1	(Whereupon, the meeting was called to order
2	at 6:04 p.m.)
3	MAYOR NYCE: Good evening. I'm going to
4	call this meeting to order. If you'll please
5	rise and join me for the Pledge of Allegiance.
6	(Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of
7	Allegiance.)
8	MAYOR NYCE: Please remain standing for a
9	Moment of Silence for Henry Austin Clark, Jr.,
10	Irene J. Diaz, John W. Laird, Phyllis Jean Mokus,
11	Jon Rogers and Lewis Joseph Whitecavage.
12	(Whereupon, all remained standing for a
13	Moment of Silence.)
14	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. You may be seated.
15	This is the July regular meeting of the
16	Greenport Village Board of Trustees. We have
17	some announcements, and then we have some public
18	hearings, a public comment period and the regular
19	public portion of our agenda.
20	Before I get into the announcements, the
21	Clerk has asked that we try something new with
22	our public comment periods and public hearings,
23	and that is that we institute a sign-up sheet.
24	This will help the stenographer to make sure that
25	we have names and addresses for the record, and

1	also give us a chance to get people lined up that
2	want to speak. She has a list now. If there's
3	anyone that would like to speak, there's a
4	sign-up sheet for actually, we have one
5	sign-up sheet this time. There will be
6	individual sign-up sheets for the different items
7	in the future. But there are public hearings on
8	the annual MS4 Report, and then subsequent ones
9	are Local Laws pertaining to the MS4 Program.
10	There are two public hearings on those.
11	And then tonight we are also going to open
12	a public comment period, it's not a public
13	hearing, but we're going to start a public
14	comment period that I anticipate will go on for
15	several months. I'll introduce that when we get
16	to it, but on Mass Public Assembly Permits in
17	Mitchell Park.
18	So anyone that wants to speak to any of
19	those, if you'll come up to the Clerk, make that
20	known to her, and she'll sign you up. We'll go
21	into our announcements and then we'll get into
22	that fun stuff.
23	Next brush pick-up is scheduled for August
24	5th. We are requesting that anybody that feels

inclined to use the brown bags. We are testing

25

out as to whether that is a better method for our Road Department, and to keep leaves and debris out of stormwater systems, etcetera. Those of you that are willing to do, so we would encourage it.

Also, we are in the midst of hurricane season. Please make the necessary preparations, develop a plan for you and your family. You can get detailed information at our website, villageofgreenport.org. Also, Southold Town has an emergency management portion of their website, as does Suffolk County. Suffolk County also has a number that you can link to on our website for anybody that needs emergency assistance during a storm event. Our shelters are not prepared for that. Suffolk County does have a shelter that is. So, if you're somebody that's going to need ambulatory care during an emergency, please contact Suffolk County.

I want to thank the Board, primarily
Trustee Hubbard, for spearheading the Skate Park
event that happened yesterday. I know he has
some people that he wants to thank. It was a
great number of people out there yesterday. It
was a great deal of fun. The weather did hold
out. And I'll turn it over to George to go

1 through the thank yous. TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay, yes. Anybody who 2 3 did make it up there, it was very enjoyable. A 4 lot of fun by young and old, older kids. We all enjoyed it. I had a good time cooking. We went 5 6 through a lot of food. 7 I'd like to thank a few people. 8 Village, all the Village workers that were there 9 before the work that went into the place. It 10 came down to the last minute, but they got 11 everything put in place. The asphalt was done. 12 I want to thank Corazzini Asphalt, Finne Contracting did the woodwork and painting it. 13 Pollack's father, I don't know his name, rebuilt 14 15 two of the ramps and put that up there, I want to 16 thank him. 17 We had some people that donated items for 18 Greenport IGA, Peconic Landing, Relief Hose 19 of the Greenport Fire Department, Hommel's Plumbing Supply and Alice's Fish Market. 20 21 We had a lot of people that helped out 22 working it. I want to thank my daughter, Kelsey, 23 and her friend Nina Waters who worked on doing the raffle tickets and all. 24 And, at this time, I want to pass to the 25

1	Mayor \$594 dollars from donations and from the
2	raffles. The two girls walked around selling
3	them, they spent the whole day doing that.
4	Andrew Semon got a lot of the prizes. I don't
5	know what all of them were or who he got it from,
6	but I want to thank him and anybody who donated
7	to him for the raffle. It was a big success, and
8	that money is going to get used to go back into
9	the Skate Park.

Also helping serve the food and cook,
Trustee Mary Bess Phillips was there with me the
whole day and cleaning up afterwards, myself, my
wife Kathy, her friend, Frannie Hodgson. Bruno
Semon and his wife Felice were there and helped
out, slicing watermelon, cheese on burgers, doing
everything, and cleaning up most of the garbage.
The Village crew had a little bit to go this
morning, but we picked up, you know, I think 15
bags of garbage and took them all to the Village
dumpster.

Joe Jacobs has some really neat pictures, I believe they're going to get posted to the Village website, with the bucket truck, some aerial view of the kids and stuff going on.

There were some nice pictures, and we had a real

1	good crowd. No injuries, no problems, everybody
2	was well behaved, they all had fun, and it looked
3	like everybody enjoyed. And we served 250 hot
4	dogs, 175 hamburgers, 20 cases of water, and 15
5	cases of Gatorade all went, and it was all free
6	to everybody, anybody who wanted it, and they
7	partaked and they enjoyed.
8	I just want to thank everybody involved in
9	it. The kids were saying to Bo Pollack, they
10	said, "We ought to do this every month." And I'm
11	like, "I don't think that's going to happen."
12	(Laughter)
13	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: But we want to try to
14	plan and do something similar again next year.
15	But just, again, a thank you to everybody who
16	came up, and also the bands. They had six bands
17	that played. They turned away five bands who
18	wanted to join after the fact, but they didn't
19	have enough time for them. Their choice of music
20	is a little different than my taste, but I
21	learned a lot by it.
22	(Laughter)
23	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: And just a big thank you
24	to everybody that put this together, you know,
25	the workers, the contractors, the kids. You

Т	know, Andrew and bo organized arr the other sturr
2	through Facebook and social media. They brought
3	the whole crowd there. We kind of just worked on
4	what we were doing, and they brought a lot of
5	kids. They came from one band came from
6	Flushing, Queens, Bellport, we had kids that came
7	down to skate. So it was just a good turnout.
8	And thank you to everybody in the community
9	that came and helped and also contributed. That
10	was it. Thanks.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you very much. We also
12	have under Liquor License Applications, Little
13	Creek Oyster Farm and Market, 37 front Street,
14	Unit #5. That's anybody interested can write
15	to the State Liquor Authority. So this would
16	bring us
17	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Excuse me, I just forgot
18	one thing.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Right, go.
20	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. I just moved my
21	paper. I forgot, this is also pertaining to the
22	skate park. We got a letter from a Mrs. Theresa
23	Ward. She sent an email saying that her
24	ten-year-old son had a yard sale and he raised
25	\$100 that he wanted to donate to the Skate Park.

1	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
2	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: His name is Jack Murray.
3	I wanted to make sure I said his name, so he
4	watches the meeting. He took the proceeds from
5	his yard sale and dropped off \$100 to the Village
6	Clerk today.
7	MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
8	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: And I just want to thank
9	that young gentleman for pitching in.
10	(Applause)
11	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I'm done now. I forgot
12	that one.
13	MAYOR NYCE: That's good. I had several
14	different conversations with young people
15	yesterday, all of whom actually young and old,
16	all of whom commented that they do believe that
17	the more activity there is there, the more
18	ownership the kids take over the park, the better
19	it will be, the less vandalism we'll see,
20	etcetera, etcetera. So I hope that I hope
21	that the kids are taking ownership of it. It was
22	great to see.
23	All right. So we're into our public
24	hearings. The first public hearing is on the MS4
25	Annual Report. This is a report that the State

requires that we submit annually. It's also required by the State that we hold a public hearing on that report.

The Village is at this point involved in the MS4 Program, although we are anxious to remove ourself from said program. We feel that we're not in it properly. But, that being said, we must do these -- this annual report anyhow.

I'll ask the Clerk in a minute if there were people that signed up that wanted to speak to this. I will say that this public hearing was properly noticed, and that anyone wishing to make comment can do so at this time for the public record.

CLERK PIRILLO: Mr. Winkler?

MAYOR NYCE: John Winkler wanted to speak?

MR. WINKLER: I'm John Winkler, 175 Fifth

Street. I just read this briefly and there's a couple of things that I noticed.

