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(Whereupon, the meeting was called to order 1 2 at 6:03 p.m.) MAYOR NYCE: I will call this meeting to 3 order. Please rise and join me for the Pledge of 4 5 Allegiance. (Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of 6 7 Allegiance.) MAYOR NYCE: Thanks. You may be seated. 8 9 This is the July 21st work session for the 10 Board of Trustees. Our first monthly report is usually from 11 12 the Fire Department. I do not see the Chief 13 here. 14 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Sylvia's here. 15 MAYOR NYCE: Sylvia has been elected Chief of the Department? 16 17 CLERK PIRILLO: No.

18	MAYOR NYCE: Oh.
19	CLERK PIRILLO: The Chief had a medical
20	situation this afternoon and wasn't sure if he
21	would make it back or not.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
23	CLERK PIRILLO: So asked that I please give
24	his report in his absence if he didn't make it.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

1	CLERK PIRILLO: So here we are. I don't
2	know if I can answer any questions that you might
3	have, but I do, of course, have some add-ons,
4	because that's my job.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
6	CLERK PIRILLO: The Board would like to
7	hire Jessica DeMartino as secretary as a
8	replacement for Mary Given. Her pay rate would
9	be 12.50 per hour, not to exceed 17 1/2 hours per
10	week.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
12	CLERK PIRILLO: The Board of Wardens also
13	would like to notify this Board that they would

14	go —— they would like to explore the
15	possibilities of going out to bid for a new
16	pumper.

17 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 18 CLERK PIRILLO: They'd like to replace 19 their oldest pumper, which I believe is 28 years 20 old. Normally, they're on a 20-year rotation. Out of deference to the Chiefs, it is suggested, 21 22 since they are all new in their positions, that we would like as our management staff to meet 23 24 with the Chiefs to guide them through the 25 process. It is a major purchase.

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1 MAYOR NYCE: Sure. 2 CLERK PIRILLO: So, if that's okay with the Board, we'd like to do that. 3 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, absolutely. Absolutely. 4 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Did they give you a copy 5 6 of the bid specs? 7 CLERK PIRILLO: Not yet. TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay, because he 8 wanted -- I asked Harry last night to give that 9

10 to the Village Attorney to review it before they11 actually go out to do it.

12 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.

13 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay.

14 CLERK PIRILLO: He said that that would be 15 provided.

16 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay.

17 CLERK PIRILLO: We're expecting those

18 shortly.

19 MAYOR NYCE: There's one other thing that 20 has come up that I talked to George about. I 21 spoke to the Chief for about a year or so. The 22 gentleman who runs the facilities up at Peconic 23 Landing and I have been talking about doing a 24 storm management or a storm preparedness drill. 25 We were trying to get it to be a town-wide thing.

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1 That's been -- that's proven to be a little bit
2 more complicated than we could work out.
3 What we've decided to try and devise is a
4 Village-specific drill, and I talked to the Chief
5 about doing this. The idea is to make sure that

6 the Village can manage utilities, tie into the 7 shelter. We have a hospital and Peconic Landing 8 all very close by. We're going to reach out to 9 all of the Town emergency management facilities 10 as well. The idea is that we do a drill specific 11 to the Village, and then identify where the 12 interface to the Town would be.

13 At this point, what we're looking to do is 14 meet with that group in early August, do a white 15 board drill the end of August, or early 16 September, and then potentially a live drill in 17 late Fall, if we can pull it together while the weather is still decent. If not, it would wait 18 19 until the next Spring. The idea is that ongoing, 20 year by year, we could prepare different 21 scenarios and different drills for all of the 22 Village crews and emergency response crews and 23 our Emergency Management Team. So we're going to 24 be looking to do that in the next -- in the next 25 month or so. Letters should be going out. It's

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a joint letter from Peconic Landing and the

2	Village as an invite to all of those people that
3	are involved in emergency management. So just to
4	bring you all up to date. I did speak to the
5	Chief about it. He's the Department is
6	interested and they like the idea. As everyone
7	says, the more we drill, the better and the more
8	prepared.
9	Were there any questions on the Fire
10	Department's report?
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Dave, they don't have
12	any agenda items that they need to post, other
13	than dealing with the pumper?
14	MAYOR NYCE: No, just accepting reports and
15	those two that
16	CLERK PIRILLO: Accepting reports, and the
17	hiring of Jessica DeMartino right now.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But there's no
19	other
20	CLERK PIRILLO: No.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: resolutions that need
22	to go on other than those two?
23	CLERK PIRILLO: No.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. No
25	amendments, or that's in Robert's department,

1	amendments
2	CLERK PIRILLO: Budget modifications would
3	be with the Treasurer.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Budget modification would be
5	under the Treasurer. Well, thank you for
6	standing in for the Chief.
7	TRUSTEE MURRAY: How about the boat, is it
8	going to get fixed?
9	CLERK PIRILLO: The Fire Boat?
10	TRUSTEE MURRAY: The Fire Boat.
11	MAYOR NYCE: I think they're looking to
12	replace
13	CLERK PIRILLO: To replace it.
14	MAYOR NYCE: They're looking to replace the
15	boat.
16	TRUSTEE MURRAY: They're looking to replace
17	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
18	CLERK PIRILLO: Yup.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. Thanks.
20	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
21	MAYOR NYCE: So our next report, then, is
22	from Village Administrator, Paul Pallas. I think

it.

23	we're starting with the Utilities, and then
24	moving to Building and Recreation.
25	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Thank you, Mayor and

Board. Yeah, I have -- I have a number of -- a couple of discussion topics, but I thought I'd hold those until after the individual department reports. I think it would just flow a little better.

First, as I had promised, that I would 6 7 consolidate some of these reports and make the 8 format similar for each department, so at least 9 when you're looking through them, you've got, you 10 know, some consistency in what you're looking at; 11 try to keep statistics at the front end, some, 12 you know, relevant reporting and informational 13 type stuff, and then some real detail at the end. 14 That's kind of the general format that I've been 15 following for all the departments.

Again, if there's any changes you'd like to see to make it more readable for you, just please let me know and I'll -- we'll certainly endeavor

19 to get those changes implemente	19	to g	get	those	changes	imp	lemente
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20	Going through each department, the Road
21	Department, you could see the statistics there,
22	nothing, nothing out of the ordinary.
23	I would like to point out a couple of
24	things, though, in the Tasks Accomplished section
25	that I thought should be noted. The one,

although small, the replacement of a water
fountain at the Third Street Park, that was a
result of some Health Department issues that they
had. And my understanding is it's been pending
for a little while, so we kind of took care of
that as soon as we realized what was going on
there.

8 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Also, the --10 watering the planters around the Village, again, 11 a small item, but we had worked -- the BID had 12 done that in the past. We worked with the BID on 13 that, too, so that our folks could do it. And 14 we're sharing the cost of that so that there's no

15	issues	on	keeping	everyt	thing	looking	good	
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16 MAYOR NYCE: Excellent.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- rather than
letting them dry out and them not getting to it
and we not getting to it.

The other thing here is talking -- is under the Projects, talking about garbage cans that are around the Village. We've done some painting, we've bought some new. I thought the ones that were painted came out really well, that the white and green I think look really good. We still

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1	should be looking to purchase additional. I'm
2	going to look to see whether we have the funding
3	for that for this year or not and try to get them
4	in place sooner, rather than later.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, I just have one
6	question.
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The garbage cans that
9	you're talking about now, are you just talking
10	about down in the Business District, or are you

11	talking about Village at other facilities, i.e.
12	Third Street Park, Fifth Street Park?
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Wherever we've
14	kind of gotten down to a point where we need 20
15	to replace what we have.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And it would include
18	everywhere, not just
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. It would
20	include okay.
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. We're going
22	to try to paint some, replace some. If they can
23	be salvaged, we will salvage them. If not,
24	they'll just be outright replaced.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So let's say, for

instance, on some of the beaches, if they need to
 add an extra can or two because it's -- you know,
 what's down there isn't working, is that also in
 the works?
 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's all I want to
9	know.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I mean, there'd
11	be I know at the Fifth Street Beach, there's
12	an issue there. And, you know, it probably
13	should have another one anyway, but we also need
14	to step up a little bit on collection as well.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I saw that
17	personally, so, yes.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Moving on to the
20	Sewer Department, again, statistics are what they
21	are, nothing exciting there.
22	In the report section under Treatment,
23	there was a some pump issues that we had last
24	month, and pump for the return, activated sludge
25	system was rebuilt and a spare grinder was

installed. The effluent pump, that should have
 said after the pump, was checked as part of the

3 PM. We're going to have maintenance procedures. It needed some outer seals and whatnot. These 4 5 pumps happen to still be under warranty, so there 6 should be no cost to us, but we're working with 7 the vendor on that. 8 We also have replaced the gratings on the 9 UV filters to cover them to minimize the amount 10 of algae, and when we put it in, it will stop the growth of algae, it will minimize the growth of 11 12 algae ---13 MAYOR NYCE: Right. 14 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- which saves us in 15 some labor costs as well. MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 16 17 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The big item is this 18 aerator system for the sludge holding tank. 19 MAYOR NYCE: Right. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As had been reported, we 21 had looked at a couple of systems, they were in 22 the \$30,000 range. We found a slightly different 23 system and it's only around 18,000. It's still a 24 lot of money, but will do the job for significantly less. And it has some unique 25

1	characteristics. It essentially just it's an
2	automated system that floats in the tank and
3	actually has the ability to keep itself clean.
4	It will reverse its direction if it gets clogged,
5	so that it's a fairly well automated system.
6	We're going to purchase the system and
7	install it ourselves. It's a fairly simple thing
8	to install, with the exception of some of the
9	electrical work that's required, that we'll hire
10	an outside firm. But the material cost for that
11	is around 18,000.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Can I just ask a quick
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because I know after the
16	last regular Board meeting, you and I I don't
17	know if the rest of the Board got a complaint
18	from the same people down in the area that we
19	were getting the complaint. Is that
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: This will take care
21	of that.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That will take care of
23	that? Okay.

24	ADMINISTRATOR	PALLAS:	The goal, the goal
25	of the system is to	take care	e of that problem.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's what I 2 thought. 3 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes, absolutely. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I just wanted to 4 5 make sure, because I did get another email 6 complaint because of the odor situation. 7 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes, yes. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 8 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And the collection 10 system, the Sixth Street Pump Station, as you can 11 see, were beginning to fail. They were -- one 12 pump was taken out, a rebuilt spare was put in 13 its place. 14 MAYOR NYCE: Right. 15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: After that one is rebuilt, then the second pump will be rebuilt as 16 17 a spare. 18 MAYOR NYCE: Right. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So we'll still have 19

20 the two pumps, plus a spare.

