2	at 5:07 p.m.)
3	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Let's open the
4	regular meeting of the Historic Preservation
5	Commission. It is November 3rd, 2014, and it is
6	5:07. My name is Frank Uellendahl, joined by?
7	MEMBER CLARK: Lucy Clark.
8	MEMBER MC MAHON: Dennis McMahon.
9	MEMBER WALOSKI: Caroline Waloski.
10	MEMBER BORRELLI: Roselle Borrelli.
11	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we have a full
12	house here. And we have two applications
13	tonight. There is one sign application and a
14	renovation, so this should be fun. Let's start
15	with Dave Murray. Please come up to
16	MR. MURRAY: Should I come up?
17	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yes, absolutely.

18	MEMBER WALOSKI: Sit in the hot seat.
19	MR. MURRAY: Hello, everyone.
20	MEMBER CLARK: We're a friendly Board,
21	really friendly.
22	MR. MURRAY: Is it?
23	MEMBER CLARK: Yeah.
24	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: The Board has changed

tremendously. 1 MR. MURRAY: It's not a hot seat anymore? 2 3 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: No. MEMBER CLARK: It can be. 4 5 MEMBER WALOSKI: Was it ever, Frank? 6 MR. MURRAY: I guess for the record, I'm 7 David Murray, 332 Fifth Avenue, Greenport. For 8 the record, I am also a Trustee of the Village, 9 but I am acting as a business owner today. And I'm coming to get a sign approved for -- in front 10 11 of the building at 449 Main Street. And the building itself does not have a sign at all, and 12 I would be erecting the sign. And, also, there's 13

14	a blank for the person who would rent the
15	downstairs when the tenant comes in.
16	MEMBER WALOSKI: That's the house that was
17	just renovated?
18	MR. MURRAY: Yeah.
19	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: But are you renting
20	the downstairs or the upstairs?
21	MR. MURRAY: The upstairs.
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Oh, okay.
23	MR. MURRAY: I'm renting the upstairs, and
24	the downstairs is close to being a I think a
25	gift shop. I'm not sure exactly yet.

1	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yean, Okay.
2	MR. MURRAY: And what we're going to
3	build everything out of the wood. The posts are
4	going to be a mahogany, they're going to be a
5	six-by-six. They're going to be painted to match
6	the house.
7	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Which is sort of a
8	MR. MURRAY: It's like a creamy
9	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: A cream color.

10	MR. MURRAY: Yeah.
11	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's a very nice
12	photo that you submitted here.
13	MEMBER WALOSKI: Like caramel, yeah.
14	MR. MURRAY: Yeah, the caramel. We used
15	that same trim color to do the top posts and
16	around the border of the six-by-sixes, I believe.
17	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Is your main entrance
18	the red door?
19	MR. MURRAY: Yes.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.
21	MR. MURRAY: Yeah. That's going to be both
22	main entrances, and go upstairs, and that's $$ I
23	have the upstairs, and then right to the left is
24	where the downstairs business will there's two
25	French doors that will lead into theirs.

5

1 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Well, let me just
2 stop you a little bit, because we invited up here
3 because you're such a familiar face, but I didn't
4 even read the agenda Item #1. May I do this -5 MR. MURRAY: You certainly may.

6	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: in between? But
7	he started already.
8	So Item #1 is discussion and possible
9	motion on a sign application submitted by David
10	Murray, tenant at the commercial property located
11	in the Historic District at 449 Main Street. The
12	applicant is seeking approval for well, it's
13	not seven 27-by-18, as I see here on your
14	application, it's actually
15	MR. MURRAY: It's actually
16	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: 30-by-18 sign to
17	be located in the front of the building; Suffolk
18	County Tax Map #1001-4-7-18. So this is so Lucia
19	knows, this is for the minutes.
20	So we started already. So we're talking
21	about the sign and the materials. So you said
22	these are six-by-six mahogany posts. They're
23	going to be painted the color of the building.
24	And the sign will be sort of dangling or attached
25	between this

