1 (Whereupon, the meeting was called to order 2 at 7:00 p.m.) 3 I'd like to call this meeting MAYOR HUBBARD: 4 to order at 7 o'clock, the work session. 5 (Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of 6 Allegiance.) 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. You may be seated. 8 The Village Attorney is on his way, he's going to be 9 a little late, just so everybody knows. Okay. 10 First report is from Harry Breese from the Fire 11 Department. 12 CHIEF BREESE: Good evening. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Just for everybody, if you 14 could speak into the microphone, speak louder so everybody can hear, and that will be good for all of us. 15 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir, let's do it. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: 0kay? 18 CHIEF BREESE: Good evening. You have all my 19 monthly reports and --20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 21 CHIEF BREESE: -- and my requests and 22 resolutions? I just have one additional question. I 23 talked to Sylvia yesterday about the ambulance, and she said it's still in -- the attorneys are still 24 looking over the specs right now for the ambulance 25

1 before it can go out to bid. Is there any progress 2 on that? 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: He is not here right now. When 4 he gets here, I'll ask. Your sheet had no requests 5 on the one. 6 CHIEF BREESE: No, we didn't. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: You didn't, okay. 8 CHIEF BREESE: We do one -- actually, I talked 9 to Robert. We had to make a budget modification. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, he has that in his report. 11 CHIEF BREESE: Okay. That's the only thing, 12 that we actually did that afterwards, because we kind 13 of got backwards with that. But just the budget 14 modification was the only request we had. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Harry, I had one question. You all went to visit the -- has a visit taken place 17 18 to Firematic? 19 CHIEF BREESE: Yes. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: How did that turn --20 21 CHIEF BREESE: We went last Thursday. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 23 CHIEF BREESE: We went last Thursday. 24 Basically, they did a -- they called it the pre-construction inspection or visit. What they do 25

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1 is they went over the specifications, they went over the whole truck, made whatever changes they needed to 2 make, which was minor. And now we're supposed to get 3 4 another copy of the truck, of the truck with all the 5 paint work that's going to be done, on how the paint's going to look. And after we approve that, 6 7 then they'll start construction on the truck, because 8 supposedly we're going to get delivery of it some 9 time in October. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's what I was 11 wondering. 12 CHIEF BREESE: Okav. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: October of this year, 14 correct? 15 CHIEF BREESE: Yes, October of this year. 16 We'll have a pre-delivery inspection some time in late September, early October, where we take a trip 17 18 out to Wisconsin. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 20 CHIEF BREESE: And then we should get the truck 21 in October. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Great. 23 CHIEF BREESE: That's all I got. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Any questions for the Chief? 25

1	(No Response)
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. I'll check
3	with the Attorney when he gets here and get you an
4	answer on the holdup on the ambulance. I hadn't
5	heard about that, so I didn't know.
6	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah, that was the only thing.
7	I talked to Sylvia yesterday and she said there was
8	still some legal issues or something they were going
9	over with the specs or something.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
11	CHIEF BREESE: Because I did the Wardens
12	asked me again last night, and apparently the Rescue
13	Squad I mean, there are some companies that want
14	to bid on it, are calling, for some reason started
15	calling Ex-Chief Manwaring about it. So they're
16	just I'm just trying to give them an answer, an
17	honest answer, because I don't know what's going on,
18	really, so.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right.
20	CHIEF BREESE: Well, thank you.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll give you a call later this
22	evening or tomorrow to let you know what the Village
23	Attorney had to say.
24	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. Thanks.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.

1 CHIEF BREESE: Have a good night. 2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Next report will be Tall 4 Ships, Trustees Jack Martilotta and Julia Robins. 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Would you like to go 6 first, Julia, or --7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I'll give an update 8 based on --9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- if you want. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: We had a meeting last night. 13 Basically, we're at the point now we're dealing with 14 a lot of logistics at the park. Ron Breuer has 15 provided us with a map. So last Friday, we met over 16 there with Kit Liset, our Event Planner. Trustee 17 Martilotta was there, Linda Kessler, Jeanmarie and 18 Jeff Goubeaud. So we did kind of a walk-through, 19 trying to place all the different things that -- you 20 know, the tents and the location of some -- the 21 Hermione, where they're going to set up their, you 22 know, table and all their informational stuff. 23 Other things that we discussed at the meeting 24 last night were the status of contracts, which apparently most of the ships' contracts have been 25

reviewed by the Village Attorney at this point, so
we're awaiting the final signed contracts. There was
a question about one of the ships, the Sagres from
Portugal, in terms of payment. I think we might have
mentioned that at the last meeting about how they
were going to be paid.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: In kind.

7

8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: In kind, yeah. We're actually 9 going to give them a purchase order, a check for --10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: A check, as opposed to --11 it was -- we weren't sure. If I may. I don't mean 12 to --

13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes. No, go ahead.

14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We weren't sure initially 15 what they were going to need. They were leaving for 16 Philadelphia and coming here. And since they're a 17 military vessel -- is that correct, Julia?

18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: They are a military vessel,19 yeah.

20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Military vessel, they're 21 not allowed to take a true payment. So we're 22 essentially going to give them in-kind something, a 23 check specifically earmarked for fuel, and that's the 24 only thing that they can use it for.

25 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.

3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Go ahead, I'm sorry.

4 TRUSTEE ROBINS: So, yeah, we've been in 5 discussions with the Boy Scouts. One of our concerns 6 was that there was enough water at the festival, 7 seeing it's going to be the, you know, hot part of 8 Boy Scouts are interested in doing at least Julv. 9 two days at the event in terms of, you know, their 10 hotdog booth, but they go beyond that. They sell water and they actually have coolers, and they wheel 11 12 them out and serve people on the dock as well when they're waiting on line. So they're in for that. 13

14 We discussed, if the Boy Scouts can't provide enough scouts and scout leaders for all four days, 15 16 because it is a four-day festival, it falls right as 17 school is ending, that -- a couple of things. Well, 18 I suggested to them they might consider collaborating with the Girl Scouts, so we're reaching out to them, 19 20 and also some of the other nonprofit organizations, 21 maybe the kids from the school, or the ROTC people, 22 or football team, something like that, you know. 23 Basically, fundraisers for the community is the idea, 24 but to get water out there for people, so that, yeah, you know, they have an opportunity to get something 25

1 to drink.

2 The other planning that's going on is in terms 3 of the -- well, I'm not going to -- I'm not going to 4 give the sponsorship report, because that really is 5 Peter Clarke and the BID at this point. He's dealing 6 with, you know, the sponsors. They -- you know, in 7 terms of designating who's going to be doing what 8 parties on what ships so, that's a detail thing that he's working on. 9

10 The small minutia, the things in terms of wrist bands, T-shirts, all that kind of stuff, is really 11 12 kind of, you know, coming to fruition right now, so 13 that all of those things are in the works. So this 14 is the intense time of the festival, obviously. 15 We're just about five-plus weeks out. So I think 16 that we are in pretty good shape to have a successful festival. 17

18 Robert Brandt reported that -- I think we have
19 how many -- how much in ticket sales now, Robert,
20 well, as of yesterday?

21 MR. BRANDT: Well, as of this morning, \$1445.00 22 online.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: These are online sales, okay.
MR. BRANDT: Actually, we're on track like we
were the last event.

1 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. MR. BRANDT: We started off super slow and it's 2 3 starts climbing dramatically. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 5 MR. BRANDT: So that's good to say. 6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, so it will increase 7 exponentially in the next three or four weeks. So I 8 now turn it over to Trustee Martilotta. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. We hit on most of 10 the things. Couple of quick -- couple of quick 11 points. 12 Yes, the contracts are mostly complete. We've 13 had a couple of ships approach us about doing 14 something free, or in exchange for, I don't know, they park here and advertise for -- nothing -- no 15 16 decisions have been made on that. 17 Another thing is this weekend, obviously, we've 18 got Memorial Day coming up, so we've gone ahead and 19 printed out, good Lord, somewhere -- I don't have the 20 email in front of me right now. I believe some of 21 the --22 MR. BRANDT: Fifty posters. 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Fifty posters and --24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Two hundred tickets, I think. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- 25 tickets, 50 tickets, 25

1 something like that.

2 MR. BRANDT: No. 3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's 200, I think. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Two hundred tickets? I don't have it in front of me and I apologize. 5 But 6 that's going to be arriving, I believe, tomorrow --7 MR. BRANDT: Yes. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- if I'm not mistaken. 9 MR. BRANDT: Tomorrow. 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And we're going to try and 11 push that out to the businesses, get it out in all 12 the storefronts, start trying to get people talking about it, and, hopefully, that will help generate 13 sales as well. 14 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think -- did we decide, 17 are the tickets going to be sold at the Seaport 18 Museum? 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's the main venue, would 20 be actually at the Seaport Museum. 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So you can either buy them 22 online or at the Seaport Museum and --23 MR. BRANDT: I want to point out, the Seaport 24 Museum is only selling adult tickets. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 25 They are.

1 MR. BRANDT: Family packages or children's tickets, you still have to go online for them at this 2 3 point. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yup. And just like 5 Trustee Robins said, we're about five weeks out, so 6 the real work begins. MAYOR HUBBARD: Yup. Okay. 7 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Could we ask questions? 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The sponsorships that you 11 mentioned, so the -- I sort of got wind that 12 Claudio's sponsored the event, and so then they were offered the opportunity to host the press conference? 13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That is -- yes. That's my 15 understanding, but I'm almost positive that's a ves. 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. We didn't vote on 17 that, right? So was that -- you mentioned that Peter 18 Clarke is running this. 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, Peter Clarke is doing 20 the BID, you know, the BID outreach to sponsors. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: He was asked to do that and 23 has been doing it. He did not come and discuss his 24 contract negotiations with me, what he was offering people, or with anybody on the committee, as far as I 25

1 know.

2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. I mean
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. Just to absolutely
4	right. I believe he kept it relatively open as to
5	what people would get in exchange for sponsorships in
6	an attempt to draw people in and customize it to what
7	they're looking for, whatever that might be. No, we
8	did not know beforehand. I also don't want to speak
9	to it. I don't know if that's something that was
10	decided on earlier before my getting there, like if
11	it was going stay open, or I don't know. Like if
12	there was what I'm saying is there's not a menu,
13	if you sponsored \$15,000, you get "A", if you
14	sponsor you understand what I'm saying, \$10,000
15	gets "B".
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, right.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: They kept it open along
18	those lines as to we were trying to tailor it to the
19	customer who was offering the sponsorship.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. They had old ship
21	contracts.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So I hope that helps.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They had old ship contracts
24	from last year from the last event
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.

1 TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- that defines, you know, 2 what people were getting in terns of parties. I mean, the ships only offer, I believe, one party. 3 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I believe so. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, per visit, so --5 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Party, meaning? 7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: A party that the sponsor can 8 have on the boat and they --9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Invite their guests? 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Invite their guests. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's one of the perks for a 13 big sponsor, you know, the high sponsor. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So it would be an 14 opportunity for them also to regroup some of their --15 16 some of their outlay for the sponsorship. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You know, I believe that -- I believe that was the thinking behind it, if 20 21 I'm not mistaken. 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For the sponsor to recoup? TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How would the sponsor recoup, 25

1 by entertaining --

2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't know. I mean --3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: By entertaining, \$100 to 4 get on the boat.

> TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, sure. Yeah. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, yeah.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 7 But my question is just --8 that's fine. If it has nothing to do with Village 9 resources, that's fine. But are there any other 10 sponsorships that are going to -- that are going to 11 involve Village assets or resources? Because from my 12 perspective, that press conference was about our 13 Village's Tall Ships Festival that the public is 14 funding, and it was at Claudio's, so Claudio's got on 15 News 12. I mean -- and everybody did great, by the 16 way, great press conference, but, you know, Claudio's 17 got on News 12 and not Mitchell Park, not our 18 Carousel, not our Village. So if there are other 19 things -- I just felt like we should have been looped 20 If there are other things that are happening in. 21 with sponsorships that involve the Village, or 22 Village assets, or Village -- I don't know, that 23 involve the Village, I would hope they would run 24 through this group and not through private --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't have an answer. 25 Ι

do not have an answer for you on that. I could reach
 out to Peter Clarke, that's not a problem. I can see
 if I can get an answer for you. I don't want to
 speak for him, I don't know. Is that --

5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I think in general on 6 that, also, Claudio's was not using the ship for one 7 of their guest receptions.

8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely right.

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: And so they were getting to 10 host the press conference, and we're going to have 11 somebody else use that ship to raise more money for 12 ourselves on it.

13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS:

14 MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe Peter explained that 15 to me, that they weren't using their private party on 16 that ship, so they were doing the press conference, 17 and we're going to have somebody else do a party on 18 that ship that we will get money for.

Okay.

19TRUSTEE ROBERTS:I think a one-page document20might clear this up and -- you know, because we've21been asked about it by the public, you know, what's22the quid pro quo for a sponsorship.23document that explains exactly what, that might --24MAYOR HUBBARD:24Sure.

25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Assuage any concerns.

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It would. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Our two representatives 2 will bring that back? 3 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, find out what's going 6 on, so there's no more questions, no more surprises, 7 that would be great. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That would be great. And 9 another guestion, there's a -- the Treasurer has a 10 budget modification. What is that for, for Tall 11 Ships? Is that for ships? 12 MR. BRANDT: That is for expenses incurred for 13 that, and I'll be addressing that when I get up 14 there. 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We'll wait, then. 16 MR. BRANDT: Okav. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thank you. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. That's their 19 report. Next report will be from Village Administrator Pallas. 20 MR. PALLAS: Yes. Thank you, Mayor and Board. 21 22 I will be relatively brief, I'll try to be. In 23 addition to the regular reports, I have a resolution 24 that didn't make it to the agenda, and I apologize. I actually haven't even sent out any information, I 25

1 will do that tomorrow, regarding the fuel tank 2 replacements at the power plant. It's -- we had bid 3 The low bidder for that was Island -- where it out. 4 am I? Island Pump & Tank Corp. Total price was 216, 5 \$216,848. The bid opening was on April 1st. Again, 6 I apologize, I did not get the details of that out. They were the low bidder. They took no exceptions to 7 8 the bid, so it's a clean bid, and it's part of the 9 upgrade. It's part of the Suffolk County Department 10 of Health requirements to upgrade those tanks as 11 well. So, again, I apologize that that didn't make 12 it to the agenda, but I will get that out to you 13 tomorrow.

14 The other item I want to point out, it's been on the website for a little bit now, the MS4 report 15 16 for the period ending March 9th, 2015. It's a 17 routine annual report that we're required to file 18 with the DEC as part of our MS4 program. Again, 19 we've been filing it for years. There are no 20 surprises in the report. I will be asking for a vote 21 from this Board on -- next week, so we can get the 22 report out the 1st of June.

In terms of specific Departments, the Road
Department did put up some new fencing at Fifth and
Sixth Street Beach, a chain with some six-by-six

posts to limit the people driving onto the beach. It
 apparently was not as successful as we thought. So
 we're going to be doing more work on that as well.
 We're going to be adding.

5 We thought about fencing, but we're actually 6 going to put up bollards, essentially wooden, more six-by-six posts kind of across the front, or the 7 8 end, rather, of the road, because they -- cars will 9 just be able to go over the curb. They're going to 10 go around, they're going to jump curbs, so I'm going 11 to move it, move it all the way over and put up 12 several bollards, and we'll start working on that 13 next week.

In addition, the Road -- the Water
Department/Road Department finished the water main
extension on Adams Street, and did storm drains,
cleaned up all the storm drains.

18 The Sewer Department is still working, working 19 well. They're still well under the DEC permit 20 requirements. We did not have to go out and buy any 21 sludge to get -- jump-start the system. The nitrogen 22 levels have stabilized things. The bugs, I guess, 23 woke up when it got a little warmer, so that seems to 24 be working well, too. Sewer Department.

The Electric Department, we did our DMNC test.

1 No issues on that either. Exhaust silencer and 2 tailpipe for Unit Number 6, we did have to remove it. 3 There were some concerns about the structural 4 integrity of the exhaust at -- we did have it removed 5 and we ordered a new one. We actually found the OEM -- the original equipment manufacturer no longer 6 7 in business, but their licensing passes on to another 8 company and we found who that was. We're actually 9 getting original equipment for replacement for the silencer. And as soon as it -- it's all been 10 11 ordered. As soon as it gets in, we'll get it 12 installed.

As you all know, on April 2nd, there was a --13 Southold Substation did have a malfunction and shut 14 us down, shut most of the North Fork down out here 15 16 for about an hour or so. PSEG requested that we run 17 a unit to assist them with some voltage issues they 18 were having, which we did on our own, brought an 19 engine up on line. We ran it for a little over 13 20 So it was relatively a nonevent, although it hours. 21 could have been a lot worse.

22 For the Building Department --

23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Wait.

24 MR. PALLAS: I'm sorry, yup.

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Before you get through the

1 Electric Department, I've been reviewing my notes and 2 I know that we have the A & F situation. Have 3 they -- what's the progress on that? I know they had 4 the original overlook. We had a proposal from them 5 to fix some of the issues from the upgrade from the 6 first go-around, and I do know that there were 7 letters that were supposed to go out. There was 8 contractors that were bing contacted. Do you have an 9 update on that?

10 MR. PALLAS: The only thing that I have, that 11 we received some responses, not all of them. I will 12 be contacting them next week to see what the status 13 of the ones we have not received yet, to get an 14 update from them when we expect to receive them. 15 They were given a time limit, but I really would like 16 to hear from them before we go any further at this 17 stage. You know, if they outright refuse, then we'll 18 have to, you know, take a step back. But I really 19 would like to hear from them as to what they -- what 20 they think of the report, essentially.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So the timeline has
 past, apparently, so --

23 MR. PALLAS: Correct. But I did get -- I did 24 get responses from -- out of the letters that went 25 out, I got responses -- I got one formal response.

1 I've gotten a request for an extension for -- of a 2 week, because of some internal glitch in their mail 3 system. And I have not heard from the third. That's 4 the one I will be reaching out to get an update. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Could you keep us in 6 the loop on that a little bit. 7 MR. PALLAS: I will. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you. 9 MR. PALLAS: As soon as I have a package, I 10 will certainly sent that out to the Board. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, because I think that's 12 important, and I think some people, not only us, but other people are waiting to hear what the status is. 13 14 MR. PALLAS: Yup. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Thank you. 16 MR. PALLAS: Moving on to the Building 17 Department, you'll note that the fees we've collected 18 for April exceeds all previous Aprils since 2006, so 19 that was -- that's good. A lot of activity for the 20 Building Department. 21 The main extension on Adams Street will help 22 businesses there upgrade their fire suppression 23 systems. It's my understanding the laundromat will be on of the first to utilize the new water main for 24 25 that.

1 The Code Enforcer's report is attached. It's a 2 lot of detail. I won't go into any of the detail. It's there for you. If you have any questions on it, 3 4 certainly, let me know. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can I ask a question about 6 the fences --7 MR. PALLAS: Sure. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: -- to prevent -- fences to 8 9 prevent illegal dumping? 10 MR. PALLAS: Yes. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Those are pump stations, 12 right, those properties? MR. PALLAS: No. One of them is right here on 13 Third Street. 14 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, that's the access to Silver Lake? 16 MR. PALLAS: Correct. 17 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 19 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. The other one is on Ludlam, and I'm not sure what that -- I'm not sure what that 20 21 property is. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's -- isn't that the one 23 that's at the back of 123 Sterling? 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, it's a pump station. 25 MR. PALLAS: Yeah.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's a pump station? 2 MR. PALLAS: Is that in back of the pump 3 station? Okay. I'm sorry. 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So there was illegal dumping 5 happening and --6 MR. PALLAS: Well, one is a trespass, actually. The other one is illegal -- yeah, it's illegal 7 8 It's really the neighbor just keeps letting dumping. 9 stuff accumulate and move forward. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 0h. 10 11 MR. PALLAS: We tell him to move it, he moves 12 it, and then it slowly creeps back. So we put up a 13 fence and maybe that will --14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's just a -- I thought it 15 was a special fence to prevent --16 MR. PALLAS: No. It's just to demarc the 17 property, that's all it is, nothing --18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup, thank you. 19 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. A split rail fence, so it's 20 not obtrusive. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And speaking of railing 22 fences, Clark's Beach, I know that there's a chain --23 you know, we have the fencing that goes across there. 24 Is there any activity going on there, because over the weekend I see cars parked outside of it. 25

1 MR. PALLAS: I'm not aware of any. I can 2 certainly look into it.

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because there's four or five 4 that are parked on the side of the road. And I know 5 the gate is locked, but I do know at one point time, 6 when we had the road construction going on, that 7 there -- you know, they were putting their equipment 8 in the back there.

9 MR. PALLAS: I'll check.

10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe it's the divers that 12 go up there --

13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know.

14 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- and they park outside and 15 walk around the gate. That's what it's been in the 16 past.

17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There just seems to be one 18 car there every night, and I'm just concerned that 19 somebody's walking around, and has a tenant 20 downstairs.

Sure.

21 MR. PALLAS:

22

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's happened before.

23 MR. PALLAS: With regard to the Recreation 24 Department, the ticket office that we used for the 25 Ice Rink has been painted. I think it blends in

rather well. We're going to use that building, as I
 had mentioned, for the Tall Ships Festival.

3 We have replaced moorings. Several moorings 4 were replaced. We're basically doing this like on a 5 four-year cycle. It hadn't been done in a number of 6 The process had been wait until enough of vears. 7 them are no good and then replace them all. So we're 8 trying to do a few a year, so that over four years, 9 they were all new. Certainly, a more -- a better way to do it, I think. 10

11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: A quick question. I'm sorry, 12 going back to the Buildings. So on the Mason Ole 13 building, I know we have a number of things pending 14 legally with Joe on that building.

15 MR. PALLAS: Yeah.

16 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just -- I did point out the 17 other day that there was a danger of a stair 18 collapsing into the porch.

19 MR. PALLAS: Yes.

20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And I asked if we could 21 barricade that. I don't know if you took care of 22 that or not.

23 MR. PALLAS: I have not as yet.

24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

25 MR. PALLAS: I will, yeah.

1 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just didn't want anybody 2 entering there. Again, I know barricades don't necessarily stop people, but at least it shows our 3 4 intent at caution. 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It shows something, to be 6 sure. 7 MR. PALLAS: Absolutely, I will do that. Ι 8 apologize, I didn't get that done. 9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. Thank you. 10 MR. PALLAS: New signs on the Carousel. I 11 think they look a little better than the ones that 12 were kind of handwritten and typed up and taped up, so there are more professional signs. The Carousel 13 14 revenue was up over last year \$1700. 15 Our new Campground Manager began working in 16 April. It seems to be working out. A lot of good 17 activity at the campground as well. 18 And that's it for me. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: On Rec, this is going to be 20 in our report, too, but maybe we can just talk about 21 Has there been any progress on the shed, the it now. 22 little shed to put there, so we can get all the ladders and stuff out of the Carousel and the 23 misters? 24 MR. PALLAS: I have not -- I have not had the 25

1 opportunity to get a quote from anybody on that, but I will. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 3 4 MR. PALLAS: I will definitely do that. I 5 definitely do want that out of there. I have always 6 wanted that out of there. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: In progress, yeah. 8 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, it's a progress. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. It does look a little It does look a little 10 -- I had stopped there. 11 more -- it looks cleaner --12 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: -- than it was when I was in 13 14 there a month ago. 15 MR. PALLAS: Yup. 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And what about the misters? 17 Had we had any --18 MR. PALLAS: We're working -- we're 19 investigating the repair work. It's a lot. There's a lot of things with that whole system --20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 21 22 MR. PALLAS: -- that need to be fixed, and it's a variety of different things, and we just have to 23 find the right contractors who will do it. It's kind 24 of a unique system. 25

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 2 MR. PALLAS: It's not your typical plumber, so to speak. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, it's not like the 4 5 mister system I have at my house. 6 MR. PALLAS: Right, yeah, it's pretty intense. 7 So, yeah, basically all the way from the pump end all 8 the way to the nozzles needs to be looked at. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okav. MR. PALLAS: And there's issues with all of it. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is it possible -- is it 12 possible that the work is so large that you would need a major budget modification to do it? 13 I can't even answer that question. 14 MR. PALLAS: 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 16 MR. PALLAS: I don't even know how much we can 17 do inhouse. There's a lot of little pieces to the 18 puzzle, so we're trying to still evaluate it and all 19 that. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So is it possible that 21 it's going to take until the next meeting for us to 22 resolve this? 23 MR. PALLAS: To find out what needs to be done, 24 I can tell you that I should be able to have yes. 25 that answer by the next meeting.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, as soon as you get 3 an estimate on it, forward it to all of us so we can 4 look at that. 5 MR. PALLAS: Yes, of course. Yes. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: And something that's in the 7 budget. We don't really have to vote on it at a 8 special meeting, we could just --9 MR. PALLAS: Right. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: If you get --11 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, absolutely. If it's 12 within -- right. If it's within the budget, I'll 13 just move forward on it. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 15 MR. PALLAS: Absolutely. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. Just give us an idea 17 what we're going to be spending towards it, that's all. MR. PALLAS: Absolutely, yeah, right. 18 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes, great. Thanks. 20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have a question. Paul, I 21 was under the impression there is a storage building 22 at the Carousel right now, isn't there, a wooden 23 storage building? MR. PALLAS: It doesn't -- it's full. 24 25 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It is filled with stuff?

1 MR. PALLAS: It's actually not -- it's used as 2 It's actually an electric shed. storage. 3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It is. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, okay. MR. PALLAS: There's a lot of electric 5 6 equipment in there. TRUSTEE ROBINS: 7 Okay. 8 MR. PALLAS: So I'd prefer not to use it for 9 anymore storage than is there now. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay, okay. Because I 11 remember being in it when I was doing plays with the 12 Northeast Stage. MR. PALLAS: Yeah. 13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And it really wasn't all that 14 15 crowded. I guess it's --16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's grown. TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's filled up quite a bit? 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Since then, yeah. 19 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. And it's not only filled 20 up, but you also need clearances between the 21 equipment and anything that's -- you're really not supposed to store things directly in front of the 22 23 equipment. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. 25 MR. PALLAS: So I'd prefer to have a second

1 building.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, I'm going to ask, and 4 this is just a thought question, have we ever -- and 5 I know you and I had discussed some landscaping 6 issues around the Carousel this winter, some things 7 that came up.

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MR. PALLAS: Yes.

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Have we ever thought about 10 having just a landscaping company just deal with 11 Mitchell Park, instead of having to stretch the Road 12 Crew and the Mitchell Park Crew? Have we thought 13 about putting an RFP out to see about maintaining 14 Mitchell Park?

15 MR. PALLAS: We haven't, but some of it, I 16 think, really is just dedicating a little bit of time 17 each year, similar to, as I discussed, about the 18 moorings. I think things just get let go for too 19 long. We're trying to do some repair work now. In 20 fact, we've replaced -- in the walkway next to 21 Aldo's, we've reseeded and put soil in there, because 22 the walkway drops right off.

23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.

24 MR. PALLAS: So we've planted grass there. 25 We've removed some of the edging wood that was

1 sticking way up.

2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. MR. PALLAS: We're not sure what was there. 3 So we removed that and put in soil. We're looking to 4 5 get some of the slates that have been broken repaired and reset in time for Tall Ships. 6 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 8 MR. PALLAS: So I think a lot of it is more 9 just paying attention on an annual basis. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 11 MR. PALLAS: Once we do that, then we can 12 assess whether we need -- whether we can handle it. 13 I don't think enough time has been spent to see if we 14 know what we can and can't handle, quite frankly. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm just throwing it 16 out --17 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, and I appreciate it. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- because I see the -- you 18 19 know, the Road Crew is now dealing with water issues, 20 you know, digging ditches and putting pipes in, and 21 I'm sure there'll be more water stuff going on. I'm 22 just not sure the manpower is getting a little too 23 thin. And it would be interesting to see what the 24 cost effect would be. But I understand, you and I have talked about the broken slate that was at 25

1 Christmastime or over the winter that closed the 2 Carousel down for a day or two. So it would be 3 interesting to see. 4 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, thanks. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And possibly even adding bulk 6 landscaping services for all the parks into -- so 7 8 whatever we do at Mitchell Park, we might get a 9 better price if we have them do all the parks, 10 because we're going to talk about Fifth Street later, 11 but kind of consider it. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for Paul? 13 (No Response) 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. Treasurer Robert Brandt. 15 16 MR. BRANDT: Good evening, everyone. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good evening. 18 MR. BRANDT: Switch glasses, get prepared. And 19 since I have it right on top, the budget mod for the 20 Tall Ships encompasses a few things. We have 21 purchase orders in place for the portable toilets, 22 tent rental, production of the commercial, the third 23 payment and final for the port fee, pay the bands, 24 the monthly payment to Creative Advertising Concepts. That encompasses the bulk of that 25

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1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 2 MR. BRANDT: All right? 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is it possible to split 4 those? 5 MR. BRANDT: To split them, what do you mean by 6 that? 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, so procedural question. 8 When we vote on -- next week, when we vote on this, 9 we will vote on one resolution for all of that? 10 MR. BRANDT: Correct. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Is it possible to put 13 them into separate -- is it possible to separate out 14 things like port-o-potties from things like CAC? 15 MR. BRANDT: Why would you want to separate the 16 port-o-potties and the CAC? 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because I think they're two 18 different -- they're two -- for me, as one of the 19 five people who has to vote on this, they're two very 20 different issues. One's a necessity. One is, at 21 this point, given where we are with funding, a 22 nice-to-have. So --23 MR. BRANDT: Which one is necessary? TRUSTEE ROBERTS: CAC. 24 MR. BRANDT: Okay. And port-o-potties are not? 25

1TRUSTEE ROBERTS:I think we have to have2those.

3 MR. BRANDT: Okay.

4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right?

5 MR. BRANDT: I would think so. I would think so. 6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, CAC is doing the 7 advertising for the event.

8

MR. BRANDT: Right.

9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And this is the key time. I 10 mean, this is when the ads are actually starting now, 11 the next four to five weeks. So this is when they're 12 supposed to earn their money, to be honest with you, 13 I mean. so.

