1	(Whereupon, the meeting was called to order
2	at 6:00 p.m.)
3	MAYOR NYCE: We'll call this meeting to
4	order. Please rise and join me for the Pledge of
5	Allegiance.
6	(Whereupon, all stood for the Pledge of
7	Allegiance.)
8	MAYOR NYCE: Thanks. You may be seated.
9	This is the November work session of the Board of
10	Trustees. We have an unusual we have a public
11	hearing that we scheduled for a Wetlands Permit
12	Application. We don't normally do these on work
13	sessions. The applicant is anxious to move
14	forward with the project before the weather gets
15	too horrible. So what I'd like to do
16	actually, the Fire Department is not here, so if
17	nobody minds, maybe we'll take the Wetlands

18 Permit Application first.

19	So I will note that this public hearing was
20	properly noticed; that anybody wishing to comment
21	on this application can do so at this time.
22	Their comments will be taken down for the record.
23	I will ask that the applicant, or the
24	representative of the applicant, introduce the
25	project and we'll go from there.

1	MS. MARTIN: Good evening. Amy Martin of
2	Fairweather and Brown, 205
3	MR. MURRAY: Hold on, Amy.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Sorry. I had turned off this
5	microphone. We don't have this going.
6	MS. MARTIN: Amy Martin, Fairweather and
7	Brown, 205 Bay Avenue in Greenport, representing
8	Emily and Nathaniel "Nat" Ewing. They are the
9	new owners of the Price property at 230 Fourth
10	Street here in Greenport.
11	We have a very straightforward application,
12	we feel, for an addition to the home and a
13	swimming pool to be added to the property. And,

14 hopefully, we have addressed the concerns that 15 the CAC had, that the 10-foot non-turf buffer 16 that the previously owners had asked about should 17 have been in place when the bulkhead was refurbished. It will be addressed when the 18 19 project landscaping is done. And the landscape 20 plan we submitted to you should show that that is 21 on both the seaward side and the Town landing side. There will be a 10-foot non-turf buffer 22 installed and maintained. 23

We have also addressed basic landscaping
concerns for the purpose of this hearing, but --

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and that's addressed on that plan, but the Ewings reserve the right to hire a landscape contractor later to do a more interesting plan when the pool is in place, and whatever. But the basics are there, and they will maintain whatever the permit regulates them to do.

7 The closest section of the pool is proposed
8 at 75 feet from the bulkhead, and there -9 basically, there is no Village Code requiring

10 that, but that is the code that is adhered to in 11 other surrounding townships, so we use that as 12 our maximum to make sure that we're protecting 13 the bay.

All the additions to the home are as-of-right and within the building envelope, and no variance is needed for any of them or sought. And all the drainage from the house will be conveyed by leaders and gutters, two dry wells that will be installed on the property.

The owners, with the help of Rob Brown as Architect, have addressed the changes to the home to keep in character with the neighborhood, and to -- as this is a well-known landmark, they are not really changing, other than making the house larger. They're trying to stay very appropriate

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to the neighborhood.
And I think that's about all I, you know,
have to say. I think we're asking for -- we
have -- the DEC permit is a nonjurisdiction, as
this had a 100-foot bulkhead that predated the

6	jurisdiction of the DEC. It's probably been
7	there for at least 100 years. And I believe even
8	what we are proposing would have been easily
9	granted a permit by the DEC, if it was required.
10	So, if you have any questions.
11	MAYOR NYCE: I think what I'd like to do is
12	open it up, if anyone from the public has
13	comment. But like if there are questions
14	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Actually, could I, since
15	she's up at the podium, ask one of them?
16	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
17	TRUSTEE MURRAY: One of the one of the
18	things that was brought back on the report was a
19	dry well for the pool discharge.
20	MS. MARTIN: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Has that been figured into
22	this plan?
23	MS. MARTIN: I think we showed that on the
24	landscape plan, an approximate location. It's up
25	to the pool contractor to make sure.

TRUSTEE MURRAY: That's going to be a dry

2	well for the pool?
3	MS. MARTIN: There will be a dry well for
4	backwashing the pool.
5	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Okay.
6	MS. MARTIN: And that will be away from the
7	property line, so
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: I don't remember. No, I
9	don't remember seeing that.
10	MR. PALLAS: It's supposed to be to the
11	sanitary sewer, not dry well.
12	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Or sanitary sewer, okay.
13	MR. PALLAS: It's supposed to go to a sewer
14	system.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. So it goes into the
16	sewer, not into the dry well.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry. Could you
18	say that loud enough, because I couldn't quite
19	hear.
20	MR. PALLAS: I'm sorry. One of the CAC
21	recommendations was for the pool discharge water
22	to discharge into the sanitary sewer, as opposed
23	to the dry wells onsite.
24	TRUSTEE MURRAY: As opposed to the dry

25 well, okay.

1	MAYOR NYCE: Which is why it's not on the
2	plan.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
4	MS. MARTIN: We'll be glad to
5	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Thank you.
6	MS. MARTIN: adhere to that.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. Thanks, Amy. Is
8	there anyone from the public who wishes to
9	address the Board on this?
10	MR. CORWIN: (Raised hand.)
11	MAYOR NYCE: If not
12	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: There's Dave.
13	MAYOR NYCE: I'm sorry?
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: In the back.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Please, in the back.
16	MR. CORWIN: My name is David Corwin. The
17	landscape plan for this project shows a lawn,
18	just lawn. It doesn't say what kind of turf it's
19	going to be. So I make the assumption it's going
20	to be Kentucky bluegrass, which I think is a fair
21	assumption. And, of course, Kentucky bluegrass

23	on the plan, and it requires chemicals,
24	fertilizer, pesticides.
25	And there's a policy in the LWRP, the Local

1	Waterfront Revitalization Program, that addresses
2	that particular issue. And I'm sorry, I didn't
3	realize you're having a public hearing this
4	evening, or I would have I would quote the
5	policy. But one thing it says is the Village is
6	supposed to have an educational program for
7	contaminants from lawns going into the water,
8	which the Village doesn't have.
9	And I have to submit to you that when the
10	owner puts fertilizer down on the lawn, it's
11	going to infiltrate right into the sand, the
12	sandy soil there, and then it's just going to run
13	into the groundwater out into Widow's Hole,
14	eventually to Peconic Bay.
15	Part of the fertilizer, of course, is
16	nitrogen, and there's a big problem with the
17	nitrogen added into the bay. If you go on the
18	Sound and the bays way to the west on Long

19 Island, they have a problem with hypoxia, I don't 20 know if I said that right, with all the oxygen 21 being used up in the water, and then, of course, 22 the fish die. You usually read -- you didn't 23 read so much this year, but you usually read in 24 Newsday about these inlets on the Sound where all 25 the fish die, and what they attribute that to is

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1 the fertilizer, the nitrogen, and the salt water. 2 The nitrogen is the governing factor, and the 3 fresh water, the phosphorous is the governing factor. So the nitrogen goes into the water, 4 acts as fertilizer in the bay water and creek 5 6 water, and it encourages these algae blooms. So, 7 when the homeowner puts fertilizer down in the 8 water, again, it's going to infiltrate, it's 9 going to go right out into Widow's Hole. 10 "That little bit of fertilizer, how much is 11 that going to hurt," the homeowner says. And I say you add up the condominiums near Sixth 12 13 Street, and Fifth Street, the lawns on Fourth

14 Street, the park -- I don't know if the park is

using fertilizer or not. I had asked when it was originally built that they use a grass that didn't need so much fertilizer. Of course, that wouldn't happen.