- 2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: -- arched structure.
- 3 MR. MURRAY: And it's -- we're going to do
- 4 a sandblast wood. The sign is going to be
- 5 sandblasted out of wood, and then painted these
- 6 colors.
- 7 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Oh, you're doing it
- 8 yourself?
- 9 MR. MURRAY: No, North Fork Signs are. Oh,
- 10 God, no. I don't know how to did that.
- 11 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. All right.
- 12 So well, I mean, I like the sign, and I also
- like the fact that you are moving closer to where
- 14 we live.
- MR. MURRAY: Right, exactly.
- 16 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So is there anything
- 17 else that you would like to tell us about your
- 18 sign application, David?
- 19 MR. MURRAY: I haven't put it up early.
- 20 MEMBER CLARK: Thank you so much.
- 21 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah. I bicycled by
- just two minutes ago and it wasn't up yet.
- MR. MURRAY: No.
- 24 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So all right. So
- then let's talk about this sign. It's open for

1	discussion.
2	MEMBER MC MAHON: I'm good. I'm good with
3	everything that's going on.
4	MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah, me, too.
5	MEMBER MC MAHON: I think it looks lovely,
6	it matches the house nicely, and I have no issue
7	with it whatsoever.
8	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It is not in any way
9	a problem with the Building Department, because
10	it's on public land it's on private land?
11	MS. WINGATE: It's on private property. It
12	needs to be six feet off the sidewalk. And
13	30-by-18 gives you 6.25 square feet, so you're
14	going to have to shorten it up by a fraction,
15	because you're only allowed 24 square feet,
16	double-sided, two signs. You only get six square
17	feet, David.
18	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So oh, wait.
19	Okay. So what does that mean? Is this too big?
20	MR. MURRAY: It's .22
21	MS. WINGATE: It's
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah, but it's

24 MS. WINGATE: Where is it rounded? 25 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: On top. HPC 11/3/14 1 MS. WINGATE: Oh, okay. Never mind. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's not the 2 perfect -- I mean, okay, well, it's 18-by-30, 3 plus the two inches. I shouldn't have said that. 4 5 MEMBER MC MAHON: It's good. 6 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So do you have a 7 problem giving him a permit with this? MS. WINGATE: No. 8 9 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I don't think so either. So, Roselle, are you --10 11 MEMBER BORRELLI: Can I say something about 12 the sign? 13 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Are you -- what is 14 your thought about the colors and the sign, 15 besides --MEMBER BORRELLI: The color, I love it. 16 The sign, I love it. The shape? Sometimes they 17 accuse me of saying that I don't say things, then 18

8	MEMBER BORRELLI: that point is
9	beautiful, because it matches the top middle part
10	of the roof on the home.
11	MR. MURRAY: Right.
12	MEMBER BORRELLI: What now, of course,
13	if money were no issue, and if we could still do

the dentil work and all that beautiful stuff that

15	people used to do, the gingerbread, way back, I
16	would take the point and keep it perfect, and
17	then where you see that crossbar over the
18	bottom but I just got in trouble, because
19	Eileen said you were too tall. So maybe this
20	isn't
21	MS. WINGATE: No, I didn't say that.
22	MEMBER BORRELLI: Oh.
23	MS. WINGATE: It's not too tall.
24	MEMBER BORRELLI: It's not too tall. Okay
25	MS. WINGATE: It's not too tall.

1 MEMBER BORRELLI: So I would take that 2 crossbeam and make it like a curve, like the 3 little dentil work on the -- with those little things. And then in those two sides there, you 4 5 see those two side triangles? And I would copy those little corners there that are like 6 7 sunbursts in the gingerbread and put the sunburst 8 here and here. And then I would do this in 9 curved and do it just like that gingerbread there, over there, and just exactly copy the 10

11	gingerbread that you've got on the roof, and that
12	would blow your sign right off the signs of all
13	signs.
14	MR. MURRAY: You know, I actually thought
15	about that and
16	MEMBER BORRELLI: Oh, you did?
17	MR. MURRAY: I did. We were thinking about
18	trying to bring this gingerbread in.
19	MEMBER BORRELLI: I mean, it's beautiful
20	detail on the home.
21	MR. MURRAY: But we're making this out of
22	like a real heavy mahogany and something that
23	would last. He wouldn't be able to cut those out
24	of the mahogany. He needs a real
25	MEMBER BORRELLI: How about like balsa wood

