1	(Whereupon the meeting was called to order
2	at 5:08 p.m.)
3	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. I guess we'll
4	call the meeting to order. This is the May
5	29th, 2014, Third Street Fire 5 p.m. work
6	session agenda of the Greenport Village Planning
7	Board.
8	Item #1 is the continued discussion and
9	possible motion on the use of use evaluation
10	application for 455 Main Street. The owner,
11	Deborah Schade, has applied to open a tea house
12	adjacent to the existing salon, Section 1000
13	District 1001, Section 4, Block 7, Lot 19.
14	So this is a work session, so, you know,
15	people are going to discuss things. We're not
16	going to vote on anything today, so go ahead.
17	MS. SCHADE: Well, I submitted

18	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Your site plan?
19	MS. SCHADE: Yes.
20	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. And I guess
21	we're going to take another look at it. So the
22	bikes look good.
23	MS. SCHADE: Thank you.
24	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: You got that done,
25	right?

1	MS. SCHADE: Got it done.
2	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. You're making
3	progress. I know it can be frustrating.
4	MS. SCHADE: That's okay.
5	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Oh, I see, okay. Yeah,
6	this is what we were after, pretty much. And so
7	I guess one of the concerns we had was with the
8	access to the toilet facilities. That's going
9	to be this separate tenant space on the south
10	side of the building has its own bathroom.
11	That's within the tea itself?
12	MS. SCHADE: No.

MR. DOWLING: No. So the bathroom

14	actually is through here.
15	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. This is the
16	salon space, right?
17	MR. DOWLING: Yeah. And this is basically
18	her waiting room, which you actually pass
19	through a sitting room to get through.
20	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Oh, that's how it
21	works. Oh, okay. So they don't really go
22	through the salon to get to the
23	MS. SCHADE: No, it's just a sitting room.
24	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: To the total
25	facilities, they go through the waiting room

1 lobby area.

2 MS. SCHADE: Yes, it's just a sitting

3 room. Yes.

4 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: So it's sort of

5 contiguous kind of space. Okay.

6 What were our other concerns? I think it

7 was just with the —— with the way this is ——

8 with the traffic flow, right?

9 MR. DOWLING: Traffic flow with that.

10 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Just the seating. 11 MR. DOWLING: And also seating. I think 12 she brought the seating down. 13 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right. 14 MR. DOWLING: She was at 52. 15 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right. 16 MS. MUNDUS: Wait. Where is the bathroom facility for -- it's 56, okay, in the salon, 17 18 okay. They have to go through the salon? MS. SCHADE: They don't have to go through 19 the salon. There's -- there'll be French doors 20 that we'll go through. There's a waiting area 21 in the middle and that's where they'll pass 22 23 through. MS. MUNDUS: Okay. 24 25 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Yeah, and it's right

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1 directly north of those French --

3 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: French doors?

MS. SCHADE: Right.

4 MS. SCHADE: Yes.

5

5 MS. MUNDUS: So this is 46 in -- the

6	maximum seating capacity is 46; is that how many
7	people you're planning for?
8	MS. SCHADE: That's inside and outside.
9	MS. MUNDUS: Wow, that's a lot of people.
10	MR. DOWLING: That's for seating, colors
11	of bikes, CO of the barn for the bikes, right? No.
12	MS. MUNDUS: What are you planning for?
13	Is it just tea? Is it beverages? Is it food?
14	What can you describe what it is?
15	MS. SCHADE: There'll be high tea.
16	MS. MUNDUS: High tea.
17	MS. SCHADE: Yeah, high tea, so there'll
18	be baked goods and sandwiches, and everything
19	will be prepared off premise. It won't be
20	prepared. It's going to be prepared in a
21	professional kitchen. There'll just be slight
22	assembly, and, of course, we'll make the tea
23	there.
24	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right.
25	MR. PROKOP: Did you draw this plan?

