1	(Whereupon, the meeting was called to order at
2	7:06 p.m.)
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. I'd like to call
4	the meeting to order. Pledge to the flag.
5	(Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of
6	Allegiance.)
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. You may be seated.
8	Okay. I want to welcome everybody to our June work
9	session. We'll start at the top with Chief Breese.
10	Come on up, Chief.
11	CHIEF BREESE: Good evening, everybody.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Good evening.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Chief, how are you today?
14	CHIEF BREESE: Good. You got my all of my
15	monthly reports, I hope, timely.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
17	CHIEF BREESE: The only thing I got extra was
18	we elected a we voted in a new member, Chris
19	Hanold, Jr., last night. I gave the application.
20	MS. BRAATEN: I'm sorry. Could you just speak
21	into the microphone, please.
22	CHIEF BREESE: We have a member who was voted
23	in last night, Chris Hanold, Jr. to Star Hose
24	Company Star Hose Company. I gave the application
25	to Sylvia limmy already signed off on it

Ţ	MAYUR HUBBARD: UKay.
2	CHIEF BREESE: the secretary, so that's
3	ready to go.
4	Need permission to have our Department picnic
5	down on Fifth Street Beach again this year, on July
6	25th.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: July 25th?
8	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. We moved the date up. It
9	was originally going to be August 1st, but that's the
LO	same day as Southold is having their 350th
L1	Anniversary that day.
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
L3	CHIEF BREESE: So we're going to try to attend
L4	that parade, so we didn't want to have a conflict of
L5	interest.
L6	And the other thing is the Wardens want to
L7	sit not sit down, but we got to figure out what
L8	we're going to do with this building, because, you
L9	know, it needs a lot of repairs. I know we had an
20	architect, and we only got one architect, but they
21	want to know what the Board's feeling is, what the
22	direction do we want to take with this, because we
23	got to do something. This place needs a lot of work
24	and we've got to figure out something, which way
25	we're going to go with this.

T	MAYUR HUBBARD: Ukay. I mean, we have two new
2	Board members that weren't a part of the meeting we
3	had back in December.
4	CHIEF BREESE: Right.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: So do you want another official
6	meeting? You want to just
7	CHIEF BREESE: I guess that would be the best
8	thing, to have another official meeting between the
9	Board and the Wardens, and sit down and figure out
10	which we're going to ge, because we only got one
11	price from one architect, and that was kind of a
12	ballpark figure.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that's general prices.
14	You're still going to have to go out to bid when you
15	go to do the work.
16	CHIEF BREESE: Right. But we're saying, you
17	know, it might be cheaper, it might be more, we don't
18	know. But we got to make a decision before we start.
19	You know, there's general repairs that got to be done
20	around here. We got to do it to keep the place
21	going, but within the next 10 years, this place is
22	just going to you know, you've seen the termites
23	coming up from the floor, it's not going to last much
24	longer.
25	So I don't expect nothing until maybe August or

1	something, because I know we got the lail Ships
2	coming and that's going to be that's a lot of work
3	still, you know, even for us. I'm requesting a lot
4	of help from all the neighboring districts
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right, okay.
6	CHIEF BREESE: for EMS standby and
7	everything. But maybe in August or September we
8	could get together and sit down and discuss which way
9	we want to go with this.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right, that's fine. Are
11	you comfortable waiting until September, until the
12	end of the summer?
13	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah, yeah, because there's too
14	much going on with the Tall Ships and everything,
15	even for us. We're trying to get EMS standby.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the summer is just busy
17	with everything, so.
18	CHIEF BREESE: Right, so that would be fine
19	with us. If you guys would do that, that would be
20	great.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Harry, I'm just going to ask
22	Mayor if we could just I know the last meeting we
23	had, we kind of looked back towards you to decide
24	kind of, you know, short-term plan and a long-term
25	plan. So I think that would help

1	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: us, as the Trustees, to
3	understand on a short-term basis what you think needs
4	to be done. And then we had talked about the
5	long-term, which is something you, as the Fire
6	Department members, need to decide what you want,
7	okay?
8	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So those were the two things
10	I came away from the meeting with.
11	CHIEF BREESE: All right.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I'm hoping that since we
13	have the two new Trustees, they will get a better
14	picture of, you know, where the companies want to go,
15	okay?
16	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. But the
18	short-term repairs, that I think is something that
19	a couple of firemen spoke to me about it, and that's
20	something that needs to be moved on a little bit.
21	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. There's stuff we need to
22	do just to keep the place going. We have to but
23	we don't want to spend too much money on it, we don't
24	want to get that far ahead of ourselves.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, no. But that's what

1	I'm saying, is, you know, I think it would give us a
2	better picture, as Trustees, where we think it's
3	going.
4	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: September would be better
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: September would be better.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: to deal with it.
8	CHIEF BREESE: That's fine.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Everything is going in the
LO	summer.
<b>L</b> 1	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. No, I understand that.
L2	It's very busy for you guys and us, too, so that's
L3	fine. It would be better off a couple of months
L4	away, give us a little time to get everything
L5	together.
L6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I have a procedural or
L7	financial question. The work that gets done on the
L8	Fire Department, can that be combined in a bond with
L9	work that we do elsewhere in the Village, as long as
20	it's all General Fund, or they're completely separate
21	projects?
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. It could be done together.
23	They've been grouped together before.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: They actually banded stuff

1	together and they did one bond once they had other
2	things.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: So that could be done together.
5	If you can, Harry, just if you get a group
6	together from the Wardens, maybe the Buildings and
7	Grounds Committee, last time we said, you know, what
8	are you actually looking for, to get a general idea,
9	are they looking for a drive-through fire department
10	like Shelter Island and Orient? Are they looking
11	single-base like this? And just a general idea of
12	what you're looking for to give us some
13	information
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: of where you want to go with it.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: That I know also was brought up
18	about, you know, the Front Street Firehouse, here,
19	combining, whatever, just to get a general idea from
20	the Department which way they want to go. That way,
21	we have the information and we can, you know, talk
22	better with you about it.
23	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right?
25	CHIEF BREESE: One more thing. Somebody came

1	over here, I took pictures, they posted a note on our
2	door there and they taped it to our Maltese Cross,
3	and you could see it pulled quite a bit of the
4	Maltese Cross off. Whoever put stuff on there,
5	because they could you advise them to please stop
6	doing that, put their thing somewhere else?
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What was it?
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: I saw the picture and email
9	about it and people were informed not to do that
10	anymore.
11	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Or put it on the metal part and
13	not on the glass.
14	CHIEF BREESE: We would appreciate it.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: I did see the email and it
16	was Paul took care of that.
17	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. Thank you.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Was it one of our people?
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it was one of the
20	committee one of the the Zoning Board got
21	cancelled or something, and somebody put a stick-it
22	up there, and when they pulled it off, the tape
23	pulled off. I'm not sure which meeting it was, I'm
24	not blaming anybody, but it
25	CHIEF BREESE: It was an accident.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
2	CHIEF BREESE: They probably didn't do it on
3	purpose.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I'm sure they didn't.
5	CHIEF BREESE: But just tell them to try and
6	not do it again. All right. That's all.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for the
8	Chief?
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, I want to ask a
10	question, that there was a thank you for having us
11	at your meeting last month.
12	CHIEF BREESE: No problem.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: There was a mention in here,
14	I think Mr. Harris. I couldn't understand what the
15	comment was. It was something about Mr. Harris
16	commented on Trustees coming to a meeting. Was there
17	a specific
18	CHIEF BREESE: Mr. Harris?
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. Pete Harris, I guess.
20	Was there was there something there that we should
21	know about, about
22	CHIEF BREESE: No.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: coming to your meetings or
24	anything or
25	CHIEF BREESE: No.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Any problem or anything?
2	CHIEF BREESE: No. I'm not sure when he
3	commented. I mean
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: He was at the
5	CHIEF BREESE: He was in he's not a Warden,
6	he was just there as a firefighter. But I'm not sure
7	what he was going what way he was going with that,
8	whether he was trying to
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Pete Harris spoke about a
10	Trustee coming to a Warden's meeting to discuss
11	have available members speak against same. So I
12	wasn't sure if you guys were trying to say that we
13	shouldn't do that or
14	CHIEF BREESE: No. It's a public meeting, we
15	can't stop you from coming.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
17	CHIEF BREESE: It's just like this, it's a
18	public meeting.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right, okay. I wasn't sure
20	what it meant, so
21	CHIEF BREESE: I'm not sure either what Pete
22	was
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All right.
24	CHIEF BREESE: getting at either.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Don't worry about it?

1	CHIEF BREESE: No, it's nothing.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: By the way, Harry, I would
3	like to say that that was a meaningful memorial that
4	was done for Richie Sycz and the kid, Bellefountaine.
5	CHIEF BREESE: Thank you.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was on Sunday. I was
7	didn't realize that it's been 38 years, I think.
8	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, since that fire on
10	Carpenter Street. And I for one remember starting my
11	career at North Fork Bank and sitting out in the
12	front, standing, as the two coffins went by in the
13	procession, and our whole community came together. I
14	was it was a memory that was worth sitting in the
15	hot sun for on Sunday. Thank you.
16	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. We're planning we're
17	going to try to plan something a little bigger for
18	the 40th, two years from now, so.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you very much.
20	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. Have a good night.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: You, too. Thank you.
22	Okay. Tall Ships, Trustees Martilotta and
23	Robins.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, sure.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You want me to start, Jack?

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Go right ahead.

an overview here of where we're at to date, kind of a schedule of events and some of the details that everybody's been asking about. I want to preface that by saying that the event schedule is in the process of being printed now, along with the event map, and should be available, I'm hoping, either by tomorrow or Monday at the latest, and at such time it will be posted on the Village website, so everybody can know exactly what's going down on what day.

So the opening ceremonies are going to occur on Saturday, July 4th, at 10 o'clock. The National Anthem will be performed, and there will be a welcome from the Mayor, and we'll be welcoming elected officials probably from the County. County Executive Steve Bellone, I believe, Al Krupski, and a number of other dignitaries have all been invited, if they choose to attend. At that ceremony, there'll be a gift for the Captains and the First Mates of the ships. One of the gifts we're planning on giving them would be a Village of Greenport flag, and also, if anybody has seen the wonderful book of Greenport postcards that was published by Gail Horton and David Corwin, we thought that would also be a nice memento

1	of our village.
2	On Monday, July 6th, the Hermione will arrive
3	at 10 o'clock, and there'll be a small reception on
4	the upper deck of the Marina office for the Hermione,
5	but the reception will not be done until the ship is
6	open for tours. We want to make sure that we start
7	the tours quickly.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia, can I just ask, the
9	reception for July 6th, is that going to be copying
10	or mirroring the first?
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It will be smaller, more
12	simple.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Inviting the same
14	dignitaries or no?
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They will all be invited to
16	attend, if they want. Yeah, same list of people.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is the public invited?
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Of course, it's a public
19	event.
20	Okay. Ship arrival dates, all right? The
21	ships, the A.J. Meerwald, the Kalmar Nyckel will
22	arrive on July 2nd and be open for tours July 4th
23	through July 7th. The Picton Castle and the Sagras
24	will arrive on July 3rd, and be open for tours from
25	July 3rd through July 7th. The Lynx will also arrive

on July 3rd, open for tours from the 4th through the 7th. And the Hermione arrives on July 6th, and will be open for tours from July 6th and July 7th.

Tickets can be purchased at several locations within the Village. The East End Seaport Museum will be selling tickets. They'll also be sold at the Zamboni building and at the Ice Rink.

Advanced ticket sales are ongoing and have been doing quite well. In the Treasurer's report, I think we have an updated sales number on online sales to date. Advanced ticket sale prices are \$15 for adults, \$10 for seniors, \$10 for Veterans, and \$5 for children. There are also family packages available. One family package is for two adults and two children for \$35. The other is for one adult and five children, also for \$35.

Advanced ticket sales will end on June 24th, at which point prices will revert to \$20 for adults, \$15 for seniors, and \$10 for children.

Transportation: We have some information from Mr. Pallas that arrangements have been made with the Long Island Railroad for expanded service on July 4th and 5th. A lot of people at the last event took the opportunity to take the train from points west.

Riverhead, Mattituck, Southold, all have stops. The

1	times of those stops are posted here. Eastbound, at
2	approximately 20 minute intervals, will be leaving
3	Riverhead at 12:15, 3:25, and 4:22. And westbound
4	return trains from Greenport will be at 2:11, 5:11
5	and 6:11. So we certainly hope that people in points
6	west that want to come to the Village for the event
7	will utilize the trains.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia, how about the Hampton
9	Jitney? I understand that's on the website as
10	providing some type of transportation. Is there some
11	package for them?
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't think they're offering
13	any special packages right now.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. They're just
15	ordering offering the normal route out from New
16	York City, is that what
17	MR. PALLAS: As far as I know. I don't know of
18	any specific
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. They're on
20	they're on the website as part of the transportation.
21	Yeah, they are.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: But their regular schedule.
23	There's nothing no expanded schedule.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. That's what I'm
25	asking as well.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, I didn't
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But their sponsorship
5	agreement said something like you're the you could
6	be the transportation something or other sponsor of
7	the Tall Ships Festival. I read something like that
8	on the agreement. So
9	MR. PALLAS: We could chat. I mean
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I don't know what that means.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I don't
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But if it just means we're
13	calling them that and there's nothing special, then
14	take their money.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I don't think they have
16	any exclusive rights. Certainly, there are going to
17	be other services coming here and doing bus service
18	to the event.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The all right. Some of the
21	things that one of the things I wanted to stress
22	to everybody in the community, and if you know
23	anybody, we need volunteers for this event. In order
24	to be successful for ticket sales and crowd
25	management down and getting people onto the boats, we

1	need volunteers. We would prefer that the volunteer
2	be at least 14 years of age, and the work would be a
3	minimum of four hours. They can certainly work
4	longer if they want.
5	We are offering some perks to our volunteers.
6	One of them would be that they're offered two
7	tickets, ship tickets to be used on another day,
8	other than on the day that they serve. They'll get
9	an event staff tee shirt. We'll provide them with
10	beverages and snacks, and also a letter of thank you
11	from the Village for their service and, you know,
12	helping out for this event.
13	So we thought, especially for students and
14	things like that who want to do some sort of
15	community service, it's a great opportunity for them
16	to serve the Village and be involved in a fantastic
17	event.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: How many do you need?
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We are looking for probably
20	50, if possible. Rather than
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Five-zero?
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Fifty volunteers. We are not
23	trying to pigeonhole people into committing to a
24	specific time. We feel that a lot of people don't
25	want to, you know, try and book their schedule in

1	advance. So we're going to leave it an open come in
2	at 9:45 to the school house on each day of the event
3	to offer your services if you'd like to volunteer.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fifty for the whole four
5	days, so
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Fifty for four days, yeah.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Twelvish per day?
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: If we're doing going at
11	that rate, we'll be very happy with that, okay? I,
12	as a Trustee, and being, you know, so involved with
13	this event, have offered my services to Kit Liset and
14	the event staff for all four days to be an on-call
15	volunteer liaison wherever they need me, so I plan to
16	be here the whole time. So anybody have any
17	questions for me?
18	(No Response)
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And if I could just
21	piggyback on that. Thank you. That was really
22	that was really good.
23	A couple of quick things. People have been
24	asking me about firstly sponsors. So we have this
25	awesome spread sheet here right now. But we are

1	essentially on track to reach that 100,000. I
2	believe, and this is eluding me at the moment, but
3	was on the spread sheet. The total collected through
4	yesterday was just shy of 92,000.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 91,875.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Ninety-one-eight-seven,
7	okay. And I believe we have commitments for more. I
8	do not have the specifics, but at our Steering
9	Committee meeting last night, they were saying
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: About 16,000 is the
L1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, there it is, right
L 2	there. Never mind. So there you go.
L3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: From the Jitney.
L4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: There you go. So that
L5	will be reached.
L6	We should also expect the public relations
L7	stuff to really begin in earnest, be that TV
L8	commercials, radio commercials. They're doing not
L9	raffling off, but you can win tickets to the event
20	through a few local radio stations. But we should
21	start to see more and more of that as we get closer
22	to the event, I guess in an attempt to drum up
23	interest.
24	Current ticket sales, I was told, are ahead of
25	the expected pace. I don't know what the exact

1	number is. Would you know?
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We have over \$6600 dollars
3	worth of tickets sold today.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 476 tickets.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 476 tickets, which I am
6	told was ahead of the last time this event took
7	place.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's ahead of the last time,
9	yes.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It is ahead of last time, yes.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, it is.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: One thing that we're going
13	to try and do, and we were talking to the Chief last
14	night, is we're going to try and divert a lot of the
15	parking towards the high school in an attempt to get
16	people, instead of looping through town looking for
17	parking, if we can get people to pull off into the
18	lots at the high school. We're going to put up some
19	signs in advance to try and try and get people
20	before they get into town to park.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So on that, I saw a map in
22	the folder. Is that the street, proposed street
23	closure plan?
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Is that the map from that
25	Brian's printed?

1	CLERK PIRILLO: No.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, it's a different map. Oh,
3	that's the
4	CLERK PIRILLO: I think what Trustee Roberts is
5	referring to is a draft map
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
7	CLERK PIRILLO: that we had created for Paul
8	some time ago. I don't know if that needs updating.
9	MR. PALLAS: No, it's the final.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: Is that the final?
11	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So at looping through
13	Adams Street, closed Main Street up to somewhere, I
14	can't remember where.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Central
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Central.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Center.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Center, and then closing
19	between the lights. So and is that that's
20	the that is the final plan?
21	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For all of this?
23	MR. PALLAS: As far as I know, yes.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And Jack was we both
25	addressed that at the meeting last night with Chief

1	Flatley, and it was determined that for the for
2	safety of pedestrians and people on the street that
3	the best thing to do was to make sure that the
4	streets are closed all four days.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For all four days?
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'd like to ask a question,
8	okay?
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Please.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because if I'm looking at
11	the map correctly, the blockade will be across
12	after the stop light, because we still have to
13	provide traffic down to the ferry, correct? So
14	south
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: At Third Street.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So Third Street.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, yes, yes.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So they'll be diverting
19	traffic from Third Street and down South Street to go
20	around, correct? Is that my understanding, South
21	Street is going to be open?
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. You could go down Adams
23	Street if you want to make the loop behind the
24	stores, or you go to South Street, continue over to
25	First or Main and head north.

Т	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS. IS there any and I m just
2	throwing this out right now, okay? Is there any plar
3	to give some of the local businesses who will be shut
4	off because of you know, because of the walking
5	area, would we be able to shut off the one of the
6	parking lots behind IGA, or two of them maybe, from
7	anyone parking and giving those people an opportunity
8	to get in and out of those parking spots? Maybe
9	perhaps IGA could hire somebody to monitor the
10	parking. I'm just throwing it out, because
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: To keep them out of the spots?
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For the customers?
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To keep it just so the
14	customers of the stores can get in and out of there.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Wouldn't we have to hire the
16	people? It's our lot.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I mean, they'll need
18	you could try to make it temporary parking on South
19	Street on the side of IGA so people could get in
20	there. You could attempt that. It's very hard to
21	enforce when people pull up and they say, "Yeah, I'm
22	going to IGA," park they car and start walking. You
23	can't stop them.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, no. I'm just I'm
25	just suggesting. I'm putting the suggestion out

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: because that is that
3	area is going to be free for traffic.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great idea.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that it may give an
7	opportunity, if we can keep it closed before the
8	events start, so no one could get into it, or, you
9	know, something. I'm just throwing the idea out.
10	Perhaps we should approach the gentleman from IGA and
11	maybe some of the other store owners, like Hommel's.
12	And because I know we are hiring someone to keep
13	someone out of our parking lot, because I need to
14	keep it open for the retail stores, so that I'm just
15	throwing it out as an idea to think about.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. I think it's a great
17	idea. I'm trying to think of how.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, I don't know.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm throwing it out to see
21	if it could be discussed, that's what I'm talking
22	about.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We could pass a resolution
24	that on those days, we're enforcing one-hour parking
25	in that lot. And so the Village of Greenport is

1	enforcing one-hour parking, and later we're going to
2	talk about parking, and then we could figure out how
3	to enforce it.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just throwing it out
5	okay? I think it's you know, it's
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Most of the other
7	stores
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great idea.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: like Hommel's, other places
LO	like that, they know all their people are coming in
L1	before 10 o'clock. They're going you know,
L2	whatever they have to go and get, they're doing that
L3	beforehand. I mean, I talked to the police, I've
L4	talked to quite a bit of the business owners have
L 5	called with concerns and everything else. Any store
L6	that needs somebody to get down to them, the police
L7	have been notified at the corner of Main and Center,
L8	that if somebody needs to get there down there, that
L9	they'll escort them in and out with a delivery, or
20	pick up a bed that they bought, a chair, whatever.
21	People will be there. There's not so much coming
22	down Front Street, because there's not a lot of
23	stores right there that would need to do that.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's in the back section.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: But in that area down between

1	Carpenter, Central, Center and all, they know that if
2	somebody needs to get in, they just go and ask the in
3	police officer, "I need to get to this store,"
4	they'll escort him in and back out. Or if somebody
5	needs deliveries and they have to get an ice cream
6	truck, and they say the ice cream comes in at noon,
7	so they may not be able to get there before 10, that
8	they'll escort them in, let them make their
9	deliveries, so nobody's without provisions or what
10	they need.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just I think that we
12	should discuss it, at least to give some of those who
13	are upset about it, because IGA does shut on
L4	Maritime Festival, he does shut half the afternoon
L 5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
L6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: because he just nobody
L7	can get into the parking lot to get to him. So I
18	just
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: He's been a great supporter
20	of the Village, too.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, yes.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I mean, I think that's
23	someone you want to keep as a friend.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And nobody's denying that,
) 5	okay? It's just this is this is an event that is

1	an opportunity, and I think we just need to be
2	looking at both sides. And I just happened to throw
3	this out and think about it for discussion, okay?
4	I'm sure the Tall Ships Committee is going to have
5	to
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, we're going to have
7	Mr. Pallas go down and look at an area and see if
8	there's a way we could do it, and help me try to set
9	something up to, you know, IGA shopping or local
10	shopping only. You can't really say local, because,
11	I mean, it's entitled to anybody. But, you know, to
12	try to keep something open for them.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: One-hour parking would do it,
14	I think. Anybody who's going to go shopping and buy
15	something and
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, it's going to be hard
17	I mean, it's going to be hard to enforce one-hour
18	parking, to tell when they go in, when they're back
19	out and everything else.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They do it at Sterlington
21	Deli, they do it I mean, they do it everywhere.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, I know that, but
23	somebody's going to have to be standing there manning it
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're going to have 50
25	volunteers.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't think that would be
2	the responsibility of the volunteer.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not going to have a
4	14-year-old kid trying to tell a guy in his Range
5	Rover that you can't park there.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, I wouldn't want to put
8	a young kid that's volunteering to try to put them in
9	that position.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I've been in my own parking
11	lot telling them to get "You can't park here."
12	"What do you mean? It's public property." I said,
13	"No, it's not public property, it's private property,
14	you can't park here," and we've gotten close to
15	fistacuffs. So you can't ask a kid to do that or a
16	volunteer, to be honest with you.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: A parking enforcement officer
18	could give a ticket.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So, if we make pass a
21	resolution and make it so, then we enforce the
22	resolution, and the parking officer am I missing
23	something, or it feels
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, we don't have a parking
25	officer right now, but, I mean

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: If you do by then, then if we
2	get we figure out how to do that.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We're talking 16 days from
4	now?
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Well, that's why I was
6	going to have the Village Administrator look at the
7	area down there, see if they can come up with a plan.
8	They'll have it before our regular meeting, if we
9	want to pass something for our regular meeting. I
10	don't want to just try to pass something now without
11	actually looking to see what we're going to try to
12	do
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: to make sure that it's
15	enforceable that we can do something.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's unfortunately been the
17	challenge with this event is that it's 16 days before
18	and we're just now hearing that the street's going to
19	be closed and sidewalks are going to be closed.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. The streets being closed
21	has been talked about for a long time.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's not news.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's been going on for a
24	while.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But I'm a Trustee, no one

told me that streets were going to be closed. So to me, what I'd like to see us do as Board, I'd like to see us take control of this event, at least for the big things like closing our streets and sidewalks, and say -- so if the Chief says we've got to close the streets for four days, it doesn't hurt anybody for us to say, "Okay, we're making a resolution, this is it." Let's end this conversation that's happening about what's going to be closed or not closed.