14 MR. BRANDT: This is part and parcel of doing this kind of event, these -- and we've isolated --15 16 you know, everybody's aware of the different factions 17 that come together to do this. So, as we -- as they'd be coming up, the expenses, because it bridges 18 19 two fiscal years, instead of doing one big budget mod for the whole event. I said I would do this fiscal 20 21 year, and then we'll do the balance of it next month 22 to finish out the thing. But we know the costs 23 involved and all the necessary ancillary things like 24 port-o-potties. I mean, that's got to happen. The commercials have to be done, the advertising has to 25

1 be done. I mean, these are necessary to make this 2 Tall Ships event happen and be successful, so. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is there a ship contract in 4 there? 5 MR. BRANDT: There is not. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. 8 MR. BRANDT: There is not. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All right. Thanks. 10 MR. BRANDT: All right. Back to these glasses. 11 The yearend is upon us. You'll see there's a couple 12 of budget mods for yearend housekeeping. I do want to point out that the utilities all fit on one page. 13 14 This ongoing project, keeping everybody on point with their budgets, has worked out beautifully. And I do 15 16 need to publicly thank two staff members outside the 17 Treasurer's Department, Deputy Clerk Jeanmarie Oddon 18 and Engineering Aide Derryl Baumer. They have been 19 terrific on keeping everybody on point with their 20 budgets. And you see the result of that, the budget 21 mod is quite small, these hear. 22 I have a couple of capital projects. Pau1 23 spoke about the two fences, Ludlam and Third Street. Talked about the Tall Ships. 24

25 We have a budget mod in here for temporary

1 part-time staffing. We want to extend our -- Joe 2 O'Byrne's stay with us. We find that we need help in 3 the Building Department. We have a shortage in the 4 Treasury Department right now, staff shortage, and 5 there's special projects coming up in the Clerk's 6 Office that need attention, so we're asking to extend 7 his stay with us. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry. Joe has to do all 9 three? 10 MR. BRANDT: Yes. He's part time, and as we 11 need him --12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Split his time in all three? 13 MR. BRANDT: Yes. correct. 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right now, he's not 15 full-time, but all of his time with us is with the 16 Clerk's Office, right? 17 MR. BRANDT: Not true at all. He's helped in 18 the Building Department, he's helped up at the 19 Treasurer's Department. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 21 MR. BRANDT: All right. The fact that he sits 22 downstairs most of the time doesn't mean that's the work he's doing. That's the available desk for him 23

- to work at.
- 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

MR. BRANDT: All right? But, no. We've been
 sharing resources. He's great. We've been using him
 everywhere we can.

4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. I understood from Paul 5 that there was going to be -- somehow, that we're 6 putting more resources against Building Department 7 staff, specifically Rental Permit Law; did I 8 understand that correctly?

9 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, we will be. It's not ramped 10 up yet, but we will be. Derryl is going to be -- as 11 I mentioned, Derryl Baumer is going to be helping 12 with the database, which is the key to this. We're 13 getting that process started shortly.

14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So this is not related to 15 that?

16 MR. PALLAS: No, it's not a -- no.

17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

MR. PALLAS: No, not related to Rental Law. 18 19 MR. BRANDT: Okay. The last resolution I have 20 concerns the cafeteria plan. This is a plan that we 21 have to put in place based on the CSEA contract that 22 allows the employees to pay their medical share. It 23 is pretaxed, so we had to have this plan in place. I need to have it executed, so I'm asking that you 24 authorize me to sign it, so that we could get it out. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But before you finish the 3 budget mods, there's one that you didn't mention. 4 MR. BRANDT: Did I skip one? 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The funding of the Village 6 road pavings. MR. BRANDT: Oh, I skipped over that one. Yes. 7 8 Question? 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: It looks like a lot, but it's 10 not. 11 MR. BRANDT: All right. I'm going to explain 12 these. MAYOR HUBBARD: 13 Go ahead. MR. BRANDT: What we're doing is amending the 14 15 budget, so we're increasing the revenue and the 16 expense accordingly and that's \$250,000. That's over 17 the cost of the estimate that we have, but there's 18 always overages, okay? We record capital 19 expenditures in the Capital Fund. In order to move 20 it, I have to go through this -- these motions. So 21 we're increasing it, and then we're moving it as an 22 expense line over, and the revenue is received in the 23 capital. 24 So the way these reports come out, everybody goes, "It's a million dollars." It's not, it's 25

1 \$250,000. It's just the way I have to record it. 2 It's standard accounting for municipal --3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we have \$250,000 that we 4 need moved over to start roadwork? MR. BRANDT: Correct. 5 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: When? 7 MR. PALLAS: That should be starting in June, 8 four roads. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In June? MR. PALLAS: Yes. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: He said June 1st is when 12 they're supposed to start, so. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just was, you 13 14 know --15 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're on a schedule and we're 16 scheduled for that. I mean, if there are any 17 changes, I'll let everybody know. But as far as we 18 know, we're expecting them to be down there June 1st. 19 MR. BRANDT: Right. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This is the four roads in 20 21 West Dublin? 22 MR. BRANDT: Three. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Three roads, yeah. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Three roads? 24 25 MR. BRANDT: Yeah.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Two blocks of each one, and 2 Central Avenue. I believe it was \$236,000. 3 Yes, that's correct. MR. BRANDT: 4 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, yes. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Somewhere around there. 6 MR. PALLAS: Somewhere around there, yeah. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And, Paul, are we at some 9 point going to be looking for a long-term plan in 10 dealing with all the roads or --11 I'm going to be reaching out MR. PALLAS: Yes. 12 and getting some -- sorry. I'm going to be reaching out and getting some quotes for engineering analysis 13 of the roads. Hopefully, I'll have that ready for 14 15 the next meeting. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. I would 17 be interested in seeing that. It needs to be done. 18 MR. PALLAS: Yup. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do we have to put a bid out for that? 20 21 MR. PALLAS: It's professional services, so 22 it's not really a formal bid, and the value is 23 relatively low. My guess is somewhere in the range of \$10,000 to do the -- to do the analysis. So it's 24 a relatively small amount. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: And we -- I discussed that with 2 I would rather -- I was hoping we could do it Paul. 3 without going out to get somebody, but have the 4 overall look at drainage, and curbs, and the other 5 stuff. These are the roads that we picked out 6 earlier, the ones we new knew were bad, just to give 7 a priority to the other roads. It gives a better 8 picture of long-range.

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TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Because we all know which roads 11 are bad, but then this just makes it -- it's in 12 writing, and then we'll try to go from there.

13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I also think it gives 14 us an opportunity to combine the Sewer and the Water, 15 and some things that they may discover need to be 16 replaced in other departments than just the road.

17MR. PALLAS: Typically, they just look --18TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

MR. PALLAS: Typically, they just look at the
 road infrastructure, but it would include street
 drainage --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

23 MR. PALLAS: -- as opposed to sewer. And it's 24 a curb -- actually, sidewalk-to-sidewalk look. It 25 will identify sidewalk curb, road infrastructure.

1 They will -- it will identify, you know, any drainage 2 issues that might need to be done, and then you'll go 3 through -- once we identify the roads, then we get a 4 design, formal design of the actual road 5 reconstruction.

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And then we could 7 break it up. So that I'm assuming at some point we 8 may have to -- we're not going to be doing all pay as 9 we go on some of this. I think we'll have to -- will 10 we have to be bonding out for some of it?

MR. PALLAS: That's going to be up to you all.
I mean, that's --

Okay. Just, you know --13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 14 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. You know, it depends on how 15 quickly you want things done, what kind of progress, 16 how much you want to get done on an annual basis. 17 You know, once we -- the study will also give us, you 18 know, like a very high level budget look --19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I wanted to 20 know. 21 MR. PALLAS: -- and what the cost to do it, so 22 you could make that decision. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I wanted to

24 know.

25 MR. PALLAS: Yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. Thank
 you.
 MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So is it conceivable that
 before September, we could, if we decide to go this

6 route, be making a decision to go for a big bond and 7 fix, you know, 10%, 20% of the Village over the next 8 "X" years?

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MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

10TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just trying to get a sense of11time frame.

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, we'll look at this. 13 We'll analyze the whole thing and see what it is. We 14 plan on doing some curbs and sidewalk now in 15 preparation of paving some of those roads --

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- because there are some that 18 we had started a couple of years ago. We're going to 19 look at finishing those up and get that work done 20 before we try to do more paving in the Fall. 21 Normally, in October we do more paving, but we should 22 have this by the August meeting, have something 23 together to know if we're going to do just another 24 burst, or if we're going to try to --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 25 Sure.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- go longer with it. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. I'm hoping we're going 3 to think long term versus Band-aids. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I mean, if you look at 5 the capital plan, it's got five years worth of paving 6 on there. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: But, you know, so, I mean, 9 that's the intention. But, I mean, if we want to 10 bond and do more all at once this year, you know, 11 we'll have that information. 12 MR. PROKOP: The way --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You have -- go ahead, sir. 13 14 MR. PROKOP: Excuse me. The way to plan that 15 out is to try to match up bond payments with CHIPS 16 reimbursement. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 17 Correct. 18 MR. PROKOP: Because, if you do it over in phases, you'll get CHIPS -- you'll receive CHIPS 19 20 reimbursement for the prior year as you move through 21 it, and that it will reduce your bond payment 22 liability. CHIPS is Consolidated Highway Improvement 23 Program. 24 MR. BRANDT: Okay. One last thing. MAYOR HUBBARD: 25 Yeah.

MR. BRANDT: And thank you, Gentlemen, for
 helping me with my report.

3 The utility billing, I do want to point out 4 that the sewer and water re-levy was down 5 significantly this year. And I want to again make a 6 shout out to Clerk Kathy Berezny and Utility Biller 7 Monique Summers. The two of them as a team have been 8 tremendous in getting these outstanding debts paid 9 down immediately. So this was a shocking number. 10 I'm very impressed with this, so I just wanted to thank them publicly. 11

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. One topic on that 13 I had somebody approach me this morning at subiect. 14 our tree thing. I know it's good to send the notices 15 out, tell people if you're in arrears and trying to 16 get them to pay it really quickly, but I've heard it 17 half a dozen times now that people got the letters in 18 the mail and it says 30 days, overdue zero, 60 days, 19 overdue zero, there's no balance overdue. So before they stuff the envelopes, if they could --20

21 MR. BRANDT: Ah, so we'll check it. Okay. 22 I'll double-check on that.

MAYOR HUBBARD: We talked about that last monthand then another batch came out.

25 MR. BRANDT: Yes. And I addressed that, so,

1 apparently, that still went out. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 3 MR. BRANDT: Okay. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Just to let --5 before we spend the postage on it and everything 6 else, you make sure. 7 MR. BRANDT: You got it. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a computer glitch 9 somewhere that's just putting out zero balances, but we're sending a letter out. 10 11 MR. BRANDT: Is it the same people? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, this is somebody completely different. 13 14 MR. BRANDT: Okay. That would have been nice 15 if it was the same people, they could just isolate it. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. No, it's not the same 17 person. 18 MR. BRANDT: All right. 19 (Laughter) 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Two things, Robert. 21 MR. BRANDT: Yes. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I've also heard from people 23 who -- a couple of people who pay their bill almost -- pay their bill on time all the time, and 24 then one time they miss, and then they get what seems 25

1 like sort of DEFCON 5 mailing from us saying, "We're 2 going to turn you off in 30 days." 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's been changed. 4 MR. BRANDT: Yeah, that has been changed. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's been changed. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You sure? 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, because Stephen -- no. 8 Stephen mentioned it to me, because I said something 9 to him, how the letter was a little to terse. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I do know that he 12 changed it. Now, it may be in the cycle. MR. BRANDT: Yeah. I don't know if it's --13 14 yeah. 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, that's with the next 16 cycle? 17 MR. BRANDT: It might be in the upcoming cycle, 18 which we just started on, so. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, okay. And then the 20 other thing is we've talked -- we've kicked around, 21 various ones of us, about online billing. Have we 22 done any research or --23 MR. BRANDT: Yes, online billing. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I know there are costs 24 25 associated, so.

MR. BRANDT: Yeah, there's major costs
 associated. And I just had a meeting with our
 merchant services a week-and-a-half ago about this,
 more the online paying of the bill.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

5

6 MR. BRANDT: That -- setting that up. First of all, the initial setup is still costly. There's a 7 8 monthly fee associated with that, because there's a 9 portal that links our website to the company that 10 we're using, and that they take a percentage. The costs add up quite quickly, all right? Now we're 11 12 still looking into other venues for that, okay? But the initial inspection of these services, they were 13 14 just too cost prohibitive.

15 The other thing, and this hit home when I was 16 looking at the webinars on these, on some of these 17 programs, they're difficult to navigate. Now I use a 18 computer every day and I was struggling with some of 19 these, and I'm going, this is not a simple process. 20 So, yes, people -- and I pay all my bills online. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

MR. BRANDT: I found them very convoluted, very confusing how to navigate. So now there would be a learning curve on top of that. So I don't how cost effective it would be for the 5 or 10% that would

1 want to pay their bills online with -- you know, 2 because a lot of people get frustrated with the 3 process of trying to do it. So I'm hoping some of 4 the --5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How it do you know it's 5 or 10%? 6 MR. BRANDT: I'm making a stab out there, because most of my -- most of my friends don't pay 7 8 their bills online. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. 10 MR. BRANDT: They still write checks, okay? 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. 12 MR. BRANDT: There's a handful of my friends 13 that are my age that use -- do everything online. 14 We're still investigating. Hopefully, the 15 interfaces have gotten simpler. Then we'll see what 16 comes up and I'll keep you in the loop on that. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 18 MR. BRANDT: It's not a bad thing, but, again, 19 there are initial charges, and then there's the 20 charge for each time we take -- you know, they pay 21 online. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What are we talking about? 23 What is --MR. BRANDT: An additional 2% would be on top 24 of the bill. 25

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we owe the company 2% each 2 time? 3 MR. BRANDT: That's how -- that's a standard 4 setup for these things, yes. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And what is the initial 6 setup? 7 MR. BRANDT: The last time we checked, it was 8 like between 20 and 23,000 to get it setup. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Wow. 10 MR. BRANDT: That's significant. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For a little village like us, 12 veah. 13 MR. BRANDT: Now that, again, that's 14 significant. I did ask our merchant service 15 representative to investigate some other companies 16 and get back to me and see if we could find something 17 cheaper. She said they're all still hovering up in 18 that range. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the math would have to be, 20 if we think we can increase payment from people by 21 more than what we'd spend right, because more 22 people -- I would hope more people would then pay on 23 time, because they're used to Verizon and --24 MR. BRANDT: Well, again, look at how many bills we're sending out a month. We're looking at 25

1 roughly a thousand, eleven hundred bills, okay? 2 Would the offset for the convenience of that, is it 3 going to be worth it for the dollars? It's not like 4 we're mailing out, you know, 100,000 bills or 10,000 5 bills every month. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. 8 MR. BRANDT: And then, you know, 10% of them 9 want to use the online. Then, oh, okay, it 10 becomes -- it then becomes cost effective. But it's a small village. There's, you know, 11 or 1200 bills 11 12 that go out a month. 13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What about the person hours 14 required to -- I don't know if we're licking 15 envelopes. I don't know what the process looks like. 16 MR. BRANDT: We had a machine that does the

17 folding and stuffing for us.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

19 MR. BRANDT: And, yes, it does do the licking 20 I had to think about that for a second. as well. So 21 that -- you know, by purchasing that machine a few 22 years ago, that sped up that process. You still have 23 to, you know, navigate the software that we use for 24 the billing system. And then you're -- now you're going to add another level to have to manage that, 25

because there's going to be the back end. We have to
 manage our end of that.

3

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Uh-huh.

4 MR. BRANDT: Okay? We have to train people, or 5 have them, you know, have good support from these 6 companies to use the software. And, as I said, it 7 wasn't -- it wasn't anything I was comfortable with. 8 I found it very difficult to navigate. Stephen, my 9 Deputy, who's a computer whiz, and gets everything right out the gate, yeah, it's a little bit -- it's a 10 11 little bit tough.

12

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

MR. BRANDT: So, again, we spoke with her.
Again, it was just about a week, week-and-a-half ago.
We spoke to her and she's going to present some other
companies that we should investigate that she has
familiarity with.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes. Is there any company 19 out there that will not maybe do a whole online 20 billing solution, but, rather, allow somebody to put 21 a credit card in there so we can bill them 22 automatically?

23 MR. BRANDT: It's still the same process, still 24 the same setup. We still need that interface, that 25 portal.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There's no more simple 2 solution?

3 MR. BRANDT: That we found, no. We have 4 looked, though, to be honest. We have been -- this 5 is -- we've been looking for the past three years at 6 this possibility. Again, the big offset is the 7 initial cost, and the fact that how many people are 8 going to use it. Is that cost -- does it become cost 9 effective, or are we just catering to 10% of the 10 population?

11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, I would think all the 12 second homeowners would be the strong market for 13 this.

14 MR. BRANDT: Possibly, possibly.

15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because they live --

16 MR. BRANDT: They might still want to -- you 17 know, as I said, most people -- I'm 55. Most of my friends still write checks. We're all computer 18 19 savvy, but some people just prefer to pay their bills 20 that way. So I don't know -- again, I don't know how 21 many people are going to use the service, so I don't 22 want to come to the Board and say, "I've got a budget 23 mod." We're going to spend \$23,000 to put this 24 software in place, and then it's going to cost us an additional monthly service fee, and, oh, you know, 10 25

1 people are using it, or 45 people are using it. It's -- you know, that has to be looked at, and I don't 2 3 know how to answer that question. 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Perhaps our Internet 5 Committee could be an option to do some market 6 research at some point, but okay. Thank you. MR. BRANDT: 7 Okay. Any other questions? 8 (No Response) 9 MR. BRANDT: All right. Thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: 10 Okay. Thank you, Robert. 11 MR. BRANDT: Give me a second, Syl. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: The Village Clerk, Sylvia Pirillo. 13 14 CLERK PIRILLO: Good evening, Ladies and 15 Gentlemen. 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good evening. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sylvia. 18 CLERK PIRILLO: I usually go backwards. So I 19 circulated an additional set of resolutions. It 20 happens that sometimes the timing is not conducive, 21 but there are certain resolutions that we need to get 22 on, so that we don't wait a month. 23 Going on to bids and RFPs, and the Carousel 24 rounding board, there was a second set of meetings regarding judging, if you will, of respondents, and I 25

1 will be work together with Trustee Roberts and other 2 members on the committee to let people know who were 3 not chosen for the job. And we are developing 4 criteria. We are refining criteria to let people 5 know about the selection process. It's a little bit 6 -- sorry. It's a little bit subjective, because it 7 is judging, because it is artwork, but the committee 8 seems to feel responsibility, which is a good thing, 9 to let respondents know who weren't chosen why they 10 weren't chosen. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we having an Executive 12 Session after this? MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't believe so. It's not 13 14 scheduled. 15 MR. PROKOP: If it's something you needed, 16 but --17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. There's an issue with 18 this that I need some -- I mean, I could maybe just 19 talk, if that's okay with you. 20 MR. PROKOP: Whatever you'd like. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But I want it to be fair and 22 right, so maybe the three of us can just --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 23 Uh-huh. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I didn't -- it was not scheduled. 25

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's not a major issue, but I 2 just wanted --3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. We'll get a 4 clarification and advice from the lawyer would be the 5 best way, then. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm new at this, so. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's fine. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That would be a very good 9 suggestion, that you, and Joe, and Sylvia discuss 10 that topic. If you perhaps would like me to weigh in 11 on it --12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, please. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- please, just include me, 14 as I have a fair amount of background of some of the 15 issues, okay? 16 MR. PROKOP: I also plan on being at Village 17 Hall tomorrow morning. I'm normally there on Friday 18 morning, so if we don't do it tonight --19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We can hang for five minutes, 20 we might get it done. 21 MR. PROKOP: It's up to you, whatever you want. 22 I don't have to rush out. CLERK PIRILLO: The bid for the removal and 23 24 pruning of trees was opened. This is a resolution I'll be asking for. I'll be asking to accept the bid 25

1 of Johnson Tree Company, which was the lowest 2 responsible bidder. And per John Quinlan, we've used them before, and they worked well for us. That was 3 4 the lowest bid. So we'll be asking for that as well. 5 Under employment, the Fire Department, I will be meeting briefly with Chief Breese tomorrow morning 6 7 to provide to him the responding resumes or 8 applications for their ad. Today was the last day. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: For the Administrative Assistant? 10 11 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. CLERK PIRILLO: 13 Today was the last day --14 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. 15 CLERK PIRILLO: -- to respond. Not to beat a 16 dead horse, but going back to Tall Ships, I just 17 wanted to, please, let everyone know that we are 18 looking for volunteers, and we are looking for 19 volunteers for each day. It is actually a very fun 20 time to be there. I was there myself for the entire 21 time for the last event. So I just wanted to put 22 that out there. 23 We had mandatory training classes for all 24 employees. For anyone who missed it, online classes are available, and Jeanmarie can help get you online 25

1 so that you can get the training that you need.

2 Cathy Matthews will be leaving us as Recreation Program Director. Today was actually her last day, 3 4 because we don't have a program tomorrow. So Paul 5 and I just wanted to thank her for her work. She was 6 instrumental in taking the program to a different 7 level and doing it in a very efficient way, so we 8 wanted to thank her for that.

9

MR. PALLAS: Absolutely.

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We could put that on the 11 announcements for the regular meeting and I'll 12 announce that at the public meeting so everybody sees 13 that.

14 CLERK PIRILLO: Will do. Thank you.

15 Back to customer service, which is really a 16 very broad scope, some of it, I kept it on the agenda 17 because it's an ongoing process. The website we have 18 made strides with. This month we have a "What's New" 19 section. We have photos that pertain to work being 20 done. We have photos that pertain to the press 21 release, to things that are happening. We almost 22 have an automated banner that gives us photos or 23 information that's running across the page. We're 24 happy about that. The informations sheets have not been finalized yet, they're still a work in progress, 25

1 and as is the customer billing that Robert and I 2 discuss with our staffs on a regular basis. 3 We also wanted to add that we will be having 4 the capability to accept Discover Card in the office 5 shortly as one of our credit cards. 6 MR. BRANDT: Thanks. 7 CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome. Any questions? 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Just on the credit cards, have 9 you gotten a price on updating to the new machines 10 with the chip? 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah 12 MR. BRANDT: That's mandatory, and merchant 13 service is supposed to provide them to us. 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. And I think -- yeah. 15 MR. BRANDT: It's mandatory, so the onus is on 16 them. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 18 MR. BRANDT: Okay? That was part of the 19 meeting from other the day. That's just going to 20 We have to have it done before October. happen. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's my understanding, if 22 you have a point-of-sale service credit card machine, 23 that you have to go back to the company to get the 24 upgrade to the program. But from my understanding from my own machine, the bank is providing that 25

1 update.

2	MAYOR HUBBARD: That depends on who you're
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I know
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: who's your current dealer.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. Okay.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Some say you'll get a discount
7	for \$200, other ones are charging \$800. So I wanted
8	to know where we stood with that, just so we're
9	not
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, ours is with do we
11	have a credit card in two different banks or just
12	one?
13	MR. BRANDT: I can't hear you.
14	CLERK PIRILLO: A credit card in two different
15	banks or just one?
16	MR. BRANDT: No, just one bank.
17	CLERK PIRILLO: Just one.
18	MR. BRANDT: And because of the vastness of
19	what we use them, it covers you know, they're
20	going to swap the machines out.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's great.
22	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay.
23	MR. BRANDT: As part of this.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. Okay. Anything else for
25	the Clerk, any questions?

1 CLERK PIRILLO: Any questions? 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just want to say, the stuff we're doing on the website is great, so let's keep it up. 3 4 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 6 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you, appreciate it. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. 8 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Our next report is from Village 10 Attorney. 11 MR. PROKOP: Do you mind if I sit here? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's fine. Just use the 13 microphone so everybody can hear you. MR. PROKOP: I first want to apologize for 14 15 being late. I spent a good part of the day in 16 Riverhead for the Village, and I had an obligation to 17 appear in court. 18 AUDIENCE MEMBER: We can't hear. 19 MR. PALLAS: Microphone. Joe, mic. AUDIENCE MEMBER: 20 We can't hear. 21 MR. PROKOP: Thank you. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I made them make sure 23 they stretched the cords, so we won't have anymore --24 is it working? 25 MR. PROKOP: Yes, thank you. Okay. So with

1 respect to that, there are three properties that I'd 2 like to bring to your attention, the work that I'm 3 working on. The first of those is 131 Third Street, 4 which is the former Meson Ole building. The Board --5 we've been working on this property for several 6 months, trying to update compliance from the owners. 7 There are periods of time over that time there has 8 been compliance, then no compliance, and the problems 9 at the building grew.

We made a court application at the beginning of May and for an order from the court directing the Village to address safety issues at the building, and Fire Code and other violations that are fairly serious.

15 I appeared in Supreme Court today in Riverhead 16 before justice Andrew Tarantino, and the Judge 17 received the application favorably, granted an order 18 directing the Village to take care of those issues. 19 And, basically, it's to take care of the -- repair 20 right a way the safety issues in the building and 21 structural issues, and then also address and correct 22 the Fire Code and other violations that are a hazard 23 to that building, the public, and the surrounding 24 buildings.

25

And the Judge also directed, since I know this

is foremost in your mind, the Judge also directed
that the Village will recover our costs. I have to
make a list of those costs for the Judge to sign off
on and present them to the Judge, but that's also
part of the order. The Village has this order in
PDF, or I can give you a copy tonight, whichever,
whichever you prefer to look at.

8 This will -- I'm going to talk about two other 9 properties. This will basically become the model 10 or -- you know, the pro forma order that we're going 11 to use moving ahead now. It was derived out of work 12 with myself and Eileen Wingate, and also Ed Ward, 13 both of whom were present in court today.

14 The Judge told me at about 10 o'clock that he 15 wanted testimony from our Code Enforcement Officer, 16 and also our Building Inspector. I asked them to 17 come to court; they appeared in court. But after 18 reading the papers, getting ready for the hearing, 19 the Judge decided that he did not need testimony and 20 went ahead and signed the order and that was taken 21 care of.

The next property on the list -MAYOR HUBBARD: Just to -MR. PROKOP: Excuse me.
MAYOR HUBBARD: Just to clarify on that, Paul

1 is going to be working on getting prices for us for the work that needs to be done down there, so we have 2 3 an idea what it's going to be. Before we go forward, 4 he's going to get some price quotes to the --5 whatever needs to be done, he's going to get us price 6 quotes, and we'll see that before we go ahead and do it. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And who's reimbursing us? 8 MR. PROKOP: It will be a lien on the property, 9 and then the bank. The bank and/or the new owner, if 10 there is one, but, in the meantime, it will be the 11 bank 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Holding or something? MR. PROKOP: 13 Pardon? 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: The company, the bank. 15 MR. PROKOP: The bank is Bay View Funding. 16 They were also named in the litigation. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, it is Bay View funding? 18 MR. PROKOP: Yeah, they're aware of it. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. So this is going 20 on the tax bill, or this going to be a separate lien? 21 MR. PROKOP: It's going to go on the tax bill. 22 If we have time, we're going to amend the bill and --23 excuse me, I'm sorry. If we have time and the work 24 is done soon enough and we generate the bill, it will go on an amended tax bill for the bill that's 25

currently outstanding. Otherwise, it will go on as a
lien on the property, so we're protected, and it will
appear on the -- it will appear as a bill this year,
but it will be added, if it's not paid, to the bill
of June of 2016, plus interest. There's interest, I
think it's 12% interest that accrues on this bill
that's pending. Did that answer your question?

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that's part of it. 9 Just out of curiosity, are they in default of Suffolk 10 County taxes, too?

MR. PROKOP: Meson Ole? You know, I don't
know, I'm sorry. Meson Ole, I could find out. I
don't know.

14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh. You know, we have two 15 sets of property taxes, so the County can be rather 16 swift when it wants to do something, so.

17 MR. PROKOP: Right. So that's a commercial 18 property, so the County, the County taking that 19 property, they would start the sale process the 20 second year of nonpayment. It takes about two years 21 to complete that process. So, you know, we could 22 find out in the meantime.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think we should have
that information. Regardless of how we deal with
things, we should have the information.

1 MR. PROKOP: Okay. So, normally, you know what 2 I do, is every time I've been doing one of these, I 3 just do a title search, because we have to make sure 4 that we name the correct owner. So, in the meantime, 5 now I'll add on a tax search so we can get that 6 information.

7

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.

8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is there a scenario where if 9 these people disappear, where the Village can take 10 over the property during this?

11 MR. PROKOP: Okay. We can -- we can foreclose 12 the lien, but it would be an execution of a judgment. 13 It wouldn't be a tax sale, the way that the County 14 has tax sales, but it would be -- oh, no. I'm sorry, 15 excuse me. We're one of the few Villages that still 16 does tax sales. I apologize.

17

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.

So tax sales were eliminated 18 MR. PROKOP: Yes. 19 in 1984, except the villages which were doing tax 20 sales as of 1984 could elect to continue doing tax 21 sales. The Village of Greenport was doing tax sales 22 as of 1984 and elected to keep doing them, so we're 23 one of the few villages that still does tax sales, which is great, because we more or less get all of 24 our taxes every year when we sell the liens. 25

1 So, actually, what will happen is this -- if 2 this is not paid by May of 2016, it will go on sale 3 for -- it will be a tax lien that will be auctioned 4 off at that time with the rest of our liens. And if 5 nobody buys it, we can foreclose the lien on the 6 property. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Or are you talking about 8 eminent domain? 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, I'm just asking. MR. PROKOP: Eminent domain? 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. 12 MR. PROKOP: Okay. Eminent domain, which is more commonly known as condemnation, but it's not 13 14 real condemnation, eminent domain is taking for a 15 public purpose, so we would have to have a public 16 purpose to take the domain. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Like the YMCA? 17 18 MR. PROKOP: Like the YMCA. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Too small, probably, but 20 public housing? 21 MR. PROKOP: Yes. Yes, anything that's 22 municipal, you know, municipal or public related. 23 There was a case in New London. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm talking 24 25 about.

1 It's a Federal -- it's a United MR. PROKOP: 2 States Supreme Court case that was fairly recent a 3 couple of years ago where the Court decided that a 4 municipality can use it's eminent domain powers to 5 take a property and then turn it over for private 6 use, okay? So what happened in New London, 7 Connecticut is that the Town of New London or City, 8 I'm sorry, City, whatever it is, took property and 9 then turned it over for private housing and other 10 development, and that was -- that was approved by the 11 Court, so that's another option.

12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If it serves a public good,
13 we can potentially get a court to approve it?
14 MR. PROKOP: Yes.

15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This is a many-years-long
 16 process, I'm guessing.

17 MR. PROKOP: No. The actual title to the 18 property takes only a year or less. To get the title 19 to the property is one year or less. The thing that 20 takes a couple of years is to determine the value of 21 the property. So, if there's a disagreement over the 22 amount that the Village offers than the owner thinks 23 it's worth, that could go on for several years. But 24 you're actually getting the title to the property fairly quick. 25

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So just for curiosity sake,
 what's our next step if we wanted to do something
 like eminent domain?

