification of hiring a Park Attendant, Gus
6	Constantine Klavas. That's, again, just a
7	ratification.
8	I have a few topics of discussion. I have a
9	few that aren't even on the list, and I apologize, I
LO	didn't get them on the list. The first one, the East
<b>L1</b>	End Seaport Museum, and Robert Robert's going to
L2	be asking for a budget modification for that. The
L3	initial set of quotes we had received. I had
L4	inquired, after we had received them, unfortunately,
L 5	as to confirm that they were being done with
16	prevailing wages, and turned out that they were not.
L7	So then they had to resubmit all their quotes, and
L8	those quotes now are much higher than they were,
L9	because of prevailing wage.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Is this for the roof?
21	MR. PALLAS: For the roof. East End Sea
22	right, for the roof.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
24	MR. PALLAS: So we have three quotes for that,
25	and we can review that when Robert comes up, the

1 actual numbers on that.

The next one is a request for use of the Railroad Dock. I had received two requests, and I think I had sent them both to the Board. One was from a gentleman named Bruce Garritano, was looking to put a boat -- a multi-year contract for a boat for events, dinner, dinner cruises, things like that, receptions, or, you know, those kinds of parties, if you will, using the Railroad Dock.

The second one was for a fishing -- party fishing boat. That's just for the month of May. The one -- and that one kind of, in my view kind, kind of fits in with the way the dock has been used for fishing in the past. The one from Mr. Garritano, he has come and asked a couple of times before, as I understand, and it's never been approved.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, he has.

MR. PALLAS: And I know we had discussed it informally once before, and, you know, I had told him that there wasn't a lot of interest. He asked if I would bring it up one more time to the Board, and that's why I'm bringing it up. So just asking whether the Board supports either, or both, or neither on those requests.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can I ask a question?
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure, go ahead.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What's the potential revenue
4	in both cases?
5	MR. PALLAS: You know, we haven't even gotten
6	that far, because the four we haven't even gotten
7	that far, because until we get to know if the Board
8	is even interested, the we really didn't even talk
9	numbers, to be honest.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So there's no set it's not
11	like the
12	MR. PALLAS: No. These
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: fishermen who have a set?
14	MR. PALLAS: Correct. These the Garritano
15	request specifically, because that would be a
16	negotiated contract.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I see.
18	MR. PALLAS: The fishing boat, we don't really
19	have anything like that, a transient type of that.
20	But the cost typically for a transient is \$20 a day,
21	but this is for a full month. So I my suggestion
22	would also be to for that to be negotiated as
23	well, as opposed to using any of the set fees that we
24	currently have.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And what prevents them from

1	going to the to Mitchell Marina?
2	MR. PALLAS: You can't you have commercial
3	activities on that on the Marina.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And the other one, the
6	party boat, he was here, I believe it was, three
7	years ago, and we had given him a price of 15,000 for
8	the year. He said no to do that. It was like okay,
9	and it kind of just dropped at that point, because he
10	wanted to rent the west pier of Mitchell Marina for
11	\$2,000 a year, and we said no, the going rate would
12	be 15,000. And he took it at that point and said,
13	"Well, I'm not paying that," and it kind of dropped.
14	Now he's come back, and it was basically the same
15	idea. He wanted to rent it for a cheaper price and
16	we told him no before. He actually has pushed this
17	time, he says he wants to have a vote on it. So I
18	think what we'll probably end up doing is put a
19	resolution on there, and we'll discuss it and we'll
20	take a vote, and however it goes, you know, it's
21	amongst it's up to us to decide if we want to
22	entertain that.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We need a number, though,
24	right, to vote on it?
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Well, I mean, we'll have

to go back. I believe it was 15,000. We'll double-check that. There also were recommendations on that kind of use on the Railroad Dock, which could be hazardous. We should look at the paperwork from the Marina Manager.

Jeff Goubeaud had some recommendations.

There's no lights at the end of the dock, there's bigger gaps. And if it's going to be just a party boat at the end of the dock coming in at midnight, it could be hazardous. So, if we did rent for him, we would have to do upgrades and put in lights and other repairs on the Railroad Dock, whereas fishermen and somebody, you know, with boots on, getting in at the beginning of the dock on Peconic Star is different than a 100-foot party boat at the end of the dock and people having to walk the whole length of the dock.

So that's just something -- we'll get the information from Jeff, his notes on it, and review that. And the gentleman has asked for us to vote it up or down, so I think we'll put it on the agenda and we'll vote it up or down, you know. Again, we'll get some background information actually on the past history on it so you know what it was.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I imagine if we want to ask the guy more questions, we could do that through

1	you?
2	MR. PALLAS: Yes, of course, yeah, absolutely.
3	On the fishing boat, I don't I mean, I don't
4	that do we need to put that on as a resolution as
5	well? We're going to do
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: If we're going to be renting
7	out I mean, it's a transient thing, so it's more
8	like just going and somebody renting at the Marina
9	for a month. So I believe then just renting for a
10	month, it's not going to be a long-term thing, so I
11	think you could really give permission, if we have
12	room for that, you know
13	MR. PALLAS: And we do at the end. We do that
14	at the end. It's a fishing
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: By the time we settle something
16	with Bruce, he's not going to be there through the
17	month of May anyway.
18	MR. PALLAS: Right, right.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: So we would already collect the
20	money for the fishing boat for the one month. I
21	think we should be able to go ahead and do that
22	through the Marina.
23	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: If that verbally agrees on
25	that.

1	MR. PROKOP: The contracts that we have
2	agreed the contracts that have come to the Board
3	before were contracts that were for one year or
4	longer.
5	MR. PALLAS: Right.
6	MR. PROKOP: Not for a month.
7	MR. PALLAS: Like we do on the transient
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: If they want to rent for a
9	month, we can collect what we can for the month and
10	they'll be gone by Memorial Day, you know, so.
11	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. Just for the month of May
12	was his request.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: So if everybody agrees, I think
14	we can go ahead and just let the Marina handle that
15	one. And the one, Bruce, we'll bring to a vote.
16	MR. PALLAS: Okay, fair enough.
17	The next item is the LWRP revision update. I
18	don't have any paper on that. I just wanted to
19	because it's been sitting around for quite a while,
20	obviously. We had submitted quite a while ago to the
21	State a draft, I guess. The State had come back with
22	a significant number of comments after quite a while.
23	The comments were so significant that the consultant
24	that had prepared it said it's really more of a
25	not quite a rewrite, but it really changed the whole

game plan, so to speak.

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So I've had discussions with the consultant, now that I had discussions with the State on this. We've asked -- the consultants prepared what he's calling a road map to move this along. We're waiting for the State to respond to that before I present that next step to the Board. But I just wanted to let everybody know that it hasn't been forgotten. We're right now waiting for comments back from the State. Once I get that, if the road map has to be revised, I will send it out to everybody. I will --I will tell you that the consultant has said, basically, they've used up all -- this was done on a grant. All the money has been used up on the grant. So I don't know what that means in terms of whether that's his problem or ours. You know, I'm waiting to see if the State approves this first.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

MR. PALLAS: I'm waiting for you all to see it, and to see if there's any room there for -- to say it's his problem. You know, the changes that have been requested by the State were formatting. Even things like certain fonts didn't match. A lot of different things that the State changed, like in the interim, from when it was submitted to when they

1	finally sent us the comments, what the State wanted
2	changed. So from the consultant's perspective, this
3	wasn't his fault. You know, it's not our fault
4	either. The State is never going to say it's their
5	fault. So I'm just trying to give you kind of a
6	flavor of what is
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, get some
8	information and bring it back, just to see what we
9	could do to try to rectify that.
10	MR. PALLAS: Sure, sure. I know we're going to
11	talk about park use at some point tonight, correct?
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh
13	MR. PALLAS: Because I have a couple of items
14	on that as well, if you don't mind.
15	The with regard as a minor Tall Ships item,
16	establishment of a ticket booth. One of as you
17	all know, one of the buildings that we use for the
18	Ice Rink, the smaller one, we actually own that one.
19	It's been requested that we could perhaps leave it
20	there. Normally, we would take that away at the end
21	of the skating season and store it. We plan on using
22	that as a ticket booth and would like to leave it
23	there until after the event, rather than take it away
24	and bring it back. It costs about \$700. We can't
25	we don't have the equipment to take it away, we have

1	to hire somebody to do it. So leaving it there would
2	save us about \$1400 to leave it there. We'll paint
3	right now, it's not the right color, obviously.
4	We would paint it as close as we can to the existing
5	buildings. So I'm just requesting if we could be
6	permitted to leave it there for now.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I mean, anybody I
8	don't see a problem with that. If it's going to save
9	us money, we're going to use it, and then they'll
10	move it right after Fourth of July and put it away.
11	MR. PALLAS: All right. Thank you.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: It should be fine.
13	MR. PALLAS: You all had seen a request from
14	ALS, Lou Gehrig's Disease folks, Ride for Life. They
15	had come through here last year.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
17	MR. PALLAS: They had come off of the ferry
18	from Shelter Island and used that as their as
1.0	Trom Sherter Island and used that as their as

1	Since we're still dealing with park issues, I'm
2	assuming that I should tell them let's stick with the
3	way you did it last year, rather than try to change
4	that, I would assume.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: They were only down there for
6	about 15 minutes, if it was even that.
7	MR. PALLAS: Right.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, it was fast, because my
9	daughter was trying do it with the school, and by the
10	time they got everybody out of school out there to do
11	it, they were already halfway to Southold.
12	MR. PALLAS: Right.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: So, I mean, they were not here
14	for long, so I don't see a problem where that's going
15	to be
16	MR. PALLAS: But as far as them to use the park
17	as their kickoff, are opposed
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think they would want to do
19	something at the Carousel first, or something, didn't
20	they?
21	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. I
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it's a number of
23	bicycles.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. But, I mean
25	MR. PALLAS: I'm assuming I should just tell

1	them to stay with the plan they had, right, get off
2	the ferry?
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The original plan.
4	MR. PALLAS: The original plan.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, or give us some detail
6	what the second part of you know, how much more or
7	how long they want it for.
8	MR. PALLAS: I don't think it's any different.
9	I think it's the same process, but I don't
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. So, I mean, I don't see
11	it's going to be problem.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's not going to last very
13	long.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's not going to be an impact.
15	So I would be in favor of letting them just use it
16	for the short amount of time that they're going to do it.
17	MR. PALLAS: For the park?
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
19	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: If everybody is okay with that,
21	I mean.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's in and out. I mean, it's
24	a good cause and
25	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. It's not technically a

1	public assembly, because they're just using it as
2	their kickoff point.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
4	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're going to start there,
6	then they travel along there. The vans and
7	everything leaves right out of there. So, if they're
8	in the park for half an hour before they go, I don't
9	think it should be a problem.
10	MR. PALLAS: Right. If it's any different than
11	that, I'll let you know.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. If it's more involved or
13	something else, let us know.
14	MR. PALLAS: But if that's all it is, then I'll
15	just them to go ahead.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: As long as Joe feels like
18	there's no slippery slope.
19	MR. PROKOP: No, as long as there's a vote. I
20	would just have a vote to do that.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
22	MR. PROKOP: So it's not just a consensus.
23	We'd have somebody to make a motion to allow this one
24	particular event.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. When? What's the date

1	of the event? We could put it on the agenda for next
2	week. It's in May, isn't it?
3	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
4	MR. PROKOP: Or we can do it next month. I'm
5	sorry, it I apologize. We could do it
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, we'll do it at the
7	regular meeting.
8	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll just, you know, approve
10	the request of ALS, and just make sure there's
11	nothing else.
12	MR. PALLAS: Okay, I will do that.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: If it's going to be different
14	than that, let us know before we vote on it.
15	MR. PALLAS: Yes, absolutely.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: But, otherwise, we'll just vote
17	on letting this one.
18	MR. PROKOP: No, that's fine
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe it's a 20-minute
20	kickoff in the park.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It says, "We will kick off
22	the ride on 4/27 in Greenport Village," so I'm
23	assuming that's the date, April 27th.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's four days after
25	our

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, it's after the
2	meeting.
3	MR. PALLAS: I don't know that it matters to
4	them if we tell them two days before, because either
5	way, they're coming off the boat.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
7	MR. PALLAS: So it's a question of whether they
8	go left or right.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
10	MR. PALLAS: So Im sure it's not that big a
11	deal.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, it was about Paul and
14	I went last year. It was about 20 minutes
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: by the time they assembled
17	and they took off, and that was it.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. But we'll put that
19	on the agenda for to vote on that next week.
20	MR. PALLAS: Okay, great.
21	MR. PROKOP: I'll do the resolution, too.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Let's word it properly.
23	And if anything changes, let us know.
24	MR. PALLAS: I will. The last discussion item
25	I have, I had gotten a request from I don't know

1	if you're familiar with this, the Hamptons.com, a
2	website that they it's focused mainly on the
3	Hamptons, but they do have a North Fork section.
4	They have they have these live as part of their
5	website, they have live camera feeds, there are like
6	four or five of them. They show it's from the
7	beaches, a couple of docks. And they had approached
8	us to see if we were interested in providing a live
9	camera feed as well.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: They would do it at the Marina.
12	In return for doing that, they would pay for the
13	camera. It would one of the one of our security
14	cameras, which could have a dual feed. And the one
15	feed would come to us for our security system and the
16	other would go to them. So we would actually save
17	money on our security system by allowing them to do
18	it. So I just wanted to see if there was interest in
19	pursuing it. I can get more details from them if
20	there's interest.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Get some more details. As long
22	as it's not going to show the kid doing graffiti on
23	it and broadcast that all around.
24	MR. PALLAS: No. It will be focused, focused
25	on the docks themselves.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I know.
2	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, yeah. So if there's
3	interest, I'll get some details.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: That could be a good idea,
5	sure. Get some more information on it.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And how many security
7	cameras? We're supposed to be finishing something
8	down at the Marina with cameras, right?
9	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, we did the interior.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, the Carousel.
11	MR. PALLAS: The Carousel. The exterior, I
12	think that's the next spot we're working on, if I
13	recall.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So this would be an
15	added?
16	MR. PALLAS: I don't I think we could
17	utilize one of the cameras that we were going to have
18	anyway, because one of them was going to be pointed
19	in the right direction. So I don't think it's I
20	think it's a savings to us ultimately.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: See what you can work out with it.
22	MR. PALLAS: Okay. I do have also, I have
23	some Executive Session items, too, after the meeting.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
25	MR. PALLAS: I think I sent you that. Okay.

