2	(The meeting was called to order
3	at 7:00 p.m.)
4	MAYOR HUBBARD: I call the meeting
5	to order. Pledge to the flag.
6	(Whereupon, the Pledge of
7	Allegiance was recited.)
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Please remain
9	standing for a moment of silence for
10	Harvey Myron Brown, Nancy Gail Benko
11	Sprenkle, John Cotugno, Jere V. Jacob and
12	Martha Sledzieski.
13	(All remained standing for a
14	Moment of Silence.)
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Be
16	seated.
17	Okay. We have a couple of
18	announcements. The Greenport Band as
19	resumed its concerts in Mitchell Park,
20	beginning at 7:30 p.m. every Friday
21	evening.
22	The 2021 Dances in the Park
23	program begins on August 2nd, 2021, and
24	there's a performance each Monday through
25	the month of August, beginning at 7:30

3	Liquor License Application. We
4	have a renewal application from the
5	Greenporter Hotel, 326 Front Street.
6	Any comments on the liquor license
7	application can be directed the SLA, and
8	your address is on our Village website.
9	Next, we have a public hearing. A
10	proposed amendment to the Village of
11	Greenport Code Section 132-50 regarding
12	the clarification of existing loading
13	zones, and the addition of new loading
14	zones within the Village of Greenport.
15	It's been posted. There's a map
16	out and a Local Law is on the Village
17	website, as well as also attached to the
18	agenda, anybody who read the agenda this
19	evening. We'll open it up if anybody
20	wants to comment on the Loading Zone
21	public hearing. Name and address for the
22	record so the transcriptionist gets it.
23	And the public hearing is open, if anybody
24	would like to speak.
25	MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Third

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2	Street.
3	I looked at it between the
4	proposed what you're taking out, taking
5	in. I was all confused. Nothing. Are
6	you taking away the existing loading at
7	IGA where they've always where they do
8	now, to move it across the street? Is
9	that what the proposal is?
10	MAYOR HUBBARD: That was the
11	proposal. But after speaking with Code
12	Enforcement, with IGA, with Village
13	administrator, I believe we're going to
14	make that a timed parking zone, that one
15	spot, so IGA doesn't have to move their
16	stuff from across the street going across
17	the road with the equipment that they
18	have, and keep that loading zone there
19	from 6 to 9 or 6 to 10 for the big tractor
20	trailer to unload there. But then after
21	that, it'll be a no-parking zone. And
22	we're gonna move the loading zone this
23	was the original proposal. Somehow, with
24	all the different changes and everything
25	else with public hearings, the loading

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 2 zone on the south side of Adams Street 3 would start at the cutout from where you come out of the IGA parking lot. 4 5 MS. ALLEN: Right. 6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Go from there, and 7 head west. That was what we had originally had talked about. Instead of 8 9 having it on both sides, keeping that section. So it's gonna be a loading zone 10 next to the drugstore. It'll be IGA zone. 11 And then where the cutout comes out and 12 13 you pull out, it'll move that, that way. MS. ALLEN: Okay. 'Cause that was 14 15 one of my things. I'm like, they've had it there for so long, it's easy, 'cause 16 17 they can unload right into the building. 18 Okay, so thank you for that. 19 I know that you're also proposing the one on Third Street. Are these 20 21 businesses going to be told that's where 22 they have to load and unload and stop 23 using the right-of-way behind where 24 Goldberg's is? That driveway is 25 constantly blocked, and it's a

right-of-way, to do deliveries. They should be told now, okay, there is a loading zone you need to use. I mean, I thought when this building was approved, that they were supposed to have their own loading zone, you know. Some of the drivers are really nice. They'll park across over at Mr. Robert's. They load. And, you know, they schlep the stuff across the street.

One of these days there is gonna be an accident or someone, with the times we live in now, because you go and pull from the deli and you go to come out that right-of-way and you can't get out and then you can't back up, either, because you got cars behind you, you know, everything gets congested. Just a way to maybe just -- a friendly reminder, hey, you can't block right-of-ways, you know, and that should be for anywhere. But the ones that I was seeing, I -- you know, I think are great.

I mean, today, 'cause I'm driving

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2	for the summer program and I have to come
3	on Main Street and turn onto Front Street
4	in that big old bus and then stop because
5	the child can't come out anywhere but the
6	corner because of the parklets and I have
7	deliveries on both sides of me so, you
8	know, just have to use extra caution when
9	you see that.
10	Okay, I'm happy about that,
11	though, with IGA. And the other ones
12	looked good, so thank you.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: All right, thank
14	you.
15	Any other comments on the Loading
16	Zone public hearing?
17	(No Response)
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Now, we're
19	gonna I'm gonna have Paul and Joe work
20	on amending what I just explained about
21	switching that on Adams Street right at
22	the corner there and then I'll offer to
23	close the public hearing, redo the map,
24	send it back out, and we'll have a
25	discussion at our work session next month.

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2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay? Everybody
4	comfortable with that? Okay.
5	I'll offer a motion to close the
6	public hearing.
7	MR. MARTILOTTA: Second.
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?
9	TRUSTEE CLARKE: Aye.
10	TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
13	MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.
14	Opposed?

16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Motion carried.
17	If you can get those maps out and
18	the wording as soon as possible, Paul, to
19	everybody and to the public.
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
21	MAYOR HUBBARD: And post it?
22	Thank you.
23	Okay. Public to address the
24	Board. I see we've got a lot here. So
25	public can address the Board on any topic.