4 MR. PROKOP: Okay. If you want to do an 5 eminent domain process on any property, the first thing that you have to do is to have a public hearing 6 7 on two things. One is whether or not there's a 8 public purpose of the taking, and the second thing is 9 the environmental, potential environmental impact of the taking. 10 So you have to have a public hearing on 11 that. There's a prescripted -- prescribed 12 notification period that's statutory, and you have 13 your public hearing. Within 90 days after the public 14 hearing, we have to adopt findings determining that 15 whether or not there was a public purpose, and also 16 whether there's a potential for an impact on the 17 environment. If those -- once you clear that, you 18 then file a petition in court, an eminent domain 19 petition. Shortly after the petition is filed, you 20 acquire title to the property, and then you fight 21 over -- if necessary, you fight over the value. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks.

23 MR. PROKOP: Okay. The next -- so the next --24 now that we have Meson Ole done, the next property on 25 this list is 229 Third Street, which is the property

1 across the street from Village Hall. There are -- in 2 addition to the visual disturbance, there are some 3 safety concerns because of the kinds of things that 4 are in the yard, basically, so it's something that 5 has to be taken care of right of away. It's another 6 situation where we've worked -- we've tried to work 7 with the property owner. There was some progress 8 initially and then everything just stopped. The 9 weather -- the weather precluded us from doing 10 anything in court for several months, and now we're 11 She was -- she did receive a set with that. 12 court-appointed attorney. The court-appointed 13 attorney promised the Village and the court that 14 progress would be made and there has not been any 15 progress, and now we're talking care of that also. 16 And now the third property is 415 Kaplan I don't know if that was discussed before --17 Avenue. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, not yet. 19 MR. PROKOP: -- I came. So I don't know if you

20 want --

21

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah

22 MR. PROKOP: Okay. So I reached out to the 23 bank and didn't hear back. So I wanted to say I did 24 leave messages for the woman that's handling this for 25 the bank, but I don't have anything to report from

the bank as far as potential for a change in status.
However, the CEO of the bank told me the last time we
spoke, which was fairly recently, that the bank was
not going to do anything to help the situation
further.

6 We do have a -- we have taken some steps. We do have a proposed contract from a contractor to 7 8 demolish that house and do abatement, some -- there 9 is some minor, what's called abatement that's 10 required and we have that proposed contract. The 11 choice that the Village has is whether to contract 12 with the contractor and advance the money to have 13 this taken care of and put a lien on the property, 14 the same way we are with the Meson Ole, except Meson 15 Ole is a court-ordered lien. So option one is to 16 advance the money under the contract and put a lien 17 on the property.

In the case of 415 Kaplan Avenue, the lien should be created soon enough that we can issue an amended tax bill, because we're still in the tax billing period.

22 Option B for 415 Kaplan Avenue would be to go 23 to court and get the same kind of order that we got 24 for Meson Ole, and I would expect that that would 25 take a few weeks. You know, unfortunately, I can't

1 I mean, I might be sitting here several predict. 2 months from now reporting that we're still waiting, 3 because the court's are fairly uncertain. That's the 4 problem. Meson Ole we really lucked out and we had a 5 Judge who was responsive and, you know -- but, you 6 know, with 415 Kaplan Avenue, if we went to court, it 7 should take a few weeks or less, it could be right 8 away even, to get a court order. So that's the 9 choice.

10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What's the difference? What 11 are the implications of each? Sorry, court order 12 versus just doing it, what's the --

13 MR. PROKOP: Just doing it is -- you know, 14 you're always subject to challenge, so -- and 15 contest. So one of the things that could happen is 16 we could go ahead and do it and put a lien on the 17 property and that process might be appealed or 18 challenged.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Which means that we'd have to
win that appeal before we'd get our money.

21 MR. PROKOP: Yes. And I'm not -- it's not --22 you know, I'm just letting you know that that could 23 happen, you know. When it's court ordered, then, you 24 know, we're doing it at the direction of the court 25 and we have to have extra layer -- extra layer of

1 protection.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But couldn't they also
challenge -- couldn't they also appeal the decision
of that court?

5 MR. PROKOP: Yes, but it could be much less 6 like -- we would close down the window of 7 probability, you know, possibility of exposure to 8 that challenge from, you know, maybe 10% or so to 1% 9 or zero.

10 Okay. Well, the contract that MAYOR HUBBARD: 11 we have written up that we've discussed over the past 12 couple of weeks. I was hoping that we'd be able to 13 get approval to try to sign that this evening. Ι 14 think everybody saw that, we discussed it. The 15 contractor is ready to go with it. If we pass the 16 resolution that Joe had written up that everybody 17 saw, they were going to start -- excuse me --18 prepping the property tomorrow and they should have 19 it done by Tuesday, Tuesday to Wednesday, was the 20 scope of where we were going to go with that.

I know there was questions about the payment, the amount of money, and everything else. She had received the \$17,500, that she was paying that portion of it. The other part, the \$28,800 is -would be our portion of it that we would be paying if

we condemn the building, but we already condemned the building. If she doesn't get it taken care of, we're going to have to take care of the whole thing. We were trying to work with her, with her using the money that she had for part of it. The total price was 46,300.

It is a question that will be going -- we're trying to but it onto the tax bill. According to the code that Joe sent me, once the work is done, you have to vote on it. Minimum of seven days after the work is done and we have the bill, to go and put it onto the tax lien.

13MR. PROKOP: Right. I mean, we should be --14MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. So --

MR. PROKOP: We should be okay, you know.
MAYOR HUBBARD: We still would be okay? I
mean, if they go and get the work done by mid next
week, it's taken care of --

19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We can vote on it next week? 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah -- I mean, yes. I was 21 hoping we could do that, because the contractor is 22 ready to go and notify the Department of Labor, start 23 all the asbestos paperwork and everything. He'll do 24 that tomorrow morning once he has a signed contract. 25 The contractor doesn't want to be liable for the

\$2,000 of the Department of Labor and starting the process, because once it starts, you can't stop it.

1

2

3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah, i would assume so. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: So, I mean, in the public 5 interest and public safety, and everything else, we're going through this, working out the deal 6 7 between the contractor, you know, Joe and the home 8 I thought this was the best way to go, owner. 9 because we'll get the building taken down. It will 10 be down before the end of next week, it's gone. And she's already told us she doesn't have the money to 11 12 pay for it, so somehow we have to do it. If we wait for her to come up with the money, it could sit there 13 14 for a year or two, and I don't feel that's in the 15 public interest to do that. That's why Connie and I 16 worked all weekend on this going back and forth with 17 the contractor with everybody.

18 I think it's a chance we're taking on it, but 19 it's going to go on the tax bill. I think we're 20 going to get paid for it eventually. It's aoina --21 it might be a year before, you know, it goes to tax 22 sale, or whatever. But to get the building down, 23 clean up the asbestos and get it taken care, I think it's a wise decision for us to vote on that and try 24 to just get that property cleaned up and taken care. 25

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1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I've had questions, as you 2 all saw in my emails, and I understand. First of 3 all, I was not privy to the fact that it was \$46,000. 4 That's how we discovered it. I don't know of any --5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I saw twenty-eight-eight 6 something. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Twenty-eight was in the

8 contract, so I didn't -- okay.
 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. That's our portion
 10 of it.

11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, okay. Number two, I 12 am just concerned. I understand putting it on the tax bill. We have a couple of things. We're not 13 sure whether the bank is still in the same position 14 15 it was before the fire. They've given her this 16 donation money. I'm assuming it's a donation, the 17 way she was talking at one of the public hearings. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I'm not sure that her 20 lienholder is still in foreclosure process, or if 21 they have just said okay. You know, the property 22 itself is just land now. There's no building, 23 there's no asset, they've closed it out. If they've 24 closed it out, that's fine. If it's still in 25 foreclosure, I just would like to know those things.

I think the building needs to come down, but I just think, you know, my responsibility is the fiscal part of the 28,800 that we have to recoup, and that's something that -- that's a big nut to put on a tax bill.

6 So can we also get it so that we put a lien on 7 the property, so, if it is sold, we actually are in 8 first position?

9 MR. PROKOP: Oh, it would be a lien on the 10 property and we would be -- we would be in advance of 11 the bank.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

12

15

13MR. PROKOP: We would be ahead of the bank,14so --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's --

16 MR. PROKOP: I mean, you know, I'll ask. I 17 don't do -- obviously, I'm not a credit attorney, 18 debtor or creditor attorney, but I can ask somebody 19 about that. But it's my understanding that municipal 20 liens are ahead of mortgages.

21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

22 MR. PROKOP: But I'll make sure of it.

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Let me clarify the money 24 part of it. The original contract had her listed in 25 the contract with the contractor with us for her

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seventeen-five and our twenty-eight-eight.

2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. We wanted to remove 4 that out to keep her separate from it, and this is 5 just our position and what we're paying to do our 6 part of the total bill. So, originally, we had her listed in there and getting her to sign, everybody 7 8 else to sign, and it got very complicated. She's 9 committed to that amount of money. The contractor 10 has picked up the check. He has her --11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- money on that part of it So the 28 --13 from CAST, from the donation. 14 originally they had everything in there. We took 15 that back out and made the contract just between the 16 Village and the contractor to pay our portion of it. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, and that's great, you And I think that's -- now that there's been an 18 know. 19 explanation. It's just that I received this email 20 and it was, okay, where's the rest of this? MAYOR HUBBARD: 21 Right. No --22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that concerned -- as I 23 said --24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- I just wish the

communication to us had been a little clearer as to
 the steps as to what was processed, that's all I was
 looking for.

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. No, I mean, I agree with 5 It was 15 phone calls and e-mails per day that. trying to get this worked out, so it took a lot of 6 7 time. And I didn't relay all of it, because it was 8 like we're doing this, we're doing that, we're back 9 and forth. And it just -- between myself, to the 10 lawyer, to the contractor, to the homeowner. She was 11 still trying to protect her rights, because it is 12 still her property, but to get the building taken So I didn't update everybody every day on it, 13 down. 14 because I didn't know myself until I got answers.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: And I think if -- you know, I 17 think the overall good is to get the building taken 18 down safety-wise and everything else, you know.

Okay. And I think --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS:

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19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Maybe for a suggestion, the 20 next time, for some of the issues that are coming 21 from you that are dealing -- perhaps when the Village 22 Clerk sends out your items to us, she give us a 23 critique on top that may help some of the process, 24 because I'm sure she's involved in some of it. 25 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because we just -- it just
 came out, this is it, and I kind of went, wow,
 communication kind of --

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I understand, because we 5 were looking at twenty-eight-eight and taking 6 seventeen-five off of it would leave us with 13,000, 7 if you were doing the math that way. So that's --8 the original contract had that and I said it wasn't 9 going to work. And instead of getting everybody 10 involved in it the whole time --

11

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's fine.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Hopefully, the next person, the next time we have a problem like this, the person has their own insurance and it's taken care of and we don't have to get involved, which is what I was hoping from the beginning, but that didn't quite work out that way.

18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And, you know, my feeling 19 is, God forbid five years from now the subject comes 20 back up again, at least there is some documentation 21 to follow through.

22

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You know, that's where I'm
coming from. It's part of the communication that we
all need to have among ourselves, so.

1 MR. PROKOP: Well, some of that I'll, you know, 2 keep in mind. You know, I just want to say about 3 this property, you'll get to know, working with me, 4 if I'm ever asked in public whether the Village has 5 any liability on a particular issue, I'll always say 6 that I'm not going to answer that. But I will say 7 with respect to this property that there are issues 8 that you have to take -- you're obligated to take 9 care of. It's not a situation where you can really 10 delay. And Mayor Hubbard was -- we worked closely to 11 try move it and expedite it --

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: True.

12

MR. PROKOP: -- because of that. The
contractor that ended up coming out was one of
several. You know, this was a fluid situation that
Mayor Hubbard was trying to, you know, ride to get it
taken care of, and that's how this all came to be.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just want to make sure I 19 understood something you said before. You feel that 20 there's a 10% chance of liability if we go forward and do this tonight, roughly, and almost maybe zero 21 22 percent if we wait a few weeks for the judgment? 23 MR. PROKOP: Not liability, I mean --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Risk of --24 MR. PROKOP: Risk of not getting all of the 25

1 money back

2 So, if we do this tonight, TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 3 there is a risk that we don't get the money back? 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that risk is 5 everywhere. 6 MR. PROKOP: Yeah. 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, I think, also, we've 8 balanced the risk versus getting more of a -- we have 9 a building in pretty scary shape right now. Kids will be off of school soon. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You know, I personally feel comfortable with that risk. Just for the safety 13 14 of the Village, I think it's best to move. 15 MR. PROKOP: That's what I was trying to 16 express, this is something that you would take care 17 of. This one you don't have a choice, unfortunately. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Our due diligence to take care of this as a Village, it's our responsibility. 20 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: So is the Board comfortable 22 voting on the resolution? 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I am, yes. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 24 I am. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I am.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'll offer a resolution 2 to approve the contract with Dirt Works that the 3 Village Attorney has written up for the removal of 4 and cleanup of the property at 415? MR. PROKOP: 415 Kaplan Avenue. 5 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: 415 Kaplan Avenue. MR. PROKOP: And could I just include the -- in 7 8 this resolution that the approval of the contract and 9 the taking -- the demolition of the property is a 10 Type -- excuse me -- is an Unlisted Action for 11 purposes of SEQRA, and that the demolition and 12 abatement will not have a significant negative impact 13 on the environment? 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, I'll include that, and 15 also include that we're putting a lien on the 16 property onto the tax bill, which we'll have to do 17 formally afterwards per code. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, yeah. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? So that's the motion. Do we have a second? 20 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This abatement -- sorry. MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. 22 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This abatement will be safe 25

1 for the neighbors, like people could be home --2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: -- when it happens? 3 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 5 MR. PROKOP: It's a prescribed --6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They contain everything that happens? 7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. There's a certified 9 asbestos remove company that's doing it, the white 10 suits, the whole nine yards, as they're doing it and 11 carting it away. When they're finished, it will be a 12 backfilled piece of property with grass seed put down, and everything will be gone, carted away, dealt 13 14 with professionally the way it needs to be done. 15 Okay. We have a motion and a second. All in 16 favor? 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Ave. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Ave. 20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Ave. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Ave. 22 Opposed? 23 (No Response) MAYOR HUBBARD: That motion is carried. We'11 24 forward the contract to Dirt Works tomorrow morning. 25

1 I'll sign it this evening. We have it here, so I'm 2 going to sign it this evening, and they'll start the 3 work tomorrow to get that cleaned up. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And they will be ratifying 5 it at the regular Board meeting? 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Hopefully, it should be 7 done by the regular meeting. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, I know, but you --9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we'll ratify it. The resolutions that we have 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 11 for the Village Attorney in here will -- because we 12 had another -- he presented us with a resolution. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm sorry? 13 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Didn't we get a resolution from him? 15 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's the one that will be 17 18 at the Board meeting? 19 MR. PROKOP: There was a -- right, there was a 20 resolution circulated about this, yes. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: About this? 22 MR. PROKOP: Yes. It's a resolution approving 23 the contract, right. MAYOR HUBBARD: 24 Yes. 25 MR. PROKOP: It will be at the Board meeting.

MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a 10-page --

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2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that's what I'm 3 saying.

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, we're going to 5 authorize -- I'm going to sign the contract tonight 6 to get the work done, then we'll authorize the rest of the work -- I mean, the resolution technically at 7 8 our Village -- at the regular meeting next week, yes. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just want to make sure. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So that part is taken care of. 11

All right. Back to your report, Joe.

13 MR. PROKOP: I had some litigation that I 14 wanted to talk to the Board about tonight, but we 15 weren't -- I have to give you a letter. I have to 16 circulate a letter in order to do that, so we can 17 have a discussion. With all the stuff going on, I 18 wasn't able to get it done by tonight or by a couple 19 of days ago. I will do it within the next day or 20 Hopefully, we can discuss it at the next two. 21 meeting briefly. But I want to -- I need to give you 22 an update and possibly look for a decision.

And I think that that's -- I took a lot of your time. Thank you. Is there anybody that has any questions for me?

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else?

2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No.

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.

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4 MAYOR HUBBARD: No? Okay. Thank you very 5 much.

6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It was awesome. Thank you 7 very much.

MR. PROKOP: Okay. Thanks.

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Report of Committees. The Audit Committee was off this month. 10 Code 11 Committee had a committee. I'll apologize for 12 missing the first part of that. I had a meeting with 13 the Building Department that day during it. Trustee 14 Martilotta and Phillips kind of started the meeting. 15 They had progress on a few topics, it went back, 16 discussing the Airbnb, they had a discussion on that. 17 They were going to get something in writing for the 18 committee to look at. Joe's going to write that up 19 and give something back, because the issue they had 20 is the rental law that we have in effect right now 21 doesn't cover the Airbnb at all. It's a completely 22 different topic, different subject. It doesn't fit 23 into it, but that's only long-term rentals and 24 doesn't deal with the owner-occupied. Owner-occupied does not have to participate in that at all. 25 So

we're trying -- he's trying to work on wording with recommendations from the Code Committee on where to go with that. So he's going to have that back for the Code Committee for our meeting in June. And there was no other recommendations to come back to the Board at this time.

7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, wait a minute. There8 was the film permit.

9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: The film permit.

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, that's right. I'm sorry. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The film permit we went 12 through, as had been directed by the Board, to take 13 what was discussed at the public hearing and to make 14 changes, which I believe, Joe, I think you have it. 15 Jeanmarie may have given it to you.

16

MR. PROKOP: Yes.

17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because that needs to be 18 brought back for -- I'm not sure whether that needs 19 to have a re-public hearing on that again, or does 20 that just have to come forward to the Board with the 21 changes that --

22 MR. PROKOP: It would be a public hearing.
23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

24 MR. PROKOP: At this point.

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: When we discussed that, it was

1 just taking all the wording and everything you had 2 talked about before I got into the meeting and write 3 up the whole new law and circulate it back out. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, that's what we need 5 to do. Right, everything that was 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: 7 changed. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. And then there was 9 the changes to the wording within the idling buses, 10 the code that we have for idling buses. We were 11 changing something to the effective of commercial --12 commercial vehicles, I think it was, or --MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, it said idling buses. 13 14 We'll change it to anything with commercial plates on it. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 15 Right. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: And livery. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And livery plates. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And livery plates also. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Livery plates. So I think 20 that's something Joe needs to create for the Code 21 Committee to just --22 Right. He's going to review MAYOR HUBBARD: 23 that and send that back and they'll do it. So we're 24 not going to actually be ready to vote on that until

25 next month. And we should have that stuff all back

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1 from Code Committee for next month to be able to vote 2 on --

3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- and finish those topics. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we did have a discussion about the Airbnb -- I mean, the short-term rentals, 6 7 and the committee did decide to ask the Village 8 Attorney to come back with a piece of legislation for 9 us to start reviewing, to start getting input from 10 the Code Committee members to do something, because 11 we all felt that the -- you know, we had taken the 12 comment period, we listened, we had a lot of information given to us, and we decided at this point 13 14 that the public is expecting something out of us, and that's why we're moving forward with it. So it's the 15 16 first stab at it.

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's all we had on the 18 committees.

19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry. So what is the --20 one of the items we want to discuss is what is the --21 what is the process? So the code -- if you don't 22 mind just sort of walking through kind of -- you 23 know, let's pretend it's 10th grade social studies 24 class. So with short-term rentals, the Attorney is going to prepare a draft of legislation, which I'm 25

1 guessing encompasses all the feedback we received,

and then Code Committee reviews that, makes changes,and then what happens?

4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Then it comes to us.
5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Then it will come back to us.
6 The Code Committee --

7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: As a proposed law? 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, whatever they had 9 discussed. There's some new people on it. I mean, 10 Michelle was very helpful with stuff that she had 11 adding to it and the discussion on it and trying to 12 separate the two laws out, because the other -- the rental law is there now, trying to make a new law for 13 14 the short-term rentals and dealing with that.

15 So those discussions, that topic all came up. 16 They're going to put that all in writing. Code 17 Committee will review it, and then there would be a 18 recommendation to come back to the Village Board, 19 actually the public hearing, we have to do a public 20 hearing on that, as a proposed law. We would see 21 that. That should be the next step. That should be 22 out for next month.

23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then what does happenis, is that it will come back to the full Board. The

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full Board can review it, and if they're not

comfortable with what they're seeing even before it
goes to public hearing, they can send it back to Code
Committee as per a vote of the Board.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I think that you may 7 be under the impression that this group here never 8 gets the final say on it. Yes, we do get the 9 final -- the Code Committee just does all the leg 10 work.

I'm worried about a 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. 12 situation where -- so the Code Committee has two Trustees and the Mayor on it, and it also has people 13 14 who are not elected on it. And so, if the -- if the 15 laws are written in -- by that group, and then -- so 16 if there are three people on there who vote on it, so 17 the three of you may agree on something and think 18 this is great, and then the two who are not -- I'm 19 not saying you're doing this, I'm just saying this as 20 a hypothetical. Then the two of us who are not on 21 that committee would show up and you guys have made a 22 bunch of decisions about -- with a bunch of people 23 who are not elected. Not that we don't want their 24 input, but the process to me I'm just -- it's a little interesting. So maybe in the short term the 25

1 answer is, if you -- if I -- I'm a Trustee, not on 2 the Code Committee, if I'm interested in at least 3 having input in something, so you know that if you 4 were to put it front of me, I would want to send it 5 back to Code Committee, I should just make the time 6 and go to Code Committee, which is I guess what I'll do. No. You could do it 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 8 that way, but also we have the Monday before the Code 9 Committee, anybody, public, Trustees, anybody who 10 wants to make comments, have something in writing for the Code Committee to review at that meeting. 11 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: You could just submit that to 14 the Village Clerk and that will be right there, and 15 all the Code Committee will have that, you know, 16 ahead of time to review it. 17 And, technically, Code Committee doesn't really 18 vote on anything, because they only make

19 recommendations. So it's not really a vote of the 20 Committee and Board Members will be voting on it, 21 it's just, "Everybody comfortable with the wording of 22 this?" "Yes." And then it comes to us for a vote. 23 It's only a recommendation.

24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
25 MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's not really voted on

1 before.

2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's just a general
3	consensus of the group
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: that this is what we
6	want. It's more of an advisory group. It's more
7	they do the leg work and reach out to it's a
8	public meeting, anyone's welcome to come to it. But
9	it's a matter of this group has the ZBA Chair, it
10	has hopefully, the Planning Board Chair will be
11	able to show up, we have a member of the public, and
12	we have who are some of the other members?
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: BID, right? Is the BID on it?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There is no one from the BID
17	at this time.
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Historical Committee.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, yeah.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Historical?
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, Historical, right.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Historical.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Which are all committees
24	
	that you know, all the Chairmen work with the code

where the three Trustees that are sitting on there
 are going to make a decision, that's not the purpose
 of the Code Committee.

4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. There could be a long 5 protracted discussion by the three of you and you 6 could -- you know, you could, if you wanted to, write 7 the law right there and get -- you'd have your three 8 votes and it would be good.

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, it doesn't work that way. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sorry. I mean, that you 11 could agree in the meeting, "This is great, let's do 12 this," and so that --

13TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it comes back here.14TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

15TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then we could have the16same discussion all over again.

17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. But if you've already 18 had the discussion, the two of us are going "We don't 19 like this," you say you like it, and it could be a 20 done deal. It's not like Congress. Just for a 21 second, it's not like Congress where a committee has, you know, 10% of the members on it. This is -- it 22 23 would be like if the Ways and Means Committee of 24 Congress had two-thirds of the entire Congress on it, right? So the way we're structured now, I think my 25

answer is, if I'm concerned about this, I should make
 time and show up, and I could just let you know from
 the gallery, you know --

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. It's an open meeting. 5 It's definitely -- it's welcomed to have comment from everybody on it. It's something that was just trying 6 7 to make -- to do all the work of the Code Committee 8 at our regular Board meeting, with everything else 9 going on, it seemed like nothing ever gotten taken 10 care of. And sometimes it seems when it goes to the 11 Code Committee, it goes there forever and never comes 12 So we're trying to make it a quicker process, backs. so it's there and back within a month or two. 13 It's 14 just that that's the intention of the new people on 15 it, is to just send it there, get the recommendations 16 real quick, and send it back right away, and have us, 17 you know, do the public hearing and get the stuff 18 taken care of.

19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The whole purpose of it is 20 to get back-and-forth feedback, back and forth 21 between the Trustees and from the Code Committee. Ι will agree with you, and I was just, and George will 22 23 tell you, as frustrated with the inactive on some 24 stuff, because it just never seemed to move along, okay, which is the reason why Jack probably looked at 25

1 me and went, "Wow, this went fast," and out the door 2 we went, so -- and it's -- you know, as I said, it 3 will always come back here. We all will -- you know, 4 by the time it gets back here, whatever your points 5 are that were presented to Jack and the other committee, we can refer it right back to Code 6 7 Committee and say this is what we want to review, 8 It's always there, it's open dialogue. okav?

9 MR. PROKOP: We've had every version that you 10 can imagine. We've had things come to the Trustees 11 and not get acted on. We've had things come to the 12 Trustees, go back to the Code Committee and then 13 never come back again. You know, we've had things --14 we've had things completely redone.

15 The other thing is, with regard to Code 16 Committee, one of the things which I'm trying to 17 accomplish is -- one of the things which I'm trying 18 to accomplish on the Code Committee is a review of 19 the entire zoning code, and we did -- we are looking 20 for comments about the zoning code. So, if there's 21 particular parts of the zoning code that you'd like 22 to have the Code Committee review, please let us 23 know, and send it to all the Trustees. You know, 24 there are parts of the code that when they get -- you know, we get an application to one of the Boards, and 25

1 then we realize that there's something in the 2 language that should be reviewed. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Commercial waterfront? 3 4 MR. PROKOP: Uh-huh 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, that's going to be a long 6 Hopefully, we get the five topics that Code one. 7 Committee has now done and finished and then --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, let's get short-term 8 9 done first, yeah. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Short-term, you know, the 11 tour bus, you know, the filming permit, the other 12 things that are on there. Those are all close to being finished, I believe. So let's get those 13 14 finished up and out, and then we could start tackling 15 some other projects. 16 Again, it's also, you know, myself and Jack are 17 new on that committee, so it's been a little learning 18 curve of how they actually did things before, because I was never on that one, so -- but I think, you know, 19 20 we're speeding it up and we'll get it done pretty 21 quick, and then we'll start tackling some other 22 stuff. 23 Okay. Anything else under Committees? 24 (No Response) We have discussion on the Wetland Permit 25

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Application from Oyster Point Condo. Paul has some
 information for us.

MR. PALLAS: Yes. At the -- when this was 3 4 before the Board last time -- I'm sorry, I apologize. 5 When this was before the Board last time, there were 6 four conditions that the Conservation Advisory 7 Council had recommended. The applicant took 8 exception to the second of those four points that had 9 to do with containment of roof runoff and 10 installation of leaders and gutters. We -- it was 11 requested of them to come back to the CAC and come up 12 with an alternative, or explain why they couldn't. 13 The CAC met with the applicant on site, came up with 14 an alternative plan from what we had originally 15 requested involving the installation of French drain 16 systems along the edge of the building, and 17 establishing a non-fertilized area of the lawn.

And they had produced a document. I know there's two members of the CAC here, and they'll correct me if I'm wrong, that the applicant's drawing was accepted by the CAC to satisfy that condition.

So, in terms of what ultimately the Board would vote on on the resolution, I'm requesting that the resolution read to incorporate our recommendations, with the exception of Condition 2, which is covered

1 by their revised drawing, some wording like that. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 3 MR. PALLAS: That's all I have. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Anybody have any 5 questions on that? 6 (No Response) 7 We'll put that for the agenda next Thursday. 8 All right. We'll go to Trustee Reports. So, Trustee Martilotta? 9 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. Myself and Trustee 11 Roberts put this together, because we had a lot of 12 like -- we had a lot of similar ideas. We figured we'd just save time and effort, as opposed to 13 duplicating efforts. So, if it's okay with you, 14 15 Mr. Mayor, we'll kind of go through it, since we had 16 done it together. Does that work out all right? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. Would you like 19 to start off this report, or would you like --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. 20 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the beach, Fifth and Sixth 22 23 Street. It's been my observation, you know, walking 24 my dog on that -- since we've had her, which is, veah, about seven years, that the beach needs 25

attention. The beach, from my perspective, it's
difficult for me to see -- in fact, I was in Mitchell
Park today and saw the intensity of the work we're
doing on the lawn. I mean, it looks beautiful. It's
clearly very well maintained.

6 And I don't think our beach is a place a lot of 7 people visit when they come to Greenport and I don't 8 think we put our best foot forward. And I think this 9 is a -- it's easy stuff to do. It's a resource 10 problem, and it's a sort of focusing effort problem. 11 I'd like to see us really focus on making that place 12 a world class place to bring your family, world place -- world class place to host an event. It's -- and 13 14 it's hard for me -- and there are folks sitting in 15 the audience tonight who put a lot of their personal 16 time and energy and effort into that beach, and I 17 don't think that we should necessarily and unfairly 18 rely on those, and money, by the way. They raised a 19 fund, right? Everyone knows the Fifth Street/Sixth 20 Street Beach Fund.

I don't think it's fair of us as a Village to have this jewel of our little park system and then require -- or the only way that we're going to have, you know, nice landscaping or a fence that's not broken is that we're going to have ask a couple of

folks to kind of go and ask their friends and
 neighbors for money. It's not the kind of Village
 that I think we are.

So I think -- we've got a list of things, some small, some large, that I think we can do. Some of these are pretty simple. But I'd would love to see us -- the season starts, you know, in a couple of days, Memorial Day, so we're behind the eight ball a bit.

10 But the basketball court, we just did the one 11 on Third Street. I don't know. Do we -- is that 12 definitely in the plans? Are we definitely doing 13 that?

14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Paul has --

15 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, it is. We're just waiting 16 for quotes from the same companies that we had quoted 17 before. They're not getting back to us very rapidly, 18 which happened -- the same thing happened on the 19 other basketball court there.

20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

21 MR. PALLAS: They will get back to us 22 eventually.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So before the new year will
they be done?

25 MR. PALLAS: Oh, yeah. No, definitely, yes.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Possibly during -- is it 2 going to get done during the season or --3 MR. PALLAS: That's my hope, yes. 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 5 MR. PALLAS: As soon as I get the quotes, we 6 can move forward. I mean, that's basically what 7 we're looking for right now. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good. Okay. Great to hear. 9 The tables and benches I think need a little --10 there might be some that need replacing, but, 11 certainly, a coat of paint or a stain on it to 12 protect. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I can give you an answer 14 on that one. Paul's been work on the two picnic 15 tables for the skate park from the extra money from 16 last year. We discussed it. He found a different 17 vendor for it, and we were going to get two tables. 18 We plan on getting six tables, two for Third Street, 19 two for Fifth and Sixth Street, two for the skate 20 park. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All right. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a cheaper vendor, cheaper 23 price. Robert has the money to take care of it, so 24 we're going to be ordering the six tables. We just don't know. They said four to five weeks on the 25

other vendor. We don't know how long it's going to
 be from this vendor, but they should be here by
 Fourth of July and installed.