I question this application because it's turf grass, Kentucky bluegrass, and it's going to put contaminants into Widow's Hole, into the bay. Right out there, we have a -- or a gentleman has an oyster growing operation. It seems to be working very well, God bless him. I think it's a wonderful thing. But as each one of these homes

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1 gets improved, and they plant Kentucky bluegrass, 2 it's more nitrogen into the water. And I'm just 3 totally opposed to planting Kentucky bluegrass on 4 these parcels right next to the water. I think 5 it's wrong, and I think the Village should make arrangements with the applicant that they use 6 7 some kind of grass besides Kentucky bluegrass. 8 Thank you.

9 MAYOR NYCE: Thank you. Anyone else that 10 wishes to address the Board before you address 11 that?

12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have a question.
13	MAYOR NYCE: All right. Then, Amy, go
14	ahead, if you want.
15	MS. MARTIN: As I mentioned, the plan is
16	basic. We addressed the issue we were told that
17	was an earlier concern. I've just been told that
18	the homeowner does not want to have lawn all the
19	way out there, that he will be reducing the
20	amount of lawn. And we will definitely adhere to
21	whatever the Board requires of us.
22	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
23	MS. MARTIN: And we are very sensitive.
24	You know, I mean, I know all the properties along
25	there have grass to the bulkheads. Very few of

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1	them have any other, you know, constraints,
2	because they were done before everything was in
3	place. But the homeowner does not want to create
4	any problems.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Understood. Is there anyone

else from the public that wishes to address the

7	Board	on	this?

9	MAYOR NYCE: Any questions? Trustee
10	Phillips, you had question?
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You answered it, because
12	I thought I was missing paperwork out of here.
13	MAYOR NYCE: Okay. If that's the case,
14	then close the public hearing?
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes.
16	MAYOR NYCE: Someone make that motion.
17	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I make a motion we close
18	the public hearing.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Is there a second?
20	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Second.
21	MAYOR NYCE: All those in favor?
22	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.
23	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.

1	MAY	OR NYCE:	Ay	/e.
2	Any	opposed	or	abstentions?

3 (No response.)

MAYOR NYCE: The motion carries. 4 5 Understanding that the applicant has 6 stipulated to -- oh, I'm sorry. I do also want 7 to read in that the Conservation Advisorv Council 8 from the Village of Greenport did review the 9 project. They had three notes. One was that the 10 applicant must provide facilities to discharge 11 the pool water into the sanitary sewer, which 12 you've heard from Mr. Pallas they have arranged 13 to do. The second is the applicant is encouraged 14 to provide landscaping that does not require the 15 use of pesticides or fertilizer, as you heard Mr. 16 Corwin speak to. And note number three, the 17 applicant must provide a 10-foot no-turf buffer at rear of property, as required in prior 18 19 wetlands permit, as you've heard from Ms. Martin 20 they've already acquiesced to.

I agree in almost all of -- with almost all of what Mr. Corwin said. The difficulty with a lot of the stuff is that, as a municipality, you can't require -- to have requirements for every plant that's planted gets a little cumbersome. 1 It has been the Village's policy to not use 2 fertilizers on our properties, and we've 3 encouraged property owners not to use fertilizers 4 as well. Also, as part of the MS4 Program, that 5 for now we are participating in, there's a large 6 move to eliminate fertilizers on properties that 7 are adjacent to the water.

8 As to the type of grass, I don't know that 9 we're going to be able to stipulate what type of 10 grass they plant. And while I appreciate 11 Mr. Corwin's comments and what the implications 12 are, I don't know that we would be in a very -- I don't know if we would be in a position to -- a 13 defensible position, if we started requiring them 14 15 to plant a specific type of grass. That's a 16 stated question for the Village Attorney.

17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Unless Suffolk County18 tells us to.

MR. PROKOP: Once it comes through the -well, we have to do a SEQRA -- we will do a SEQRA
consideration at the meeting. It may become part
of that. But, generally, that's not a condition.
MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

24		MR.	PROK)P: 1	[t's	not	the	type	e of	grass
25	that	you	would	tell	them	to	do,	but	you	may

1 restrict use -- you know, activities on the 2 grass.

MAYOR NYCE: Right, that's what I thought. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that's most of what the Peconic Bay Estuary is doing, is that they're suggesting that certain types of non-fertilizer, or was looking for --

8 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- as I said, product or 10 vegetation. But it's an interesting -- it's an 11 interesting discussion that's going to be coming 12 up in the future, considering we're on the 13 waterway a lot.

MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely. And the other
thing that I had asked them, if we have this on
here tonight, they are anxious to move forward.
The Village Attorney has reminded me that we have
to do a SEQRA resolution.

19 MR. PROKOP: We could do that at the

20	meeting if
21	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. I was just going to
22	suggest that we give them the authorization to
23	move forward.
24	MR. PROKOP: Oh.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Which we can't do at this

1	meeting. Does the Board have a problem with
2	having them starting all of the other work, and
3	that as of Monday, then we could give them
4	authorization to start?
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Never really done that
6	before.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The regular building
8	permit. You're referring to the regular building
9	permit that they can commence, just not the work
10	on the pool?
11	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. Do you guys is
12	that a
13	MS. MARTIN: They would like to do
14	demolition and things inside the house, and start
15	with those things, not

16	MAYOR NYCE: The Wetland Permit Application
17	would not preclude you from getting a demo
18	permit, so that's what if there are other
19	things that you could to get started, I guess the
20	general feeling of the Board is positive to
21	the to this application, so
22	MR. PROKOP: That would be fine. It's only
23	the wetlands
24	MAYOR NYCE: So if you could do that, and
25	then we would approve the wetlands permit, which

1	is the only thing we're going to approve anyhow.
2	All of the other building permit stuff you can do
3	as of right through the Building Department, and
4	wouldn't yeah, you wouldn't need further
5	authorization from us.
6	MR. BROWN: When will the Board resolve all
7	of the issues?
8	MAYOR NYCE: A week from tonight. That
9	would be a week from tonight.
10	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: The 24th.
11	MR. BROWN: In the meantime, we could file

12	for the building permit?
13	MAYOR NYCE: Yes.
14	MR. PROKOP: Is the building going to be
15	within the wetlands buffer, the wetlands area or
16	buffer?
17	MS. MARTIN: No.
18	MR. PROKOP: The building that you're
19	talking about?
20	MR. BROWN: No.
21	MR. PROKOP: No?
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's existing.
23	MR. PROKOP: Then it's okay.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's a pre-existing
25	building.

1	MS. MARTIN: Well over 100. The building
2	itself is over 100 feet from the wetlands.
3	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
4	MR. PROKOP: That's fine. So you just
5	can't have any activity within the wetlands area
6	until
7	MS. MARTIN: The pool is 75 feet.