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2	Name and address for the record. And, go
3	ahead.
4	MS. WADE: Randy Wade, Sixth
5	Street, Greenport.
6	I am so glad to see the Rotary
7	here because they are a wonderful
8	civic-minded people. And in talking to a
9	couple of them, I realize that this plan
10	for the mini railroad and how it will be
11	laid out in Moores Woods is confusing to
12	them. It was confusing to the reporter
13	for the Suffolk Times who said that I
14	claimed it would block the nature path,
15	whereas anybody looking at the plan,
16	there's a line with X's, and it's
17	referenced as six-foot chain link fence.
18	And the profile is the
19	100-year-old oyster path which now has the
20	flags on either side to mark out where the
21	edge of construction could be and the silt
22	fence to keep it out of the wetlands.
23	Just in from that, on the right, is a
24	six-foot high chain link fence that we've
25	been told will be painted black so it will

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be attractive, and it goes across the -blocking the nature path for a service road, and then the tracks are on the left side of the oyster shell path that, again, is the 100-year-old oyster shell path that in 1971, '72, Greenport's Ecology class established a nature trail there with maybe 25 markers, highlighting what people could look at. They hired three high school kids that summer to guide people through it. 4,000 people came to look at the nature trail. Other schools, besides Greenport, were using it as a classroom. And it's -- nobody seems to understand that the plan -- the DEC moved the tracks to higher ground so that they'd be up on the oyster shell path so that this fence is blocking the nature trail.

We love the railroad. We want the railroad. There are certainly places for the railroad. But the DEC has boxed us all into a corner by having this choice of either the nature trail or the railroad, and it's an unfortunate choice. Thank

2	you.
3	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
4	Got somebody coming up. Wait a
5	second. Go ahead.
6	MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen again,
7	Third Street.
8	First of all, I was one of those
9	students back in the '70s that worked on
10	the nature trails in Moores Lane.
11	So to give history, we have trails
12	that go from the softball field all the
13	way to the North Road. Up towards the
14	North Road, there's a little confusion
15	because they call it the Boy Scout Camp.
16	Well, back in the '70s, I was one of the
17	Girl Scouts that was in there clearing and
18	making a camp.
19	The other day I'm like, you know,
20	I haven't been following exactly where
21	this railroad is going, but I don't even
22	know how many years ago it was that we sat
23	in this room when Rotary came here with
24	this idea. I was over the moon. I'm one
25	of the oldies from around here, okay, grew

up. I know what the railroad is. I have the memories of the railroad and I think it would be an amazing thing, not just for our Village, for Greenport, but for everyone.

I also think it'll bring more attention to that part in Moores Woods. And hopefully we can get the state park going as well and have a nice area there for families to go and spend an entire day, to have ball fields, to have a skate park and have the train there as well.

So curiosity got the better of me and I'm like, I don't understand what's being talked about, why -- how it's blocking the trails. Because back when we started this in the '70s, we never went in at that end. It was more where the softball fields are. That's where our entrances were. We didn't always come out near the tower. There's other ways to get into that one little section. You're talking one small section that the railroad will be taking up.

The Board, the Rotary waited how long for someone who didn't even live around here to pull the same thing and say, "Oh, there's an endangered flower in there, you can't put the railroad there." So you had to wait to see if it bloomed. Guess what? It didn't bloom. It's not there. Sometimes people make more of a deal out of something than it actually is. It's not like you're talking about putting the miniature train of in all of Moores Woods from Front to the North Road, okay. You're talking one small area that this train will be going in that is gonna be such a benefit to everyone, young and old.

So, yes, it bothers me, especially when this information gets put up, too.

You know, we need to get the proper information out. I heard someone say that, "Oh, I never heard of this before."

You guys might have the right year. I don't. I don't know how many years ago it was when this was first proposed, but I was in this room when it was proposed.

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 2 And my first thing that I said to them 3 was, "Let me know what I can do," because I am so for this that I really hope you 4 5 push -- let this go through. They got 6 held up because of that nonexistent plant 7 life. We got held up with COVID. Please 8 don't have any more holdups. I would like 9 to see this put in. I would love by October to have these kids back on a 10 11 haunted train. 12 I talk to my kids on my bus all the time about this, you know, and they 13 have no clue what I'm talking about. And 14 I said, "You just wait." So to give the 15 next generation and those that have never 16 17 experienced this before, this experience. 18 All of this is gonna disappear. So, 19 please, for one small area of all of 20 Moores Woods, please pass this. Thank 21 you. 22 (Applause) 23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Go ahead. 24 You're next, John. 25 MS. WELLS: Hi. I'm Lydia Wells.

I live on 306 Johnson Court.

And I've been an educator for -today I was counting. It's like 48 years
or whatever. And during the '90s I was -I helped run a program at the school in
the summertime for our Greenport kids
where I was the nature lady. And I would
take the kids into Moores Woods to take
and look at all the different things that
were there and allow them to explore.

I am thrilled that this is where the train is going to be. We really can expand this. We can put in a nature program. The train could stop along the way. There's a whole variety of things that we can bring the nature to kids in a safe way, too.