1	Now, to the individual Departments.
2	For the Road Department, just a couple of
3	highlight items. They are continuing we are
4	continuing to work on hydrant repairs, so we're
5	continuing on that process.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did you just say hydrant
7	repairs?
8	MR. PALLAS: Hydrant, yeah.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I have a question.
10	Down at Mitchell Park, there is that hydrant that has
11	the big circle around it that says "Out of Order". I
12	don't are there any other hydrants in that area,
13	or is that the only one?
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: There's out on the road and
15	everything.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Out on the road.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. But that one is shut
19	down. Why?
20	MR. PALLAS: It shut down it's shut down for
21	the winters. It will be turned back on.
22	MR. SWISKEY: You're not talking about the dog
23	hydrant, are you, Mary Bess?
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's the one behind the post
25	office. That's

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, the one behind the post
2	office.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: When the Marina is shut off,
4	that's shut off with the Marina.
5	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Because it would freeze if it
8	wasn't shut off that way.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. So the
10	protection, the fire protection back there has to be
11	dependent on the ones up front, then?
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's why we were working on
15	the standpipe system and everything else. We're
16	going to end up what we'll probably end up doing
17	is doing away with whatever happens with the
18	standpipe system is get a hydrant that's going to be
19	open and usable year-round right there.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: And then you wouldn't need the
22	whole suppression system out on the dock if we could
23	do something like that.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Depending how the pending

1	lawsuit goes with that, because we really run into
2	dead-ends on that. So we may end up just putting a
3	permanent hydrant there that can stay on year-round.
4	So instead of powering the system, the truck will be
5	right there and you just pull the hose out.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's what I thought.
7	I just
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the intention. Yes,
9	after we did hydrants tests in October, they told me
10	that the hydrant was off, and investigating it, it's
11	shut off every year, because the valve is before the
12	hydrant.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's how it was designed and
15	that's how it is. So it will be back on shortly, but
16	for next year, we'll make sure that there's
17	something, a valve is either moved or another hydrant
18	put in
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I want to know.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: beforehand, so that we have it.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, because it made me
22	uncomfortable.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
24	MR. PALLAS: The biggest one of the biggest
25	projects they worked on, obviously, is the removal of

1	the Ice Rink. The road crew works to help the Marina
2	staff to remove the Ice Rink. It's quite an involved
3	project, so that's another item that I thought was
4	important to note.
5	They also continue to do pothole repairs. You
6	know, I know it's a big it's certainly a big
7	issue. We're starting to get things ready for the
8	spring, so that's where we are on the Road
9	Department.
10	With the Sewer Department, one of the biggest,
11	I guess, issues that we're currently dealing with,
12	the, as they're called, the bugs in the system. They
13	kind of go dormant in the cold weather. And this
14	year, because of the extended cold, Ray was having a
15	little trouble getting them to wake up. So he may be
16	reaching out to import some bugs, essentially, to
17	kick-start the system. It's not an expensive
18	process. I don't want to say how much, I don't
19	remember, but I remember when he told me the amount,
20	it was like, well, it's nothing, really. If it's
21	\$2,000, it's a lot, that's my memory.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
23	MR. PALLAS: I haven't gotten a confirmation
24	from him where he is on that yet. They did have some
25	minor electrical problems, which have been rectified.

1	As the thing started to thaw out and move a little
2	bit, some wiring, some grounding had come loose and
3	that has all been fixed up.
4	The Electric Department, we've been continuing
5	to do some of the work inhouse. We replaced a water
6	heater for Unit 5. The oil heater automation control
7	units have been put in, and video surveillance has
8	been completed at the plant, just so it's on the
9	record.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: One other thing.
11	MR. PALLAS: Yup, sure.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: DMNC.
13	MR. PALLAS: Oh, the DMNC test, that would be
14	in, yeah
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	MR. PALLAS: next month's report.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Next month?
18	MR. PALLAS: It's this month. But, yeah, we
19	did do the DMNC test, so.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I would just like to say
21	that I know that Trustee Roberts was up there. I
22	don't know if anybody else was up there. Did you get
23	up there, Jack?
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, yes.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It was awesome.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I would like to say that I
3	was impressed with Doug Jacobs in the lead role he
4	took in dealing with getting that DMNC test going.
5	And I just would like to say that I was really
6	impressed with the extra effort that was on that
7	employee's part.
8	MR. PALLAS: I appreciate that. I will pass
9	that along to him.
10	Moving on to the Building Department. Total
11	you know, there's some detailed reports in here, but
12	total fees collected was a little over \$4,000, which
13	continues to be a good resource there.
14	A couple of highlights in the report section.
15	During a recent inspection of the communication
16	tower, we need to better secure the that area.
17	The fence needs to be beefed up, if you will, because
18	it's become quite a dump site. So we really need to
19	do take a look at it and see what we can do to fix
20	that up a little bit and secure it a little more.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Which property?
22	MR. PALLAS: Pardon?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Which property are you
24	talking about?
25	MR. PALLAS: The communications tower.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The one
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Off of Washington.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, off of Washington?
4	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
6	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anyplace where there's a chain
8	down or a gate open, stuff ends up being there.
9	MR. PALLAS: Right, right. So there's two
10	other properties we're looking to put a fence on, the
11	property on Third Street here and at the end of
12	Ludlam Place. That we're just looking more for like
13	a split rail kind of fence, just to show where the
14	property line is, to serve as some kind of a barrier.
15	We can probably do that inhouse. We have to purchase
16	the materials. So we'll I just wanted to advise
17	you that we're looking into that as well.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Which one on Third Street?
19	MR. PALLAS: It's down the access to Silver
20	Lake.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Silver Lake, yeah.
22	MR. PALLAS: We're also finishing up on the
23	website and the Building Department application
24	pamphlet. We should have be able to do the
25	website before the within a month to get that all

1	set up, and I iii rooking forward to getting it. we
2	spent a lot of time, the Building Inspector spent a
3	lot of time preparing all the documents, getting them
4	all updated, so they can be incorporated as direct
5	PDFs, rather than scanned in copies, and a much
6	better description for each type of permit, what's
7	needed to be done for to navigate that. That's
8	just complicated at best.
9	And we have the Code Enforcer's report in there
10	as well, so that I won't go into any of the you
11	can read that. There's a lot of stuff in there.
12	Let's see. Sorry. Moving on to the Recreation
13	Department. We did hire, and get the number for
14	today's tonight's meeting as well for
15	ratification, the new Campground Manager. We'll be
16	working on getting a plan together for getting the
17	campground ready for the spring. They have been
18	working on it already, so a lot of work has been
19	done. I'm looking forward to working with the new
20	manager there.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, Paul, do you need a
22	resolution from us tonight to hire him?
23	MR. PALLAS: No. I mean, it's already
24	ratification at the meeting.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: We just yeah.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just checking.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll do it next.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I thought you heard. Okay.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll date it for when he
6	started work.
7	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. And we're also beginning to
8	work on the moorings for Stirling Harbor. Again,
9	it's a fairly big projects, but we're working on that
10	as well.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: How about the lifeguard
12	project for Fifth and Sixth Street Beach, because
13	that, you'll need to be opening that up soon.
14	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. We have actually done a
15	little bit of work with the Town of Southold on that.
16	As they get applications, they're going to share them
17	with us, so that we don't have to go out separately,
18	because they, obviously, get a whole bunch more.
19	They always said they've told us that they've got,
20	you know, at least a dozen extra every year
21	applicants that they don't need, so we'll be working
22	with them, rather than trying to go out on our own.
23	We tried to get some kind of an agreement with them
24	to work together and maybe roll our lifeguards into
25	their schedule. They just said it was too much work

1	to add another person. I don't I'm just repeating
2	what I heard.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right, okay.
4	MR. PALLAS: But I think even that, we
5	another thing we've spoken about is if we run into an
6	issue where we don't have a lifeguard on a particular
7	day, they said, you know, "Feel free to call," and,
8	you know, if there's anybody available, they'll pull
9	their folks and see if there's somebody that can
10	shoot over for us as well.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: If we could expand our list a
14	little bit more, too, other alternates or something.
15	We did have a couple of Saturdays last year where,
16	especially later in the season, when kids are going
17	to college, and heading out and looking at schools,
18	we ran into a couple of weekends where we didn't have
19	coverage, so.
20	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. One of the well, the
21	problems we have, and apparently this has been going
22	on for a while, that you only have one seat, and
23	nobody wants to say, "Well, I might call you in for a
24	day."
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, I know.

1	MR. PALLAS: It's tough to get them, but we
2	certainly we're going to try to we had three,
3	we actually had three last year, believe it or not.
4	It just they just disappeared, and then they
5	wouldn't show up, and the alternates wouldn't show
6	up.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
8	MR. PALLAS: You know, but we certainly are
9	going to do our best.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: And that's that's enough from me.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Did you have something
13	specific you want to question? Everyone's going to
14	speak at the end, if you want.
15	AUDIENCE MEMBER: I just wanted to say, I have
16	no problem oh, Carol Myaveck (phonetic), Third
17	Street.
18	I have no problem with the ALS organization
19	kicking off, I think it's marvelous. Are you opening
20	yourselves up to a lawsuit from other organizations?
21	That's my question.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Yeah, we're going to
23	talk about the whole Mitchell Park will be
24	discussed shortly, so okay. I appreciate the input
25	on that. I wasn't sure exactly

1	AUDIENCE MEMBER: That's okay.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: what the questions was for.
3	Okay. Anything else for Paul?
4	(No response.)
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you, Paul. Oh,
6	sorry. Robert. You knew that. I had to look at my
7	list.
8	MR. BRANDT: I was waiting for you.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: I know, that's fine.
10	MR. BRANDT: I didn't want to jump the gun.
11	Good evening, everyone.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: How are you?
14	MR. BRANDT: Okay. A bunch of resolutions
15	here. I need a resolution to authorize us to put the
16	outstanding water and sewer balances and arrears onto
17	the property tax this year. Relating to that, I'm
18	going to jump right into it right away.
19	Under Utility Billing, when we sent the notices
20	out this back in March, the utility biller used
21	the wrong date. So the people got a bit of sticker
22	shock, because it presented the amount due straight
23	through March, and that's not how this works. This
24	goes through December, the end of December. So we
25	had a few calls on that, so I wanted to publicly

1	apologize. We did send out letters for a correction
2	on that, and we have since implemented the process,
3	so that won't happen again.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
5	MR. BRANDT: So I just wanted to point that out
6	Next resolution is to fund the expenses for the
7	marketing and P.R. for the Tall Ships event. You
8	seem to have had a question on that, so I'm just
9	going to let you jump in.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, I guess it's to the
11	committee. Has there been any report of funds raised
12	by the BID yet?
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: A lot of maybes, but nothing
14	collected yet, as far as I know.
15	MR. BRANDT: We have money coming from Newsday.
16	I'm supposed to be getting that, hopefully, at the
17	next meeting.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
19	MR. BRANDT: That's the plan.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How much?
21	MR. BRANDT: Seventy-five hundred. I only have
22	two promises of Peconic and the hospital, was 8,000
23	each, 16.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And
25	MR. BRANDT: But, no, we have not I have no

1	cash.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We have the money commitments.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do we have a Letter of
4	Intent?
5	MR. BRANDT: I would ask you guys that.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe there were verbal
7	commitments.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: These are all verbal.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't believe there's a
10	Letter of Intent.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: All verbal.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't think any letters
13	have been collected. I don't even know that that was
14	part of the process, to be honest.
15	MR. BRANDT: Okay.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I believe last time they
17	did verbal commitments, and most people, I believe
18	95%, came through. I believe there was one person
19	that didn't follow through on it the last time. So,
20	hopefully, if we want a Letter of Intent, we could
21	ask for that to have it, you know, more sooner than
22	later.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay, yup.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're going to try to do that,
25	just so we could start putting it together. But I

1	know what where you're going with that, Doug, so
2	we could see.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, a verbal commitment
5	doesn't it's not it doesn't count until you
6	have the check in your hand. But if there's a letter
7	at least saying, "I intend on giving X amount of
8	dollars," we could start working out a budget and
9	that would be helpful.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And so far, the Village is in
11	for 50,000?
12	MR. BRANDT: Thirty-seven-five-hundred has been
13	spent so far. That's the port fee.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
15	MR. BRANDT: And the next payment of 12,500 is
16	due in June, so you'll be seeing that next month.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I thought we spent
18	twelve-five on CAC already, no?
19	MR. BRANDT: No, we haven't spent anything on
20	them. They've been working there. I don't know what
21	happened with their contract. They just recently
22	settled with us. I wouldn't have any
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: The contract went back and
24	forth for almost two months.
25	MR. BRANDT: Yeah, so

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: With wording and other stuff on
2	it, like that. We weren't comfortable with part of
3	it and they weren't comfortable, so that went back
4	and forth. So the contract just got finished up, I
5	believe so.
6	MR. PROKOP: Right. We only recently actually
7	got their comments.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
9	MR. PROKOP: And then we turned it around right
10	away, but it just took a little time.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I've said this publicly,
13	I've said it to members of the BID. From my
14	perspective, as one of the five votes on this, I
15	actually wrote out for Sarah Phillips at First and
16	South, who's one of the people working on this, just
17	a general schedule that would make me feel
18	comfortable that the money is coming; \$100,000 of
19	Letters of Intent by this work session, 25K in cash,
20	and then at the next one, 65K in cash.
21	So, from my perspective, their fundraising
22	effort is lagging far behind based on what I've read
23	in the minutes and what I've heard at these meetings.
24	So I'm just sort of publicly saying I'm not ready to
25	support more money from the public for this event