- 2 MR. PROKOP: Did you draw this plan?
- 3 MS. SCHADE: No.
- 4 MR. PROKOP: No?
- 5 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: So what's our next
- 6 step, here? I mean, you know, this plan sort of
- 7 shows what we were looking for.
- 8 MR. PROKOP: Well, there's a couple of
- 9 things.
- 10 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
- 11 MR. PROKOP: The reason why I asked that,
- there's a couple of things that are missing of
- 13 the information.
- 14 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: All right. That's why
- 15 I'm asking.
- 16 MR. PROKOP: Like, normally, you would
- 17 have dimensions on the plan. Like you have the
- 18 10 parking spaces shown, but, you know, we would
- 19 need to know -- you know, I didn't want to hold
- this up. I mean, we would normally get the size
- of the parking spaces and things like that. And
- there's like a line between two of the parking
- spaces, six and seven; is that a walkway?
- MS. MUNDUS: It's unusual for us to have a
- 25 hand-drawn plan, right? I mean, how do we know

               CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Are they required to

         have that for this kind of thing?
              MS. WINGATE: No, it's not in the code.

              MS. MUNDUS: Who did prepare this for you?
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23 MS. SCHADE: I hired somebody to prepare 24 it for me. 25 MS. MUNDUS: And it's a professional Planning Board Work Session 5/29/14 1 preparation? It's not signed, there's no --2 there's no verifiable way --MS. SCHADE: I didn't know that I needed 3 to have that. 4 5 MS. MUNDUS: Okay. I'd like to know whether it's accurate or not. And as it's drawn 6 7 out, we just sort have to take your word for it, 8 because there's no independent, you know, contractor that did this. I don't -- I don't 9 10 know. 11 MR. DOWLING: I did a walk-through --MS. MUNDUS: You did. 12 13 MR. DOWLING: -- to take a look at it. MS. MUNDUS: Okay. 14 15 MR. DOWLING: But I, obviously, didn't go 16 with a tape measure, or anything like that. MR. PROKOP: Okay. Normally, on a plan --17 MR. DOWLING: I only did it a couple of 18

19	times. I decided to take a walk-through and
20	see.
21	MS. MUNDUS: Okay. All right. Pardon me.
22	I haven't been to the last few sessions, so I'm
23	trying to excuse me.
24	MR. PROKOP: Normally, on a plan, instead
25	of indicating, you know, seating for 14, you
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1	would have tables and the type of seating you're
2	going to have.
3	MS. SCHADE: Okay.
4	MR. PROKOP: You've been here a couple of
5	times for other applications where we've asked
6	people to make sure that they draw tables in,
7	and dimensions of tables, and things like that,
8	and any actual seating.
9	MS. SCHADE: I can do that.
10	MR. PROKOP: Please.
11	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: You should draw you
12	know, if it's going to be five tables or four
13	tables, distribute the 14 chairs among those,

that number of tables. So just make a round

15	table and an indication of a chair. And if
16	you're going to have umbrellas on those tables,
17	put that on there.
18	MS. SCHADE: Okay.
19	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay? That's what
20	everybody else does, you know, and I know you're
21	doing this for the first time.
22	So I would suggest for the parking that
23	you find out what a standard parking space is,
24	and indicate what the measurement is here. You
25	should do that for your own self so that you

know that that number of cars will fit there,
just like you see in the IGA or some other
parking spot. You know, it's probably like a
10-by-20 footprint, and then -- and I think that
allows enough -- I don't know, but I think that
allows enough space between the cars to open
doors without, you know, hitting cars. So you
should do that, so that you can actually see
that it's going to be this many spaces, unless
your -- you know, your person that prepared

11	this, you know, should do that.
12	But I would you know, I don't know if I
13	if I should be suggesting how to, you know,
14	line out a parking lot to the applicant, but
15	MR. PROKOP: Well, there's dimensions, and
16	under the State Code, there's dimensions for
17	parking spaces, isn't there? Is there a code
18	for parking spaces?
19	MS. WINGATE: (Nodded yes.)
20	MR. PROKOP: So then
21	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Well, then, can Eileen
22	tell you what those are so that you could if
23	you wanted to measure them yourself, you could
24	do that with the State Code. And then, if it's
25	not going to be 10, it could be nine, or it

could be 12, if -- you know, you should do that,
so that there's a -
MS. SCHADE: Okay.

CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: You know, what else?

MR. BURNS: How many cars do you park

there now on average?

