1 (Whereupon, the meeting was called to order at 2 7:08 p.m.) 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll call the meeting to order 4 with the pledge to the flag. 5 (Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of 6 Allegiance.) 7 Okay. We'll start with Chief Breese from the 8 Fire Department. 9 CHIEF BREESE: Good evening, everybody. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening. 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Good evening, sir. 12 CHIEF BREESE: I apologize again. Jessica 13 hadn't caught up with the point sheets and 14 everything. She said she'll be caught up by this 15 Sunday, so next month we'll have a full report for 16 I apologize for not having all the reports for vou. 17 you. 18 Other than that, the only thing I got is we're 19 going to do a hydrant test on the 25th, and I kind 20 got to Sylvia a little late about them putting them 21 in the paper. So, hopefully, we're going to have 22 something in the paper next week to do --23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 24 CHIEF BREESE: For a hydrant test at 9 a.m., like normal. 25

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. We'll notify Joan
2	Dinizio and we can get it in her article, and we'll
3	have the paper.
4	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. And we'll have it put on
5	the sign out front.
6	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
7	CHIEF BREESE: Is there any I'm sorry. Did
8	you have something?
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay.
10	CHIEF BREESE: Any progress on the ambulance?
11	What's going on? Are we ready to go award the bid,
12	or is the
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe so. The Attorney is
14	not here now. He went through everything. He went
15	with the same recommendation that the Truck Committee
16	had with going with the PL.
17	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah, PL.
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Going with PL, yes.
19	CLERK PIRILLO: Chief, there's a letter in your
20	mailbox explaining that.
21	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. So we're going to do that
22	tonight or next week? When do you do that?
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll get a resolution. We'll
24	vote on that accepting the bid at our regular
25	meeting.

1	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. Okay, so next meeting.
2	Just an update on the new truck, 833. We're
3	going to the factory on the 21st and the 22nd next
4	week, which is Wednesday and Thursday. We're doing a
5	factory trip. It's already built. I've got nice
6	pictures of it. If anybody wants to see them,
7	they're in the office. You're welcome to come look
8	at it. And we're going, like I said, Wednesday or
9	Thursday. The Committee is going and a couple of
10	Chiefs are going. Myself and Jeff are going.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
12	CHIEF BREESE: Other than that, I don't have
13	anything else. Anybody got any questions for me?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I do, to be honest
15	with you, just because I happened to notice in the
16	report that one of the members mentioned something
17	about the timing of the sirens and
18	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. Again, what happened was
19	Integrated Wireless came to remember the sirens
20	went off like five-minutes-to-six before? Well, they
21	came and fixed it. And I don't know what they did
22	when they fixed the timer, the timer that goes off.
23	So now it goes off at six o'clock, but they did
24	something to change the cycles that it goes through.
25	

Like for a rescue, it's only supposed to go off once,

1 and for general, before it went off four times. Now 2 it's going off like six or seven. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. 4 CHIEF BREESE: They're coming back and putting 5 in a new repeater soon. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 7 CHIEF BREESE: So we're going to have them 8 correct that so it's not annoving everybody as much. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. They also mentioned 10 something about the volume, too. Did that get turned 11 up also or --12 CHIEF BREESE: No, they never --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. 13 14 CHIEF BREESE: They couldn't change that. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, there's no controlling it. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. 17 CHIEF BREESE: There's no way to change it. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. 19 CHIEF BREESE: No. That's the only thing they 20 have no control over, it is what it is. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. It's just 22 some people have made mention of it, which --CHIEF BREESE: 23 Yeah. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I know years ago, there -- was there a siren up at the Light Plant, out 25

1 of curiosity? 2 CHIEF BREESE: Was there a siren? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Was there a siren 3 4 someplace? 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just it's always been --MAYOR HUBBARD: Just the air horns at the Light 7 8 Plant and the one siren here and that's it. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. All right. It's 10 just, you know, I've had some people kind of mention 11 it, but it may be the fact that it's going off a lot 12 more than what it's supposed to. 13 CHIEF BREESE: I never hear the thing, but they 14 say it is, so --I hear it. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 16 CHIEF BREESE: But no. When Integrated 17 Wireless comes back, we're actually -- we're going 18 with another frequency for high ban radios. They 19 have to come back, put a new repeater in with the 20 Cablevision tower, and put a new antenna. They're 21 going reprogram the --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. As I said, I just had 22 23 several people kind of, you know --CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. Even some of our -- like 24 I said, some of our members complained about it, too. 25

1 That's what I picked up in TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 2 the report, okay? 3 CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. Anybody else? 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for the 5 chief? 6 (No Response) 7 Okay. 8 CHIEF BREESE: Thank you. MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 9 10 CHIEF BREESE: Have a good night. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: You, too. Okay. Next, we have 12 the Village Administrator, Paul Pallas. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Good evening, everybody. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening. 15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You have my reports. 16 I'll go through some highlights in a bit. First, 17 just a couple. One resolution, at least one 18 resolution to ratify the acceptance of Laser 19 Industries, Incorporated for the sidewalk and curbs. 20 We are still waiting for -- we have the signed 21 contract. We anticipate getting the insurance from 22 They're aware of the schedule for them tomorrow. 23 paving. They've worked with Corazzini before, so there is no issue in terms of them coordinating the 24 two schedules at this point. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: At this point. I'11 3 clarify -- qualify that with that statement. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 5 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It should be okay. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So their -- the timing is, 7 so that I can just mention it, is the idea to start 8 is in another day or two, week? 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Next week some time is 10 the anticipated start date. Again, we can't even let 11 them start until we get their insurance, and 12 that's --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 13 No. I know. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's been -- that is 14 15 the holdup at the moment. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I'm just looking more 17 for information to get out to the people. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: And they know we're going to 19 start paving on November 2nd. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 20 That's what I wanted to November 2nd? 21 know. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's the start date for 23 Corazzini to start paving, is November 2nd, it's a 24 Monday. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: And they know that's -- the 2 curbs have to be done by then. The sidewalks they 3 could do a little later, but the curbs on the areas 4 that need to be done, the roads that are being paved, 5 has to be done before that. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, that's good. I'm glad you got the date of November 2nd. 7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: You could give that date to 9 everybody and let them know that's what we're doing. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 10 Yeah. 11 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Based on the volume on 12 the -- Laser Industries indicated they think it's 13 four or five days in total. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Including sidewalks. 16 So, you know, as long as they start next week, we're 17 in good shape. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's up to them. 19 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, exactly. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, great. 22 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Okay. First item of 23 discussion is the Clark's Beach proposal from Long Island Divers Association. I'm not sure if Barry 24 Lipsky -- the President was supposed to be here. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: He's behind you. 2 MR. LIPSKY: May I approach? MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 3 4 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You've all seen the 5 letter. Basically, it's three or four times a year 6 to use the beach. It's kind of up for discussion. 7 The Long Island Divers Association indicated 8 that they would do some cleanup work for us in return 9 for access to the beach. That's pretty much the 10 whole story, so. 11 Great. Well, thank you for MR. LIPSKY: 12 letting me come here tonight. I'm Barry Lipsky. I'm the President of Long Island Divers Association. 13 We 14 are a nonprofit 501-C organization, corporation, and 15 one of the main goals that we have as that 16 organization is to maintain dive sites throughout 17 Long Island. The problem is there are very, very few 18 access points for divers to get to water. 19 This Clark's Beach, which is known as "Secret 20 Beach" to divers, is one of the best dive sites there 21 are on Long Island, but it was cut off a number of 22 years ago for reasons, I believe, may have had to do 23 with some things with regards to cost factors, possible debris that was accumulating, and just 24 controlling of the site. And we want -- I want to 25

talk about that a little bit tonight as to what maybe
we could do as a group together, between Greenport
and the Long Island Divers Association.

4 Almost exactly a year ago, the Town of 5 Southampton, I became notified that they were going to rip down what is known as the Ponguogue Bridge, 6 the old Ponquogue Bridge. I found out about it and 7 8 it was pretty much in place that this bridge what 9 coming down because the results of what happened 10 during Hurricane Sandy. I got in touch with the 11 Trustees, I got in touch with the Town, I met with 12 The Town Supervisor, and we all met. We had some very, very good meetings. To make a long story 13 14 short, that bridge is not going to come down. And we 15 have a tremendous relationship between the Town and 16 ourselves because of the way we approached the whole 17 situation and the whole thing worked out.

With regards to Greenport, we, as divers, are user-friendly type of activities. This is a great location. I know three out of my children, three out of four of my children were divers there. The fourth one was too young when the place got closed down.

What I'm proposing, what I'd like for you to consider is that the place be opened, the gate be opened, maybe only about five times a year, and

that's really about all we're looking for. This way
we could be there to assist on maintaining that place
for those five or so times. The hours would be,
suggesting 4 -- I'm sorry, 8 a.m. to let's say 4 p.m.
We are requesting on the weekends, because that's
when divers are going to be using the facilities.

7 In the past, and continuously, we do beach 8 cleanups. We have done them at Secret Beach, and we 9 would like to continue doing that at the end of the 10 season, we would be involved with a beach cleanup. 11 At one time, we also were in the harbor here in 12 Greenport and we inspected all the moorings for you. 13 I was a part of that team that did the diving and did 14 the inspections on those moorings. That's just one 15 example of one of the things we could do for you as a 16 town, if you would like, because we do have some 17 very, very qualified divers.

18 I happen to be a public safety diving 19 instructor. My job, as -- it's not my main job, of 20 course, but my job is I teach fire departments, 21 police departments on rescue diving. I do that 22 throughout New York, Long Island and the Tri-State 23 area. The company I do it does it for the military in the United States and other countries abroad. 24 So. yes, I feel very comfortable talking here in the 25

1 firehouse, because I am a fireman in Bayport.

2 But, simply, my request is to do something of which you feel comfortable with, which would help us, 3 4 of course, regain this access to this beach area, 5 which is so precious to us. To do it on a limited 6 basis, that's coming from me personally, as well as my board, because we don't want, quite honestly, 7 8 overwhelm ourselves either. So, if we're going to be 9 there for trying to maintain this place, I would like 10 to keep it somewhat restricted also.

Daytime hours, although night diving is great. I was just at Ponquogue Bridge Saturday night playing with a shark underwater in the dark, it was great. But, you know, it would be daytime hours. It would be, you know, Saturdays and/or Sundays. And if we can help you, that's something of which we would actually love to do.

18 So, if you could consider that, we would 19 greatly appreciate it. And however way you need for 20 me to work with you, I would do so. Like I said, I 21 worked very, very well with Anna Throne-Holst, and 22 she was absolutely amazed when we showed her 23 underwater what's underneath that bridge. And you've 24 got some great things under water here also and we would like to share that, you know, with the dive 25

community. And especially my big thing is the young
 divers, you know, trying to get the younger divers
 see things, especially on Long Island, instead of put
 you on an airplane all the time and going someplace
 else, because there's a great amount of things to see
 underwater.

Divers, like I said, are user-friendly type of activities, and they do take care of the areas that they're in, and they also respect the areas that they're in, and as a dive organization, we would be a part of that. So whatever you could do for us, we would greatly appreciate it.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. You say four to five
 days a year. What time of year, all summertime days?
 MR. LIPSKY: Spring, summer, fall, just spread
 them out.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Like once a month fromMay to October?

MR. LIPSKY: That sounds very, very reasonable,yeah.

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And about how many 22 people do expect to have out?

23 MR. LIPSKY: That's going to be hard to tell, 24 because there's so many people looking at me right 25 now saying, "I really hope you get this thing

1 approved." But I'm going to say anywheres from 15 to 2 40. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. 4 MR. LIPSKY: I'm guessing. MAYOR HUBBARD: Just so we have the 5 6 information, you know, one weekend, one day a month for the five months, with up to 50 divers, or 7 8 whatever, just so we have that so we could put that 9 out to the public and everything else. 10 MR. LIPSKY: Sure. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, the idea of actually 12 opening up that property to everybody on a limited basis and all I think is not a bad idea. It's been 13 14 closed off for everybody in the Village for a long 15 time ourselves. 16 MR. LIPSKY: Sure. MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, except for people 17 18 that climb over the fence and go around the fence and 19 go out there on weekends, so. 20 MR. LIPSKY: Oh, okay. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, I think -- any 22 other questions for him? 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: I think we could discuss that and, you know, see if we can work something out for 25

1 next year. I mean, myself, it sounds like a decent 2 idea to start using the property on a limited basis. 3 And it's not like it's every weekend where they're 4 there all the time. With that kind of schedule and that amount of people. I think it could be something 5 we should be able to work with. 6 7 MR. LIPSKY: Okay, great. 8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think to have an 9 organization like yours have access to the water would be fine with me. 10 11 MR. LIPSKY: Okay. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'd like, Paul, at some 13 point, could we go down and take a look at the site? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: 14 Sure. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I haven't been down there in 15 16 a long time. And I like the idea, but I also know 17 that at times we've had other activities down there. 18 And I'm not guite -- because I've seen -- I mentioned 19 to you a couple of weeks ago, there's been a lot of 20 cars over there on the weekends and a lot of fishing 21 poles. So I think there is a group already down 22 there fishing on the weekends, so --23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, they are. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. MAYOR HUBBARD: But myself, I haven't been down 25

1 to that beach in years, so I don't even know what it 2 looks like. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I haven't either. So I 4 don't even -- since we sold off half of it to the 5 County, I'm not even sure where the borderline is for 6 what you're talking about, okay? That's the other 7 question I had, is --8 The County bought everything to MAYOR HUBBARD: 9 the east, adjoining the other property where they have their other --10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: The Dam Pond Preserve. Thev 13 bought the east section of it. The main section of 14 the roadway and our outflow pipe are to the west side 15 of it with the road that goes down. 16 MR. LIPSKY: Right. I've looked at the 17 surveys, not in while, but I've looked at the 18 surveys. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 20 MR. LIPSKY: The main area that we're talking 21 about is within your jurisdiction. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That was my question. 23 Okav. 24 MR. LIPSKY: Yeah. Divers are not going to really climb fences with diving gear and equipment. 25

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1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no. My husband's a 2 diver. No, no, no, no, I know. 3 MR. LIPSKY: Okay. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 5 MR. LIPSKY: Do I wait to hear back from you, 6 or how does that work? 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. We'll have a discussion. 8 We'll put it -- if everybody's okay, we'll put it on 9 the agenda to vote on it at our next meeting, which 10 will be next Thursday. 11 MR. LIPSKY: Oh, next Thursday. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: And then we'll go from there. MR. LIPSKY: That would be great. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: If it gets approved, Paul will 15 contact you and let you know --16 MR. LIPSKY: Beautiful. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- what the outcome is. 18 MR. LIPSKY: Okay. 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Is this your contact information? 20 21 MR. LIPSKY: Yes. I sent you a letter, yeah. 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: The letter. 23 MR. LIPSKY: Oh, great. Thanks very much. And 24 you have all contact information there? 25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah.

2 MR. LIPSKY: Great.

3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, great.

4 MR. LIPSKY: Thank you all very, very much.
5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you very much for
6 coming out. Thank you, we appreciate it.

7 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Next item is a proposal 8 from the Hockey Club, Greenport Hockey Club. In the 9 past, it's been, I guess, somewhat of an informal 10 arrangement that we've had with the Hockey Club, and 11 in an attempt to formalize it, the Hockey Club also 12 asked for some changes to the -- to the arrangement, if you will. I've sent it out to everybody, you've 13 14 got the details there.

15 There were two changes that were requested by 16 the Village Attorney in this where the -- Item 5, 17 where the club was going to hire an outside 18 contractor for snow removal and reduce funds from our 19 rental rate, there was no limit on that. The Village 20 Attorney suggested a \$2500 a year limit. The Hockey 21 Club was fine with that.

22 On the item where the club has the option to 23 reschedule cancelled sessions, the Village Attorney 24 suggested we put that -- put in a clause in there 25 that it's at our discretion, the date and time would

1 be at the Village's discretion, and they were fine with that as well. So that's -- those are the two 2 3 changes that were requested. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 5 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We have -- yeah. We will have a resolution prepared to that effect for 6 7 next week. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh. 9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's fine. 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Are there any questions 11 on that at all? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. Just make sure it's all prepared for next week, because then you're going to 13 14 be -- if you wait until the end of November to vote 15 on it, hopefully, we'll have ice already. 16 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It will be done, it will 17 be done. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 19 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The last item I have is 20 a somewhat older item. The Long Island Railroad 21 Museum had originally asked for -- to turn over the 22 lease, I guess, that we have with them to go direct 23 to the MTA. We currently lease from the MTA, they 24 lease it from us. They wanted to go direct to the We had -- not this Board, the prior Board had 25 MTA.

1 agreed to do that. A letter was sent under the prior 2 Mayor to approve that. 3 Subsequent to that, the Long Island Railroad 4 Museum wanted to also include the property to the north. I think I -- I apologize, I only have one 5 6 copy. I can pass it around --7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no. 8 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- but I think everybody 9 saw it. So a piece, a section to the west. I just 10 wanted to find out if that was acceptable to 11 everybody. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To the west or the north? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: To the north. 13 I'm 14 sorry, to the north. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To the north. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Between the hedge and the back 17 of the building. 18 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: It used to be the old line that 20 used to go through there. 21 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: The ferry loop comes up around 24 behind their building --25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, right.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- going to the hedges that are 2 there, that section.

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: They want to use it -they do use it for parking anyway for staff, I guess, and that they want to continue that.

6 But that one is a little more complicated. Ι think that's the one where it's part of the County 7 8 agreement, so I'm not assure if we can -- we have to 9 wait until that's actually signed off on. But the 10 MTA is looking to -- they are required to go out to 11 an RFP process for the -- for the other piece, for 12 the building itself, and they want to know if they can include that or not as part of the RFP. 13 So they 14 just want something from us that says we're okay with 15 that, that's what the request is.

16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just need to get a 17 clarification, okay, here. So, in order for that to 18 be separated from our lease between the -- in other 19 words, our direct lease between MTA and the Village 20 of Greenport, they're going to put that back, that 21 piece out for an RFP, and it's not guaranteed to go 22 to the museum?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's correct.
Railroad -- the Railroad Museum is quite well aware
of that. In fact, it was discussed publicly.

1 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I remember that discussion. 2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I warned them a couple of times and he was fine with it, so. 3 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But are we fine with it now 5 that -- now my understanding was in the beginning that this was just going to be a clear transfer to 6 7 them from the MTA directly to the Railroad Museum. 8 Are we, as a Village, really want to put that piece 9 up and have something in there that -- you know, that 10 we know longer have some control over? 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're waiting for the 12 determination of all those pieces of property; we said that one. We could do it without that. I know 13 14 Mr. Fisher is back there raising his hand. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I know he is, I see him. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: We could have him just clarify 17 exactly what they're asking for. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's up to you, Mr. Mayor. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Do you want to just 22 clarify that for them? Don, come on up and just --23 so we know exactly what we're talking about before we 24 go any farther. MR. FISHER: If you recall -- Don Fisher, 25

1 Railroad Museum of Long Island, President.

2 If you recall the meeting that we in December 3 when I brought the original proposal to the Board, I 4 had stated that the parking area that used to be an 5 old ferry line back prior to the 1970s, or when they 6 moved from Claudio's over there for a short period of time, was licensed to the North Ferry Company from 7 8 the MTA. And at that time in December, I had stated 9 to the Board that we would be talking to the ferry 10 company to get that piece of property contiguous with 11 the building.

We did have that meeting January some time, end of January, beginning of February, and at that time, the ferry company believed that that was part of their ferry line and it was part of their license with the MTA. And they agreed that in 2017, when their license came due for renewal, that they would turn that 130 feet of parking over to us.