1 just to get the detail and just stick it up? 2 MEMBER WALOSKI: It wouldn't last. MR. MURRAY: Then I'll be also --3 MEMBER BORRELLI: I don't know, cut it out 4 of a jigsaw. I don't know much about any of 5 that, but I just — aesthetically, I was

7	thinking, wow, it looks real pretty.
8	MEMBER WALOSKI: Actually, to me, it would
9	be pretty, but I think the main thing, yeah, for
10	people to see the M. Murray.
11	MR. MURRAY: Yeah.
12	MEMBER BORRELLI: Right.
13	MEMBER WALOSKI: And I think that might
14	just get would be gilding the lily a little
15	bit too much.
16	MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay.
17	MEMBER WALOSKI: You know, I'm into design
18	like you are, too, but I think the thing that
19	David wants is for people to see a sign, "M.
20	Murray," and I think
21	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Now, let me ask you.

24	know, the house is the house, and it's

beautifully renovated. I think the sign should

CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: For the future store? 8 9 MEMBER WALOSKI: Yeah. 10 MR. MURRAY: Yeah, that's the space for it. 11 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So this is going to -- yeah. So then the structure actually 12 13 becomes more reasonable and makes more sense. I 14 wouldn't go into that kind of --15 MEMBER WALOSKI: I think it's very 16 carefully thought out. 17 MEMBER BORRELLI: Detail. 18 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: I wouldn't go into 19 that kind of detail, Roselle, because it's just a 20 sign. 21 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right. 22 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You could still 23 approve this, right? MEMBER BORRELLI: Oh, I love this the way 24

it is, I think it's beautiful.

23	anything or
24	MS. WINGATE: Yeah, they have it.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: We have, yes.

2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: We have. Please,

MEMBER WALOSKI: Yes.

3 have a seat, if you don't mind.

4 MS. WINGATE: I just wanted to say that I

5 allowed the construction team to start

6 disassembling the existing porch because it was

7 rotting.

8 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.

9 MS. WINGATE: So, in my opinion, it was not

about the fact that it's a what-if construction,

it was a necessary construction. But I brought

12	him here because it's about the types of
13	materials that he's proposing.
14	MEMBER MC MAHON: Right, right.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.
16	MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah. In a lot of these
17	projects, especially something like this, I'm
18	looking at it, and I am also the owner of a big
19	house that needs —— every aspect of it needs to
20	be touched. So a lot of times I have to get into
21	it to understand even what the project is. So
22	even stripping and doing as much demo as possible
23	to understand the project is totally acceptable.
24	MR. RUHS: Yes.
25	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So, okay. So the

- 1 application was signed by Kyle Ruhs. Are you
 2 Kyle Ruhs?
 3 MR. RUHS: Yes, I am.

 5 the spelling of the name?

8 welcome, Kyle. 9 MR. RUHS: Yes, thank you. 10 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So tell us -- I mean, 11 I think we all are familiar with, of course, 12 Sterling Street, and with the house itself. It's 13 a beautiful old structure. And reading your 14 application, I was very happy to see what the 15 owner and you are proposing. But, if you don't 16 mind, go a little bit into detail what it is that 17 you want to do. MR. RUHS: Okay. So the existing porch, 18 19 the deck itself, the porch ceiling, they're all in very bad condition and --20 21 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Hold is the house? 22 MR. RUHS: How old is the house? I don't know, I'm not sure. 23 24 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Is it -- Eileen, you

4 MS. WINGATE: Oh, it's over 100 years. Yeah, it's over 100 years old. 5 6 MEMBER WALOSKI: It looks 1800s, yeah. 7 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: 1880s or so, in that 8 neighborhood, 1890s? 9 MS. WINGATE: Yeah, it sounds about right. 10 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay. And has it been in Ms. Scholl's family? 11 12 MS. WINGATE: For a very long time. 13 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah, okay. So not 14 much has happened during her ownership, probably, 15 right? 16 MS. WINGATE: (Nodded yes.) 17 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So we can imagine 18 what the porch looks like. 19 MR. RUHS: Yeah, it's in bad condition. 20 So, basically, what they want to do is just 21 rebuild exactly what's there, and use the same materials that are also there. 22 23 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right. 24 MR. RUHS: So I have some samples here