1	until our partners in this event show up with some
2	money as well. So they've got a week, so I hope I
3	wish they were here. I wish they were here talking
4	to us. Again, if I were asking for 17,000 bucks, I'd
5	be here asking for it. So I hope that's I hope
6	that the BID or somebody will come in and contribute,
7	and that's where I'm going to vote.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine, yup.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or I hope they show up with
10	25K by next week and then I'm all in.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: That would be great for all of
12	us. It would ease everybody's mind on the whole
13	event, you know. So I will speak to them and I'll
14	try to see what I can serve up and try to get, you
15	know, letters out.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Good. I would have to ask
17	Julia and Jack, they're both the Co-Chairs of the
18	Steering Committee, I do believe that that's probably
19	within your scope of the committee to be pushing for
20	that issue, correct?
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, absolutely. We
22	brought it up last time. One of the things I was
23	told, I don't want to get the dates wrong, somewhere

in the range -- they told me the last time they did

this, about 30 days out is where the money started

24

25

1	coming in.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, it is.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
6	MR. BRANDT: Yeah, it did come then,
7	absolutely.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So they told what I've
9	been told, and, again, you know, I was told that 30
10	days out. So they're looking to get verbal
11	commitments in the expectation that, you know, within
12	30 days to five days after the event is when they
13	collected all of their money.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I believe that's what
15	CAC is supposed to be also pushing for also, is it
16	not?
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're supposed to be. I
18	just I mean, they're they need to be working a
19	little harder and they need to get information back
20	to us. I believe that's where, you know, Doug is
21	going with that. And I think we all want to hear
22	that. Everybody wants to hear where we stand with
23	it. So, I mean, just so you know.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, you could speak to the

1	committee and I will speak to, you know, Peter Clarke
2	and to the Ex-Mayor myself and just say, you know, we
3	need more than just a verbal commitment, so we need
4	to sure something up. And most of the money should
5	come in by Memorial Day. Last time they got it, most
6	of it in April after tax time. They got it between
7	April 15th and the end of April for Memorial Day
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Which is yeah.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: is when they got the bulk of
10	the money. So we just need to say, you know, we need
11	to have these checks in hand by Memorial Day and a
12	Letter of Commitment a little sooner.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, I was at the BID meeting
14	today and, you know
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: they did discuss
17	sponsorships. They went over a number of, you know,
18	people that are either have been contacted, or
19	they need to contact, and they went over the ones
20	that they do have verbal commitments from. Now, you
21	know, I will speak to Peter again and see if he's
22	prepared to get Letters of Intent for some of the
23	ones that are committed. I mean, they are legitimate
24	sponsors, a lot of local businesses and things like
25	that, you know, who've done it before, they were

1	sponsors in the past. And, I mean, I think that
2	their word is good, so I'm fairly confident, you
3	know, that they are going to produce the funds. But
4	that was the discussion as of the meeting this
5	morning.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We had a meeting this morning,
8	okay?
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, but even the verbal
10	commitment, just a list of names of how much the
11	verbal commitments add up to
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: would be a help to all of
14	us, if they just said we have verbal commitments for
15	60,000 or 6,000.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: It would just clear up in
18	everybody's mind if we're on the right track. So
19	I'll just have them make a list of the verbals.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We brought that up.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Like I said, I thought
22	Peter was going to be at the meeting tonight. You
23	know, he obviously isn't here, but I'll reach out to
24	him tomorrow and
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: see if he's prepared to,
2	you know, forward that information to us before next
3	week, okay?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: That would be great.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the next Steering
6	Committee meeting is when?
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Next week, Thursday.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Next Thursday?
9	MR. BRANDT: Next Thursday.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Next Thursday. So it's
11	before this meeting?
12	MR. BRANDT: Correct, at 5:00.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I got it here. At 5:00 it
14	is? Okay, figures.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That is a little tight.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we would be able to get
17	maybe, perhaps some kind of an update at the regular
18	Board meeting?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, if their meeting goes as
20	long as the last one, they'll come right from that
21	meeting right to our regular meeting.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, you know, fresh
23	information right off the presses.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, absolutely. It's a
25	matter of it's a matter of trying to collect up

1	information. They have a lot there. I don't think
2	that there's a been a focal point of collection at
3	this point. Like that was the distinct impression I
4	got from the meeting.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And that's something that
7	we're going to we're going to accomplish.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I did talk to
9	Jeanmarie. She mentioned to me yesterday about the
10	discussion of trying to create an information
11	packet
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: for you and for Julia, so
14	that it makes it a little bit easier to move forward,
15	so that there's some types of checks and balances.
16	And, also, it gives us a background for the next
17	time, if there ever is another event. So that I did
18	talk to her about that and it's an excellent idea.
19	It's been one I've wanted for a long time.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, that is a goal. I'm
21	trying to assemble some sort of a binder so you guys
22	have something. It's a little Army speak, but like
23	something we could pull off the shelf, and that Mayor
24	Hubbard will know exactly what's going on with the
25	Tall Ships. Right now, that document does not exist.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, it doesn't.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: But that's not to say that
3	it will not.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Something I'm working on
6	diligently.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. Just because the
9	money took a long time or came in late last time
10	doesn't mean it should every time.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's right.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So to Mary Bess' point, I
13	thought we learned from it. And until April 6th, I
14	was on the vendor side of this equation, for the most
15	part, and what happens when the public agency isn't
16	ready to commit the money is that somehow the vendor
17	finds a way to tighten their belt and work for free a
18	little bit longer, or they go and help you find the
19	money. So that's the message I'd like to send to
20	CAC, if that 25K
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think they already got
22	that message with the abstract refusal to pay
23	anything today until they Robert and I had a
24	discussion with them on the phone this morning, that
25	they need to get within the process and start moving

1	a little faster, or the check that we have waiting
2	for them may take a little time longer to get to
3	them.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Okay.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Very good.
6	MR. BRANDT: All right. Next, I have a
7	resolution authorizing the issuance of a check for
8	the Marina start-up bank. Historically, we've always
9	made that out to the Village Administrator, so that
10	would be made out to Paul.
11	And, lastly, a resolution for the additional
12	work, the additional funding needed for the museum.
13	The original budget amendment was for 14,950. This
14	increases a bit to \$11,050 more. The costs were
15	coming at
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's around 25,000?
17	MR. BRANDT: That's the cap, and he's just
18	whispering that they're going to be less than that.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, good.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it going to be less than
21	that?
22	MR. PALLAS: Less than what was the number?
23	I'm sorry. Twenty?
24	MR. BRANDT: Twenty-five.
25	MR. PALLAS: Well, it could I'll have it

1	ready for the meeting.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Yeah, the original price
3	with the prevailing wage, we went through that last
4	time down there with the other vendor that did it
5	and
6	MR. PALLAS: We have one quote only within the
7	last day, so I haven't really gotten through all of
8	it
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
10	MR. PALLAS: to see which is the right one.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll just verify that and see
12	what it is, but make sure it is prevailing wage, so
13	we don't have the same problem we had last time.
14	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
15	MR. BRANDT: Okay. We had a bond interest
16	payment. I'll give you the breakout here. The total
17	payment was for 60,815, 5900 for the parks. That was
18	the electrical upgrade. This is interest-only
19	payment, interest on the street sweeper and on the
20	electric upgrade.
21	And just as a matter of talking points, I had a
22	CD, general reserve CD that I was recording
23	separately. I've now moved it on the general ledger
24	to coincide with Mitchell Park debt. They are
25	both lines, both accounts are making the same

1	interest rates, so I'm planning on moving some of the
2	savings account into a CD with more money.
3	Hopefully, we can get a better rate on that.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
5	MR. BRANDT: We are starting a complete
6	inventory on the meters in the Village. Stephen, the
7	Deputy, championed this. We just want to verify
8	serial numbers. We want to identify any meters that
9	are not running, and verify that they're readable.
10	This has not been undertaken yet. The reader meter
11	has been ahead of the game, and this is a project
12	we're giving him to fill in. We need to get this
13	inventory done so we know that everything ties out to
14	what our software says. All right? So I just wanted
15	everybody to be aware of that.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Robert, while we are on
17	billing, and while you're here, have you all explored
18	online billing?
19	MR. BRANDT: We did about three years ago. It
20	was very cost prohibitive to get started. That
21	said
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's a large up-front?
23	MR. BRANDT: Yes, it was a big chunk up front,
24	and we were shot down at the time.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How much.

MR. BRANDT: I don't remember. You asked me that in an email this morning. I couldn't find the paperwork on that. That's not to say we're not going to investigate it again, and that's -- you should be aware that we can pursue that over the summer and see about that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Part of the other problem with it is that at the time that we did the actual project markup and getting the prices on it, Doug, was the fact that our server and our accounting system that was on the computers at that time, which have been updated since that time, just couldn't handle that type of activity, so that was part of it. It has been discussed.

I know it was discussed when I first came on the Board, because I wanted to see that the electric bills could be paid, the taxes could be paid. That has been part of a process that I have been working with the Treasurer's Office and the Clerk for the last couple of years as we've gotten the server updated. That's the other reason why that door is locked all the time during -- you know, after everyone is out of there, is because our server is downstairs and to make it secure. And there are some discussions of looking towards that to ease it,

1	because I initially some of the projects I wanted
2	to do was to have it actually on the website, so
3	people who wanted to pay could actually do it that
4	way, and it would save time and money for
5	administrative costs. But, as I said, it's a work in
6	progress.
7	When I first came on the Board, the server was
8	a 1980 server. I don't and it was antiquated at
9	best. And computers around here, and I think George
10	will agree with me, were I think some of them were
11	still dot matrix, to be honest with you. So there
12	has been a lot of catch-up.
13	I understand. You know, we all are advanced in
14	our own computer capabilities. The Village is
15	catching up. It's just it's you've got to
16	catch up with the software to do it as well, and
17	that's costly. That is extreme. KVS was costly,
18	okay?
19	MR. BRANDT: Right. And the implementation was
20	frighteningly costly. I don't remember the amount at
21	the time. Again, we should continue to pursue that
22	and see if there's a change at this point.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So how do we how do we
24	take a next step?
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Audit Committee is the

1	one that takes the step on that. That's what we did
2	last time. Actually, Robert and I did a whole audit
3	of the IT services within the Village. So probably,
4	since that was maybe three years ago
5	MR. BRANDT: Yeah.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: it is time.
7	MR. BRANDT: And at that time, Stephen did the
8	survey with the available online companies that
9	offered this service. There was only three at that
10	time that were suited to interface with our
11	equipment. Again, things have changed, so we should
12	just start pursuing that.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay, great. Thank you.
14	MR. BRANDT: Okay. Rents received, 74,937. We
15	did receive the first payment of the East-West Fire
16	contract. The second bill is going out this week for
17	the second payment.
18	And I think that's about it. Anyone have any
19	questions?
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Any questions for Robert?
21	(No response.)
22	MR. BRANDT: I guess we're okay.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I don't think so. All
24	right. Thank you

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We're going to ask
2	Jeanmarie to come up in Sylvia's absence and do the
3	Clerk's report.
4	MS. ODDON: Good evening, all.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Good evening, Jeanmarie.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Good evening.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Good evening.
9	MS. ODDON: I'd like to first start out, if you
10	could, Page 2 of the customer service. Sylvia asked
11	me to present this first regarding the broad overview
12	and review of what we're going to try to do with our
13	liaison, Mary Bess Phillips.
14	Just the highlight points here. The further
15	evolution of the website, the finalization of the
16	information sheet for the residents, finalization of
17	the information sheet for new business owners, and
18	the finalization of the an application packet for
19	new business owners, which Paul spoke about. The
20	streamlining of customer billing, and the faster and
21	more broad dissemination of information. Let's see.
22	The other thing we had was the
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry. So can we get
24	into
25	MS. ODDON: Sure. Do you have questions?

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So what do we -- right. So what specifically are we doing?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, what has happened is since the Organizational Meeting, and Mayor Hubbard made me the Liaison to Village Hall, I have only had one meeting with Sylvia and Jeanmarie, to be honest with you. As I explained before, a lot of the things that I just mentioned before are part of this.

I plan to deal with getting the FOIL requests out faster. I plan on having information on the website. I also plan on -- there's the discussion of the IQM2, which is an internal program for us, as Trustees, and the managers to make the work flow much easier for us.

I actually have a suggestion, which is part of my portion of the work -- the work session, is that I'm going to ask Robert and the Audit Committee to look into purchasing laptops that are Village laptops for the Trustees that will tie us into the IQM2 program, so that we will, for the future Trustees and Mayor, have an actual reference desk. Record retention is very important to me. The history of this Village is very important. But in order for these Boards to move forward, they have to have background information. And I'm sure over the next

1 month or two, you and Jack are going to be asking for 2 certain copies of things that Julia and I and George 3 may have at the top of our head, because we were 4 actually involved in it, policy decisions that were 5 made, actions that took place, contracts that already 6 existed. So those are the things that I want to see 7 updated. And as they're updated and on a system, 8 anyone asking for them, it will be easier to pull it 9 up and to give it to the public. That's number one. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Number two, I would like to 12 change -- you know, part of this is Sylvia and 13 Jeanmarie, they're the managers of this whole thing, so we have a lot of discussion to do. I feel that 14 15 the Village Clerk's Office is the record-keeper, as 16 well as the time-keeper. So I expect to see, and I 17 do, I expect to see more notices going out with 18 updating everybody as to what's going on. I'm sure 19 that you probably have seen some of how I operate 20 already, so that's where I have been given free rein 21 by the Mayor to make communication and customer 22 service a plus. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. Thank you. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're welcome. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We talked about a couple of 25

things with -- with the Clerk and with Jeanmarie, that I don't know if we should get out here, but we talked about potentially having one person who's nominated at different parts of the day to be the sort of greeter in Village Hall, so when people walk in, there's someone who says, "Hi, how are you doing? How can we help you?" And maybe rotating that responsibility. There seemed to be some interest in that idea, but -- so every person who walk in there gets someone who greets them and helps them figure out what they need. The packets are a great idea, George, I'm looking forward to those.