"Hello, everybody. The Village Board is closing the streets on these days, this is a resolution," and be done with it.

From my perspective, the Trustees control the streets and the sidewalks of this Village, because we represent the people. And I think there's a lot of concern in the community that a sort of committee of people who are not elected that operates mostly in secret is closing our streets and sidewalks.

I don't think this is a big deal. I think we can just go with the recommendation of the Police Chief, do a resolution, tell the community this is -- this is what we're doing. So does that seem like a bad idea to folks? I'm sensing frustration.

MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that is the plan.

Actually, I already spoke to the Village Attorney

about that to see what's legal, who has to do it, and ask the Police Chief about it. You know, the Police Chief doesn't need a resolution, but it would be helpful for enforcement and everything else to have a resolution to do it. I plan on bringing that up, that we have a resolution just to clarify it, that we're not being told by the BID or anybody else what's going on.

The original resolution for the Tall Ships was to mirror the same thing that happened last time and last time it did happen. And the BID letter that went out several months ago told people what was going on. Some of the store owners might not have read it, or whatever, and most of them have called me and talked to me and I've had meetings with them, and, you know, it is what it is.

I mean, it shouldn't have been a surprise to somebody that has a store right on Front Street that didn't know that the roads were going to be closed for Tall Ships. I mean, I think it's a little naive to say that. But, I mean, we're planning on having a resolution to vote on next Thursday to say to everybody that we're passing a resolution, we're closing from Main Street to Center Street for the four days. And if traffic doesn't bear keeping the

1	roads closed, the Police Chief with his Lieutenants
2	are going to be down there. If we say it's three
3	o'clock on Tuesday and there's nobody around, we're
4	not going to keep the roads closed. It's not a
5	strict deadline
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: of six o'clock.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That's perfect.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: So if it looks like everybody
10	clears out by 4:30, say, "You know what, the road's
11	clear," let's bring a street sweeper in, let's clear
12	the road, let them take down the barricade. We're
13	going to use some common sense, not keeping it closed
14	on a strict deadline.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's what's been discussed, and
17	that was my intention of trying to manage the affair
18	that day.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the memo we got earlier
20	said that they would be closed for all four days.
21	And so I just want to make sure everyone's aware,
22	Monday and Tuesday are work days, so I have to come
23	back to work, everyone has to go back to work. So
24	I'm not sure. You know, for the merchants who are
25	not happy with this, a compromise might be to at

1	least open on Tuesday, possibly Monday. But if
2	you're saying we can leave it flexible, I think the
3	resolution should just reflect that.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right, with the discretion of
5	the Police Chief, who's in charge of crowd control.
6	If the crowd is really small and we don't need the
7	roads closed, there's no reason to keep it closed
8	just because we said six o'clock.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's my feeling. I talked
11	to, you know
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what my
13	understanding is that's how we've always done
14	anything in the Village. We've always looked at it
15	to be fair, and if it just wasn't busy enough to keep
16	something closed or do something, then we just went
17	ahead and got back to normal.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right, and modify it that day.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think Monday is still going
21	to be a busy day. Tuesday I think is going to be a
22	lighter day.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: On Monday with the Hermione,
25	the first day here, I think that's going to be a busy

T	day. But luesday, 1T, you know, 1T's two o'clock,
2	everybody's on the sidewalk and it looks like it's
3	safe, and I don't think they're going to get more
4	people coming after that, that I'll speak to the
5	Lieutenant and the Chief of Police down there. We'll
6	do what we have to do, whatever's appropriate, as
7	much as we can.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just want to
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: George, I'm sorry, but I
11	would like Paul to take a look at the parking lot
12	behind IGA.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Let's see if we could do
14	something for that strip, yes.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just wanted to comment that
16	having been at the Tall you know, at the Steering
17	Committee meeting from the beginning, and Chief
18	Flatley did attend almost all meetings, and the topic
19	of street closures, you know, came up relatively
20	early on, and the assumption was that if the if we
21	are in festival mode and the festival is indeed going
22	on for four days, that it was the Chief's
23	recommendation that, you know, the streets be closed
24	for safety. That was the that was the reason for
25	it, okay? So it was not something that came last

1	minute, okay? It was always an understanding
2	amongst in the committee. And is I said, Chief
3	Flatley was always at the meetings, every Tall Ships
4	meeting. I think he was very good at attending.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, Jack, I do believe
6	that Julia was explaining to me the meeting, and you
7	did ask the Police Chief the reason. So could you
8	kind of explain the reason why it was
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I was actually moving to
LO	that, absolutely.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So we understand what the
13	Chief means by safety, we have relatively narrow
L4	sidewalks. They're expecting a fair a very large
15	amount of people being here on different days. Two
16	things they thought might happen.
L7	One, the foot traffic might spill over from the
18	sidewalk into the street, and that causes a potential
19	problem, obviously, if the streets were open.
20	The second problem that might arise is if they
21	need to bring an ambulance or some sort of rescue
22	vehicle down towards Mitchell Park and Front Street
23	is just like clogged with cars, it's not going to get
24	there. However, if we have a whole ton of people and

an ambulance, you know, with sirens on, or whatever,

25

people are going to get out of the way and that ambulance can get down there. And to me, that's rock -- you can't argue with safety, you know, and I thought that that was a pretty rock-solid reason, to be honest. So that was his reasoning. I just wanted to make sure I shared that with everyone.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So when people started asking me about this, I went to look at what the Board has done on Maritime, and pretty much every year I found a resolution closing streets for Maritime, so I think there's precedence. And I think the lesson learned for us is I wish I had thought about this in April. I didn't think to ask the question. I, frankly, assumed that the previous Board had voted to do it, because everyone talked about it like it was happening.

So, you know, the other lesson learned is that what happens in that Steering Committee has never -- has had a hard time getting to the public until now. So this is really great. Thank you. And I'm just really excited to see all the money is there. That's really exciting. And I'm happy to be able to finally just fully get behind this thing.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Just one other thing to

1	clarify. Like Trustee Martilotta was saying, talking
2	to the Police Chief, talking about going one way,
3	coming in and going through. Once you get down to
4	the corner of by Coronet, there's no place you're
5	going to go to. You're not going to be able to park,
6	you're not going to be able to go into a store, but
7	traffic could move through there. But you're better
8	off using the side streets because there's going to
9	be traffic jam. So that's why we looked at the, you
10	know, cones on each side, one lane of traffic going
11	in, but you're really not going to get anywhere by
12	doing that. So that's another reason why, you know,
13	the same thing, it was just completely bottled up.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. And then, yeah,
15	like if we needed a rescue, that would be a problem.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: And the vendor the vendors,
17	there was only eight vendors coming in. They're off
18	to the side.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's not going to be like
21	Maritime Festival with vendors along the whole
22	Village. There's a few additional vendors. The food
23	court is going to be on Central.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: But there's only there's

1	very few vendors. People are already committed to
2	other things. This is something different. Maritime
3	Festival, they book that years in advance, they know
4	when they're coming out
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: for here, so they don't have
7	much going on with that. Just that's all I had to
8	add. Go ahead.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. One other thing I
10	just wanted to add. The bands had been the main
11	stage had originally been set to be down towards
12	Claudio's over there.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. They're going
15	to be moving that. There seemed to be some issue.
16	I'm not exactly sure what it was, to be honest. But
17	what they're going to do is they're going to put the
18	bands in Mitchell Park, see if I get this right, all
19	the way on the east side of Mitchell Park.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: On the west side, all the way
21	to the
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: On the west side it is?
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. So it's
25	backwards.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Near the dock that goes down
2	to the West Pier.
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay? There's an area that
5	used to have tall grasses there that's been cut down,
6	so that would be the location of the band.
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And that will be there
8	Saturday, Sunday, Monday during the day. For Monday
9	night dances, it will be in its normal spot up on
10	the
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Boardwalk.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: stage, but whatever it
14	is up there. All right? So if you see the bands,
15	that's where they're supposed to be.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right behind the post office.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, yes, absolutely.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: The walk-through right behind
19	the post office.
20	MR. PALLAS: By the closer to the water.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: On the Marine side.
23	MR. PALLAS: Directly behind, yeah.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: On the Marina side.
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: On the Marina side behind

1	the post office, absolutely.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it going to be down to
3	the grass?
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: On the Marina side.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. That's all I
6	had.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And also on the safety front,
8	the Fire Department has requested, and we will
9	barricade that access road that comes up behind the
10	post office going up to the Boardwalk.
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Fire Department requested that
13	be kept open as a fire lane, so that will be done
14	with signage and barricade. I think Paul said we'll
15	take care of that.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm good.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else Tall Ships?
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't think so.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm good. I'm good.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, thank you for the
22	report, thank you for the progress, and thank you to
23	everybody that's worked on getting sponsorships and
24	getting checks in and
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: progress with getting all
2	the details taken care of. Hopefully, the weather's
3	going to be beautiful and we're going to have a great
4	day. Village Administrator.
5	MR. PALLAS: Thank you, Mayor. I do have one
6	Executive Session item after the meeting, just very
7	brief. I think I sent that out to you.
8	In keeping with the I guess the Tall Ships
9	and the park, just so you're aware, L.D L.D.
10	Flecken was the company that originally built the
11	Carousel building. They were scheduled to be on-site
12	at the end of June. They did show up. They have
13	been working on the doors, and it's working out very
14	well. They're able to get them all functional, but
15	not all of them. We're getting four sets functional
16	and that should be done by Friday, by tomorrow night,
17	the latest Monday. They'll have we'll have four
18	sets of doors functional.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Four out of?
20	MR. PALLAS: Four out of 12.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Out of 12.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'd like to say thank you,
23	because when I was on the Carousel Committee, that
24	was one of those things that you and I discussed that
25	I know it took a lot of work to find the original

1	contractor for the doors and get them to come.
2	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.
4	MR. PALLAS: And they're making some minor
5	modifications to help facilitate some of these
6	problems that we've had in the past don't happen.
7	But I'm certainly going to continue to recommend that
8	we do some annual maintenance with this same company.
9	They really do know what they're doing, because they
10	built them.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was one of the goals in
12	the committee.
13	MR. PALLAS: Right.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Some money is supposed to be
15	put away for the maintenance. Okay.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, what was your date that
17	those doors will be operational by?
18	MR. PALLAS: Monday.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Monday? Okay.
20	MR. PALLAS: I mean, they'll as they're
21	doing them, they're becoming operational.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. All right.
23	MR. PALLAS: So certainly by tomorrow, we'll
24	have at least two.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: If I may, sir, what was
2	made what is or was making the doors fail to
3	operate?
4	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, a multitude of things.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
6	MR. PALLAS: They're so large and so heavy, the
7	but the all the weight comes down to a single
8	ball bearing on the edge of the door.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Understood.
10	MR. PALLAS: And that's the modification
11	they're making. They were just steel. Now they're
12	changing them out to stainless steel and then putting
13	in grease fittings, so that we'll be able to actually
14	keep them greased on a regular basis, and they
15	shouldn't ever be a problem again.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.
17	MR. PALLAS: Still work on the I forget what
18	they call them, but as they open and close, there's a
19	screw hinge kind of thing that pulls them in and out,
20	that needs to be realigned. It gets out of alignment
21	a little bit, so it starts to get out of whack. And
22	if you continue to operate them in that condition, it
23	gets worse and worse, so.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Understood. Thank you.
25	MR. PALLAS: Also have a contractor. We met

1	with several contractors to do some masonry repair
2	around Mitchell Park. We're going to do some for the
3	Tall Ships event. We're going to fix up all the
4	things that must be fixed, all the loose bricks,
5	things like that, slate and whatnot. That will all
6	be done before the festival. The rest of the
7	repointing of the of all of the slate will be done
8	after the festival. But anything that presents any
9	kind of a safety issue will be dealt with on that.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: The repointing work is
11	that's on the where exactly is that?
12	MR. PALLAS: Completely around the Carousel.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, I see.
14	MR. PALLAS: That's all slate.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
16	MR. PALLAS: And all has to be repointed, the
17	whole thing.
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And some of the one of
20	those slates cracked over the winter, too. Are those
21	going to actually be replaced?
22	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, the yes.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You know, any of those cracked
24	coming up?
25	MR. PALLAS: If they're falling I think if

1	they're cracked, we'll probably leave them.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
3	MR. PALLAS: But if they're starting to flake
4	away
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
6	MR. PALLAS: those will be replaced, yes.
7	So that's ongoing.
8	I do have five five resolutions currently,
9	three to ratify hiring of three employees at Mitchell
10	Park, Angela Klavas, Sophie Jacobs, Jordan Maichin.
11	I think that's how you pronounce it.
12	I have two additional resolutions, I don't know
13	if they're in your packet, for salary increases for
14	part-time seasonal employees. One is for Tristan
15	Mangham, who has actually worked at Mitchell Park and
16	for the Marina for over seven years. He's still
17	currently at minimum wage at 8.75. We'd like to
18	bring him up to \$11 an hour, because it's been seven
19	years. Jeff reports that he's a very good employee,
20	conscientious. He works both the summer season and
21	the winter season at the Ice Rink during the winter.
22	We're asking to make that retroactive to May 25th of
23	20 May 25th of this year.
24	The second one is for Sarah Doherty. Again,
25	she's at the starting salary. She's been there for

1	three seasons. We're just raising her salary from 9,
2	currently 9 to \$10 an hour, again, retroactive to May
3	19th of this year.
4	So those are the five resolutions.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And Sarah works in the
6	office?
7	MR. PALLAS: She works in the office, yes.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
9	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. I did have a topic of
LO	discussion, solar panel issues. I don't have any
11	paper on this. I just wanted to alert the Board that
12	we've gotten a number of requests, mostly all
13	residential requests about installing solar panels on
L4	their roofs, asking about the buy-back, selling
L5	energy back to them. We don't have a current tariff
16	with the Power Authority to allow that. I'm going to
L7	start with assuming it's okay with you, I'm going
18	to start exploring what that process would be with
19	the Power Authority as a regulator to put in place
20	what most utilities currently have. So I just wanted
21	to let you know about that, that I was going to start
22	that process.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is there any way that the
24	NYSERDA grant could help fund any costs associated
) 5	with I understand there may be capital costs to

1	get a program going.
2	MR. PALLAS: Well, this isn't for a program,
3	this is just so that people, if they want to do it,
4	they have tax incentives. There's enough money out
5	there, but the one thing that isn't there is a
6	provision that if there's excess energy, that they
7	that we would pay them back for what we
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
9	MR. PALLAS: what we took.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: That's the only thing that's
12	missing in this whole process for that.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So you're going to go
14	research all of that?
15	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Could the NYSERDA grant, if
17	we were to move on to further rounds, could that help
18	us?
19	MR. PALLAS: No. That's more for what's called
20	community solar. That's for utility level solar
21	directly into the system, as opposed to individual
22	services.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
24	MR. PROKOP: So one of the reliefs that other
25	municipalities have provided the residents is the

1	to try to standardize the engineering that has to be
2	done when you when you do these panels on your
3	roof, there's an engineering review that has to be
4	done, especially if you do it independently of one of
5	the companies that does it. And other municipalities
6	have tried to standardize that, or get a standard
7	price, because there's a wide range of what could be
8	charged for that as one way of bringing relief to the
9	homeowners that try to do this.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
11	MR. PROKOP: That's one of the things that can
12	be done.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we before we leave
14	Mitchell Park, misters, any progress?
15	MR. PALLAS: We're slow. You know, there's
16	as I explained before, virtually the system, from the
17	pump all the way to the nozzles, doesn't work.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
19	MR. PALLAS: You know, I don't have the
20	specifics to where we are in that, but I'm fairly
21	certain that with all the things that would need to
22	be done, it's not going to be done in time for the
23	Tall Ships, that I could tell you.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But, I mean, is it the kind
25	of thing where maybe we it's too far gone and we

1	have to
2	MR. PALLAS: I don't think so.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
4	MR. PALLAS: I don't think there's any one
5	thing that breaks the banks, so to speak.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
7	MR. PALLAS: I think there's just things that,
8	again, haven't been maintained that need to be
9	cleaned up and fixed. That's my impression
10	currently.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So wait until after Tall
12	Ships and then maybe
13	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: get into it?
15	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Clearing out the stuff from
17	the Carousel to the shed?
18	MR. PALLAS: We're trying to get the shed
19	company, in contact with them. They're just not
20	returning our calls, essentially, so we might have to
21	go look for another vendor. It was a local company
22	that we were looking at.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, the little one out there?
24	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. It's actually a big
25	company.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
2	MR. PALLAS: It's actually one spot. It's
3	actually part of the bigger company. For some
4	reason, they're I guess they're just too busy, I
5	don't know, but we are still looking at that, yes.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks.
7	MR. PALLAS: Just general, general report
8	highlights, very few. The Road Crew has been
9	working, getting the parts ready for the season.
10	They've worked with the Marina staff to do moorings,
11	fixing up the Mitchell Park area with topsoil. We're
12	going to be doing some more crushed stone spreading
13	within Mitchell Park. That's on tap for the next
14	week or so, so we're going do get moving on that.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I know you don't I don't
16	think you're on Facebook. I've been praising you and
17	the crew on Facebook, so please
18	MR. PALLAS: I will pass that along.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: For the beach stuff, so thank
20	you.
21	MR. PALLAS: That's my next item was that we've
22	done a lot of cleaning and painting at the Fifth
23	Street bathrooms. I think they turned out really
24	well. We did that inhouse, we didn't have to
25	contract that out. So I was very pleased that they

1	were able to do enough inhouse and get them in good
2	shape.
3	One other highlight: The Camera Obscura
4	actually, in terms of revenue, is actually up by \$43
5	this year, so I just thought that was a little
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's good, it's functioning and
7	being used.
8	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, exactly. And actually, Jeff
9	wanted to make sure I pointed out that
10	John Fudjinski has been instrumental in keeping up
11	the maintenance on that, so we've been able to use it.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's been part of the
13	problem with the whole operation is the maintenance
14	on the Camera Obscura.
15	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, yeah. The Recreation
16	Center, as I'm sure you all know, we're in the
17	process of probably fairly well along moving. Sylvia
18	did a great job in coordinating the painting on that,
19	and, you know, it came out really well, and we're
20	just continuing to keep stuff moving on that as well.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Also, I want to thank
22	everybody who came down and assisted with the
23	painting on Saturday and Sunday. Trustee Robins
24	brought down pizza and soda on Saturday. I spent
25	Saturday afternoon and part of Sunday morning there.

1	Sylvia was there, Chatty Allen, Margo. I had never
2	met Margo before, she was there on Sunday helping
3	out. And it was a good some of the colors are
4	really interesting.
5	(Laughter)
6	It wasn't my choice of colors.
7	CLERK PIRILLO: They were bright.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: But the kids are going to love it.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Crayon colors.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They worked hard on those
11	colors, George.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: But it's looking very it's
14	looking real good and everything else. It's going to
15	be a good move for us and all. I just wanted to say,
16	you know, thank you again. If I forgot anybody, I'm
17	sorry. Yes, it was Wayne and
18	CLERK PIRILLO: Jojo.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Wayne, Jojo, yes.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We had Marty and his son Nick.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: And Marty.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Marty. It was Marty I was
23	thinking, yeah. Marty and Jojo's kids.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Margo Devito, yeah.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And Christian and his friend,
2	yup.
3	MS. ALLEN: And Christian was there.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: So, I mean, it worked out well.
5	It was you know, it was fun to see the place.
6	And, you know, we're not there yet, but it's getting
7	there. Just thank you to everybody involved.
8	MR. PALLAS: That's
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, I have one.
10	MR. PALLAS: I'm sorry.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I have one question on
12	the Sewer Department.
13	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In reference to the sludge
15	removal, I see in the Capital Budget we have, and we
16	spoke about it at Audit Committee, a piece of
17	machinery that would be drying out the sludge to take
18	the water out so that we're not paying for that. Is
19	that something that could move forward a little bit?
20	MR. PALLAS: In fact, I'm not prepared for this
21	meeting, but in the for the July meeting, Ray
22	actually has found a new system.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
24	MR. PALLAS: A completely different type of
25	system that virtually eliminates the need to haul

1	sludge at all.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, really? Oh, wow.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Great. Okay.
4	MR. PALLAS: There's a possibility that
5	whatever remains, we could actually there's so
6	little of it, we could pull it out only twice a year
7	out of the system and spread it in the field. We'd
8	have to get DEC approval ultimately, but that's
9	the how much the liquids are taken out of it.
10	It's not a prototype, it's actually a working system
11	in various locations.
12	We've had some Ray has had some brief
13	discussions with the DEC about it, showed them some
14	of the how it works, and they seem to be pretty on
15	board with it so far. But I would report a little
16	bit on the details. We're still doing the research
17	on it. It's not cheap, but it's cheaper than the
18	other system, but it's still not cheap. But it
19	over the long term, it saves a tremendous amount of
20	money.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because our sludge removal
22	costs have gone up year to year since we
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. It was 14,000 gallons
24	last month.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. So, I mean, I

1	think
2	MR. PALLAS: It appears to be a good system,
3	but again, we're just kind of starting the research
4	now.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. As I said, it's part
6	of long-term planning on the plants, and making it
7	more cost efficient. And it just kind of caught my
8	eye and curiosity. When it came up at the Audit
9	Committee, we were discussing capital budgets, so
LO	that was one of the things that came up.
11	MR. PALLAS: That's all I have. A couple of
L2	other things that will come up during other's reports
L3	that I have to talk about.
L4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Light Plant?
L5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are you doing Building?
L6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Light Plant, what's going or
L7	with the Light Plant?
L8	MR. PALLAS: Well, I didn't again, there
L9	were no I didn't have any highlights. Those were
20	the highlights.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
22	MR. PALLAS: I didn't have anything specific,
23	and the reports are in there.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh. So do you want to do
25	Electric first, because I want to ask about Building

Ţ	Department.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I would like to ask the
3	Electric. We have had many discussions in the past
4	couple of months, and I know we've been concentrating
5	on Tall Ships, but I'd like to get us back to the
6	basics of what's going on with the letters that were
7	sent out to the contractors in dealing with the
8	issues at the Light Plant that needed to be
9	corrected.
10	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. We Joe and I are
11	actually reviewing responses to those. We're in the
12	process of reviewing them.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	MR. PALLAS: Again, with everything else that's
15	going on, it's taking a little longer, but we do have
16	them and we are reviewing them.
17	MR. PROKOP: We did have one meeting where we
18	reviewed the letters that came back and we're going
19	over them now. We're trying there's a trying
20	to develop a strategy, basically, to address the way
21	that they respond.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So, hopefully, before
23	the next work session, we'll have some movement on
24	that?
25	MR. PALLAS: I would think so, yeah.