4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.

5 MAYOR HUBBARD: So it would be two for each 6 park.

7

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Great.

8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. More frequent trash 9 I think it seems that on weekends we pickups. 10 probably need either staff, more folks against it, 11 or, you know, in all of this stuff, the bathrooms. 12 You know, when people have big parties there. I don't know if we want to ask our Code Enforcement. I don't 13 14 know if he's the right person, but if we have a way 15 of sort of, you know, suggesting to folks or 16 enforcing that they clean up after themselves, like 17 our permitting process says you have to. And then I 18 know that in the permitting, there's also a thing 19 that we take a deposit, and if they don't clean up 20 after themselves, we can take that money and use it 21 to pay for a cleanup service. I don't know if we do that, but --22

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: A lot of the stuff down there 24 is just family gatherings, and they don't actually go 25 through getting a permit, so we don't collect a

1 deposit on it.

2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Some large groups that go down
4	there and use it, which is great. We they kind
5	of they're supposed to self-police themselves, if
6	they bring garbage in, take it back out. It doesn't
7	always happen that way. But Paul was going to
8	discuss with the Road Crew about additional we
9	have guys come in and do the downtown garbage.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: They usually finish. I believe
13	two o'clock is when they're done for the day. I
14	believe he's working five to two, I think.
15	MR. PALLAS: I think so.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: So maybe at 1:30, do another
17	run down there, make sure that they're empty before
18	he's finished for the day. But, at the end of the
19	day, it wouldn't be until the next morning, unless we
20	create another whole shift for somebody. But we're
21	definitely going to try to increase the pickup down
22	there.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's great, good. Yeah,
24	because, you know, the bins end up kind of
25	overflowing, and it's we're already talking about

1 lifeguards, but, I mean, the lifeguards are 2 essential. And so I guess it sounds like we have a 3 plan in place for that. 4 MR. PALLAS: We're working on one, yeah. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're working on it. Yeah, 6 it's late, obviously, but -- and you said we are 7 doing work in the bathroom; did you tell me that 8 earlier today? 9 I did. They're actually -- the MR. PALLAS: 10 painting is completed. There's some fixtures that 11 we're replacing that won't be ready for this weekend, 12 but we're going to do some temporary work so that the bathrooms will be open this weekend, but they're not 13 completed. They'll be functional, but not completed. 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And does that mean we won't 15 16 need a port-o-potty this season? 17 MR. PALLAS: We've always had a port-o-potty, 18 my understanding, even in addition to the bathrooms. 19 That's always been there. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 20 Have we? 21 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 23 MR. PALLAS: It's my understanding that it's 24 always been there. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is that -- but a lot of times 25

1 the bathrooms aren't open. I always thought -- my 2 assumption was that the port-o-potty was there 3 because no one opens the bathrooms. 4 MR. PALLAS: I think it's for the hours that they're not open, typically. It's not -- it's not in 5 6 lieu of the bathrooms, it's -- the bathroom's not 7 open all into, you know, dusk. I mean, it's open --8 I forget what time they actually close the bathrooms. I don't --9 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Usually, the lifeguard goes off 11 duty at 5:00 and lock it up. MR. PALLAS: The lifeguard, yeah, closes it. 12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 0h. at 5:00? 13 14 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, that's when it would be 15 closed. That's what the port-o-potty is for. That's 16 my understanding the way it's been in the past. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But if someone comes and does 17 18 track later, couldn't they close the bathrooms then? 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: They could, but we'd have 20 nobody working at that time on Saturday and Sunday. 21 So we have to try to figure out what we're going to 22 do to get somebody to come in and do another shift, 23 or whatever we're going to do. They work in the 24 morning. They work at 5 in the morning until 2 in the afternoon, and then there's nobody else on in the 25

1 evening.

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What if a Trustee offered to 3 open the bathrooms in the morning, could we move a 4 morning person to afternoon? 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'd have to look at that. The 6 morning person is taking care of the garbage 7 throughout the whole Village. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So could he or she 9 just do that in the afternoon instead of the morning? MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, first thing in the 10 11 morning, all the garbage cans downtown would be 12 overflowing from the night before. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 13 Right. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: After Saturday night, Sunday 15 morning, if they're not emptied, that stuff's going 16 to be all over the place if we don't do it before it 17 starts getting crowded again for the next day. 18 Do you want to say something, Paul? 19 MR. PALLAS: We've used marina staff. Thev're 20 supposed to be going down there when -- before the 21 lifeguard gets there to open and close, to open and 22 then close if there's no lifeguard there. You also 23 have the issue of cleanup of the bathroom. If we 24 leave the bathroom open later, there's nobody around to clean it before it gets closed, and then when it 25

opens in the morning, it's filthy. So it's not just
 a matter of closing it, it's there's other things we
 take care of in theory, to take care of before we
 close it up.

5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So you may not know this off 6 the top of your head, you probably don't, but I would 7 be interested to know what it costs. So, from my 8 perspective, this is not a -- this is not a solution 9 for a beach. I mean, if you go to Jones Beach or something, they don't say, "Oh, we close the bathroom 10 at 5 o'clock, you're kind of out of luck." They --11 12 things are open when people are there. And the 13 reality is that people go there at 7 a.m., they go 14 there at 7:30 p.m. to watch the sunset. So it would seem to me that there is a solution to having it open 15 16 during daylight hours, it's just going to cost 17 something, right, because we have --

18 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, we have to have somebody
19 come in and clean it, yes.

20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So it's really --

21 MR. PALLAS: I think that would end up being --22 what would ultimately end up being the main issue is 23 that there would be nobody available to clean it at 24 that point in time.

25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But how much money are we

1 talking, do we know?

2	MR. PALLAS: I mean, I would off the top of
3	my head, I don't know. I mean, if we bring in
4	someone just to clean it, it's very difficult to get
5	people to do that, number one. It's not even it
6	would be more than a cost issue. It's getting
7	someone that you're going to pay just to clean one
8	bathroom once a day. We've tried to do that even
9	with Village Hall and it's been a problem, believe it
10	or not, to get cleaning companies to come in,
11	particularly in the summer. They're
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What about just I mean,
13	there are people in this Village who need work,
14	right, I mean
15	MR. PALLAS: Again, we can look into. You
16	know, that's up to all of you, ultimately. But it
17	sounds simple in principle, but I think,
18	logistically, it would start to become cumbersome. I
19	mean, I can let me give it some thought and see if
20	I come up with a different solution.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We do it at the marina, don't we?
22	MR. PALLAS: Yes, the marina staff does that
23	and
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So, if we can have
25	the if the bathrooms can be open during sort of

normal use hours at the marina, I don't see how they
 can't be open at the beach.

MR. PALLAS: Again, there's staff there.
There's no staff at the beach, that's what it boils
down to.

6

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

MAYOR HUBBARD: 7 I think some of the staff at 8 the marina, they get dropped off, they're riding 9 their bicycle, they're younger kids, to get somebody 10 to go down and bring stuff down to the beach to clean But we could -- you know, we could try to 11 it up. 12 advertise for something to see if somebody is interested, or wants a part-time job doing it, or 13 14 whatever. But the marina staff, everything is there, and you just tell the kid, "You've got to clean up 15 16 before you go home. He's right there doing it, 17 instead of having the vehicle to drive down to Sixth 18 Street from someplace else. But let's investigate 19 and see what we could find.

20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.

21 MR. PALLAS: I'll see what I can come up with. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: So we could ask, you know, if 23 maybe some -- a Village worker that's on -- you know, 24 one of the union workers now wants a couple of hours 25 overtime or something, we could ask and just see if

1 we get any response from that.

2 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, take a look. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, that would be great. 3 4 I'd like us to at least think about a solution, and 5 if it's money, then let's think about whether we want 6 to spend it. This Village is spending a quarter of million dollars to host a Tall Ships Festival for 7 8 people who don't -- largely don't live here. This is 9 a beach that's used by the people who live here. So 10 I'd love for us to at least know -- and if it's \$100,000 cost or something to us, then maybe it's not 11 12 possible, but I appreciate it.

13TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: In addition to that, if I14may.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.

15

16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You know, I live at the 17 end -- I live at the end of the street, I take my 18 kids down there all the time. I think that at one 19 point, they had very clearly established lines as to 20 where the playground was, where the volleyball court 21 was, where the swings were. I think that those lines 22 over time, like you were saying with the park, maybe 23 the time wasn't spent on this park in the past. And 24 I think that it's going to be a fairly heavy lift for the Highway Department. You know, they've got a lot 25

to do. I think it might be something for us to
consider to get somebody in there, a professional
type person, a landscaping company in some capacity
to move the sand back to where the sand used to be
and the grass back to where the grass used to be.

6 If that's -- like what do we have in here? 7 Street lights. The -- where they got the playground, 8 the really cool one that's the ship, I mean, it's 9 clearly older. You know, there's some graffiti 10 inside it. The wood is -- I don't know how old it 11 is, but it has been there for some time.

12 And it's not a matter of -- I don't think it's a matter of just getting somebody in there with a 13 14 rake for a couple hours. I think that there's some work that would need to be done in there to bring it 15 16 up to, quite frankly, the quality I think that our 17 Village residents deserve. We do such an awesome job 18 with Mitchell Park. I think with the some investment 19 here, and, you know, I don't need to enumerate all 20 the things that we wrote down, I think that we could 21 do it. But I think we need to look at getting 22 somebody in who does this for a living, someone 23 professional. The sands needs to be raked out and There's all kinds of horror in there. You 24 cleaned. 25 know what, little things to make it a better place

1 for the kids to play, I think the Village residents 2 deserve that. 3 MR. PALLAS: If I might --4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Please. 5 MR. PALLAS: -- make a discussion, I know we 6 have similar issues right here --Yes 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 8 MR. PALLAS: -- at this. And, I mean, with 9 regard to keeping the sand in one place, they're 10 virtually the same issues. I will suggest that if 11 we're going to look at one, we should do both 12 simultaneously --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, absolutely. 13 14 MR. PALLAS: -- rather than do one and not the 15 other. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 17 MR. PALLAS: You know, the basketball court 18 issue is a little different issue, because it's a 19 fairly big expense. I don't believe that, you know, 20 fixing up the sand is going to be that big, and 21 providing some kind of a simple border for those is 22 going to be that large. But we can certainly take a look at that and find out what that -- those costs 23 might be and I can report back to the Board on that. 24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 25 Thank you.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Once again, that brings up 2 the RFP for a landscaping company.

3

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Perhaps dealing with the 4 5 whole Village, and Mitchell Park included. I think 6 our Road Department is stretched too thin. As we get 7 busier in the summertime, they're constantly one guy. 8 And I don't know if any of you have all seen it, but 9 it's the big flatbed truck headed to the dump for 10 just one day. You know, they're tapped, okay? So is 11 it cheaper for us to go out to have the professionals 12 deal with all of this and -- or hire another person, That's where I'm coming from. 13 okav? And 14 something -- you know, we also have the Road Crew 15 going up to mow the lawn. They have to take care of 16 the campground, they have to take care of Moores Lane 17 up by the skate park. You know, they have a lot on 18 their plate.

19 MR. PALLAS: Absolutely.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And if we're pushing for the parks to be upgraded for our residents to use them, then I think it behooves us to take a look at the cost. It's not going to be a decision that's made next month -- I mean, next week, but I think it would be just an exercise in economics to take a look at it.

1 MR. PALLAS: Again, I can -- you know, I view 2 it as two different things. One is more of a capital 3 type of a one-time expense. The maintenance work, I 4 can certainly contact a few landscapers to get an 5 idea of what it would cost to have someone come in.

6 I don't know that there would be necessarily 7 any direct savings. We don't do any of this work on 8 an overtime basis, but, certainly, to free up the 9 road crews to do other work. So I think -- I mean, 10 that -- again, that's a decision, you know, for you 11 all.

12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And another idea, we're going 13 to talk about the Parks Conservancy proposal next, 14 but a possibility would be through a vehicle like the Parks Conservancy for somebody to donate time for 15 16 their -- for a tax deduction that then helps the 17 people in the Village of Greenport that can save us money, so -- but before we move to that, though, is 18 19 there anything on the list here that is problematic, 20 or something we couldn't do, or wouldn't want to do, 21 you know?

22 MR. PALLAS: Nothing stands out. A lot of this 23 is, again, things that I've actually wanted to take 24 care of, and just, you know, we're slowly getting 25 there. We'll ramp some of it up.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

11

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All right. And then I would like to ask for a resolution to -- I don't know if we 3 4 have this already, but just whatever we have to do to 5 prohibit, ban driving on the beach. I don't -- I've 6 never heard of a beach that you drive on until I moved here, and I lived next to a beach almost all my 7 8 life, near a beach all of my life. So it's not good 9 for the beach, not good for the environment, it's not 10 good for the water quality. I think --

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Kids on the beach.

12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Not good for the kids on the 13 So the chain helps with the safety with the beach. 14 kids, because now it's just our employees, but I 15 don't know why our employees needs to drive on our 16 So can we -- can we get a resolution to -beach. 17 because we're about to do this big project there. We 18 can return the thing that's sort of a road back to 19 being the beach, and just make it very clear to 20 everybody we are banning driving on our beach, so 21 that, you know, next time I see someone driving down 22 there, I can call the Southold Police and get them to 23 stop doing it.

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know. Is there 25 anything in our code that says you can't ride on the

1 beach? I don't know if there's anything in there. MR. PROKOP: I don't think so. I'll check and 2 3 see. I'm sorry, but I don't believe that there is 4 right now. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I checked, there isn't. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: But to make it something that's going to be enforced, we need to do a code change. 7 8 MR. PROKOP: It would have to be a law. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, it would have to be a 10 law. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: It would have to be a law a 12 code change. We have to do a public hearing on it. I mean, in the short term, can we just put -- you 13 14 know, just a sign banning, no vehicles on beach. 15 MR. PROKOP: Yes. Then you could put --16 MAYOR HUBBARD: But then it's going to be hard 17 for them to write a ticket on it, but we could 18 attempt putting a sign on for now. But I believe --19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It scares people away? 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. We can make up a sign to 21 say no -- you know, no vehicles on the beach. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That would be great. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And Paul's plan, too, yeah. 24 MR. PALLAS: Right. Again, we're -- you know, we're going to be putting in the blocks. I mean, 25

we're going to make it virtually impossible. You
 know, you'd have to literally break the chain on the
 Fifth Street side. On the Sixth Street side, we're
 going to space them such that a vehicle can't get
 through at all. So, you know, it will be --

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, you could put a 7 sign up also, but --

8 MR. PALLAS: No, I definitely will put a sign 9 up, but just --

MAYOR HUBBARD: But to do a resolution, as, you know, Trustee Roberts is asking, would have to be -we'd have to add it as a code and do it, so they'll be able to write a ticket against the Village Code. So it's something we could look at for the future, but the short, we could put a sign up, and he does the other measures to keep people off.

MR. PROKOP: The things you were talking about
putting in, you're talking about putting what,
pilings?

20 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, the four -- the six-by-six 21 wood posts at the end of the street.

22 MR. PROKOP: Okay. If I could just recommend 23 respectfully that you put in at least one or two that 24 could be removed so an emergency vehicle could get 25 through there.

1 MR. PALLAS: No, I'm sorry. This is just at 2 the end of Sixth Street, the area where that doesn't 3 have the chain. They're still going to maintain the 4 chain, the chained access. We will maintain that 5 access, yes. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I think to Joe's point, 7 the Fire Department will have a key to that chain? 8 MR. PALLAS: They already do. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: They have bolt cutters if they 11 don't have the key. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah, the bolt cutters. 13 MR. PALLAS: It wouldn't stop them anyway, 14 ultimately. 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All right. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: If they need to get in there, 17 they will. And, of course, they always cut the 18 middle of the chain instead of only at the end. 19 MR. PROKOP: So you can adopt that resolution 20 and then post the sign that says "Pursuant to Resolution," we'll give it a number. 21 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Awesome. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay, great. Thank you. 24 MR. PROKOP: If that's what you want to do. 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. So this is -- this

1 Parks Conservancy idea is something that I've talked 2 with Trustee Phillips about, I've talked with folks 3 in the community. There are a couple of prominent 4 members of the community, Marc LaMaina from 5 Lucharito's in particular who's wanted to get behind 6 This is -- I mean, New York City does it. this idea. There are park districts all over this place. 7 8 Mattituck has a park district. You know, out in 9 Orient, there's the little park district where you 10 can't go unless you are a member. This is -- we're 11 not talking about doing anything with excluding 12 people or passes to the beach. This is an idea 13 basically to create a financial vehicle, to create a 14 nonprofit organization that partners with the Village 15 to do great work in our parks, and to do kind of 16 maybe more long-range kind of thinking than sometimes 17 a village can do. Especially if the Village falls on 18 hard times, the Parks Conservancy will be there to 19 make sure that the playground equipment is safe.

There's a whole bunch of work we can do down the hill here at the Third Street Park. From my perspective, that's a place that's sorely neglected. And I think we've almost lost the park for kids, and now a lot of adults hang out there. And to the extent that I think some kids -- I've heard from some

parents in town, some kids are afraid to play down
 there, and that is heartbreaking to me.

3 So a Parks Conservancy can take on more than 4 just sort of a repair here, or a repair here, or 5 repair there. Parks Conservancy can raise money. 6 Parks Conservancy can have, you know, big events 7 where people write big checks, particularly our new 8 crop of second homeowners who care about this 9 community and maybe don't know how to get involved. 10 Parks Conservancy can make decisions fairly quickly, and it can be a vehicle for those who want to donate 11 12 services in kind. Let's say somebody wants to build 13 a bathroom as some sort of donation. I'm just making 14 this up. At any rate, a Parks Conservancy is a nice 15 vehicle.

16 What I'm asking for here is a -- what I'm 17 asking for here is basically for the Village to give 18 in-kind services, I think mostly the Attorney and the 19 Treasurer to establish the vehicle. And I'm 20 proposing that Trustee Phillips and I are nominated 21 to represent the Village on -- in this conservancy, 22 and that we build a Board, you know, as I've sort of 23 outlined here for that, so that the organization 24 then -- sort of like the way The Friends of Mitchell Park, you know, is entrusted with funding events in 25

Mitchell Park that are approved by us. This would be
 the same for all the other parks, Steamboat Corner,
 any park.

So it's a long-range plan. Right now, I think it requires a little bit of time from the Attorney and the Treasurer, possibly others, to get -- to establish the 501(c)(3), get the kind of document, the paperwork in order, so that maybe this Fall we could start fundraising for it.

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I just have a question 11 to the Attorney. Is this something that's legal for 12 the Village to do, to set this up? I know the other 13 ones were done outside the Village. The Village had 14 nothing to do with Friends of Mitchell Park, that was 15 done as a private group. I don't know. Can the 16 Village legally set up a fund to do this?

17 MR. PROKOP: It would have to be -- well, the 18 Village could set up its own fund. The Village 19 cannot set up a fund for an outside organization. So what would have to -- what it actually would be is it 20 21 would be an outside -- I'm sorry. And this is just 22 based on listening to you for a few minutes. It 23 would be -- an outside organization would be set up, 24 and then we would enter a partnership agreement, basically, with that outside organization, and to, 25

you know, give us the foundation for working together
 in the future.

3 Just one thing which I wanted to make you aware 4 of is now donations to the Village are deductible. 5 Donations of money and property to a village are 6 So that's basically it. We couldn't -deductible. 7 we couldn't do it as a part of the Village 8 government, but what we could do is if it was set up, 9 we could enter a partnership agreement with the 10 Conservancy.

11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do you happen to know if -- I 12 mean, how does New York City do it, I wonder? I 13 think that would be a question for us

MR. PROKOP: I think it's generally through a
partnership. I think many of those things, like when
you walk through Times Square, there's a Times Square
Alliance, I believe.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

18

19 MR. PROKOP: That says it's in partnership with 20 the City of New York, I think. So I believe that 21 that's how it would function. Mitchell Park actually 22 came through a bequest -- excuse me. Friends of 23 Mitchell Park actually came through a bequest. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right, and then Mitchell. 24 MR. PROKOP: 25 Yeah.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: And I know that took like five 2 years for them to get the not-for-profit status, and 3 everything else, because we were asking for that for 4 quite a while and it took a long time for them to do 5 it, but they've been doing that privately. I was 6 just wondering if we could set that up as --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 7 No 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- the Village, or if that has 9 to be done separately, and then we would --10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Red School House grants, 11 that come up. 12 MR. PROKOP: It would be done separately, 13 established separately, and then we could enter an 14 alliance. And, I mean, I'm willing to contribute If it gets -- I mean, if it's viewed favorably 15 time. 16 by the Administration, I'm willing to work on it. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Let's get some information on it. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, I'm proposing it here, 19 too, because I want to hear what you all think. 20 MR. PROKOP: I mean, what I would recommend. 21 since I think that some version of this exists in 22 many other forms, I think what we could do is go 23 online, look for the other documents that exist, or 24 the Secretary of State may have some of these agreements on file. 25

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, thanks for the offer to 2 I'm just curious -help. MR. PROKOP: If it's approved by the --3 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. 5 MR. PROKOP: Excuse me. As long as I'm 6 authorized by the Board. 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm presenting it for discussion 9 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: One of the things I'm 11 curious about with this, and this is something that we had talked about, if let's say I own a landscaping 12 company or knew somebody who did, could I get them to 13 14 then do work at the Fifth Street Park, like you were saying. Would that then be able to be something that 15 16 is tax deductible? Do you know what I'm saying, like 17 since they're donating? Probably I think that that 18 would be a way that we could probably get some of 19 this work done at the park. MR. PROKOP: We wouldn't determine that, that 20 21 would be up to their tax advisor. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. But it's a 23 possibility, at least for --MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 24 25 MR. PROKOP: Yes.

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

2 In theory, when the Little MAYOR HUBBARD: 3 League field was done, I can use that as an example. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. MAYOR HUBBARD: The people that donated the 5 6 irrigation system, they donated the system, they 7 wrote that off on their taxes as charitable 8 contribution to the Village and that was done. So 9 that -- the mechanism is there for that to be done 10 right now.

11

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, it is?

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. So, if somebody wanted to do that I believe down at Fifth and Sixth Street, the same company put in the irrigation system would pay for material, for all the labor, everything else. The installation was all free. And they write that off on their taxes as they're doing that. So that could be done now.

19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm sorry, I apologize.
20 MAYOR HUBBARD: No problem.

21 MR. PROKOP: So if somebody wanted to make a 22 restricted gift to the Village of -- somebody wanted 23 to, or a group of people wanted to get together and 24 donate \$25,000 for the improvement of a beach, you 25 know, with certain restrictions on it, they could do

1 that, and it would be tax deductible to them. It 2 would be the same thing as a charitable contribution. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Now, would it be earmarked 4 for whatever specific --5 MR. PROKOP: It would be a restricted gift. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It would be, yeah, like 7 that's -- I think that's what I'm asking. Like I 8 would make sure -- like somebody's not going to 9 donate 25 grand and it would go into the General 10 Fund? There's no problem --11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I think -- okay. 12 I think that's something that -- and I know Robert and I have talked about it. 13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 15 But when those funds come 16 in, we pass a resolution to establish a line item for them, okay? 17 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 19 MR. PROKOP: And to accept them. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And to accept them. 20 It's 21 not just something that's just --22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, no, no, which I 23 understand. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the other thing is the Village Treasurer, and, Robert, correct me if I'm 25

wrong on this one, each year we carry over, which we
 will be doing, I believe, in this next year budget
 amendments, you included that, Robert?

4 MR. BRANDT: No. It's automatic. It's in the 5 Trust and Agency now.

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's in the Trust and Agency 7 now, so it's just automatically carried over. There 8 was some confusion back, because the Village a couple 9 of years ago was not used to taking these kinds of 10 donations.

11

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I believe there was a 13 small amount that the Village Treasurer at the time 14 didn't carry over. I mean, five -- it was \$500, I 15 think. It's very important to the taxpayers here who 16 donated it, but in the overall picture of the money 17 that gets transferred back and forth, it was one that 18 was oversighted and has been corrected. So I do 19 believe, Robert, now all of those types of donations 20 are put into the Trust and Agency?

21 MR. BRANDT: Correct, and that -- correct, and 22 that money is earmarked specifically for Fifth 23 Street. It won't be spent. Nobody can take it and, 24 you know, pay for fuel, or whatever.

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Government, governmental

1 budgets, we can have -- we can have funds that are 2 restricted, used for specific purposes. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There are four different 5 types of reserve funds, right, Robert? 6 MR. BRANDT: I couldn't hear you. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I said there's four types of 8 different funds that we can reserve money for, 9 restricted? 10 MR. BRANDT: Four types? 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Restricted --12 MR. BRANDT: Restricted, unrestricted, assigned 13 and -- oh, I just went blank on the fourth. I know, I can't remember. 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 15 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Trust and Agency? 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Would we be able to --MR. BRANDT: That's a function of fund balance. 17 18 Here we're talking about if someone was going to 19 donate something, and, like you're saying, someone 20 wants to donate services to a park, they can put 21 restrictions on that, I believe that's correct. If 22 someone wants to say, "Here's a play set," playground 23 or merry-go-round, or something like that --24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: One guick follow-up question with that. Let's say we had, I don't know, 25

1 Martilotta Landscaping donates "X" amount of work to 2 the park, would we be able to put up a sign? Do they 3 have that at the Little League field, like --4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, all the names that did 5 that all have signs. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So all the services 6 donated, we could do something along those lines? 7 8 MR. BRANDT: I would ask him. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm sorrv? MR. BRANDT: I would ask him. 10 11 MR. PROKOP: If it was approved by -- the sign 12 would have to be approved by the Trustees. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 13 But --14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Everybody that did that, it 17 says "Kurkeries Field" (phonetic) and it has all the 18 people that donated on it all listed on it. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. No, I had seen that. MAYOR HUBBARD: That's still there. 20 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. No. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: So we could do the same thing. 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That might be --24 MR. TASKER: It's not in a residential area, 25 though.

1 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Be careful of the signs. Please be careful. 2 3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: You want the park to look like 4 that, like a billboard? 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: What's that? 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, not necessarily, but I 7 don't know what that would look like. I don't even 8 know that it's something we want to do. I was just 9 curious if that would be --TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, because, I mean, that's 10 11 kind of like in the baseball field, that's what it 12 looks like. There's all these commercial signs up and stuff. 13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't want to do that. 14 15 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And you wouldn't want the park 16 to look like that. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: A sign that says "Landscaping 18 Done by Sound Side Landscapers" that goes there for 19 the season. I know they've done work down there before. 20 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: That could go up there. 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Something -- you know, 24 maybe something next to the latrines or something. Ι was just curious if that was even a possibility. 25

1 Okay. Thank you.

2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So, I mean, is there I'm
3	not hearing any sort of objections to this concept,
4	so is there
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. I'd just like some
6	information to see how we would go about doing it to
7	make sure it's done legally. And I didn't know if
8	the Village itself could set it up to do it with two
9	you know, two Trustees on it, setting up. That
10	sounds more like a Village function. It sounds more
11	like it should be a private function that gets it set
12	up and does it, and then comes to us
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's right.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: and then we say yes. But,
15	you know, you're going to use our property to do
16	this
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it has to be done on
19	the private sector, similar to Friends of Mitchell
20	Park.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's an interesting concept,
22	but I would like to find out more of the legalities
23	of what the Village is involved in some of them.
24	It's a very it's a very adventurous

MR. PROKOP: Okay. Well, I could look at that.
 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I haven't done enough
 research on it, really.

4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. I've been reading it 5 over and over, Doug had just sent it to me, and it's 6 got a -- it's piqued my curiosity. But I also know 7 that I need to know the legalities of it, because --8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fair enough.

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- when the -- when I was 10 finishing the Red Schoolhouse grant, part of that was 11 to set -- the funding was set aside to set up the 12 Friends of Mitchell Park, to set up the 501(c)(3), so 13 it took a little while for it to get done.

14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thank you. Some sort 15 of basic stuff. On Monday night dances, everyone's 16 favorite, I would like a resolution -- I have -- she 17 didn't give me the names in time and numbers, but I 18 have the names and numbers for the checks for the 19 Monday night dances bands, so I can give that -- can 20 we get a resolution for that?

21

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: One thing that's new on here, so the Friends of Mitchell Park have already kicked in \$3,000. We -- I have already gotten -- I've gotten soft commitments, too, for another \$1500. So

1 my next resolution here is I'm basically asking for a 2 resolution that allows me to offer in exchange for a \$500 donation from a business their name on the signs 3 and fliers that we create. So I just wanted to 4 5 have -- before I ask people to write checks, I wanted 6 to be able to say -- I wanted Board approval, 7 basically, just this is what you're getting, you're 8 getting your name on a sign, or something just real 9 simple. What of kind of --10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It's the one place that's not 11 AUDIENCE MEMBER: 12 commercial. MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, there's really not a lot 13 14 of signs that we put out for it, but, I mean --15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, we put a -- we put a 16 banner up and it's like -- so, right now -- last year 17 it said "Sponsored by IGA," because IGA kicked in 18 \$7,000, which we hope they're going to do again. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Have you approached them yet? 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Diane, the Event Coordinator,

is doing that, she's approaching them.

22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So, if it's IGA, and, you
know, so IGA has a big label, a big brand, and so
basically we're just saying, "Dances in the Park,"

you know, "Brought to you in part by" these people.
It's an opportunity to get -- to make this a
revenue-positive event, or extend it so the people
who are donating are considering that if we get
enough money, maybe we could have an extra night or
two in the Fall and they're going to make more money.
That's sort of how it goes.

8 So I don't know if I need a resolution for this 9 or not, but I feel like I need the Board's approval 10 to offer this sort of a --

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. If you're going to be 12 asking for money and everything, there should be a 13 Board resolution for it.

14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Along with the soft \$1500 17 commitment, pending Board approval, the woman who 18 coordinates this does an awful lot of work, and for 19 -- it's a big job, and it's been all volunteer and 20 she's done it for a lot of years. We pay the sound 21 guy 2700 bucks, or at least we have in the past. Ι 22 mean, I'll ask for a resolution for that again. And 23 given that she's been instrumental in raising the 24 7,000 from IGA, the 3,000 from Friends of Mitchell Park, it seems fair to me that we compensate her for 25

her time. So I'm going to propose -- I would like to
propose a \$1500 Event Coordinator fee her, for Diane
Mulvaney. So I don't know if -- that's new. So, if
you want to do that as a separate resolution -MAYOR HUBBARD: That would have to be separate,

because you already had a resolution and the budget's
 set for the \$11,000 not-to-exceed number. So you
 need to finish that one up with what you got there.
 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: This won't exceed the 11.
 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I haven't seen it yet, so
 that's --

12 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. I actually did the 13 math on that, but right. So, yeah, if you want to 14 separate those out, that's fine, but I think it's 15 worth -- it's certainly worth discussing --

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: -- as a Board. And again,
18 since she's already -- she's already raised enough
19 money to pay for it, so she's already raised \$10,000.
20 So --

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm not questioning that. It's 22 just a question of creating -- you know, volunteer 23 positions to make them paid positions changes the 24 perspective of what we're doing.

