23	MAYOR STUESSI: Please be seated. All right.
24	We have some announcements here. First one is that
25	Village Hall will be closed Monday, October 9th in

1	observance of the Indigenous Peoples' and
2	Columbus Day.
3	The Greenport Skate Park Sound and Skate
4	Festival will be held on October 7th, 2023.
5	The Greenport Harbor Brewery Annual Oyster
6	Festival will be held on October 8th of this year.
7	In addition to that, the Halloween Parade
8	will be held on October 28th, with a rain date of
9	October 29th.
10	And jumping ahead very briefly, later on in
11	the meeting, there is going to be a motion to bring
12	back the Maritime Festival on October 21st and
13	22nd, which I'm very excited about holding a vote
14	on this evening.
15	And one more late-breaking item is I see my
16	friend, Don Fisher, back there. We, together with
17	a number of members of the Electrical Department,
18	and another volunteer Don had, managed to get the
19	minitrain out of the electric plant and it is
20	loaded onto the train tracks, the engine and the
21	three cars, and it is stowed away inside its room
22	over there, and we'll be going and testing very
23	soon. So thank you for all of that, Don.

make a motion to open the public meeting to receive 1 2 comments on the following State Liquor Authority application, for Lobby Bar LLC, 30 Front Street, 3 4 Doing Business As Whiskey Wind. May I have a second, please? 5 6 TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Second. MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor? 7 8 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye. TRUSTEE BRENNAN: 9 Aye. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye. 10 11 TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: 12 MAYOR STUESSI: Aye. 13 The motion is open. If the applicants could please stand at the podium. Thank you for being 14 here this evening, gentlemen. This is a relatively 15 16 new process for the Village of Greenport. We've 17 only had one other applicant come in front of us 18 with a proposal for a new liquor license, you guys would be the second. 19 If you could tell us a bit about yourselves 20 21 and the business plans for the Whiskey Wind, which 22 is obviously a longstanding part of the community, that would be appreciated. Answer any questions 23 24 for the Board, and then you could be seated and 25 we'll take any public comment on it. Thank you.

1	PAUL MONAHAN: Great. My name is Paul
2	Monahan, this is Mike Rose.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: And if you'd mind just
4	stating your each of your addresses for the
5	record, too, for the Stenographer.
6	PAUL MONAHAN: Sure.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you.
8	PAUL MONAHAN: I live full time at
9	455 North Road in Greenport, which is a small,
10	little place called the Lin Beach House, next to
11	Kontokosta. I have been here since 2017 full-time.
12	Mike, you've been living where?
13	MIKE ROSE: I live at 2200 Hobart Road in
14	Southold full-time.
15	PAUL MONAHAN: And Mike's been here since
16	2019. I moved to Greenport to start some beverage
17	alcohol businesses in another field. Some friends
18	and I came and fell in love with Greenport and we
19	opened a distillery, which is across from the
20	High School, called Matchbook Distillery, where we
21	buy farm and up-cycle, repurpose a lot of people's
22	waste into alcohol.
23	We needed a place to live, and the
24	ten-year-old kind of defunct Shady Lady, if anybody
25	knows the history of that building, we decided to

take that over, because we found it was challenging to rent a place in Greenport for seven people, which we didn't really think of. And we have since turned that into a year-round Bed and Breakfast, where we rent the first floor out for any private events.

Mike came here in 2019, as a good friend, to help us, I guess, with our energy we needed with these big projects. He's a part-time firefighter in Southold, volunteer, and he is the proprietor of Bogey's Bottled Goods, which if you ever go to in Southold across from the IGA, that's a fabulous neighborhood wine and spirits store.

Mike and I met in 2009. We were opening a hotel lobby bar in Boston, Massachusetts, which is a nostalgic entity name that we decided to create for this. Since then, we've worked in every facet of the liquor industry, even prior to coming here, for distributors, for suppliers. And we fell in love with the North Fork and Greenport and we wanted to make this our home.

And we had always frequented the iconic bar, Whiskey Wind. That's where we celebrated wins in business, our family and loved ones, a place to just grab a beer and watch a game. And when the

1	opportunity came for us as potential buyers, we
2	really looked at what that bar meant to everybody
3	in the Village, what it meant to us personally.
4	And kind of those emotions of nostalgia and
5	beautiful fishing village, very similar to where
6	Mike and I grew up on the south shore of
7	Massachusetts, we really wanted to carry it on as
8	great stewards of what the bar has been and what it
9	intends to be.
10	So we continue to operate it as is, if the
11	opportunity is granted to us, for a year-round
12	great place to come and celebrate all the wins we
13	all have. So I'd appreciate your support, Mike
14	appreciates your support, and we appreciate the
15	consideration.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Are there any questions from
17	the Board?

19	your intentions are to kind of, you know, keep that
20	iconic place, because it is definitely a local

23	that is out of any new operator's control with the
24	New York State Liquor License. You do have to
25	close for a certain amount of time. Mike and

in the system already, if you will, for lack of better words, background checks and fingerprints are already past that introductory applicant phase. And so we'll look to expedite and make sure we're up to code with Suffolk County Health Department with new ownership. And then as soon as that temporary license gets emailed, as they do from your lawyers, that's kind of the best day in the world for anybody who has ever had one of those emails, then we'll open up the doors and welcome everybody in.

MAYOR STUESSI: And what are the plans for

MAYOR STUESSI: And what are the plans for existing staffing and new staffing?

PAUL MONAHAN: Everyone will stay the same. They seem to be very excited about some new energy. And, again, we've been patrons there since we've been here full-time, so they've gotten to know us pretty well.

MAYOR STUESSI: Great. I've certainly enjoyed many times at Whiskey Wind and have been a customer of both of your places.