The monitoring of the runoff, is that the

-- they put some pipes in, I guess, to check the
water at different levels to inspect what kind -what the groundwater, what's happening in the
groundwater on Fifth Street and Sixth Street. I
don't know if they did it any other place. What

1	kind of monitoring is going to be done? What is
2	this?
3	MAYOR NYCE: I think those were done prior
4	to the drainage basins that are being put in at
5	those two spots.
6	MR. WINKLER: Okay.
7	MAYOR NYCE: They wanted to find out what
8	water levels were, so they knew how deep
9	MR. WINKLER: Right.
10	MAYOR NYCE: they were going to go with
11	their dry wells.
12	MR. WINKLER: Okay.
13	MAYOR NYCE: They're going to they
14	monitor all discharge that goes over and
15	MR. WINKLER: But, I mean, is it equipment,
16	is it equipment that's going to be put down there
17	or
18	MAYOR NYCE: No, they test it periodically,
19	is my understanding.
20	MR. WINKLER: Okay. That's the only
21	question I have.
22	MAYOR NYCE: But they do and it's mostly
23	for stuff that you'd find in street runoff like
24	oils and what's the stuff that comes out of
25	transformers?

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Mineral.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Minerals and etcetera.
3	MR. WINKLER: Yeah. I mean, it seems like
4	something that would be good for the bay, you
5	know, because we have people dumping oil and that
6	sort of stuff. That wouldn't be good.
7	MAYOR NYCE: And I apologize for my comment
8	earlier, that I said we're not the MS4 Program
9	itself is a massive program that costs a lot of
10	money to maintain. We're looking to not
11	that's a double negative. We're not looking to
12	not do things to eliminate runoff. What we're
13	trying to make sure is that if we're in this
14	program, we're in it properly. And our
15	contention is that Sterling Creek was misnamed as
16	an impaired waterway and we shouldn't be in the
17	MS4 Program.
18	We want to do the right thing by the bays
19	and the road-ends as far as runoff. I want to
20	make sure that that's clear. I wasn't saying we
21	didn't want to do it.
22	MR. WINKLER: Again, I have to read this
23	some more, but, you know, as long as it's not
24	going to have a big effect. Again, I've heard
25	some rumors on how much they have to do down at

1 the Fifth Street Park, swales, and brick, 2 permeated bricks in the road to somehow absorb 3 the runoff before it gets into the bay, and that 4 would affect that park quite a bit. MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. 5 6 MR. WINKLER: So, I mean, that's not so 7 much the brick in the road, but if they put a 8 swale across that property --9 MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. 10 MR. WINKLER: It's going to have a big 11 effect. Okay. Thank you. 12 MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. 13 CLERK PIRILLO: Mr. Moore. 14 MR. MOORE: Are you taking comments on just 15 the MS4 report? 16 MAYOR NYCE: This is on the MS4 report, and then the next two, the next two public hearings 17 18 will be on the Local Laws. 19 MR. MOORE: I'm interested in the two 20 chapters, not the report. 21 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 22 MR. MOORE: Thank you. 23 MR. SALADINO: But, Dave, I didn't get to sign in. I'm sorry. Can I speak? 24 25 MAYOR NYCE: On the MS4 report?

1	MR. SALADINO: On the MS4 report.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
3	MR. SALADINO: Yes?
4	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
5	MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street.
6	You had mentioned it's an unfunded mandate.
7	Could you tell us could you share with us what
8	the penalty will be if we don't comply?
9	MAYOR NYCE: Noncompliance is the same as
10	it's a SPDES permit that the DEC issues. We
11	are issued a SPDES permit, so we would be
12	noncompliant. I don't know off the top of my
13	head what the financial penalties are, no.
14	MR. SALADINO: Is it prohibitive?
15	MAYOR NYCE: It is prohibitive.
16	MR. SALADINO: More than the cost of
17	implementing?
18	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
19	MR. SALADINO: Do you think?
20	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
21	MR. SALADINO: Thanks.
22	MAYOR NYCE: So, if there's no one else
23	that wishes to comment on the MS4 annual report,
24	I would entertain a motion to close that hearing.
25	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So moved.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Is there a second?
2	TRUSTEE MURRAY: I'll second that.
3	MAYOR NYCE: All those favor?
4	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.
5	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
8	MAYOR NYCE: Aye.
9	That public hearing is closed.
10	The next public hearing would be on a Local
11	Law creating Chapter 114 of the Village of
12	Greenport Code, amending Chapter 150 of the
13	Village of Greenport Code. I'm sorry. That's
14	the MS4 report, which is I'm sorry. I'm going
15	to ask Mr. Prokop to go over the intent of this
16	Local Law, and then we'll open up the public
17	hearing.
18	MR. PROKOP: Thank you, Mayor. The first
19	Local Law that we have tonight for a public
20	hearing is to create Chapter a new chapter,
21	Chapter 114 of the Greenport Village Code. And
22	in that new chapter, it will there will be
23	adopted, if this Board if this Board adopts
24	the Local Law, there'll be adopted regulations
25	regarding stormwater management, and further

_	regulations witch amend some of the regulations
2	in the existing Chapter 150, which is the Zoning
3	Code of the Village of Greenport.
4	The amendment to the Chapter 150 of the
5	Zoning Code of the Village of Greenport will
6	largely be to adopt the regulations contained in
7	Chapter 114, the new Chapter 114, so that in
8	development that the Stormwater Management
9	regulations is applicable to, that that will
LO	follow through regulations in Chapter 150.
L1	Now what all of this is, is it's required
L 2	it's actually required regulations that are
L3	imposed by the New York State Department of
L4	Environmental Conservation. The Local Law is
L5	virtually word-for-word provided for by the DEC.
L6	And in order to fully comply with the MS4
L7	requirements, we need to adopt this Local Law, or
L8	a Local Law similar to this, as part of our
L9	Greenport Village Code.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Is that clear to everyone?
21	MR. PROKOP: And that's the
22	corresponding
23	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Simplified it, huh?
24	MR. PROKOP: Yeah.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. Has mostly to do with,

1 as I understand for the zoning portion, has to do 2 with stormwater management during construction, 3 stormwater management during renovation, 4 stormwater management on your property as you are renovating or building a piece of property. 5 6 Most of the regulations, as I understand 7 them, again, as I understand them, don't pertain 8 to us, because the Village is as small as it is, 9 and we have a separate sewer system and 10 stormwater system anyhow. That being said, as 11 Mr. Prokop said, the State requires that we adopt 12 these into our local code. 13 So, with that, did I misspeak, Mr. Prokop, 14 or is that --15 MR. PROKOP: No, that's correct. Most of 16 the development --17 MAYOR NYCE: I wanted to simplify it a 18 little bit more. 19 MR. PROKOP: Yeah, thank you. Most of the 20 development that takes place in Greenport this 21 would not even necessarily apply to. 22 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 23 MR. PROKOP: But we are required to adopt a Local Law. 24 MAYOR NYCE: Right. So, with that, I will 25

1	state that this public hearing was properly
2	noticed. Anyone wishing to comment can do so at
3	this time for the public record. And I'll ask
4	the Clerk if there's anyone signed up to speak?
5	Mr. Moore, did you want to address the Board?
6	Mr. Moore, did you want
7	MR. MOORE: Sure. My name is Doug Moore,
8	145 Sterling Street.
9	I liked Mr. Prokop's summary of the new
10	chapter. It's certainly a lot shorter than all
11	the boiler plates. This is a very long chapter.
12	One comment I had to make, down around Page
13	11, it does indicate that this really only
14	applies to land development in excess of one
15	acre. It does, however, down near the bottom
16	under D, include all property development. And
17	in that case, only the I forget the acronym,
18	but the Stormwater Management Officer has to
19	approve the plan. I think it would be a good
20	idea if that approval in the paperwork was
21	forwarded to any other Boards or individuals that
22	are reviewing those plans, because this doesn't
23	provide for anything but an approval of a plan.
24	So I think things like planning, it would
25	be very beneficial if that information could be