25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well, do we ask the Tall

1 Ships Coordinator to volunteer her time? We're 2 paying her, right? I mean --3 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's a paid job. This has 4 always been a volunteer job, you know. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, we'll have the discussion 7 on it. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Okay, good. Thanks. 9 Quick updates on Monday night dances. We 10 have -- we decided to go with small lock boxes to 11 walk around and collect the cash donations from 12 folks, so that money is not going into a person's hand, but into a lock box. But the committee feels 13 14 that tiny lock boxes with people circulating and volunteers circulating will be more effective. We 15 16 have also -- we've agreed that Jack or I will be on hand for the final collection of all the cash at the 17 18 end of the night and locking it in the Marina office. 19 MR. BRANDT: Is that --20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So -- sorry? 21 MR. BRANDT: Is it an employee going around and 22 collecting the donations? TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Volunteers under a Trustee's 23 24 supervision. That goes against our policy. 25 MR. BRANDT:

1 It's got to be an employee.

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Collecting the --3 MR. BRANDT: Didn't we always --4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: My understanding was that if 5 it's a lock box, then it can be a volunteer. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Are we wrong on that? 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we wrong on that? 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We might be. I don't --9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the auditors -- the 10 report we have said that it had to be employees that 11 were handling the cash and taking money in. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was our corrective 13 action plan from the Comptroller's Office --14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- who ripped us a new 16 backside up and down that we weren't handling cash 17 the proper in Mitchell Park. 18 MR. BRANDT: That's one of the locations that 19 we had an issue with that we tried to resolve. That 20 one came up last year. 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I thought the problem was 22 not that it was not an employee of the Village, but 23 more that -- it seemed to me the problem was that we 24 were handing a bucket around with cash. 25 MR. BRANDT: That was a big issue, period, yes, yes.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, that was -- oh,
 okay. Because that's what I took away was the issue,
 was that -- it's not like we had a spackle bucket we
 were walking around and getting cash in it.

MR. BRANDT: Right.

5

6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Which I could see being a 7 problem.

8 MR. BRANDT: A lock box, that big box --

9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.

10 MR. BRANDT: -- doing whatever they were doing 11 with that, but that -- what we instructed everyone to 12 do last year is to have an employee. You know, there 13 has to be Village employees collecting money for the 14 Village.

15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the challenge with that 16 from the Committee's perspective is that our 17 employees are not their Marina employees. They're 18 not bought into the event. They're not going to 19 go -- for lack of a better word, sell the lock box 20 thing, where it's the volunteer who's helping 21 organizing the event, they know people in the 22 audience, we think will do better.

23 MR. BRANDT: Mary Bess, do you remember if the 24 Trustees were okayed on that corrective action? I 25 don't recall.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's something, in all 2 honesty, I'd have to go back and take a look at. 3 MR. BRANDT: We'd have to check on that. It might be that you guys are okay to walk around and do 4 5 that as representatives of the Village. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. I didn't realize 7 that. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Robert, we'll have to go back, because we are -- we are covered under the 9 10 bonding and the insurance for the Village, so we may 11 be covered by that. I honestly don't know off the 12 top of my head. I can't answer you. Well. let's review that and 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: 14 check that, you know, find out for sure if it's --15 because we don't want to go back and to being 16 noncompliant as we were before. 17 MR. BRANDT: Exactly. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: So let's check the legality of 19 it and, you know, find out what it is. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Trying to find the best 21 revenue opportunity for us that's not so --22 MAYOR HUBBARD: The more money that comes in, the easier -- the better it is. The more that comes 23 in, that's better for all of us, you know. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Maybe if my little 25

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fundraising effort is successful, that would offset a
 loss, a shortfall in revenue because of the big lock
 box. Anyway, okay. So we'll have to look into it.
 0kay.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. Good? TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.

7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. For me, a8 couple of things quickly.

5

6

9 I'd like to make a resolution -- I'd like to 10 have one for myself and Trustee Roberts to be Village 11 Liaisons to Southold Town Board. This is something I 12 handled poorly last month. However, it was, I think a -- I think it's a good solid idea. I'd like 13 14 for us to be able to have some sort of direct contact 15 with Southold Town Board. I realize that you do, 16 Mr. Mayor. But just as some of the Trustees, if 17 you're not comfortable with who we've chosen, you let 18 me know. But there are things where I feel being 19 able to meet on a regular basis with the -- with Southold Town Board Members, I think would be -- I 20 21 think would behoove us. I think it would be helpful. 22 There's a couple of construction projects going on 23 over by the railroad tracks, just immediately out of -- out of our jurisdiction, and we would have the 24 opportunity to have some say, in addition to, you 25

1 know, stuff that comes up with the sewer, shared 2 services, infrastructure, things that would benefit 3 us mutually. I think this would give us --4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Housing. 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Housing. I think this would give us an opportunity to speak directly with 6 7 them. That would be something we'd be able to do. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. The only thing I would 9 say, that I know that the two of you started this and 10 you're both interested in it, but I'd rather have somebody -- one of you and somebody else that's been 11 12 on the Board --13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- for a while longer, just --15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, just so background of 17 what's been going on in the Village and everything Not picking on the new guys, but, I mean --18 else. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You're the Mayor. Whoever 20 you choose, sir, I would support it. I just think 21 it's a good position for us to have. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, it definitely is. The Town 23 already appointed two people, Robert Ghosio and Jim Dinizio. They're both from outside Greenport, and 24 everything else. And I think two people here working 25

1 with them, I think it's a great idea. But I would 2 like -- you know, Mary Bess has a lot of background 3 with stuff --4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- that's been going on in the 6 Village and all with one of you, whichever one of you 7 prefer to be on the committee. But I'd rather have, 8 you know, some background and some knowledge of stuff 9 that's been going on in the Village, along with one 10 of the new guys. 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: 0kav? 13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think it's a great idea. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. So --15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We just happened to be 16 sitting together when we typed it up. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I know. You had already 18 spoken to them. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: So which one would you --21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'd let you pick. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I would like to, if I 23 could. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: If that's all right.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. So we'll have --2 the resolution will be Trustee Phillips and Deputy 3 Mayor Martilotta to be the Liaisons with the newly 4 created Town Committee.

> TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Awesome. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

5

6

7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Awesome. Just cooking 8 Softball field: I don't know if everybody's along. 9 aware, we are now the -- the Mattituck League 10 essentially folded. The Riverhead League is not 11 doing so well, so we're going to be hosting most of 12 the softball games over on Moores Lane. And the 13 League has stepped up and done some work on it, but 14 there's a few things we need to do, or a few things 15 we need to do and a few things I'd like to do.

16 There's about half a dozen lights out in center 17 field, center field and center left. I'm sure that's 18 something we can fix. And some of the bulbs out 19 there are also dim. I'm not sure if that's the 20 covers or that these light bulbs get dim. I don't 21 know.

22 MAYOR HUBBARD: They might need to be cleaned 23 and taken apart --

24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- if there's bugs and stuff in

1 there, whatever.

2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. And this comes from
3	just, you know, speaking with the Chairman of one
4	of the Chairmen of the League, Chris Golden, also you
5	and I had spoke to, they had asked for these things.
6	One of the things they also asked for is along
7	the third base line, the west side of the field,
8	there's not a real fence. There's something that was
9	constructed out of plywood at some point, and it's
10	not really doing particularly well. They said if we
11	were able to reimburse them for the fence, they would
12	supply the manpower and put it up. The estimate they
13	got was \$1600. I will get a receipt for that.
14	Mr. Golden said he would get it to me as soon as
15	possible, but I just wanted to put it out there
16	and
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just normally on that, we would
18	purchase the fence and not them.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We would purchase it?
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's hard for them for us to
21	reimburse them
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: because fencing is on State
24	bid.
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

MAYOR HUBBARD: We normally do that. So if they have the estimates, or whatever, it would be hard for us to write a check out from the Village to Greenport Softball League. It's easier. The only way we could do it is to write a check out to Riverhead Fence --

7

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- to purchase the supplies,
9 and they donate the labor. We would do it that way.
10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: So he has the two estimates of 12 the prices and manages to bring that in, and we could 13 pay for the materials ourself.

14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'll speak to him tomorrow
15 about that, and that would be great, because it
16 didn't look good.

17 Last, but not least on this part, if you look 18 immediately to the west of the field just along the 19 wood line, maybe about 10 feet in, there's 20 construction debris. There's piles of plywood and --21 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the old dugouts. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm assuming it's the old 23 something.

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's the old dugouts - 25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: The old dugouts.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- that the softball league 2 took and threw in the woods, instead of disposing of 3 them. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. Which was --5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- clearly not the right 7 answer. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Clearly. And I had 10 assumed it was something along those lines. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: But with that said, it's 13 got to be in there 10 years. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: At this point, the people 16 who through them in the woods may or may not be on 17 the softball league. I don't know who they are. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: But just the same, I feel 20 that that's something that we should -- and they had 21 offered to help supply us some labor to remove them. 22 I think it's something we should clean up. We're 23 going to have people coming from the whole North Fork 24 here to play. MAYOR HUBBARD: Could we get a dumpster up 25

1 there? If we get a dumpster and put it in the 2 parking lot, and if they can get the stuff all done. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Take it over to the dumpster, 5 or whatever. If they need a hand with a backhoe 6 pulling it out, I'm sure we can have one of the -- I 7 know those guys are on weekends. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: But if we can get one of the 10 road guys to go up with a machine to just help just 11 pull it out, or whatever --12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Just yank it out and 13 then --14 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- and get it into a dumpster, 15 then we can get the dumpster and get it carted away. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That would be great. And 17 I'll speak to them about it tomorrow. I'm sure 18 they'll be -- they'll actually be thrilled, because 19 it's the dugouts. That awesome. 20 I'm not sure exactly how this goes, All riaht. 21 this is -- all right. Mutual aid call for the Tall 22 Ships Event. I was told that we should ask for this, 23 and I don't know if I'm doing this right, because I've never done this before. I know that the Fire 24 Department will be running a festival over on Moores 25

1 Lane during the Tall Ships, and at least a couple of 2 davs, if I'm not mistaken. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. It goes from Wednesday to 4 Sunday. 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: To Sunday. And then --6 MAYOR HUBBARD: And that's two companies in the 7 Fire Department that are doing it. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And with the Tall Ships 9 going on, Chief Flatley has suggested that we ask for a mutual aid call for -- and I believe this has to 10 11 be --12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Fire Department asks for 13 that. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: They do, but they asked me 15 to bring it up at the meeting. I'm not sure. No, no 16 need? 0kay 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Chief Flatley asked for it, 18 or the Fire -- the representative on the committee 19 for the Fire Department asked for it? 20 CLERK PIRILLO: We were discussing it. We were 21 discussing it at the Steering Committee. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. 23 CLERK PIRILLO: So we were discussing it at the Steering Committee, and we said that we would bring 24 it back to -- because we didn't have a Fire 25

1 Department representative there --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, so that's what --2 3 CLERK PIRILLO: -- that night, so we said we 4 would just bring it back to them as a gentle 5 reminder. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 7 CLERK PIRILLO: They know they have to do it. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 9 CLERK PIRILLO: They would just bring it to 10 them. 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I just wanted to make sure 12 I didn't miss that piece. CLERK PIRILLO: A friendly reminder. Thank you. 13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. Thank you. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Normally, like they do 16 for the Strawberry Festival in Mattituck, or 17 whatever. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: If they feel that they don't 20 have enough manpower to handle it, they'll ask for 21 assistance from another department, but that's 22 something the Chief would take care of. 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. Okay. Like I 24 said, I wasn't sure how that was supposed to happen. 25 Right. The Clerk will relay MAYOR HUBBARD:

1 that information.

2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. Moving along. 3 Moving along. Digitization of Village documents, the Laserfiche -- Laserfiche. Okay. One of the things 4 5 we ran on was transparency in government, and we have an opportunity to put out -- we have an opportunity 6 7 to digitize our documents. 8 I want to be very clear on how I would see this 9 going forward. If I may, the first thing I think 10 we'd have to do -- we have to do is put an RFP for a It's about \$6,000. Spoke to Lloyd, who's 11 scanner. 12 last name is escaping me. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Reisenberg. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Reisenberg. He said about 15 \$6,000, and we could start digitizing it. Southold 16 Town got a grant a couple of years back and they were 17 able to put all of their documents up on the website. 18 I think it's something that we should do as well. 19 Now --If I could. 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Please. 21 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: One of the benefits to this 23 is that FOIL requests, so if I need to FOIL most 24 things from Southold Town, I go to their website, and I go to Laserfiche and I search, you know, whatever, 25

1 whatever I want to find and it's all there. It's a big process of scanning all the documents into the 2 3 system, and I think we start with the documents that 4 come out of this meeting first and worry about the 5 old stuff later on. But once we -- once we kind of 6 take it on the chin and get this project done, then 7 we should save countless Village resources responding 8 to FOIL requests, because everything will just be out 9 there. And that's an important kind of long-term 10 cost savings there. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And so how am I going to 11

12 do this? I lost my part.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, we can have a resolution 13 14 to go to do the RFP, but you have to have some kind 15 of spec of what you're going to RFP for. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So I need the specific --17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the equipment or 18 whatever, whatever you're going to need for it. 19 CLERK PIRILLO: I think it's not actually an 20 RFP, it's probably a bid. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 23 CLERK PIRILLO: Because it's not services. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Okay, yes.

25 CLERK PIRILLO: It's for the actual scanner,

1 which is a machine.

2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. CLERK PIRILLO: So it's a bid, number one. 3 4 Number two, I don't think you can have that one machine as a stand-alone. In other words, once you 5 6 have a scanner, and the microfiche, you need, according to Jeanmarie -- I wasn't at the meeting --7 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 9 CLERK PIRILLO: -- that you went to, because I 10 was out of the office. You need other parts as well, 11 okay? 12 We participated in the grant with Southold Town 13 and we started the process of scanning records. From 14 our perspective, and I would love to minimize the time that we spend on FOILs, that would be wonderful 15 16 for everyone. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 18 CLERK PIRILLO: But in addition to that, also, 19 what we have -- excuse me. What we have is of utmost 20 importance are birth and death certificates. So 21 we've already started the process with Southold Town 22 of scanning, and we have a reciprocal relationship 23 with their computer system. So we would need to 24 integrate this into that system as well, so that we can have all the parts talk to each other. 25

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TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Lloyd told us that we can do 3 that. It's my understanding that we're part of this 4 grant and we're actually not -- we're not using the 5 opportunity right now, so --

6 CLERK PIRILLO: We started, and we do it 7 sporadically based on -- unfortunately, based on the 8 manpower that we have, because it takes a very long 9 time manually to scan records. I know Jeanmarie was 10 up there for some half days when I could spare her, 11 begrudgingly, and we've done it, we've done it that 12 way. We also had people on the Southold side helping us that we wanted to thank them for. 13

14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What about a temp agency? 15 The Deputy Clerk cannot have time for this, I would 16 imagine.

CLERK PIRILLO: Not at all.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You guys are busy, right?
 19 CLERK PIRILLO: That's part of the problem.
 20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So what if we hire a temp
 21 agency?

22 CLERK PIRILLO: Fantastic. I don't know
 23 where - 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Would it work? I mean --

25 CLERK PIRILLO: I don't know where Robert is

1 going to find us the money, but yes, absolutely, no 2 problem. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, why don't you put 4 together the bid, not just the scanner, but whatever 5 software, whatever we're going to need to make it so 6 it's functional. 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: And let's the equipment if 9 we're going to do that, and then we'll figure out how 10 much we want to go into hire a temp or hire somebody 11 else to do that. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, but just talk to 14 Lloyd about what we actually need to make this 15 functioning, so it's tied into their system, so that 16 we don't have something that's here and we can't do 17 anything with it. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. No, absolutely. 19 Very fair. Thank you. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Find out what we need and get 21 the specs on that and move forward for it. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. Thank you. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Jack, just for your information --24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm sorry. I have 25

1 terrible allergies.

2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay. I feel it 3 myself.

I happened to be at the library today at the
Greenport Improvement Committee meeting, and I
happened to mention this type of technique or
technology, and the libraries have gotten away from
it. They've started using the cloud instead.
TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Part of it is the fact that 11 technology changes continuously, and we used to go 12 from the little, you know, the video machines --

13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, sure.

14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- to the floppy disks, to 15 whatever. So the library systems are far more 16 advanced than we are as far as recordkeeping, and 17 maybe it would behoove you to take a couple of 18 minutes to stop and talk to Lisa Richland about what 19 their future plans are for documentation and 20 recordkeeping in the library.

21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. My sister actually 22 works in Cutchogue Library, so I have some experience 23 with that. My reason for thinking we should pursue 24 this one with Southold is it's all purchased, you 25 know what I mean? They have the capacity to store

these documents. So if we could get capacity to put
 them in there --

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I understand. But what 4 I'm trying to say is that you have another 5 opportunity to -- before we start spending money on 6 something, perhaps there is another alternative.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A different way. Maybe the 9 library will be able to work with us to -- the 10 libraries will always be around. They will always be 11 the record-keepers for us, whether they're in print 12 form or in the new technology.

13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.

7

14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think to gather more 15 information before we spend money, even though we are 16 part of the grant. I understand the birth 17 certificates and the death certificates, they are 18 kind of important to -- you know, for recordkeeping 19 for New York State as well. But some of our records 20 that are in the basement there I'm concerned about. 21 and that's just where I'm coming from. So I would 22 take the opportunity to spend a couple of minutes 23 with them.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely, I will. Andthank you, I appreciate that.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. We didn't put this in 2 the written report, because the meeting happened after it was due, but Jack and I went to go see 3 4 Assemblyman Palumbo as not representing the Board, but as two Trustees and constituents. We had a 5 6 really great meeting, even though he was a half hour 7 late. And we talked about a number of things, you 8 know, long-term things like cleaning up the waters 9 with the sewer system, trying to find housing 10 There are a couple of short-term opportunities. 11 things that he seemed to feel we could get done 12 pretty quickly if we get what's called a Home Rule I'm looking at Joe, because does that mean 13 Letter. 14 something? Is that a --

It's a resolution of the Board. 15 MR. PROKOP: 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay, right. So I guess I'm 17 asking for a resolution to write a Home Rule Letter 18 that says we're asking New York State for blinking 19 lights in the crosswalks, crosswalks on Front Street, 20 to sort of slow down our speeders who come into town 21 and don't realize we have a bunch of kids walking 22 around in our crosswalks.

And I wanted to propose a similar Home Rule Letter to the Assemblyman for increased signage on Route 25, telling people exactly where to turn for

1 Shelter Island Ferry. I think that might help 2 alleviate a lot of congestion down there, some sort of sign that says -- if we need a plan for this, I 3 4 don't have the plan tonight. But, you know, he 5 seemed to think that there's a pot of money between 6 he and Senator LaValle, something like \$50,000, that if they have a Home Rule Letter, they can do small 7 8 projects like this. So I thought if he's offering us 9 money, we should take it.

10 So signage around Shelter Island Ferry, so it's very clear, you know, "Turn on Sixth Street in a half 11 12 mile," and -- because right now, I think you all know, the sign that shows you where the ferry is 13 14 something that somebody made with like paint on a piece of plywood or something. So he offered to help 15 16 us with signage. So I thought that was really 17 positive, so we wanted to come to you all and share 18 that with you and ask for that resolution.

I think if you split these two, if you do
those -- the blinking light one seems to be -- I'm
assuming you all would support that. That one I
think we could get done pretty quickly. The signage
one requires a little bit of discussion and thought.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm not sure about the -- even
though I'm very concerned about safety in the

1 crosswalks, those blinking light structures are 2 pretty large and, as we know, our sidewalks are 3 pretty narrow down there to begin with. So if you 4 put --5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry, I'm talking about 6 a little -- it's a little thing that goes on the 7 street. 8 **TRUSTEE ROBINS:** Oh, in the street. 9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: In the crosswalk. It's a 10 little piece of tape. 11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, I thought you were talking 12 about the one like --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sorry, no. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- we have over by the school. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I should have been clear. 15 16 It's a -- it's a -- it looks like -- it's like a 17 little wire, essentially, that blinks to show people 18 there is a crosswalk here, you're supposed to slow 19 down. 20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. And it shows up during 21 the daytime, as well as at night? 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Uh-huh, yeah. It's like a 23 flashing yellow in the street. I can provide you 24 with a picture of one. MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I never heard of that 25

1 before, but that's --

2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Those two come in you've
3	all seen it, right? Those two crosswalks, people in
4	the summer, people blow through there.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, yeah.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We could put a
8	resolution on to send a letter and request them to
9	pay for some new signs. I'm sure they're going to
10	probably want more information of what you want on
11	the signs, and stuff like that, so maybe work on it.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. Maybe let's take one
13	at a time. Why don't we do the pedestrian crosswalk
14	thing now and
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. It sounds like that
16	should be quick, if they're going to install it and
17	put it in, it's just a matter of getting power to
18	them and everything else.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's going to be running wires
21	over the top if you're going to try to get to the
22	overhead lines
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, okay. Okay.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: where they're going to be,
25	you know. So, I mean, this

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Not right next to a pole where 3 the crosswalk is, how you're going to power them --4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Right.

5 MAYOR HUBBARD: We have to take a closer look 6 at it and see what's there.

7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, sure. But either way, 8 the State would pay. And he seems to think there's a 9 pot of money that was appropriated this past session 10 for Home Rule items like this, and he is a fan of 11 Greenport, so --

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

12

13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We had a nice conversation14 with it.

Yeah. The other things we talked about,
there's an opportunity potentially next year to tap
into the Environmental Protection Fund in a
significant way, which he did for Riverhead last year
for their sewer system, for a sewer expansion.

20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Almost \$5 million, I
21 believe.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. So he said that
basically how that went down is that Sean Walters was
-- Sean Walter, Walters, the Town Supervisor of
Riverhead was the squeaky wheel and just persisted

and they got the money. So I'm proposing to be a squeaky wheel on our behalf, and I think getting as much for our sewer system so we can all support it.

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4 The MTA, so reached out through kind of various 5 connections to get -- I've built a relationship with 6 Mitch Pally, who sits on the Board of the MTA, 7 represents Suffolk County, and he's also a fan of 8 Greenport. A lot of people are a fan of Greenport, 9 which is great. He offered to bring together some of 10 the folks who were responsible for their sites, 11 landscape architect, real estate person, and then an 12 overall project manager, and come out and visit with us, and I invited George. You couldn't be there that 13 14 day, so I went and listened to -- basically what they 15 did, they provided this drawing that I put in the 16 report to indicate to us the areas here at the MTA 17 site that once the County is out of -- you know, no 18 longer a tenant to them, that will be directly under 19 our control. And what they said was go back to the 20 Board and come up with a plan, and we're all ears for 21 a plan for the site. It's unlike any other site they 22 have, because it's got waterfront involved, and 23 because it's, you know, part of this kind of seasonal 24 village that is desperate for parking in the summer. They don't -- they can't -- they can't put a 25

1 bunch of time and energy into it, as you all know, 2 because we don't get much service and enough ridership out here. So, anyway, I put the drawing 3 4 into the report and I would love to know exactly how we can -- I think the thing to do probably -- but I'm 5 not an expert here. I road my bike around the site. 6 It feels to me like maybe 200 parking spots. 7 The MTA 8 offered to flatten it for us, which I thought was 9 great, but they don't want to do anything without a 10 plan from us. And that there are two key things that 11 could happen here based on the plan that we proposed 12 to the MTA. And again, I have to tell you, they seem to think -- they steam to sort of say, "Give us a 13 14 good plan and we'll let you do what you'd like with it." One of those is, if you look at this map, and 15 16 those of you in the public, you have it in the 17 document, there's a little piece that's outlined in a 18 dotted line. It's hard to tell without color, that 19 is the lease they have with the ferry company, and 20 then the rest of it is the lease that they have with 21 the County and now us.

It is possible for us to take over control of this entire piece of land, which has significant revenue implications with the ferry company. What I'd like to call the moon parking lot, which is the

1 one north, because it has a big crater in it, that's 2 currently, yeah, up on Wiggins. It's used right now mostly for parking for a bunch of the buildings on 3 4 that street. That, from there, actually right 5 with -- when the County deal goes through, the 6 turnaround just south of that will become under our 7 control, which means that we could do a whole variety 8 of things there. We could put up a toll booth if we 9 want.

10 So we're going to have -- there's a way for us 11 to build a plan that looks forward in terms of our 12 needs as a Village, in terms of parking, and that 13 becomes a really -- gets us revenue that I believe we 14 deserve after years and years and years of the ferry 15 company giving us not a dime to help with our roads, 16 and their customers tearing them up.

Beyond that, we all -- we had an interesting discussion with the MTA folks about the Hampton Jitney, and the fact that they're using the MTA property that is leased to us and none of us are getting anything from that.

So my -- I'm not here with a detailed proposal of what I -- I'm throwing out some ideas, and I want to, either if this is the right time to have a discussion, or at the next work session, or whenever,

but I think this deserves some thought. I also think
there's probably, much like you're getting somebody
to do analysis on the roads, there's probably -there's probably someone in your world who does
analysis of sites like this who can offer us, you
know, the best kind of revenue -- revenue-friendly
plans for this.

8 Also, a surprise to me and meeting with the MTA 9 folks, the lot on the west side of Fourth Street is 10 also part of their property, which they indicated 11 they would be happy for us to take over, and that, by 12 my account, could be 20, 30 parking spots. One of 13 the MTA folks recommended you make that, quote, 14 unquote, long-term parking. And all of this could 15 include us beginning to finally charge for parking 16 down here.

17 People come -- I mean, I went down there today 18 and you can tell Memorial Day weekend is coming, 19 because all the people have come and they've started 20 to park their cars and go over on the ferry to save 21 money on the ferry, so we kind of lose on both ends. 22 We get nothing from the ferry company taking people 23 back and forth, and they're taking up our parking. So, when people come to visit this weekend, they're 24 going to have to park further away or park in front 25

1 of someone's house.

2 So this to me, this is a great opportunity. 3 I'm really excited about it, and I want your 4 direction and -- your direction as to how we take 5 advantage of it. The first step is we get someone to 6 kind of provide us with options. The first step is 7 we put our heads together and brainstorm, and then 8 have our analyst engineer person go and use those 9 recommendations. But I see revenue, I see parking, I 10 see a great opportunity for Greenport.

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We had a parking study 12 done, I believe it was three years ago, that included 13 that piece of property, so we should probably look at 14 the parking study. I don't remember what specs are 15 in there. But before the parking meter talk came up 16 a couple of years ago, the parking study was done 17 throughout the whole Village and that property was 18 all included in that. So we'll have a look at what's 19 in that parking study before we go and start 20 repeating stuff on it.

Also, we need to look at -- because the Railroad site, Railroad Museum, they're trying to lease their -- that part of the property themselves, right? And we're working on the other four leases. Where do we stand with that?

1 MR. PROKOP: We're --

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything from the County? 3 MR. PROKOP: All the paperwork is done and 4 signed off on. We're waiting for an email from the 5 MTA confirming that the agreement -- that the 6 property in the assumption agreement is the same 7 property as described in the lease. For some reason 8 that they won't back off from, the lease describes 9 the part -- the lease has a certain description of 10 the property that's involved, and they use the 11 different description in the assumption agreement, 12 although I asked them to use the same agreement so we 13 know it's the same property. They didn't do that, 14 and I wanted -- I asked them to give us an email 15 confirming it's the same property, so we at least 16 have something, and we're waiting for them. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who's -- I mean, with the 18 19 railroad, who's taking over the old turntable? Is 20 that still going to be on our portion? 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. You know, just the -- we 24 spoke to them --25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just the building, right.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Just the old package house.
 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.

3 MAYOR HUBBARD: That they're going to go and 4 lease that directly. So they would be out of the 5 picture of the four leases we had. Well, let's get 6 the status of where we stand with that stuff. Let's 7 look at the parking study, and put that information 8 together, and try to see if we can come up with some 9 kind of plan on it.

10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There also was at one point, 11 when I first was elected, there -- or before I was 12 elected, there was some committees that were meeting 13 in reference to down there. There had been a plan 14 put together dealing with making a transportation hub 15 down there, so --

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's part of the parking 17 study and everything else that was done there.

18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it still in there? I
19 can't remember if that was part of it.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'd have to go back and just 21 find that information and see what's there, so we 22 don't have to start redoing stuff that was just done, 23 and it was all done fairly. It was done within five 24 years. I don't remember exactly, but we can look at 25 that.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We've got the ears and the 2 potential support of some folks at the MTA who want 3 to help us, so. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, let's figure out 5 where we stand with the leases, how long it's going 6 to be before we actually have control. Let's look at the parking study and then we can --7 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yup. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- discuss it further. 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sounds great. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Awesome. 13 MR. SUSSMAN: Just one comment. You've got to remember that that's also a New York State and 14 Federal Historic site. 15 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you. Oh, Farmers 18 Market, here we go. All right. I kind of wanted to 19 address the Farmers Market to let you know where 20 we're at and what's going on with this. 21 We had spoke to the people who run the Farmers 22 They're going to be evicted from where Market. 23 they've been hosting it at the Methodist Church. The 24 Methodist Church, as you -- as we all probably know, is closing its doors. 25

One of the original places we were looking at
 was to host it basically in the lawn right over in
 front of the Firehouse.

4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So let's back up a second.
5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sorry. Go ahead.
6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're proposing that a great
7 thing for a community to have is a Farmers Market.
8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.

9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And that it would be great to 10 welcome a Farmers Market back to the Village. It's a 11 great thing for families, great thing for kids. I 12 want my daughter to be able to go and meet the person 13 who made the honey, or meet the person who grew the 14 chicken, or grew the oyster, or the cauliflower that 15 we're going to buy.

16 So our first proposal is that this would be a 17 great thing for the Village to host. We want to talk 18 to you about what are your thoughts about how we do 19 that, and what sort of fee structure to put in place. 20 And then the second challenge is finding an 21 We have a lot of great sites appropriate site. 22 around here. For obvious reasons, Mitchell Park is 23 not -- we're not going to propose that. We don't 24 want to propose a site that takes away parking, so then that takes us to the original site, which we're 25

1 no longer going to propose.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No longer going to
propose. That was the original one. We met with the
Chief, who didn't like the idea.