8	MAYOR NYCE: Right. The pool is 75, so the
9	pool would fall within the 100 feet. So you'd
10	have to wait a week on starting the pool, but you
11	could certainly start on the house, if that's
12	does that seem a reasonable resolution?
13	TRUSTEE MURRAY: (Nodded yes.)
14	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yes.
15	MAYOR NYCE: Fantastic. All right. So we
16	will put it on the if you could have the SEQRA
17	resolution.
18	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
19	MAYOR NYCE: And put it on the agenda for
20	Monday for approval. Thank you all very much.
21	MR. BROWN: Thank you very much. Thank you
22	all for your consideration.
23	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
24	
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Next would be the monthly report from the
 Fire Department. The Chief is still not here.
 They had nothing that they needed from us, except

4 accepting their reports. But I wanted to ask the Village Clerk to reach out to the Fire Department 5 and the Board of Wardens. They had asked about 6 7 setting up a meeting, which we should do for 8 early December some time. I know that they had 9 gotten -- we gave them some financial breakdowns 10 on the project they're talking about for 11 improvements to the building here at Station 1. 12 I know that they have that information now. So 13 if you could work with the Fire Department and 14 get back to us as to availability for a joint 15 meeting. 16 Were there any -- does anyone have any 17 questions or comments about the Fire Department's 18 report this month? 19 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I didn't. 20 MAYOR NYCE: Okay, terrific. So moving on 21 to Village Administrator, Paul Pallas. And 22 you're going to start, Paul, with the Road 23 Department or ---24 MR. PALLAS: Well, the -- as we've been 25 doing, I have all the reports in your package. I

just want to point out some highlights. My
 highlights, unfortunately, are not in the same
 order as the reports, but, you know, I apologize
 for that.

I'll start with the Building Department. 5 As I talked about at the last meeting, the Rental 6 7 Law Permit has been started. The first section 8 was mailed out the beginning of the month. We 9 are doing it by tax map section, there's six 10 sections. There's actually seven, but one of 11 them is parks, so it's really six sections. Over 12 the course of six months, all areas should be at 13 least mailed out.

14 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

15 MR. PALLAS: And then appointments will

16 follow up subsequent to that.

17 MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

MR. PALLAS: With the Recreation
Department, the Ice Rink has started to be put
together. We did purchase a new office trailer.
As you are aware, every season we moved a wooden
building from the campground over to the Ice Rink
area. Not a good idea to move a wood constructed
building, so we've purchased an office trailer,

1	that. We purchased one. We will continue to
2	rent the second one, as we've done over the
3	years. But this office trailer now is a
4	replacement of the wooden one.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Not to backtrack, Paul.
6	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
7	MAYOR NYCE: I want to go back for a
8	second. Under the Building Department, you'll
9	notice that they've listened appearance tickets,
10	and all the rest of it. You should note that the
11	address is the address of the property owner, not
12	necessarily the property. So there's some listed
13	in Islip
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And Manorville.
15	MAYOR NYCE: and etcetera, etcetera.
16	That's so the address is listed to the
17	property owner, not the actual physical property,
18	so that there's no confusion there.
19	MR. PALLAS: And I think we handed out I
20	think Sylvia handout a revised copy that shows

21 the location of the occurrence as well.

MAYOR NYCE: So that would be me without
the revised copy, letting you know that -TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah, it was given this
evening.

1	MAYOR NYCE: There you go. Okay. So,
2	sorry.
3	MR. PALLAS: It's quite all right. And in
4	terms of revenue, Recreation Center itself,
5	revenue was up 24, a little over \$2400, which was
6	a good thing. The Marina revenue was up a little
7	over \$7,000 compared to October of last year.
8	Again, that's, you know, a positive trend there.
9	MAYOR NYCE: Uh-huh.
10	MR. PALLAS: At the Road Barn, we've built
11	sand and salt storage bins out of I forget
12	what they're called, large concrete bunkers,
13	essentially
14	MAYOR NYCE: Yup.
15	MR. PALLAS: to segregate salt and sand
16	within the renovated area that the Road Crew,

17	Road Barn Crew did themselves. They did all the
18	work, physical work themselves on both the
19	renovation. I think I have reported on that, but
20	the now they've gone the next step with the
21	salt and storage bins, essentially, that are
22	protected from the weather now, which is,
23	again
24	MAYOR NYCE: That's terrific.
25	MR. PALLAS: all done inhouse without

1	having to expend any additional funds.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.
3	MR. PALLAS: The Sewer Department, the
4	aerator for the sludge holding tank was
5	installed, put in service on November 5th.
6	Hopefully, that will alleviate any of the issues
7	they've been having there.
8	MAYOR NYCE: That will become much more
9	evident come spring, as the warmer weather
10	MR. PALLAS: Yeah. It's tough in the
11	winter to tell, but, hopefully, in the spring
12	we'll know for certain.

13 In the Electric Department, one of the 14 items for the upgrade project was replacement of 15 an air compressor. We were able to do that 16 inhouse as well, we didn't have to hire a contractor. We did that, did some repiping. 17 18 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. 19 MR. PALLAS: Rebuilt the compressor. So we've, again, done some work inhouse, which saved 20 21 some money as well. 22 Those are the highlights. I do have four resolutions that aren't in the package that will 23 be ready for Monday. The first is a security 24 system. As I'm sure you're aware, a number of 25

1	months ago, we had put out an RFP. We had
2	received three proposals. We are recommending,
3	and I believe I had sent that out to the Board
4	prior, recommending Hamptons and North Fork
5	Technology Professionals' proposal. Total cost
6	is 35,430. We're not going to do all of it at
7	this time. It's kind of done by site. Each
8	individual Village site has a separate price, and

9	we're going to do, I think, Village Hall, Waste
10	Water Treatment Plant, the Power Plant, the Road
11	Barn and the Skate Park at this time.
12	MAYOR NYCE: And then the Firehouse is
13	going to be, and Mitchell Park
14	MR. PALLAS: Mitchell Park will be in the
15	spring or early summer of next year. The Fire
16	Department, we're going to wait to get something
17	from the Fire Department on that.
18	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
19	MR. PALLAS: So that was the first
20	resolution.
21	The second one is a change in a contract
22	between the Village and Adventure Treks.
23	Adventure Treks manages the Marina and the
24	recreation facilities. Since I came here
25	since I've been here, I've increased some of the

1	responsibilities in that area, and it does
2	with that increased responsibility, it does
3	warrant an increase in the contract price,
4	requesting it to go from 2,079.50, paid twice a

5 month, to 2500 paid twice each month. Again, I
6 have the details that I had sent out to you as
7 well on that.

8 MAYOR NYCE: Yes. Jeff has taken on a 9 great deal more responsibility over the last year 10 or so, not only in the park, but running the 11 campground. And now with Sarah Totten being full 12 time, also that takes in the Carousel, he's 13 taking in the Rink. So he started as just the 14 Marina Manager, and now really is doing most of the Recreation Department stuff, and I believe 15 16 actually is even overseeing some of what Cathy 17 does, Cathy Matthews does at the Rec. Center 18 itself. 19 MR. PALLAS: Yes, correct. 20 MAYOR NYCE: So for all intents and 21 purposes, he's become Paul's assistant in the 22 Rec. portion of the Village, where Derryl is in 23 the Utility portion.

- 24 MR. PALLAS: Right.
- 25 MAYOR NYCE: So he has taken on a great

1 deal more responsibility.

MR. PALLAS: The third one, actually, I 2 3 need to request an Executive Session. It's 4 related to the performance of a particular 5 employee. So if I could have an Executive Session, a brief one after this meeting, I'd 6 7 appreciate it. MAYOR NYCE: Uh-huh. 8 9 MR. PALLAS: And the last resolution I 10 have, as part of the process of reviewing the 11 outage that happened in August, the Power 12 Authority, and we, in my report, also details that a thorough review of the installation is 13 14 warranted. I reached out to -- and the Power 15 Authority has basically mandated it at this point -- have reached out to a company, A&F 16 17 Testing, who's done some work for us, a very 18 reputable firm. They have given me a proposal, which I have forwarded to the Board. 19 I would 20 also ask that if we could vote on this tonight to 21 keep this process moving. The Power Authority 22 has requested a report in a timely fashion. Even 23 a week will make a difference at this point to 24 move this forward. Total cost for that is 25 55,150.