1	passed forward. And, for instance, the Trustees,
2	with a wetlands permit, if that's in connection
3	with the development, also it would be very good
4	if that could be part of the regulation, that
5	that would be passed on.
6	MAYOR NYCE: I believe that's the intent,
7	that that will become part of the paperwork that
8	follows the job.
9	MR. MOORE: And you did mention some level
10	of exemption of the Village properties. But I
11	would suggest that one of the greatest amounts of
12	runoff that's uncontrolled is currently from
13	Village streets. So it would be nice if there
14	was some coverage, that any improvements in
15	Village draining systems would include proper
16	management to prevent the pollution that this
17	regulation is intended to control.
18	And are you taking comments on the other
19	chapter later?
20	MAYOR NYCE: Immediately after this one.
21	MR. MOORE: I'll be back. Thanks very
22	much.
23	MR. SWISKEY: Did I sign up for this one,
24	Sylvia?
25	CLERK PIRILLO: You did on another subject

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1 looking at this and, basically, this says almost 2 every activity in the Village, whether it's a renovation, the way I'm reading it, and not the 3 4 way Mr. Prokop says, this is quite -- all land development activities subject to review and 5 6 approval by the Planning Board, that's almost 7 everybody, everything that comes before the 8 Village. All right? 9 MAYOR NYCE: No. 10 MR. SWISKEY: All land development 11 activities not subject to review by the Planning Board, basically, if I get a building permit --12 the way I'm reading this, whoever does this is 13 going to have to submit a Stormwater Prevention 14 15 Am I reading that right, David? Plan. 16 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yes, you are. 17 MR. SWISKEY: You and I are both agreeing 18 on that. Who is going to review these Storm Water Prevention Plans, because they could be --19 you could take a small parcel of property and 20 21 make a real mess out of it. In other words, if 22 say I had a parcel and I'm putting a garage on, and, well, there's runoff off the roof. 23 24 going to have to put in dry wells to manage that 25 runoff?

1	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That's a question I was
2	going to ask. The Town of Southold requires this
3	as well right now. So, if you do a renovation to
4	the house, as far as I'm reading it, you're going
5	to have to do dry wells for a renovation, and
6	you're going to have to maintain the entire
7	you're going to have dry wells for
8	MR. SWISKEY: Hay bales for the whole
9	thing?
10	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Well, for the entire
11	project during construction, hay bales.
12	MAYOR NYCE: During construction.
13	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah, during construction,
14	but dry wells to contain it.
15	MAYOR NYCE: For properties over an acre.
16	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Right. Properties over ar
17	acre?
18	MAYOR NYCE: Properties over an acre.
19	MR. SWISKEY: Maybe I missed that, because
20	I don't
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Not properties less?
22	MR. SWISKEY: see where it says on here
23	that. I'm reading Article
24	MAYOR NYCE: Village Attorney just said, as
25	he read it

1	MR. SWISKEY: Well, where? May the Village
2	Attorney please tell me where it is, because I
3	don't see it?
4	MR. PROKOP: I'm sorry. What?
5	MR. SWISKEY: Where it says properties over
6	an acre, I don't believe it says this on here,
7	from what I'm reading.
8	MR. PROKOP: Well, many of these
9	considerations are reviewed by the Planning Board
10	anyway. The Planning Board in many applications
11	considers now considers runoff and
12	MR. SWISKEY: Yeah, but there's nothing in
13	here about an acre. If you've got 100-by-100,
14	you have to comply, from what I can see, right,
15	David? Is that the way you read it?
16	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That was the question I
17	was going to bring up, too. I did have that
18	question, because
19	MR. SWISKEY: I think that this was
20	TRUSTEE MURRAY: the way this law reads,
21	and this is everybody's complying with this,
22	this isn't just the first time every municipality
23	has seen this
24	MR. SWISKEY: No.
25	TRUSTEE MURRAY: is that you have to

1	contain
2	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
3	TRUSTEE MURRAY: your runoff with dry
4	wells.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Well, you have to contain the
6	construction site during that construction.
7	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Well, that as well as
8	that, but the dry wells after the fact. They
9	want your gutters to go into dry wells, and they
10	want you to add gutters
11	MR. SWISKEY: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE MURRAY: if you don't have them.
13	MR. SWISKEY: Yeah, but most land in the
14	Village parcels don't have enough room for a
15	four-by-eight-by-four-foot dry well.
16	MAYOR NYCE: That's exactly correct.
17	MR. SWISKEY: So I think before we pass
18	this, we should do a little modification so it
19	fits the reality of the Village, is what I would
20	urge this Board to do. Yes, Mr. Prokop?
21	MR. PROKOP: Yeah. It's actually
22	determined it's actually defined as there's
23	three conditions. One is stormwater runoff from
24	land development activities, discharging a
25	pollutant of concern, or stormwater runoff from

- land development activities disturbing five or more acres, or stormwater runoff from land development activity disturbing between one and five acres of land during the course of the project, exclusive of the construction of single-family residences.
  - So I think that the majority of the properties in the Village would probably be excluded.
- 10 MR. SWISKEY: Well, that's --

- MR. PROKOP: And there's also different levels of compliance, and there -- as the Mayor and the other Board Members said, there's one level that has to do with during construction, and then the other has to do with permanent provision for containment.
  - MR. SWISKEY: Because my point is I'm getting -- all right. I agree, that's the way it should be, but it should be written down, so when somebody picks it up five years down the road, somebody on the Planning Board doesn't tell somebody with a 50-by-100 lot, "Hey, you've got to" -- and he's like no. It should be hard and fast and in stone whatever is going to apply in the Village and how it's going to apply, because

Τ	administrations change, attitudes change, but
2	land doesn't change.
3	MAYOR NYCE: Yup.
4	MR. SWISKEY: And, like I say, if they come
5	along in five years and tell me, because I'm
6	changing the roof on my garage, that I basically
7	have to put in gutters and storm, you know,
8	drains on property that ain't big enough to hold
9	the rains.
10	So I think the Village Board should be very
11	cautious before they move forward on this, and
12	perhaps another public hearing or two to explain
13	things better, because, you know, if information
14	comes out, and perhaps Mr. Prokop could write a
15	synopsis that people could understand of
16	exactly you know, something simple, not we's
17	and I's. You know what I mean, Mr. Mayor.
18	MAYOR NYCE: I do.
19	MR. SWISKEY: Thank you.
20	MR. OSINSKI: Michael Osinski, 307 Flint
21	Street.
22	I own a parcel larger than an acre. What
23	does this do to me? I mean, this is a real
24	concern, because I'm not concerned so much, you
25	know, we don't really do much there, we don't

1	build much. But say like the shipyard, there's a
2	three-acre parcel. God knows what's there. How
3	is that going to affect the shipyard? You know,
4	I think, you know, we have a you know, we have
5	an old waterfront here, hundreds of years old.
6	We all know, even Mitchell Park, you know, God
7	knows what's still there. So I think that we
8	should be a little circumspect about it.
9	And my other concern is stormwater, the
10	drain, the runoff from the streets is the major
11	source of pollution. If we're if we're making
12	all kinds of new laws to control what private
13	residents do and we're ignoring the major source
14	point of pollution, are we is the Village
15	immune from fixing all these all these streets
16	that are running right into the bay?
17	MAYOR NYCE: No.
18	MR. OSINSKI: Does this preclude does
19	the Village have to remedy the situation?
20	MAYOR NYCE: Under MS4, yes.
21	MR. OSINSKI: I think it really should.
22	You know, I think
23	MAYOR NYCE: And the Village's intent is to
24	MR. OSINSKI: Yeah, I think that that's
25	you know, since it's the major source, you know,

1 all the regulation concerning these minor source 2 points are sort of, you know, foolish compared 3 to -- if the major source is the streets, let's 4 clean up the streets. 5 MAYOR NYCE: Right. And, ultimately, the 6 State's not interested in funding that activity. 7 They want the small municipalities to take on 8 that major activity and, so they push --9 MR. OSINSKI: But you can do dirt roads, 10 you can do things. 11 I understand. They push it MAYOR NYCE: 12 down the road. As I stated before, the Village 13 is intent on making those repairs to those road 14 ends, because it's the right thing to do for our The other -- the other portions of it 15 waterways. 16 we're acting on very cautiously. 17 MR. KEHL: Bob Kehl, 242 Fifth Avenue. 18 This could also add a large expense to people 19 that are trying to put additions on houses. I 20 mean, it could cost like \$10,000 more to put dry 21 wells in and run this stuff around, and put your 22 silt and your hay bales all around the houses, 23 along with -- I agree with what Bill Swiskey

said, there is not enough room on these place,

and you need it to put -- it has to be written

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25

Τ	out in fine print exactly now this stuff is going
2	to be, because I know it's going to get switched
3	around later on. Someone's going to bitch and
4	someone's going to say, "Oh, geez, he doesn't
5	have the silt liner, he doesn't have the hay
6	bales around his house." The poor guy's got a
7	little lot he's trying to squeeze a house in, or
8	he's trying to put an addition on, and he can't
9	afford to do it, and you start adding \$10,000 to
LO	the cost of the addition and the guy can't afford
11	it. I mean, people around here aren't rich.
L2	TRUSTEE MURRAY: You are.
L3	MR. KEHL: Yeah, I wish.
L4	(Laughter)
L 5	MAYOR NYCE: Does anyone else from the
L6	public wish to address the Board on this?
L7	(No response.)
L8	MAYOR NYCE: I'll ask if the Board has any
L9	comments? Trustee Murray, were your comments
20	made or do
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: No yes, it was made and
22	discussed. Thank you.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Trustee Robins wants to make a
24	comment.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Under Exemptions,

