1	(Whereupon, the meeting was called to order
2	at 6:00 p.m.)
3	MAYOR NYCE: All right. It being 6
4	o'clock, I'll call this meeting to order, and ask
5	you to please rise and join me for the Pledge of
6	Allegiance.
7	(Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of
8	Allegiance.)
9	MAYOR NYCE: Please remain standing for a
10	moment of silence for Estelle S. Berne and
11	William S. Comber.
12	(Whereupon, a Moment of Silence was
13	observed.)
14	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. I'd also like you
15	to remain standing for a moment of silence, if
16	you will, for Lynda Dickson, Trustee George
17	Hubbard, Jr.'s sister, who passed away recently.
18	I'd like to do an additional moment of silence.
19	(Whereupon, a Moment of Silence was
20	observed.)
21	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. You may be seated.
22	We have a couple of announcements to start
23	off.
24	Village offices will be closed on September
25	1st in celebration of Labor Day.

1	Trustee Hubbard has an announcement
2	regarding the Skate Park Festival.
3	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. I'd like to
4	publicly thank KB Martin Studio. They did a
5	fundraiser with skateboards, where people were
6	painting, decorating, doing their own logos on
7	them. Billy Martin is the owner of the place,
8	they're on East Main Street, lower part of Main
9	Street. They raised over \$2,000 and they
10	delivered a check. I've talked about this. They
11	brought a check for \$2,000 into Village Hall for
12	use at the Skate Park. And I just want to thank
13	them very much for what they did.
14	Their website does have some pictures of
15	some of the skateboards, and the stuff was very
16	interesting. He had it on display for a month
17	down there. I just want to thank Billy and his
18	wife for what they did in helping out the Skate
19	Park. Thank you.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Thanks, George.
21	Under Public Interest, the next brush
22	pickup is scheduled for September 2nd, for which
23	we want kindly request that you use the brown
24	bags, if you're so inclined.
25	Hurricane season is upon us. Please make

1	necessary preparations and develop a plan for you
2	and your family. Detailed information on
3	preparations is available on our website,
4	www.villageofgreenport.org. You can also use
5	Suffolk County's website, Suffolk County FRES.
6	In conjunction with the NYSERDA Program,
7	Village electric customers are eligible for a
8	solar rebate/incentives program, for which
9	applications will be accepted until December
10	31st, 2023, or until the funds are committed. If
11	you're interested in that, please call Village
12	Hall and ask for the Building Department?
13	MR. PALLAS: No. They can just ask for me,
14	I'll give them some more details. Primarily, the
15	NYSERDA Program typically we're not eligible for.
16	The funding source is different than a normal
17	funding source.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
19	MR. PALLAS: So our customers are eligible.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. With that, I would
21	like to address the outage of last Thursday,
22	starting with reading a statement that we have
23	come up with.
24	At approximately 7:30 a.m. on Thursday,
25	while in the process of performing normal

switching operations to allow for the testing of circuit breakers, a relay caused both, two substations at the power plant to trip offline. This was not a situation that could be resolved via the use of a generator, as this was not a generation issue. We were, in fact, able to energize both substations early in the resolution process.

While attempting to restore service, it was discovered that a low-voltage control fuse had also tripped. This prevented one of our substations from coming back online. Once that was rectified, one of the substations was re-energized and we were able to restore service to four of our six circuits.

During the restoration of two remaining circuits, it was discovered that the distribution relay association -- associated with these two circuits in the older section of our substations were set at a level that would preclude the entire load being restored at the same time. Consequently, we were required to disconnect multiple distribution transformers to ensure that partial loads could be restored. Once that was accomplished, the dozens of disconnected

transformers were each reconnected manually one at a time. This is an arduous and time-consuming process, but is the only possible way to ensure the restoration of service in a safe and reliable manner.

As part of the restoration process, it was decided to tie together the two remaining circuits under the assumption that a section of one circuit was not functioning properly.

We appreciate everybody's patience through the outage. Clearly, it was not something we were planning to do, nor was it by any means operator error, mismanagement, had nothing to do with the upgrade at the plant. This was clearly and simply a piece of equipment that stopped functioning, and the crew did their utmost to restore electricity as quickly, and safely, and effectively as possible. Yes, it took longer than we anticipated. It was frustrating to us, as well as to those that were without electricity.

At this point, I'd like to turn it over to Village Administrator Paul Pallas, if he has any additional comments he'd like it make.

MR. PALLAS: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. Nothing

really specific. The press release fairly well summarizes what happened. It was, as you had said, an unfortunate event. We were in the process of doing something quite normal and it just -- these two circuit breakers decided to trip offline. It could not be foreseen in any way, and we did everything we could to get service back on as quickly as possible.

The thing that I discovered in the process were these two distribution circuits that just could not handle the in-rush of current, is what it's called on transformers, that when they first come on, there's a significant amount of current that is over the level that the relay is designed to protect against. So, therefore, it tripped it right back out. That's why we took transformers offline and then put them back one at a time, rather than all at once, and that did resolve, ultimately did resolve the issue. So I just wanted to make sure that was clear.

MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely, which brings us to the wrap-up for this little mishap.

There will be brief scheduled outages for select Village electric customers. There is a map that's being distributed, it's on our Village

1	website. These are plant outages for August
2	26th, beginning at 4 a.m., the idea being that
3	it's done at a time where it will not affect
4	people. It's expected that the outage, which is
5	necessary to help restore our system to its
6	normal state, will be very short in duration.
7	And we thank everyone in advance for their
8	patience and understanding while we continue our
9	full restoration efforts.
10	Do you want to expand on that at all, Paul?
11	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. Again, since we're
12	still kind of in the investigation of what caused
13	the initial outage, we don't want to put the
14	system in a condition where it was when
15	everything happened. Normally, we would require
16	these outages at two ends of the substation. We
17	don't want to tie them together, which is what
18	started the whole outage in the first place,
19	until we fully investigate it, and that
20	investigation is, unfortunately, going to take a
21	little time, probably in the order of a few
22	weeks, quite frankly. So we're going to take
23	this take this small, brief outage and restore
24	the system back to where it was before all this
25	started.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. That's the end of the
2	announcements. At this point, we'll start the
3	public portion of this meeting. I would like
4	to I would like to state prior I'm sorry.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Did we get a sign-in
6	sheet, Sylvia?
7	CLERK PIRILLO: The sheet is at the podium
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
9	MAYOR NYCE: The sheet is at the podium.
10	I would like to let everyone know that
11	prior to Resolution #8 being read, I will be
12	offering a motion to table that, pending an
13	Executive Session at the end of the agenda. We
14	would like to confer with Counsel before casting
15	a vote on Resolution #8, which is the license
16	agreement between the Village of Greenport and
17	North Ferry Corporation. I anticipate we will
18	have a brief Executive Session, out of which we
19	will be casting a vote on that. That will be at
20	the end. So when that comes to the agenda item,
21	I will be offering a motion to table. The rest
22	of the agenda is as printed.
23	Would anyone like to address the Board?
24	MR. SWISKEY: I do.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

1	MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184 Fifth
2	Street.
3	I was reading through your press release
4	and it makes no sense, because I know the system
5	because I built the damn thing. And you're
6	saying that one relay tripped both transformers.
7	Well, Mr. Pallas, what relay was that?
8	MR. PALLAS: I don't know the I don't
9	recall the specific relay. These relays, Bill,
10	as you know, are tied together through control
11	circuits. So if there's a common problem that a
12	relay picks up, then both transformers can and
13	will be tripped offline.
14	MR. SWISKEY: That made about as much sense
15	as this press release. Paul, the system is not
16	built like that.
17	MR. PALLAS: In fact, it is, Bill.
18	MR. SWISKEY: Take my word.
19	MR. PALLAS: In fact, it is, Bill.
20	MR. SWISKEY: Take my word, Paul.
21	MAYOR NYCE: No, Bill, we're not going to
22	take your word.
23	MR. SWISKEY: Well, I'm going to hand you
24	something, because this was the condition of your
25	system before you started. And this new

1 transformer that you've been saying for almost 2 two years is ready and online. Well, the only 3 thing you were carrying on it with the power 4 plant, you had the switch open. Yesterday you tried to close the switch, and guess what, 5 6 everything went out. 7 MR. PALLAS: Bill, I'm sorry to interrupt 8 you, but, in fact, the transformer was carrying 9 three of the circuits. Transformer 2 was carrying the -- I forget the numbers, 2, 3 and 6, 10 11 I believe, and Transformer 1 was carrying 1, 4 12 and 7. MR. SWISKEY: Well, that's not what I heard 13 14 and --15 MAYOR NYCE: Bill, hearsay. 16 MR. SWISKEY: I got a question, okay? I'm 17 asking Mr. Pallas a question. Were you at the 18 plant when this switching occurred? 19 MR. PALLAS: I was on my way in at the 20 time. 21 MR. SWISKEY: So who did the switching? 22 Who screwed up? 23 MR. PALLAS: Nobody. 24 MAYOR NYCE: Nobody screwed up. 25 MR. PALLAS: The conditions, being very

1	specific, we were closing the tie-preaker between
2	the two transformers, at which point both
3	transformer main breakers tripped offline. That
4	is what happened.
5	MR. SWISKEY: That's usually an indication
6	that something is out of synchronization. Now
7	there's a synch breaker on that cross tie. Now
8	it's
9	MR. PALLAS: Bill, I'm sorry again, but
10	synchronization has to do with the generator
11	spinning.
12	MR. SWISKEY: No, it has to do with
13	MR. PALLAS: No, it absolutely does.
14	MR. SWISKEY: different transformers in
15	different systems.
16	MR. PALLAS: No, it doesn't, Bill. They're
17	both fit from the exact same source and one
18	MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. And if one is A, B and
19	C and the other is A, C and B, they're not in
20	synchronization, Paul. They may have the correct
21	rotation, but they're not in synchronization.
22	MR. PALLAS: Bill, first of all, the
23	systems were tied together before, so nothing
24	could have changed to make them
25	MR. SWISKEY: Well, anyway, you know, I've

Т	asked the rower Authority to rook filto this. I
2	called his office today. There's got to be an
3	investigation, because we spend an awful lot of
4	money and it don't work. And it's time the other
5	Board Members started asking real hard questions,
6	because the other day is just a harbinger. The
7	first indication was that big PPA when we
8	couldn't generate, and then everything was
9	MAYOR NYCE: No, has nothing to do with it.
10	MR. SWISKEY: Everything was fine with the
11	everything was fine with the engines, you told
12	us. How come we had to spend \$13,000 to have
13	Elemco reprogram the I mean, Basler reprogram
14	the electronic regulator?
15	MAYOR NYCE: Because that was part of the
16	upgrade.
17	MR. SWISKEY: What do you mean? The Board
18	regulated that program. You tried to use them,
19	they didn't work. Basler in fact, I have the
20	bill here, and the bill is quite clear. It says
21	13,000 and so much money to reprogram electronic
22	regulators. Now you're telling me it was part of
23	the upgrade?
24	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
25	MR. SWISKEY: You know, Mr. Mayor, it's