1	MR. PROKOP: Do you have an extra copy of
2	that so I can see, please?
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I have a copy of it, Joe.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul, as I asked you
5	earlier today, the report that's being generated
6	is a little bit different than the one that we've
7	received from American Electric.
8	MR. PALLAS: Yes. The one from American
9	Electric was really looking at the components of
10	the system, as opposed to the system as a whole.
11	This one is really going to look at the entire
12	system, including the engineering, to see that
13	the system functions together as a unit, as
14	opposed to individually.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So it will be reviewing
16	what our contractors did and our engineer
17	created?
18	MR. PALLAS: Yeah, at a very high level,
19	but yes, yes, to make sure that it will function
20	the way that it was intended, yes.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That was the

first question. The other question was after this report has been generated and we've had a chance to review it, and if it should give some indication of changes that need to be made, or

1	some errors that were made, do we have any
2	recourse, after this report has been reviewed, to
3	go back to our contractor and engineer?
4	MR. PALLAS: I think we always do. You
5	know, it's a question of whether there's money
6	left to hold back. And as far as I know, they
7	have not been fully paid at this point, so there
8	would be money held back, if there were egregious
9	problems found. Obviously, if there are minor
10	wiring issues, you know, A to B kind of thing,
11	it's not egregious. But if it doesn't function,
12	certainly, that's an issue.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But, I mean, that is one
14	of the
15	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's one of the
17	overall, looking at the whole project, to make

18 sure that it's almost like an audit of what happened? 19 20 MR. PALLAS: Yes. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 21 22 MR. PALLAS: Yes. TRUSTEE MURRAY: Now, Paul, I mean, we're 23 going to get looked at and saying why are we 24 spending this money at this point. And didn't we 25

1	have this done six months ago, if I remember? We
2	had somebody came in and analyzed what we did
3	and
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That was American
5	Electric.
6	TRUSTEE MURRAY: American Electric.
7	MR. PALLAS: Right.
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: And now we're looking to
9	spend \$55,000. I can only imagine what some
10	people are going to say about this.
11	MR. PALLAS: Well, American Electric,
12	again, they did more of a component-by-component
13	review, and not really a system overview. You

14	know, as part of what A&F Testing is going to do,
15	they're going to look at that as well, but
16	they're also going to look at the bigger picture
17	and see again, to make sure that the whole
18	system, from the transformer, high-side breaker
19	all the way to the distribution system, does
20	function together as a unit, and that's the
21	difference between the two testing.
22	MAYOR NYCE: And what the other testing
23	was, was the wiring to and from the transformer.
24	MR. PALLAS: Right. And this is much
25	broader than that. This is yeah.

1	MR. PROKOP: Did you you read the
2	conditions?
3	MR. PALLAS: I reviewed them, yeah.
4	MAYOR NYCE: I mean, clearly, I'm not happy
5	with the situation, having to spend, you know,
6	money again. That being said, I don't know that
7	we have a whole lot of choice. What I would like
8	to do is review what they come up with very
9	carefully, and if there is anything in that that

10 we can go back to either the engineering, or the contractors, or the other testing company, they 11 12 all have to be bonded. I mean, I understand we 13 have -- we've paid the other testing company, but 14 if there is something that comes out of this that shows, you know, something should have been 15 16 caught, I want to go after them immediately. 17 MR. PALLAS: Okay. 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think you're 19 also running into the issue that we also need 20 to -- once this report is generated, we also need 21 to look at the original plans from Mr. Braun's 22 company and make sure that things were clearly --23 clearly spelled out, or issues were put on the

24 table.

25 My understanding is that the only company

30

that hasn't been paid is we had to have \$7,000 retainage from Hawkeye; that I believe, if I checked, was deducted from their voucher payment. But I think the other companies have all been paid. So that's -- you know, I know you said you

6	haven't signed off of them. I'm not sure what
7	transpired before Paul got involved with that
8	portion of it.
9	MAYOR NYCE: I don't there was money
10	still.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Okay, because I
12	asked the question and it was kind of like no one
13	could give me a straight answer.
14	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah, I know. I believe there
15	is money still owed.
16	MR. BRANDT: There's retainage with that.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did all of them have
18	retainage, Robert?
19	MR. BRANDT: No, just Hawkeye.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just Hawkeye had the
21	retainage.
22	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. But I believe, if
23	we do find a design defect or engineering defect,
24	or whatever, we do have recourse as a Board to
25	say, "This is what we found out, this was not

done properly," and then we'll have to address

2	that through the Village Attorney. But, I mean,
3	even if they've already been paid, we have a
4	recourse back on that.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I think that's
6	I mean, I think we all need to kind of be on the
7	same plain. And once this report comes out, this
8	is something we will be doing.
9	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
10	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yes.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I think that's
12	only reasonable and
13	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: and fair, not only to
15	those who are the company, but also to us, who
16	have been dealing with this, and ratepayers. I
17	mean, in the end, this is part of the upgrade in
18	the capital improvements.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Yes, it is.
20	MR. PROKOP: Do they know when this will be
21	done?
22	MR. PALLAS: I'm sorry?
23	MR. PROKOP: When will this work be
24	completed?
25	MR. PALLAS: I just communicated with him

1	today. He thinks he can start within a week or
2	two.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, we have a
4	deadline.
5	MR. PROKOP: Because there's time limits.
6	If we're going to if we end up in a situation
7	where we have to make a claim against the
8	contractor, there's time limits, so I'll have to
9	check the time limits.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I was
11	asking.
12	MR. PROKOP: But we're pretty you know,
13	I'm sure that it's pretty tight.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: They said they would
15	need they're going to need eight weeks to
16	generate the report, from what I remember.
17	MR. PALLAS: I'm sure we can cut that down.
18	I think that's their boiler plate language.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah? Okay.
20	MR. PROKOP: Does this cover enough?
21	MR. PALLAS: Yes.
22	MR. PROKOP: The scope is broad enough?

23	MR.	PALLAS:	Yes.

24 MR. PROKOP: Okay.

25 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We're also, from a time

1	label —— I mean, on a timetable from NYPA, are we
2	not?
3	MR. PALLAS: Correct, yes.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We need to have this
5	completed by?
6	MR. PALLAS: The end of January.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: February, actually.
8	MR. PALLAS: Yes, the report to them in
9	February, I believe.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: In February, okay.
11	MR. PALLAS: I believe we'll have all the
12	testing done then.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So we really okay.
14	Do you know what line item this is coming out of,
15	or you're taking out of the fund balance, out of
16	the Electric Fund?
17	MAYOR NYCE: Come out of yeah, come out
18	of

19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

20 MAYOR NYCE: For the capital improvement.

21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just wanted to
22 know where it's coming from.

23 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. I am upset that this 24 money is not going to an actual improvement, but 25 is going to do something, part of which we have

1	already done, which I'm not happy about. But I
2	don't see I don't see any other recourse. But
3	I agree with Trustee Phillips, that if
4	anything if there's anything in this at all,
5	that I want to go very aggressively after anyone
6	who may have been responsible.
7	So is the Board comfortable with taking
8	action on this tonight?
9	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yes, yeah.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.