1	MR. PROKOP: Oh, way before the next work
2	session.
3	MR. PALLAS: I would think so, yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Way before that? Okay. And
5	then my other question is A & F. Did we contract
6	them to have they finished their project up there,
7	or what's going on with A & F?
8	MR. PALLAS: Well, A & F was contracted to do
9	the investigation, and to do what's called a
10	Coordination Study. The I'm getting the
11	Coordination Study from them tomorrow. It's
12	unrelated to the upgrade, it's just something that
13	needed to be done.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's what I'm
15	sorry, I used the wrong term. I know the upgrade is
16	one, but the coordination is
17	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. They are done, other than
18	the Coordination Study, and that's just a study,
19	that's all it is.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: On the Building Department
22	and Code Enforcement Report, I'm I'm pretty
23	excited to see a lot of these things are starting to
24	say "condition resolved", "situation resolved". I
25	think that means that whatever we're doing is

1	starting to work. So we obviously have a lot of wor
2	to do, but we're getting there on some of these
3	things.
4	I'm surprised to read that some people think
5	it's not that think it's didn't realize it
6	would be a bad think to have trash in the front yard
7	so it's an interesting read.
8	Where are we I see two oh. I also want
9	to mention specifically, I was at the Rotary Club
10	meeting this week. They are the Code Enforcement
11	report indicated that there's no progress happening
12	at North and Third out here. I think you know the
13	house I'm talking about, it's mentioned in here.
14	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But I can tell you that
16	they're working on hauling things out of the
17	basement. So I don't want the Rotary Club,
18	they're working every Saturday, 10 to 12, and they
19	would love volunteers. I'm going to try to get out
20	there. I would think bring some boots. So I know
21	they're working hard on that, so make sure
22	everyone letting everybody know.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think, Paul, that's the
24	Local for Local Program.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Craig Richter is the
2	gentleman that I told you I approached for the
3	Ruffners to help them with that program. So I do
4	know that that's been ongoing. And I do believe that
5	the Rotary, just to put it out there, will be doing
6	some more fundraising, and I do believe that they're
7	looking for any help to help with that project. So
8	okay?
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Also, I drove past that
10	property, as a matter of fact, just the other day,
11	and noticed that it does indeed look a lot improved
12	than it did several months ago. So the Rotary has
13	been instrumental in doing a lot of cleaning out in
14	the yard.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So it is coming around.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But I notice 210 Broad Street
18	is on here and something horrible happened there a
19	couple of months ago. And it looks like we're at a
20	roadblock on that particular one, but it's just a
21	legal roadblock. But it reminds that where are we
22	with rental permit law? And my understanding is that
23	Joe is going to be able to help us.
24	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. Well, notices are going
25	back out. The process is starting to pick up again.

1	I don't have any specifics on it, unfortunately, for
2	this meeting.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But we're moving?
4	MR. PALLAS: Yes, yes.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because what's interesting
6	about the whole Airbnb thing, which is obviously a
7	big challenge ahead of us, but I notice that we're
8	able to go after the Airbnb people who have illegal
9	and unsafe apartments. And our rental permit law is
10	because they were posting on the internet for
11	everyone to see, which is really great work, and so
12	our rental permit law will sort of allow us that same
13	visibility. Okay.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: People that have year-round
15	rentals aren't advertising on the internet like
16	Airbnb is.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So it's a lot easier to
19	identify them, obviously.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But that's why you all passed
21	that law, so we can
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. One of the things I'd
23	like to when we go on to Airbnb, I'm going to have
24	a suggestion about amending our rental law, so as a
25	beginning step.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for Paul?
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Is this all cash, these,
3	these handwritten?
4	MR. PALLAS: No, I don't believe. No, I dont'
5	think so.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What are you talking about?
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Like is there ever something
8	that comes in that's from a certain
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Which?
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, sorry.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are you talking about the
12	Carousel or the
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, the reports out of Rec.
14	and Marina.
15	MR. PALLAS: No, this is the no, this is not
16	just cash.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's receipts.
18	MR. PALLAS: These are just no, that's not
19	just cash, no.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Is there it's hard
21	to know what all this is, and is there a way we can
22	move to, you know, an electronic report when it's
23	printed?
24	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I've been we've been
25	kicking it around.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
2	MR. PALLAS: We, you know, just haven't gotten
3	to it, yeah.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's that just Donna takes her
5	deposits and everything else, whoever comes in daily,
6	credit cards, check or cash and just totals for the
7	day.
8	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the old system that
10	Mr. Abatelli had in place.
11	MR. PALLAS: Yup, that's the same one that
12	we're using, yeah.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because there could be great
14	data on here. You know, how much of this is boats
15	paying in advance? How much is boats extending time?
16	How much is you know, Carousel, how many are
17	buying 20 packs? At some point, it would be great to
18	get if it's electronic, then we can an Excel,
19	like maybe you can kind of crunch some numbers and
20	help us figure out, maybe if we offer a deal on 20
21	packs of tickets at the Carousel during whatever, you
22	know, we might be able to maximize revenue is my
23	point, so.
24	MR. PALLAS: Yup.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. Thanks.

Τ	MAYUR HUBBARD: UKay. IS that
2	MR. PALLAS: All right. That's all.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: All done with Paul?
4	(No Response)
5	Okay. Thank you, Paul. Thank you. Stephen is
6	sitting in for Treasurer Brandt, who is taking
7	medical time, personal time.
8	MR. GAFFGA: Good evening. Let's just start
9	with some business. There are three resolutions to
10	be requested to be placed on the agenda. The first
11	one is Budget Amendment 2163. That's the funding of
12	the five Tall Ships. And if you turn to the budget
13	amendment page, you could see it's for the Kalmar
14	Nykel, the Picton Castle, the Sagres, the A.J.
15	Meerwald, and the Lynx.
16	The second resolution is to fund our Event
17	Planner and for the credit card fees for Tall Ships,
18	and that's Budget Amendment 2164.
19	The third resolution actually has a typo. It
20	states that it's 2165. It's actually Budget
21	Amendment 2166, and that is for the masonry repairs
22	at Mitchell Park that Paul had already discussed.
23	If we go through, we have the Utility Billing,
24	our meter reading is on schedule. Brennen is doing a
25	good job. He's been, you know, getting everything

done in time on a monthly manner, so trying to get the bills out equally.

And our Community Development, we have five recertifications and two interims to report -- were performed. The SEMAP was completed and submitted to HUD.

There was a public review held on 5/21 for the Administrative Plan, and the five-year Annual Plan was completed and submitted to HUD on 5/28.

With respect to the motion for the budget amendments, I request respectfully that there be action on the first one, Budget Amendment 2163 tonight, so that we could meet some of our contractual obligations to pay these ships on the --some of their contracts are coming due very shortly. I want to make sure that we have time to cut the checks and get them to them in a timely manner.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Yeah, Treasurer Brandt did speak to me about that beforehand, before he went into the hospital. He was afraid if we voted on it the 25th and to try to get the wire transfers and everything done beforehand, with the holiday starting on Friday, July 3rd, he wouldn't have enough time to make the transfers and get everything taken care of ahead of time, so he was hoping we could vote on that

1	this evening. It's in the budget, you know, it all
2	complies.
3	MR. GAFFGA: It's broken out by ship on the
4	budget amendment
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
6	MR. GAFFGA: itself that's attached, too.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: So what was it, 126,000? I'm
8	trying to
9	MR. GAFFGA: A hundred and twenty-three.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: And hundred and twenty-three
11	thousand.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A hundred and twenty-three.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's not 246?
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
15	MR. GAFFGA: No.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, no.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And, happily, we're much
19	closer with revenue now towards that amount than we
20	were last meeting.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Do you need that resolution
23	to have a
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I'd like to we have a
25	resolution to approve the Budget Modification #2163.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll second it.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Well
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, you want to do this?
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just a brief discussion.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So I went and read all these
8	contracts, just because information is power, and
9	just so I want everyone in the public, everyone to
10	know that some of these contracts had payments due
11	months and months, or weeks and weeks ago at least.
12	I can't remember. One of them had like five
13	different payments. So
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Was Hermione in the lead?
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No, Hermione had three.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Three.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Theirs is due July 1.
18	Anyway, I get why Robert wants us to do this, but the
19	contracts have been due for a while. And I'm you
20	know, I've said all along, if the money's in, I'm in.
21	So thanks, everybody, for all the work, the
22	volunteers who got these sponsorships in.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Any other discussion?
24	(No Response)
25	All in favor?

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.
6	Opposed?
7	(No Response)
8	Motion carried. So the Treasurer's Department
9	can work forward move forward with that.
10	The other stuff we'll vote will be on the
11	regular agenda for next week. All right. Any other
12	questions?
13	MR. GAFFGA: Unless there's any other
14	questions.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for Stephen?
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Good job.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Nice job.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Good job, nice.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: By the way, I just want to say
20	congratulations to Steven, who was married on
21	Saturday.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, married on Saturday.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's right, that's
24	right.
25	MR. GAFFGA: Thank you very much.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: A newly married young man.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well done.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: You skipped the honeymoon to
4	come back to be with us tonight?
5	(Laughter)
6	MR. GAFFGA: Can't leave the Treasury
7	Department unmanned.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you very much.
9	CLERK PIRILLO: Dedication.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Village Clerk. Good
11	evening, Sylvia.
12	CLERK PIRILLO: Good evening, everyone. I just
13	have a few of course, I have an addition, besides
14	the application that we have for the Fire Department.
15	I was advised by the HATCAST, Hellenic American
16	Taxpayers and Civic Association of Southold Township,
17	that on their Public Assembly Permit application that
18	we approved last month, they had the wrong date. I
19	believe that they put in a date for a Sunday and they
20	wanted the Saturday. So I've already put it into my
21	work session, if it's okay with the Board, for next
22	week to change the date.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: To correct the date? Okay.
24	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay? Just to amend the
25	last month's resolution, okay?

1	Under contracts and agreements in my report, we
2	are referring to 415 Kaplan Avenue on a week from
3	today, on Thursday, we'll have an Assessment of Costs
4	public hearing regarding that. An assessment is
5	available. I have copies with me today. Of course,
6	that will be posted tomorrow.
7	The Pumpout Station Agreement between the
8	Village and the Town was fully executed. I received
9	the fully executed copy today, actually. So do you
10	need
11	MR. PALLAS: No.
12	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I want to make a comment on
14	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: 415 Kaplan Avenue.
16	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I was speaking with a neighbor
18	who lives right next door and she wanted to
19	compliment the contractor who did the work, that it
20	was done in an extremely professional manner. She
21	felt very comfortable that everything was being done.
22	The cleanup was excellent, so I just wanted the
23	public to hear that.
24	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you very much.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I noticed that, since I'm the
2	guy who gets to review the vouchers each month and
3	you're all very jealous of that, I noticed that, Joe,
4	in your bill, you separated 415 Kaplan. Is that so
5	we can put those costs against
6	CLERK PIRILLO: Those costs are
7	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
8	CLERK PIRILLO: Those costs are in the
9	assessment.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're in there?
11	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. I believe it's 1,750,
12	going from memory.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
14	CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome.
15	MR. PROKOP: A lot of work by a lot of people
16	went into completing that.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Was the homeowner
18	notified that she had that completed now?
19	CLERK PIRILLO: Paul, did you notify the
20	homeowner?
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Because the homeowner
22	because by code, they have to be served with a copy
23	of that before the public hearing?
24	MR. PALLAS: I don't remember, I'll have to
25	check.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just make sure that the
2	homeowner was served with that before we have the
3	public hearing on it.
4	MR. PALLAS: Okay. Yup.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that something that comes
6	out of your office, Sylvia, or which department does
7	that come out of for serving the notice on that?
8	MR. PALLAS: It would come out of mine, I
9	think.
LO	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: So I
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe the Building
L3	Department puts it together, puts the package
L4	together. By our code, it says that the Building
L5	Department does it, that we have to prove we have
L6	to serve the homeowner on it, then have the public
L7	hearing to assess it, so.
L8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's what I thought,
L9	but I just would like to make sure that that gets
20	done.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that's why I brought it
22	up, to make sure that somebody gets it taken care of
23	this week.
24	MR. PALLAS: I'll get it taken care of, if it
25	hasn't been already.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: So we're clear with the public
2	hearing and we can assess it if it's not.
3	MR. PALLAS: If it's not done, it will be done
4	tomorrow.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine.
6	CLERK PIRILLO: Under Financial, I'm
7	referencing a check received from the Farmers Market.
8	I wanted to thank Lara McNeil. We received that very
9	timely. I believe it was the day after our regular
10	meeting. The Farmers Market opened last Saturday,
11	and I had a chance to pass by before painting, and
12	Lara was thrilled to be there. So I just wanted to
13	say that.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did we ever clarify which
15	parking lot they were supposed to be in?
16	CLERK PIRILLO: We did, and they were in the
17	correct parking lot, and I let Lara know that the
18	other day.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Then okay. Then I
20	will the next time we have something like that, I
21	will ask for pictures to be presented, because that's
22	not to lose that many parking spots for the
23	Farmers Market, I thought we were going in the
24	smaller one, not the bigger one.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Actually, when I said it that

1	day, there were 18 parking spots when I described it
2	that night.
3	CLERK PIRILLO: Right, two times nine.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: To go on the other one, it
5	would be right in the middle of Second Street as part
6	of it. And there's five parking spots, but they'd be
7	in the middle of the road, which would take would
8	block access to those houses.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: I believe you referenced nine
11	on each side, so that would be 18, two times nine.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's right. That was my
13	intent. I didn't have a picture of it when I
14	described it, because that way, I think the two
15	barricades would block the entrance, and you have the
16	two sides going in.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: I saw your picture and all, but
19	it was they were aware they were projected to be
20	by what I had discussed, so.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. All right.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Somebody put a
23	superimposed map on the photograph of it, that it
24	would of the proposed location, and I think that
25	was where I when I saw it, that's where I thought

T	it was going to be.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Like I was there at 10:30,
3	11, and there were a bunch of parking spots still
4	available in the other lot, so.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
6	CLERK PIRILLO: A letter was created to be sent
7	to Assemblyman Palumbo. It was signed today, and
8	will be circulated this evening, if not tomorrow
9	morning, and will be sent to Assemblyman Palumbo.
LO	This is regarding the safety issue that we have with
11	the blinking lights, okay?
L2	Under Resolutions, I have a blank for an
L3	account. I'll be working with the Deputy Treasurer
L4	in the Treasurer's absence to figure out from which
L5	account we'll be taking the cash and expense.
L6	MR. PALLAS: There's one resolution on here for
L7	the Intermunicipal Agreement between the Village and
L8	the Town of Southold for, as stated, qualified
L9	certified lifeguards for our Fifth Street Beach. The
20	Town did vote on it Tuesday and approved it. I don't
21	know I sent out late today, unfortunately, the
22	revised agreement. There's some changes that they
23	wanted. I don't have a problem with the changes. I
24	think, Joe, you had reviewed them. You were okay
25	with the changes as well?

1	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
2	MR. PALLAS: So I have copies here if you want
3	to look at them.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, I copied it off.
5	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I didn't have a problem
7	with it.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I just wanted to ask about,
9	Joe, about the some of the red line the
10	indemnification clause, so
11	MR. PROKOP: It's going to have to be tweaked a
12	little bit. We have a pretty we have standard
13	indemnification language
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
15	MR. PROKOP: the Board has approved and
16	but the concept is okay.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So
18	MR. PROKOP: It will be a
19	cross-indemnification.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So, in other words,
21	the Village isn't held responsible if the lifeguard
22	MR. PROKOP: We're only the Village will
23	only be held responsible for indemnifying the Town in
24	the event of Village negligence or omission, and the
25	same thing from the Town.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: But could that negligence be
2	failure to have proper equipment, or what would
3	that what would that be?
4	MR. PROKOP: I wouldn't comment on that
5	publicly. If you wanted
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
7	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'll ask you later at
9	Executive Session.
10	MR. PROKOP: If you wouldn't mind.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure, no problem.
12	MR. PROKOP: I just don't want
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
14	MR. PROKOP: to be on the stand three years
15	from now.
16	(Laughter)
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I mean, I'm not a lawyer, I'm
18	just asking a question. And then the all right.
19	That's it. Thanks.
20	MR. PALLAS: Understanding that there may be
21	some minor changes, I would like to get a vote on
22	this, at least as a concept with maybe you know,
23	as approved by Joe after the fact, just so that we
24	can move this forward. The Town is ready to move
25	forward with this. I'd like to be able to put this

1	in place now.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is this is something that
3	we'd be able to vote on next week?
4	MR. PALLAS: Sure, but that gives us two days
5	to you know, I don't know whether they're going to
6	put someone in their schedule.
7	MR. PROKOP: They have to staff this. You
8	know, there's a delay built into this, so they
9	because they have to staff it. So whenever I'm
10	sure that the I'm sure it's not a 48-hour
11	turnaround for them.
12	MR. PALLAS: Yeah.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Probably come up with a
14	weekly staffing plan, or something along those lines.
15	MR. PROKOP: I'm not sure. So we just
16	unless you want to vet it more and then vote on it
17	next week, I mean, just I could let them know that
18	it's going to come up for a vote and they should
19	MR. PALLAS: They should plan staff.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't have a problem doing
21	it. I have a problem not seeing the final document
22	before we vote on it. I have said that as long
23	and I am just I'm going to start sticking my feet
24	into the ground on that one. Sorry.
25	MR. PROKOP: We could vote next week on it.