T	just becoming almost like I don't even know
2	why I come here to get lied to, but I'm telling
3	you, these people in the hotels
4	MAYOR NYCE: You're not being lied to.
5	MR. SWISKEY: and the other businesses
6	that lost money, join the complaint, you'll get
7	your money back from the Village that you lost,
8	because what's going on in here is just
9	ridiculous.
10	MAYOR NYCE: Anyone else like to address
11	the Board?
12	MS. MC ENTEE: Joanne McEntee, 242 Fifth
13	Avenue.
14	I do I would like to know who will be
15	paying for the damages to people's electrical
16	equipment that have been destroyed, or have been
17	damaged during this whole surge? Is the Village
18	going pick up the bill for those?
19	MAYOR NYCE: No.
20	MS. MC ENTEE: No. And why not?
21	MAYOR NYCE: Because the Village is not
22	liable.
23	MS. MC ENTEE: You're not liable?
24	MAYOR NYCE: No.
25	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. Were the people

1	warned? Were they given notice, fair warning
2	that this was going to happen? We get plenty
3	MAYOR NYCE: It was an accident.
4	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. We get plenty of
5	notice that we are having our fire hydrants
6	drained at a certain period of time so we know.
7	MAYOR NYCE: This was not a test, this was
8	an accident. If we could plan accidents, the
9	world would be a much safer place.
10	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. So Mr. Pallas
11	mentioned at a work session previously, at the
12	last work session, in reference to parking
13	permits down at Fifth and Sixth Ave Street, so
14	I would for Mr. Pallas, if he could elaborate on
15	that.
16	MR. PALLAS: The what I
17	MAYOR NYCE: No. It's a work in progress.
18	This it's not a question and answer. If you
19	have comments, please comment, make your comments
20	to the Board.
21	MS. MC ENTEE: Well, he
22	MAYOR NYCE: He made reference to something
23	as an ongoing investigation that he's looking at.
24	MS. MC ENTEE: So that's an investigation?
25	I didn't know permits were an investigation.

1	MAYOR NYCE: No one's used permits down at
2	Fifth and Sixth Street for years
3	MS. MC ENTEE: I understand that, but
4	because Mr. Pallas
5	MAYOR NYCE: So to bring it up now, he
6	mentioned it, and in mentioning it, he's
7	researching it.
8	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. I understand what
9	you're saying, but Mr if Mr. Pallas brings it
10	to a work session and he brings it out to the
11	public, we, the public, are allowed to know what
12	is behind the whole aspect or the thought of what
13	is going on.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Sure. Once his research is
15	done, you'll be informed as to what we found out
16	and what we're intending to do.
17	MS. MC ENTEE: That's fine. So are we
18	hiring, are we in the midst of hiring an
19	attendant down there?
20	MAYOR NYCE: No.
21	MS. MC ENTEE: That does not have anything
22	to do with Resolution #8-2014-9; is that correct?
23	Where would the park
24	MAYOR NYCE: No.
25	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. Where would that park

1	attendant be?
2	MAYOR NYCE: She's working in the
3	Recreation Department at Mitchell Park
4	MS. MC ENTEE: Fair enough.
5	MAYOR NYCE: and the Carousel.
6	MS. MC ENTEE: Fair enough. So my question
7	to you really is that, or how are we going to
8	support we are going to need someone down
9	there. If Mr. Pallas follows through with all
10	this, of having the permits down there, which we
11	haven't used, so he said, in six or seven years,
12	or so
13	MAYOR NYCE: It's been longer than that.
14	MS. MC ENTEE: that we haven't had to
15	have that.
16	MAYOR NYCE: It's been yeah, it's got to
17	for the 13 years that I've been here, there's
18	never been permits.
19	MS. MC ENTEE: I understand. I
20	MAYOR NYCE: And it goes I'm sure it
21	goes well beyond that.
22	MS. MC ENTEE: Yes, and I lived down there
23	in 1986 for 13 years and there was no permit down
24	there either.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Fine.

1	MS. MC ENTEE: So let's you know, I get
2	bringing in revenue, I completely understand
3	that. What I'm saying is that you have all these
4	events down there, you don't have attendants down
5	there. You don't have people to pay for a permit
6	at the time. What's going to happen is all these
7	people are going to be parking up the street at
8	all the residential homes. And do you think that
9	they want that? They're already parking down on
10	the side street in between Fifth and Sixth
11	excuse me in between Fifth and Sixth, and
12	they're not supposed to be doing that either. So
13	when we have these huge events, which are many,
14	and I believe there's supposed to be an event fee
15	when they are down there, and there are many,
16	that where are these people getting their
17	permits? I'd like to see how this is going to be
18	controlled.
19	MR. PALLAS: Mr. Mayor, if I may.
20	MAYOR NYCE: This is I'm completely
21	confused, because this is something that was
22	brought up as a work in progress.
23	MS. MC ENTEE: Absolutely. But it is
24	MAYOR NYCE: There are no answers yet.
25	MS. MC ENTEE: That's correct, so that's

1	why
2	MAYOR NYCE: I understand your concern.
3	There are no answers as of yet
4	MS. MC ENTEE: I would like to hear what
5	Mr. Pallas has to say, honestly. He has a little
6	bit of input.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Then I suggest you give him a
8	call during the week and make an appointment to
9	see him.
10	MS. MC ENTEE: We are here as the public
11	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
12	MS. MC ENTEE: to talk about the agenda,
13	what has been going on in the work session.
14	MAYOR NYCE: The agenda.
15	MS. MC ENTEE: Again
16	MAYOR NYCE: There's nothing about parking
17	at Fifth and Sixth Street on the agenda.
18	MS. MC ENTEE: That's correct, but we are
19	public-speaking here tonight.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
21	MS. MC ENTEE: And Mr. Pallas brought it up
22	at the previous work session last week. We have
23	a right, the public has the right to listen to
24	what he has to offer.
25	MAYOR NYCE: No. The public has a right to

1	come and comment, which is what you have done.
2	MS. MC ENTEE: I've asked and he did say.
3	MAYOR NYCE: You asked.
4	MS. MC ENTEE: I'm surprised that you're
5	not allowing him to speak, because he did say
6	that he was he had a little bit of input.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Joanne, could I ask
8	I'm sorry, Mayor. Can I ask Joanne a question?
9	MAYOR NYCE: Sure.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do you have a particular
11	concern, because that particular code happens to
12	be in the book and hasn't been enforced for
13	years.
14	MS. MC ENTEE: It has been for many years.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
16	MS. MC ENTEE: And it hasn't been used.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm asking you,
18	what is your concern about re-looking at the
19	MS. MC ENTEE: One, I'd like to I don't
20	want to see that the residents that are living
21	down there actually have an issue with the
22	parking, and that somewhere along the line the
23	parking has to be controlled. And if you don't
24	have an attendant down there that how are you
25	going to control that? So that costs the Village

1	money, but the village does the village paying
2	someone down there, having someone down there,
3	does it what is cost effective?
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Joanne, I
5	understand where you're coming from.
6	MAYOR NYCE: I don't.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That is something that
8	will come out in the discussions of the public
9	hearing when it goes past all the process. He's
10	discussing something that's in the beginning of
11	talking about it, putting it out. You're kind of
12	like five feet ahead of the game. But I
13	understand where you're coming from.
14	MS. MC ENTEE: That's right.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I appreciate hearing
16	it, but it's too early in the process. We
17	haven't we just started. Several neighbors
18	down there have made a complaint about
19	MS. MC ENTEE: Absolutely.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: the parking situation
21	and it behooves us to start the process. I
22	understand where you're coming from, I think we
23	all understand where you're coming from, but,
24	please, just make what your concerns are and then
25	move on to the next subject that you have on your

1	paper.
2	MAYOR NYCE: And we will take your
3	concerns. Likely, that this process will end
4	up before the Code Committee. So voice your
5	concerns. Those concerns will be vetted as it
6	goes through the process.
7	MS. MC ENTEE: Is there something I did not
8	see in the code that there's a guest permit?
9	Have you ever had any idea about a guest permit?
10	What about the people coming from New York City?
11	What about the people that are not in our area?
12	What happens when we have an event down there and
13	they're not coming from our area? Is that fair
14	to them that they can't park out there and use
15	that park, because it's open park, from what I
16	understand.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Uh-huh.
18	MS. MC ENTEE: So I just think that you
19	should take that into consideration.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
21	MS. MC ENTEE: Are there event fees?
22	MAYOR NYCE: There are Mass there are
23	fees associated with Mass Public Assembly Permit
24	applications.
25	MS. MC ENTEE: Over 25 people.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Over 50 people, I believe
2	MS. MC ENTEE: Fifty?
3	MAYOR NYCE: is a Mass Public Assembly.
4	MS. MC ENTEE: Okay. I really would like
5	to see the revenue really come in on that,
6	because there are I believe there are a lot
7	more events than you actually know about.
8	I appreciate you listening to me.
9	Mr. Pallas, I look forward to listening to what
10	you have to say in reference to the parking
11	permits down there. Thank you very much for
12	listening to me tonight.
13	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
14	MS. PITTORINO: Hello, Mayor and Board. My
15	name is Deborah Pittorino and I am here because
16	I'm very concerned about
17	MAYOR NYCE: I'm sorry. I need an address
18	for the record as well.
19	MS. PITTORINO: I'm sorry?
20	MAYOR NYCE: Just for the record, where
21	you're from as well with Greenporter.
22	MS. PITTORINO: Address? 326
23	Greenporter Hotel, 326 Front Street.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
25	MS. PITTORINO: I am here because I'm very

1	concerned. I'm concerned about my business, I'm
2	concerned about our customers, and I'm concerned
3	about our Village. I'm not here to argue with
4	anybody or cast aspersions, but what I do want, I
5	want some answers.
6	So we had this blackout and, you know, we
7	were out from 7:45 until about 9:30 at night, and
8	we got a variety of answers when we called the
9	power company. So I want to better educate
10	myself. So I have two questions. I have a few
11	questions. The first one is who will be
12	investigating this? Is it a third party or is it
13	in an interested party?
14	MAYOR NYCE: We will do an internal
15	investigation.
16	MS. PITTORINO: So it's an interested
17	party. So it's not a third party, an independent
18	party, so you're going to investigate yourselves.
19	MAYOR NYCE: We're going to investigate as
20	to what happened, why it happened, and prevent it
21	from happening again.
22	MS. PITTORINO: Okay. So I guess we'll
23	have to find some other way to get the
24	information from an uninterested party, correct?
25	MAYOR NYCE: What uninterested party?