19 Since then, what's been discovered, and Paul 20 was at the meeting in August, the ferry company only 21 has license to what they call the jug handle, that 22 little bulge that goes into the parking lot at the 23 end where the cars turn around. The major part of 24 that two-lane road that runs from Third Street to 25 Fourth Street is actually part of the Suffolk County

1 license, and is part of the transfer from the County 2 to the Village, along with the Railroad Dock and 3 apparently the parking lot. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: There's four pieces down there. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's four pieces. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Four separate leases, yes. 7 MR. FISHER: So where we were in August was 8 that since there has been no movement since January of 2015 on that transfer from the County to 9 10 Greenport, and it seems to kind of be just like 11 hanging out there, that the MTA has gone to the 12 County, and the County is willing to give that piece 13 of the driveway, the parking area to the contiguous 14 piece that will be the new license between the MTA 15 and the Railroad Museum of Long Island. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: After an RFP process has 17 been completed, correct? 18 MR. FISHER: Right, right. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Which means that there is no guarantee that --20 21 MR. FISHER: That's correct. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- you'll get the RFP. 23 MR. FISHER: Right, and we stated that in 24 December, also, and that was the understanding, yes. It's a process, it's a bureaucratic process that 25

1 we're going through.

2	So where we're at right now is the County and
3	the MTA have both reached out, I believe, to Joe
4	I'm sorry he's not here tonight and have asked for
5	an indication that it's okay with you for the County
6	to turn that little piece of parking area, that 130
7	feet, over to us.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
9	MR. FISHER: So that's what Paul's got here.
10	If it's okay with you guys, you need to let Dori
11	Masri Roberts (phonetic) from the MTA, who you know,
12	and Ms. DiFanni (phonetic), I believe is her last
13	name, at Suffolk County, and Joe, if he was here.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: He'll be here shortly. He had
15	something he had to go to and he'll be a little late.
16	MR. FISHER: I believe he's been in contact
17	with them and there's been some communication back
18	and forth. As long as you don't have a problem with
19	it, let them know the County will take that 130 feet
20	of driveway, give it to us. They'll cede their
21	interest in that. The Village has already ceded its
22	interest in the building.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Correct.
24	MR. FISHER: That's already being done. But
25	then once the County cedes their interest in the

parking area, MTA will get approval from the Long
Island Railroad, and put out the RFP. And we're
ready to go with filling out the application for the
RFP, and I'm optimistic that there's not going to be
any change.

6 We have written responses from the State now 7 through the County, through the Town, right here to 8 the Village, that we'll be going into the RFP. 9 Everyone from the State to the Village wants it to 10 remain as a Railroad Museum.

Also, MTA has stated that because it is an Historic District, there are a great many restrictions that come with the Historic District as far as changing the exterior of the buildings and the property. So anything can happen, you never say never, but we think that that would deter anyone else from being interested in the property.

18 And also, we have reviewed with the MTA and 19 Greystone Realty the new roof, the new deck, the painting of the building, the pointing of the 20 21 building, and we've now included resurfacing of the 22 parking area. And those five items are also going to 23 go into the RFP, which is also going to make it less 24 desirous of somebody that wants to go in there. So anyone that's interested in opening up a 25

1 discotheque, a restaurant, a nightclub, you know, put 2 a church in there, whatever they want to do, they're 3 looking at historic property and those restrictions, 4 and they're looking at these five issues that are 5 going to have to be addressed within the first five 6 years of the license. So, as I say, anything can happen, but I'm 7 8 optimistic that, you know, we're going in the right 9 direction, everybody's working together. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Don, 130 feet, what are the 11 actual dimensions of the property? I know it's an 12 odd shape, but, Paul, do you have a -- can you let me see that for a second? 13 14 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's the red area. It's hard to ready. It's 150, 130, or something like 15 16 that. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: This is behind the building, 18 right? 19 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct. 20 MR. FISHER: Right. You used to live right 21 there. 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I know, and I know what used 23 to go on in that little stretch there, too. MR. FISHER: From Walden's house to the --24 25 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, yeah, okay.

MR. FISHER: There you go.

1

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't think you can build a
discotheque back there. Just double-check it and
make sure you're just being facetious here.

MR. FISHER: Well, being facetious. But the 5 6 MTA's desire is to put some parking with the 7 building, because as it stands right now, what we've 8 uncovered as we peeled the onion back, your license 9 historically has been from the southern edge of the 10 deck to about a foot inside the north eave line to 11 the building, very narrow, it's only 35 feet wide. 12 the length of the building from Fourth Street. Your line, as it stands today, actually runs north/south 13 through our brick sidewalk. 14 That means that the 15 County has license to the parking area where our flag 16 pole is, where the forsythia hedge is, the grass and 17 those trees. So we're actually picking up from the 18 County an L-shaped -- almost a little flag lot there.

19 The MTA is desirous to connect that with the 20 building, so that if someone else were to take it, 21 there will be parking there; it also assures us 22 parking. They've also increased the southern 23 boundary by 16 feet to include the track and the snow 24 plow, the caboose and the boxcar. As a matter of 25 fact, all of this gerrymandering of the lines is what

1 has held up putting the boxcar on the wheels. I'm 2 pleased to say that we're looking at a date in early 3 November, probably another three weeks, four weeks, 4 and that project's going to be done. So there's a 5 whole 'nother set of bureaucracy to go through, but 6 what really held that up was where these lines were. 7 So it's been a busy summer. But at this 8 juncture now, we all know what's going on with that 9 north parking lot. The County and the MTA would like 10 to know that you're okay with the County giving it to us. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 12 MR. FISHER: That's it. Thank you 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. Thank you. 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thanks, Don. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thanks, Don. 16 We could circulate the MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 17 map around so everybody knows what is, Paul, and I'll 18 put it on the agenda and discuss that on Thursday. 19 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Moving on to our regular 20 reports, the Road and Water Department, you have the 21 reports there. I just want to point out a couple of 22 highlights. 23 The Mitchell Park bluestone was replaced with 24 the appropriate size stone throughout the park. That's all completed. I think the crews did a great 25

1 job on that.

2	They also worked on setting up for the Maritime
3	Festival. They had to do the sanitation on their
4	own. They were not assisted by North Fork Sanitation
5	this year, for whatever reason. They didn't have the
6	manpower. Again, I think they did they did a
7	pretty bang-up job on that as well.
8	Moving over to the Sewer Department, as you can
9	see in the reports, a lot of preventive maintenance
10	is being done, has been done and continues to be
11	done. We're looking at replacement of generators.
12	We've gotten, I think, one quote on them. We have
13	we need more quotes in order to move forward, so
14	we're still working on getting quotes for those for
15	replacement of the generators.
16	On the moving to the Electric Department,
17	again, you have the information there, but,
18	certainly, if you have any questions.
19	The exhaust silencer for No. 6 was replaced.
20	We're finalizing engineering specifications for to
21	bid out a new fire alarm system within the power
22	plant.
23	Ongoing physical projects that are in process,
24	Island Pump & Tank is replacing the vehicle fueling
25	systems. That's in process. I expect by the end of

1 October to actually have the tanks on site for that, 2 so that's moving along. The force main for the basement's drainage 3 4 system of the building itself, again, is almost done, 5 again, should be done by the end of the month. 6 Incorporated in that would be an oil water separator for any oily water that's in the basement to get 7 8 pumped out on that. 9 Any questions on those departments? MAYOR HUBBARD: Did we -- did the advertisement 10 11 go out for a new lineman? 12 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. 13 CLERK PIRILLO: It went out in --ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We did it in the local 14 15 paper. We did it locally where I'm going to be 16 sitting down with Sylvia tomorrow or Monday to come 17 up with a list of publications that's a little more 18 widespread than that. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 20 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: But we at least started 21 the process. And we've reached out through various 22 contracts to see --MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that's what we talked 23 about last week. 24 25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: I wanted to make sure you
2	started doing that.
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. Yeah, we
4	definitely did.
5	You have the Building Department reports.
6	There's no great highlights. The only thing I will
7	mention, although it would be more for next month's
8	report, the some repair work is being done.
9	Started today on the Meson Ole building, basically to
10	shore it up. It's not final work, this is just to
11	stabilize the problem areas of the building. Took a
12	little while to get that moving, but we finally had
13	gotten some action on that. So I think that's also
14	positive, a positive thing.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Are we doing that, or is
16	the
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, that's yeah. No,
18	it's not being we're not paying for it.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's through the bank,
21	actually, as I understand it. So I think that's I
22	was happy to see that finally move forward.
23	Moving on to Recreation. Again, if you have
24	any questions on any of the reports, some of the
25	details. The revenues in all areas was up, which is

1 good. 2 In September, we had the Off Soundings Fall 3 Series Race. The very following weekend, we had the 4 Maritime, so two weekends in a row in September the 5 Marina was quite active, so it was good news for us 6 there. 7 They continue to do repairs. Some of the power 8 cable pedestals, which over the years deteriorated, 9 and they're working on repairs for those as well. 10 And the Rec. Center itself. the new 11 applications have been set up. Enrollment this year 12 is higher than last year. Again, we have some good programs going on there. The campground has wound 13 14 down, and we're preparing for the end of the season 15 on the campground as well. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: When does that close? 17 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I believe at the end of 18 the month. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 20 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I think at the end of 21 October, if I remember correctly. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Same with the Marina? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The Marina is closed now 23 24 officially. They're still taking some transients, if they do pop in, until the end of October, but the 25

1 official date has already past.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

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3 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And that's it for my4 reports.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Any questions for Mr. Pallas? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A & F, I know they've been up there, according to some emails. Do you have --

8 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. I apologize, I 9 should have noted that. They've done their -- they 10 will be finishing up with the coil replacements of 11 the tap changer tomorrow, anticipated to finish up 12 Next week, we will -- probably mid week, tomorrow. we'll energize the transformer, Transformer #1, and 13 14 let that stabilize for a little bit, and then start doing the transfer probably the following week, 15 16 transfer load from Transformer 2 to transformer 1.

17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So the DMNC test,
18 you'll start thinking about that down the road in
19 January?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We're not in the period yet for the winter test. Well, maybe we are. Maybe started in mid October. We have until February to do that. But once the transfer is made, we will schedule those.

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And then the other

issues from A & F, that you were going to get a
 schedule from them moving forward on the capital
 project?

4 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. I've been going 5 back and forth with them on the scheduling. They had 6 some issues with the drawings. We think we've 7 finalized those. I need to follow up with them and 8 revise the new schedule. I had one, but it was a 9 tentative. Until we finalize the drawings, I 10 couldn't really do anything with it, because it 11 wasn't really ready. So I will hopefully finalize 12 that with them tomorrow or early next week and get 13 that out to the Board.

14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then, Mayor, as far as 16 the litigation that we were discussing, will the 17 Village Attorney and the Village Administrator give 18 us some type of an update where they are with that at 19 some point?

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. Well, I mean, when Joe 21 gets here, we can ask him about it. I don't know 22 where -- I know they just went out, they're waiting 23 for responses. I believe it's too late for the 24 responses, so it's time to take the next step. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. It's been kind of

1 sitting around for a while. Okay. That's it. MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll ask the Attorney, when he 2 3 gets here, for his report. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Thank you. 4 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for Paul? TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. It's all 7 8 vou, Robert. TREASURER BRANDT: Yay. 9 Good evening, 10 everyone. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening 12 TREASURER BRANDT: I have a few resolutions First one we talked about at last month's 13 here. 14 meeting was for the Length of Service Award Program 15 we every year budget. I'm unsure of how high it's 16 going to go from year to year, the invoice. We 17 always have a residual leftover and it's been --18 we've been advised by the auditors to start paying a 19 little bit more towards the LOSAP Program due to the 20 low return on investments. I mean, you guys had the 21 meeting here a few months ago with RBC, so you're 22 aware of that. So I'd like to have a resolution to take the 23 24 unspent balance and invest it towards that program. 25 Right. The \$5,000 payment that MAYOR HUBBARD:

1 we normally make in March, do you still have enough left for that? 2 3 TREASURER BRANDT: Yeah. MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So we paid the bulk of 4 it early in the year, and there's always one payment 5 due in March. 6 Okav. 7 TREASURER BRANDT: Yeah. I'll double-check 8 I think we do have that put aside. that. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. That's fine. And this 10 is this year, this current budget year money you're 11 talking about? 12 TREASURER BRANDT: Correct, correct. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 14 TREASURER BRANDT: Also mentioned at last 15 month's, the Carousel always seems to have a little 16 bit of remaining revenue that gets gobbled up into 17 fund balance. We had talked about putting that 18 aside, restricting that for Carousel repairs 19 directly, so this way we can start self-funding those 20 repairs. So I have a resolution asking to start 21 restricting those funds. 22 Okay. The next resolution, due to my 23 overexuberance, will not be on the agenda next week. 24 We jumped a few steps in the process, so I apologize. There's a whole particular set of process we have to 25

1 go through before we even get to this stage, so this will not be presented. 2 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're talking about the 4 Greenport Housing Authority reports? Correct, right. 5 TREASURER BRANDT: 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So that's not going to be a resolution. 7 8 TREASURER BRANDT: That will not be on. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. That's something you 10 and the Mayor have to discuss? 11 TREASURER BRANDT: Correct. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 13 TREASURER BRANDT: All right. Two budget mods 14 for funding. We were just talking about the sidewalks and curbs, so I have the budget mod in 15 16 place for that Capital Project, as well as the gravel 17 replacement for Mitchell Park. 18 That's it for resolutions this month. 19 Utility billing: We did make -- the TC payment 20 is coming up. I guess I'm jumping ahead of myself 21 But the monthly collection is going to be here. 22 lower. We made our catch-up payments, we're getting 23 to that point. So that's with the October NYPA bill, 24 which will be reflected in the January -- the bills that are due in January, December bills that come due 25

1 in January.

2	The survey that I was asked to put out for
3	online payments, we started getting people are
4	receiving returning their surveys. We've only
5	gotten 160 as of the day I made this report. I
6	haven't seen any come in since. We've already
7	started sending out Sector 1. We ran the bills
8	today, so we're already into the second cycle here,
9	so I don't know if I'm going to get anymore. So,
10	hopefully, I'll have an update for you next month on
11	that, development on that.
12	Bond payments: I already jumped the gun here.
13	The TCC payment is scheduled for the 16th, tomorrow.
14	That's the 75% payment for this year. We have our
15	usual bond payments for the 2014, as well as the
16	brownfield.
17	That's all I have for you guys. Any questions?
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Just one real quick. You
19	said there's some left over in the Carousel each
20	year. What are we talking?
21	TREASURER BRANDT: There seems to be a couple
22	of grand. I don't have a set number, because it does
23	fluctuate year to year, but the Carousel tends to be
24	profitable.
	·

TREASURER BRANDT: Okay? So we'd like to, you
 know, just restrict that money for the Carousel
 repairs themselves.

4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This has been going on for a 5 When I was on the Carousel Committee, the while. 6 Carousel Committee requested that the Village Board, 7 at the end of the budget year, take some of that 8 funding and put it away for capital improvements, 9 because what was happening is it would be getting put 10 into fund balance and then repairs weren't being 11 done. So for the last, what, three years, I think, 12 we've tried to squirrel it away. But this year, I just -- in talking with Robert, and as part of my 13 14 to-do checklist on the end of the year, I just asked him to -- reminded him about it, that's all. The 15 16 Carousel Committee is the one that recommended it a 17 couple years ago.

18 TREASURER BRANDT: Trying to put it aside is, 19 you know, difficult at best, because getting -- it 20 goes to fund balance, then you have to pull it out 21 with a budget amendment the following year. By 22 restricting it, that money will be readily available 23 for any of these repairs.

24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, I get that. I was 25 just curious as to how much we'd have available to

1 make repairs, you know, a couple of grand. 2 TREASURER BRANDT: I honestly don't remember. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It's better than nothing. TREASURER BRANDT: I just looked a week ago, I 4 don't remember, but it is -- it's significant enough 5 6 to start socking it away. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. Thank you, sir. 7 8 TREASURER BRANDT: You're welcome. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for Robert? 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 12 TREASURER BRANDT: Thank you, everyone. CLERK PIRILLO: Good evening, Ladies and 13 14 Gentlemen. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Good evening. 16 CLERK PIRILLO: I'd like to start with my 17 additions, as I usually do. 18 We have a resolution accepting the resignation 19 of James Fogarty from the Village of Greenport Electric Department, effective October 9th, 2015. 20 21 That will be added to our agenda for Thursday. 22 We also have a resolution hiring George Pope as 23 an After-Care Aide/Counselor for the Village of 24 Greenport Recreation Center at a pay rate of \$9.00 per hour, effective September 19, 2015. That is a 25

1 replacement of the appointment we made last month. 2 That gentleman did not start with us, because he 3 obtained a full-time job instead. We thank him and 4 wish him luck in his opportunity. So that's not an additional person, it's just a replacement. 5 6 Again, thank you to the Fire Department for 7 allowing us to use this facility for our charity 8 event, which is in December, for our Recreation 9 Center. That's our annual event. And just a 10 reminder, I'm sure Trustee Phillips will do this as 11 well, about our Halloween --12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Halloween Parade. No. I'll 13 let you do it. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: Halloween Parade. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll let you do it. 16 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I am seeing many of the 18 things I was going to discuss have been brought up 19 already, so. 20 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. On Halloween, of course, 21 starting at 9 o'clock. 22 Under the informational section of my report, 23 I'd also like to add that Attorney Prokop, Trustee 24 Phillips and I had a rather lengthy conference call regarding the process of coordinated review. 25 And

1 following that conference call, I created a synopsis 2 of exactly how the process -- not exactly -- of how 3 the process begins and how it is to be handled. 4 Village Administrator had a very good idea, that for 5 each of the Boards, we're going to embellish upon 6 this general process, so that each Board has more 7 detailed information. Of course, we're already in 8 the process.

9 I had already sent a letter, for example, for 308-310 -- excuse me -- 308-310 Main Street to New 10 11 York State Parks Historic -- Recreation and Historic 12 Preservation, and they responded in kind, thanking us 13 for the information and advising what they feel the 14 next step should be, okay? But in order to take away 15 any mystery, because this is a new process for 16 everyone, we'd like to be well involved in the 17 procedure, okay? Attorney Prokop is in the process 18 of reviewing the synopsis that I created.

19 Any questions thus far?

20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The only --

21 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The only other addition to that is when the coordinated review paperwork is presented to the Clerk, I do believe it would be beneficial if the actual copy of the application is

1 included in the coordinated review.

2 I mean, I took the time to go check a folder 3 today, because we have one for the Episcopal Church, 4 and found a few things in there that I think should 5 have been brought to the attention of us, as a Board, 6 as well as previously Boards interacting with it. 7 But it's kind of hard for us to get a sheet of paper 8 and not really kind of see what's going on. So that 9 would be helpful to you, I think, in the Clerk's Office to have that, as well as the folder, as we do 10 with the wetlands permits, okay? 11

12 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. I will obtain that from 13 the Lead or beginning agency, if you will, beginning 14 Board, and circulate that all together as a package.

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And when you have that 16 together, send it to all of us, so we can review it 17 and see what's there, along with -- where everybody 18 checks off on the box, if each one got it, so we know 19 what the process is. That way we're all familiar 20 with it, and everybody will see it, and we know 21 what's -- so once you're finished reviewing that, 22 make sure we all get that.

23 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: You're talking about the 24 actual application for the project?