A lot of times when I'd be in the Moores Woods with the kids, I would point out poison oak and poison ivy, tell them to stay away from it. Usually, I was the one that got it. So I'm really happy that we'll, at least, have the train to go through and they'll be able to enjoy our

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 2 woods. 3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, thank you. All right, Mr. Saladino. 4 5 MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, 6 Sixth Street. 7 I would just like to -- I didn't come to any of the previous meetings where 8 9 the proponents of not having the railroad at Moores Woods, so I listened to them and 10 11 I just kind of -- to the substance of 12 their arguments, I would just like to --13 Moores Woods, I looked at the tax map. It's 175 acres, not counting Silver 14 15 Lake and some other stuff, so 240 total. But the area we're talking about is 175 16 17 acres. 18 I looked at the DEC permit, the tree survey. They're gonna take down 19 19 20 trees, two old growth, 17 young, less than 21 the circumference of the -- of the trees 22 were from two to five inches, basically 23 kind of like saplings. They're all white 24 oaks. White oaks. I looked up white oak 25 because I don't know about white oaks and

1 REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 2 swamp oak. They -- they're big cover, 3 ground cover, a hearty tree, grow very fast, between 15 or 16 to 24 inches a 4 5 year. 6 So if you planted a sapling, a 7 two-foot sapling, in less than a generation that tree would be 22 feet 8 9 tall. So I'm sure Peter knows this. didn't. That surprises me. So the fact 10 11 that you're gonna lose two old grow trees 12 and 17 trees that are less than from two 13 to five inches in circumference in 177 acres, to me, just didn't seem like that 14 15 big a deal. I heard at these meetings that 16 17 there shouldn't be a railroad and a park. 18 I went to the National Park Service. They 19 control over 300 national parks and national historic sites. In 300 national 20 21 parks and national historic sites, there's railroads. Some of them are commercial 22

and some of them are tourist built just to

service that park. Some of the parks are

more well known than others, Yosemite,

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Yellowstone, Zion, Glacier. The National Historic Site that has a tourist railroad is Gettysburg, so it's not like some obscure park in Dugway, Utah, you know, that somebody built a railroad.

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I heard complaints that the vernal ponds would be filled. For the people --I'm sure the Board knows, but for the people that don't, a vernal pond has no water source except rain. It's a depression in the ground, usually a clay bottom. And the Department of Environmental Conservation defines a vernal pool as not deeper than four inches. So you have a depression in the ground that's filled by rain that's not deeper than four inches. I don't want to be snarky, but it's basically a puddle. And during the summer it doesn't exist because it evaporates. During the fall and spring, they fill. And seeds do germinate there and amphibians do lay their eggs there. But in my 12 years on the CAC, what I found is, is that nature,

1 REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 like, they adjust, they adapt and they 2 3 overcome. So if a vernal pond, pool is filled over there, nature's pretty smart, 4 5 that they move over there. So, again, I 6 don't think, you know, the 1,000 feet of 7 right-of-way that might fill some vernal ponds, pools would create an environmental 8 9 hazard or a ecological hazard or a hazard to nature and woods. 10 11 I just heard Randy talk about the 12 fence. I looked at the DEC stamped plans. 13 The fence is for the first 300 feet of the 14 1,000 feet of right-of-way. I'm not sure how long the entire nature trail is. I 15 16 have to guess it's two or three miles. 17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Something. I'm 18 not sure the exact line. 19 MR. SALADINO: I'm not sure. 20 Maybe. 21 So the fence will run for the 22 first 300 feet from the entrance on Moores 23 Lane. You have 1,000 feet of right-of-way. You have 300 feet of chain 24 25 link fence. I can't imagine anybody not

1 REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 wanting a fence around even a mini 2 3 railroad right-of-way in the society that we have today, you know, number one. 4 5 Number two, if the fence obscures 6 the view of nature, if you look to the 7 right, to the left when you walk in, perhaps you look over there. Again, I 8 9 don't -- these are legitimate concerns that some folks have and I don't want 10 11 to -- but, I mean, I think 1,000 feet of 12 right-of-way that has perhaps 300 feet of 13 chain link fence to guard along that portion of the right-of-way is a good 14 15 compromise. I think, I think it -- to suggest that it should be built someplace 16 17 else, I think, at this point just doesn't 18 make sense. 19 Someone had brought up the 20 expense. Will there be expense? Probably. There's an expense to 21 22 everything. After it's built, the Village 23 will probably maintain it and fix stuff, I mean, but we do that for a lot of stuff. 24 25 We do it for the ice rink. We do it for

2	the skate park. We do it for Fifth
3	Street, for Sixth Street, for Third Street
4	Park, for the basketball courts. And I'm
5	sure there's enough people here, too, that
6	are generous enough to make contributions
7	to offset the cost.
8	So I think, I think and I had
9	said this somewhere. I think the benefit
10	to the village far, far outweighs the
11	detriment to the woods. So I would
12	encourage you guys to do this. Thank you.
13	Thanks for listening.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, thank you.
15	(Applause)
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anybody
17	else wish to address the Board?
18	MR. CAPON: George Capon. I was
19	born and raised in Greenport.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Just your address
21	for the record.
22	MR. CAPON: 509 Seventh Street.
23	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
24	MR. CAPON: As I said, I'm 90
25	years old. I remember is when they built

the road, I should say the building for
the Boy Scouts, and a lot of trees and
that was taken down. I can remember the
Village made a road from Moores Lane all
the way around to Moores Lane again to let
a road to go by for people to come in.
The Village people was hand in hand that
came in and help the Boy Scouts, taking
down trees, brushes and everything else.
Not one thing about Moores Woods.

Another thing I remember, Harry
Munzel, a good, good man from the Village
of Greenport, he made a road just a little
ways from where the train is gonna be.
And I went around, all the way around,
come back out on 25. When they went
around all the way in the back, I was told
by my uncle that worked by the Village,
said that when they went all the way
around, way past of where the train is
gonna be, there is nothing but swamps.
And they -- the Village brought in
Southold Town, and I can't remember
anything about that, and said they dug it

2 all out and filled it in so the road would 3 go around to them.