18	cost of \$55,150.00 total. To be expensed from
19	Account E.0352.205. Completion of this review
20	and verification will satisfy requirements, as
21	directed by the New York Power Authority. So
22	moved.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
24	MAYOR NYCE: By way of discussion, you're

25 comfortable?

1	MR. PROKOP: I'm okay. I just think the
2	resolution should state that it's professional
3	services contract, because it's not
4	MAYOR NYCE: So, by way of in that
5	discussion, I'd like to note that in this
6	resolution, it's hiring professional services?

9	We'll have it tomorrow.

2	TREASURER BRANDT: Right.
3	MAYOR NYCE: That's what it was.
4	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: It could wait until

6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
7	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: That's why it was there
8	and it got taken back off.
9	MAYOR NYCE: The days are starting to run

11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. And then the
12	other question I think that I've had is that I
13	asked for a copy of the agreement that's been for
14	a long time with the Maritime Museum, and I was
15	just hoping that we've been we've now done air
16	conditioning, we've now done the roof, we've
17	spent some money on the building. I think it's
18	time we looked at their agreements, since I think
19	it's 1996.
20	MAYOR NYCE: Sure.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I think it's
22	time.
23	MAYOR NYCE: I mean, the stuff that we've
24	done, we're responsible for doing anyway.

1 understanding --2 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: -- that we're 3 responsible for it, but I think that any part of 4 5 that agreement was money that the Museum was 6 supposed to be paying us back over a certain time 7 period for the original establishment of the Museum. I'm not sure if that has ever taken 8 9 place. There's quite a few things in there I 10 think that we need to look at and review it. 11 MAYOR NYCE: Okay. 12 TREASURER BRANDT: Okay. 20	CLERK PIRILLO: The two Village voter
21	registration days will be on the 5th and 7th of
22	March, respectively. On the 5th, which is a
23	Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, the 7th,
24	is 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.
25	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.

1	CLERK PIRILLO: Okay. So I just wanted to,
2	as public service announcements, reiterate those,
3	if we will.
4	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
5	CLERK PIRILLO: As an add-on, because we
6	can't go without one, we have Robert, I
7	believe, advised the Board in writing that the
8	State Local Match Program for FEMA has training,

9 and it's mandatory. It will be held this week, as a matter of fact, and we just found out 10 recently it's November 19th, so upcoming. We 11 are -- we don't -- excuse me. We don't have it 12 on either of our work session reports yet, 13 14 because we're contemplating who's going. 18	CLERK PIRILLO: Clearly.
19	TRUSTEE MURRAY: No, we want to keep the
20	award.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Oh, right, sorry. Frommer's,
22	huh? We're the cutest village.
23	CLERK PIRILLO: Cutest.
24	MAYOR NYCE: That's cool. All right.
25	CLERK PIRILLO: All right. Any questions?

1	MAYOR NYCE: No.
2	CLERK PIRILLO: Or comments?
3	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That's all you got?
4	CLERK PIRILLO: I'm short and sweet
5	tonight.
6	MAYOR NYCE: I would say, since you guys
7	are short-staffed, I understand the FEMA thing
8	is mandatory, if it's not necessary for all three
9	of you to go, and it's one of those things where
10	somebody can go and collect information and bring
11	it back, I would be more comfortable with that.
12	CLERK PIRILLO: Which is why
13	MR. PALLAS: May I?
14	CLERK PIRILLO: Sure.
15	MR. PALLAS: The session is only two hours.
16	And it's in Riverhead?
17	CLERK PIRILLO: It's in Riverhead.
18	MR. PALLAS: It's in Riverhead.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's a Cornell
20	CLERK PIRILLO: It's a Cornell Cooperative.
21	It's not an all day.
22	MAYOR NYCE: So it's a half day?
23	MR. PALLAS: And there's two different
24	sessions, one in the morning, one in the
25	afternoon. So we would if all three go, we

1	would split it.	
2	CLERK PIRILLO: There	's different ways to

4	MAYOR NYCE: Gotcha,	okay.

18	MAYOR NYCE: Anything	else for Sylvia?
19	Thank you, Sylvia.	
20	CLERK PIRILLO: Thank	you.
21	MAYOR NYCE: Next rep	ort will be from

22 Village Attorney, Joseph Prokop.

23 MR. PROKOP: Thank you, sir.

24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are we going to continue

25 from Code Committee or what?

52

MAYOR NYCE: Pick it up from where we left
 off.

3 MR. PROKOP: Good evening. Thank you. So I have -- the bulk of my report was for -- to let 4 you know about Code Enforcement, things that are 5 happening as far as there's been a number of 6 7 violations that were issued. I have -- these are 8 starting to come up in Court. And, you know, 9 there's a process when they get -- you have the issuance dates. There's sort of an extended 10 11 process where they get on the court calendar in the Justice Court, and then we start my end of 12 it, which is the actual prosecution and 13 14 resolution.

We have two trials that are pending in
December that are coming up, and fairly
significant charges that were written. We have

18	the enforcement of a prior trial that we were
19	successful. And there were directions from the
20	Court as a result of that trial that have not
21	been complied with, so we're working on that.
22	There's been a number of other cases now that the
23	prosecution of which is now pending in Court.
24	We have two Local there's two Local Laws
25	that came out of the Code Committee that are

being finalized, as far as the Code Committee was
concerned. They were attached to my report, and
I think they're going to make it on the agenda.
CLERK PIRILLO: (Nodded yes.)
MAYOR NYCE: They're for
MR. PROKOP: For public hearing. And I did
a lot of work during the month on the Fire
Department pumper acquisition. You know, I only
you know, I didn't I was very careful with
the billing, but I wanted to assist the project
to make sure that it went ahead successfully, but
it was a I dealt with the sales the company
is out of state, it's an out-of-state company,

but it has a Long Island sales rep., and that's
basically who we're dealing with regarding the
pumper.
And I think that was basically what I
wanted to go through. Does anybody have any
questions about anything in my report?
(No response.)
MR. PROKOP: Okay. Thank you.
MAYOR NYCE: Thank you, Joe. Under Reports
from Committees, we had a Code Committee meeting
today. The Code Committee does not have any
specific action necessary for this Board from

1	this month. No, there was nothing, there was
2	nothing to report from that committee. They're
3	moving they have accepted, the Code Committee
4	did accept that they will they will start
5	looking at the overall R–2 Zoning throughout the
6	Village and the transient rental property.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And throwing the
8	artists' lofts in along with it.
9	MAYOR NYCE: And throwing the artists'

10 lofts into that as well.

11		I	'll ask	Trust	tee	Robins	if	she	wants	to
12	give	an	update	from	the	BID				

13 TRUSTEE ROBINS: The BID, a pretty busy 14 time of year. There were two meetings. There 15 was their regular meeting on October 23rd, and 16 I'll give you a summary of what we discussed 17 there.

18 They talked about coordinating the 19 Shellabration, which is going to be -- I think 20 its the third year, kind of a celebration of 21 seafood being served throughout the Village, 22 coordinated with different restaurants, and an 23 opportunity to kind of kick off the holiday 24 season. So the decision was made to do that on 25 December 6th and coordinate it with the Village

1	tree lighting.
2	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So we'll work with Clerk
4	Pirillo to schedule that accordingly.
5	Linda Kessler, who is on the Maritime

6 Committee, reported that the festival this year
7 was a great success. They look forward to a new
8 organization of that event, and, you know,
9 continuing to work to make that a better
10 fundraiser for them.