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The -- whatever the actual

1 project is, not -- it's similar --2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It could be -- it could 3 be multiple applications, because there maybe a 4 Zoning application, there may be, you know, several 5 different kinds of applications. You, obviously, want all of them. 6 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, we just need the cover 8 sheet. I don't think we need all of this stuff. 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Okav. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We just need the cover 11 sheet, so that at least if we want to go into detail, 12 we can take the initiative to do that. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I understand, okay. I 13 14 just wanted to clarify. But I think in fairness to 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 16 the other Trustees here, that they should have the information at least to be able to have an idea of 17 18 what's being discussed. 19 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Okav. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Not everyone here has served 21 on Zoning, Planning, Historic, or have been involved 22 in it, and I think that that just helps move the 23 process and the communication along a little bit 24 easier, okay? MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. We don't need plans and 25

1 specs and all the other stuff. 2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, no, yeah. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Just, you know, a deck at this 4 piece of property and what they're -- in general, 5 what they're doing. 6 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure, yup. MAYOR HUBBARD: And if they want any further 7 8 details, they can get that from Village Hall. 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Got it. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's trying to eliminate the 11 presentation of the first one that was given to the 12 Village Clerk, which was just walked in the door, handed a piece of paper, and said, "It's your turn 13 now in coordinated review." So I found that very 14 15 distressive, and I think that that was not fair to 16 the rest of the staff. 17 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's why I'm bringing 19 it up, okay? 20 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Okay. 21 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. Trustee Martilotta, 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am. 23 CLERK PIRILLO: In your role as Liaison --24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am. CLERK PIRILLO: -- to Southold Town, if you 25

1 could please, in terms of preparedness, ensure that 2 Mayor Hubbard and myself are both on lists to be 3 included in meetings --4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: The OEM? CLERK PIRILLO: -- that involve emergency 5 6 preparedness, please. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You got it. 7 8 CLERK PIRILLO: Please. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No problem. I spoke to 10 him regarding you. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 12 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'll make sure that 13 Mr. Lloyd -- goodness gracious. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: Reisenberg. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Reisenberg. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Reisenberg, there we go. 17 I spoke to him regarding your email. I'll make sure I put you on as well. 18 19 CLERK PIRILLO: Appreciate that. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No problem. 21 CLERK PIRILLO: Appreciate that very much. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: When that happened after the 23 organizational meeting, he was supposed to add you 24 and not take everybody else off. He took everybody off and put just you. 25

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No problem. I was 2 unaware. 3 Okav. So that's --MAYOR HUBBARD: 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'll pass that along. 5 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But since we brought up the 6 7 subject of Lloyd, and I've had several complaints, 8 and actually listened to the recordings of our 9 Village Board meetings. And I'll be honest with you, 10 at first I thought it was a problem with our 11 technology, but in listening to the CDs, obviously, 12 our sound problem isn't the problem. So is there 13 some way that we could impose on the Town of Southold 14 to either purchase a new piece of equipment, approach 15 Cablevision, which was an excuse to me before that 16 they have. But we need to -- we need to be able to 17 have our residents who do not attend the Village 18 Board meetings be able to at least understand what 19 we're saying. So I'm just hoping that perhaps -- I 20 don't know if you want Jack and I to reach out to 21 him, or if you want to reach out to him, Sylvia, but 22 somebody needs --23 MAYOR HUBBARD: The two of you can reach out to

them. And, you know, if they want to partner withit, you know, we can help. If they need to buy a

1 certain piece of machinery, we're using it also, so 2 let's see what we can do. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. I just --4 as I said, I got a couple of phone calls, and I 5 actually got a -- I don't have Cablevision, I have 6 Direct TV, so I --7 MAYOR HUBBARD: They had a bad month, because 8 the Town Board meeting -- it wasn't just our meeting, 9 it was the Town Board meeting, too. At first they said it was all our recording, and it turned out it 10 11 wasn't and it was their problem. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: They did correct it later on, 14 but our meeting is only on there for a week. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But in fairness, and 16 since the Clerk's Office is making the effort to get 17 all this stuff out and information, communicating, I 18 think we need to just push a few buttons, that's all. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I mean, I think offering 20 to help split the cost or whatever. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. We'll 22 work on it. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 24 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. Two more questions, if I 25 may. Trustee Martilotta again.

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes. ma'am. 2 CLERK PIRILLO: In your report, you are stating 3 that requested documentation of FOIL process for 4 Building Department and other files was accomplished, 5 no response. I apologize for that. To what do you 6 need a response? To what is a response lacking? 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That one was Doug's. Ι 8 don't know off the top of my head. I know that he 9 was looking for, along with a couple of members of 10 the community -- he had put in -- I'm trying to 11 remember off the top of my head now. You know, I 12 don't know. I'll have to send that to you right 13 away. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: I appreciate that. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'll get to him. I'll get 16 with him. 17 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yup. 19 CLERK PIRILLO: Appreciate that. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: You got it. 21 CLERK PIRILLO: And the last thing is that we 22 have a request for a resolution for a Turkey Trot. 23 And in your report, we're saying that just requesting the Board's approval for a Mass Assembly Permit. 24 Do we have a Mass Assembly Permit? 25

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, what we had done in 2 the past is when there were groups -- I'm trying to 3 think. It was the ALS made the -- they had like a 4 bike ride for the -- for ALS earlier in the year. 5 Everybody was in Mitchell Park for 15, 20 minutes and 6 then left. I don't know that we necessarily had a 7 permit. What we're looking for is almost just to let 8 everybody know we would like to do this. We're 9 looking for tacit approval from the Board itself, that on that morning, you know, we'll be able to get 10 11 20 people to go and then run through the Village. We 12 didn't want to just go ahead and do it without going 13 through the Board first. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: Right. I'm sorry, but not 15 using Mitchell Park or using Mitchell Park? 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Just to gather in the morning at Mitchell Park --17 18 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- and then run five 20 kilometers throughout the Village. 21 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay, thank you. I just wanted 22 to clarify that. That's up to this Board. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So you're not asking for any 24 road closures or anything? TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, no, no. It will all 25

1 be on the sidewalks, but I didn't think it would be 2 appropriate to --3 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- have signs up, you 5 know, turn this way, turn that way, and people asking 6 what's going on. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So we wanted to make sure 9 we went through everybody first. CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: We should be able to approve 12 that. I mean, basically, you want to just gather there and take off, go around town and then --13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- come back, where you're not 16 really using the park. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine. 19 CLERK PIRILLO: Perfect. Thank you. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The only thing, Sylvia, that 21 I would ask, and I didn't get a chance to mention 22 this afternoon, in reviewing the Mitchell Park 23 policy, we have in there a cutoff date for use 24 requests as of March 15th. 25 CLERK PIRILLO: March 15th, yes.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have two questions. First 2 of all, this is brand new. How are we going to be communicating to those who have used the park in the 3 4 past that this is a new -- you know, this is -- you can't wait until two months or a month before that 5 6 you want to come to the Board for a Mass Assembly 7 Permit? And how are we going to get that out to 8 people like the Chamber, and whatever, to let them 9 know that events that they're thinking about, they've 10 got to get it into us before March 15th? 11 It's a good question. CLERK PIRILLO: We've 12 had it up on the website for quite some time. We had 13 it up for a long time. We had the Local Law. We had 14 the law up for a long time, we had the regulations up 15 for a while and discussion. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Most organizations don't look at that. You know, they're going to be -- I 17 18 know that most of the publications are getting ready 19 to come out for -- the North Fork Chamber, I think, 20 is starting the Long Island -- the Long Island --21 what are they called? LIV whatever. 22 CLERK PIRILLO: Long Island Visitors and 23 Convention Bureau. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: LICVB. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They're all getting ready to 25

1 put their publications together, so that's why I'm asking, okay? 2 3 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I believe last year we 5 only had eight people that had applied for it the 6 previous year. So we could take those eight people and mail it out to them. 7 8 CLERK PIRILLO: Exactly. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: And everybody else is going to 10 be general information. 11 CLERK PIRILLO: Exactly. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Because before we did the 13 thing, we went to the previous year for 2014 and 14 there was only eight, I believe. 15 CLERK PIRILLO: That's right, there were eight, 16 yes. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: So eight or nine. So, I mean, 18 we can send out to those people that used it in the past, Relay For Life, anybody else who might want to 19 20 do it. 21 CLERK PIRILLO: Right. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Everybody else is going to have 23 to just go off the --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's fine, but I just -- I 24 think we just need to make --25

1 CLERK PIRILLO: That's fine. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Make it available as 3 communication tools, okay? 4 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. We'll go backwards into 5 our records and then email to everyone, as the Mayor 6 says, who has requested use of the park in the past, 7 and make sure that they're aware of our new 8 requirements. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 10 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay? I think that's fair. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right, along with the Marina 12 guests, so that they have the information, because we 13 had a couple of requests from them before. 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 15 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes, an upcoming request as 16 well already that we already received. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. That's the other --17 18 the Marina is the other issue, too. I mean, we're 19 sticking that also into the March 15th, the Marina 20 activities that Jeff generates? 21 They normally book six months MAYOR HUBBARD: 22 in advance anyway, so they should already be doing 23 that, they should be. 24 CLERK PIRILLO: We have already have a request for next summer. 25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is the Marina Manager aware 2 of that? 3 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 5 CLERK PIRILLO: I believe so. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: How about we double-check? 7 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay, can do. Bids, the bids 8 on the resolutions, the Treasurer and I were 9 discussing the fact that annual bids --MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, the annual -- okay. 10 11 CLERK PIRILLO: 0kay? 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: I was going to do that under Audit Committee. 13 Okay. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's where it came up, but 16 you could it now --17 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay, that's fine. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- if you've got information on it. 19 CLERK PIRILLO: I just want make sure we don't 20 forget. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 22 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. So the Mayor will be 23 discussing the fact that annual bids will be added as a resolution as well, and that's coming from the 24 management team, actually, so thank you. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Yeah, we discussed it 2 with -- well, we did it in Audit Committee, we talked about it. The list is out. Robert put a proposal of 3 4 most, but I have to finish fine-tuning what it is, so 5 everybody can review that. It will be a resolution 6 to go out and do the yearly bids. Normally, we'd do it earlier in the year. It's just been a process 7 8 trying to do different things, switch around finding 9 the old bids and whatever. We're going to do this 10 and this will -- we should have everything back to 11 prepare for next year's budget. So we'll be doing 12 that now so we'll have it for next year's budget. The stuff we had now, the old ones will be discarded 13 14 and we'll go with the new stuff. 15 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. Any questions? 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, wait. No, no. I have 17 one more. 18 CLERK PIRILLO: All right. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it's dealing with FOIL 20 requests. 21 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. My understanding is 23 that all the FOIL requests need to come through your 24 office for any particular document within the Village. That's the way the procedure was set up. I 25

1 believe and you're responsible under the law to 2 follow the certain time periods, correct? CLERK PIRILLO: Correct. 3 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's come to my attention 5 that that's not quite what's going on in a certain 6 department. Hopefully, it's not going on in other 7 departments. But, at one point, we gave an 8 educational -- educational teaching for all the 9 employees, Joe led it. Is that possible that we 10 could arrange for that again so that the employees 11 understand what the process is? 12 CLERK PIRILLO: Sure. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That we do have a law that 13 14 we have to follow. And that they are not only -- as an employee, if they're not following the procedure 15 16 within the Village, that they're not only putting the 17 Village at risk, but they're also putting the Village 18 Clerk's Office in a bad scenario. So that's one 19 thing I would like to see set up between you and the 20 Village Attorney, if that's all right with you, 21 Mayor. I think all the employees of this Village 22 need to understand what the FOIL request or the 23 public access requirements are. 24 CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 25 Okav.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anything else for the 2 Clerk? 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. sir. 4 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Okay. The Village 6 Attorney. Joe, we had something came up before. The Ambulance, the Fire Department cleared that up with 7 8 You sent the letter and it's in his box. them. 9 Just he had a question for you. 10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: That was taken care of. 12 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I reviewed the contract, I 13 reviewed the Truck Committee's report, and the Truck 14 Committee -- I agree with the Truck Committee. Ι 15 just wanted to see what they technically had to say 16 first, but their technical response is exactly what I 17 agree with. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 19 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It came up with legal, so that's fine. 20 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So you want to go and 22 put that on the agenda to go out to bid -- I mean, to 23 accept the bid on that --ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- so they can start doing the 25

1 truck? 2 ATTORNEY PROKOP: That's my recommendation. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Did you get that Sylvia? 4 CLERK PIRILLO: I'm sorry. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: The ambulance, we're going to go accept the bid --6 7 CLERK PIRILLO: Yes. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- with the exclusions, and 9 that will be on the agenda. I just want to talk to 10 you first before we put it on the agenda, so it's --11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, that's good, I agree with 12 that. And I want to -- I was going to say this to 13 you separate, but since this came up at the meeting, 14 I wanted to commend the Truck -- the Department and 15 the Truck Committee. I think that they did -- the 16 technical review of the bid I thought was 17 particularly good, very solid 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Thank you. There 19 was one other question on the power plant. Where do 20 we stand with the litigation on Phase I? I know --21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. So I was going to --22 actually, as part of my report, I was going to 23 request a brief Executive Session. But, I mean, we're really -- I mean, there's not much left to talk 24 There's no -- there hasn't been a response at 25 about.

all. I mean, we have -- we sent a demand letter to
 Genesys identifying six items that we think are
 significant issues with the engineering design work.
 And there was -- there was a sort of cross-response
 where I think I sent him an email.

6 We said we wanted a response in 10 days, and I think on the eleventh day I reminded him that I 7 8 hadn't -- or the 10th day, I reminded him that I 9 hadn't received anything from him and from -- excuse 10 me, from the company. And we got a response that he 11 thought that he had told us that he was going to be 12 on vacation and needed more time and to respond. And that was back in August, you know, July, August, so 13 14 nothing has happened since then from Genesys, and so 15 the ball's really in our court.

I have reviewed the agreements, and, you know, I think that this -- you know, I think that there is a -- you know, definitely a question that we should -- about the services that were provided.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, and --

22 MAYOR HUBBARD: So do we need a resolution for 23 next week to --

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, please.

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- commence legal action

1 against Genesys Engineering?

2	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. One of the things which
3	I wanted to talk to you about in Executive Session,
4	basically, is, you know, how to how you want to
5	handle the legal part of it efficiently, you know,
6	because I don't want it to be you know, we're sort
7	of in it's not the same situation as Manning,
8	because Manning we had a defendant that was bankrupt.
9	But, I mean, it's a similar situation in that it's
10	going to be a technical case, you know, from an
11	engineering standpoint. So I would just need to
12	identify what the costs are, what exactly we're
13	getting involved in.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Joe, just one quick question.
16	If it's, you know, a technical case with engineering
17	required, would that involve expert, you know
18	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, right.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: hiring a consultant, expert
20	consultant and things like that?
21	ATTORNEY PROKOP: So we were fortunate in
22	you know, in the manning case, the I'm only
23	mentioning that, because it's going to have similar
24	issues. The Manning case, what we were able to do
25	was to you know, the first thing is I agreed to

1 take the case on a -- on a representation to the 2 Village that I would -- that my billing would never 3 -- I would keep track of my time, but my billing 4 would never exceed one-third of whatever the amount 5 due -- amount that was ever recovered, if anything 6 was ever recovered. So that way we knew that there 7 was going -- it could only turn out to be a positive 8 for the Village, there wasn't going to be a negative.

9 The Manning case, the defendant -- it was a 10 contracting problem. The contractor filed for 11 bankruptcy, disappeared. The contractor was bonded, 12 but the bonding company filed for bankruptcy and was not available, and we were still able to get, you 13 14 know, a fairly good recovery in the case. And my 15 bill, which was literally a fraction of the time that 16 I put into the case, and I gave an accounting of my 17 time to the Village, my bill was adjusted and reduced 18 by like 70%. I mean, I basically contributed about 19 80% of my time just to keep the case going so we 20 could get a satisfactory recovery.

And I see that there's a question about my bill in one of the work session reports. So the two Trustees that are raising the question weren't part of this when it started, so you may not understand what I just talked about, but that was basically --

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1 it was sort of a backwards contingency, where I 2 promised that I would keep track of my time, and my time, whatever I billed, would never exceed one-third 3 4 of the recovery. So it would -- I agreed to do it on 5 that basis, and the Village, that way we'd be 6 protected, so -- because the estimates of the 7 Attorney's time in the beginning, when we started 8 that case, were 100 to \$200,000. And I couldn't put 9 the Village in a position where, you know, you ended 10 up with a \$100,000 legal bill and got \$30,000, so I 11 agreed to do it.

12 In the Genesys litigation, we're almost in the same situation. I don't want to, you know, go into 13 14 that kind of arrangement necessary -- you know, right 15 awav. I don't think it's necessary right away. But 16 I just want to point out to you that we have to be --17 when you start a technical case like that, you're 18 right, you have to think about engineering costs.

19 One of the things that happened in Manning was 20 Cashin Associates came in at the end. They had done 21 work for the Village. Previously, Cashin Associates 22 came in at the end and gave us some very valuable 23 information regarding the problems with the project. 24 And, you know, hopefully we can get somebody like 25 that to help us out with the engineering on Genesys,

1 where we're not, you know, spending a huge amount of 2 money in expert fees. 3 But, anyway, a long story -- the long story 4 short is that with Genesys, the ball's in our court. 5 You know, there's no response from him. We've 6 identified -- you know, we're fortunate to have 7 Paul's expertise. Paul was able to identify exactly 8 the points that were at issue. We produced them in a 9 letter demand and there was no response at all. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Nothing. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Now the A & F 13 correction report we got from them, what it's going 14 to take to repair, well, it wasn't done properly. 15 The rewiring of Transfer #2, whatever they need to 16 do, can we use -- if they're going to be doing work 17 and they're doing work for us now, can we use that 18 against them, or do we get somebody separate to 19 interpret? 20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. We can use that as the 21 basis of the beginning of the lawsuit. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, that's -- right. 23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We may need a different 24 expert along the way, but that will definitely -they definitely could appear as a witness and we 25

1 could use that as a basis.

2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Because they reviewed
3	everything on Phase I that was done, reviewed it and
4	said, "This is what's wrong, this is what needs to be
5	corrected." So we already had that part of it done,
6	so we take that to start the case and we could move
7	forward with that. Did you hear that, Paul?
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Most of it.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. To just use A & F.
10	Instead of getting somebody, to use that to start the
11	basis of it and see where we go with it.
12	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Makes sense to me.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just so you can prepare that
14	and get together with Joe, and we'll vote to commence
15	action on that on Thursday.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Mayor, at some point,
17	though, after the resolution has been passed, I would
18	like perhaps Joe and maybe Paul put together a short
19	plan of you know, legal plan of action for us to
20	be a little clearer as to and I know Joe threw out
21	a whole bunch of numbers tonight, but I would just
22	like to have something from them just stating that, a
23	couple of scenarios that perhaps we could push the
24	issue and maybe get Genesys to settle this a lot
25	

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, we need to. We need to put 2 together what the projected costs is going to be for 3 the repairs to do everything, and then say, you know, 4 this is what it's going to take to repair and fix it 5 and --6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I'm looking for. Sorry, I'm not talking too clear tonight. 7 That's 8 what I'm looking for. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. They'll start working on 10 numbers and figures and see what we need to do to 11 get -- to make it all right, to finish it off and 12 make it right. 13 Okay. All right. The rest of your report, 14 Joe? 15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. Thank you. The rest 16 of my report is we're working with the -- although, I 17 still have very -- two guick guestions for Executive 18 Session. I'm sorry. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We have court tomorrow and 21 there's two cases I have to handle and input on. 22 We have several Local Laws that I've been 23 working on that are coming now before the Board, and one for public comment, and then there's also the 24 taxi law, taxi stand law. 25

1	We have the we're trying to get the
2	equipment off of the MetroPCS tower, and I just want
3	to remind the Board that had they want to take
4	it they wanted to take it off. We're just trying
5	to work through the process of taking it off. It's
6	still there, right?
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: As far as I know.
8	ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay.
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We haven't issued a
10	permit.
11	ATTORNEY PROKOP: It wasn't taken off today,
12	okay. But it's imminent that will be taken off. We
13	just have to I'm trying to get some money out of
14	them and, you know, a few other things. But the
15	thing is that I just want to point out to the Board
16	that the site will be available. You know, if we
17	have other people talking to us, or whatever, you
18	know, the site will be available, because MetroPCS
19	will be gone.
20	We completed the contractual work for the
21	sidewalk and curb repairs. I worked with the Village
22	on that. There's a number of projects that I'm
23	working on with the Treasurer's Department, which are
24	the Treasurer's Department, you know,
25	quote/unquote, in the Treasurer's Department, because

the end result will be an issuance of a check, but there -- matters which involve legal analysis, and some contractual, some litigation, and I'm working with Robert on several of those now, so we can clear them up. We did spend a good amount of time.

6 It looks -- on SEQRA, again, the SEQRA process 7 before the Board, among the Boards, it looks like 8 there's light now at the end of that tunnel. You 9 know, after two or -- one or two or three months of 10 fairly serious discussion among the Board Chairs 11 about, you know, just -- you know, just reconfirming 12 our compliance with the regulations, it seems to be 13 moving ahead nicely now.

And there was a general agreement on some more detailed work -- detailed language in some of the Board agendas, and additional information that wasn't in the Board agendas previously, just to give -- you know, fill them out more with information to the public, and we're taking care of that.