And, you know, of the five of us up here, I think you and I, Mary Bess, are the most active Facebookers. And we've been talking about the website, and I know that it's hard to get kind of instantaneous updates on the website, but I would love to see us open up a Village Facebook page, so we don't have to mess around with our website right now, but just one that's owned by the Clerk's Department, where they can just post status updates, "Here's what happened at last night's work session." And it's really easy to do. You or I could probably train these folks how to do it and it's free.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's part of --

1	that's part of the overall plan, okay? And I do want
2	to connect it to the website.
3	So, as I had explained to you with the
4	conference call the other day, there are some
5	changes, because we are at the point where we need to
6	review the website and take some of the money that we
7	have budgeted for for this year, okay, to upgrade
8	that. So there's a lot of things in the work, it's
9	just that it's not going to happen a week or two
10	after the annual meeting.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. No, it was. And I
12	talked to the Village Clerk about some of these
13	issues also and everything. You know, she's away on
14	vacation, because we changed meeting dates.
15	Otherwise, she would have been here and we'd have a
16	better update, but we will get that from her.
17	And somebody designated per hour to be there,
18	you know, I think could be difficult at times with
19	breaks and everything else. But the general
20	intention is to have a friendly voice and somebody
21	there. Just I think I told you, nobody used to
22	answer the phones a couple of years ago. Finally,
23	now somebody answers the phone all the time, which
24	was

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll take credit.

25

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: an update, you know. So
2	we're going to try to make it so somebody there's
3	a smiling face there just saying hello and try to
4	help.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Part of it is
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: So she's already talked about
7	that.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Part of it is how the
9	office workflow flows, and that's something that ${\tt I}$
10	will talk about. I was John Kanas trained. What can
11	I tell you?
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
13	MS. ODDON: I mean, I can speak for the girls
14	in the office. We do a tremendous amount of phone
15	calls. We do a tremendous amount of people walking
16	in. And if the girls, you know, do not have you
17	know, if there's a break in time, then I'm up at the
18	counter. Monique is very helpful, you know, at
19	times, when we're shorthanded. So we're all making
20	an effort to make sure that we're friendly, open.
21	And if we need to get Derryl in an emergency
22	situation, someone, if we can't get him on the phone,
23	we go upstairs, we go get Paul. We do what we have
24	to do in order to facilitate.
25	But we can expand. I agree that you know,

_	with hary bess, expanding on what we have now. It's
2	always best, you know, for future growth.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
4	MS. ODDON: Okay. But the girls, I just want
5	to let you know, the girls are doing a good job.
6	The other thing I want to point just go
7	through, we had a few bids. We had the fuel storage
8	tank bid that we opened on April 1st. We had four
9	respondents, and the prices ranged, as you could see
LO	in the reports. Then we went on to the Campground
L1	Manager. We opened that on the 26th of March. We
L2	had four respondents. Two of those didn't provide
L3	pricing. One, we had a quote for 19,000, the other
L4	one quoted \$15 per hour. And the Recreation Program,
L5	a Director, we opened that on April 2nd. We had two
L6	respondents. Neither of those provided pricing for
L7	the services to be rendered. The Clerk and the
L8	Village Administrator interviewed on April 10th a
L9	candidate.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, can I just ask a
21	question? The fuel storage tank bid, did you have an
22	idea when you're going to move forward on that?
23	MR. PALLAS: It won't be it will be at the
24	May meeting. It won't
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: May meeting? Okay.

1	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, it will be the May meeting.
2	I won't have time to get a review and analysis before
3	then.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
5	MS. ODDON: And then under Contracts and
6	Agreements, a check came in in the amount of 360,000
7	from Peconic Landing. It was hand-delivered to the
8	Clerk on March 25th. And the remaining balance is
9	due on March 20th, which
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: 2016?
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: 2016?
12	MS. ODDON: 2016. Sorry. No, I just my
13	eye
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine.
15	MS. ODDON: Sorry, my eye jumped. Okay,
16	apologize. Let's see. And the other check that we
17	received was for the Town of Southold, which was
18	\$370,018 for the East-West Fire Department contract.
19	We did the for the Tall Ships. We did the
20	LICVB grant, we put in for that. We're still waiting
21	to hear back from that.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I want to say a lot of
23	work went into that, by the way. You and Sylvia
24	really
25	MS. ODDON: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: pulled that out.
2	MS. ODDON: Thank you. It was a big challenge.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There was kind of a time
4	deadline on that and they really it was tough.
5	MS. ODDON: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Appreciate that.
7	MS. ODDON: And we appreciated everyone's
8	efforts that did help us along the way, because it
9	was very labor intensive.
10	Then we just have our general legal notices, of
11	course, that are listed.
12	The letters that went out was the letter of
13	support from the MTA regarding the RRMLI direct
14	lease. We did a letter for the Governor for the
15	CHIPS funding. We had another one to NYMTC for the
16	regional freight plan update, and one to Mark Woolley
17	for the major road and repair reconstruction funding.
18	We had our general liquor licenses, one for
19	Stirling Sake, another one for Susan DiPaola. And
20	then we received an amended application for the Deep
21	Water Bar and Grill, so we're doing an amended legal
22	notice on that. And
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Joe, you had a question
24	about that one, did you not?
25	MR. PROKOP: I think it was resolved.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, it was resolved?
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: It was taken care of?
3	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's fine.
6	MS. ODDON: Okay. And also, under training, we
7	have the annual mandatory PERMA training. That has
8	been scheduled for May 6th here at the Firehouse, two
9	sessions, 10:30 and 1:30.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: And that's also for Board
11	Members. I don't know if you gentlemen knew that.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
13	MS. ODDON: That was my next comment, yes.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes. I asked her to make
15	sure that she
16	MS. ODDON: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: PERMA is as well?
18	MS. ODDON: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: SCVOA is coming this
20	MS. ODDON: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Next week. PERMA is training
22	for Board Members.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
24	MS. ODDON: May 6th.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I know what PERMA is, but

1	Jack told me he doesn't. So would you mind just
2	telling him what that is?
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, I'd appreciate it.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Employee Relations
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have sexual harassment
6	sensitivity training.
7	MS. ODDON: Blood borne pathogens.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Blood borne pathogens. What
9	was the other one? There was something else.
10	MS. ODDON: Sexual harassment.
11	MR. BRANDT: Safety.
12	MS. ODDON: Safety.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Safety, all kinds of things.
14	MS. ODDON: And then he changes it up, because
15	it's the same courses every year. So Frank Laurita
16	is our representative. So he changes it up, and
17	actually PERMA changes the names constantly. Blood
18	borne pathogens seems to stay the same, but the other
19	ones have a little different training.
20	We also I spoke to Chief Breese for
21	clearance to use this area. And I also let him know
22	that in addition to the Board Members, the Fire
23	Department members are welcome. So if anybody needs
24	their training, I let him know that they are welcome
25	as well.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: I took it last night for an
2	hour and 15 minutes, so.
3	MS. ODDON: Okay.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's difficult to stay awake
5	when it's something we do each year with the Fire
6	Department. But anybody from the Fire Department
7	that needs that didn't make it the other night,
8	they can make it during the day.
9	MS. ODDON: And what we did, the May 6th date
10	is actually we timed it around brush pickup,
11	because with Pete's crew, and everyone, you know, out
12	helping, we made it so that it would be in between
13	brush pickup week.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
15	MS. ODDON: So we should have pretty much full
16	attendance.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do we do the driver safety
18	course for all the employees, you know, a three-hour
19	course.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: We haven't done one in a while.
21	MS. ODDON: Since I've been here, I've never
22	seen a driver safety course.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that something that our
24	insurance company would encourage us to do?
25	MS. ODDON: I could ask Frank. I'll just make

1	a note of that. I'm sure Frank has something and
2	he'll be more than welcome to come out.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just curious, that's all.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
5	MS. ODDON: Okay. I can look into that. And
6	then, basically, we have our resolutions. Of course,
7	we all talked about Kit Liset. She's coming on as
8	our Event Steering Committee Coordinator.
9	We then have one that concerns the Tall Ships
10	as well, Nadira Vlaun, for the creation of art work.
11	We also have the campground independent
12	contractor, along with oh. And we also have our
13	SCVOA Municipal Training, which is also open to
14	whomever would like to attend. You just have to let
15	us know. It's the training on zoning and planning.
16	It's open to whomever would like go. It's
17	actually I've attended it numerous times and it's
18	a very good course. And Joe usually is a speaker and
19	his courses are very interesting.
20	MR. PROKOP: Is that May 12th?
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, May 12th.
22	MS. ODDON: It's May 12th, and it's going to be
23	at the Riverhead I'm pretty sure it's at the
24	Aquarium.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's at Atlantis, yeah.

1	MR. PROKOP: I think what we're trying it do
2	this year is NYCOM is going to also
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are they going to be there?
4	MR. PROKOP: participate and we're going to
5	I think we're going to split it into two halves.
6	And the first half will be several courses form
7	NYCOM. The NYCOM courses I think are going to be
8	really good for anybody in this Board. They're going
9	to be, I believe and this is hot off the press. I
10	don't think this is official yet, but it's a course
11	on open meetings procedures and things like that that
12	are valuable for Board Members. But that's what
13	we're trying to work out, is one of half is one
14	half is NYCOM, and then the second half is zoning and
15	planning that I'll do with somebody else.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Do we need to sign up the
17	amount of people ahead of time?
18	MS. ODDON: Yes. We actually sent out notices
19	quite a while ago when we got the invitations. So
20	far, it's Trustee Phillips, myself, our Assistant,
21	Debra, and, of course, Sylvia. The Zoning
22	Chairperson asked that once we have an agenda, which
23	they haven't sent us an agenda yet, we're going to
24	follow up on that. Once we have an agenda, then
25	he'll determine if it's

1	MR. PROKOP: It will be next week.
2	MS. ODDON: It will be next week?
3	MR. PROKOP: Right.
4	MS. ODDON: Okay.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. But also for the two new
6	Trustees, if you are interested, just let her know,
7	so she can sign us up for it.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm interested.
9	MS. ODDON: Okay.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
11	MS. ODDON: You're interested.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, interested, but
13	committed that day.
14	MS. ODDON: Okay. So we have
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm going, too.
16	MS. ODDON: Yes, you're okay.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, your name was down on
18	there.
19	MS. ODDON: Yup, you're right there. Okay. So
20	I'm going to add Jack. And, Doug, you're committed
21	that night. Okay.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: You could add me on to that, I
23	plan on going.
24	MS. ODDON: Okay. And we're also going to put
25	out a reminder. Generally, Debbie would put a

1	reminder out. That will probably be on Monday, you
2	know, just saying hello, you know, here we go.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
4	MS. ODDON: I may wait for the agenda, so that
5	I can send that out with a reminder, because that
6	will probably make people determine whether they want
7	to attend.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
9	MS. ODDON: Then we have the resolution
10	MR. PALLAS: We'll talk about that in Executive
11	Session.
12	MS. ODDON: We'll talk about that in Executive.
13	And then, of course, Shelley Scoggin is doing her
14	usual Waiter Race.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yup.
16	MS. ODDON: And Sylvia had notified, when this
17	came about, Chief Flatley, and we received an email
18	response back to him that he is thanked us for our
19	alerting him and that he has his it's on his
20	calendar, and staff.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
22	MS. ODDON: So he will do his usual, as he's
23	done in years past.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right.
25	MS. ODDON: Does anyone have any questions?

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: No questions?
2	(No response.)
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you very much.
4	MS. ODDON: Thank you.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: You filled in good.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Nice job.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you, Jeanmarie.
9	MS. ODDON: Thank you.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Attorney Prokop.
11	MR. PROKOP: Okay. Thank you. Welcome to the
12	new Trustees.
13	And for my report, I'd like to talk first about
14	415 Kaplan Avenue, and confirm my understanding where
15	we are now, and answer questions, if you have it.
16	So we have we had a Public Nuisance Notice
17	that was originally served on the property under the
18	Greenport Code. It was served under the Greenport
19	Code after a determination by the Fire Marshal of the
20	condition of the property. The homeowner appealed
21	the Public Nuisance Notice to the Village Planning
22	Board, and, again, that's a process that's under our
23	Village Code.
24	The Village Planning Board reviewed the appeal
25	at its meeting on April 2nd and denied the appeal,

and said that there was properly a public nuisance, and the demolition of the building should proceed. The -- on April 10th, the owner of the property filed an appeal of that decision, the Planning Board decision, with the Village. And under our Village Code, the appeal of the Planning Board decision goes to the Board of Trustees, and at our next regularly scheduled meeting, which is on April 23rd. So, on April 23rd, there will be an agenda item to consider the appeal that's come in from the Planning Board decision.

Now I wanted to say that I read the appeal, both the appeal to the Planning Board and also the appeal to the Trustees, the second appeal, and the --what's stated in the appeal --what's stated in the appeal is that the homeowner is not contesting that -- the process of demolishing the house and cleaning the property. What the homeowner is contesting is that whether we should have given five days notice or 21 days notice. In either case, we're obviously -- we're way past the five days notice, we're also now way past the 21 days, but that is contested.

Now -- and what she has said in the second appeal is that what she really wants the Village to

do, and this is virtually her own words, what she really would like the Village to do is cooperate with the bank and give the bank enough time to demolish the house. She doesn't want -- she doesn't want the Village to move ahead, apparently, and try to demolish the house before the bank has a contractor that comes in and does it, and that's basically what was stated in the appeal.

So I know throughout this whole process we've been working with the bank, at first almost hourly. Even the CEO of the bank actually got involved, the CEO of Bridgehampton National Bank got personally involved in this to try to help the situation along. So we've been working with the bank and the homeowner, trying to have the best result for everybody.