Now, another thing I understand, that a lot of people here is against wetland. The only thing I'm gonna say is our wetland is, if you can remember, the condo just east of the nursing home, there is nothing but swamps. And they built all these condominiums there and they dug down almost eight feet to clear out all that land and filled it in. That is what wetland is. This train coming in has nothing to do with wetland, nothing to do with wetland.

Again, now, this year, when they started in, I talked to a lot of the Rotary and their petition coming out. I went out into the Village, doors to doors, and went and got over 2,500 signatures all for this here train. I only had one person that told me they was against this here project. So I hope after this here meeting go, now the Village would say go, go and go.

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2	(Applause)
3	MS. DECRUZ: Margaret Decruz, 25
4	Washington Avenue, Greenport. This is a
5	scary crowd, I can see it's big. Anyway.
6	So I'm reading something I wrote
7	because if I just start, try to talk ad
8	lib, I screw it up. It's not that long,
9	but okay.
10	So, Dear Mayor Hubbard, Board
11	Members, administrators, staff and Rotary
12	people and fellow residents, I understand
13	there's been a lot of time, energy,
14	paperwork, fundraising, more paperwork and
15	emotions invested in getting the mini
16	railroad back into Greenport. So the
17	points I make are not meant to negate any
18	of those efforts or the ideas.
19	I've read the permits, plans,
20	drawings and I see that a lot of careful
21	consideration went into them. Although I
22	do have different ideas than what is
23	currently proposed, I'm not making it or
24	you wrong. If you can listen with your
25	original good intentions to bring

2	something joyful to the Village and the
3	children and without judging me or my
4	ideas, I'd appreciate it. I know it's
5	hard to do that.
6	All right, that's my introduction.
7	Here's what I want to say.
8	Last week I made a request to look
9	at the Moores Lane area from a larger
10	perspective where other wishes, desires or
11	needs could be incorporated along with the
12	mini railroad. These are the mini
13	railroad, skate park improvement, a clean
14	enclosed dog park, if possible, restrooms,
15	and preserving the forest and wetlands of
16	Moores Woods as a refuge for all
17	creatures. A plan that brings in the
18	larger community with their energy,
19	imagination, labor and fundraising
20	abilities would be a community uniting
21	endeavor and perhaps make many people
22	happy. Yes, it would take time to pause
23	and reassess, but could be worth it in the
24	long run.
25	My second point which I did not

which I didn't deliver well last week is that this is a different time than when the original plan was initiated. Besides the pandemic, more people and more traffic out here, we have more bigger and glaring environmental and climate disruptions everywhere, including here.

Partnership's website and saw the updated projections for sea level rise are six inches for 2020's -- for the 2020's, 21 inches for the 2050, and 47 inches for 2100. This means that increased threats from ongoing global warming make the wetlands and forests more vulnerable to flooding and wind events, but more important for Greenport resilience.

When I looked at the maps from the Peconic Estuary Partnership -- these are long words now, okay. When I looked at the maps from the Peconic Estuary Partnership's Climate-Based Critical Lands Protection Strategy Criteria and Ranking Tool, it appears the railroad is on a

Class 1 critical natural resource area or also significant coastal fish and wildlife habitat. Those designations are made by the state. And in Section 3.4 of the 2020 Comprehensive Plan for the Town of Southold, Natural Resource and Environmental Protection Draft, Moores Drain and Pipes Cove are one of 21 designated significant coastal fish and wildlife habitats. The Town of Southold recognizes the importance of protecting and enhancing these valuable habitats. That's part of the plan.

With the projected sea level rise of six inches for the 2020's and the critical need to protect the areas, I think a wise action would be to rethink and relook at the plan. My idea is that the efforts and funds raised for the railroad may go further with a simpler plan that does not entail going into the woods, thus no need to build a bridge over wetlands and cut down important large trees. Funds could be used to help

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2	preserve the woods for the children's
3	future so they have tadpoles, frogs,
4	fireflies, birds and flowers that we,
5	adults, love.
6	Now is not the time to down trees
7	and clear vegetation that are needed for
8	holding water and CO2 and preventing
9	erosion. Trees are considered to be like
10	a lake. That's how much water they hold.
11	The forest and the wetlands are our
12	buffer. They make Greenport more
13	resilient.
14	I propose redirecting energy and
15	money towards the above, skateboard park,
16	dog run, restrooms, mini railroad, picnic
17	benches, shade trees, a water fountain and
18	community involvement. Thank you for
19	listening.
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
21	(Applause)
22	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anybody
23	else wish to address the Board? Can't
24	stand up first. Okay, go ahead. You're
25	next, sir.