20 So I think that that's what I wanted to cover. 21 Is there any questions?

Oh, I think that -- I'm sorry. I notice in the
Roberts -- excuse me, Trustee Martilotta, Trustee
Roberts' report, I noticed the things that you're

calling -- referring to as visits with outside
 counsel, I just -- if I can assist you with that at
 all, let me know.

TRUSTEE MA

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Because, like particularly, 6 Lamb and Barnosky, I had occasion to talk to him, to 7 the attorney there about something else, and he -- I 8 just wanted to make sure that you spoke to the right 9 people, because there's a number of attorneys like at 10 a firm like that.

11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. Well, just so you 12 know, when Trustee Roberts was going through the --13 he was going through all the bills for the month, 14 there was a couple of names that popped up that he 15 didn't know. He did a quick Google search and gave 16 them a call to find out who they were.

17

ATTORNEY PROKOP: Right.

18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I mean, that was the 19 question like regarding your bill. Like when we 20 looked at the bill, he ended up showing it to me 21 later, and he says, "Does this make sense to you?" 22 You know, there was one number of 23, another number, 23 a couple of other numbers in there, and I said "I 24 really don't know what it means."

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Right.

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And, you know, thank you 2 for explaining it. But we just wanted to make sure. 3 You know, we wanted to make sure we were reaching out 4 to you about that. And, like I said, when reaching 5 out to the outside counsel, it was literally that, 6 the bills came in and we just didn't know who it was, 7 so we just did a quick Google. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. There's procedure 9 with doing the abstract, okay? And I'm assuming that 10 perhaps Trustee Roberts isn't aware of the fact that 11 he can go easily back to the Village Clerk and the 12 Village Treasurer to find out the explanation as to what those bills were. 13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I don't want to speak for 15 Trustee Roberts in that regard. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, your name is on 17 the --18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It is. No, absolutely, 19 and I explained as much. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And there is a process with 21 the abstract, okay? So that is one of my concerns. 22 And the other concern is that the Mayor is the 23 one who needs to give us guidance as to when we can call legal counsel or not, because we could have 24 extra charges added beyond their retainage. 25

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I'm just not sure if 3 that's how you want to proceed. I know that's how 4 the previous Mayor proceeded. But if we were to 5 contact anything that was not within our, you know, 6 outside counsel, within our own Village Attorney, we 7 kind of had to reach out to the Mayor to see if it 8 was within our --MAYOR HUBBARD: 9 That is correct. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 10 Okay. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: A memo was sent out to that. I 12 need to reaffirm that again --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 13 Okav. MAYOR HUBBARD: -- of where we were with the 14 15 procedure, but I will speak to Trustee Roberts about 16 that. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. As I said, the 18 abstract is one -- he has the availability of finding 19 out exactly what is entailed with a name if it's not familiar to him --20 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- by going back to the 23 Village Clerk and the Village Treasurer. And then if 24 he doesn't feel satisfied with that answer, then he can always go to the Mayor. And I think that has 25

1 always been the process, and that's -- as I say, he's 2 not here tonight, or I would reiterate it again. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Mostly, I hear questions to the 4 Treasurer. I answered most of the questions. 5 Between the Treasurer and the Clerk, they answered 6 They had 14 questions and they were most of them. all answered, I believe. 7 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Just a clarification, Joe. 0n 11 the Global Common Option Agreement, the way I read 12 this is that Mr. Foxen's RFP was rejected and he's 13 not going to be getting the contract to do that, 14 correct? 15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. He was told that it was 16 -- I mean, rejection is, you know, a formal action. 17 He was told basically that the plan that he was 18 proposing would not qualify. So it wasn't that it 19 was not -- it wasn't accepted for consideration, I 20 would say. 21 TRUSTEE ROBINS: All right. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. It was just they had 23 their pre-conference meetings and everything else 24 before they actually do the RFP. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 25 Right.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: He had that, and they said, 2 right now, he doesn't comply with the RFP, because 3 there's no way to get to the power to the south side, 4 but they could modify the RFP, depending on who else responds to it. But for them to submit their 5 6 proposal to it, they have to put down a quarter of a million dollars to submit it that's nonrefundable. 7 8 And in their pre-conference talks, they said, "Right 9 now, you're not going to be qualified for it," so 10 they're not going to submit their proposal unless it 11 gets modified by PSE&G. 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. So then basically now, 13 we're not going to be involved in the NYSERDA process 14 for the New York prize, then, correct? 15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, that's separate. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's completely different. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: But they were taking care of 18 that for us. I mean, he has no --19 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's completely separate, 20 completely separate things. 21 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's a separate 22 contract with Global Common. 23 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Really? Okay. And they would proceed with that? 24 25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: They are proceeding with

1 that, yes. 2 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okav. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: The NYSERDA thing, that's a 4 completely separate project. They're just moving 5 forward. We're working on Phase II on that. The 6 Village staff gave him a bunch of information. He's 7 putting the package together. That's still moving 8 forward. TRUSTEE ROBINS: 9 Okay. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: The peaker plant was something 11 that was a completely separate thing, same names, but 12 different -- you know, different project. So we are still in contention for the next round of the NYSERDA 13 grant. Hopefully, we'll get the million dollars, and 14 15 we'll see how that goes. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Joe, on the Townsend Manor 17 tax refund, is that the total grievance for the 18 Village, or is that just the total grievance between 19 Southold Town, Suffolk County and us? 20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The grievance for the 21 Village -- it's the Grievance for the Village. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Eighty-two hundred dollars 23 is the whole total for the Village? 24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Including this year is \$8200. Now, I have to go through and make sure. This is a 25

1 process that we go through, these big ones, and just 2 make sure that all the years match up and everything. 3 So I can't affirm -- I can't confirm the amount, but 4 it's going to be that ball park, it's going to be 5 that --6 How many years back did they go MAYOR HUBBARD: 7 that they grieved, do you know? 8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's -- veah. It's like 9 \$1500 a year, so it's five years, probably. 10 And just so everybody -- I'll say this 11 publicly, I'll explain it to the Board and say it 12 publicly. What happens is there's a program which you'll see in your tax bill. If you look at your tax 13 14 bill, you'll see a separate line item in the Town taxes called Real Property Tax, I think it's called. 15 16 And what that is, is that if the Town of -- all the 17 Towns in Suffolk County. If the Town of Southold has 18 to give a refund to Townsend Manor, or Hawkeye, 19 whatever it is, that refund is actually given by Suffolk County, and then Suffolk County charges back 20 21 the residents of the area that were affected by the 22 refund in that tax line, they figure it out. So, in other words, if the Town of Southold has 23 24 to give back Townsend Manor \$60,000, the Town of

25 Southold does not give -- write a check for \$60,000

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out of their budget. What happens is Suffolk County
 gives back the refund and then charges it back to the
 Town of Southold over a number of years, it actually
 finances it, and for the school district and for
 other taxing authorities.

6 And the villages, however, take the brunt of that, okay, because what happens is we are sort of at 7 8 literally the tail at the end, you know, at the end 9 of this, and we -- unless I get right in the 10 conference, which I do for other villages, and make 11 sure it's handled a certain way, we end up basically 12 just having to write a check based on what the Town decides, works out, and that's the situation. 13

14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's a question --15 I've asked this a couple of times dealing with the 16 tax certioraris that come in, and I've noticed them 17 come in, and I've asked this. Is there a way that we 18 can participate with the Town of Southold to 19 protect -- protect the Village a little bit?

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There is a way? Because --ATTORNEY PROKOP: If they let us. If they start to open up and let us do that, yes. So the way we could do it is we could request that there's no reduction in the Village -- I mean, there's

1 certain -- there's other parts of this that could be 2 negotiated other than just give in and give up the 3 money, there's other ways. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because we can't budget for 5 it, we have to -- I mean, we can see what's coming up --6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Correct. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we have no idea of 8 budgeting for this every year, correct? 9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Correct, yes. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And Hawkeye hurt last year. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. MAYOR HUBBARD: Anything else for the Attorney? 13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, sir. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you, Joe. 16 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Thank you. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Reports from Committees: 18 Audit Committee, basically we discussed the 19 yearly bids and everything else. I mentioned that earlier. That was -- we talked about that. 20 We 21 talked about the vouchers, reviewing and everything with Trustee Roberts, but he's not here. So anything 22 else with that I can discuss with him. 23 Code Committee: We went over the short-term 24 The Code Committee recommended that that 25 rental law.

1 comes back to the Village Board. Everybody got a
2 copy of it and looked at that. So we will discuss it
3 this evening, if there's any changes on it, or we
4 could schedule a public hearing and put it out to the
5 public. If anybody from the Board has anything they
6 want to discuss on it, change, talk about it, or we
7 could just recommend to send it to the public.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I know that in all 9 fairness, Trustee Roberts had quite a few comments on 10 it, and I'm just wondering if we should perhaps take a step back and give him an opportunity to present 11 12 comments to us before the next Board meeting. We 13 could put the resolution on and then table it, if 14 that's what you want to do, but in fairness, you 15 know, he should have an opportunity to have the same 16 discussion we're having at the work session. So 17 that's what I'm putting on the table.

18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh. I mean, nothing says 19 it has to go out to the public and schedule a public 20 hearing at this point. You know, we could sit on it 21 for a month, we could discuss it amongst ourselves, 22 or, you know, what's the feeling of the Board? I'm not --23 TRUSTEE ROBINS: 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Do you want to just put a vote on to schedule the public hearing and we could 25

1 discuss it as a Board at that point, so that the 2 public can start discussing it, or do you want to 3 just hold off for a month? 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think it's only fair to 5 hold off a month. I know he did have a lot of stuff 6 he wanted to say about it. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said, you know, in all 8 fairness -- in all fairness, he's not here, so, you 9 know, and I understand his job and we all have that. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think in fairness, we 13 should just give him the opportunity --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think that's the right 14 15 thing to do. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- to have a discussion with us as the Trustees. 17 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. So we will not --19 I mean, we'll just -- we'll hold off on putting 20 out -- scheduling a public hearing, I should say. 21 We'll hold off on that for a month and let the Board 22 discuss it. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's fair. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that's fair. 24 The 25 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right, that's fine.

1 other stuff at the Code Committee was all minor, we 2 really didn't discuss anything else. The short-term 3 rentals were taking up the major part of the 4 discussion. So, hopefully, that's taken care of from them and we'll move on to some of the other topics 5 6 they've had on there. All right. So that's under 7 Report from Committees. 8 Discussion: Did you have something in 9 particular for that, Clerk? We normally don't have 10 that on there. Was that --11 CLERK PIRILLO: No. I'm sorry. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, there was nothing? Okay. 13 I wanted to make sure I wasn't missing something. 14 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All right. Mayor and 16 Board: We'll start with Trustee Phillips. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, there's a couple of 17 things. First of all, I just got an email from 18 19 Patrick Lofthouse, and I'm sure that Doug -- his 20 letter of resignation from the Carousel Committee. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think you need to put that on the agenda. 23 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. We've been expecting that for a while, so it's --25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. I just -- I just got 2 it, to be honest with you. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we might as well take the 5 opportunity to -- yeah, Patrick Lofthouse is --6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Resigned from the Carousel Committee. Okay. 7 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have a couple of things, 9 most of what I've discussed. But I would ask that --10 and I know we've discussed it, but is it possible, 11 and I don't think we need a Board resolution. but 12 could we on the front door get a push-bar? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that when we have 14 15 meetings that go late upstairs, the staff is not 16 having to wait for us to unlock the locked door. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. 17 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I also would like to see it 19 on the back door coming in. I would like to see that 20 that's a push-bar. And I don't know, is there a 21 push-bar? 22 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I think the back one is. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: The back door is a push-bar. 25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: The back, yeah.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is the back door? 2 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. And 4 upstairs, I've noticed the emergency door that's -the jalousie window that's going -- the door that's 5 6 going out, could we somehow change that configuration? Because I know that you can't enter 7 8 and it pushes out, but the jalousie window, I mean, 9 there's a lot of cold air that comes floating 10 through, and it's easy to break that to get into, to 11 be honest with you. So I'd like to see that changed, 12 if possible. 13 And the other thing is I spoke to Robert, and I'm not sure if it's possible, but on the camera in the back door, where the emergency ramp -- I mean, where the handicapped ramp is, some of the cameras will or have a program where it -- or a sensor that if somebody's coming up the handicapped ramp and

14 15 16 17 18 19 there is nobody in the back, it will shoot up on the 20 computers to those who are monitoring it to make 21 people aware there's somebody that's handicapped at 22 the back door. Because I know plenty of times 23 there's not been people back there, and I think that 24 just would be a positive ADA situation. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: 25 Sure.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it makes me 2 uncomfortable that somebody is making the effort to 3 get up to use the handicapped ramp and then can't get 4 in the door. 5 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The FOIL, that's the biggest 7 thing, is that's been bothering me. And that's 8 pretty much it. 9 I'm sorry. My mind's been a little confusing, 10 given some family circumstances, so I'll be up to 11 snuff next month. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, fine. Thank you. Trustee Robins. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. The first thing I have is electric report. I did a site visit over at the 15 16 plant on September 22nd with Doug Jacobs. We did an 17 exterior inspection of the facility, with attention 18 paid to a number of infrastructure projects that are 19 in the works. I checked out the new tank for the force main 20 21 that will remove the water and oily fluids that 22 collect in the electric plant and pump it to the 23 sewer plant. He pointed out the location, which is a 24 preexisting concrete pit near the entrance that is well suited for the containment of the tank and pump. 25

Work Session 10/15/15

1 There's considerable amount of concrete flat 2 work that needs to be done, with some surfaces in 3 very poor condition. We're currently receiving bids 4 for the work.

5 Doug showed me the area where the new fuel 6 tanks for our fleet of Village vehicles will be 7 located. The site is on the east side on a 8 preexisting slab. The fueling area is defined by a 9 series of concrete-filled steel posts. Power feeds 10 will run underground to provide electric to the pumps 11 and to service the computerized monitoring system.

Bid specifications are in the works for a smoke and fire alarm system, as Paul mentioned, for the plant and the outbuildings, and for the replacement of the south entry gate.

Doug and I looked at a crack in a section of brick wall on the east side, which needs attention, as well as other areas of brick that need to be repointed.

The Bilco door on the north side should be replaced and properly flashed, as this is an area where water is entering the basement.

Inside the plant, Doug pointed out a number of
improvements that were done inhouse, including new
jacket water expansion tanks that provide cooling

1 water for the generators when they're running, as 2 well as new wiring and circuitry to heat the oil and 3 pump it to the generators to keep them warm. 4 So Doug was very helpful in walking me through. 5 We went over those things, took a bunch of pictures. 6 I'd be happy to share them with the members of the 7 Board, if they'd like to see them. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia, I just have one 9 question. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sure. 11 Because I know, Mayor, we TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 12 discussed this at Audit Committee, and maybe Robert and Paul. Have they decided on this computerized 13 14 monitoring system, how they're going to deal with it 15 at the light plant between the Fire Department and 16 the employees? 17 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We haven't finalized 18 that. I need to -- I've reviewed all the 19 documentation. It's not abundantly clear in the 20 documentation as to what options are available. It 21 appears that there are multiple options, and I 22 believe it can be programmed to function in a variety 23 of ways. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So I think from card 25

1 readers to key fobs to any number of, you know, 2 iterations of that. So I think it's an extremely 3 flexible system. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So what we discussed 5 at Audit Committee was that the Fire Department has a 6 different need than the employees have, so we'll be able to accommodate --7 8 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I believe so. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You think so? Okay. 10 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I mean, that's the way 11 it reads in the documentation that I reviewed. Ι 12 just need to confirm that with the vendor. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. So then that fueling 15 system is not just for the employees and fleet 16 vehicles, and it's also for the Fire Department, as well as the dual use? 17 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, any Village vehicle. 19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Any Village vehicle. MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 20 21 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I went to a BID meeting today 22 and we -- I'm going to give you their reports from the minutes, basically, of what was discussed. 23 24 They've created a drop-box account to place their minutes now. The Treasurer's report has asked 25

that they prepare five years of quarterly bank
 statements, because they have a consultant coming at
 the end of the month and he requested to, you know,
 have an overview of the expenses for the BID on a
 five-year basis.

6 Discussed PR and advertising. Katharine Schroeder, who does the website work for the BID, 7 8 reported on her work with Taste North Fork, the 9 upcoming Shellabration event, and a Constant Contact 10 account. They feel they need to create a more 11 engaging and informative platform to encourage 12 communication between BID members and businesses in 13 the Village.

And events report, they discussed the creation of a master calendar with a list of their events throughout the year that can be amended as new events are created. There's continued emphasis on late fall and early winter season and shoulder season events. That's a big focus of theirs, is to expand the season as much as possible.

21 Committee Reports: They discussed the idea of 22 creating seasonal committees for fall, spring, summer 23 and winter that will have two members from the BID 24 and two members from the community at large for 25 members who can't commit to serve full-time, that,

1 you know, they would encourage them to maybe work on 2 a committee for the spring and fall instead of when 3 their businesses are really busy in the summer. 4 Existing committees: Committee members from 5 the Web, Social Media, PR, Marketing Events, Code, 6 Trustee, Museum and Historical Committees would work 7 along with the seasonal committees to help shape and 8 direct their work. 9 Members decided they will not pledge any funds 10 to the East End Seaport Museum until they receive 11 financial reports. As of today at the meeting, I was forwarded financials for 2013 and '14 via email, so 12 13 the members can view that. 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry. For the East End 15 Seaport? 16 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Seaport Museum. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, how about they send it 18 to us, because according to their management 19 agreement, we're supposed to be receiving those 20 financials as well. 21 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And they will be coming. 22 We're sitting down to discuss their lease, you know. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, I'd be happy to forward the email that I received today. 25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, it would be nice if 2 they forwarded it to us as a Board, to be honest with 3 you. I mean, it's great, I'm glad you got it and I'm 4 glad the BID got it, but, I mean, it would be nice if 5 they gave it to us as a Board, to the Mayor. Sorry, 6 I just, you know, have to say it.

7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: There was a -- Kim Barbour, 8 who was from Cornell Cooperative Extension, will 9 be -- she'll be or working with the -- Kim -- okay. 10 Kim Barbour from Cornell Cooperative Extension is the 11 organization that will benefit from the sale of 12 bracelets to the Shellabration event that's taking She's going to be working to assist with 13 place. 14 promotion of the event, that she was looking for 15 funds from the BID in the amount of \$2,000, which was 16 approved.

17 On Wednesday, October 28th, Marco LiMandri, a 18 BID specialist from New City America, will be here 19 for a day of meetings with the BID. It will be 20 taking place at the schoolhouse. Mr. LiMandri was 21 retained by the BID to offer his expertise in the 22 area of Business Improvement Districts. He's been involved in the creation of 28 such districts. 23 The meeting will be attended by BID members, as well as 24 Tom Scalia, President of the North Fork Chamber of 25

Commerce. I plan on attending the meeting, and I
 will report to the Board at our November work
 session.

4 I did a report on my visit to Albany and I 5 don't have it with me right now. I did make copies of a -- just an overview, kind of a simplified 6 7 definition of the New York State Energy Initiative 8 that's known as the REV. Reforming the Energy Vision. 9 REV is a strategy built -- to build clean, resilient 10 and affordable energy systems for all New Yorkers. 11 REV centers on three strategic pillars. The Public 12 Service Commission's Reforming the Energy Vision Regulatory Docket, NYSERDA's Clean Energy Fund, which 13 includes the New York Green Bank and New York Sun, 14 solar energy, and NYPA is leading by example with 15 16 investments in innovative solutions.

17 REV's objectives include enhancing customer 18 knowledge and tools that support effective management 19 of their bills. So it's supposed to increase the 20 knowledge and availability of consumers to know -- to 21 shop for energy costs and to try and control their 22 energy costs beyond the current system.

