	8	MAYOR NYCE: Thanks. You may be seated.
	9	This is the October work session, Village Board
1	.0	of Trustees.
1	.1	We have our monthly reports. Our first
1	.2	report will be from the Fire Department, Chief
1	.3	Harry Breese. Chief, how are you?
1	.4	CHIEF BREESE: Good. How are you doing,
1	.5	buddy?
1	.6	MAYOR NYCE: Good.
1	7	CHIFF BRFFSF: You got my monthly all my

18	monthly reports, correct?
19	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
20	CHIEF BREESE: Attached to the resolutions
21	was a report from H2M, our Architects.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
24	CHIEF BREESE: The Board of Wardens would
25	like to sit down with the Board and discuss where

1	we're going to head with the amount of repairs
2	that need to be done on this place, so.
3	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
4	CHIEF BREESE: They'd like to set up a
5	meeting, so it's up to you guys, I guess, to pick
6	a date.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Let me work with the Clerk and
8	we'll come up with some dates and shoot them back
9	to you.
10	CHIEF BREESE: Okay, that sounds good.
11	MAYOR NYCE: And figure something out.
12	CHIEF BREESE: All right. And the other
13	thing there was a question on the the other

14	thing was a pumper.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
16	CHIEF BREESE: The truck we just went out
17	to bid for.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
19	CHIEF BREESE: I got the Sylvia sent me
20	an email from the Attorney.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, there were questions.
22	CHIEF BREESE: There was a couple of
23	questions. Some of the questions I can answer.
24	The one about Scott Air Packs, we just wanted
25	that included with the pumper, but we're not

1 going to buy those, because I can actually them \$1100 cheaper off the State contract, at least. 2 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 3 CHIEF BREESE: So that was a big thing. We 4 basically just want to go with the pumper, which 5 was five-forty-seven-three-hundred, without the 6 additional equipment that was mentioned in the 7 bid. 8

9 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

10	CHIEF BREESE: But as far as some of this
11	other stuff, I really don't know the answer. I
12	know there was an inspection trip noted for the
13	end.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
15	CHIEF BREESE: But I think they changed
16	the I think they changed law or something.
17	You're only allowed one inspection trip now,
18	you're not allowed two, or something. I'm not
19	sure how it went, because the last truck we
20	bought was a heavy rescue truck and I don't know.
21	Do you remember back then? They changed it on us
22	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. I'm not sure how
23	many times they went. I thought they went three
24	times.
25	CHIEF BREESE: No, we only went once with

1 the heavy rescue truck.

TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Did you? Okay.

3 CHIEF BREESE: Yeah. The only trucks --

4 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The other trucks we went

5 at least two times.

6	CHIEF BREESE: The only reason they went
7	three times is because they're right in
8	Pennsylvania, and they were taking their own
9	personal vehicles and driving. That was Paul
10	Cordy Quarty and a bunch of the guys.
11	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay.
12	CHIEF BREESE: They could go to the factory
13	as much as they want. We can, too, if we want to
14	go at our own expense. But I think the way the
15	law read, for some reason, somebody told us
16	you're only allowed one inspection trip, and that
17	was for the final inspection of the truck before
18	delivery.
19	As far as anything else, I really I
20	mean, I'd have to look at the contract to answer
21	any of the rest of the questions about it. But
22	we just wanted to go with a basic truck the
23	Wardens voted on, and leave the air packs off and
24	the spare bottles.
25	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay.

- 2 through it, just so that we can make sure that
- 3 we're following the right procedure, so I'll ask.
- 4 Who should he contact to get those questions
- 5 answered to move it along?
- 6 CHIEF BREESE: I'll contact Pierce and I'll
- 7 have them get a hold of you. I have your number,
- 8 I believe, so --
- 9 MR. PROKOP: That would be great. Thanks.
- 10 CHIEF BREESE: I'll have a representative
- 11 from Pierce contact you.
- 12 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, and that would make the
- most sense. The whole point of this is not, you
- 14 know, to -- so it gets lost in all the --
- 15 CHIEF BREESE: Right.
- 16 MAYOR NYCE: —— little details, but we do
- 17 need to make sure that the details --
- 18 CHIEF BREESE: No. We want it to be right,
- 19 too.
- 20 MAYOR NYCE: Right.
- 21 CHIEF BREESE: We want to make sure we get
- what we're paying for, too.
- 23 MAYOR NYCE: Right, absolutely.
- TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. We included all
- of that stuff in the bid, though, correct, the --

1	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. It's just that there
2	were some —— there were some questions as to
3	where within the bid they were, and it just
4	MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. But if he's telling
5	us that they just want the basic truck, that's
6	changing the bid. Is that going to affect it?
7	MR. PROKOP: We're not changing the bid.
8	CHIEF BREESE: We're not changing the bid.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
10	CHIEF BREESE: There was a bid for, I think
11	it was five-forty-seven-three hundred
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
13	CHIEF BREESE: for the truck, and then
14	with the additional items
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's what I
16	wanted.
17	CHIEF BREESE: it was 581-something, or
18	589-something
19	MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. I just wanted to
20	know. Okay.
21	CHIEF BREESE: Right.
22	MAYOR NYCE: That's cool. So

TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Although, also, there was 24 no payment schedule in there. You had the list 25 and \$8,300 discount if you pay for the chassis Work Session 10/20/14 1 on --2 CHIEF BREESE: Yes. 3 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: To start. Normally, they have it, you know, half down, some kind of 4 payment schedule. There's nothing there. I know 5 6 Joe noticed that. 7 CHIEF BREESE: Okay. 8 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: There's nothing in there. 9 It doesn't say how much of a down payment, when it's due. 10 11 CHIEF BREESE: I don't remember, but I 12 could look up. 13 MR. PROKOP: Well, there could be a payment at the end of it. That's probably why there's 14 15 no -- there may be no --16 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I mean, they do classify that the -- you get a discount if you pay for a 17

chassis upfront.

16	try to sell it. I don't know what the Truck
17	Committee is planning on doing. The old truck?
18	CHIEF BREESE: Yeah, I don't know. We kind
19	of it's kind of up in the air. I'd kind of
20	like to see us try to sell the thing and get some
21	of the money back, because it's still in decent
22	shape. I mean, I think that would be the best
23	way to go.
24	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay.
25	CHIEF BREESE: Try and recoup some of our

17	question.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. That needs to be
19	spelled out in the contract, definitely.
20	CHIEF BREESE: I will mention that.
21	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. The color of the
22	vehicle, I know it doesn't say there in there
23	what color.
24	CHIEF BREESE: It's going to be red, white
25	over red.

1 CHIEF BREESE: White over red?
2 CHIEF BREESE: The same. It's going to
3 have the chevron on the back. You know, it's
4 going to have the new — by NFPA, whatever the
5 law was for it.