At the Central Pumping Station, one of the pumps -- one of the two large pumps will be -- is in need of rebuilding, and that's going to -- it should hold for the summer and they'll rebuild it at the end of the season.

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1 MAYOR NYCE: 0kay. 2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Claudio's pump 3 station, the generator switchgear failure alarm, 4 it had burnt out circuit boards. Some switches 5 had burnt as well. The parts and labor for that 6 will be around three -- a little over \$3,000. 7 We've ordered the parts and it will be installed 8 upon arrival. 9 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Just so you're aware, that it can be started manually in case 11 12 the power goes out. So it's not that it doesn't work, it's the starting, so the automated 13 starting system on that. 14 15 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a question,
17	because I haven't seen the name recently, but
18	Cliffside, is that pump situation all
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I would have to say
20	yes, because I haven't heard about it myself, so.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Last time I talked to Ray, he
22	said it was operating normally.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just haven't
24	heard anything about it. It's not been mentioned
25	for a while, so I was just wondering.

1	TRUSTEE MURRAY: It's a good thing.
2	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know. That's what I'm
4	saying, it's a good thing, but I just
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's exactly why I
6	said it, it must be good.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: If there was a
9	problem, Ray would have certainly told me, he
10	never hesitates.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But no. But

12	that one was a problem to begin with.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's why I'm
15	asking.
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right. Under the
17	Building Department, just, again, a couple of
18	highlights. The fees collected
19	MAYOR NYCE: Electrical Department?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Electric.
21	MAYOR NYCE: You skipped Electric.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Oh, I'm sorry.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Electric.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's after that?

25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Oh. Well, I have

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1	some items. Again, most of these are fairly
2	straightforward. There's nothing in here that
3	struck me as I have some other comments about
4	that during regular comments.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
6	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There's a few things
7	in there. We're still working on certain items

8 for the Suffolk County Department of Health. 9 That's all going according to plan. Nothing --10 again, nothing exciting on most of that. There 11 are some highlights I will talk about in a little 12 bit.

13 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

14 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm sorry. The Building Department, fees collected, a little 15 16 over \$6,000. One item that has come up is a lot 17 of municipalities do have a fee schedule for more 18 intensive review of plans, for plan review work. 19 And we're going to be recommending to the Code 20 Committee that perhaps that's something that should be looked at. I just wanted the Village 21 22 Board to be aware that we're going to be making that recommendation to the Code Committee. 23 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You mean, you're 25 speaking about this first item here about the

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1	Ansell systems and the fire?
2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes, yeah. Some of
3	these things can the review itself can be

4	pretty intense, take a lot of time, so and a
5	lot of municipalities have a different fee
6	schedule for buildings that require that,
7	depending on the size of the system, and it's
8	somewhat variable. We're only just getting
9	started with looking at what other municipalities
10	do and what the fees are.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So we're not
12	going to be doing duplication of inspection as
13	MAYOR NYCE: No.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
15	MAYOR NYCE: This will be changing the fee
16	schedule.
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's just a fee
18	schedule change.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, to change the fee
20	schedule. Okay. Just for fee, okay.
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Just for the fee
22	schedule for the review, for the code review
23	piece.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're not getting into
25	where we're going to be going in

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: doing the inspection
3	of that?
4	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No.
5	MAYOR NYCE: No.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I wanted to
7	double-check.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No. The next note
9	there about the rental code, it's not it's not
10	worded well. We're not looking for Village Board
11	approval. There is a couple of items that I'm
12	actually reviewing in terms of the letters and
13	administrative issues, and that's really what has
14	been by here approval for myself, and, actually,
15	I have to run it by the Village Attorney as well.
16	So that once that's done, then we can rule that
17	out.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The other next
20	item is the there's a couple of Village-owned
21	properties, and, I'm sorry, I don't know the
22	exact locations, but there is adjacent neighbors
23	that are actually using it for storage, for lack
24	of a better description. We believe that if we

1 split-rail fence, at least a demarcation of where 2 their property is and our property is. We can 3 purchase the material and we'll have our crews install it, just a simple split-rail fence. 4 5 We're in the process of getting estimates, and 6 we'll be able to put that in place once we get the material. 7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, how about the 8 9 removal of the debris that's there right now? 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We keep it -- we 11 have been successful in getting the owners to 12 remove it. But no sooner does it get removed 13 that it gets put back. 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. 15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So we'll try to get it removed, get the fence in right away. 16 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And then, hopefully, 18 that will stem it a little bit, we hope. 19 20 MAYOR NYCE: After what period of time does

21	it become our property if it's on our property?
22	(Laughter)
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are you looking for
24	something in particular?
25	MAYOR NYCE: No. Just a little heads-up

1	to, you know, if you're replacing it.
2	<pre>MR. PROKOP: It's technically abandoned,</pre>
3	right. You know, when somebody puts something on
4	our property, it's technically abandoned, so it
5	becomes our property right away.
6	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
7	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Excuse me. Can you speak
8	into the microphone?
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Oh, I'm sorry, I
10	thought I was.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is it on, Paul?
12	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, it's on. I
13	apologize.
14	The last item there is the a training
15	was held for two of our personnel for the it's
16	called the Geographical Imaging System, commonly

17 referred to as GIS. It's a -- the training was 18 part of a grant that the Town of Southold -- we 19 share with the Town of Southold for a GIS system. 20 We're still exploring how robust the system is. 21 My initial look at it and my initial discussion 22 was that it was a fairly simple system. But, 23 upon further review, it does appear that we can 24 get all of our facilities mapped into this one 25 system.

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1 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And it's the same 3 system that actually we had used in where I was, 4 previously worked, and it was a very good system. 5 A little complex at first to learn, but once you learn it, it becomes pretty straightforward. A 6 7 different process than a CAD System, Computer-Aided Drafting. This is done on what's 8 9 called a geodatabase. I don't even know what 10 that means, but that's what it's called. So it's 11 tagged to a location. All the stuff you map is 12 tagged to a location, as opposed to, you know,

13 just a drawing, if you will.

14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, is that similar to
15	the Google Maps and Bing Maps kind of thing?
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I think so. I know
17	it can be linked to those.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So it must be done
20	the same way.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So, yeah.
23	MAYOR NYCE: I think the end result for
24	this is that we can have both the pole maps, the
25	sewer maps, all of those listed on a GIS, and

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1	then those will be available to the crews via
2	laptop while they're out in the field, so rather
3	than having to come back and look at the
4	individual maps. It's going to take some time,
5	I'm assuming, to download the hard copies that we
6	have and get them mapped into the system.
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. You really
8	have to you really have to start from scratch.

9 You just can't take, unfortunately, what we have.

10 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

11 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's fairly labor 12 intensive to set it up, but once it is set up --13 and you can do it in pieces, you don't have to do 14 everything at once.

15 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

16 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You know, you get the poles and the wires first, and then, you 17 know, work your way down to transformer switches, 18 19 fuses. And you can -- you know, on the system 20 itself, you can literally just point at it and it 21 brings up a drop-down box that tells you all the 22 equipment that's physically there, whether it be 23 on the electric side, or the water side, or the 24 sewer side. I believe that's -- we have -- this 25 will have that capability.

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MAYOR NYCE: That's good.
 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's the one piece
 that I'm not certain of yet.
 MAYOR NYCE: Obviously, the most critical

5 is the stuff that's buried --

6 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right. 7 MAYOR NYCE: -- that we rely on either the 8 knowledge of the crew leader --9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right. 10 MAYOR NYCE: -- you know, to remember where the stuff is, because a lot of it's sort of 11 hand-drawn. Whatever else that we can get that 12 as accurately in there as possible, that would be 13 extremely helpful. 14 15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The last area is 16 Recreation. We'll start with the Marina. For 17 June, the revenues were up by almost 10 -- a little over \$9,000 to 66,654.88. A lot of this 18 19 is due to some -- to one particular large boat that was there for the month of June. But we 20 21 have noticed that there seems to be an increase 22 in the larger boats, but, unfortunately, a commensurate decrease with the smaller boats. 23 24 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. 25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: On balance, it

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1 actually still garners us more revenue. But we 2 have talked with some of the other marinas around 3 and they're experiencing similar -- the same 4 thing. We don't know why, but --5 MAYOR NYCE: Higher fuel costs? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I guess. I don't --6 yeah, we believe it's got to be economic. 7 If 8 it's universal everywhere, then it's got to be 9 economics, economically driven. I just wanted to, you know, point that out. 10 11 In terms, again, of highlights, Seacoast 12 Marine did finish up the East Pier project just 13 before the Fourth of July weekend. It really did make a big difference. I don't know if anybody's 14 15 been out -- was out there before and after. I 16 know when I was out there before, it was a little 17 shaky at best. Now, even in a good wind and when 18 good sized boats go by, the wakes, you can't even 19 feel it move. There's still a little bit more to 20 We could wait until the Spring, some do. 21 cross-bracing underneath, and we will bring that 22 up again in the Spring at this point. MAYOR NYCE: Excellent. 23 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We did add another 24 25 dumpster as a minor item. But, again, in terms

1 of keeping the area clean, that has helped a 2 little bit to keep the area around the marina 3 clean. The Camera Obscura is operational. 4 In terms of the Rec. Center --5 MAYOR NYCE: Paul, just to back up, we're 6 7 also looking to in the Fall do substantial work at the Railroad as well? 8 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. MAYOR NYCE: Right? 10 11 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. 12 MAYOR NYCE: We were waiting until after 13 fishing season to --14 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct, correct. 15 That has been on the list. 16 The Rec. Center, we have 80 kids enrolled there. We had a -- someone from the Cornell 17 Cooperative Extension give a talk to the children 18 19 about healthy eating, good nutrition. It's a 20 good program. We would like to extend it a 21 little longer next year, so we'll look to do

22 that.

23	We did have the Health Department
24	inspection, both this was, obviously, the
25	report for June. It was unannounced

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27

inspection will occur in July that did occur.
 I'm waiting for a formal report from the
 Department Health, but my understanding is there
 were only some very minor items cited, nothing - nothing egregious, just simple, simple things.
 MAYOR NYCE: Good.