1 which start on Page 11, at the top of Page 12, 2 "Routine maintenance activities Item B states: 3 that disturb less than five acres and are 4 performed to maintain the original line and grade, hydraulic capacity, or original purpose of 5 6 a facility," I read that as an exemption on most 7 of the properties in the Village, really. In 8 other words, a preexisting condition of the 9 property is -- has the potential to be exempted from the -- what you were reading before. 10 11 MR. SWISKEY: I agree with you on that, but 12 it should be written down harder, because, like I 13 said, let's move on it. 14 MAYOR NYCE: I agree. I would -- I'm going to -- if the Board doesn't have anymore comments, 15 16 I'm going to ask that the Village Attorney take 17 the comments that were made here tonight and I 18 would like to -- I know this is a template law 19 that the State wants everyone to adopt. I don't 20 believe that the Village fits in most of the State's MS4 Program, because they're usually 21 22 talking about lots that are an acre-and-a-half or 23 two acres or over, where you actually do have stormwater that can be abated on that property. 24 You can't do that in the Village. You can't 25

1 possibly take the stormwater from your house and 2 get rid of it on less than a quarter of an acre. 3 Now, if, in fact, the State allows us --4 allows those homeowners to use the Village storm drains as part of their property's stormwater 5 6 runoff, then this law should state that. And if we can get exemptions for properties that are 7 8 less than a certain acreage, or we can clarify 9 that general maintenance of rebuilding of 10 existing structures are exempt from, then I have less trepidation about approaching this Local 11 12 Law. MR. PROKOP: Okay. I'll do that. 13 MAYOR NYCE: But, as it reads, I agree with 14 15 It's a little the comments that were made. 16 heavy-handed, and potentially adds to cost for 17 people that's unnecessary, without actually approaching what the State is trying to do, and 18 19 that is, as Mr. Osinski pointed out, to actually clean up the water that's going into our bays. 20 21 If that's the intention, then let's make sure 22 we're doing it the right way. 23 MR. PROKOP: Okay. MAYOR NYCE: With that, I assume we will be 24 doing another public hearing, so we would -- we 25

         on a Local Law creating Chapter 114A. And I will

         ask the Village Attorney again to do a synopsis

         of 114A.

               MR. PROKOP: Okay. What 114A is intended
         to do, basically, is to be the enforcement
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1	mechanism for Chapter 114. And again, this is a
2	Local Law that's prescribed by the New York State
3	Department of Environmental Conservation. The
4	language of the law is from that agency, and it
5	would be a new Chapter 114A of the Greenport
6	Village Code.
7	MAYOR NYCE: And it sets up who would
8	monitor, how they would monitor, and what the
9	fines would be for illicit discharge?
10	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
11	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: We will have 114 and
12	114A?
13	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
14	MAYOR NYCE: We have a public hearing set
15	up, so we might as well have it.
16	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: All right.
17	MAYOR NYCE: So that being said, this
18	public hearing has been properly noticed. Anyone
19	wishing to comment can do so at this time for the
20	record. We'll ask is there anyone on the list?
21	CLERK PIRILLO: Mr. Winkler, are you
22	speaking again?
23	MR. WINKLER: I'm good. Thank you.
24	CLERK PIRILLO: Mr. Moore?
25	MR. MOORE: Yes, just one comment.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Okay, Mr. Moore.
2	MR. MOORE: Thank you. Again, Doug Moore,
3	145 Sterling Street.
4	"Illicit discharge" is a very exciting
5	sounding term.
6	MAYOR NYCE: Whatever gets you going, Doug.
7	(Laughter)
8	MR. MOORE: You can get arrested for that.
9	I might be confused, but it's my
10	understanding that privately maintained septic
11	systems are not permitted in Village borders
12	where sanitary systems are available; is that
13	correct or not?
14	MAYOR NYCE: I think if they already exist
15	and they haven't been changed, they're allowed
16	to they're allowed to continue. At the point
17	where they no longer function, you are required
18	to hook up to the sewer system.
19	MR. MOORE: I see.
20	MAYOR NYCE: I believe that's how it
21	that's how it was instituted way on back and it's
22	been the same ever since.
23	MR. MOORE: Right. On about Page 10, and
24	then 11 and 12, there's quite a lot of detail on
25	privately maintained systems.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
2	MR. MOORE: And a lot of performance
3	parameters. So, hopefully, if there is a
4	prohibition against repairing them, then all of
5	these issues about fixing them and meeting
6	certain standards might have to change.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Again, there's no prohibition
8	of fixing them. At the point where they don't
9	function properly at all and need to be removed,
10	then you're required to hook up. As long as you
11	maintain your system and it functions within
12	reasonable limits, it's allowed.
13	MR. MOORE: Let's say replacing a cesspool.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Replacing a cesspool would
15	probably require you to then abandon it and hook
16	up to the sewer system.
17	MR. MOORE: Well, you might just want to
18	look at those sections, because it seems to give
19	the impression that people just meet certain
20	standards and there you know, they continue
21	with the system. I'm just pointing that out as a
22	possible complication if there is a directive to
23	change to the sanitary system that the Village
24	operates.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

T	MR. MUURE: Ukay. Inanks.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Is there anyone else who
3	wishes to comment on yes.
4	MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. You don't want to
5	catch Sandy Beach in the catch 22 on this,
6	because they you know, most cesspools, when
7	the house is sold, usually the bank tells the
8	buyer or the seller you have to hook it up to the
9	water and sewer, so that's how they've been going
10	away over the years. So that's not a real issue.
11	There can't be more than maybe three or four left
12	in the whole Village besides Sandy Beach.
13	What bothers me here is 99% of the
14	pollution, and we all know it, is from Village
15	streets. Village drains go overboard. It's
16	like and then we talk about severe penalties.
17	How does the Village penalize itself? So I just
18	wanted to throw that out there.
19	You know, you could talk a first flush
20	system, and we put a few in over the years in the
21	Village, which is they don't cost that much,
22	but you could on a certain amount of streets,
23	unless the streets is really a mess, like at the
24	end of Fifth Street, I don't know how many dry
25	wells or this plastic thing, if contained it

1	goes in the ground, it's contained, the funding
2	where the pollutants are contained in it, but
3	that would be expensive.
4	Anyway, I just wanted to comment on that.
5	Thank you.
6	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. If there's no one
7	else that wishes to comment on this Local Law,
8	then I would make the same comment on this one
9	that I did on creating Chapter 114, to the
10	Village Attorney, that we go through this after
11	going through Chapter 114, and make the
12	enforcement portion of it match what we created
13	as Chapter 114, and we'll bring this up again at
14	somewhere in the future.
15	That being said, I would entertain a motion
16	to close that public hearing.
17	TRUSTEE MURRAY: So moved.
18	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Second.
19	MAYOR NYCE: All those in favor?
20	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Aye.
25	Any opposed or abstentions?

1	(No response.)
2	MAYOR NYCE: That is closed. We've gotten
3	through the public hearings. Thank you.
4	The next portion of this evening is a
5	public I'm going to open a public comment
6	period. I want to give a little bit of
7	background on this before we do so, and also
8	state that this is just the start of a public
9	comment period that I and the Board anticipate
10	will be going on for several months with regards
11	to the use of Mitchell Park, primarily as
12	pertains to the issuance of Mass Public Assembly
13	Permits.
14	I have asked the Village Attorney to go
15	over what rules, regulations and stipulations the
16	State has placed on that property, because there
17	was State money used to create Mitchell Park. So
18	the State may have some limitations as to what we
19	can do as far as fees, usages, etcetera,
20	etcetera, so I've asked him to review that.
21	Primarily, what we're looking for comment
22	on at this point is should the Village grant Mass
23	Public Assembly Permits for the use of Mitchell
24	Park or not. We cannot eliminate people to

congregate at Mitchell Park. It's a public park,

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people can do in the park what they wish, as long as they're not constricting anyone else's use to that public space.