Market animation and leverage of tax -- of
ratepayer contributions, system-wide efficiency, fuel
and resource diversity. This would include the

1 incorporation of renewables. That's part of the 2 NYSERDA program that we're familiar with here in the 3 Village. System reliability and resiliency, which 4 also relates back to basically transmission of 5 current power line. 6 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And distribution. 7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And the distribution of power, 8 and reduction of carbon emissions. 9 So this is a -- even though this is a New York 10 State energy initiative, this is part of a greater 11 Federal energy initiative on the part of the Federal 12 Energy Commission. A little -- there's also a little schematic 13 14 here, a little diagram of how they envision the 15 distribution of energy via the system, where the old 16 network basically used centralized power, and the new 17 network would incorporate centralized power, as well 18 as all these other possible renewable sources like 19 solar, wind, eventually, hopefully, battery, and 20 hydropower, things like that. 21 So I did make copies of this for everybody on 22 the Board. I do have a few extras, if anybody from 23 the audience would like to see them. 24 And the meeting up in Albany was very informative and engaging, to say the least; a lot of 25

1 bright speakers, and enjoyed it very much. I do have 2 a written report, which I will email to the rest of the Board on that as well, okay? 3 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. 5 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you very much. 6 Trustee Martilotta. MAYOR HUBBARD: 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. We came up with a 8 few resolutions. The first one we'd like to suggest 9 is permitting the second annual Greenport Turkey Trot 10 to begin in Mitchell Park, like we spoke to before, 11 on the 26th, 7:30 a.m., 5K race through town; 12 requires no road closures. My apologies. When I typed this up, I did 13 write a Mass Assembly Permit, and I apologize. We 14 15 don't -- people organizing this, Liz Smith and Noah 16 Thomas, they will not need a Mass Assembly Permit. 17 We really -- what we're actually looking for is just, 18 again, like tacit approval from the Board. We'd like 19 to get 30, 40 people in there in the morning, start 20 there and run through town. It's a fundraiser for 21 CAST. It did well last year. Again, something local 22 for the people in town, by the people in town, and, 23 you know, for very little effort on our end. I think 24 we could support something really nice for families to do on Thanksgiving morning. So that was our first 25

1 one. 2 And, again, I apologize. When I typed it up, I put in Mass Assembly Permit and that was --3 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's fine. 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- ridiculous. Μv 6 apologies. 7 All right. The second one: So this summer, 8 myself, Trustee Roberts, and I'm sure other people 9 from the Board as well, I know Mayor Hubbard spoke to 10 it, there was a lot of times on the corner over there 11 on Third Street and Wiggins on the way to the ferry, 12 there seemed to be problems with cars backing up, people coming down Third Street to try to cut into 13 14 the ferry line. I know at one point a school bus was 15 stuck there, I believe, for an extended period of 16 time. 17 We thought that maybe this would be the time to 18 start talking about it. We spoke, like I said, to a 19 lot of people in town. Spoke to Chief Flatley, who 20 also mentioned he thought that we should change the 21 traffic pattern. I'm not sure exactly how we would 22 go about it, but we were looking at possibly, at 23 least during the summer months, changing the traffic pattern to make it one way up Third Street. 24 I don't know if it -- exactly how one would go about it, or 25

1 if we would just open it up to the public, like get 2 public comment on it. But now that the time has 3 passed, you know, we didn't want to lose focus on 4 this just because the lines aren't so long down at 5 the end of Third Street. MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the past two weeks, it's 6 7 been around -- I have to go to Fourth Street and get 8 on line. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: And I --10 MAYOR HUBBARD: So it doesn't end at Labor Day. 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure, sure. No. And I --12 we walk the kids down there all the time as well. 13 But we were looking to see if there was something 14 that we could do. And when we spoke to Chief 15 Flatley, one of the things that he recommended was if 16 we could make Third Street one way up to the traffic 17 light. He said even if it was seasonally, it would 18 probably help. It would also help in the case of 19 emergency vehicles, which is something he had 20 mentioned as well. We though it was a fairly 21 compelling argument. We thought that that might be 22 enough to bring it up, have some sort of public 23 discussion on it to see if there was something that 24 the public would like to do to change that traffic pattern to avoid that backup between Third Street and 25

1 Wiggins. I was wondering what you guys thought. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I mean, I saw the map 3 that you had about going through that parking lot, 4 and I don't believe you're going to be able to fit a 5 tractor trailer to go through that, and you're 6 actually going to move the traffic farther up Front 7 Street. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Up Wiggins Street, excuse me, 10 because you're going to do away with about 15 cars 11 that would be in the line now that won't be able to 12 get in there. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. All right, that's fair. 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: So, you know, going down to the 15 corner and around the loop. And if you watch a truck 16 that tries to get in there to try to go through that 17 area, it's as narrow as it is down here, but you'll 18 be trying -- you're going to be going in the other 19 lane where there's through traffic to try to get 20 through. 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: It's fair, I hadn't 22 thought of that. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Do you think there's 24 anything else we could do? 25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The other point -- the other 2 point, because I've done a fair amount of research on 3 this, and I was hoping to get to the Southold Town 4 Traffic Committee meeting, but I didn't get the date 5 from anybody, and I don't know if anybody attended, 6 but the North Ferry wants to do something as well. 7 And I know that there's been several reach-outs, not 8 only to you, Mayor, but to myself, from Bridg to talk about the situation down there. And part of the 9 10 problem is, is that we have a State road, we have a County road, we have all kinds of roads down there, 11 12 that it's just a coordinated review, not just us stating that we can make it one way. 13 I mean. 14 that's -- you know, so that's -- I would -- you know, 15 as I said, I've been discussing it. I know I have a 16 couple of calls into the Department of 17 Transportation, trying to find out exactly what their 18 procedure is. A stop light is in their control, not 19 our control, so that's another issue. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And, in all honesty, at one 22 point, there was, and this is just a side topic, but 23 in looking at the whole picture of that area, there

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was an application and I believe it was withdrawn.

And, Paul, correct me or not, on the corner piece of

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1 Third and Main, at one point, there was an 2 application for the empty lot that was there. 3 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. That was 4 withdrawn. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think that's going to 6 enter into another traffic situation there, if something does develop with the empty lot that's 7 8 there. 9 But I think -- I understand wanting to get more information --10 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- but I think we, as 13 Trustees, need to do some more homework to find out 14 what's actually entailed in it. As I said, I've had several calls to Senator LaValle's Office, and I did 15 16 ask Al Krupski a couple of times. So I just haven't 17 gotten any answers back from him, because I'm sure 18 it's election time. That's not something that's 19 forthcoming in their mind at the moment, so. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So, if we look at it, just 21 so maybe this can help me as I go forward, so Third Street itself, is that what you were saying is a 22 23 County road? TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's --24 MR. SWISKEY: No, it's a Village road. 25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's a Village road. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's just a Village road. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Village road, but the 114 --4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Wiggins Street is considered 5 part of 114 through the State. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: But it's still a Village road, 8 but that's --9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But Route 25, where the stop 10 light is, is controlled by the State. 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. Yeah, up at Third 12 Street, absolutely. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Up at the top of Third, you 13 14 know, on Main -- on Front Street. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ves, ves. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? So I think that, you 17 know, as I said, it was one of the things that I 18 wanted to talk to. As you and I start a conversation 19 with Southold Town. I think it would be beneficial if 20 we started that way first and found out what we're 21 really dealing with. I don't want to get people's 22 hopes up and saying we're going do something when we 23 can't, is my concern. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, I don't want -- oh, 24 absolutely, absolutely not. But what I was hoping 25

1 with this, and I'm actually glad we're talking about 2 it, because this will help when I try and, you know, 3 call random people up over the next few weeks. You 4 know, what I was trying to figure out is what is the 5 best way -- what would be the best way to address it, 6 you know what I mean? So as -- when I call up, let's 7 say I call up Senator LaValle, or whomever, what I'm 8 trying to come up with is some sort of a plan to 9 present them with, because that seems to be what I've 10 had the most --11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, here's the thing, 12 Now, you know, I'm calling him, George is Jack. calling him, you're now calling him. We'll need to 13 14 have a coordinated effort. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, no, absolutely, 16 absolutely. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay? And it needs to go 18 through him. You know, we could do all the 19 information finding, but --TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No that's what I'm 20 21 speaking to, but would --22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Can I make a suggestion? 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Please. 24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So since this involves a 25

1 couple of different -- I think the impact of this 2 affects a couple of different municipalities -- you 3 know, levels of government, not just municipalities. 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: And also the North Ferry. 6 One of the things that I think you might consider 7 doing is having --8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: A meeting. 9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Right. Have like a hybrid 10 IMA, you know, with us, the Town and the North Ferry, 11 and then split the cost of a -- or even have the 12 North Ferry pay for it, because it's their traffic, a lot of it is their traffic to begin with; of an 13 14 inexpensive consultant to just come down and look at 15 this, because this is a -- there's people that do 16 this professionally. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: They can look at this in a 19 minute and figure this out. You know, we could be 20 looking at this and say, well, traffic this way, 21 traffic that way. I drive through to work through 22 there, George does, too, and I know, from my own 23 standpoint, what the problem is, but I would never know how to fix it. 24 25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav.

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: And there are -- I think when 2 Third Street was going to be developed many years 3 ago, a company called Schneider Engineering came 4 in --5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, they did. 6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- and looked at it. Т mentioned that I think he called Steve Schneider to 7 8 talk to Paul, because I recommended that, but -- so 9 they're around, there's other people around. I just 10 know that they're inexpensive. I don't know if 11 there's somebody you consider. I'm not -- there's no 12 reason why I mentioned that other one, just to throw 13 out a name. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: But if we could -- if we get 16 an agreement as to how it could be paid for, and then 17 get a -- you know, just the beginning of an 18 inexpensive -- somebody coming down -- George knows 19 what the days are that there's problems. The Mayor 20 could say, you know, come down on, you know, 21 whatever, one of the days that he's identified and 22 take a look. And I'm sure the way they visualize 23 these things, they'll be able to in a second say this is --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well that's --24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 25 Right.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the signage needs to be 2 improved in some spots. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. There should be a 4 folder, because Dave Nyce, myself, with Bridg Hunt 5 and Julie Ben-Susan, went to the Southold Town 6 Transportation Commission. We had several meetings with them, they came up with a proposal. The 7 8 proposal was not doable to everybody the way it was 9 proposed at that time. 10 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: There was a lot of kickback on 12 it and everything else and that's where it ended. So 13 you really should look --14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- at the paperwork from that, 17 because they had it coming in at that point, coming 18 here along the train tracks, and coming in and doing 19 away with the whole loop. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: And making Wiggins Street 22 back into a two-way street. All right. That didn't 23 go anywhere, because there was a lot of opposition to 24 doing it that way and it ended. Another proposal that just came up recently to 25

1 me was when you're going down Third Street, put the 2 stop sign on Third Street at the corner of Wiggins. 3 So people coming down the road have to stop, and the 4 ferry line has access to go through, because that's 5 where those people are cutting in and they go right 6 across the road, they're at a stop sign. If they're 7 not stopping at the stop sign, they get a ticket. 8 And so if 20 cars are stopped there, each one of them 9 has to stop, and then they can't get into the line, 10 they can't cut through. All right? 11 That was something that just came up to me with

12 somebody that was standing there waiting for a bus, 13 actually a City Fireman who does crowd control in the 14 City. And he's standing there and saying, "You know, 15 if those people had to stop there and these people 16 had access to go through, there's no way for them to 17 cut in. It's just it's an option --

18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's a great idea. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- to look at it. And so, you 20 know, you put a white line right across with a big 21 red stop sign, boom, you have to stop there. You 22 can't just drive right down thinking you have the 23 right of way. 24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's a relatively

24 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's a relatively25 inexpensive way.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's very inexpensive. We 2 could try that for a season and see if that works. 3 It was just an option that was thrown out. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're talking about 5 stopping at the end of Third Street, correct? 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. Right at the corner house 7 where Larry Rhodes (phonetic) lived, you'd have a 8 stop sign right there. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, right. Well, you know -- okay. But we also would have to 10 11 coordinate with the stop light, because that -- you 12 know, you're going to start backing stuff up a little But, anyway, it's something to discuss. 13 bit. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, this morning, they went 15 all the way back to the stop light today, yesterday 16 and today. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, no, it's going to be 17 18 that way for a long time. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. The south side is such a 20 nightmare, they're coming this way to get across, and 21 that's what it is. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No room. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: So I think that we get some 24 more information, meet with the Southold Town Transportation Commission, get it on their schedule. 25

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sylvia can give you the date 3 for that and find out and let you both know what it 4 is. We'll meet with them again. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, look at their 7 original proposal that came through last time. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll find the folder for 9 that. 10 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: And it has a map and everything 12 that's drawn out there. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I was on the original 14 committee for that years before. I don't remember 15 the date. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: I was looking for something six 17 months ago in my Father's scrapbook from 25 years ago 18 and there was a discussion on North Ferry. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, yeah. Yeah, and there's 20 always --21 MAYOR HUBBARD: And at that point, they were 22 going to take them and go along the train tracks from 23 Sixth Street down, because they had access to the 24 road there and we had the right-of-way. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: And that's 25 years ago and it
2	hasn't been solved yet.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, it hasn't.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: And it's only gotten worse.
5	So, I'm just
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I'm sure it has.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: So I'm just warning you what
8	you're getting into, because it's not going to make
9	everybody happy.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, no, of course not.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: The idea of Third Street being
12	one way, it sounds good, but I'm sure the people in
13	Sterlington Commons and the Blue Canoe, people that
14	have to go around the block to try to get to them,
15	and step to that little alleyway that comes out onto
16	the main road
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They'll just go wild.
19	MAYOR HUBBARD: Front Street, it's going to
20	be a nightmare for those people. You're going to
21	hear a lot of kickback from them.
22	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. I mean, like I
23	said, I was just trying to put some ideas out.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Okay. But that's --the new one with the stop sign is something new that

1 just came up. So meet with Southold Town, and, you 2 know --3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Chief Flatley's on that, along 5 with other people, and see what -- you might come up 6 with something different. 7 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, is Derryl the assignee 8 to the Southold Transportation or are you? 9 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I believe we both are, 10 actually. 11 Okay. Could you perhaps TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 12 maybe ask Derryl when he gets notices to shoot them to Jack and I --13 14 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- so that we can --16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That would be great. 17 Thank you. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Because I missed the 19 last one, because I honestly didn't know what it was. 20 I couldn't figure it out from the Southold Town 21 website, so. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll get it on the agenda, and 23 also invite North Ferry to go along with you, if you 24 want to, or work on it. But they went last time with us. 25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that's what I figured

1 we'd do.

2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. And get on their
3	agenda, so that they know you're coming.
4	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. Cruising
5	along. So, as we've been going with the short-term
6	rental law, one of the things that we keep looking at
7	every month is where are we with the rental permit
8	law, and it's been going on for an extended period of
9	time. And when I wrote this up, again, repeal would
10	not be the right word, but I'd like to review it. I
11	think that there's something that's not working with
12	it. For it to have been on the books for 18 months,
13	two years, somewhere in that range?
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: About two years, I think.
15	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: About two years and we
16	haven't we haven't it. There's
17	MR. SWISKEY: They haven't issued one permit.
18	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well, we haven't. No, we
19	haven't issued permits. So perhaps I like the
20	idea. I think it's great that we're trying to keep
21	tenants safe, I really do, I think that's an
22	outstanding thing. But without issuing the permits,
23	you know, are we accomplishing that task?
24	And, again, I don't want to throw the baby out
25	with the bath water, I think that there are really

1 good things in it. But if we're not able to issue 2 the permits, is it serving its purpose? 3 And I wasn't on -- you know, you guys could 4 speak to it better than me, you were on the Board at the time, but I -- I don't know. To me, that's 5 6 troubling, you know, that we haven't been able to 7 issue any permits. Is it -- is it a staffing 8 problem, or is there something inherently that we 9 could fix with the law to make it more workable? 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. But you and I, with 11 Trustee Roberts, had a discussion after the Code 12 Committee about this, and I asked that we had some information before we go any farther with it. 13 And --14 well, let me just --15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: I got updated information from 17 the Building Department today. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll just -- I'll just read all 20 what they -- what's part of the report, and this says 21 where we're at with the whole thing --22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Please. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- up to date. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? In all, 257, properties 25

1 have been identified as two-family, multi-family, 2 mixed use and apartment units. Within those 3 properties, I've estimated there are 21 properties 4 with approximately 120 residential units. One hundred and one second notices have been sent out in 5 6 Sections 3 to 7. Sections 2 and 3 should be complete 7 this month. I'm not sure which in what sections and 8 how much is in those. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: But that's -- I'm just, you 11 know. There are 46 incomplete applications. All the 12 property owners have been notified what additional 13 paperwork is required. There are 45 complete 14 applications. Scheduling inspections is the next 15 step. Eleven properties have changed hands, and new 16 property owners need to be located and contacted. 17 Nine applications need to be processed. Five 18 applications have been returned as owner-occupied. 19 The largest lack of information is that the number of 20 rental units within the co-ops. I'm assuming she's 21 meaning the condos and stuff. 22 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Condos, correct. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. So that's where we're at

right now. There's 45 applications are back.

25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: She's done -- I was told today 2 she's done two inspections. We've taken in \$400 so 3 far on applications. They're not collecting the 4 money on the other applications until they actually 5 issue the permit. 6 So out of the 257, we've got -- basically 20% have responded back with completed applications that 7 8 she's going to start doing inspections on. 9 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. So do you feel that -- if you feel that it's doing -- if you feel it's 10 11 not necessary, then, you know, again, this is more 12 for discussion than anything else. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. Well, it is. No, I 14 understand that, and that's why, when we talked, I 15 saw it in your report, and I'm like -- you know, I 16 said we could get together and talk about -- get some 17 information before we just go have a public hearing, 18 so we know what we're talking about going to the 19 public. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. Then I'll be honest 20 21 with you, 100%, I came away from that thinking that 22 you wanted me to do this. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: So I must have -- I 24 misheard and I apologize. 25

1	MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I just I wanted to get
2	some information
3	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: of where we actually stand
5	with it.
6	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
7	MAYOR HUBBARD: One thing that Paul informed me
8	of today, Ed took classes last week. Ed is now
9	certified to be able to do these inspections.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: All right.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: So Ed was not able to do that
12	before, because he didn't have the certification. He
13	was at classes last week. He's now certified to do
14	it, so now we have two people that we can schedule to
15	start doing the 45 inspections.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
17	MAYOR HUBBARD: So I think if we go with this
18	right now, try to see what they can complete. We've
19	got 90 applications, 45 are complete, 46 are being
20	adjusted.
21	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: I know this week several people
23	have been in with checks and paperwork to Village
24	Hall. People are stepping up, they're trying to get
25	going on this. So I think before we have the public

1 hearing and discuss doing away with it, let's get the 2 Building Department, with the two of them working on 3 it, tell them we need to get this done as quick as 4 possible, and have a discussion next month with the 5 updated information. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I think that's more than fair. 7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: So at least we have some idea 9 where we stand now. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you. 10 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: And so now we can move forward 12 with it. 13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely. 16 TRUSTEE ROBINS: George. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Go ahead. I'm sorry. 18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's my understanding, isn't 19 the property owner also able to have an inspection done on their own if they prefer by a professional 20 and submit that? 21 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 23 So it's not -- we don't TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. 24 have to be the ones to do the inspection, if they 25 want to do their own.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: If somebody wants to hire their 2 own person, they could hire an engineer, hire a 3 person that's qualified to do it, they can bring 4 their own paperwork in. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: How many were transferred? 6 Did you say there were 11 out of --7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I thought it was 11. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Was there 11 out of the --MAYOR HUBBARD: Eleven properties had changed 9 10 hands, and new property owners need to be located and 11 contacted. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So we have no idea as 13 to what those 11 either --MAYOR HUBBARD: We -- I really -- I didn't --14 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm just --16 MAYOR HUBBARD: I didn't get into specifics on 17 certain properties. I just wanted, in general, where 18 do we stand with this law two years later. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. No, I'm just -- my 20 curiosity, that's all. TRUSTEE ROBINS: Mary Bess, I might be able to 21 22 get you the information about the properties that 23 changed hands and the intended use because of the real estate transfer. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, because that is one of 25

1 the issues that has been raised with the short-term 2 rentals, is some people decided to not do the 3 long-term rentals anymore. They would be making more 4 money with the short-term, and some of those have 5 changed hands. And I'm just curious as to what those 6 11 properties -- because, if they came out of the 7 long-term rental, then that's another indication as 8 to what direction this may be taking, and may not be 9 what we wanted to accomplish out of it either. So that's --10

11 Right. Well, we can get a more MAYOR HUBBARD: 12 in-depth analysis on it. I just wanted to have some general information where we are with this. 13 I'm sure 14 they will contact these 11 people, find out what's 15 going on. Some people I don't believe understood the 16 law, because it says five applications are 17 owner-occupied. If they're owner-occupied, you don't 18 need to do the long-term rental law. That's part of 19 the provision on that, so.