1	MR. PALLAS: I mean, yeah. I mean, if
2	that's if that's you know, if that's the
3	decision, that's fine, I'll abide by it. I'll try to
4	talk with them and explain, you know, it will likely
5	be approved, and if they could staff up anyway, that
6	we would appreciate that.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Do you think we are
8	jeopardizing our chances of getting lifeguards by
9	delaying? I mean, it's an opinion thing, but
10	MR. PALLAS: It's possible. I can't I can't
11	answer that without talking with them, and I'll talk
12	to them tomorrow.
13	MR. PROKOP: My understanding is we won't
14	jeopardize the transaction, but we may it may be
15	delayed, for whatever the delay, you know, whatever
16	the time factor is.
17	MR. PALLAS: Right, that's yeah, right. Not
18	for the whole season, but it might we might lose
19	the first weekend.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Tall Ships weekend, yeah.
21	Can we approve the old the pre-red line version
22	that we saw earlier?
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, if it's going to be
24	modified and changed, we can't do that.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, we can't do that.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, the only thing we could
2	do
3	MR. PALLAS: These changes are what the Town
4	requested, so I don't if we approve it, then
5	they'll say no.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. We could do the same
7	thing actually what the Town does when they do it.
8	They'll approve the resolution pending approval of
9	the Town Attorney.
10	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, yeah.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's really just the two
12	Attorneys working out the indemnification on it, and
13	whatever that is, the concept, and the payment, and
14	everything else, the principle, I think we're all in
15	agreement with.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I'll be prepared to
17	vote on it tonight.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: So, I mean, I understand where
19	you're coming from, Trustee Phillips, we go through
20	this a lot, I mean, and we're trying to stop that
21	from getting paperwork at 5:30, before we have a
22	meeting at 7. That's I saw that with the red
23	lines in it. I'm like, I didn't even print a copy
24	out, because it's too hard to try to read as you're
25	trying to get cleaned up and get to a meeting.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, yeah, because my
2	business
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, I don't want to
4	jeopardize losing graduation weekend of not having
5	lifeguards down there.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Great, yeah.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: So I'll offer a resolution to
8	approve the IMA with Southold Town for lifeguards,
9	pending final approval of the Town and Village
10	Attorney.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll second it.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Second.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Motion and second.
14	All in favor?
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.
19	Opposed?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll vote aye, but I'm
21	making the comment that I wish in the future that
22	this type of legal stuff is presented in a final form
23	before we get to work sessions.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, I mean, I totally agree.
25	I mean, there was eight different emails back and

1	forth with it, and I started reading them, and I
2	waited for the final version, but, again, like that
3	was late today.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Like I said
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you for voting on that.
6	We need to have a lifeguard down there and it's
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm not disputing that.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: And he's supposed to start next
9	weekend. I don't want to hold it up.
10	MR. PROKOP: Someone probably said that at the
11	Town meeting last week, too, when they voted on it.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
13	MR. PROKOP: And you've raised that objection
14	to me before, and I certainly recognize it and I
15	agree.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Now I'm raising it to the
18	total management team. I'm raising it that I'm just
19	going to start sticking my feet in the ground
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yup, okay.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: because I've asked for it
22	for the last seven years and it just kind of like
23	(gesturing with hand over her head). So I'm just
24	I'm putting my foot down now. Sorry, guys.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: No problem. Okay. Anything

1	else for
2	MR. PALLAS: The only thing I have that's on
3	her report is the two wetlands permits that are going
4	to be the hearing next week, I did send those out
5	today; there's conditions. The only reason I'm
6	bringing it up now is I just want to make sure that
7	the Board understands that what the CAC is requesting
8	is that the conditions that are listed become part of
9	the resolution ultimately, assuming you agree with
10	them, that it becomes part of the resolution.
11	You know, the CAC worked very hard on both of
12	these, and I commend the group on that, because there
13	was a lot of a lot of good dialogue on both of
14	these wetlands applications from the CAC and a lot of
15	important issues were raised, and I would hate to
16	lose the concepts that we put forth in that.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Joe, is it all right for me
18	to ask a question about some of the CAC's
19	recommendations
20	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: or I have to wait for the
22	public hearing?
23	MR. PROKOP: No, now's a good time to do it.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. On the Widow's Hole
25	Preserve, I see that they've requested that some of

1	the historic significance of the site still be left
2	in place, and one of them is the remnants of the
3	ExxonMobil facility and the Battleship Ohio.
4	Has the I mean, has the Peconic Land Trust been
5	made aware of this?
6	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And they have no problem
8	with this or
9	MR. PALLAS: I don't think so. They're
LO	discussing it.
L1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
L2	MR. PALLAS: They did respond, saying that
L3	they're willing to work with us to preserve as much
L4	of the history as possible. So it's really just two
L5	items, so I can't imagine ultimately that they would
16	have a problem. In discussions I had with them, one
L7	of the two items that were that are being
L8	requested to be preserved, they had absolutely no
19	problem. The other one they just had to think about
20	it and how to go about it. But the concept they were
21	in favor of, actually.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I was just curious
23	that they
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I'm assuming if CAC is
25	saying to leave them, that it passes muster with them

1	from that it's safe environmentally to leave
2	there.
3	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. It's just, yeah as far
4	as yes, yes.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
6	CLERK PIRILLO: Any additional questions or
7	topics?
8	(No Response)
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
11	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you very much.
13	Okay. One question for you, Joe. Is your talk
14	going to be long or short? We have Gail Horton is
15	here to make a presentation to us on the Carousel
16	running boards, and instead of keeping her here real
17	long
18	MR. PROKOP: She can go before me.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All right. At this
20	time, I'd like ask Gail, would like to come up and
21	just give us your report? You can come up to the
22	I don't believe that's turned on.
23	MS. HORTON: Okay.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: I received an email about this
25	this afternoon that Gail was coming tonight. So

1	instead of her waiting until we get done
2	MS. HORTON: Thank you.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: whenever, we're going to let
4	her do that and get back home.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They have a copy of your
6	MS. HORTON: Hm?
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They have a copy of your
8	report.
9	MS. HORTON: With the names?
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. You want that?
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
12	MS. HORTON: Hi.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: A report on the rounding boards
14	from the Carousel, the RFP we had, so Gail will fill
15	us in on it.
16	MS. HORTON: Okay. Well, I'm not going to give
17	you the dates, if you don't mind. You have the dates
18	of the meetings. But we first had we had 13
19	applications. We would RFPs. I wish we had more;
20	we were hoping. We worked very hard. I mean, we
21	spent days sending out letters and things like that,
22	but we had 13 respondents excuse me
23	respondents.
24	And before the committee itself got the RFPs to
25	go through, we invited two artists to go through them

1	Thirtially and kind of pick out the ones they thought
2	most would work together and fill in the requirements
3	of the rounding boards as we sent them out. So we
4	I was there. We spent the morning doing that, and
5	they came out with, I believe it was seven, seven
6	artists. And so then the committee met. Doug was
7	there, right? Yes. And they went through the final
8	the final seven and picked out four people, and we
9	also oh, excuse me. And we also had two
LO	longstanding, pretty well respected artists, John and
l1	Nancy Weissman from Southold assist be there to
L2	work with us, and they picked out four people. The
L3	names aren't in here. And they are
L4	Julie Goldman, who is both Brooklyn and out here,
L5	Enid Haffan (phonetic), who is New London and out
L6	here, Barbara Maslin (phonetic), and she is from
L7	Riverhead, and Cindy Pease Rowe who is Greenport. So
L8	that is the four they picked out, and they're the
L9	ones that we are recommending to the Board be
20	approved so they could have contracts and move the
21	work along.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
23	MS. HORTON: Any questions?
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: I didn't have any questions.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I want to thank you all for

T	the work, and that was a long project. And I just
2	want the Board to know that I had sort of on your
3	behalf grilled the committee to make sure that the
4	process was solid and fair, and I feel confident
5	after talking with them that it was a fair process,
6	and they made a choice that they felt was best, both
7	artistically and for the Village, so thank you.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you very much for
9	your time, Gail, and we'll put that on as a
10	resolution to approve that on next Thursday.
11	MS. HORTON: Okay. And then I, of course, have
12	to say something else.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're here, you got the
14	floor.
15	MS. HORTON: I got it, thank you. I don't know
16	whether you got your invitation yet from Greenport
17	School, but the 375th you got it?
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Tuesday, right?
20	MS. HORTON: Yeah, Tuesday. It's really I
21	mean, it's amazing what these kids have done to their
22	digital story-telling. And I would run into them,
23	and there was the Fifth Grade all the time on the
24	street. They did several field trips to gather their
25	information for their reports, and they're very

1	excited about it. And the teacher that I spoke to,
2	Stephanie Pollock (phonetic), said that they liked
3	the digital story-telling so much that they're going
4	to use it next year with the Fifth Grade curriculum.
5	So I hope some or all of you can show up to see their
6	work, and thank you.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you, Gail.
9	MS. HORTON: Bye-bye. Have a good night.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: You, too. You can go home and
11	relax now.
12	MS. HORTON: Okay.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not done yet.
14	MS. HORTON: I'm going to go see Criminal
15	Minds.
16	(Laughter)
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll go sorry.
18	Thank you for pausing for a moment, Joe.
19	MR. PROKOP: No, that's all right. Thank you.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: And we'll go to the Village
21	Attorney report now.
22	MR. PROKOP: Okay. So I have a list of about
23	ten things that I wanted to cover, and almost every
24	one has been already covered, so I'll go quick, if
25	that's okay with everyone.

There's a number of the -- a number of the difficult situations that I'm working on in Supreme Court, also Code Enforcement. I've had positive progress, one of which is Meson Ole. We're hopeful of -- there's been a sort of turn in the bend there, and hoping it could be resolved quickly.

I wanted to mention, it came up in the -- it was going to come up in my report, but it came up in the Tall Ships Committee report, and I -- a lot of these logistical things, which you're attributing to the Tall Ships Committee, are being handled. I know and speaking only for myself, are being handled as part of my normal job.

So this -- just only as an example, the street closure, and parking, and things like that, those are the things that people have been asking me now for one or two months, and I've been, you know, giving support on.

One thing which came up tonight, which I, you know, would say I have a concern about is you should probably clear -- hearing what's happening, you should probably decide on clearing an emergency lane somewhere. I guess that's probably been figured out, some, you know, emergency access if you're going to be closing the main road, but I guess that's been

figured out.

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We did complete the lease with Clinton, the Clinton Memorial Church, that seems to have been going well. The people that I work with there were happy to accommodate the Village, and I know we were fortunate on our end.

We did complete the lifeguard IMA. And, again, I'm sorry, the language wasn't finalized for tonight, but it's something that was in a fluid situation, just coming to an end now.

With regard to Code Enforcement, I haven't reviewed a list for this month, so I can just -- I apologize, but I'm familiar with all the cases, if you have any particular questions. The general process is -- you know, I just want to respond to some things that I heard discussed. The general process is that people will -- unless it's an emergency or, you know, a safety issue, and we have dealt with safety issues immediately, the general -the general processes that somebody will receive one or two visits, or, you know, written paperwork, and then that if it's not -- if whatever the situation is, it's not dealt with, a violation will be issued, and the next step will be that they'll see me in court.

Ed Ward -- I get the calendar e-mailed to me by the court, which I greatly appreciate, it's a big help, because then all I can do -- all I have to do is turn it around. And I forward it -- when I get it, I forward it to Paul, Eileen, and Ed Ward, and we can get set up for the court date.

We're in court basically every week now with some -- with many -- several cases. We've made a lot of progress in several very difficult situations that have been longstanding problems in the Village, and, you know, combination social problem, violation problem, and everything you could imagine wrapped up in some of these -- some of these issues. But with Ed's patience and diligence, we've been able to -- and he has a certain likability about him that is helpful. He's very diligent with his approach, but he also has a good nature to him and -- as compared to me. And when we work together with these people, it seems to be going well as far as how the process has been run.

The court, as far as enforcement, you know, I just want to mention again, the end process now for a lot of -- a violation ticket on a Building Code violation will only result in the violation being removed, or a trial, or a guilty plea with a fine.

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It's not going to result in an administrative default or judgment. So if somebody has a problem on their property and they get a ticket for that, the only resolution will be some kind of judicial resolution with either a guilty plea or the Judge telling them that they -- or they have to do something. That's as compared to other types of violations that we write, which are open alcohol violations, parking, things like that that are single events that are no longer taking place, so we don't have to worry about compliance. With those situations, what we're able to work out with the court now is that if there's -if there's nonappearance or not cooperation, they do eventually end up in a judgment, a civil judgment. And there's been many of these that have been processed now and, you know, we expect down the line to be recovering the fine money that's due on those.

And I think that that's -- as far as code enforcement, you know, I can answer questions. I think that that's what I wanted to bring to your attention. Paul's managing the process and -- Mr. Pallas, and, you know, these are the parts of it basically that go together.

Ed seems to work really well independently. He has the experience now where he can basically, you

1	know, leave the office on his own and deal with some
2	of these situations, and that seems to have been
3	working a lot better more recently.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
5	MR. PROKOP: Any questions about anything,
6	anything else going on?
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Actually, Joe, I have a
8	question. At one point, we had a Legal Assistant
9	here that helped you with the kind of day-to-day
10	legalese issues that go on. Are you planning on
11	replacing her at some point?
12	MR. PROKOP: Yes. We are actively looking now.
13	Actually Shauna Segelke was working here. She got a
14	job in a in Nassau County that she wanted to take,
15	which was a good opportunity for her. She took it,
16	and we're looking now to replace her. The only
17	the time factor has been the transition through the
18	academic year, and now that that's behind us, we
19	expect to be able to get somebody in.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, because you do have
21	that line and it's in your budget, so that I'm
22	just curious, because I think it was a great help on
23	getting some answers for the staff, as well as for
24	the Trustees, and as well as helping you get some of
25	the paperwork moving along.

1	MR. PROKOP: Right. Thank you for reminding
2	me. She was especially helpful with contracts and
3	agreements, and we'll try to get somebody in as soon
4	as we can.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Thank you.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for Joe?
7	MR. PALLAS: Joe, maybe I forgot. North Ferry
8	agreement, was I supposed to talk about that, or were
9	you going to bring that up?
10	MR. PROKOP: No, I forgot. I so we have the
11	North Ferry we have a proposed North Ferry
12	agreement. The language, as far as I'm concerned, is
13	in its final is, you know, subject to a response
14	from the Trustees. More or less, the Attorneys are
15	okay with it.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe we talked about that
17	last week and everybody was comfortable with what we
18	had there.
19	MR. PROKOP: Yeah. So, as far as I'm
20	concerned, it should be a resolution.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It should be on the agenda?
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, yeah.
23	MR. PROKOP: It has the mutual termination.
24	The consideration was increased. It's not the
25	consideration that was in the contract that we had

1	for consideration last month. And so the payment was
2	increased, and also the termination provision was
3	made mutual. So we have we basically have the
4	same right now that the North Ferry does.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And do you have anything
6	that you're going to put into Executive Session, or no?
7	MR. PROKOP: Well, if you have an Executive
8	Session, yes. If you don't, then I don't have
9	anything.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Paul asked for it.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Paul asked for it.
12	MR. PROKOP: It might be one or two litigation
13	items.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Employee.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: One or two litigation items?
16	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the public will be able to
18	review North Ferry contract before next week? It's
19	going into the we're going to vote on it?
20	MR. PROKOP: As far as I'm concerned, yes.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, okay.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, if it's going on the
24	resolutions for the regular meeting, it would be
25	attached to the package.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: To this one, right?
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To the regular meeting.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Regular meeting.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We still have to time,
5	though, to get it in, is my question.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, yeah.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for Joe?
8	MR. PROKOP: Oh, we have I'm sorry. I want
9	to mention the three Local Laws. We have three Local
10	Laws coming up. I apologize. We have three Local
11	Laws coming up. There's filming, idling, and no
12	driving on the beach.
13	So filming is we the Code Committee spent a
14	lot of time coming up with a filming Local filming
15	regulations, and then we had the turnover in the Code
16	Committee, so we basically redid a lot of it to
17	with some really great help from the new people on
18	the Code Committee, the new members of the Code
19	Committee. And, in the meantime, we also came up
20	with the purpose of it is not to regulate the heck
21	out of filming, it's to basically work enable the
22	Village to have a structure to work with people that
23	would like to do films here, and all types of films.
24	There's different regulations for student films and
25	commercial films.

1	The idling Local Law, what it does is addresses
2	idling of basically any car that's not a personal
3	vehicle can't cannot idle for more than five I
4	think it's five minutes, is what we have, on a public
5	street.
6	And then, finally, we have a proposal for no
7	driving on the beach, another Local Law for that.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just to clarify that,
9	the two, the filming and the idling, we're in the
10	final stages of that. We're having a public hearing
11	next Thursday, and we're going to try to vote those
12	on. I think we're just having the public hearing on
13	driving on the beach.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Correct, yeah.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right, there's no it's just
16	a code change.
17	MR. PROKOP: Right.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right? But just so everybody
19	knows, we plan on voting on those for next Thursday.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All three? Don't we have
21	to
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: The code change is just no
23	driving on the beach. That's just a code change.
24	After the public hearing, we can vote on that one.
25	MR. PROKOP: Yes.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. But just that
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We are going to have a public
3	hearing?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: Public hearing on all three of
5	them, yes.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Before we vote on it. That was
8	going to be part of my report from the Code
9	Committee, which was next.
10	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, that's all right.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine.
14	MR. PROKOP: Pretty soon, we won't have anymore
15	reports.
16	(Laughter)
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's it, we're going to
18	shorten them all up, combine them. All right. Thank
19	you, Joe.
20	MR. PROKOP: Okay. Thanks.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. From the Code Committee
22	that went back and forth, and everything else,
23	that's
24	MR. PROKOP: Oh, I'm sorry. The most important
25	thing I forgot. Tonight is Lucia's 29th birthday,

1	and I wanted to thank her for all of her hard work.
2	MS. BRAATEN: Thank you.
3	MR. PROKOP: Our reporter, our stenographer.
4	And, you know, we come and go with vacations. My
5	schedule is off, so I'm here a few minutes late for a
6	couple of meetings, but the one thing that we can
7	always count on is that Lucia will be here, and
8	that's you know, from my standpoint, I really
9	appreciate her dedication, her dedication and
10	excellence in her work.
11	MS. BRAATEN: Thank you.
12	MR. PROKOP: The good news is she takes down
13	everything that I say. The bad news is that she
14	takes down everything I say.
15	(Laughter)
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: She's got you both ways.
17	MR. PROKOP: Yeah. Congratulations.
18	MS. BRAATEN: You said I was younger than I
19	was, though. Thank you.
20	MR. PROKOP: Happy birthday.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Happy birthday. Thank you from
22	all of us.
23	Okay. Code Committee, those two things were
24	finalized. Hopefully, they're done after we vote on
25	them next week, so we can move on to important

1	things.
2	The discussion on the Airbnb, we've had a lot
3	of talk about that. Joe is going to be working on
4	putting something together in writing for next
5	month's meeting to try to narrow down the scope of
6	where we're trying to go. I know the Town had their
7	public hearing. They thought they were moving
8	forward and they kind of tabled everything for more
9	information. It's a really touchy topic, and I
10	think, you know, the more input we can get, the
11	better. But we're making progress on that and the
12	other two are done. Was there anything else from
13	Code Committee?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, that was pretty much it
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: I think that covered it.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Airbnb discussion was
17	the one that we came out with
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: asking Joe to put
20	something together for some type of like
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's going to need a
22	different our rental code is not going to be the
23	same. It won't work for the short-term rentals. So
24	looking at making that a completely in the same
25	chapter, but a different paragraph or different

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section of the code to deal just with the short-term rentals, because what we have now will not apply to that. So that's where we're going with that.

On Audit Committee, we talked about the yearly -- going out for yearly bids on a bunch of different topics. I know Robert was going to work on that. He's, you know, not here now. I don't know how far he got with that list, but, hopefully, we'll have that list together for us to vote on next month to try to get that going, because before we start doing the yearly bids, the year's going to be over. That's what happened last year. We talked about, talked about it. All of a sudden it was October, and said we'll wait until next April. So we need to get the list of what we're going to do, so we can submit that to all the Board Members, and we know exactly what we're going to got out to bid and what that pertains to.

There were some new suggestions from Trustee Roberts of different stuff that we could go out for. So we just need to see the finalized list, so before we vote on it and go out to do it, we know everything is included that we're looking for.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. And the Electric audit will be coming for the Electric Department.

1	The yearly audit will be in July,, I believe they're
2	coming. Is that right, Stephen?
3	MR. GAFFGA: I'm sorry?
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: The Electric audit, the dates?
5	MR. GAFFGA: Yes, they're coming in July.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then I believe they
7	tried to combine the yearly audit of the Village
8	totally, but still at the same date, which I believe
9	is September, Stephen?
LO	MR. GAFFGA: Yes.
L1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then we did discuss the
L2	payments for the TCCs that isn't I believe this
L3	October we will be completed with all of the upfront
L4	and catchup, and we will I believe the last audit
L 5	that we did was the six-month true-up that we needed
L6	to do with the agreement that we had with NYPA for
L7	the that Mayor Nyce, Ex-Mayor Nyce did for the TCC
L8	payments, and the other job that went along with
L9	the
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. But they said we did
21	the six-month audit, we don't have to do the
22	six-month audit anymore.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. We don't have to do
24	more, right.
) 5	MAYOR HURRARD: And we're moving forward with

1	that. The TCCs, everything will be paid up.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, October of this year.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: And then they'll stabilize the
4	rates over the next several years, and that will be
5	the double payments.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
7	MR. GAFFGA: And after October, the TDA charge
8	should go down for
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
10	MR. GAFFGA: Slightly for all the utility bills
11	going forward.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Was there anything else from
14	Audit?
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's pretty much it. But
16	that's a nice thing to hear, that we're almost
17	through that whole drama.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And we'll be getting better
20	ideas and that our electric bills are going to be
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's all we have under
23	committees. Discussion: I don't think we had
24	anything else we needed to discuss.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the only thing I did

is I sent around an email earlier today and actually this morning that I think at some point either -- and it's not going to happen at this work session, but I think at the next work session we need to discuss the Board policy as far as how the overall minute-taking is done within the Village.

In 2007, there was a Board policy that every minute within all the statutory Boards was done verbatim. In looking with the Village Clerk, and just keeping -- looking at the costs and the time lags that have been coming from trying to get the minutes up, I think we need to kind of discuss do we want to continue doing the verbatim minutes for the work session, and the regular meeting, and the Planning Board, the Zoning Board and the ZBA, and Historic, or do we want to take a different route? I had put some suggestions for discussion. Do we need to go out for a new RFP? Do we need to put more money into the budget, if that's the way this Board feels the policy should go?

There's been some frustration from not only the management, but from the public, of not being able to get the minutes within the 14-day time period, although everybody's been trying hard. The length of our minutes, our meetings have gotten longer.

1	Planning Board meetings I know have gotten extremely
2	long, and there's sometimes humanly possible, just
3	you can't get it all done.
4	So I would like to have that discussion at the
5	next work session, so that we can make some formal
6	decision with the Village Clerk, so that we as a
7	Village Board are not putting her in a position of
8	not being able to follow the law that's for minutes.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? That's what I'd like
11	to do.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. She's got a copy just to
13	show you here. That's our work session minutes from
14	last month.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, I know.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, it's a huge project
17	they're undertaking.
18	CLERK PIRILLO: May I join you?
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, go ahead.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. I was promised by
22	Lucia, as a matter of fact, that we would have the
23	work session meeting minutes tomorrow, and they were
24	not provided tomorrow, they were provided today. I
25	have this original and two other copies. This one is

1 313 -- I'm sorry, 316 pages.

The delay was partly attributed to the fact that we haven't had meetings of this length previously, so it took a little bit of work.

Actually, it takes a lot of work. It's not just the transcription, it's also reviewing the transcription for accuracy.

Thus far, I personally have been very pleased with the accuracy of the minutes, which having been only the Fire Department secretary for seven years, nothing like verbatim, I understand that you can't just produce the minutes, you then have to review them for accuracy.

That having been said, we all understand the sensitivity of the 14-day timing. In order to accomplish that, Diane Flynn, who is the owner of Flynn Stenography and Transcription Service, kindly has dedicated Lucia to only our Village Board work session and regular meetings, so that other transcriptionists will be available for our HPC, Planning and Zoning meetings. This should help Lucia, and when -- so that she's not, let's call it, bogged down with those meetings, okay, and we can continue to provide these in a timely manner, okay?

Also, it was brought to my attention by

Attorney Prokop, who will explain this better than I, that there is a -- there is the availability to bill differently the transcription reports, once we receive them, especially having to do with the Zoning and Planning Boards. So that will help alleviate some of the cost, some of the additional cost involved.

But I wanted to thank Flynn Stenography, because up to now, they've done an excellent job of providing the minutes and providing them very accurately, with an index in the back to make them nicely searchable. And I appreciate the fact, as Joe said earlier, that the ladies that work for the company are always timely, regardless of the weather, even though they live an hour-and-a-half away, and I'm very sensitive to that fact, having been a commuter.

All that having been said, if the Board feels it's appropriate to revisit and go out to RFP, the only thing I would ask is that you could let me know in advance what the ramifications would be of not meeting the 14-day deadline, so that this way we could publish it right in the RFP. I would appreciate that so that everyone's on a level playing field.

MR. PROKOP: So what was -- I'm not sure about the RFP requirement. I can review that, if you'd like to involve me. But the -- what was anticipated was when Glynis was hired, it was expected that -- it was expected that her time would be rebilled to the applicant -- applicants basically, because under the law, you're -- when somebody comes before a Board that they're seeking relief from, so in this case it's the Planning, Zoning and Historic Committee, you're allowed to charge -- the Village is allowed to charge or rebill for costs that it has, stenography and also consulting and professional costs.