We have -- as many of you know, the park is fairly new in the grand scheme of things. What this administration has done is to attempt to, without ultimately putting real strict controls on the park, to see what the use was going to be over time. So instead of coming up with a hard and fast list of rules from day one as to what the park could be used for and not used for, what we opted to do is go on a case-by-case basis, and the stipulations were that if there was a public benefit, and it wasn't constricting a majority of the people's use of the park, or it was a major public function that the Village was a sponsor or cosponsor of, then we would allow it.

And comments have been made over the past seven years that the park was going to be used, and eventually overused, and there would come a time when there wouldn't be a weekend when there wouldn't be some event happening in the park. That has come to pass. And over the course of last summer and this spring, this Board started to look to deny different activities because of

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that extended use of the park. This spring we denied a couple of activities that we thought were not appropriate for the park. We had to backtrack. But, as we were doing that, Trustee Hubbard made the comment that you're not going to be able to go to Mitchell Park on any given day without somebody renting, because that's what the Mass Public Assembly Permit really does, a portion of the park.

So what we determined to do at last month's meeting was to place a moratorium on the Mass Public Assembly Permits for Mitchell Park while we determined, through a long-term public conversation, how we want the park to be used going into the future. There were two things brought up at that meeting as ways forward. One was to make the fee for the use of the park for the Mass Public Assembly Permit prohibitive. George had suggested \$1,000, I suggested 2500, not knowing whether or not we can enforce that, because the State may stipulate an amount that we can charge. But that would be the one way to go. The other would be to eliminate Mass Public Assembly Permits entirely, and it would just be a public park where people could assemble as of

1 right. And if they were impeding other people's 2 rights, they would be asked to move on, etcetera. 3 So, with that, we are looking for input 4 from the public. The Board will be discussing this at length, I'm assuming for the next several 5 6 months at meetings. We'll accept comment 7 written. You can write to the Clerk, you can 8 email to the website, villageofgreenport.org, and 9 we'll take the comments tonight. The idea is to 10 basically take the temperature of what do people 11 think we should be doing with our local park. 12 I know there was a lengthy discussion. wasn't at the BID meeting. The Business 13 14 Improvement District is going to want to weigh in I notice Linda Kessler is here. 15 on this. Ι 16 don't know if she's here representing the BID. Ι 17 talked to Peter Clarke. They are going to have a 18 public comment at some point. I told him it was 19 going to be a longer term for the comment period, 20 so I guess he opted not to make that public 21 comment tonight, but we'd be looking for their 22 comments as well. 23 So, with that, I'll open it up. Sylvia,

you have a list of people that wanted to speak on

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this as well?

1	CLERK PIRILLO: Well, I have Mrs. Osinski
2	and Mr. Roberts. I don't know their subject
3	matters.
4	MRS. OSINSKI: I'm deferring to Mike
5	Osinski, if that's okay.
6	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. Your name and address
8	for the record.
9	MR. OSINSKI: Michael Osinski, 307 Flint
10	Street.
11	I'd like to read the First Amendment to the
12	Constitution, United States Constitution.
13	"Congress shall make no law respecting an
14	establishment of religion, or prohibit the free
15	exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of
16	speech, or of the press, or the right of the
17	people peaceably to assemble."
18	I think that and it goes on a little
19	bit. But I think that this Board, you know, this
20	is the governing document under which we all live
21	in this country, and I think this Board should
22	tread very lightly on the amount of restriction
23	that it wants to place on public property,
24	because we, as citizens of this nation, have the
25	right to assemble. And I may disagree with

1 people, or whatever, and, you know -- but they 2 have that right to assemble. And I would not 3 want -- this is a public place that they want to 4 assemble in. And I think that the Board should 5 be very circumspect in its limitation of the 6 right of American citizens to assemble peaceably. 7 Now if people are rowdy, drunk, that's 8 another thing. Okay? But I go through the park 9 almost every day, I see drunks loitering in there every day, every day. I go through -- I mean, I 10 11 benefit from the Maritime Museum, the annual 12 whatever it is. Maritime Festival here. You know, I sell oysters, and that's a big -- that's 13 14 a big event. It takes over the whole Village, it takes over the park. There's a lot of events. 15 16 You know, we have Christmas tree lighting. That's, you know, just in and of itself is a 17 18 religious event. We have a menorah that gets 19 lit, you know, that happens in the park. Let's let everybody use that park and let's let 20 21 everybody assemble. You know, this is a right 22 that citizens have, that if you try to curtail 23 it, people will contest it and you'll lose. You know, it's the First Amendment of the United 24 States Constitution. 25

1	MAYOR NYCE: But let me clarify. The Mass
2	Public Assembly Permit, as issued by the Village
3	Board, what that does I should have started
4	with this. What that does is that gives that
5	applicant specific rights to a specific portion
6	of the park for their event. Okay? If we don't
7	grant that, the park is exactly as Mr. Osinski
8	said, it is an open space, anyone can use it,
9	anyone can assemble, that that is that is a
10	citizen's right to do. So this Board is
11	looking
12	MR. OSINSKI: But the permit process is a
13	good process to control what they do there,
14	what you know, if it's out of bounds. The
15	permit process is a good process.
16	MAYOR NYCE: All the permit process will
17	allow us to do is to authorize use of specific
18	structures, amplification. We cannot limit
19	people's right to assemble, regardless of who
20	they are. It's a Mass Public Assembly Permit.
21	All it does is it grants a specific portion of
22	that property to a group for a specified period
23	of time.
24	Okay. Who else was on the is there
25	anyone else on the list? That was it?

1	CLERK PIRILLO: Mr. Roberts.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Mr. Roberts.
3	MR. ROBERTS: Good evening. Doug Roberts,
4	415 Sixth Avenue.
5	So Mitchell Park's amazing. It's part of
6	why I moved here, I think a lot of us who have
7	come in the last 10 years or so. We have a lot
8	of other parks in this Village, too, and some of
9	them are not so amazing. I see kids playing in,
10	you know, some conditions over here that
11	sometimes I'm not sure I would want my own
12	daughter, when she grows up, to play in. We've
13	got port-o-potties instead of bathrooms. This
L4	stuff I'm not, you know, Pollyanna. This stuff
15	takes money, it takes revenue. We have a
L6	potential revenue-generator in Mitchell Park.
L7	I don't want to take this park away from
18	any Villagers, but it occurs to me that the
19	vineyards around here, they rent their space out
20	for five grand, ten grand. That's before you
21	bought a glass of wine and a piece of cake. So
22	I'm not pretending that we could host weddings
23	here, I'm not saying we should, but this could be
24	a revenue-generator. Like any investment, you

know, if you pay a bunch of money each year for

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the financing on it, right? Like any investment,

let's figure out ways to turn it into revenue,

while still making it a public park.

I, for one, am a Villager who would support something like five to ten days a year with specific rules. We have to end the event by a certain hour, the volume has to be at a certain level or lower. But I'd sign up for big-money events that can bring revenue into the Village, pay off our debt faster, and get these other parks where a lot of the Villagers, the locals, where our kids play, get those looking better sooner, so -- or fix some sidewalks.

You know, my wife and I walk our baby in a stroller on the street most blocks around here, because there are potholes, or roots, or whatever. I know this stuff takes money. That's a park where we could make money. I'd love to see you all think about ways that -- where we could do that.

And if it has to go for a public referendum, because, you know, we're going to take people's park away for ten nights a year or five nights a year, let's figure out -- let's put it before the public. Let's everybody vote, and

1	if you know, we make it clear. If you support
2	this, there are going to ten nights where there
3	might be an event there that has people from out
4	of town.
5	And, by the way, for these events, we
6	should require, if you come here and use our
7	park, you've got to hire you know, your
8	vending has to come from local vendors, from
9	Village vendors. You know, let's make it a way
10	for our businesses to make money, let's make it a
11	way for our Village to pay off our debt faster
12	and improve our other parks. So I'd love to see
13	that. Thank you.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
15	MS. MC ENTEE: May I speak?
16	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, please.
17	MS. MC ENTEE: Joanne McEntee, 242 Fifth
18	Avenue, Greenport.
19	I just have a couple of questions, like who
20	would determine that Mitchell Park is appropriate
21	for its use? Who would be that person that would
22	be making the decision for those people to make
23	to be at the park?
24	MAYOR NYCE: This Board makes that
25	decision.