ATTORNEY PROKOP: So some of these still haven't been sent out. Some of the original packets haven't been sent out.

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: I believe everybody has been
24 sent out. We're on second notices.

25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: All the ones that we

1 know of have been sent out. 2 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We're on second notices, 3 okay. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Second notices. 5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I mean, my familiarity with 6 other municipalities that have done this, I mean, 7 this is actually a pretty remarkable return, I mean, 8 pretty strong return -- response. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I mean, 20% on the first round that we've gotten back in completed 10 11 applications. If we get the other, we'll be closer 12 to 50%. The 46 incomplete, if they get their information in, we'll be closer to 50% of --13 14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, we got -- we got 90 15 back, right? It's just the 45? 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we have 91 back. 17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Correct. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Of the possible -- now it's 19 approximate of possible, you know, 257 properties, 20 but we don't know. 21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay. Yeah, I mean, I think that's --22 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. So, I mean, I say we 24 give them another month and have this discussion next month, and let's see -- and push Ed and Eileen to 25

1	start scheduling the inspections. With the two of
2	them, at least they should be able to do a couple
3	each per week. And if the places are good, you know,
4	let's get the information back and get some money in
5	to cover their salary doing it and let's move it
6	forward. Okay?
7	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah. Well, that seems
8	more than fair.
9	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. I just I wanted
10	to have the information, because I didn't know myself
11	where we stood with it.
12	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Absolutely.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: A lot of things are thrown out
14	there, we're here, there, whatever. This is the
15	up-to-date information we for now.
16	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, I appreciate it.
17	Thank you. A couple of things real quick.
18	Last year, one of the things when we had all
19	that snow that continued and seemed to never stop, it
20	started to build up on downtown. And I know that we
21	had spoke to it before, like there had been a
22	discussion, will we remove the snow from the business
23	district. I know that we do when it reaches a
24	certain level. I wanted to start having that
25	discussion now, as we're in October. I mean, I

1 imagine we're probably somewhere between eight and 2 twelve weeks away from snow coming down, and see what 3 our plan was. 4 I really -- one of the things last year, as, 5 you know, somebody who tries to walk their kids, I 6 really had a tough time --7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- going downtown last 9 year, because once the snow built up between the 10 sidewalk and the curb, I guess you'd call it, or 11 sidewalk and the edge of the road down in the 12 business district, you know, it froze and then we weren't able to get rid of it. And I kind of really 13 14 wanted your thoughts on that, like --15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- how we could do that 17 differently so that that doesn't happen. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: The way it used to be in the 19 past, the Village would go down after each storm and 20 clear the sidewalks downtown across by IGA, by the 21 drug store and everything else. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: I talked about this earlier. Ι 24 said we're going to go back to doing that again. We didn't do it last year, we only did it for big 25

1 storms. We're going to do that for each storm. 2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay, perfect. All right. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Downtown, we will take care of 4 That's something -- I had a guick talk with that. 5 Pete Manwaring about it a while ago, but we're going 6 to -- that's going to be our policy, is just to go down there and just do. 7 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. No, that's --9 MAYOR HUBBARD: It used to be done that way, 10 and it takes a little extra overtime sometimes, 11 especially some of the street corners, to go around 12 with the loader. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 13 Sure. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: Every time I knew when they 15 were done plowing, when Bobby Peterson would go by my 16 house with a loader to do the road ends. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, Bobby's no longer here. 19 We haven't had somebody to do that, but when you get 20 a loader going around, they're done plowing and 21 they're pushing back the corners. That's great. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: So --23 MAYOR HUBBARD: So it was a policy change or 24 something that just wasn't done. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. I need a 25

1 clarification, okay? 2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, ma'am. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. We are not going 5 to be taking care of the sidewalks in front of the 6 business owners? MAYOR HUBBARD: 7 We are not. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. We're doing it after 9 they shovel them? 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: They're going to shovel the sidewalks, as they did in the past. 11 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: When the piles all get out to 14 the edge, we're going to go down there with the 15 Bobcat, or whatever --16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- push it in the road and just 18 scoop it up in the truck and take it to Moore's Lane. 19 Instead of waiting for 20 inches, when there's eight 20 inches and the pile is there, before it freezes, 21 we're going to just move it. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Because the way I'm 23 reading this, that that's --MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, that's --24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That wasn't making sense to 25

1 me, so okay. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. No, we're not taking 3 over the shoveling. People are still responsible for it. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: When they clear everything out, 6 they put it out to the edge of the road, we're going 7 to go down there and cart it away. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Which we always did in the past for downtown. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, I know we did it in 12 the past. I know we did, but I'm just --13 MAYOR HUBBARD: They used to do in front of the 14 churches also. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: Each church had it done. Ιf 17 there was any snow, before the weekend, they were 18 done. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Just to double-check. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: And it's just something that a 21 bunch of new guys and different people in the Highway 22 Department, and then they -- some of them weren't 23 here when that was done, and we're going back to the 24 old policy. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have no problem with it. 25

1 I just want to clarify that, because I do not feel 2 that I need to pay for another business. MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 3 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That's great. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: We don't need a resolution on 6 That's just -- it's a procedure to commit the it. manpower to do it. 7 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: And we're making that 10 commitment. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's great. All right. 12 Last one: We've been talking about making a 13 Senior Building Inspector position, which, you know, 14 may well be something we needed, and I know that we 15 were able to find money within the budget. My 16 question was just, and this isn't meant to split 17 hairs, this was a serious question, is to like where 18 in the budget -- what did we have to take from the 19 budget in order to do this? 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: From fund balance. 22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Was something eliminated? 23 Was there extra padding in there to begin with? I 24 mean, I understand it's a municipal budget and that is something that's in there. I was just curious as 25

1 to -- you know, as we get -- as the Treasurer is able 2 to provide it. It's just one of the those things, I 3 would like to know where it came from. I mean, what 4 -- am I making -- am I making sense in saying that? 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, you are. I could tell 6 you, I had a discussion with the Treasurer today. 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right now, we have a consultant 9 that's working with the Building Department, working on plans and stuff like that, projected probably by 10 11 the end of the year, and the salary will probably end 12 up being around \$20,000, what we're paying to the 13 consultant. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: When we have a Senior Building 16 Inspector, we won't need that consultant anymore. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: There's going to be another 19 person that's going to be in charge of doing that. 20 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: So you've got 20,000 there. 22 Fines, applications, other stuff that's going along 23 with stuff that's being billed back to the applicants 24 should be around 20,000. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: 25 Okav.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: The other 20 will come from the 2 taxpayers. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's 60,000 for salary, then 5 should be option, you know, other stuff. But I know 6 you -- there's no way to say that fines and 7 everything else is going to be equal to all that. 8 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. no. no. that's not 9 what I was looking for at all. MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, I know. 10 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I just thought --12 MAYOR HUBBARD: But I know that Trustee Roberts had asked that and he wanted it announced of where 13 14 it's going to come from. Talking with the Treasurer today, that's basically -- Studio A/B now is working 15 16 as Planning Consultant. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: And she's being hired to -- you 19 know, to assist with the department. I would like to 20 see that being done inhouse and not have an outside 21 person coming in and doing it that's billing us 22 hourly. 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. So, yeah. So that 24 was my question. I just --25 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right.

1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I was curious if we had 2 taken it from some account. MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. 3 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: It would basically be coming 6 from fund balance to bill, to pay for it this year. 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: And we would be budgeting it 9 for next year. So when we work on that budget, 10 that's basically what I'd like to do, because, right 11 now, we're allow to bill for the time from the 12 consultant to the applicant on a big project through 13 the Planning Board. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: So that's where that money, 16 some of that money will be coming from. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: You know, originally, 19 Studio A/B, when she was hired, it was going to be 20 revenue neutral. It hasn't turned out that way, 21 because she's working on other agendas, other items 22 that needs to be done and we're paying her to do it. I'd rather have a staff member do it, provide a 23 24 full-time job for somebody else in the Village. 25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Understood. And thank

1 I do appreciate that. It makes a lot -vou. 2 Robert, did that make about --MAYOR HUBBARD: 3 TREASURER BRANDT: Right. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's about what Robert and I 5 talked about today. It's rough. It's something to 6 go with for the budget for next year. 7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. No, no, no. I 8 appreciate that, that's really helpful. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: So it's the three 20s; 20 from 10 the budget, which basically would be a 2% tax increase. But I'm sure we'll try to trim somewhere 11 12 else and not have to do that. But 20,000 will be a 13 2% tax increase. 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: And then fees and penalties 16 would be a third, and not paying an outside 17 consultant would be the other third. 18 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That will save us money. 19 All right, sure. 20 Just so you guys know, I put a bunch of stuff 21 in here. When they thought the hurricane was coming, 22 I was activated for the National Guard, and this 23 is -- I make up something very similar to this for 24 lower Manhattan. I spoke to the Mayor, obviously, and sent everybody an email. That's something that 25

1 I'll look to try and start putting together 2 something, so that we have some sort of packet. Like 3 we had spoke, a lot of it exists in Village Hall. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, it does. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I have just not been able 5 6 to get that, as we're still in football season. But 7 as that winds down, I look forward to trying to put 8 something like that together, so that we can review 9 it as a Board and make sure we're all on the same 10 page. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think, Jack, that the 12 Village Clerk, on a lot of the communication that I've noticed in here, she and I have worked on over 13 14 the years. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I think perhaps it might 17 be a good idea at some point after football season, 18 that you sit down with Sylvia and I, and we will put 19 things out. But I do believe that our emergency 20 preparedness plan has a lot of that information in 21 it, or no, for communication? 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: I don't know how much is 23 actually in writing or where it all is. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. MAYOR HUBBARD: The operation center was moved 25

1 from the power plant. I know you asked to have it at 2 the power plant. It was moved from the power plant and it's located in the front office here now. 3 4 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure, that makes sense. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: At the Firehouse. 6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: At the Firehouse, yeah. In fact, there are three 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: 8 designated phone lines that are in there with phone 9 numbers and everything else. The Clerk has those, that we could forward them, you know. I mean, a lot 10 11 of -- I know you reached out to somebody at the Red 12 I don't know who you were talking to. Cross. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Well. I've reached out to 13 14 the Red Cross. Again, when I get activated, it's one 15 of the things. I help set up the shelters throughout 16 Long Island and New York City. And, also, when I was 17 speaking to them, I said, "So, what are we doing in 18 Greenport?" You know, I'm sitting down with the 19 State, State Office. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: And what did they tell you? 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: They told me that they 22 would get back to me, then there was no hurricane. 23 But I ended up finding out through some paperwork 24 that we had on the shelf. I guess the emergency 25 shelter is the high school.

1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes. 2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: They had the flood zones mapped out. I was just curious about --3 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: -- how in the past has 6 this happened, like how has it gone out, how have they reached out to us? 7 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think Sylvia and I 9 would be able to help you with the last hurricane as 10 to what transpired. 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No, and I appreciate it. 12 I just happened to be sitting in New York City OEM Office and I was like, "You know what, I should send 13 this out." 14 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: I'll give you a brief 16 description of what Red Cross did for us. 17 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: We got the Mayor's van at the 19 time, drove to Southold and got cots and the blankets and stuff and brought it back, because Red Cross said 20 21 "It's too nasty, we're not coming out to the East End." 22 (Laughter) 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sounds about right. MAYOR HUBBARD: And so Southold Town manned 24 the -- Southold Town manned the shelter. 25

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1 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Because at the time, gave us the key to the front door and said, "Hey, you can use 3 4 the school." 5 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: That was during Irene. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. 7 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: We learned from that. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, we did. MAYOR HUBBARD: For Sandy, the stuff is now 10 11 stored at the school. They have 100 cots with 12 blankets and stuff. It's stored there. Command at the time made a space for it in the basement --13 14 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- and it was stored there. 16 He -- we learned for the first time that they need 17 somebody from the school to actually be there, 18 because if we need something from the school, nobody 19 knows where anything is, as outside people that are 20 trying to do it. 21 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: So he had staff on hand 23 throughout Sandy when we had people there. And we 24 actually -- we get activated when Southold Town does. 25 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Through Lloyd Reisenberg. 2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okav. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: We don't open up a shelter 4 ourself, because in the Village -- most people that 5 came to that were from outside the Village. 6 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: That seems fair. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: A few people down Fifth Sixth 8 Street. The evacuations and everything else are done 9 by the Fire Department, because it goes by the fire district line. 10 11 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: All right. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: And all the people down Bay 13 Shore Road, other places like that, people that they 14 were evacuating aren't Village residents. 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay. 16 MAYOR HUBBARD: And for us to try to do that 17 outside, the Fire Department handles all of that, 18 so --19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: No. Which is totally --20 yeah, I wasn't looking for the Village to take on 21 I was just -more. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. But that's what --23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yeah. Because during 24 Hurricane Sandy, we had to evacuate Staten Island, it did not go well, so I was curious. It was just 25

1 more -- just more curiosity than anything else, you 2 know. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Once you get done and we have 4 time, like I said, we'll set up a meeting. We'll meet with the Fire Chief to go over it. I'll show 5 6 you the command center here --7 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Sure. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- what we have, and you can 9 meet with the Clerk, and, yes. Is it all in writing? 10 It probably should all be in writing. It's No. 11 easier to hand it to you and everybody would have it, 12 but that's the basic of what we have. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Too easy. Thank you very 13 14 much. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure. 16 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: I appreciate it. No, I really do. All right. That's it. 17 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 19 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Thank you very much. MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. Thank you. I've 20 21 got a few things. The Tree Committee, all the stuff 22 from the tree on Third Street that came down, the 23 sculptors have made the stuff. They're working on 24 putting together the auction for it. TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, cool. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Jane Ratsey Williams is meeting 2 with Mayor Nyce, who had the contact with all the 3 people that were making the stuff. I believe we have 4 seven pieces to be auctioned off at this time. It 5 may be a few more, but we're going to work on the 6 details to try to get that done. We told them we'd 7 have it hopefully by the end of the year, so look 8 forward to that coming up. We don't know what it's 9 going to be. We're going try to do something with 10 that.

I have paperwork here from the old 33, the old
antique Mack that was rebuilt and everything else.
I'm going do ask for a resolution to be put on for
the agenda. Basically, it's done.

15 The truck was given to the membership of the 16 Fire Department from Jamie Mills, who owned it, he 17 gave it to them. They've refurbished it, rebuilt it, 18 did everything to it. It's immaculate, it looks 19 really great. The trouble is they can't register it, 20 because they got to have 198 people on the 21 registration, because it's given to the membership of 22 the Fire Department, okay? 23 (Laughter)

And they're not a 501(c)(3) corporation, so they can't -- they can't register it. So they could,

you know, drive it in the Village, but they want to
 get a plate on it.

3 So I have a resolution. Bill Price is the 4 attorney working with them. I have a letter from 5 Jamie Mills donating it to the Village with wording 6 that says, "In no event shall the truck be disposed 7 of without unanimous vote of the Fire Wardens and the 8 Captains of each company." And then there's just a 9 resolution stating that the Village accepts the truck 10 from Jamie Mills with those conditions. So we will 11 be voting on that. That way the Village will get a 12 plate for it.

13 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Oh, yeah, sure.
14 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's -- basically, they want
15 to get a license plate for it.

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Okay.

16

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: And that's -- long story short, 18 you know, four years of restoring it, it's all done. 19 But now they tried to get a registration for it and 20 they couldn't. All right? So it took three months 21 to get that, but that's the explanation. When you 22 see it on the agenda, that's what we're doing. 23 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Makes sense. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? I have an agenda -- a resolution here. I'll get my paperwork. We're going 25

to vote on this this evening. This deals with
Adventure Treks, Jeff Goubeaud's contract. The
wording of the contract says that he has to have
written notice that we're not going to renew the
terms as is, which there was consensus at an
Executive Session last month that we were not going
to renew as is.

8

TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: But we can't just do it with a 10 written notice, we have to have a Board resolution. 11 All right. So I'm going to read this now. I'm going 12 to make a resolution.

13 Resolution authorizing nonrenewal of Adventure 14 Treks' contract. Whereas, the Board of Trustees of 15 the Village of Greenport approved an agreement on 16 October 28th, 2013 with Adventure Treks, Ltd., to 17 provide harbor and marina management services to the 18 Village of Greenport;

And whereas, the agreement has a term which is self-renewing on each November 1st, unless either party provides 30-day written notice to the other property that the agreement is not renewed;

And whereas, Adventure Treks, Ltd. and the Village of Greenport mutually agree to extend the date of the Notice of Nonrenewal for 2015 -- for the

1 2015 renewal to October 16th, 2015;

And whereas, the Board of Trustees has reviewed the agreement and its terms and conditions, has determined that it's not in the best interest of the Village to renew the agreement under its current terms and conditions.

7 It is, therefore, resolved that the Board of 8 Trustees hereby determines that the Adventure Treks, 9 Ltd. agreement should not be renewed under its 10 present terms and conditions for the November 1st, 11 2015 renewal, and that the Village Mayor and Village 12 Clerk, with the assistance of the Village Attorney, 13 are hereby authorized and directed to send a letter 14 of nonrenewal to Adventure Treks, Ltd, effective 15 October 15, 2015. I so move.

16

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll second.

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. And just discussion on 18 that and for the public. We hired Margo as our Rec. 19 Director, and she's going to be working on taking 20 over the duties of the Carousel with the staffing and 21 everything else, working with the young children. 22 That's going to be her responsibility.

Jeff was given a raise and put in charge of
that. We're taking that portion back away. We're
not getting rid of Jeff, we're not changing that.

1	We're going to discuss the terms and conditions of
2	what we're going to do it. But part of Margo's
3	salary is coming from the money that we're saving of
4	not having Jeff do that work. So he's going to be
5	doing she's going to be doing the lifeguards,
6	Carousel staffing, working with the kids, and other
7	stuff like that.
8	So that's that's what this is all about,
9	that's what we discussed, and that's what we're going
10	to do. So we're going to renegotiate Jeff's
11	contract. In the future, we just need to do this, so
12	that we're not renewing it automatically.
13	Okay? Everybody comfortable with that?
14	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yup.
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. All in favor?
17	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.
21	Opposed?
22	(No Response)
23	Motion carried four to zero. We already
24	started to talking to Jeff and he knows about that.
25	So he's not being fired, he's not being kicked out

1 the door, we're just not renewing it automatically 2 per the contract. 3 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Yes, sir. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? I'm thinking there was 5 one other thing. Was there one other thing that we had, we talked about? I don't think so. That's all 6 7 I have. Anything else we could talk about --8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I forgot to mention, maybe 9 you'll think about it awhile, if you could give me a 10 second. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 12 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We had -- the Suffolk County 13 Village Officials Association had its training last 14 night, and the semiannual training. There were 15 several people from the Boards there. And I just 16 wanted to thank those people for their -- the Village 17 for supporting the organization by sending those 18 people in, and those people for their time. 19 The next training will be in April. And you 20 don't have to listen -- you can go to it and not 21 There's a lot of other trainers that listen to me. 22 are available. Last night they actually had a good 23 training on Village elections, where somebody came 24 down from NYCOM, spoke on how to run a Village election. But thank you for the support for that 25

1 organization.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Okay. Public to 3 address the Board.

4 MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth Avenue. Ι 5 don't know if I misread, but basically it was Doug, 6 probably wasn't Jack that wrote this, when they were talking about snow removal. 7 I don't know if I 8 misread that he wants to -- if people haven't cleared 9 their sidewalks, meaning residents, within a certain 10 amount of time, that the Village will go and clear 11 the sidewalks? And I hope that's not what's going to 12 go through.

MAYOR HUBBARD: No. That's something they had
in the report. That's not something --

MS. ALLEN: Okay. That's why I'm saying that's something that I'm just hoping doesn't go through. And I commend you for stepping up and going back to the way it was, making sure the Town is clear with the curbs, because last year it was -- I mean, we got hit.

MAYOR HUBBARD: It was an exceptional year.
MS. ALLEN: Yeah.