So when Glynis was retained and we got that concept for the first time to do that, it was anticipated that we would piggyback that rebilling with the stenographer rebilling. Now what we've started doing -- I started doing for -- with stenography billing is to basically -- there's a way to break it down so it's fair to the applicant and also to the Village. And I'll work with the -- with the management and show them, you know, what a proposal is to do that. It's actually fairly easy to do, and it does pick up 100% of the charges. So that would reduce our stenographer charges significantly every month by doing that.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. As I said, we're
2	responsible to make sure that everything is in place
3	so that we do not put the Village Clerk or the
4	management staff in a compromising position. That is
5	the policy-setting of this Board and that's why I'm
6	bringing it up. I appreciate the accolades that are
7	given to the transcriptionist company and that's not
8	my intent for bringing this up, okay?
9	CLERK PIRILLO: I understand that. I
10	appreciate your intent.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My intent is to have us as a
12	Board decide how important the cost for this is, as
13	well as how important the history is created by these
14	minutes. So that, as I said, the costs are going
15	higher, the meetings notes are getting thicker. And
16	I think it's just we, as a Board, need to make sure
17	that our staff are have the capabilities of
18	performing what needs to get done legally. So that's
19	why I brought it up.
20	MR. PROKOP: You know, the problem is
21	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
22	MR. PROKOP: we have to have an historic
23	all these things that happen in the Village now have
24	gotten really complicated, and the law, the law on
25	minutes is basically that you're required to record

1	votes, but the vote is almost useless now, it's
2	really the end of a complicated discussion. And we
3	need to be able to go back and look at the and
4	everything we do from this Board, from this Board to
5	the Historic Board, we need to be able to go back.
6	Our successors need to be able to go back and see
7	exactly what we did, what was discussed, because it's
8	the only we had a really complicated discussion
9	with the Planning Board. The fact that they had done
10	this years ago was very helpful.
11	I don't want to go on. I'm sorry, I apologize
12	to be so verbose, but
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Are there other are there
14	other solutions potentially out there using
15	combination of audio, or text-to-voice, or
16	voice-to-text?
17	CLERK PIRILLO: Sure there are, but it's a
18	Board decision if it depends on whether the Board
19	decides to have verbatim minutes.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So my question is, because I
21	don't know, is there some service out there that
22	would pass muster for municipal government that is a
23	voice-to-text, so that maybe Planning we could have
24	an automated process that might not be as accurate as
25	Lucia? I hate to do this on her birthday, but, you

1	know, I don't know. So my question is could you
2	could somebody research and find out are there other
3	options that are either, A, less expensive, or, B,
4	faster, so that it's automatic, we're posting a
5	recording, we're posting a recording a document
6	that's automatically created off a recording?
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Those are some of the things
8	that you and I looked at a couple of years ago when
9	we did the RFP. We have one thing dealing with this
10	and it's called an Article 78, and Joe will tell you
11	that I lived through two of them, being the Zoning
12	Board Chair. And having the written word, because I
13	asked for two Court I asked for Court Stenog
14	transcriptions.
15	(Laughter)
16	It's been a long day, folks, since three
17	o'clock. To do those minutes, because we weren't
18	doing them in the past. And to protect the Village
19	from Article 78s, to have that data is extremely
20	important for the Legal Department, as well as for
21	everyone else here. So that's the recording part
22	is a little you know, is one of those that can be
23	touchy if the equipment fails.
24	So I just at this point
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It needs to be looked into,
2	but
3	CLERK PIRILLO: The other thing is yeah, a
4	good point. The other thing is you had you said
5	something just now, but you could probably tell me,
6	you said something just now to the effect of
7	something less accurate or efficient than Lucia, but
8	then you're sacrificing the original purpose of
9	having the verbatim transcription.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right. So I'm saying the
11	verbatim would be an audio recording that we post,
12	and then we so we would just for Village Board
13	meetings maybe have the real deal.
14	CLERK PIRILLO: How does that hold up in court,
15	Joe? If you need Planning or Zoning, if you need to
16	go to court for something Planning, or Zoning, or HPC
17	related, could you could an audio recording take
18	the place of something written?
19	MR. PROKOP: No, it would have to become
20	transcribed.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: It would have to become
22	transcribed.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Really?
24	MR. PROKOP: Yeah. The problem is that
25	CLERK PIRILLO: Yup.

1	MR. PROKOP: The problem is that what the
2	people that do our meetings now are trained to all of
3	our voices and they know who's speaking, and the
4	public, too, you know, the public. So they
5	whatever she does, and I'll never understand this,
6	but her somehow, any most of the people in this
7	room now, when they speak, her fingers know who,
8	exactly who they are. And if you go
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the recording you can't, I
10	see. All right.
11	MR. PROKOP: In a good way I'm saying that.
12	(Laugher)
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the light bulb just
14	went on.
15	CLERK PIRILLO: You got that, right?
16	MS. BRAATEN: I did.
17	MR. PROKOP: That's not picked up.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But anyway
19	MR. PROKOP: That's not picked up. And I can
20	tell you that I left a meeting six months ago from a
21	Village ZBA meeting that did summary minutes, and by
22	the time I got made a right turn to get on the
23	road to drive home, I was fighting with somebody at
24	the meeting hysterically over what was said and
25	oh, no, somebody that wasn't at the meeting screaming

1	at me about what was said. And I just said, "That's
2	it, we're doing verbatim minutes from now on,"
3	because you can't and right now, Dennis, or Doug,
4	or one of the Chairpeople can before a meeting can
5	go to Eileen's office or Sylvia's office and say, you
6	know, "What happened?" You know, "There was an
7	application on this property 10, five years ago or 10
8	years ago, can I see the transcript to see what
9	happened," and right away it comes out. You know,
10	otherwise, they'll say, "Can I hear the recording,"
11	and then, you know, it's just not the same.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Anyway, that's what I was
13	requesting, that we look into it and
14	MR. PROKOP: But we should.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And you and I can continue
16	on that.
17	CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah, we'll revisit it.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll look at it. You know,
19	technology changes and everything else. See whatever
20	is available and we'll go from there.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: Will do.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
23	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. Thank you for the
24	opportunity.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Any other

1	discussion?
2	(No Response)
3	All right. We'll go to Report of Trustees.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: They're pictures of parking
6	in our Village.
7	MR. PROKOP: I'm not in any of these pictures,
8	right?
9	(Laughter)
LO	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: License plates have been
L1	Jack. So any of us who have tried to go to the IGA
L2	since Memorial Day, or pick up a prescription or
L3	something, we all know the problem, that it's I
L4	don't know. I guess I've proven in the three months
L5	on this job that I'm willing to start talking about
L6	issues that are going to get me yelled at by people,
L7	and I know that parking is going to get all of us
L8	yelled at and no one's ever going to be happy. But I
L9	also know that we've got a problem around here,
20	because we don't we don't enforce our parking
21	rules, our parking codes.
22	And so Jack and I have been sort of poring over
23	this. I took these pictures around the Village. All
24	these scenes you recognize of what I would describe
25	as sort of a free-for-all of parking, particularly

the Railroad Dock. That's where a lot of the -those scenes are from the Railroad Dock, the circle
by Little Creek and the Marina office. I mean, when
there's the Peconic Star boat loading on or off that
Railroad Dock, it's just cars everywhere. And so you
can't get a wheelchair by, you can't get a stroller
by sometimes. God forbid we need to get an ambulance
down there. So there are safety reasons. We all
know this stuff, so I'm not going to bore you with
all that.

Jack and I reviewed the parking study that the Board had commissioned in 2009 and it gives very clear recommendations. It says location strategies -- sorry. Basically what it's saying is that you want to -- you want to promote shared use of parking resources when you get to, quote, unquote, 85% capacity, which on a summer weekend, and I haven't done the scientific study, but I would tell you, it feels very much like 85% or more.

So I just am proposing to you all that we follow the recommendations from this study that the previous two Boards ago had commissioned and we enforce the rules that we got. We can chalk some tires, we can start giving out tickets. I know that the folks at the IGA would be very happy if we did

that, because people come and park in that lot all day.

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I mean, we could go on and on. I think we all agree on this. I think it's probably a question of how, so -- and we can talk about the more long-term stuff down the road, but I do want to point out just some back-of-the-envelope math.

If we were to invest in a -- if we were to pick a couple of lots, say the Jitney, Railroad, Ferry lot. which, by the way, right now is all -- mostly, what I can tell, people who come and park and go to Shelter Island for a few days and then come back and leave their cars. If we can put some sort of -- one of those machines in there where you go and you buy a ticket and you put it in your dash, and you pay for however many days, and then have a Parking Enforcement Officer go around the dashboard and see who's paid and who's not, this could be -- with a conservative estimate, there are 100 spots in the Railroad Dock, a little bit more, 100 spots on the Adams Street dock lot, which is really close to Claudio's, who, of course, charges \$20 a day. If we were to get \$20 a day from those spots, and we could have several people cycling through and parking, to park long-term, at the bear minimum, 10 weeks of the

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summer, two days a week for two-day weekends, 100 spots times 20, you get to \$40,000 in revenue pretty easily. And I did some math or we did some math here in this report showing that if we paid -- if we pay \$20 an hour for a Parking Enforcement Officer, sort of a guess, but we kind of talked and these numbers probably work out, if we give 744 tickets over the course of just a summer, and we could potentially put a code or put -- we could potentially put these parking restrictions in place just for the summer, and then in the winter make it back to the free-for-all, if that's what we want to do. tickets a week at a \$20 an hour Code Enforcement Officer -- sorry, 744 a summer gets us to break even. And so that just doesn't -- doesn't feel like a lot of tickets to me.

Fifty tickets per week, Memorial Day to Maritime weekend, 50 tickets, and that's obviously assuming they all get a successful plea in court, but -- so maybe put it at 60 tickets a week, and we're at least breaking even. And this is not as much about chalking the tires, it's not as much about revenue, but it's about -- I hear people's pain when they want to go to park in those 30-minute lots at the IGA, when disabled people want to be able to park

1	and go pick up something at the pharmacy, when
2	merchants say, "I can't get people to park in front
3	of my store."
4	I feel like this is an easy solution. Maybe
5	I'm being a naive new Trustee, but it feels to me
6	like if we commit to this, we get and I know,
7	George, you've talked with Southold Town P.D. about
8	working with them. If we can get their Parking
9	Officer to report to you and work under your
10	direction, at least in a sort of dotted-line way, you
11	know, obviously reporting to the Chief, but, you
12	know, taking sort of day-to-day direction from you, I
13	think we'd do a great thing for our Village.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Another thing I'd liked to
15	point out also, when you said shared-use parking,
16	that means that there's a turnover at the parking
17	spots. I believe it was what would you say, it
18	was two hours?
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We have two-hour code, yes.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Two-hour code. So we're
21	looking for most of us that live within the
22	Village, you know, it does not take me two hours to
23	shop for groceries at the IGA, it doesn't. You know,
24	I come in, I get what I need to do and I leave. And
25	I think that when we're looking at enforcing the

shared-use parking, we're looking at people that have come out for the day.

And, really, the parking study does a great job in dividing up our parking into two distinct areas.

One, I think it was on-street and the other off-street, on-street being down -- essentially the Business District, down Main Street, down Front Street and the side roads associated.

And one of the -- one of the things that this might solve is instead of having everybody who comes into town circling like sharks, hoping that they can park within, you know, 38 feet of Mitchell Park, perhaps this would then move them from that area, because they're all getting tickets, to the off-street parking, which might be the Railroad Dock, Adams Street lot. There was a couple of others. Yeah, essentially that.

But we're looking at -- the parking study said there was just shy of 400 spaces available for parking off-site, you know, off the main drag, and it's not that far away. But I think by having somebody enforcing this shared use, you pull in, and then you leave, or you receive a ticket, I think that that would provide the impetus for people to then park in these -- in these larger lots that are --

1	that are a little bit out of hardly far from the
2	downtown. But I think that that would make it easier
3	for all of us who live here year round to go to the
4	pharmacy and get what you need and then leave. My
5	two cents to think about.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. So can we do we
7	need to do we need a resolution to do this?
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, let me just ask if
9	the Chief Did Chief Flatley their work session
10	was yesterday and he was going to bring that up to
11	the Town Board, if they had the resources to supply
12	us with a TCO.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: He hasn't gotten back to me
14	about that.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
16	CLERK PIRILLO: I expect to hear from him
17	tomorrow.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, we'll have an
19	answer on that tomorrow. Joe already has the
20	Intermunicipal Agreement written up to go forward
21	with this. We just need to know whether the Town
22	they hired six new TCOs. I don't know if they had
23	the manpower and how much time they'll be able to
24	give us. And I didn't I forgot to call today to
25	find out

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: if they could supply us with
3	the manpower.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we hire one if they
5	can't?
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know what's involved in
7	training a TCO and what's involved in that. I'll ask
8	Chief Flatley the same thing.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can we go find one who's
LO	trained by someone else who's looking for work? I
L1	mean
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know. I mean
L3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: My question is does it have
L4	to be a Southold Town P.D. Officer
L5	MR. PROKOP: No.
L6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: TCO, or can it be somebody
L7	who has the appropriate certificate who we hire for
L8	weekends?
L9	MR. PROKOP: It could be somebody that has the
20	appropriate certificate, but they would be issuing
21	Village Code violations on the parking, you know,
22	overtime parking
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
24	MR. PROKOP: things like that, fire hydrant
25	parking.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And would it hold up in court
2	the same way as the Southold Town P.D.?
3	MR. PROKOP: Yes. Under our code, they just
4	have to be designated as the as one of the people
5	that are authorized to issue violations.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So the Town is the sort of
8	easiest, fastest way, but if we don't get it that
9	way, can Ed Ward do this?
10	MR. PROKOP: No. It would tie him up too much.
11	I mean, could he do it? Yes. But
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Legally, he could?
13	MR. PROKOP: Yeah.
14	MR. PALLAS: Legally, but there's no staff
15	inspector
16	MR. PROKOP: It would wipe him out. It would
17	wipe him out.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Can I do it?
19	MR. PALLAS: No way.
20	(Laughter)
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's sort of a serious
22	question. I mean, can a Trustee do it?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: I really don't know.
25	MR. PROKOP: Well, I think I think you could

1	be designated. I mean, I could look that up. I
2	could let you know.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Deputize? Okay.
4	MR. PROKOP: So I think those I think in our
5	Village, it goes by designation, but I'll let you
6	know.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Because if we're going to do
8	it, we're going to get somebody that's you know,
9	Saturday and Sunday are the key days for doing it,
10	you know.
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, sure.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: So that's what I had discussed
13	with the Chief. If we could get three days out of
14	somebody, Friday, Saturday, Sunday, you know, and see
15	if we could have that, not full-time, but at least
16	those weekend days. Because then if we had Ed doing
17	it, he'd be there on weekends, he wouldn't be there
18	on Tuesday and Wednesday dealing with the housing
19	issues, you know.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Uh-huh, yeah.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: So, I mean, let me get a
22	call we'll get a call out to Marty tomorrow and
23	find out what that is, and I'll brief the Board on
24	where we where he stands, if he could man it for
25	us. If he could man that and we could get the

1	manpower from them, then we could move forward with
2	the IMA that Joe already has written up.
3	MR. PROKOP: So a TCO is not going to generate
4	740 tickets. I think the last time we had a TCO was
5	about 100 tickets.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's correct.
7	MR. PROKOP: Pardon me?
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was correct, it was
9	only 100 tickets.
10	MR. PROKOP: Yeah. And to get see, the
11	thing is like if you if you and I walk by IGA, you
12	know, a couple times, you know, walk with a family by
13	a couple of times, we'll say to ourselves, "Wow, that
14	green" "that green car has been there a couple of
15	hour, you know, this is ridiculous." But the thing
16	is in order to make that one impression, that one
17	car, that's one ticket. But even to write that one
18	ticket to that one car, you have to have the legal
19	you know, certain things that you can allege legally.
20	And you're talking about doing that 740 times, which
21	means really 1,000 times, you know, to get out 740
22	tickets.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Out of curiosity, what's
24	required legally to write a parking ticket? I'm
25	just being serious.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I don't follow this.
2	MR. PROKOP: Yeah, there's an allocution, you
3	know, "I went by" you have to have a note. You
4	have to be taking notes, "I went by at 10:20 and I
5	saw the car parked in space number 6," or wherever,
6	you know, this space.
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
8	MR. PROKOP: Because that's the other thing,
9	some people move cars around, you know, so you have
10	to
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Chalk the tire.
12	MR. PROKOP: Chalk the tire, right.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, I'm just yeah, I
14	was just curious.
15	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It takes a second.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I always knew
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. I mean, I've been
18	nailed so many times.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I didn't know I didn't
20	there was a lot to it. That's me.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So let me let me play the
22	devil's advocate?
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? Adams Street parking
25	lot, fair amount of employees in the summertime.

1	Adams Street, what is it, two-hour parking in Adams
2	Street? Is that what the limit is?
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't believe that's no.
4	It's only on the Main Street. Adams Street is not
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, that's all day.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's an off-street
7	parking.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Main Street or behind the
9	stores, off the behind the stores, behind Arcade
10	and I think the
11	MR. SALADINO: It's 30 minutes.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's 30 minutes, correct?
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: No.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What was it, two hours
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Only the Arcade side of the
17	street, but the center aisles are all day.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. Only on Front and Main is
19	the two-hour parking. Adams Street all the way, I
20	believe, is open. That's where they're supposed to
21	park.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's off-street parking, and
23	that would be the goal, to move them there.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So that's seven, seven

1	spots there.
2	MS. ALLEN: The two-hour is on Main.
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah. The two-hour would
4	be the on-street parking. Front Street, Main Street,
5	Third Street, South; Third, South Street, and, you
6	know, at least according to the thing.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, I participated
8	in that, so that's
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, I'm sure. No. I just
10	had something from
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But a lot of the issues,
12	after we had the public hearing about the parking
13	meters and then all the comments came from a lot of
14	the merchants, and I'm talking about the merchants,
15	is that why would they want to push a customer out in
16	two hours or 30 minutes because they wanted to say in
17	the store to in the restaurants to eat? I'm just
18	playing devil's advocate here, okay? So is that
19	something that is going to be accomplished by pushing
20	the people out of those parking spots? I mean, you
21	know, what do the restaurant people all feel about
22	that?
23	Part of the problem is, and let's be honest,
24	Claudio's for years has taken the initiative to
25	protect their business by putting their property,

T	some of their property as parking, okay? That has
2	caused an overflow into our side streets, because
3	their employees are also going out into our side
4	streets. We have to be honest, okay?
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, you know, employees in
7	the summertime increase around here, so where are we
8	going to put them all?
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, I would say the
10	off-street parking would be
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: All the parking lots are full
12	every Saturday and Sunday, people parking everywhere.
13	I think a lot of what we need to do, which is more of
14	the safety issue, is this past Saturday there was a
15	bus in the turning lane on Third Street, parked there
16	running for hours.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: They were just sitting there.
19	You couldn't you couldn't get out. You go by,
20	going onto South Street from Main Street, there's
21	cars it's the hash marked, which mark no parking.
22	There's cars parked there. You can't make the
23	corner, you can't get in and out. There's all these
24	other parking spots that the regular cops going
25	around could do it, they're not going to. You know,

1	they don't have the time, they're dealing with other
2	issues. The TCO around the handicapped zones, the
3	fire hydrants, the corners and everything else, so
4	people could move and traffic could keep flowing,
5	those tickets, they could write 10 every weekend day.
6	Every Saturday and Sunday, you could write at least
7	10 of them each day easily, you know, and that's
8	and I'm not driving through town all day. But
9	Saturday afternoon, after noon, from noon until
10	5 o'clock, there's cars all over the place, so
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: All over the place.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And I don't know what we do,
14	if we tow, but that down at that Railroad Dock
15	is it's really a mess and
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, you also have to
17	remember that the guys on the crews on not only the
18	party boats, but on the other boats, used to have
19	parking spots in designated parking spots in that
20	railroad park lot, and that has been either put to
21	the side or has been given to the Hampton Jitney
22	people. So, in all fairness, okay, in all fairness,
23	you have to they've done the best to keep first
24	of all, some of them to keep vehicles off the dock.
25	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And a truck backing down.
2	Or the Peconic Star, in all honesty, yes, their
3	customers, they are a problem. I'm sure you've seen
4	it in the morning and at night, okay?
5	So, in all fairness, you have to they're
6	doing the best they can down there to when they
7	can't get a parking spot because the other parking
8	lot is full, because they originally used to have the
9	whole section where the bus is and that first tier
10	there, and the Village changed that, so
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. It's not so
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we could revisit.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's not so much that it's the
14	crews that are parking there, it's the customers, and
15	that's what needs to be enforced, and that's stuff
16	that we'll address with
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Tickets.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: With Paul, with the Marina
19	Manager and all. It's when they're coming back, they
20	want to see the boat coming in. Somebody needs to go
21	over there and say, "You got to take" "cart your
22	stuff over there. You can't back up onto the dock to
23	load your fish up," and everything else. But the
24	crews in the morning, those guys, they park off to
25	the side.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's really not them, it's the
3	customers.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm not talking about the
5	fishermen, I'm talking yeah.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. You know, you're saying
7	the crew, but the crew and everybody else, they're
8	out there on the boats. Sid's out on his boat, Mark
9	is, they guy from Peconic Star. They're out there,
10	they're doing their stuff and they're gone.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: It's the customers. And they
13	come in with 50 customers, everyone wants to go down
14	there and get their fish, instead of carrying their
15	bag of fish.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the other thing that's
17	been happening is because of that situation of guys,
18	including Sid, and have been parking behind the
19	railroad company, because they can't get on and off
20	when that happens. So that's part of the issue,
21	okay?
22	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just telling you how
24	what goes on.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? I do have concerns
2	about two vehicles that are near the fire pipe, or
3	the fire water pipe, or fire you know, the pipe
4	that's there for the hoses to if there's an
5	incident with the ferry and the dock, there's the
6	pipe that comes up that's for the it's not a fire
7	hydrant, but it's
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Standpipe.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Standpipe or something. I
10	don't know what it's called, but that's blocked all
11	the time.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Where is that?
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's near where the dumpster
15	is and where the meters are. But that's constantly
16	blocked on weekends all the time.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, a lot of this is stuff
18	that we need to enforce it and just have somebody
19	there when the boat comes in to take care of it. I
20	know I go fishing out in Orient. If I park in the
21	restaurant parking lot, the captain of the boat says,
22	"You can't park there, you go park over there," and
23	makes me walk to the end of the parking lot, and ${\tt I}$
24	carry my fish and stuff off to the side. So we need
25	to enforce that with the boat captains. And if our

Marina Manager is down there with a boat captain
every day, "Tell your people when they get off the
boat not to pull their cars up here, they can't do
it," the
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or you're going to get a
ticket.
MAYOR HUBBARD: Exactly. And the captain of
the boat needs to be told to enforce that. And, I
mean, that's what they do in Orient. I go down to
Orient By the Sea, I pull up by the that's
restaurant only. They told me, "Park your car over
there, we're not leaving until you move your car," or
I don't get on the fishing boat.
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure, yeah.
MAYOR HUBBARD: So we had to tell them to
enforce it themselves and not let their customers in
the wrong spot, which we'll discuss that and we'll
work on that.
TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That would be awesome.
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I was just going to say
MR. PROKOP: I have a few more comments.
TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure.
MR. PROKOP: Okay. So I'm in favor of the TCO,
I think it's a good idea. I think the visibility of
somebody walking around would deter a lot of illegal

parking, or I also think that there should be -- if you're trying to free up a lot, there should be a big sign there that says, "One-Hour Parking Enforced," or whatever -- whatever the parking is in these different places enforced. And then I think they're having somebody walking around visible; that has a big impact.