6 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: No, I understand that

7	part. It's just we've had three different
8	styles. We've had plain red, we've had white
9	over red, and then we've had black over red, and
10	didn't say in there. I was just curious what we
11	were getting.
12	CHIEF BREESE: Honestly, George, I'd have
13	to read more into the detail of the contract. I
14	didn't read it that much, so.
15	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: All right. Well, in the
16	contract, they have four pages on paint, but
17	nowhere does it say the color.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, exactly.
19	MS. PHILLIPS: There was great detail on
20	the paint.
21	CHIEF BREESE: I spent too much time
22	probably looking at the chevron, because at one
23	time the chevron was green, was green and red,
24	and I kept joking, "What, are you buying a
25	Christmas truck?"

- 1 You may have a green and red fire truck driving
- 2 around town. So maybe -- I never looked at the

paint, honestly. 3 4 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay, just to clarify 5 that. 6 CHIEF BREESE: Okay. 7 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Also, did the Wardens vote on how they plan on paying for it? 8 9 CHIEF BREESE: The last I knew, they were 10 planning on taking the money out of the apparatus 11 replacement. 12 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. 13 CHIEF BREESE: There was enough money in there last time. I talked to Robert. 14 15 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yes. CHIEF BREESE: I believe there was 700 in 16 17 there. 18 MAYOR NYCE: If you wanted to finance part 19 of it. 20 CHIEF BREESE: Yeah, because there was 21 something in there about bonding. 22 MAYOR NYCE: Right. If you want to finance 23 part of it and cash on the rest. 24 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Well, I'm sure a payment

schedule would list that out when we get that --

1	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
2	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: and see what it says
3	and what the options are.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, absolutely.
5	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: All right. So we'll have
6	that when he gets that information. Okay.
7	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. I will call Pierce
8	tomorrow and I'll ask them to contact Joe and try
9	and get this all straightened out.
10	MR. PROKOP: It looked good. The
11	Department did a very good job on this. We just
12	need to get some of the procedural things taken
13	care of.
14	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. That's not a problem.
15	And then after Joe is happy, then what do we do?
16	How do we move on from there? Do we do you
17	guys sign a contract or
18	MAYOR NYCE: We accept the bid and
19	authorize you to make the payment, I believe,
20	would be the next step.
21	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
22	MAYOR NYCE: We accept their bid and the
23	payments are made.

MAYOR NYCE: Right. 25 Work Session 10/20/14 1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So, I guess --2 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: If the payment is made at 3 the end, that's what the, you know, payment schedule is going to say, it could be eight 4 5 months for them to build the truck. 6 CHIEF BREESE: Right. 7 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. 8 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So there's really nothing 9 that we have to worry about right away. That's why I was asking if they say want a down payment 10 11 of 150,000 --12 MAYOR NYCE: Right, absolutely. TRUSTEE HUBBARD: -- then the Wardens have 13 14 to vote on using that money, and then we have to 15 vote on it also to take anything from that 16 account. 17 MAYOR NYCE: If that comes up, let us know. We can always call a special meeting to 18

authorize, you know --

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MR. PROKOP: Sign the contract.

20	CHIEF BREESE: Okay.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Even the Wardens could call a
22	special meeting to authorize the payment, then we
23	could do the same in kind, if that becomes
24	necessary. It doesn't sound like the timing is
25	that critical.
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1	CHIEF BREESE: Okay. That sounds good. Is
2	that it?
3	MAYOR NYCE: Anything else for the Chief?
4	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: No, that's it.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you, Chief.
6	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Thank you.
7	CHIEF BREESE: You didn't put in the paper
8	about the hydrant test is going to be
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: October 26th.

25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.
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1	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you, Chief. Our next
2	report will be from Village Administrator,
3	Mr. Paul Pallas.
4	MR. PALLAS: Thank you, Mayor and Board.
5	You have all my reports. I just want to
6	highlight a couple of items for various
7	departments.
8	The first would be the Marina. That
9	revenue was up for September, almost \$4500, so
10	we've had, you know, a banner year. So I think

we're going to try to get totals for the year and

12	see where we are relative to budget and last
13	year. So I think I think it's going to show a
14	very a fairly positive number.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
16	MR. PALLAS: The other highlight is the
17	maintenance assessments in the East Pier. As you
18	recall, we had done some of the piling work.
19	There is some cross-bracing that is definitely
20	definitely needs to be done this Fall. I'll see
21	where we are on this that, and if we can use the
22	original contract or not. We have to redo that.
23	And then we'll be assessing if anything else
24	needs to be done as well.
25	The Recreation Center, we have 14 more kids

17

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this year.

2 MAYOR NYCE: Sorry. Not to — there was 3 also — we talked about doing some more on the 4 commercial dock this autumn as well.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: The railroad dock?

MR. PALLAS: We're doing electrical work

now. We're doing electrical work --

- 8 MAYOR NYCE: It is being handled, okay. MR. PALLAS: -- next week, I think. 9 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. 10 11 MR. PALLAS: Or two weeks to redo all the 12 meters. MAYOR NYCE: Good. 13 14 MR. PALLAS: And the services going out on the pier. So that's all scheduled. 15 MAYOR NYCE: And then there was some 16 structural work we were to do as well come 17 18 Springtime, or was that going to be done in the Fall as well? 19 20 MR. PALLAS: No, I don't think it was going to be 21 in the Fall, probably Spring. I spoke to Jeff, 22 he didn't mention it, so. MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 23 24 MR. PALLAS: But I'll follow up with him on

MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.

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that as well.

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2 MR. PALLAS: The Recreation Center, we have

3 14 more kids this year than last year, which is,

4	you know, a good thing.
5	We're also looking into a different
6	license. I'm not sure of the details, but
7	there's been a lot of back and forth with the
8	County, I believe, on that. There's a lot of
9	documentation that they need to get this
10	additional license. We may never get it because
11	some of the documentation we may not have,
12	because it's such a small program. But, you
13	know, we're working on that as well.
14	MS. PHILLIPS: I'm sorry, Paul. There's
15	additional documentation to create a different
16	program or
17	MR. PALLAS: No, same program. It's I
18	think the gist of it, if I understand it
19	correctly, is for additional student benefits,
20	more than the program. It's the same program.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	MR. PALLAS: We do have to have a little
23	bit higher ratio of student-to
24	teacher—to—student, which is the nature of one of

my -- it's not in here yet, but it will be in for

- 1 Monday, resolution for an additional -- an
- 2 increase for one of the employees there.
- 3 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. So
- 4 they're taking the current program and upping it
- 5 another step, as far as educational components?
- 6 MR. PALLAS: It's really not -- no, it's
- 7 really not changing the program, per se.
- 8 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
- 9 MR. PALLAS: It's really more just
- 10 additional regulations that qualifies other
- 11 students to get aid, as I understand it.
- 12 MS. PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. Now --
- okay. So it's going through the opposite --
- 14 okay.
- 15 MR. PALLAS: Correct.
- 16 MAYOR NYCE: I fully apprised Paul of the
- fact that this is a drop-in center. We are not
- an after-school program.
- 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Program that's --
- 20 MAYOR NYCE: We're not doing all of that
- 21 stuff, because the cost associated with doing
- that makes it prohibitive for most of the people
- that would take advantage of it. What he had
- 24 said is that there's some documentation necessary