1	MS. PITTORINO: A third party that doesn't
2	have any alliance with whoever's doing their own
3	internal investigation. So you're investigating
4	yourself, so there's not like another like a
5	power authority or somebody else who will
6	investigate you?
7	MAYOR NYCE: I'm confused, because what is
8	it that you
9	MS. PITTORINO: So what I'm asking is what
10	would be the
11	MAYOR NYCE: feel that the electric
12	company would gain by the power being out? The
13	electric company didn't gain anything by the
14	power being out.
15	MS. PITTORINO: Oh, no, not no, not all.
16	I'm saying what one can gain by not stating
17	exactly what happened, because I don't
18	understand.
19	MAYOR NYCE: We stated exactly what
20	happened.
21	MS. PITTORINO: You know, well, I don't
22	understand it, and I'm a very educated person and
23	I don't understand it.
24	MAYOR NYCE: I don't understand it either.
25	It's electricity that I don't understand. We

1	have the viriage Administrator, who has run the
2	Electric Department at Rockville Centre for
3	20-some years. We have linemen that have been in
4	the business for a considerable number of years.
5	They are going to investigate.
6	MS. PITTORINO: Okay. So they're going to
7	investigate it. They're going to give us the
8	information as to what happened?
9	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
10	MS. PITTORINO: So are we part of LIPA or
11	not?
12	MAYOR NYCE: No.
13	MS. PITTORINO: Because one of the answers
14	I got we're not part of LIPA. So what does
15	LIPA have to do with Greenport?
16	MAYOR NYCE: Nothing. It's a shared
17	franchise area.
18	MS. PITTORINO: Shared franchise. So when
19	I called and I was told that it had something to
20	do with LIPA, then that wasn't correct?
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't know who told you
22	that.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't know who told
24	you that.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That would not be an

1 appropriate response. 2 MS. PITTORINO: Okay, so that's not 3 correct. 4 MAYOR NYCE: No. 5 MS. PITTORINO: And then my other question 6 has to do with the other young lady. She 7 mentioned -- so she asked you who would be paying 8 for the damages. So if Greenport is not -- the 9 Village of Greenport isn't responsible, then 10 who's responsible? 11 MAYOR NYCE: It is an unfortunate 12 occurrence that -- for which insurance -- but the 13 Village of Greenport -- in an outage such as 14 this, which is unintended, accidental, I 15 understand the Village is not liable for the 16 damages. 17 MS. PITTORINO: It's accidental. 18 MAYOR NYCE: But I would encourage you to 19 contact your insurance company. 20 MS. PITTORINO: No, we have. We have, but 21 they're going to -- they're going to come to you 22 with questions to find out --MAYOR NYCE: And that's -- and that's fine. 23 MS. PITTORINO: -- whether it was an 24 accident or whether it was negligence. 25

1	MAYOR NYCE: It's absolutely not
2	negligence. But, yes, I would encourage your
3	insurance company to contact us and our insurance
4	company and we will assist through the process.
5	There is absolutely no the Village of
6	Greenport Electric was in no way interested in
7	having the power go out, either through
8	negligence or
9	MS. PITTORINO: Oh, they might interested
10	in covering their tracks, though.
11	MAYOR NYCE: No, no.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, come one.
13	MS. PITTORINO: Which is why I would like
14	to have a third-party investigation.
15	MAYOR NYCE: There's no such thing as
16	covering tracks.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Our employees that
18	are
19	MAYOR NYCE: There's no covering tracks.
20	The power went out. The power went out during a
21	routine switching of this breaker, and we spent
22	the rest of the day trying to get the power back on
23	MS. PITTORINO: So that means that it could
24	happen again, right? Because since you don't
25	know how it happened, it could happen again,

1	correct?
2	MAYOR NYCE: Anything can happen at almost
3	any given time. That's what this that's what
4	this item shows. The power could go out at any
5	given time.
6	MS. PITTORINO: No.
7	MAYOR NYCE: It generally does not.
8	MS. PITTORINO: It generally does not.
9	MAYOR NYCE: But at any given time,
10	accidents can happen and equipment can fail. We
11	have been systematically replacing equipment for
12	the last several years.
13	MS. PITTORINO: So is our equipment up to
14	code? Are we are we in the we're in this
15	century?
16	MAYOR NYCE: Yes, we are now.
17	MS. PITTORINO: So then why did it go out?
18	MAYOR NYCE: I can't answer that, for the
19	same reason that you can't answer why lightening
20	struck in one place and not in another.
21	MS. PITTORINO: But that's lightening.
22	We're talking about equipment. Equipment, that's
23	science, that's not lightening.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. So do you know when
25	your car might break down, and if so, why that

T	piece of equipment all of a sudden decided to
2	break down?
3	MS. PITTORINO: Yeah. You know, I can
4	actually pretty much if I don't maintain my
5	car, chances are it will break down.
6	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. We've been
7	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Is your car as old as the
8	electric plant?
9	MS. PITTORINO: Excuse me?
10	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Is your car as old as the
11	electric plant?
12	MS. PITTORINO: That's my question. I'm
13	asking if we're maintaining our equipment so that
14	we are in this century.
15	MAYOR NYCE: We are maintaining our
16	equipment.
17	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That's what we are doing
18	now.
19	MAYOR NYCE: We are maintaining our
20	equipment on a regular basis.
21	MS. PITTORINO: So is the equipment old or
22	not? You just mentioned it. How old is the
23	equipment?
24	MAYOR NYCE: The plant goes back years.
25	That switchgear is

         big (indicating) and it tripped out. We don't
16
         know why. That's -- that was what prevented
17
         Substation 1 from being put back on. It may have
18
         caused both of them to trip in the first place.
19
         That's what we're trying to find out, and that's
20
         going to take us some time. Those are the things
21
         that are inherently part of an electric system.
22
         These types of controls can and do fail, just
23
         like anything, as the Mayor alluded to, in your
         car can and does fail.

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MS. PITTORINO: Well, yeah, but I -- like I

T	said, I don't my equipment my equipment
2	doesn't break down. I don't know about yours,
3	but I do something called preventive maintenance.
4	MR. PALLAS: This would not preventive
5	maintenance would not have made a difference. It
6	would not have made a difference. In fact, what
7	we were doing at the time was setting up for
8	preventive maintenance on one of the circuit
9	breakers. That's what the purpose of the
LO	switching operation was in the first place.
l 1	MS. PITTORINO: And you would do that like
L 2	at the height of summer, when we're probably
L3	in the this Village probably goes from 3,000 to
L4	10,000 people?
L 5	MR. PALLAS: It's routine. It was routine
L6	switching. It's not anything that I would do any
L7	other time. I mean, the fact that the that it
L8	was summer or not didn't make any difference to
L9	what happened. It had nothing to do with
20	MS. PITTORINO: And how often does it get
21	done, then? What is the schedule?
22	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. I don't know what has
23	been done in the past, I have no idea.
24	Typically, these types of circuit breakers
25	MS. PITTORINO: Who does? Who does?

T	TIK. FALLAS. I Have to research the
2	records.
3	MS. PITTORINO: You don't know.
4	MR. PALLAS: But it's that's not
5	maintenance on the circuit breaker didn't cause
6	the outage in the first place.
7	MS. PITTORINO: And is there a schedule for
8	the maintenance? Does anybody know, is there a
9	schedule?
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I would believe that
11	it's called a standard operating procedure up at
12	the light plant
13	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: that maintains their
15	normal activities. They've been doing that for
16	years. The employees up there take pride in what
17	they do. They look forward in trying to find
18	mistakes.
19	I called Mr. Pallas at as soon as the
20	my electricity went off. I'm assuming that you
21	are the same as I am. You can't tell when the
22	compressor in your walk-in cooler is going to
23	kick off on you because there is no maintenance
24	that you can do on that. And this is similar in
25	that there was a fuse that let go on the inside,

1	from what I'm understanding. Okay?
2	The women and men of the Village of
3	Greenport work very hard. They didn't slough
4	off, it wasn't done on purpose. They worked hard
5	and kept on going way into the night so that
6	everybody got back on that day, and that's
7	something that I think we ought to be saying
8	thank you to.
9	I understand everyone. I lost a
10	compressor. A lot of people I'm sure you lost
11	some stuff also. I lost it from it going on and
12	off, on and off, on and off, but it's part of
13	and I've lost compressors here in the Village of
14	Greenport years before. It happens. We're not
15	LILCO, we're not PSEG. If we were there, we'd
16	probably still be out, to be honest with you.
17	MS. PITTORINO: So we have our own, so that
18	our power so ours is more up to date than
19	theirs, then?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not it happened.
21	There's nothing you can do other than we need to
22	pick up the pieces and move on and try to prevent
23	it and try to not have it happen again.
24	MS. PITTORINO: But that's what I'm asking.
25	I'm asking so that I can

1	MAYOR NYCE: This has nothing do with the
2	fact that we have regular scheduled maintenance.
3	This just happened. That's what Trustee Phillips
4	is trying to say. Hold on a second, please.
5	(Whereupon, the siren sounded.)
6	MS. PITTORINO: So when my insurance
7	company calls you
8	MAYOR NYCE: Hang on a second.
9	So what Trustee Phillips was trying to say
10	was that regardless of the scheduled maintenance
11	and the standard maintenance that we do, these
12	things can occur, and, unfortunately, on Thursday
13	it did occur. There is nothing that could have
14	been done to prevent it. Everything that can be
15	done is being done on a daily basis.
16	Mr. Pallas has just joined the Village as
17	of this last Spring. Prior to then, our Director
18	of Utilities was doing the scheduled maintenance
19	with the crew up there. Okay? There is at
20	this point, there is nothing more that we can say
21	about it. It happened and it's unfortunate. If
22	you have claims through insurance, we will help
23	you through the process with our insurance
24	company, but
25	MS. PITTORINO: That's what I was going to

1	ask you. What is the answer, though? When the
2	insurance company says, "What happened," what is
3	the answer?
4	MR. PALLAS: It's in the press release. If
5	they have more detailed questions or need some
6	clarification, they can call me. I will give
7	them any information they need to assist in your
8	claim.
9	MAYOR NYCE: Anybody that needs a copy of
10	the press release is welcome to either ask for it
11	via email through Village Hall, or stop by
12	Village Hall and get it, or download it off our
13	website, and that will give you the information
14	necessary to get started.
15	MS. PITTORINO: No, I read the press
16	release.
17	MAYOR NYCE: That will give you the
18	information necessary to get started. We will
19	assist in any way we can through the insurance
20	process, and that's the best I can do for you.
21	I'm sorry.
22	MS. PITTORINO: But because it just
23	happened, then it could happen again, right? It
24	could happen on a regular basis, correct?
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't know. How many

1 hours --2 MAYOR NYCE: We can't say no to that, because, yes, anything can happen. So how do 3 4 you --5 MS. PITTORINO: Well, I just can't believe 6 anywhere that could happen. MAYOR NYCE: I can't sit here and assure 7 8 you that the power will never go out, because 9 that's unrealistic. 10 MS. PITTORINO: It happens in third world 11 countries, but, I mean, it shouldn't happen in 12 America. 13 MAYOR NYCE: It happens everywhere all the 14 time. 15 TRUSTEE MURRAY: It happens all over the 16 place. 17 MAYOR NYCE: It happens everywhere all the 18 time. 19 TRUSTEE MURRAY: It happens all the time. 20 That's why --21 MAYOR NYCE: It happens here. 22 MS. PITTORINO: But I live in Greenport. 23 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Well that's --24 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. 25 TRUSTEE MURRAY: If you lived anywhere

         else, if you lived in Orient, you would -- most

         people get generators because it shuts off all

         the time.