And he bank, the bank decided that they would be -- they would opt to take -- demolish the house and they're prepared to do that. They have a contractor that they've selected and we have -- we actually very early on, we -- inside the Village, we completed the paperwork that had to be done for this, and we actually had paperwork that just needed a signature to move ahead, because there is a permit that's required for the demolition, and the bank has

1	been aware of that.
2	So, in speaking with the bank now, after we got
3	this second appeal, I said, "Well, you know, the
4	homeowner really just wants the bank to take it down,
5	not the Village," and we're now working with the bank
6	to move ahead with that process.
7	So it should be on our agenda for the 23rd.
8	The demolition might even happen before then, or
9	might happen after then, depending on what the bank
10	wants to do, but that's the status.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just to be clear,
12	because this is the first time we've had, since I've
13	been on the Board, that we've had somebody actually
14	appeal to the Board, so the process, she comes in and
15	states her case, or is it just a matter of us just
16	voting on it? How does the appeal process work at
17	the Village Board, because I've never been on one, so
18	I just I want that, so everybody knows
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I appreciate it.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: what we're going to be
21	responsible for on the 23rd of how we do that.
22	MR. PROKOP: Okay. So it's not it's not a
23	public hearing, although you could it's not
24	technically or legally a public hearing, although you
25	could accept public comment. Okay, that's number

1	one, because I've been asked that question
2	continually. So it's not officially a public
3	hearing, but you can accept public comment.
4	Number two is the homeowner should be given the
5	opportunity to address the Board. If she does so,
6	fine. If she doesn't come, that's fine, you could
7	vote on it either way.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
9	MR. PROKOP: And, you know, that would
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: So, basically, we're just going
11	to have a resolution if we if we see it that way,
12	just denying her appeal?
13	MR. PROKOP: Yes, if that's what you decide.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: That just takes a regular vote
15	on denying the appeal?
16	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I just I want to be
18	clear on where we go with it before we have the
19	meeting so we all know.
20	MR. PROKOP: Right. And she as I said, she
21	framed she framed the appeal a certain way, so we
22	have to address that.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
24	MR. PROKOP: Which is
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have to address the

1	difference between the five days and the 21 days,
2	right?
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. But it's been 70 days,
4	so that either way
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I know.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: if the original piece of
7	paper from back in February was wrong, it's
8	already she's had more than enough time. Okay.
9	MR. PROKOP: But, you know, early on, we
10	selected this process, because we wanted to work with
11	we wanted everybody to everybody's rights in
12	this and their interest, we wanted to have them
13	protected. So we selected that's why we selected
14	the path that we did.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Can you inform the
16	bank that we are voting on this on the 23rd?
17	MR. PROKOP: I did, and I
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. So just they know
19	that we're going to take a vote on it?
20	MR. PROKOP: Yes. I'll copy everybody on it.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: So they're prepared right that?
22	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All right. That's fine.
24	MR. PROKOP: So that's 415 Kaplan Avenue.
25	The I have one or two things that I need decisions

1	on in Executive Session, please. It will just take a
2	minute, but I needed
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
4	MR. PROKOP: to discuss with you. I'm
5	sorry.
6	With Tall Ships, I wanted to bring to your
7	attention that I'm working on a number of agreements
8	with ships, with Tall Ships, and some of the vendors
9	that are involved in getting them done, so those are
10	being processed.
11	And one other thing I wanted to mention was the
12	last time that this was done, there were permits that
13	the Village obtained for the event, and I was told
14	early on that the BID is taking care of that. So we
15	have to
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Huh?
17	MR. PROKOP: you know, just discuss what
18	they are. And I've asked that question many times,
19	and I've been told every time.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We better talk about that, you
21	know, so I can talk to Peter. But let me know what
22	those permits were.
23	MR. PROKOP: Okay.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Let's talk to tomorrow and
25	I'll

1	MR. PROKOP: Okay.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And we'll get Peter in.
3	MR. PROKOP: I mean, we're still in the time
4	frame where it's not an emergency, but it's something
5	that has to be brought up and just confirmed.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
7	MR. PROKOP: The other thing that I wanted to
8	mention is the continuing change at Justice Court,
9	and answer any questions that you have about that.
10	You know, Justice Court has been sort of evolving,
11	because they have they hired a person as a
12	supervisor there now. It used to be there was a
13	person in charge, but that was more or less a senior
14	clerk with several clerks working under her. Now
15	they have a person who's specifically a supervisor, a
16	much higher level, Civil Service level and pay grade,
17	and she's I'm familiar with working with her in
18	other municipalities, she has a lot experience. I
19	mean, fortunately for us, she has experience
20	specifically in villages and is sensitive to what we
21	need to do in order to have our code enforcement
22	calendar properly properly managed. And we've
23	been she's been helpful to us in that respect, and
24	so that's been going well.
25	The final thing that I wanted to before I

1	open to questions, the final thing I want to mention
2	is that, as you know, we've had a Planner working
3	with the Planning Board for a few months now, and
4	that's another situation which is evolving. We've
5	had a meeting, one or two meetings inhouse to use her
6	talents. She's a very talented person. We're trying
7	to use her specifically in certain parts of the
8	process to match up to her skills.
9	One of the things that we talked to her about
10	at a meeting a week or two ago was to have her
11	involved in writing decisions for the Planning Board.
12	I think that that's a good idea, and she could take
13	that over. But she's helped us with a couple of
14	difficult applications and been a plus so far, just
15	from my standpoint.
16	Does anybody have any questions about anything
17	that's on my report or otherwise?
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I don't.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
21	MR. PROKOP: Okay. Thank you
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All right. Thank you.
23	Okay. Report from Committees: We it was my
24	first Audit Committee and Code Committee, along with
25	the two new Trustees. It went well. You know, they

1	were teaching us now the process worked, because I
2	was new to that.
3	On the Code Committee, one thing we did come up
4	with is the Monday before the Code Committee meeting
5	which would be the second Monday of the month,
6	anybody from the public, Board Members, anybody who
7	wants to have something brought before the Code
8	Committee, to submit it to the Village Clerk
9	beforehand and it will be reviewed at that meeting.
10	So it kind of gives a timeline of when we want the
11	stuff in. That gives a week for the Committee
12	Members to review the stuff, go look at a situation
13	or a problem, and it just is like a deadline to
14	submit stuff. So that's for the public and Board
15	Members, or any Village employee that has something,
16	want it reviewed, that's the deadline we set. So
17	that would be we're meeting on the 2nd. That
18	should be the first Monday.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It would be the first
20	Monday.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: First Monday. I just want to
22	make sure.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yup.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: So the first Monday, we're
25	going to have that information in.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the time has changed.
2	You got it at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that if the public would
5	like to participate or would like to sit and
6	listen
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: it's later in the day
9	than it was in the past.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. It used to be at
11	3 o'clock, we changed it to 4 o'clock. And Audit
12	Committee used to be at 2. That's now at 3 o'clock
13	on the second Monday, which is a new date and time,
14	new day and time, but it's at 3 o'clock every other
15	month. All right. And they're open meetings. If
16	anybody wants to come to them, they're open. So if
17	anybody wants to come and hear what's going on with
18	them, that's it. The rest
19	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Go ahead.
21	MR. PROKOP: The Code Committee input comes in
22	through the Village Clerk.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, right.
24	MR. PROKOP: So you can contact the Village
25	Clerk with any problems.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, I thought I said that
2	already.
3	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
5	MR. PROKOP: I apologize.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: And neither committee had
7	recommendations to the Village Board at this time, so
8	we had nothing else on that.
9	Under discussion, we've got En-Consultants, the
10	Wetland Permit Application for Oyster Point
11	Condominiums. We had reports back from the CAC.
12	There's been stuff going back and forth on that.
13	This is if we want to discuss that amongst ourselves
14	before we have a motion.
15	MR. PALLAS: I would like I would ask if the
16	Board would hold off on those discussions until next
17	month's work session.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine.
19	MR. PALLAS: The CAC is in the process of
20	reviewing it. We've gotten some comments. It's been
21	suggested that the CAC revisit the site in light of
22	the comments from the consultant.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's perfect.
24	MR. PALLAS: And then make a further
25	recommendation to the Village Board.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine. It's no
2	problem holding off on it, but normally we try to go
3	in the same time frame. If that's going to work out
4	fine, then we have no problem.
5	MR. PALLAS: We've spoken with the applicant.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: And they're okay?
7	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, they're dealing with it.
9	MR. PALLAS: They're dealing with it, right.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine. All right.
11	Okay. So that's all we have under there. We'll open
12	it up to the Trustees. Trustee Martilotta, you're
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All set. Thank you.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's it. You need
16	something specific or
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All good?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. If you had anything else
20	to bring up, anything else you want to talk about?
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Actually, one thing. Doug
22	and I today met with oh, my goodness, Lloyd
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Lloyd Reisenberg?
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Loyd Reisenberg,
25	absolutely.

1	MAYUR HUBBARD: II, yes.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: One of the things we were
3	looking at or we've been talking about was the
4	digitizing of the records at the Village Hall. And
5	when Sylvia comes back, we'll have to touch base with
6	her. But it seemed that they've had a lot of success
7	with it. They had a specific scanner that they used,
8	and over the course of, it seemed, was, Doug, about a
9	year-and-a-half or two years?
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, something like that.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Somewhere between a year and
12	two years they were able to digitize everything. I
13	believe the expense for the machine was somewhere in
14	the range of \$6,000. I think it's something we
15	should look at. I think it would be great to be able
16	to clean out the basement. And I think it would be
17	also advantageous to all the people in the community
18	to be able to find that stuff on the website, as
19	opposed to a FOIL request. I think it would ease the
20	burdens on the Clerk's the Clerk's Office over
21	time.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right? So we'll get
24	more and I'll give it to you.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That would be great.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILUTIA: Yes, SIr.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Trustee Robins?
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Just I touched a little bit on
4	the fact, you know, I attended the BID meeting today,
5	and, obviously, a lot of discussion was on the Tall
6	Ships. They did get on to some other subjects as
7	well. They are planning to do an opening reception
8	for Andrea Cote, who is going to open her exhibit of
9	the "Port of Views" thing on the observation deck at
10	the Marina. They want to do a reception for that on
11	May 30th, and they're going to try and coordinate
12	with the galleries in the Town to keep everything
13	open, so it will be an extended evening event.
14	They also are partnering again with SPAT for
15	the Shellabration. That's a Fall event. They plan
16	their events well in advance.
17	We talked about the Tall Ships press event
18	that's going to take place on May 5th, and, you know,
19	that they want to promote that as much as possible.
20	They also want to agendize the rest of the members in
21	the BID who really aren't aware of what's going on so
22	much with the Tall Ships Festival by sending out a
23	couple of informational kits to them. You know, once
24	Jeanmarie and Sylvia, we get that information from

the event planner, they want to make sure that

25

everybody in town is up to speed and knows what's going on with that.

I was going to give a report tonight on the electric distribution system here in Greenport, and seeing as how I know we have some other things to cover in terms of Mitchell Park, I'm going to save that until next month.

I did go up with Paul Pallas to Saratoga Springs last night for the NYAPP Conference. So much fascinating things to share with everybody about the world of public power, what's going on, things that do relate to the NYSERDA grant, and Governor Cuomo's initiative to promote renewable energy and improve the distribution system.

So what I intend to do, actually, one of the things that we were charged with is trying to educate the public on this. So I'll start this next month. But I'm going to give my report, and, hopefully, report every month. Maybe I'd like to -- we're looking into a PowerPoint thing so that I can start educating the public a little bit more on the world of public power. Okay? Thank you

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. Trustee Roberts.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks. That's a great idea,

1 Julia.

A couple of short little things. First of all, most people know I live down in West Dublin, and I'm going to invite the community, hoping to put it on the website and in the announcements for next week's meeting, beach cleanup on May 9th, the day before Mother's Day, which I've been told is now the most important day of the year, by the way, by my wife. Bring rubber gloves, 9 to 12. Come on down and we're going to get the beach ready for the summer. Anybody's welcome.

Some reports from a couple of the committees that the Mayor has appointed me to.

The Carousel Committee, great group of folks, once I -- once we figured out where and when we were meeting. I think we've got that solved for next time. But they need a couple of things. They -- so everyone's aware of the RFP they put out to collect -- to get proposals for artists to build the panels on the Carousel, they got 13 responses. They're going to have a -- they have a committee of art review experts, or artists, or gallery owners, people who understand art who are going to review the responses, and then give a short list of ones for the -- of artists for then the committee to either

approve or disapprove.

And what I thought was interested about their approach, that I really liked, is that their -- they believe there needs to be consistency in the design. So they may choose one artist, they may choose three artists, they may choose six artists, but as long as they're consistent. Anyway, they're in the middle of their process. I think next month I'll be able to tell you who they've chosen.

A couple of things. I think this is for you, Paul. They need to find a place to store these panels, because some will come in early, some will come in late. These probably aren't going up until December, I would guess, but these are -- they're 18 feet wide. So I don't know if there's a facility here, but it was suggested maybe look into Jernick's, or maybe the one in Southold to store. But, apparently, some of them are going to take several days, or maybe even weeks to dry, because of the materials they're using.

So they also need a copy of our tax exempt form. I figure they could just walk into Village Hall and get that, but they need to go buy supplies for the project.