7 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The campground, 8 we're 100% occupancy for the last two weeks of June, and for July and August, so that's a good 9 thing on that. The Strawberry Festival was a 10 11 slight decrease in occupancy, but some people 12 stayed longer than normal. So on balance, again, it's probably financially the same. Estimated 13 14 revenues for the three months, May, June and 15 July, is 43,000.

16 That's it on the formal reports. Just a17 couple of discussion items or comments just as

18 general items.

19	The one thing I will say, the Skate Park is
20	will be nearly ready, but will definitely be
21	ready for Sunday. You know, we put in a lot
22	of effort went into that in a short amount of
23	time. I do would like to point out, Derryl
24	Baumer was exceptional in making sure everything
25	was being coordinated and contractors weren't

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1	tripping on each other. I think as of today, the
2	paving is done. The fence should be done. The
3	painting will be done tomorrow. There was almost
4	nothing
5	MAYOR NYCE: Derryl was very happy today.
6	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. Yes, he was a
7	lot less stressed. So I think we're in good
8	shape for that as well, so.
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. I stopped up there
10	when I got home and it looks very good.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, I noticed it
12	this morning.
13	MAYOR NYCE: The pavement, I saw it torn

14 out over the weekend.

15	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. They also did the
16	apron going into the ball fields.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, great.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
19	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The apron is done.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did they? Oh, okay.
21	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The apron is done, it's
22	all roped off.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, good.
24	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So they did a very nice
25	job, it looks good.

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1 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. I'm actually 2 pleased with the progress, it does look really 3 good. MAYOR NYCE: Thank you, and thank Derryl as 4 well. 5 6 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I definitely will. MAYOR NYCE: I mean, I thanked him earlier, 7 8 and thanks to George, who is spearheading this. Thank you. 9

10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: In terms of our 11 Information Technology infrastructure, we are 12 working towards replacing our server. The 13 current server we have, both the physical device and the software that runs it, is outdated. We 14 15 can't get updates for it anymore, and it has to 16 be replaced. There's literally no choice at this It's really become a liability at this 17 stage. So we're working towards doing that. 18 stage. We're getting some costs for that. And, you 19 20 know, I think we're just going to go ahead and 21 move on that. The cost is not extreme, it's not 22 going to require a formal bidding or anything 23 like that. We can buy the material or the actual 24 physical equipment off the State contract at a 25 fairly good price. So I think we're in good

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1	shape on that as well.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Will we be able to get
3	that? Remember, we're supposed to have the
4	server not viewed to the public in this process?
5	MAYOR NYCE: As we're doing that, yeah,

6	we'll do the same thing, we'll screen it.
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. As part of
8	the process, we're going to relocate it.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I believe that was
11	the plan.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because that was part of
13	the Correction Action Plan
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: when the audit was
16	out here, what, two or three years ago?
17	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
18	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: In terms of the
19	power plant progress, I am quite happy to report
20	that the new substation transformer is carrying
21	load at this point.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
23	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We energized it last
24	week. It's only carrying the Power Plant load at
25	the moment. We do have some relay checks we're

1 still doing. We hope to have that completed by

2 the end of the week and actually carrying roughly 3 50% of the Village load by next week some time, 4 but it is carrying load. It's working fine, 5 there's no issues with it at all, so we're in good shape on that as well. Additionally ---6 7 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Can I just interrupt you for one --8 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm sorry. TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The Skate Park is all 10 roped off, so kids weren't supposed to be on 11 12 there. There's a whole bunch of them in there. Is there a problem with them using it this 13 14 evening? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'd really prefer if 15 16 they didn't. 17 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Right. Well, my wife saw 18 them up there. She went by to look at it. 19 She'll got back and just tell them to wait until 20 tomorrow. 21 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, I mean, at 22 least until tomorrow. 23 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. I didn't know if 24 Corazzini said when --25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.

1	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: to use it or not. I
2	wouldn't go.
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
4	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: They went through the
5	yellow tape to get inside to try to use the new
6	asphalt.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I hope the motorcyclist
8	didn't put his motorcycle in there, or whatever
9	he rides.
10	MAYOR NYCE: Well, I think you had
11	mentioned it at last month's meeting. The idea
12	is that we have the two transformers and we're
13	going to run each transformer will carry
14	approximately 50% of the load
15	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct.
16	MAYOR NYCE: at any given time.
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Each transformer can carry
19	full load, if necessary, but that is if they're
20	running.
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. Each the
22	design is that each transformer can carry the

23	full load, and each one, actually, has plenty of
24	room for growth.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Right.

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The load of the
2	Village is a little over seven, seven megawatts,
3	and the transformers are rated up to 10, so
4	there's plenty of room for growth on each.
5	And the in terms of the cooling tower,
6	which is the next big ticket item that we're
7	doing there, the plans are received and the bid
8	specs are received. We're going to put them out
9	on the street hopefully this week, at the latest
10	next week. Once we get all the upfront parts of
11	the specs together
12	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: we'll be issuing
14	that for bids.
15	MAYOR NYCE: And what do you anticipate as
16	the return date for that?
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's a fairly
18	large project. I would put it at three weeks,

19	just to make sure to give the contractor enough
20	time.
21	MAYOR NYCE: So we're looking at August at
22	the earliest.
23	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I would
24	MAYOR NYCE: Probably September is when we
25	would be awarding?

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I would possibly
2	at the August meeting, but it would need some
3	time for review.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Probably September, right.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: But probably
6	September.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's not an issue.
9	We're not going to take it out of service
10	until
11	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
12	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: after storm
13	season anyway.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Yup.

15	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So it gives us a
16	little bit of time to really schedule out the way
17	that we're doing that, so we keep at least one or
18	two units available during construction. But I'd
19	rather have all three of them available, if I
20	can.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So we're going to
23	wait until after storm season passes.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
25	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So that's it on

1 that. And the two items that I actually have on 2 the agenda, the -- an explanation of the PPA, 3 Purchase Power Adjustment, and Transmission 4 Congestion Contracts, I just thought it would be 5 a good idea to just kind of walk through the 6 process, kind of a high level of how that all 7 works.

8 Essentially, as I'm sure people know, but 9 I'll start from the beginning in any event, we 10 have a rate -- what's called base rates, which

11 covers some amount of our purchase costs, but 12 primarily it's for salaries, depreciation, the 13 cost of the equipment, basic costs that we have. 14 Again, in there are some basic costs of purchase 15 But when we get our monthly bill from the power. 16 Power Authority, which is where all of our energy comes from, all the billing for all of our energy 17 18 comes from the Power Authority, that's -- we 19 compare that to the base, and whatever the difference is on a per-kilowatt-hour basis, not 20 21 on a total dollar value, but on a dollars per 22 kilowatt hour, cents per kilowatt hour, that's 23 what ends up as the Purchase Power Adjustment. Embedded in those costs from the Power 24 25 Authority are things like New York Independent

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System Operator charges, transmission costs,
 demand charge. And even within the Independent
 System Operator charges, on the NYPA bill,
 there's probably four or five different pieces of
 that.
 I can tell you from experience that the

7 bill that the Power Authority gets from the Independent System Operator has somewhere upwards 8 9 of 30 individual billing codes. It's an enormous 10 task to go through those. So, as part of that process, we don't get that part of the bill until 11 12 two months after the bill -- the usage month. So 13 for our usage in January, it doesn't show up on 14 the Power Authority bill until March, which then means it ends up as a PPA in bills that go out in 15 April. So April bills will actually have a 16 17 financial recovery from something that happened in January. Not exactly realtime pricing, to say 18 19 the least. We have absolutely no control over that. That's when the bills come in. That's how 20 21 the process works. We certainly are -- have 22 started talking about ways we might alter that 23 process. It's a very difficult process to alter, 24 so we -- and something has to be done extremely 25 carefully, so as to minimize the impact on our

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1 ratepayers.

2 MAYOR NYCE: We had talked at one point

3 about the possibility of doing -- I don't know the term, but basically flat billing with the 4 5 true-up at the end of each year, that we could 6 offer that to our customers. It ended up being 7 fairly complicated, so we didn't opt to go that 8 way, and we weren't sure how many customers would 9 go for it. Is that something that is one of the --ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's one of them. 10 Another method that I have used is to do what's 11

called prospective. In other words, I do an --12 13 we do an estimate of sales and costs for the 14 following month. The problem here is, what I've 15 seen, the bills from the Power Authority are so volatile, and primarily because of the New York 16 17 ISO charges, they vary so radically, and it's 18 such a large component of the bill, that doing 19 those estimates is very dangerous.

20 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You know, if you're off by even a little amount, you know, you end up in a financial hole. And then how to do you reconcile that without having a tremendous impact? If you try to reconcile it in a single

1	month, well, now you're taking a big hit the
2	following month. You've kind of defeated the
3	purpose of doing it in the first place.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So, you know, we're
6	going to just very go slowly and there may be
7	nothing we can do, and if so, then it is what it
8	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The other thing we
10	started looking at is on the bills themselves is
11	to provide a little bit more information on the
12	bills than is currently there. You know, a lot
13	of utilities provide a lot of detail on what goes
14	into the bill. We're looking at that as well.
15	Again, these are things that aren't going to
16	happen quickly, but we are exploring them to make
17	it a little easier for folks to understand.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Cool.
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Another component
20	within the Purchase Power Adjustment is what's
21	called Transmission Congestion Contracts. The
22	Transmission Congestion Contracts are essentially

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is.

- 23 a replacement for our Legacy Transmission
- 24 Contracts that we had with the Power Authority,
- 25 Con Edison and LIPA. Right now, we only pay LIPA

for transmission, and it's really as part of the
 New York Independent System Operator process.
 It's a postage-stamp rate that everybody that's
 on the LIPA system pays.

5 The Transmission Congestion Contracts are 6 essentially a financial hedge against high ISO 7 costs that are called congestion. And, you know, 8 we did have these legacy contracts that expired 9 in October of 2013. There was no way to renew them. All three of the municipal electrics on 10 11 Long Island all had no choice but to convert. Τ 12 shouldn't say that. We had the choice to not 13 convert, but not converting means we would have 14 been exposed to these Transmission Congestion 15 Charges.