2	MAYOR NYCE: How many times in 16 years?
3	MS. PITTORINO: Yeah.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Come on, Deborah, the power
5	goes out.
6	MS. PITTORINO: Maybe once or twice.
7	MAYOR NYCE: No, it's not true.
8	MS. PITTORINO: No, it's not a normal.
9	It's not a normal. You can't tell me it's
10	normal.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Nor was this. This wasn't
12	normal either. No one sat down and said, "You
13	know what, we had a normal outage on Thursday."
14	MS. PITTORINO: I don't think any worker
15	did it intentionally. I know that everybody's
16	working very hard, but I think somebody made a
17	mistake, and I think
18	MAYOR NYCE: No, no. I'm telling you no
19	one made a mistake.
20	MS. PITTORINO: I think someone owes it to
21	us to explain to us what happened.
22	MAYOR NYCE: No one made a mistake. You
23	got the explanation. It is as simple as a fuse
24	blew. I'm sorry.
25	MS. PITTORINO: So a fuse blew, okay. So

1 that's the answer. Okay. 2 MAYOR NYCE: That's what the press release 3 said. 4 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I had a lengthy discussion 5 with Mr. Paul -- Mr. Pallas the day after the 6 Okay? We spent -- he spent 45 minutes outage. 7 trying to describe, you know, the electronics of everything that went on. He did diagrams and 8 9 schematics, and everything like that. 10 The press release was an attempt to try and 11 put it to a level where people could understand 12 the process of what happened, but there's nothing secret about what's going on. This press release 13 14 was just a compilation of what he tried to 15 describe to me in the office, including the 16 process of everything that was done from the very 17 beginning, beginning of the outage, until finally 18 powered was restored a little after 11 o'clock 19 that night. And I was in Village Hall most of the day 20 21 with the workers, and I have to tell you that the 22 work ethic of everybody there who stepped up and 23 tried to deal --MS. PITTORINO: Oh, no, I'm not worried 24 about that.

25

1	IRUSTEE RUBINS: With all the phone
2	calls coming in and everything like that, and the
3	guys that were out working the line and the men
4	at the plant, everybody stepped up and dealt with
5	this.
6	MS. PITTORINO: No, I agree with you.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, I was, you know,
8	extremely impressed. I can tell you the
9	frustration that a lot of LIPA people, including
10	my own mother, had after Sandy, you know, where
11	her power was out close to a week. You never
12	even got a person on the phone, you just got, you
13	know, a robocall, a recorded message. So, you
14	know, I mean but we are a small village, okay?
15	We have an electronic plant that is over what,
16	50, 60 years old. Okay? And our upgrades are
17	ongoing. But, you know, I mean
18	MS. PITTORINO: But so we're in
19	compliance?
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes. Are we perfect? No,
21	we're not perfect
22	MAYOR NYCE: Yes, we're in compliance.
23	MS. PITTORINO: We're in compliance, okay.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: but neither is PSE&G.
25	So I think a little patience and calm is in order

1 here. Okay? Thank you. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think the other thing 3 that everyone needs to remember is that during 4 the hurricanes and during storms, we've had electric, where other communities didn't have 5 6 electric. So that pretty much speaks -- and 7 those employees that are up there now are the 8 same employees that plugged through those storms 9 as well. So, in all honesty, for them, I'm going to say thank you for them. Yes, a small fuse, 10 11 because I understood some of what Mr. Pallas said 12 caused a great amount of problems. But you know what, those men and women, they sat here and they 13 worked until 11:30, 12 o'clock at night until 14 15 they got everybody up and running, and for that, 16 I have to say thank you to them, no matter what 17 other things come along with it. 18 MS. PITTORINO: I don't think anyone's 19 questioning the work of those people. You keep bringing that up as a -- you know, I don't know, 20 21 you're trying --22 MAYOR NYCE: Then what else is there?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What else is there?

MAYOR NYCE: You think there's some sort of conspiracy.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You want somebody to
2	blame? There's nobody to blame here.
3	MAYOR NYCE: I mean, there's no conspiracy.
4	There's no no one said
5	MS. PITTORINO: No one is saying there's a
6	conspiracy. I just want the truth of what
7	happened.
8	MAYOR NYCE: You've gotten the truth. You
9	have gotten the truth over and over.
10	MS. PITTORINO: So the fuse blew and that's
11	what the insurance company will find, right?
12	MAYOR NYCE: It's in the press release,
13	Deborah, I can't say it enough times. It's in
14	the press release what happened. Okay?
15	MS. PITTORINO: Okay. Thank you.
16	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you.
17	MS. WINKLER: Maritza Winkler, 175 Fifth
18	Street in Greenport. My comments will be brief.
19	It is about the outage, and, frankly, I'm
20	concerned about the lack of official
21	communication from this group or the Village on
22	exactly what was going on. And, really, this
23	outage was a concern, but if in the future we
24	have something that is even more severe, what
25	plans do we have to communicate with your

T	residents on what is going on, what the official
2	word is? Why didn't we have something up on the
3	website? Why did we wait until the following day
4	to issue a press release or a communication?
5	MAYOR NYCE: We issued press releases all
6	through the day.
7	MS. WINKLER: It could have been far worse.
8	MAYOR NYCE: We issued press releases all
9	through the day.
10	MS. WINKLER: Where?
11	MAYOR NYCE: LNG, Suffolk Times website.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Newsday.
13	MAYOR NYCE: Newsday.
14	MS. WINKLER: You've got an official
15	website.
16	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
17	MS. WINKLER: I didn't see anything on the
18	website, because I on our web did we post
19	anything, Sylvia, on our website on that day?
20	CLERK PIRILLO: Not on that day, because we
21	were using we started with LNG in the morning,
22	because we were concerned that if people were
23	experiencing the outage, they would be left in
24	the dark, quote, unquote, and not be able to go
25	to their computers. Later on in the day, we then

T	contacted the Suffolk Times, News 12. Newsday
2	called repeatedly and they were updating their
3	online version as well. And then we used our
4	website the following day when everyone was back,
5	when we knew everyone was back.
6	MS. WINKLER: I know full well that you
7	issued a press release the following day. To me,
8	the official word is from the people that run
9	this Village. Oftentimes the press gets it
10	wrong. Oftentimes it is incomplete. They quote
11	names of people without titles. It was woefully
12	inadequate, woefully.
13	MAYOR NYCE: I think you're confusing a
14	press interview with a press release. A press
15	release is printed verbatim, that's what we
16	issued.
17	MS. WINKLER: A press release was issued
18	the following day, was it not?
19	MAYOR NYCE: We issued press releases all
20	through the day.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Maritza, I turned on
22	I was looking on Suffolk Times and Suffolk Times
23	put it out and then they kept updating it on
24	their website with the Facebook page.
25	MS. WINKLER: As a press release, as

1	quoting that it was information from the Village
2	Office?
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They kept putting the
4	word "update" on it. It you noticed, it was up
5	on the top. But I do know for myself, I walked
6	around the Village and talked to some of the
7	people who were at the outages and told them that
8	they were working on it. I stopped I didn't
9	get into the residences, because I wasn't in that
10	section, I was downtown mostly.
11	MS. WINKLER: Oh. I'd like to see
12	something, that it's not about reinventing the
13	wheel. I mean, Southold has an emergency alert,
14	where they call you at home, or issue a text, or
15	post an emergency alert on the website as things
16	are happening, and to me, that's official, not
17	from the press. I'd like to hear it from my
18	Village of what is going on.
19	MAYOR NYCE: I appreciate that comment.
20	(Applause)
21	MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street.
22	The first thing, I would like to respond to
23	Mary Bess. I've talked to a thousand people in
24	this Village. I haven't heard one person, not
25	one person blame an employee, not one person

1 blame an employee. We all know they did a good 2 Maybe somebody here, maybe somebody here is 3 willing to admit it, but I haven't heard one 4 person blame an employee. This is not about 5 blaming employees, this is about a lack of 6 communication between the public and their elected representatives. 7 8 One of you guys, one of you guys -- you 9 were in Village Hall all day. One of you guys 10 should have been on the front steps talking to 11 the people, letting the people know. There was 12 100 people that I talked to that couldn't get through to Village Hall, that had no clue what 13 14 was going on. People were told the lights will 15 be on in an hour, the lights will be on in an 16 hour, the lights will be on in an hour. I read 17 in a local online publication that the Mayor was 18 unavailable for comment, numerous times. 19 MAYOR NYCE: It's easy to print that. 20 MR. SALADINO: First of all, where is --21 what? 22 MAYOR NYCE: It's easy to print that. 23 MR. SALADINO: So the press is lying? MS. FINN: 24 No. MR. SALADINO: Say it. Say it. 25 If that's

1	what
2	MAYOR NYCE: Take from that what you will.
3	MR. SALADINO: If that's what you're
4	saying, just say it.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Take from that what you will,
6	John.
7	MR. SALADINO: David, what, is this
8	semantics?
9	I agree with Maritza, it should have been
10	on the website. It should have been on the
11	website. It shouldn't have been on Channel 12.
12	If people don't have electric, they're not
13	watching television. You know, everybody carries
14	a cell phone. Everybody carries a cell phone.
15	If you put it on your website, I read it on my
16	cell phone. Everybody has the internet. And
17	then you want to argue the difference between a
18	comment, a press comment and a press release.
19	You know, people suffered through this.
20	I've been to every work session that you
21	have. I've read every work session report.
22	Mr. Pallas is here just recently, so we're not
23	going to say a lot of stuff about Mr. Pallas or
24	his qualifications. But in those work session
25	reports and at the work sessions, listening to my

representatives talk, there has been problems. The project is behind schedule, we've heard that. We've heard there was a problem with a transformer. We've heard there was a problem with a former Director. We've heard there was a problem with not doing tests on time. Mν neighbor, Bill Swiskey comes up here and he tells you these things and you dismiss it. And a lot of the stuff that he says has come to pass, has been proven that perhaps he's been right. And the only place people get -- and the work session and these meetings aren't the only

work session and these meetings aren't the only place people get information. Believe it or not, the people that you hire to go to that power plant, I wrote their names down, well, not their names, but people from Hawkeye, Hinck, Elemco, even the employees. They're interested in talking about what goes on and they give a different story. I don't see any merchants here, but I eat my lunch in Perry's every day, I eat at the Greenport Deli, and we see these guys come in and we say, "Hey, what's going on at the power plant," and they tell us. They don't arrive at night by stealth, like a SWAT team or SEAL Team Six, and they do their job and they sneak out of