And one of the members of the committee that is

1	going to make the decision on who is chosen is also
2	one of the applicants. So they need advice from us
3	on how to handle that, and I said, off the top of my
4	head, I think you just don't participate. But if
5	there's anything else they need to do beyond that,
6	I'm not the legal expert, you are, Joe, so
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Doug, can I just ask two
8	questions?
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? Because I've been
11	involved with the process
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: up until now. The group
14	of consultants or the group of people who are going
15	to be reviewing, I believe at one point they were
16	asking for them to be paid. Did they mention that to
17	you?
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They mentioned that.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So that's
20	something that's something we have to
21	(Laughter)
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I assumed it was already
23	budgeted, no?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. Actually, it was
25	something that at the last meeting it was brought up,

1	because they had not finalized anything, nor had they
2	come up with any type of numbers for me. So that's
3	one thing I would find out.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And number two
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I think I have it here.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: the discussion, as far as
8	the one person who was dealing with picking the
9	artists being one of the applicants, I think that was
10	the whole focus of why they wanted the juried the
11	juried three people.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that it was a clear-cut
14	a clear-cut decision as to that there was no
15	preference.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: To make a first cut.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To make the first cut, okay?
20	So and if that particular person doesn't make the
21	first cut, then that they can move forward. But if
22	he gets chosen, then he has to kind of take a step
23	back.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Step back, yup.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, okay.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I checked my notes. They
2	told me, because I did ask, that they've already been
3	approved to spend \$600 on four \$150 honorarians for
4	reviewers. Is that
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They want a they want a
6	resolution from you to the Board to spend \$600.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So I guess they're
8	requesting that.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They have \$600, but
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Jeanmarie, if you can put that
12	on the agenda for next week.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. Okay.
14	Dances in the Park: So a couple of things
15	here. It's just in kind of working with these
16	folks, and I've been talking with the Friends of
17	Mitchell Park for a few months now, the committee
18	that we appointed on April 6th is actually not the
19	committee, so it's really all been Diane Mulvaney
20	who's worked very hard on this for years. And from
21	the perspective what I'm learning is that it seems
22	that if Diane decided not to do this, the whole thing
23	might fall apart. So I've been grateful for her work
24	and passing on our thanks to her.
25	So I wanted a resolution to remove Lilly

Dougherty-Johnson, Rosemary Skabelkas and Kathleen
Decker from the committee, because they haven't
expressed an interest in participating. And then
we're going to add some new blood, Kevin Cahill as
representative of -- or as Liaison to the Friends of
Mitchell Park, and Joseph Campisi. So can we get a
reservation -- resolution to do that?

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just so we get the paperwork right. And then I wanted to get a resolution to basically -- to book the festival, assuming we don't come up with a Mitchell Park policy. So 7:30 p.m. on July 6th, you know, all the Mondays between July 6th and August 31. We need to get them approval so they can -- the Friends of Mitchell Park won't commit funds to them until they have approval from us, and as well as IGA.

So we have a good fundraising plan in place. That's what we talked about today, at our 5 o'clock today. I think this is potentially going to be a revenue-positive event for us, which, you know, then we can -- it's very important to this committee that if it is revenue-positive, that the money gets used to do, you know, "Dances in Mitchell Park Bonus" in September, or something like that.

1	And so anyway, we're working on our
2	fundraising, but the fundraising, the first key piece
3	is getting the dates approved and getting the
4	festival approved.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just in the past on
6	that, they gave us the list of the bands that were
7	going to about there with the dates. So you want to
8	just confirm the dates? Are you going to fill in
9	band names later? Last year, that's what they did.
10	They had the list of the ten eight events with a
11	band name on each one.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: And we approved that as a
14	whole thing.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I can get you most of
16	those. Winston Irie is apparently still in Antigua,
17	where he doesn't respond to calls or emails.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. Okay.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I wish I could send
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just we need to work on
21	it, because that's how we did the resolution the last
22	couple of years. We had the dates and who was
23	playing there, so everybody had the information in
24	advance. Even if you could fill in most of them,
25	just so we have that.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: And we've got no problem with
3	approving that.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Excellent.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think we did individual
6	resolutions for each band, didn't we, George?
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, we did the whole package
8	deal.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We did them all at once?
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. We had
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We did the whole package,
12	because the contracts have to get to Joe to sign.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. We had the eight
14	groups.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: And we had the dates of each of
17	them were done, and we did it as one resolution for
18	the whole season.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All right. I'll type all
22	that up for Jeanmarie.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, that's fine.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: And if some are still missing,

you could put, you know, "To be announced," or something like that, if they're not firm. But at least everybody has an idea of who's playing on what week.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay, great. Thank you.

So just some things I've been sort of talking to folks about over the last few months. I'd really like to see us consider bringing the farmers market

back to the Village. I think this is a really important part of community life, of Village life,

of, you know, allowing local artisans, and local

farmers and other folks sell those locally produced

products to people here in our Village. I think it's

a unique thing about our Village, that we have a

great place where people can walk in a kind of a

rural setting, and then here's our Village, we can

walk and go buy locally produced products. So I

think this can be, again, revenue neutral,

potentially revenue positive. I've talked with Lara

20 McNeil from the farmers market. They're very eager

to work with us.

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I believe a great site for this is actually the lawn out here in front of the fireplace -- the fireplace -- the fireplace -- the firehouse, where kids play soccer sometimes after school. I've talked to them and

1	they're willing to do it on that site. So I want to
2	put that out to the Board and see if we can get a
3	resolution to have the farmers market back inside the
4	Village.
5	They're so far away down the street there, and
6	I feel like that hurts their commerce, and I think
7	it's a great partnership between us and our local
8	farmers and artisans.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Have you approached the
LO	Fire Chief at all, the Board of Wardens about that?
L1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No.
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
L3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do I need to?
L4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, they control they
L5	maintain the property. It just could be the one
16	weekend when they have the chicken barbecue.
L7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Saturday?
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
L9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In August.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just as, you know, a courtesy
22	of when we use building.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: We let them know what's going
25	on here, just to approach them, so we don't just say

1	that lot is being taken away. You know, just to keep
2	the peace with everybody, you know, we approach them.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm happy to do that.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, that's fine.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We've had sort of informal
6	kind of we-think-it-will-fly kind of confirmation via
7	Lara, so we'll
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: make a formal request.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you, yeah.
12	So, in general, regarding the budget, I'm
13	hoping we can kind of make very clear delineations of
14	things we can do to put money against roads and money
15	against things like this documentation project that
16	we talked about with Lloyd today, and kind of getting
17	resources against putting our documents online,
18	starting with the most recent stuff. I think there's
19	great long-term savings in this, so our staff doesn't
20	have to spend hours and hours responding to FOIL
21	requests.
22	So I noted that in the budget the legal
23	contractual expenses have gone up 20,000 this year,
24	and I know that that's based on some overage from
25	this past year, but it seems that, you know, maybe we

should look ahead and see if that's a budget line item where we can put money against this project, which is about transparency, and I think crucially important.

I also -- we're going to put a resolution out there that the money from Trustee Martilotta and I are not taking the health care benefits is specifically earmarked for road improvements, or for bonding against roads. I know we're going to talk about Capital Budget later on, but I want to make that a very kind of clear thing that we're doing, and that that money is going to fix roads.

And then the big thing, the sort of -- the big thing I brought, you know, for months, months, months, when I was sitting out there, I heard talk about Mitchell Park. I've talked about Mitchell Park. We've had public comment periods for a very long time and it's -- at the last meeting before we took office, before Jack and I took office and you became Mayor, we heard a couple of people say, "Enough already with the talking, let's get forward with the policy." So I sat down on a Saturday morning and wrote what I believe is the synthesis of all the ideas I've heard about Mitchell Park, and I've tried to put together a policy. And my -- you

know, this is my first meeting, so feel free to tell me this is not good policy, Joe, and it needs to be legally tight, etcetera. But what I'm trying to do is push this forward expeditiously, and put together all the ideas I've heard. This is a policy that keeps the park open to the public, keeps events free, cultural in nature.

That I'm also trying to take the bureaucracy out of this. It's a little heartbreaking to hear a Shakespeare company come here and have to present to the Board of Trustees that's running a power plant, and a sewer plant, and a whole Village, about whether they can do A Midsummer Night's Dream in our park. I'd rather keep this pretty simple, because I think most of these things, as long as they fit this policy, if the policy is airtight, the Shakespeare company should be able to send us a document, a two-page Word document that a couple of people can look at, ratify it against the policy, and say by email, "Yup, that's a go."

And when you and I spoke the other day, George, you suggested that we put into this policy, I think it's a great idea, anything that's under 25 people in terms of assembly doesn't need approval, as long as it kind of fits the policy.

1	So I put together these bullet points, and I
2	wanted to sort of put it out for discussion amongst
3	us, and I wanted the public to see it and sort of
4	react to it. But I did my best to pull together
5	everything I believe I've heard from the public and
6	from you all when I was sitting out there.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I mean, that's great.
8	Jeanmarie actually has a folder with all the other
9	comments and everything else. When I get to well,
10	we could do it now. I mean, on my part of the report
11	on Mitchell Park, I know you've been discussing
12	things with the Friends of Mitchell Park and all. I
13	was going to try to put a synopsis together what we
14	had and just ask them. They're the people that are
15	charged with overseeing it and everything else. Just
16	ask them for a little guideline on instead of us
17	making the decision, ask them their recommendation on
18	what they think should be done in the park.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But that's not their mission
21	statement.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, no, it's not their
23	mission station, but they're down there, they're
24	with it.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: To ask for a recommendation
2	from them. We've asked the public, everybody else
3	for it. What I would like to see us to do is vote to
4	actually lift the moratorium next week, and keep the
5	same Village-sponsored event we had last year, and
6	then review what we want to do for the future and
7	have a policy in place for the May meeting; to take
8	Doug's report, the other folders that we have, put it
9	back out there, ask the Friends of Mitchell Park for
10	a little guidance and their thoughts of what's going
11	on down there. Plus people could start planning the
12	stuff that we've allowed for the past five, ten years
13	to not to hold them up anymore. So I'd like to
14	lift the moratorium on the 23rd and have our policy
15	to be voted on at the May meeting, if
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't have a problem with
18	that.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're just, instead of
20	you're right, it's enough talking, it's gone on for a
21	long time.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, love it.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: The moratorium has been since
24	last July. We need to open up and get going with it,
25	but that way we have a firm policy, we vote on that,

Τ	put it out to the public, we vote on it at our may
2	meeting, and then it should be done before the season
3	even starts.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I can tell, having spent
5	time with the Friends, that their main they won't
6	support anything that's not Village-approved. So
7	their whole mission is to
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh, yeah.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: look to us to define it.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So if we decided that only
12	you know, whatever.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're going to trust us,
15	but they'd love to take a look and give us feedback.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: I would just like to have their
17	input on it, because if you go from the comments, we
18	went from one extreme to the other with all of it.
19	And I've tried to read everybody's letters, and you
20	could be from nothing to everything, to charging
21	thousands of dollars, to all kinds of things. I
22	would just like to have their input on it. You know,
23	it was just another person, another layer of somebody
24	giving information, along with the public and
25	everybody else.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: So I'd like to have that, a
3	motion to lift the moratorium on the 23rd, and then
4	for us to vote on a policy in May.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And how are we going to put
6	together so I'm trying help us take a step here,
7	SO
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, you are. Well, we're
9	going to take your folder. I want to put the request
10	out to Friends of Mitchell Park tomorrow, if
11	everybody is okay with that. We'll ask them for a
12	little guidance on it, if they have any input,
13	because we haven't asked them directly, but they have
14	a direct connection to the park. So asking them
15	directly, "How do you feel about this," and then give
16	a copy of the stuff we have in the folder, your
17	report, stuff that I have written, Mary Bess had
18	submitted, Julia submitted. Jack hasn't, but that's
19	all right. And the outgoing Mayor and the outgoing
20	Trustee did not submit anything in writing. But the
21	ones we have in writing, put it all together, let
22	them review it and then we'll go from there.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay?
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: That should end the whole
2	discussion or have a policy. But all the stuff that
3	we've done this past year, the Dances in the Park,
4	the Shakespeare in the Park, those people can set
5	their agendas and get going with it.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because they've been
8	Village-sponsored.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, they have, and we'll
10	just we'll let them in, because they were there
11	last year. We'll let them in, but anything new,
12	we'll set the policy up for that.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. Thank you. A couple
14	of more things. So in the interest of transparency
15	and communication, I wrote down what I sort of
16	borrowed what I do in the private sector when I'm
17	running an organization in terms of responsiveness to
18	customers, particularly around emails and calls. I'd
19	like the Board to consider putting a resolution out
20	there to show a commitment to the public that we are
21	going to respond to them when they when they
22	contact us, so I wrote that out here. I welcome
23	comment.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Doug, in all honesty, I have
25	passed on your resolution to the New York State Open

Meeting -- to Open Government. I had a discussion with them on the phone today, and part of the problem is when we have someone who passes us an email that has an address to every one of us, has it CC'd to the press, has it CC'd to a group of people, and is asking us for a decision, okay, and if three of us answer that email with a decision of yes or no, we are in violation of the Open Meeting Laws.

There is actual findings from the Committee on Open Government where conference calls have taken place, where they had three Trustees on a conference call and they made a decision, and she said the key word was once you make a decision. She was not comfortable with this. I had emailed it up to her.

So I am going to make a recommendation. I understand where you're coming from, but I think that we really need to take a look at this from a legal aspect, so that we're not putting the Village and ourselves in a situation of violating the Open Meeting Laws, okay?