Do you guys have any open violations with Building Department, Police Department, or any other agencies at either your liquor store or

Motion carries. With that, a couple of 15 16 things in regards to this. This is now our fifth public hearing on this particular item or items, 17 18 the draft rewrite of Chapter 150. We've also had two public information sessions that we worked very 19 20 closely with the Business Improvement District to 21 hold over the past several weeks. We had some 22 great attendance with that, which has been 23 wonderful. 24 We have had two separate iterations of 25 changes to this document over the course of the

life of it now, which started in mid July. So we're now approaching two months with the document. There's been a tremendous amount of public feedback that the Board has listened to. We've heard some important things as part of that. The last changes were on the September 8th draft, which is posted to the website.

With that, there were a couple of items that we heard from a number of people, business owners and their representatives, in the past couple of meetings that there's a belief that we as a Board should make some modifications to this. And some language has been drafted at my request, which was circulated to the Board earlier today. Those two items in particular are making certain and making it abundantly clear in the code that those restaurant uses, which are in Waterfront Commercial, will have no issues with rebuilding in kind off of their existing plans, in the event of some sort of calamity, whether it is a hurricane, flood, fire, or something else. That language we are reviewing with Counsel right now, and we'll publish it here relatively quickly in the -- in the coming days.

Second item was -- and, you know, that's not

having any substantial expansion. So it's really -- if you take the example of one particular restaurant that's, you know, been there for decades, if there is some sort of calamity, there would be no issues with them rebuilding within a time certain.

And what we're talking about looking at is that they have to file a building permit within six months of the event, and then start construction in true due diligence within six months after receiving their building permit on it.

The other item that we heard from a number of people was some concern about the payment in lieu of parking for more, how shall I say, intensive uses, which are the ones that are conditional in the updated code within the CR District. Those are for hotels, motels, new bars, new restaurants of a larger size over 1500 square feet.

And so the proposal that we're taking a look at right now, is to allow, through a variety of options, you could go to the Zoning Board, you can also request a parking study be done that would be specific to that project. And so rather than establishing any type of fees for those larger projects immediately, there would be a parking

1 study that would be commissioned by the owner of 2 the property, if they choose to go down that route. The Village would manage it through the Planning 3 4 Department, and then that would be reviewed as part of the Planning Department application. Again, 5 6 language will be shared here shortly. 7 Are there any comments from the Board on 8 this? I know this is something we've all, you 9 know, heard a lot about in recent meetings and took 10 it to heart. 11 (No Response) 12 MAYOR STUESSI: With that, I will open it up 13 for public comments. Is there anybody that would 14 like to speak? MATTHEW MICHEL: I'll definitely speak. 15 16 MAYOR STUESSI: Please. 17 MATTHEW MICHEL: Matthew Michel, 400 Main Street. I didn't want to be the first here, but here I am. 18 So the question I had first was how do we 19 justify these regulations when looking at all the 20 21 other businesses in town and acknowledging that 22 they don't have any parking? I mean, none of the 23 restaurants have parking. I would say three of 24 them maybe have parking. How are we justifying 25 putting all this on new businesses?

1	MAYOR SIDESSI: So the only new businesses
2	that are required to provide any parking, or a
3	parking study to be provided, are the larger
4	restaurants, bars, and hotels, those conditional
5	uses. Any other new business opening up, whether
6	it's retail or a moderately sized restaurant, a
7	great example would be 409 Main Street, which is
8	about 1,000 square foot of space. If a small if
9	a moderately sized cafe were to go in there, the
10	current code, because it's a change of use, would
11	require some fees for parking as part of it. The
12	new proposal, there are no fees in it whatsoever.
13	Anybody else want to make any comments in
14	regards to this?
15	MATTHEW MICHEL: There's no fees in the new
16	proposal for smaller projects or for
17	MAYOR STUESSI: For any retail or moderately
18	sized restaurants. It's the threshold is 1500
19	square feet or higher.
20	MATTHEW MICHEL: For a for a patron and
21	kitchen area, correct?
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Correct.
23	MATTHEW MICHEL: I mean
24	MAYOR STUESSI: On the ground level. There
25	could be storage downstairs or upstairs without any

1	issue. But as I said a moment ago

4	small? I mean, I was proposing a 1500 square foot
5	kitchen.

9	it's disguised under parking, but, really, I
10	don't I don't know if that's the full reason. I
11	mean, it's just like it's not adding up for me

14	development at this point. I know we've seen it
15	over the last couple of years. What's happened
16	seems to have happened, and now we're trying to put
17	a Band-Aid on it, and I don't really I don't

20	fees, but it feels like just an opportunity to then
21	turn down this bigger project still. So I guess
22	I'll have to read the code, I don't know.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I am a little curious as to why the BID is objecting to this. It does bring people in in October. Maybe the young gentleman that spoke before could kind of give us further explanation, or anybody from the BID Board, because October is not a busy, busy time. We have the Halloween Festival, which -- the Parade, which is the next weekend. But usually October you're looking for some type of events to be here, so I'm

curious as to why you're objecting to this. Could somebody answer that one for me? Considering as a member of the BID, this is the first time I'm hearing about an objection.

KIM LOPER: Kim Loper. I don't think we're objecting. I think we're just saying that there should be a little bit more thought process. And maybe there's a risk that if businesses do -- like restaurants start, you know, buying food again and everything, and then it is another crap weekend, without another rain date set in place.

I personally think it might tarnish the Museum more than the businesses, because I was told that if all the vendors can't -- can't make it, they're going to take the rejected ones. And then if those people come, what's going to happen next year? Are they going to fight over who gets seniority and placement? Like it just doesn't seem like it was thought out completely with the businesses, as well as the vendors, coming up with an arbitrary date after the fact. That's what I think.