1	MS. MC ENTEE: This Board does?
2	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
3	MS. MC ENTEE: And that's great. I do
4	believe that Mitchell Park needs to bring in a
5	lot more money. We are in a deficit right now.
6	I'm happy to see that our Village is moving in a
7	direction, or hope that it will be moving in a
8	direction, and that this brings in more cash for us.
9	That's really all I have to say. Thank
LO	you.
L1	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Mr. Swiskey, and
L 2	then MR. Moore, if you wanted to comment.
L3	MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184 Fifth
L4	Street.
L 5	There's something here that most people
L6	don't understand, and the best story I could tell
L7	of it is there's launching ramp in Jamesport the
L8	Town of Riverhead put in, which used a lot of
L9	State money. And way back when, the Town of
20	Riverhead was going to charge. Anybody that used
21	the ramp had to pay a fee if you weren't a
22	Riverhead resident. Well, somebody took them to
23	court and sued. Since it was paid for with State
24	money and Federal money, guess what, you can't do
25	that.

And besides, they talk about a revenue-generator. To generate enough revenue in that park to make a difference on the debt -- the debt has to be paid by the Marina, and these big ships that are coming are going to do it. I'm looking at like there's six or 700 feet of tall ship down there, times \$4 a day, plus the -- that's where your money's going to come from. To generate enough money out of that park, which is a pipe dream, you know, the park, you're going to rent the park because the Carousel's there, that generates some money, but that park would be destroyed.

The purpose of the park, to begin with, and I was here when it was first proposed and put together, I can remember when they had the shovel raising in the middle of winter, they had to go down there with jackhammer, make a hole and put some sand in there, so the politicians could do that. And the politicians said, "No, you got to come over." "But why?" You know what I mean?

But the point is that it's come down to this: We got away with it for a long time with the menorah lighting, you know, we got to say what it is, but now we've been caught. So now

1 it's either all or nothing. So you can't say, 2 "Well, we're going to let the Maritime Museum use 3 it." They're not basically a Village agency, 4 even though we will support their function. That 5 will just get you in trouble in court. Or a boat 6 show from the -- that will get you in trouble, 7 too. You either have to permit everything or 8 permit nothing, except what the Village sponsors, 9 like Dances in the Park that you can prove that 10 you're putting these on. These other things 11 you're not going to.

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So it's a real catch 22 and you're going to need to have some ideas. And, like I said, it's -- the money to pay for the park is going to come from the Marina, it's not going to come from the I mean, the Greenport Band can play in the park. You can -- the religious group that was park. there the other day, and I don't speak against religious groups, but some merchants and some other people, "Well, they were rowdy and they were making noise. Did you hear them? They were" -- well, that's when, even though you had to allow them, that's when somebody from the Village went down -- should have went down there and said, "You're out of bounds, you're

1	disturbing the peace here, you're basically in
2	violation, and you need some type of use
3	ordinance." But you could have done it and said,
4	"You either stop this nonsense or you have to
5	leave the park."
6	You have to be able to enforce, and it's
7	like it's going to be it's not going to be an
8	easy thing to come up with this policy, because,
9	like I say, it's been paid for mostly by Federal
10	and State money. And we can't just tell some
11	citizen from New York City that has his Federal
12	taxes or State taxes, you can't go to this park
13	and stand on a soap box and scream out your

I think the success of the park, as you indicated, has actually caused the problem that we're talking about tonight. And I think we've been watching and waiting probably long enough, so that it's time to have some established policies.

views. Oh, we can play -- we can stop them from

I think the public has generally supported the Village-sponsored activities. I think -- I've never heard anyone say, "Well, that's just a terrible thing to have Dances in the Park." So those activities are certainly a good thing.

I think the Village could arrange for a determined number of events in the park in advance and take applications for them. I've suggested this in the past.

I think we do distinguish a difference between the freedom of -- right of assembly and freedom of speech to actually regulating and controlling organized activities of the park. So I think you could do that, and these would be based on merit, which basically apply to public interest and benefit to the community. And I think if you had established the standards that you use when evaluating these proposals, you really wouldn't have a problem.

One additional comment is that I think the profit motive for venues in the park should not be the consideration, I think it's the benefit to the public. I see nothing wrong with charging an appropriate application fee for processing, or the cost of the event and its cleanup, that's

1 certainly reasonable. But I think trying to turn 2 the Village into a money-maker outside of the 3 Marina activities really is against what the 4 public is interested in. They'd like to use the park and perhaps allow a small amount of side use 5 6 by appropriate groups. Thank you. MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Mr. Saladino, you 7 8 wanted to comment? 9 John Saladino, Sixth Street. MR. SALADINO: 10 I would like to echo also what Mr. Moore 11 said. I think everyone should be able to use the 12 park. You know, the park doesn't belong to me. I think everybody should use the park. And I 13 14 think one of the reasons why we're here is because of the denial of a Mass Public Assembly 15 16 Permit and then a granting of it, and then a 17 little bit of craziness that happened with that 18 event. I think that has a lot to do with what's 19 going on now. We all know -- Mike read the Constitution. 20 21 We all know you can't limit the right to 22 assemble, but you can kind of limit the way you 23 do it, in my opinion, not being an attorney. I don't think you should be able to -- I think the 24 Village -- I think the Village should have the 25

1	right to limit amplified music or especially
2	when it's adjacent to another Village facility
3	that people might be expecting peace and quiet.
4	You know, I don't know what the boat is
5	MAYOR NYCE: But they're next to Claudio's.
6	MR. SALADINO: Next to Claudio's. But I
7	just I happened to be at the park for a
8	particular event, and I must have spoke to I
9	spoke to four or five of the larger boaters. I
10	spoke to the crew from Skyfall, and I kind of
11	asked, I said, "What do you guys think here?"
12	And he says, "Oh, this is pretty crazy."
13	So do they have more of a right than the
14	people that had the park? I don't know. I think
15	they have an equal right. I think they should
16	have been there should have been some kind of
17	limit on how much noise or how much you have a
18	right to religious freedom, but you don't have
19	the right to be disruptive about it. You know,
20	that's what I'm kind of thinking.
21	How you guys solve that is going to be a
22	big deal, I think. You know, I don't know how
23	you're going to solve that, but if you limit it
24	to being undercover, or a certain portion.
25	I'm not sure I agree with my pal, Billy,

1 that, you know, the whole park should be 2 available to the public. I kind of think you can 3 set aside portions, if there is an event or 4 something, that you limit the Mass Public Assembly Permit holder to that portion of the 5 6 park, that it's not interfering with other stuff 7 that's going on. I don't know if that's legal. 8 Maybe Joe knows if that's legal or not. 9 Also, I know that, you know, in New York 10 City, they have special event permits, you know, 11 that -- everything in New York City is for rent. 12 Everything that's there is for rent, from the library to the Statute of Liberty to the 13 14 planetarium, everything is for rent. But it's not a matter of you walking in there and you set 15 16 up a table and you sell lemonade. You've got to 17 get a special events permit to do it and they put big restrictions on you, and they charge big 18 19 monev. 20 I don't know about the property. 21 guys know with these applications, that if you do 22 give something that belongs to the Village to 23 somebody else, the Village should be reimbursed for it? I don't know if -- I don't know if 24 you're going to be able -- again, Billy seems to 25

1 know more about this than I do. I don't know if 2 the State is really going to have a problem with 3 you renting 2,000 square feet of Mitchell Park 4 for a venue fee for somebody to put a tent and have their revival meeting, as an example. 5 6 So what you do, I think -- actually, I kind 7 of thought the first step of this process would 8 be to find out exactly what the State allows 9 before we comment and say, "Well, no, that's baloney," you know, you could do this, and Billy, 10 11 says, "No, you can't do it," and I say, "Yeah, 12 you can." It would be a helpful thing to the people that are going to comment the next time if 13 14 we knew exactly how the State felt about it, or the Federal Government felt about it. 15 16 You know, we kind of went through this 17 process with the Railroad Dock, we kind of 18 squared that away. So maybe now we'll find out 19 what the State thinks about the park and then we 20 can have a more informed opinion. 21 Thanks for listening. 22 MAYOR NYCE: That's a valid comment. 23 That's a miscommunication between Trustee Hubbard 24 and myself. We knew we were going to do this. Ι

wasn't at the meeting that George set this up.