1 They don't care if we know what's going 2 And what they say is contrary to what you 3 "Everything is fine, John, everything 4 works. Everything works. We're not behind schedule." It's not like our engineer --5 6 MAYOR NYCE: I never said we weren't behind 7 schedule, John. I never said we weren't behind 8 schedule. We've been drastically behind 9 schedule. 10 MR. SALADINO: Dave. I'm talking now, 11 Dave. I don't interrupt you, Hardly ever. 12 MAYOR NYCE: You do. 13 MR. SALADINO: Hardly ever. 14 MAYOR NYCE: No, you do a lot. 15 MR. SALADINO: Hardly ever. 16 MAYOR NYCE: You do a lot, John. I'll show 17 you the same respect you show me, okay? 18 MR. SALADINO: I thought I come here and 19 I'm polite, and I ask pertinent questions, and I use a civil tone. Are you saying otherwise? 20 21 That's been my experience here. Whether you see it in a different way, maybe you should look at 22 23 things differently. 24 But these guys have no dog in the fight to lie about what they see. So when you get a guy 25

1	from Hawkeye, or a guy from Elemco, or perhaps an
2	employee say, "You wouldn't believe what's going
3	on up there," and then I come to this meeting and
4	I hear you say it's all peaches and cream, I
5	don't know. Who do I believe? Who do I believe?
6	We have a power outage. I have no clue
7	about electric, I have no clue. I believe
8	Mr. Pallas, a relay blew, I believe that happens.
9	But I also, from listening to you at work
10	sessions, reading the reports, you guys know we
11	read all the reports, and even when you's talk in
12	code, that there have been problems there. There
13	have been problems with contractors, there have
14	been problems with engineering designs, there
15	have been problems with a transformer, there has
16	been problems with a million other different
17	things. And then a guy like Swiskey comes up
18	here and tells you about these things and you
19	say, "No, Bill. No, Bill," in your so I would
20	I would think that I would think that the
21	public is entitled to know exactly what's going.
22	If you made a bad mistake by hiring
23	somebody that wasn't up to the job, you should
24	say it. If you made a mistake by continuing to
25	defend somebody, or making a mistake by

1 continuing to defend somebody that's not entirely 2 up to the job, or even if there's a perception, a 3 perception of the guy not being able to do the 4 job, you should say that. You should say that. We deserve that. We deserve that. 5 6 So to sit up there month after month, month 7 after month, month after month and say everything 8 is good when you know it's not, you're doing a 9 disservice to the public. I have a couple of agenda items I would 10 11 like to ask you about. Are there any resolutions not on the agenda that you're going to vote on? 12 MAYOR NYCE: No. 13 14 MR. SALADINO: I didn't get it, I'm sorry. 15 MAYOR NYCE: No. 16 MR. SALADINO: And the Executive Session, 17 there's going to be an Executive Session after 18 the meeting. Are you going to vote in the 19 Executive Session? 20 MAYOR NYCE: No. 21 MR. SALADINO: Are you going to come -- are 22 you going to adjourn? 23 MAYOR NYCE: (Nodded ves.) MR. SALADINO: There's a lot of people 24 Is the public going to have to leave? 25 here.

1	MAYOR NYCE: During the Executive Session,
2	yes.
3	MR. SALADINO: I think I had sent some
4	correspondence to Sylvia from Mr. Freeman that
5	it's unreasonable to ask the public to leave,
6	especially a full house, that he thought it would
7	be more appropriate if you guys left and the
8	public remained here, since it is
9	(Laughter)
10	MR. SALADINO: I didn't say it to be funny,
11	it's the truth, and I believe Village Hall has a
12	copy of his opinion. So you could either listen
13	to the Committee on Open Government and make 50
14	people leave the room, or you guys could do
15	whatever you think is right.
16	As far as the resolutions, are you going to
17	give you're going do give the Clerk a \$3,000
18	raise. I'm guessing that's like 70 bucks a week.
19	Last month you gave the Director, the Highway guy
20	a \$4,000 raise. I'm sure they deserve it. We
21	just heard how great a job the employees did.
22	How do they how do these people get a raise
23	and these guys don't get a raise? How do you
24	justify that? That's just a comment.
25	The licensing agreement with the North

_	refry, 13 there something you can share with us
2	about that?
3	MAYOR NYCE: Not until after we confer with
4	Counsel.
5	MR. SALADINO: Well, from what I
6	understand, and I'm sure the Attorney will have
7	an opinion about this, with the Sunshine Law and
8	stuff, if both parties I mean, there can be no
9	other interested parties to this. It's the North
LO	Ferry and the Village of Greenport. No one can
11	come between those two parties as a negotiation,
12	to break up a negotiation. So can you at least
13	share the dates that you're talking about? They
L4	would have it for one year, two years, five
L5	years? Can you give us the terms of use? Would
L6	anything be allowed on that, though? I know you
L7	don't want to tell us the price. We already know
L8	the price, but, you know, maybe the other people
L9	that don't know the price, you would be willing
20	to tell them. My question to you is like why the
21	secret? You're going vote on it tonight.
22	MAYOR NYCE: There's no secret. We
23	discussed it at work session.
24	MR. SALADINO: I missed that work session.
25	MAYOR NYCE: You just said that you've been

1 to every work session I've been, John. I missed that one. 2 MR. SALADINO: I had 103 fever, I didn't want to infect the public, 3 4 so --5 MAYOR NYCE: But by your standards, doesn't 6 that make you a liar? 7 MR. SALADINO: Well, David, the truth of 8 the matter is, if we're going to play this stupid 9 game, the truth of the matter is I was probably 10 at --11 MAYOR NYCE: You started this stupid game, 12 John. MR. SALADINO: I was probably at as many 13 14 work sessions as you have in your term as Mayor. 15 So I missed last week. If the work session 16 minutes ever go up on the website, I'll read what 17 happened. 18 So there's nothing you can share with us. 19 Thank you. And Resolution #10, I already -- I already 20 spoke to Mr. Pallas, and if -- as a disclaimer, I 21 22 hear my friend, Doug Moore, say it all the time, I am a member of the CAC, but I'm not here 23 speaking as a member of the CAC. 24 25 I read -- I read the response from the

Ţ	contractor. I find it I find it almost
2	insulting what he had said, and I hope you guys
3	do, also. I mean, and I don't want to take a lot
4	of time on it, but the first thing I'd like
5	remind you, the LWRP says that every marina has
6	to install a pumpout. They have, 40, or 38, or
7	46 slips. The contractor suggested that you
8	postpone it to a different time and let him go or
9	with the project. I disagree with that. I think
10	that's crazy. I think now's the time. He also
11	suggested that he has to do this job in
12	September. There's nothing from the DEC, the
13	Army Corps of Engineers, or any other dock
14	builder in the world that they're restricted to
15	doing their work in September. So I'm sure
16	they've got a few more weeks or months to do
17	that.
18	The price of the system, compared to the
19	price of the job, is minuscule. We were talking
20	about a portable system, 3, \$4,000 for a portable
21	system, compared to a 2 or \$300,000 project, it's
22	minuscule.
23	And the last thing well, it's not the
24	last thing, but the thing I find most insulting,
25	he had the nerve to suggest that there are no

1 boats at that marina that have holding tanks. 2 Anybody that's ever -- that's blatantly untrue. 3 That's blatantly false. So I would ask you to 4 consider that before you consider this 5 application. 6 And, oh, the last thing I have is 7 Resolution 22. Trustee Phillips is going to 8 create a grant proposal with the assistance of a 9 grant writer. Do we have a dollar figure for 10 that grant writer? 11 MAYOR NYCE: No, not as of yet. 12 MR. SALADINO: So you're going to vote on it without putting a price on it? 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: John, all that is, 14 15 it's --16 MAYOR NYCE: It's an RFP, basically, right? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's an RFP. 17 18 That's --19 MR. SALADINO: I'm just reading the resolution. 20 21 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, I know. At the 23 work session, I put out that I was looking for an RFP to assist me in a grant, to go out --24 25 MAYOR NYCE: Looking for a proposal.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: and look for a grant
2	writer to assist in writing the grant.
3	MR. SALADINO: Are you going to vote on the
4	resolution the way it's written?
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I was going to
6	suggest, when we got down there, we'd change some
7	of the wording.
8	MR. SALADINO: Okay. Well, thank you.
9	Thanks for listening.
10	MR. ROBERTS: Good evening. Doug Roberts,
11	133 Sixth Street.
12	I just want to start by saying thanks, and
13	share our thanks with the crews who worked so
14	hard on the power outage and everybody that was
15	involved, we all appreciate it.
16	One of the things I'm probably among the
17	things I'm most grateful for is that when I walk
18	into my house, I can turn on a light switch and
19	the lights go on. I don't have to know how it
20	works, I don't have to understand it, it just
21	works. And I actually think we spend a little
22	too much time at these meetings talking about how
23	our power plant works. I don't think the rest of
24	the public cares that much about it. What we
25	care about is that the lights work. And what we

care about is knowing what's going on and when there are going to be issues.

So, in general, I think what's great about being in Greenport is that in Hurricane Sandy the lights were on within 12 hours at our place, and all of our friends around the area were coming and charging phones, and all of that stuff, etcetera, and that's what's great. And then what's bad is that on a random Tuesday, whatever that day was, Thursday in August, it goes off. It's part of life. You know, you live by the sword, die by the sword.

So I think we should -- since I don't understand how power plants work, I look at data, and the data are that that's I think the only time that's ever happened since I've lived here without it being planned. So I just want to say that let's put all this in perspective, and thank you for all the effort to get everything back up and running.

I feel horrible for folks who had a major issue. I was lucky enough to be out of town with the family that day. I feel horrible for folks who lost money from their businesses, and I hope that they're able to recoup all of that from the

1 power companies.

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So I don't know anything about power plants, but what I do know about is organizations, leadership, and marketing, and communication, and I really wish we heard more from you guys that day. I really wish we could have seen people talking and little videos on websites. And, you know, we're not New York I don't think anybody needs to go get, you Citv. know, a fleece, like Mayor Bloomberg would always wear during these emergencies, and talk in front of lecterns every hour. But I would loved to have heard more from you. I think hearing from the people who run this place, it's a very kind of, you know, small town, and hearing from people when you're going through a tough time I think helps you feel a little more reassured.

I think we have to consider all the folks who own homes here, who don't live here and for whom this is a second home, and I was like those people that day, because I was up with the in-laws in New Jersey. And I was feeling, "What am I coming home to? I don't know." You know, "Do we have to postpone our trip?"