16 And, you know, the analysis that I did when 17 I made this decision in Rockville Centre was it 18 was like a tenfold difference on one against the

19	other. It was really a no-choice type of a
20	decision. So that I just want, again, to explain
21	that that's a piece that's in there.
22	The other part of that that's important to
23	note, the old transmission contracts are always
24	due after the month of use. Transmission

25 Congestion Contracts were something that had to

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be purchased in advance. So we had to pay for them, so we had to collect for what we already paid, plus collect for what's going to come due next, so --

MAYOR NYCE: Which was a big negotiation 5 with the New York Power Authority that I had a 6 7 year ago, trying to get them to understand that 8 the cash that we set aside, that they identified 9 that we should use for those transmission 10 charges, was for the upgrade at the plant, which 11 they finally understood. So that's -- now we're 12 recouping that amount of money to put back into 13 the thing, and then a separate line recouping for next year's transmission charges, at which point 14

15 we'll level out.

16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And spreading them
17	over two years would really minimize the impact.
18	I mean, what I I mean, what I did in Rockville
19	Centre I did in a year, and it was you know,
20	and I think Freeport did the same thing. By
21	spreading it over two years, it actually had less
22	of an impact than it would have had. So I think
23	that was a good decision, obviously.
24	I think that I'm done, unless you have any

25 questions for me.

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MAYOR NYCE: That was pretty thorough.
 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah, you did a nice job,
 Paul.
 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Nice job, yeah. Thank
 you for explaining the PPA. I think that was - TRUSTEE MURRAY: I think that was a big
 help.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's a big help to get 9 that out as to what's entailed with it, so people 10 understand. And I really like the idea of

- putting more information on the billing. 11
- 12 MAYOR NYCE: Yup.

13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that will give a 14 better understanding as to where we're at and where we're headed. 15

MAYOR NYCE: So our next report, then, will 16 17 be from Village Treasurer, Robert Brandt.

18 TREASURER BRANDT: Good evening, everyone.

19 MAYOR NYCE: Good evening, Robert.

20 MAYOR NYCE: How are you?

21 TREASURER BRANDT: I don't think my report

22 is going to be as extensive as Paul's.

23 TRUSTEE MURRAY: I hope not.

- 24 MAYOR NYCE: Yes, but maybe more exciting.
- 25 TREASURER BRANDT: Well, let's hope so.

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1 Let's hope so. 2 (Laughter) 3 TREASURER BRANDT: I have a couple of 4 requests for resolutions that were required that -- not required, NYPA requested that we do. 5 We did establish two separate funds, one for the 6

7	TCC collection, the other for the upgrade of the
8	plant. They want an actual resolution.
9	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
10	(Laughter)
11	TREASURER BRANDT: So what I did is I
12	actually took their wording and I said, "This is
13	what you want, this is what you get."
14	I have a couple of budget mods. I have one
15	final 2014 accrual. I apologize. It's done,
16	though, after that.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
18	TREASURER BRANDT: Also, I have one for
19	moving donations from Fifth Street Park. They
20	were in the A Fund. They don't roll forward.
21	I'd like to get them forward.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Yup.
23	TREASURER BRANDT: The next one is Hawkeye
24	tax grievance. When we calculated it, it was
25	based on our rates from 2008 on. It's actually

from the Assessor's Year 2008, which would be our
 2009.

3	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
4	TREASURER BRANDT: So there's an
5	adjustment. It's forty-four-forty, \$4,440. So
6	I'm asking for an amendment to fund that.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
8	TREASURER BRANDT: The East Pier repair,
9	you didn't mention that. Am I still going
10	forward with that, the 2,000 for the East Pier?
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
12	TREASURER BRANDT: Okay.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
14	TREASURER BRANDT: There was a change order
15	for the
16	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
17	TREASURER BRANDT: Okay. So I have a
18	budget mod in place to fund payment of that so we
19	can get that taken care of.
20	MAYOR NYCE: That was for some additional
21	wave attenuation, or something like that?
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Piling, some piling at the
23	end of the pier. I apologize.
24	TREASURER BRANDT: I do want to point out
25	that the budget mods, the wording has changed,

1	because I've tortured you guys by making you read
2	them to get them into the minutes.
3	(Laughter)
4	TREASURER BRANDT: So, with some guidance
5	from Trustee Phillips and some help on the
6	wording from Clerk Pirillo, we think we've got it
7	down, where this will you don't have to read
8	the actual budget mod, and it will go right into
9	the minutes for you guys. So, hopefully, this
10	will work.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
12	TREASURER BRANDT: All right. Real quick,
13	I do want to amend the resolution for hiring
14	Monique Summers. She's our new Utility Billing
15	Clerk. Her start date was supposed to be June
16	11th. That got moved to June 30th, because she
17	had Jury Duty, which I thought was real sweet of
18	her.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
20	TREASURER BRANDT: So we have to put that
21	forward.
22	We have back-wage compliance and wage
23	agreement between us and the Department of Labor.

24	I believe you guys are all aware of that. We
25	need an authorization for the Mayor to sign that

1 And the last one, I had asked you back in 2 April about doing a budget mod to fund the 3 heating system. And I did say at that meeting 4 that if we paid for it in this fiscal year, not that fiscal year, I wouldn't need the budget mod. 5 6 So I'd like to rescind that, if that's okay with you guys. So I'd go on record with that. 7 8 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. TREASURER BRANDT: All right? Debt 9 service, we only had one. We had the refunding 10 11 bond payment, 47,000. But we did pay our first 12 payment for the TCCs this year, the 25% for 166,000. 13 14 Meter reading, the part-timer has come back 15 and he's helping us out sporadically, but it is 16 keeping us in process. 17 MAYOR NYCE: Good. 18 TREASURER BRANDT: So Housing Authority, they did -- they cancelled their meeting for last 19

20	month, they didn't have a quorum. They are
21	meeting again this month. Their financials are
22	attached.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
24	TREASURER BRANDT: And here's some good

25 news. Property tax collected, we got the bulk of

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1	it in. This is like historic. We got 981,000					
2	collected.					
3	MAYOR NYCE: Already?					
4	TREASURER BRANDT: Already.					
5	MAYOR NYCE: Wow.					
6	TREASURER BRANDT: Of that, the actual I					
7	actually have that figure.					
8	MAYOR NYCE: Wow.					
9	TREASURER BRANDT: Part and parcel of that,					
10	the actual Village tax we collected was 906. The					
11	other components were BID, the sewer and water					
12	arrears, and then minuscule penalties. But I					
13	think that's astounding that we got that in that					
14	quickly this year.					
15	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.					

16	TREASURER BRANDT: Linda was great for
17	putting out too many notices for late notices.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Julia will be asking you, we
19	are ready then to fund the BID?
20	TREASURER BRANDT: We can fund the bulk of
21	it, yes, yes.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
23	MAYOR NYCE: I'm sure they will be looking
24	for that as soon as possible.
25	TREASURER BRANDT: I assumed I was going to

1	get a call this week on that.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Let's see at the meeting
3	this week.
4	TREASURER BRANDT: Any questions, folks?
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Robert, I had one, is I
6	was looking at the debt service I mean, you
7	know, our debt schedule for this year for
8	payments. And the other day, you, and Steven and
9	I had a rather interesting conversation about the
10	Marina electric upgrade bonding that we went out
11	for, and we have two payments coming due in

October and in April. And I was just wondering, have we -- or have we gotten a handle as far as the big boats that are coming in there? Are we -- you know, there was a promise that this was going to be able to be paid from those larger vessels coming in.

18 TREASURER BRANDT: Right. I haven't gotten 19 the July reports yet of all of the July money, so I don't know what the actual impact is going to 20 But just from seeing what June is doing, I'm 21 be. seeing an increase in the revenue so far on that. 22 I mean, we're looking at the -- the debt service 23 24 for this year, though, is only \$14,000. That is just interest payments. The principal kicks in 25

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1 next year.

2	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
3	TREASURER BRANDT: That combined with the
4	Mitchell Park, the Marina is supposed to
5	receive any profits after we pay off all the
6	bills, all of that goes towards the debt service.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Right.

8	TREASURER BRANDT: So, if this keeps
9	growing the way it's been going, I think we're
10	going handily cover that and start making a major
11	dent on Mitchell Park.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
13	TREASURER BRANDT: All right? But I do
14	have to sit with Jeff and go over the numbers,
15	because I haven't seen July's yet.
16	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, my curiosity
18	is that we went ahead with this and I'd like to
19	see how it's working out.
20	TREASURER BRANDT: Me, too, frankly.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I mean, I think it's a
22	good point just for the future for any other
23	renovations that we do down there.
24	TREASURER BRANDT: Right.
25	MAYOR NYCE: I think the primary drive to

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that was the thought would be that -- was that we would get a season, a full season from different yachts that are staying in there, and that would

4	be a substantial increase in income, rather than
5	just on a transient basis. So this year is sort
6	of a trial. Thus far, from what I've heard from
7	Jeff, boats are very happy with the electric.
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: I think it's doing pretty
9	good.
10	TREASURER BRANDT: Can I see it?
11	(Referring to photo on iPad.)
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, no, no, I'm
13	not
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I got the
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Pictures can say a
16	thousand words, but to be table to document it
17	from year to year would be an advantage for us.
18	MAYOR NYCE: And we need to track the
19	finances. Obviously, it's an off year. There
20	are fewer smaller boats. The bigger boats
21	TREASURER BRANDT: Well, that said, we're
22	still the numbers are still coming in.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
24	MAYOR NYCE: We're still ahead. It would
25	be nice to get some guarantees for next year, if

1	boats are going to sit there for the entire
2	season, which would give us a guaranteed income
3	that we could
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But, once again, to have
5	a basis as to
6	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: year one, so that
8	someone coming along in the future can take a
9	look at it, and if things need to be changed, or
10	if we need a new direction or an old direction,
11	or whatever, without that information, we really
12	can't do too much. Okay?
13	And I do know that, you know, the Carousel
14	brings in a fair amount of money, which that
15	needs its repairs. But we also have the Ice
16	Skating Rink that's part of all of this overall
17	recreational budget, and that's another concern,
18	okay, is because that doesn't make
19	MAYOR NYCE: No, it doesn't.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: anything in the
21	tax
22	TREASURER BRANDT: No, that breaks even.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So that you
24	understand where I'm coming from.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We need to start having
2	something to basis for future budgeting in the
3	future. Okay? That's where I'm coming from.
4	TREASURER BRANDT: We've started at the
5	real basic one just to start tracking and see
6	what's going on. But, again, we only have we
7	don't have the rest of don't have all of July
8	yet.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	TREASURER BRANDT: And June was negligible.
11	July is when it starting hitting.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And really tracking, June
13	doesn't count.
14	TREASURER BRANDT: Yeah. I mean, just
15	compared to last year, July and August were
16	incredible months.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
19	TREASURER BRANDT: And I'm already seeing
20	the beginning of July doing that, but I don't

21	again, we don't have the end of it, so it would
22	be interesting to see how we
23	MAYOR NYCE: That analysis should be
24	will likely be done towards November, right
25	before we go into budgeting for next year.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, I'm bringing
 it up now so that the thought process can - TREASURER BRANDT: Well, I'll probably
 bring it to you guys earlier than that just if
 it's good news.