I read it. I have a working relationship with the Albany Open Government Committee, so I would like to hear back from them before we present anything as far as a discussion with a resolution.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fair enough.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: I can tell you, from talking to
2	other people, other staff members, most of them do
3	respond back the same day, if they can. If not, it
4	is the second day. So, usually, that would give them
5	actually more time to respond back, because most of
6	them get answered the same day.
7	But, I mean, as a guideline or, you know, a
8	suggestion, you know, it's definitely something that
9	could be doable. But actually as a resolution,
10	voting, saying we have to do that, really, I think
11	could be troublesome. But we'll get more information
12	on it.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Then we could put it up for a
14	vote, and if it doesn't pass, then it doesn't pass.
15	But I also, I acknowledge that this is me just
16	drafting something and it needs review, and it
17	needs
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm just trying get it
20	started.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And then two more things. I
23	would love to see and this is something I did hear
24	a lot about during the campaign, and I'm somebody who
25	also believes this. I would love to see us adopt the

1	Town's dog beach policy. Note that I'm also
2	organizing a beach cleanup to pick up from the
3	delinquents who leave things on the beach. In the
4	winter, I think they think it's going to melt with
5	the snow. It drives me nuts.
6	So I would the Town's put together a really
7	nice dog beach policy, where, you know, in the summer
8	months, you can't be on the beach with a dog, except
9	on a leash, between 9 and 6, and but, you know,
10	6 a.m. is fine. So it's a well written policy, it
11	was well publicized last year, I'd love to see it.
12	Right now our beach says "No Dogs Allowed", and
13	if you go down there every morning between 6 and 10,
14	you see a bunch of dogs, and most of the dogs have
15	owners who pick up after them.
16	So I'd love to see us adopt that policy. But
17	I'm very concerned about the water quality, and I $$
18	think we should put in a hefty fine for people who
19	don't pick up. And, you know, I'll be the first to
20	call Ed Ward to get down there and give them a
21	ticket, because that is not a good practice.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have a code for it.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: We have a code for it.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have a code for it,
25	right.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Code for cleaning up not
2	specifically to the beach. We have a Village code,
3	clean up after your dog anywhere.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Anywhere, so that would
6	include the beach.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's great. So use that.
8	But the dog the Town's policy is a nice one,
9	because it allows for people to use the beach when no
10	one's around with their dogs, so I think it's a nice
11	thing.
12	And then the last thing is how do we put a
13	blinking light on Front Street by the post within
14	the crosswalks, and is that expensive, and can we
15	look into that before the summer?
16	MR. PROKOP: It would require a DOT approval.
17	MR. PALLAS: It's a State road.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A State road.
19	MR. PROKOP: It's New York State DOT.
20	MR. PALLAS: It's a State road, so
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A State road, and we'd have
22	to pay for the meter.
23	MR. PROKOP: Well, that's what I'm saying.
24	We'd have to go to DOT, and it's up it would up to
25	New York State DOT to do that.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So we have to go
2	through like Senator LaValle or something?
3	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And you have to pay, you
6	have to pay for the unit. That's why I believe that
7	the stop lights that are all along, the Town of
8	Southold pays money for those, don't they, rental
9	money? I think that's how it works.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm not sure on that, I don't
L1	know.
L2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's why they kind of
L3	hesitate putting a whole bunch of them up.
L4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
L5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that's how it works,
L6	to be honest with you. But, yeah, that's a State
L7	road, so the DOT is going to
L8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, run it by the State and
L9	see what they say.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Last thing, I just want to
22	thank all the Village staff, and fellow Trustees, and
23	Mr. Mayor, for all your patience and help as we've
24	been getting up to speed. It's been you've all
25	taken our meetings and I really appreciate it, so

1	thank you.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
3	MR. PROKOP: Can I just say something?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
5	MR. PROKOP: So I just want to say that with
6	all due respect to Trustee Roberts, I know that he's
7	new to the process, but the legal the line item
8	that he referred to was a complicated line item.
9	There's a lot of things that are coming in and out of
10	that line item, and just I want the public to
11	know, because I've been here I've been very
12	fortunate and grateful to have been here working for
13	the public for a long time, and I've enjoyed every
14	minute of it. But with respect to my portion of that
15	line item, the amount that was budgeted for Joseph W.
16	Prokop, Esq., Village Attorney, for the 2015-16
17	budget year is \$2,000 less than I was budgeted for
18	when I first took this job. And if there was an
19	overage, in order to if there was an overage as
20	I said, it's a complicated line item. There's a lot
21	of things that go in and out of there, and it's not
22	something that can just be looked at in a second and
23	say, "Okay, well, this amount was paid," or whatever,
24	because I often pay expenses for the Village from my
25	out of my own pocket and then get reimbursed, and

T	things like that.
2	So it's a complicated process, but I wanted to
3	make the point that, as I said, you know, again, the
4	amount that I'm budgeted for this coming year is
5	actually \$2,000 less than the amount that I was hired
6	for the first year that I worked here.
7	MR. BRANDT: I would like to say that line,
8	he's not the only one that hits that line, there are
9	other lawyers that hit that line.
LO	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. I didn't mention any
l 1	attorneys. I talked
L2	MR. PROKOP: Again, just as a point of
L3	information, I'm not coming back at you or anything
L4	like that. I don't mean to be like that, just as a
L5	point of information, just to familiarize you with
L6	the process. And thank you.
L7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you.
L8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Trustee Phillips.
L9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I attended Audit and
20	Code. I also had a very interesting meeting with
21	Marc LaMaina and Grant, Grant from the Suffolk Times.
22	They are both interested in doing some fundraising
23	and looking into improving the Third Street Park. I
24	spoke to Paul about this. I wanted to get them
25	together before the work session, but that didn't

quite come out the way I wanted it to.

They're both very excited. They even have their employees excited about looking into and thinking of fundraising to improve the playground equipment, and improving the park to make it for -- three goals that we discussed, and one of them was to make the area safe for parents and children to play in the open fresh air, create a joint effort within the community to take pride and ownership in the proposed upgrade, and including the discussion of some play equipment for handicapped children, and fundraising.

What I'm looking for is I would like to have the Board's permission to continue discussing this with Marc and Grant, along with Val Shelby, who you've -- as the recreational. And at the Organizational Meeting, Doug was put in charge of parks, so I would like to have that, and Paul start to work with the joint effort on meeting with them and start moving something forward for the community down there.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay?

MAYOR HUBBARD: I think that's great. Anybody who wants to volunteer and try to help out and raise

1 some money for it, that's more than welcome. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The two of them are really 3 excited. One of them has already met with a 4 landscaper with helping for a design layout of 5 planning and a lot of other things. So they're very 6 gung-ho about it. And I was really excited about the 7 enthusiasm of two business people that wanted to give 8 back to the community. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: That sounds great. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's one of the things 11 I'd like to have the Board permission to do. 12 The other things is, as I mentioned before, the record retention and the records in general for the 13 14 I would like to work with Paul and with 15 Robert and the Audit Committee to discuss the laptop 16 situation. We have email problems. I think this 17 would also help move that email server away from, or 18 the company away from, which frustrates me to no end. 19 I also had a discussion with Lisa Richlan at 20 the Floyd Memorial Library. And I also spoke to the lady from Peconic Land

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? And that's pretty
3	much it.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just on that topic,
5	Paul, Derryl and myself met with Rachel
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: this past week. She was
8	down and met with us at Village Hall
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: and went over what we want,
11	what she could do for us, what you know, what
12	could go on. So we had an hour discussion on it,
13	which was helpful and everything, but she had some
14	ideas, and she'd be more than willing to come back
15	out
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think it would be
17	great.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: and meet with the whole
19	Board.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I think it would be
21	great, okay?
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, okay.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I met with Sylvia and
24	Jeanmarie, of course, before the communication, and
25	Trustee Roberts got out of me to do the abstract this

1	month, but it's yours next month.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you very much.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're going to love it.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I will pay it forward for
5	the next new guy.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Exactly.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's pretty much it.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Work, work, work out.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Okay. I just had a
11	couple of things. Mitchell Park we already talked
12	about, so that will be on the agenda.
13	I have the Tree Committee. Every year they do
14	a spring planting. John Quinlan dropped it off at my
15	house today. I didn't review it yet, but it's a list
16	from the Tree Committee of trees and stuff they want
17	to do. Normally, we go out to bid and we do that in
18	the springtime. So I'm going to there's a copy
19	for everybody. I'll give you a copy, but we'll give
20	it to Jeanmarie, and then it will be advertised, then
21	go out and do a planting. And if anybody has any
22	ideas for other places, let the Tree Committee know.
23	The other thing, we did talk about the roads at
24	the budget hearing and all. Paul was working on
25	prices on some roads, just to let the public know.

Roads we're looking at doing immediately before summertime right now are Brown, Clark and Flint Street from 6th over to 4th, two blocks on each road, and also Central Avenue next to Goldin Furniture and Emilios, they had completely ripped apart this year. Besides that, those we're going to try to do with money we have in the bank right now. The rest of the project we're going to go over and review curbs, sidewalks and everything on the rest of the roads, and try to do it more as a packaged deal of doing the overall road instead of just the paving.

But those roads down over in West Dublin, those curbs were put in quite a few years ago. So that -- those roads are pretty much set. We could just pave them, they shouldn't have to be bothered. I mentioned that at the budget hearing. But anybody who wasn't there, I'm just letting everybody know that's the plan for right now, immediate future. And then we're going to set a plan up during the summer and do some more work with curbs and stuff during the summer and then pave again in probably late September, October, and do another batch. So that's the game plan for right now.

And besides that, I've had a ton of meetings, I had a ton of stuff scheduled, stepping in, you know,

1	meeting with the East End Mayors and Supervisors, and
2	all kinds of other things, along with meeting with
3	both Trustees and everybody else. It's been a hectic
4	month, but it's been a good a good month so far.
5	At this point, I'd like open it up to the
6	public, if anybody would like to have a comment.
7	MR. SWISKEY: Yeah.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. Come on up to the podium
9	and state your name.
10	MR. SWISKEY: I just have to keep my friends
11	here a little while longer.
12	Anyway, first thing I want to say is, Mary
13	Bess, I don't believe there's any law that prohibits
14	an individual Trustee of answering simply an email
15	saying basically, CC you all. All you got to put
16	in there is an individual answer from me, so it's not
17	a meeting. So it can be done, I mean, and it should
18	be done. In other words, I would agree
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Bill, I'm not disagreeing
20	with you, but everyone has this "reply also". I
21	would prefer getting an answer before we get
22	ourselves in trouble.
23	MR. SWISKEY: Well, then Mr. Prokop can contact
24	Mr. Freeman at the basically, the Committee on
25	Open Government, and I think he's going to tell you

1	there's nothing wrong with it.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
3	MR. SWISKEY: You're the one that brought it up
4	that we might get in trouble. I don't think we will.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I already
6	MR. PROKOP: One of the things that I'd like to
7	say, since that committee has been, you know, at the
8	forefront here, is just I caution everybody to
9	remember that that's an advisory committee. He does
LO	a great job and that's you know, he's become an
L1	institution in New York, which is wonderful, he
L2	provides a great service, but it is just an advisory
L3	committee. And when I look at their opinions, I
L4	confirm them with my opinion based on case law that I
L5	review. So I'll review that for the Board.
L6	MR. SWISKEY: But I don't think there's a
L7	problem. I think we got to stop ducking that issue.
L8	Let's get off that for now.
L9	There's mostly about the Tall Ships Committee.
20	Why didn't the Ex-Mayor and Peter Clarke show up
21	tonight? They were scheduled.
22	AUDIENCE MEMBER: They can't answer for them.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: I talked to them before the
24	Organizational Meeting about coming to this meeting.
25	We changed the dates and everything else. And like I

1	said before, I had something come up today. I was
2	going to call them today and I couldn't do it, just
3	to confirm if they were coming. So I don't have an
4	answer for you on that, but I will speak to them
5	tomorrow.
6	MR. SWISKEY: But they have to remember,
7	they're spending my money.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Without a doubt.
9	MR. SWISKEY: This Village Board is their boss.
10	If they don't want to do the job, then take them off
11	the committee and appoint a new Chairman and the
12	new because this \$300,000 belongs to the taxpayers
13	here, so we have certain rights, just and this
14	grant from Newsday, is that for advertising? Is that
15	free advertising or is that real money?
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was real money.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Real money, it's a check.
18	MR. SWISKEY: It's a check.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
20	MR. SWISKEY: All right. That's what I wanted
21	to know, because sometimes you get
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: In-kind services that we
23	MR. SWISKEY: In-kind services.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
25	MR. SWISKEY: And you can't really they were

1	counted as income, so last time. You can't do that,
2	because they weren't taken out of the expense
3	account.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Without a doubt.
5	MR. SWISKEY: So you actually didn't make the
6	money you thought. That's one of the problems with it.
7	Then one of the big things I think that this
8	Board should be rushing to approve is Global Common.
9	That's worth about \$600,000 a year to us. If we got
10	that money, we could do roads, we could pay off our
11	debt. I mean, we can't hesitate here, in other
12	words, and it's the same with the New York State
13	grant. You could come up with a quick policy or
14	quick plan. This is if we get this money, this is
15	what we're going to do, and we're going to put a
16	substation down here. You know, it's not that
17	difficult to do. You can do that inhouse.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: I definitely agree with you.
19	MR. SWISKEY: And these things need to be done.
20	And you're on a short deadline. I would urge the
21	Board next week to vote on these things.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh.
23	MR. SWISKEY: And what do I got here? You
24	know, it was hard to keep track, I didn't bring a
25	pencil and paper.

1	One other thing. I got the emails from that
2	went back and forth between the Village and A & D
3	Testing or A & F Testing, and from what I could see,
4	that transformer will never be compatible. It
5	doesn't have the same primary tap pattern as the old
6	one. So even you set one real low and the other one
7	in the middle with no secondary regulators, you'll
8	never be able to operate them in parallel, which was
9	the one of the main goals. So somebody's going to
10	have to start going after somebody. Whoever was
11	responsible, either for the design and purchase of
12	that transformer, we need to go after, and we need to
13	go after in a hurry. Thank you.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: You're welcome.
15	MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street.
16	Thank you for this opportunity. I won't be long.
17	Two-and-a-half hour work session, is like when Billy
18	used to be on it.
19	(Laughter)
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, this is short compared to
21	that.
22	MR. SALADINO: Listen, if I get a vote, I vote
23	yes for Global Common, so you can put me down for
24	yes.
25	And just I just misunderstood what Bill

1	said. We're not going to do the grant, they're going
2	to do it. If you say okay, they're going to go the
3	grant, right?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. It's a win/win for us.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not cost for us.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're going to do the
7	paperwork, and if they're getting approved for it and
8	they get it
9	MR. SALADINO: So you don't have to worry about
10	doing it inhouse.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: It won't cost us a nickel on it.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
13	MR. SALADINO: I read Mr. Roberts', Trustee
14	Roberts' comments about the people that would be on
15	the park committee, there was five people.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Approval Committee, yeah.
17	MR. SALADINO: Park Approval Committee. You
18	might consider the Board might consider having
19	somebody from the public
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great idea.
21	MR. SALADINO: on the committee, as opposed
22	to just from the BID, from the you know, you might
23	get the public's opinion about who and what might be
24	in there.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great idea.