11

MS. SCHADE: Generally, on average, eight, 7 eight to 10. 8 9 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. 10 MR. BURNS: So it could fit there. 11 MS. SCHADE: Uh-huh. That parking lot has 12 been there for a long time. 13 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Yeah, yeah. And do we 14 have a -- we don't have the -- do we have to put 15 a code -- I mean, a number of spaces for the 16 square footage of the building like you do, you know, the ratio formula for this, or is that --17 18 MS. WINGATE: All existing buildings are 19 exempt from parking regulations. 20 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay, okay. 21 MR. DOWLING: Cool. 22 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay, that's great. 23 So -- and do we need tables on the inside to 24 show the seating? Should there be a seating

MS. WINGATE: The inside is based on a

arrangement on the inside, pictured with

3	calculation from New York State Code. So, if
4	you want to see tables and chairs, but all as
5	a Building Inspector, all I need is the square
6	footage to determine how many tables and chairs.
7	So it really doesn't matter what she draws.
8	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: You have that already,
9	don't you?
10	MS. WINGATE: The 14.
11	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
12	MR. DOWLING: Yeah. On the last site
13	plan, you actually had the tables on there.
14	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Oh, that's right.
15	MR. DOWLING: I noticed they weren't on
16	the new one.
17	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: If she redraws this
18	with the tables outside and some measurements
19	for the parking, can this be can we approve
20	this at the next meeting?
21	MR. PROKOP: Yes.
22	MR. BURNS: Great.
23	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay?
24	MS. SCHADE: So you want measurements,

parking spots and tables?

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	1	MR. DOWLING: Tables and chairs.
	2	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right, umbrellas,
	3	tables and chairs.
	4	MS. SCHADE: Okay.
	5	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: And measure it so
	6	that with the code, and if this number of
it.	7	parking spaces has to be changed, you can change
	8	MS. SCHADE: I can do that.
	9	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Do we need to have her
	10	stripe this and number this, I mean, if it's
	11	already preexisting?
	12	MS. WINGATE: Well, we don't number.
	13	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right.
	14	MS. WINGATE: That's up to you.
	15	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: You know, the reason is
	16	you've already got it numbered. Now, you know,
	17	we're trying to figure out the real number.
	18	MS. MUNDUS: The whole purpose of the site
	19	plan is to be able to verify whether you are
	20	doing what you say you are going to do when we
	21	approve it or not. And that's why we're asking
	22	for more information, to make sure that it's
	23	correct. because 56. if I counted correctly.

MUNDUS: I mean, it's something we should think about. 10

                   provide -- we should require 10 parking spaces.

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or two of them has to be handicapped, reserved Planning Board Work Session 5/29/14 1 for handicapped, and those spaces should be 2 marked. 3 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: How is someone going to mark all those spaces and without going through 4 5 a huge parking --MR. 11	good. You'd probably agree with that, right?

12	So should we go over this again?
13	MR. DOWLING: Yup.
14	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: The seating, just
15	measure it, measure the spaces for here,
16	including any special measurements for the
17	handicapped, and just mark the handicapped
18	with just label it "handicapped" on those
19	two on the plan, and that's enough.
20	MS. SCHADE: Okay.
21	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right, do you think?
22	MS. MUNDUS: Yeah.
23	MR. DOWLING: Yup.
24	MS. SCHADE: Thanks.
25	MS. MUNDUS: Thank you.

1 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: So then you can do that
2 with Eileen, if you need Eileen in the meantime,
3 and we'll get the new — we'll get the new
4 drawing, or the additions to that drawing.
5 MS. WINGATE: For next week.

6 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Next week before the

7 meeting.

8 MS. SCHADE: Okay. 9 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: And then, you know, 10 we'll put a motion on there to approve this once 11 we look at it. 12 MS. SCHADE: Okay, great. Thank you. 13 CHAIRMAN JAUOUET: Item #2 is a motion to 14 accept an application from Douglas Elliman Real Estate. This is a use -- this use evaluation is 15 for the continued use of 124 Front Street as a 16 Real Estate office, formerly Lloyd's Real 17 18 Estate. The property is zoned 19 CR-Commercial-Retail. The application has 20 also -- has a significant -- excuse me. The 21 application also has a sign component. It's 22 District 1001, Block 4, Lot 9 -- Block 9, Lot 26. 23 24 Are you the representative? 25 MS. DENNEHY: Yes.

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- 1 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
- 2 MS. DENNEHY: I'm Karla Dennehy with
- 3 Douglas Elliman.