1	MS. PHILLIPS: Additional aid?
2	MAYOR NYCE: Basically rebated money for
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, now I understand.
4	MAYOR NYCE: the program itself
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Now I understand.
6	MAYOR NYCE: that's already run.
7	MS. PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	MR. PALLAS: And for the Utilities, just
9	two items to highlight.
L0	One, the Road Crew and Electric Crew worked
l1	to take out 13 take down 13 trees by our own
L2	crews. We didn't have to contract it out, which
L3	is a significant savings, so I just wanted to
L4	point it out.
L5	In addition, at the road barn, the Road
L6	Crews themselves did some renovation work,
L7	significant renovation work, in the area of the
L8	building where they store the salt and the sand,
L9	the awning. We constructed the whole roof area,
20	cleaned out the whole inside and set up

different two different stalls, I guess you'd
call them, one for sand and one for salt/sand
mixture. So they did that all inhouse again
MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.
MR. PALLAS: saving a significant amount
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of money, rather than have to contract that out,
MAYOR NYCE: That's great.
•
MR. PALLAS: That's all I have.
MAYOR NYCE: Great.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
MAYOR NYCE: Okay. Questions for Paul?
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Paul, I just see the note
here under the Treatment Plant, that the
Aqua-Aerobics System has been delivered. Has
that work started, installation, yet?
MR. PALLAS: Yes, the it hasn't been
completed. The machine itself has been
installed. There's still electrical work to be
done. They're going to be working on that over
the next couple of weeks.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.

17	MAYOR NYCE: This is for the sludge holding
18	tank?
19	MR. PALLAS: Correct.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, terrific.
21	MS. PHILLIPS: And the cooling tower
22	project, the bid?
23	MR. PALLAS: We've received bids.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We had one bidder,
25	right?
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MR. PALLAS: Right, and we're reviewing it

2 at the moment. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Reviewing it? Okay. 3 4 MR. PALLAS: Yeah. 5 MAYOR NYCE: All right. Thank you. The next report will be from the Village Treasure, 6 7 Robert Brandt. TREASURER BRANDT: Good evening, everyone. 8 MAYOR NYCE: Good evening, Robert. 9 10 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Good evening, Robert. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Good evening, Robert. 12 TREASURER BRANDT: Tall Ships Festival 2015

13	is coming next fiscal year, but in this fiscal
14	year, I have some expenses to attend to.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
16	TREASURER BRANDT: The first thing I'd like
17	to do is set up revenue and expense lines in the
18	Recreation Fund, since this is a Marina event,
19	staffed by the Marina. All our credit card
20	machines tie to the Recreation Fund. This would
21	make my bookkeeping a lot easier. So I'd like to
22	establish those lines right away and get that
23	going.
24	I do have a budget amendment. It's all
25	attached. Oh, here it is. This is to fund the

- 1 Tall Ships port fee.
- 2 MAYOR NYCE: Right
- 3 TREASURER BRANDT: We have to get this paid
- 4 pretty quickly, so I'd like to get this approved
- 5 through.
- 6 The other thing, the third thing is a
- 7 resolution authorizing me to do an interfund
- 8 loan. If we take the money out of the Recreation

9	Fund to pay the port fee in this fiscal year, I
10	don't have an offset revenue. So I'm going to
11	have a big issue at the end of the year
12	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
13	TREASURER BRANDT: covering 50,000. I
14	would rather have an interfund loan on the books,
15	which could be cleared up once the revenue starts
16	coming in.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Do me a favor.
18	TREASURER BRANDT: Yeah.
19	MAYOR NYCE: You've talked to our auditors
20	about this, or you haven't?
21	TREASURER BRANDT: I have not.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Please do.
23	TREASURER BRANDT: Okay.
24	MAYOR NYCE: So that they're aware of it
25	when they come in. We had to we've had some

- issues in the past where we've done stuff that's all proper, but they're not aware of it, so they
- 3 don't understand it, and they put it in places
- 4 different than we had anticipated. You know what

5	I'm saying, that they categorize it differently?
6	TREASURER BRANDT: Clearly. Clearly, I've
7	been coming across that.
8	MAYOR NYCE: So, as we do this, let them
9	know what we're doing.
10	TREASURER BRANDT: Absolutely. Absolutely.
11	MAYOR NYCE: And so that they know what to
12	look for and why they're looking at it.
13	TREASURER BRANDT: I would also ask the
14	Board to vote on this tonight, these three
15	resolutions. I'm running out of time to pay the
16	port fee, and I think the week would make a
17	dramatic difference, if I could get the payment
18	out.
19	MAYOR NYCE: When was the payment when's
20	the payment due?

18	We have I have spoken to the Attorney

23	County voted to end their position in the lease,
24	but they're still working on the paperwork with
25	the MTA.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. Sounds about right.
2	MR. PROKOP: And just by the time they
3	MAYOR NYCE: Two monstrous organizations.

5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Was it a 99-year lease?

We should, if it's appropriate, maybe pen a joint letter of 3 thanks to them --4 MR. PROKOP: Okay, that's a good idea. 5 6 MAYOR NYCE: -- for considering that. 7 MR. PROKOP: Thank you. The other thing we

8 did, I did two of the laws for the Code 9 Committee. One was involving the Chapter 48, and 10 the other was involving some of the fees for the 11 Village. 12 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. 13 MR. PROKOP: They seem to have been moving along satisfactorily. 14 15 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. MR. PROKOP: And does anybody have any 16 questions about my report, or anything else? 17 18 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: No. 19 MR. PROKOP: Okay. Thank you. 20 MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. > The other one is it had come to our attention that there's an additional amount of time and effort needed by the Building Department to review fire suppression systems. The design of them, as they're going in initially, is not to do with the upkeep or maintenance of them, but the initial analysis of the systems. So the Building Department asked could we levy a fee for that, either to be able to hire somebody outside to do the work, or if we do it inhouse, it would cover any additional overtime, or whatever. And the Code Committee looked at that, and they're proposing, I believe it's a \$100 fee. So that's the other item that will be an agenda item to set a hearing to amend that portion of the code as well.