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then the other 7 question I had is -- and I know I had a 8 discussion with Paul earlier, because I also am 9 looking at the road debt, and I know that we had 10 some discussion in the past about putting a plan 11 together for bonding and capital plans. And I 12 know you, Paul, you and I had a discussion, and I 13 just thought it might be interesting to find out 14 how far we are on some of the minor repairs that had been discussed to start before the total 15 capital -- you know, what areas you might be 16

17	interested,	you know,	where we're	at,	when	it's
18	going to sta	art, those	things.			

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And thanks for mentioning that, because I realize I didn't -- I missed that whole item on my agenda.

In terms of what -- we're still trying to develop a list of projects that we can do within the funding that we have currently. But long-term, what we're looking to do is really

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1	develop a true capital plan. We're going to get
2	requests from each individual department, a wish
3	list, if you will, of capital improvement items,
4	and it would include things like the Skate Park,
5	like the Marina, you know, and we
6	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Basketball court?
7	
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Basketball court
7 8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Basketball court definitely, which is going to be well, one of
-	
8	definitely, which is going to be well, one of
8 9	definitely, which is going to be well, one of them is going to be done this year, working on

contractor this week, that's my I hope, and then 13 we'll try to schedule it as soon as possible. 14 15 In addition, but items like that, rather 16 than do it the way that it's being done now, is 17 to do it, you know, prospectively, rather than 18 reactionary. 19 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. 20 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So we will have this 21 plan in place. Then we will present it to the 22 Board, and we'll show what the financial impacts 23 of them are, what money we have inhouse to use 24 now, and what may have to be bonded, and what the 25 impact of those bonds is going to have on the tax

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1 rate going forward. It's a little bit more 2 formal, but I think it's a little more 3 structured, and be a little proactive, as I said. MAYOR NYCE: And as the Board is a well 4 5 aware, this is what we've been working towards 6 for the last eight years, getting the debt to a 7 point where we can handle it, getting the budget 8 to a point where it stands on its own. And year

9 by year, we've whittled down. We have a10 substantial fund balance.

11 And, as we discussed last year, not the 12 budget that we just adopted, the year before, Charlene and Robert sat here and we talked about 13 14 in a couple of years time being actually able to 15 do a real Capital Budget, which Paul is picking 16 up and doing. I think it's fantastic that we're 17 in that position, and I'm anxious to see that as part of the next year's budget cycle. 18

19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think that's
20 part of it and that's why I'm bringing it up.
21 But I think we also -- we have been communicating
22 out to the public that we're going to be doing
23 some type of roadwork.
24 MAYOR NYCE: Yes.

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I think we need to

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keep telling them that, you know, we need to get
 a progress as to where we are. I know you
 mentioned that Pete was trying to put the plan
 together. I don't know where he is with it.

5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's not finalized
6	by any stretch of the imagination.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	MAYOR NYCE: I don't think we can do any
9	major paving until the end of the hot season.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't think we
11	have the funding to do anything major, but we're
12	going to try to hit some really distressed spots,
13	those areas, you know, to the extent that we can
14	and not compromise a larger project later on.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We need to be
17	careful not to do something that has to be
18	undone. So it's really it really has to be
19	done with a lot of forethought.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. But, as I said, we,
21	as a Board
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yup.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: we need to keep
24	making the public aware that we're working on
25	something, and it's not just in silence and

1	ADMINICIDATOD DALLAC. Diab+
1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Understood.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's all on my part.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you, Robert.
6	TREASURER BRANDT: Okay. Thank you.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you, Robert.
8	MAYOR NYCE: Our next report will be from
9	the Village Clerk, Sylvia Pirillo.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: Good evening, Ladies and
11	Gentlemen.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Good evening, Sylvia.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: There is a change on my
14	report in a date for a Public Assembly Permit, as
15	requested by Vanessa Mims. In lieu of the 3rd of
16	August, they she has requested the 9th, which
17	is the following Saturday.
18	MAYOR NYCE: August 9, 2014.
19	CLERK PIRILLO: Correct.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay? And we have there
22	are additions, of course. We have touched upon
23	the change order for Seacoast Marine. There's a
24	resolution that goes with that as well. We need
25	to have a resolution for the change order.

1 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. CLERK PIRILLO: Okay? So it will be a 2 3 change order for \$2,000 to account for the 4 60-foot pod. 5 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 6 CLERK PIRILLO: In addition, we are asking 7 the Board --8 (Whereupon, the microphone was adjusted.) 9 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. We are asking the Board to please vote on two hiring 10 resolutions this evening. One is for the Road 11 12 Department. The Head of that Department has 13 chosen a candidate from the pool of applicants 14 per the job opening in June, I believe, that was advertised in June, both inhouse and out. And we 15 16 have a resolution asking that this person be 17 effective this Wednesday, which is the 23rd of 18 July. 19 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. CLERK PIRILLO: Okay? So, if the Board 20 doesn't mind. 21

22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry, excuse me.	Ι
23	have to I'm sorry.	
24	(Whereupon, Trustee Phillips left the	
25	room.)	

MAYOR NYCE: What's the second one? 1 CLERK PIRILLO: The second one is a similar 2 hiring resolution for lifeguard. And, again, 3 we've touched upon our lifeguard issues already 4 this evening. The lifeguard effective date is 5 6 July 30th, which is next week. We could actually hire on Monday. If the Board would indulge us to 7 8 please hire tonight and then ratify it, we may 9 get the person to start sooner. 10 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 11 CLERK PIRILLO: And thereby solve a host of 12 issues. 13 MAYOR NYCE: Does anyone have an issue with either of those? 14 15 TRUSTEE MURRAY: I have no issue. 16 TRUSTEE ROBINS: No issue. MAYOR NYCE: Do you have the wording on the 17

18 resolution?

19 CLERK PIRILLO: I do.
20 MAYOR NYCE: Do you want to hand it Trustee
21 Murray? Do you want to offer those resolutions?
22 TRUSTEE MURRAY: I make a RESOLUTION hiring
23 Charles Bumble, III as a Laborer in the Road
24 Department, at an hourly wage rate of \$14.00 per
25 hour, effective July 23rd, 2014. All applicable

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1	health and other benefits apply to this full-time
2	hiring, as does the requisite six-month Civil
3	Service probation period. So moved.
4	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Second
5	MAYOR NYCE: Any discussion on that motion?
6	(No response.)
7	MAYOR NYCE: All those in favor?
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Aye.
12	Any opposed or abstentions?
13	(No response.)

14	MAYOR NYCE: That motion carries. I will
15	note for the record that Trustee Phillips is
16	excused for a moment for an emergency phone call.
17	Second resolution?
18	TRUSTEE MURRAY: I'd like to make a
19	RESOLUTION hiring Spencer Ganley as a Lifeguard
20	in the Recreation Department at an hourly wage
21	rate of \$12.00 per hour, effective July 30th,
22	2014. So moved.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Second.
24	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Second.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Second by Trustee Robins. Any

1	discussion on that motion?
2	(No response.)
3	(Whereupon, Trustee Phillips returned to
4	the meeting.)
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry.
6	MAYOR NYCE: No problem. All those in
7	favor?
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.

10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Aye.
13	Any opposed or abstentions?
14	(No response.)
15	MAYOR NYCE: That motion carries.
16	I'll ask the Clerk to put those on for
17	ratification on Monday, and welcome both those
18	individuals aboard.
19	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry. And I'm
21	sorry, I had to take care of that. The lifeguard
22	situation, was that one of the resolutions?
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.
24	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. 2 MAYOR NYCE: We were hiring, so that it 3 could be done as of tomorrow. And the other one 4 is Pete was asking for the Road Department 5 person, so that they could start Wednesday to be

6 in this pay cycle.

7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. The lifeguard was8 the one I was interested in.

9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: If I just may note 10 also, in terms of lifeguards, I've started a discussion, I don't know if it's going to go 11 12 anywhere, with the Town of Southold to try to 13 work with them perhaps on filling the lifeguard 14 positions as rotating through their own lifeguard process. I don't know if it's going to go 15 16 anywhere, but it was -- I thought it was worth a 17 discussion.

18 My understanding is that this is an ongoing 19 issue year after year, and it just seems to me that they have 22 lifeguards. You know, we have 20 21 two or three for one seat, and they have 22 multiple. How hard could it be for them to do 23 it? And I think it would be in keeping with, you 24 know, the concept of shared services. 25 MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.

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TRUSTEE ROBINS: It is a good idea.

2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So it's something
3	I've started to explore with the Town.
4	MAYOR NYCE: That's great. That's great.
5	CLERK PIRILLO: Recent events, we had a
6	very successful High School Reunion event this
7	past weekend, so
8	MAYOR NYCE: Yes, I heard. I wasn't able
9	to get down there.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: It was, it was extremely
11	successful.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: We had a shuttle provided
14	by Peconic Landing. The shuttle was to run for
15	three hours or so. They kindly granted us use of
16	the shuttle and driver for the entire day.
17	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
18	CLERK PIRILLO: That having been said, with
19	approximately 1200 people at the event, parking
20	was
21	MAYOR NYCE: Wow.
22	CLERK PIRILLO: a little bit of an issue
23	in the neighborhood.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Wow, 1200 people.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: But I was going to say

1	MAYOR NYCE: And it's great.
2	CLERK PIRILLO: The residents kindly the
3	residents were very kind about it, and we
4	appreciate the fact that they recognize that it's
5	a not even an annual event. It was a
6	successful event. It was well done and without
7	issue or consequence.
8	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
9	CLERK PIRILLO: So we appreciate everyone's
10	support of that.
11	MAYOR NYCE: That's terrific.
12	TRUSTEE MURRAY: How did the cleanup go?
13	CLERK PIRILLO: Cleanup went well, without
14	issue; without issue.
15	Dances in the Park, which tonight's event
16	is starting shortly, we have received we have
17	received a check for \$7,000, as noted in my
18	report. We are tomorrow expecting another check
19	from a different organization for \$3,000.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.
21	CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. I won't name the
22	organization yet until the check is received.