I know you putting out press releases is

Т	great, and I want to add from the comments from
2	before, I'd rather not hear it through a
3	secondary source. You know, at the risk of
4	stating the obvious, Twitter is a really easy
5	format to use. Maybe not everyone is a Twitter
6	person. That's how I consume my news, and a lot
7	of folks I know in this Village do the same. If
8	someone has a Twitter account, official, not
9	someone's personal account, but if there's a way
10	to just sort of broadcast, you know, real
11	quickly, "Here's our latest press release, here's
12	the link, here's what's going on," you know, ther
13	people can interact with you that way. You know,
14	it's amazing. You can interact with huge
15	corporations that way. Suffolk County's Office
16	of Emergency Management has a Twitter feed, we go
17	back and forth with them.
18	So I think it would have been great to hear
19	more from you that day, and I hope this is and
20	there are other things. I think this is,
21	hopefully, a lesson learned for all of us. It
22	certainly was for me as a Villager. But, you
23	know, there are systems out there that can do
24	things like robo-texts and robo-calls, so when

there's a real emergency, you can get in touch

25

1 with us.

But what about little stuff? Like I never know when the fire hydrant thing is happening. I think, in general, I think we can get better at communicating with Villagers. All of a sudden, I just look and my water is brown, and I say, "Oh, they must have been doing something with the fire hydrants."

So, if there's a way for us to opt in on the website through an email program or a text program, there's a way for us to even pay a little extra money to, you know, find me wherever I am on some sort of system and opt into it, I'd love to explore that.

And then shifting gears off of the power thing, last month we talked about Mitchell Park. I'm a Villager who's really concerned about that issue. And if there's a way -- I don't know where we are in that process, it feels like it's kind of taking a while, maybe it has to, I don't understand all of it, but if there's a way for people like me to help accelerate the process and help with it, if there's some sort of committee being formed or something where people can get involved, I'd like to know about it. I know that

1 there are others who would as well. So thanks 2 for your time. 3 MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. 4 MR. MOORE: Good evening. I'm Doug Moore, 5 145 Sterling Street. And as my friend, 6 Mr. Saladino, reminds me, I'm Chair of the Zoning 7 Board of Appeals, but I'm speaking as a ratepayer 8 tonight. 9 I won't belabor the point about 10 communication, I think it was deficient. 11 a suggestion by email how you might do it, and I 12 hope you'll be more responsive. The day after an occurrence, an official announcement is way too 13 14 late. 15 I'm a little concerned about the press 16 I obviously am not an electrician, an release. 17 electrical engineer, but it seemed there were two 18 issues. The first was resolved rather quickly. 19 The problem with two of the circuits, which apparently could not handle the load to 20 21 reenergize, is a concern. It's not a generation 22 problem, apparently not related to the upgrade, 23 but something must have changed. If the load changed and the circuits can no longer handle it, 24

you would think they'd be updated. So I'm a

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little concerned why that isn't an obvious problem that should have been known about.

And I compliment you on the solution to disconnect transformers in the field, allow the circuit to come on and reattach them, but I think any of the business owners who were still dark at 9:30 at night had a very significant claim, and I think, you know, you really need to address that issue. I'm sure you're going to investigate it, but to find out what went wrong and how you can fix it, because this sounds like something that should not have happened.

I'd just like to make a comment. I think that's a good idea about the Board considering exiting, if they are in the minority with the audience. I think the chuckle came from probably everybody thinking whether they'd let you back in after you had your Executive Session, so maybe that's where the laughter came from. Thank you.

MR. PALLAS: Mayor, if I may, I just want to clarify one thing that Mr. Moore said. It's not a load issue. The circuits are capable of handling the normal load that they experience, not with a lot of room to spare, and that's evidenced by the fact we even now have two

T	circuits tied, so one circuit is carrying the
2	load of two. It's not a load issue, it's really
3	just an in-rush when you first turn everything on
4	at once. It's two different two different
5	concepts.
6	MR. MOORE: Same thing will happen again.
7	MR. PALLAS: But when we know why it
8	happened, we will take steps to mitigate it. And
9	as part of the process, we're going to look to
LO	see if there some changes we can make in the
L1	settings, we'll do that.
L 2	MR. KEHL: Bob Kehl, 242 Fifth Avenue,
L3	Greenport.
L4	I agree with Mr. Saladino. He was talking
L 5	about the employees in the Village, they'll talk
L6	to you. I had quite a conversation with a couple
L7	of them that day, and they said this was a test.
L8	It was Mr. Pallas decided the test was going
L9	to be that day. So how does this all of a
20	sudden, nobody knows. Mr. Pallas said he doesn't
21	know when the next test is going to be, yet he's
22	the one that makes the decisions.
23	MAYOR NYCE: He set up the standard when
24	they're going to set this stuff up. He's the
25	he's the Village Administrator, runs that plant.

1	He determines when they're going to do their
2	standard testing and they do it on a regular
3	basis. The fact that it was done on that day
4	MR. KEHL: It was supposedly a test on the
5	new part of the system they're putting in.
6	MAYOR NYCE: It was a test
7	MR. KEHL: Everything was working
8	beautiful. It wasn't hot out, the system weren't
9	overloaded. Why screw with it in the last two
LO	weeks of August? Smile and laugh all you want,
L1	it's a joke to you.
L 2	MAYOR NYCE: No, it's not a joke to me.
L3	MR. KEHL: It is.
L4	MAYOR NYCE: No, because you can do one of
L 5	two things.
L6	MR. KEHL: Every time I come here it's a
L7	joke, you laugh.
18	MAYOR NYCE: No, sir. You can do it one of
L9	two ways. If we just let it go and don't do our
20	standard testing, then that's what you're
21	suggesting we do.
22	MR. KEHL: Can we wait until after Labor
23	Day? No, that would make sense.
24	MAYOR NYCE: The idea with doing testing on
25	a regular basis is exactly that, you do did on a

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1
         regular basis. If you do it on a regular basis,
 2
         you don't expect it to go off. There was no
 3
         expectation that the power was going to out.
 4

But do it, please --8 MAYOR NYCE: All the time. 9 MS. MC ENTEE: -- because it will help all of us. 10 MR. REED: 11 Good evening. Michael Reed, 430 12 Front Street. A couple of quick -- answer some 13 questions. 14 It wasn't 50 or 60 years old, Julia. The 15 light plant was there before, the late 1800s, 16 one. 17 The other thing the gentleman was talking 18 about, the nice lady, I don't know her name, do 19 like the school. I think Gary implemented this last year with getting everybody's cell phone. 20 21 Everybody has a cell phone. This way you can 22 say, "Hey, this is what's going on." Keep 23 everybody at ease. You know, somebody told me you get 24 punch-drunk after a while. You know what, it is 25

hard, all you guys, you know. But I have one little thing I'm really not too happy about.

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I was at the work session on the 18th of It just -- it's kind of childish. You talked about like ice cream parlors, you made little references and stuff like that, and then you had a little thing for Bob Moore -- Bob --Mr. White's place. And then, Mary Bess, you said, "What are we going to do, put another ice cream, like we need another one." Come on, you're better than that. You said that at the I'll look at the transcript, I wrote it down. You're condescending. You guys are all -you work for us, we pay your salary. I know it's not a lot, but you got to be nicer. You know what, same thing for this gentleman. I don't know you, haven't had the pleasure to meet you yet. Chill, all right? Kindness goes a long way.

I know you're in like the grip of a pit pull, but these people are the most giving people in the community. I've been here, my family, for over 200 years. The only one who has been here longer on this planet is George on this Board, right? I'll give you a pardon on that. You're

1	looking good, though. But you know what, just do
2	your job. If you want to do your job, shut your
3	mouth, know your place. But don't roll your
4	eyes, don't do this, because these people work
5	hard for their money.
6	I make no bones about it in my family.
7	I've been blessed working in Greenport with what
8	I do. There's other people here that can't
9	barely afford to rub two nickels together. Be on
10	their side. You know what, you owe it to them.
11	You're doing a great disservice. It's hard. I
12	understand that. Well, I don't understand
13	because I'm not on that side. But, you know
14	what, these people will give you the shirt off
15	their back. Do the other way to them. Listen to
16	them.
17	I know it's hard, but, you know, like I
18	said, you get punch-drunk after a while. You got
19	to get back up, but listen to them. Don't roll
20	your eyes, no condescending remarks. You guys
21	are better than this. That's all I've got to
22	say. Thank you.
23	(Applause)
24	MR. HOLLID: Good evening, Board. Joe
25	Hollid, 415 South Street.

1	I'm pretty concerned about this power deal,
2	too. It seems to me that and I'm not I
3	don't want to belabor anything with it, but I
4	find it difficult to believe that there is no
5	backup for the power that we are going to have.
6	If it's going to be new or a newer deal coming
7	in, one switch should not control the whole deal.
8	If a switch goes, doesn't it go to a backup
9	switch? Isn't there a backup for something here?
10	What the heck is going on with this power plant?
11	When I hear one of the first meetings I
12	came to I've only been here about two years
13	almost now. I came from Southold, and Southold I
14	lived for almost 30 years. Power only went out
15	in emergencies, in hurricanes or anything, it was
16	nothing like this. And one of the first meetings
17	I came to, I hear that, "Oh, yeah, we fixed a
18	problem using a pool pump to repair the
19	situation." A pool pump. Is that backup
20	equipment? What the hell? Am I wrong? I don't
21	get it. You know, don't we get our power from
22	New York Power Authority, or it gets transferred
23	through the power plant? How does that work?
24	And if it does, how come we can't get that coming
25	right to us, or why does there have to be like ar

1	intermediary power deal where and if it's
2	switched, why can't it why can't they switch
3	it so it works properly? One switch throws
4	everything out of control?
5	I know you're going to make an assessment
6	and you're going do an investigation, but to me,
7	this is totally unreasonable to have this
8	situation happen. I'm really upset about it when
9	I hear about a pool pump, and then and a
10	switch that controls the whole thing. And we're
11	going to hear something about it in the future.
12	It's like everything I hear, we're going to take
13	care of it, we're going to look into it, it's
14	going to happen. We don't know when, how. Two
15	weeks, is that it, Paul, or is it going to be
16	three weeks, four weeks? How many how long is
17	it going to be before we find out what's going on
18	with that?
19	MR. PALLAS: I honestly can't answer that
20	question, because when the
21	MR. HOLLID: That's what I hear every time
22	over here. Everybody says that we're going to
23	take care of it, whether it's going to be
24	resolved in time. What time? Will it be public
25	known publicly known at that time when it is,

1 or what? 2 If I may, just the MR. PALLAS: 3 investigation is going to take a while, simply 4 because of the complexity of the system, and 5 without knowing the exact cost. 6 MR. HOLLID: Why should this system be so 7 complex for a small village? I mean, isn't it --8 this is not a -- we're not talking what the old 9 cliche is, rocket science. I mean, it has 10 probably a lot of old switches, relays. Relays? 11 Man, I dealt with relays and electronics when I 12 was in the service like 40 years ago. Relays? I'm disappointed. I don't understand, and 13 14 maybe I should be up to date more on this, but I just look at the -- and Mr. Swiskey, I mean, he's 15 16 worked for how long in the power plant, like 40 17 years, 30 years? 18 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. What they're telling 19 is not true. 20 MR. HOLLID: This man knows the ins and 21 outs, he knows everything that's going on there, 22 and you guys really don't understand him. 23 don't believe him? I mean, there's got to be some kind of resolution here that's palatable to 24 everybody in this room that says, okay, accidents 25