I mean, I saw somebody one night -- one day I was leaving a meeting here. Somebody pulled right up in front of a parking -- in front of a fire hydrant and blocked it, got out of the car, went into a store, and it wasn't an employee. And I managed to flag -- I just happened to see policeman. I stopped and he went back, and I guess -- I don't know what he did, I guess he ticketed the person, but that's what we need to do.

But the other thing is you can't, just to -- I'm happy to help you work with something like this if you want to project the revenues, but it's not just a question of -- so maybe we'll write 740 tickets, maybe we'll write 7400, I don't know. But the thing is you can't just multiply times 50 and come up with the number, because a lot of -- you know, you have to manage -- a lot of people don't show up, and that's now working. At least we're

1	doing something that we're working with the
2	judgments. But a lot of the other people come in
3	and, you know, "I went into the IGA, my mother got
4	taken to the hospital, it was my mom and she got
5	taken to the hospital and we got stuck there. The
6	car was there for six hours, there was nothing I
7	could do." "I work at the" "I work at the candy
8	shop, I was doing a delivery. I'm really sorry, it
9	won't happen again." You know, over and over again I
10	listen to this stuff in court and I have to manage
11	it. You know, so that's so just be respectful of
12	that also.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure. Thanks. We have to
14	weigh the benefit to the people who live here,
15	though, and maybe it's worth a few bucks, the Board
16	might decide. I know that
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. The quality of life
18	issues, being able to go
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: To get to the drug store and
21	get your medicine is definitely worth some pause for
22	that.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, since
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Let's find out where the TCO
25	is. We'll get an answer on that tomorrow.

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks.
2	MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll get an email out to
3	everybody.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thank you. That's great.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And since you're bringing up
6	the quality of life, and since Trustee Roberts got my
7	email, Main Street, between there's been several
8	vehicle smackings of
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: windows, and whatever,
11	and I think it's time that we take a look at
12	re-routing that, so that it's either a one-way some
13	section around. The vehicles are getting bigger. We
14	have now there's the small, little ones and the
15	huge trucks that are trying to get down that street.
16	I'm waiting for a fatal accident, a fatality with a
17	pedestrian one of these days, especially since the
18	area itself has increased, the population of people
19	and businesses for a long time. The Cinnamon Tree
20	area there or Stirling Square was not full of
21	business ventures, it was empty. So I would really
22	like to take a look at that or discuss re-routing
23	some of that, so that it makes it safer for people
24	coming in and out of the Village, or the people that
25	live there, to be honest with you. I didn't know how

1	to go about that, but that's something that I would
2	like to put on the table for discussion.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Or maybe no parking there in
4	the summer, was an idea someone
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
6	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Ten or 20 spots, but we
7	should think about it.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. There's 21 spots
9	between Bay Avenue and Center Street.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's right.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: So you would talk about making
12	the whole east side of Main Street down there no
13	parking. That's a lot of spots, but, I mean
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm not advocating, I'm just
15	saying that was suggested.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, I know. I counted up
17	there. After it was discussed, I counted how many
18	were there.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But, you know, the thing is
20	I've seen in other municipalities, and actually in
21	other in other cities that I travel to who have
22	the same streets and have the same issues, and they
23	have re-routed stuff to make a one-way so that
24	vehicles they had parked, it left it kept the
25	established parking spots that were needed, and it

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just was getting used to doing -- going around the corner instead of going straight through.

So I just would like to explore it. I think we should explore it. I think it's something that we've gotten to this point, it's been discussed for years. It was discussed back in the '80s, it was discussed in the '90s. So I think maybe we have the technology now to -- and the emphasis to discuss it now in 2015.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll have discussion further.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Don't want to have a long parks discussion tonight, but just -- I know, Mary Bess, you've been working on this. There's been a lot of discussion around town about finally kind of making an investment of Third Street Park. And so I just had this idea that I put in here to ask you if you would consider holding a public hearing -sorry -- holding one of our meetings up at the AME Zion Church, and having a public hearing as part of that meeting about what should we do -- what could we do with Third Street Park, because I hear a lot of people say we should put a fence around it, which I've been saying for a long time, but there may be other things that -- you know, we're going to have to make decisions at some point if we decide to improve

that park, which most of us agree really needs to be done. I would love to have a community meeting and talk about it in maybe a different forum. So that was just an idea I wanted to throw out to you. I thought it would be an interesting --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, in -- okay. Well, part of the original plan was to meet with some of the community members first with a one-on-one and just kind of get a feel for what they think is important and then reach out to the rest of the community members. I'm not sure they're ready for a public hearing yet. I think we need to -- we need to finalize plans as to what might happen there, and then present it to them and give them some idea to follow.

I think if you get a public hearing -- this is my feeling -- a public hearing on that topic, I'm not sure that everyone would show out for it. I just think that a one-on-one approach to that community -- in that community to the people, Val Shelby, you, me, Marc, whatever, reach out to the leaders in the community, especially the Spanish, as well as the colored community down there. It would be a more positive reaction than a public hearing. That's my personal opinion, okay?

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Either way, I mean, I think
2	they're I don't want us to get analysis paralysis
3	either. I mean, there are probably kind of a couple
4	of small things we can do, like put a fence, get rid
5	of the huge stump, find a way to create some shade.
6	Paul?
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the huge stump is
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There's actually something
9	planned for that stump.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Going to be planned for the
11	stump. Yeah, that's becoming a seat.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'm sorry?
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's being made into a bench.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's becoming it's being
15	made into a bench.
16	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Oh, okay. I didn't know,
17	sorry. Anyway, can the road crew or somebody move
18	those tables out from under the shade, because
19	usually a bunch of adults sit in there when they're
20	working.
21	MR. PALLAS: I mean, we can certainly move
22	them. I don't know if they'll stay moved
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
24	MR. PALLAS: but, you know.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Is there any reason why adults

1	can't use the park, too?
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: A lot of folks in the
3	community have said that they don't bring their kids
4	because they're concerned about the adults sitting
5	there. I've heard that a lot.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I had seen a lot of children
7	playing there, too, during the day. I keep a pretty
8	good eye on that park, so I don't understand why
9	adults aren't allowed to be there, too.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I'll connect you with them,
11	you could talk to them.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, children usually do
13	come with adults.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, I think that
15	would for me, anyway, that would be key, I mean,
16	like having lived in like Nassau and New York City.
17	Like during like park hours, usually it's for the
18	kids or for adults with kids, you know. And if
19	that's the case, then that's fine. But I think
20	that I think that's something that we should look
21	at as we go forward and look at the parks, is that
22	something a park like Fifth Street, which is more
23	adult and kid friendly, I think is a place, of
24	course, adults should be all the time. If the focus,
25	and I don't know if this is the focus, is for Third

1	Street to be a kids park. Then I think that we
2	should put the priority towards kids and/or parents
3	with kids, as opposed to adults. It's something we
4	would have to decide, or maybe it has been decided;
5	that I don't know. I haven't been able to find it.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Well, it doesn't strike me as
7	an adults' park. I mean, it's obviously a playground
8	for children.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, no, absolutely.
10	Absolutely.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And I'm just saying that if
12	I've observed, you know, some adults sitting there
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: and talking, but I don't
15	see how we can discriminate against adults sitting
16	there talking, you know, and say they shouldn't be
17	there.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No one's suggesting that.
19	I'm sharing that parents have told me they're
20	concerned about taking their kids to the park because
21	there's some potentially some not great adult
22	activity happening there. So I can connect you with
23	the people who suggested that. But no one's saying
24	we should not let adults in the park, to be clear.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Paul, we had gotten

1	prices on fence over there. We've talked about that
2	a while ago, but it just hadn't gotten done.
3	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. We had we had priced out
4	some chain link fence, and you and I had a
5	discussion, and I was instructed to get chain link
6	fence prices. I know you and I had a brief chat
7	about that and you were thinking more in terms
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
9	MR. PALLAS: of a split rail. And I had
10	kind of put that on hold until some of this
11	discussion. I can get pricing
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
13	MR. PALLAS: for a split rail, if you'd
14	like.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. The original plan
16	was for a split rail fence and put like the green
17	mesh wire on the inside of it, was what we had talked
18	about a couple of years ago. So a split rail fence
19	with the green mesh, so kids can't climb through it,
20	and it just keeps
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah, yeah, yeah.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Protects the ball from going
24	out and everything. There used to be a split rail
25	fence across the back of the fire property there. It

1	all fell apart, it got old and it wasn't done.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: A while ago.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, Trustee Murray had
4	talked about that, because he was going to donate the
5	labor, the Village was going to get the material, and
6	it just never happened. It was going to be an Eagle
7	Scout project. When they were painting Greenhill
8	Cemetery, the Eagle Scouts the younger Scouts were
9	painting the fence three years ago, and then the
LO	Eagle Scouts, when summertime got here, they were
L1	going to do a project and put the fence in. Eagle
L2	Scouts turned 18, graduated high school. They
L3	weren't interested in spending their summer putting a
L4	fence in for us for free, and that's where that ended
L5	two years ago. So we need to go back and just get
L6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, what I would like, and
L7	I know that and Doug has had a discussion, is that
L8	there was some proposals put together for having a
L9	donation not a donation, but donation of an
20	overall landscaping and fencing proposal that someone
21	had put together. So if I could get that and give it
22	to Paul and see what it says, because it was from
23	someone who actually puts playgrounds together.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: That would be great.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that that would be a

1	help towards discussing it and
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And, Doug, I think you and I
5	need to get together and have a discussion on this,
6	but there was so much going around that I took a step
7	back to just I didn't want confusion going on, so.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: We need to do something. It
9	was two years ago we talked about it. We need to get
10	a fence around there and make it safe for the kids.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we will. My schedule is
12	free this week. The Captain has left for fishing, so
13	I am not tied to the phone or the computer, so.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Out of curiosity, does
15	Third Street Park have a name other than Third Street
16	Park? Like was it ever anything other
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is David Corwin here? Does
18	it have another name?
19	MR. CORWIN: I thought the Village Board, after
20	Larry Tuthill died, named the Fire Department
21	wanted to name that Larry Tuthill Park
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I
23	MR. CORWIN: and they were going to go ahead
24	and fix it up.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I thought.

1	MR. CORWIN: And then somehow the park by the
2	ferry
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah, that's right?
4	MR. CORWIN: got named Larry Tuthill Park.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
6	MR. CORWIN: And Larry Tuthill deserves two
7	parks.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, all right. But my
9	wife had an idea that maybe name it after a couple of
10	kids, Corey Freeman and Michael Brown, kids young
11	men who had passed in recent years, and thought if it
12	was just Third Street, that might be something
13	CLERK PIRILLO: Basketball court.
14	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Basketball court.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The basketball court are
16	dedicated to those guys.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay, not a problem. It's
18	just that she's had that all right, cool. She's
19	had that idea, and I was like, oh, that's pretty
20	cool.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that's something
22	that we can come up with.
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I did not know that the
24	basketball court had a name. I thought it was the
25	Third Street basketball court. Cool.

1	MS. ALLEN: We just had a very young child pass
2	away who lived, I believe, on Fifth Avenue
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Certainly an idea.
4	MS. ALLEN: who used to go there.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. Okay. I'm sorry.
6	That was just a question. I didn't mean
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Let's go back to the
8	report and keep this going.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I apologize.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. So we'll get some
11	progress. We'll get updated on the
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Great. Thank you.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: on the Third Street parking.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. I'm going to say
15	this wrong. Digitization of Documents: That
16	Laserfiche project, I think I got all the answers for
17	you. It took me a little longer.
18	So, in speaking with Southold Town, folks
19	there, we found out a couple of things. The scanner
20	needed is an FI, fox, India, 6770. I guess it's a
21	specific scanner that's needed that runs in the order
22	of \$6,000. Other questions that I think I'll see
23	what I all right.
24	So I spoke to Lloyd Reisenberg. He does the IT
25	over at Town Hall. He was explaining to me that we

1	need to purchase this scanner. In addition, there
2	are no he said there is no other associated pieces
3	to the scanner. It's a scanner, and then he said,
4	essentially, it's a plug-in-place for all intents and
5	purposes.
6	I then spoke to Elizabeth Neville. She didn't
7	seem to think that there would be any problem as far
8	as licenses go, like you know, like software
9	license or something.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: She thought we were all
12	we would be fine there.
13	In addition, there is let's see if I get
14	this right an older connection directly to
15	Southold Town that the Building Department, I
16	believe, is currently using, in addition to there is
17	a web-based one as well, a website-based connection
18	as well. Am I saying that correctly?
19	CLERK PIRILLO: It's called Municity and it
20	runs on a VPN.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Municity? Okay.
22	CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah. And, also, with Clerk
23	Neville, I had spoke I had spoken with her when we
24	got together for Memorial Day, okay? And did she
25	tell you that we can use their scanner as part of the

1	Records Management Grant that we participated in with
2	them, instead of buying our own?
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: When I met with Doug
4	and I met with Lloyd gees, I don't remember
5	when he said that that was an option. And one of
6	the issues that was raised by I believe Jean Marie,
7	Jeanmarie was there, was just a matter of physically
8	bringing somebody would literally have to be, you
9	know, bringing boxes and sitting in the basement of
10	Southold Town and coming back. And I guess that had
11	been tried in the past
12	CLERK PIRILLO: No, he didn't.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: and was very labor
14	intensive.
15	CLERK PIRILLO: It was a start-and-stop kind
16	of we did it sporadically as we had time, and the
17	staffing, the staffing to scan with our own laser
18	machine would be challenging as well.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
20	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay?
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, one of the things
22	one of the ways that I saw this possibly finding
23	success is as documents are now produced, like
24	whatever, for example, might be made from tonight,
25	that might be something that we could then put

1	online. So whenever this would start working, we
2	could start putting our documents up online.
3	As far as the things that are in the basement,
4	all right, past paperwork, of course we would like to
5	that get up there, but I think that that would be a
6	slower process. These documents all have to be
7	vetted, we'd have to have the manpower to do it. I
8	guess it's not a huge hurry. Some of those papers
9	have evidently been down there for 100 years.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: It's not it's not those
11	I'm sorry.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: It's not those so much.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
15	CLERK PIRILLO: It is what where it would be
16	very helpful, what you're suggesting, is with the
17	birth and death records, okay, because we have we
18	have very, very old birth and death records dating
19	literally back to the 1800s.
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: And it would be very helpful
22	and very safe to use the scanner and to scan those
23	records into there, so that protects their longevity.
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: As far as the documents,
25	like from whatever is made from this evening, that

1	would be a difficult thing? Like instead of it being
2	boxed up and put away, it would be a difficult thing?
3	I'm asking, I'm very sincerely.
4	CLERK PIRILLO: Sure.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That would be a difficult
6	thing to scan those and put them up?
7	CLERK PIRILLO: No, that wouldn't be difficult
8	at all, but it
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: As far as you're talking,
10	as far as historical stuff
11	CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: birth and death would
13	be the place to start?
14	CLERK PIRILLO: Yeah, it would. It would be a
15	great it would be a great use of that system.
16	MR. PROKOP: Isn't tonight already scanned?
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm saying.
18	CLERK PIRILLO: Tonight's been up. You know
19	the work session minutes are up on the are up on
20	the website?
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
23	CLERK PIRILLO: Right?
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILUTIA. But this document arrows
2	them to be this program allows them to be
3	searchable in a way that I mean, you're more of a
4	computer person than me. I'm not
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah. You can go search for
6	a Planning Board document from 20 years on the Town
7	website to figure out what happened with a property
8	down the street from you. It's a transparency issue.
9	From the research we've done, we've put out an RFP
10	for the scanner, and all of a sudden we have a much
11	better solution for transparency. We reduce the
12	FOILs, we get the documents out to people, which is
13	really the only goal of this thing. And it seems
14	that there's really nothing stopping us from doing
15	it, except getting the scanner and figuring out how
16	to organize the resources to do the work and the
17	Board prioritizing the work. But I think what we're
18	saying is transparency is important to us.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I have to ask a
20	question.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sylvia, on the IQM2
23	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: isn't that a system that
25	you can get I mean, to expand it, isn't that a

1	system that has the minutes and some of the
2	information that they're talking about that could be
3	put on that?
4	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we already existed with
6	that, correct, where it would be
7	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: searchable documents?
9	It's just we have to expand our fee that we're
10	dealing with? We'd have to expand the program or the
11	contract that we have with them?
12	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What about the paper that
14	comes in, the contract I mean, all those Tall
15	Ships contracts, for example, should be available on
16	Laserfiche or something.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But on IQM2, if we were
18	if we were expanding the usage of that, that would be
19	a section that she could would be able to put
20	into and I believe the Town of Southold used to
21	have that program. And, Sylvia, correct me if I'm
22	if I'm going in the wrong direction, but you used to
23	be able to put into the search and it would bring up
24	the actual board meeting that had all of those
25	documents attached to it, did it not?

1	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's similar to the
3	Laserfiche for this type of working document, it's
4	just not for the stuff that's the old historical
5	stuff, right?
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Would this IQM2 actually
7	pull I'm sorry. Would it actually be able to go
8	into the individual documents and
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that's what I do in
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Not just the title, but
11	into the document itself?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I've done with
13	the Town of the Southold and it kind of
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. I'm just
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I'm asking. That's why
16	I'm saying, is I think we have that capability
17	already.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We just need to explore it a
20	little further.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: We're not using it.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, we have okay. All
23	right.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You know what I'm saying?
25	I'm saying I understand the old documents, I'm

_	concerned about them in the basement, too.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I really am.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I think that we've been
6	spending money for a system that we haven't been
7	fully utilizing, and part of it is because I don't
8	think the manpower has been able to catch up on it.
9	But if we're going to start with the current stuff, I
LO	think we could do that. But if Sylvia, do you
11	Jeanmarie is the one that actually operates that,
L2	because we all should be able to get into the IQM2 to
L3	be able to look at the agendas and to make notes to
L4	the Department Heads, and whatever. Isn't that what
L5	it's used for?
L6	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, we can, and get electronic
L7	post-it notes and comments.
L8	And, Trustee Martilotta, if you'd like, along
L9	with Trustee Roberts, you can sit with Jeanmarie and
20	get the IQM2 people on the phone and see if there is
21	an overlap, because if it isn't, we may as well go
22	with the system you're proposing. But if there is an
23	overlap and we're happy with the functions
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: and what they can

1	accomplish, then maybe we shouldn't reinvent the
2	wheel. We can decide that at a later date once we
3	see all the capabilities, if you'd like.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
5	CLERK PIRILLO: We can try to wrap it up within
6	a week
7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: True.
9	CLERK PIRILLO: if we want to, so we can
10	move ahead for next Thursday.
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Sure. Maybe the way to
12	handle this, if I could
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
14	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: what if could we ask
15	the Clerk's Department for essentially some quick
16	estimates of costs, both in terms of, you know,
17	dollars we'd have to spend for man or woman power to
18	scan documents into Laserfiche versus IQM2? And I'd
19	love to see kind of, you know, what are we looking at
20	in terms of real costs, because transparency is
21	important, and we have to make decisions about what
22	we can and cannot afford right now, next year. Do we
23	go get a grant? But right now I'm all I'm hearing
24	is we can't, we can't.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: I'm not I'm not trying to

1	I'm not suggesting that we can't, I'm trying to
2	suggest the way that we can do it most effectively.
3	Anything, anything is workable.
4	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Well, I think the
6	intention of where they're going is if we had our own
7	scanner, we could tie into all the paperwork and the
8	hardware that Southold Town already has. And instead
9	of taking a box of stuff from Greenport to go to
10	Southold, traveling there, when somebody has a free
11	hour, they can go right in Village Hall, go in the
12	back room and start making copies right there.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's kind of along the
14	lines of
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: I mean, I think that's in
16	general, that's instead of using their scanner and
17	the stuff up there, the technology is there, we can
18	tie into it, so we have our own scanner. So if
19	somebody's got a free hours, they can start scanning
20	some old stuff.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's kind of what I was
22	thinking of.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: So that's so putting that
24	all together
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: we all want the same idea.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: But instead of somebody taking
4	this box and going to Town Hall and spending an
5	hour-and-a-half, or losing an hour-and-a-half driving
6	back and forth and everything else
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: you got an extra hour, go on
9	downstairs and make some copies.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. Essentially, yes.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I'm also saying that we
13	have a system now. Let's look and see what that
14	capability is to we're already paying for it.
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Might as well.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we might as well see what
18	the capabilities are.
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Certainly, absolutely.
20	Absolutely. Okay. Thank you. I didn't know that.
21	Thank you.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: And let's have a report for
23	that for next month. Sylvia will work on that and
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: we'll get back and we'll try

1	to end that one and get going on it.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay. So the
3	Facebook/Communication I forget what we called
4	ourselves Internet Committee, Sylvia and Mary
5	Bess, Paul and I, we didn't get to this one last
6	month, but so, basically, a couple of people did
7	some research. There are some really easy things and
8	inexpensive things we can do, if we decide to, to
9	do be more proactive in getting communication out
10	to folks. So the direction from the Board was to
11	find a way to message out on Facebook without
12	allowing conversation, so it's just outgoing
13	messages. So the way to do that is we create a
14	group, and the public who happen to be on Facebook
15	can opt into the group, and then they can get our
16	messages and there would be no discussion. So "Power
17	outage should be done in four hours," "Please buy
18	Tall Ships tickets," etcetera.
19	And then we also, Paul and Sylvia and Mary Bess
20	have been looking into a service called Constant
21	Contact, which is basically just it's email, it's
22	sending emails out to people. Again, both of these
23	are optional. The people who people opt in to
24	receive these communications from us, from the