> I'll turn it over to Trustee Robins and the Audit Committee. She had asked to read that

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- 1 report.
- TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. The Audit Committee
- 3 met this afternoon and we discussed cash
- 4 receipts. The committee recommended that cash
- 5 receipts received at the Ice Rink be handled the
- 6 same way as receipts at the Carousel. Carousel
- 7 Committee members have been advised of cash
- 8 guidelines and purchasing procedures according to
- 9 Treasurer Brandt. There should be a separation

- 20 We already mentioned that the audit is
- 21 pending. I guess we're going to be getting
- 22 results of that next week.
- So I think those were the major things that
- 24 we discussed.

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1 in the Park, and the fact that that has really 2 grown to become quite a Village-wide event. It's 3 now somewhere in the neighborhood of 12 to \$14,000 spent on that. The major donors for that 4 5 are the IGA and the BID. MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, the major donor is us, 6 Greenport, Southold IGA. 6	open through the event, and we treat it like it's			
7	a big deal, because, at this point, it really is

17	over one acre, and you're doing substantial
18	restoration or renovation to the property, then
19	you would need to comply with the SWPPP, which
20	contains runoff on your property during the
21	course of construction.
22	MR. PROKOP: A SWPPP is basically a plan as
23	to how you're going to deal with runoff, and
24	that's basically what it is.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Right.

3 MAYOR NYCE: Right. So I think in the last

4 public hearing, we clarified that for the public. This really doesn't — it does not have a huge 5 6 effect on Village residents. We are required by 7 the State to adopt a Local Law of this sort. 8 So I don't know if anyone has any comment, 9 or we just put it on the agenda and vote it up or 10 down. 11 MS. PHILLIPS: I think we pretty much 12 discussed it at the public hearing. TRUSTEE ROBINS: A straight up and down 13 14 vote, I think it's ready. 15 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. 17 MAYOR NYCE: The same with the Chapter 114A, then, just lists --18 19 MS. PHILLIPS: There's not really much we 20 can do about it. I mean, we share a body of 21 water with the Town of Southold and they have to 22 have it, so that's the other part of the 23 requirement. 24 MAYOR NYCE: And to reiterate, that we are,

along with the Town of Southold, still pursuing

- 1 an argument with the DEC and the state that
- 2 Stirling Basin was miscategorized. Therefore,
- 3 including us in the MS4, the mandatory MS4
- 4 Program, and I said this at the first and second
- 5 public hearing -- no, I wasn't here for the
- 6 second public hearing, at the first public
- 7 hearing.
- 8 The Village of Greenport is always going to
- 9 do its best job of containing stormwater. We
- don't want it to go into the bay. We make our
- 11 living off of the bay. But that being said, the
- 12 MS4 Program I still contend is an unfunded
- mandate, it's expensive. So, if we don't have to
- 14 comply with the State under the mandatory
- 15 compliance, we'll still do, you know, our best
- job to contain stormwater. But we will continue
- 17 that fight with Southold Town as our ally with
- 18 the State to get them to recategorize Stirling
- 19 Basin, and then take us out of the MS4 Program,
- 20 the mandatory portion of it.
- That will conclude that. So we go into
- reports from Board of Trustees. I'll ask Trustee
- 23 Hubbard to kick it off.
- TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. Tree Committee,

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1 another thank you to the Village Electric 2 Department pruning the tops, the Road Crew taking 3 down the bottom parts and cutting them down. You 4 know, it's a lot of good cooperation going on 5 with them. In the past, things didn't always 6 work as easy as they are working now, and it's 7 working out well, and it's a good job. So I just 8 want to thank them again. MAYOR NYCE: That's terrific. 9 10 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Greenhill Cemetery, we 11 had our meeting. We hadn't met in several 12 months. PHILLIPS: Keep putting him under the 17 bus like I did, keep going. 18 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Well, no, it's just --TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's okay. No, I mean 19 I'm joking. 20

	22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Trying to find things is

	25	under "G" for Greenhill Cemetery, there's nothing
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	1	under "G". So we have the staff working on

18	and the Town. It's another place with the Town
19	and Village working together. We also agreed to

MAYOR NYCE: -- for the work. The State

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- 1 had offered that it might do the work at its bid
- price, which could be substantially lower than
- 3 others. But we would do a joint application with
- 4 the Town of Southold, and State DOT, and the

5	Village of Greenport. And then Paul and Joe are
6	looking into the possibility of the Village
7	dedicating that road to the State, so that they
8	would then be responsible for the maintenance of
9	it ongoing, and eliminate the issues that come
10	up, and Southold Town is doing the same thing.
11	The idea is to determine whether or not the State
12	would take dedication of it or not, and if they
13	would take it as is, or whether we'd have to
14	repair it first. But either way, in a long-term
15	sense, it seems to make a lot of sense for us to
16	not have to maintain that road. If, in fact, it
17	is a State it's thoroughfare from State 25 to
18	State 25, the State should maintain it. So we're
19	slowly looking into that as well. But, as George
20	said, it was a very productive meeting.
21	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The State Engineers
22	outnumbered us, they had four of them. Each one
23	had a different category, and each one talked a
24	different thing and all. I mean, we went
25	through we tried to play the whole scenario,

- where they're doing it, what they're doing. And
- they say it's a disconnected road and it's been
- 3 that way, there's others in the State. I there's
- 4 there's 25 here, and they start again over there.
- 5 And we tried to sell our point very hard, and
- 6 they say, well, in the State, there's hundreds of
- 7 these same kind of situations and they can't
- 8 justify using State money to fix technically a
- 9 Village Road.
- 10 MAYOR NYCE: And we asked if there were any
- others in Suffolk County, and they couldn't think
- of any off the top of their heads, but there are
- plenty in the rest of the state, that was their
- 14 argument.
- TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Right.
- MAYOR NYCE: But, again, they weren't -- it
- 17 wasn't a one-sided discussion. They actually did
- 18 throw some ideas back as to how we might move
- 19 forward.
- 20 The other part of it that I forgot, the
- other part is working on formalizing the
- 22 Intermunicipal Agreement between us, Southold
- Town, and Department of State. We plow Front
- 24 Street for them, because their plows are too big
- to get down the road anyhow. And, you know,

1	there have been these handshake deals. They're
2	very interested in making sure that they're not
3	just handshake deals, that we all understand what
4	the exchange is. I think that also could be a

I do want to just bring up one thing, 9 and I have seen that we're beginning the season where, again, we're starting to get requests for 10 11 events, public events, Public Assembly Permits. And we had a request for a marathon now, a 12 13 half-marathon in the Village. And I think that

14	it's something, number one, that the Board needs
15	to revisit and get back to our Public Assembly
16	issue.
17	MAYOR NYCE: That was one of the items I
18	wanted to bring up as we're wrapping up.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. You know, because
20	that is going to come up again and we need to
21	come up with a resolution on that.
22	MAYOR NYCE: We do.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The second thing is
24	request for special events, which are not
25	necessarily centered in the park. But the fact

that we have become such a popular destination for so many different organizations now, that this is something that's going to continue to come up. And I really think that we need to have, if not — probably a policy of how we decide, because I really believe that it's possible that just about every weekend for six months we could have somebody coming in that's going to request to do something in the Village

It's great to be popular, it's wonderful, it's good for the businesses, and what's good for the businesses, I truly believe, is good for all of our citizens, but we do need to be able to have some rules and guidelines on that.