1	nappen. Inis doesn't seem to me that it should
2	be an accident. There should be a solution to
3	this, backup for a switch, something that you can
4	say, "Okay, switch is down," boom. "We need
5	another switch on, let's get it back up and
6	running." Nine hours?
7	I know you have to again, this is an
8	outdated system, of course, but you've got how
9	many transformers? You've got turn on one
10	transformer. Everybody says you've got to turn
11	each transformer on in succession. I understand
12	that, but it sounds so God darn outdated, it
13	really does sound to me.
14	And I lived in Rockville Centre, too, for
15	about eight years. I married my wife who was
16	from Rockville Centre. That system hardly ever
17	failed, only in an emergency situation,
18	hurricanes, whatever. But, right now, I'm just
19	amazed that this Village, that we can't get
20	something better, can't do something better. And
21	how much money is it going to cost to update the
22	system. And if there's no backup, what the hell
23	good is it? Because if there's an accident, we
24	can't we're out of power. I rest my case.
25	MS. DUBE: My name is Jacqueline Dube. I

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manage the Harbor Front Inn in Greenport. And I'm just wondering -- I know I spoke to 2 3 you, Mayor, at 10 o'clock in the morning. At 4 which stage did you realize that the power wasn't going to be on in an hour or two hours? We had 5 6 35 guest rooms, people in the hotel, dark, people 7 with medication that needed to be refrigerated. 8 Guests are asking us, "When do you think the 9 power is coming on?" So from 10 o'clock in the morning until after 9 o'clock, when the power 10 11 finally did come back on. We appreciate all the 12 hard work that went into it, but at which stage, again, did you realize that it's not coming up at 13 14 10, 11, 12, it's going to come up after dark? MAYOR NYCE: At the same time you did, 15 16 because I was in constant contact with 17 Mr. Pallas, and they were trying various things 18 all throughout the day. And as you well know, we 19 were in contact with you all day. You were 20 getting --21 MS. DUBE: We were in contact with you most 22 of the day. 23 MAYOR NYCE: Fine. 24 MS. DUBE: Because we were concerned for the guests. 25

1	MAYOR NYCE: Fine, understood. We were
2	giving you the information as we had it, as we
3	were getting it.
4	MS. DUBE: So it was your belief that in ar
5	hour, up to two hours?
6	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
7	MS. DUBE: The markets came on in the
8	morning, around 10-ish, ours was to going to come
9	up maybe after two hours?
10	MAYOR NYCE: That was what I was being told
11	at the time.
12	MS. DUBE: What's the protocol for maybe,
13	perhaps, some rolling blackouts? That would give
14	us some relief, since there was power up here,
15	power down there, we're in the center; health and
16	safety issues of the guests, completely blacked
17	out for 12 hours.
18	MAYOR NYCE: It has to do with how the
19	circuits are done.
20	MS. DUBE: So it's not possible?
21	MAYOR NYCE: We were having
22	MS. DUBE: Like I think I recall, and I
23	could be wrong that it happened, during Sandy we
24	each had so many hours when it was down, but
25	maybe my recollection is off.

1	MAYOR NYCE: They were being put on put
2	back on as they were coming down during Sandy.
3	And every circuit and every feeder that went down
4	we were bringing back up as we could. In this
5	case, we were having difficulty with the feeder
6	that feeds the electricity to your business.
7	That was the one we were having difficulty with.
8	It took longer to handle than the rest of them.
9	That's why that circuit came up last.
10	MS. DUBE: Okay. I guess the communication
11	with us could have perhaps been a little better
12	in that circumstance, where we could then
13	communicate
14	MAYOR NYCE: That's been made very clear,
15	and I appreciate it.
16	MS. DUBE: with the guests, because it
17	was very difficult and stressful for you, as well
18	as for us, with being responsible for 70-plus
19	people.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Understood.
21	MS. DUBE: And we had hired a personal
22	security company to come in to help monitor, you
23	know, fire alarms. So it was seriously a health
24	and safety issue concerning concerning that
25	blackout.

1	MAYUR NYCE: Understood.
2	MS. JAEGER: Hi. I'm Mary Ann Jaeger, 430
3	Front Street, Greenport.
4	I'm not going to say too much about the
5	outage, except for the fact if you didn't know
6	what was happening and you didn't know what to
7	do, most people call somebody who knows the
8	system. I've been in this Village since 1956 and
9	I don't ever, ever recall having the lights out
10	for nine hours.
11	My husband years ago bought a generator and
12	I thought the man lost it, God rest his soul.
13	But thank God he did, because last year, I
14	believe it was, or the year before, we were out
15	in a snowstorm, and we started the generator.
16	Now we were the only ones, other than the
17	hospital, that had lights that time. We were
18	fortunate. This time we didn't even turn the
19	generator on.
20	But, as I said, if you know somebody who
21	knows this system, like Mr. Swiskey does, you'd
22	have done better calling this man than to have
23	everyone wait for nine stinkin' hours.
24	And the little girl down the block from me,
25	she sits at death row. She has to have oxygen.

1 A portable oxygen machine does not last very 2 long, I know this for a fact. That girl had to be taken again to the hospital, and that's not 4 fair to her.

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That man said -- that's it for the electric, but I will say this: I watch these meetings being televised, and what I've noticed is every time somebody asks a question, "Well, we'll tell you about it later." It's like the issues get skirted around until somebody comes up with an answer, and it's very disheartening to people. We pay the taxes; you're supposed to do the work for us.

And then you, Miss Robins, this lady was sitting here talking and you'd like to jump down her throat there at one point. Yes, you looked like you were ready to attack her, and that was the lady over there, Debbie, Deborah, that lady there. You come at her like white on rice. And I'll tell you something, she's a nicer person than I am, because you're being here to do for the people, you don't jump down our throats.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I didn't comment to her at I don't know what you're talking about. all. MS. JAEGER: No, you were. You came at

T	nere very quickly, and I sat there and I watched
2	it, and that's wrong. You don't do that to
3	taxpayers. They wouldn't do that to you if
4	they unless they had a reason, and you had no
5	reason to do that. And everyone of you get paid
6	by the Village taxes. So understand something,
7	when the people come to you with a concern, you
8	damn might want to take care of it and answer
9	them. Thank you.
10	(Applause)
11	MR. WINKLER: Well, that took a while to
12	get here. John Winkler, 175 Fifth Street.
13	On the power plant, it was an unfortunate
14	thing that happened. I just think if it wasn't a
15	scheduled, planned thing, that maybe the
16	Utilities Director should have been here when
17	that before that started, and maybe that's a
18	point that if this happens again, that he's on
19	site so he can handle whatever and suggest
20	whatever happens to fix the problem.
21	I'm a little confused about the transformer
22	disconnects, that you had to physically
23	disconnect each wire on the transformer. That's
24	what it sounds like to me. Transformers have a
25	disconnect switch on them, so I don't know why

you just didn't turn off the disconnect and then bring them up.

MAYOR NYCE: Which is what they did.

4 MR. WINKLER: Well, that's not what was said.

6 MAYOR NYCE: In the field.

MR. WINKLER: It was said that the wires had to be disconnected from every transformer and then physically put back on again. You know, throwing the switch just doesn't take that long. It doesn't take nine hours, but all right. You guys got enough of that tonight.

I have a question on the Tall Ship Steering Committee and the budget. This Tall Ship was approved by resolution, I believe, about three months ago, when -- David, when you were supposed to go to Washington, right before that, and I never heard any numbers. I heard, "Oh, it's going to be the same as last time." Okay. Last time there was \$175,000 budgeted, and we ended up spending two thousand and -- 215,000. I don't ever remember -- and maybe I didn't make every work session like John does, but I don't ever remember getting any approval to increase that budget at any of the work sessions anywhere. So,

1 again, we're going through this process again and I don't see any numbers. I just see an open 2 3 check for this, for the Hermes (sic), or the 4 Lafayette ship, a blanket for getting an event planner and marketing, and there's no money 5 6 attached. What is -- have we -- have we written any checks to anybody yet? 7 8 TRUSTEE MURRAY: No. 9 MR. WINKLER: Okay. I mean, I looked on the Lafayette ship's website and they're coming 10 11 here, it's on their website already. So I don't 12 understand how they could put that on their website if they didn't pay that they were going 13 to come here. And if we're going to have to lay 14 15 this money out, where is the money coming from,

what fund? I'm sure we're going to have to lay out something. We're going to have to pay these marketers, we're going to have to pay these, you know, people that are going to plan the event. And we have three resolutions on here tonight, and it's just a blank check, and we don't know what you're going to spend. How much is being budgeted? I'd like to hear a number, if that's

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possible.

I guess you had a Steering Committee

1	Thursday, or did you cancel that?
2	MAYOR NYCE: We had.
3	MR. WINKLER: So when all this was going
4	on, we had a Steering Committee meeting. That's
5	pretty amazing. Thank you.
6	MS. WILHELM: Hi. Rena Wilhelm, Sterling
7	Avenue.
8	I've only come to a couple of these
9	meetings and, as you know, the first one that I
10	came to I was just talking about honesty and
11	integrity. And the next one I came to was about
12	the electric plant and people getting penalized
13	for a failed test, or whatever. I came to the
14	meeting regarding the Osinskis and a typo, and
15	I'm here as a result of the power outage.
16	I kind of feel like the power outage did
17	not affect me at all. I was downtown at
18	business, but nobody knew what was going on. And
19	again, communication was key and that's been
20	covered.
21	One thing I do want to make a note of is
22	that although it has nothing to do with you, some
23	of Newsday, people were printing out, oh, you
24	know, how unfortunate some of the businesses were
25	affected in town, and there were other things

that were a little bit more serious. I'm glad that Harbor Front Hotel brought up medications that need to be refrigerated, health equipment that needs to be plugged in. I felt that was a little bit more severe.

I guess my reason for standing up tonight is because, and David, I've mentioned this to you, I feel like I continually lose faith in how the Board operates and how the Village is going to be protected, projected in the future, and just with some of the things that have happened, electric plant thing. It's almost like these things happen and then, "We're sorry, we couldn't foresee this," and there's an apology that follows, but I'm wondering where the preventive measures are.

We didn't have a policy for Mitchell Park and then local -- or not even local church threatens to sue and then we have to react to that. I understand that having a policy for Mitchell Park is multifaceted and it's something that takes months or years to plan. But I just sort of feel like the bigger issues that happen within the Village that affect all of us are things that happen that we then say, "Okay, we're

1 sorry, we have to take care of it somehow." 2 I'm just wondering if there's more preventive --3 preventive measures, I guess, for things that 4 affect the Village in such a way where we all 5 come here and show up, and, you know, are up in 6 arms about things. 7 I think the Skate Park, I think Dances in 8 the Park, all these things are really, really 9 great. The trees are being known for, I don't 10 know, best trees in Greenport. Those are all 11 fine and they're fun, and it's something that we 12 can celebrate, positive things we can celebrate, 13 but it just seems that the negative things are so 14 negative. And I don't know if that happens in other villages and this is just the course of how 15 16 the Village runs, and you're going to have great 17 things that happen and horrible things that 18 happen, but I don't know. I don't even know what 19 I'm saying. I guess you kind of know what I'm 20 saying, or not really. 21 TRUSTEE MURRAY: (Nodded yes.) 22 MS. WILHELM: I don't want things to be 23 like such a shock, like, "Oh, my God, what happened," and so and so is suing the Village. 24

And I don't know, it seems like -- I don't know.