of -- just to give you an example, this is a

- Douglas fir product.
- 2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah, that's
- 3 beautiful.
- 4 MR. RUHS: That's going to be used for the
- 5 decking. This is a yellow pine product that's
- 6 beadboard, it's going to be used for the porch
- 7 ceiling.
- 8 MEMBER WALOSKI: Oh, that's nice.
- 9 MR. RUHS: Those are all going to be --
- 10 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: They're all going to
- be painted?
- MR. RUHS: Yeah.
- 13 MEMBER WALOSKI: Nice.
- 14 MEMBER MC MAHON: Yup, you're all set.
- 15 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Very nice.
- 16 MEMBER MC MAHON: Exactly what I have.
- 17 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Beautiful tongue and
- 18 groove. Are you holding onto the slightly
- 19 pitched porch?
- MR. RUHS: Yes, yes.
- 21 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: As is, okay.
- MR. RUHS: And all the railings will be
- 23 duplicated exactly the same way.
- 24 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: There's a design that

1	MEMBER WALUSKI: Yeah, they're very pretty
2	That design is really lovely.
3	MR. RUHS: Yes.
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Because it's not the
5	only house. There are a few examples like this
6	here in the Village of Greenport.
7	MR. RUHS: Yeah. And it has those acorns
8	on it, and the ones that I think there's only
9	that has to be replaced, so they're going to
LØ	replace it with similar. All the wood on the
l1	railing will be one-by-two cedar, painted. And
12	anything that has to be because this is
13	basically a it's not a total renovation, it's
L4	more of, you know, as-you-go
L5	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah.
L6	MR. RUHS: replace and repair. So, you
L7	know, on the bottom, they have all this lattice
L8	work. Anything that — anything that's damaged
L9	will be replaced with cedar lattice.
20	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right.

22 MEMBER WALOSKI: I'm just noticing there 23 are two different types of posts here. Here it's 24 like a more simple structure, and then here it's 25 like turned. HPC 11/3/14 1 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: You mean, the 2 railing? 3 MR. RUHS: Yeah. 4 MEMBER WALOSKI: The railing — not the 5 railings, but the posts on the railings. They're two different things? 6 7 MR. RUHS: That's actually --8 MEMBER WALOSKI: Are you going to just do 9 it the same exact way, or is it going to be all 10 just one or the other? MR. RUHS: Okay. Well, that railing there 11 12 is to the side open deck, so that's almost like a totally different structure. And it's not really 13 14 -- it's not really part of the whole view of the 15 house. CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's detached, right, 16

MR. RUHS: And painted the same colors.

21

17	it's not attached to the front porch?
18	MR. RUHS: Not at all, no.
19	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.
20	MR. RUHS: It's separated. So they're
21	planning to, on that particular open deck, which
22	is a very small deck, I think it's about
23	12-by-8
24	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Oh, okay
25	MR. RUHS: they're going to use Ipe.
	UDC 11/2/1/
	HPC 11/3/14
1	MEMBER WALOSKI: What's Ipe?
2	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Ipe.
3	MR. RUHS: That's a Brazilian hardwood.
4	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Yeah.
5	MR. RUHS: That's very durable.
6	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Mitchell Park is all
7	about Ipe. It's a hardwood. But you're not
8	going to paint it, you're leaving it
9	MR. RUHS: Natural.
10	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Natural.
11	MR. RUHS: Actually, what they're replacing

it with is like a two-by-six pressure treated.

13	So this is definitely a much better upgrade than
14	what's there.
15	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Right, yeah.
16	MR. RUHS: As far as the railings on the
17	deck, there was no plan to change those railings.
18	MEMBER WALOSKI: They're going to leave the
19	spindles.
20	MR. RUHS: Yeah.
21	MEMBER WALOSKI: It's very pretty
22	CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: So you just basically
23	renovate you scrape them, you paint them, and
24	leave them as is.
25	MR. RUHS: Correct.

1 MEMBER WALOSKI: That's fine.
2 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: It's just the
3 decking.
4 MR. RUHS: Because they're in good shape.
5 CHAIRMAN UELLENDAHL: Okay.
6 MS. BORRELLI: Is the house aluminum sided,
7 vinyl sided or —