I know last week I was walking down Front
Street and noticed a charter bus that was parked
in front of a restaurant taking up two or three
parking spaces. I had actually had some
discussions with Long Island Convention and
Visitors Bureau about the parking of such buses,
and we had determined that a policy would be to
suggest buses drop off their passengers in the
Village, and then go park over on Moores Lane
near the Polo Grounds. I call it the service

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1 road.

2 MAYOR NYCE: I think we have -- our Village

3 Code prohibits buses parking on Village streets,

4 with the exception of school buses.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Do we have code on that?

6 We talked about that, Paul. 7 MS. PHILLIPS: They can't stay running. 8 MAYOR NYCE: Oh, we did a no-idling. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No idling. 10 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I believe that's what it 11 12 was. But there is --MAYOR NYCE: We should —— that's something 13 we should review. I know we had a public hearing 14 15 way on back. TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. 16 17 MAYOR NYCE: And it was going to -- it was 18 going to prohibit buses parking on Village streets, with the exception of school buses. 19 20 MS. PHILLIPS: Because I know there's some 21 type of State Law that on the roads for night 22 deliveries, that they -- like tractor trailers 23 making a night delivery can't block up the road, 24 because they've approached other property owners

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to put the tractor trailers, so they could unload

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the gear, so they can run it back and forth.

- 2 MAYOR NYCE: Right.
 3 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But there was something
- 4 with the buses, we have the no-idling, but I'm
- 5 not sure about no parking, I can't remember.
- 6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: First of all, it was
 7 parked, it was not idling. It was about two to
- 8 three hours.
- 9 MAYOR NYCE: Understood. Can you
- double-check it? I want to make sure we don't
- 11 have something. I thought we did, because I know
- we addressed it years ago. But if we don't, yes,
- that makes a lot of sense, because there are more
- and more charter bus, and we see them in random
- 15 places. And Front and Main Streets, they're not
- going to park as much, although in this case they
- 17 did. But even on Village side streets, they're
- 18 probably not necessarily appropriate places for
- 19 them to park. We can have them park up on the --
- 20 what used to be the --
- 21 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Firemen's track.
- 22 MAYOR NYCE: Firemen's track up on Moores
- 23 Lane.
- TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah, because there was
- 25 two that were parked on Third Street in front of

1	Legion Hall, enough blocking the turning lane,
2	and through there, they unloaded their passengers
3	and they sat there for several hours. I believe
4	that started with the Library was having tours
5	out of there, and the buses were coming and
6	waiting three or four hours.
7	MS. PHILLIPS: That's where it was. Yeah,
8	that's where it was, because we had a discussion
9	a couple of years ago.
10	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: We had the public hearing
11	and the meeting on that, and I thought we did say
12	no parking in the Village, but I have to check
13	that. But the complaints up there when they were
14	coming and get the kids.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
16	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: They showed up two hours
17	early to get the kids to get everybody on there
18	was the issue.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Would that also then
21	include the side streets, like
22	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.

MAYOR NYCE: Yes.

23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It would?
24	MS. PHILLIPS: It was at the Library, if I
25	remember correctly. They kept pulling up there
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1	to take the children, or if there were programs,
2	and there were complaints from the neighbors that
3	the buses were there two hours, idling the whole
4	time.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Right. Terrific.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I went with Clerk
7	Pirillo and a couple of members of her office, as
8	well as, I think, two members of the Zoning Board
9	to a Suffolk County Village Officials Association
10	training up in Huntington a couple of weeks ago.
11	Those are excellent programs. And we went and
12	listened to a presentation by several people from
13	PSE&G on emergency management for storms, and
14	also an excellent presentation by Joe Prokop
15	about SEQRA.
16	MR. PROKOP: Thank you.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Environmental review
18	process that basically all of our projects need

19	to go through. And it was a very informative and
20	educational evening, well spent. Thank you.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. Mr. Murray.
22	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Well, as Sylvia started
23	mentioning, the festival this weekend at the
24	Third Street Park, the naming of the Third Street
25	Memorial Park, Sylvia and Derryl both have done a

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lot of work on this. So she thanked Val Shelby, 1 which is going to be very instrumental this 2 3 weekend on it, but she and Derryl also did quite a bit of work on it, so I wanted to thank them. 4 5 CLERK PIRILLO: Thank you 6 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Also, Peconic Landing will 7 be donating all the food for this. We're going 8 to be cooking up hamburgers and hotdogs. And the 9 weather looks beautiful this weekend, so I 10 anticipate after the 60 kids do the Carousel ride, they'll come over and --11 12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Shoot some hoops. 13 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Shoot some hoops. So it should be a nice -- it should be a nice event. I 14

15	think the weather being as nice as it's going to
16	be on Saturday, it could be a pretty big event.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Cool.
18	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Because, you know, you
19	never know.
20	MAYOR NYCE: It's true.
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: So we have about I
22	think we're going to, you know, cook up a good
23	bit, so it should be a good time.
24	MAYOR NYCE: Excellent
25	TRUSTEE MURRAY: So. we'll see how it goes.

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TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I just have one question 1 2 for Trustee Murray. The Sixth Street Park, I had a couple of phone calls about that. Just an 3 update, is that now on the plan for the 4 5 springtime? TRUSTEE MURRAY: We hope so. 6 7 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. MR. PALLAS: We hope to get it out. 8 MAYOR NYCE: As we're putting the budget 9 together for next year, it's --10

11	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So that's what I said, if
12	it's not early spring, it would be after the new
13	budget starts.
14	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I just want to get some
16	kind of update, so I could tell this person that
17	we brought it up, we talked about.
18	TRUSTEE MURRAY: I emailed her and told her
19	to give me a call if she'd like to discuss it.
20	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. Well, I told her
21	that a month ago and she hadn't gotten in touch
22	with you, or whatever.
23	TRUSTEE MURRAY: No, she you know, she
24	hasn't, so hopefully she'll call.
25	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: All right.

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TRUSTEE ROBINS: Recalling our discussions
about that in the work session two or three
months ago, that we did mention both of those
parks.

TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah.

6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And that we were going to

7	do one at a time.
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Right, we're exactly.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Third Street was in pretty
10	poor shape, so we decided

21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: But they use it for
22	different things. And Fifth Street, it needs it.
23	I can't wait until Fifth Street gets done. So,
24	hopefully, Paul can figure out a way to get it
25	done. We'll push him in the Spring.
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1	MR. PALLAS: It's really up to Robert, not

2	Committee.
3	MAYOR NYCE: I saw that.
4	MS. PHILLIPS: So that's that. The
5	Carousel Committee, there's been a lot going on
6	with the Carousel Committee. They have this
7	grant that they need to proceed with. There
8	needed to be a clearing of the air as to how the
9	new procedure is in dealing with repairs to the
10	Carousel. Before it was Mr. Abatelli and some of
11	the Carousel members. In my discussions with
12	Paul as to how he would like to proceed with it,
13	it's now going to be where everyone requests
14	things through Jeff. Jeff will then go to Paul.
15	And it's a couple of extra steps, but it's a
16	change in systems, and I think it will run a
17	little bit smoother.
18	As I explained to the committee, Mr. Pallas
19	is an engineer, which seemed to ease them a
20	little bit, as far as that he knew what he was
21	talking about with the Carousel. So that's a
22	change in what's going on.

So, hopefully, they'll concentrate on the

rounding boards and getting that project out the door.

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1	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sarah, at the Marina
3	Office, will now be at the Carousel on the
4	weekends. She's been hired as a full-time
5	person. So that should alleviate some of the
6	confusion with the cash drawers, supervision.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
8	MS. PHILLIPS: And will be a communication
9	between the volunteers who are there on the
10	weekend and the staffing.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There was a discussion
13	that I put on the table, that they have to
14	understand that with Mr. Abatelli's retirement,
15	that the committee will not be so actively
16	hands-on on repairing things, you know. So
17	Mr. Pallas and I will be discussing that a little
18	bit further as to the maintenance plan.
19	The Carousel Committee, over the last year,

20	has made sure that we now have a spare washer
21	that needs to be done, so that when the one
22	that's in the Carousel does decide to take a die
23	we can repair the Carousel quickly. We now have
24	it maintained every day. It's taken on a whole
25	new role as far as an asset that's being watched

The National Carousel Committee, of course,
the Association was at the — it was a great
success. It was quite a pleasure to see so many
people smiling at what really is something that's
a jewel for the Village, okay?

MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.

MS. PHILLIPS: I think that was pretty much
it. Those two committees have — had to revamp
themselves, and, hopefully, we can just move in a
different direction, okay?

MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The only other thing is
you and I have a couple of things in common that

we spoke about at Code, that you're going to be

16	bringing up.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I'll let you take
19	care of those two things.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. I'm going to go in
21	reverse order of my list.
22	The final update for now on the Tall Ships
23	Event is that, as Trustee Robins mentioned, there
24	was a fundraiser for Hermione on the Intrepid
25	last Tuesday, which I attended with Peter Clarke

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1 from the BID. The BID put up the initial money for the table, and we hosted three potential 2 3 sponsors, major sponsors. And when I'm saying major sponsors, we set that bar at about 15,000 4 5 per major sponsor. So I think the BID is well on 6 their way to starting to get sponsorship monies. 7 As you well know, they pledged to raise \$100,000. If, in fact, these three are on board at that 8 9 level, they're well on their way. I also had the opportunity to meet the new 10

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and have offered it to the Village. I went and
met with her. I emailed pictures and specs to
everybody. I don't know that we have a space big
enough for it.

TRUSTEE MURRAY: It's big.

MAYOR NYCE: It is big. I don't know that we have a space big enough for it. The only two places that might be big enough would be the Polo Grounds and maybe Fifth Street Park. But I don't think it would fit in Fifth Street Park without taking up the entire space. And if we put it at the Polo Grounds, I don't think it leaves room for the carnival and all the rest of that stuff.

I'm throwing it out because it is a cool piece. The part of it that's most intriguing to me was that the other — the other project that they did was called "The Ship of Tolerance," which is an ongoing project, it goes around the world. It's basically a structure of a ship that gets built in a community. They do outreach in

the community and the schools, and the kids in
those schools — there are different seminars and
talks about what tolerance is, what intolerance
is, and these kids put together these banners
about tolerance and intolerance, and they hang on

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was that if we could find a place for this pirate ship, that it could be a "Ship of Tolerance" in Greenport, we could do that same outreach with this piece.

So I would ask everyone to brainstorm, if you could think of a place where it might live. I'm going to reach out to the school to see if maybe they have some space for it, and if so, if there's a direct tie-in for that program as well. The problem with living in a one square mile village is there's generally not a whole lot of extra space.

TRUSTEE MURRAY: What is it, 40-by-90, right?

MAYOR NYCE: That's about right, yeah.

1/	It's nearly 100 feet long and
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's like a building lot.
19	MAYOR NYCE: That being said, the space
20	that it takes up, it takes up that amount of
21	space, but you walk in and through it.
22	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Right.
23	MAYOR NYCE: There's basically only the aft
24	cabin of the ship that's above ground, then the
25	gunnels around the ship itself. And the howsprit

are the only real pieces that you see that are

above ground, the rest you walk through. So it's sort of a walk—through and walk—on attraction.

It would be nice to see the piece come back to Greenport, and I'm asking you guys to brainstorm on it as well. And, like a said, I will reach out to Mr. Gamberg and see if maybe the school is interested in some way, shape or form, or if we can come up with some way to jointly work on that.

TRUSTEE MURRAY: And Gary Loveless said he'd be — he'd love to help to, you know, put it

13 together.

MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. And I'm sure we could 14 15 get plenty of volunteers to drive, I mean, it 16 disassembles, and to ship it back up here.  that, I'm going to have a resolution to have the
- 4 Code Committee take that up.