1	MR. SALADINO: Or just as a suggestion.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Is that a volunteer?
3	(Laughter)
4	MR. SALADINO: I'll tell you what I told the
5	last Mayor. I'll do anything my Village needs me to do
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: John, I will be calling upon you
7	MR. SALADINO: As a matter of fact, I did
8	volunteer last time, I guess.
9	But and the other thing I have is with the
10	Tall Ships. Why the former Mayor didn't come or
11	Peter Clarke didn't come, nobody seems to know.
12	This Tall Ship Festival came about because the
13	last Tall Ship Festival was touted to be a success
14	financially. It wasn't. If people are willing to
15	accept the truth, they know that, and a lot of people
16	do know that. You used the expression "fuzzy math".
17	That's exactly what it was, to wait six months for a
18	report and then to see fuzzy math.
19	So you used that Tall Ship Festival, and don't
20	get me wrong, everybody loves a tall ship, but you've
21	got to be honest with the people. You know, if you
22	make money, you make money. If you lose money,
23	before you have the next festival, you tell the
24	people that and then they decide if they want to go
25	forward or not.

1	MAY	OR HUBBARD:	Uh-h	nuh .		
2	MR.	SALADINO:	This	Tall	Ship	F

MR. SALADINO: This Tall Ship Festival, if we can believe the work sheet that the BID put out, there's \$275,000 budgeted. That's fictitious. We've been -- we've been watching -- we've been watching former Mayor Nyce duck the issue for the last year-and-a-half. Moving along, it's fine, we don't know. Everything was a secret, everything was in the dark, no information. Actually, I even talked to somebody from the Steering Committee. They were told they couldn't discuss it. I mean, what exactly is happening at that committee that can't be discussed

with the public, whose money they're spending?

I looked at the budget now, there was also an addendum to their advertising budget. They were going to spend 22,000, now they're going to spend 50,000. I tried to mention it last week, about \$20,000 in unreported expenses. You took the time to report that the Carousel made a few extra dollars. You took the time to report that the campground made a few extra dollars. In the last report, you neglected to mention that the Marina lost \$15,000 in rental income. In this particular report, it's four days, 1200 feet of dock space, comes out to about \$19,000.

1	Have the festival, but be honest. Tell the
2	people what it's going to cost. If it costs too
3	much, you say, "Well, we went over the budget," but
4	be honest with the people. The 275 I just gave
5	you \$50,000 worth of additional expenses that aren't
6	on that work sheet. So now the budget is not really
7	\$275,000, it's \$325,000.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: May I?
9	MR. SALADINO: Absolutely.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. Just it's my
11	understanding, again, I've only been in one meeting,
12	that they originally started out with eight, eight
13	ships; is that correct?
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's eight to nine?
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It's eight to nine. It's
16	my understanding that they are looking to eliminate
17	one of those ships and take the cost associated with
18	that ship and move that over to advertising. Again,
19	I will I will be able to give you something in
20	greater detail
21	MR. SALADINO: Well, it was well, again, I
22	don't want to take up a lot of time.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. I'm just trying to
24	MR. SALADINO: No, I understand, Jack.
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.

1	MR. SALADINO: And that's a great answer. But
2	what was my understanding from because it only
3	looks like I'm nosy, and I'm kind of really
4	listening. It was my understanding that the extra
5	ship that you were talking about was free. The one
6	that they had added, that went from seven to eight,
7	that was like on the house.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, no. I believe the
9	free one is still yeah, they didn't get rid of the
10	free one.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: The free one's still coming.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The free one's still there.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's not saving any
14	money, the free one's coming.
15	MR. SALADINO: So the free so the one that's
16	leaving is 50 grand? All I'm saying is
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I can't give you a number.
18	MR. SALADINO: You know, I looked at this I
19	looked at that sheet, and, I mean, there's things
20	there was things just there was just things that
21	for labor, the last one you allocated \$9500 for
22	labor, this one you allocate \$6400 for labor. It's
23	an extra day. How do you get less labor on Fourth of
24	July weekend for four days, as opposed to three days
25	for last time?

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: John, I believe because two of
2	those days are work days, okay?
3	MR. BRANDT: And that was overtime.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So we will have Village staff
5	on two of those days.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The other one was
7	overtime
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: on the previous Tall
10	Ships.
11	MR. SALADINO: Well, no, that's what I'm
12	talking about, overtime.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, regular days, right?
14	MR. SALADINO: That's what the line item says,
15	overtime, overtime labor.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The whole four days, is two
17	of them a work day?
18	MR. PALLAS: Two of the four days are regular
19	work days.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Regular days.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are regular work days for
22	the Village workers, correct?
23	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, not overtime, just
25	regular work days.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. No, go ahead.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I'm just trying to get
3	something corrected, that's all.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
5	MR. SALADINO: And for the but, you know I
6	could go on.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
8	MR. SALADINO: I mean, it's a big document, I
9	could go on. To have this go on for a
LO	year-and-a-half and not get any information from I
11	applaud you for wanting to give the public
12	information. For having this go on for over a
L3	year-and-a-half and not getting information I think
L4	is despicable.
L5	I think, Trustee Robins, you're doing a good
16	job. I think you're trying do the right thing. For
L7	you to come here every month for the last six or
L8	eight months and say, "Well, I went to the BID
L9	meeting, and they're talking to a couple of people,
20	and they're getting some money," who? Why is that a
21	secret? Why can't we know that? Why is that
22	private? Why is that I'll ask the Attorney
23	through the Board, why is that privileged?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't even think you had any
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't think it's private. I

1	think, you know, unless there I'm not you know,
2	I believe until there's actual commitments you
3	know, a lot of this was these sponsors that they're
4	telling me they have, and they do have a list, you
5	know, there were no commitments on them, so I don't
6	think they're going to say
7	MR. SALADINO: But why is it impossible to even
8	know who the sponsors are? I mean
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, if they're not
10	committed, they're not a sponsor.
11	MR. SALADINO: I'm not talking about Tall
12	Ships Festival. I can't go to them and steal their
13	sponsors.
14	MR. PROKOP: No. Anybody we have an agreement
15	with
16	MR. SALADINO: I'm sorry?
17	MR. PROKOP: Anybody we have agreement with is
18	public information. I mean, these are things that
19	are negotiated, and negotiated with a lot of people.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
21	MR. PROKOP: The negotiations, there's nothing
22	really to make public. I mean, these are
23	discussions. And then once it comes to an agreement,
24	then the agreement is public.
25	MR. SALADINO: So just so we understand, we're

1	on the same page, if the BID is talking to Greenport
2	Harbor Brewery, we're not allowed to say they're
3	not allowed to say that, or you just or they're
4	talking to the hospital?
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, they're allowed to say
6	that, but I'm not going to come and I'm not going
7	to come and give you their list. I mean, I've been
8	urging the BID to come to these work sessions for
9	months, okay, and give their own report, rather than
10	me having to speak for them, okay? I attend the
11	meetings, I take my notes, and I record what's said.
12	MR. SALADINO: And we I'm sorry for
13	interrupting. And we accept that behavior from them?
14	We have no leverage with we're putting on a
15	\$300,000 festival and we ask them to come and they
16	say no and that's okay?
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Our leverage is not to
18	vote
19	MR. SALADINO: I'm sorry. I'm sorry.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Our leverage is not to vote
21	to give them more money, which is what I'm trying to
22	get my colleagues to do. That's our leverage.
23	MR. SALADINO: Well, I heard that tonight, but
24	that hasn't been the profile for the last
25	year-and-a-half.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, it hasn't, but John
2	AUDIENCE MEMBER: It's a whole new day.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But John
4	AUDIENCE MEMBER: It's a whole new day, we're
5	going to start fresh.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We'll see what happens next
8	week.
9	MR. SALADINO: Are you on the BID?
10	AUDIENCE MEMBER: I wish.
11	(Laughter)
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Let's see what happens.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, John, I could just you
14	heard the discussions tonight.
15	MR. SALADINO: I'm sorry
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Our intentions, and everybody,
17	we all plan on being different. From here going
18	forward, it's going to be different. You're going to
19	have reports. We're going to report back exactly
20	what happens. Tonight we said we're going to ask
21	them for a list of possible donors. So we're trying
22	to take it from in the dark and bring it wide open to
23	everybody, so we all know what's going on.
24	MR. SALADINO: George, I appreciate that and
25	that's great, but we heard that before, we're going

1	to have it next month, we're going to have it next
2	month.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well
4	MR. SALADINO: This is April. I mean, when are
5	we going to get the report, July 3rd? I mean, yeah,
6	really.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I wasn't Mayor then, I'm
8	not on the committee.
9	MR. SALADINO: I understand. No, I understand.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: But I'm just telling you, from
11	here on, you will get the reports. I'm not going to
12	tell you I'm going to give it to you and not give it
13	to you. And I know Mr. Martilotta is not going to do
14	that. You know, we're all on the same thing. We
15	want this to be wide open to everybody. So you're
16	going to have the reports real soon, and you'll have
17	it monthly.
18	MR. SALADINO: Well, I know for a fact three or
19	four people showed up tonight just to hear that
20	report
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
22	MR. SALADINO: that was promised on Monday
23	that they would here to give the report. I just
24	for this amount of money, I hear you guys debate over
25	pennies, over pennies. I hear the discussion go on,

1	and you have to know. These guys are a little new.
2	You have to know, Trustee Phillips has to know. I've
3	been to every one of these meetings, I heard it all.
4	I heard it all.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
6	MR. SALADINO: I heard the good, I heard the
7	bad. So here, \$300,000, and, all right, we'll talk
8	about it next month. Maybe it will show up next
9	month, we'll talk about it then. Okay? Robert's
10	going to give them \$37,000 tomorrow, you know, for
11	what? For what? We don't even know the name of the
12	boats that are coming. I apologize.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
14	MR. SALADINO: I'm on a rant here and I'm
15	raising my voice. Thanks for listening.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. Anybody?
17	MS. MC NEIL: Lara McNeil, Second Street.
18	First, I want to say thank you for even considering
19	trying to incorporate the farmers market into the
20	Village a little bit closer. Hopefully, it will work
21	out. I think that we provide a valuable service to
22	the community.
23	That aside, I want to talk about Tall Ships
24	really quickly.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure.

1	MS. MC NEIL: Step out of my farmer markets
2	role.
3	I'm going to I have very high hopes for the
4	new Board. I hope everything turns into something
5	different than what we've seen. And I'm going to ask
6	you as a Board to consider at your next Executive
7	Session who you take money from, and whether you have
8	a contract with them, and whether you have any
9	interest with them, and whether they have any
LO	interest with the Village before you take money from
<b>L1</b>	people for Tall Ships sponsors, because those are
L 2	some of the people that cut blacked out last time.
L3	So I'm going to ask you not to do that again.
L4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry, I don't know what
L 5	you're talking about.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know what you're
L7	talking about, Lara.
L8	MS. MC NEIL: So the donations for sponsorships
L9	we got last time, I know that some of the FOILed
20	stuff were blacked out.
21	MR. SWISKEY: They blacked out certain donors.
22	MS. MC NEIL: Some of the donors were blacked
23	out. And then asking we have to accept money
24	from
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: They eradicated the names of

1	people. It was blank lines with it was black and
2	it would say \$5,000, or whatever.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Really?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: The name
5	MS. MC NEIL: I'm going to ask you to not
6	accept money from people that you're in contract with
7	as a Village, okay?
8	MR. SWISKEY: That would be vendors, the power
9	plant, the sewer plant.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You mean the vendors?
11	MS. MC NEIL: Like in the event Peconic
12	Landing, maybe. I mean, let's just as a group sit
13	down and talk about the ethics of what money that
14	you're going to chase because the BID might not come
15	with what they're promising. And I really don't
16	think you should give the BID any money until they
17	show up with side sponsors.
18	Oh, and one silly little thing, but if you're
19	doing archiving with the records, make sure they're
20	scanable documents, because I know in the past stuff
21	has been scanned and it's not searchable documents.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. Well that but
23	there's also the issue, some of those documents that
24	are in the basement have to have tender loving care,
25	and that's an archivable process.

1	MS. MC NEIL: But it also might be a teachable
2	thing for the person who's doing the actual scanning,
3	of what forms, how to which button to push,
4	because I know that when I was on the Planning Board,
5	I got documents that you couldn't search through.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That stuff's been changed,
7	Lara, since you left, okay? I've been a little busy
8	beaver for the last very silently busy, but
9	MS. MC NEIL: We see you. You're involved in a
10	lot of stuff.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. A lot of the upgrades
12	have been from my pushing, okay?
13	MS. MC NEIL: I'm excited for you as a new
14	Board. I hope you guys I'm glad you're on
15	Thursdays now.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Thanks.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
18	MS. MC NEIL: And thank you again for your
19	consideration.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else like to speak to
23	the Board?
24	MS. HELLER: Ann Heller, Third Street. I would
2.5	iust hope that the Board would not rush to indoment

1	about the peaker plant. It seems to me that the same
2	thing that happened last year, that the person comes
3	in and they're although he said it wasn't a
4	deadline, there is a deadline, and you're supposed to
5	vote on everything. So the grant is one thing, but
6	if it's going to be definitely tied to the peaker
7	plant, I think you should give it more consideration.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
9	MS. HELLER: I don't know why Greenport would
10	necessarily want to have a peaker plant who's, you
11	know, paying for the utilities for the South Shore.
12	I mean, why should we have something in our community
13	that's benefitting the Hamptons, and, you know, all
14	the pools and the air conditioning down there? So I
15	think that's something, you know, to really think
16	about.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
18	MS. HELLER: And it's they denied it,
19	Southampton doesn't wasn't it, you said Shelter
20	Island doesn't want it. If it's such a great thing,
21	why don't they want it? So that's something the
22	Board should think about.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. Anybody else
24	like to address the Board?
25	(No response.)

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'll offer a motion to
2	adjourn to Executive Session briefly.
3	MR. PROKOP: To discuss litigation.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: To discuss litigation.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Second by Trustee Roberts. All
7	in favor?
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.
13	We're adjourned to Executive Session. Thank you.
14	(Whereupon, the meeting was adjourned at 9:43 p.m.)