2	MR. BRUDER: My name is Pat Bruder
3	and I live on Oyster Pond Lane in Orient.
4	And I just I'll be very brief.
5	All I want to do is say thanks to the
6	Village, to the Board for your support for
7	the last four years. It's been a long,
8	long trip. And I' we're gonna get this
9	thing done. But thank you very much for
10	your support.
11	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you.
12	(Applause)
13	MR. ISRAEL: Hi. I'm Marcel
14	Israel. I'll use 685 Osprey Nest Road,
15	Greenport.
16	I went to Greenport pre-K through
17	graduating in 2002. I was part of the Boy
18	Scouts 251. We did the trail in Moores
19	Woods. I was part of building the skate
20	park in Greenport, giving kids a place to
21	go.
22	You know, I look around Greenport
23	today. It's changed a lot from when I was
24	this size. There's a lot more people.
25	There's a lot more stuff to do. But what

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2	Frank had was special. I know I rode that
3	train every year. My children have never
4	seen that. They've seen the tracks.
5	They've seen what's left. And they ride
6	the carousel, they go to the skate park.
7	But I think that would be special, special
8	for every child in Greenport and every
9	child that visits Greenport. It's a part
10	of our history. Frank Fields was a
11	community member and loved trains. And
12	just to see it again would be amazing.
13	That's all I got.
14	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
15	(Applause)
16	MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
17	to address the Board?
18	MS. FINNO-ISRAEL: Hi. Amy Finno.
19	I actually own the property next to
20	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Just, name
21	and address for the record, please.
22	MS. FINNO-ISRAEL: 35 Middleton
23	Road, Greenport.
24	MAYOR HUBBARD: And your name?
25	MS. FINNO-ISRAEL: Amy Israel.

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2	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.
3	MS. FINNO-ISRAEL: So I also grew
4	up with that train, and to not see my kids
5	ride it is just a sad thing. And I think
6	Moores Woods has become less of a tourist
7	attraction over the past 25 years.
8	It's doesn't even have the luster of
9	what it used to have. And I think a train
10	would make that space so much better and
11	revive it. And to not push forward
12	something like this and keep the tradition
13	alive in Greenport, I think, would be a
14	big mistake. That's all I have to say.
15	MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.
16	TRUSTEE CLARKE: Thank you.
17	(Applause)
18	MAYOR HUBBARD: Did you want to
19	say something, Rich? You got up and
20	then okay.
21	MR. WEBSTER: Hi. Kevin Webster,
22	665 Gillette Drive, East Marion. Usually,
23	I bring my own microphone so this is kind
24	of tough, but.
25	So just want to talk a little bit

1

2 about the train. I am an Oyster Ponds 3 graduate, so class of 1982, so I did not ride on the train as a kid. But I owned a 4 house on Middleton Road for a couple a 5 years before I moved to East Marion 23 6 years ago. And since I've been in East 7 Marion, I've taken my son there over the 8 9 years many times, loved riding on the train. I love the haunted train. If some 10 11 people here know me, I love Halloween. 12 It's my favorite holiday. And I am hoping 13 that we get this train. Obviously, the train going in there would be great to do 14 something for Halloween. I think it'll be 15 great for the kids. I think it'll be 16 17 great for people coming in from out of the 18 area as another thing to come to the great Village of Greenport and the North Fork 19 20 and see. I love it in that location. 21 think it's a great thing to honor Joe 22 Cherepowich and the family who's back 23 here. So I 100 percent approve this and 24 want to see it go forward. And I commend 25 you, Mr. Mayor, and the rest of the Board

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 for this, and I thank you very much for 2 3 the time. 4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 5 (Applause) 6 MS. WALKER: Hi there. Heather 7 Walker, 2530 Gillette Drive, East Marion. And I, too, just wanted to thank 8 9 you for all of your support. The train means a lot to me. Not only did I enjoy 10 11 the train growing up, my children enjoyed 12 the train growing up, but especially my 13 dad, Joe Cherepowich, who's unfortunately not here today. 14 But back in 2017 when he first 15 came up with the idea that the train was 16 17 just, just in storage and nothing was 18 being done to it, and he came up with the idea that we, as Rotarians, should restore 19 20 it and get it back in action, but where do 21 we put it and how do we do it. 22 So with the Rotary support, we all 23 agreed, as a club, I mean, many of us, 30, 24 40 people, that this is something that we 25 want to stand behind. So he spoke with

1 REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 2 Mayor Hubbard and got the Village 3 approval. So once that was decided upon, we got to work with all the fundraising. 4 5 So this is a project that we've 6 been all working on together for, you 7 know, over five years. So it does bother me when other community members say they 8 9 haven't heard about it, they didn't know where it was gonna be. It's never been a 10 11 secret. It's been talked about since day 12 one when it was decided it was gonna be on 13 Moores Lane. 14 So I would like to thank everyone. 15 I really would like to see this happen. Greenport has changed a lot over the 16 17 years. Seeing, you know, many 18 generations. There's a lot of 19 restaurants. There's a lot of bars, a lot 20 of little expensive boutiques, the wineries, breweries. There's -- it's 21 22 dwindling for things for families to do, 23 besides, you know, walks or beaches. 24 The carousel, I'm sure, had a lot 25 of people not for that, either, right in

the heart of the Village, but they overcame. And to me, I think it's one of the most beautiful parts of the Village now, places for people to visit, Dances with the Park, the carousel.

And my vision and, I think, a lot of the Rotarian's vision, is that this is going to be a beautiful attraction. We're only going to enhance Greenport. We're going to make it more beautiful. We're going to have educational things for the kids.