5	MS. PHILLIPS: Well, I think that you also
6	should mention that it's a review of R-2
7	altogether.
8	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And we may just leave it
10	alone. It's something that I think is a wise
11	idea to review it. There have been numerous
12	discussions, numerous statements, numerous
13	frustrations, and it may be fine, it may not.
14	But I think it behooves us as a Village every
15	once in a while to take a look at how we operate.
16	We do change from generation to generation
17	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: and decade to decade
19	as property owners change.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. And I think that
21	it is this Board's job from time to time to look
22	at it, as the zoning board, but not the Zoning
23	Board of Appeals. But as the zoning board, we
24	should every now and again look at the overall
25	zoning of the Village and make sure that it fits

- with a comprehensive plan moving forward, that it
- 2 represents what the Village is supposed to look
- 3 like, not only today, but, you know, in five, 10
- 4 and 15 years from now.
- 5 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Maybe you could
- 6 incorporate also, we've had numerous complaints
- 7 about the Airbnbs.
- 8 MAYOR NYCE: Well, that's my next point.
- 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's the next thing.
- 10 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. Because, if
- 11 they're doing that, let's --
- 12 MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
- 13 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: —— hash it all out of
- 14 where that fits in our zoning, because it's -- I
- don't think it's going to go away, so.
- 16 MAYOR NYCE: I agree with you, and that was
- 17 the next part that I was going to bring up.
- TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. I jumped the gun
- on this.
- 20 MAYOR NYCE: No, it's fine, it's fine.
- 21 They do they dovetail. And I've gotten
- 22 several emails, one from Mr. Corwin this last
- week, oddly enough, on the day that the Attorney
- 24 General from the State of New York rendered

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: With his 41-page report.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Had his press release. And
3	New York State is taking the approach as of now
4	that they are improper hotel rooms. That's the
5	stance they're taking for now. We need to
6	continue to watch that. There's no law around it
7	as of now. But we also discussed briefly at Code
8	Committee that maybe they want to take up that
9	issue as well, again, first to identify where the
10	issues are, what the issues are, and then
11	potentially propose a solution to that situation.
12	And so I'll have a resolution on as well to
13	for the Code Committee to take up that one as
14	well.
15	MS. PHILLIPS: Just for information
16	purposes, when I was researching the properties
17	within the Village of Greenport today that
18	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I had mentioned at
20	Code Committee, there is a 41-page opinion now
21	from the Attorney General that's online

23	MS. PHILLIPS: that I would like the
24	Village Clerk to perhaps print off for us to
25	read
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1	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: because it was
3	extensive and had some very from what I
4	scanned on it, had some very important points
5	that I think we all need to think about.
6	MAYOR NYCE: I think, right, in advance of
7	the Code Committee taking it up, I would like
8	also for her to give that to Village Attorney and
9	Village Administrator. I'd like an opinion
10	letter from the Village Attorney as to how it
11	affects the Village in specific, and what
12	portions of that we might want to start the
13	discussion. So, Joe, if you could draft up that.
14	MS. PHILLIPS: But I think you also need to
15	mention that it's not just Airbnbs, we also
16	MAYOR NYCE: No.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's other companies

MAYOR NYCE: Yes.

18	that are out there.
19	MAYOR NYCE: There's half a dozen of them.
20	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Right, in general. So,
21	if we're going to look at the R-2 zoning, let's
22	look at that also, see where that fits in, and,
23	you know
24	MAYOR NYCE: There are a lot of issues
25	around it. There as Trustee Phillips brought

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1 up at the Code Committee, Asha from our Section 8 2 Program has noted that the number of Section 8 3 apartments have dwindled, because people are 4 making more money doing the Airbnb than they 5 are --MS. PHILLIPS: I think she mentioned it to 6 7 Doug Moore. MAYOR NYCE: And Tanya. 8 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I'm talking 10 to Tanya. MAYOR NYCE: So it's an interesting 11 12 scenario. And we're having exactly the same 13 issues that they're having in New York City.

14	There are articles that, you know, the
15	rent-stabilized apartments in the City, they're
16	starting to try and push people out of
17	rent-stabilized apartments in the City doing the
18	same thing. So it's a multifaceted issue and
19	MS. PHILLIPS: Well, I think, just to make
20	a note, out of the 17 properties that I listed at
21	Code Committee today, three-quarters of them used
22	to be two-family rentals.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Interesting.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And they're now
25	single-family.

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1	MAYOR NYCE: Interesting.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So they're now part of
3	the rent. So it was an interesting education.
4	And Mr. Corwin's email was extremely explicit and
5	detailed in telling us what to look for. And I
6	just want we need to take it a little bit
7	further to make sure that we're doing the best
8	for the Village.
9	MAYOR NYCE: Uh-huh.

	10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They've actually been
	11	trying to deal with this all summer long over in,
	12	I believe, Southampton.

	2	MAYOR NYCE: The sharing economy, they call
it.	3	TDUCTEE DORING. The charing occupant and
		TRUSTEE ROBINS: The sharing economy, and
	4	it's a reality, and absolutely is something that

could have a profound effect on the Village, so something that we need to be on top of.

MAYOR NYCE: On that note, I talked with Paul this morning, and the rental permits will be rolling out November 1. It's going to go sector by sector. We're using — we're doing the smallest section of the Village first. There's a 30-to-60-day return on that, so it's not going to be a bunch of inspections all at once. First is the letter going out, and people coming back in and filling out the permits. So that will be rolling out as of November 1, and we'll make an announcement at the televised meeting as well.

The last item that I had was, as Trustee Robins pointed out, that we do need to continue the discussion on the use of Mitchell Park as pertains to Mass Public Assembly Permits, whether or not we want to continue to issue them. As I see it, based on the discussions we've had so far, there are two paths we can go. One is to continue to issue Mass Public Assembly Permits,

- 1 and, if it's legal, set an exorbitantly high fee
- for that permit. The other one is to not issue
- 3 Mass Public Assembly Permits for Mitchell Park at
- 4 all, just leave it a public park, and the only
- 5 events that would happen would be
- 6 Village-sponsored events, such as the Dancing in
- 7 the Park, or if we're a sponsor for Relay for
- 8 Life, that that could happen, or the Maritime
- 9 Festival, etcetera, etcetera. If it's a
- 10 Village-sponsored event, then, of course, the
- 11 criteria for a Village-sponsored event is that it
- incorporates the Village and Village residents.
- So I'll open it up for discussion. How do
- we want to proceed on this? Do we want it --
- 15 TRUSTEE MURRAY: I'll start.
- 16 MAYOR NYCE: What governments usually do is
- 17 appoint a committee.
- 18 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Right, and I think that
- might be a very good idea to do. I feel, with
- the vast number of applications, I think we need
- 21 to stop the permits altogether, except for the
- 22 Village-sponsored events. We're -- if we don't,
- we're going to have something every Saturday and
- every Sunday. We're going to have to allow them,
- and I don't think we want that. I don't think

1	the people want It. I think they want some of
2	it, but I think if we —— if we don't act on this,
3	what's going to happen to that park, we will have
4	more complaints than anything. So my opinion is
5	that we stop mass —— all the permits altogether.
6	MS. PHILLIPS: And just have the Village
7	TRUSTEE MURRAY: And just have the
8	Village-sponsored events.
9	MS. PHILLIPS: Which would have to be
10	approved by the Board.
11	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. And we would have to be
12	either the initiator of the event, or
13	MS. PHILLIPS: One of the sponsors.
14	MAYOR NYCE: One of the sponsors. But we
15	would have to be we would have to participate
16	in the event in some way. So, you know, most of
17	those events are self-explanatory. You know, the
18	Tall Ships Event, clearly, you know, we're not
19	going to issue ourselves a Mass Public Assembly
20	Permit. But, yeah, it would and, at that
21	point, it would have to be a community—driven

22	event.
23	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Right.
24	MAYOR NYCE: And so whoever wants to do the
25	event would have to come make their case that it

is a community-driven event. And I said Relay for Life, that's a major community event, but I still think they would still have to make their case to this Board that it is a community event, at which point we would be — we would get on board as a cosponsor of the event and would then allow it to happen.