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: But we need to start it right24 away.

25 MS. ALLEN: Right.

MAYOR HUBBARD: We can't wait until there's a

1

2 foot of ice that's there that's not going to move 3 without destroying something. 4 MS. ALLEN: Absolutely. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: So that's going to be a policy 6 we're just going to put in place and we're going to 7 do it right from the first snowstorm. 8 MS. ALLEN: Yeah, I commend you for doing that. 9 I think that's awesome. 10 The other thing, listening to you guys talking 11 about the ferry situation, what you just did tonight 12 was a no-brainer. But we can factor the two-way. 13 Put the stop sign there, and this way people, they 14 can't just jump it, someone is there. They say, no. 15 Now you can legally go down Wiggins to get into the 16 ferry line or to just move. And this way it gives 17 larger vehicles the right access, a safe access 18 making left-hand turns, you know, be it a big bus, 19 which right now where the cones are, it's very 20 difficult for us making that turn, because they've 21 got them on the double line. So we're in the far 22 left lane trying to swing this big old thing, and if 23 there's cars on the other side, it at times is very 24 hazardous, you know. So if it goes back to the way it was when we 25

1 were kids, Wiggins was a two-way street, I like the 2 idea of the stop sign on Third Street, which 3 literally makes people stop. They're not -- now 4 they're not blocking, you know, Wiggins, and they 5 have to turn right, you know? You can even put on 6 the stop sign, "You cannot enter the ferry from here, 7 must turn right." But what you guys just pulled up 8 tonight is basically, you know, a brainstorm that 9 clicked together that makes it safer for everybody, 10 so thank you. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you. 12 MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street. I 13 didn't hear you say make Wiggins a two-way. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: That was one of the proposals before. 15 16 Because if you don't make it a MR. SALADINO: 17 two-way, where's the car that's stopping for the stop 18 sign on Third Street going to go? You know, it could 19 stop, but now he's got no place to go. 20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, they could just -- they 21 could just go right through the parking lot and go 22 right around like they do now, but yes. MR. SALADINO: You and I know about that. 23 You 24 and I and four other people know about that street. The guy who's got to go --25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: I know that. 2 MR. SALADINO: The guys that go through the 3 ferry line, they don't know about that street. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: John, I completely understand. 5 You put one of the signs that they have in Riverhead, 6 "Do not block intersection," so you just stop at the 7 stop sign, you can't pull across and block them. 8 MR. SALADINO: Right. I had asked this 9 question before and I didn't -- I didn't quite 10 understand the answer. It was why can't we put a --11 what prevents the Village from putting a sign up 12 saying "Ferry Line Starts" wherever you might start it on Sixth Street? I think it says Sixth Street. 13 14 But you said no, you can't, because 25 is a State 15 road and you can't put a sign up. Listen, I've seen 16 40 signs on -- from a soup kitchen, free soup, to, 17 you know, to buy knick-knacks someplace, so there's 18 signs all over 25. Do we honestly believe that 19 somebody from --20 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. 21 MR. SALADINO: -- the DOT is going to come down 22 and tell you to take that sign? 23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: (Nodded ves.) 24 MR. SALADINO: And Joe is shaking his head. I don't believe it. I don't believe it for a second. 25

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1 First of all, unless you tell them, if you're going 2 to tell them that there's an illegal sign. 3 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No. They drive through here 4 all the time. 5 MR. SALADINO: So you put it on Third Street 6 facing -- anyway, I don't really care about that. 7 You guys will square that away. 8 I have a few -- a couple of questions. The 9 Divers Club, I heard the guy from the Divers Club say 10 that they wanted to use the Clark's Beach for five or 11 six days. And my question to him would have been 12 would the public be included in those five or six 13 Could we go there? If they they're there, can davs? 14 we go there, too? If you're going to open the gate 15 for them, are you opening the gate for the public 16 also? Because he also said he was in favor of 17 keeping the restrictions, which kind of meant that 18 they would be allowed. 19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Well, I said at the 20 time, I'd like to make access available to everybody 21 from the Village, because they own that. So if we 22 say it's going to be opened up on May 30th --23 MR. SALADINO: It's everybody? 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: -- it's is going to be open, 25 yes.

1 MR. SALADINO: Okay. You had mentioned a 2 coordinated review. I listened to a great lecture 3 last night. Now I'm like an expert now. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Oh, great. 5 (Laughter) 6 Because I went for an hour, MR. SALADINO: 7 so -- but I would suggest -- I would suggest that 8 when you give the package, you can propose giving 9 packages to the other --10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 11 MR. SALADINO: The Village Board and the other 12 Boards that aren't involved. The Lead Agency, 13 obviously, would have the package. To include the 14 whole package, not just the cover sheet, because 15 there's a whole lot more information in the package 16 than just on the cover. And to make an informed 17 decision -- you mentioned Trinity Church. To make an 18 informed decision about that, there's a lot of stuff 19 in that package that you'd need know, you know, like 20 finances and stuff like that. So to just -- to just 21 give the cover sheet, and then for either the Village 22 -- for the Village Board to figure out what's the 23 next 11 pages, and then form an opinion about it, it 24 just -- it just doesn't make sense to me. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: John, I was talking more 25

1 than just a cover sheet. I was talking actually 2 putting the application in with a description, and 3 that's something that I'd like to work out with the 4 Village Clerk and the Village Attorney. MR. SALADINO: Well, I think that's a grade 5 6 But I kind of heard -- I don't know if it was idea. 7 you, but I kind of heard just the cover sheet. 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. That part was my 9 discussion on it. I didn't want to see where an 10 applicant comes in and we say you have to have 30 11 copies of your whole plan, with blueprints and 12 everything else, because we're doing HPC, Planning, Zoning, and Village Board and the Building 13 14 Department. Right now, we ask for six copies, I believe. You'd be asking -- if we're going to 15 16 include full copies for everybody, it's going to be 17 thirty-something. 18 MR. SALADINO: Well, it usually goes to the 19 Chairman. I mean, you know, one agency is going to 20 be the Lead Agency, and then what is there, the three

others? So it needs three extra packages, and I'm
sure whoever gets it --

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. I'm saying not that each 24 person has to get that, because some of the stuff we 25 get here, you know, you get -- you know, it's 30

pages, and for each member to get a full package with
 blueprints and everything else would be very
 expensive on the applicant.

4 MR. SALADINO: It would be a burden on -- it 5 would be a burden on the applicant.

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: And it would just be going in 7 the garbage can most of the time, so.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And what's been happening, 9 okay, John, just to clarify, is all we've been 10 getting is just the single page of coordinated 11 review, and there's nothing in the Clerk's Office for 12 us, as the Trustees, a folder to go take a look at it. You have to request a building folder, which --13 14 which is fine. We request as Trustees, request by 15 email, they set up a time to sit down and look at the 16 building folder. But I think for ease of us, it 17 would be easier to have that same information, as we 18 do for wetlands permits, actually, in the Clerk's 19 Office for anyone to --

20 MR. SALADINO: I was actually astonished when 21 coordinated review was first -- like you said, it's a 22 new process, and that information wasn't provided. 23 You know, I just didn't understand. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said --

25 MR. SALADINO: How do you make it, how do you

decide? You know, you really don't know what's going
 on.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But we had to, yeah, so.
MR. SALADINO: So the other thing I heard
tonight, that FOIL requests must be -- you have to
FOIL it for all information from Village Hall. And
my question is, is that -- is that a Village rule?
Because it's a Village rule.

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. What I'm talking about, 10 and just to clarify, is the public access 11 applications need to be completed and given to the 12 Village Clerk directly. What's been happening is we have had information where people have come in and 13 sat in front of a staff member and have reviewed 14 15 information, and then the public access document is 16 then given to the Village Clerk to sign without it 17 going -- when she's responsible for it, it needs to 18 start in the Clerk's Office first and then divvied 19 out as to setting up times for building files to be 20 reviewed, other documents that have to be FOILed for.

There are some things that are just normal public documents. What I'm talking about is the process that we set up has had a glitch in it, and there's been some issues that it just needed to be reminded to the staff that there is a procedure

1 within Village Hall that those public access 2 applications need to be completed first and given to 3 the Village Clerk, for her to take her legal 4 responsibilities under the FOIL laws to make sure they're followed within, because she's responsible 5 6 for it. 7 MR. SALADINO: Well, I understand, but, see, 8 that's where I'm getting confused. I understand 9 public access, certain documents you don't have to FOIL for. 10 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Correct. which --12 MR. SALADINO: And -- but then, you say under 13 FOIL Law, we have -- we have the duty. So I would 14 ask the Clerk, through the Board, I'm kind of --I don't -- I don't know that 15 CLERK PIRILLO: 16 you're completely understanding what Trustee Phillips 17 said, and I don't mean that in a --18 MR. SALADINO: I don't. 19 CLERK PIRILLO: I know. Okay. I know, so let 20 It's not -- it's not that she said we're me trv. 21 going expand FOIL to include documents that weren't 22 included before. As a matter of fact, as you know, 23 and I think everyone knows, we're going the opposite 24 way, that more documents are more readily available, okay? So that's not -- that's not what she said. 25

What she's saying is that all FOIL requests are
 supposed to come to me first as the FOIL Officer. So
 if someone places a FOIL request, they should come to
 me first.

5 The process shouldn't be -- she's concerned 6 about process. Trustee Phillips, correct me if I'm 7 wrong.

8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I am worried about the 9 process.

CLERK PIRILLO: She's concerned about the 10 11 process, and she's concerned about people 12 circumventing the process, going to another manager or another staff member, looking at a record, and 13 14 then going backwards and saying, "Oh, let me fill out a FOIL request and have the Clerk sign it." Okay? 15 16 Because that's not fair to the staff member and it's 17 not fair to me, as the FOIL Officer.

18 MR. SALADINO: And I understand that if it's 19 about a FOIL. And I don't want to belabor the point 20 because it's late. I understand that about a FOIL 21 request. I mean, all FOIL requests should be --22 should originate in your office, we all acknowledge that, we all understand that. But there's some 23 24 questions and some stuff you can ask and look at without filing for a --25

1 CLERK PIRILLO: Correct. And no one is 2 suggesting a change in that procedure at all. 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's just reminding --4 CLERK PIRILLO: Trustee Phillips is -- I think 5 the problem came in with the use of the term "FOIL", 6 and also the use of the term "records access". MR. SALADINO: 7 Okay. 8 CLERK PIRILLO: Let's make them the same thing, 9 John, okay? 10 MR. SALADINO: Okay. Thank you. 11 CLERK PIRILLO: You're welcome. 12 MR. SALADINO: I have a crazy guestion. I was 13 going to leave it until last, but there's the public 14 -- you're going to change the code for a taxi stand. You put out an RFP for a taxi stand for space that's 15 16 on First Street? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 18 MR. SALADINO: Was it? Is he paying us or are 19 we paying him? 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Who's paying about what? 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: He's charging his customers. 22 Nobody's -- we're not paying him, he's not paying us. 23 MR. SALADINO: So it's just a question that 24 this guy has the right to put a taxi cab and --25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not just --

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, we're designating one 2 parking spot where a cab could go. 3 MR. SALADINO: Okav. 4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Not a particular cab 5 company, where a cab could go. That's my 6 understanding; am I not correct? MR. SALADINO: 7 Then what was the RFP for? 8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah, it was --9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're sticking to a 10 particular cab company? 11 CLERK PIRILLO: That's what the RFP was. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: That's what the RFP was. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 13 Okay. All right. I --14 okay, never mind. I was under the impression from -okay. I thought -- I asked the guestion. I was told 15 16 it was only for the spot and any cab could go up into 17 it. I guess I misunderstood, sorry. I'm not keen on it. 18 MR. SALADINO: Mary Bess, I understood it. I 19 understood it to be one -- somebody filled out an RFP 20 and that person has the right to use that spot. I 21 have no clue how it's going to work. I mean, how 22 many cabs does this guy even have? You know, there's 23 eight guys waiting there and this guy's got to drive to Cutchogue, you wait 45 minutes. I don't 24 understand. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: It was an attempt to try to 2 make people know that there's a cab available in the 3 Village to give you a ride home if you need it, was 4 the intent of what was being done by it. So we're 5 trying to just assist anybody who might need a ride 6 that there's a spot. If you go there, if the guy's 7 annoyed, by the time he gets back, you have a spot, 8 you can go and try to get a ride home. That was --9 MR. SALADINO: I understand the logic behind it. 10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. 11 MR. SALADINO: I just don't -- I just don't --12 so you put out an RFP for a guy who wants to park his 13 cab at this spot, and one guy showed up. And I know 14 this sounds crazy. What do you say, you know, "Okay, I'll park my car there"? You know, "I'll be the 15 16 cab"? 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 18 MR. SALADINO: Is that it? Okay. If I was 19 there, I'd say that's okay. The short-term rental, you said you were going 20 21 to postpone a public hearing because Doug is not here 22 tonight. In engineering, they call it analysis by 23 paralysis, by analysis. I mean, he's been in on the It's been in the Code Committee since 24 talks. 25 Broadway was a prairie.

1

(Laughter)

You put it out. And the way you people should 2 3 get information is from the public. I mean, I keep 4 reminding you that it's a republic here, and there's 5 no direct vote, but you kind of vote the way the 6 people want, you know. So put it out to the public. 7 Have a public hearing or two public hearings, and 8 then when Doug shows up from wherever he's at 9 tonight, you'll have the input from the public, and 10 then you -- you can discuss it among the Board and 11 come up with a viable solution. But to postpone it 12 again, the public hearing, to postpone it again because one member is not here, he's probably fully 13 14 versed on it. I mean, it seems that Doug has a lot of -- I don't hear a lot of it being discussed, 15 16 because maybe I don't hang out at the places where 17 they're talking about it. But, yeah, they don't talk 18 about it a lot at the Rhumb Line, you know. 19 (Laughter) 20 So -- but my suggestion would just be put --21 have the public hearing, let the people -- and use 22 the information that the people get you and then vote 23 your conscience the way -- whatever you think is 24 But to postpone it again is just -- it's riaht. counterproductive. 25

1 The ferry line, we talked about the stop sign. 2 I'm uncomfortable about talking to you guys 3 about this last thing. I have never once come up 4 here and advocated for myself or for a family member, 5 but tonight I have to. It's about the Maritime 6 Festival. 7 A family member, my wife took a booth at the 8 Maritime Festival. She purposely restricted the area to provide a little more room in front of the booth, 9 10 and she had a few kids wear maritime costumes and do a little dance every 45 minutes. 11 12 She was approached by a member of the BID or 13 the Seaport Museum. I have the name. I'm kind of 14 a -- I would give it to you later, if you want. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 16 MR. SALADINO: But if you want me to say it 17 publicly, I'll say it publicly. The woman approached 18 and told her, "Listen, you have to stop that." And, 19 obviously, she asked why. She said, "Well, you're creating a liability for the Village." I really 20 21 didn't understand, yeah. You got a street full of 22 people with beer, and baby carriages, and dogs, and 23 bicycles, and you have five preteens doing a little 24 tap dance. And in all fairness to Lucy, my wife, she had 25

1 set her booth back an extra two or three feet. She 2 bought a smaller canopy just so she could set it back 3 two or three feet. She was allocated 10 feet into 4 the street, she only had seven, so -- and the kids 5 danced there. I have a problem with that. 6 First of all, you know, what authority does the 7 BID have to enforce Village Code, or a volunteer from 8 the Seaport Museum? So I would ask the Liaison to 9 the BID, perhaps you could ask that. I really --10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: The only thing --11 MR. SALADINO: I'm glad that I wasn't there, 12 because normally I don't lose my temper, but in this particular case, I would have lost my temper. 13 14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: This seems -- this seems 15 totally out of line for me, too, John, before I say 16 anything else. 17 I will mention that there was discussion about 18 the BID's insurance policy at the meeting today. 19 There was a question. A couple of people who were 20 involved with what was done for many years, the kayak 21 race, asked me why there was a reason why they may 22 not be allowed to do the kayak race this year. So I 23 looked into it a little bit. I contacted some people 24 from the East End Seaport Museum to try and find out what was going on, and I was told that there was an 25

insurance issue. I really didn't find that out until
 today, by the way, or yesterday. I think Linda
 Kessler was speaking to me.

And, apparently, somebody -- some new members on the Board of the Museum took a look at the current insurance policy and it was discovered that they are seriously underinsured, okay? So that was the reason why they, in fact, didn't do the race. And they are in the process of having their insurance policy reviewed right now, okay?

11 So that being said, I totally disagree with 12 what was done to you. And I don't know who spoke up 13 and said that was the case, but there was some issue 14 going on there amongst the Board members about their 15 insurance right now. So maybe that was the genesis 16 of that comment.

MR. SALADINO: Well, a kayak race in an open
harbor with boat traffic, even at glass beach
(phonetic) where it's protected, that's not a
perceived danger, that's not a perceived liability.
That's an actual danger, because, you know, when you
have plastic boats and stuff, I mean, stuff happens.

Five preteens doing a tap dance on Main Street, you know, for a minute-and-a-half tap dance every 45 minutes, that's a perceived liability, that's not a

reality, especially when the streets are packed with
people doing a whole lot more crazier stuff. So for
her to have to stop doing that two hours before the
end of the day, because this -- and actually it was
Linda -- I don't know why I'm withholding her name.
It was Linda Kessler that came and told her.

7 My question to this Board is what's her 8 authority to even say that? What's the BID's 9 authority? What's the Seaport Museum's authority to pretend or to enforce Village law? I mean, their 10 11 insurance company -- their insurance doesn't cover 12 the people in the street. If somebody fell down, would they -- would they make application to the 13 14 Village for damages, or would they make application 15 to the Seaport Museum? So my question is, is, you 16 know --

17MAYOR HUBBARD: They shouldn't have had18authority, John, and we'll check into that.

MR. SALADINO: I kind of think, because she had to stop a couple of hours early, the kids were disappointed. I don't know if the people were disappointed, if they liked it or if they didn't, but the kids were disappointed. You know, she deserves at least -- and again, I'm uncomfortable saying this, because as you all know, I've never ever advocated

1 for myself or a member of my family. No. It's unfortunate that it 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: 3 happened, and we will check into that make sure it 4 doesn't happen again, you know. 5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There were a couple of other 6 things that I was going to bring up to you. 7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That really, because --9 MR. SALADINO: I was just -- you know, if 10 somebody had -- if it was -- if it was a policeman 11 that said it, or if it was a Village official that 12 said it, you know, it's something else. You have the 13 rule of law, you're our representative of the 14 But for the BID to say something like that, Village. 15 for a member of the BID, and worse yet, if she's not 16 a member of the BID and she's just a volunteer at the 17 Seaport Museum, that makes it doubly outrageous. I 18 don't know what position the Village --19 Yeah. TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think the lines are 20 being blurred a little bit here, too, because the BID 21 and the Seaport Museum are two separate entities. She happens to be a member of both, okay, so -- but I 22 23 don't know whether --24 MR. SALADINO: Dual. 25 TRUSTEE ROBINS: What did she say, that she

speaking on behalf of the BID, or as a member of the
 Seaport? Because I think it's the Seaport and their
 insurance, from what I understood today at the
 meeting, that was the concern.

5 MR. SALADINO: Well, like I said, a kayak race 6 should be a concern. You know, a Saran Wrap boat, 7 perhaps they should be concerned. But, again, I 8 mean, you know, if you -- I don't think anybody but a 9 Village official should, or somebody appointed by the 10 Village, represent themselves as being the authority 11 of what goes on on a Village street, you know. So, I 12 mean --

13TRUSTEE ROBINS: I agree with you totally. I'm14just trying to clarify it so I could ask the15appropriate person and what was said, that's all.

16 MR. SALADINO: Well, I think, once you ask and 17 once you speak to Ms. Kessler, and once you ask and 18 you get her side of the story, if it, in fact, 19 reflects what I'm saying here, perhaps they could 20 apologize, at least.

21

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.