11 The dates were set for the annual meeting. 12 There was an organizational meeting held on 13 November 5th, and the annual meeting, which was 14 held on November 13th at Claudio's. On the 15 agenda was the appointment of Kim Loper from 16 Harbor Pets to become a new appointee. She was 17 appointed by the Village Board.

18 A little bit of update on tourism. The 19 East End Tourism Alliance has reorganized. The 20 Long Island Convention and Visitors Bureau is 21 working on a \$600,000 grant for the North Fork. 22 That's part of a regional grant being allocated 23 by Governor Cuomo.

A contract and check for \$25,000 has been sent to the Hermione, which is going to be the

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lead vessel of the Tall Ships Festival. I think

2 I mentioned last time that some members of the 3 BID attended a gala on the Intrepid to kick off the event of the Hermione coming here, which is 4 5 really quite a -- quite a story. It was attended by a lot of very notable people. And the BID 6 7 used it as an opportunity to reach out to some of their priority sponsors. So that was the -- that 8 9 was the beginning of their looking for new 10 sponsors.

Clerk Pirillo is going to draft a letter to 11 12 primary sponsors that will include optional sponsorship levels, P.R. about the Hermione, a 13 video link of the launch of the Hermione. And 14 what would be included in a primary sponsorship 15 16 would be actually for the sponsor to support an 17 entire vessel, or share in the support of an 18 entire vessel, and that would entitle then to do 19 some very nice things, including I think a dinner 20 on the boat of the night of their arrival.

I think the Mayor and Peter Clarke met with the new Head of the Long Island Convention and Visitors Bureau, who's looking to promote the Tall Ships event as an international event. So there's a lot of interest in P.R. going on out

1	there right now, and we're going to definitely
2	take advantage of their reach and their money to
3	help us to promote the event.
4	We also and also at that meeting, a
5	presentation was made by the people from Peconic
6	Landing, with an overview of their current
7	operation and their plan of expansion.
8	Can I bore you a little bit with the
9	organizational meeting now?
10	MAYOR NYCE: Sure.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia, I just want to
13	just double
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You said that the BID
16	issued a check for 25,000?
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No. We, the Board, we
18	did. I'm just reporting that
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: the first 25,000 of the
21	50,000 contract for the Hermione was sent to the
22	Hermione.

23	TRUSTEE	PHILLIPS:	0kay.	I just want
24	TRUSTEE	ROBINS:	So we're	retaining them.
25	TRUSTEE	PHILLIPS:	Right.	I took it that

1	you were saying that the BID did it.
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So the organizational
5	meeting was held on November 5th, and they
6	discussed the goals and achievements from 2014,
7	which were to animate the waterfront, to support
8	new marine-related businesses.
9	Capital improvements achieved in 2014 were
10	a brochure rack in the schoolhouse for all of the
11	promotional literature about the Village, some
12	new trash containers, and working with the
13	Village to have all the plants watered throughout
14	the course of the season.
15	Communication and advertising, Peter Clarke
16	says that this was the best year ever for that.
17	Caroline Waloski suggests that we do better
18	planning to create advertising events that

19	promote the Village. Peter suggested that the
20	BID hire someone as a part-time Administrative
21	Assistant to help them with these events.
22	Jan Claudio reports that Katharine
23	Schroeder, who does the work on the social media
24	and their website, is working on a weekly
25	communication with businesses what's going on.

1	Then they went into their mission statement
2	and policy priorities for 2016, which are
3	which are Code Enforcement, a BID map, business
4	development, and a clear BID mission. They also
5	talked about the three key things are
6	communication, to promote the Tall Ships event,
7	and they're talking about expanding the BID
8	footprint. The BID original charter, I think,
9	was only within the Village and yeah. And
10	they're talking about expanding that beyond.
11	There is a lot of interest, people that would
12	like to be, you know, included in the Greenport
13	Village Business District. So that would require
14	a rewriting of the Charter, basically, and the

hiring of an attorney, so they are -- that's one
of the things they're going to be looking into
for 2015 and '16.

18 Their goals are communication and outreach, use of Facebook, the web, and Twitter, social 19 20 media as a way to promote the Village and have 21 people be able to find out what's going here; 22 events at the schoolhouse, Shop Local Campaign, 23 supporting local merchant groups, business development, and the use of a philosophy for what 24 25 gets posted on Facebook. They want to make sure

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that there's a similar message, that people
 aren't just putting anything out there, which can
 happen with social media.

The other thing is that they'd like to have a welcome package, providing all new businesses with information about contacts at Village Hall, how to outreach new businesses, and possibly a monthly newsletter. So, basically, their top priority, again, is communication. That's going to be their theme in 2015–16. 11 So thank you very much.

MAYOR NYCE: Terrific. That brings us to
reports from the Mayor and Trustees. I'll ask
Trustee Hubbard to start it off.

15 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Okay. Just a couple of16 quick things.

17 The Tree Committee had their meeting. The 18 bid specs, I believe, came back in for the trees 19 and the stumps, and all that, so that should be 20 worked on this week, so they can get going on 21 that, get all that taken care of before winter.

22 With the Union, the MOA, the draft MOA was 23 forwarded to the Union today, so they're going to 24 discuss that. And then, hopefully, they're going 25 to schedule a vote and go from there, or they'll

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get back to us with changes, or whatever. Got
 the paperwork in, you know, we all saw last week,
 they got it today. So, hopefully, we'll have an
 answer for that for next week.

5 MAYOR NYCE: That would be terrific.
6 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: I believe they're trying

7 to schedule a meeting before Thanksgiving, but8 I'm not sure.

9 MAYOR NYCE: Right.

10 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: It depends on how they
11 can work that out, but that's where that's going.
12 MAYOR NYCE: Terrific.

13 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Also, I did attend the 14 meeting at Saint Agnes School with the Guardian Angels; very informative. Don't know where it's 15 all going to go from there, but it was a couple 16 17 of hours. And a lot of comments, words, and everything else, it was interesting. So we'll 18 19 see what happens with that. And other meetings, 20 they talked about scheduling everything else. 21 MAYOR NYCE: I have an update on that. 22 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Right, okay. One thing 23 that did come out of that, I know we used to get 24 updates from the Police Department. A few things 25 that were said at that, that I didn't know were

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going on around here. If you could get back to
 like a monthly update or something from the

3	Police Department, which is a few things that
4	happened in town that I had no idea about.
5	MAYOR NYCE: Okay.
6	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: So I think, as a Board,
7	to get that update, at least we know where we can
8	try to look or observe things, or whatever, it
9	would be informative.
10	MAYOR NYCE: Sure. I will send an email to
11	Chief Flatley tomorrow.
12	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Yeah. It could be brief,
13	just in general. Just some of the things that
14	went on, you know, I didn't know, that other
15	people brought up at the meeting. I'm like,
16	"Wow, I didn't know that."
17	MAYOR NYCE: Right.
18	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: You know, so that was it.
19	MAYOR NYCE: Fair enough. Thank you.
20	Trustee Robins?
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I didn't attend any
22	committee meetings, but I will speak also to the
23	meeting that George just referred to, where
24	the Curtis Sliwa spoke over at Saint Agnes.
25	It was a well-attended meeting of a lot of

concerned citizens. And I thought that the
 meeting was very informative. I was impressed
 with the diversity of the crowd. There were sort
 of representatives there from a lot of different
 constituents in our area.