5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The Wardens, we met with the 6 Wardens.

7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: The Wardens, yeah. Well, 8 the Chief had spoken for them, deferred to him. And 9 he knows -- he didn't feel it was a good place, and 10 he would certainly know more than us.

11 Other places we were looking at, in speaking to 12 those involved, was the Third Street Park. We were 13 also looking at Steamboat Alley, if I'm not mistaken, 14 Doug.

15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Possibly.

16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Possibly.

17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I mean, it could be down at 18 the beach. Talked to some folks who recommended 19 actually the moon parking lot, the one with the big 20 crater there, because it's central and there's a lot 21 of parking near there.

22 So I think the first question for you all is 23 what are your thoughts on having the Farmers Market 24 come back to the Village? We think it's a great 25 idea. What do you think?

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, first of all, I never 2 thought it left the Village, because it was down on 3 First Street. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, I know. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, I mean, let's be, you 6 know --7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: On Village property. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think a great place for the 11 Farmers Market would be up in the Polo Grounds. 12 There's plenty -- plenty of parking up there, wide 13 open spaces, children can run around up there, you 14 know, and it's within walking or biking distance, 15 basically. I think that's an underutilized space, to 16 be honest with you, and a great space. They had the 17 Skate Park Festival there last year. So I think that should be on the table, definitely. 18 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. The Steamboat corner, 21 that's a memorial to all our Veterans. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. MAYOR HUBBARD: And I would not even think 23 24 about that one, actually, you know. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay, you got it. I was 25

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kind of thinking along those lines myself.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. There's no parking down 3 there. It's a very crowded intersection. That would 4 be a dangerous place.

5 We had talked several years ago, before they 6 moved to the Methodist Church, about the parking lot 7 right across from the liquor store. The farthest 8 west parking lot has one entrance in to block that 9 There's 19 -- 18 parking spots in there. off. 10

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yup.

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: The deadened of Second Street. 12 The first parking lot, you block it off from 8 to 12 Saturday morning. After 12, then it's open for the 13 rest of the day. 14

> TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know about that. That 17 was mentioned in the past. At the time, there was 18 price discrepancies and everything going back and 19 forth between the Farmers Market and the Board, and 20 that's when they decided to go to the Methodist 21 Church, if I remember that correctly.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav.

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: If everybody's comfortable with 24 that, I think that's -- it's a parking lot, it's downtown, there's parking right there. Take a look 25

at it. Talk to Lara. You know which parking lot I'm
 talking about, Lara?

3

MS. MC NEIL: Yeah.

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Do you think that would work? 5 When it was Adams Street, there was a lot of Village 6 manned -- Village resources to block off half of 7 Adams Street to where they were doing it and all. It 8 took a lot of effort to separate it each weekend. 9 Down there, put a barricade up on Friday night, and 10 they'll park in that one parking lot. When they're 11 done, you take the barricades down. It's very little 12 work from the Village to do it, and it's in a central 13 location downtown.

14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the other point or
15 positive of that particular is that as you go across
16 the parking lots, it connects you -- you have an easy
17 access from Front Street coming across the back.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: On the walkway.

19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure, the walkway.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's an advantage for them. But perhaps maybe, if Lara's here, I just heard maybe we could just get -- if you don't mind, and if the rest of the Board Members don't mind, maybe she could come up to the podium and we could probably talk about the parking lot idea.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That would be great. 2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It would be awesome. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In a few moments, if the 4 rest of the Board Members agree. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, it's fine. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'd love it. If we're on it, let's just --7 MAYOR HUBBARD: 8 MS. MC NEIL: Lara McNeil. My main concern 9 would be the fact those parking lots are heavily used 10 for people who live in the neighborhood there, so how we would kind of tackle that problem of having it 11 12 there. You know, now we have an ice cream shop that has decided to live there, so how do we address that? 13 14 I guess how do we kind of keep the long-term parking 15 that seems to have occurred in the Village municipal 16 lots? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I have a couple of items down 19 the list, so maybe we'll --20 MAYOR HUBBARD: How do you -- that's going to

20 MATOR HOBBARD: How do you -- that's going to 21 be a problem anywhere. I know just the kids playing 22 on the side lot here, the neighbors were complaining 23 about it. The neighbors said to me, if you're going 24 to bring all this right next door to their houses, 25 they weren't comfortable with that. Down there,

there's the couple of houses on the dead end of
 Second Street, but there's really no other neighbors
 that would bother, except the people just parking
 there.

MS. MC NEIL: Right.

5

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: And if they would just put a 7 notice on them, "No Parking Saturday Mornings From 8 8 to 12," and have them use the other part of the 9 parking lot, you know.

10MS. MC NEIL: It might be an educational11effort.

MAYOR HUBBARD: I think so. I think once they know about it, it's going to be there. I think it gives you enough room to do it. I counted, there's nine spots on each side, so it would 18 parking spots for the four hours, but there's not much else that would really bother at that spot.

18 MS. MC NEIL: Right.

19 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know.

MS. MC NEIL: That's really my only concern about that. And then, obviously, I don't want to be like the person taking away parking from anybody either.

24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We'll do that.

25 MS. MC NEIL: Okay.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that parking lot
 doesn't really get heavily used for transient,
 similar to what you had going on down in the Adams
 Street parking spots.

MS. MC NEIL: Right.

5

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Another idea, and once 7 again, it probably would present a problem, is I had 8 emailed you to see if the vendors would fit down here 9 on the grassy knoll of the Third Street Park.

10 MS. MC NEIL: Well, that was what the second --11 you know, that was the second one after we came to 12 the Wardens meeting last night. Kind of just felt 13 that they didn't feel like it was a good idea.

14 I overall, and I'm saying this as a Village 15 resident, and somebody who lives very close, feel 16 like it would be great to have something positive 17 going on in this part of town, and the Farmers Market 18 is very positive. And if they went over there, it 19 would add a positive vibe to something that was 20 really not very positive. And it would just bring a 21 different -- probably bring people to this part of 22 town that have never even been here that have lived 23 in other parts of town. So that's what my -- you 24 know, one of my thoughts about that whole thing, really. 25

1 I mean, I do -- I agree with MAYOR HUBBARD: 2 your concept on it. The only thing, there's no 3 parking around the whole park and on the other side 4 of the street. So there's no parking anywhere near 5 So anybody who would want to pull up with that. 6 their car would have to park either in the Firehouse 7 or down on West Street or something.

8

MS. MC NEIL: Right.

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Because it's all no parking 10 around the whole perimeter of the park, yes, and on 11 the other side of the street, because it's very 12 tight, because there's a narrow road to the S turns 13 there. So there's no parking anywhere in that whole 14 area.

15

MS. MC NEIL: Right.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: So those people would be into 17 the neighborhoods or somewhere else, because they 18 wouldn't be able to park there at all. But, I mean, 19 being on the grass would be fine, but if you would 20 come by car, you're going to pull in the parking lot 21 right here, or on the side streets. You can't park 22 right next to it.

23 MS. MC NEIL: I don't feel like that many 24 people come to the market by car, to be honest with 25 you.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh. no. Well --2 MS. MC NEIL: So that's just my observation. Ι 3 don't think that we ever expanded beyond that one 4 block where we were on First Street. And, easily, 5 the people could park on Center Street. I think we 6 would probably have to put a sign or something up, so 7 people -- that was -- that was my original reason for 8 saying this, because I thought, oh, people are going 9 to be parking in these spots, right, so -- and, 10 certainly, I could try to control that, and the 11 vendors can park anywhere. I could -- the vendors 12 are going to park wherever I tell them to park. I'm 13 kind of pretty strict with vendors. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, you want to take a 15 look at those two spots? Everybody take a look at 16 those two spots, and, you know --17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That would be great. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- see what we could do. 19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: When do you plan on -- when do 21 you start? 22 MS. MC NEIL: Whenever I can. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. I didn't know if you 24 started, you know, the end of June. MS. MC NEIL: Yeah, no. They're cleaning out, 25

1 the Pastor over there, so that wasn't even an option 2 over there, so we're totally in limbo. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. If those places 4 accommodate it, I mean, I'm in favor of continuing 5 with the Farmers Market. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Those were the matters before. 8 It just came down to, you know, it was money and 9 where to put it, you know. 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. sure. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So do we know -- do we know 12 where the -- what the costs would be, or what we're 13 -- so we should talk about the money part of it. 14 What were you -- what were we hoping? 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I believe in the past, 16 you were paying 750 to the Village, and then it was 17 going to go up to 2500, because of the man hours and 18 everything, because we had guys down there blocking 19 off the road and everything else. There was a lot of 20 overtime with guys that were working on other stuff, 21 instead of what they were supposed to be doing. 22 MS. MC NEIL: Do you mind if I speak to that 23 quick? MAYOR HUBBARD: 24 Sure. MS. MC NEIL: I physically -- I physically put 25

1 all the cones and barrels.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well --3 MS. MC NEIL: Just like I physically went --4 and they're heavy, so I remember clearly doing it. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 6 MS. MC NEIL: And I didn't charge. MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Well, as reported 7 8 back, whatever --9 MS. MC NEIL: I know. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- the discussion was, you 11 know, the guys were down there blocking off the road. 12 There was, you know, Village resources involved in doing it. That's why the price went up, and I 13 14 believe that's when you went to the Methodist 15 Church --16 MS. MC NEIL: Right. MAYOR HUBBARD: -- for the same price. Okay. 17 18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So do we have a sense that 19 this would be less expensive on Adams, on -- on the lot on South? 20 21 I mean, it's a matter of MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 22 just settling on a price. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, they were paying 750 24 If everybody's comfortable with the 750 or 25 there.

1 I wouldn't go back to the \$2500 fee. 1.000. It's a 2 matter of two barricades to make sure it's blocked 3 off the night before, and then take the barricades 4 down. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm comfortable with the 5 6 750. MAYOR HUBBARD: 7 Okay. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's -- I'm feeling that 9 figure out. Okay. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thank you. The next 11 item --12 CLERK PIRILLO: Excuse me. MAYOR HUBBARD: 13 Yes. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: The Stenographer would like to take a 10-minute recess, if that's okay. 15 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. 17 MS. BRAATEN: I could go until 10 o'clock. 18 CLERK PIRILLO: Until 10 o'clock? 19 MS. BRAATEN: Until 10 o'clock. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Quickly, this one I think is 22 a no-brainer, at least it is to me. We've had a lot 23 of horrible tragedies around drunk diving around We're about to enter the summers season. 24 here. Ι think we can do a very easy and good thing for the 25

1 community by marking a spot as a taxi stand right at 2 the corner of Front and Main. So I would like a resolution to do that, and then put out an RFP for 3 4 taxi companies to apply to the provider of the cab or 5 the taxi stand. I think on these weekend evenings, 6 you're going to find people will use this, and I 7 think we might potentially save a life or two. So 8 thoughts?

9 Okay. I just -- I don't think MAYOR HUBBARD: that's a good spot for it. Probably taking one of 10 11 the prime parking spots that we have downtown right 12 on that corner, because you have a loading zone right next to the Coronet, you have no parking across the 13 14 street in front of the Sweet Indulgences. The next 15 spot you would take would be back in front of Toppy's 16 Salon and it's a very busy area. I mean, if we put 17 it over on First Street where the bus stop is and had 18 something over there --

19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- maybe they could just --

21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah.

22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or central.

MAYOR HUBBARD: But right on Front and Main,
because it's actually, you know, the State road down
there, you know, First Street is a Village road, to

1 put something on First Street and have a taxi stop. 2 So instead of going out the front of Whiskey Wind, 3 you go out the back door and the taxi's there. I'm 4 just, you know --5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, that's a good idea. Ι 6 never though of that. MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, put it back there 7 8 where we had the bus stop to put a taxi stop back 9 there, not on the main road. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So can we have a resolution 10 11 to do that on the agenda? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, just to create a parking 13 spot for it. 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And then to --MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, what's involved. 15 Just to 16 try to do a handicapped parking spot, we have to go 17 through a process, where it's not a matter of just --18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, really? 19 MR. PROKOP: Parking is actually allocated by 20 the code, so we would have to eventually change the 21 code. 22 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But we can just -- can we 23 just create a taxi stand spot and so only allow taxis 24 to park there, the way we do for the Police and --MAYOR HUBBARD: You have to do that by code, 25

2 It has to be a code change. 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: So, when we go to designate a 5 handicapped spot and that's for a church or 6 something, we have to go and say this is a spot, have 7 a public hearing and try to designate it that way. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So does this then go 9 to --10 It's just a matter of we have MAYOR HUBBARD:

and you can't write a ticket, you can't enforce it.

to schedule a public hearing to create a taxi spot,
do a resolution to do that, and we have a public
hearing on it.

14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thanks.

15MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Can you put that16down on there, Sylvia?

CLERK PIRILLO: Okay.

1

17

18 MAYOR HUBBARD: And then we'll get the public 19 comment on it and everything else about it at that 20 time.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And then realizing that -- I didn't realize we had a time limit, and I didn't realize this was going to take so long. So, I mean, we have other things we've written down here, you know, so I have to go through them because I want to

1 discuss them.

2 The short term -- I think a big piece of 3 getting towards short-term rentals in these 4 resolutions, we're requesting to move the --5 everybody around here, except Village of Greenport, 6 has five bedrooms in their B&Bs, and I think it would 7 ease some of the stress on our B&B community if we --8 if we put out there to the public to revise our code to make us a five-room B&B. And that would help them 9 10 pick up more of the -- our legal B&Bs pick up more of 11 the kind of transient housing needs, instead of the 12 short-term rental piece, which is going to take us a 13 long time to figure out what we're with, and, in the 14 meantime, it's completely unregulated and we don't know if it's safe, we don't know who's doing what. 15 16 No we don't, you're right. MAYOR HUBBARD: 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I hope we might consider 18 letting the B&Bs rent to five, instead of three, and 19 put that into the proces for public hearing and the 20 code revision. And I wrote the specific language 21 down in here, so --22 MAYOR HUBBARD: We could schedule public 23 hearings to switch that over, that would be fine. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Doug the only thing is --MAYOR HUBBARD: 25 We can have a public hearing on it.

1 TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- I did look at the whole B&B law, the 150-7 law, and there are a number of items 2 3 there that would also go along with that in terms of 4 if you were going to increase the number of rooms 5 from three to five. Then would that also mean that you would have to add an additional two parking 6 7 spaces? Would you have to increase the minimum lot 8 size from 10,000 square feet? And would you have to 9 increase the square footage of the house, which is 10 now 2000 square feet? So all of those things I think 11 would have to move along with it, too.

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: The public hearing would vet 13 all that out and we'd go through that information at 14 the public hearing doing it.

15

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Some of the B&Bs might not be 17 capable of going from three to five. But if they 18 have -- if they meet all the other restrictions and 19 everything else, and they have the room and the lot 20 size and everything else, great. So we would have a 21 public hearing and discuss all that.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. But I just think that
those other things would have to be changed as
well --

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. Well, it would be on the

1 whole thing, because we would change -- review the 2 whole section of the code. TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- to accommodate the 3 4 additional parking and --5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Doesn't it read that 6 you have to have parking for all your rooms? It 7 doesn't say three, right? 8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It says one off-street parking 9 space is provided for each rental room. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So if you increase it 11 to five, then I think you have --12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: You have to have two 13 additional parking spaces. 14 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, the code already sort 15 of says that. But the square footage, yeah, we have 16 to --17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Square footage of minimum 18 house size, 2000 square feet. There are other ones 19 in here in terms of size. And the room has to be 120 20 square feet, which is 10-by-12, egress. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll have a public hearing on it. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We'll have the public 22 23 hearing in --Right, get the neighbors of 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: them and everything else, and let everyone talk about 25

1 it and we'll discuss it. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Done? 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Trustee Robins. 6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. Two things. I was 7 going to give this last month. I wanted to give a 8 little information about how our electrical system 9 works here in Greenport, it's brief. I've just 10 written it, but I've tried write it in a way that 11 would be fairly understandable to the public. 12 So the Village of Greenport obtains over 70% of our electric -- our electric from electric 13 14 hydropower. This power is produced from Niagara Falls and here's how it works: 15 16 The Niagara Falls plant is located 17 approximately four-and-a-half miles downstream from 18 Niagara Falls. It is made up of two main facilities, 19 the Robert Moses Niagara Power Plant and the Lewiston 20 Pump-Generating Plant. In between the two plants is 21 a forebay that can hold about 740 million gallons of 22 water. Located behind the Lewiston Plant is a 23 1900-acre reservoir that holds additional supplies of 24 Basically, up to 375,000 gallons of water a water.

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second is diverted from Niagara River and conveyed

through conduits under the City of Niagara Falls to
 Lewiston. From Lewiston, the water flows through the
 Robert Moses Plant and spins turbines that power
 generators, which in turn convert this mechanical
 energy into electrical energy.

6 The cost of hydropower is significantly less 7 than the power that we purchase from the ISO, or 8 Independent System Operator. This power we purchase 9 from the ISO is called incremental power.

10 The ISO is like a broker that administrates 11 electric cost for generators, who are the power 12 plants, and what they call Load, the purchasers of 13 electricity. We are Load.

14 Rates for ISO power are market-driven and 15 they're based on supply and demand. The price that 16 Load pays from the ISO is being determined primarily 17 on an hourly basis.

18 The Village is billed by the New York Power 19 Authority for the purchase powered from the ISO. 20 NYPA bills on a delayed cycle for the New York 21 ISO-related purchases.

During a meeting we had recently with NYPA at the New York -- the NYAPP conference that Paul Pallas and I attended, they offered to try and improve on their timing of billing us for power purchased from

1

2

the ISO. This should help our ratepayers have a bill that is closer to the time frame of the actual use.

I know that's a lot in one time. I'm going to be presenting this in a PowerPoint presentation at a later date to the public in an effort to try and educate the public a little bit more about what the world of public power is doing right now.

8 There is an initiative on the part of Governor 9 Cuomo called a REV, which is REV, which is -- and one 10 of the components of that is to try and educate the 11 public on what's going on in the world of public 12 power, how rates are being determined, and how they're trying to incorporate energy renewables like 13 14 solar, wind, and things like that, into what's known 15 as microgrid. And since we are one of the original 16 microgrids in Greenport, I think it's relevant that 17 we understand, you know, where the power is coming 18 from and what the -- what the goals are, you know, 19 going forward in the future.

20 And part of this, actually, is going to be 21 addressed in this NYSERDA grant project that 22 Mr. Foxen has applied for the Village.

The other thing I wanted to discuss with you is a project that I'm calling the Greenport Jail Project. Paul Pallas and I met with Ron Breuer from

the East End Seaport Museum last month. He invited
 us there to have an overview of the museum. It's my
 intention to support the museum, because I consider
 it to be the keeper of our maritime history.

5 Ron Breuer has proposed an idea to create a 6 Police Museum at the Greenport Jail. We're looking into working with them to apply for a Suffolk County 7 8 Community Development grant. A museum at this 9 historic jail would be a wonderful site for tourists 10 to visit. According to Ron, there is a tremendous amount of interest from Police and Fire Departments 11 12 both on Long Island and throughout the Metro area.

13 The Village part of this project would center 14 on the remediation of the building. This is a 15 matching grant with a percentage of the grant based 16 on a series of eight criteria.

We're also looking to engage the Greenport Rotary in this endeavor. Ron and I will be speaking at the Rotary on Tuesday, May 26th, to present our idea to them.

The old Jail was a favorite destination for local children on Halloween night, who were also treated to a hayride and a ride on the Carousel by the Village. I think this is a great opportunity to restore the Greenport Jail and share it with our

community and visitors who come to our wonderful
 Village.
 I encourage my fellow Board Members to attend

4 this upcoming Rotary meeting. Thank you.
5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: When?
6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: When? I'm sorry.
7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: When is the meeting?
8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Tuesday, the 26th, 8 a.m., at
9 Hellenic.

10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia.

11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 8 a.m.?

12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia, I would strongly 13 suggest that you invite the members of the Greenport 14 Improvement Committee, who have been working on the Jailhouse Project for the last year. They were --15 16 and Mr. Pallas is aware of it, because there has been 17 structural changes. Tom Payne has done a lot of work 18 on it. There has been talk of trying to put a grant 19 together. So I am strongly suggesting that you meet 20 with them. They have done a lot of work already on 21 the historic situation of the Jail. Clarebeth 22 Cunningham, before you started the Red Schoolhouse 23 grant, that was part of what their focus was, was the Jail. 24

25 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. I'm only trying to take

advantage of a grant, you know, that's due June 22nd,
 so, you know, I wanted to move on it.

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It would have been nice if 4 you had mentioned it to me, so I could have mentioned 5 it at the committee this afternoon.

6

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

7

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Trustee Phillips.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I met with the Greenport 9 Improvement Committee this afternoon. We have a 10 young lady by the name of Michelle Schott that you 11 all received an email proposal from. She's been 12 doing a lot of work and has approached the Sterling Historical Society. The school, the Floyd Memorial 13 14 Library is on board with it. And what the committee 15 is asking and what she's looking for is just a letter 16 of support that the Village will help in any way as 17 far as, you know, giving her access to information. 18 She's not looking for any money from us right at the 19 moment, and part of that is to get the grant process 20 started, which she's applied for.

The Red Schoolhouse grant still has some funding left from it for the oral history and the Interpretive Center, so she's putting together a proposal of what she would like to start doing, oral history. We would like -- we're going to -- and it's

1 probably not going to make it for this month's Board 2 meeting, because we only had a meeting this 3 afternoon. But we would like to take some of that 4 funding to let her start doing the interpretive --5 the oral history portion before she gets any grant 6 money, so that she can take advantage of some of our 7 Village residents who are older or disappearing fast. 8 So that was part of the discussion.

9 They're very interested in her proposal, and 10 they're very much looking for the Board to write a 11 letter of support. So that's one of the resolutions 12 I'd like put onto the agenda.

13 The other is the committee itself has put 14 together what they're calling a Greenport Village 15 Voices. They would like to have the approval from 16 June 5th to August 28th, Friday evening, from 6 to 8, to have the Schoolhouse available for them for sort 17 18 of lecture series. July 3rd is one, because I'm 19 assuming that the Tall Ships would be using the 20 Schoolhouse. They're just trying to get people to 21 come on a Friday and talk about what's going on in 22 the Village. They're going to have speakers. 23 Cornell is going to come for three of the Fridays. The Wheelhouse Cafe by Yvonne Lieblein, she'd like to 24 do a talk. Amy Worth at the South Street Gallery 25

1 would like to do a talk.

2	So Carol Wilder, who is a member of the
3	committee, has been very busy in trying to gather
4	stuff. So I need on the agenda to be able to have
5	those dates, which I have here that I got this
6	afternoon, made available for the Greenport
7	Improvement Committee to do the series called
8	Greenport Village Voices. So that's something I'm
9	looking for.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Do we have anything scheduled
11	for the Schoolhouse in the evenings, Sylvia, do you
12	know?
13	CLERK PIRILLO: We do. Yes, we do. So I need
14	to make sure there's no overlap.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. Well that's
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Make sure it doesn't
17	interfere with somebody else
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, yeah.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: who already has permission
20	to use it.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. That's why I have the
24	dates. It was a little difficult getting around on
25	them. You always

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we get Corky Lyon
 (phonetic) to give one of those lectures?
 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I believe she's working on
 it, to be honest with you.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Awesome.

5

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I also have another young 6 7 lady who wants do a youth program in the Schoolhouse 8 and it's called Youth Metal Smithing. Alexa Suess 9 would like to teach a group of students how to do silversmithing like copper, silver, nickel gold. 10 Ι 11 have the proposal here. I got her information from 12 her. I'd like to send it around and everybody think about it, but I also need to cover what our insurance 13 14 issues would be with it, because Silversmithing is 15 not just like painting.

16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh. She would actually be 17 doing it in the Schoolhouse?

18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's one of the -- that's 19 one of the things. So that's why I am -- I think 20 it's a great thing, and I think it's something that 21 we really need to kind of help her pursue. And I 22 would like to just get support for me to continue 23 doing this so that she could -- if we can't do it in 24 the Schoolhouse, try to find another place for her to do it so that she could teach the kids, okay? 25

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Awesome

1

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I'll do that. I'll pass
this out, this around.

4 The other resolution I believe you all received 5 from me, that I'm requesting that we write to the 6 United States Coast Guard to give us a classification on flyboarders. I have been doing some research. 7 8 Several communities in other states have requested it 9 from the United States Coast Guard to give it a 10 designation. I found out that paddle boarding is 11 considered a vehicle -- I mean a vessel, excuse me, 12 and that they have certain safety requirements that they're supposed to be following. Part of this is to 13 14 understand what this type of sport is, but my concern 15 is the activity in the waterfront.

I'm also concerned about our liability, since
the State of New York does not require recreational
boaters to carry liability insurance. So I would
like to -- a letter from us getting into the mix as
to what is a designation of a flyboard.

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I have no problem with 22 that.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's about it.
 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. A couple of things that
 I have. Okay. We're going to take a five minute

break. Everybody can stretch a little bit and then
 we'll go back. Okay.

3 (Whereupon, the meeting was recessed at 4 10:05 p.m. and resumed at 10:15 p.m.) 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I just want to let 6 everybody know, Memorial Day, eight o'clock, behind 7 Arcade is our parade, our local parade, that's on 8 Monday morning. It's a really nice event. Anybody 9 who could make it, go behind the Arcade to the Railroad Dock. Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts do a 10 11 little display with flowers and a tribute, and then 12 back here for refreshments, cupcakes, coffee cake, 13 coffee, orange juice, whatever. It's open to everybody, it's a really nice thing. 14 Then the Town 15 parade is in Southold at 10 o'clock. We're all 16 invited to March, so anybody can do that.

I believe they're doing it differently, the Southold parade. They're doing the speeches first this year, okay? And we're lining up. They're doing those at -- by Southold Savings Bank, the gazebo there.

22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.

23 CLERK PIRILLO: I think so.

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. It's a different line. 25 I believe you guys might not have been there, but we

1 used to line up down by Wayside. We're up a block, 2 we starting from there. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We meet at -- where do we 5 meet? 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: We meet there at 10 o'clock. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: At Wayside. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, the next block. At the 9 gazebo, across from Southold Savings Banks and across from IGA. 10 11 MS. ALLEN: Capital One. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Capital One, okay. And they 13 used to do the speeches at the end, at the Legion 14 Hall, and they're doing them first, from what I read. Is that correct? Of course everybody would march, 15 16 then they'd do speeches, then everybody was 17 dispersing, nobody stood around for the speeches, so 18 they're doing the speeches first, okay? Just so 19 everybody knows that. 20 We got the keys for the Rec. Center yesterday, 21 so we are now -- we have a contract. The Rec. Center 22 is going down to the Perry Daycare Center, we're 23 going to be in there. We're going to need to set up 24 some time for some volunteers to help paint. We're going to get in this week and pick out some colors of 25

1 what we're going to do with the rooms, have Paul get 2 supplies for us. I'll get extra ladders and rollers 3 and stuff. So once I have a date, we'll post it on 4 the website and let everybody know when it's going to 5 So we're going to try to do it with just be. 6 volunteers instead of hiring somebody to do it. Keep 7 the cost down and we'll just -- maybe the next -- the 8 following weekend, I would guess, by the time we get 9 it all together. But we just need to be in there by 10 the end of June. That should be find.

11 I've set a tentative date for the Skate Park 12 Festival for July 26th. I need to speak to the two 13 young gentlemen who helped out last year organizing 14 it. We started about this time to get everything 15 going on it, so we could start booking bands and all. 16 That's a Sunday. We did 12 to 5 last year, weather 17 permitting and else, but that's a tentative date that 18 we're scheduling for right now. Any changes, I'll 19 let everybody know on that? 20 TRUSTEE ROBINS: What's the date?

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: July 26th?

22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: 26th?

MAYOR HUBBARD: It's a Sunday morning. There's
nothing scheduled up there. We already did Rec.
Center.

1 Mitchell Park guidelines, all the Trustees got 2 it. It should -- it's been on the website since 3 Monday. I take -- we're going to vote on it next 4 week, I hope to. I'll take comments from the Board 5 Members now, anybody from the public who has comments 6 on what we have. But, basically, it was synopsis of 7 three public hearings, 20 letters of recommendations. 8 I tried to put it all together with the Clerk. We 9 kind of just, boom, this was what we got. This is 10 what -- everybody felt like it was the general 11 intention of what we wanted. Fine-tuning, tweaks, 12 additions, you know, it's not a done deal yet. I 13 just wanted something out there that we had something 14 in writing to vote on, so. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I had one guestion --16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- dealing with the Village 18 community, dealing with the Village community 19 organized events. We're not just restricting to 20 Or, I mean, what mechanism are you going to that. 21 use? Are we going to be having them -- someone apply 22 wanting to become a Village-sponsored event? I mean, 23 you've named quite a few here. I don't know if 24 that's what you really want to put. MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that's pretty much 25

1 everything that we do now. So if somebody else wants 2 to be added to the list, I would say they could come 3 put a request in, and the request to be, you know, as 4 another Village-sponsored or community event. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That was --6 MAYOR HUBBARD: I think we covered everything 7 that we had, you know, that we allow at this point 8 right now. Anything new would have to come back as a 9 request. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. No, that's -- I just 11 want to make sure that that's --12 MAYOR HUBBARD: As long as everybody is 13 comfortable. That was the intention, what we do. 14 That's, you know --15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So our -- the situation we 17 had where -- do we put ourselves in a situation here 18 where a group could come and say, "You're 19 discriminating against us, you're not letting us 20 become a Village-sponsored event based on our 21 religion, our --22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I mean, I don't believe 23 I know you sent some paperwork to me. I didn't SO. 24 have time to finish reading all that before tonight, because I had other stuff this weekend with the other 25

things going on. I will defer that to Joe. I mean,
 with what we have here, Joe, do you think there's
 this --

4 MR. PROKOP: Can I see?

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Have you seen that?
MR. PROKOP: I saw it a while ago.
MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think if we're -- on 9 Number 8, we're requesting that all -- I'm assuming 10 all Mass Assembly Permits or Letters of Intent and 11 wanting to are being submitted by March 15th. So 12 we're looking for yearly Mass Assembly Permits. Is 13 that what we're looking for?