4	had when I came back, I asked the Village
5	Attorney to start looking into that. We decided
6	not to put off the start of the public comment

15	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
16	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: We talked about it last
17	month with the other public hearings; postpone
18	it. My feeling was let's start discussing it.
19	We'll, you know, get answers to the stuff today
20	and then we'll come back again and we'll do it
21	over again.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
23	TRUSTEE MURRAY: We can work on it.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Is there anyone else that
25	wishes to comment on this?

1	MR. SALADINO: Winkler.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, John.
3	MR. WINKLER: John Winkler, 175 Fifth.
4	I would like this we keep talking about
5	Mitchell Park, but this affects all the parks.
6	MAYOR NYCE: No.
7	MR. WINKLER: Third Street, Fifth Street.
8	MAYOR NYCE: We're talking about
9	specifically Mitchell Park.
10	MR. WINKLER: Well, it's the same problem,
11	though.
12	MAYOR NYCE: Oh, I'm sorry. I
13	misunderstood what you were saying.
14	MR. WINKLER: And the other park. They are
15	public parks also. And we did have a little bit
16	of a revival down in Fifth Street Park.
17	MAYOR NYCE: It was more of a reunion.
18	MR. WINKLER: Not no, not the reunion.
19	This was a religious event
20	MAYOR NYCE: Oh, yeah?
21	MR. WINKLER: that was done down there.
22	And, again, it was fine. They cleaned up and
23	everything else. But they were loud and there
24	were some complaints from the local you know,
25	I think the residents from around the area. But

1	my question is, is we take a deposit when we do
2	an MPA, right, and we give it back. We don't
3	give it back?
4	MAYOR NYCE: No, it's nonrefundable, right?
5	Mass Public Assembly Permit application fee is
6	nonrefundable, right?
7	CLERK PIRILLO: The application fee is
8	nonrefundable.
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: There's a \$500 deposit
10	that gets returned, if there's no damage.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Right. There's an application
12	fee that's not refunded, there's a deposit that
13	is refunded.
14	MR. WINKLER: Okay. So I guess what I'm
15	confused about is that, okay, the application
16	fee, I don't know what the fee is, but
17	MAYOR NYCE: Fifty bucks, I think, isn't it?
18	CLERK PIRILLO: (Nodded yes.)
19	MR. WINKLER: I think that the deposit or
20	the application fee should be higher, okay,
21	because even though somebody's using that
22	facility one time or twice, the maintenance of
23	that facility over the course of the year is
24	costing the Village money. So, in order to keep
25	the parks up to par for people to want to use

1 them, then we should keep that money. We should 2 keep it and this is part of doing business. 3 you want to -- again, the fee that you charge, 4 that's something that has to be figured out. But I think for every MPA, there should be a fee 5 6 that's not given back, and maybe a little bit 7 more deposit, so if they mess up the place, or 8 they break something and we have to -- the 9 Village has to repair it, fine, you take it out 10 of that deposit.

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But you got to -- you got to have -- people have to have skin in the game. Okay? If they don't, if they have a lot of money up in front, they're going to be more careful. Okay? money that we charge for the application should be spread over, and what -- what does it cost for the Village to maintain the park? What does it cost the Village to maintain Mitchell Park? It should be -- it should be fed into that revenue, okay, from the thing, because it's not just one The person is using it one time, but you have to maintain that park for the whole year. 0kay? So they should be paying more than \$50. Okay? Whatever that fee is, again, it's up to the State; maybe we can't. But, again, I just

1	think in the case of all of the parks, not just
2	Mitchell Park, with this MPA permit. Okay?
3	Thank you.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Anyone else who
5	wishes to comment at this time?
6	(No response.)
7	MAYOR NYCE: All right. Then that would
8	lead us into the basic public portion of our
9	agenda, which opens it up to anything from the
10	agenda. Does anyone wish to address the Board?
11	MR. SWISKEY: I do. First thing I'd ask, I
12	had sent the Board an email today, I assume
13	everybody got it, about because if you go to
14	that website, man, there is a lot of rental
15	activity going on in this village which is not
16	regulated. I mean, one guy is offering 12 beds
17	above a restaurant, and I know there's no
18	sprinkler system in the restaurant. And I
19	remember poor Mr. Gary Bartilucci on Main Street,
20	when he wanted to build an apartment above his
21	gallery, and you basically almost drove him out
22	of town with the sprinkler system, and insisting
23	do we intend to send our Village Administrator
24	and our Building Inspector and our new Code
25	Enforcement Officer around to these people and

1	say, "Hey, what's going on, you just can't rent
2	this room"? I mean, you have to meet certain
3	and I read the new Village Rental Code and it's
4	quite strict. It applies if you're renting a
5	room or anything else. So does this Board you
6	know, before I go too far, does this Board intend
7	to take action on this matter?
8	MAYOR NYCE: I have already taken action on
9	it. One thing you do need to know is that the
10	rental permit is for year-round rentals, not
11	for not for transient or seasonal rentals.
12	Secondly, I did ask both the Village
13	Administrator and the Village Attorney to look
14	into the whole Airbnb, or vacation property
15	owners websites, etcetera, etcetera, to see what
16	exactly we can and cannot regulate, and what our
17	code does and does not apply, and they will be
18	getting back to me shortly, and I will get back
19	to you.
20	MR. SWISKEY: Well, I hate to disagree with
21	you, but I read the Rental Code and in the
22	MAYOR NYCE: Why would you disagree with
23	me? I just told you what we were doing.
24	MR. SWISKEY: No, no, on the
25	MAYOR NYCE: That's asinine.

Τ	MR. SWISKEY: You're saying it only applies
2	to year-round. It applies it has a specific
3	thing in there where it says the rental and it
4	says transit rental. Basically, if you read the
5	Rental Code, the whole thing, which I did, these
6	apartments are covered, because, I mean,
7	basically the code says if you rent it for less
8	than a month, you still basically they're
9	these people are liable to the code.
10	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: No.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Transient and seasonal rentals
12	were exempt from the rental permit
13	MR. SWISKEY: Well, now we're exempting
14	people and we're picking on people. I mean, this
15	is not I don't know what you should think
16	about this. This to me is unbelievable for you
17	to say that when I read the Rental Code.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Read it again.
19	MR. SWISKEY: Perhaps Mr. Moore and I
20	will, and I will send a copy of it to you.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
22	MR. SWISKEY: And Mr. Moore and the rest of
23	you.
24	MAYOR NYCE: I already have a copy. Just
25	read it again.

1	MR. SWISKEY: But the Rental Code
2	specifically mentions transient, transient
3	rentals, and they're covered in the code.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Yes. No, they're not.
5	MR. MOORE: They're mentioned, but they're
6	exempt.
7	MAYOR NYCE: They're mentioned, but they're
8	not covered.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They're not covered, yeah.
10	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Next. Do you have
11	something else?
12	MR. SWISKEY: You're saying well, this
13	sounds to me like the Village Board is picking
14	and choosing who it wants to basically
15	MAYOR NYCE: The Village Board already
16	adopted the Rental Permit Law, we're not picking
17	and choosing. That conversation we've already
18	had. You've made your point. What's next?
19	MR. SWISKEY: Well, I'm speaking on this
20	issue and I still have things to say. Like I
21	said, this is the Board is basically it's
22	picking and choosing who it wants to
23	MAYOR NYCE: The Board is not picking and
24	choosing. The Board has adopted a Rental Permit
25	Law and we're enforcing that Rental Permit Law to

1	the letter of the law. So, if you're going on in
2	the same subject, I suggest you move on to a
3	different topic.
4	MR. SWISKEY: Well, how about this: How
5	about running a commercial enterprise in a
6	residential neighborhood, which is you you are
7	doing when you rent a room, Mr. Mayor? That's no
8	way around that, that's in the Tax Code.
9	MAYOR NYCE: As I said, I asked the Village
10	Attorney and the Village Administrator to look
11	into the situation and report back to me as to
12	what we can and cannot do based on what our
13	current code states. Would you like to move on,
14	please?
15	MR. SWISKEY: No, I'd like to get some
16	straight answers from you.
17	MAYOR NYCE: That was as straight an answer
18	as you're going to get, Bill. I've asked them
19	to

11	MS. MC ENTEE: Well, it was in my
12	complaint.
13	MAYOR NYCE: Everything that's been
14	inspected by our Building Inspector has been
15	inspected properly.
16	MS. MC ENTEE: Right, one person. One
17	person.
18	MAYOR NYCE: There's one person
19	MS. MC ENTEE: Right.
20	MAYOR NYCE: as a Building Inspector in
21	this Village because it's one square mile.
22	MS. MC ENTEE: But, as Mr. Kehl had said in
23	a previous meeting with the Board of Trustees, he
24	has listed all the energy codes and they were not
25	followed by and so I'm just trying to assist