6 There's definitely an interest and need for 7 members of the community to hear that we are 8 taking this seriously and we're on top of it. 9 So, you know, I just wanted to be there, get 10 information, and let people know that I certainly 11 do care about this and want it to be pursued. 12 Thank you.

13 MAYOR NYCE: Trustee Murray?

14 TRUSTEE MURRAY: My report is on the Marina 15 itself. I went -- over the last couple of years, 16 I've been observing the Marina structures and 17 I don't know if you guys know, but noticed them. 18 our Marina structures are made of clear cedar. 19 And if you can pass these around, I couldn't copy 20 them very well, I tried it, but over the -- you know, over the years, they're starting to 21 22 deteriorate. And I would like to make a motion 23 to go out to RFP to cleaning and restoring these

24	build	dings	down	at t	the Mar	rina.	It's [.]	time to	o do
25	it.	It ha	asn't	beer	n done	since	we've	built	this.

1	And if you'll notice, the Blacksmith Shop has
2	some multi-colors.
3	And I think we should price out each
4	building individually in case we want to take
5	them one step at a time.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. The Blacksmith
7	Shop, if it is not my understanding, is that not
8	part of under the management of the Maritime
9	Museum?
10	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that really is their
12	responsibility
13	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Is it? Okay.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: not ours.
15	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Well, I thought, if we
16	if we priced these out individually, we could
17	either tackle them individually or the Marina
18	has been stained with a product that was not used
19	originally on the wood. I believe it was a

20 combination of a weathering stain and bleaching 21 oil, and part of the Marina was stained with a 22 solid stain. So I'm not saying that we have to 23 strip it, but I think we need to make a decision 24 on what we want to do with the wood, whether we 25 go back to the original weathering stain, which

1	is to me, it's fantastic, you know, or what
2	they did at the Marina, which is a solid.
3	MAYOR NYCE: Right. And they did the solid
4	there because it was a more uniform look?
5	TRUSTEE MURRAY: It was a mistake.
6	MAYOR NYCE: Gotcha.
7	TRUSTEE MURRAY: It was a blatant mistake.
8	And then he also used it on the Blacksmith
9	Building, too.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't like the way that
11	looks.
12	TRUSTEE MURRAY: No, I don't either. So I
13	would that's what I would like to do for
14	possible work on the Marina in the springtime, is
15	to start addressing some of the these

16 buildings.

17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Dave, is this the new
18	bathrooms that were recently built? Is that that
19	entrance to that, or is that the entrance
20	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.
21	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That's right to the right
22	of this here.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, that's into this
24	building.
25	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
2	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah, that's right into it.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That' not that's not
4	the public bathroom building, correct?
5	TRUSTEE MURRAY: This is the public
6	bathroom.
7	MAYOR NYCE: It is.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, that is. And it's
9	already deteriorated? I mean, we've only
10	that's only been up since when?
11	MAYOR NYCE: 2008.

- 12 TRUSTEE MURRAY: This is the north side, so
- 13 it's a lot worse.
- 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
- 15 MAYOR NYCE: 2008.
- 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Nine, 2009.
- 17 MAYOR NYCE: It gets a lot of weather.
- 18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.

19 TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah.

- 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sure it does.
- 21 MAYOR NYCE: Does anyone have an objection
- 22 to putting an RFP out for the cleaning of the --
- 23 TRUSTEE HUBBARD: No.
- 24 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Are you going to power
- 25 wash it first?

1	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Yeah, it would be a
2	cleaning and restoring process to the wood.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
4	TRUSTEE MURRAY: That's it.
5	MAYOR NYCE: That's it? All right.
6	Trustee Phillips.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I attended Code this

8 afternoon. Audit we will be having in December. 9 The Carousel Committee had a meeting this 10 week where we met -- not this week, last week, 11 where we met with the Friends of Mitchell Park 12 over the funding of the rounding boards. The RFP 13 went out and has come back. The Committee will be receiving the information from that and moving 14 forward as to what to decide to do. It has not 15 been without some contention, it continues. So I 16 just feel that my job is to keep it moving 17 18 forward, and to make sure that the process is 19 followed, and that's all I can do with that. 20 The other thing that I did do this couple 21 of weeks, and I had a discussion with Mr. Pallas, 22 is that the Small Cities grants we have not applied for and for a while with the Village. 23 24 There is some money under the Small City funding

25 that we really can't do anything with until we

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either provide a project or move something.
 So I did have a discussion with Mr. Pallas
 about hiring a former employee to help us on a

4 consulting basis to get us through the process of 5 the Small Cities grants, and Robert Brandt has agreed to work with me on it, as the Treasurer's 6 7 Department would be involved in it, trying to get 8 it moving forward. 9 The Governor -- it's a learning process for all of us. I don't think it's going to be in the 10 11 same direction of housing. I think there are 12 other opportunities for us under the Small Cities 13 grants. 14 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. 15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's what I --16 MAYOR NYCE: Our most recent successes with that have been actually with the wastewater 17 18 treatment plant. 19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. So I think we 20 have some other items within the Village, that to 21 try to look for some funding to coexist with our 22 current funding might just help the world along a 23 little bit, especially if we have the availability of finding some money to replace 24 some sewer pipings, and whatever. 25

1	MAYOR NYCE: Absolutely.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm assuming that you
3	haven't finished the discussion with the former
4	employee.
5	MR. PALLAS: I have not.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
7	MR. PALLAS: Still working on it.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm trying to think what
9	else. I spoke to Trustee Hubbard, and I didn't
10	have a chance to talk to Trustee Robins, about
11	the meeting that took place last week. I would
12	have liked to attend, but my schedule was of one
13	I couldn't. And I was a little uncomfortable
14	having all of us in the room at the same time, to
15	be honest with you. So I'm assuming Trustee
16	Murray felt the same way I did.
17	I would like to have the gentleman come
18	here and give us a presentation. I think if he
19	wants the interest of the Village, it would have
20	been nice for him to kind of, you know, come to
21	us, and probably, you know, we could have
22	gathered more interested people, as well as what

23 was there. I have to say that. So, other than 24 that, that's it.

1 off, I think you all received a letter from the Railroad Museum, and Mr. Fisher is here from the 2 3 Railroad Museum. They have asked to come and discuss with us at a work session. There is the 4 5 possibility of them doing a direct lease with the 6 Long Island Railroad for that property. And I 7 would like to, if this Board agrees, invite him to the December work session. He volunteered to 8 9 bring the yule log, we'll bring the eggnog. Just 10 wanted to lighten it up a little bit. So the December work session, we'll have at least a 11 12 discussion just outlining where it goes. And 13 then depending on where it goes from there, what 14 I would guess is there might be some working 15 committees moving on to work that through. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Could you also ask him 16 17 to bring a copy of the survey map of exactly what

18 portion of the property he's talking about?

19 MAYOR NYCE: Sure.

20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I think it would

21 be helpful.

22	MAYOR NYCE: Yeah. And I will have Paul
23	and Joe pull up our copies of it as well, to make
24	sure we're all talking about the same stuff.
25	As an update on the meeting the other

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1	night, I after the incident occurred a couple
2	of weeks ago, I reached out to the Chief of
3	Police, and was happy to find out that he was
4	already in contact and in discussions with
5	Superintendent Gamberg of Greenport School,
6	Greenport Southold Schools, which is where I
7	think those discussions should start, and they
8	did start. You know, several weeks along,
9	obviously the community is very much concerned.
10	My feeling about how this process works,

11 it's fine for a consultant to come and have a 12 meeting, but, ultimately, the process is best 13 served if the community gathers to determine what 14 the problem is first. Let's start with the 15 school, the Police Department, and municipal 16 officials, identify the problem. 17 There is a meeting scheduled for this 18 Thursday with Chief Flatley, myself, Supervisor 19 Russell, and Superintendent Gamberg, out of which 20 I assume will be a large public meeting to 21 discuss what the Police Department and the school 22 sees as the way forward, once the ultimate issue 23 has been identified and what they feel the most likely answer to the issue is. Should we need 24 additional help down the road, absolutely, call 25

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in -- call in a consultant. But I thought that
 the meeting was putting the cart before the
 horse.