Village. The committee discussed an idea where there

25

1	would be a weekly "Here's what's happening in your
2	Village," or "Here's what's happening in Village
3	Hall," and it's, you know, "Planning on Thursday,"
4	and "Here's the ZBA agenda." And a lot of great
5	things could come out of this, in addition to
6	emergency and other kind of event communications. So
7	the Constant Contact costs were around it was
8	about \$500 for the year?
9	MR. PALLAS: I think that's what it was.
10	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, that's what it was.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: So we set it up and we just
13	put it on the website, "Here," click here to either
14	opt into the email thing, if you're an email person,
15	or the Facebook thing if you're a Facebook person,
16	and then we have and then we create a process
17	inside Village Hall where messages that you want to
18	put out, the Board wants to put out, go through
19	somebody, and go out to those two channels, and we're
20	now proactively communicating with the Village at
21	500 the cost of 500 bucks.
22	So I thought we did some good research, we had
23	good conversation, and I'm interested in figuring out
24	a way to move this forward. I don't know if we need
25	a resolution or if we need to just do it.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the Facebook page we
2	already said that we were going to do that.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Right.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: The Constant Contact, we would
5	have a resolution to sign us up for Constant Contact
6	with the cost of \$500 for the year, so we just have a
7	resolution to do that.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And does the Board agree that
9	these are both we should pursue both channels
10	and
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I still have the objection to
L2	the Facebook page. And I disagree with you about the
L3	group page. I have, unfortunately, screen shots of
L4	research I did on this, done. I can try and get them
L 5	in a larger format, but, basically, the public the
16	creation of a group page, this is in the section on
L7	privacy settings for Facebook. Public page: Who can
L8	join? Anyone could join or be added to invite by
19	member. Who can see the group's name? Anyone. Who
20	can see who's in the group? Anyone. Who can see the
21	group description? Anyone. Who can use group tags?
22	Anyone. Who can see what members post in a group?
23	Anyone.
24	So it is not just an outgoing thing. It will
) 5	he vou know

1	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I believe you can turn
2	off the that the administrator, which would be us,
3	can turn off the ability for anyone to post, or
4	reply, or comment.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I couldn't find that, and I
6	Googled and went into Facebook, who seems to be the
7	only authority on Facebook, is Facebook,
8	unfortunately.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Of course.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There's nobody else comments
11	on it, and
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just I just
13	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I will triple-check.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I will, too, because I
15	just recently discovered a glitch in my own group
16	that I need to see why that happens, so with the
17	security levels. I really do recommend that we start
18	with the constant contact first, let's just get it
19	going.
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's easy, right? There's no
21	objection.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's easy to do.
23	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's no and to be honest
25	with you, that's something that can move along

1	faster, given the amount of work in the next couple
2	of weeks with the Tall Ships. So I think that that's
3	something that could be easily set up, right, Paul,
4	Sylvia?
5	CLERK PIRILLO: (Nodded yes).
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Do people use Constant Contact?
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, they do.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The villageofgreenport.com is
9	a Constant Contact.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, some people aren't on a
11	computer all day long.
12	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: No, no. So you don't all
13	you do is you click on a link on the Village website
14	and you put in your email address.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Email and then you get a
16	blast.
17	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And it just emails you.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're part of an email blast.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: You don't actually use it, we
20	use it.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It just sends you it just
23	sends you the email.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You don't even have to

1	you can't answer back on it, you have to you just
2	get the email.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: That was the only question,
5	that's what we had with the Facebook and everything
6	else, because we know how that what that all turns
7	into after several weeks.
8	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: So this is like the robocall
10	that the school has when
11	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Exactly.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, that's exactly what
13	it is.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Same thing what we're doing.
15	All right. It's a different different name than
16	what
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yup.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine
20	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: And at the bottom of each
21	email, you say, "I no longer want to see updates from
22	the Village of Greenport,"
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, they have the option.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: and they can opt out.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll have that as a

1 resolution for Thursday.

MR. PROKOP: Develop a policy.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, yeah, we do have to develop a policy, and that's something that we did discuss, and we're going to get back to that, okay? But I think to make a positive move forward with the Tall Ships, we all need to concentrate on that for the next couple of weeks. So this is -- the policy on that can hold off for a month.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Fair enough. Thanks.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'll make this as quick as possible. For the Liaison requests, myself and Trustee Phillips are on that. I'm not sure -- well, this is something that I had thought of and I wanted to bring up to see if we would be allowed to speak, simply ask questions of our counterparts. A couple of people who have come up -- more than a couple people have come up and spoke to me with concerns about -- they want to build an electric warehouse over on Seventh Street, over by that empty lot over by Lewis Marine. A number of people in the Village like kind of back up to that and have brought some concerns up to me about it. And I was wondering if that was something you would be comfortable with us speaking to our Liaison from Southold Town Board

1	about.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Just about the setbacks, just
3	asking them not to not to grant a variance on
4	behalf of Greenport Villagers.
5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, what the logic is
6	behind it, you know, so that we could we could
7	then speak to them about it, no?
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just in general, the
9	principle, normally, the Town Board doesn't get
10	involved in our ZBA and we don't get involved in
11	their ZBA. If their
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Then that's fine.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, private citizens can
14	go, all those homeowners can go to their public
15	hearings and everything else.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's fine.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: But for the Village Board to
18	ask the Town
19	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Then I'm glad I'm asking you.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: ZBA to not do something
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: it's really it puts us
23	and them in an awkward situation, because they have
24	Board's that are supposed to be autonomous from the
25	Village Board or Town Board to handle their

1	jurisdictions.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Then I'm glad we're
3	asking, absolutely.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: So, you know, you can go as a
5	private citizen and say, "You know, this is where I
6	live, I want to talk about it." All those residents
7	can do the same thing. But, as a Village Board, we
8	really shouldn't interfere with their ZBA.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Then I would suggest that
10	to them as well.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I appreciate that.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, I think that would
14	that should
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If for some reason there is
16	something that's a ZBA action and it but it is
17	along with a Village property that's next to them
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: then we as a Board can
20	say something.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right?
23	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. Like I said
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That makes us the neighbor
25	to the applicant.

1	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm trying to tread very
2	lightly.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, it's a tough
4	it's a tough call.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: I understand the interest of
6	going down there and look at it and everything else,
7	but it is completely in the Town and they really need
8	to deal with that.
9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, so that's
11	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm all about it.
12	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, okay.
13	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Also, we wanted to
14	there's been talk in Southold Town, and I know that
15	it had come up here, something close to the border
16	about if there might be some interest in developing
17	some sort of an affordable housing in the area, or
18	close to the Village, if that was something, even a
19	discussion we could have with them. You know, is
20	there has there been any plans in Southold to do
21	so, and could we?
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. The Town has talked
23	about several projects. They haven't done anything
24	out east. The last one they did was in Mattituck.
25	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: You could talk to them and see
2	if there's something
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: that they're interested in
5	doing, but there's really not much room in the
6	Village for it.
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: But talk to them and see if
9	there's something there.
LO	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm talking outside of the
L1	Village.
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
L3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Because there's no room in
L4	the Village for it to speak of.
L5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, one or two lots here or
L6	there, but there's really nothing that's the
L7	magnitude of what they're looking at doing, or
18	actually needed in Southold Town.
L9	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: But reach out to the two of
21	them and talk to them and see what plans they have
22	and bring back some information. If we could see
23	assist or help
24	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't see any reason we

1	you know, everybody knows.
2	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I had to ask, right?
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: We all know we need it.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, yes.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: So
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: But I wanted to make sure
7	we're speaking with
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's fine.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, you know, I have been
10	reading. There's been some activity with their
11	housing. So, I mean, I don't have any problem with
12	getting together with Jim and Bob Ghosio and talk to
13	them about it.
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I just had a couple, you
15	know, I wanted to
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, no.
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: ask, and I'm glad I did
18	that. Thank you. Thank you. I think that was it.
19	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: What about the Police Chief?
20	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh.
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Would it be possible for you
22	all to ask the Town Board, or if we can just ask them
23	directly, but I'd love to since we have sort of a
24	new Board, new Mayor, maybe have a conference with
25	the Police Chief at a work session and talk about,

1	you know, things that we might be able to do together
2	to help kind of keep people safe around here.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, we've asked for that
5	before.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, we've had actually, he
7	came as a Lieutenant, the Police Chief didn't. But
8	he might send Lieutenant Krushevski (phonetic) down,
9	or something like that, you know.
LO	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Yeah, come to a work session.
L1	MAYOR HUBBARD: No. We'll invite them and see
L2	if they could come to
L3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: That would be great.
L4	MAYOR HUBBARD: our next session, yes.
L 5	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think that would be a
L6	cool thing.
L7	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: MTA, last thing. Are we able
L8	to
L9	MR. PALLAS: I haven't really had time to deal
20	with that yet
21	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Okay.
22	MR. PALLAS: with everything else that's
23	going on. It's been on my list of to-dos.
24	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: It's a big project, it's a
25	long-term project, but it could be a huge one for us.

1	So maybe next month.
2	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, I'll try.
3	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks.
4	MR. PALLAS: Okay.
5	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks, everybody.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's it?
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. Trustee
10	Robins.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have two reports. Just a
12	brief BID report. They had a meeting this morning.
13	Obviously, a topic of conversation were the Tall
14	Ships. They report that they're still trying to work
15	on a few additional sponsors, which is good. They're
16	concerned and making sure that they are communicating
17	with all the businesses about the event details right
18	now to make sure that they're all aware of everything
19	that's going on.
20	They were talking about something that we
21	mentioned at the meeting the other day, the need for
22	additional posters and rack cards, which I think are
23	supposed to be coming to Village Hall tomorrow, if
24	I'm not mistaken.
25	MR. PALLAS: I'm assuming, yeah.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, yeah. Peter still had some concerns about information going out, the itinerary, rules and regulations. I think a lot of those things will be resolved once we get the agenda published on the Village website and the map of the event. So that's pending, I would say within the next couple of days.

They are doing a thing where they have ordered pins for the members of the crew of all the ships that they'll be distributing, and they told me that they may have a few extras, which they would probably be offering them to maybe our volunteers. They're very nice, the pins, you know, with the logo of the Village of Greenport on them.

On other business, they voted yes to provide a letter of support to the firefighter that was requested by Charlie Ritchie. And they announced that they will be donating \$2,500 to the Dances in the Park.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Wow, great.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's awesome.

TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Referencing that, I have in the report a request for a resolution for -- or just for you to write a letter to them, whatever, the sponsorship letter. Can we just make sure to cover

the paperwork? Thank you.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. Just a little thing in the Utilities Department. I recently took a tour of the Hawkeye Power Plant, which is over in Moore's Woods, been there since 2003. I went over with Paul Pallas. I had full briefing of the history of the construction and operation of the plant by Robert Zorchik (phonetic), who oversees and manages the plant, and Steven Squillante, who's the Senior Vice President at the Haugland Group.

Greenport Plant is a 54 megawatt simple cycle combustion turbine generation facility whose purpose is to provide capacity, energy and ancillary services to the Long Island Power Authority.

In my education of public power and the need for reliable electricity, I was interested in seeing this facility that has been leasing space on land owned by the Village for a number of years. I was very impressed with the impeccable maintenance and safety protocol that takes place every day at the plant. What surprised me was how little time the plant actually generates power.

The concept of plants such as this is to provide grid-ready electricity when peak demand threatens to disrupt service to customers on the East

End. Increased demand for electricity, which I recently discussed with Keith Hayes from the New York Power Authority, is being driven by our insatiable appetite for devices, controlled living environments, etcetera.

I appreciated the tour and I found that Hawkeye has been a good steward of our land that provides invaluable service to our neighbors. I just wanted everybody to know that.

Just also a little shout-out to the Planning Board. A constituent business owner, who recently went through the process of applying to the Planning Board to do some construction over on First Street, somebody who I do -- a building -- a builder and property owner told me that his experience with the Planning Board was excellent, that he felt that they really tried to work with him on everything, and that he had been through a similar process, I don't know, maybe 10 years ago when he built over on First Street and it was a much more arduous process. So I just wanted to let the folks on the Planning Board know that he went out of his way to compliment them.

Oh, and just a quick update. By the way, we are going to be getting the grant application in on the -- a project over at the Jail. And Paul and I

1	met over there this morning with John Zurawski from
2	Kolb Mechanical to get a price on a heating system,
3	and it looks like the heating system needed for the
4	Jail is seeing is such a small space, we can
5	probably go with a small what did he say, a
6	Mitsubishi wall unit?
7	MR. PALLAS: Mitsubishi, yeah.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. So it shouldn't be a
9	terrific expense. So I'm going to be working with
10	Clerk Pirillo to get that grant application ready and
11	out by 4:30 on Monday, along with Tall Ships that
12	we're working on. Thank you very much.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Trustee Phillips?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I attended Audit and Code
15	Committee, so those things have been coming out.
16	I am glad to see that in Code we did move
17	forward on the Airbnb. I think to the public, that's
18	a good sign that we're talking about it. I'm not
19	sure how it's going to come out, but I'm sure it will
20	be as controversial as the Town of Southold, as
21	seemed to be.
22	The Greenport Improvement Committee, the grant
23	process for Michelle Schott that we gave support is
24	being worked on. She and Lisa Richland were working

on it today. At the meeting, we as a group want to

25

move forward on the grant, finishing the interpretive oral history part of the Red Schoolhouse grant that's still left over that we still need to finish. So we're making a recommendation or we're going -- I'm asking for a resolution to set an \$8,000 budget for Michelle Schott to start doing the oral history. That's one of the -- that's one of the resolutions that we would like on it.

I also have another young lady that would like to be doing an educational class for children. And, unfortunately, Joe, I think my email to you must have gotten lost because I can't find it, and I know -- it's dealing with doing silversmithing. And she would like to have classes in there for children. My one concern is the type of work that that entails inside that building might not be to the advantage. It might be -- I think it's working with the electric --

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Soldering?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Soldering things, the little solder guns. So I'm not sure that that's something that we really want in there. I'm not sure, I'm throwing it out. But I would like to find another spot for her within the Village to do that, because I think the program is worthwhile. So I'm not sure if

1	maybe we could convince the Blacksmith Shop to maybe
2	open up a section for her to be in there. I don't
3	know what that building looks like, so I just would
4	like to find a spot for her to do that for the kids.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll talk to Paul and
6	see if he could come up with a place, or something
7	like that. Hot irons in that old building I don't
8	think is a good idea.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, no, I know. The
10	enthusiasm and she's very excited, and she's been
11	very patient, and I just the Greenport Improvement
12	Committee wasn't crazy about it either. So I past it
13	by them, but I would like to find someplace for her
14	to do that.
15	The other thing that I want to bring up, and
16	it's a future project, at one point we did get a
17	grant. And, Sylvia, please remind me, because it's
18	been a while, we had gotten a grant for economic
19	development surveying.
20	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. But we went up to RFP for it.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	CLERK PIRILLO: If I remember well. I don't
23	think I believe we had one response
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did we lose the funding?
25	CLERK PIRILLO: and I also believe that we

1	acted on it.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did we lose the funding?
3	MR. PALLAS: No, not yet.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Not yet, we haven't lost the
5	funding?
6	MR. PALLAS: I have been asked if we're still
7	interested. I'm sorry. In looking, and I haven't
8	looked at it in some time, but some of the elements
9	that are in that economic development survey, I don't
10	know if they conflict with some of the LWRP elements.
11	It just seems that they don't really line up very
12	well.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	MR. PALLAS: Because they're talking about
15	similar things, changing codes and things like that.
16	I don't know that we want to do both of those things.
17	The results could end up conflicting.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I can't remember what was in
19	it, it's been a while.
20	MR. PALLAS: It's been a while. I can take
21	another look at it and see, but my memory was that it
22	just didn't seem to make sense in light of the LWRP
23	process.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, what I'm
25	thinking about is that currently the SBA is reaching

1	out to small businesses, and I would just like to
2	perhaps invite them to come out and talk to some of
3	the ones that similar to the Arcade and some of
4	the other people that are given the opportunity to
5	flow out some economic ideas, incubator ideas for the
6	winter months, trying to create a downtown in the
7	winter that's got more than just nothing, okay? So
8	that's one of the things I'd like to work on, but I'd
9	like the Board's permission to do that, so.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. Get some information and
11	come back and report back to us. You know, we'll all
12	be interested in hearing that, I believe.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, that's fine, because
14	there's a lot going on for small businesses in New
15	York State, and the SBA is reaching out to all small
16	businesses, and I think most of our community falls
17	into that, okay?
18	All right. That's pretty much it.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The rest of it's been
21	covered.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Thank you. Most of
23	the stuff I have we've already discussed about. A
24	couple of things.
25	Just an update on the paving. We got a

1	confirmation today. They're supposed to be here on
2	Tuesday to finish the seven roads that they started,
3	so that should be done before graduation, before Tall
4	Ships. That is not the final layer that's down
5	there. You weren't the only one that questioned
6	that. It was the base coat, two-and-a-half inch base
7	coat compacted. Another inch-and-a-half top coat is
8	going on, and that will finish it. So those little
9	bumps and the curbs, everything will be taken care
10	of. They're supposed to be back Tuesday, depending
11	on the weather, but that's what was scheduled for.
12	MR. PALLAS: Right.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Has anybody received anything
14	on the opening on the Zoning Board? Have we received
15	anything back in Village Hall?
16	CLERK PIRILLO: (Shook head no).
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I've received one
18	application. I want to speak to the person and to
19	the Zoning Board Chair. I'll let everybody know if I
20	put a name on the Zoning Board for the meeting on
21	Thursday, somebody that's interested.
22	Planning Board I still haven't had anybody. I
23	haven't had time to really do a lot of researching.
24	I had one person in mind, but I don't know if they'd
25	be interested or not. If anybody else has any ideas,

Τ	send it to me so we could try to see I know Doug
2	had said I know.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have somebody. I'll talk
4	to you about it later.
5	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's fine if you have
6	somebody. I think the Zoning Board spot, I believe
7	that should be taken, but we still need somebody for
8	the Planning Board. I don't want to drag it out for
9	too long. I'd like to get these Boards filled back
LO	up and get people in and helping out.
L1	Okay. Signed a lot of contracts. We did I
L2	signed the CSEA contract from 2011 to 2017. I got
L3	that, that was here this past week. I signed that
L4	and sent that back. They had is that all signed
L5	by them, too, are we completed?
L6	CLERK PIRILLO: I believe so, yes.
L7	MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's completed. It's all
L8	that's done. That's something that went on for four
L9	years to get done. They finally finished printing it
20	up and sending three copies out.
21	Pretty much it. You know, just again a thank
22	you to everybody that's been working on the Tall
23	Ships. It's going to be a fun affair. To be honest
24	with you, I can't wait until it's all over with.
25	There's a lot of other stuff going on. We have a lot

1	of things going on throughout the Village that's
2	taking up everybody's a lot of time, a lot of
3	discussions, a lot of talk. It's going to be a fun
4	thing. We're all going to enjoy it, we're going to
5	get through it, and then we're going to move on to
6	some other stuff. All right?
7	So now I'd like to open up to the public to
8	address the Board. Chatty, come on up.
9	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay.
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: Is that mic on there?
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know if it's on.
12	MR. PALLAS: It should be.
13	AUDIENCE MEMBER: It's on.
14	MS. ALLEN: Is it on?
15	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yeah, it's on.
16	MS. ALLEN: Oh, okay.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just name and address for
18	the
19	MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth Avenue. The
20	first thing I just want to say, Doug, the reason
21	people gasped when you said get rid of that stump
22	I went to the Arbor Day ceremony at Larry Tuthill
23	park. When that tree came down, pieces were taken,
24	they went off to different people. They were made
25	into sculptures and everything else. That money is

going to go back into our Tree Committee, okay?

There was a woman that has been here, well, God rest her soul, she's not with us anymore, was on the original Tree Committee, her name was Lillian White. Her and her husband had lived over on Fifth Avenue, I don't even know how many years. They found in the tree her and her husband's initials, okay? When they redid the Tree Committee, when it came back again, she's the first person they went to. She came with everything and said, "This is what we did, this is what" -- and she was right there. She was such a driving force in this community.

The past 10 years I've called her GG, which stands from great-grandma, because that's what her kids called her and she wouldn't let me call her Mrs. White.

The Tree Committee is planning on dedicating that tree to her and putting initials back into that tree. So that's why those of us that were at that ceremony, and I broke down that day, and I'm trying not to break down now, because I -- that's why we gasped when you said that, okay, because there is a plan for that tree. So that's why sometimes, you know, this is -- goes back to knowing history, and knowing what this woman meant to this Village, to

1 this community.