4	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
5	MS. DENNEHY: Nice to meet you.
6	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Nice to meet you.
7	Okay. So I guess you should just why
8	don't you start to tell us
9	MS. DENNEHY: Okay.
10	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: if you've got some
11	comments on what you're going to do, and how
12	it's going to change, and how many more people
13	or how many less people than they had before.
14	MS. DENNEHY: Okay.
15	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Just what you want to
16	say.
17	MS. DENNEHY: Generally speaking, right
18	now, it's we have rolled in the same number
19	of people that were there before, with the
20	addition of one.

15	use down. I don't think that this is that type

- 6 effort to support each other, so that our
- 7 locally-owned small businesses can thrive. We
- 8 all try to avoid the overlap in stocking the
- 9 same products, so that our small, but growing,
- 10 community of consumers is able to shop and
- support each business in our town.
- The owner of Flying Point was aware of our
- 13 store and the brands that we carried. Within
- 14 six days of opening five doors down from our
- 15 store, Flying Point carries the majority of the
- 16 exact same brands that we do: Penny
- skateboards, Surftech stand-up paddle boards,
- 18 Kialoa paddles, Toms shoes, Havaianas footwear,
- 19 Roxy apparel, Quiksilver apparel, the list goes
- on. I'm concerned for our small town and that
- 21 it cannot support this oversaturation of
- 22 product.
- 23 Chris and I had visited with Flying Point.
- We went in and introduced ourselves to its

feels invasive.

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and we are trying to work something out.

Knowing that he was required to come in front of this Board tonight before opening the doors, the owner of Flying Point advised his staff to open last weekend and Flying Point opened. This disregard of how our town works and behaves

I realize that One Love Beach has a much larger stake in this than most, but our neighboring stores are also affected. I also realize that free market and competition are part of the game, and a healthy part at that. I just ask that when bigger, wealthier businesses come to Greenport, that they tread lightly on our town. Slow down, look around you. We live here and we work here. And we really do love our town, and we invite you to be a part of it, but don't disregard the rules and don't disregard the businesses that we've all worked so hard to create.

It's a fairly large truck, and we've had a hard
enough time getting our own cars up and down

any -- I know I've always wondered about
business owners parking in front of their store
and eliminating parking spaces for
other shoppers, and that's a particularly large
truck, and was wondering of that -- if the owner
is expecting to leave that there on a regular

17	basis. It's sort of a 20-foot sign. It's
18	interesting to me from that perspective.
19	On the second thing, I've recently been in
20	front of this Board and have appreciated both
21	the guidance and process, and was not surprised
22	by each of the stages. And so I don't think
23	it's I think you should be expected to follow
24	the procedures, and I encourage whatever we can
25	do to follow the rules. It was one of those

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complicated -- you know, I bring my boy to the 1 2 meetings. He's been learning the process of 3 government a bit, and I think one of his 4 questions is, okay, you have some people follow 5 the rules and some people come for forgiveness, and which one is the right thing to do. 6 7 That's my only comments. MR. PROKOP: So where does this truck 8 9 park? MR. WILE: Well, I know they've been 10 loading and unloading as part of operating a 11 12 retail operation. But I was just curious if

13 it's an -- if it's intended to be an ongoing thing. It's parked in front of the new 14 15 location, the Flying Point truck. 16 MR. Is that code or is that some other kind of -- that's got to be code. 6 MR. DOWLING: Well, the Planning Board 7 8 falls under the Village Code, I guess. 9 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right. 10 MR. PROKOP: Yes. It's an interpretation

11	of the code, so it's kind of both.
12	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Then what do you when
13	someone starts building a house without a
14	permit?
15	MS. WINGATE: It's a violation of the
16	Zoning Ordinance.
17	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Huh?
18	MS. WINGATE: It's a violation of the
19	Zoning Ordinance.
20	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right. So is there a
21	fee schedule attached to that?
22	MR. PROKOP: It's \$250 a day. But there's
23	a couple of different violations. It's just not
24	you, know, there's probably when you open
25	like that, there's probably two or three things

that you're doing wrong, it's not just one
thing.

CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Right.