Like I said, for years kids have always rode on Frank Field's train. Do they still walk in the parks? I don't know. I know through my generation, my kids' generation, we did not go as a class over from Greenport school and walk through the woods. There's all sorts of reasons, you know. Education is a lot more stringent. You know, you're focused. You're limited in class time. There's not a lot of time for walking through the woods. So I feel like this is a way that

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2	we can bring education back and enhance
3	the area.
4	So anyway, I would like to see
5	this happen, and I appreciate all of your
6	support.
7	(Applause)
8	MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Anybody
9	else wish to address the Board?
10	MR. ISRAEL: Good evening,
11	everyone. My name is Richard Israel. I
12	currently live in East Marion or the
13	border of Greenport and East Marion.
14	I'm here representing the Rotary
15	Club and all the work that we've done over
16	the last four years. This was a project
17	that we presented to the Board in 2017.
18	We basically had always the commitment of
19	the Village, which we thank you. I think
20	all of our local community understands
21	what Frank Field's train was and the
22	importance to get it running again.
23	Four years ago, when it was
24	brought up, it wasn't like we just decided
25	this is where it's going to go. We went

around with the Village, we looked at several sites, and we picked the site on Moores Lane for a multitude of reasons. It was already a public park. It already had the ability to handle people. the skate park there. We have our ball fields there. We have our fairgrounds there, okay. It was designed, and over the years it has grown to where it can handle the capacity of people to come visit and do.

The park has always been there, okay. It's been under -- I don't want to say underutilized, but there's more things that can be done there. You know, the center of Greenport has become a very, very busy place. And I think we -- if we direct people, which we'll be doing that with this, it will help that area grow. It'll help people realize that we can park in other areas of the town and still walk to it. We're all in walking distance. That's the great part of the Greenport.

So four years ago everybody was

gung-ho, let's do it. And the first thing that happened was we had to go get our permits. We applied to the DEC, only to our chagrin, that there was a couple of botanists and the like who said, "What are you doing," "You shouldn't do this."

And we spent four years with the DEC proving both to the botanists who weren't even from this area to that what they were suggesting did not exist where we were going to put the train. And the DEC worked with us and the Village. And the Village did, you know, a tremendous job to help us get through that gauntlet. And we've placed the train to where we have -- are not tearing down a lot of trees. Originally, we were tearing down a lot of trees, you know, to put it on a -- just a simple path. We've now changed that path.

As part of that approval, the train is on the shell road, which everybody thinks is historic. The shell road, as we all know, was built as a

service road to get into Moores Woods to handle the drainage and keep it running and smoothly.

So if you look at our plans, which are finally made, and you go out into the woods, you can see where the shell road is and where we're allowed to disturb. So I believe we have to get the opportunity to build this. We will try to keep -- and the plans show it that way, that the train will stay as far left as it can so to not to impede onto the wetlands, as designed by the DEC or set up. And then we'll take a look at where the fence will go within that radius so to protect the children and to leave enough space and the like.

If we had to, we could probably widen the road along the 200 feet or so that it's impeding on the shell road. And it's a shell road because we all know that back in the day, that was the cheapest form of fill that we could find, and we didn't know what to do with our oyster shells that used to pile up over

everybody's, you know, two stories at the end of history and every other place. So it's a great natural filler for what it is and that's what the Village did back in the day, okay. It is probably the best compacted road we got.

So, understand that we have the same concerns with nature as everybody else. We all know Moores Woods. We know its utility. We know its way.

As several people have said here earlier, there are many ways into Moores Woods, which maybe many people don't understand that. Maybe through some education, we can do that. We've heard stories about how it used to -- that road used to go all the way in there and turn and go up to where the Audubon Society is. These are all trails that have not been maintained over the years, neither by the naturalists or the volunteers that are purporting to come here and the like. It's something that we all could take better care of Moores Woods and create it

and open it up. But this is a beginning.

3 You know, people have suggested that we

4 create a dog park and this and that.

5 Well, we have to start someplace, okay,

6 and I think the train is a good

7 opportunity for us to start.

said, and we're still sticking by our guns, that we're gonna try to get -- one of the major things we want to see is public bathrooms. 'Cause I will tell you, without the public bathrooms, we all know where they go to the bathroom. And if that's insensitive, you know, land, this is one of the things that will help improve the area. We need that and we'll

figure out how to do it, okay.

The issue is that over the last four years, we've spent quite a bit of money and we just started to spend money again to start to prepare to build the railroad. We have to build a bridge which we never expected to do. We have a lot of other expenses that were never originally

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 2 created. 3 The Rotary Club probably to date has raised about \$200,000 for this project 4 5 all from people, and not from people who gave us \$50,000. From everybody who went 6 7 to our fundraisers and gave us \$20 and \$50 and \$100. So just like we've gone out and 8 9 gotten, you know, signatures from 2,500 people, that's the people that have given 10 11 and supported. That's the people of our 12 Village who want this to come about. 13 And again, we're ready to do it. We've put all our efforts for it. And I 14 15 have to say, the Village of Greenport has always stood behind us, 'cause I think 16 17 they, as, I'll use the word locals, 18 understood how important it is to keep the family traditions and basises (sic) that 19 20 make Greenport special. And we want to 21 keep that. We don't want it to disappear. 22 We don't want it to land up in the history 23 books as, oh, there used to be. We don't 24 have to do that, okay. 25 Greenport has become a very

successful place. It's a very family-oriented place. This fits into all of the criteria that, if we look forward, it meets it. It creates something that keeps the character of our Village special. And I believe that it is the beginning of things that will answer all the questions that the people who are questioning it are -- will get better. Wе will -- and it has to be done by the community. It can't be done by the Rotary Club. We can't build your village, okay.

But if interest is brought back to that area and we get the Boy Scouts again or we get other people who love to go into the woods, help us start to clean it up and do what it was 50 years ago after that school project, that would be great. If we create the bathrooms and create a public space that can be utilized for education and the like, these are all good things that will spurn more growth and good stuff for our Village, and that's all we're asking.

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And we're at a point where if we stop now, I don't know what to do, guys.

We've raised money. I wouldn't even know who to give it back to. We've spent money. I don't know where to get it to give it back to the people.