1	Thanks.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Anyone else who wishes to
3	address the Board?
4	MR. HOLLID: Can I readdress or not?
5	MAYOR NYCE: (Shook head no.)
6	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Everybody see the
7	basketball court at Third Street?
8	MS. WILHELM: I have.
9	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That looks good, doesn't it?
10	MS. WILHELM: I think it looks amazing.
11	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Okay. That's one good
12	thing.
13	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Where's the fence?
14	MR. SWISKEY: Running for re-election, are
15	we, David?
16	MR. CORWIN: My name is David Corwin and
17	I'd like to address you about Resolution #10, the
18	wetlands permit to replace 120 linear feet and
19	bulkhead 18 inches in front. And there's no
20	mention there of the pumpout facility that the
21	Conservation Advisory Committee wanted.
22	And if you go back to the original LWRP,
23	Local Waterfront Revitalization Program, February
24	1987, and I'd like to read to you part of what it
25	says. I know everybody is really tired by now.

1	Article 34: "Discharge of waste materials
2	in coastal waters from vessels will be limited so
3	as protects significant fish and wildlife
4	habitats, recreation areas, water supply areas."
5	And it goes to tell a little more about it, and
6	then it says, "The dumping of oil, refuge,
7	garbage, sewage or waste is prohibited within the
8	Village of Greenport. To further the intent of
9	this policy, pumpout facilities are required at
10	marinas or expansions of existing marinas within
11	the coastal area of the Village. Pumpout
12	facilities must also be installed at all marinas
13	within three years from the approval date of the
14	Greenport Local Waterfront Revitalization
15	Program."
16	So that was 1987 and many years have gone
17	by. I'm not I don't know of any promises
18	anybody made about putting in a pumpout facility,
19	but I will tell you, we've the Conservation
20	Advisory Committee, which I am on, Council it is,
21	it's not a committee, has asked, that is put in a
22	pumpout, and they basically say, "We'll do it,"
23	and then they laugh at us when they go out the
24	door and say, "We're never going to do that."

Maybe Stirling Condos will be different, but ${\bf I}$

Т	would be surprised in they were. So it they re
2	promising the pumpout, from my experience, it
3	won't get done. If they want to tell you that,
4	that we're going to do it after the fact, get a
5	performance bond. Get a bond that says \$5,000
6	we'll pay the Village of Greenport, but let me go
7	further.
8	You can't approve a wetlands permit that
9	does not comply with the LWRP. You can't do
10	that, it's against the law. So this motion as
11	it's set up tonight, in my opinion, is incorrect,
12	it's the wrong thing to do, and I'll ask you to
13	please vote no. Thank you.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Is there anyone
15	else that wishes to
16	MS. DI CAPUA: Hi. I'm Laura DiCapua, 416
17	South Street. I'm relatively new here, and this
18	is my first meeting, and whew, wow.
19	(Laughter)
20	MS. DI CAPUA: So I don't want to talk
21	about electricity. I have a concern about my
22	block, which is a tiny block. And there was a
23	volunteer there a few a couple of months ago
24	assessing trees, and it was nice to hear it.
25	I've done major renovation to a house there; that

1 this block, this little block right down the next 2 block here is known as the forgotten street, and 3 that's about the best way you could describe it. 4 When it rains, I have waterfront property. It 5 comes up on the sidewalk to the middle of the 6 street. 7 MR. SWISKEY: It's liable to raise your 8 taxes. 9 MS. DI CAPUA: So, but I think the bay is about a half a mile from here. And I have 10 11 concerns with mosquitoes. It's stagnant water. 12 It takes several days for it to subside, so it's 13 sitting there. And I think it's enough time for 14 mosquitoes to breed. It doesn't take too long 15 for that to happen. And there has been many 16 confirmations that there's the West Nile Virus in 17 some mosquitoes that have been tested out here in 18 Suffolk County. 19 The sidewalk is crumbling, and it's just 20 this tiny, little street and there's so many 21 problems. The sidewalk is crumbling. They're 22 raised from the roots of the trees, it's very

dangerous. There's one little house there, well,

that has no curb whatsoever, so when it rains, it's a swamp there, it's all mud. 25

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1 So I -- as I say, I'm new here. I don't 2 know if this is where this is addressed, or 3 whether I need to go somewhere else, but it's 4 really in rough shape. It's crumbling, it's sunken, so the water just -- it's like a natural 5 6 gully there, the water just accumulates every And I kind of know a little bit about the 7 rain. 8 block, that there's only about six houses on it. 9 but half of them were occupied by elderly people. 10 So they -- I guess they just about had enough 11 strength to get a meal in or something and they 12 didn't address any of these problems, so this has been going for quite some time. 13 But there are 14 new people coming in with maybe a little bit of 15 energy, and I'd like to know where to address 16 this energy to see that maybe something can be 17 done. 18 MAYOR NYCE: The sidewalks, what I would 19 suggest is you visit the Village Clerk at Village Hall, Sylvia. We keep a list of sidewalks, if 20 21 you could bring the address, the closest address 22 to it. 23 MS. DI CAPUA: My house. 24 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 25 TRUSTEE MURRAY: What's the number?

1	MAYOR NYCE: Then make sure
2	MS. DI CAPUA: 416.
3	MAYOR NYCE: We'll make sure. What we do
4	is we keep
5	MS. DI CAPUA: And 408 has no curb.
6	MAYOR NYCE: We keep a running list of
7	sidewalks that are in need of repair, and we do
8	repairs in the Fall and in the Spring. So we'll
9	make sure
10	MS. DI CAPUA: Is it by the most need or
11	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, it's by most need.
12	MS. DI CAPUA: Okay. Maybe I got a shot of
13	getting to the top of the list.
14	MAYOR NYCE: There you go.
15	MR. SWISKEY: Good luck.
16	MS. DI CAPUA: Good luck.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Let's find out first if you
18	are on the list, then we'll have someone do an
19	assessment of it. If it's not on the list
20	MS. DI CAPUA: Oh, I doubt that that's the
21	case. I think I have to let my intentions be
22	know.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Okay, so that's fine, but that
24	would be
25	MS. DI CAPUA: As I say, there are elderly

1 people there. I don't think they did anything 2 about it, but something needs to get done. 3 MAYOR NYCE: They oftentimes get reported 4 by other people as well, not necessarily the property owner, people that are walking around, 5 6 and whatever else. So that would be my suggestion. Let's make sure it's on the list, 7 8 and then we'll have an assessment done. 9 MS. DI CAPUA: As I said, I'd be very happy 10 to come back and announce that something's been 11 done. 12 MAYOR NYCE: Fantastic. MS. DI CAPUA: 13 Do it with positive 14 thinking. 15 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. 16 MS. DI CAPUA: Thank you. 17 MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Is there anyone 18 else who wishes to address the Board? 19 (No response.) MAYOR NYCE: If not, that will conclude the 20 21 public portion. 22 I would like to address a couple of things. 23 We've heard copious amounts about last Thursday's I would like to thank everyone for their 24 outage. 25 comments, as most of you, did not expect that.

1	do appreciate the comments, mostly because the
2	communication portion of it, our feeling was that
3	we were communicating. I will take some
4	responsibility in that I don't think about
5	Twitter, you know, so I'll take the hit for that
6	one. I don't live in that world, but it's a
7	great idea. And the whole web-based information,
8	great. We've done very well in hurricanes in the
9	past. We clearly did not do that well in the
10	communication on Thursday. We were giving
11	information to people. I did stand on the steps
12	in front of Village Hall for several hours in the
13	morning. I didn't stand there all day. So for
14	that, I apologize, but there was information
15	enough from you (laughter).
16	We will attempt to implement some of the
17	suggestions that were made, because they're good
18	ones. Early on, we didn't use the website
19	because there was no power to Village Hall
20	either. But later in the day, we certainly could
21	have, could have done something along those
22	lines.
23	We were literally all day long attempting
24	to solve the problem of that one last feeder, and
25	it took longer than it should. But thank you for

1	the comments. We will attempt to do better on
2	the communication portion.
3	Promising the power will never go out again
4	I can't do. I'd love to do it, I can't do it.
5	It would be disingenuous of me to say that the
6	power will always be on.
7	The North Ferry agreement, I will refresh
8	some people's memories as to just some
9	broad-stroke items. There is a potential
10	agreement between North Ferry and the Village of
11	Greenport for them to rent the dockage space on
12	the south side of the West Pier, so that there
13	are no boats docked there by the Village,
14	allowing for them a clearer channel to dock their
15	ferries. And before we enter into that
16	agreement, the Board wants to have one last
17	conference with the Village Attorney about the
18	legal matters.
19	There is a sum that's being proposed by
20	North Ferry for that rental. It is a long-term
21	agreement. Part of the discrepancy was that they
22	wanted a perpetual one, which the Village is not

allowed to enter into. So there are terms. It

is long-term, but it is not a perpetual

25 agreement.

23

As to the Tall Ships Event, the Tall Ships Event has been, since it was proposed, been proposed as a \$250,000 event, which is what the RFP was when it went out prior. That budget is based on proposed ticket sales and sponsorships to cover the event itself. This is what we did last time. We did an event that was \$220,000, in rough numbers. Okay? That's what it was last time. The expenses were around 210, the income was around 220, 225, 222, as I recall. Our intent is to do the same thing.

Last time we had no budget to work from, because there had been no records kept of how these events were run in the past. We now have one. We're working off the budget from last time, expanding it by the number of days. This event will be an additional day. I think it's four days, as opposed to three. So we've fleshed out the budget. The idea is, again, that we will offset the cost with sponsorships being raised by encouraging sponsors to give money up front, and then ticket sales in advance, and then on the day of the event.

The BID has pledged to raise \$100,000 in sponsorships, so there's almost half the money in

1	the outset. Last time we raised 80% of the
2	funds for the event were raised with ticket
3	sales, generally speaking, the days of the event.
4	There were very few advanced ticket sales, and
5	the last event three ago was in the midst in
6	the height of the economic downturn. There was
7	nobody giving sponsorship monies. I'm encouraged
8	that there's a little bit more money out there at
9	this point, and that we will certainly raise
10	money to offset the cost. But we are setting our
11	expenses to be matched by the income.
12	With that, we will go into our agenda, and
13	I will offer RESOLUTION #08-2014-1, adopting the
14	August 2014 agenda as printed. So moved.
15	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Second.