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4 MR. PROKOP: So it's probably, you know, 5 three times 250 for each day, and then, you

know, 750 a day for seven days, you know,

- 7 whatever it is. So that's what it comes out to.
- 8 You know, I can go over it with Eileen and we
- 9 can figure it out, what the violation is.
- 10 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: You're going to do
- 11 that?
- 12 MR. PROKOP: Yes. I'll do it by the next
- 13 meeting.
- 14 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
- 15 MS. WILHELM: Rena Wilhelm. I'm a
- 16 resident of Greenport, and I also own The White
- 17 Weathered Barn on Front Street.
- 18 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: The what?
- 19 MS. WILHELM: The White Weathered Barn on
- 20 Front Street. That's what I own.
- MR. DOWLING: The store, yeah.
- MS. WILHELM: The store.
- 23 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Which store is that?
- 24 MS. MUNDUS: I know.
- 25 AUDIENCE MEMBER: You're fired.

1 (Laughter.)

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2 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: How come I haven't

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3 heard of that? It's on Front Street, right?
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- 4 MR. DOWLING: It's on the south side of
- 5 the street.
- 6 MS. MUNDUS: She moved. She used to be
- 7 next to Di Angela Leather, and then she moved
- 8 from that location to Front Street, which is
- 9 across from The Market, basically.
- 10 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
- 11 MS. WINGATE: Next to the book store.
- 12 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. I walk by there
- every day, but I'm so close, I don't see the
- 14 sign.
- 15 MR. DOWLING: You should stop in some
- 16 time.
- 17 CHAIRMAN JAUOUET: I will.
- 18 MS. MUNDUS: That's because it's
- 19 weathered.
- 20 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay.
- 21 MS. WILHELM: One of the things that I
- 22 really appreciate about fellow Greenport
- 23 merchants is that if one store is already
- carrying a certain brand and a new store comes
- 25 in -- I know myself, before I opened in

Greenport, even though we make all our stuff, so it's not going to really match anyone else's, I did go around to Greenport and figure out like what stores are already here, and to make sure that I wasn't going to be stepping on anyone's toes.

When you have a situation where you have a new store coming in and they are carrying the exact same brand as a small mom-and-pop, as we would call it, store that is directly going to affect the livelihood of that business, that's just something that us in Greenport don't do to each other.

The other thing is that when you open an account with a certain vendor, typically, you want to ask that vendor what is the proximity of the next person or other business that's carrying the same product, because some vendors themselves have their own regulations that they won't — you have to be 45 miles away from each other before you carry — someone carries the same brand. So, if you have, for instance, a business that already has these accounts,

because they have various locations already, there's no real stop to carrying that brand,

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because they already have a long relationship with those certain vendors. So that's my only concern.

We have a couple of stores in Greenport where there was a little bit of a conflict of interest with certain brands, and the owners of those businesses did go to the other stores and said, "Look, I carry this product and I'm not comfortable, you know, with you carrying it," and everyone has been very courteous not to do that to each other.

And although your intention is to be open seven days a week for the entire season, once you start seeing what a winter is like here, those of us who have gone through the cold winters, may not find that it is feasible for you to be open. And I would really, really hate for a store that is open throughout the entire year be — have their bottom line affected by

20	someone who wants to open all year, but may
21	realize that it's it doesn't work. So that's
22	my thoughts.
23	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: What role does the
24	Business Improvement District play in this
25	situation? Don't
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	Planning Board Work Session 3/29/14
1	MS. WILHELM: I am not on the BID Board.
2	MRS. DOWLING: I am.
3	MS. WILHELM: Blake is. I don't think
4	there's anything that's official. It's just
5	sort of a it's common courtesy.
6	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Okay. That wouldn't be
7	a topic of discussion at one of those
8	MS. WILHELM: I think it should be a topic
9	of discussion.
10	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: at one of those
11	meetings where the competing owners, potential
12	competing owners could face each other.
13	MS. WILHELM: Yes. And I actually do
14	think it's this example should be set as

something even -- I mean, you obviously have

16	your regulations as far as how you can open and
L7	what the process is. I think that even
18	before part of that process is whether or not
19	the exact same brands are being carried by
20	someone who already opened a shop in Greenport.
21	And the Dowlings realized that there was a niche
22	in Greenport that was missing and took it upon
23	themselves to open this great shop. Everyone in
24	the Village knows them, and it's a rain on a
)5	narade That's my two cents