So, you know, we've done everything. We've tried to stay to the book. We've waited. We've hired people. We've done everything else. We just spent money to, you know, survey it out, lay it out so that everybody can look at it. We've ordered rails for the train. Everything. And the community, once they heard that we had our approvals, all the people that were willing to help four years ago have resurfaced. We haven't lost them. Yes, we've lost Frank Fields, and it would have been nice if he could have seen his train running again. We've lost Joe Cherepowich, who was really the first person who brought it up and said, hey, let's do that. And the Rotarians and me, we all got behind it and we've been

2 fighting ever since.

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We want to see this happen. And

if it's gonna take another four years, I

can't tell you I'll be standing here or it

will ever happen. It will kill the

project.

I think we have to look at the project and say let's move forward, let's face our problems, like I do in development every day, and we'll correct things as they are needed. If we need a little wider path, so be it, we'll create it. We have the swath of where that road goes in to make it a little wider, if needed. We have the ability where the fence stands, you know, as per plan, has -- you know, we can move it in. doesn't have to be 15 feet away. It would be nice if it was 50 feet away so that no one would ever see it, but, you know, we can come up with solutions for that, but it's -- it can be done. And I think we just have to have the effort. And I think we all have the concern to do it right.

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 2 And I think with all of us, we will do it 3 right, you know. There's no -- we're being 4 5 transparent here. We're trying to do the 6 right thing. We're trying to make 7 something happen that, as you can see, everybody wants to happen, you know. I 8 9 think if you speak to everybody, even the two or three people that have come up in 10 11 opposition, they don't really want to stop the train. They just want to tweak it or 12 do something to it. And we can look at 13 that, but it has to be done by the 14 15 professionals and everybody else. And we have those people all on board. 16 So, give us a chance. We'll do 17 18 the right thing. Rotary always does. Rotary has always stood behind this 19 20 Village. We have done multiple projects over 50 years, 75 years, whatever, and 21 22 we're part of your community. So give us 23 a chance and let us move forward. And it 24 will be a great thing in retrospect. 25 Just like some people have said,

1 REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 2 whoever wanted the carousel in the middle 3 of Greenport. If you remember those public hearings back then, I think if we 4 5 had allowed guns in here, we'd have dead 6 people. 7 So understand, you have to let it happen and let it grow, and it will be for 8 9 the best of our community. And I think everyone on this Board has always been 10 11 behind us and we thank you for that and 12 let's just get it done, okay. Thank you 13 for your time and effort. 14 (Applause) 15 MR. HILBRAND: Jaap Hilbrand, 160 16 Sterling Street in Greenport. 17 I've been all over the Middle 18 East. I've seen Israel. I never knew 19 there were as many of you. So, good 20 tactic. 21 We'd be standing back, and not to 22 hold up any more of us who are over 80 and 23 standing-room only, one or two things. 24 What color is the fence going to be? 25 Brown, beige, green, natural? A lot of

She keeps everybody on their toes, and I thank you for it. 4 MS. GALVEZ: I really didn't think 5 I was gonna talk so I'll make this quick. 6 7 Colette Galvez, 350 Rabbit Lane, East Marion. 8 9 I'm presenting here as somebody whose parents used to bring me from out 10 11 west to go to the train and to come out to 12 Greenport for the day to visit, but I'm also here as a past Earth Science educator 13 and a Long Island native plant gardener. 14 I'm looking at both of these 15 16 sides. I think, as what people have said, 17 we could work together. I hike Moores 18 Lane. It's almost impossible to hike it without getting ticks and thorns. It 19 needs a lot of care. There's a lot of 20 21 invasive plants in there. It's going to 22 be ignored if we don't bring attention to 23 it. 24 And I know it sounds crazy, but 25 sometimes bringing in something, like the

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railroad, where they've kind of listened to the community and have adjusted their plans and are willing to probably adjust their plans and make a small environmental impact as much as they can, like you said, ten trees, we could plant those -- I could plant them tomorrow if we need, to make that as an attention to draw in people and educators and say, hey, let's do a trail, let's clean this up. You're not gonna get anyone out there right now. We tried. Ιn April, I believe there was, like, a cleanup and not that many people showed up. I did one in July. I think five of us showed up.

You're -- you need to have an attention and make it important and have families go there and say this is important. The same thing as you pointed out with it being the wetlands with the fish population and all that. If there are people there and it's made attention to of, hey, this is something that we need to take care of. We have the train here.

REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 1 2 This is our enjoyment. Let's now put our 3 attention to taking care of this. It's 4 that yin and yang. So I just think that, you know, 5 6 sometimes you need something to get to the 7 overall of goodness of the environment and the goodness of the community. 8 9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. 10 (Applause) 11 MS. LAUBER: Hi. Peggy Lauber, 12 149 Sixth Street in Greenport. I'm 13 president of North Fork Audubon Society. 14 And Richard, very well said, I --15 from the beginning two months ago when I 16 heard that the DEC permit was issued, what 17 did I say to you guys? I said we really 18 all need to work together here. Moores Woods is a gem. It's a jewel. It's been 19 20 sadly neglected for years now, 21 probably especially in the past ten years. 22 And one thing that was pointed out is that 23 the main entrance or it was the original entrance was from the main road to the 24 25 North Road, they're impassable. It'd be