23 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

24	CLERK	PIRILLO):	But	tha	at wi	ill		
25	MAYOR	NYCE:	But	if	we	get	it	by	next

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1	Monday, we can announce it at the televised
2	meeting and thank them.
3	CLERK PIRILLO: Absolutely, absolutely.
4	They expect to have it tomorrow, but that will
5	help the program tremendously.
6	MAYOR NYCE: And get a letter of thank you
7	out to them.
8	CLERK PIRILLO: And kudos to the committee
9	and all the program
10	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
11	CLERK PIRILLO: participants.
12	MAYOR NYCE: That's terrific.
13	CLERK PIRILLO: To talk a little bit about
14	management staff and team inside Village Hall:
15	We are working on any variety of projects and
16	processes that we have established in the past
17	and streamlining them, and making a better, and
18	easier, and more efficient workflow. This is

19 evident in our grants.

20	As you see, I've been reporting quite a bit
21	on grants, and our grant process has been
22	streamlined substantially. We have been doing a
23	great amount of work, especially on the Water
24	Quality Improvements grants for Fifth and Manor
25	Place. So we just wanted to note that, let the

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1 Board know that those are proceeding well.

2	Same thing with FOILs. I am in the process
3	with the Building Inspector of again streamlining
4	that process. It's a little bit arduous and
5	time-consuming, not just for us, but for the
6	person that is requesting the foil. So she and I
7	are working together, and, again, the procedure
8	has taken less time
9	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
10	CLERK PIRILLO: as of this point. So
11	we're happy to report that as well.
12	Annual bids: Annual bids are in review and
13	discussion again in Village Hall. We are
14	reviewing processes that we put in place many

15	years ago.	The ultima	te goal is	to	have all the
16	bids at the	same time,	going out	to	bid at the
17	same time.				

18 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

19 CLERK PIRILLO: Which is something that we 20 began many years ago. Somehow the process went 21 askew. Now we're fixing that. We're fixing that 22 and we're proceeding accordingly. We'll report 23 to the Board and let this Board know of our 24 progress.

25 MAYOR NYCE: Good.

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1	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay?
2	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. Anything for
3	Sylvia?
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Question. I know you
5	interviewed somebody for the interviewed
6	several people for the Code Enforcement position
7	Any decisions made?
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We could discuss
9	that in Executive Session.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

- 11 CLERK PIRILLO: We have that as an item.
- 12 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.

13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

14 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.

15 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you.

16 MAYOR NYCE: Thank you, Sylvia.

17 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Thank you, Sylvia.

18 CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome.

19 MAYOR NYCE: Our next report will be from

20 Village Attorney, Joseph Prokop, to my left.

21 MR. PROKOP: Thank you, Mayor. Good

22 evening.

23	MAYOR NYCE:	Good evening.
24	MR. PROKOP:	I have a number of things to
25	bring to your atte	ntion, that I have a few I

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do have a few things that I'd like to talk to you
 about in Executive Session, very brief, just
 updates.
 There was a resolution proposed to the

5 Suffolk County Legislature regarding the Railroad
6 Dock. It's gone through -- Village Administrator

7 Pallas and I have gone through it and on two different occasions made -- requested amendments. 8 9 So the resolution now I think is in its second or 10 third version and we're hoping that it gets 11 passed. It's been put on the table for adoption. 12 There's a period of time that has to pass once 13 it's placed on the table, but we're hoping that 14 the most recent version will go through and be 15 adopted.

16 MAYOR NYCE: When I talked to Legislator 17 Krupski, they were hoping for the 27th of this 18 month. It probably is not going to make the 27th 19 of this month because of the amendments, so it 20 will make next month, their next month's. 21 MR. PROKOP: 0kay. 22 MAYOR NYCE: Is that the case? 23 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Is that what they 24 said? 25 MAYOR NYCE: Well, he had said -- the

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information I'm saying, this is a couple of weeks
 ago when I spoke to him, he was talking about

3	trying to have it on their agenda for their
4	meeting the 27th.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: As far as I know, it
6	still should be able to be done that way.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The changes that we
9	made, they didn't in the discussions or the
10	email discussions back and forth, they didn't
11	indicate that it would delay it.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
13	MR. PROKOP: I'm not aware of a delay.
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
15	MAYOR NYCE: All right. I'll reach out to
16	him, because he had also asked that I come up to
17	the meeting. We sent them a letter of support
18	for it
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right.
20	MAYOR NYCE: which he wanted for the
21	committee.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right.
23	MAYOR NYCE: But he thought it might not be
24	a bad idea for us to go and actually present our
25	case to the Legislature that we are in favor of

1 this.

2	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right, right.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a question.
4	We're still responsible for maintaining the
5	parking lot, and why aren't we just taking all
6	four pieces over?
7	MR. PROKOP: We are.
8	MAYOR NYCE: We are.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, we are?
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is that because the
12	way I was reading it, it looks different.
13	MAYOR NYCE: No, it's the entire.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
15	MAYOR NYCE: It's the entire property.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
17	MAYOR NYCE: The County is backing out of
18	the entire property. We would then be the
19	sole tenant from
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: For the Maritime Museum,
21	the Railroad Museum
22	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: and the parking lot,

24 so that we could actually do --

25 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. The only other one

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1	that's still leases directly from Long Island
2	Railroad is North Ferry.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	MAYOR NYCE: But everyone else
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I just
6	MAYOR NYCE: We would be the only other
7	tenant on that property.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, because I was
9	reading it okay. I'm sorry, I misunderstood,
10	because I was
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That was actually
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: scanned through that.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, that was
14	actually the nature of the changes that
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. Oh, all
16	right.
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: the Village
18	Attorney and I picked up on, that they it
19	wasn't clear in their resolution of what they

20 were giving up.

21 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS:	So	we	made	sure	that
23	they delineated it.					

24 MR. PROKOP: We went back to the original25 language of the lease. There's a description in

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1 the --2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Lease. MR. PROKOP: Like a four or five-line 3 4 description in the original lease. What I was able to do is to copy and paste that into the --5 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 7 MR. PROKOP: -- the lease description into 8 the resolution and we picked that up. So I'm 9 sorry. When I say Railroad Dock, I really mean 10 the Railroad Dock property as a combination of 11 four --12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. All right. 13 MR. PROKOP: It's four different parcels. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's all I 14 wanted to just --15

16	MR. PROKOP: Thank you for asking.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It was a little
18	confusing and I was getting confused.
19	MR. PROKOP: Yes. That's actually the
20	reason for the amendments.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	MR. PROKOP: Because it was referred to as
23	the Railroad Dock.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
25	MR. PROKOP: It was actually four parcels.

With regard to MS4, we're completing the 1 2 obligation that we have under the DEC regulations 3 with the adoption of two Local Laws at next 4 week's meeting, if anybody has any questions. MAYOR NYCE: We have the public hearing at 5 6 next --MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry, I apologize. The 7 8 public hearings at next week's meeting. If anybody has a question regarding the Local Laws, 9 please give me a call, or Mr. Pallas. 10

11 I worked with the Treasurer's Department

12	and regarding the Hawkeye refunds and matter.
13	We had a meeting with Mr. Pallas, and also
14	several conversations, to enable us to complete
15	that.
16	There's a number of enforcement matters
17	that I'm working on with the Village, I've
18	summarized them here. If anybody has any
19	questions, please let me know.
20	And I did get a renewal of a request
21	regarding expansion of the sewer system with
22	regard to Peconic Landing. I forwarded that to
23	the Village and it's being reviewed now.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Excellent.
25	MR. PROKOP: And then I have three two,

three or four of really quick things to just
 update you on, and no discussion, just update. I
 just wanted let you know things that are going on
 in Executive Session.
 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. Thank you, Joe.
 Reports from Committees. There are none
 from Code and Audit. They were not able to get a

8	quorum for the Code Committee today, so it did
9	not meet. Audit Committee will meet next month.
10	I'll ask Trustee Robins if there was an
11	update from the BID. I know they meet this
12	coming Thursday.

13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, we meet on Thursday. 14 Last month's meeting, discussions for a number of things that -- I don't know if anybody was aware 15 16 of or read in the paper about the antique post box at the corner of Claudio's, quite a bit of 17 18 discussion about that. I guess the Village, they 19 put a request in to us to take possession of it and maintain as a nonfunctional post office box. 20 Is that what we're doing with that? 21

22 MAYOR NYCE: Right. And I think what we've 23 done is we've kicked it back to the BID to take 24 it as --

25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.

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1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: As their own, right.
2	MAYOR NYCE: If they're interested in it.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, good, good.

4 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, exactly, they could take
5 possession of the property.

6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. We did discuss a 7 little bit the proposed -- at that time, proposed 8 moratorium on events in Mitchell Park, just to 9 advise them that we were going to move forward 10 with a moratorium, and a certain section of this 11 upcoming meeting for the public to give comments 12 on that as well.

13 We discussed a little bit the Tall Ships 14 Festival, but we were awaiting a meeting of the 15 Steering Committee, which has since taken place, 16 so we didn't go into a great deal of discussion 17 about that. They did ask for a few volunteers. 18 And members of the BID, in addition to Peter 19 Clarke, would be Linda Kessler and Sarah 20 Phillips, did also throw out some ideas for 21 fundraising on that. So those were the main 22 topics of conversation.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have a question.
Mayor, are you going to be giving a report on the
Steering Committee?