MR. SALADINO: If it agrees with what I'm
 saying here. Thank you. Thanks for listening.
 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

25 MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184 Fifth

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1 Street. John brought up something very interesting, 2 one of the questions I was going ask. What's the 3 East End Seaport Museum pay us in rent each year? 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Nothing. They're not paying us 5 anything right now, Bill. 6 MR. SWISKEY: Don't you think it's time we resolve that issue? Because that building can be 7 8 rented like even just seasonally for five grand a 9 month in the summer. That building has the 10 potential. The Village should be getting at least 25 11 to 30 grand rent year round for that building year 12 That's a cheap going rate. round. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aren't we looking into that, 13 14 Joe. 15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We have a lease and we're 16 going through that. 17 Right. You brought it up last MAYOR HUBBARD: 18 month, we discussed it. We got the lease out, we 19 have copies out, and we're just trying to set up a 20 meeting with the people down there. MR. SWISKEY: Well, I think it's time to say, 21 22 "Oh, hey, we want this lease in place by January. Otherwise, take your stuff and get out," because the 23 24 building belongs to the taxpayer, it doesn't belong to the people in that association. 25

1 And, I mean, it's a little bit ridiculous that 2 it's went on this long. What did we put into a roof 3 and other repairs in that building? An enormous 4 amount of money.

5 It's like -- and the festival, in my 6 estimation, people don't even go anymore. It's 7 turned into -- I mean, they were worried about John's 8 wife and a couple of 12-year-olds dancing in the 9 street, you know what I mean, something. We got a 10 truck selling beer in front of Mitchell Park. And 11 who set up that tent in Mitchell Park, was that the 12 Village or the beer seller, the one where the people got their beer from the truck and then drank it? 13 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: That was not the Village, that was done by -- I guess -- I don't know who put that 15 16 tent up, if that was done by Greenport Brewery. 17 CLERK PIRILLO: I don't think it was done by us. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: It was not done by us. I don't 19 know who put it up, Bill. 20 MR. SWISKEY: Julia, was that set up by the 21 East End Seaport Museum? 22 TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm not a member. I don't 23 have any liaison relationship with the East End 24 Seaport Museum.

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MR. SWISKEY: Because I don't think that was

1 I mean, that was like -- you know, it's like riaht. 2 a stick in the eye. We have a policy. And if I sell 3 the beer in the street and you walk into the -- and 4 that beer truck is a hell of a lot more liability 5 than if a kid skins a knee in the street, and we all 6 know that. If somebody gets hurt drinking beer in the street, the Village is really in the dirt. 7 8 And the East End Seaport Museum, I assume to 9 use our street, they have to provide how big of an insurance policy, Mr. Prokop? 10 11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's provided in the -- in 12 the agreement. I'm not sure what it is. MR. SWISKEY: Is it a million dollars? Because 13 14 that would be a small policy. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are you talking about the 16 current contract that we have for the building or for the festival? 17 18 MR. SWISKEY: No, no. When they -- when they 19 use our streets. 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: When they do the festival? 21 MR. SWISKEY: When they do the festival, they 22 should be providing a 10 million dollar policy to the 23 Village. ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's not 10 million. 24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's not 10 million. 25

1 MR. SWISKEY: It's not 10 million? 2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, we'll check on that, 3 we'll find out what it is. 4 MR. SWISKEY: Because that would be -- that 5 would be way underinsured for what I see on these 6 streets. And I think it's time that the Village got more control over it's festival back, and I think 7 8 it's time that we collected the rent on that 9 Enough is enough. I mean, you don't want building. 10 your kids dancing in the street, I got a problem with 11 that. 12 And the next issue is, all right, Jack here 13 suggested making First Street one -- I mean, Third 14 Street one way on, I guess --15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Heading north. 16 MR. SWISKEY: Heading north. That would kill 17 the Sterlington right off the bat, you know that. And there's no way you can make Wiggins Street 18 19 two-way again, because your ferry line comes down 20 from Sixth Street. On Wiggins Street on a busy day, 21 Wiggins Street, between Third -- is full between 22 Third and Fourth Street is full. So there would be 23 no way. If a bus turned up there and ones coming the 24 other way, what's going to happen? It's a bad situation. 25

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And you're going to have to force the ferry company to put somebody down there for the summer months, whether they like it or not.

4 And another thing, and it's been mentioned, the 5 ferry -- it's not a road coming off the ferry, it's a private driveway. There should be a stop sign there. 6 7 In other words, they should get off the ferry, like 8 in New London -- where the Orient for New London 9 ferry. Two cars go off and then there's a stop sign. That way, the traffic coming off of Wiggins and Third 10 11 Street has the right of way. And that ferry traffic 12 only moves when that -- the other traffic's not 13 moving.

I mean, it's time that we stop the bleeding for the ferry. And if it's a little bit inconvenient for them and their passengers, that's too bad.

And I brought this up at two or three meetings now. We actually have a right to collect like a dollar fee for each car that gets on that ferry in Greenport. Is this Board even considering that?

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: We've checked into it, Bill, 22 and we're told it's not legal to do it without making 23 it a special district, and it wasn't worthwhile doing 24 that.

25 MR. SWISKEY: Make it a special district. It

could be \$100,000 a year or more dedicated just to
streets. I mean, I hear it's against the law without
a special district. Can somebody -- how about at the
regular meeting next Thursday somebody bring me the
actual law that says that, because I hear a lot of
things coming out like, "Oh, it's" -- and then the
law is never produced.

8

MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

9 MR. SWISKEY: And when you tell me it's a law, 10 I want to see the law. And if it's not a big process 11 to pass a special district, what does it take, a vote 12 of the Village Board, vote of the County?

13MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm not really sure, Bill.14We'll find out that and I'll get back to you on that.

15 MR. SWISKEY: Well, maybe you should have that 16 information, because somebody -- it could be \$150,000 17 a year that we're just not collecting and we should 18 be collecting. I mean, I'm all for free money and 19 that would be free money.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Bill, it came up during the 21 debates and during the campaign, and the two new 22 Trustees and myself, we all talked about this to try 23 to see if we could do it and we were told it couldn't 24 be done. So we'll get that reason why it can't be 25 done and we'll get that to you in writing.

1 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. because I assume that in 2 other place, I assume if you go through a process, you can do it; am I right, Counsel? 3 4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Where do you think that --5 where do you think there are places that it was done? MR. SWISKEY: Port Jeff had at one time. 6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: 7 Bridgeport had it. What --8 so, first of all, I'm knowledgeable about this. Ι 9 have researched this in the past, and I'm prepared at 10 any time to make a report to the Board, if the Board 11 asked me to do that. 12 I will say this came up once before, and I went 13 to the step -- I personally experienced what happened 14 in Bridgeport, not as an attorney, but trying to get on the line of cars that was created one night. 15 But 16 the -- I spoke to the people in Bridgeport that did 17 this, the corporate counsel at Bridgeport, and she 18 said to me that she would give me all the 19 information, the information that they had from when 20 they did this. They did that and had since taken it awav. And she said to me, "Under no circumstances 21 22 ever do this." And I -- and I waited --MR. SWISKEY: Well, that's Bridgeport. If we 23 24 can do it, let's try. ATTORNEY PROKOP: I'm not -- I didn't act -- I 25

1 didn't act or not act on that recommendation. I'm 2 just passing along that that's what the Counsel said. 3 That's not a -- that had no relevance to any 4 recommendation that I would make to the Board. 5 MR. SWISKEY: But from what I understand, 6 you're telling me they did it, and that for some 7 reason they took it away, but they actually did it, 8 they actually had a fee in place. 9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: There was a time -- if you go 10 to -- if you go to Bridgeport and the booth is still 11 there, it's now used as a security booth, there was a 12 time when the city charged a fee, yes. So then we can do this. MR. SWISKEY: 13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, that's Connecticut. 14 15 MR. SALADINO: If we lived in Connecticut 16 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah. Well, yeah, but we also 17 live in New York. I want to see a statute that says 18 we're prohibited from doing it New York, because I 19 hear a lot of "Oh, it's a law," or it's -- but nobody 20 ever produces the law or the court case. We got the same thing at the ZBA right now. The Chairman asks 21 22 the Lawyer to produce the law, and the law hasn't 23 been produced yet, from what I understand from the 24 Chairman. Let's produce the law and we'll move forward with it. If we have to hire special counsel, 25

1 we hire special counsel. A hundred thousand plus a 2 year is a lot of money not to be collected. And 3 maybe that's my personal opinion, but I'd damn sure 4 look into it deep. 5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okav. 6 MR. SWISKEY: And, if you could, Mr. Prokop, 7 please bring the law, because I'm going to ask about 8 it. You know, I'm like a dog, I'm not going to let 9 go of this bone. You either prove to me that we can't do it, or, I mean, if you don't want to do it, 10 11 then I would urge the Board to hire special counsel. 12 Is that too much to ask for, George? No, we'll get it. We'll get a 13 MAYOR HUBBARD: 14 report for you and we'll discuss it. 15 MR. SWISKEY: Thank you, I appreciate it. 16 Oh, repaying the streets, you're going to do Central Avenue, I hope? 17 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, we are. 19 MR. SWISKEY: I know you have a vested interest 20 there, but it really needs it. You were down it the 21 other day. 22 MAYOR HUBBARD: I'm down there every day, yes. 23 MR. SWISKEY: It's almost as bad as those 24 cross-streets south of the railroad, you know what I 25 mean?

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh. 2 MR. SWISKEY: So, yeah, you got my vote on that 3 one. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 5 MR. SWISKEY: Now, let's see here. Oh, does 6 anybody know how much extra money we made on the East 7 Pier this year from the big boats? Just looking at 8 the monthly incomes every month from the Marina, I'd 9 say we made -- those big boats made us a lot of 10 money. 11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. The actual number I 12 don't know. We could have -- well, the big boats, 13 yes. ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't know. 14 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 16 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I'd have to research --17 MAYOR HUBBARD: All right. 18 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- the difference 19 between --MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll try to get a number for 20 21 you on that. 22 MR. SWISKEY: I would say it added, I don't 23 know. 24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 25 MR. SWISKEY: Could be 70 or \$80,000, which is

a lot of money, because you only paid 300 for the
 lighting.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Exactly.

3

MR. SWISKEY: You're going for pay that off in nothing. You could get to the point if maybe we had a couple of other slips along the other dock, you could actually break even on that every year, and not have to reach into your fund to pay your bonds. But that's worth looking into, but it should have been done a long time ago.

11 Oh, the Clerk spoke about the -- I guess our 12 FOIL laws are getting more liberal, because during 13 the Nyce administration, it was like pulling teeth, 14 I'll tell you that. It was like things that people 15 were entitled to, they were made to wait 28 -- so I 16 hope that's changing, is it? I hope.

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. We're trying to be more 18 open with it and everything else. But what she was 19 talking about, people would come in without the FOIL Officer knowing about it, "Oh, can I get a copy of 20 21 that?" And copies were being made with that, and 22 saying, "Oh, I got a copy of this," and then filling 23 out the paperwork. But if you're going to want a 24 copy of something, you look at it, you want a copy of it, you're supposed do the process the right way. 25

1 That's all we're trying to do. 2 MR. SWISKEY: Yeah, and I could go along with 3 that. 4 Paul, the two generators we're talking about replacing in the Sewer Department, where are they? 5 6 Which -- where are they? ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't remember the 7 8 sites, Bill, I have to look at that. 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Was that replacing, or was that the new ones we talked about? Because we didn't have 10 11 them at pump stations. We were going to take the 12 Peconic Landing money and using --ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct. that's what I 13 14 had quotes on. 15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Is that what you have? 16 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Right. That's putting in ones 18 that we don't have. 19 MR. SWISKEY: That was replacing Sixth Street, 20 basically. 21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes. 22 MR. SWISKEY: But he talked about -- I thought 23 they said replacing. 24 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It may have been misworded, I'll double-check. 25

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: It did say -- it said repair or 2 replace. 3 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: It's supposed to be putting the 5 new ones that we don't have on a couple of the pump 6 stations and using Peconic Landing money to pay for 7 that as a capital repair and do that. 8 MR. SWISKEY: All right. That's -- you know, 9 that makes more sense, because the only real old 10 generator you have is the one at Third Street. 11 That's real old, but it still runs. 12 And wait a minute. Oh, one more thing. We hired outside counsel to represent us for Smoked Fish 13 in the Southold Town Court. What is that outside 14 15 counsel charging us an hour? 16 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I think it's 200 an hour. Т believe it's 200 an hour. And don't know that we 17 18 got -- even gotten a bill from him yet, but I believe 19 it's 200 an hour. MR. SWISKEY: Two hundred an hour. What's the 20 21 total fine that we can get out of this? 22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I don't know. I would have 23 to ask the counsel. 24 MR. SWISKEY: Because this guy, to me, he just got away with everything. I mean, I think the Court 25

1 is just going to toss it out, because the guy is 2 going to say, "Hey, I got all the permits." So he 3 got away with one there. He beat us, basically. He 4 stayed open in violation of our cease and desist 5 order. He just -- he laughed at us. And I find that 6 a little aggravating that he could away with that, 7 that we let him -- that we didn't walk in there with 8 an order and say, "Vacate."

You know, you can pull the CO, you can do a lot
of things. Southold, they do it all the time.
Somebody gets wise with them, suddenly the cops show
up and you got to get out. That kind of thing really
leads to -- it leads to the, you know, people -- the
perception of selective enforcement in this Village.

I mean, it's like -- and after the shipyard thing and a couple of other things, are some of our committees even relevant anymore? In other words, because certain people get to bypass them and certain people don't, and it becomes very selective. And one of them is like the CAC with the shipyard, he just walked -- he just walked all over us, and --

MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, he did, and he admitted he
did, Bill. He said he didn't know. I mean, I -MR. SWISKEY: All right. He didn't know. And
maybe Steve didn't know, but John knew.

1 MAYOR HUBBARD: Well, the owner of the property 2 came in and admitted to us that he did not know he 3 needed the permit, and he was -- he apologized to us. 4 And the work is done, and we were just trying to make 5 the best of a bad situation that he put us in and 6 himself in. But he came here and he admitted to us that he didn't know he needed it. He thought he had 7 8 everything in order, so.

9 MR. SWISKEY: Oh, and there's a couple -- a 10 couple of other issues here. One of them is the 11 power plant. A while ago, Trustee Phillips asked 12 Mr. Pallas to produce a timeline of what went wrong 13 at the power plant, in other words, from day one on 14 the upgrade, the beginning to present. Did we ever 15 get one of those?

ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I haven't done that yet, no. MR. SWISKEY: How long ago did we ask for that? Because if we're going to court, we should have some information readily available.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Bill, I was talking to both Paul and to Robert about that this morning, so, hopefully, we'll have some information. I received some spread sheet information from Robert, and, hopefully, we'll be able to digest that. I understand completely where you are. I was a little

frustrated that it wasn't in process, but it will
 start being done shortly.

MR. SWISKEY: Because this stuff, if you're going to -- you know, this is no longer -- you're going to go to court and you could look very ridiculous if you go very unprepared.

7 And another thing, and I said it at the time, 8 the Board and the Mayor at the time laughed me off, 9 but if you look at the original contract with 10 Genesys, the motion you can get back to the total of 11 the first contract, which is about \$250,000. So, if 12 you're going to run up \$100,000 in legal feeds, you 13 ain't even coming close to making yourself whole. I 14 think -- I hope you realize that. I hope your 15 Attorney is aware of that, because I mentioned it. 16 It's right in the first Genesys contract, and I've 17 never seen a clause in a contract like that before 18 get approved, but it was. And it is there, isn't it, 19 Mary Bess, you've seen it?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, I've seen it, and that's the reason why I have asked for the Village Attorney to give us some type of an outline of where we're at and what's going on.

24 MR. SWISKEY: Because just to rebuild that 25 transformer, to rewind that new -- I guess it's an

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Eaton Transformer, that could go well over \$150,000, because it's got to come out, it's got to be sent away to the factory, it's got to come back. There's a lot wrong there.

5 And here's another thing. You're talking 6 about, all right, you got water in the cellar, you 7 got drain water. You got to clean it up with an oil 8 separator. You still shouldn't be putting it in your 9 sewer, it's against your sewer regulation. There's a 10 huge drain field across the street from the power 11 Remember when we put that in, George, in the plant. 12 late '80s and '90's?

13

MAYOR HUBBARD: Uh-huh.

14 MR. SWISKEY: That's where you should be 15 pumping that cellar water to, not to your sewer 16 plant, because you could overload your sewer plant on 17 any given day. You get a heavy rain and that's when 18 that cellar floods in the light plant, you could pump 19 100,000 gallons of water up there a day. You could overload that plant on a rainy day. That's what the 20 drain field is for. 21

22 So I would urge it to go to the drain field, 23 because that's where it belongs. Because there's 24 about 30, 40 rings under there, if you look at the 25 site plan when the drain field was put in. And the

drains, all you got to do is get it into the drain
 outside the plant and it's gone. It's a little bit
 mystifying.

But, anyway, the light plant is the big concern. You know, we all talk about short-term rentals, and you've got condos and what, but we're talking about a two-and-a-half to three million dollar mess and it has to be made right. It's the future of the -- it's the one gem that you actually have.

11 Trustee Roberts talks about, oh, you can buy 12 power. You can't buy it any cheaper than you can in 13 Greenport. It just isn't -- anyway, have a good 14 night.

MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Mr. Corwin.
 MR. CORWIN: I'm sorry, I'm not -- my name is
 David Corwin. I'm sorry, I'm not going to be able to
 keep you here as long as Bill and John did.

(Laughter)

20 MR. SWISKEY: Dave, give us a break.

19

21 MR. CORWIN: But I want you to know what it's 22 like from a landlord's perspective in the rental law. 23 I have a house on West Street, a two-family house. I 24 filled out the form as best I could. I didn't think 25 it was a very good form. Interesting, it says,

1	"Tenant," Number 5, "Tenant Information," and you can
2	check off two-family, or single-family, or a
3	townhouse or multiple use residential, but there's no
4	multi-family place on the form. All right. Somebody
5	left something out, I guess.
6	Then you go to the sworn declaration, the
7	signing. It says in part, "I have read copies of
8	Chapter 103, Regulations for Property Rentals, in the
9	Code of the Village of Greenport, and in New York
10	State Property Maintenance Code, and agreed to abide
11	by the same." Well, I didn't read them, I crossed
12	that out, and I signed the form.
13	I took it to the Town Clerk to get it
14	notarized, because the Clerk here charges two bucks,
15	everybody else is free. But if you want me to read
16	that stuff, you got to send it to me. I don't think
17	it's a lot. If I want to read it from the Village,
18	I've got to FOIL for it, and perhaps you're thinking
19	I could go online and read it.
20	If you go to New York State Department of State
21	and look at the Building Code, they make it so its
22	incomprehensible, okay? If you go
23	ATTORNEY PROKOP: But it's not the Building
24	Code that you're talking I agree with you about
25	the Building Code.

1 MR. CORWIN: The Maintenance Code is in New 2 York State Department of State's Building Code, and 3 all that is set up to be incomprehensible so you got 4 to pay 600 bucks to the International Code Committee. 5 And then if you read the Village Code, it's not 6 much better, because the Attorney himself said over 7 at the Code Committee he tried to make copies of the 8 Village Code, the Zoning Code, and it was a very 9 difficult task. 10 My reading comprehension off a computer screen 11 is not very good. So I did my best, filled out the 12 form, and then it comes back, they want partnership papers, managing agent information, deed. I don't 13 14 want give the deed. The tax map says all this stuff. Period of occupancy, I'm not interested in giving 15 16 that information. All the stuff is FOILable. Ι 17 don't want to make it public information. Floor 18 plan, all right, maybe a floor plan, but then that's 19 par for a floor plan. And a Certificate of 20 Occupancy. None of the houses I own have certificate 21 of occupancies, they were before the law.

So I just wanted to make you aware that when you put together forms like this, given people to fill out, and I made an honest effort, and then it comes like that, do another five or six hours of

1 work. By the time I'm finished, it's eight or ten hours of work. It's over a thousand dollars worth of 2 3 work, from my perspective. I'm renting to low income 4 people. Now they're going to have to pay for that 5 somehow, not you guys. Thank you. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Okay. Anybody else 7 wish to address the Board? 8 (No Response) 9 Okay. I'll call a motion to adjourn to Executive Session for --10 11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Litigation. 12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Litigation at 9:55. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second. 14 MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor? 15 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Ave. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye. 17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye. 18 MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye. 19 We're adjourned to Executive Session.