1 REGULAR SESSION - 7/29/21 great if we could walk those trails, but 2 3 they're impassable right now. And let's all work together. But it's also to you, 4 5 the Village. You guys are responsible for 6 Moores Woods. You guys own the woods. 7 We're the community, but you're the governing body here that is responsible 8 9 for Moores Woods. And I've been saying this from the 10 11 beginning, Moores Woods need our 12 attention. Right now it is a mess back 13 there. And I think we need to bring in 14 some experts who understand what needs to be done about the drains, the culverts, 15 the trees that are down in front of the 16 17 paths. What do we do about that? I know 18 there are DEC regulations about how this 19 all can be handled. But right now, 20 literally, you -- I would ask anybody here 21 to try walking from the main road to the 22 North Road. You can't. It's completely 23 impassable, winter, spring, summer and 24 fall. 25 And I would like very much to work

with the Rotary. I know there's enthusiasm. It's fantastic. As the woman before just said, this is an opportunity for us to work together, make that whole woods, not just the fenced in part here where the train is. Let's make the whole woods something to be proud of. We can bring it -- not just bring it back to what it was. Let's make it better than it ever was as an opportunity to educate our community, our children about nature. It's an opportunity for us all.

So we are willing and able and want very much, as North Fork Audubon, headquarters in Greenport at the Royal 8th and Nature Center, adjacent to the north end of Moores Woods, originally connected. And by the way, that main road to the North Road was the original, the origin of the Bay to Sound Trails Project in Southold Town. Greenport has not -- my understanding is has not been working with the rest of the trail system to get that passable. So I have a great interest in

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2	that.
3	And, like I say, and as people
4	have been saying, the more people that we
5	can, like, bring into that woods
6	responsibly, not just a, you know, place
7	where you hang out while you're waiting to
8	go on the train and then throw your trash
9	out there, but let's all have respect for
10	that woods and make it better than it ever
11	was. Thank you.

When I 7 first moved 13 years ago to Greenport, in one of the first meetings that I went to 8 9 like this, there was a gentleman who was a fisherman, and some of you will remember 10 11 his name, but I don't, who said, 12 "Greenport has plenty of amenities. don't have enough businesses." And as I 13 thought about that sort of comparison 14 15 between amenities and businesses, I realize that we've gotta have both and 16 17 that, in fact, many of the amenities make 18 for good small businesses. So protecting 19 our amenities is incredibly important and 20 we don't do it very well with a number of 21 the amenities we already have. You know, 22 the misters are not working this summer. 23 The camera obscura, although it's one of 24 only five or six in the whole country, 25 it's a prize which we are not using

anymore. And to make Moores Woods the kind of amenity that we all want to see is going to take a great deal of attention that we are not now paying.

And Peggy is absolutely right. I have walked in Moores Woods in the last few days and it is a mess. There's been some recent attention to it with some piles of woods along the side, but, you know, piles of logs are not the solution.

So a great deal of this has to be done. And I appreciate the comments about having volunteers and the Rotary. People who are dedicated to the Rotary do a lot of this work. But I think a lot of this work has to be done by Village staff. And there needs to be somebody who is really paying attention to the maintenance, the amenities, the beautiful things we have here that will be done in a better way, in a more organized and usual way, a function of the Village, itself, not just of well-meaning volunteers. That's my point. Thank you.

3	streamlet that goes all the way out into
4	Pipes Cove. If you follow it, which I
5	have, I've got a few scratches because of
6	it, if you follow it, it goes all the way
7	into the marshes behind Schoen's Dean's
8	place and all the way out to Moores out to
9	Pipes Cove. It is historically what
10	drains our whole area. Greenport used to
11	be much swampier than it is. And I
12	believe that that's part of the history
13	that we should enhance, also. It's not
14	just it's not just nature. It's not
15	just a train. It's a real big part of our
16	history. And the shells are part of it.
17	And also, I mean, we have a great
18	opportunity to tell a bigger story here.
19	I think we should use that as a foundation
20	for what we're doing. Thank you.

Do we want to destroy a 11 tree canopy and disturb unique plants and animals? Do we want to disrupt a quite nature 12 walk area for the community? I don't think any 13 one of us would approve of cutting down trees and installing train tracks and a 6ft chain 14 link fence in Mitchell Park, or Sixth Street Park, or Third Street Park, or 67 Steps, for 15 any reason. How can we call this a Nature Study Area if we are destroying the nature 16 area? The construction alone for this project will be incredibility destructive, please 17 reconsider your plans and relocate the mini-train outside of Moore's Woods. 18 I find it unbelievable that there is nothing 19 on the Village web site about Moore's Woods or its history. There are no signs "Moore's 20 Woods" designating the area as a historic place. There are no signs marking the nature 21 trail or educational material provided. There's no mention of Moore's Woods history in 22 any of the Village and Town surveys or studies. I think we can do better. 23 I understand that plans have been on-going for 24 several years regarding the Mini RR. 11	A History of Moore's Woods
12	"Moore's Woods was given to the Moore family
13	in 1640 by a grant from King James, and thus got its name. Around 1870, Mr. William Moore
14	decided to drain Silver Lake, as around this time Moore's Woods and the surrounding area
15	was a dismal swamp and a great insect problem. He hired laborers from New York City to dig
16	ditches to drain Silver Lake, therefore drying up the woods and relieving the insect problem.
17	Unknown to him, Silver Lake is spring fed, and is impossible to drain. This attempt was known
18	as Moore's Folly. This 200 -acre parcel of land is today owned by the Greenport Water
19	Authority, and is used as a watershed.

22	In 1971 the Greenport High School ecology class was given permission to use the woods
23	and develop it as a nature study area. A project of the ecology and earth science