The other part of that is that the park would then be just an open public park, and we still would not be able to deny people access to the park. Like say a group wanted to congregate in the park, they wouldn't need a Mass Public Assembly Permit, because we aren't issuing them. They would be allowed to be there as of right, until or unless they're impeding someone else's use of the park, at which point they would be asked to disperse. They can still be there, but

18	they can't they don't have the Mass Public
19	Assembly Permit gives them the authority and the
20	right to use a specified portion of the park,
21	and, as such, they can block access to anyone
22	else to that portion of the park, okay?
23	So, if we don't issue those Mass Public
24	Assembly Permits, then if there's a group
25	congregating and they're denying access to other

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people, then they can be asked to move. 1 2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: To leave. 3 MAYOR NYCE: Not to leave, but to move, and to allow the free passage of people through and 4 5 around the park. 6 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Are they able to set things up? 7 8 MAYOR NYCE: No. 9 TRUSTEE MURRAY: No, right. MAYOR NYCE: That's the other thing that 10 Mass Public Assembly Permits allow, is the use of 11 facilities, electric and all the rest, putting up 12 13 a tent to demarcate the area that you've been

14	given, etcetera, etcetera. So, no, you would not
15	be able to put out tables and chairs, all the
16	rest of that. It would just be an open public
17	park in that scenario, is my understanding.
18	And if I get way out of line, Joe will
19	probably rein me back in.
20	MR. PROKOP: So far, so good.
21	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: But you'd have a
22	restriction like on amplified music or anything
23	else?
24	MAYOR NYCE: There would be no amplified
25	music.

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TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. 1 MAYOR NYCE: Again, if it's a 2 Village-sponsored event, like the Monday Dances 3 4 in the Park --TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Anything but -- people 5 that say, "All right, well, we're not" -- "We 6 don't need a permit, but we're going to come," a 7 band wants to come and play, or they want to do a 8 revival, or a speech, or whatever, there's no 9

10	amplified music or anything, they can't do
11	anything in there?
12	MAYOR NYCE: No. No equipment, no setting
13	up, and they have no guarantee that they're
14	allowed that space.
15	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Right.
16	MAYOR NYCE: Like if there's a protest,
17	say, they can all be there, they can all
18	congregate, but they can't block anyone else's
19	use or access of the park. So they can all be
20	there, but, you know, they can't be in a
21	specified area. Now, if you're going to do a
22	concert, people are going to sit, so in that
23	scenario, no. No, they if it was blocking
24	someone else's use of the park, they would have
25	to disperse or move. And no, no amplified, no

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1 stages, no -- none of that.

2 MR. PROKOP: And the other concerns would

3 be damage to the park and safety issues.

4 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

5 MR. PROKOP: So safety issues would also

- include crowding, and use of facilities, you 6 7 know, things like that. MS. PHILLIPS: You mean, if we didn't have 8 9 a Mass Assembly Permit. MR. PROKOP: Right. 10 11 MAYOR NYCE: Right. 12 MR. PROKOP: The considerations. So it 13 would be -- as Mayor Nyce said, it would be the 14 obstruction of, or exclusive -- the things that 15 we would not permit is obstruction of use of park by public, the other public, of exclusive use of 16 17 some portions of the park, anything that creates 18 nuisance or a health and safety issue, or also 19 potential damage to the park. 20 MAYOR NYCE: Right. 21 MR. PROKOP: Crowding or overcrowding would 22 be an example of a safety issue.
- TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm in agreement with
 Trustee Murray on this one. I certainly have
 lived here long before the park was here, and

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when it was created, that was my belief, that the

intention was for this to be a people's park and an open space to enjoy. And the proliferation of events that have taken place, I can only see that this is going to continue to happen if we don't put an end to it, basically. And I agree, it's the people's park, certainly to be used for public events and things that are being done for the community. That would be my on intention on this.

MAYOR NYCE: Okay. The other side of the discussion is to potentially have an exorbitant fee. I had asked the Village Attorney to make sure that we were authorized, because there was State and Federal money used to create the park, whether we were allowed to set that fee at whatever we wanted, or whether there was a threshold at which the State or Federal Government would step in and say no, we were not allowed to set a fee that high.

MR. PROKOP: So the answer is that the fee has to be — the fee cannot work in a way to — once you decide that you're going to accept a fee for the use of the park, the fee cannot be the mechanism to regulate the use of the park, so the

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1	fee can't be set at a level that's prohibitive,
2	you know, separate from all the other
3	considerations, which I'll mention. But the fee
4	itself cannot unilaterally be set as the
5	mechanisms for prohibiting or regulating the use
6	of the park. The fee should somehow correlate
7	with the cost of the use of the park, but the
8	cost of the use of the park, which we you
9	know, which we don't take into account.
10	There's a lot of administrative time, and
11	also legal time, that's spent in looking into the
12	use you know, dealing with the use of the
13	park. So it's not just, you know, replanting
14	grass and things like that, I mean, there's other
15	things that are taken into account which could be
16	incorporated into the fee.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. But it right, we
18	would have to equate it to there would be a
19	reasonableness, that if this if it went
20	litigious at some point, that it would have to
21	be —— we would be required to show that the fee

was reasonable to recoup monies expended by the

12	year at 2500, that's \$25,000 that goes for the

15	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: It cost us 20,000 just
16	patching the stuff and refilling it.
17	MAYOR NYCE: Right. And then to that end,
18	we're back to what Trustee Murray said, was that

11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, because we're doing
12	in-kind services.
13	MAYOR NYCE: If we sponsor the event.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's Village-sponsored.
15	TRUSTEE MURRAY: If it's Village-sponsored,
16	then
17	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
18	TRUSTEE MURRAY: We could do that, Joe, we
19	could have
20	MR. PROKOP: If it's Village-sponsored.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Joe, well, let me ask you
22	this question: I'm not advocating going down
23	this route, but with a high fee, would we in any
24	way be liable to a lawsuit or hardship thing from
25	an organization that could not afford it, who

could say the Village is discriminating against

people that — organizations that don't have the

funding?

MR. PROKOP: Yes. They're going to say —

they're going to say that they have the right to

a little space in the park. You know, they