I don't -- I won't make my personal
feelings about Mr. Sliwa known, because it's
neither here nor there, but I thought that that
meeting was premature, that the meeting should -the first meeting should have been the one we're
anticipating setting up.

I understand that people want things to
happen quickly. These incidents don't grow
overnight, they grow slowly and surely, and they

13 grow within the community. My feeling is that the community needs to address them in the same 14 15 way that they grow, from within, and to address 16 them head on, and in a slow and methodic way. And the people that are most responsible for 17 18 taking care of those individuals and the kids 19 that are involved should be the ones leading the charge. And that's -- as I said, that is already 20 happening. 21

I was very, very happy to hear that the school and the Police Department had already been -- they had been talking for well over a week when I talked to them last week. So I will

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1 let you know the outcome of my meeting on 2 Thursday. There will likely be a press release. 3 And, like I said, the Chief, when I saw him at our Steering Committee meeting, it was the Tall 4 5 Ships Steering Committee meeting the other day, he would like very much to have a large public 6 7 meeting. I don't know where it's going to be. I would assume the school would host it, but I'm 8

9 not positive. I reached out to them, saying I'd 10 like to facilitate an open meeting, and that's 11 when I found out that they were already meeting, 12 which made me very happy. So I will keep you 13 posted on that.

14 The last thing I have would be an update on 15 the Tall Ships. The Steering Committee did meet 16 last week. The purpose of that meeting was to review the RFPs for promotional services that 17 we're looking to go out for, and to touch base 18 19 and set up schedule ongoing. There were five 20 responses this time; we narrowed it down to two. 21 And I anticipate an answer from the Steering 22 Committee as a recommendation to this Board as to 23 who they would recommend that we hire by our 24 meeting next week, so that we can stay on 25 schedule.

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Sylvia was going to reach out to both the
 applicants that we liked to see if they could,
 you know, better their price a little bit, but
 the Steering Committee felt comfortable with

5 either one in any case.

6	I also, as a follow-up to what Trustee
7	Robins said about the event on the Intrepid, the
8	BID, as we've discussed before, has pledged to
9	raise \$100,000 for this event. They've raised,
10	by our rough calculations at this point, almost
11	50 of that. Two at least two of the people
12	that went to that dinner on the Intrepid are
13	going to be major sponsors at about 15 grand
14	apiece. Until you know, until they have the
15	agreement inked, I don't want to say, but they're
16	well on their way securing money for this event.
17	By —— like I said, Peter and I, by rough
18	calculations at this point, they were about 50
19	grand into the fundraising already for the event,
20	which is which is nice, considering how early
21	on it is. I thought that would give you guys
22	some degree of comfort.
23	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Dave, how much did we get
24	last time? We didn't get

25 MAYOR NYCE: We didn't raise much more than

1	75,000 in sponsorships. We came up with,
2	obviously, quite a lot more than that in ticket
3	sales. Seventy-five is about right, isn't it,
4	Robert?
5	TREASURER BRANDT: Yeah.
6	MAYOR NYCE: There was not a lot out there
7	in sponsorships.
8	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Right.
9	MAYOR NYCE: You know, the economy was
10	vastly different, and we were we were
11	fundraising after the first of the year for an
12	event on Memorial Day. So most corporations had
13	already had already started their fiscal year,
14	so they didn't have money set up, or, you know,
15	they started their calendar year, so they weren't
16	in a position, not only economy-wise, but hadn't
17	budgeted for it. And we had very little time. I
18	think with this additional lead time, and having
19	both the BID Board and this Board reaching out to
20	different people, I think that's helped. So
21	anybody that you guys have contacts with, you
22	know, every little bit helps.
23	We will have by our next Steering
24	Committee meeting, we will have a breakdown of
25	what major sponsorship gets you, what you

know, for different breakdowns in dollars, what
 that gets you as far as advertising for the
 event, etcetera, etcetera.

And the next Steering Committee meeting will be early in December, at which we will start the P.R. process and start forming the event itself, and charging people with the different tasks.

9 I'm meeting with Peter Clarke of the BID 10 and Trustee Robins this week to go over the 11 fundraising portion of it. Trustee Murray, I'd 12 like to meet with you and Mr. Gamberg about the 13 educational component. Hermione is really 14 anxious to have a very, very large educational 15 part of this event. They're big on the history 16 of it on their end. They have a school that's very similar sized to Greenport-Southold. So it 17 would be a nice -- nice to do some sort of 18 19 exchange with the two. And they're very anxious to do an English -- you know, U.S. to France, 20 21 France to U.S. thing, particularly because it's

22	around General Lafayette's trip to the U.S. and
23	the Revolutionary War tie-ins. They're very
24	anxious to do that, so I've made the after
25	Thanksgiving excuse me we can meet and get

1 that kicked off.

2	Other than that, we're on the Tall Ships
3	things is on schedule. We will be meeting after
4	December. Once January starts, we will probably
5	be meeting twice monthly to keep everything
6	rolling. And we'll start with the promotional
7	press releases, etcetera, etcetera, after the
8	first of the year.
9	That's about it. You guys have any
10	questions on anything I had said?
11	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: No.
10	TOUCTER DUTULIES. No. I think it is

12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I think it's

13 become -- the first event was the first stepping

14 stone. And I think that in the marketing world,

15 it was a success that other people are going to,

16 as the Long Island Convention --

17 MAYOR NYCE: Yeah.

18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They're seeing that as a19 positive for Greenport.

20 MAYOR NYCE: They are. And I should 21 mention that Mr. Clarke and I did talk with 22 Yan -- I'm not getting his last name -- the new 23 Head of the LICVB. And last time at this event, 24 we took advantage of a grant that East End 25 Getaway got for our event, they went out and got

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it for our event for us. He said that there
 would be more money than just grant money
 available for us for this event. They're looking
 to actually put real dollars into the event,
 intend -- Trustee Robins, being our liaison to
 that group, I'm sure you'll be coming back with a
 bag of money from LICVB.

8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Bags of money, bags of 9 money.

10 MAYOR NYCE: That was a good meeting. He's 11 been involved in these events internationally, so 12 he understands the implication. And, yet, the 13 Village has done these events for a lot of years,

14	and it is nice this time having a template to
15	work from. You know, we have a budget to work
16	from. We have, you know, a real template, and
17	records to work from makes it should make it
18	that much easier. It will still be a hectic
19	weekend.
20	All right. I guess that concludes the
21	business before this Board tonight at 7:18.
22	You need a brief Executive Session, so at
23	7:18, I will offer a motion to adjourn to
24	Executive Session to discuss an employee issue.
25	So moved.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Second.
2	MAYOR NYCE: All those in favor?
3	TRUSTEE HUBBARD: Aye.
4	TRUSTEE MURRAY: Aye.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
7	MAYOR NYCE: Aye.
8	We are adjourned. Thank you.