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1	MAYOR NYCE: Yup.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
3	MAYOR NYCE: I'll do that under mine,
4	rather than just from committees.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. No, no. I just
6	was curious, because I had heard you'd had the
7	first meeting.
8	MAYOR NYCE: Yes. The discussion we were
9	going to hold tonight, Mr. Pallas asked that I
10	table that discussion. There are some additional
11	bits of information that we will need before we
12	discuss that. So we're going to postpone it
13	until next month?
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. So the discussion on
16	the Wetlands Permit Application from
17	En-Consultants will be postponed until the August
18	meeting.
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Potentially, next
20	Monday, but more than likely, it will be the full
21	month.
22	MAYOR NYCE: If it's going to be discussion
23	and there's no rush on it, I'd prefer to do it at
24	

1 it's put on the agenda for then. 2 Next would be reports from Mayor and 3 Trustees. I'll ask Trustee Hubbard to kick it off. 4 5 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. I just want to 6 thank everybody who did work on getting the Skate Park put together. It's not all done yet, but a 7 8 lot of progress on that. 9 Bo Pollack, who's one of the young guys 10 that was working with me, I've met with him 11 numerous times. I talk to him almost three or 12 four time a day with questions and stuff, along 13 with Derryl and Paul. He's a real go-getter, you 14 know, and he wants answers, he wants stuff going. 15 He was going to come this evening, I guess he 16 couldn't make it. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's too bad. 18 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Just to give an update, 19 see what we do at a Village Board meeting, and also highlights, just that he was going to give 20

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21	me an itinerary for what's going on next Sunday.
22	I don't have that yet, but I'll make sure he
23	emails that to everybody.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Did he find a P.A. system?
25	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I don't know.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. The last I talked 2 to him, he hadn't found one yet. I'll follow up with him. 3 MAYOR NYCE: 0h. TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Right. He had somebody 4 5 that was going to be doing stuff for the bands. 6 Well, right now, I'll just give a quick rundown. 7 They plan on six or seven bands playing, 45 minutes each, you know, going from 12 to 5. It's 8 9 not a true competition, as had been in the past. 10 More exhibition, but they are going to do some stunts. And he had some prizes that were donated 11 12 for like, you know, best flip, or whatever, but it's not a format where it's real structured. 13 14 Right now, on -- the Clerk's Office made a bunch of posters; they were going to put them 15 out. These young kids don't communicate by 16

17 posters and writing.

18 MAYOR NYCE: No.

19	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Everything is Facebook
20	and emails.
21	MAYOR NYCE: It's all social media.
22	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: He's got, he says, 120
23	people that have responded that they are
24	definitely coming.
25	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.

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1	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The likes, or whatever,
2	invitations is 1300, you know.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They do an invitation,
4	yeah, that's what they do.
5	MAYOR NYCE: And even old-fogey-me got two
6	invitations.
7	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Did you? Okay.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This one did, too.
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I'm not on Facebook, so I
10	didn't get that. He did create a web page on it.
11	We have struggled to try to get to it. I found
12	it once and I looked at. He's given the address

13	to the Clerk and to Derryl. They've tried to
14	find it, they've haven't. So it's there,
15	Greenport Skate Park Festival, but he's working
16	on revamping it.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: We're doing food that
19	day. He has a couple of vendors that are coming,
20	they're going to be selling stuff. I've got some
21	donations. I'd like to thank Relief Hose.
22	Greenport Fire Department made a donation towards
23	food. Peconic Landing came on board today and
24	made a donation of hot dogs, and buns and stuff.
25	What we're going to try to do is the food

1 for the kids and everybody that's there, is the 2 food's going to be free, we'll put a donation jar 3 out.

4 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Great.

5 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So we're not going to be 6 charging for hot dogs, hamburgers, Gatorade, 7 water, whatever. I'll try to get all that stuff 8 donated, and whatever donations come in will go

9	into a jar, and that will be turned into the
10	Treasurer to help with future repairs to pay for
11	what's getting done.
12	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Terrific.
13	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So that way, a young kid
14	comes up, doesn't have any money, wants to eat,
15	we're not worrying about cashing you know,
16	cash transactions and everything else. Put
17	something in the jar for it and that's how we're
18	going to try to do it.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Cool.
20	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: And it looks like it's
21	all working out well.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: You know, with the
24	donations and everything else, we should have
25	enough money to cover the food, and then we'll

1	see what happens when we collect.
2	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think it's great. The
4	blacktop is done. I think Mr. Pallas, Derryl and

5	Angie	probably	did a	great	amo	ount to	get th	at
6	one.	Last week	it w	as swe	eatir	ng it a	little	bit.
7		TRUSTEE H	UBBAR	D: Ye	eah.	Well,	yeah,	
8	there	's been	that	's wha	nt a	lot of	the ph	one
9	calls	have been	abou	t.				

10 The Circus is here on Thursday and Friday 11 this week. On Saturday afternoon, I'm going to 12 be meeting with the kids up there. Anybody who 13 wants to come up, any last-minute cleanup, 14 touchup, finish painting, you know, garbage, whatever, Saturday afternoon, I'd say probably 15 between 2 and 3 -- I'll try to get home earlier 16 than I have been on Saturdays -- just to go over 17 18 everything. And then going to be setting up 19 probably 10 o'clock Sunday morning. We're going 20 from noon to five. He's got vendors, other 21 people coming down. And I'm not sure of all that 22 stuff, but it sounds like it's going to be, I 23 hope, a better turnout than they had last year, 24 more family-friendly. So, hopefully, anybody who's got kids, if it's suppertime, and Pats 25

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1	going to, you know, let them know it's a family
2	thing, so everybody could come, you know.
3	MAYOR NYCE: It's great. It should be a
4	good afternoon.
5	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. And the other
6	thing was the Little League field, I was up there
7	in the building, refreshing my spackling skills.
8	(Laughter)
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: It's been a while since I
10	taped and everything else, but I had some young
11 footers,	guys do the sheetrock for me. Four-by-twelve-
12	I can't pick them up and put them on the ceiling,
13	so I didn't even bother. So I got two young guys
14	that put the sheetrock up. I was taping and
15	spackling this weekend.
16	So that's pretty much next weekend, I
17	hope to well, not the following weekend,
18	we'll get the Girl Scout in to paint it, put the
19	shelves back up, and that will be all completed.
20	MAYOR NYCE: That's great. Thank you very
21	much.
22	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: That's about it, and hope
23	to see everybody on Sunday.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Cool, absolutely.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'll bring my skateboard.

1 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Bring your skateboard, 2 yup. I'll bring some Band Aids. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I'll bring the wheelchair. 4 (Laughter) 5 TRUSTEE ROBINS: We're going to need the 6 7 Band Aids. MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, gauze and plaster. 8 9 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. MAYOR NYCE: Trustee Robins. 10 11 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Beyond the BID report, 12 just wanted to say that, you know, I've been in continuous -- having continuous briefings with 13 14 Mr. Pallas on what's going on at both the 15 Electric, Utility and the Sewer -- the Wastewater 16 Treatment Plant. I did engage in some discussions with the constituents who had the --17 had been complaining about the odor problems, 18 19 just to update them on what was going on there, 20 what was being done. Mr. Pallas actually had a 21 crew go out and investigate a line running from

22	the plant to the neighborhood there to make sure
23	there were no leaks.
24	So, you know, I think that this resolution

25 we're going to pass for the, you know, aerator, I

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ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, that's what it

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guess it's sort of like a, yeah, aerator blend,
 or whatever.

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is.

4 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Hopefully, we'll remediate 5 the problem, or we're confident that it is, and 6 happy that it's, you know, going to be done at 7 the cost.

8 Other than that, I just want to say that, 9 you know, I do go around town and kind of notice 10 things on the sidewalk, or whatever. I'm always running into Village Hall, taking pictures. 11 But 12 what I have noticed, there's a big change. 13 There's been a great response to them. A lot of 14 times these things are taken care of within 24 hours. I go down the next day and they're done, 15 you know, something's been filled, the hole's 16

17	been taken care of. So I think, in general, the
18	Administration in the Village is in competent
19	hands and things are really starting to happen,
20	so I really appreciate that. Thank you very
21	much.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Thank you.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Trustee Murray.
24	TRUSTEE MURRAY: My report tonight is
25	regarding the mega-yachts that everybody is

1	seeing that we're filling up very nicely. Word
2	is that we're extremely cheap compared to Sag
3	Harbor.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Inexpensive. Cheap is such a
5	cheap word.
6	TRUSTEE MURRAY: No, cheap is the word I'm
7	hearing, which I don't really like.
8	MAYOR NYCE: No, absolutely.
9	TRUSTEE MURRAY: But they're charging \$8 a
10	foot, where we're at \$4. And after the season
11	next year, I'd like to see our rates go up to at
12	least 5.50. I think we can definitely get it.

Jeff is -- I don't want to say he's turning 13 people away, because he's not, he's just having a 14 15 hard time fitting them in. We're not turning 16 people away yet for that, which is good, but 17 we're getting close. And I think we can really generate a lot of revenue over the years with the 18 19 mega-yachts. I mean, that's why we did the 20 program in the first place.

And so I'm going to be pushing hard after the season to raise our rates, not on the smaller boats, because, you know, we want to lure them in, but the mega-yachts are using it at a parking lot, which is fine and they're paying. But I

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1 think we should definitely raise our rates to 2 help pay for more things. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. MAYOR NYCE: Have there been any serious 4 5 inquiries from anybody to sit there for the 6 season, or is it mostly transient? TRUSTEE MURRAY: A lot of it's transient, 7 8 but people are inquiring about, you know, staying

9	longer term, more than just, you know, three or
10	four days. We haven't gotten the full seasonal
11	rentals, but, you know, I thought we would. I
12	thought we would, but we're keeping it full.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Jeff told me the other day
14	he has a yacht that's coming in for, I think, six
15	weeks.
16	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah, yeah. But six weeks
17	is great, and it's a big one, too.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Yeah, I know it is.
19	TRUSTEE MURRAY: So, you know, he's getting
20	great money, but I think there's a lot more to
21	get.
22	MAYOR NYCE: I agree.
23	TRUSTEE MURRAY: So it's going well. I
24	think he's happy with it.
25	MAYOR NYCE: That's terrific.

1	TRUSTEE MURRAY: And Dances in the Park
2	is —— the check that Sylvia talked about, is
3	going well, and tonight should be a good show.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. Thank you.