1 and trying to find out. MAYOR NYCE: And the energy code -- the 2 3 energy code is -- that is required of new 4 construction, it's not required of old construction. You are not required to -- my 5 6 house is from 1862. I'm not required to now bring it up to current energy codes --7 8 MS. MC ENTEE: But do you -- I'm sorry. 9 MAYOR NYCE: -- because it is a preexisting 10 house. 11 MS. MC ENTEE: Right. 12 MAYOR NYCE: If I completely demolish that house and build it, I have to build it to current 13 14 energy codes. 15 MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. I do understand that 16 it is preexisting. I also realize that when you 17 take something and make it from a fuel or oil 18 home heating system and change it to electrical 19 within our Village or within our state, that you 20 do need to make sure that it is in compliance 21 with all the energy codes and you will -- you 22 cannot have sloughs, there's no insulation, and 23 this is not followed by certain people or contractors that are hired, or in Eileen's words, 24 and I won't say them exactly to the way she said 25

1	it at a previous meeting, that when other people
2	went up to a home and inquired about a home that
3	they thought maybe they might want to buy that
4	home, it wasn't fit for their needs, but it was
5	fit for a local contractor. And I disagreed with
6	what she has to say. And we'll all have
7	disagreements, don't get me wrong. I am saddened
8	to see that most of these homes are favoritismed
9	to a contractor from Shelter Island, not our
10	local contractors here in the Village or the Town
11	of Southold. Let me tell you
12	MAYOR NYCE: Those houses were bought by
13	that contractor.
14	MS. MC ENTEE: I get that.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Any other contractor in the
16	area had the opportunity
17	MS. MC ENTEE: I get that, but what
18	MAYOR NYCE: Please, let me finish now.
19	MS. MC ENTEE: Yes.
20	MAYOR NYCE: You're going to pick on a
21	certain contractor, that's fine, but the rules
22	apply to everybody the same.
23	MS. MC ENTEE: Absolutely, not.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Please. Every other
25	contractor in Southold Town or the Village could

1	nave bought those properties; they did not. Our
2	Building Inspector inspects and makes sure that
3	everybody does the same job everywhere.
4	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. Let me just read you
5	this last little piece that I have.
6	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
7	MS. MC ENTEE: I can take an old piece of
8	furniture, which I have done in the past, and I
9	can make it shine. Let's not let the Village
10	extend to local contractors that make poop shine.
11	A little paint inside and out, some landscaping,
12	and new appliances does not work within our
13	community. It doesn't make it in compliance. I
14	am here to make this community a better
15	community, and I wish this Board would really
16	truly understand what I have to say.
17	Thank you for listening to me tonight.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
19	MR. KEHL: Bob Kehl, 242 Fifth Avenue. Are
20	any one of you engineers?
21	MAYOR NYCE: No.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't profess to be
23	one.
24	MR. KEHL: You're an engineer?
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, he's an engineer.

1	MR. KEHL: You know what the New York State
2	Energy Code is?
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'm familiar with
4	the code. I don't know it by heart.
5	MR. KEHL: Well, you better dig into it.
6	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Pardon?
7	MR. KEHL: Better dig into it, because I
8	don't care what you're saying. When they take it
9	and take a house that's certified, an engineer
10	comes in and he does a whole certificate, and the
11	whole house is figured as an envelope, and they
12	start from scratch, and this is a minor. What I
13	read last week is a minimum, or the last meeting,
14	is a minimum for the insulation of the house.
15	He's not even meeting things on the houses. He's
16	skipped the things with the slabs. There's no
17	insulation on the slabs. He's got R15, tops, in
18	the walls instead of R26. He doesn't have any
19	R49 in the ceiling. I've seen R19 in the
20	ceilings. And he takes houses he doesn't have
21	insulation and he's going to put in electric
22	heat in.
23	When you take a house, it doesn't matter if
24	it's existing or preexisting or not, you switch
25	it from electric heat, all the rules go out the

1 You have to bring it up to code to put the electric heat in. 2 3 I've talked to three --4 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Bob. Bob, he's not taking the walls out. 5 6 MR. KEHL: I've talked to three engineers. 7 I've talked to Southold Building Department, they told me the same thing. They said, "What the 8 9 hell is going on in Greenport?" 10 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Bob he's not taking the 11 walls out. 12 MR. KEHL: He doesn't have to take the walls out. 13 14 TRUSTEE MURRAY: All right. 15 MR. KEHL: He's got houses with no 16 insulation in them. TRUSTEE MURRAY: No, he does not, Bob. You 17 18 guys are bashing him. 19 MR. KEHL: Oh, you guys can blow smoke up 20 my ass all day long. 21 MAYOR NYCE: We're going to keep it polite. 22 MR. KEHL: I'm trying, I really am. 23 really frustrated, because I've seen job after job after job, and she just turns her head the 24 other way and let's it go, and you people just go 25

1	along with it. She's the Building Inspector, she
2	comes in and enforces it. You know what, the
3	engineer is writing out an energy report for that
4	house based on oil heat, and she isn't checking
5	to see if he's putting electric heat in there,
6	and she's just rubber-stamping them as they go
7	through. So tell me what you want, but nothing's
8	being done.
9	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. The Village
10	Administrator will make sure that she is doing
11	what she's supposed to be doing. She enforces
12	the code the same for everybody. That's your
13	jobs and his jobs, the same for everybody.
14	Anybody else wish to address the Board?
15	(No response.)
16	MAYOR NYCE: If not, that will conclude the
17	public portion.
18	And I will offer RESOLUTION #07-2014-1,
19	adopting the July 2014 agenda as printed. So
20	moved.
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Second.
22	MAYOR NYCE: All those favor?
23	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.
24	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.

12	want to say anything? They went through the
13	interviewing process. You want to say anything
14	about
15	CLERK PIRILLO: You have the bio.
16	MAYOR NYCE: I have the bio.
17	CLERK PIRILLO: It's in your folder.
18	MAYOR NYCE: What's that?
19	CLERK PIRILLO: It's in your folder.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Sorry.
21	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: She should have warned
22	you that you had it.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, you should have warned
24	me that I had it (laughter). I don't see it,
25	Sylvia.

1	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Mayor, we'll do it.
2	CLERK PIRILLO: We'll do it.
3	MAYOR NYCE: All right.
4	CLERK PIRILLO: Mr. Pallas and I had the
5	pleasure of interviewing Mr. Ward, and selected
6	him as the most appropriate candidate for the
7	job. He has been a Southold resident for 18
8	years; was a member of the Police Department for
9	many years, serving in Hauppauge with the Fourth
10	Precinct; was a longstanding member of the COPE
11	Division.
12	Mr. Ward is eager to join us, would like to
13	his first order of business would be to
14	establish a working rapport with the business
15	owners, and also with the residents. He is
16	accustomed to patrolling long-term. He was in
17	the Bicycle Unit as well, and is very skilled at
18	creating relationships, establishing them,
19	maintaining them. And, again, his first order of
20	business will be to introduce himself to everyone
21	in the Village. And, of course, his familiarity
22	with our code will then will then assist him
23	and assist the residents and business owners.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Excellent.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: We look forward to him

1	coming on board. He'll be starting tomorrow at a
2	20-hour-per-week position.
3	MAYOR NYCE: And I'll let him know in
4	advance, there's an illegal brush pile in front
5	313 Second Street. That would be my house. No,
6	I'm kidding.
7	Just as a reminder, the Board, we've been
8	talking about this for quite a long time. I
9	apologize, my phone is buzzing. I'm excited that
10	we are actually we're now at a point to hire
11	Code Enforcement. I still think it's going to be
12	a full-time position at some point, but to get
13	into it as a part-time is fantastic. To be able
14	to even start, starting with the major items
15	being brush and snow removal, and all the rest of
16	that.
17	I want to welcome you aboard. We're very
18	happy to be starting on this process.
19	MR. WARD: Thank you. I look forward to
20	working for the Village.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Excellent. So, with that, I
22	will offer RESOLUTION #07-2014-9, hiring Edwin
23	Ward as Code Enforcement Officer, effective July
24	29, 2014, at an hourly rate of \$22.00; not to
25	exceed 20 hours per week. So moved.

We haven't had this problem in the past. This year, for whatever reason, we've just had a difficult time getting somebody that can show up on a regular basis.