14 MAYOR HUBBARD: What we're trying to do, 15 instead of stuff coming in sporadically all around to 16 everybody, we're going to set up the summer schedule 17 with everything we have going on. Anybody who wants 18 to use a park, get it into us so we could vote once 19 for the year on it. Other things will happen, but 20 our yearly things that we know about, that way it's 21 not something that comes up all the time. We'll set 22 the schedule for the year, Dances in the Park. A11 23 the other things, it's on the calendar for the whole 24 year and we know well advance of what's happening. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I thought you were 25

1 saying that we would set that as a yearly deadline 2 for anybody wishing to use the park. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: But that's -- yes, that is the 4 intention that --TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 5 Okav. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In other words, any new one 7 wanted to come in, they'd have to be able to get the 8 application in by March. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. This is the new 10 guideline, so everybody knows get it in --11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- the beginning of the year, 13 before March, and then we try to vote on it then. If 14 something new came up or anything else --15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We can always add that in. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- we would do that on an as --17 per basis as it comes in. If something else comes, 18 change it. But this way our yearly stuff would all 19 be done at one time. MR. PROKOP: Well, this doesn't have -- there 20 21 were a couple of changes that I recommended. This 22 doesn't have those changes reflected. But the basic 23 idea is you cannot restrict freedom of speech in a 24 park. I mean, that's basically --MAYOR HUBBARD: 25 Right.

1 MR. PROKOP: So as long as we work with that 2 guideline, then everything's okay.

3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So there's no way anybody 4 could say, "We want to be one of your Village-sponsored events. You do a" -- "you let a 5 6 Shakespeare company come, you do a Maritime Festival. 7 We want to do a festival." That is something that we 8 would find that we don't want to allow happen. And 9 they can't come and say they can't, you know, do a --10 whatever the clause is in the Constitution that says 11 we can't discriminate against them, but we're 12 protected against that?

MR. PROKOP: If a group wants to assemble in the park to express freedom of speech or religious freedom, we cannot regulate that or stop it. So wether it comes in as -- we can't layer this with saying that they have to be approved as a community event. They have to be able to just get access to a park.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: As long as they're not blocking 21 anybody else's access or anything else and they're 22 not charging for it. So I believe that's, you 23 know --

24 MR. PROKOP: The only thing that we can do is 25 if they -- if it's a suitable size -- if it's of

1 sufficient size, it may cause issues at the park, 2 like Mayor Hubbard just said, preventing other use by 3 the public or possibly damage to the park, we can put 4 it -- we can put it in another location. We could 5 tell them that they have to use a different park. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 7 MR. PROKOP: Or a section --

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A different section of 9 Greenport, is that what you're saying? 10

MR. PROKOP: Yes.

11 I guess I'm stuck on the TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 12 definition of what a Village or community-organized 13 event is could be perceived by some as being somewhat 14 arbitrary.

15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think what the Mayor is 16 going for, I think what we are going for with this is 17 the sponsored events I think are annual and repeated. 18 But these are things that are on our schedule and we 19 plan on doing each year, whatever. It was Relay for 20 Life, it was the Halloween -- you know, it's 21 something that we have on the calendar already, as 22 opposed to a special designation that someone is --23 the way I see it, there are no perks to go along with 24 that, this is just something that's on the calendar every year because it's something that we run. 25

1 MR. PROKOP: Right. I think this was meant to be inclusive, not exclusive. And as long as it's 2 viewed with that, that's okay. 3 4 TRUSTEE ROBINS: George, let me just clarify. 5 Also, in this Village/Community-Organized Events, 6 that is meaning Greenport or/Greater Greenport 7 community events, correct, not all communities; is 8 that your intention? MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that's the intention of 9 everybody was, you know. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right, okay. So that's -- I 12 mean, that's what my --13 MAYOR HUBBARD: So we don't need everybody from 14 up the Island trying to come down here and use park. 15 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Exactly. It's our park. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's for our people. Yes. 18 that why I -- okay. That's your intention, then. Is that clear enough, Joe, in our language. 19 20 MR. PROKOP: Yes. So what some municipalities 21 do that have gone through this, that have reviewed 22 these recently, is they call them Assemblies of 23 Expression. So we might -- we might add another 24 group. We might add another -- something else to that list called an Assembly of Expression, which 25

1 encompasses both free speech and also religion. 2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And we would allow that? 3 MR. PROKOP: Yes. 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So, therefore --MR. PROKOP: We have to allow that. 5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right, right. I'm not saying 6 7 we shouldn't. I'm trying to avoid --8 MR. PROKOP: No. I'm just saying --9 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: A group came -- when a group 10 came here and cut off part of the park from 11 everybody, and it really -- people are still upset 12 about it, right? And so I'm trying to make sure that we don't get forced into having to do that again. 13 So 14 I'm asking the same thing a bunch of times. I think 15 you're saying we're good. 16 MR. PROKOP: We wouldn't get -- we don't have 17 to be forced to do that again. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The group could come, they 18 19 just can't block -- they could come back and have a 20 meeting, but they can't block off the park from you 21 or me. 22 MR. PROKOP: They can't have exclusive use of 23 any portion of the park. 24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thanks. Do we have noise in here? 25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So --

MAYOR HUBBARD: No. I know the intention was no amplified music, but our own Dances in the Park has amplified music.

6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But couldn't we say you have 7 to follow the Village's -- we have a code in place. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: A noise ordinance that hasn't 9 been enforced in a bunch of years, but yes. I mean, 10 I'm trying to write it so that our own stuff isn't --11 we're not going to be in violation ourself when we do 12 it.

13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.

MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, that was the intention,
because --

16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not enforceable anyway. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. No amplified music was 18 one of the things people had suggested, and we're the 19 first violator, because we do it every Monday for two 20 months.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Dances in the Park, yeah.
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That violates the policy?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
MAYOR HUBBARD: It's amplified music in a Park.

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the decibels.

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, I thought it was -- I 2 thought it was related to -- I have reread it. 3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Decibels. I think it's 4 decibels. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's decibel limits. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I though it was decibels, but 7 before 10 p.m. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: 8 I think it was a decibel 9 limit. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's a decibel limit. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'll research it. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But's it's still -- it's an 16 unenforceable law. 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We might want to define free 18 events. So an event that is there and it doesn't 19 cost you to walk into it, but you're supposed to buy 20 something, you might want to define --21 TRUSTEE ROBINS: We don't allow anybody to buy 22 anything in the park. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, let's define people 23 24 we've had, and, Sylvia, please correct me if I'm off base, but I know we had some people who are into 25

yoga, meditation, want to have their classes in the
 park where they've paid the fee for the instructor.
 CLERK PIRILLO: They have wanted that, yes.
 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And may be doing it, and we 6 wouldn't --

CLERK PIRILLO: Having the -- we have had the
classes there for free when the instructors do not
charge, we have allowed that.

10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm worried about something 11 where somebody brings a bunch of things to sell, so 12 it's free to go look at what they're selling, but you have to purchase -- there's a sort of expectation 13 14 that people would purchase. We just might want to --15 I'm kind of thinking, you know, down the road. We 16 might want to define what a free event is, or say you 17 can't sell something in the park, maybe. Maybe have 18 a separate line item.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. The problem we have
with that that came to my mind is during Maritime
Festival, the hospital sets up down there and then
they sell their raffle tickets, and they're selling
that in the park, because the raffle is done.
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Clearly, it might be charity.
MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well -- but they're

1 still selling something. 2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It's true. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I'm just trying to think 4 of other things that were on there, and I was like, well, we allow them to sell their raffle tickets and 5 6 their raffle was held in the park. 7 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're soliciting donations 8 for a charity, which is different than selling. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I just --10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And the same thing on the 11 food. At Maritime, don't we serve -- aren't people 12 selling food in the park? 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, no. 15 TRUSTEE ROBINS: They're selling --No food. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No food. That's 17 been done away with. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. It happened once or 19 twice, and no. Even the Boy Scouts use the --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Those are all outside of the 20 21 Any food is either at the food street or over park. 22 by --23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. But it had been in the 24 past and we said we wanted to go away from that, so that's why. 25

1 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The last thing, I don't love 2 publishing that tents are allowed, because I'm 3 worried now a bunch of people are going to come and 4 propose tent events. I like that they're moved over 5 to that spot, but we might want to say no tents are 6 allowed, except special permission of the Village 7 Board.

8 I'd like to really protect -- I know we have to 9 do those tents sometimes, because people come and 10 give us a whole bunch of money to rent out that 11 marina in the off-season.

12

MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.

13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And so out of respect for 14 that, but I hate seeing a tent in our park. I would 15 propose, and I don't whether to handle this now or at 16 the meeting, but I'm going to -- at the meeting, I 17 would propose that we say no tents except the Village 18 Board.

19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, you kind of -- okay.
20 Then what is the definition of a structure? Isn't a
21 tent a structure?

22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Structure, anything that you 23 want to put up, other things.

24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, right.

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: But, I mean, technically, if

they're going to take -- put a tent up, then they're
 taking the public use away from it, so it wouldn't be
 allowed.

4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I got you, yeah. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right? TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Right. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: So if they're putting a tent, 7 8 saying this tent is for us only, they're not allowed 9 to do that, except for the marina guests that are 10 putting the tent up. For somebody else who wants to 11 come in, put a tent up to do a wedding or something, 12 they're not allowed to put a structure up or do that. But this doesn't cut off --13

14TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's a little confusing.15MAYOR HUBBARD: It still allows our customers16of the marina to rent the whole marina out to put17their tent up.

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Why don't we write the only
19 time you put up a tent is if you rent the whole
20 marina and --

21 MR. PROKOP: Well, you -- oh.

22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You can't.

23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I want to say no tents,
24 except very special circumstances.

25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't think you can do

2 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Why not? 3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's a very special 4 circumstance. I mean --5 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No. I'm going to define it 6 as you rented the whole marina. The only time we'll put a tent up is you rent the whole marina. 7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I mean --9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Either that, or tents by the 10 permission of the Board 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Tents only for marina 12 guests, but then is that being discriminatory for 13 somebody else? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Or tents have to have --14 15 tents have to have Board approval, or something like 16 that. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Tents only at the marina, or if 18 it's with board approval, and we have to approve 19 anyone with a tent. All right? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 20 The tents have to be 21 approved by us? 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: If the marina saying they want 23 to put a tent up, they're going to ask us first, so that, that will cover that. 24

25 MR. PROKOP: That's good.

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that.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that all right? MR. PROKOP: (Nodded yes.) 2 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That covers us against, you 4 know -- it gives an out. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else? 6 (No Response) 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. Well, we'll 8 take the public comment on this afterwards, but I'll 9 put that on the agenda to vote on next Thursday. 10 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks for putting that 11 together. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, you're welcome. I think 13 I'm forgetting some something else, but I can't 14 remember right now. So there was something else. 15 I'm trying to find the note. It's in a pile of 16 paperwork. 17 I just want -- I was just going to ask Bob 18 Foxen, you want to give us a brief explanation what 19 you want to do? Would the public -- the public would 20 probably want to hear what he's talking about. Ι know what it was. Go ahead, Bob. Bob Foxen is from 21 22 Global Common. He submitted a grant for the NYSERDA 23 microgrid for us. He's going to update us on that, 24 and also on another proposal. 25 MR. FOXEN: One was a grant, a NYSERDA a grant

1 for \$100,000 initially, if we get through all the 2 It potentially could be \$8 million for the phases. 3 Village of Greenport for a new power plant for the 4 Village. So this is part of the proposal that went 5 We're pretty optimistic about it. The team in. 6 included General Electric, Burns Engineering, my own 7 firm, Global Common. And we got some really good 8 letters of support from the Mayor, from the hospital, 9 from some of the other stakeholders in the Village. 10 So we're really hopeful that we are selected, at least for the first round, and then we'll see what 11 12 happens next.

The other proposal that we sent into the 13 14 Village was for a lease, an option to lease a parcel of land to build the seconding peaking plant which we 15 16 talked about recently. And as we discussed, there are a number of financial benefits, and we believe 17 18 very minimal environmental impacts, and we're asking the Board to consider that. And I'm welcome to take 19 20 any questions. I could go into the details, if you 21 want me to go through any further details tonight. 22 I'm not sure --

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: A brief description. It's 24 getting late. I don't want to be real long, because 25 there's a couple of other things that we need to take

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care of. Just give us -- give the public a real brief description of what you want to do, Bob.

3 MR. FOXEN: So the plant would be in the range 4 of 50 to 75 megawatts, is our expectation. It would 5 be fired by natural gas. Liquified natural gas would be brought in. So it would be cleaner than say 6 oil, or kerosene, or ultra low sulphur diesel. 7 It 8 would run -- it would be limited to run only at peak 9 times, so the permit would be a maximum of 2000 hours 10 a year, which is the same as the permit for the 11 existing peaking plant.

I did a little research. The existing peaker plant, for example, in 2013 ran about seven hours a day in the summer, and most of the rest of the year it doesn't run at all. So these are just peaking plants that are necessary in the summertime, which there's vacationers and so on and air conditioning demand.

And what we'd like to do is get an option to lease the land, and that would allow us to go to PSEG Long Island and try to negotiate a contract to purchase the energy, and we really need to get the lease option before we can have the meaningful discussion with PSEG.

25 So that's the -- that's the big picture. And

1 if I'm -- I'm probably forgetting a lot of details, 2 but I'm trying to be quick, because I know you guys 3 have been here a while. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Did any Board Members 5 have any if questions for Bob? I have a couple of 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. procedure questions for us, but no. 7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So thank you, Bob. 9 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can I ask a question? MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. 10 11 AUDIENCE MEMBER: How big are the liquid gas 12 tanks, how big are they? MR. FOXEN: Well, the trucks that bring them 13 out are the same size as an oil tank. 14 15 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Okay. 16 MR. FOXEN: So they're thousand gallons. 17 AUDIENCE MEMBER: But the container they're 18 stored in? 19 MR. FOXEN: Forty feet long in the back of the 20 trailer is for the container. It could be really any 21 It would probably be -- the maximum amount in size. 22 New York State is 70,000 gallons. 23 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Okay. 24 MR. FOXEN: It's probably -- it's actually smaller than any other state. So 70,000 gallons 25

is -- I think the diesel storage tanks, I'm going to
say 3 to 400,000 gallons of diesel are stored there
now, so there are a lot more diesel storage -- or
kerosene they actually use there now.

5 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yeah, they use kerosene. 6 Okay. So it would be smaller?

7 MR. FOXEN: So it would be a lot smaller, 8 Now we may or may not have to have diesel right. 9 That's going to be up to negotiation with backup. 10 LIPA. We may want to have diesel backup, because, 11 for some reason, we can't get the primary fuel here. 12 You know, it's a fairly short -- short amount of a 13 run hours we could get out of 17,000 gallons, so --14 but that would be the maximum size tank, would be --15 MR. SALADINO: Are these reciprocating engines

16 or are they turbines?

17 These would be reciprocating MR. FOXEN: 18 engines, and there's a bunch of reasons that we 19 prefer that. One, they're more efficient than 20 turbines are, probably 10 to 15% more efficient. 21 Two, is they're very flexible, just like your cars. 22 You can run your car fast or slow, so it's very 23 flexible to follow the renewables that are going up 24 and down. So if you have solar or wind, the reciprocating engines are much more able to cycle up 25

1 and down to follow the wind.

2 MR. SALADINO: And how many. How many would be 3 to drive --

4 MR. FOXEN: Well, it would really depend on the 5 vendor we select, let me put it that the way. The 6 thing we have now, we probably would have a series of 7 -- they make a nine mega watt, and then they make a 8 an 18 megawatt, approximately are the sizes. So if 9 the site -- if it was going to be 50 megawatts, they could have six nines, it would be 54, so it would be 10 11 around that level. So it will vary depending on what 12 the ultimate size of the plant would be, and that 13 would really depend on what the customer wants. 14 MR. SALADINO: I vote yes. 15 AUDIENCE MEMBER: I vote yes. 16 MR. FOXEN: See, these guys are easy. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Very good. Okay. Thank you 18 very much, Bob. 19 AUDIENCE MEMBER: We need roads. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you very much. Okay. 21 Board discussion on this? 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are we going to have a 23 public hearing that's noticed, so other members of 24 the community have an opportunity to hear about this? MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we will. 25

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's an option agreement. 3 We would have a public hearing before we get farther 4 into the process. But, I mean, review it, read it. Before we do anything, we're going to discuss it 5 6 You know, any other questions? Before we more. 7 actually go and have them start building or 8 something, we would definitely have a public hearing 9 on it. Yes?

MR. FOXEN: 10 Just one other thing. I should 11 have said. The option agreement is a conditional 12 option. So before anything is finalized, the Board 13 would have to -- once we have a more definitive plan, 14 the Board would have to give final approval. So 15 you're not getting final -- we're not asking for 16 final approval now, we're asking for just conditional 17 approval.

18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, but, Bob, we still
19 have a community that should hear about it, other
20 than just here at the last work session.

21 MR. FOXEN: Sure. Yeah, exactly. I just want 22 to be clear that this is not a final decision.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I understand that, but
we have some concerned citizens, and the Board will
make the ultimate decision. But we also need to make

1 sure they have the opportunity to hear what's being 2 discussed and put before us. 3 MR. FOXEN: Sure. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sorry. Just I feel that 5 way. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: We could schedule a public 7 hearing right now for next month. And we could have 8 a public hearing and let the public comment on it and 9 everything else. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's fine. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: And it will be noticed and 12 everybody will have it. So let's schedule the public hearing for next month and we'll get it all out there 13 and we'll talk about it. 14 15 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So are you asking us to vote 16 on the option agreement now or no? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 17 No. 18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: No. 19 No. I think we'll have the MAYOR HUBBARD: 20 public hearing first. 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll talk about it before we 23 go -- and still, it's still just going to be an option, but we'll get the public comment from 24 everybody on it, before we even give -- if we give it 25

1 to them, we have to make sure that it's going to 2 stand. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Right. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: And I don't want to switch it afterwards. 5 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, that makes sense. That's why --7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: So we'll schedule the public 9 hearing for next month and we'll get them an answer 10 then. 11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I still I haven't seen 12 got a copy of the grant that Bob's group wrote on our behalf. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I was looking for a 14 15 copy of it. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. I know there was emails 17 about it. The paperwork you just made for the 15th, 18 the deadline, do you have a copy of that? 19 MR. FOXEN: That went in on Friday. I sent a 20 copy to you and to Paul. I didn't know what the 21 protocol was in terms of who it was I should sent it 22 to. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 24 MR. PALLAS: I can forward it out. 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Forward it. MR. PALLAS: I will do it tomorrow. 2 3 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: I dealt with so many emails 5 over the past couple of days, I didn't see it, so --6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just curious. MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. 7 8 MR. FOXEN: I could send it to everybody, if 9 vou want me to. MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, Paul could forward it, or 10 you could send it the Board members, that's fine. 11 12 MR. SWISKEY: Can you put it on the website, too? 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure, yeah. We already 15 submitted -- it's already submitted, so, yes, it 16 should go to the website and let everybody see it. 17 We talked about it, so. Okay. The other thing I did 18 forget, North Ferry. We had the discussion, we 19 talked. We have --20 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we doing it now? I had 21 another question about this. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, okay. 23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Environmental Impact Study. 24 So, Bob, you seem like a nice guy, but I need an Environmental Impact Study from somebody besides 25

Global Common before I could consider this. How do we -- this is out of my area of expertise. So how do with do that?

4 MR. FOXEN: I can answer that, Doug. So, as 5 part of the permitting process, you have to go 6 through what's called SEQRA. That's a State So there'll be an 7 Environmental Impact process. 8 independent firm that will be hired who does 9 Environmental Impact Studies, essentially, and 10 they -- so they would go through that. You would 11 have to get that study completed and there would have 12 to be a determination by a government entity that confirms there's no significant environmental impact, 13 14 and that all has to be done before you get the 15 permits.

16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But after we sign the Option17 Agreement?

18 MR. FOXEN: But remember, you're only signing a 19 conditional option. So if, for example, you are 20 uncomfortable with the -- the way it's worded, if 21 you're uncomfortable with the environmental impacts 22 associated with the project, then you can vote. 23 There's a provision in here. I'll sit down and 24 review this for you. This provision says if you're not comfortable with the environmental impacts, 25

1 potentially you can vote not to proceed.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: So SEQRA comes back and we 3 don't like the determination that says it's going to 4 have a harmful impact on the environment, we could 5 cancel the deal then once its done. 6 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And who pays for the study? 7 MR. FOXEN: We would pay. 8 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. 9 MR. PROKOP: The environmental review that's 10 done, is that review that's -- what is it called, Section 10 or Article 10, the expedited review? 11 12 MR. FOXEN: Well, Article 10 is a siting that 13 you're going to --14 MR. PROKOP: The siting one. 15 MR. FOXEN: The siting rule. I think we would 16 be covered by that. The siting rule is going to --17 and that really pulls together a whole bunch of 18 permits under one kind of umbrella. So we would be 19 covered by the siting rule. The threshold for that 20 is I believe 20 megawatts now. 21 MR. PROKOP: Right. 22 MR. FOXEN: It used to be 79 megawatts. 23 MR. PROKOP: Right. 24 MR. FOXEN: So we're going to be covered by the siting rule in all likelihood. 25

1 MR. PROKOP: But is that thorough? But that's 2 a thorough review? 3 MR. FOXEN: A subset of the siting rule would 4 be you have to do the Environmental Impact 5 Assessment. MR. PROKOP: Okay. I'll take a look at it. 6 7 MR. FOXEN: Fox you have to get the air 8 permits, you have to get all the permits that are --9 water permits, etcetera, yeah. 10 MR. PROKOP: Thank you. 11 Was there anything else for Bob MAYOR HUBBARD: 12 for the -- on the peaker? 13 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you, Bob. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you very much, 14 15 Bob. You can head home, yes. It's just -- it was a 16 long meeting tonight, that's all. 17 We had the North Ferry agreement. I know John 18 would like to hear this, Mr. Saladino. We discussed 19 this. The agreement we had talked about last year 20 never came to fruition because it wasn't good for 21 either side. 22 The Village Attorney, along with the attorney 23 for North Ferry, they've come up with paperwork. We 24 have a proposed agreement here. We're not going to 25 vote on it tonight. I just -- I gave it to the Board

1 It just got finalized the other day. It's members. 2 going to go on the website. You got -- people all 3 see it. Basically what it is, what we had talked 4 about last year was no use at all of the West Pier on 5 the outside of it, and they were going to pay us 6 around \$9,000. This agreement is -- we're going to be paid \$8700 and in two payments for the year, but 7 8 we're allowed to put up to a 73-foot boat on the 9 easternmost outside of the West Pier, if that makes 10 sense, the outside of the West Pier. So --11 MR. PROKOP: No, that not correct. That's not 12 correct. That's not correct? 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: 14 MR. PROKOP: We can use up to 73 feet of the 15 pier. 16 MR. PALLAS: And the payment was7,000, not 87. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 18 MR. PALLAS: Sorry. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. I should have gone 20 back to like I thought it was. Okay. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's 2016 that it becomes 22 8750. 23 MR. PROKOP: Right. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's 7,000 for the first 24 25 year.

1 MR. PROKOP: The first year is 7,000.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All right. So I knew I 3 had the number from somewhere, but --

4 MR. PROKOP: It doesn't say the length of the 5 boat. It says that we can use --

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: We can use up to 70 --7 MR. PROKOP: -- 73 feet of the pier.

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, all right. We could use 9 up to 73 feet of dock space on the outside where they 10 always complained about we put a boat, if that makes 11 sense. The West Pier, the outside, 73 feet. So 12 we're going to get rent from them, not quite as much as we were getting before, but we can put a boat out 13 there and collect our marina income from that spot. 14 Does that make sense? So, hopefully, we could 15 16 generate \$15,000 in income from that spot, along with 17 them paying for the other part of it, and it will end 18 up being a money-maker, and it's not just that we 19 can't use the space at all.

20 MR. SALADINO: Is it 73 feet restricted from 21 the east end, from the east to the end measure 73 22 feet?

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we could use up to 73 feet 24 from the end of that dock going --

25 MR. SALADINO: West

MAYOR HUBBARD: West, yes.

1

2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: We're going to be seeing3 that?

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. Well, we could put 5 out -- there's extra copies. I'll give you a copy, 6 you could see it. It's just I wanted the information 7 out there. I want to try to vote on this on our 8 meeting next week.

9 We've discussed it at Executive Session. I 10 want the public to have it. That's why I was just 11 bringing it up now. Contracts will be on the website 12 and you can review it, just so you know about it. 13 You can question it when we -- before we vote on it 14 next week. Okay. That's the other thing I had, so I 15 think we covered all that.

Public to address the Board. Anybody like to speak? Come up to the podium. Just state your name just for -- so we know who's speaking for Transcriptionist.

MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, I live on Fifth Avenue. I just wondered about -- when you were talking about the ferry signages, usually if you're coming into town, it is marked that you turn at Sixth Street, and then there is just a small sign on Wiggins telling you to turn. Okay. Maybe it's

1 simple coming in, some kind of a sign at the traffic light, "Ferry Enters At Sixth Street." You know, 2 3 something simple for right now, that -- I got to say, 4 since last month's meeting, they've been really good in the morning's with bus. There was only one day I 5 got stuck and that's the people that were parked way 6 too far. You know, they've been having someone down 7 8 there in the mornings, you know, helping with traffic 9 there, because, like I said, the only other really 10 solution is turn Wiggins back into a two-way. Someone comes down Third you, say, "Uh, no." You go 11 12 down Wiggins, you go down, you have to turn around and get back on line, you know. 13 But, I mean, maybe 14 just a sign up on, you know, by the light saying, you know, "Ferry Line Enters At Sixth", you know. 15

I mean, I don't think there is like the perfect solution to this, you know, but just trying to find ways to, you know, work around it, maybe. If there's something there and people actually see it, they go, "Oh, okay, I can't do go that way." I mean, you still will get the -- that will, but, you know, maybe that will work better.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. And just to inform
everybody, North Ferry, they've had somebody down
there every morning from 6:30 until 9. It's worked

1 out well. They're diverting traffic, telling people 2 to go around the block and come down. And I spoke to 3 the manager, Bridgford Hunt. He was actually down 4 there last week himself, and he admitted that they really need to have that man all the time. 5 So it's 6 taken a long time to get to that point, but he actually -- him working the line for a week said we 7 8 really need somebody here all the time, and they plan 9 on trying to do that for the summer. I can't 10 guarantee it all the time, but that is their 11 intention right now, is to have somebody down there 12 every morning to stop the bottleneck. Mr. Tasker.

MR. TASKER: Good evening. I'm Arthur Tasker.
I live at 19 Beach Street in Greenport. Two things
I'd like to comment on.

16 First, nearly two years ago in August of 2013, 17 the Village decided to enter into two contracts to 18 examine proposed sewer extensions, which would 19 include extending the sewer to 26 Village residents 20 on Sandv Beach. That seems to have gotten lost in 21 the shuffle I. Know I was in communication with 22 Trustee Robins several -- a month or so ago, and she 23 very thoughtfully looked into it, reporting to me 24 that there was a study that was going to be completed, and the engineering reports would be 25

provided at the end of April. That, of course, has
 not happened.

3 The study that she's referring to was to be a 4 house-to-house survey of all the people in the area 5 who might be affected by extending the sewer to the 6 Gull Pond area, to Brewer's area, and to Sandy Beach. 7 And that survey has not been taken, because -- at 8 least on Sandy Beach. None of the Village residents 9 on Sandy Beach have been surveyed. And I think we're 10 beginning do get the feeling that the Village is more 11 interested in sewer revenue from nonresidents than it 12 is in providing sewer service to its residents. And 13 I'm wondering if anyone can comment on the status of 14 those contracts and the engineering studies. TRUSTEE ROBINS: 15 Yeah. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Go ahead, Paul. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul is going to talk. 18 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, we did do surveys. We 19 didn't hit everybody, more of --20 MR. TASKER: You didn't hit anybody in the 21 Village who would be affected. 22 MR. PALLAS: No, that's not true. We did, we 23 did survey some folks. We've provided the information to the consultant. We've done physical 24

surveys of the infrastructure. The consultant has

25

all the information, and I expect a report from them
 any day, quite frankly.

MR. TASKER: It was a condition precedent of the engineering work that all of the residents were to be surveyed. Now I know for a fact that no one on Sandy Beach has been surveyed, none of the residents of Greenport Village have been surveyed.

8 MR. PALLAS: Again, I know that people were 9 surveyed. I can't -- I cannot sit here and tell you 10 who was and who wasn't.

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

12 MR. TASKER: That's it? So no survey at the 13 end of April as promised?

14TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are we talking about -- I'm15sorry.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure.

17 MR. TASKER: The complete report --

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do we need to send an email
19 out to ask people if they want surveys? Is that
20 all --

21 MR. TASKER: The complete report was to have 22 been done by -- at last check, by the end of April. 23 It's now the middle of May.

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. As Paul said, it wasn't 25 completed yet. As soon as we get it, I'll make sure

1 you get a copy of it.

4

2 MR. TASKER: We're certainly looking forward to 3 it.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

5 MR. TASKER: Because, as I told, I have 6 appeared at least three times previously, when the pipeline crew hits Sandy Beach, they're going to be 7 8 met with a brass band. People want and need the 9 sewer over there. They're in a very fragile 10 ecological situation. They have cesspools, not even 11 septic tanks in a -- on a sandspit that isn't more 12 than about 50 feet wide from the creek to the bay.

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.

14 MR. TASKER: So --

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I mean, I'm sure now 16 most of those people are back now. But during the 17 middle of winter, if they were doing the survey 18 during the winter, that the people weren't there. 19 You know, I mean, that just -- most of the places are 20 boarded up for the winter. But we'll get the answer 21 from the engineer and we'll forward it to the public 22 as soon as possible.

23 MR. TASKER: Okay. Well, we look forward to 24 getting it in any case.

25 The second thing I just want to comment

1 briefly, the report of the Code Committee with regard 2 to the short-term rental legislation or ordinances 3 being proposed was curious, because we weren't told 4 anything at all about what the content of the 5 conclusions were, just that a code provision is going 6 to be prepared at some point. It would be 7 interesting to know what the broad-stroke 8 recommendations came out of the Code Committee. And 9 I think that it is a mistake to think that you're 10 going to balance off short-term rentals by allowing an increase in the number of rooms in a B&B. 11

12 First of all, if you raise it to five, that 13 means you've got to have a six-bedroom house, because 14 the owner has to be present. How many six-bedroom 15 houses are there in the Village of Greenport, and how 16 many might be converted by breaking room -- big rooms 17 down two -- one room into two, for example, and meet 18 the requirements of the code, which I believe are 400 19 square feet for a room? But you've got to have total 20 square footage of the house, total square footage of 21 the lot, as one of you mentioned earlier.

And it's a complete impracticality to think that more B&B rooms permitted, but not practical, are going to address the competition, if you will, of Airbnbs, which is the back -- simply a backdoor way

of running a bed and breakfast without complying with any regulations or paying any fees. So I think that those should be considered very seriously in looking at what you're going to do in two areas, B&B regulation and short-term -- short-term rental regulation. Thank you.