5 Trustee Phillips.

6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Carousel Committee
7	met, and I expressed there are some changes
8	going on that Paul's been very involved in as far
9	as some mechanical issues that the committee has
10	expressed some issues over. The other was the
11	brochure. Marjory Moffat has done a wonderful
12	job of putting together a true history and P.R.
13	for the Carousel brochure, that she took the
14	initiative and ran with it. And that, hopefully,
15	should be here, I think, at the end of this week
16	or the end of next week.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Cool.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So there's a lot of
19	excitement with that.
20	The rounding board issue, there was some
21	rather loud discussion, that they needed to
22	create a plan of action or it just was never
23	going to get done. So that's where the committee
24	is at at the present moment.
25	The Greenport Improvement Committee is

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1 moving along with the Jailhouse. Tom Payne and John Winkler have been busy putting together a 2 quote on getting rid of -- I mean, of dealing 3 4 with the inside, of having it where the asbestos 5 and the lead paint removed. They have a quote, which I need to talk to Paul about, which 6 7 sometime next week we'll have a meeting, because I also need to get a clear direction from you, as 8 9 you're not showing up to the meeting, similar to 10 Mr. Abatelli showed up. So I need to get a little guidance from you as to where you want me 11 12 to fit in between the committee. 13 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure. 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. The Jailhouse has 15 been cleaned out. All the important documents, or documents or anything that was in the 16 17 Jailhouse has been moved to Village Hall in the 18 basement in a locked room for the moment, so that 19 it's safe. Lisa Richland has done an inventory. 20 And I believe she met with you, Sylvia, Lisa did. CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, she did --21 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 23 CLERK PIRILLO: -- last week, and she's 24 coming back this week, I believe Thursday. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. So she's been 25

1 taking inventory of what was actually there. So 2 from a historical point, we have some direction. 3 The committee wants to focus on getting the 4 Jailhouse open as something -- hopefully, we can 5 get it for maybe the Fall season, especially near 6 Halloween. Maybe we can get something in there, 7 which would be interesting. They've done that in 8 the past. So that's what's going on. 9 I only have one resolution that I would 10 like put on, and that is to request that David 11 Abatelli be appointed to the Greenport 12 Improvement Committee and to the Carousel 13 Committee as a volunteer. Both committees desire 14 to have him on, and he has expressed an interest, so that's one of the resolutions that I would 15 16 like to see. TRUSTEE MURRAY: Does he really want this? 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, he does. 19 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Okay. 20 MAYOR NYCE: He's already on a Board? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We dealt -- this was --21

22	MAYOR NYCE: He just retired.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This was well discussed
24	before he retired.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, he hasn't had a

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month off yet. 1 MAYOR NYCE: The Carousel and --2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Greenport Improvement 3 4 Committee. MAYOR NYCE: -- Greenport Improvement 5 Committee. Okay. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And pretty much most of 7 my questions were done throughout the rest of the 8 9 meeting. You know, as I said, the financial part 10 of it is a concern, and I know we have some electric payments coming up and bonding. And I 11 12 am just concerned. I just don't want to see 13 things stalled and lose out on a lower bond 14 rating for going out for stuff. 15 MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely, understood. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul and I had a 16 discussion over that. And I have some concerns 17

18 in watching what's going on with the economy and the interest rates. So, once again, getting back 19 20 to seeing with the Mitchell refinancing, I really 21 want to kind of have that in the back of their 22 head, so that it's for the taxpayers' benefit. 23 MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's pretty much it. 25 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. I quess the

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1 start-off would be an update on the Tall Ships. 2 We did, in fact, have a preliminary meeting with the Steering Committee members. What we did was 3 we started with primarily the Steering Committee 4 5 that worked in 2013. We went through that list 6 of names, approached those people to see if they 7 would still be interested in doing that. There 8 have been some changes, because some people have 9 moved. School is out of session, so the representatives from the school were not 10 11 available. I will be reaching out to Mr. Gamberg 12 personally.

When we talked to them at the Business

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14 Advisory Council meeting before the end of the school year, I mentioned that this project was 15 16 coming up, and then we would have an entire 17 school year to focus on the history of Hermione 18 and General Lafayette's trip over to the U.S. for the Revolutionary War. It gives them something 19 20 to -- the kids to tie into over the course of the 21 year. They were interested in that, so I'm going 22 to follow up with him over the summer season to see if there's some sort of curriculum stuff that 23 the schools want to do, but also to reach out to 24 have the schools involved as volunteers. 25

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1 Primarily, all we did at that Steering 2 Committee meeting was make sure that we had 3 identified people. I asked members of that committee if there were additional people that 4 they would like to see appointed. There have 5 been some names recommended. And then we went 6 7 over the basic structure, primarily again the 8 same as what we did last time.

The structure will be the same, budgeting

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10 is basically the same. I've asked the Treasurer to pull the 2013 event revenue and income --11 12 revenue and income. Wouldn't it be great if it 13 was both? Expense and revenue reports that were 14 done for that event. What I told the Steering Committee was that I would do an outline of both 15 16 the event itself, much like last time, and the 17 budget, much like last time. We then set up a 18 schedule of meetings and a rough time line 19 between now and next July.

The event, to remind everyone, is next July 4th weekend, 2015. It will be the 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th. The 4th is a Saturday. The ships will, as of now, we're a year out, but as of now, the ships will be arriving the Friday, will be ready for tours the Saturday, Sunday, Monday, Tuesday.

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Hermione will be here the Sunday -- I'm sorry.
 The Monday and Tuesday -- no, I'm sorry, Sunday
 and Monday. Hermione will be here the 5th, from
 what I understand.

The other thing that I want to let people

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6 know, we had talked about there being a --7 potentially being an event in New London at the 8 same time. That was a possibility; it still is a 9 possibility. As of now, there is nothing 10 scheduled for New London. We are the only port 11 that these ships have to go to over that weekend. 12 That being said, Tall Ships America in the 13 initial discussion brought it up, because, if 14 they have a number of ships that have no place to 15 go, they may look to do an additional event. So I wanted to make sure that we had had the full 16 17 discussion, that everyone understood that there 18 might be another event. If so, it will also be a 19 Tall Ships America event, and there would be some 20 cross-promotion, etcetera, etcetera. As of now, 21 there is no other event, we're the only event. 22 There's nothing going on in New York City. 23 Hermione is there because that's where her home

24 base is. Their offices are in New York City.

25 They're obligated for the Fourth of July.

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The other thing that I would like to do

2 structurally is exactly what we're doing now. I would be making a report to this Board each month 3 4 on what the Steering Committee has done. What I 5 would like -- what the Steering Committee asked 6 is that it be authorized by this Board to work 7 within the structure. It's not going to -obviously, we have a budget for the event, but to 8 9 be able to set up the event and to allocate 10 Village assets in order to structure the event, 11 short of making any fiscal decisions, which would 12 be done both by the BID's Board for their 13 finances and this Board for our finances. But 14 that the Steering Committee be offered a degree 15 of freedom to set up the event within the 16 confines, basically, of what we had done last time. And I said that I would bring that up to 17 18 this Board. I didn't necessarily see there being 19 an issue with that. But that way they don't --20 there's not the Steering Committee making --21 coming up and discussing it, making a decision, 22 and then having to wait an additional month for 23 that decision to be acted on. We will be doing 24 everything within the same confines.

25 If there is stuff that's coming up that's

1	going to move faster, I will by email contact
2	everyone. I will also make sure that we have
3	that the Clerk will be involved, taking minutes
4	of those meetings, that those highlights will be
5	emailed out to everyone prior to these meetings.
6	I don't know yet when we've scheduled for those
7	meetings to happen. If they're right before the
8	work session, then no worries. But if they're,
9	you know, almost immediately after, then I'll
10	make sure everyone has the minutes of those
11	meetings as soon as those meetings takes place.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And the budget
13	issues will be separate so that we can actually
14	see what's going on each month, so that we
15	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Treasurer's
17	Department, maybe, or however you're going to
18	work that out
19	MAYOR NYCE: The Treasurer's Department
20	will be handling the finances. As of last
21	much like last time, the idea is that we are $$
22	we're the bank for the event, but the event is

23	supposed to pay for itself; that ticket sales and
24	sponsorships will be paying for the ships'
25	appearance fees and all of the other services

1 that are provided.

2 What we discussed at length at the BID ---3 I'm sorry, at the Steering Committee meeting was that the primary focus of this Board and the 4 BID's Board would be outreach to the business 5 community to get sponsorships; that we would all 6 7 work much like a Board of Trustees works for a 8 major organization, that they're the 9 income-raisers reaching out to -- in point for 10 the BID, to their purveyors, to the people that 11 supply them, reach out to them to get 12 sponsorships. And then, as Board Members here, 13 we would reach out to the people that work with 14 the Village and for the Village to the 15 contractors, and whatever else, to try and raise 16 money for sponsorships in that way, and that would be our primary focus. 17

18 That's pretty much it. It was very much a

19 preliminary meeting. Again, the idea is the 20 structure is very much the same. We have a great 21 deal more time than we did last time, so the 22 outreach, both from a what-the-event-is sense, 23 but also trying to raise additional funds, should 24 be more successful than it was last time, and it 25 was successful last time. So I think, given the

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additional time, we should have a very, very
 exciting event.

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have one 4 question, getting back to the financial part of 5 it. And I understand that, you know, we're the 6 bank, as you call it, okay, but what degree has 7 the BID promised to be part of that bank on a 8 monetary --

9 MAYOR NYCE: On a monetary basis, they are
10 allocating a great deal of their -- that year,
11 fiscal year's budget.
12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

MAYOR NYCE: But they still need to discussit as they're putting their budget together.

15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's
16	MAYOR NYCE: But they are treating that as
17	that will be the event that you're they may
18	not be able to finance a lot of the stuff,
19	smaller stuff that they've done
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In the past.
21	MAYOR NYCE: over the course of the year
22	for that season, but they're discussing that.
23	They're discussing the potential of a one-time
24	additional
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1 MAYOR NYCE: -- revenue tax for that year 2 on the District. All of those discussions, I'm 3 sure Trustee Robins will be having with them 4 during their -- during their meetings. But they 5 are -- they're obligating themselves financially, 6 and will be -- my hope, will be spearheading the 7 sponsorship portion of it.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. As I said, it's 9 something that I, as a Trustee, would like to 10 feel secure in, because, as George has mention in

11 of the past, you know, during this, it could be a change of this makeup of this Board. So I 12 13 just -- for me, as a Trustee, and responsible to 14 make sure that things are written down, or things 15 are out in the open as to what's going on. 16 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. Again, the idea of 17 this -- it's the same structure. The idea is 18 that ticket sales will fund the event. We're not 19 -- we're not increasing our expenses over last 20 time. It was a three-day event last time. I'm 21 being as conservative with this on the financial 22 end as I am with our annual budgets. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, I just --24 MAYOR NYCE: That I am way underestimating 25 revenues and --

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1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I'm not disagreeing 2 with that, but I just -- learning from the first 3 go-round, I think that that communication needs 4 to be brought to us each month, so that we all 5 understand where we're going. And, also, the 6 Village residents and taxpayers know where we're

7	going. Okay?
8	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because it is a joint
10	effort between the business community and the
11	Village Board.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Any other questions on that?
15	If not, that concludes the business for this work
16	session. It's 3:37 2:37.
17	(Laughter)
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
19	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: It has been all day.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Exactly. So at
21	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: 7:27.