1	MRS. DOWLING: I just wanted to mention
2	that, and I did say so before
3	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: What is your shop
4	again? I'm sorry.
5	MRS. DOWLING: One Love Beach.
6	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Oh, you're Chris I'm
7	sorry. Okay.
8	MRS. DOWLING: Yes, that's me.
9	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: I had never met you.
10	MRS. DOWLING: Chris and I had gone down
11	and talked to Chris and Stacy at Flying Point

12	and we are in the process of talking about that
13	exact thing. And again, and I said it before,
14	that the conversation was encouraging.
15	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: So what's your
16	MR. ZUCCHERO: There's 800 brands to
17	choose from, so I don't really think that I need
18	to really carry a lot of things that they carry.
19	So, if we want to like do this type of thing,
20	that's fine, I have no problem with it.
21	MS. MUNDUS: Mark, I encourage you to join
22	the you know, the community of merchants,
23	because it's really Greenport is
24	MR. ZUCCHERO: I would love to. I have so
25	much to say.

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MS. MUNDUS: It's a lot about

accountability and what Sag Harbor used to be 30

years ago, and, you know, a rising tide lifts

all boats.

MR. ZUCCHERO: In Southampton, I carried a

brand called Letarte, women's really high end

bikinis, so they're selling to me, and they

8	opened a store on Jobs Lane. So there's no
9	real, like, love and war, they want bottom
10	lines. Everything is made in China. No one
11	really cares about anyone. They want to get
12	their commission.
13	So the thing that we have to do is come
14	together and create things that are a little
15	different and not be like that. Because I
16	called the rep and the rep said, "I don't care.
17	I don't get commission on it. I can't do
18	anything to protect you." And that's that
19	was how my phone call ended, because
20	CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: And that was a
21	particular line?
22	MR. ZUCCHERO: Yeah, it was a particular
23	bikini line where we sold in Southampton pretty
24	well, and they opened their own store on Jobs
25	Lane, which is on around the corner from Main

- 1 Street where I am.
- 2 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Yeah, I know.
- 3 MR. ZUCCHERO: And no one cares.

4 MR. DOWLING: But some do. 5 MR. ZUCCHERO: I care, and I think it's a 6 thing like that we can work out together based 7 on what issues that we have, because I feel like there's enough brands to go around, if you look 8 9 at the whole big picture. MR. DOWLING: There are, yeah. But some 10 11 reps do care about their product and ask to be 12 pulled from the store --13 MR. ZUCCHERO: That's true. 14 MR. DOWLING: -- and have. 15 CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: Well, then that should be the thing that you guys work -- I don't know 16 if this is --17 18 MS. MUNDUS: Well, this is about ethics, 19 really. 20 MR. DOWLING: Yeah. CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: I know, but still --21 22 MS. MUNDUS: It's sort of outside the 23 scope of the Planning Board. CHAIRMAN JAUQUET: But still, you know, it 24 25 could mean the difference between an original

- shop in town that's interesting and one that
- is -- you see everywhere. And, you know,
- 3 that -- you know, I don't know.
- 4 MRS. RULE: Can I stay something? I am
- 5 Stacy Rule, I'm Chris' wife. We're going to be
- 6 managing it together.
- 7 I think that we will work something out, I
- 8 really do, and I think it can be a different
- 9 thing. I think we're all going to be okay. We
- 10 had a lot of people who came in already and
- said, "This is different, we needed something
- 12 like this." And I have been to your store, but
- my impression was that it was a little bit
- 14 different, and that, you know, there is --
- people said, "Oh, it's nice to have this on the
- 16 North Fork." So I don't know -- I know we're
- both surf shops, but I think that there's a way
- 18 to -- it seems already a little different from
- 19 what I'm -- from the feedback that I've heard,
- from even the, you know, next door and the
- 21 people on our side of, you know, the street who
- have probably been at your store. So it seems
- 23 like there's room there. I think it's all -- it
- 24 will be okay.

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1 because you have a lot of members -- you have 2 people who sit on the BID, Business Improvement 3 District Board right here. After the meeting, you guys should get together and try to work it 4 5 out, because, like I said, a rising tide lifts 6 all boats, rather than just forging ahead. 7 MRS. RULE: That's right. I think the other -- the people around us who came and 8 9 welcomed us when we were working there already 10 seem to be -- have that mentality, that it's 11 going to lift things up and it will be a good 12 thing.