7

MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

8 MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street. I 9 would like to add to what Arthur said. Most of us 10 will recall that we had public comment and a public 11 hearing about increasing B&Bs from three to five two 12 years ago, three years ago. It was well attended. 13 And in my mind, it was soundly disapproved, nobody 14 wanted it. So I would have to echo what he said, you 15 know.

16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Airbnb didn't exist then, you 17 know. I mean, it existed, but it wasn't an issue we 18 had to deal with. So it might be a different 19 conversation now, do you think?

20 MR. SALADINO: I don't. I don't believe it 21 will be, because I think it's two different issues. 22 I think the Village already has -- I'm going to talk 23 about my stuff here for a few seconds, then we can 24 kind of debate, if you want, about that. 25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes, sir.

1 MR. SALADINO: I have a question for -- I'm not 2 going to say Bob, because I was reprimanded today. Robert, the budget mod for the fence, it's 60 -- I'm 3 4 not sure if it's 63 or 12-6. I'm just -- is it 5 12,600 or 6300? MR. BRANDT: Oh, I'm sorry. You're looking at 6 7 the pay. It's 63. 8 MR. SALADINO: It's 63 on there? 9 MR. BRANDT: Yeah. 10 MR. SALADINO: My comment about that is, I 11 mean, it's two vacant properties -- you're done. 12 It's two vacant properties and we're going to spend \$6300 to prevent two next door neighbors from keeping 13 14 their stuff on it. I mean, that -- I just -- I don't 15 think that's the best way to spend the taxpayers' 16 money. I think if the guy next door is putting his 17 woodpile, or right now he has a garden on it, you 18 know, somebody in authority should go there while 19 they're going -- while you're coming from the house, 20 or Trustee Phillips is coming from the fish market 21 and say you can't do that. You know, you're going to 22 spent 63 -- I understand there's one on Ludlam also, 23 but --24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. MR. SALADINO: -- it's 6300 bucks and we're 25

going to put up a corral fence that, you know, just
 violate the guys next door.

3 MAYOR HUBBARD: We have

4 MR. PROKOP: We have.

5 MR. SALADINO: Do it. Excuse me, but do it 6 again, and make the fine prohibitive enough that he 7 won't consider doing it in the future. I don't 8 understand that.

9 I don't park in handicapped parking spaces 10 anymore, because I paid that big fine and I don't want to do that anymore, you know. So I don't know 11 12 what's easier. Is it easier for somebody to go there 13 and write a summons for trespassing, or encumbering, 14 or whatever the summons would be, or is it easier to 15 install a fence that is probably going to be ignored 16 anyway, plus cost 6300 bucks?

17 And I have a question about the Wi-Fi upgrade, 18 that's \$6,000. What exactly is a Wi-Fi upgrade. 19 What do you do to upgrade Wi-Fi marina? 20 MR. BRANDT: I'm just asking to make the mod. 21 MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I don't -- I mean, I 22 don't -- I'm not an expert, John, by any stretch of 23 the imagination, but it's installation of equipment to extend the reach of the Wi-Fi signal out to the 24 end of the pier, that's essentially what it is. 25 Ιt

1 includes routers and wiring.

2 Six thousand dollars? MR. SALADINO: 3 MR. PALLAS: That the estimate we got, yes. 4 MR. SALADINO: And the wouldn't the vendor kind 5 of want to -- if you're buying the service, wouldn't 6 the vendor -- I know when I got Wi-Fi in my house, they kind of came and gave the stuff and I pay a fee 7 8 every month. This is -- this is our --9 MR. PALLAS: No. 10 that's at the front end. We already have that, but it doesn't -- it won't reach out to the pier. We 11 12 need to install things to get it to the equipment that goes back out to the rest of the system. 13 14 MR. SALADINO: I thought all of Mitchell Park 15 was -- okay, you know. I have another question about 16 some money for Robert. What is fund 5990? 17 MR. BRANDT: That's appropriated fund balance. 18 That means we're borrowing from our fund balance. 19 MR. SALADINO: So you're taking the money from 20 the fund balance and putting it into another line 21 item? 22 MR. BRANDT: Correct. 23 MR. SALADINO: Okay. I apologize for taking up 24 a lot of time, but -- so we did the public hearing. I have a question about the -- about the ferry 25

1 You had mentioned. Trustee Roberts had lease. 2 mentioned that we could take over the ferry lease. Ι 3 had understood, from reading the lease -- I'm 4 intimately familiar with the Long Island Railroad 5 lease, as some of you might know. They have a 6 separate lease. 7

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

8 MR. SALADINO: They have separate lease 9 agreement that we're not taking over that's not being offered to us, as far as I understand. 10

11 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can I clarify? The MTA folks 12 said that if we make a proposal for the whole site, they would prefer to have one lease. If we make them 13 14 a good proposal, they would consider also giving us 15 that lease.

16 MR. SALADINO: Well, how can they -- how can 17 they break their lease?

18 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: When it's up.

19 MR. SALADINO: Oh, it's a 50-year lease.

Wasn't it a 50-lease? 20

21 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah.

22 MR. SALADINO: From 1982? From 1982?

23 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm not sure. Maybe I misunderstood. 24

MR. SALADINO: I'm sure one of you guys know. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: The lease that they have with 2 North Ferry had nothing to do with this, so I don't 3 know what the terms of it were. 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I think it's a couple of 5 years. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: They pay them rent. North 7 Ferry pays them rent directly. It doesn't come 8 through us, so I don't know. 9 MR. SALADINO: It was my understanding it was the same as ours, a 50-year lease. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: That could be. I'm not sure, 12 John. I don't know. MR. SALADINO: So -- well, the only reason I 13 14 mention it is because we should -- we should have the truth instead of -- or the facts instead of 15 16 speculation. I mean, you know, we could do this, we 17 do this, we could do it this, and actually we can't. 18 So might as well just --19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I have what the MTA guy told me, which is that it's up in '21, but I will clarify 20 21 it. 22 MR. SALADINO: Well, that would be -- that 23 would be end the of a 50-year lease. It was in 1980. No, it would be 30. All right. I don't know. 24 The softball fields, you want to spend 1600 25

1 bucks on softball fields. I think a couple of years 2 ago we gave them 16, 1800 bucks to repair a fence. 3 Do they pay a fee to use those fields? 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't think they pay a fee. 5 They carry their own insurance and they pay towards 6 the lights. They don't pay a fee. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They pay per game, don't 8 they? They pay per game. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, they pay per game? They 10 pay per --11 MR. SALADINO: Pay for what? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Per game. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Per game. CLERK PIRILLO: Per game. 14 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Per game. 16 MR. SALADINO: So they pay a fee? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 18 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: I thought that covered the 20 lights, though, doesn't it? 21 CLERK PIRILLO: No, two separate things. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Two separate? Okay. 23 MR. SALADINO: All right, if they pay a fee. 24 And you mentioned the noise in the park. I have a question about -- I read in the agenda 25

1 that you're going to approve or approve -- I don't 2 have the wording, of a Long Island Railroad letter. I come to all the work sessions, I listen to the 3 4 discussions. I never heard of a letter for -- could you tell us what -- share with us what's that about? 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: The letter was just intent to 6 7 ask them to extend service on weekends and all. It 8 was a form letter that was sent to all municipalities 9 and I was just signing the letter saying yes. 10 MR. SALADINO: Oh, it has nothing to do with the festival? 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: 12 No. MR. SALADINO: Oh, because didn't we have a 13 14 deal with them with the last festival? 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: They're working out -- yeah, 16 they're doing a package deal and everything else. 17 This was just a follow-up. The letter was sent to 18 Mayor Nyce. He had not signed it, so they sent it to 19 me, and all the municipalities on the East End were signing to say, "Please extend services on weekends 20 21 for us and give us more trains and bus." 22 MR. SALADINO: How is that working out for you? 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Not so well yet. 24 MR. SALADINO: I have one question about the 25 Tall Ships. I had spoke to a potential sponsor, a

1 guy that was approached to be a major sponsor, and in 2 the discussion with President of the BID, he was told 3 that his product, if he chose to be a sponsor, his 4 product would be the exclusive product, that 5 particular product, of the festival. He declined. 6 He declined because there was no contract for him to 7 read. He's an attorney, you know, he knows better 8 than to just say, "Yeah, okay." Is that, in fact, 9 true? Are those offers being made? I mean, how can 10 you -- how can you tell one vendor that your hamburgers, or your beer, or your wine is going to be 11 12 the only wine, or beer, or hamburger, or umbrella sold at that festival? I don't understand. 13 I don't 14 even -- I would ask the attorney. I don't think 15 that's legal. And --

MAYOR HUBBARD: I will ask the President of the
BID about that, because I don't know.

18 MR. SALADINO: That's my kind of follow-up 19 question. Jack was nice enough to give us a report 20 and Trustee Roberts was nice to give us a report, and 21 Trustee Robins was nice enough to give us a report. 22 I'm finding it hard to get my head around it. I ask 23 these questions. Every week I have a question, every 24 month I have a question that somebody's going to ask one of those guys, the former Mayor, or Peter Clarke, 25

who refuse to talk to you about anything, because,
apparently, Steering Committee meetings are
privileged, they're private. So they don't answer
any questions. So I asked the questions here, and
when I asked the questions here, the response is,
"Well, I got to ask those guys."

And I don't know whether you guys agree, but it's not fair to the public. You know, why is it unreasonable for me to expect that somebody that's spending my money, my, collectively, money, not to come here and give us answers? I understand there's a Liaison. The Liaisons only have the information that they give and they can't be questioned.

14 I've asked for this before. I think it's pure 15 arrogance that they won't show up here. I think 16 there's something to hide that they won't show up 17 here and answer these questions. I don't know if I 18 -- I can't put it any plainer than that. And I look 19 to you, George. You're the Mayor, you said things 20 would be different. I look to you to kind of correct 21 I mean, it's -- it's not their money. this. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.

23 MR. SALADINO: It's not their money, it's my 24 money. And to -- you listen to the bits and piece 25 that come out. And believe it or not, people -- some

people do want to talk about it. Some people do want to talk about it, but the people in authority -- and actually, the President of the BID told my friend, told this particular guy, he says, "Oh, I can make any deal that I want, I'm on the Steering Committee, I'm in charge of the Steering Committee."

7 Do you guys know -- everybody here knows my 8 I'm here, my primary interest is money, is story. 9 When I come up here, I talk about money, and money. 10 I'm not -- I'm not relegating my authority as a resident to somebody that perhaps might be a 11 12 resident, maybe not. You know, it's almost like the Masons, you got to show like a secret handshake to 13 14 get in to talk to these guys. It shouldn't be like 15 that. We understand the past administration, 16 everything was a secret. I don't understand why this should be a secret. I mean, there's two elected 17 18 officials out of 27 people there. Who's representing 19 me? And every other person on that committee is a 20 business owner. Who's representing the public? 21 Who's representing the citizens here that may or may not have to foot the bill for this deal. 22 23 That was my little rant. Thanks for listening.

MS. LATHAM: Hi. I'm Sarah Latham. I'm the owner of the Fordham House Bed and Breakfast, located

at 817 Main Street. I'm here today in support of
requested resolutions to revise the code, Section
150-7(B)(7)(c) as follows: The renting of rooms is
limited to not three, but five rooms for lodging and
serving of breakfast, and not more than two
individuals shall occupy a room, for a maximum total
of not six, but 10 casual and transient roomers.

8 Both the State of New York and the Town of 9 Southold limit bed and breakfasts to a maximum of 10 five rooms. I encourage Greenport to join them and 11 allow bed and breakfast owners in the Village to grow 12 their businesses. These businesses provide safe regulated rooms for visitors to Greenport. 13 Owners 14 reside on the premises, and parking is provided for 15 each room.

I'm a graduate of Greenport High School and I've returned to the North Fork in the hopes of raising a family here. For me, two more rooms is the difference between simply covering my mortgage and overhead costs and being able to make enough to provide for a simple living that would allow me to do this full-time while raising that family.

As we look toward the more arduous task of addressing short-term rentals that are currently offered on site to just Airbnb and VRBO, I believe

that allowing Greenport's bed and breakfasts to go from three to five rooms immediately provides more inventory for those interested in staying in the Village with the security that this inventory is already subject to existing regulations that have proven to be safe and acceptable for both visitors and residents alike.

8 And I just want to reiterate that I think this 9 is a separate issue from the overall issue of 10 short-term rentals, and I look forward to a public 11 hearing to hear the community's concerns and what we 12 would need to do to have safe and acceptable rooms 13 increased to five. Thanks.

14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thanks.

16 MS. LATHAM: Oh, let me ask one more question. 17 What is the process? So if it goes to a public 18 hearing, that would be some time in June, we think, 19 or we hope?

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we schedule a public 21 hearing. It would be June 25th, I think around June 22 25th.

23MS. LATHAM: The public hearing for it?24MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

25 MS. LATHAM: And then it would need to also go

1 to the Code Committee if the public hearing -- would 2 it come back here after the public hearing? 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: It doesn't have to go to the 4 Code Committee. The Village Board could vote on it 5 the following month after the public hearing. 6 MS. LATHAM: So in July? 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 8 MS. LATHAM: Okay. Just so everybody knows. 9 It's the busiest season. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the easiest procedure. 11 You have the public hearing, take comment. Normally 12 we don't vote on something the day of the public hearing to give everybody time and allow somebody who 13 14 couldn't make the meeting to submit written comments, and then we would vote on it the following month. 15 16 MS. LATHAM: Okav. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right? 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sarah, can I just ask you 19 a -- Sarah, can I just ask you one question, as far 20 as --21 MS. LATHAM: Yes, sorry. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As far as -- as far as the 23 parking --MS. LATHAM: 24 It was coming from here. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, I'm sorry. As far as 25

parking, I believe you have enough parking to
 accommodate a B&B.

MS. LATHAM: So I do have a large-sized lot, so I don't want to speak for everybody in the association. It would be easy for me to accommodate the parking.

7

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

8 MS. LATHAM: I had some ideas just in 9 discussing this with the other owners of the B&Bs in 10 Greenport. I think -- think we could be creative 11 about how we could maybe get revenue for the Village 12 and add parking, even if it wasn't off-street 13 parking. But to answer your question, yes, I would 14 be able to add a parking spot.

15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Thanks.

MR. SWISKEY: Just on what the -- William
Swiskey, 184 Fifth Street.

Just on what the young lady says, nobody in the Village has enough parking, so we should try to use parking to restrict the B&Bs running from three to five, because you can work out other solutions. To use that, you're just -- well, you're killing them anyway.

Oh. And, first of all I want to commend
Trustee Roberts and Trustee Martilotta for putting

1 their report on the website. I wish all the other 2 Trustees and the Mayor would do it, because it actually helps if you know it's going to be 3 4 discussed. And I think if perhaps Trustee Phillips 5 and Trustee Robins and the Mayor could do it, it 6 would be nice. Anyway, to -- the first item I'd like to speak 7 8 about is Tall Ships, and we've had reports, and we've 9 had this. How much money is actually the Village committed -- has spent so far, does anybody know? 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Robert Brandt knows. 12 MR. SWISKEY: What? \$91.007.43. 13 MR. BRANDT: I do. 14 MR. SWISKEY: \$91,000. How much money have we 15 got in the bank from the donations, I mean, not 16 promises, real money, checks in hand? 17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Twenty-two-five. 18 MR. BRANDT: Twenty-two-five. 19 MR. SWISKEY: We have 22,000 out of how much, 20 how much promises? 21 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: A hundred. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: One hundred. 23 MR. SWISKEY: And we voted tonight to spend how much more on that -- out of that 91? 24 25 MR. BRANDT: No. That's included in the budget

1 mod.

2 MR. SWISKEY: And we have other ships' 3 contracts coming due fairly quickly.

4

MR. BRANDT: Correct.

5 MR. SWISKEY: And we got to pay at least 50% of 6 these contracts, I guess. So we're going to be quite 7 a bit in the hole from what the BID promised us. And 8 I think the BID has either got to step up or 9 something's going to happen, because, I mean, Peter 10 Clarke can't run around town making promises on 11 behalf of the Village.

12 The Village is running this festival with 13 Village money. These guys won't even come here and 14 I mean, the offer that they made to this report. 15 person was like, "Oh, can give you an exclusive." 16 You can't give an exclusive, Peter. What is this guy 17 thinking? Somebody had better speak to him. He's 18 not running this Village, this Village Board is. 19 And, I mean, that's just -- and the disrespect. Thev 20 don't come here to report? If I was Mayor, they'd be 21 off the committee, they'd be bye-bye, take a hike, 22 fellas.

I mean the Village -- the last time the Village did the collections. Now -- and the Village had to do the -- had to make -- you know, get the

1 collections in. These guys, if they don't make it, 2 it's no skin off their teeth, whereas the Village is 3 going to be required. If they don't make it, we're 4 going to have to make it up. So I think we need 5 better reporting, and I think -- and like Doug --6 Trustee Roberts said, when you vote on a resolution 7 for the Tall Ship spending, each item should be 8 separate, not banged together. How much do we spend 9 giving the company that's doing the advertising? How 10 much are we giving to the ship? I'd like to see a separate resolution for each spending amount. 11 And I 12 don't care if it's too much work the Treasurer. That's our money. I'm a taxpayer. I can pay two tax 13 14 bills in this town. It's my money that's at risk and I want a little accountability. And if it's a little 15 16 more work for an employee, that's tough.

17 That's my opinion, and that's what I used to 18 tell employees. "No, this is what you do. You work 19 for me, this is what you do." And the sooner they 20 learn it, the better, because you have a lot of 21 employees running around here, they've forgotten who 22 they work for. They work for the public, they work 23 for this Board.

Anyway, to get back to the next item, why don't we hire some summer help like we used to, you know,

1 college kids or something. You could hire a college 2 kid for eight or ten bucks, or whatever you hand out 3 in the park. They work in let's say Sixth Street 4 from noon until six at night, when the bathrooms 5 close. You know, he doesn't have to do hard work, just keep the bathrooms clean, go around, pick up. 6 7 He could run to Third Street Park, do a little 8 picking up. It could be done.

9 And one thing I'd like to see in the park, and 10 I've pushed this for years, is a shade arbor. You 11 see young couples going down there. I take my grandchildren down there, so I'm not pushing a baby 12 carriage, the kid walks now, okay? But you see young 13 14 mothers coming, coming with their baby, one toddler 15 walking, he's going to play on the playground, and 16 that little one is in the baby carriage. And the 17 closest place they got to sit is the picnic tables, 18 which are far away from where the playground is.

19 So when I -- you know, you've seen the shade 20 arbor at the Town Beach, right, Jack's Shack, George. 21 Something like that wouldn't cost them much to put 22 together. It has the bench, it has the table, and it 23 has the canopy, and she can sit there with a baby and 24 watch the toddler play.

25 And the Village could actually build that thing

themselves, it's not that much. You could get a
 contractor to lay it out for you and your own people
 could build it. I know some contractors who would
 volunteer to lay it. But, anyway, give it a
 consideration.

Now -- and like Arthur Tasker there said, and I 6 7 -- you know, this just came to me, we haven't got a 8 report that was due in April yet from our sewer 9 contractor? Are we -- are we hiring that many 10 incompetent engineers that they can't get their jobs 11 done? Maybe it's time we start looking at different 12 It's like this A & F thing, it's time for a people. decision at the Power Plant. Somebody screwed up. 13 14 These people are not responding to you, have your lawyer contact them. You know, it's time to move 15 16 forward. You're running the show, they're not. Get 17 tough with them. That's the way you make them 18 respond. If nonresponses like go -- you know, 19 they're telling you basically go pound salt, and I 20 don't like that, not a bit, and this Board shouldn't 21 like it either.

Now, how is the asbestos test going at Kaplan
Avenue? Was it significant or -MAYOR HUBBARD: Sixteen to 19% on five samples.

25 MR. SWISKEY: Sixteen to -- that's not

1 significant at all, that's low.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well -- but still, it 3 was a positive test.

4 MR. SWISKEY: It's a positive test.

5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Between the five samples, they 6 varied from 16 to 19%.

7 MR. SWISKEY: A composition of a shingle.
8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

9 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. And the shingle --

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: The interior and everything 11 else, there was no positive samples on the interior.

12 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. Because \$46,000 is a lot 13 to demolish that house, even if it has asbestos 14 contamination. That's a huge price. There's 15 basically three large dumpsters there and it's gone. 16 That amount is -- the Village is going to wind up 17 owning that property, because she'll never make that 18 tax, she'll never pay that tax bill. So, you know --19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Bill, I don't disagree with 20 Bill, I don't know what's going to happen, but, vou. 21 in the meantime, she doesn't have the money to take 22 it down and we need it down.

23 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. Well, you're going to have 24 to take it down now. It got a little bit out of 25 hand, so now the Village has got to take it down.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: The bottom line. that's what we 2 just -- we're just trying to do what's right and get down so nobody else has to deal with it. 3 4 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: And then, you know --MR. SWISKEY: And the -- oh, during the 6 campaign, it was talked about the ferry, all right? 7 8 We've been hearing about the ferry tonight. Has 9 there been any progress on the dollar a car fee for 10 entering the ferry from Greenport, because that can 11 be done, that can be done through your County 12 Legislature. It becomes part of their fee structure. And a dollar a year -- a dollar a car is going to 13 14 give you \$100,000 or more a year for free money to 15 fix roads. So I think the Board has to go back to 16 that.

17 I know it may have been -- some people may have 18 thought it was rhetoric during the campaign but, not 19 to me. I think it's a significant source of revenue 20 recurring every year. If you had that \$100,000 every 21 year and say this is just to fix a road, this road, 22 you'd be forever fixing roads. You know, in 10 23 years, you'd be in wonderful shape. Because, you 24 know, I went through Treasurer Brandt here. He goes through four motions to take money out of --25

1 basically which is a bank book, and put it into an 2 account to fix roads. I don't know why he does that. 3 There's no minuses or pluses here. It used to be 4 when you did a budget mod, the money came from this account, that was minus. The money went to here, it 5 was plus. So everybody -- I couldn't tell, the 6 7 truth, and I know how these things work, what was 8 going on here. Was it 250,000, was it half a 9 million, or was it -- you know, it's. To do budget 10 mods like this make no sense at all. They call them 11 budget adjustments. You move \$250,000, yet you're 12 posting a million. Does that make any sense, you're a million --13

14 MR. BRANDT: It's a two-sided journal entry. 15 You have to get a revenue and expense and, as I 16 explained to you, move it from the General Fund into 17 the Capital Fund, so you could track it over the 18 course of more than one year. If we're going to have 19 ongoing projects of any capital nature, that's the 20 way it's recorded. So I'm sorry it doesn't -- you 21 don't approve of it.

22 MR. SWISKEY: No I approve this, Robert. 23 MR. BRANDT: That's the way the software is 24 completed.

25 MR. SWISKEY: The software, the software is

1 causing this, hey?

2 MR. BRANDT: Yes, it's causing this problem, 3 yes.

MR. SWISKEY: Not good accounting. Your
software is causing this mess. That's not good
accounting practices.

MR. BRANDT: Well, sorry you feel that way. 7 8 MR. SWISKEY: I do. I have a minor degree in 9 I mean, this is ridiculous. Can anybody tell that. 10 me exactly? If you looked at this, you couldn't tell 11 how much money was being moved here. You look at 12 that and say that's a million dollars, right? Am I I'm asking, Jack? 13 right?

14TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I couldn't explain it to15you.

16 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No. I know that it's what 17 Robert just said, that it's moving -- that's the 18 delta how many times the money moves.

MR. SWISKEY: Well, why does it have -- why
can't it move just from the bank account to Account
H, which is a capital account anyway, H-51, because H
is capital.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Isn't the point that we're
not spending a million, we're spending 250?
MR. SWISKEY: Right. Why are we only spending

1 That's not even going to touch what you got to 250. 2 We should have -- be spending a million. do. We 3 have it in the fund balance. I mean, we need -- our 4 roads are in horrible shape. It's -- anyway, I have 5 one more thing, because I don't want to keep 6 everybody past their bed time? AUDIENCE MEMBER: It's already past. 7 8 MR. SWISKEY: I was at the budget hearing, 9 okay, and when I asked specifically about 10 hospitalization, our two Trustees weren't going to 11 take it. The other -- two other Trustees and the 12 Mayor said in six months they would be off it. I just want to ask how is the progress. Are you going 13 14 to meet that goal, George? 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: I plan on it. 16 MR. SWISKEY: Mary Bess? 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm working on it. MR. SWISKEY: All right. 18 Julia? 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I did not say that I was going 20 to go off it, I said I was going to go on a single 21 plan, okay. I did not say I was going to go off it. 22 MR. SWISKEY: And then you said you were going 23 to go off it, but I won't argue about it, because I 24 know stories change. But I intend to ask at every meeting until it's done, because in six months, we 25

1 could have \$88,000 a year available to fix roads. 2 You can move this money around, you can put it 3 pilots, or you can call it -- believe me, it could be 4 done. But I agree with Trustee Roberts. On his last 5 resolution, you're saving 44,000 on these two by not 6 having hospitalization. Why don't you just pass a 7 simple resolution that that money is going for road 8 funds? To me that boggled my mind. Thank you.

9 MS. MC NEIL: Lara McNeil, 321 Second Street. 10 You have to get me to a meeting, because then I'll 11 get up and talk.

12 I'm kind of impartial about the bed and 13 breakfast thing either way. But I want to mention 14 something that which I think has been getting Section 150-32 of the Village Code about 15 bypassed. 16 amendments to the 150 Chapter, and how it should be 17 going to the Planning Board before it goes to public 18 hearing for -- it specifically says if any part may 19 be amended, supplemented or repealed, Village Board 20 on its own motion or recommended by the Planning 21 Board. Prior to public hearing, every such proposed 22 amendment shall be referred to the Village Planning 23 Board for a report. The Village Board shall not take 24 action on any such amendment without such report from the Planning Board, unless the Planning Board fails 25

for any reason to render such report within 45 days after the next scheduled -- regular scheduled meeting. And then it actually calls out what the Planning Board should be reporting to you on when you make those changes. So I feel that you shouldn't be scheduling a public hearing until you first ask the Planning Board.

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: You are 100% correct. I didn't 9 know that section of the code right then, but that 10 would have been picked up by the Lawyer before we 11 actually went and scheduled it, before we did the 12 agenda, but we were --

MS. MC NEIL: I understand there's been some
things that have bypassed this --

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, no.

16 MS. MC NEIL: -- in the past.

17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What section is it?

18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: What section is that?

19 MS. MC NEIL: 150-30 -- 150-32 and then 150-33.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We will review that and 21 we're going to do it right.

22 MS. MC NEIL: And, you know, do it right, 23 exactly.

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. No, that's -- I'm glad 25 you brought that up to us, because I didn't know that

1 section of the code. I don't remember it offhand. 2 MS. MC NEIL: Thank you. 3 Thank you, Lara. MAYOR HUBBARD: 4 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. 5 MR. CORWIN: My name is David Corwin. I have pages here of my grievances against the Building 6 Inspector, but I'm too tired to read them tonight, 7 8 and you're all too tired to listen to them. I think. 9 So what I want to ask about is the 10 street-sweeper. I see it at 5:30 on Friday morning 11 downtown on Main Street or Front Street. When is it 12 ever going to hit any of the residential streets? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Good question. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I could just -- I'll 15 give you a quick answer on that. I put the request 16 in last week for that. They started doing it. They 17 went down Sixth Street, they started doing it down there. They blew the pump no it, it had not water, 18 19 and it was just spreading dust around. The part, I 20 believe, was supposed to be in yesterday. 21 MR. PALLAS: It was picked up today. 22 CLERK PIRILLO: We got it, we picked it up 23 today. 24 MR. PALLAS: Today. MAYOR HUBBARD: We part came in today to fix 25

the pump, and so they'll be working on it tomorrow.
And then I put the request in for the potholes and
sweeping on the side streets two weeks ago, and
they're going to be getting to that real soon. I
agree with you.

If we go back to when your 6 MR. CORWIN: Good. 7 father was Mayor, we go back 30, 35 years, there was 8 talk about the harbor walk, the harbor walk, the 9 harbor walk, which was a very nice idea, and pretty 10 well it's been completed with Mitchell Park. But now on the east side of Mitchell Park, there's a parking 11 12 place for like five vehicles. So it's like the 13 manager, the park -- the marina and whatnot park 14 there. And what I want to say is why don't you take 15 one of those parking places out of there so you can 16 walk from Mitchell Park to across what used to be the 17 White's Bait Shop and just have an area that's for 18 pedestrians, not for parking of cars down there, down 19 at the marina?

And then at the budget hearing, I brought up the East End Seaport Museum and the line items to spend money on the roof there, which has been spent. But there's no revenue items for these things. What's the status of that? Are you going to collect rent from them or what's going on with that?

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We talked about it at 2 that time. I did not follow up, so I don't know 3 where we were.

4 MR. BRANDT: We were obligated by our lease on 5 that to make repairs to that building. There's no 6 revenue side. We're not expecting to get, you know, 7 rental income

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, but I've asked a 9 couple times, and a few years, and, Robert, I'm not 10 I've asked for us to have a management at you. 11 agreement review and update something, because at one 12 point years ago, and I think Mr. Corwin and perhaps Mayor Hubbard will remember, we paid out money to 13 14 construct that Maritime Museum and there was supposed 15 to be a repayment to the Village over years, and I 16 have no idea if that's been completed. I know Robert 17 and I have been looking for it. Robert, you haven't 18 found it yet, have you?

- 19 MR. BRANDT: No, no.
- 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

21 MR. CORWIN: Well, why don't you just tell them 22 "You got to pay rent"? I mean, if -- place has got 23 to be worth three \$3,000 a month anyway. You don't 24 have to charge them that much, but you're getting a 25 lot of money away.

1 What I'll try to do is come back in a week and 2 read my grievances in front of the TV. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 4 MR. CORWIN: I didn't want to do it in front of 5 the TV, because I didn't want to embarrass the 6 Building Inspector or myself, but everybody's tired. 7 Thank you. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: David, could you -- could 9 you possibly -- maybe, would it be possible for you 10 to email that to all of the Trustees and the Mayor? 11 Oh, you have them all -- you have it all blocked? 12 Okay. All right. MR. CORWIN: I'll email it to you, but I want 13 14 to be in front of the T.V. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no, I'm not -- I 15 16 just would like -- I just I think it just --17 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If you would, that would be 18 great. I'll read it. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't disagree with the 20 T.V., I just think it would help us understand. 21 MR. CORWIN: I will do that. Thank you. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Is there anybody else that would like to address the Board? 23 24 (No Response) All right. I'll offer a motion to adjourn at 25

1 11 -- well that clock's wrong. 11:25? 2 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 3 Second TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Second. Aye. 4 5 TRUSTEE ROBINS: 11:26, actually, George. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 11:20 whatever. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Twenty-six. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Second?