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Just let me -- some of these you guys have already done. Is it okay if I speak to someone at school and put out a -- you know, tell them we're looking for volunteers for Tall Ships, any high school kids that need community service, please, and give a contact, you know? But I think if it goes on the school site and then gets shared, you know, you might get kids who we thought of afterwards with the Rec. Center. Why didn't we put that up for kids that need community service? You know, you might get more kids that might come and help, even if it's just a few hours. We did that with the All-Class Reunion. This girl was not from around here, her mom graduated from Greenport. She spent the entire day with me volunteering. So I said to her, "Do you need any community service?" We took our GHS All-Class Reunion letterhead and we signed her up and we wrote down the amount of hours she had done to put towards her community service. You know, so if that's okay, I could, you know, tomorrow get that word out --MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, please do. MS. ALLEN: -- to try and get volunteers. Okay. And now parking. Oh, idling. I think I told Mary Bess, New York State Law is five minutes

that's fine.

for any tour bus, school bus, limousine. If they're
idling more than four minutes, they're breaking the
law. So, you know, you can you can make it three
minutes, as a Village Code, but five minutes is the
max that we are allowed, and I double-checked with
work. I know as a school bus driver you can't idle
more than five minutes, you know. So you can make it
three if you want, you know. But I agree with you,
we're not supposed to idle, you know. You tell them,
"Look, you're dropping a party off, go up by Moore's
Lane, go hang out up there. Leave the bus running
with the AC." You know, there's nobody around. And
behind IGA, if I'm not mistaken, against the wall,
that's 30-minute parking.
So I agree, for you know, with Tall Ships
here, there, Colonial, you're not going to use it.
Chalk them, you know, and check. You know, like all
of you said, it doesn't take that long to run in,
especially when that's going on, because no one's
going to be in there anyway. But just having the
convenience for us that live here, trying to get
somewhere if we have to. I mean, the weekend I'll be
hanging with that one over there all weekend, so

Oh, the other is the ferry. There was a big

1	discussion about how traffic gets to Shelter Island
2	Ferry from Orient. I wasn't doing anything, so I
3	took a ride. From Orient Ferry, they have you go all
4	the way to Moore's Lane, come up Moore's Lane, turn
5	onto Front. First sign you're going to see, you
6	know, go past the school, Shelter Island Ferry, Sixth
7	Street. So I went down Fourth and Fifth just to see
8	signage. There were signs that said, "Enter Ferry on
9	Sixth Street." Now I know you can't put certain
10	signs because it's State roads, this road, that road.
11	Can't we put the signs that are like on Fourth and
12	Fifth Street at the light up here, just you know,
13	it says you enter the ferry line from Sixth Street.
14	Coming the other direction, everything tells you, you
15	know.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Chatty, are you talking
17	about at the stop light?
18	MS. ALLEN: Yeah.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's State road.
20	MS. ALLEN: Okay. So there's no way any sign
21	could go at all?
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just and I didn't really
23	want to I told the Mayor that I had had some
24	contacts with Senator LaValle's Office from Fisheries
25	and mentioned to him that we have a signage problem

1	with Shelter Island Ferry. And I have written a
2	letter to him, and Palumbo, and to Al Krupski asking
3	that we start asking them to help us with the DOT
4	to try to get better signage, because in all honesty,
5	the GPSs actually send everybody down Third Street.
6	MS. ALLEN: Right. Yeah. No, no, I know that,
7	but sometimes, you know, I didn't know if we could
8	just put, you know
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I found that. That's why
10	I haven't said anything because I haven't had an
11	opportunity
12	MS. ALLEN: Okay.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: to talk the Mayor about
14	it, and this is what I found out.
15	MS. ALLEN: I just like I said, I never even
16	paid attention to the ones on Fourth and Fifth
17	Street. I just happened because I was riding around
18	specifically looking, you know, and it's just a sign
19	that says, and, you know, "Please Enter Ferry Line
20	form Sixth Street."
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. There's some signage
22	that we can do that had to have trees cut back, or
23	whatever.
24	MS. ALLEN: Yeah.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But, as I said, I didn't

1 bring it up because I didn't -- it's something I need 2 to talk to the Mayor about. 3 MS. ALLEN: Okay. Well, I -- just, you know, I 4 was just throwing it out, because I know some signs 5 we can put up, some we can't put up. You know, just 6 trying to get people to, you know -- and if you make 7 Main Street heading the other direction, then people 8 are going to have to come and loop around anyway and 9 they're not going to make the ferry. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. I had guite a few 11 people comment on that. 12 MS. ALLEN: But the other thing with having a 13 traffic officer, I forget who had said, just having 14 the presence of someone walking around makes people 15 think twice, you know. So I totally agree, you know, 16 and even if you start out with Friday, Saturday, 17 Sunday. I know I joked to say give me a golf cart 18 and I will do it during the week, you know. I can't 19 physically walk all day. 20 But I think starting, and then people are going 21 to get the idea, "Oh, hey, they're serious. It says 22 30-minute parking. I got a ticket. Uh-oh, next time I better park a little further." 23 And as far as businesses, your business is 24 here, the parking lot long-term is here. You're not 25

talking about making all of Greenport Village, you know, timed parking, you know. And it just makes sense that, you know, yeah, certain areas people need to get to. So, all right, that's it.

MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Thank you. I just want to clear one thing up. I know Doug and Jack weren't on the Board when that tree came down over there. They're going to -- it's going to end up being carved out as a bench where that tree stump is, with the curved part of it, and it's going to be a carved bench that's going to be there, similar to what they did in front of the hospital. That was carved out there.

And also, all the pieces that all came out of that, I believe there's 12 different carpenters and artists that have taken and made stuff out of that. They've got -- most of that art work is done. They're setting up a raffle. They're going to have an auction and raffle the stuff off, probably in the Fall, probably September. And whatever -- they're putting a minimum price on the stuff. Whatever comes in on it, you're going to have a piece of the original tree from the Third Street Park and it's going to be a bowl, or different sculptures and different pieces like that, and whatever money that

Τ	generates is going to go back to the free committee.
2	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Very cool.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just some background, because
4	that happened when they came down last summer, or
5	whatever it was, and they've had this stuff for
6	almost a year now, but they've all finished it, and
7	now we're hauling the pieces back in.
8	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Very cool.
9	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Thanks.
LO	MAYOR HUBBARD: Sylvia, have you received
L1	anything back in yet?
L2	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, we have.
L3	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. So if you want a
L4	quick a sneak peek, she's got some pieces at
L 5	Village Hall now. But stuff is supposed to be coming
L6	in over the summer and a raffle or auction will be in
L7	the Fall.
L8	Okay. Anybody else want to address the Board?
L9	MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street.
20	A quick rhetorical question. You said about
21	ferry line starts here, ferry line starts you
22	know, I live over there and I can't remember what the
23	sign says, but who would say something? Mary Bess
24	says it's a State road, we all know it's a State
25	road. Do we hang banners and stuff that's

1	advertising this? If you were to put an
2	informational sign there, does the State even know
3	where Greenport is
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, there is
5	MR. SALADINO: to send somebody here to say,
6	"Hey, take that sign down"?
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Definitely.
8	MR. PROKOP: DOT would.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: DOT, yeah.
10	MR. SALADINO: Really? And is there a big fine
11	involved?
12	MR. PROKOP: They'll be driving through to look
13	at something else.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.
15	MR. SALADINO: Anyway, you know, it seems
16	like or put a sandwich board sign, like, "Fire
17	Boat tour, don't turn here."
18	(Laughter)
19	You know, it just seems kind of simple
20	sometimes.
21	But the other thing I would like to mention is
22	we mentioned about the minutes, and I'm almost
23	positive the Board knows, perhaps for the public that
24	doesn't know, I had an email chain going with Mayor
25	Hubbard and some members of the Board. I think

1	verbatim minutes, I think it's I'm here, I hear
2	everything you guys say, so I kind of know what's in
3	the minutes and but for the people that aren't
4	here, I always advocate for the guy that's not here.
5	You know, a lot of people follow through the minutes,
6	they follow what's going on and what interests them,
7	and because a lot times the press is not extent,
8	their coverage isn't as extensive as what's in the
9	minutes, and what's going on, and the nuances and
10	stuff. So I would be I don't know if anybody
11	suggested it, because Billy was talking, I couldn't
12	hear, abolishing verbatim minutes, but I would be
13	totally against that.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, that was not what was
15	being suggested.
16	MR. SWISKEY: It wasn't?
17	MR. SALADINO: Then good.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, that's not what was
19	being suggested.
20	MR. SALADINO: Then good.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What I'm suggesting with
22	that is that we need to look at it, we need to look
23	at the cost, and we need to review the Board policy
24	that was set back in 2007, because we have issues of
25	timing, and things have changed over the years, so

1	it's time to look at that. That was not advocating
2	getting rid of verbatim
3	MR. SALADINO: I didn't say I said I wasn't
4	sure.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I just wanted to clarify
6	that, that's all.
7	MR. SALADINO: And as far as as far as
8	timing, somebody had said, you know I think it was
9	Daniel Webster, or maybe somebody else, you know,
LO	because you think the law unjust. Because a law is
L1	unjust, it doesn't cease to be a law. It's 14 days
L 2	to get the minutes. I understand sometimes it's a
L3	hardship. I don't know the solution to it. Like we
L4	hear other places, you don't like the law, change the
L 5	law. But until you change the law, it's 14 days.
L6	For eight years, the CEO of this corporation,
L7	the Mayor of this corporation, the head of this
L8	corporation, had a mind set, had an attitude of not
L9	sharing as much as people would have liked. As the
20	CEO, that goes down the line to everybody that works
21	for him. Sometimes the public sees that, you know.
22	And if the mind set or the attitude has changed,
23	good. If it hasn't, maybe it should. So that's kind
24	of like what I have to say about the minutes.
25	The other thing, you were talking about

Ţ	parking. I would like to bring up boat parking.
2	I this has been my pet peeve for years, since
3	we've had the Marina. We're in the boat-parking
4	business and then we have a dock that we let people
5	park for free. I just I don't get it, I don't get it
6	Saturday I picked up somebody from the
7	Jittney
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Visitors Dock.
9	MR. SALADINO: The Visitors Dock. Saturday I
10	picked up somebody from the Jitney, there was five
11	boats there. Plus the Visitors Dock is supposed to
12	be under 22 feet. Every boat there was 30 feet or
13	over, there was five boats. I dropped that person
14	off again at 5:30 at the Jitney and there was six
15	boats there.
16	Claudio's Sag Harbor charges \$1.50 a foot
17	for four hours. Claudio's charges \$1 a foot for
18	three hours. If the Village charged the same as
19	Claudio's, you're talking 450, \$500 for three hours;
20	six hours, it's \$1,000. People say, well, you

at the Visitors Dock. It's just -- it just amazes me that we're willing to throw away -- we'll debate about stuff that costs almost nothing, and then

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know -- and I was in the Marina that day. There was

nine boats in the Marina, six of them parked for free

\$2,000 on a weekend in a 10 or 12-week season could pay for a new daycare center. We wouldn't have had to close the daycare center. You know, it could have been -- I just don't understand. And it's cost-effective.

You pay the kids in the marina nine bucks an hour, eight bucks an hour. If you sat there for six hours, you know, it's 60, \$70. You give them an umbrella and a thermos of lemonade and, you know, make the Village, you know, seven, 800, \$1,000, especially during Maritime Festival, especially during Tall Ships. You're going to have to beat them off that dock with a stick to get them away from there, that and Bay Avenue also. That's what I'm -- about that.

And the last thing is -- no Tall Ships, I'm not going to talk about Tall Ships, but I'm going to kind of refer to them. At the last Tall Ship Festival, when it was over, the previous Mayor said they're going to use it as a model for the Maritime Festival, that's going to be the model for the Maritime Festival. What was the debt? Okay, you know, that's good. But I would just like to -- I would just like to see you guys -- the sponsor is -- the sponsor is the Seaport Museum. And two years ago, it changed

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from the -- or three years ago, it changed from the Seaport Museum, only because it's coming, only because as soon as the Tall Ship is over, we're going to start talking about the Maritime Festival. sponsors have changed, and it was the Seaport Museum and the BID, the BID. And then they had input on who could be in the streets, who couldn't be in the streets, how nautically related it should be, and how many corn dog sellers we should allow. You know, to me, it was like who cares. The guy pays his rent. If he makes a profit, he makes a profit. doesn't make a profit, he doesn't come back the next You know, the Village shouldn't be worrying about how much profit a guy makes renting a 10-foot square booth on Front Street. But what I would like to see is, is that the taxpayer share it. The Seaport Museum gets its Operating Budget. The merchants get to put a down payment on the savings, and the taxpayers get nothing.

I talked to four or five municipalities -well, I talked to people from four or five different
municipalities that have festivals. They have no
problem with the municipality charging for a vendor's
license, a vendor's fee; not a lot, \$25. If you

taxpayers get nothing.

charge \$300 for three days for a vendor to set up on Front Street, and not the merchants, not the merchants, just outside vendors, and you get 100 vendors, you're talking about for the Village for the those three days \$5,000. That could be used to paint the daycare center.

I just don't understand why it's -- the general population is never taken into consideration. It's like, "Well, we've got to do this for the merchants to help them," and that's a good -- that's noble, we should do that, but the residents have given up their streets, their convenience. They should share in the profit, they should share in the bounty.

So Joe would know better than anybody here, I'm guessing. If -- you know, for the Seaport Museum to charge \$100 a day for a table, for the Village to say, "Well, we would like some kind of vendor licensed," \$25, or \$50, whatever it is. If you're coming from Babylon, if you're coming from up-Island someplace to participate in the Maritime Festival, to set up a booth and sell flutes, or Pashminas, or whatever you're going to sell, candy or jelly, whatever you -- whatever they sell, whatever they sell is fine with me, I don't care, some guy's not going to not come here for an extra \$25. Some guy or

1	some person is not going to come here and not set up
2	their booth because the Village is going to charge
3	them a couple of bucks to do that.
4	And again, I want to reiterate, because I don't
5	want any merchants here? I don't want any
6	merchants like getting angry with me.
7	(Laughter)
8	Not the merchants. Not the merchants, not
9	their booths in front of their stores. They could
10	square that away with the Seaport Museum and the BID
11	or whoever. Just the outside, the guys that live on
12	the other side of Seventh Sixth Street, you know.
13	Thanks for listening.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you, John.
15	MR. WINKLER: Good evening. John Winkler, 175
16	Fifth Street.
17	On a positive note, I want to compliment the
18	Board on all the work that's been done down at Fifth
19	Street Park. It's really looking good, and I
20	appreciate all the efforts from Paul and the Board.
21	I want to discuss Third Street Park a little
22	bit. I have a little experience in improving parks
23	in Greenport, being my wife and a friend of ours have
24	spent a lot of time on Fifth Street Park. Third
25	Street Park can be very there are plenty of

merchants and there are plenty of landscapers that would help us with the Third Street Park. They did it down at Fifth Street, no charge. I had S & L come in, put a sprinkler system in in the whole park for no money but material. We can do the same thing with Third Street Park. There's got to be a front person, and I would be willing to help anybody who wants to help me, one of the Trustees, or whatever. We could go to Riverhead Lumber, we could get the posts, we could get the -- you know, just like Fifth Street Park. They'd probably donate it to us. They did it for the Skate Park. They used to donate the plywood to repair the Skate Park back in the day.

Chris Moore, who is another guy from -- he's volunteering next year to do all the winterization of Fifth Street Park for all the plants for nothing, because he tried to do a bid on it and he has to charge prevailing rate, and couldn't do it, couldn't afford it. But, fortunately, we have funds donated by the residents that we were able to pay another -- another person less money to do the job. The same thing affected -- happened at the Third Street Park.

All we need is somebody to step up and go out there and get some help. It's not a hard thing to do. I've never been turned down from anybody I've

L	asked to help us, okay, especially with the kids.
2	You could see it with the Skate Park. It's an easy
3	thing to do. It just takes a little time to go
1	around and talk to people and ask, okay? So that
5	would solve that problem.

Then there's a question. I was on the GIC for a little while, and all these things you're talking about, the Seaport Museum, I got all these prices already. I mean, I had a contractor come in for sandblasting the place. I had an HVAC contractor come in and give us prices on the HVAC. I don't know what happened here with the Seaport getting involved, because that was one of the GIC's projects. And after I left the GIC, it seemed to just fall off. But it's already been done, I've got all the estimates. And I don't know why it's just sitting there, but --

TRUSTEE ROBINS: This was mainly about the timeliness. The grant is due in a couple of days and nothing was happening with it, so -- and this part of the grant is only for remediation of the building, and it absolutely will work -- we're planning on working with the GIC.

MR. WINKLER: Well, I just don't understand how the GIC got out of it and the Seaport took it over.

1	That's my
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's not necessarily taking it
3	over, okay? He had an idea about a Police Museum
4	there. It's not take and it's a great was a
5	great idea.
6	MR. WINKLER: Yeah, well, that's that was
7	the discussion you had.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And it was simply a matter of
9	this grant was coming due
10	MR. WINKLER: I put the stuff in storage.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: and I didn't want us to
12	lose another year of opportunity. So that's why I
13	MR. WINKLER: Yeah, I understand. I
14	understand.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You know, that was where it
16	came from, that's all, John.
17	MR. WINKLER: Another question I have, I think
18	at the last meeting Trustee Phillips mentioned about
19	closing out the Jail I mean the Schoolhouse, that
20	we had money that we had to spend. I remember being
21	at a GIC meeting. We were paying Gail Horton to do
22	oral history of the Schoolhouse. Whatever happened
23	to that?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: She's turned it over to
25	Michelle Schott to start doing. She we discussed

1	it with her.
2	MR. WINKLER: Okay.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. She did some of it.
4	MR. WINKLER: Okay.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But she's involved now with
6	the anniversary for the Town of Southold. So we
7	discussed Michelle Schott has been in contact with
8	her, as well as David Corwin and the Stirling
9	Historical Society. And in order to move this
10	forward, that's one of the it's to move it forward
11	so it's not sitting still anymore, okay? But there's
12	been much discussion with the School, with the
13	Library. The Floyd Memorial Library is going to be
14	leading this new grant application that Michelle
15	Schott is putting together, and that's where that's
16	headed.
17	There's been no slights for Gail Horton. She's
18	very much aware that this is going on.
19	MR. WINKLER: No, that's not
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This is to get it this is
21	to get it
22	MR. WINKLER: I was under the impression that
23	money was done, we had to close that out a while ago.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: She didn't finish no, no,
25	no. What it is, is she didn't finish the project and

1	we had that money left over from all the volunteer
2	hours that we got credit for for the Schoolhouse.
3	That was part of the grant money that wasn't spent on
4	materials, or it was it was available because
5	people like you, and Tom Payne, and a few other
6	people, the volunteer hours counted as money, okay?
7	MR. WINKLER: Okay. During my time on the GIC,
8	we had looked for the final finances for the
9	Schoolhouse, and we got this like preliminary budget
10	that was what the Village spent on the Schoolhouse.
11	And there was a lot of like very like we bought
12	six TVs, and we didn't buy six TVs. And so that was
13	supposed to be just like a preliminary audit or
14	something?
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, you're talking about the
16	original budget that went in that you saw?
17	MR. WINKLER: Yeah.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's not
19	MR. WINKLER: Has that ever been finalized?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's not what the
21	finalization was. There were several budget
22	modifications.
23	MR. WINKLER: Yeah.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If you want, I will get
25	you

1	MR. WINKLER: Is there a final?
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. I will get you a copy
3	of the closeout, okay? That's where it will also
4	explain the volunteer hours
5	MR. WINKLER: Okay.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: and why we have money
7	left to continue with the interpretive center and the
8	oral history, okay?
9	MR. WINKLER: Great. I appreciate to see that.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
11	MR. WINKLER: Thank you so much.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And as far as the Jailhouse,
13	in all honesty, I was just as surprised as you were.
14	MR. WINKLER: Yeah. That was a
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, that's something that
16	hopefully the grant is successful, and it will
17	MR. WINKLER: That would be great, the grant.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: involve the original
19	concepts for GIC, which was to put it back to being a
20	Police Museum.
21	MR. WINKLER: Thank you so much.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're welcome.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
24	MR. SWISKEY: I'm getting old, George.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: I know, been sitting too long,

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MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. William Swiskey, 184 Fifth Street.

First thing I'd like to say is, George, you know, we can afford to put a fence around Third Street Park. Why don't we just have Paul go tomorrow, call three vendors and see what they want. You could pass it at the -- you know, let's get it done. I've heard too much discussion. I would ask each -- you know, put it on the agenda, let the Trustees vote on it, and let's get it done. And if there's a few other things, I mean, you're not talking a whole lot of money. Let's just get these things.

You know, I've started to hear tonight about like committees and grants. Well, some things just have to get done. It's like the three roads or four roads that got done. They were talked about during the election. Next thing you know, they were done. Well, we don't need a big study to find the next roads to fix. Try Third Street, like from Front Street down to Center Street, South Street, say from Fourth Avenue down to the -- you know, send your people out, let them come back. Maybe not the next meeting, but the next work session say, "These are

1	the next three streets we got, this is how long they
2	are," and see if we can fit it into the budget.
3	Let's just get things done.
4	And there's a new neighbor moved onto Fifth
5	Street, so I went to the party. You know, I was
6	discussing with you know, I was discussing with
7	some of the people down there about Fifth Street
8	Park. We actually should have a shade arbor down
9	there; doesn't cost that much. We either need to get
LO	the plans from the Town for the one they used at
L1	you know, the old Jack
L2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Town Jack Shack.
L3	MR. SWISKEY: Jack Shack, yeah, you know, the
L4	Town beach, okay? Let's get those plans from them.
L5	It's not that much money, and I'll wager we could get
L6	a group to put one together. And that, and plus, we
L7	already authorized the money for the basketball
L8	court, right?
L9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.
20	MR. SWISKEY: Let's just tell the guy to go
21	there and do it.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: That's been talked about there
23	It's in the process. It was just
24	MR. PALLAS: Difficulty getting the bids back.
25	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. The one company

1	MR. SWISKEY: What we need is to just get it
2	done, push it.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: I agree with you, Bill. I've
4	been trying to push it and getting stuff, just take
5	it off the back burner and put it to the front, and
6	just get them done and check it off.
7	MR. SWISKEY: The shade arbor, we can get these
8	things done.
9	And as far as Third Street Park, a few more
10	pieces of playground equipment, the fence, you know,
11	a water fountain, I don't know if you want to
12	consider a real bathroom or not there, but a few more
13	picnic benches there. And at Sixth Beach and
14	garbage cans, that stuff, for less than 10 or \$15,000
15	and it's there, we could get it done.
16	Oh, and there's one more item here, it has to
17	do with the Carousel. Now I remember how many
18	doors on the Carousel are actually working?
19	MR. PALLAS: Well, when they get finished, by
20	Friday, there'll be four sets working.
21	MR. SWISKEY: How many sets were working before
22	they arrived?
23	MR. PALLAS: One, maybe two.
24	MR. SWISKEY: I could remember months ago, and
25	I don't know, I guess people that were sitting on

1	this Board can remember, because I made a comment
2	about it, but just people were complaining that work
3	there about how bad a shape it was getting in. And I
4	asked the Mayor at that time, and I mentioned it,
5	that the doors didn't work, and I got an answer from
6	him that every door worked and it was backed up by
7	some people. So I don't think you should go around
8	lying to the public about this. And that really
9	ticks me off, because none of those doors worked, and
10	it's about time we got them fixed. They should have
11	been fixed a year ago. I mean, this we don't want
12	to go back to what was in the previous
13	administration. Let's go with the honesty. Let's go
14	tell Paul to get the bids for the fence. Let's get
15	the fence up, and go get at the shade arbor. And
16	thank you.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: You're welcome. Just to
18	clarify that, Bill, the picnic tables, two for the
19	Skate Park, two for Fifth Street, and two for Third
20	Street. It's supposed to be delivered hopefully next
21	week. They said we should have it by Fourth of July.
22	MR. SWISKEY: And more garbage cans, too,
23	George.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
25	MR. SWISKEY: Because people don't leave these

1	messes. They leave these messes next to the garbage
2	cans because they're full.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.
4	MR. SWISKEY: Unless we're going to have them
5	picked up twice day, we need more cans.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: They're working on that, they
7	have been. Okay.
8	MR. SWISKEY: Thank you.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Thank you. Is
10	there anybody else who wishes to address the Board?
11	(No Response)
12	All right. I'll offer a motion to go into a
13	brief Executive Session at 10:15.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll second it.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Seconded. All in favor?
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
18	TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.
21	We're going into Executive Session for a
22	personnel issue.
23	(Whereupon, the meeting was adjourned to
24	executive session at 10:15 p.m.)
